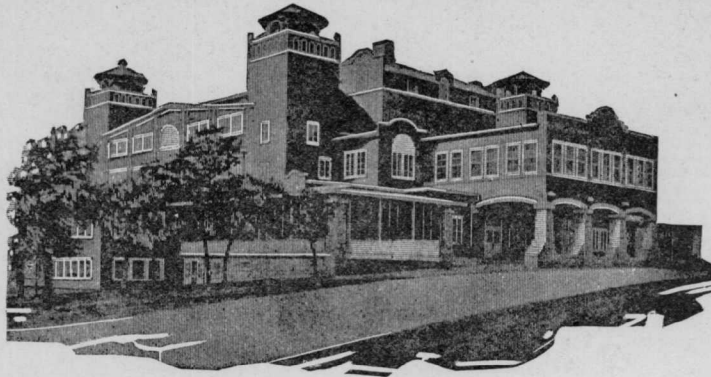

Daily Proceedings

FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION

Opening—The Sixtieth session (being the sixteenth session since the division in 1910) of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the First Methodist Church, Waxahachie, Texas, at 9 o'clock A. M., November 18th, 1925, with Bishop James E. Dickey in the chair. The first hymn sung was "How Firm A Foundation," led by Dr. John M. Barcus. The Bishop then announced Hymn No. 463, "Jesus Lover of My Soul," after the singing of which, the Conference joined the Bishop in reciting the Apostle's Creed. Bishop Dickey led in a fervent prayer. He read a portion of the third chapter of John's Gospel, addressing the Conference from verse sixteen, "God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son."

Roll Call—The secretary of the former session called the roll and 264 members in full connection responded, 14 members of the first year's class, and 8 of the second year, two local preachers who had served as supplies, and 46 lay delegates.

Alternates—The following alternates were seated: Cisco District, W. M. Armstrong in place of Mrs. J. W. Foster; Ft. Worth District, Mrs. W. H. Matthews in place of M. L. Williams, G. A. Henderson not being eligible because not being a member of the Church for a sufficient number of years, C. F. Webb was put in his place; Gatesville District, Mrs. R. W. Helm in place of John M. Grimland, Mrs. W. W. Moss in place of John Weaver; Waco District, Mrs. S. P. Neville in place of A. L. Fiser; Waxahachie District, J. B. Forbes in place of Dewitt Rice, Weatherford District, T. F. Temple in place of J. B. Strain.

Elections—A. D. Porter was elected secretary and on his nomination the following assistants were elected: R. W. Nation, J. M. Bond, R. A. Crosby and M. A. Turner. F. O. Waddill, Statistical Secretary, and J. M. Bond, Editor of the Conference Journal.

F. O. Waddill nominated the following assistant statistical staff who were elected: Horace Poteet, W. B. Morton, A. E. Turney, R. H. Boyd, C. O. Hightower, E. R. Patterson, W. T. Veatch, O. O. Odom, Edmund Heinsohn, W. E. Harrell.

Welcome Address—The pastor host introduced Mr. H. N. Peters of Waxahachie who delivered a welcome address, to which Bishop Dickey fittingly responded.

Hours of Meeting and Adjourning—On motion of G. W. Shearer, the hour for meeting was set for 9:00 A. M., and for adjournment at 12:00 M.

Bar of the Conference—The main auditorium was designated as the bar of the Conference.

Visitors—The following visitors were introduced: Dr. T. D. Ellis, secretary of the Church Extension Board; Dr. E. H. Rawlings, secretary of the Board of Missions; Dr. J. W. Shackford, General S. S. Secretary; Rev. Geo. F. Fair, of the Northwest Texas Conference; Dr. A. J. Moore, pastor of Travis Park, San Antonio; Dr. H. D. Knickerbocker, P. E. of the Dallas District, North Texas Conference; Dr. C. C. Selecman, president of S. M. U.; Rev. D. L. Coale, General Evangelist; Rev. E. R. Barcus and O. T. Cooper of the North Texas Conference; Dr. J. Sam Barcus, president of Southwestern University; Dr. Frank S. Onderdonk, Superintendent of the Mexican work in Texas; Rev. E. R. Stanford, president of Westmoorland College, San Antonio; Dr. J. E. Harrison, of the Arizona Conference.

Resolution—Thomas S. Barcus offered the following resolution which

was adopted: "Resolved, that eleven thirty o'clock be fixed as the hour for taking the vote on the pending plan of Unification under the order of the General Conference, and that the vote be by ballot, without debate, and that the vote be immediately followed by the first ballot for delegates to the General Conference,

"Resolved further, That when we adjourn at noon today, it be to meet at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, to continue balloting for delegates for the General Conference.

Transfer Ir.—In answer to question 9, the Bishop read the name of J. W. Leggett, as received by transfer from the Northwest Texas Conference.

Second Year Class—The names of the following were called, their characters passed and they were continued in the class of the second year: Charles W. Ferguson, A. L. Long, J. I. Patterson.

Full Connection—Answering question 6, "Who are admitted into full connection?" the names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they having passed approved examinations and been recommended by the Committee on Admissions, were called to the bar of the Conference and after giving satisfactory answers to the disciplinary questions, and after a brief but valuable address by the Bishop, were by a unanimous vote received into full connection: Edmund Heisohn, Thomas Marvin McBrayer, Frank L. Turner, Robert Henry Price, Clarence O. Boatman, Eustace R. Gordon, David R. McCauley, Paul W. Utley, Jos. L. Chunn, Joseph S. Cook, Alvin S. Gafford, and Thomas Wesley Hook.

The name of Henry P. Watkins was called, his character passed, and he was advanced to the class of the third year, being in orders.

T. W. Hook was passed from the first to the second and from the second to the third year class.

Vote on Unification—The hour for the vote on Unification having arrived, the Bishop suggested that the roll be called and each member stand and cast his ballot. This suggestion was made the order by unanimous vote of the Conference.

The following tellers were appointed: J. W. Bergin, C. H. Booth, W. M. Rader, J. W. Fort, H. L. Munger, and W. B. Andrews. The roll was called and the tellers received the votes.

General Conference Delegates Election—Voting for the delegates for the General Conference was begun. Tellers appointed for the lay delegates were W. E. Williams, and W. W. Lastinger; D. K. Porter was appointed as their secretary.

The clerical tellers were: Alonzo Monk, Jr., J. W. W. Shuler, W. H. Matthews, J. E. Crawford; with R. A. Crosby and Homer T. Fort as secretaries.

The first ballot was spread.

Adjournment—After sundry announcements, Bishop DuBose was presented to the Conference, pronounced the benediction, and the Conference was adjourned.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening—The Conference met pursuant to adjournment at 2:30 P. M. Bishop Dickey in the chair.

Mr. Charles F. Eden and Mrs. Ethel Eden Spinks favored the Con-

ference with two beautiful duets, after which Rev. E. F. Boone led in prayer.

Minutes—The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Result of Clerical Ballot—The first vote for clerical delegates was announced. 257 votes cast, 129 necessary to elect. F. P. Culver received 175; E. B. Hawk received 168; J. E. Crawford, 155; C. H. Booth, 152; J. W. Bergin, 133; and were declared elected.

S. A. Ashburn moved that no vote be counted unless it contained the proper number of names to be voted for. The motion was unanimously adopted.

Result of Lay Ballot—The first ballot for lay delegates was announced as follows: 73 votes cast. 37 necessary to a choice. W. W. Lastinger received 50; W. S. Rowland, 46; B. F. Cherry, 43; Mrs. E. W. Kimble, 42; Leake Ayers, 42; A. K. Doss, 40; J. W. Mitchell, 40; and these seven were declared elected.

Result of Vote on Unification—The vote on the Plan of Unification was announced: Votes cast, 344; for the plan, 162; against the plan, 182.

Second Ballot on Delegates—The ballot was spread for the second clerical vote, and also for the second lay, the Bishop charging that three names be written on the ballot for the clerical and one on the lay.

Presiding Elders' Reports—Question 21. "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?" the names of the following presiding elders were called and they reported for their respective districts and their characters passed: A. D. Porter, L. A. Webb, O. F. Sensabaugh, John M. Barcus, F. P. Culver, C. E. Lindsey, Sam G. Thompson, C. R. Wright, E. B. Hawk, S. J. Rucker.

Second Lay Ballot Result—The result of the second lay ballot was announced. 71 votes cast; 36 necessary to a choice. No election.

Standing Committees—S. J. Rucker read the report of the Presiding Elders nominating the Standing Committees, which was adopted. (See Committees).

Third Lay Ballot Result—The third ballot for lay delegates as announced showed 66 votes cast, 34 necessary to election. No choice.

Commission on Budget—W. B. Andrews nominated J. W. Fort to take the place of L. A. Webb on the Commission on Budget, and it was ordered.

Communications—Various communications were at this time referred to the respective Boards and Committees.

Fourth Lay Ballot Result—The result of the fourth ballot for lay delegates showed 70 votes cast, 36 necessary to a choice. And W. Erskine Williams receiving 37 votes was declared elected.

Alternates—On motion of F. P. Culver, it was ordered that four alternates for the clerical and four for the lay delegates be elected.

Dr. T. D. Ellis—Dr. T. D. Ellis, General Secretary of the Church Extension Board made a short statement to the Conference on his leave-taking.

Second Clerical Ballot—Second clerical ballot was reported. 254 votes cast, 128 necessary to elect, and O. F. Sensabaugh receiving 130, was declared elected.

Superannuate Endowment—Dr. Arthur J. Moore, of San Antonio, represented briefly the Superannuate Endowment Fund.

Leave of Absence—E. M. Dailey was granted leave of absence because of illness in his family.

Supernumerary—Question 21 was continued and the names of the following were called, their characters passed and they were referred to the Committee on Conference Relation for the Supernumerary Relation: T. W. Ellis, J. D. Smoot, C. S. Field, J. R. B. Hall, J. Fred Patterson, A. T. Culbertson.

The name of B. E. Kimbrow was called and his character passed.

Arrival of Delegate—The presence of F. F. Downs, a lay delegate from the Georgetown District, was noted.

Location—Question 11, "Who are located this year?" was called and L. G. White was granted location at his written request.

Superannuate—Question 21 was again resumed. The names of the following were called, their characters passed and they were referred to the Committee for the superannuate relation: H. P. Shrader, J. G. Pollard, D. C. Ellis, W. V. Jones, E. M. Sweet, J. M. McCarter, V. J. Millis, C. V. Oswalt, J. J. Rape, W. K. Simpson, E. F. Boone.

Third Clerical Ballot Result—The third ballot was announced. 222 votes cast; 112 necessary to elect, and P. E. Riley receiving 131 and Sam G. Thompson receiving 114, were declared elected.

The ballot was then taken for four clerical alternates.

Lay Alternate—The first vote for lay alternates was announced resulting in the election of A. G. Adair.

The ballot was then spread for three alternates.

Memoirs—The name of J. C. Carter was called and his name referred to the Committee on Memoirs.

Superannuate—Question 21 was resumed, and the names of the following were called and their characters passed and they were referred to the Committee for the Superannuate relation: E. B. Chenoweth, I. F. Harris.

On suggestion of J. W. Bergin, a collection was taken for I. F. Harris, resulting in \$122.85, which was turned over to him and a receipt taken by the secretary.

Lay Alternates—The announced result of the second balloting for lay alternates was 55 votes cast, 26 necessary to elect, and H. B. Furr and Mrs. H. B. Clark receiving 36 and 32 votes respectively were elected.

The ballot was spread for one lay alternate.

Clerical Alternates—The ballot for clerical alternates came in as follows: 186 votes cast; necessary to elect, 94. E. Hightower received 103 and was elected; A. D. Porter, 99, and was declared elected.

The second ballot for clerical alternates was spread.

Lay Alternates—The third vote for lay alternates resulted in the election of T. F. Temple, he receiving 40 of the 53 votes cast.

Arrival of Delegate—The presence of J. H. Farmer, lay delegate from the Corsicana District, was noted.

On motion of W. M. Rader another vote was ordered taken before adjournment.

Superannuate—Question 21 resumed again, and the names of the following were called and their characters passed and their names were referred to the Committee for the superannuate relation: F. L. McGehee, A. C. Lackey, N. E. Gardner; J. E. Walker, B. A. Snoddy, B. A. Evans, W. H. Crawford, C. W. Macune, W. A. Gilleland, H. B. Henry, C. Rowland, M. M. Morphis, R. L. Reese, C. W. Daniel, and Horace Bishop.

Devotional—A motion was offered by W. C. Hilburn, that the period from 8:30 to 9:00 in the morning, be devoted to a season of prayer, led by J. H. Stewart, and the motion was adopted.

Adjournment—Numerous announcements were made, the doxology was sung and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by W. H. Crawford.

SECOND DAY, THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION

Opening—The morning devotional service began at 8:30 under the leadership of Rev. J. H. Stewart, who read Acts 13:2 as the basis of his remarks.

At nine o'clock Bishop Dickey called the Conference to order, and Bishop H. M. DuBose read the First Chapter of Phillipians, making important comments thereon, after which he led the Conference in prayer.

Minutes—The minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved.

Roll Call—The roll of absentees was called. (See roll). Further calling of the roll was dispensed with on motion of John M. Barcus.

Alternate—R. W. Tinsley was seated in place of Paul Matthews from the Georgetown District.

Arrival of Delegate—The presence of M. L. Williams, principal delegate from the Ft. Worth District was noted and he took his seat.

Second Clerical Ballot Result—The result of the second ballot for alternates was announced showing the election of S. J. Rucker, who received 66 votes, and E. W. Potter, who received 63 votes of the 123 cast.

Dr. R. H. Bennett—Dr. R. H. Bennett was presented and addressed the Conference on Christian Education.

Arrival—The presence of J. Fred Patterson was noted.

Introductions—The following were introduced to the Conference: Dr. R. W. Adams, of the Texas Conference; Rev. Jesse L. Thompson, of the Texas Conference; Dr. G. S. Slover, of the Northwest Texas Conference; Rev. Glenn Flinn, of the Texas Conference; J. Leonard Ray of the West Texas Conference; Rev. J. O. Leath, Dean of Texas Woman's College; Rev. J. E. Roach, W. Harrison Baker, T. M. Jones, C. L. Bowen, R. E. Porter, and R. F. Shinn, all of the North Texas Conference.

Bishop John M. Moore was presented and greeted the Conference.

Board of Missions—Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions was read by Alonzo Monk, Jr. Dr. E. H. Rawlings spoke to the report, as also did Bishop Dickey.

Subscriptions Taken—A subscription was taken toward the securing of \$36,000 on the \$750,000 now so badly needed by the Board of Missions, and for \$4,000 for aid in the drouth stricken area of the Central Texas Conference. The pledges amounted to \$27,000.

Thomas S. Barcus moved that the presiding elders be ordered to prorate the askings among the charges of the Districts. The motion was laid on the table, by a motion offered by A. D. Porter. Alonzo Monk, Jr., read a portion of the report and spoke to same. T. D. Ellis, J. W. W. Shuler and J. W. Fort spoke to the report. G. W. Shearer rose to a point of privilege. On motion of E. B. Hawk, the report was temporarily tabled. The time was extended.

Place of Next Meeting—On motion of E. W. Potter, the selection of the next place of meeting was made the order of the day for 10 o'clock Friday morning.

Adjournment—Numerous announcements were made, the doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by R. W. Adams.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Opening—Conference met at 9 o'clock with Bishop Dickey in the chair. Dr. R. C. Armstrong read the 12th chapter of Romans and led in prayer.

Minutes—The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Introductions—The following were introduced to the Conference: Mr. John W. Barton, of the Publishing House; H. K. Agge, of the North Texas Conference; W. E. Lyon, of the Northwest Texas Conference; J. W. Hunt, President of McMurry College; and Dean E. D. Jennings, of Southern Methodist University.

Alternate Seated—Mrs. C. E. Lindsey was seated as alternate in place of T. P. Hord of the Gatesville District.

Publishing House—Mr. John Wynne Barton spoke, representing the interests of the Publishing House.

Lay Activities—J. E. Crawford addressed the Conference in the interest of Lay Activities.

Selection of Next Meeting Place—Question 4, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" was called. E. W. Potter nominated First Church, Corsicana; C. H. Booth and A. A. Allison seconded Corsicana; and Corsicana was chosen by a unanimous vote.

Texas Christian Advocate—Dr. G. S. Slover spoke representing the Texas Christian Advocate.

Southern Methodist University—Dr. C. C. Sealeman, president of S. M. U. represented that institution, and emphasized the importance of the payment of the Educational Pledges.

Southwestern University—Dr. Sam J. Barcus, president of Southwestern University, discussed the plans on which that University is conducted.

Introductions—Rev. W. H. McKinsie, pastor of the local Baptist Church; Rev. E. S. Bledsoe, pastor of the local Christian Church; and Dr. J. W. Mills of the Texas Conference were introduced to the Conference.

Texas Woman's College—Dr. H. E. Stout, spoke briefly of the work of Texas Woman's College.

Junior Colleges—Major J. S. Cook, president of Meridian College, and Prof. R. G. Boger, president of Weatherford College, represented their respective institutions.

Property Protection—Rev. Ed R. Wallace of the Northwest Texas Conference, was introduced and explained a certain plan for the protection of church property, after which P. E. Riley moved that a Committee on Memorials to the General Conference be appointed to which the Wallace Plan be referred. The motion prevailed, and the chair appointed J. W. Fort, W. M. Rader, E. Hightower, W. B. Andrews and A. W. Hall to constitute the committee.

Law Enforcement—Atticus Webb spoke on the question of enforcement of the prohibition law. On motion of W. B. Andrews the time was extended.

Sunday School Work—E. Hightower, Assistant Editor of the Sunday School literature, represented the General S. S. work.

A. & M. Work—Rev. Jesse C. Thompson, student pastor at A. & M. represented his work at that state institution.

Adjournment—After a number of announcements, the doxology was sung and W. B. Andrews pronounced the benediction.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY MORNING SESSION

Opening—The Conference was called to order by Bishop Dickey, at the hour set for the morning session. "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing," was sung, and J. W. W. Shuler read a few verses from the 21st and 22nd Chapters of the Book of Revelation, and led the Conference in prayer.

Minutes—The secretary read the minutes of the Friday morning session and they were approved.

Presentation—J. W. W. Shuler presented a copy of the Holy Bible as a gift of love and appreciation from the preachers of the Weatherford District to S. J. Rucker, the retiring presiding elder of that District, to which he fittingly responded. The Bishop commended the spirit of such a deed that contained within it a whiff of the roses.

Admission on Trial—Question No. 1, "Who are admitted on trial?" The following coming properly recommended from their respective Districts and having passed satisfactory examinations upon the approved course of study and being recommended by the committee on Admissions, were admitted on trial, namely: Cisco District, Austin Carl Hallsell, James Thomas Gardner; Ft. Worth District, Leslie W. Seymour, Floyd E. Johnson, Floyd W. Trash; Georgetown District, Arthur G. Standlee; Waco District, J. D. F. Williams, Ernest W. Swearingen; Waxahachie District, Hubert C. Smith; Weatherford District, C. R. Hooton, Charles H. Sisserson.

First Year Class—Question 3, "Who remain on trial?" The names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were advanced to the class of the second year: Melvin A. Walker, Roy L. Transfer Out—The name of E. L. Hill (in orders) was called, his character passed, and the Bishop announced his transfer to the Northwest Texas Conference.

Leave of Absence—Leave of absence was granted to J. D. Knoy.

Deacons' Orders—Question 17, "What traveling preachers are elected deacons?" Edmund Heinsohn, Thomas M. McBrayer, Frank L. Turner, Robert Henry Price, Clarence O. Boatman, Eustace R. Gordon, David R. McCauley, Paul W. Utley, Joseph Singleton Cook, Alvin S. Gafford, and T. Wesley Hook. Their names were called, their characters passed, and they were elected deacons.

"What local preachers are elected deacons?" Roy L. Crawford, W. D. Richards, J. T. Casey, of the Brownwood District; James T. Gardner,

of the Cisco District; James A. Irvin, of the Cleburne District; Uel D. Crosby, from the Ft. Worth District; John Barton Bailey, Waco District; Wm. Kenneth Pope, Waxahachie District.

Elders' Orders—"What traveling preachers are elected elders?" Sam A. Billingsley, R. E. Briggs, H. W. Gaston, Floyd Hollingsworth, A. G. Hulme, Earle Page, James L. Ray, Ernest Roper, Philip L. Shuler, Wm. F. Smith, H. DeWitt Tucker, Clarence Edward Wade, Robert L. Butler, E. M. Dailey, James W. Culwell, Wm. C. Ferguson, J. C. Grimes, Ralph Eugene Nollner. All their names were called, their characters passed and they were elected elders.

Fourth Year—The names of A. J. Helms, G. G. Smith, and T. J. Justice were called, their characters passed and they remained in the fourth year.

Local Elder—I. R. Darwood, a local deacon from the Corsicana District was elected an elder.

Presentation—D. L. Collie called the superannuates to the chancel and presented each one of them a crisp five dollar bill as the gift from a layman of the Waxahachie Church, through the pastor, G. W. Shearer.

Vote of Thanks—A rising vote of thanks was extended to the generous donor and to the ladies of the local church for their kindness in furnishing meals free to the superannuates and their wives.

Discontinued—Question 5, "Who are discontinued?" Answer: S. E. Frost, Jr.

Readmission—Question 8, "Who are readmitted?" Answer: No one.

Transfer In—Question 9, "Who are received by transfer from other Conferences?" W. H. Coleman from the New Mexico Conference.

Preachers from Other Churches—Question 10, "Who are received from other churches as traveling preachers?" No one was the answer.

Withdrawal—Question 12, "Who have withdrawn or been expelled?" Answer: No one.

Memoirs—Question 14, "What preachers have died during the year?" Answer: J. C. Carter, R. J. Tooley, and K. S. Vanzant. Their names were referred to the Committee on Memoirs.

Resolution—Horace Bishop offered a resolution concerning sister Mollie Cox, widow of the sainted J. Fred Cox, requesting that she be invited to sit within the bar of the Conference, and the resolution was adopted. The resolution is as follows:

Resolved; That it was a joy to the Conference to see on the first morning of this session, Mrs. Mollie Cox, widow of Rev. J. Fred Cox, and the only surviving charter member of this body. We would have been glad to have her present at each session and sitting within the bar of this Conference as an honored member. Inasmuch as her health has not permitted her to attend other sessions, we express our regrets and send her cordial greetings and trust that her remaining years may be blessed with the presence and power of God, and all the comforts of the gospel that sustained her and her sainted husband during the struggles of pioneer life, and the victories of faith during their whole pilgrimage.

Smith, and G. W. Kincheloe.

W. H. Crawford rose to a point of personal privilege.

Characters Passed—Question 21 was continued, and all the preachers whose names had not been previously called, were called one by one and their characters passed.

When the name of J. N. Rentfro was called, E. M. Edwards, a man living in the bounds of the Georgetown District, arose and stated that he charged J. N. Rentfro with heresy.

The Bishop read paragraph 730 of the Book of Discipline and stated that the Presiding Elder, Sam G. Thompson, had looked into the matter carefully and found absolutely nothing in the charge. Whereupon the Conference by unanimous vote passed J. N. Rentfro's character.

Hospital Report—W. Erskine Williams read the report of the Trustees of the Methodist Hospital. W. H. Matthews spoke to the report. F. P. Culver offered the amendment fixing Easter Sunday as Hospital Day. The amendment was lost. E. B. Hawk, G. W. Shearer, Thomas S. Barcus and J. W. W. Shuler spoke to the amendment. The report was adopted. B. F. Alsop moved that Mother's Day be set as the Hospital Day.

W. B. Wilson and J. W. Bergin spoke to the motion. C. R. Wright rose to a point of order that this discussion was out of order because the paper left the fixing of the Hospital Day with the Commissioner. The point was not well taken.

J. W. Fort, T. F. Temple and C. H. Booth spoke to the motion. W. B. Wilson arose to explain that the Old Peoples Home was the property of Southern Methodism and not simply of the North Texas Conference. The Alsop motion was carried by a vote of 106 to 76, the report was adopted and follows:

HOSPITAL BOARD

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference in session at Waxahachie, Texas, November 18th, A. D., 1925:

When the future historians of the Central Texas Conference shall read the journals, perhaps the reports of no Boards shall be quite so inspiring as the reports of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Hospital.

At the meeting of the Annual Conference one year ago, the concrete and steel frame of the Hospital Building had reached the fourth floor. That part of the work was completed so that we now have a great nine story roof and frame construction entirely completed and the stone and brick and terra-cotta is now up to the third floor. The work continued with little interruption until July 1st, on which day the Board held a meeting in the Hospital Building and after the meeting, laid the corner-stone. The corner-stone laying was an impressive program, Dr. F. P. Culver, in the absence of the President, presiding. The stone was laid under the auspices of the Grand Lodge A. F. A. M. of the State of Texas, with Hon. Fritz G. Lanham the orator of the day.

At the meeting on July 1st, it was found that the contract for the total exterior of the building, had not been more than one-half completed with a large amount of material on hand and only one-half of the contract price paid. In view of this circumstance, there was nothing to do not postpone work until additional money was received or plans

made to secure money. However, work was continued until about September 1st.

Some \$25,000.00 has been paid in since July 1st, and we are glad to say that the banks of Fort Worth have now agreed to loan as a temporary loan, a sufficient sum to enable the contractors to go forward with the present contract which will complete the exterior building. The Board unanimously agreed that if the banks would make this temporary loan secured by the pledges, that the Board would proceed immediately to complete a sufficient part of the building so that one hundred beds and the operating rooms may be put into operation. This action upon the part of the Board will be taken not later than the completion of the present contract and upon re-payment to the banks of the amount borrowed. All of this is, in the opinion of the Board, most encouraging. We confidently believe that this Conference and all of its agencies pledged to this great work will prove faithful that we may have a completion of this great enterprise.

The assessment that you have made for the Hospital Commissioner and the expenses of the Board have not only left the actual pledges to the Hospital to be used for the building, but the moral effect has been very fine; in that all who have made pledges have been assured that the expenses of the promotion of the Hospital were being paid by your assessment. The assessment of \$7,500.00 is scarcely enough for this promotion work and we would like to have a larger appropriation, but in view of the claims of other Boards of the Church, we only make a request for an assessment of this amount and trust that by no means will you reduce this sum.

A report from the General Hospital Board shows that we have made most encouraging development of the Hospital movement in our Church. In 1920, when the question was raised for the first time in reference to the building of a Hospital in the Central Texas Conference, there was within the bounds of the Southern Methodist Church only two Hospitals. This report from the General Board shows that we now have the following Hospitals in successful operation:

- (1) Wesley Memorial Hospital, Atlanta, Georgia.
- (2) Barnes Hospital, St. Louis, Missouri.
- (3) Methodist Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee.
- (4) Methodist Hospital, Houston, Texas.
- (5) Methodist Hospital, Hattiesburg, Mississippi.
- (6) Montgomery Memorial Hospital, Montgomery, Alabama.
- (7) Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington, Kentucky.

We believe that a hospital policy has now been inaugurated that will help us to obey the command of Jesus to "HEAL THE SICK."

The terms of office of several members of our Board expire with this Conference year and we nominate and recommend for re-election the following as members of the Board: L. A. Webb, J. H. Stewart, T. B. Yarbrough, F. F. Downs, H. N. Peters, F. P. Culver, and W. R. Walker, and in place of J. E. Hickman, resigned, we nominate and recommend for election C. B. Frost of Eastland, Texas.

We have elected W. H. Matthews as Hospital Commissioner and request the Bishop to appoint him to this work for the next Conference year.

RESOLVED: 1st. That we re-affirm our purpose and pledge made at Weatherford in November, 1922, to raise in the Central Texas Conference outside of Fort Worth District, \$500,000.00 for the Methodist Hospital at Fort Worth.

RESOLVED: 2nd. That the Organizations of the Conference, District and Church, already provided for under the general direction of the Board of Trustees and Hospital Commissioner, speed up the work as much as possible, and continue it until the entire quotas of Districts and Churches are secured in pledges and are paid in full.

RESOLVED: 3rd. That we set aside the month of April as a special period of time for an intensive campaign for the completion of the pledges, and especially for cash to meet the emergency in completing the present contract.

RESOLVED: 4th. That we call upon all the forces in the Church to co-operate with the Sunday School and Epworth League in making "Hospital Day", which is to be named later by the Hospital Commissioner, a great day for hospital education and for securing offerings for the Children's Department of the Hospital.

RESOLVED: 5th. That we endorse the plans of the Board, providing for memorial rooms in the Hospital, and that we also endorse the plan of the Board to ask individuals, Churches, Sunday Schools, Sunday School Classes and Missionary Societies and Epworth Leagues to furnish rooms in the Hospital.

RESOLVED: 6th. That all our Pastors be requested to preach on the subject of the "Hospital and Nurse Training", and the Woman's Missionary Societies and Epworth Leagues be requested to have this subject discussed in all Conference and District Meetings.

Whereas, Bishop James E. Dickey is now completing a quadrennium as President of the Central Texas Conference, we desire to give our high appreciation of the splendid service he has rendered among us. Both by his rare eloquence in the pulpit and by his unfailing courtesy and his tender and thoughtful consideration of his brethren, he has won a large and abiding place in all our hearts. We would also include in this expression Mrs. Dickey, whose queenly, gracious womanhood, so beautifully adorns and complements his great ministry as one of our Chief Superintendents. FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening—Conference met pursuant to adjournment at 2:30 P. M. with W. B. Andrews in the chair. M. K. Little conducted the devotional exercises, reading a portion of the 7th chapter of Luke. The Conference sang one verse of "Jesus Keep Me Near the Cross." Brother Little led in prayer.

Memorial Session—On motion of E. F. Boone, 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon was fixed as the hour for the memorial session.

District Conference Records—The report of the Committee on District Conference Records was read by C. W. Irvin and was adopted. It follows below:

Temperance and Social Service—Report No. 1 of the Committee on Temperance and Social Service was read by T. F. Temple. H. B. Watts moved to amend by striking out "Mother's Day" and inserting "some suitable Sunday." The amendment was adopted. The report was discussed by J. W. Fort, J. D. Hendrickson, J. W. Bergin, H. B. Watts and C. H. Booth, and it was adopted. It follows below:

REPORT No. 1 OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference in Session at Waxahachie, November 18, 1925.

Dear Brethren:

We, your Board of Temperance and Social Service, beg leave to submit the following report:

First. We are gratified to report that the C. C. Young Memorial Home for the Aged is still on the way to a glorious realization. The whole property has been deeded over to the Church in fee simple, and the charter revised to a fac simile of that of Southern Methodist University.

We rejoice that the nearly two hundred applicants for shelter and raiment at the hands of our Church will soon be considered for immediate relief and the reproach of our negligence be removed.

We again recommend that some suitable day be observed as a memorial to this home and on this day an offering be taken for the same.

We commend the election of the Rev. W. B. Wilson as agent for the home and bespeak for him a kindly consideration from both pastors and people of our great Conference.

Second. We recommend a continuance of the appropriation of \$3,000 for the coming year to the Mission Home and Training School at San Antonio.

Third. We recognize the Woman's Christian Temperance Union as a great force in this country for the creation of temperance sentiment and the diffusion of specific knowledge as to the evil effects, both physical and moral, of alcoholism in general, and we particularly commend the untiring work they have done through the years and are now doing for the children and youth of our great country along the lines of temperance and respect for law.

We also urge those who have the instruction of our children before them to keep these matters in mind; whether in the Sunday school, public school, Epworth League, or Woman's Missionary Society.

Fourth. For one hundred years Methodism has been the uncompromising foe of the liquor traffic, and so far as we are concerned, there will be no let up in this fight until the outlawed traffic makes an unconditional surrender to the mandates of our Government. We denounce as unworthy of membership in our Church those citizens who by patronizing the bootleggers not only debauch themselves and trample under foot the Constitution of our nation, but also are contributing to the war chest of out-lawed criminals of the worst sort in their war against the Government.

We denounce as an insult to our Government, the statement that our authorities can never enforce this law. And say that if those in charge of governmental affairs do not enforce it, they are traitors to their country. Many men, and some women, seeking office by vote of our people, loudly proclaim that they are prohibitionists, but when elected they seem to forget every campaign pledge. We notify all such, that we will judge them by the acts of their administration, and not by their high profession.

Through the legislation passed and approved by the administration now in power in Texas, by the character of some of its appointees, and by the wholesale pardoning of criminals, a very large per cent of whom

are boot-leggers, respect for law in our State has received a severe blow.

We declare that no one who drinks liquor, or otherwise violates the laws of our country, or who, having taken the oath of office to enforce all laws in our State impartially, failing to do so, is unworthy of our respect as loyal American citizens; and that any Methodist who continues to vote for such has broken faith with his Church.

For years the Anti-Saloon League has been the instrument of all the Evangelical Churches in our common fight against this enemy of mankind. Its past record inspires our confidence in its ability to lead us in this fight to a glorious end. But, our Churches are failing in their duty to render that adequate financial support necessary to enable it to win. We urge upon our pastors and official boards to render a more hearty cooperation with the League than has been done since the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment.

We commend the movement of the League to organize the Christian vote in each community, the local organization of the Laymen's Official Leagues, and commend the arrangement whereby our own Brother W. M. Rader is to have charge of this work under the direction of the Anti-Saloon League, and pledge him our loyal support.

We heartily endorse Rev. Atticus Webb, of our own Conference, for his efficient, wise, and progressive administration of the affairs of the Anti-Saloon League of the State and able editorials of the "Home and State." We pledge our wholehearted support to him and his co-workers in the crucial fight before them.

We request Bishop Dickey and his cabinet to appoint Atticus Webb as Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas, and W. M. Rader as superintendent of organization work of the same.

Fifth. We request the Epworth League Conference, at Lake Worth, to incorporate a Temperance Course in its annual program.

Sixth. We deplore the disposition on the part of some of the public press to publish puns, slurs, and flings which tend to break down our temperance laws; and respectfully request the Associated Press to publish this paragraph of our report.

Seventh. We urge upon the motion picture people the duty of excluding from their programs all pictures whose tendency is to break down and destroy chastity, and slur Christianity, and prohibition, and commend them for all efforts made toward reform.

THEREFORE, be it resolved, That this Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, representing a membership of more than 90,000, in annual Conference assembled does hereby endorse Senate Resolution 5, without any amendment or change, providing for the immediate entry of the United States into the World Court; and urge our Senators to exert their influence in every proper way to secure its enactment.

We instruct our Secretary to send a copy of this resolution to each of our two United States Senators.

The assessments for Conference Work are \$100 less than for last year. The assessment of \$500 for Lay Activities for last year was not approved for this year. The assessment for Conference Entertainment is \$2,400 this year, an increase of \$400.

The assessments for General Work total \$3,338 more than for last year. This is for General Conference expense. The Board of Apportionment failed to send us the increased assessment of \$1,744 for last year. Therefore last years amount is added to this year's assessments for each district except for the Weatherford District, which assessed its share, \$150 last year. These amounts are added after the division is made according to the scale and therefore the totals do not balance with the figures according to the scale.

Lay Activities—The report of the Board of Lay Activities was amended on motion of W. M. Rader, striking out the assessment of \$500.00 called for in the report so that it would conform to the decision of the Commission of Budget. The report, as amended, was adopted, and follows below:

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference, in session at Waxahachie, November 18th, 1925:

The Conference Board of Lay Activities and the Conference Lay Leader make the following report to this Annual Conference:

The work of the Conference Board of Lay Activities is not a spectacular work. Its work is perhaps to be understood as the silent leaven that leavens the whole.

And yet the Conference Board of Lay Activities should be, and we believe in this Conference is, a promotion board and yet promoters who are successful in their enterprises should be lost sight of in the success of the enterprises.

We believe that under the influence of the Conference and General Boards of Lay Activities, that an increasing number of men and women are giving of their time and money to the work of the Church, and that in an increasing larger number of Churches, that there is an active group of members who really want to carry on the program of the Church.

At the last meeting of the General Board, two outstanding and comprehensive lines of work were undertaken. One to develop a Stewardship conscience and the other to conserve the efforts and develop the fellowship of our men, by uniting them in Brotherhoods.

In order to accomplish these purposes, the General Board of Lay Activities agreed to raise, without any public call upon the Church, a sufficient fund to secure the services of two men, experts in their line of work, to go forward with these developments until the meeting of the General Conference. Rev. J. E. Crawford, of our own Conference, is the man secured for the development of a Stewardship program and we are sure that you will agree with us that no more capable man could be found. Mr. F. T. Barnett, a most attractive and interesting speaker, who had been offered another important post by our Church, agreed to accept the place as Wesley Brotherhood Secretary, and has already had large success in the organization of Brotherhoods.

The General Board of Lay Activities is arranging for fifteen Regional Conferences on Christian Stewardship and Brotherhood Work. Mr. William Ward, President, and Sir Richard Winfrey, Treasurer of the World Brotherhood Federation, two most distinguished citizens of Great Britain, will come to the United States in January and speak at these great Conferences. One of these Conferences, being the one for North Texas, will be held in February and we trust that you will use every endeavor to promote the purpose and the attendance upon the Conference to be held at Dallas, and that you will set as a minimum for attendance one delegate from each Church.

There will be held in each District, as soon as practical, after the close of this session of the Annual Conference, a District meeting under the auspices of this Board, in which a prominent place will be given to the discussion of the Christian Education movement. There shall be the heartiest co-operation between this Board and the Conference Board of Education, not only in these meetings, but in every way, to create a sentiment favorable to the redeeming of the pledges made to the Christian Education movement.

As to the Conference work, it is still the desire of our Board to assist in every way to carry out the objects as heretofore outlined that the time may soon come when all salaries and assessments shall be paid in full and that we shall never be satisfied until all possible payments are made on Centenary Education, Superannuate Endowment and Hospital pledges.

We are glad to report that our Conference Lay Leader had a most interesting and successful trip to the Mission Fields and that the Manual of the Board has been translated into Japanese, Korean, Chinese and Russian and that Conference Lay Leaders have been elected for all of the Conferences in the Orient.

Memorials—On motion of W. M. Rader, certain memorials to the General Conference were referred to the Committee on Memorials, and one memorial read by M. A. Turner took the same course. The Committee on Memorials was permitted to retire.

Report No. 1 of Board of Missions—Alonzo Monk, Jr., moved that Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions be taken from the table. The motion carried. After discussion, the report was adopted as revised, and follows below:

REPORT No. 1 OF BOARD OF MISSIONS

To the Presiding Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference: Brethren:

Believing that the present missionary situation is but another call of God to our Church, and that the amount of money needed at this time is but another opportunity to prove our loyalty to our Christ, and to those missionaries laboring in near and remote fields, be it therefore resolved by this Conference:

1. That we shall gladly endeavor to raise within the next three or four months, in addition to all present assessments for missions, forty thousand dollars, ninety per cent of which will be our free-will offering to the fund of \$750,000.00 now needed by our General Board of Missions for the prosecution of its work. It is understood that all Missionary Specials now being carried by individuals, organizations, or churches, save specials by Sunday Schools and Leagues, shall apply on this fund. Ten per cent shall be used in our Conference as an Emergency Fund to relieve the situation caused by the drought. All money, not to be applied on Specials, when collected is to pass thru the hands of the Conference Treasurer, who keeps ten per cent for the Conference Emergency Fund and sends ninety per cent to the General Board for General Maintenance Fund.

2. That this move is in no sense to be interpreted as a distribution of assessments, quotas, or shares, but as a spiritual opportunity to answer, not the call of the Board of Missions, but the call of the Christ, and that all plans of preparation and methods of securing the money shall be in accord with the principle of free-will offerings upon the part of the membership of our Churches.

3. That we request the Presiding Elders to hold their annual Missionary Institutes during the months of December and January, and that the Institutes shall be so planned as to reach the highest possible number of the missionary workers within the District. This is to constitute the chief source of inspiration and information for the undertaking.

4. That as far as possible the last of January and the first of February shall be devoted to the securing of this money, either as cash or within sixty days or ninety days.

5. That our Conference Missionary Secretary, Rev. E. W. Potter, be given oversight and charge of this work without salary.

Memorials to General Conference—E. Hightower read Reports Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of the Committee on Memorials. The reports were considered, one at a time, and after some discussion were adopted. They follow below in order:

REPORT No. 1—COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS

To the President and Members of the Central Texas Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Waxahachie, Texas, Nov. 21, 1925.

Dear Brethren:

Your Committee on Memorials has considered the paper referred to us known as the Ed R. Wallace Protective Plan and hereby recommend

the adoption of the following memorial to the next General Conference:

First. Insert at the proper place in Paragraph 112 of the Discipline the following question:

"What amount has been paid to the Indemnity Loan Fund this Conference year?"

Second. Place the following as Article X, in place of Article X, paragraph 515, Discipline of 1922:

"The Board shall have authority to raise and administer an Indemnity Loan Fund to protect our property against losses by fire and tornado. This fund shall be derived from annual collections in each pastoral charge according to article 10 of this paragraph. The amount of the assessment to provide protection for each piece of property shall be determined by the presiding elder or a representative of the Board of Church Extension in consultation with the Quarterly Conference or Board of Trustees, but it shall provide indemnity for loss of not less than 25% nor more than 75% of the value of each piece of property. Such protection shall become effective when payment of assessment is made to the presiding elder or an accredited representative of the Board.

"The Board shall hold in cash and liquid securities a sufficient fund to cover all probable losses; but should losses be sustained in excess of the amount of the Indemnity Loan Fund which remains unexpended, such losses shall be placed on the calendar to be met in their regular order. Should a difference of opinion arise as to the amount that should be paid for damage by fire or tornado, the Conference Board of Church Extension shall make inquiry through one or more of its members and assess the value of the loss. The amount of protection, evidenced by money received, shall be determined by establishing insurance rates where property is located. The Board shall not conduct an insurance business, nor issue policies, but shall safely hold, loan, collect and distribute in an equitable manner all funds paid into the Indemnity Loan Fund, but it shall not involve in this department of its work any other funds which law of the Church requires it to administer. No appropriation shall be made to cover a loss by fire or tornado, unless the collection for the Indemnity Loan Fund shall have been previously paid in or placed in the hands of the presiding elder, who shall act as mediary between the Board and the Churches.

"The Board shall place all churches and parsonages now receiving its aid under immediate protection, collecting from the Boards of Trustees of such churches and parsonages a sufficient assessment to cover not less than 25% nor more than 75% of the ascertained value of such properties, and placing sums so collected in the Indemnity Loan Fund."

This proposed legislation covers the essential features of what is known as the Ed R. Wallace Property Protective Plan, which is hereto attached and made a part of this Memorial.

INDEMNITY LOAN FUND

For the Protection of Churches and Parsonages

In the regular meeting in Louisville, April 28, of the representations of the Conference Boards of Church Extension, I was asked to present in a written form the plan for the Protection of Church Property which I had presented on the floor. Also that a copy be furnished the Boards

of Church Extension. I hereby present a brief statement of the plan I have formed as the result of much study, covering a period of over ten years.

We are losing between \$150,000.00 and \$200,000.00 annually in premiums paid out in excess of indemnities collected from losses from fires and tornadoes.

Much of our property is unprotected. If our great Government wisely compels her endangered men to pay for and carry protection, we should as wisely enact a law by which our great Church may force our property under protection at minimum cost.

This can be done. To enforce an act or law, there must be a force in operation. Let, therefore, the General Conference pass the law assessing all charges a blank amount to be fixed at each first Quarterly Conference equal to the premium fixed by the insurance commissioner of the State to cover not less than 25% nor more than 40% of the value of said property as agreed upon by said Quarterly Conference, and the Presiding Elder or a representative of the Board of Church Extension.

The assessment will be put in the budget or raised otherwise, but protection is not effective until the assessment reaches the Louisville office.

To eliminate the cost of underwriters, office buildings and high priced officials let the present force operating in the Louisville office attend to this work. Allow unaided churches twelve months to come under the regulation, but let each pastor and Presiding Elder urge an immediate collection to be taken and forwarded to the treasurer of Church Extension; Louisville, Kentucky. All Churches aided by the Church Extension Board will, at once, be placed under this regulation.

Property may be insured in other Companies if pastors so desire, but no donation will be made from the Indemnity Loan Fund until settlement has been made with all insurance companies and then the donation shall not bring the amount above 75% of value of property.

Each and every year all the charges pay, or should pay, an assessment to the Church Extension Board and may or may not at any time receive a donation. This assessment will be responded to more cheerfully than any assessment made against the people, for it will protect their church property in case of losses.

The Board of Church Extension will not operate an insurance system but hold in trust an Indemnity Loan Fund to be securely held in trust, safely loaned, and equitably distributed in case of loss by fire or storm to the charges entitled to protection.

This is a brotherhood of the churches as safely supported as the brotherhoods operative in the Conferences at the present time.

This assessment is to cover only the Churches and Parsonages in the United States.

In case losses are sustained in excess of premiums paid in, they will be placed on the calendar and will be paid in order as fast as assessments are collected.

In addition to these assessments, donations will be made to the Indemnity Loan Fund.

As a result of the large saving realized, the Indemnity Loan Fund will rapidly increase in volume and soon as the Board can wisely do so, let them decrease the assessments until within fifteen years we can carry our own risks with an assessment amounting not to exceed one-half the present cost of protection.

This plan of assessment to be paid to an Indemnity Loan Fund to be in turn donated, in case of losses, not only eliminates all high cost of operation but evades all complications of State laws controlling insurance companies.

It is purely a Brotherhood of the Churches, limited to churches and

parsonages and in no case doing business with the public, therefore limited by no law.

This will be the most enormous business ever launched by the church, but no enterprise is complicated by reason of its volume.

We are today absolutely losing annually almost as much as our annual collections for Church Extension.

“That paragraph 45 be amended to conform to this provision.

“That paragraph 94 be stricken from the Discipline.”

It shall be understood that this change does not effect the life tenure of those who are now Bishops of the Church.

Standing Rule—J. W. Fort offered an amendment to the Conference Standing Rule No. 1 which after some discussion and amendments, was adopted as follows:

"The District Steward and the Recording Steward of each charge, the District Lay Leader, District Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the District Trustees are ex-officio members of the District Conference. Besides these, each church is entitled to one delegate for every one hundred members, or two-thirds fraction thereof to be elected by the Church Conference, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate."

Superannuate Homes—The report of the Board of Trustees for Superannuate Homes was read by W. C. Hilburn and adopted. It follows below:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR SUPERANNUATE HOMES

Our agent has been diligent in the prosecution of his work during the past year, but not with the same success as of other years owing to prevailing financial conditions, and not because of any lack of interest upon the part of either the pastors or people in taking care of our Superannuated Preachers in the way of securing homes for them. The securing of a Superannuate Home at Eddy as a special Waco District enterprise, started last year, with such flattering prospect of success had to be postponed on account of prevailing drouth in that section of the Conference, but with good crops next year it is confidently believed that the home can be secured this coming Conference year.

Two vacancies have occurred in the Board of Trustees during the past year on account of the deaths of William Lambdin and R. F. Young.

We recommend the appointment of J. B. Ingle, Grandview, to take the place of William Lambdin and H. H. Simmons of Hillsboro, to take the place of R. F. Young.

It is very important that our people have annually presented to them the cause of Superannuate Homes as it is impossible for our agent to visit all the charges in the Conference during the year. We therefore instruct him to appoint some suitable person to represent our work at each District Conference, and we request the Presiding Elders to give such representatives a suitable time and place on their respective programs; and furthermore we request that these representatives be asked to take an offering for this great cause.

We request Bishop Dickey to appoint D. L. Collie agent for Superannuate Homes for the ensuing Conference year.

Orphanage—The report of the Committee on Orphanage was read by T. B. Sowell and was adopted without discussion. It follows below:

COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE

To the Central Texas Conference in Regular Session at Waxahachie, November, 1925:

We your Committee on Orphanage submit the following report and recommendations:

We find the general growth of the Home good; the Public Accountants who audited the books show everything in good condition and the receipts and disbursements regular; the number of children admitted during the year was 62, and the number released was 40, making a total increase of 22, the number now enrolled 352. The general health of all children has been above the average, not a death in the Home during the year. The report shows the continued call for help on the part of the dependent and neglected children of our Church and State. The industrial activities show gains in all departments except farming; the broom factory shows a profit of \$891.00; the printing department, \$795.80; the dairy department, \$995.98; laundry department, \$794.65. The farm department shows a loss of \$1,968.75. This loss was caused from the extreme drouth.

The assets of the Orphanage have increased above \$90,000.00 during the year. This coming from the number of fine offerings that have been made as follows:

The total valuation of all properties and equipment is estimated at \$625,780.39.

Recommendations

Whereas, the dependent children are constantly asking for admission to our Home in numbers far greater than our accommodations can provide and,

Whereas, the opportunity for doing Christian work in this worthy service for the Orphan Child is one among the greatest of our Church, therefore be it resolved:

First, that we as a Conference, give our hearty endorsement to the recommendation of the General Board of Managers in asking for \$150,000 from the five Texas Conferences in the Christmas Campaign to be used for current expenses and needed buildings;

Second, that December be designated as Orphanage Month throughout our Texas Methodism so that an Educational Campaign may be put on to show the needs of the Orphanage and its opportunities to our Methodism;

Third, that in so far as it is possible, the second and third Sundays of December and the weeks preceeding these be used in setting forth the claims for the Home and the offerings taken; that these offerings be taken both in Sunday School and the congregation of each church and a follow-up campaign be made so that every member and friend of Orphan Children will be given an opportunity to make a real Christmas gift. On circuits and missions we recommend the entire month of December be used in order that each Church may be reached.

Fourth, Dr. W. T. Gray has been untiring in his efforts and has so faithfully and capably filled the place as Field Secretary; we recommend that he be reappointed as Field Secretary for the Conference Year of 1925-'26.

Fifth, we recommend that the Orphanage Committee be made a Quadrennial Committee.

Christian Literature—The report of the Board of Christian Literature was read by E. M. Wisdom, was adopted, and follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

To the Members of the Central Texas Conference:

Dear Brethren:

We, your Board of Christian Literature, are very much pleased with the sentiment the church is creating for better literature. Our reading has become a part of our regular program of life. We are reading all kinds of literature which is having a telling effect upon the whole society. The news stands are filled with magazines and periodicals with attractive covers and catchy titles which is very appealing but the most salacious and seductive ones are not on display but can be had by a private purchase from the news agent.

It is well known and a very regrettable fact that our boys and girls of high school age and older are not buying and reading the best books and magazines. Our young people and many of the older ones as well know more about the moving picture actors and actresses, athletes, pugilist and comic characters than they know about the best authors.

We would urge our pastors to keep the subject of good literature continuously before our people, emphasizing that we have reading matter suitable for all ages.

It is regrettable that we are not generally interested in distributing Methodist Literature (for that is Christian Literature) as we should be. We have a large supply of tracts, setting forth our peculiar doctrine which should be in the hands of our people, for just a line at the right time might save a great soul to our church.

Our Publishing House has had a very phenomenal success in the last few years. It has increased in value until we have a property worth several million dollars. There has been the greatest increase in sales this year ever. Thru the revenues, they have been able to distribute one hundred thousand dollars to the conference claimants of the church.

We should encourage our people to supply themselves with their

reading matter from our own book houses. They carry a great stock to select from and is as reasonable in price as can be had anywhere.

Our Sunday School literature is among the best and is very ably edited, which is proven to us in the way other denominations are using it. But we regret very much that this literature does not have a 100% circulation throughout our Methodism.

Dr. E. Hightower has prepared a handy pocket edition of the Sunday School lesson for 1926, which we highly recommend to all who need such helps.

The Quarterly Review, The Laymen, The Missionary Voice and Epworth Era deserve the widest and best circulation possible. The Nashville Advocate is for all the people and as we are approaching General Conference, this paper should have the largest subscription in its history.

We are greatly delighted with the wonderful success of the Texas Christian Advocate through the past year. The circulation has been increasing but not with the ratio that we had hoped to have. The publisher is asking that a vigorous campaign be carried on until January 1, 1926, giving the pastors a per cent for their work.

Rev. George S. Slover is keeping his contract with the Joint Board of Publication by giving a certified auditor's financial report to the patronizing conference.

Our Editor, Dr. E. P. Riley, has been the right man in the right place. He has carried the Advocate through perhaps the most turbulent time of all its history, satisfying to all in the most magnanimous way.

We recommend the appointment of Dr. P. E. Riley, Editor of the Texas Christian Advocate.

Spiritual State of the Church—L. D. Boatman offered the report of the Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church. It was adopted and follows below:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH

We submit the following report:

The distinct progress that has been made along many lines brings joy to our hearts. The Committee commends the great building program—new churches erected and debts liquidated, as well as plans for future expansion. We rejoice in the large number of additions that have been received. Great revivals have blessed our churches and the conversions and additions have paralleled our building program. We are glad to record this because no matter what we may achieve financially, our church is a colossal failure, if it fails as a soul winning institution.

Men are guided to Heaven, not by sign-posts, but by foot-prints, and to make Christianity effective and attractive, we must have Christianity in earnest. Conquest has made our great church and conquest will sustain us until the end. We recommend that our pastors preach positive Christianity, and that they and the laymen supply the service and recreational needs for our membership.

We recommend that our pastors lead our people in developing a larger spirituality and closer fellowship in our regular services. We neither need nor desire the icy formalism and elaborate ritualism that characterizes some modern churches. Methodism does not need to ape other churches, but will do well to continue in the paths trod by her early leaders.

We recommend that special emphasis be given to Teacher Training Courses and that each Sunday School teacher be enrolled in a course.

We recommend that our pastors assist the parents in the religious

life of the home, inquire as to the religious welfare of each member and suggest appropriate literature. Salacious literature is flooding the country and we cannot be too diligent in providing good literature for our young people. The young people should be urged to attend the regular services and their parents should set the example.

We cannot stress too strongly the importance of Decision Day in the Sunday School and the necessity of having consecrated Sunday School teachers, who should be able to lead their pupils to Christ in the classroom.

It is a matter of gratitude that we will not be compelled to retreat nor retrench in our missionary enterprises, nor recall some of our missionaries, but will be able to maintain the entire field with renewed zeal.

We urge our pastors and lay leaders to undertake to strengthen the church pride and loyalty of our people and give to the world an unparalleled example of zeal and service.

We condemn the practice of deliberately and publicly criticizing our pastors and limiting their usefulness. We suggest the reading of the disciplinary clause on "uncharitable and unprofitable conversation." We should rather love and honor our ministers for their work's sake.

We rejoice in the progress of the past year and face the future with Christ's comforting words—"Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

Sunday School Board—The report of the Sunday School Board was read by T. E. Bowman. It was adopted and follows below:

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:
Dear Brethren:

The Sunday School is preeminently the teaching agency of the Church. Its field of operation is as wide as from the cradle to the hoary head. The task of the Church is the training of the whole man. The increasing emphasis which is being laid on secular education today makes it necessary for the Church to enter this field with decision and energy. This era of educational expansion may be made an era of vastly increased opportunity for the cause of Christ, if the Church sees the day of her opportunity and provides an adequate program for teaching the religion of Jesus.

We are glad to note that our own Sunday School leaders have been among the first to recognize this necessity, and in order to meet the need, have correlated and graded our literature so as to meet every demand of the growing and developing natures of our people.

We cannot too strongly emphasize and recommend the importance and worth of our own literature. It is second to none. The enormous demand for all our literature is evidence of this fact. The present circulation of all our Sunday School periodicals, not including graded literature, is 1,950,000, an increase of 53,000 over previous years. The total circulation of literature for the Graded Courses is 518,880, being an increase of 61,605 over previous years. The total circulation of all kinds of Sunday School literature is 2,477,880, the net increase over previous years being 114,615.

We congratulate our Church on the fact that our Sunday School Board is now publishing Departmental Group Uniform Lessons for the Primary Department and for the Junior Department. The lessons are a very valuable adaptation of the graded lesson principle to the needs of the small Sunday School. Through the lessons it will be possible

to minister to the need of the younger children in the small Sunday Schools more efficiently than we have been able to do in the past.

In this connection we desire to call special attention to four weekly papers published by our Sunday School Board. These are: "Our Young People," for persons above seventeen years of age; "The Torch Bearer," for girls between ten and seventeen years of age; "The Haversack," for boys between ten and seventeen; and "Boys and Girls," for the younger children. The purpose of these papers is to furnish our children, youth, and young people with wholesome and stimulating reading matter. A part of this reading matter is informational, being in the form of biographical and historical articles, and articles dealing with such every day facts and occurrences as are deemed suitable and useful for those for whom the papers are respectively designed. Another part, made up mainly of clean and wholesome stories, is inspirational, being intended to kindle the imaginations of the readers and to awaken their admiration for high and worthy ideals. Still another part is purposefully religious, being designed especially to interest our boys and girls in the programs and activities of our Church, and to promote the development of the religious life. These papers are all of high literary quality and have been found to be interesting to the respective groups for which they are prepared. By the use of these papers published by our Sunday School Board for the average of less than a cent and a half a week, a boy or girl may be supplied with wholesome reading matter that will amount in the aggregate to twelve good sized volumes a year. The circulation of these weekly papers is steadily increasing. The combined output of these four papers being above 300,000.

While speaking of the literature for our children and young people, your Board would say that it unanimously adopted a resolution extending to our General Elementary Superintendent, Miss Minnie E. Kennedy, our sincere thanks for the valuable work she is doing in the matter of seeking to overcome the evils growing out of the presentation of debasing and demoralizing pictures on the screens of America, and that we indorse the plan of the Motion Picture Betterment League, which originated in the Elementary Division of the Sunday School.

We desire to call special attention to another periodical published by our Sunday School Board, "The Workers' Council", the publication of which was resumed about one year ago. This is a Journal of principles and methods of Religious Education designed to help Sunday Workers of all types. We recommend that in all our Sunday Schools, each officer and teacher be supplied regularly with the "Workers' Council."

We are pleased to note that our Sunday School Editors are now preparing Courses of Study for use in Week Day Religious Education, and Courses for use in Vacation Church Schools.

We are glad to note that this has been by far the best year in Leadership Training in our Conference. Eight Standard Training Schools have been held, resulting in 767 credits of award. Eighty Junior and Local Training Schools have been conducted. 92 diplomas without seals have been issued, 61 blue seals, seven gold seals, 2,090 certificates, making a total of 2,250 credits of award.

We would earnestly urge upon our people the importance of using the literature of the Southern Methodist Church in Southern Methodist Sunday Schools. It is impossible to create in any school that does not use our publications an attitude of loyalty toward our Church, or to interest either its teachers or its pupils in our connectional enterprises.

We wish to express our appreciation for the faithful and efficient service rendered by Conference Supt. of Sunday Schools, Rev. R. F. Brown. We request the Bishop to re-appoint him to the position of Conference Supt. of Sunday Schools. We desire also to express our hearty thanks to Mrs. R. F. Brown, Supt. of the Elementary Division,

for her faithful and untiring work. We request also the appointment of Rev. E. Hightower to the position of Associate Editor of Sunday School Literature.

The following recommendations are offered by the Board:

First. That the Sunday School Board provide for at least one Standard Training School in each Presiding Elder's District.

Second. That an increased number of Cokesbury Training Schools be held in places where it would not be possible to put on the Standard Training Course and that we urge our Pastors to study the units necessary to become approved instructors in this course.

Third. That we set as a goal for the New Year 3,000 credits of award in the Standard Training Cause, and 250 credits in the Cokesbury Cause.

Fourth. That we emphasize the importance of Summer Leadership Schools at Mt. Sequoyah, and request our pastors to do all they can to have representatives of their Sunday Schools to attend these Summer Schools.

Fifth. That we follow out and co-operate with the suggestions of the General Sunday School Board in the matter of Evangelism in the Sunday School.

Sixth. That we adopt the same plan as last year for financing District Organization, which plan is that this year the second and fifth Sunday's offerings in the Sunday School following the adjournment of the Annual Conference to be sent to the District Secretary for use in promoting the Sunday School interest in the Districts.

Seventh. That the third Sunday in April, or as near thereto as possible, be designated as Sunday School Day and that our pastors and superintendents take the matter seriously, and that the offering on that day be sent to W. S. Rowland, Temple, Texas, Treasurer of the Sunday School Board.

Eighth. That Mother's Day, or as near thereto as possible, be set apart and observed as "Hospital Day" in the Sunday School, and that the offering be sent to Rev. W. H. Matthews, Hospital Commissioner, for the purpose of equipping the Children's Ward.

Ninth. That we heartily endorse the plan of having our Sunday School accept the European Special and urge upon our pastors and superintendents whose schools have not accepted the plan, the importance of accepting the plan at once and the sending of their Monthly Missionary Offerings to E. W. Bridges.

Tenth. That the Conference endorse the action of the Conference Sunday School Board in the matter of Dual Extension Work as proposed by the Missionary Education Department of the General Sunday School Board, the Centenary Commission and the General Board of Missions.

Eleventh. The observance of Children's Week through the three-fold programs of the parents meeting, the Visitation Plan, and the Forward Step Committee, and that we urge our churches to observe that week.

Church Extension—The report of the Board of Church Extension was read by J. J. Creed, was adopted, and follows below:

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Dear Brethren:

To aid the many building enterprises of our Conference, we have been asked for approximately fourteen thousand dollars at this session. To meet this great demand, we have received from the Conference Col-

lections only \$3,808.75. It is apparent from these figures, that we are able to render only a fractional part of the assistance needed. The main difficulty lies in the fact that the assessment allowed by the Commission on Budget for our Board is nearly two thousand dollars less than it was during the last quadrennium and more than two thousand less than that levied by the General Board upon us. Consequently, your Conference Board is positively suffering, which will account for the fact that we have been compelled to turn down many worthy applications on the one hand, and on the other hand to scale to a painful minimum many others which seemed a bit more needy.

We desire also to call attention to the fact that our best work is often rendered impossible by the loose and inaccurate manner in which the application blanks are prepared. When the facts and figures called for in these papers are withheld, it is utterly impossible for us to know the merits of the case. Some do not even have the signature of the Presiding Elder, others fail to show what has been raised by the Church applying and others still do not recite the Trust Clause in the deed. These errors are absolutely fatal and we are prohibited by the law of the church from dispensing these sacred funds in the fact of such circumstances. The questions asked in the blanks are very simple and the facts called for can all be obtained with little effort and consequently we respectfully insist that these papers be fully and accurately prepared.

After the most careful and painstaking consideration of the merits of all the applications submitted to us, the following grants have been made, to-wit:

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

We, your Epworth League Board submit the following report:

We are gratified to report great increase in League Activity in our Conference. The young people of our church are receiving greater attention and training in service for our Lord than at any previous time.

During the past six years the Epworth League activity in Central Texas Conference has increased approximately three hundred per cent in number of chapters, members enrolled and money raised.

We now have in our Conference two hundred ninety-five chapters, 9,590 members, which is an increase over last year of 18 chapters and 1,112 members.

Total money raised by the League the past year, \$12,326.00, against \$11,441.00 the previous year.

Your Leagues have raised for missions this year \$4,712, against \$2,229 raised the previous year.

The League is the only organization in the Church having paid the Centenary Pledge in full.

The report of our Conference Field Secretary more than justifies the creation and maintenance of that office.

The Summer Assembly held at Lake Worth, July 4th to 10th, was attended by more than a thousand of our young people. 308 credits on Christian Culture course were granted to 154 Leaguers.

We recommend that every effort reasonable be made to maintain and make permanent the Lake Worth Assembly.

Every District in the Conference held approved Institutes, ranging from two to five days.

There are 16 Active Union Organizations in the Conference, meeting monthly with average attendance of 150.

We hold no brief against the Y. M. C. A. nor Y. W. C. A., but we note with pleasure the growing interest in league work in our colleges, and pray that the time may speedily come when we can have our own Church Young People's Organizations leading the Christian Activities of our Methodist Young People in our Methodist Colleges.

We commend the work of our General Board, especially the zeal and activity of our own Ralph E. Nollner, and recommend that he be appointed to same relation for next year.

We are pleased with the progress made in the past year in our own Conference under the leadership of our Field Secretaries, Louie D. Williams and J. D. F. Williams. We recommend that Rev. J. D. F. Williams be appointed Field Secretary for the Central Texas Conference for the coming year.

We heartily approve and commend the work of the Commission on Methodist Student Movement in Texas, and urge co-operation with Brother Glenn Flynn, our able leader, in this activity.

We urge co-operation on the part of all our church in making the Memphis Conference for Methodist Young People the greatest meeting of its kind ever held in America, and we predict that it promises to be one of the greatest moves ever made in our church.

Five thousand choice young people from all over our church will assemble in Memphis, Tenn., Dec. 31, for a four days Religious Conference.

We call attention to some discrepancy in reports on Anniversary and other special days. The money received by the Conf. Treasurer does not equal amount reported. We urge the pastors to see that Leaguers send all money to Mr. Leon L. Parkman, Ft. Worth, Texas, promptly, and see that all pledges are reported.

We further recommend that the Fourth Sunday in June be made Harry Hughes Memorial Day, and ask that all Leagues observe the day.

The League Conference has set a goal of \$5,000.00 Missionary Special to be known as the Harry Hughes Memorial. \$3,700.00 has been subscribed since July. Every League is expected to make a pledge to this worthy cause.

We ask that the Commission on Budget appropriate \$3,250.00 for League work for the coming year.

Board of Education—H. B. Watts read the report of the Board of Education and there was some discussion as to the time mentioned for pressing the collection of the educational claims. The report was adopted and follows below:

BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

Dear Brethren:

We, your Board of Education, desire to submit the following report:

The educational institutions which have been represented before our board have entered upon the fall term of the present session with most favorable conditions in the matter of attendance. Our schools are evidently in such high favor among our people, that they are sending their boys and girls to them in increasingly large numbers. We have no problem of lack of attendance in our schools and colleges. But to properly care for expanding student bodies, we do have a most serious problem of equipment and maintenance. The assessment we make in the face of large, and enlarging, expense accounts is entirely inadequate. In the next quadrennium it should be materially increased.

The Christian Education Movement

We are approaching the fifth year of the Christian Education Movement. The last regular payment fell due November 1, 1925. There are also a large number of irregular and deferred payments that have begun to mature. The collection of these pledges, along with the large sums of "new money" from special campaigns, will make the total educational receipts for the quadrennium far in excess of the amount paid for any other like period of our history. We are now in the midst of the last year of the quadrennium and we want to make every possible effort to collect the pledges to the movement. To this end we are calling upon the pastors, presiding elders, and laymen to give us their full co-operation. We recommend that you set aside the months of January, February, and March for this purpose. We also ask that you give full and unhampered right of way to this work for this particular period.

It is a matter for congratulation that collections for the Christian Education Movement during the year just closed have been little short of the last year, even in the fact of unprecedented drouth. In directing this work, Rev. J. B. Berry, Conference Secretary and Treasurer, has rendered most faithful and efficient service. A total of \$53,509.00 was raised in the Conference this year.

Educational Institutions

Southern Methodist University—The session of 1924-25 was the most successful in the history of the institution. As usual there has been an increase in attendance, the total enrollment being 2,530. At the beginning of this session two new schools were inaugurated. The School of

Law and the School of Engineering and Architecture. To these new departments there has come instant response and ready promise of great success. To meet great needs and growing demands, the Board of Trustees has set as a goal, ten million dollars for buildings, endowments, loans, fellowships, etc., within a period of seven years. In this program of advancement, we most heartily concur. During the past year there has been added to the endowment of Southern Methodist University \$159,000. In addition to this we have Kirby Hall completed and McFarlin Memorial Auditorium and Hyer Hall of Science are well under construction.

Southwestern University—This year has been an unusually good one. Early in the present year the historic Woman's Building was burned. But the contract has been let and work is now under way for the construction of a magnificent fire-proof building to take the place of the one that was burned. This was made possible by the heroic gifts of the citizens of Georgetown and by some gifts amounting to more than \$100,000 from friends of the school residing in Houston. The Cody Memorial Library has received some notable gifts, amounting to more than \$50,000. In order to provide for future growth the Trustees have bought all the real estate between the Administration Building and the grounds of the Woman's Building. We heartily commend the Greater Southwestern University Movement in the interest of a larger productive endowment and better equipment.

Texas Woman's College—The eleventh session closed with a net total attendance of 494 students. There is a large increase for the opening of the new term. The spirit of work and service are apparent in both faculty and student body. The school maintains the highest standards of scholarship and personal honor. The financial situation is an all important problem at the present time. Two hundred and fifty thousand dollars must be raised for endowment this year if our classification is maintained.

Meridian College—This institution has felt the tremendous pressure of drouth conditions. Notwithstanding, the outlook is encouraging. The property has been greatly improved with repairs. The decrease in student body has not been as large as expected under conditions. The faculty is excellent and religious condition of student body good.

Weatherford College—There has been a forty per cent increase in attendance with the opening of the fall term. An unusually strong faculty has been selected. A splendid gymnasium was built last winter. The Girls' Co-operative Home has been operated with success. About \$70,000 has been received as endowment from the Couts Estate. This is now a Junior College, out of debt, with a small productive endowment, but with much need for more buildings.

Wesley Bible Chair—During the past year more than 400 students in the University of Texas took the course of our Instructor. A beautiful two-story stone building was completed and our work comfortably housed in its own quarters. The field for work here is always unparalleled. More than 1,600 boys and girls from Methodist homes were in the University last year. We commend this most worthy enterprise.

Student Work Commission—We recommend that a permanent State Commission on Religious Activities among college students in Texas be constituted, into whose hands shall be placed, as rapidly as possible, the general care and supervision of all forms of special religious work among Methodist students in Texas now being done under the support of the several annual Conferences of the State. This Commission shall be composed of two representatives from each of the five annual Conferences of the State to be elected every four years upon the recom-

mentation of the Boards of Education of the several Conferences. From Central Texas Conference we recommend the election of Cullom H. Booth and H. Bascom Watts.

Abuse of Two-Thirds Rule—In 1922, out of 262 men received on trial, we admitted 22 under the two-thirds rule, about one in twelve. During the past year we have admitted 34 out of 300, or one in 8.8, by this rule. With our many strong schools and our aid funds for students, there is no reason why Annual Conferences should not require their young applicants to measure-up to the very modest standards set by our Church for admission into the ministry, namely: a high school course, or its equivalent. This rule exists only for very occasional emergency cases, and is being very sadly abused.

General Statement—We unreservedly record our confidence in the administration of the affairs of our educational institutions. We believe unequivocally in the Christian integrity, and the fidelity to worthy Methodist tradition, history, doctrine, and policy of the men and women who make the teaching force of our colleges. We firmly assert our belief that they are engaged with ourselves as the servants of God and the Church in the great common task of bringing the Kingdom of God on earth.

Sabbath Observance—The report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance was read by T. D. Ellis, was adopted and follows below:

SABBATH OBSERVANCE

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

The committee submits the following report:

We deplore the widespread Sabbath desecration so general over our country, and urge our members and fellow-citizens to awaken to its dangers. We warn all of the calamities that are certain to fall on the Sabbath breakers, whether men, cities, states or nations. We call our preachers to sound out in no uncertain note, the importance of Sabbath observance on the part of the leaders of our church, and beg them to take a more positive stand against the more common forms of such desecration; as buying, selling, traveling unnecessarily, trips to fairs and automobile excursions, on the Sabbath—the picture shows, football, baseball, golf, and other such amusements on the Sabbath day.

We remember with sadness the difficulty encountered in raising the \$36,000 to save the missionary cause of our great church, and at the same time we recall that a few weeks ago, gate receipts of one Sunday baseball game in Ft. Worth, amounted to more than \$36,000.

Realizing that home training, both by example and precept, plays a large part in forming ideals of the coming generation, we beg that parents strive to make their homes conform to the gospel of the Sabbath.

We feel that our nation should not license or condone Sabbath breaking. We commend our State and Federal Courts, legislatures and Congress for their Godly habit of resting on Sunday, from their labors. Congress should not only adjourn on Sunday, but, as guardian of our

national safety, should also see to it that all interstate business should stop on Sunday, excepting always emergency instances of necessity and charity. Such laws for the District of Columbia is a duty we owe to God and country. It would be of infinite benefit to every home, city, and state of America.

In answer to a communication from the National Sabbath Crusade Committee of the Tennessee National Conference: We recommend T. D. Ellis be elected as principal delegate and B. R. Wagner as alternate, by the adoption of this report, to confer with the committees, appointed for promoting Sabbath observance and urge on Congress on the third Wednesday in January, 1926, the wisdom of enacting a Sunday Observance Law, for the District of Columbia.

We urge that all post offices be closed on Sunday, and that no mail or mail trains move on Sunday, so that all workers connected therewith may have a Sabbath of rest as God commands.

We believe that twenty million newspapers published and sold on Sunday are a mighty menace to the preservation of our Christian Sabbath. We beg our brethren of the press to prayerfully consider this vital matter, and pray them to speedily return to the Godly habit of publishing, selling and shipping papers every day EXCEPT SUNDAY. God sanctified the Sabbath for all, and we must all help to have it.

We also recommend the appointment of Rev. R. C. Armstrong as the Secretary of the Sunday League of America.

American Bible Society—The report of the American Bible Society Board was presented by Preston Broxton and was adopted. It follows below:

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY BOARD

The American Bible Society is the official agency of Protestantism for Bible distribution throughout the world. Its annual circulation approximates 7,000,000 volumes, while the number of languages into which the Bible has been translated totals 770.

The American Bible Society touches the work of our church at its

most vital points. The production of the Scriptures in the spoken languages of the people is essential for the Missionary program of the Church at home and abroad. In fact, no missionary could carry on successfully without the Bible as his ally.

Your Board is pleased to report that it had before it Rev. J. J. Morgan, agency secretary of Dallas, and our Conference representative, brother Armstrong. Each of these representatives report a year of progress. The Southwestern Agency reports an increase in the volumes distributed of 67,000 over last year. We heartily commend the work of our representatives in this important field.

We recommend to our pastors the observance of Bible Sunday, December 6th, having been designated for that day. The theme selected is, "The Four Hundredth Anniversary of the Publication of William Tyndale's Translation of the New Testament into English." Suitable literature will be mailed out from the Dallas depository free of charge.

We also call attention to the fact that in many of our jails over the country may be found prisoners who are of foreign extraction. These people, many of them, have never read from the Word of God. While incarcerated in jails, they are eager for reading material and will devour anything offered them in their mother tongue. Scriptures and portions may be had from the Dallas depository in any language and much good may be accomplished by a distribution of the same to these unfortunate peoples.

We recommend the reappointment of Rev. J. M. Armstrong as Field Secretary of the American Bible Society.

Your Board of Missions joins with the General Board of Missions in requesting:

First. That all Centenary pledges be settled at once practically on the subscriber's terms.

Second. That all fourth Sunday offerings by the Sunday Schools be sacredly preserved for the support of our work in Europe.

APPENDIX.

Conference Rules.

1. The District Steward and the Recording Steward of each charge, the District Lay Leader, the District Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the District Trustees are ex-officio members of the District Conference. Besides these, each church is entitled to one delegate for every one hundred members, or two-thirds fraction thereof, to be elected by the Church Conference, provided that every church shall have at least one delegate.
2. The Presiding Elders are a standing committee to nominate all the boards and regular standing committees at each session of the Conference.
3. The Presiding Elders are required by Conference resolutions to send to the Secretary of the Conference, immediately after the meeting of their respective boards of District Stewards, a copy of the assessments made on each charge, and these assessments are to be recorded by the Secretary as the official assessment against the several charges of the Conference.
4. The Conference shall elect a Statistical Secretary for the ensuing year, who shall name the several district editors, after consultation with the Presiding Elders, said District Editors to be Assistant Statistical Secretaries, whose duty it shall be to collect the statistical reports from the preachers in charge within the several districts and see that they are properly edited and turned over to the Statistical Secretary, during the first day of the Conference session.
5. The Chairman of Committee on Admissions shall make written report to be filed with the Secretary of the Conference, concerning each one admitted to the Conference. This report shall embrace: Full name, name of parents; date and place of birth, conversion and license to preach; date of marriage; name of wife, and such other facts of his life as may be deemed important.
6. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the presiding eldership shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.
7. The Conference Commission on Budget shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special assessments to be levied upon the churches, unless such new or special assessments shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the M. E. Church, South, or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so intrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust had been executed and how.
8. The Conference Commission on Budget in its report shall give the contrasts between the several assessments for the present year and the proposed assessments for the ensuing year so that the Conference can act on the report with clear knowledge. It shall be the duty of the Commission to furnish the "Table of Assessments" for the ensuing year, arriving at the scale for the districts by finding what per cent the total church membership in the individual district is of the grand total church membership in the Conference, and by finding what per cent the total salaries in the district are of the grand total of salaries paid in the Conference, and then dividing the sum of these two decimals by 2.
9. All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports, except the statistical reports, coming before the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk, the original copy to be retained by the Secretary in the archives, one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Texas Christian Advocate, and one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Central Texas Conference Journal.

Brownwood District—Poe's Chapel to the Wingate Charge. Drasco and Pumphrey form a charge. Talpa and Crews form a charge with Benoit and Harmony afternoon appointments. Glencove is placed with Novice. Coleman Circuit is composed of Bethel, Echo, Wesley Chapel, Valera and Voss. Trickham is placed with Rockwood. Winchell, Mt. View and Brooksmith form a charge.

Cleburne District—Burlson is placed in the Cleburne District with Crowley attached to it. Denton's Chapel is placed with Burlson. Bono is placed with Joshua and George's Creek. Fall Creek is placed with Godley and Cresson. Membrino and Hill City are placed with Granbury Circuit. Egan is placed with Cahill and Barnesville on the Alvarado Circuit.

Corsicana District—Divide Irene and Mertens Charge and make two charges, one to be known as Irene and one as Mertens. Do away with Emmett Charge. Put McCord Church with Mertens and Emmett and Jones Chapel with Irene. Divide Purdon and Harmony Charge and make two—calling one Purdon and the other Harmony. Put with Purdon, Brushy Church from the Emmett Charge and Corbet for an afternoon service. Take Dover off the Munger Charge and Nebo off the Richland Charge and put them with Harmony. Take Datura and Horn Hill off the Mexia Circuit and put them on the Munger Charge—giving Saturday night and a Sunday morning service to Datura and a Sunday night to Horn Hill. Make a new charge in Mexia calling it Bonham Street, Mexia. Give this church three Sundays and one Sunday to Shiloh and Fallon. Make a station of Richland.

Fort Worth District—Everman and Kennedale are placed together. Forest Hill and Glen Garden are placed together. A new charge is formed of College Heights and Smithfield. A new charge is formed of Kellar, Collieville and White's Chapel, known as Kellar and Collieville.

Waxahachie District—Avalon is added to the Bardwell Circuit. Garrett is added to the Boyce Circuit. Webb is added to the Britton Circuit.

Weatherford District—Garner is taken from Millsap and placed with Whitt. Rocky Mound is taken from the Graham Circuit and placed on the Loving Charge.

Memoirs.

REV. RICHARD J. TOOLEY

Richard J. Tooley was born in Griffin, Georgia, January 18th, 1864. His parents were both devout, godly people who prayed with and for their children and earnestly desired that they should serve the Lord. In 1872 he removed with his parents to Dallas, Texas, where he spent twelve years, during which time his mother passed away. In 1884 the family removed to Grandview, Texas. On December 1st, 1887, he was married to Miss Vannie Swain who was reared near Grandview. In the month of June, 1889, Brother Tooley was gloriously converted to Christ in a revival meeting conducted by the writer's father, Rev. J. M. Bond, Sr., Rev. W. W. Henderson being the pastor at Grandview at that time. In October of that same year at the Fourth Quarterly Conference, Rev. J. Fred Cox, presiding elder, he was licensed to preach, and immediately entered Southwestern University at Georgetown to prepare himself for his life's work. During his last year in Southwestern, he supplied the North Georgetown Circuit under Dr. Horace Bishop, Presiding Elder. In November, 1892, at Waco, during the session of the old Northwest Texas Conference, he was admitted on trial, and was appointed to the Lometa Charge, Rev. E. F. Boone, Presiding Elder. After that he served the following appointments in the order named: Copperas Cove, Coryell City, Carbon and Gorman, Bardwell, Forreston, Venus, Red Oak, Salado, Hewitt and Abbott. This brought him to the year 1908 at which time he entered the evangelistic work, being related to the Conference as a Supernumerary. He continued in that relation until the Central Texas Conference met in Weatherford in 1922, when he was superannuated. In the year 1920 he supplied the Springtown Charge the latter half of the year, the pastor's health having failed. He made his home in Weatherford from the time he entered the evangelistic work in 1908, until his death which occurred while he was in the sanitarium in that city on the evening of Friday, January 2nd, 1925.

He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Wilson at Fort Worth, Texas, in November, 1893, and was ordained Elder by Bishop Galloway at Brownwood, Texas, in November, 1898. During his evangelistic career alone, he conducted 358 revival meetings, ranging in duration from ten days to four weeks each. He kept no record of the number of conversions and additions to the church, but those who knew this man and his work through the years will testify that literally thousands of souls were saved under his ministry.

Brother Tooley is survived by one sister, Mrs. Emma Huffman of Whitesboro and three brothers, J. T. Tooley, an attorney of Tampa, Tex.; Rev. R. V. Tooley of the Northwest Texas Conference and pastor at Sylvester, and Rev. L. B. Tooley of the North Texas Conference and pastor at Myra. He also leaves his devoted companion who for thirty-seven years has walked faithfully by his side, sharing with him the joys and sorrows of the changeful life of the Methodist ministry; and their six children, three daughters and three sons, as follows: Mrs. George Stoops, Mrs. Cullen Credille, Miss Adrian Ruth Tooley, William Bond, Clement Baird, and Roy P. Tooley, all being married except Miss Adrian and Clement.

Brother Tooley was in ill health for several months before his death and suffered much. Like all true servants of Christ, he desired to live, and do as much work for the Master as possible, but when he realized that this could not be, he was reconciled to go on and join the loved ones and old friends who had outstripped him to the other side.

His funeral service was conducted in the First Methodist Church at Weatherford by the pastor, Rev. T. Edgar Neal, assisted by Rev. G. A. Schlueter, and on Sunday afternoon, January 4th in the presence of a

large company of friends and relatives, some from many miles away, his weary body was laid to rest in the Grandview Cemetery. After a few words of tribute from the writer of these lines, the last service was conducted by the Masonic Fraternity of which he was a member. His grave is near the place where he first found the Lord, and alongside the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway where tourists from many lands will pass to and fro in their restless journeyings, but he will not be mindful of these, because his noble spirit has journeyed to the far-off city of God to await the time when these mortal bodies shall be changed in the twinkling of an eye, being brought forth from the graves by the power of Him who became the first fruits of them that slept.

Since the days of childhood I have known and loved Brother R. J. Tooley. Through his close association with my preacher-father, I was thrown much in his company, and he was always an object of my admiration. As a man, I never knew him to flinch in the face of danger where duty was involved, nor shun an obligation that fell upon him. As a Christian, he possessed an uncommonly deep faith in God, never doubting His Word for a moment. He was a strong believer in an over-sheltering providence, always trustful that God would look after His own, and some of his observations of the workings of Providence in his own life would remind one of the experiences of the ancient prophets. Like the Apostle Paul, he never tired of relating the circumstances of his conversion. Thousands of people throughout the Southwest have been thrilled at the story of "that bright, June day in the Methodist Church in old Grandview, while Jim Bond was preaching, when God saved him from sin and made a new man of him." As a preacher, he was bold and fearless, merciless against sin, tender toward the sinner, a hater of sham and hypocrisy, often very eloquent in discourse, and endowed with great spiritual power. As a revivalist, he was eminently successful. Unique in his methods, he entered a campaign expecting to win and was nearly always successful. He was undaunted amidst the most adverse conditions, often bringing victory out of what seemed to be failure, having believed from the beginning that God would bless the effort if he did not despair. Over yonder he has already met many whom God enabled him to call from lives of sin to lives of Christian service, and as the years pass on, he will be meeting many others. We shall miss him with his hearty greeting, brotherly hand-clasp and happy laugh when we come to our annual gatherings, but some day when our course is finished, we shall strike hands with him again, and it will be to say good-bye no more. May the Heavenly Father be with his dear ones all, and may they so live as to meet him again.

REV. J. C. CARTER

He ceased his earthly ministry April 21, 1925. He ceased not to labor and love unto the end.

Rev. J. C. Carter was born in Giles County, Tennessee, Oct. 12th, 1847, converted during the second year of the Civil War, and joined the Methodist Church, South. In Sept., 1875, he was married to Miss Mary Richardson. To this union were born four children: Jim Carter, who died in 1909, being in business at Carlton, Texas, when he died; Dr. H. C. Carter of Eastland, Texas; Mrs. Cora Mitchell, of Iredell, Texas; and Marvin Carter, in business at Ardmore, Oklahoma. His wife died in 1909, just after he superannuated. After some years he married Mrs. Mattie Thomas of Carlton, Texas. A fine Christian woman, with whom he lived happily until death.

J. C. Carter was admitted into this Conference by transfer in 1886. His appointments were Carlton Circuit 1887 and 1888; Hico Circuit, 1889; Martin's Gap, 1890; Merkel, 1891; Cottonwood, 1892; Glencove,

1894; May, 1895 and 1896; Smithfield, 1897; Carlton, 1898 and 1899; Bluffdale, 1900; Proctor, 1901 and 1902; Cross Plains, 1903; DeLeon, 1904; Iredell, 1905 and 1906; Fairie and Cranfill's Gap, 1907; Big Springs Mission, 1908; Superannuated, 1909.

The last religious service that he was in, in the church, was the fifth Sunday in November, 1924. He sang, "A Charge I Have to Keep." He was unable to leave his room the last three months of his life. Never did I feel more heaven in my soul than when at his request, I read from God's Holy Word, knelt at his bed-side, and prayed. Nothing satisfied the longing of his soul as did the Word of God. To him it was drinking at the fountain of Eternal life. He believed it was God's word sent unto man.

I was in his room frequently the last three months of his life, God and His Church were his themes for conversation. He surely had "perfect love casteth out fear," (I Jno. 4:18.) His life was a living witness to this doctrine. He was calm, and undisturbed, and had as sweet a Spirit as any. He said to me one day, "I am ready for whatever God desires to send me." If he had one word of complaint, no one knew anything of it. His friends were there daily; and he suffered for nothing; he accepted it all as coming from God.

He preached regularly for more than fifty years, but few men indeed have such record. He had a message from God unto man. He lived his message, and delivered it unto men, he knew about the God he presented. To him God was a loving Father, a Providential Guide, and One Who always watched over His children. His most delightful hours were spent in His immediate presence seeking the glorious path of Eternal life. Whatever his lot was, he accepted it from God, and called men from sin unto righteousness.

He has now joined the throng on the other side, where he still serves in rapture and bliss the One for Whom he gave all. He has entered the heavenly sanctuary filled with the glory, wonders, and praises of the Lord God Almighty, to shine and shout forever. He has for his loving companions, Saints, Angels, Archangels, Cherubim, Seraphim, God the Father, Son and the Holy Spirit, and the end inconceivable. He has gained heaven with all its wonders, beauty and glory. Friends and relatives know where to find him. His funeral was held in the Methodist Church at Iredell, where his daughter, Mrs. Mitchell, lives, in whose home he died.

REV. KIRBY SMITH VAN ZANDT

Rev. Kirby Smith Van Zandt was born near War Eagle, Missouri, May 30, 1860. In 1862 his parents moved to Arkansas where at 9 years of age he was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South. When only 19 years of age he yielded to the call of God for the ministry, and was licensed to preach at Fairview in Baxter County, Ark. The next year he joined the Arkansas Conference. There he served Big Flat, Wiley Cove, Van Buren, Goshen, Berryville, and Bentonville Charges. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Fitzgerald in 1884, and Elder by Bishop Hendrix in 1886.

In 1881 he was united in marriage to Miss Mattie E. Gilliam. To them were born five children: Mrs. S. L. Culwell, Mrs. Horace Irby, Mrs. Lester Buford, Raymond Van Zandt, and Earnest Van Zandt.

In 1889 he transferred to the old Northwest Texas Conference. In this Conference he served the following charges: Red Oak, Grandview, Cresson, Green's Creek, Iredell, Benjamin and Vera, Springtown, Whitt and Bethesda, Bardwell, Corsicana Circuit, Scranton, Gordon, May, Joshua, Westover, and Leuders. At this time, his health having failed, he took the Superannuate relation and moved into the Superannuate

parsonage at Carbon. Here, in broken health, he waited until September 9, 1925, when he heard the call of the Master which took him from labor to rest.

The above records a few milestones on what was a remarkably useful life. It is the story of 40 years of hard, self-denying labor in which a life was poured out without stint in the service of the Master. Not a year of this time was his salary adequate for the needs of his family. Yet, "for the joy that was set before him" of preaching to others the gospel that had saved him, he pressed on and was faithful to the end.

K. S. Van Zandt was really a great preacher. He thought clearly, and had a splendid command of English for the expression of his thoughts. He was deeply religious, and while preaching gave evidence of being truly "moved by the Holy Ghost." Thousands of people were born into the kingdom of God under his ministry. Doubtless there was a great multitude waiting at the pearly gates to give this old supererannuate welcome into the land where "There is no night—for the Lord giveth them light."

He leaves a wife, Mrs. K. S. Van Zandt, and a daughter, Mrs. S. L. Culwell, who presides with grace in another parsonage home; a son, Raymond Van Zandt, who is a member of the Northwest Texas Conference; two daughters, Mrs. Horace Irby and Mrs. Lester Buford, and Earnest Van Zandt, who lives with his mother. These live to cherish his name in precious memory. Thus while God buries his workmen he carries on his work."

His going marks the passage of another of the "old time" preachers. Men who took the Bible as "the word of God," who had a deep conviction of sin, and had experienced a great salvation. They have wrought nobly and we have entered into the great heritage of their labors. Humbly praying that we may be worthy of the mantle that falls upon us, we would say,

"The pains of death are past,
Labor and sorrow cease;
And, life's long warfare closed at last,
His soul is found in peace.
Soldier of Christ, well done!
Praise be thy new employ;
And while eternal ages run,
Rest in thy Saviour's joy."

The Sunday night before she was stricken Monday morning, the last song was "O Think of a Home Over There." She sang it with unusual volume and sweetness. She partly recovered from her first stroke of paralysis, and tried to sing in the congregation but not with her former effectiveness. As we now view it when she was singing so sweetly that Sunday night it was prophetic, for she would not sing it again as effectually until she sang it anew in her Father's kingdom.

After Mrs. Holt's third stroke of paralysis her husband in quest of her health last September took her to Los Angeles, California, hoping the mild climate and vegetable diet would prove helpful to her. She improved for a short time but soon began a gradual decline.

MRS. VINEY JONES

Mrs. Viney Jones, wife of Rev. W. V. Jones, a superannuate member of the Central Texas Conference, was born in Red River County, Texas, November 18th, 1847 and died at her home in Iredell, Texas, July 5th, 1925, after her and Brother Jones had walked hand in hand together for a little more than sixty years.

When she was a small girl her father, Bowlan Cain, moved to Hunt County, Texas, where she grew to womanhood and was married to W. V. Jones, December 8th, 1864. At the time of her marriage, Brother Jones was not a preacher, but it was generally known that he had answered the call and intended to enter the ministry in a short time, and the intended bride was fully informed of all this before the marriage and she accepted it for the better as she believed.

Four years later Brother Jones was granted license to exhort and after six months as an exhorter, he was given license to preach, and about thirty days after he was licensed to preach, he became a pastor, by supply work, in the old Northwest Texas which that year convened in Waxahachie, November 16th, 1870. From the time Brother Jones became responsible for a charge, his devoted wife was ready to help bear the burdens and share in the hardships incident to the life of a preacher in a new and sparsely settled country. She was ready and willing to make sacrifices that her husband might be able to meet his appointments and discharge the obligations resting upon him.

As the wife of a pioneer Texas preacher, she was always loyal to the work assigned to her husband whether it be a mission, circuit, or station, and most cheerfully entered into the work, no matter what hardships and privations it might bring, and ready to suffer or rejoice with the people, she with her husband was sent to serve. Up until Brother Jones' health forced him to retire from the active work as a pastor, and until age brought upon Sister Jones infirmities and she was not able to do domestic work as she had done, her home was the home of the tired preachers. Such men as Wm. Monk, J. Fred Cox, J. P. Mussett, E. A. Smith, E. A. Bailey, E. F. Boone and many others in making their round on large districts found a resting place in her home and she gave them the best she had.

Sister Jones was truly a devoted Christian woman, and not only gladly gave her life to the work of her husband in his ministry, but she gave words of cheer and comfort to all of God's messengers, but more especially to young preachers and although she was brought up in the Methodist Church, and had been a loyal member of that church from her girlhood, still she was possessed of a broad Christian spirit that extended to other religious bodies and she delighted to entertain in her home ministers of other denominations and they were her friends. She told her husband several times this year that she would not live through the summer, but assured him that the way was clear for her entrance into unending happiness and everlasting joy. She sowed in tears, but shall reap in joy and will, no doubt, bring her sheaves from many places up and down the frontier of Texas, and has already entered into the joys of a fruitful life.

Jones of 2101 Heaton Avenue, Fort Worth; Guy Jones, 1302 Homan Avenue, Fort Worth; Mrs. R. R. Goodman, Oklahoma City; and Miss Stella Jones, who keeps house for her father.

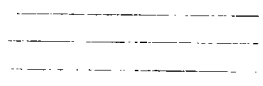
