Daily Proceedings

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

Opening—The Sixty-first session (being the seventeenth session since the division in 1910) of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the Austin Avenue Methodist Church, Waco, Texas, at nine o'clock A. M., November 17th, 1926, with Bishop John M. Moore in the chair.

The opening hymn was No. 631, "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun Doth His Successive Journeys Run." The Apostles Creed was repeated and the Bishop led the Conference in prayer, closing with the Lord's Prayer.

Ephesians, first chapter, first to fourteenth verses, was read as the lesson, the Bishop offering pointed and forceful comments as he read, and closing his great address by raising the question, "What is the responsibility of Methodism—What great plan did God have for Methodism?" He asserted that Methodism had a spiritual message for mankind, and urged that we, as members of this body, lay ourselves out to the full limit in our efforts to measure up to these large responsibilities. After the address, the Conference stood and joined in singing, "He Leadeth Me, Oh Blessed Thought."

Roll Call—The Secretary of the former session called the roll, and 246 clerical members, 10 second year men, 12 first year men, 4 preachers acting as supply pastors, and 49 lay delegates answered to their names (see roll).

Elections—A. D. Porter was elected Secretary, and on his nomination, R. W. Nation, R. A. Crosby, M. A. Turner, J. U. McAfee and J. M. Bond were elected assistants. F. O. Waddill was elected Statistical Secretary, and on his nomination, the following Assistant Statistical Secretaries were elected: Horace Poteet, R. H. Boyd, P. L. Shuler, J. T. Gardner, C. O. Hightower, R. J. LaPrade, J. U. McAfee, P. E. Lancaster and W. E. Harrell.

Hours of Meeting and Adjourning—On motion of F. P. Culver the hour for meeting was set at 9:00 A. M., and for adjourning at 12:30 noon.

Bar of the Conference—Cullom H. Booth moved that the bar of the Conference be designated as that part of the main floor in front of the gallery, and it was so ordered.

Graham; Georgetown District, Mrs. E. P. Williams in place of J. S. Fox.



Welcome Address—The pastor-host, C. H. Booth, introduced Mr. W. F. Barnett, manager of the Methodist Home at Waco, who addressed words of welcome to the Conference, and presented a supply of directories of the present session, these having been published in the Methodist Home print shop.

Introductions—The Bishop introduced the following visitors: Dr. L. E. Todd, Secretary of Board of Finance, St. Louis, Mo.; Dr. E. B. Chappell, Editor of Sunday School Literature, Nashville, Tenn.; Dr. C. C. Selecman, President of Southern Methodist University, Dallas; Rev. J. J. Morgan, Agent of American Bible Society, Dallas; Dr. Frank S. Onderdonk, Superintendent of Texas Mexican Mission, San Antonio; Rev. J. P. McReynolds of the Northwest Conference, Rev. Paul Evans of the West Texas Conference, Rev. E. L. Spurlock, President of Kidd-Key College, Sherman; and Rev. Jesse C. Thompson, pastor of student work at A. & M. College, College Station.

Transfers In—Question 9 was called—"Who are received by transfer from other conferences?" and the Bishop announced the following names: Dr. C. M. Bishop, elder, from East Oklahoma Conference; Prof. R. W. Goodloe, elder, from West Oklahoma Conference; Dr. G. E. Cameron, elder, from St. Louis Conference; Dr. Caspar S. Wright, Rev. F. B. Buchanan and Rev. W. G. Gwaltney, elders, from the West Texas Conference; and Rev. C. A. Norcross, deacon in Class of Third Year, from Northwest Texas Conference. All these were present and were introduced to the Conference except Dr. Cameron, Dr. Bishop and Rev. F. B. Buchanan.

Standing Committees—J. H. Stewart read the report of the Presiding Elders nominating the Standing Committees, and the report was adopted (See list).

Board of Missions Vacancy—E. B. Hawk was placed on the Board of Missions in place of W. C. Hilburn, deceased.

Communications—Numerous communications were announced by the Chair and referred to the proper boards and committees.

Memoirs—Question 14 was called, "What preachers have died during the year?" and the following names were referred to the Committee on Memoirs: W. V. Jones, E. A. Smith, W. C. Hilburn and R. F. Brown. The Bishop called for the Conference to stand as a mark of sympathetic respect to these four beloved and fallen comrades. Bishop Moore led in an appropriate prayer.

Superannuate Endowment—Dr. Luther E. Todd spoke to the Conference concerning the work of the General Board of Finance, urging the prompt payment of all money collected and brought to Conference for that great cause. Bishop Moore responded to the address of Dr. Todd, stressing the importance of raising the Central Texas Conference quota of the Superannuate Endowment Fund.

Temperance and Social Service—Dr. R. H. Bennett, representative of the General Board of Temperance and Social Service, addressed the Conference.

Student Work at A. & M. College—Rev. Jesse C. Thompson brought to the attention of the Conference the important work being done among the students of A. & M. College by the Methodists of this state. Cullom H. Booth also spoke a few words concerning the situation.

Epworth League—Rev. Ralph E. Nollner, Assistant Secretary of General Epworth League Board, brought a report from that board.

American Bible Society—Rev. J. J. Morgan presented the interests of the American Bible Society.

Co-operation with Publishing House—Bishop Moore urged the proper co-operation of the members of the Conference with the Methodist Publishing House.

Editor of Conference Journal—On nomination of J. M. Bond, Rev. M. M. Chunn was elected editor of the Conference Journal. A. D. Porter spoke words of appreciation on the part of the Conference for the efficient seven years' labors of J. M. Bond as Editor of the Journal.

Reports of Presiding Elders—Question 21, "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?" was called, and under this call A. D. Porter, Presiding Elder of the Brownwood District and L. A. Webb, Presiding Elder of the Cisco District, reported for their Districts. Their characters passed, and as the names of the preachers in those two districts were called, their characters also passed.

Commission on Benevolences—H. E. Stout read a resolution calling for a Conference Commission on Benevolences which was adopted, and is as follows:

RESOLUTION FROM CONFERENCE BOARD PRESIDENTS

Whereas, the new Discipline (1926) calls for the correlation of all the educational and administrative agencies of the church in the promotion of Christian stewardship (Par. 561), and requires an annual every-member canvass in behalf of all the benevolent claims under the direction of the General Board of Lay Activities and with the co-operation of all the general agencies of the church (Par. 570);

And, whereas, a General Commission on Benevolences has been formed, consisting of the general secretaries and a representative from each of the other general agencies of the church, to carry out the intent and purpose of this new legislation;

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Central Texas Conference constitute a Conference Commission on Benevolences, composed of the Presidents of the various Conference Boards, which shall be auxiliary to the General Commission and shall co-operate with the General and Conference Boards of Lay Activities in the cultivation of Christian stewardship and the promotion of the full payment of the benevolent assessments, and that Friday morning at ten o'clock be fixed as the order of the day for considering the report of this Commission.

Southern Methodist University—President C. C. Selecman presented a brief report of the progress of Southern Methodist University. The Bishop followed with a discussion of the needs of the School of Theology, laying special emphasis upon the urgent demand for a dormitory for theological students.

Adjournment—After sundry announcements, the Conference adjourned at 12:40 P. M., with the benediction pronounced by Dr. R. C. Armstrong.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

Opening—Bishop Moore called the Conference to order promptly at nine o'clock, announcing Hymn No. 19, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing", which was sung, the Conference standing, and Rev. M. K. Little led in prayer. Paul's Epistle to Titus was read as a lesson, the Bishop making very interesting, pungent and instructive comments.

Minutes—The minutes of the previous session were read by the Secretary and were approved.

Roll Call—The roll of absentees was called (See roll). On motion of J. W. Bergin, further calling of the roll was suspended.

Alternate—Mrs. E. W. Bridges was seated in place of Leake Ayres from the Gatesville District.

Vacancies on Boards—G. W. Shearer was placed on the Board of Trustees of Superannuate Homes in place of W. C. Hilburn, deceased. W. B. Andrews moved the substitution of A. W. Hall on the Budget Commission to accord with Standing Rule No. 6, and this was done.

Introductions—The following were introduced to the Conference: Rev. F. H. Harvey of the Minnesota Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Dr. David W. Carter of the Texas Mexican Mission, Dr. J. Marvin Culbreth of the General Board of Education, Dr. E. H. Rawlings of the General Board of Missions, and Rev. A. C. Saylor of the Southwest Missouri Conference.

Special Session—At the request of the Conference Board of Missions, Judge W. Erskine Williams moved that a special session of the Conference be ordered for 7:30 P. M. to hear and consider Report No. 1 of the Mission Board, and to give audience to the address of Dr. Rawlings. The motion prevailed.

Admission on Trial—Question No. 1., "Who are admitted on trial?" was called, and Willard Emerson Shipp, coming properly recommended from the Waco District, having passed a satisfactory examination, and being favorably reported on by the Committee on Admissions, was admitted on trial.

Advancement of First Year Class—Question No. 3 was called, "Who remain on trial?" The names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were advanced to the Class of the Second Year: James Thomas Gardner, Floyd Ernest Johnson, Leslie W. Seymour, Chas. H. Sisserson, Arthur G. Standlee, Earnest Wesley Swearingen, Floyd W. Thrash, J. D. F. Williams and Wallace Nail Dunson.

Remaining in First Year Class—Question 2, "Who else is in the Class of the First Year?" was called. In answer the names of Hubert C. Smith and C. L. Hodges were called, their characters passed, and they remained in the Class of the First Year.

Discontinued—The name of Austin C. Halsell was called and he was discontinued.

Full Connection—Question No. 6, "Who are admitted into full connection?" was called. The names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were advanced to the Class of the Third Year, being also elected to Deacons' Orders: Melvin A. Walker, Homer

Ross Hall, Andrew Kenneth Marney, Adrian C. Jones, Robert Howell Davenport, Wallace Nail Dunson, Jos I. Patterson. The names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were advanced to the Class of the Third Year, being already Deacons: Roy L. Crawford, John B. Bailey, and Kenneth Pope. The names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were advanced to the Class of the Third Year, being Elders: T. B. Sowell and J. B. Weathers.

Remaining in Second Year Class—Question No. 4 was called, "Who else is in the Class of the Second Year?" and the names of the following were called, their characters passed, they remaining in the Class of the Second Year: B. H. Keathley, H. J. Sanders, (elder) Wm. M. Justice, B. M. Cox, C. W. Ferguson, A. L. Long, and L. D. Williams.

Received from other churches—Jackson Capine Oglesby was received from the Methodist Episcopal Church in the Class of the Second Year, his character passed, and he was elected a Deacon and advanced to the Class of the Third Year.

Advanced to Fourth Year—The names of the following were called, their characters passed and they were advanced to the Class of the Fourth Year: H. P. Watkins (elder), Edmund Heinsohn, T. M. McBrayer, R. H. Price, C. O. Boatman, E. R. Gordon, Frank L. Turner, D. R. McCauley, Paul W. Utley, Jos. L. Chunn, Alvin C. Gafford, T. Wesley Hook and Wm. C. Davis.

Remaining in Third Year Class—The name of Jos. S. Cook was called, his character passed, and he remained in the Class of the Third Year.

Election of Elders—Question 19 was called, "What traveling preachers are elected elders?" and in answer the names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were elected to elders orders: Arthur Jackson Jones, Geo. Gober Smith, Van Poe Morrison, John Daniel Knoy, Hushell Harry Nance.

Remaining in Fourth Year Class—In answer to Question 16, "Who else is in the Class of the Fourth Year?" the name of A. J. Helms was called, his character passed, and he remained in the Class of the Fourth Year.

Local Deacons—In answer to Question 17 (second section), "What local preachers have been elected Deacons?" the following were elected: R. L. Bowman from the Brownwood District; Floyd Ernest Johnson, Floyd William Thrash, Richard Pinkney Crenshaw and Jos. Edward Gibson from the Fort Worth District; George Fred Siler from the Gatesville District, and Hubert C. Smith from the Waxahachie District.

Local Elders—Question 19 (second section), "What local preachers have been elected elders?" was called and the answer was no one.

Reports of Presiding Elders—Question 21 was resumed, the name of O. F. Sensabaugh was called, his character passed and he rendered a report of the year's work in the Cleburne District. The Bishop called the names of the preachers in the District and the answer in each case was "Nothing against him." When the name of C. O. Davis was called, the Presiding Elder stated that he had withdrawn from the Methodist Church in order that he might unite with the Church of the Disciples, and his credentials were filed with the Secretary of

the Conference, answering Question 12, "Who have withdrawn or been expelled?" The character of John M. Barcus was passed and he reported for the Corsicana District, after which the names of all the preachers in that District were called and their characters passed.

Dr. E. B. Chappell—Dr. Chappell, Sunday School Editor, spoke to the Conference elucidating the Dual Extension Plan, also explaining the re-writing of the Graded Courses of the Sunday School Literature.

Presiding Elders' Reports—Question 21 was resumed. C. R. Wright reported for the Fort Worth District, and his character and that of every preacher in the District were passed. C. E. Lindsey made a report for the Gatesville District and his and the characters of the preachers in that district were passed.

Christian Education Movement—Dr. J. Marvin Culbreth spoke to the Conference on the progress of the Christian Education Movement, and concerning the General Board of Education.

Supernumerary—The names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the Supernumerary relation: T. W. Ellis, C. S. Field, W. B. Gilliland and S. P. Gilmore. This was in answer to Question 22.

Superannuate—In answer to Question 23, "Who are superannuated?" the names of the following were called, their characters passed, and they were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the Superannuate relation: J. R. B. Hall, R. C. Armstrong, R. B. Young, J. F. Tyson, P. W. Layne, M. S. Hotchkiss, J. B. Berry, B. F. Alsup and A. T. Culbertson. The names of all who have been on the superannuate list during the past year were called, their characters passed, and they were referred for the same relation (See list).

Effective List—The name of M. L. Story was called, his character passed, and he remained on the effective list.

Telegram from Baptist Convention—The following telegram was received:

"The Baptist General Convention of Texas sends greetings and prays that Heaven's best blessings may be upon you with guidance of the Holy Spirit."

Reply to Telegram—On motion of J. E. Crawford, the secretary was instructed to send a suitable reply.

Adjournment—Communications were referred to various boards, numerous announcements were made, the doxology was sung, the benediction, pronounced by B. F. Alsup, and the Conference adjourned.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY EVENING SESSION

Opening—After a delightful program of song by the choir of the Austin Avenue Methodist Church, the Conference convened pursuant to adjournment, with Judge W. Erskine Williams in the chair by the appointment of the Bishop. The Conference stood and sang, "We are Marching to Zion", and Dr. E. B. Hawk led in prayer.

Report No. 1 of Board of Missions—T. S. Barcus read Report No. 1 of the Conference Board of Missions and moved its adoption. While the motion was pending, Dr. E. H. Rawlings was presented and addressed the Conference. At the close of the address, the re-reading of the recommendations was called for and this was done. J. W. W. Shuler spoke to the report. J. W. Fort raised the question, "What will be the quota of the Central Texas Conference of the one million

dollars referred to in the report." Dr. Rawlings answered that it would run about fifty cents per member of the church. Dr. T. S. Barcus spoke to the report. J. W. Cowan made inquiry as to the work of the Missionary Committee in the local church. The following also spoke to the report: W. M. Rader, T. S. Ogle, W. H. Coleman and W. N. Curry. W. M. Rader offered an amendment to read as follows (See amended paragraph). E. B. Hawk urged the adoption of the report. S. P. Nevill spoke to the amendment. T. S. Ogle offered an amendment to the amendment, striking out the words "Our share" and the amendment to the amendment was lost. The amendment was adopted, and the report as amended was then adopted with one single negative vote. It follows below:

REPORT NO. ONE, BOARD OF MISSIONS

At its last session in Memphis, Tennessee, the General Conference directed that "in every church each year during the months of January and February," a "special Missionary cultivation campaign shall be conducted throughout the whole church in every congregation, when each member of the church shall be given an opportunity to make a free will offering for maintaining the general work of the Board." By special resolution the General Conference ordered that "the goal in this special appeal shall be to secure at least one million dollars over and above income from assessment, Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues for maintenance each year during the quadrennium."

In pursuance of the above provision, the General Conference further ordered that the preacher in charge shall "organize a missionary committee, which shall be auxiliary to the Conference Board of Missions," that the pastor shall be in charge of the special campaign in each congregation through the months of January and February, and through the missionary committee shall conduct "an every-member canvass in every congregation to secure a free will offering for missions in addition to the assessment."

The Education and Promotion Secretary of the Board of Missions, Dr. E. H. Rawlings, appeared before your Board, and in a very impressive statement set forth the plans of the General Board for the conduct of this two months period in the church. After due and prayerful consideration, your Board in this report No. One offers for your consideration the following recommendations:

1. That the Central Texas Conference hereby welcomes the plan for a period of missionary cultivation throughout the church each year, and we pledge ourselves, preachers and laymen, to enter heartily into the plan as outlined for our acceptance.
2. That we accept responsibility, and will submit the every-member canvas and free will offering to our people as proposed.
3. That the attention of the pastor be called to the new status of the missionary committee as related to the Annual Conference Board, as well as to the general missionary cultivation of the local congregation, and the pastor is hereby urged immediately at the beginning of the Conference year, if it has not already been done, to organize a missionary committee in every congregation.
4. That the attention of the Presiding Elder be called to the provision in Article 21, Paragraph 482 of the Discipline, in which he is directed to "conduct with his preachers and lay representatives a missionary institute, in which institute he shall lay plans for the district-wide observance of intensive missionary cultivation during the months of January and February." We ask that his missionary institute be held in conformity with this provision, and that during this Conference

session the Presiding Elders arrange dates and places for their missionary institutes, to occur as far as possible in the early weeks of January.

Adjournment—The Conference stood and sang one stanza of "The Kingdom is Coming," two announcements were made, and the session adjourned with the benediction by M. S. Hotchkiss.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Opening—The Conference convened at nine o'clock A. M. The Bishop asked for the singing of Hymn No. 355, "Love Divine, All Love Excelling." T. S. Armstrong led in prayer. Bishop Moore read a few verses of Paul's Letter to Timothy.

Minutes—The Secretary read the minutes of Thursday morning's and Thursday evening's sessions, and they were adopted.

Admission into Full Connection—The class for Admission into Full Connection was called to the chancel to hear the address of the Bishop. After the address, the young men gave satisfactory answers to the questions propounded and by a unanimous vote of the Conference were admitted into full connection. The list is as follows: Melvin A. Walker, Homer Ross Hall, Andrew Kenneth Marney, Adrian C. Jones, Robert Howell Davenport, Wallace Nail Dunson, Jos. I. Patterson (deacon), Roy L. Crawford (deacon), Jno. B. Bailey (deacon), Kenneth Pope (deacon), J. B. Weathers (elder), and Jackson C. Oglesby.

Telegram—The Secretary read the following telegram:

Waco, Texas, Nov. 18th, 1926.

"Baptist General Convention of Texas,
San Antonio, Texas.

Your message of greeting received with deep appreciation by the Central Texas Methodist Conference. Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We thank God and make mention of you in our prayers. Hearing of your love and faith which you have toward the Lord Jesus and toward all saints, let brotherly love continue.

The telegram was approved by the Conference.

B. A. Snoddy—D. L. Collie moved that a telegram be sent to Rev. B. A. Snoddy, a superannuate member of the Conference, who is at home sick, and it was so ordered.

Membership on Board—A. W. Hall called attention to the fact that he was ineligible to membership on the Commission on Budget because he was already a member of a Conference Board. The point was well taken and on motion of W. B. Andrews, G. W. Shearer was placed on the Commission on Budget.

Amendment to Standing Rule No. 1.—J. D. Hendrickson offered an amendment to Standing Rule No. 1, bearing on membership in the District Conference. A. D. Porter spoke against the amendment. J. W. Fort and J. W. W. Shuler discussed the matter. The amendment was lost.

Leave of Absence—C. E. Wade was granted leave of absence on account of a funeral.

Words of Commendation—J. W. Fort spoke words of praise concerning the address of the Bishop to the Class for Admission into Full Connection, and his remarks were greeted with applause.

Report of Commission on Benevolences—C. L. Cartwright read the report of the Commission on Benevolences and moved the adoption of the report. H. E. Stout spoke to the report, and J. E. Crawford, Associate Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, addressed the Conference. J. W. Bergin also spoke to the report, calling attention to the fact that the Conference collections represented the actual support of many of our workers. The Bishop urged that everyone be informed as to what is involved in the benevolences, the report was then adopted and is as follows:

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON BENEVOLENCES

We, your commission, composed of the Presidents of the various Boards, appointed as auxiliary to the general Commission on Benevolences to co-operate with the General and Conference Boards of Lay Activities in the promotion of Christian Stewardship and the full payment of the assessments for all the benevolent claims, beg leave to report as follows:

1. We rejoice in the opportunity afforded in this Commission for closer fellowship and more intimate and sympathetic relations among the different Conference Boards. The work of the kingdom is one work, and the purpose of all the interests represented by all our boards is one and the same, namely, the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth.

2. We recognize the wisdom and timeliness of the action of the General Conference in providing for the correlation of all the educational and administrative agencies of the Church in a great program of stewardship cultivation, as outlined in Par. 561. We believe that we have no more fundamental need in our church today than the training of our people in the principles and practice of Christian stewardship. Our hope of stemming the tide of materialism that is threatening our civilization, of safeguarding our membership against the deadly curse of covetousness and of financing our regular work and succeeding in all our forward movements in behalf of our special interests lies in such training. We join heartily with the Board of Lay Activities in urging that a Christian Stewardship Committee be organized and an earnest, persistent effort be put forth to educate our people in Christian Stewardship in all our churches.

3. We deplore the great loss to our General and Conference boards and the work of the kingdom the past quadrennium through the low percentage of payment on the benevolent assessments. While we note with pleasure that the record of our own conference in this regard is considerably above the average, yet we would not be satisfied with less than 100% payment of these sacred claims. The most imperative financial matter before us as a Church is that we bring up this base line of our work.

We would urge that the Central Texas Conference set a worthy standard for entire collection the first year of the new quadrennium by paying the benevolences in full.

To this end we recommend that the every member canvass to provide for these interests be made in every charge as early in the conference year as possible. We would call attention to the fact that May 1st has been fixed by the General Commission on Benevolences as the date for a church-wide check up, at which time every church, Charge, District, and Conference shall report the results of the canvass. On behalf of our respective Boards we pledge to the Board of Lay Activities and our Presiding Elders our hearty co-operation in

the program to educate our people on the benevolences and secure 100% on the assessments for these interests.

Report of Board of Lay Activities—Prof. C. F. Webb read the report of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. The report was adopted, and the adoption elected W. J. Baker, Fort Worth, Texas, as Conference Lay Leader, answering Question 41, “Who is elected Conference Lay Leader?” The report follows below:

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference, in session at Waco, November 17th, 1926.

The Conference Board of Lay Activities makes the following report to this Annual Conference:

The last General Conference gave new responsibility to the Boards of Lay Activities. Three outstanding responsibilities were placed upon the General Board.

First: It is provided that the General Board of Lay Activities shall be charged with the cultivation and promotion of Christian Stewardship and for the purpose of carrying out its plans it shall correlate the various educational and administrative agencies of the Church. It is provided that a definite period each year shall be designated in which major emphasis shall be given to the study and promotion of Stewardship principles. The Discipline makes it mandatory upon every Church to have a committee on Christian Stewardship and the composition of this committee is given in paragraph 562.

Second: The General Board of Lay Activities is given direction and authority to develop “The Wesley Brotherhood of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.” The Discipline directs that Brotherhoods shall be organized where practical, in all of our congregations.

Third: The General Board of Lay Activities is charged with the promotion of the payment of the benevolent assessments of the Church and is directed to inaugurate plans and policies to reach the entire membership of the Church in developing a conscience on this question and securing a contribution from every member. To this end it is charged with the promotion of an annual every member canvass throughout the Church in behalf of all benevolent claims, which we recommend shall be at the earliest possible time.

We call your special attention to the circuit and the Church Board of Lay Activities which now becomes the pastor’s cabinet. We believe that this Board will be of very great value to any pastor. We are glad to state that the laymen of the Church are more and more becoming informed as to the purposes and plans of the Church and will be better prepared and more active in giving assistance in carrying out the great programs of our Church.

We recommend, most heartily, the “Methodist Layman” which is the official organ of the Wesley Brotherhood. We request an appropriation of \$750.00 to carry on our work.

Not for ourselves alone, but for our predecessors in office also, we hereby express our gratitude to Judge Williams for helpful suggestions, formal and informal instructions and wholesome correction. We admire his remarkable powers of organization and administration, and his skillful generalship.

The laity of the Central Texas Conference, especially the official contingent, owe much to Judge Williams for revealing to them their possibilities as laymen in the service of our Church, and showing them that theirs is no less real a ministry than that of the preachers.

He is like the proverbial blacksmith preacher who used to say, "My business is to serve God but I shoe horses to make expenses." Group Insurance—John M. Barcus presented the request of the Conference Brotherhood in regard to the proposition of group insurance. Horace Bishop spoke briefly on the subject. E. Hightower moved that the paper be laid on the table, and this was done.

Presiding Elders' Reports—Question 21 was resumed, the name of Sam G. Thompson was called, his character passed and he reported for the Georgetown District. The names of all the preachers of that dis-

trict were called and their characters passed. The name of F. P. Culver was called, his character passed and he reported for the Waco District. The names of all the preachers of the Waco District were then called, and their characters passed. J. W. Bergin's name was called, his character passed, and after making a report for the Waxahachie District, the names of all the preachers in that district were called and their characters passed.

Leave of Absence—Mac M. Smith and E. R. Patterson were granted leave of absence.

Weatherford District Report—The name of J. H. Stewart was called, his character passed, and he reported for the Weatherford District. The names of all the preachers of the District were called and their characters passed. Thus was completed the call of Question 21, "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

Amendment to Standing Rule No. 10.—O. F. Sensabaugh offered an amendment to Standing Rule No. 10, and after a brief discussion, the amendment was withdrawn.

Superannuate—The name of W. A. Neill was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the Superannuate relation.

Report of Board of Temperance and Social Service—The report of the Board of Temperance and Social Service was read by M. L. Boone. During the consideration of the report, Dr. J. H. Groseclose of the North Texas Conference, was introduced, and made a statement concerning the C. C. Young Memorial Home for Aged Women, located at Dallas, Texas. Thos. S. Barcus made the point of order that the \$3,000 asked for in the report for the benefit of the San Antonio Mission Home was not properly before the Conference, but must be presented to the Commission on Budget. The point was well taken. C. H. Booth made a motion to strike out "Mothers' Day," and to insert the words, "taking a collection for the Home some time during the year." The amendment was adopted. Atticus Webb spoke to the report. F. P. Culver offered an amendment to strike out the words "without reservation," and the amendment was adopted. The report, as amended, was then adopted and follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

We, your Board of Temperance and Social Service, beg leave to make the following report:

During the last seven years a great deal of false propoganda have flooded our country through the secular press, and it has not been adequately answered by our religious press and pulpit. This has produced a serious crisis in our fight for temperance. On this crisis, we adopt the following statement from our General Board, and make it a part of our report:

"We realize that the resistance of the people will gradually be weakened by this misrepresentation and by the tissue of falsehood that is fed to the people by the organized propoganda, and that it must be met by the truth. The task that lies before the friends of temperance and order is the most exacting that they have ever faced. There is need that the Churches deliver all their force for prohibition and that civic and social organizations actively interest themselves. We especially commend the Wcmen's Christian Temperance Union and the Anti-Saloon League as agencies to which the people must rally for leadership in the fight. The former successes of the W. C. T. U. must be parelleled by an equally effective program of education, and

the political means by which the Anti-Saloon League has achieved success must be employed in the retention of what we have gained and in advancing the conquest of prohibition legislation through adequate enforcement of laws."

In order to accomplish what is here suggested we recommend that the following program be carried out within the bounds of the Conference.

1. That the quarterly temperance lesson be taught and among the younger students, that great emphasis be laid on the necessity for abstinence from the use of intoxicating liquors.

2. That the committees on temperance and social service required by our discipline be appointed in all districts, charges and churches.

3. That quarterly, if possible, pertinent facts involving up to date information on this question be given from our pulpits by pastors, or by laymen on invitation of the pastors.

4. That the superintendents of the Department of Temperance and Social Service of our women's department carry out a vigorous program in behalf of this cause.

5. The Anti-Saloon League of Texas has promised to furnish literature and assistance for carrying out the above program of education when requested. Also a movement is being inaugurated in the department of lay activities of some of our Texas Conferences to lend assistance along the same line. We recommend that our conference co-operate in the movement.

6. We urge our pastors and laymen to use the free literature of the Anti-Saloon League to the fullest effect for our cause.

7. We endorse without reservation the W. C. T. U. and the Anti-Saloon League. We recognize that the vicious attack now being made on the Anti-Saloon League in our state and nation is simply an attack on the cause of prohibition.

8. We know that it takes money for the Anti-Saloon League to support its organized work and to publish and distribute the enormous amount of literature it is putting out. Their only means of securing this money is by public free will offerings taken in services in our church and in other churches.

9. We endorse the C. C. Young Memorial Home for aged women located at Dallas. We are informed by Dr. J. H. Groseclose that the home will soon open and that among the aged women who will be first admitted are two from the bounds of our own Conference. These good women and many others will have to be supported. For this purpose we recommend that free will offerings be taken for this home some time during the conference year and remitted to those in charge of that institution.

10. Another of these institutions for Social Service sustained by our church is the Mission Home and Training School at San Antonio, in which we have joint ownership with the West Texas Conference. We recommend a continuance of the appropriation of \$3,000,000 for the coming year.

11. We recommend to the Bishop and Cabinet the appointment of Rev. Atticus Webb as Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas.

Presence of H. L. Rogers—H. L. Rogers was noted as being present at the previous morning session.

Report No. 2 of Board of Missions—W. Erskine Williams read Report No. 2 of the Board of Missions, providing for a Conference, Missionary Secretary, and moved its adoption. Cullom H. Booth spoke in opposition to the adoption of the report. Bishop Moore stated that while we have a crowded condition in the Conference, that should not have any influence in the adoption or rejection of the report, but that it should be considered on its own merits. J. W. Fort and J. W. Bergin spoke in favor of the report; M. W. Clark and C. H. Puckett spoke against it. S. J. Rucker and W. W. Ward expressed their approval of the report, and F. F. Downs opposed it. F. P. Culver spoke for the report's adoption. During his speech, C. H. Booth rose to a point of personal privilege. Judge Geo. W. Barcus and W. J. Hearon opposed the adoption of the report, and C. R. Wright expressed himself as favoring it. On motion of R. C. Armstrong, the previous question was ordered. The vote was taken and the result was 95 for, and 147 against the adoption of the report, and it was therefore rejected.

Mission Cause—Bishop Moore exhorted the Conference to carry out a strong, aggressive missionary program in this time of great need and large opportunity.

Board of Education—The Board of Education was granted leave of absence from the Conference room.

Report of Sunday School Board—T. E. Bowman read the report of the Sunday School Board and moved its adoption. M. A. Turner made inquiry as to the Fourth Sunday's collection for Missions. Dr. E. Hightower explained operation of the agreement between the General Sunday School Board and the General Board of Missions respecting the Dual Extension Plan. The report was then adopted, and is as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

Dear Brethren:

The Sunday School Board reports as follows.

The past Quadrennium in Sunday School Activities has been by far the best of any Quadrennium in the history of our Conference. The work along all lines has progressed in a wonderful way. Several agencies have contributed to this success. The ability of the General Board to get hold of the best methods for Sunday School work, the thoroughness with which they have been worked out and made usable, and the rapidity with which they have been put in operation have been a source of great inspiration and help to all our people. The manner in which this knowledge has been brought to our people through Institutes, Training Schools, and Conferences of various kinds, together with the general awakening of the Pastors and Sunday School Workers has made possible the rapid progress that this Conference has made. Never was your Board more hopeful for the Sunday School Work.

In view of the progress made, we feel that we have come to a time when we can enlarge our program, and we have some recommendations to make that we trust will meet with the approval of this Conference.

The last General Conference gave what was virtually a new commission to the General Board, that of projecting a program of Sunday School Extension. This program is known as the "Dual Extension Plan." This plan proposes to hold in equal balance before the Sunday

Schools the support of our home mission work and the support of our foreign work. In particular, it offers to the Sunday schools of the Conference an opportunity of helping to support a trained home mission worker devoting his time to Sunday School extension in the unchurched area of the Conference and an opportunity to support Sunday School work in the foreign fields. This has advantages, both financial and educational. The extension plan may be indicated as follows:

- (1) Organizing Sunday Schools in unchurched areas.
- (2) Sympathetic and intelligent supervision of weak and struggling schools that are likely to die unless intelligent aid is given.
- (3) Sunday School extension among other races living within the bounds of the Conference.
- (4) Conducting Cokesbury Training Schools throughout the rural sections of the Conference.

Your Board feels that the time has come when it can project this plan of work, and it has so acted. In view of the fact that the plan calls for the employing of a man for full time, the Board unanimously requests the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. B. Curry to the position of Superintendent of "Dual Extension Work." This appointment carries with it a stipulated salary of \$3600.00, together with an allowance of \$600.00 for expenses and \$300.00 for office help.

During the year, and late in the year this Board, and the Conference has suffered almost an irreparable loss in the going of Brother Brown, our Conference Superintendent. He was doing a phenomenal work for the Sunday schools of the Conference. The feeling of the Sunday School Board, and we are sure of the entire Conference, and of all who knew him is fittingly expressed in the following resolution which was passed by the Board:

"In Memory of Rev. R. F. Brown"

"With sad hearts the Sunday School Board of the Central Texas Conference recognizes the great loss to our Church and the Sunday School cause in the passing on October 27, 1926 of our faithful and beloved Brother and Conference Superintendent, Rev. R. F. Brown. It was he who pioneered the way, blazed the trail, and laid the foundation for the successful fruition of the Master's cause through the Sunday Schools of the Conference. His zeal, loyalty, and enthusiasm were an inspiration to all with whom he came in contact, and his sweet-spirited handling of all problems, both of his own and others, has been a benediction to the Sunday School workers throughout the Conference. Peace be to his ashes."

Rev. G. A. Schlueter was elected by the Board, and is hereby recommended to the Bishop for appointment to the position of Conference Superintendent of Sunday Schools to fill the place so ably filled by Brother Brown. The salary designated is \$3000.00, with an allowance of \$300.00 for office help, \$400.00 for expenses. In this connection, and for your information we desire to say that the Board unanimously selected Mrs. G. A. Schlueter to fill the position of Superintendent of the Elementary Division that was so worthily filled by Mrs. Brown. Mrs. Schlueter is well equipped for this work, and will be free to go with Brother Schlueter and assist him in his work. The Board feels that it has a happy arrangement in the employment of all these workers.

This Board urges every Pastor and Superintendent to thoroughly familiarize himself with Section 2, Paragraph 386 of Discipline, which paragraph requires all our Sunday Schools to observe one Sunday in each month as "Missionary Day, and let the offering taken on this day, as the Worker's Council may elect in advance, be a special for

missions, jointly approved by the General Board of Missions and the General Sunday School Board; or a special for the promotion of Sunday School work under the General Sunday School Board in missionary areas at home and abroad." The carrying out of this part of the Program is obligatory on the schools. Your Conference Board greatly desires that you send the offerings of this day to Rev. E. W. Bridges, Gatesville, Texas. The Board will need the money to carry out the new enterprise known as the "Dual Extension Plan" that it has launched.

Evangelism

The method of Evangelism offered for the Sunday School is doubtless the most effective method to be found anywhere. It is very gratifying to learn that 92,428 Sunday School pupils were received into the Church last year, an increase of 3,508 over the preceding year. Evangelism in the Sunday School is not some spasmodic effort, but a continuous effort which lasts throughout the year. In view of the vast possibilities wrapped up in this plan, may we not urge our Pastors and Sunday School workers to use as best they may this effective agency fostered by the General Sunday Board of our Church for reaching and saving the young life of our country. May we not ask that Decision Day be conscientiously observed in every school?

Training Work

We congratulate the members of our Church on the program of Leadership Training that is being promoted by the General Sunday School Board. The number of credits issued by the Training Department of the General Board in 1916 was 637; the number in 1921 was 15,989; the number issued in 1925 was 44,192. The number of training credits issued last year by the General Sunday School Board was greater than the number issued by all other Protestant denominations combined, which maintains training standards approximately equal to our own.

In our own Conference, during the past year we had 13 Standard Training Schools, as compared with 8 held in the year immediately preceding; and 2502 units of credit in the Standard Training Course, as compared with 2090 during the year immediately preceding. Also, during the past year, 67 credits in the Cokesbury course have been issued to our Conference. During the year 1925, the Central Texas Conference led all the Conferences of our Church in the number of Blue Seals awards, and was surpassed by only one Conference in the number of incomplete diplomas issued, and was surpassed by only three Conferences in the total number of units of training credit.

We urge on our preachers and laymen the promotion of the Training Program of the General Sunday School Board.

Sunday School Administration

We had before us reports from 10 schools making Program of Work "B", and reports from 5 schools making Program of Work "C". These reports indicate actively organized schools making the Program of Work for which they were checked. However, the comparatively few reports make it impossible for the Board to assemble facts as to the actual condition of the Sunday School in the matter of Administration.

We commend these who have responded, and we would recommend that special emphasis be placed on the "Check Up" of all the schools in the Conference.

District Organization

We are gratified to know that in each of the ten districts of the Conference a District Organization has been maintained with the necessary officers, and where these officers have been active great and

Definite results have been obtained. The Board earnestly asks for the intelligent, active and intensive co-operation of all district officers in carrying out the plans of the Board during the year. We recommend that the District Organization become responsible for holding a District Sunday School Institute in each District.

We recommend that the Sunday School Offering taken on the first Sunday of the new Conference year be sent to the District Superintendent to be used for the promotion of Sunday School work within the bounds of that District.

Special Days

We believe that the interest of our Sunday Schools can be greatly strengthened by a careful observance of the special days.

We recommend that "Hospital Day" be observed on "Mother's Day," in the Sunday School, and that the offering on that day be sent to the Hospital Commissioner for use in building and equipping the Children's Ward in the Hospital.

We recommend that the 3rd Sunday in April as designated in the Discipline, or as near thereto as possible, be observed as "Sunday School Day," and that the offering on that day be sent to W. S. Rowland, Temple, Texas, Treasurer of the Board, for use in financing Sunday School work in the Conference. We also recommend the observance of Promotion Day and Decision Day as required by the Discipline.

We further recommend with all the emphasis possible that the fourth Sunday in each month be observed as "Missionary Day," with prayer in the Sunday School, and that the offering be sent to Rev. E. W. Bridges, Treasurer of Mission Fund, for the promotion of Dual Extension Work.

Literature

We heartily recommend the use of the Literature issued by the General Sunday School Board. It is the best that can be found for Methodist pupils. We have not the space to mention each periodical. We do want to call attention to two lesson courses known as the "Graded Lessons," and the "Group Uniform Lessons." The Group Lessons are gotten out for use in small Sunday Schools. The difference between the "Group Uniform Lessons," and the "Graded Lessons" is that, whereas the latter are graded by years, the former are graded by departments. That is, there is one course for all Primary pupils (6-8), one for all Juniors (9-11), and one for each other department in the school. We would like to just mention four weekly papers published by the General Board. These are "Boys and Girls"—a beautifully illustrated paper for children under ten years of age. "The Javersack"—for boys from ten to seventeen. "The Torch Bearer"—for girls from ten to seventeen. "Our Young People"—for everybody from eighteen to one hundred. The intention of this wholesome, religious literature is to as far as possible overcome the influence of the vile publications which are offered for sale by practically every news stand in our country.

Children's Week

We urge the observance of Children's Week through the three-fold programs of the parents meeting, Home Visitation, and the Forward Step.

Vacation Church Schools

We heartily endorse the plan of the General Board for Vacation Church Schools and recommend its use as far as possible among the schools.

We endorse the work of the Rev. E. Hightower, and respectfully

request the Bishop to appoint him to the position of Associate Editor of the Sunday School Literature.

Standing Rule No. 10—O. F. Sensabaugh presented an amendment to Standing Rule No. 10, and W. B. Andrews spoke favoring the paper. It was adopted. (See Standing Rules).

Committee on Conference Relations—M. W. Clark read the report of the Committee on Conference Relations, and it was adopted. (See answers to Question 22 and 23 in the Condensed Minutes).

Place of Next Meeting—Question 42 was called, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" J. N. Rentfro nominated Georgetown, and the nomination was seconded by Sam G. Thompson and Jno. M. Barcus. E. B. Hawk nominated Fort Worth, and the nomination was seconded by D. L. Collie, W. Erskine Williams and C. R. Wright. Fort Worth was chosen, and on motion of J. W. Cowan, the decision was made unanimously.

Hospital Board—The report of the Hospital Board was read by W. Erskine Williams. J. W. W. Shuler called attention to the overlapping of the dates proposed and this was referred to the Commission on Budget. The report was then adopted and follows below:

REPORT OF HOSPITAL BOARD

Waco, Texas, Nov. 20th, 1926.

To the Bishop and all members of the Central Texas Conference, now in session at Waco, Texas, November 20th, 1926:

One of our General Secretaries, who recently visited the hospital at Fort Worth, stated that in his opinion the building of this great Hospital was the most daring undertaking ever proposed by a single Annual Conference.

The full exterior of your hospital building has been finished and to all appearances you have a completed building. The total cost of the building to date is \$471,863.92. We owe, however, \$100,000.00 to the banks of Fort Worth who have been kind enough to loan us this money temporarily and \$78,955.30 to the contractors. In view of this indebtedness, the contract has not been let for the interior of the building. The most imperative present necessity for the hospital enterprise is the payment of pledges to liquidate this indebtedness.

The Board has not been willing to borrow a sum sufficient to complete the interior of the building until the payment of the amount now due. We therefore particularly urge the immediate payment of all past due pledges.

The assessment that you have made for the Hospital Commissioner and the expenses of the Board have not only left the actual pledges to the hospital to be used for the building, but the moral effect has been very fine; in that all who have made pledges have been assured that the expenses of the promotion of the hospital were being paid by your assessment. However, the above is true only because we had one years assessment prior to the time we employed a Commissioner and practically the total amount, including the present years assessment, has been used up to this date and the amount paid on a \$7,500.00 assessment is not quite sufficient to pay the salaries and expenses of the Board in its meetings and we request a small additional assessment, making a total of \$8,000.00. We believe that this will keep us in the clear so that we can keep the fine effect of this plan and we therefore earnestly request this amount.

The Board desires to express in the most certain and hearty way its appreciation of the outstanding work done by Commissioner W. H. Matthews during the five years that he has acted in this capacity. Commencing without a dollar, at the end of five years, and largely through his efforts, the Church has in actual physical assets, paid for property worth at least \$400,000.00 and has in pledges from individuals and the Conference, enough money to fully complete this great building, which, when completed, will be worth at least a million dollars. We acclaim all honor and praise to Dr. Matthews and know that he can go to whatever new task that may be assigned to him with the consciousness of duty well performed. We know that the whole Conference will join with us when we say, "God bless you, Brother Matthews."

We recommend the organization of Golden Cross Societies under Paragraph 540 of the 1926 Discipline, where it is provided that a hospital under the control of the Conference may promote for itself the Golden Cross Enrollment. Under this provision our hospital will receive the entire proceeds of the enrollment.

The books of the hospital have been audited up to October, 31st, 1926, and we submit below the balance sheet of the Auditor for your information:

We take great pleasure in stating that we have elected Rev. C. Q. Smith as Hospital Commissioner and we request the Bishop to appoint him to this work.

We request the adoption of the following:

Resolved 1st. We re-affirm our purpose and pledge made at Weatherford, Texas, in November, 1922, to raise in the Central Texas Conference outside of Fort Worth \$500,000.00 for the Methodist Hospital.

2nd. That the organization of the Conference, District and churches already provided for under the direction of the Board of Trustees and the Hospital Commissioner speed up the work as much as possible, and continue it until all district and church pledges are secured and paid in full.

3rd. We set aside the month of April and May, 1927 as a special period for an intensive campaign for the completion and payment of pledges and especially for cash to complete the payment of all present indebtedness.

4th. We call upon all the forces in the Church to co-operate with the Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues in making "Hospital Day,"

which is hereby fixed as Mother's Day, May 8th, 1927, a great day for Hospital education and for securing offerings for the Childrens Department of the Hospital.

5th. We endorse the plans of the Board for Memorial Rooms in the hospital and the plan to ask individuals, churches, Sunday schools, Sunday school classes, missionary societies and Epworth Leagues to furnish rooms in the hospital.

6th. All our pastors are requested to preach on the subject of the hospital and on nurse training and the Womans Missionary Societies and Epworth Leagues are requested to have this subject discussed in all Conference and District meetings.

Committee on Sabbath Observance—J. F. Clark read the report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance. M. A. Turner moved to amend by striking out that part of report referring to Sunday papers. The amendment was adopted, and the report, as amended, was adopted. Rev. R. C. Armstrong spoke on Sabbath Observance.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE

To the Bishop and members of the Central Texas Conference:

Your Committee submits the following report:

The Sabbath is fundamental in national, religious, and civic life, the fourth commandment being a part of the moral law governing the universe of God, and is therefore made constitutional in the government of all nations. This commandment forbids Sabbath desecration either by men, cities, states or nations. Its observance is absolutely necessary to our spiritual life and growth. The obligation to respect and observe the Sabbath is equally binding on all nations and individuals alike, being the universal law of God his people. We believe that the desecration of the Sabbath is equally as criminal as the taking of the name of God in vain or the breaking of any other commandment of the Decalogue.

Therefore it is the sense of this committee that our pastors, more than ever, lay greater emphasis upon the observance of this holy day, by preaching at least one sermon a year on Sabbath Observance to each congregation within their charges. We urge our preachers and laymen to assist in keeping holy the Sabbath both by precept and example, thereby creating a stronger public sentiment for its observance, which public sentiment is the first means of securing Sabbath legislation both in the state legislatures and national congress. We deplore the present moral conditions existing among our people on account of certain practices such as buying and selling, unnecessary traveling, picture shows, foot ball, base ball, golf, and other amusements on the Sabbath day.

We realize that our government, with its wondrous liberty and wealth, cannot survive without a Sabbath, honored and kept. Strict Sabbath observance was a prime and vital factor in our nation's rise and rapid growth to greatness, and that virtue we must preserve or our nation will fall to ruin, even as Nehemiah witnessed that Israel fell. There is no safety without religion, and no religion without

a Sabbath. It is a startling fact that Sabbath desecration permeates our national and interstate commerce—the greatest commerce in the world—to an alarming extent. We deplore the fact also that our national capital, which was once ideal in Sabbath observance, now permits all forms of Sabbath-breaking business and amusements on Sunday. All this mighty tide of evil is deluging and infecting every state, county, town, teaching our children Sabbath desecration in every form, encouraging and establishing Sabbath breaking in every hamlet.

We protest and warn all against these menacing conditions. We call upon our public officials in church and state, our legislators, governors, mayors, congressmen, President, and all God fearing people to aid in suppressing this dangerous evil. We recommend that Rev. T. D. Ellis be elected delegate, and Rev. B. R. Wagner, alternate, by the adoption of this report, to confer with committees for promoting Sabbath observance, and urge on Congress, on the third Wednesday in January, 1927, the wisdom of enacting a Sunday Observance Law for the District of Columbia, and to provide for a Sabbath Day's rest in our National Congress. We believe that God meant for all workers, even news papers, railroad workers and news boys, to have a Sabbath day; and we know we cannot expect a continuance of God's mercies, nor can we abide in Jesus—"Lord of the Sabbath"—unless we rest from labor on the Sabbath day; and we urge all others to do likewise.

Report of Epworth League Board—J. D. F. Williams read the report of the Epworth League Board and it was adopted. It follows below:

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

To the Bishop and members of the Central Texas Conference in session at Waco, Texas, November 17th, 1926.

Dear Brethren:

We, your Epworth League Board submit the following report:

Growth

The year just closing has been the greatest in the history of the Epworth League of the Central Texas Conference. The young people of our church are receiving more attention and training in church activity, and are serving and contributing more to the Church than at any previous time. There has been a net increase of around 400 per cent in the number of chapters, in membership, and in finances within the last eight years.

There are at present in the Conference 19 active organized Epworth League Unions. There are only four different territories in the Conference that are not served by the League Unions. This is a gain of the number of League Unions of 5 since the last Conference, and of 17 in the last eight years.

We are also glad to report that the growth of the Epworth League has been general throughout the entire church. There are at the last report 8,845 league chapters in operation, with a membership of 267,289. Let us realize that this large and growing constituency lays upon the Epworth League a heavy burden of responsibility, which can be carried only by the divine aid given through prayer.

Training Work

Every district in the Conference held an approved institute during the year. Six league unions held Standard Union Efficiency

Institutes. A total of 126 units of credit on the League Christian Culture Course was awarded at the Union Institutes.

The Assembly held July 5-9, 1926, at Texas Woman's College, Fort Worth, Texas, was the greatest in the history of the Conference. The total number of registered delegates was 347, with several hundred more visitors. A Life Service Consecration meeting was held on the last night of the Assembly and some 30 or more Epworthians gave themselves in a definite Life Service decision to the work of the Church. A total of 509 units of credit was given to those at the Assembly. This makes a total of 786 units to be granted during the League year. Christian Culture Diplomas were presented to 26, and 5 received their Degree of Efficient Epworthian. The Assembly for next year will be held again at Texas Woman's College, the date is June 27th through July 2nd. We urge every pastor to see that his League or Church is represented at this great meeting of inspirational uplift for our young people.

Finances

For the first time in the Conference, the Epworth League reached its goal for the Missionary Special. The goal had been set at \$3,000.00, and \$3,054.00 was raised and remitted by the League chapters. Over \$4,000.00 has been pledged already for next year, and the goal has been set at \$5,000.00. The Epworth League has constituted its Missionary Department as the Harry Hughes Missionary Memorial, all of the money raised for this Memorial is used for missionary purposes. The Specials for this next year are: Dr. S. H. Wainwright, Japan, \$2,100.00; 17 native circuits in Japan, \$850.00; 3 Districts for Christian literature, \$240.00; Texas Mexican Mission, Native worker, Benito Hernandez, Hillsboro, Texas, \$720.00; Scarritt College, Nashville, \$500.00; African Special, \$500.00. A total of \$5,000.00.

It has been a splendid year financially, even exclusive of the Missionary Work. Some of the items received by the Conference Epworth League Treasurer last year are: Life Service Fund as Student Loans, \$409.00; Chapters to Conference Expenses, \$518.00; Anniversary Day offering, \$275.00; at Summer Assembly \$2,457.00. The total received by the Treasurer during the year was \$7,779.75. We call attention to the fact that all Epworth League money for any connectional cause whatsoever should be sent direct to the Conference Epworth League Treasurer, Mr. Leon L. Parkman, P. O. Box 1778, Fort Worth, Texas.

Field Secretary

The League Board has worked for some eight years to secure a fulltime Epworth League Field Secretary, and we have realized that objective. For two years now we have had this worker for the Conference. The Field Secretary this year has traveled over 18,000 miles in the interest of the work. We realize that the work of the Field Secretary is rendered effective in proportion to the interest and cooperation of the pastors. Therefore, we urge all pastors to call upon the Field Secretary that he might assist them in the work with their own young people.

Policy and Future Work

The policy as adopted by the Leaguers for their work of next year may be expressed thusly;

1. To continue the work of the Life Service Department that others might enter this work, and those who have already volunteered may be helped and encouraged.
2. To continue the work of the study classes, and of the Christian Culture Course.

3. To hold an approved Institute in each District, and where there is more than one Union in the District, to hold an Institute in each Union.
4. To continue the work on the Standard of Efficiency and Excellence, and to organize all chapters under this plan.
5. To urge that Epworth League Anniversary Day be observed in every Church in the Conference.
6. To urge that every Chapter make a voluntary pledge to the Harry Hughes Missionary Memorial and to the Conference Expense Fund.
7. To have all connectional money of the Epworth League to be sent to Conference League Treasurer.
8. To award the Fort Worth District Loving Cup on the same plan as last year.

Two other plans are in progress through the entire Epworth League for the coming year. The first is the Young People's Revival. This movement was started in the presidents' meeting of 1924-1925, and is rapidly finding a permanent place in the program of the League. The date for this meeting is suggested as September of each year. The second plan is the Epworth League "Know Methodism" Oratorical Contest. This Contest is Church-wide. For further particulars about this Contest, watch the Advocate during the month of December.

Recommendations

The Epworth League Board makes the following recommendations to the Annual Conference:

1. That the third Sunday in June, the 19th, be set aside as Harry Hughes Memorial Day, and that this service be observed at the evening church hour with the program that will be sent to each Epworth League.
2. That every pastor see that his Epworth League is given the opportunity to make a voluntary pledge to the Harry Hughes Missionary Memorial and to the Conference Expense Fund.
3. That every Church observe Epworth League Anniversary Day, March 27. The Discipline sets this day and says that it shall be observed in every Church, and that an offering shall be taken at the Church service and remitted direct to the Conference Epworth League Treasurer.
4. That Rev. Ralph E. Nollner be recommended for the appointment of Assistant to the General Secretary of the Epworth League.
5. That, as our Field Secretary, Rev. J. D. F. Williams, be appointed as Assistant to the General Secretary of the Epworth League.
6. That we request the Commission on Budget for an appropriation of \$3250.00 for Epworth League work during the coming year.

Report of Orphanage—J. Fred Patterson read the report of the Committee on Orphanage, and it was adopted. It follows:

REPORT FOR ORPHANAGE COMMITTEE

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

We, your Orphanage Board, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have had the annual Orphanage report before us, which shows the institution as being in a healthy, growing condition. The "Baby Cottage," (a home for forty children from three to five years old) has been erected during the year at a cost of more than \$30,000.00, and one of the old buildings remodeled at a cost of \$40,000.00.

The assets of the Orphanage is \$770,000.00 The receipts from the Conferences on the Christmas offering has reached something over \$110,000.00. This Conference has been very liberal in support of the institution this year.

We have 378 children in the Home at this time and have turned away almost a thousand this year for the want of room. The general health of the children is good; however, we report the death of two during the year. The school work of the children has been very satisfactory. The Home activities have been satisfactorily operated this year, and have netted the institution \$8,480.00 (one-tenth of the entire operating expenses of the year). We commend the management for their constructive program in the training of our boys and girls for good citizenship.

Whereas, there is an ever increasing demand on the Orphanage for homeless children, far beyond our ability to accommodate; and,

Whereas, there is no greater opportunity open to the church to do a real Christian work than to save these dependent and neglected children from becoming criminals and training them to become good, honorable and upright citizens;

Therefore, be it resolved: First, that we, as a Conference, give our hearty endorsement to the action of the general board of managers in asking the five Texas Conferences to raise \$150,000.00 for the Orphanage in the Christmas campaign, to be used for current expenses and for needed improvements.

Second. That December be designated as Orphanage Month throughout Texas Methodism, and that an educational campaign be put on setting forth the needs of the Orphanage and the great opportunities of service to the church.

Third. That the second and third Sundays of December be designated as Orphanage Sundays, and that on one of these Sundays in all stations (and that all of the Sundays of December on Missions and Circuits be used), both in the Sunday School and in church services, in order that the claims of the Orphanage be presented and a collection be taken and that a follow-up campaign be made so that every member and friend of the Orphanage children may have an opportunity to make a real Christmas gift to a worthy and needed cause.

We further recommend the reappointment of W. T. Gray, Field Secretary, Methodist Orphanage.

We also recommend that A. D. Porter and Ed McCullough be re-elected as members of the General Board of Managers.

Board of Christian Literature—R. A. Crosby read the report of the Board of Christian Literature. E. Hightower and P. E. Riley spoke to the report and it was adopted. It follows below:

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

To the members of the Central Texas Conference in session at Waco,
November 17, 1926:

Dear Brethren:

Your Board of Christian Literature has the honor to report as follows:

First of all, we commend and appreciate the excellent services of Dr. P. E. Riley, a member of Central Texas Conference, as editor of The Texas Christian Advocate for the past quadrennium. His timely and clear and forcible editorial work, and his administration of the affairs of his office in general, merit highest praise.

We make an earnest plea to our preachers and laymen to make stronger and more nearly regular efforts to increase the circulation of

our conference organ, which in our judgment, should come to 10,000 homes within our boundaries.

Our general organ, The Christian Advocate, published at Nashville, deserves far greater support than it is receiving. The entire subscription list as reported last February in only 20,518, which represents a gain of less than 4000 in four years. Our publishing interests, in general, have suffered serious losses, according to the quadrennial report issued Feb. 28, 1926. Of the 20 publications of our Church 6 show a decrease in circulation.

We applaud the efforts and rejoice in the success of our Sunday Schools everywhere in the matter of teacher training schools and institutes.

We again exhort that our own Sunday School literature be used by our Methodism in preference to any other that is being issued, but do not discourage the use of other literature as collateral reading and study, especially for teachers and advanced students.

We urge our membership to note well the character and purposes of all our publications, of which three are new, and to acquire and make liberal use of them as far as may be at all practicable. There is a glaring and lamentable lack of information in our Church members regarding our policy, our program and our ultimate aims—to say nothing of our tangible properties.

As the reading of secular literature is so widespread and is of no commanding interest, we beg Methodist parents and Methodist young men and women, and Methodist youth to cultivate more intensely their taste for wholesome, uplifting, edifying and spiritualizing literature. Public utterance has already been given at this session to the proposition that to caution the younger people against indecent books and magazines is equivalent to inviting them to seek out and read such literature; hence the safer course is apparently if not evidently to magnify and praise literature that is good and leave unmentioned that which is bad.

A remark has recently gained currency in this country to the effect that among the obsolescent things of today is the old-time blush of modesty. If this be true, then such a condition is due in part to the voracious reading of the unwholesome, vitiating, polluting stuff, which, in flamboyant covers, issues reeking with filth in a constant and stupendous stream from presses devoted to sordid gain alone. This stuff is the figure of speech of our fathers, "A stench in the nostrils of civilization."

Adjournment—After various announcements, the Conference adjourned with the benediction pronounced by E. R. Barcus of the North Texas Conference.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening—The Conference convened pursuant to adjournment, at 2:30 P. M., with Dr. John M. Barcus in the chair by appointment of the Bishop. The hymn, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing," was sung, the Conference standing, and Rev. E. L. Lloyd led in prayer. Bishop Moore took the chair.

Minutes—The Secretary read the minutes of the morning session and they were adopted.

Board of Education—C. H. Booth presented Report No. 1 of the Board of Education, moving its adoption. While the report was pending, Mr. Charles Berry, Son of Rev. J. B. Berry, Conference Secretary of Education, made a report of the work of the office filled by his father. The Bishop urged the payment of delinquent pledges. F. P. Culver called attention to the action of the Educational Commission of a few years past, explaining what that plan embraced, and laying emphasis upon the necessity for a more liberal support of Texas Womans College. The Bishop emphasized our need of a great womans' college in Texas. Horace Bishop pointed out that we were increasing the appropriations more and more to this institution. The report was adopted, and is as follows:

REPORT No. 1 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

Dear Brethern:

We, your Board of Education submit herewith our Report No. 1.

At its last annual session this Conference joined with the other four annual conferences of Texas in the Creation of a state-wide commission on religious work among Methodist students in state and independent institutions within the bounds of the five annual Conferences of Texas. This Commission composed of two representatives from each of the five participating conferences met in Austin, February 9, 1926 and organized, taking under its supervision the work formerly under the care of the Trustees of the Wesley Bible Chair at Austin, the work of the A. & M. Commission, and such other student work as they found existing in the state.

The commission found its first task to be that of working out a constitution by which it could legally take over the rights and duties of the Trustees of the Wesley Bible Chair which holds a state charter. This constitution has been prepared and is submitted herewith for your adoption as such action is required by the charter of the Wesley Bible Chair.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE WESLEY FOUNDATION OF TEXAS

Article 1—Name

The name of this association shall be the Wesley Foundation of Texas.

Article 2—Composition

Sec. 1. The Wesley Foundation of Texas shall be composed of two representatives from each of the five annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Texas, viz: Texas Conference, Central Texas Conference, North Texas Conference, Northwest Texas Conference, and West Texas Conference.

Sec. 2. Each of said annual Conference shall at the beginning of each quadrennium elect its two representatives aforesaid upon the nomination of its Board of Education for a term of four years.

Sec. 3. Vacancies shall be filled by the annual Conference on nomination of its Board of Education for the unexpired term. If necessary during the vacation of the Annual Conference the Commission may fill any ad interim vacancy by appointment; to continue until the next session of the Conference.

Article 3—Object and Purpose

The Wesley Foundation of Texas is hereby created for the purpose of taking over, enterprising and supervising all the special religious work and activities, both now being done and hereafter to be done by the annual Conferences of Texas among Methodist students at any institution of learning supported by the state or any other institution which may choose to come under the direction of the Commission.

Article 4— Wesley Bible Chair

The Wesley Bible Chair is a corporation duly chartered, organized and empowered by and under the laws of the State of Texas. Its organic charter is dated the 5th day of February, A. D. 1918. Such corporation is now specifically recognized by the five patronizing Annual Conferences of Texas aforesaid and its corporate existence shall be continued. The work of said Wesley Bible Chair being specifically placed under the direction of the Wesley Foundation of Texas.

The charter of the Wesley Bible Chair provides for twelve directors. The ten members of the Wesley Foundation of Texas, together with the Presiding Elder of the Austin District of the West Texas Conference ex-officio and the pastor of the University Methodist Church ex-officio, shall constitute said board of twelve directors.

Article 5—Organization

The said Wesley Foundation of Texas shall meet at some convenient place early in each quadrennium and organize by electing from its membership a chairman, vice-chairman, secretary and treasurer. At the same time it shall fix the time and place of future meetings.

Article 6—Powers and Duties

The said Wesley Foundation of Texas is hereby vested with full power to organize the religious activities at said institutions of learning, to supervise them and generally to control and manage the same, all necessary powers being hereby delegated to said Wesley Foundation for such purposes. It shall be the duty of said Wesley Foundation to make recommendations from time to time to the Conferences and the General Board of Education for the support and maintenance of such activities and enterprises under its supervision. Said Wesley Foundation shall have full power to pass all such orders and to make all necessary by-laws necessary or useful for the accomplishment of its work.

Article 7—Adoption and Amendment

This constitution shall become fully effective when adopted by the five Annual Conferences aforesaid. Amendments may be made hereto and become effective when similarly adopted by said five Annual Conferences.

You will note that your commission has designated itself as the Wesley Foundation of Texas. This is in accordance with the action taken by the recent General Conference with reference to this field of service.

REPORT NO. 2 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

To the Bishop and members of the Central Texas Conference:
Dear Brethren:

Your Board of Education desires to submit report No. 2, which is as follows:

The various educational institutions which have been represented before us have entered upon the fall term of the present session with a splendid enrollment and with the outlook of a promising year.

Christian Education Movement

The period for collecting the pledges to the Christian Education Movement was extended to December 31, 1927. Our Conference pledged in this movement \$691,025.00 on which there has been paid the sum of \$260,969.00. During this Conference year there has been collected the sum of \$34,225.00 according to the report furnished us by our Conference Secretary-Treasurer of Education, Brother J. B. Berry. We commend him most highly for the splendid results which he has accomplished, and we are deeply grieved to know that the state of his health is such that he has had to retire from active service. During his incumbency of the office of Conference Secretary-Treasurer he has rendered the Church a most faithful and efficient service.

Educational Institutions

The Southern Methodist University, Southwestern University, Texas Womans College, Meridian College, Weatherford College, and the Wesley Bible Chair, were each represented before us and each furnished us with written reports which gave us a full and clear account of their activities, their present outlook, and their plans for the future. The immediate problem that is ahead of us is to furnish these institutions with adequate funds that they may more successfully perform the task that the growing interest in education and increasing student bodies places upon them.

All the homes have been kept well insured, over \$400 of outstanding indebtedness has been paid, and over \$700 raised and expended for improvements and repairs on the homes.

It is with much pleasure that we have learned, since the beginning of this session of the conference, that Judge W. T. Jackson of Groesbeck, has recently completed a beautiful five room cottage with all modern conveniences and that he intends to give this property as a home for some worthy Superannuated preacher. This in memory of his deceased wife. We greatly appreciate and heartily commend this generous act upon the part of Judge Jackson.

In the commercial world, publicity is an important element of success in any enterprise. It is equally true in church work. REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Dear Brethren:

We desire to call your attention to the Church-wide appeal, issued by the Appropriations Committee of the Board of Church Extension, for aid in rebuilding churches and parsonages destroyed by the recent storm in Florida. It is said to have been the greatest loss ever sustained by our Church in a single disaster. Our brethren in this stricken territory deserve our prayerful sympathy and financial aid.

Without these figures, it is impossible for your Board to ascertain the merits of your case.

General State of the Church—Mrs. Granbury Boyd read the report of the Committee on the General State of the Church. Bishop Moore spoke concerning the great need of a spiritual revival in the church. The report was adopted, and is as follows:

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE SPIRITUAL STATE
OF THE CHURCH**

We, your Committee on the Spiritual State of the Church, submit the following report:

The distinct progress that has been made by our great church along many lines, brings joy to our hearts. We heartily commend the great building program of our church this year. New churches and parsonages mark the achievements of great efforts put forth, but more than this, great revivals have blessed our church and its ministry. Conversions and additions have more than paralleled our building program. This we are glad to record, because, no matter what we achieve financially our church is a colossal failure if it fails as a soul-winning institution.

Therefore, as your Committee, we try to look, not only at the great achievements of our church in the past but to plans for greater achievements in the future, and we submit a few thoughts that we feel are of vital interest to our church.

Seeing the tendency of our people, both young and old to drift away from the fundamentals of our church, or incorporate hurtful things into their church life, such as questionable entertainments of all kinds, especially that which would question our Christian integrity and impede our Christian progress. We would recommend that every pastor be urged to preach a positive Christianity.

We do not condemn our young people for their desire for a good time any more than we do the older people, but we do go on record, as a church, condemning any recreational usage that would bring about evil results. We feel that both the pastor and the parents should be more patient with the young life of our great church in their search for recreational joys, but that they should co-operate with their young people and help them to steer clear of any hurtful indulgences, by furnishing them the proper entertainments in their homes. So much so that they will not go elsewhere to find them.

We recommend that our pastors assist the parents in the religious life in the home, by suggesting appropriate literature, and by lending their influence toward providing for the social needs of our young people. Salacious literature and improper social indulgences is a serious menace to the spiritual welfare of our youth.

We feel that there is too much adverse criticism of the ministry, by the laymen. The right kind of criticism is helpful. We believe that if those laymen and women, who indulge in adverse criticism of the ministry, would hold up the hand of the pastor with their presence and prayers at every service, that they would make them much more efficient in their work for the Master. The same might be said concerning every other officer of the church. We believe the whole church needs a renewed baptism of the Holy Ghost. We need to get nearer to the altar of God and there tarry until we be endowed with power from on high. We need to cultivate a more intense loyalty to our great church on the part of the masses. We want to be more careful and faithful in our attendance of the regular church services and the observance of our church laws. We urge that our pastors stress the observance of the laws of our church in every detail.

Seeing that the Sunday School is an indispensable power for the advancement of the Kingdom of God, we are in hearty accord with the Sunday School Board in all its work. We urge that decision day in our Sunday schools be observed and the necessity of having consecrated Sunday school teachers, who are able and willing to lead their pupils to a saving knowledge of Christ. We recommend that special emphasis be given to teachers training courses, and that each Sunday school teacher be enrolled in a teacher's course. We recommend a deeper and more thorough consecration on the part of the leaders and of the whole church, remembering that where men lead, boys will follow. Conditions would be wonderfully improved among our members if church discipline were enforced. Church membership means obligations and responsibilities. There should be a marked difference in the conduct of the man of the church, to that of the man of the world.

Methodism's success must never be measured by what she raises and expends in money, but by the number of souls she saves from sin. However, tithing should be our least consideration. To fail to keep God's law of one-tenth of our whole income sacred to God's cause does effect us spiritually. We feel that no one can be spiritual who robs God of His own. May there be a great awakening on this fundamental law, not only for the good of the missionary interests of our church and for the proper support of the institutions of the same, but for our own soul's good. We pray best who pay best. May the Christ who gave Himself for us, help us to at least give to Him his own, and thus will we be blessed.

American Bible Society—Preston Broxton read the report of the American Bible Society. It was adopted and follows below:

REPORT OF AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

To the Bishop and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

Dear Brethren:

The Board had before it this year Rev. J. J. Morgan, Agency Secretary of the Southwestern Division, who reports continued prosperity of the work of which he has charge. The year records a large distribution of the Bible in this territory.

Perhaps the most profitable work of the Society is done by the distribution of the Scriptures to the foreign speaking peoples. It is no small matter, but a work of large import, to give the Bible to foreigners in their own tongue. Many of these people have been deprived of the Word of God, and to bring them into possession of the Word of Life is to create for them a new day, and a new being. Our churches in Texas have before them a wide door of opportunity to use the American Bible Society in assisting to give the Scriptures to Mexicans, and other foreign speaking peoples in their own language.

We recommend the observance of Universal Bible Sunday which occurs this year December 5th. If a later date is desirable it will be appropriate to use it. Suitable literature to aid in its observance has been or will be mailed to all pastors.

The Society stands ready, so far as its funds will permit, to cooperate with Mission churches, Sunday Schools or Young People's societies in supplying jails, hospitals, rescue homes and other charitable institutions with Bibles or portions of Scripture.

On the recommendation of Rev. J. J. Morgan, we ask again that Rev. J. M. Armstrong be appointed as Field Secretary for the Society.

37. What is the number of parsonages, their value, and the amount of indebtedness thereon? District parsonages, 11; value, \$79,000.00; indebtedness, \$2,100.00. Parsonages belonging to pastoral charges, 237; value, \$795,792.00; indebtedness, \$31,525.00.

38. What amount of insurance is carried on Church property, and what amount has been paid out in premiums? Insurance carried, \$3,040,371.00; premiums paid, \$22,781.00.

39. How many churches and parsonages have been damaged or destroyed during the year, what is the amount of damage, and what has been collected thereon? Churches damaged, 6; parsonages damaged, 5; amount of damage, \$6,720.00; collected, \$1360.00.

40. What is the number of superannuate homes, and what is their value? Homes, 15; value, \$36,500.00.

41. Who is elected Conference Lay Leader? W. J. Baker.

42. Where shall the next session of the Conference be held? Fort Worth, Texas.

APPENDIX.

Conference Rules.

1. The District Steward, the Charge Lay Leader and the Recording Steward of each charge, the District Lay Leader, the District Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the District Trustees are ex-officio members of the District Conference. Besides these, each church is entitled to one delegate for every one hundred members, or two-thirds fraction thereof, to be elected by the Church Conference, provided that every church shall have at least one delegate.
2. The Presiding Elders are a standing committee to nominate all the boards and regular standing committees at each session of the Conference.
3. The Presiding Elders are required by Conference resolutions to send to the Statistical Secretary of the Conference, immediately after the meeting of their respective boards of District Stewards, a copy of the assessments made on each charge, and these assessments are to be recorded by the Statistical Secretary as the official assessment against the several charges of the Conference.
4. The Conference shall elect a Statistical Secretary and an assistant Statistical Secretary who shall serve till the close of the Conference following. The Conference shall also elect two assistant Statistical Secretaries for each of the several districts. The two District Assistant Statistical Secretaries for each district shall be nominated as follows: The Statistical Secretary shall nominate one man and upon his election he shall nominate the second man. It shall be the duty of the District Assistant Statistical Secretaries to collect the statistical reports from the preachers in charge within the several districts and see that such reports are properly edited, properly entered upon the sheets provided for that purpose and to turn the finished sheets over to the Statistical Secretary in the evening of the second day of the Conference session.
5. The Chairman of Committee on Admissions shall make written report to be filed with the Secretary of the Conference, concerning each one admitted to the Conference. This report shall embrace: Full name, name of parents; date and place of birth, conversion and license to preach; date of marriage; name of wife, and such other facts of his life as may be deemed important.
6. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the presiding eldership shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.
7. The Conference Commission on Budget shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special assessments to be levied upon the churches, unless such new or special assessments shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the M. E. Church, South, or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so intrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail what the trust had been executed and how.
8. The Conference Commission on Budget in its report shall give the contrasts between the several assessments for the present year and the proposed assessments for the ensuing year so that the Conference can act on the report with clear knowledge. It shall be the duty of the

Commission to furnish the "Table of Assessments" for the ensuing year, arriving at the scale for the districts by finding what per cent the total church membership in the individual district is of the grand total church membership in the Conference, and by finding what per cent the total salaries in the district are of the grand total of salaries paid in the Conference, and then dividing the sum of these two decimals by 2.

9. All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports, except the statistical reports, coming before the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk, the original copy to be retained by the Secretary in the archives, one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Texas Christian Advocate, and one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Central Texas Conference Journal.

10. Each preacher in charge shall, on the first morning of the Conference session, hand his complete statistical report to one of the Assistant Statistical Secretaries for the district in which his charge is situated.

11. All requests by boards, commissions, or individuals for dates for special campaigns to secure money shall be submitted to the Commission on Budget, whose duty it shall be to work out a schedule for said campaigns so that as far as possible, overlapping may be prevented. The Commission shall submit its report to the Conference for approval.

Changes in Charge Boundaries

Brownwood District—Marie is placed on Norton-Mazeland charge from Bronte.

Cleburne District—Lone Willow placed with Brazos Ave; Egan and Bethany to Grandview Circuit; Huron afternoon from Whitney, Waco District; Files Valley, Pleasant Hill and Bee Creek received from Waxahachie District and added to Covington Charge.

Corsicana District—Dover from the Harmony charge to Munger, which is now called Coledge Circuit. Bush Prairie and Mt. Zion transferred from Purdon to the Irene Charge. Mt. Nebo transferred from Harmony to the Richland Charge. Purdon, Harmony and Pursley from the Purdon Charge. Eureka from the Max Ave. Charge, with Mildred and Navarro form the Eureka Charge. Max Ave. is a Station.

Fort Worth District—Kellar goes to Saginaw; Haslet, Collieville to Eules Charge, and White's Chapel becomes afternoon appointment from Grapevine. Thus Kellar, Collieville Charge is absorbed.

Gatesville District—Coyote from Valley Mills added to Mosheim. Lanham from Fairy and placed on Hamilton Circuit. Evergreen from Ireland and placed on Jonesboro Charge.

Waco District—Elm Mott from Aquilla placed with Penelope. Lakeview from China Springs placed with Bosqueville. Mooreville added to Bruceville and Rosenthal. Speegleville placed with China Springs.

Waxahachie District—Itasca Circuit is absorbed; Berrys Chapel goes to Milford, and Files Valley, Bee Creek and Pleasant Hill as stated under Cleburne District.

Memoirs

REV. W. V. JONES

Because the necessary information is not at hand, we are not able to give the place or date when Brother Jones was admitted on trial, or the several charges served by him, but he was admitted about 1868.

He was born in Mississippi, Dec. 22, 1847, and his father came to Texas when Brother Jones was about two years of age, and settled in Hunt county where he was reared, where he was converted and where he was licensed to preach.

Being reared on the frontier of Texas the educational advantages of Brother Jones were limited, but after being admitted on trial, he became a hard student, read many good books, and became a well-informed man.

He was admitted into the Northwest Texas Conference and served many circuits, missions and stations during his active ministry. When 17 years of age he married Miss Vina Cain who preceeded him to the grave only a few months. She was a woman ideally fitted for her place as the wife of an itinerant preacher, and did her work well.

Some 20 years ago Brother Jones was placed upon the Superannuate roll of this Conference, and this action was without complaint on his part, and he never became sour or ceased to preach, but had regular appointments up to the date of his death, and his neighbors and friends heard him gladly.

He was more than an average preacher, in visiting his people which added much to his popularity and usefulness as a minister of the Gospel.

On his birthdāy, Dec. 22, 1925, this good man ceased his labors in this world, and departed to that home about which he had so often preached for more than 55 years.

He was always true to his pastor, true to his family, friends and self. Truly a good man has fallen, but we know where to find him. Peace to his memory.

REV. E. A. SMITH

E. A. Smith was born June 17, 1856, near Gallatin, Sumner county, Tennessee. He was the son of J. W. M. Smith and his wife, Nancy A. Hunt. The family moved to Kentucky in the early days of the Civil War where the father organized a company for the Confederate Army, and served as a Captain until his death in 1861. The mother married Freeman Senter who died in the fall of 1869. In 1874 Brother Smith accompanied by his mother and half brother, E. G. Senter, came to Texas and settled close to Mexia. A brother, John Wesley Smith, was accidentally killed in 1876, and it was this tragedy which proved the turning point in the life of the one who was to be a Methodist minister. Kneeling by his brother's body, he gave his heart and life to God.

In the fall of 1876 he was liscensed to preach at Alvarado, Texas. He was admitted on trial in the Northwest Texas Conference at Belton in November, 1878. His first pastorate was Ennis Mission which he served three years. It was during this period that he married Miss Kate Carson, whose life was ever afterwards to be linked with his in faithful, devoted service. Later, he served Reagor Circuit and from this work he went to Vanderbilt University to better prepare himself for the ministry. On returning to Texas, he entered upon a most useful ministry, which extended over a period of thirty-eight years, during which time he served the following appointments: Alexander Mission, Jonesboro, Lorena, Mexia, Taylor, Dublin District, Ennis Station, Abilene District,

First Church Temple, Corsicana District, and subsequent to his stroke of paralysis, Italy, Groesbeck, Itasca, and Rice.

Brother Smith was charged by his church with heavy responsibilities as the list of appointments will clearly reveal. His efficiency and loyalty warranted the confidence of his brethren. He was an unusual exegetical preacher. He went for the great redemptive messages of the Word and made them live again, in that he knew for himself their power and fullness.

His ministry was honored of God in many gracious revivals and in strengthening the churches he served. His thorough possession of clear conception of the real ends of life, the sanity of his methods, made him a most exceptional counselor for the young minister. The writer, whose first work was under him as Presiding Elder, shall always feel himself debtor to this man of God.

Brother Smith was stricken with paralysis on the morning before the Annual Conference opened at Hillsboro in 1914. From this time he was never himself physically, but his intense desire to be of service called him back for some six more years of service.

He asked for superannuation in 1921, and since that time his home has been in Waxahachie where he won for himself the highest possible respect not only from the churchmen, but also from all who knew him. He shall ever stand out with many of us as one of the truly great characters we have met.

The Father called for him on February 9th, 1926, and he took his place in the home eternal. He is survived by his faithful companion and the following children: Mrs. Frank Self, Waxahachie; Mrs. F. E. Singleton, Eastland; Mrs. A. Marcia, Fort Worth; Mrs. Lewis J. Gebhard, Birmingham, Ala.; Rev. Hubert Smith, Southern Methodist University; R. L. Smith, Corsicana, and Herman Smith, Abilene.

REV. W. C. HILBURN

Rev. W. C. Hilburn, son of Rev. A. S. and Mrs. Emily Francis Hilburn, was born in Green County, Ark., January 14th, 1865. After a brief illness of only three hours, in the parsonage of the Boulevard Methodist Church, Ft. Worth, Texas, he peacefully "fell on sleep." He was reared in a religious atmosphere. His home was a house of prayer. His parents made it a place of high thinking and noble living. Because of the early training and Godly example of his splendid parents, he was converted and joined the church at seven years of age. In the summer of 1887 he was licensed to preach and began at once to make definite preparation for his life-work. He was admitted on trial into the old Northwest Texas Conference in the fall of 1889. His early academic training in the best schools of his locality, and the years of eager, patient study as a pastor gave him a wide circle of thinking and a mind well stored with accurate and illuminating knowledge. He was an accurate and strong thinker. He read the masters and knew them. His intellectual fellowship was always with the best thinkers. Before it was destroyed by fire, he had one of the largest and most carefully selected libraries to be found in any parsonage home in the state.

He was a worthy and valued member of the Old Northwest and Central Texas Conferences for 37 years. These years were full of high endeavor and splendid achievement; years full of tears and joys, full of hardships and heroic service. During these eventful years of incessant labor he faithfully and efficiently served the following charges: Comanche Ct., Goldthwaite, Ballinger, Coleman, Bartlett, Ennis, Mexia, Clarendon, Mansfield, Granbury, De Leon, Hico, Grandview, Handley and Boulevard, Ft. Worth. In every place he left a "cloud of witnesses" to his unselfish devotion and abundant labors.

On November 15, 1888, he married Miss Mattie F. Overall of Dyer, Tenn. It was the happy consummation of a mutual love. It was a union blessed of heaven. She was an ideal wife and he was a model husband. She did not hinder but helped him. Her ministry in the home made him stronger for the ministry without. They were kindred souls inspired by a common passion. The glow of their love lightened and lighted the path of each. Their mutual love builded a model home out of which came a family that blessed every community in which they lived. They were the complements of each other, both were made stronger because of their union. It was a point of honor to serve each other. They were lovers to the end. Out of this ideal union were born eight children: Mrs. Clara Bradford, Herbert Spencer, Anna Lillian, Marvin Benson, Ruth Frances, Thelma Lina, Mrs. Mildred McCleskey and Charles. They all live to reflect imperishable honor upon him as a wise and affectionate father.

Brother Hilburn's "sudden going" was a shock to all Texas Methodism and an unutterable grief to those who knew him best. The true riches in our great Conference lie not in her Cathedral-like houses of worship, nor in her endowed institutions of learning and mercy, but rather in the Christ-like character of her members. Since this is true, how great is our loss in the departure of our beloved brother? He had in himself the true riches and gave them without stint. He was one of the workers who never shirked, one of the leaders who never lost faith. He was one of the faithful who never laid down his task till it was done. Upon his strong shoulders he carried not only his own burdens but also those of his brethren. He was a vital unit in the working force of the Conference. He was dependable in any emergency that might arise. In the affection and esteem of his brethren he held a large place. No man in the Central Texas Conference was better beloved. His brethren delighted in him because they were his delight. All men believed in him and trusted him without question or reservation. His personality drew men to him irresistibly. He led men, he did not try to drive them. All found him a wise counsellor and an unfailing friend. No man did he ever deceive, or friend did he ever forsake. He had a genius for friendship. He was a great friend. It was easy to love him, for he was one of the most lovable men that I have ever known. The atmosphere of peace and brotherliness was always about him. He was an apostle of peace and good-will. Bickerings and strife found no harbor of refuge in his great soul.

He never sought to stand in the lime-light. He was never sensational. It was not for the applause of men he hungered, but their hearts. It was not place he sought but power to influence men in right living. In the public assembly he was not one of its noisy speech-makers, but rather one of its outstanding examples of all that was right and fair. He did not contribute many words to the long drawn-out debate, but his presence helped to gain a fair and unbiased determination of every question. His most winsome eloquence was in deeds rather than words. He was not swayed by popular passion nor confused by current fads and fancies, but rather weighed everything in the balance of quiet thinking. He was a man of sanity and poise. His emotions were deep but they did not run riot. He was the master of himself. All his forces were under control. His life moved on, not spasmodically, but quietly, evenly, thoughtfully and masterfully.

He was a good man, every bit of him was good. He did not claim to be perfect, but he was and is "going on unto perfection." He did not profess to be the best man in his Conference, but he struggled to be the best man that it was possible for him to be. Failure in attempting to attain the best was to him better than success in attempting to attain only the good. It is men such as he who helps to lift

the tides of clean living to higher levels. It is a character like his that enriches the world and makes it a happier and safer place in which to live. It is hearts like his that transform the Methodist ministry into a glorious brotherhood. In all the temptations of his life and in all his contacts with men there has not been left one stain upon his name, not one question of his integrity, nor one doubt of his loyalty to God. His life is an open book and those who read it will find there the record of a golden-hearted man. His faith and works have made rich contribution to the history of his Conference which could be woven by a deft hand into a most thrilling story.

Brother Hilburn was a great preacher-pastor. He was one of the few ministers I have known who could remain in the same pulpit one or twenty years. His people did not tire of him. They heard him with joy and profit. To them he was a prophet sent of God. He knew the word and proclaimed it with power. He spoke with authority for he had his commission from Heaven. He turned many to righteousness. At times he spoke with great liberty and unction, but always with edifying and persuasive power. He was a true shepherd of the flock. At all times night or day he was ready to minister to them. No sacrifice was too great for him to make, or service too small for him to render for their good. Trouble of any kind in any home won his sympathy and immediate ministry. Is it any wonder that his people loved him and sought to retain him as their pastor?

He was a great father, an earthly type of the Heavenly Father. He emphasized the duties of parenthood rather than the rights of parenthood. He knew his duty to his child and did it; he knew the duty of his child to him and demanded it. He was the head of his home. Never did he surrender that place of responsibility and leadership. He ruled not with the authority born of physical force but with the authority born out of love. He and his good wife reared as splendid a family as ever graced a parsonage home or adorned any circle of society. There is not one of those superb sons or daughters that is not an honor to their parents and blessing to the world. While we could not say that he ever caused to be constructed any towering building or mighty industrial plant, yet we can say that he built a great home and family, the mightiest task to which any human life could be devoted.

Measured by the true standard, Bro. Hilburn was a great man. It is not riches, or place, or pomp that makes life great, for these may be the accidents rather than the achievements of life. It is heart that makes greatness. And this was his pre-eminent possession. No one can be great in the greatest greatness without it. It is great heart that inspires and leads on "till the day is done." It is great heart that woos and holds with chains of steel. It was his great heart that made him one of the trusted leaders of Texas Methodism for the last thirty years.

REV. R. F. BROWN

Rev. R. F. Brown was born in Center, Texas, May 10, 1870. He finished his earthly life in Waco, October 27, 1926, having reached the age of 56 years.

Born of Godly parents, he was religious from earliest childhood. When asked his age at conversion, one who had known him from childhood replied, "Bob Brown was born converted". He united with the M. E. Church South during a revival meeting held at Nacogdoches, Texas, in 1884, when he was 14 years of age.

On December 25th, 1890, he was married to Miss Lola Carraway. This union was blessed with four children: Ione, who died aged 13

months, and is buried at Coleman, Texas; Rev. Robt. E. Brown, who is a member of the North Carolina Conference, living at Goldsboro, N. C.; Joe C. Brown of College Station, and Miss Maurine Brown of Waco. It is worthy of note that all three of his children are college graduates, and active useful Christians. He is also survived by his aged mother and by two brothers, Ed Brown of Blanket and Jim Brown of Coleman.

In his early manhood Bro. Brown was a druggist and had built up a successful business of his own at Coleman. But although a life of ease and possibly of affluence seemed assured to him, he turned aside from this to follow a divine call to the itinerant ministry. He was licensed to preach at Sweetwater, June 1, 1904; joined the Conference at Mineral Wells in the fall of 1904; was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon by Bishop Hoss at Brownwood in 1906; and was ordained Elder by Bishop Key at Waco in 1908.

He served in order the following charges: Albany and Moran three years; Rising Star, two years; Comanche two years; Midlothian three years; Herring Avenue four years. During the last eight years of his life he led the Sunday School forces of the Central Texas Conference, first as Sunday School Field Secretary and later as Conference Sunday School Superintendent.

No truer, better man than R. F. Brown has ever gone in and out among us. His heart was as pure as the heart of a little child. His life was as transparent and clean as the sunlight of God. He walked among us as a Nathaniel in whom there was no guile, a Barnabas, who was a "good man, full of faith and of the Holy Ghost".

Brother Brown was true and good in all the relationships of life. It was the writer's privilege to live for two years in the same house and to know something of the beauty and sweetness of his family life. To his dear wife he was always the gallant knight and devoted lover. His children almost idolized him. After his death one of his stalwart sons said, "I never heard my father utter an unclean word and I never saw him lose his temper". As a pastor he was always diligent, efficient and greatly loved by his people. In his relations with his brethren in the ministry he was faithful and just, gentle and kind.

In his Conference Sunday School work he found the crowning joy and success of his ministry. He gave himself wholly to his work. He became in a splendid way a man of one work. And what magnificent results he has achieved! He pioneered the modern Sunday School program in the Central Texas Conference, and placed his Conference in the vanguard of Sunday School progress. At the Conference of 1925, he reported more than 2000 teacher training units, and had he lived to make his report this year, he would have reported 2750 units. He literally laid down his life for this work. Some of us who were close to him knew that he was burning out his life and we begged him to take more thought for himself. But he could never refuse any call of Sunday School opportunity; "Whosoever will save his life shall lose it; and whosoever will lose his life for my sake shall find it." The manner of his death was a peculiarly fitting end for such a life. He died as he had lived, serving and praying. He was assisting in the funeral service of a friend and had just finished a prayer when smitten with the fatal stroke of apoplexy. Loving hands bore him up and prevented his falling. His last words related to Sunday School work. The good physician who had been hastily summoned was the teacher of the Austin Avenue Men's Bible Class. Just before losing consciousness, Bro. Brown said to him, "Doctor how is your Sunday School Class doing?" His funeral, held at Austin Avenue Church, was conducted by the writer, assisted by the following members of the Conference Sunday School Board: R. A. Chisholm, T. E. Bowman and P. T. Stanford. His pallbearers were pastors of

the Waco Methodist Churches and a large company of his brethren in the ministry and a host of sorrowing friends following him to his last resting place in Park Lawn Cemetery. He is not dead. Such a life can never die. R. F. Brown will live on in the hearts of those who loved him; he will live in the lives of his splendid children; he will live in the great Sunday School work which he pioneered in this Conference; and in the presence of God, he, himself lives forevermore. "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again, with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him."

What hope for rearing a good and interesting family without a nest in which to nurture fledgelings,

and minus the material environment suitable for training and equipment for the duties of life? I have seen few girls in my life who would acknowledge any wish to become the wife of a preacher.

On the other hand the appeal of an altruistic, self investment for the salvation of lost men and women, and the elevation of the moral and religious character of such, can overcome the desire of a Christian woman for a home and happy environment, and when a promising young preacher challenges her to join with him in the work of the Christian Ministry, his call places him on at least equal terms with any other candidate for her heart and devotion.

Although Mattie Williams had health, home, refinement, and luxury, along with all that congenial society could give, she gave herself without reservation to the young preacher "for richer, for poorer, for better for worse, in sickness, in health, till death should part them."

Nobly and without hesitation or even regret she has kept that vow. At this moment we declare the splendid results. A successful life, not as the world goes, but yet successful in all that makes real success; a useful life, achieving the desire of her heart in training a family; accomplishing great things as a leader of the young and especially the children in the various charges her husband has served; becoming an inspiration to the faithful women of the church in society and missionary work; strengthening by the wise counsel and faithful support her husband in his incessant and successful toil; her habitual neatness in appearance; her easy manners showed the culture she had received in her native Missouri home; all these things combined with perfect poise, showed her to be "a woman of a thousand." With our translated friend?"

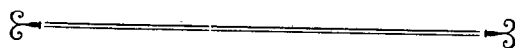
