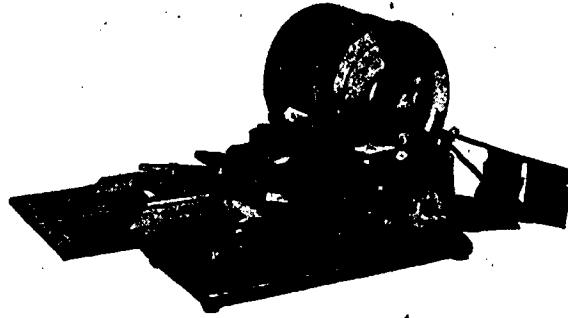

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Opening—The Central Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the sixty-seventh session (which is the twenty-third since division), at 7:30 p. m., November 9th, 1932, in the Austin Avenue Methodist Church, Waco, Texas. Bishop Samuel Ross Hay, D. D., LL. D., presiding. "Stand Up for Jesus" was the opening hymn, and Dr. C. C. Selecman, President of Southern Methodist University, led in prayer.

The 103 Psalm was read responsively.

Elections—On nomination A. D. Porter was elected secretary and on his nomination, R. W. Nation, R. A. Crosby, Roy L. Crawford, A. C. Haynes and W. N. Dunson were elected assistants. M. M. Chunn was elected the Conference Journal editor. F. O. Waddill was elected statistical secretary, with C. O. Hightower assistant, with the following District secretaries: Brownwood, E. W. Swearingen, B. B. Edmiaston; Cisco, W. G. Gwaltney, R. H. Davenport; Cleburne, J. L. Oliver, T. D. Ellis; Corsicana, Horace Poteet, A. K. Marney; Ft Worth, Paxton Smith, F. W. Thrash; Gatesville, J. T. Gardner, J. B. Weathers; Georgetown, J. W. Leggett, W. E. Shipp; Waco, Oran Stephens, Hayden Edwards; Waxahachie, R. L. Crawford, J. L. Ray; Weatherford, C. D. Wooten, C. E. Wade.

Hours—On motion of Dr. Gaston Hartsfield the hours of meeting and adjournment were fixed at 8:30 a. m. and 12:30 p. m., respectively. The bar of the Conference to be the first sixteen rows of seats in the auditorium.

Committees—T. Edgar Neal read the report of the presiding elders filling vacancies on Boards and nominating the Standing Committees.

Communications—The various communications to different Boards were referred.

Welcome—Dr. Hartsfield introduced Mr. G. H. Zimmerman, mayor of Waco, who gave a very striking address of welcome, to which Bishop Hay fittingly responded.

Lay Activities—Following the organization of the Conference Mr. J. R. Edwards, Conference Lay Leader, introduced Prof. G. L. Morelock, who addressed the Conference on Christian Stewardship.

Announcements—Bishop Hay announced that Bishop James Cannon, Jr., would address the Conference at 11:00 a. m. the following day.

Bishop Hay made exhortations regarding the Laity and their work in the Church.

Adjournment—The doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. F. P. Culver.

SECOND SESSION—THURSDAY MORNING

Opening—The Conference came to order promptly at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Hay in the chair. While the audience stood, "He Leadeth Me" was sung. Dr. J. W. Johnson read a part of the 21st chapter of Luke and gave fitting comments thereon, after which he led in prayer.

Minutes—The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Introductions—The following were introduced: Dr. A. F. Smith, Publishing Agent; Dr. C. C. Selecman, President Southern Methodist University; Rev. T. W. Brabham, President Texas Womans College; Dr. Gillis, Presbyterian minister of Eastland; Mrs. R. L. Culbertson, San Antonio Home and Training School.

Supernumerary—Question 22 was called and the following were referred for supernumerary relation: T. W. Ellis, P. W. Layne, C. S. Field, J. T. Wilson.

Superannuates—The names of all superannuates were called. Five had answered the roll call above during the year. All others were continued by reference for the same relation, except Paul Christopher, who had become effective during the year. The names of I. E. Hightower and G. R. Wright were added to the list.

Roll Call—The Conference directory was called, and two hundred seven clerical and seventy-one lay delegates answered present. (see roll)

Motion—On motion of J. W. Bergin, further calling of the roll was dispensed.

Standing Rule—Dr. Bergin called attention to conflict in Standing Rule No. 2 and the Discipline. The chair ruled the Discipline the rule.

Anniversary—The Board of Christian Literature had as speakers Dr. A. F. Smith and Dr. A. J. Weeks.

Report—The report of the Committee previously appointed to do work in preserving the files of the Conference was read by A. D. Porter as follows:—

Dear Brethren:

Some time past the Conference authorized that certain work be done on the Central Texas Conference Journals. To this end a committee was appointed consisting of A. D. Porter, Rev. C. O. Shugart and Mr. H. F. Mayes.

This work has been finished and we are glad to report to you as follows:

The original volumes written in long hand, are placed in fireproof vaults in Southwestern University at Georgetown, Texas. These contain the history of the Conference from the year 1866 to 1901. Volume seven contains the chronological roll which is incomplete and partial.

While volume eight contains statistical tables for the years 1886-89, and volume nine containing statistical tables for 1890-93, are both retained by the Conference Secretary.

One set of typewritten copies is to be placed in the care of some trustworthy institution that will appreciate having these books and will secure them in fireproof vaults.

One set will be kept in the "Conference trunk" by the Secretary of the Conference.

Not a single one of the seven volumes kept by the Southwestern University is to be lent to any one except on the authority of the Secretary of the Conference. The same is true of the set yet to be placed.

Reports—The names of the following presiding elders were called and they made reports of their Districts: R. O. Sory, Geo. W. Shearer, for Cisco District, C. S. Wright, F. P. Culver, Roy A. Langston, T. Edgar Neal, A. D. Porter, C. R. Wright and L. L. Felder. This in answer to question 21.

Southern Methodist University—Dr. C. C. Selecman spoke concerning our Western Educational work, especially referring to S. M. U.

Texas College C. M. E. Church—Dr. D. R. Glass spoke concerning the work of the stated College at Tyler, Texas. An offering was made totalling \$50.63.

Anti-Saloon League—Dr. Atticus Webb addressed the body relative to law enforcement and prohibition.

Resolution—E. R. Stanford read a resolution which was amended by a substitute motion by W. W. Ward and it was adopted as follows:

Whereas, for the past several years the amount of money contributed to the church has decreased materially, effecting especially the Benevolences, and—

Whereas, The apportionments made for our General Work in the days of prosperity and plenty, by our last General Conference, have not been reduced by the General Board of Apportionments (Par. 349), and—

Whereas, We cannot in fairness to our own claimants reduce our Conference Apportionments, unless the General Apportionments are also reduced, because a Law of our church compels the Conference Treasurer to make distribution of these funds according to the allotment made by the Commission on Budget, (Par. 345).

Therefore Be It Resolved:

First: That for the year 1932-1933 this Conference set as a goal the payment of 75% of the 1931-1932 total of apportionments.

Second: That we instruct the Commission on Budget to distribute all apportionments to the Districts according to the same scale as that of 1931-1932.

SPECIAL DAYS

Third: That this Conference concentrate all Special Days and Offerings during the year on one day, except that of the Orphanage, which shall be presented during the month of December.

Announcements and Introductions—Miss Jennie Burleson of the State Home in Waco was introduced. Announcements were made urging all members and visitors of the Conference to visit the Methodist Home Friday afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock. Dr. Selecman was announced to preach at 3 p. m.

Bishop Cannon—Bishop Hay presented Bishop James Cannon, Jr., who spoke, following an enthusiastic applause by the body. His address was highly appreciated by all hearers and much information was brought concerning Temperance and Social Service. At the close of the address an offering was taken for the General Board of Temperance and Social Service amounting to \$36.49 and was given to the President of Board, Bishop Cannon.

Adjournment—The doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Cannon.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Opening—The Conference was called to order. "Savior More than Life to Me" was sung. Dr. A. L. Scales led in prayer. One verse of "My Faith Looks Up to Thee" was sung.

Bishop Hay read from Luke's Gospel and led the assembly into deep devotion as he commented upon the Word.

Introductions—Dr. O. T. Cooper, North Texas Conference; Hon. W. A. Tarver, of Austin; Dr. D. E. Hawk, of Oklahoma; Dr. E. B. Hawk, Louisville, Ky.; Dr. Harold G. Cook, of Paris; Rev. E. L. Ingram, of Marlin, and transfers as follows: B. B. Byus, J. B. Jordan, L. R. Vanderpool, G. A. Brown, P. W. Walker, W. P. Cunningham, were introduced.

Next Session—"Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" was asked. Mr. Boyce Martin placed Corsicana in nomination. Mrs. J. S. Callicutt and Dr. C. S. Wright made seconding speeches. The vote was unanimous, thus answering question 44.

Leave—Rev. C. N. Morton was granted leave of absence to attend a funeral.

Rescue Work—Mrs. R. L. Culbertson addressed the body relative to the San Antonio Mission and Rescue Home. E. R. Stanford made additional comments of commendation.

Admitted—"Who are admitted on trial?" The following having passed the proper committees were admitted on trial: John Robert Caruth, from Ft. Worth District; Robert Clark Calvert, Waco District; Roy Johnson and Geo. M. Greebon, from the Weatherford District.

Class of the First Year—Who are in the class of the first year was called, and passage of characters were made and reports given and each

was advanced to the class of the second year as follows: Wallace Pittman, Hubert W. Crain, Harley R. McDaniel, Robert F. Stone, Alvin Maulden.

Class of the Second Year—Who remain on trial was asked, the names of the following were called, characters passed and they reported and advanced to the third year: Lawrence M. Greenhaw, Samuel A. Baker, Hayden Edwards, S. O. Crouch, G. A. Brown.

B. L. McCord and A. B. Nichols were continued in the class of the second year. Bishop Hay announced that at 10 a. m. Saturday, Bishop A. Frank Smith would address the class for admission into the travelling connection.

Deacons—S. O. Crouch and G. Alfred Brown were elected to deacons orders. J. E. Morton and E. T. Wright were elected to local deacons orders.

Ordination—Bishop Hay announced that all deacons would be ordained at the close of the sermon Sunday morning and the elders at the conclusion of the Sunday afternoon session.

Hospital—Judge W. Erskine Williams read the report of the Hospital. H. N. Peters and Dr. C. Q. Smith spoke to the report. Dr. Truman C. Terrell, newly elected superintendent, was introduced and spoke to the report and the adopted report follows:—

We make the following report:

We had before us a communication from Dr. Chas C. Jarrell, General Secretary of the General Hospital Board, in which he brings the information that the general hospital work of the Church is in very favorable condition and great work for the good of humanity is being done under this department.

The report of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Hospital at Fort Worth conveys the information that the books of the hospital have been audited by certified accountants and found in good condition. They report the total value of the hospital at Fort Worth at \$1,371,823, with an indebtedness of \$518,300.00. Unpaid pledges amount to \$237,000.00, of which amount \$126,500.00 is due on pledges outside of Fort Worth. The total volume of business of the hospital for the year ending September 30, 1932, is \$108,394.00, with cash receipts of \$96,194.00, the cost of operation being \$100,613.00. It is believed that there will be collected from the unpaid accounts a sufficient sum so that the year's business will show no loss in operation.

Your hospital maintains the very highest rating. It is fully approved by the American College of Surgeons and the American Medical Society. 4646 bed patients have been cared for since the opening of the hospital in March, 1930. There have been a total of 3270 surgical cases. 733 babies have been born in the hospital since its opening. There are 200 doctors on the medical staff. The school of nursing is fully affiliated with the state and national League of Nursing Education. There are now 40 students in the school of nursing, 6 having graduated.

The hospital has undergone tremendous economic strain, the collection of pledges slow, and in some cases, impossible, but the commissioner-superintendent and the trustees have been very diligent in carrying forward the work of the hospital. A moratorium on the bonded indebtedness has been granted so that now no interest will be due until February, 1934, and no principal until 1937.

The board of trustees, subject to confirmation by this conference, have entered into a contract with Dr. Truman C. Terrell, who has been the hospital pathologist and has operated the laboratory since the opening of the hospital, to become the superintendent of the hospital. He will assume the duties that Dr. C. Q. Smith has had as superintendent, and will be responsible to the board of trustees. Under the contract, made subject to your approval, he guarantees the operating expenses of the

hospital before he receives any compensation. After all expenses of the hospital are paid, he will receive any profit that may be made until February, 1934. During the period from February, 1934, until October, 1937, Dr. Terrell will pay all operating expenses and all interest on bonded indebtedness, and if there are profits after these payments are made, then he will receive these profits, provided that he shall not receive more than \$5,000.00 per year. We believe that this is a most favorable contract for the hospital and recommend the approval of the contract as made by the board of trustees with Dr. Terrell.

The board of trustees, as well as the hospital board and the Conference as well, have suffered a great loss during the year because of the death of Rev. J. H. Stewart, and we recommend that Rev. J. S. Cook, of Waxahachie, be elected to fill the vacancy, which term expires in 1934.

The terms of the following members of the board expire at the end of this Conference, namely: J. W. Bergin; Amon G. Carter; J. W. Johnson; T. Edgar Neal; C. Q. Smith; R. J. Jackson; and C. L. McCartney. We nominate as their successors: J. W. Bergin; Amon G. Carter; J. W. Johnson; T. Edgar Neal; C. Q. Smith; Ward B. Powell; and John B. Collier, Jr.

This Annual Conference, in session at Ranger in 1928, pledged an assessment for four successive years of \$10,000.00 per year. This was made by agreement with Fort Worth citizens, who, upon their part, agreed to raise during the same period \$125,000.00. In fact, more than \$300,000.00 was actually paid by the citizens of Fort Worth under this agreement. We therefore claim from the Budget Committee an assessment of \$10,000.00 for this, the fourth year, under that agreement.

We join with the board of trustees in the following expression of appreciation for the services of Dr. C. Q. Smith, who has so faithfully served the hospital for six years and during whose administration the sum of \$570,000.00 in cash has been paid on the hospital building; said resolution being as follows:

"We hereby express our appreciation of the services of Dr. Smith as Commissioner and Superintendent of the hospital. He has been faithful and wise in the administration of its affairs. We commend him for his tireless labors and the achievements which he wrought. No one could have given himself with more devotion to his task than that which he invested in the building of this institution. He has our unqualified endorsement and sincerest appreciation for the distinguished service he rendered to the hospital. We accept his resignation with the deepest regret."

We recommend that the Disciplinary Golden Cross program be vigorously prosecuted, and to that end we recommend the month of May as Golden Cross enrollment period. We recommend that credit be given on any outstanding pledges by whatever amount is paid during the Golden Cross period.

We ask our preachers to commend their hospital wherever opportunity presents itself, and believe that they can do so without fear of embarrassment.

We recommend that Rev. Frank L. Turner be appointed hospital commissioner and Golden Cross director for the ensuing year, at a salary of \$25.00 per month.

We recommend Dr. Truman C. Terrell as superintendent, as provided in the contract referred to above, and request that he be elected to that position by this Conference.

Fourth Year—The fourth year class was called. They made reports and were elected to elders orders as follows: C. M. Crowe, C. C. Henson, C. D. Wooten, J. W. Whitefield, D. L. Barnes. C. A. Wilkerson was already in orders.

Memorial—The hour of 2 p. m. Sunday was made the order of the day for the Memorial Session and Bishop Hay announced that Rev. M. K. Little would preside.

Resolution—Dr. J. W. Bergin read the following resolution which was passed by the vote of the Conference:

In accordance with the spirit and recommendation of our last General Conference, and in the interest of efficiency and economy, it is the judgment of this annual Conference, that the work of our church can be more satisfactorily supervised by fewer presiding elder areas.

Therefore, be it resolved: That we, The Central Texas Conference, request our Bishop to give serious consideration during 1933 to the redistricting of our Conference, so that if possible, this might be begun at the next annual session.

Standing Rule—Dr. Porter offered a correction in Standing Rules and this was passed to the Journal Editor.

Dr. Cook—Dr. Harold G. Cook addressed the Conference regarding the financial system in use at First Methodist Church, Paris. Bishop Hay urged consideration of the plan.

Church Extension—Dr. E. B. Hawk spoke to the conference concerning the work of Church Extension.

Question 21—The question of official life and administration was called and the names of all preachers in the following Districts who had not made previous reports were called and reported: Weatherford, Waxahachie, Waco, Georgetown, Fort Worth. When the names of J. C. Grimes, J. H. Stewart and D. A. McGuire were called they were referred to the committee on memoirs. At the call of W. C. Taylor he was granted a location at his own request.

Special Order—J. B. Curry made a motion fixing the time of the hearing of the report of Temperance and Social Service. A substitute motion was made fixing the time jointly with the Board of Finance on Saturday evening and the substitute prevailed.

Vacancies—Several vacancies on boards were filled on nominations.

Adjournment—The doxology was sung and Dr. Horace Bishop gave the benediction.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS—SATURDAY MORNING

Opening—The Conference was called to order by the presiding Bishop. Several hymns were sung and J. R. Edwards led in prayer.

Bishop Hay read extracts from the Book of Revelation and gave some very outstanding and inspirational comments.

Minutes—The previous days journal was read and approved.

Bishop Smith—Bishop A. Frank Smith was introduced and brought fraternal greetings.

Motion—G. W. Shearer moved reconsideration of the action of yesterday in the case of C. S. Fields and recommended superannuation. F. P. Culver, G. W. Shearer, C. B. Diltz, J. W. Fort, O. F. Sensabaugh, S. G.

Thompson, C R Wright, Dr Horace Bishop, A D. Porter discussed the motion. C. S. Fields added to the remarks and he was granted super-annuation.

Transfer—M. Phelan was transferred into the Conference.

Reports—Question 21 was resumed and all preachers in the following Districts made their reports: Corsicana, Cleburne, Cisco, Brownwood.

When the name of J. T. Sanders was called it was stated he had united with another church. His character was passed and he was so recorded in answer to question 12, "Who have withdrawn."

Memoir—The names of C. H. Booth, S. J. Rucker and E. P. Williams were referred to the committee on memoirs.

Election—J. W. Johnson was placed on the Board of Church Extension.

H. D. Tucker—When the name of H. D. Tucker was called, his presiding elder, G. W. Shearer, stated that about the middle of the year there were rumors against his character and rather than face trial he surrendered his credentials, thus withdrawing from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. His credentials were accepted and filed in the archives of the Conference.

Commission on Budget—A. C. Haynes read the report of the Commission on Budget and adopted as follows:

Transfers—Bishop Hay announced T. M. McBrayer transferred to the North West Texas Conference and J. D. Farmer received from the same Conference.

Full Connection—The class to be received into the Conference in the traveling connection were called as follows: L. M. Greenhaw, S. A. Baker, Hayden Edwards, S. O. Crouch, G. A. Brown.

Bishop A. Frank Smith addressed the class and they were received by unanimous vote.

Orders—H. E. Jackson, an elder from the Assembly of God Church, was called to the chancel. After questions propounded by Bishop Hay and his agreement to the Doctrines and Discipline of our church his orders were recognized and he was received as a local elder.

Conference Relations—W. J. Hearon read the report on Conference Relations and the report was accepted as the condensed will show, answering questions 22 and 23.

Statistics—The Statistical secretary, F. O. Waddill, gave the report of the statistical staff answering questions 24 to 42.

Leave—Mr. Leake Ayres was granted leave of absence.

Lay Activities—Hon. Nat Harris read the report of Lay Activities which was adopted and reads:

The Board of Lay Activities—We report continued progress in the cultivation of Christian Stewardship under the direction of the General Board, and we favor and urge the organization and conduct of Stewardship classes throughout the Conference.

We note the almost universal observance of Laymen's Day throughout the churches, and recommend the continuance of such programs, in the conviction that thereby more beneficent results will be achieved. We must develop the laymen in skill, train and equip them to the end that there may be more skilled workers for the Master. In this, we have set as a goal the bringing to the membership of the church an understanding of the great program of the church, thereby educating the membership in the privileges, duties and obligations of Christian Stewardship, and also the training of laymen so that religious services may be conducted in every pulpit throughout the conference every Sunday. To this end, therefore, we urge a more general use of laymen as three minute speakers and as speakers in all vacant pulpits.

We, therefore, recommend to the pastors that in the selection of the church and charge lay leaders great care be taken to select only those who are willing and able to enter into this great work. It is only through the co-operation of the pastors along this line that the greatest good can be achieved.

We concur the suggestion of the General Commission on Spiritual Life that Church Officers' Retreats be held, wherever practicable, for the spiritual development of our stewards and other church officials.

We recommend that we hold Efficiency Institutes for stewards in our Conference, and that the Board of Lay Activities give special attention, in connection with the pastor and the board of stewards, to improving the financial systems of the churches throughout the conference.

We recommend the circulation of our own METHODIST LAYMEN in all churches. It is informative, educational and inspirational, opening up to the laymen a larger vision of usefulness.

We recommend that the pastor and church lay leader make a special effort to place this periodical in the homes of at least five laymen in each pastoral charge.

We recommend a widespread and careful study of the informative and inspirational literature provided by the General Board. If this is done there will be a universal deepening of the spiritual life of the membership, and a more vital realization of the obligations incident to membership in this our great church, and a larger development of stewardship life.

Appreciating work done this year by the Conference Lay Leader, his assistants and secretary, we nominate for re-election J. R. Edwards, of Fort Worth, Texas, as Conference Lay Leader, Hal H. Cherry, of Brownwood, Assistant Conference Lay Leader, and C. F. Webb, of Fort Worth, as Secretary of the Board.

Since our last annual meeting, one of the members of this Board has answered the last summons, and it is with universal regret and profound sorrow that we report the recent passing of brother J. M. Clower, for many years the faithful and efficient Lay Leader of the Cleburne District. Never was there on this Board a more useful, consecrated member.

"They are not far removed, our loved,
Across unmeasured space,
For deathless soul to soul may reach
As were we face to face."

Assuring the pastors of this conference of our sincere desire to be of greater use to them in carrying on the work of the Kingdom during the ensuing conference year.

Motion—A. D. Porter moved that when we adjourn we do so to meet at 3 p. m. and in final session Sunday evening at 7 o'clock.

Board of Finance—C. N. Morton read the report of the Board of Finance No. 1, which follows as adopted:

BOARD OF FINANCE

Report No. 1

We Recommend:

First—That 25% of the funds of the Board for Distribution at this conference be set aside to take care of necessitous cases.

Second—We recommend that Rev. W. B. Andrews be appointed Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment for the ensuing year.

We urge all our preachers to join the Conference Brotherhood.

W. B. Andrews—Rev. W. B. Andrews addressed the Conference.

Postmaster—A collection for the Conference Postmaster was made, amounting to \$20.35, and was given B. S. Crow.

Announcements—Announcements were made that Dr. J. M. Dawson and Dr. J. W. Johnson would be the anniversary speakers Saturday evening. Sunday preaching assignments were read by Gaston Hartsfield.

Dr. Horace Bishop gave tender words of love and devotion to his brethren.

Adjournment—The doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Bishop A. Frank Smith.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening—The Conference opened at the hour of 3 p. m. with Bishop A. Frank Smith presiding. "Come Thou Fount" was the opening song and Rev. J. S. Cook led in prayer.

Church Extension—J. J. Creed read the report of Church Extension, which was adopted as read:

Your Board of Church Extension is yet without any funds with which to make donations to the many churches which are in distress. This grows out of the fact that no assessment has been allowed by this Conference for Church Extension for several years. During this year, somewhat more than \$4,000.00 has accumulated in our Loan Fund, but what the churches seem to need most, are gifts rather than loans.

The Board wishes again to admonish against the incurring of debts, which cannot be easily met with reasonable effort, even in times of the depression. We urge that the law of the church be carried out more faithfully which requires that three fourths of the funds be secured before any building enterprise is undertaken.

We recommend that Dr. J. W. Johnson be placed on the Board of Church Extension to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Rev. E. P. Williams.

Missions—P. E. Riley read the report of the Board of Missions and it was spoken to by J. E. Crawford and adopted as follows:

Your Board of Missions submits the following report:

The Mid-Year meeting of the Board was an occasion of spiritual uplift and vision. In addition to this, a meeting of great significance and far reaching influence was held in Fort Worth when Bishop Sam R. Hay called the pastors of the rural charges to a conference concerning the special problems of their field. This Board desires in this report to express its deep appreciation of the fine interest and painstaking care that the Bishop is giving this important phase of our work, and to express the opinion that his leadership in this vital field is the beginning of a new day for the rural church.

We had as visitors to our Board, Mr. G. L. Morelock, Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities; Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Oxford, of Palmore Institute, Kobe, Japan; and Dr. E. H. Rawlings, one of the Secretaries of the General Board of Missions. We are indebted to these visitors for their wise counsel and for their words of inspiration.

We call attention to the General Missionary Council, which meets early in February, at Payne College, on the occasion of the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of that institution.

We make mention also of the fact that during the past several months the centennial of the sailing to Africa of Melville B. Cox, first missionary from America, has been observed, and we suggest that it would be well if notice of this centennial might be given in all of our Churches, and auxiliary celebrations held wherever practicable.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend the recognition and support of the Fort Worth Good Will Industries, an institution set for the relief of the worthy poor and underprivileged. Through this work from three to four thousand people have been helped, and many thousands more can be helped if a greater and more sympathetic co-operation can be accorded this home missionary enterprise. We appreciate the fine work that Rev. Boyd W. Kramer, the Superintendent, has done in this field.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend that the Committee on Rural Life, of which the Rev. John A. Sicheloff is Chairman, in co-operation with Bishop Sam R. Hay, be authorized to conserve and to continue the work of solving the problems of the rural church during this year.

We commend most heartily the work done during the past year by our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Rev. S. A. Ashburn, and request his appointment.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. John M. Neal as General Evangelist.

District Conference Records—The Committee on District Conference Records was read and accepted, which reads:

The Committee on District Conference Records, submit the following report: We found after careful examination the eight records present were kept in excellent manner; two records short. They are the Cisco District and Brownwood District records.

Rural Pastors—J. D. F. Williams read a resolution recommending rural pastors meetings. After being spoken to by J. E. Crawford it was adopted as follows:

The Circuit Preachers in session called by Bishop Sam R. Hay in Fort Worth, Texas, September 20th, 1932, submit the following recommendations to the Annual Conference for its consideration and action:

1. That the first quarter of the year 1932-33, November, December and January to be given entirely to the Conference and General Benevolences.
2. February and March be given to the Kingdom Extension Campaign.

Benevolences—The Commission on Benevolences read their report, which adopted follows:

Your Commission on Benevolences has endeavored to carry out in detail your program. We appreciate the co-operation of our presiding elders, pastors and laymen in this work. While results have not been large, in many instances heroic sacrifices have been made.

We have counceled with the representatives of the General Commission, G. L. Morelock and Dr. J. E. Crawford.

There will be but one piece of literature on Benevolences for general distribution. This literature will cover the regular Benevolences and the Kingdom Extension. We request the General Commission to send this literature to each pastor immediately after Conference.

The study-book plan will be used again this year.

We call attention to the fact that Kingdom Extension Institutes are to be held in the interest of the whole Benevolent program with particular emphasis on the apportionments.

Fort moved that recommendations be considered item by item. This motion lost. G. A. Brown moved to amend the report by inserting to continue the commission. This motion prevailed. S. L. Culwell, J. W. W. Shuler, F. O. Waddill spoke to the report. W. W. Ward moved that the report be mimeographed and sent out for study and take action at the next session. This motion was lost. J. C. Oglesby and J. I. Patterson spoke to the report.

Gid J. Bryan offered a substitute asking that recommendations be printed but not adopted. This motion lost.

J. E. Crawford spoke to the original. Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh called attention to some items of the report.

The original motion as amended was adopted and reads:

To the Central Texas Conference:
Brethren:

We your Commission on Ministerial Supply and Support report as follows:

In the year 1931 there were 87 pastors of this Conference who received less than \$950 each for their year's work from their charges. The average size of family was 4. 80 of these received appropriations from the Board of Missions, averaging \$140 each man. The average value of the poundings and produce given each was \$36 for the year. The estimated annual rental value of the parsonage was \$120 each. The average income from the charges was \$625. This means that one half that number or 43 men received less than that average, that is less than \$625; some received as low as \$170.

It is estimated that incomes from the charges have been reduced by 30% for this year 1932. This means that the average this year has been \$439. Supplementing this has been the missionary appropriation of \$140 each on the average. And the estimated value of rent of parsonages was \$120. With an average of \$36 each from poundings and produce. Making an average estimated income this year of \$705. And to make this average, it means that one-half that number, or 43 men, received all told, less than that sum.

In 1931 these preachers have spent an average for food of \$300 each; with their average car outlay of \$283 each. Their clothing has

cost them an average of \$125 per family; their contributions have averaged \$84 each; their insurance premiums have averaged \$84 each. For schooling expense, books and periodicals, medicines, hospitals, funerals and other expenses including incidental expenses an estimate has been made of \$200 for each pastor. Indebtedness amounts on the average to \$122. It will take an average of \$30 each to pay interest and retire the indebtedness in five years. Making a total average outlay of \$1095. With an average income from all sources of \$801. An average deficit of \$294. House rent is not figured in this last summary estimate. For if that \$120 annually is added to the income, it should be added to the outgo. It is left out of both. One-half the number received less than their annual deficit would reasonably be more than \$294. And this computation is for 1931.

With an estimated cut in income from charges for 1932 of 30%, and with only one-half of the items that make the outgo, subject to a similar cut, it must mean that the deficit for the year 1932 would exceed \$294 each minister. This means that each to keep out of debt has been compelled to abandon the work of the ministry to paint, hang paper, hoe, pick cotton or do other labor that can be done by a man with less equipment for \$1.25 per day.

Your commission believes that the men composing this Central Texas Conference are a brotherhood; with ties binding each to the other that are, or should be, welded of God. It is this Conference which sends us out, with the Bishop acting only as the spokesman. We are a sent ministry.

We should remember that "Ye that are strong ought to bear the burdens of the weak and not to please ourselves." And we cannot say to these our brethren, "Be warmed and be fed," and not minister to their needs.

There are 28 ministers, not counting presiding elders, who received in 1931, \$3,000 or more.

Your Commission finds that something has been done about this problem by the Northern Methodist Church. After several Annual Conferences of that Church had tried experimental solutions, a Commission was appointed by the last General Conference of our Northern sister Church.

Their last General Conference adopted:

1. A schedule of minimum salaries for each Annual Conference, to be adopted by the Annual Conference.
2. The location of ineffective men who have no charges against their characters.
3. The placing of "supply" men under the control of the Annual Conference, instead of under the District Superintendent (Presiding Elder) alone.

The Presbyterian Advance for April 28, 1932, carries an article entitled: "Stabalize Pastors and their Salaries." or "A Plan to Steady the Presbyterian Pastor." Another article in the same denominational magazine is entitled: "Scotch Maintenance of the Ministry,"

The Scotch plan has been in successful operation for several decades, in fact since shortly after 1872. Under it, the ministerial support of each congregation is placed in a central fund; and each pastor receives from it 160 pounds, or \$800. (In later years this was raised to \$1,600.) Then the rest is divided. But every pastor in the connection receives first his minimum of \$800 (or later \$1600).

Your Commission knows that the various Presiding Elders are doing something, oftimes from their personal funds, to relieve the distress of their underpaid men; and we heartily commend this.

We recommend:

First—That appropriations to some other objects be further cut down, and substantially more money be made available to the Board of Missions to supplement the salaries of these under-supported preachers.

Second—That for the coming year, the obligation to follow up its men and see that they are properly supported, be placed on the Districts; each to look after its own. To this end, we recommend that each Elder give at least three days, at least twice during the year, to each of such charges in his District. In that time, let him go from house to house and farm to farm; and by personal one-by-one interviews, enlist more adequate support from the field for the pastor there. Following this by a group meeting with a careful tabulation of results.

Third—We recommend that, what was called among our soldiers in line of battle, "The Buddy system," be adopted in each District. At or before the first District Meeting of preachers, and after prayer for the advancement of the Kingdom of God in that District, let the men who are receiving the more adequate support, voluntarily approach in fine brotherhood, some less fortunate minister in that District. May the better paid preacher consider the field of his "buddy" a part of his field. Let the stronger brother financially, among the many good things that make demands on his salary, consider first the sustenance of his "buddy." And share with him his income, to the extent of \$10 per month, more or less.

Fourth—We recommend that an opportunity to thus "share in the fellowship of the sufferings of Christ" be given to able laymen; by presenting to each such layman, a definite circuit preacher and his field, as his opportunity for special Kingdom of God service in his District.

We recognize that this proposal has not the value of permanence nor is it comprehensive. But it is something. Relief of this sort has already started. This is merely bringing up the line to the advanced positions taken by some of our brethren.

"Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

This Commission was appointed for investigation during this year, and to report to this Conference. Unless you see a need for our continuance, and so move, we pray for our discharge.

Election—Upon resignation of F. L. Turner he named J. R. Banes as Conference auditor and he was elected.

Orphanage—J. Fred Patterson read the report on Orphanage and it was spoken to by W. F. Barnett and adopted as follows:

ORPHANAGE BOARD

The general conditions of the Methodist Home are normal in so far as the internal operations are concerned. It has been impossible to increase the number of children during the year because it has not been thought best to attempt to build other dormitories; however, we have kept the maximum number of children in so far as the present equipment will accommodate. The health of the children still ranks above the average for a similar group of children in the homes of our State; we have not lost a child by death now in over eight years and there have been very few cases of serious illness. The applications for admission are far above the number for any previous year in the history of the Home. It is to be regretted that we have been unable to take advantage of the opportunity to aid dependent and neglected orphan children more thru this time of need.

The offering from the Church has fallen far short again this year. Our Conference fell below last year \$7,520.96. This expressed in the care of children means that we have failed to provide for thirty-eight children this year less than we cared for last year and this at a time when the child really was suffering for assistance. The Board of Managers reduced the request for maintenance this year from \$150,000.00 to \$100,000.00 and urged that each Conference make a special effort to secure its part of the fund needed for operation during the month of December.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

First—We as a Conference pledge our full support to securing the funds needed for the operation of our Home on the same high standard of efficiency as has been during the past.

Second—We set aside the Month of December to present the needs of the Home to our various congregations and use every possible effort to secure the funds in proportion to the ability of our charge compared to other charges of our Conference.

Third—We urge the offering for the Orphanage during the Month of December ahead of any other offering that may be asked at the hands of our people; that is to say, we take the collection for our Home before we take an offering for any other general cause of the Church, thereby making it possible to complete the needs of the Home at the Christmas time so that it will not be necessary for those in charge of the Home to make other calls throughout the year.

Spiritual Life—The report of the Commission on Spiritual Life was read by T. E. Bowman and adopted, which reads:

In line with the General Conference Commission on Spiritual Life, your Conference Commission submits the following recommendation:

First—By every means in your power lay upon the conscience of our preachers and people the absolute need of the deepening of their spiritual lives and a more aggressive evangelism.

Second—An insistence that our preachers hold revival meetings, combine Sunday School evangelism, personal evangelism, home visitation evangelism, with the appointed revival season.

Third—That in all the programs of Kingdom Extension Cultivation during the months of January and February special emphasis be given to spiritual values.

Fourth—Special emphasis in all district conferences on the importance of deepening the spiritual life of our people.

Fifth—That the Bishop in charge be requested to fix a special period each day at the next session of the annual conference for special emphasis on spiritual life values and that plans for the proper observance of this hour be made and announced as early in the year as possible.

Sixth—The holding of Spiritual Life Conferences, or Retreats, for districts or zones to include both laymen and preachers.

Seventh—An effort to enlist each Christian home in some plan for daily family devotions and the giving of thanks at meals.

Eighth—Placing our Christian literature in the homes of our people; our Church papers, other religious magazines, and religious books.

Ninth—The organization of special study classes in such subjects as Stewardship, Missions, Evangelism, etc.

Tenth—A definite plan and effort to follow up members that move from one charge to another.

Eleventh—Special effort to reach the needy places with public worship services and revival meetings.

Twelfth—A call to our people everywhere to live the principles of Christ in their social, industrial and political relationships so that through their very lives men may see the Christ.

Spiritual State—The Spiritual State Committee reported and R. T. Wallace, the reader, moved its adoption, which follows:

Report of Committee on Spiritual State of Church

Believing that this is a God given opportunity to bring the spiritual state of the church up to New Testament standards of spiritual life, and noting with deep interest the large number received into the church this year on profession of faith, and the willingness on the part of the good laymen to heed and practice the gospel of the Christ, which is the power of God unto salvation unto everyone that believeth,

We therefore recommend:

1. That our preachers continue, and if possible with greater zeal the preaching of a full gospel in all of its peace, purity, and power. We further urge all our members and especially our preachers to ever remember that they should be "holy in all manner of conversation," and "to keep themselves unspotted from the world."

2. That prayer groups be organized among our people with definite objects and goals to be reached through the same. Such as, the saving of the lost, reclaiming the backslidden in heart, and for a deeper Christian experience in the life of the worldly-minded Church members.

3. That we eliminate so far as possible, those forms of worldly amusement, from our lives that do not tend toward Godliness.

4. That we supply those forms of amusement and recreation that are wholesome and have teaching and spiritual values. And thus through the co-ordination of all our spiritual resources, create a deeper spiritual state in the church.

Elections—W. W. Ward nominated a number to fill vacancies on the Board of Christian Education and they were elected.

Reports one and two of the Board of Christian Education were read. Following speeches by Dr. King Vivion, J. A. Siceloff and Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh the reports were adopted in full:

REPORT NO 1**Board of Christian Education:**

Whereas the financial condition of the nine educational institutions being operated in Texas under the individual and the joint control of the five Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, presents at the present time a problem of major and critical interest, and—

Whereas the successful continuance of the educational work of these conferences seems to lie in the direction of some sort of unified educational program or system for the State,

Be It Resolved—that we, the members of the Central Texas Conference, assembled at Waco, Texas, Nov. 10-13, 1932, do hereby request our Presiding Bishop, on nomination by the Conference Board of Christian Education, to appoint from within the bounds of our conference two ministers and two laymen, neither of whom is a paid employee or a member of the Board of Trustees of any church school in Texas, who, with two ministers and two laymen similarly appointed from each of the four other annual conferences of Texas, shall constitute a Joint Commission on Methodist Educational Work in Texas.

It is understood that this Commission shall make a thorough-going survey of the work being done by the above mentioned institutions, with fields now being served by them, the opportunities for further service before them with their present and prospective financial status, and with

this data in hand shall work out some sort of unified educational system or program for the state with some plan for financing same, and report for adoption, such system or program and such financial plan to the five participating conferences meeting in their regular sessions of 1933.

It is further understood that any action taken by this conference in this matter, is of no effect until similar action has been taken by the four other annual conferences of the State.

REPORT NO 2.

REPORT BOARD CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Your Board of Christian Education comes to make its report in the spirit of victory.

I. COLLEGE WORK

We had before us representatives of our educational institutions as follows: Dr. C. C. Selecman and Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh of S. M. U.; Dr. King Vivion of Southwestern; Rev. T. W. Brabham of T. W. C. and Mr. R. G. Boger of Weatherford College. Their reports reflect courage and determination to weather these testing days courageously.

The five Annual Conferences of Texas this year are contributing to our nine schools, colleges and universities in Texas less than \$50,000 for their operation. This amount is far from adequate, and our Texas Methodism must soon face the fact of outlining a financial program that will insure the future safety of our schools. Looking toward such a program, we are recommending that our own Conference join with the other four Texas Conferences in establishing a Commission to study the needs of our educational institutions, and offer to Texas Methodism a comprehensive program for conserving and making permanent such schools and colleges as we now have. We hereby request Bishop Hay to appoint Rev. W. H. Cole and Rev. J. I. Patterson, clerical, Mr. A. D. Rhea and Mr. H. H. Simmons, Lay members, to represent the Central Texas Conference on the Commission.

Southwestern University, through the generosity of our people throughout Texas in response to an appeal sent out last May, has received \$30,000 in cash as an emergency fund. In addition to this sum, Southwestern also received as a gift from the late Miss Jennie Tapp of New Boston, Texas, an approximate sum of \$125,000. Miss Tapp in her will directs this sum to be used for the education and training of young ministers and missionaries of our church. Your Board joins Southwestern University in expressing the genuine appreciation of our Methodism for this beneficent gift, and call attention to the fact that Miss Tapp was led to remember Southwestern through a suggestion from one of our pastors some years ago. There are other persons of means who might also remember our schools and Orphanage if only our pastors would suggest to them a way in which their lives might continue to be a blessing through years to come by inserting in their wills similar gifts.

We commend the splendid work being done through our Wesley Foundation at our several State schools.

II. LOCAL CHURCH AND YOUNG PEOPLES' WORK

Reports indicate that our laymen are accepting enthusiastically the new program for local churches. We indorse the work of our Executive Secretary in furthering this important work, and urge upon our pastors and churches to invite Rev. G. A. Schlueter into their churches and make use of his services in every way possible.

Definite objectives in the rural work have been achieved the past year in the Weatherford and Gatesville Districts. The display in the Book room is self-evident. During the coming year similar work will be undertaken in the Brownwood, Cisco, Corsicana and Georgetown Districts. We commend the rural work being done by our Extension Secretary, Rev. J. D. F. Williams.

We call upon all pastors to magnify evangelism during the special period of January and February, culminating in Decision Day early in March, followed by proper instructions for church membership prior to the Easter reception. Also to carry on continuously in the community a campaign to "reach the unreached."

In response to a request, we are combining three Special Days, viz., Sunday School Day, Young Peoples' Anniversary Day and College Day, into one day to be known as Christian Education Day. We urge every church to observe this Day in April with program to be furnished, taking an offering and forward to Rev. G. A. Schlueter, 2616 University, Ft. Worth. The 4th Sunday missionary offering is to be sent to Rev. G. A. Schlueter, except the Young Peoples' offering which goes to Mr. Ed. Summers, Ft. Worth, Texas.

The salaries and budgets of the Executive Secretary and the Extension Secretary have been reduced, and we wish to commend to the Conference these young men for the splendid spirit in which they have accepted these reductions.

Christian Literature—D. L. Barnes read the report on Christian Literature, which adopted reads:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Dr. Alfred F. Smith was before the Board and gave us a report of the Publishing Agents, Whitmore and Smith. His report was as follows:

"The Publishing House has had a wonderful year in spite of difficult business conditions. The sales for the year amounted to \$1,666,230.61. This is a decrease of only nine and six-tenths per cent as compared to the sales of the previous year. They report a net profit of \$37,635.75. With this year's profits and \$22,364.25 which they are taking from a reserve fund which they have been accumulating through the years they are making a total appropriation of \$60,000.00, to be distributed this year to the Conference claimants."

The Publishing Agents are also to be commended for the wonderful improvement which has been made in the Christian Advocate.

We commend the other periodicals of our Church. The World Outlook should be read by all members of our church.

We stress the importance of our Sunday Schools using Methodist literature. The editorial staff of the General Board of Christian Education have succeeded in giving us the best that can be obtained.

The Board of Christian Literature recommends that the following men be appointed to fill the vacancies which have occurred during the past year: On the Board of Christian Literature, Rev. P. W. Walker to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Rev. D. A. McGuire, and Mrs. G. W. Bradley.

The Board recommends that Rev. J. M. Wynne be appointed to fill the unexpired term of Rev. S. J. Rucker on the Joint Board of Publication of the Southwestern Advocate; we also respectfully request the appointment of Rev. M. Phelen, as field editor.

Dr. Weeks of the Southwestern Advocate was before the Board and presented his plan to lower the subscription price and increase the circulation of this periodical which is an imperative necessity for our Methodism. It stands squarely for the whole program of our Church, and should be in every Methodist home. To increase the circulation and

strengthen this powerful arm of our service, we recommend the following plan:

1. The Publishers will continue publication as heretofore, and furnish the paper at \$1.00, net per annum, provided they are guaranteed a subscription list of 25,000.

2. We believe that a reduction in subscription price from the present rate of \$2.00 per annum, is desirable. To secure it, however, the Publishers must have a guaranteed list of 25,000 subscribers. For the membership in the territory served by the Southwestern Advocate, this means one subscriber for every twenty members, or five subscriptions for each one hundred names on the church rolls, using the reports made to the Conference in the fall of 1931 as the basis of computation.

3. The total number of subscribers to be secured in each Annual Conference, on the basis above set forth, to be apportioned to the several districts, and to go to the various charges through the district stewards. When a charge thus secures the number of subscribers that it is to get, and sends that number to the Publishers at the agreed price of \$1.00 per annum per subscriber, it has discharged its responsibility. Where the number is not secured, it is expected, and is essential to the success of the plan both of publication and a subscription rate of \$1.00 per annum, that the charge will pay to the publishers the amount of the deficit on its quota. For example, if a charge is apportioned ten subscribers on a basis of membership of two hundred, and secures only eight subscribers, it will be expected to remit the balance of \$2.00 to the Publishers, otherwise we cannot guarantee the total number of 25,000. It is obvious, of course, that the item of Advocate subscriptions can be placed in the budget. Every subscription secured at the agreed price of \$1.00 relieves the budget of that much. Any unsecured can thus be paid for without any unduly heavy burden falling on the budget. We believe, however, that with a subscription rate of \$1.00 that no charge need fail in securing all the subscriptions asked for.

4. It is of the utmost importance that every church and every pastor enter this plan, and we recommend that the first half-month of December be set aside as the time in which these subscriptions are to be secured.

Temperance and Social Service—W. E. Fisher presented the report of Temperance and Social Service. Motion was made that the report be read at the evening anniversary service and the motion prevailed. The adopted report reads:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Prohibition is still a moral issue and that means with the church there can be no surcease of the battle. A temporary majority vote may determine the position of politicians but not the position of the church of the living God. Whatever form the warfare may assume, whatever be the particular battle in the war, the issue is always fundamentally between the selfish appetite of the drinker and the greed for gold of the seller on the one hand and the protection of the individual, the home and society on the other. Whatever other church, social or political groups may say or do, Methodism will not lower her standards or agree to give a legal status to the traffic in intoxicants anywhere under the flag.

Our founder, John Wesley, branded the dram sellers of his day as "poisoners general," and his true followers today recognize the traffic as being the greatest public enemy of the individual, the school, the home, and the church.

Each recurring General Conference of the Church brings a new emphasis of the importance and responsibility in the holy task of social service and moral reform.

The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has clearly stated her position on the moral issues of our day including prohibition and the Eighteenth Amendment. By act of the General Conference of 1930 a plan of procedure has been outlined for making her position effective and machinery has been set up for carrying out this plan. It is the duty of the Presiding Elders to see that the District Boards and Local Church Committees in every District shall be set up as ordered by the General Conference and outlined in the Discipline.

This Conference goes on record as emphasizing the fact that the teachings of Jesus Christ concerning human brotherhood must be applied to all the complex, economic, social and international problems of the present day perilous condition. Our economic situation cannot be stabilized until there is such a system of production, distribution and consumption as will give to every man, woman and child not only the bare necessities, but some of the comforts of life. Love for our neighbor demands this. Inherent in this teaching of brotherhood is opposition to war and love for peace. The followers of Jesus must demand the outlawry of war as a method of settlement of international disputes.

We need a new emphasis on the sacredness of the ballot box, the majesty of the law, and the importance of strict law observance on the part of every American citizen; the sanctity of the home, the evils of divorce, and the training of children to the value of discipline and respect for authority. We need to imbibe a deeper reverence for things divine such as God's word, God's house, and God's holy Sabbath Day.

Finally, and most emphatically, we call upon our Senators and Congressmen to stand for the retention of the Eighteenth Amendment, and furthermore, we urge that mass meetings be called throughout the country to insist that regardless of party platform or presidential declarations, Congress retain our Federal Prohibition laws.

To this end we request the Anti-Saloon League and the W. C. T. U., to take the initiative in setting up local committees from all the churches regardless of political affiliations, in every community for the purpose of giving true facts to the people and the delivery of dry sentiment to our Congress and Senate.

We commend the plan of a great mass meeting of young people to be held at Mt. Sequoyah annually for the purpose of study and expression concerning prohibition.

We commend the work of the Anti-Saloon League and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and recommend the appointment of Dr. Atticus Webb as Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas.

We commend the work of our Mission Home and Training School at San Antonio and ask for the same appropriation as last year.

We recommend the University Extension Courses offered by S. M. U., under the direction of Dr. Taylor in the study of Temperance and Prohibition for young people. Let study classes be organized in all our Leagues and Sunday Schools under this supervision.

Again we reconsecrate ourselves upon the altar of sacrificial living and service to the work of making a new world wherein righteousness reigns.

Whereas, for the past four years the United States has been the victim of wide-spread, organized, vicious propaganda put out through practically every medium of public expression, save the pulpit, for the

purpose of reflecting unfavorably upon the Eighteenth Amendment and for mobilizing sentiment in favor of unconditional repeal and,

Whereas, the slogan set before the American people in the last few months and especially within the last week is "Beer by Christmas" and,

Whereas, the wet forces are vigorously at work formulating their plans for the immediate legalization of beer and wine and openly and viciously disregarding the Constitution of the United States,

Be it resolved, that we call upon all the preachers of this conference to begin immediately in their local churches and communities, campaigns of preaching and other educational activities to give the people the truth on the liquor question, to create new attitudes and loyalties on the part of the public toward the sacred importance of temperance and prohibition.

Be it further resolved, that we call upon the General and Conference Boards of Missions, Christian Education, and Lay Activities to cooperate fully with the Board of Temperance and Social Service, and to use all the forces within their power to stem the tide of wet propaganda now flooding the country, and to call upon other Christian agencies in the country to join in this fight.

Sabbath Observance—The committee on Sabbath Observance read their report, which was adopted after motion by W. A. Flynn:

In as much as the observance of the Christian Sabbath is one of the fundamental ties that hold men faithful and loyal to God and since God has warned us to remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy,

We call your attention to the fact that the Sabbath is being commercialized and used for personal gain.

Whereas, we, your committee recommend that both ministers and laity use the Sabbath day as Jesus would use it if he were in your place.

American Bible Society—Rev. W. D. Gaskins read the report of the American Bible Society, which follows:

BIBLE SOCIETY

Since the organization of the American Bible Society in 1816 it has issued more than 237,000,000 Gospels, Testaments, and Bibles. This Society strives for a world circulation of the Bible to all people without denominational or racial discrimination. The Bibles are furnished at cost price and distributed at cost price through the Societies. Its Agents and Colporteurs are pioneers of missions at home and abroad. It furnishes missionaries with the chief implements of their work—the Bible. Its ten home and twelve foreign Agencies cover the entire home field and thirty foreign countries, and it has correspondents in more than thirty countries outside of those included in the Agency field. In the World War nearly 7,000,000 volumes were distributed to the soldiers and sailors of various nations.

The Society has done a remarkable work in the provision which it has made for the blind. Scriptures in the American Braille, and other systems are furnished the blind either by donation or at a nominal charge of 50 cents per volume. The Society is dependent upon churches and individual donors for the support of its work. Income from sales of Scriptures covers the cost only of the Scriptures sold. We recommend the observance of universal Bible Sunday in December as far as possible by all the pastors of the Conference.

Financial—J. E. Crawford read a resolution on finances, which was adopted as follows:

Whereas we have heard with pleasure Dr. Harold G. Cooke explain the financial plan which he has inaugurated and which is working so successfully at Paris, Texas, therefore, be it resolved:

1. That we express our appreciation of the work which Dr. Cooke is doing and the contribution he is making toward the solution of the problems involved in successfully financing the local church.
2. That as a Conference during the coming year we devote special attention to the improvement of the financial systems in our churches with a view to the development and adoption of the plan or plans best adapted to our various local situations.

Board of Finance—C. N. Morton read the report of the Board of Finance No. 2, which follows:

REPORT NO. 2

The Board now has 60 superannuates and 70 widows on its rolls. We have received from all sources this year sums as follows:

From the Publishing House.....	\$ 2,740
From the General Board.....	2,788
From the Conference Treasurer—approximately....	11,300
From Trap property.....	186

Total from all sources.....\$17,014

After deducting 25% of this amount to take care of the more needy case, the Board found that it could appropriate \$4.00 per year of service to the superannuates and two dollars and sixty-six and two thirds cents per year of service to the widows, and distribution has been made to the claimants on this basis.

A few of the good women decline to receive anything from this Board, and on behalf of the other claimants the Board extends to them sincere gratitude for their generosity.

The Board recommends the re-appointment of Rev. W. B. Andrews as Conference Agent for Superannuate Homes for the coming year.

MEMORIAL SESSION—Sunday Afternoon

The Memorial Session of the Central Texas Conference met at 2 p. m. with Rev. M. K. Little in the chair.

“How Firm a Foundation” was sung, followed by the reading of the 90th Psalm. Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh led in prayer.

“In the Sweet By and By” was sung.

“What preachers have died during the year” was asked, with the answer as follows:

The memoir of Walter Griffith was read as follows by Bruce M. Cox:

REV. WALTER GRIFFITH

Rev. Walter Griffith was born in Montgomery County, in 1861. In 1865, with his father, he moved to Bell County. In 1881 he was married to Miss Beula Walker.

He was converted at the age of thirty-seven and immediately surrendered to the call to preach. He was ordained a deacon by Bishop Galloway at Brownwood in 1898. In 1900 he was appointed to supply the Floydada Charge, and that year was admitted on trial. He was in the active ministry for thirty years and held the relation of a superannuate four years. His ministry blessed the following charges: Floydada, Silvertown, Lubbock, Frost, and Brandon, Chatfield, Wortham, Malone, Itasca Circuit, DeLeon Circuit, Scranton, Barry, Thrall.

He was superannuated in 1928. For two years he lived at Corsicana, and then moved to Barry where he lived until his death. He was killed in Corsicana by a passing automobile, March 22, 1932.

Bro. Griffith lost his first wife by death while at Malone. During his pastorate of the Itasca Circuit, he was married to Mrs. Willie Kelt. He is survived by his wife, who resides at Barry, and a daughter by his first wife, Mrs. Everet White of Corsicana.

To know Bro. Griffith was to love him. His life was as radiant as the morning sunlight, and his every expression was that of hope and good cheer.

He was tender, charitable, and kind to all. He was truly a servant of God responsive to every call of need from man. He was a diligent and faithful pastor, and endured hardships as a good soldier, greeting every rebuff with a smile.

A few months after this writer was appointed to Barry, a friend interested in my success inquired, "Does not Bro. Griffith's popularity detract from your work?" I answered, "His presence is an inspiration, his words of counsel that of wisdom, and his life in our midst a real benediction."

Following the services at the Chatfield Church conducted by Dr. Casper S. Wright, assisted by Rev. R. H. Heizer, and Bruce M. Cox, the interment was in the Chatfield Cemetery.

Bro. Griffith had just responded to the call of our presiding elder for service, when God called to him in the next hour.

The reading of J. C. Grimes memoir was read by L. L. Felder:

JAMES CLARENCE GRIMES

James Clarence Grimes was born in Sulphur Rock, Ark., June 4th, 1879, and answered the call to come up higher on April 25th, 1932, in the Methodist Hospital, Fort Worth. While yet a small boy his parents moved to Ellis County, Texas. When he was about grown his family moved to Breckenridge. It was here that he met, wooed and won the hand and love of Miss Anna L. McClenny and on Dec. 12th, 1905, they were happily married. Unto them two sons and two daughters were born, all of whom, together with their mother and his father survive.

In 1908 Brother Grimes and family moved to Olney, Texas. It was here that he heard and answered the call of God to preach. For several years he worked as a local preacher in the Olney church. It was during these years that he organized the Olney circuit and served as the first pastor on the work. In 1919 he served the Magargle charge as supply and in 1920 the Antelope charge.

In 1921 he was admitted on trial in the Central Texas Conference and served the following charges: Whitt two years, Azle two years, Loving three years, Aledo one year and the Weatherford circuit three and a half years. It was while in the midst of his fourth year on this work that he heard the call to come up higher.

Brother Grimes was faithful to all the program of his church, looking after her every interest. We had no more faithful man than he. He loved men and was interested in all their needs. He was a kind, faithful husband, a loving father and a true friend. His friends were those who knew him. He rests with his Lord.

The memoir of E. M. Sweet was read by C. O. Shugart:

REV. EVANDER M. SWEET, SR.

Rev. Evander M. Sweet, Sr. was born in Quincy, Florida, October 27th, 1837, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Aaron Smith, Fort Worth, Texas, July 9th, 1932, in the 95th year of his age. Was married to Miss Cornelia Brown of Fort Gaines, Georgia, in 1862, to which union three sons and two daughters were born, Evander M., Jr.

and Marvin of California; Charles, who died early in life, and Mrs. Carrie Smith, and Miss Nina Sweet, of Fort Worth, Texas. He was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in early life and received license to preach the gospel May 23, 1874. Became a member of the East Texas Conference December 17, 1874. Subsequently was transferred to the Central Texas Conference in which he continued until death, serving throughout his active Ministerial life various Stations, Circuits and College Presidencies and Bible Agencies.

In his career as a preacher in charge we find him leading quite a company of valuable men into the ministry. In this service, he reproduced himself several times. His ministerial labors were rewarded in opportunity to touch many who have become real agents in the making of other lives a blessing to many. Among his students were Dr. W. D. Bradfield, Governor Colquitt and Senator Sheppard who ever speak of him in terms of love and admiration. In fact, it was his by Divine Grace to influence those who became intimate with him in such a way that his name will ever be honored by them.

To the above quotation from the obituary of Brother Sweet, written by his life long friend, Rev. D. F. Fuller, might be added, that besides the work of a number of preachers licensed under his ministry or receiving instructions under him in the old Daingerfield school or Granbury College.

But Brother Sweet's religious activities did not cease when he was superannuated. Wherever he went, he quickly found some special work to do.

And then through his fifteen years as an invalid, he continued to minister to those who came within his presence. Of this ministry, a neighbor and friend of the family, Mrs. E. G. Hinman, wrote the following tribute:

"Much has been spoken and written about this noble servant of the Lord as teacher and preacher. But to me, who was privileged to live neighbor to him for eight years and to know him intimately for the last four years of his life, which time was spent confined to his bed as a result of a fall, I would pay a tribute to him on the ministry of suffering. Like a real soldier, he bore the pain and confinement for four long years, blessing the lives of many who were privileged to visit him.

"Never a murmur escaped his lips. Sometimes on entering his room, I would ask him how he was feeling and he would say, "Just as bad as can be." Then quickly he thought of the sufferings of his Savior or of Paul and his own pain was forgotten. I can see his face now; how it would light up as he would tell of the conversion of Paul, then he would add, "I say it reverently, but that same light has shown above me, leading me in the path of righteousness for His name's sake."

Brother Sweet loved his family and friends, but more than these, he loved his Lord and Savior. His was a long and beautiful life of service and when the Heavenly Father called him to the Eternal Home, he left a little room vacant save for the sweet memories of his presence there that will last as long as those who loved him linger here."

The funeral services were in charge of Rev. C. O. Shugart, Central Methodist, assisted by Presiding Elder F. P. Culver, Rev. M. K. Little, and Rev. W. H. Coleman of Fort Worth, Rev. D. F. Fuller of Grand Prairie and Dr. W. D. Bradfield of S. M. U., Dallas. Rev. R. C. Armstrong of Fort Worth was on the platform, but unable to take part in the service. Burial was in Oakwood Cemetery, Fort Worth, beside the grave of his sainted wife.

The one of D. A. McGuire was read by S. A. Ashburn:

D. A. McGUIRE

Daniel Asbury McGuire was born in 1872 on the 28th day of March in an humble log home in the Indian Creek Settlement, Comanche County, Texas. In this home were born several other children who were reared by a Godly father and mother, staunch in the principles in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and ever believing that the Creator of this magnificent universe was supreme above all that was physical, and in the minds of their children they instilled the ever living principles. What higher education he had was gained at old Pollytechnic College in Fort Worth.

In 1894 D. A. McGuire was licensed to preach, and was admitted to the N. West Texas Conference. He married Miss Corine Tunnell of the same settlement from which he came. He taught school in 1898 for the first six months at Mesquite, Texas, and the last six months he supplied Zepher Methodist Church.

In 1899 the North West Texas Conference appointed D. A. McGuire to the May Charge. Here he spent four years and remodeled the parsonage of the church. In 1903 he was sent to Rising Star. Here he spent three years. In 1906 he was sent to Robert Lee. Built a church and was moved by the Central Texas Conference in 1907 to the McKinley Avenue Methodist Church in Fort Worth, which is now Trinity Methodist Church, and purchased the lots that the church now stands on. He spent three years here. In 1910 he was moved to Weatherford Street Methodist Church for his first time and spent two years here. In 1912 he was moved to Grandbury, Texas, and built a church. Moved in 1913 to Clay Street Methodist Church in Waco. He remodeled the church and built a Sunday School annex to it. He spent four years in Waco as a Pastor of this Church, and then the World War was on, and he was selected in 1917 by the Central Texas Conference to be the Soldiers' Pastor for the boys in Camp McArthur at Waco.

He spent two years in this work, and then the Mission Board in 1919 placed him in the field as a Conference Evangelist to assist them in their work. He spent three years in this work, and in 1922 he went back into the Pastorate and was sent to Rogers, Texas, where he built a magnificent edifice to Methodism. After two years, he was sent again by the Central Texas Conference to Weatherford Street Methodist Church in Fort Worth. He finished the great task that had been undertaken by the men before him in building his last monument to the God that he loved so well. He never knew the word can't, and with God as his shield and full determination he pressed on until today there stands a monument of stone, which personifies the hardships he overcame. He spent seven years as Pastor of this church, and reached the age of sixty, and as he had said through the many years he was going to quit the active Pastorate work at this age, because the average congregation usually wishes a younger man:

He was appointed Conference Evangelist in 1931, which was the last appointment he filled as a member of the Central Texas Conference. D. A. McGuire went where he was appointed to go by his church. He lived the truth and was just himself in the company of the idle rich or the humble. A persons station in life had no bearing on the mission he was sent to perform with them. He never used a by-word in his life.

As a shepherd he fed his flock on food from the Lamb's Book of life. In his home he was a true husband, true to the principle of God and Man. He was a father that never flinched from leading his two children Hollis and Thelma in the right paths of life. Earthly possessions

were little, but a name and character to be recognized, and be carried on was the inheritance he left those who stayed behind.

In returning from a business trip to Fort Worth, Texas, from Memphis, Tennessee, death took him in an automobile accident. The memory of D. A. McGuire, and the impressions he made on his followers for many years will remain in their minds. It can truthfully be said he fought a good fight, he kept the faith and now he has gone to receive the crown that was laid up for him.

J. A. Siceloff read the memoir of S. J. Rucker:

SAMUEL JAMES RUCKER

S. J. Rucker was an itinerant Methodist preacher thirty-seven years, having been admitted on trial in 1895 and was closing his fourth year at De Leon when he died in Denver, Colo., August 16, 1932. He was born in Rutherford County, Tenn., August 4, 1868, and moved to Texas with his parents when a lad of eight years and settled in McLennan County, near Waco. In August, 1881, he was converted at the old Stanford Camp Ground, under the ministry of Rev. E. R. Barcus. Six years later he yielded to a call to preach and on August 17, 1887, was granted a license. The following month he entered Southwestern University, and in 1892 he graduated with the degree of Master of Arts. Then followed three years of training in the Biblical department of Vanderbilt University, taking the degree of Bachelor of Divinity. In November of that year, 1895, he joined the Northwest Texas Conference and was sent to Tenth Street Mission, in Waco. He counted himself highly honored to be given even an humble place in the militant ranks of the Texas Methodist itinerants. The spirit that characterized him then was the same that possessed him throughout his entire ministry. Be it said to his credit that he always left a charge in better condition than when he went to it. In his thirty-seven years he served the following charges: Tenth Street Waco, Peach Street Mission Fort Worth, Salado and Corn Hill circuit, Seventh Street Temple, Granbury Station, McGregor, Rice, Mexia, Abilene, Belton, Mulkey Memorial, Coleman, Gatesville District, Hillsboro, Ennis, Weatherford District, Cisco, Bartlett, Granger and De Leon.

November 9, 1897, he was married to Miss Beth Foster of Georgetown, who proved a helpmeet indeed throughout their thirty-five years of wedded life. Five children were born to them, two having died in infancy, and three, Sam J. Jr., Mrs. W. V. Overbaugh and Foster, survive.

Among the outstanding characteristics of Brother Rucker's ministry were these: Sincerity of purpose, abiding faith in God, depth of conviction, clarity of judgment, fearlessness in administration, charity toward his brethren, and painstaking in all details. He made it a point to know the people whom he served and was especially attentive to the spiritual development of the young. He is greatly honored today in that his own children "rise up and call him blessed." Brother Rucker made no pretense at oratory in his preaching, but he was clear, concise, instructive and interesting. He loved the Church more than he loved himself. More than once in his ministry he found it necessary to make choice between his own well-being and the Church. Always he chose the Church's best interest even to his own hurt. Like John, the Forerunner, he did his duty and let God take care of the results.

In the first days of August, with his wife and son, Foster, he drove to Denver, Colo., to spend a few days with his other son, Sam. J. Jr., in Englewood, a suburb of Denver. While there, and on his birthday while on a picnic given in his honor, he suffered an attack of the heart which was superinduced by mountain climbing. Twelve days later God called him to his heavenly home.

The memoir of J. T. Bloodworth was read by W. H. Coleman:

REV. J. T. BLOODWORTH

J. T. Bloodworth, a member of the Central Texas Conference, was born in Marshall County, Miss., January 20, 1860, and died in Ft. Worth August 16, 1932. Converted at the age of 20 in a camp meeting in McLennan County, Texas, he was licensed to exhort, and a year later was granted license to preach. Three years later he was admitted on trial into the Northwest Texas Conference. In the fall of 1885 he was appointed to the Mineral Wells circuit, in the Weatherford district. At that time the Weatherford district embraced all of Texas west of Weatherford as far west as the New Mexico line, and included all of the Panhandle and Greer County—now a part of Oklahoma. The following spring his presiding elder, seeing the type of man he was, asked him to go west and travel the Mobeetie circuit, which included practically all of the upper Panhandle. At that time there were no railroads or highways or cities or towns in that vast section. Large ranches covered the territory, with ranch headquarters few and far between. The request of the presiding elder appealed to the young itinerant, so J. T. Bloodworth started on the long journey to his new field of labors. It was strictly pioneer work. Only two Methodist preachers—J. T. Hosmer and a Brother Robertson—had preceded him in presenting the Gospel to the people of that sparsely settled section of Texas. His ministry was mainly to the cowboys. Whenever he could get a few of them together he would tell them the good news of redeeming love. Through heat and cold, oftentimes hungry, and when night came on, if no ranch or "dugout" were near, the young prophet would stake his horse, and spend the night in the open. It was thus that the Kingdom began to be established in the Panhandle, where today are populous cities, oil fields and productive farms. Practically all of Brother Bloodworth's ministry, until he was appointed to the evangelistic work, was spent in West Texas. He believed, without question, the Bible, and that the Gospel is the power of God unto salvation. He preached that Gospel with clearness and power. Multitudes were converted through his ministry. His Irish wit enabled him to palliate an unpleasant truth and make the truth more effective.

The wife of his youth and companion of his labors and sorrows, together with the two surviving sons, Joe and Lloyd, survive him. His prophetic mantle falls upon Lloyd, pastor of one of our churches in Tucson, Ariz., who, with his mother, ministered to him in the last hours. His illness was brief. In his lucid moments he talked about preaching and the things pertaining to the Kingdom. Just before he went out, and in one of his most lucid intervals, when asked by Lloyd for one of his favorite passages, said "All scripture is given by inspiration of God."

The eight years of his superannuation he declared to be the most trying period of his half century as a preacher. The years of pioneering in West Texas he recalled with joy, nor did he count the privations and hardships of those years as anything unusual. He was simply following the way the Master went and to him it was a privilege. He finished his course with joy. His reward is sure and abundant.

A. W. Hall read the memoir of C. G. Shutt:

REV. C. G. SHUTT

Rev. Crockett Grayson Shutt was born at Rock, Mercer County, West Virginia, September 15th, 1856. Here as a fourteen year old boy he gave his heart to Jesus in consecration that increased as the years

went by. Here he went to Sunday School on Bluestone river. There were two classes: one in the Bible for those who could read, and the other in the blue-back spelling book for those who could not read. Bro. Shutt could read but had no Testament. After trying in vain to borrow one from an old lady who smoked, he succeeded in renting it by furnishing her with smoking tobacco for the summer. The road to Sunday School had been blocked during the War by felling trees and had not been opened. Through this wilderness, infested by rattle snakes and copper-heads and many wild animals, this barefoot boy went to Sunday School and laid the religious foundation for his after life. The same fidelity that characterized his boyhood clung to him through life.

About 1878 Bro. Shutt moved to Texas and taught school in Peoria, Hill County, Texas. Here, feeling himself called of God to preach, he was licensed. In 1879 he was admitted on trial into the old North-west Texas Conference; was ordained deacon in 1881 and Elder in 1883. His first charge was Covington Circuit which he served, as he did every other charge for the next fifty years, with great zeal and acceptability.

On September 15th, 1881, Bro. Shutt was most happily married to Miss Mollie Gray. She proved to be a wonderful helpmate and companion to him in his ministerial life. To them were born two sons, Sam H. Shutt of Sherman, Texas, and Claude A. Shutt of Los Angeles, California; and one daughter, Miss Bonnie Shutt, now Mrs. W. B. Gilleland of Ft. Worth, Texas.

Sister Shutt having passed to her reward in 1917. Bro. Shutt was married to Mrs. Laura Haines on August 19, 1920. He is survived by his present wife, his three children and four grand-children.

Bro. Shutt's ministerial career was characterized by great diligence and consecration to his work. His field of labor was almost entirely on circuits where opportunities for service were unlimited and financial returns very meager. In spite of these conditions, he met his financial obligations promptly and educated each child.

Bro. Shutt had great revivals. He was a great pastor. In these visits he prayed, had conversions, sold and gave away Bibles and innumerable other books and tracts. He believed in the church papers, secured many subscribers and wrote for many years for the Texas Christian Advocate under the title, "The Golden Medley."

In the midst of other activities the Conference Collection and all other interests of the church were always provided for. On the last charge he served though past "three-score years and ten" he picked cotton many days and applied his entire earnings on the Conference Collections.

Bro. Shutt was a great church builder. At one time Oak Cliff, West Dallas and Duncanville were in his circuit and he built a church at each point in a single year. He built the first church in Oak Cliff.

Some years ago he reported that he had built more churches than he had spent years in the ministry. He built 35 churches in his 50 years of ministry.

He never forgot his high privilege as a good citizen and stood at all times for every moral issue; speaking, writing, and distributing literature that his people might be thoroughly informed.

About the first of September, 1929; while serving the Kerens Circuit he had a heart attack which came near terminating fatally. It was but few weeks before the Annual Conference which was to terminate his fiftieth year in the ministry. At Conference this brave soldier of Christ was unable to carry on further and took the Superannuate relation. A

home was provided for him at Itasca where fifty years before he had begun his ministry. Here this saint of God found rest among friends.

While all knew that his strength was limited, no one realized that the end of his pilgrimage was so near. Attacks of asthma came with greater frequency and persistence until on Sunday evening, August 21st, about 8:45 he heard the Master saying, "It is enough; come up higher," and his spirit went home to be with Jesus. No one who ever knew Bro. Shutt will ever have any question as to where to find his regal spirit.

The memoir of J. H. Stewart was read by Edmund Heinsohn:

REV. JAMES H. STEWART

On Saturday morning, September 2, 1932, a great host of friends were grieved to hear of the passing of Brother James H. Stewart. He had just returned from his vacation which consisted of a visit with his children and other relatives. His death occurred at the home in Belton at one o'clock, Saturday morning, after an illness of less than a day's duration.

And with the going away of Brother Stewart was ended a long and useful ministry to all of Texas Methodism, and particularly to the following communities: Covington and Blum, 1892-1893; Mansfield Circuit, 1893-1895; East Waco, 1895-1897; Itasca, 1897-1899; Mineral Wells Station, 1899-1901; Vernon Station, 1901-1904; Polytechnic, 1904-1906; Ennis, 1906-1908; Vernon District, 1908-1910; Mulkey Memorial, 1910-1911; Brownwood District, 1911-1915; Hillsboro Station, 1915-1918; Waxahachie District, 1918-1922; Temple, First Church, 1922-1924; Eastland, 1924-1925; Weatherford District, 1925-1929; Arlington, 1929-1931; and Belton, 1931-1932.

No man was ever better prepared both in works and spirit for the great transition. For forty years he had served faithfully the highest and best interests of his church. As Presiding Elder he was fair both to the preachers and to the churches, putting first always the needs of the Kingdom. And his work in the various pulpits his service was always such as to put forward and advance the cause of Christ. And as a pastor, as the shepherd of his flock, he was at his best. "That which was behind of the afflictions of Christ" he tried to fill up by carrying and sharing the burdens and sorrows of those to whom he ministered.

Brother Stewart knew and practiced the most difficult are of all, the are of making goodness attractive. The funeral service conducted in the First Methodist Church at Belton, was in charge of the reader of this article, who answered the call to the ministry during Brother Stewart's pastorate at Temple. And Brother John Bowden, ministerial student at Southwestern University, who was drawn into the ministry by the influence of Brother Stewart during the Belton pastorate, also spoke a word of tribute to one who had meant much to him. The service at Covington was in charge of Rev. T. Edgar Neal, Presiding Elder of the Georgetown District, who together with Dr. F. P. Culver and Rev. J. W. W. Shuler spoke of the work and influence of their friend. At Belton Rev. Wallace Pittman sang "When They Ring Those Golden Bells," and at Covington the same song was sung by Mrs. A. L. Scales. Wherever Brother Stewart has gone lives there have been blessed and enriched and their allegiance to the life of goodness has been strengthened. To us in the service at Belton it seemed that there was one verse that in a peculiar way described the life and spirit of our departed friend, and that the 7th verse of the 52nd chapter of Isaiah: "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him that bringeth good tidings, that publisheth peace; That bringeth good tidings of good, that publisheth salvation; that saith unto Zion, Thy God reigneth."

Surviving Brother Stewart are Mrs. J. H. Stewart, Dallas, Texas; and four children, one daughter, Mrs. John B. Pope, Hart, Texas; and three sons, James H. Stewart, Dallas, Texas, Robert Stewart, Arlington, Texas, and Gathings Stewart, Dallas, Texas; and other relatives, and friends who are legion.

Dr. F. P. Culver read the memoir of C. H. Booth:

CULLOM H. BOOTH, A. B., D. D.

Cullom H. Booth was born May 26, 1876 in a Methodist parsonage near Pulaski, Tennessee. He passed away at Dallas in the home of his brother, L. E. Booth, on the night of November 1, 1932. He was reared in an atmosphere of religion and culture. His father, Rev. H. L. Booth, was an able minister and a cultured gentleman, and one of the organizers of the North Alabama Conference. His inheritance from a noble ancestry could not have made him other than a dignified and courteous gentleman. He was sent to Vanderbilt University to complete his education, from which institution he received his Bachelor's degree. He began preaching at the early age of twenty. In the beginning of his ministry he did some supply work in and near the city of Florence in the bounds of the North Alabama Conference.

In 1901 he was received on trial in the old Texas Conference, but the charge to which he was assigned was placed in the West Texas Conference. His appointments in that Conference were; First Street Austin, now Ward Memorial, three years, Bastrop two years, University Church Austin, four years, San Marcos, two years, and Laurel Heights San Antonio two years. In 1914 he was transferred to the Central Texas Conference and stationed at Georgetown three years, Corsicana four years, Waco District two years, Austin Avenue Waco, four years, and Fort Worth District two and one-half years. In 1930 Bishop Hay having chosen him to succeed Bishop Kern, transferred him to the West Texas Conference and stationed him at Travis Park, San Antonio, where he had a brilliant beginning. Soon after he settled in San Antonio, the disease which finally caused his death began to sap his strength, so that in one and one-half years he had to be relieved of this heavy charge. Then Bishop Hay brought him back to the Central Texas Conference and assigned him to the Cisco District. When his transfer was announced on coming back from San Antonio it was greeted with tremendous applause. He had come back to those who knew and loved him best.

Dr. Booth built three churches which stand as monuments to his wisdom and zeal. They are Ward Memorial Austin, University Church Austin, and Austin Avenue Waco. He also built the beautiful parsonage at Corsicana which is a credit to him and the church.

He was a member of three successive General Conferences, 1922-26-30. In these assemblies his voice was heard and influence felt. By his bold advocacy and persuasive arguments he assisted in the passage of some much needed legislation and helped to defeat some unwise measures. He was an esteemed and useful member of the General Board of Education. His counsel was sought and often his judgment prevailed. He gave much of his time and thought to its problems. When the three Boards were merged at the last session of the General Conference he was placed on the new Board of Christian Education, which position he resigned when his Conference relations were changed by his transfer to Travis Park. He was a member of the Board of Trustees of Southern Methodist University, and that institution never had a more loyal friend or wiser advocate. As a trustee of the Methodist Hospital in Fort Worth he was a faithful worker, ever responding to the demands it made upon him.

In 1903, September 24, Dr. Booth was married to Miss Clare Eddens. This was a happy union. They trusted and loved each other. Side by side they walked through twenty-nine radiant, unclouded years. No more beautiful thing could be found this side of heaven than the deathless love with which they blessed each other. The tenderness of his soul flamed out in the chivalrous attitude he bore toward her and the protecting care with which he surrounded her.

Dr Booth was a preacher of unusual power. He made diligent preparation to preach. He was a student of many books, but above all he was a student of the Book. He had a well-stocked library and made good use of it. He did not try to please but instruct. His effort was not to soothe but to arouse to action. His method was simple, direct, impressive. He sought to convince the mind and stir the heart. Those who waited upon his ministry felt the touch of his spirit as well as the Lord's as he spoke to them about the deep things of God. No congregation ever backslid under his ministry. The Gospel he preached was one of joy, because he believed in a joyous religion. Some of his utterances we will never forget because they came flaming from a happy heart and scintillating mind.

Dr. Booth was one of the leaders of Southern Methodism; his name and influence are Church wide. He has made a fine contribution to his Church. His memory will linger long with those who love the great and heroic. He was a wise legislator, a tactful administrator, a sympathetic pastor, an inspirational preacher and a Christian gentleman with a heart of gold.

The memoir of D. L. Collie was read by F. P. Culver:

REV. D. L. COLLIE

Rev. D. L. Collie of the Central Texas Conference died in Elizabethtown, Ky., on Tuesday, November 8. He was 79 years of age and had been a superannuate five years. The funeral was held at the First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, on Thursday afternoon, November 10.

He was a native of Kentucky and first joined the Louisville Conference, and early in his ministry transferred to the Denver Conference. He transferred back to Kentucky and in 1902 was transferred to the New Mexico Conference, and later to the Central Texas Conference. He served important charges in Texas but his last active years were devoted to the cause of the superannuate preachers. He secured nine superannuate homes in Central Texas Conference. Survivors are two sons, Morris W. Collie of Pecos and Owen P. Collie of Ft. Worth, and six daughters, Mrs. P. L. King, Middleton, Ky.; Mrs. Lewis Root, Louisville, Ky.; Mrs. J. F. Nail, Elizabethtown, Ky.; Mrs. Ed. Height, El Paso; Mrs. J. F. Garrison, Little Rock, Ark.; Mrs. Will S. Horn, Fort Worth. He was a devoted and worthy minister trusted and beloved by those who knew him. We profoundly sympathize with the sons and daughters and other relatives.

C. S. Wright read the memoir of E. P. Williams:

REV. EDMUND PAYNE WILLIAMS

Rev. E. P. Williams' parents were Rev. J. and Mrs. Almyra P. Williams, he was born in Collierville, Tenn., and was graduated from the University of Miss., spending from 1883 to 1885 inclusive in this school.

After his school days he came to Texas as principal of the public school at Aurora, Wise County, and later was principal of the Seventh

Ward Grammar School at Fort Worth. He was elected president of Granbury College and received an honorary Master of Arts degree from that institution.

While public school principal in Fort Worth, he became superintendent of the Mulkey Memorial Sunday School with Bishop Boaz as pastor now.

In 1896 he was licensed to preach and in 1900 he was admitted into the Northwest Texas Conference, thus serving thirty-two years.

Bro. Williams served the following pastorates and districts: Polytechnic, Ballinger, Eleventh Avenue-Corsicana, Taylor-two pastorates, Mexia Station, Cisco and Dublin Districts, Weatherford First Church, Georgetown, Boulevard and Missouri Avenue, Fort Worth and Hubbard. From Hubbard, after a lingering illness, he joined the church above.

His survivors are his wife, two sons—E. P. Jr. and W. Erskine II, a brother—Judge Erskine Williams of Ft. Worth and a sister—Mrs. J. Sam Barcus of Sulphur Springs, also two grand-children.

Prominent among his committee assignments was chairman of the Conference Board of Church Extension. All in all he was a most useful member of our Conference.

He died at the Methodist Hospital in Fort Worth on Sept. 13, 1932. The funeral was conducted from Mulkey Memorial Church at 3:00 P. M. September 14th. His remains were laid to rest by the side of his father in Pioneer Rest Cemetery, Fort Worth, Texas.

His presiding elder, Rev. C. S. Wright, was in charge of the funeral. He was assisted by Dr. F. P. Culver, Dr. J. Sam Barcus, Dr. A. D. Porter, and Rev. S. A. Ashburn.

In many respects Bro. Williams was a marvelous man. His disposition, his mental aptitudes, his studies, all had a tendency to set him apart from other men. He did not act or think or speak like other men. Every act, thought, word, bore the impress of his unique personality. It was **his** act that was done, **his** thought that was uttered, and **his** word that was spoken. He borrowed nothing, called no man his master and served only Christ and his fellowmen. He was outspoken in his utterances, courageous in his statements, and charitable in his opinions. He was true enough to Christ to mean what he said and to say what he meant. He was brave enough to think for himself and to speak what he thought. He was broad-minded enough in his notions of life and religion to be charitable even in the presence of narrowness and stupidity. Many a sinking spirit has been filled with new hope by his wonderful vision of "things not seen." Many a perplexed mind has found firm ground through his profound thinking about God and human life. He was respected by old and young and loved by all.

His last days were full of suffering, also full of hope, and in his dying hour, he won the victory. Truly it may be said of Bro. Williams that a great man in our Isreal has fallen. The prophet, that told anew the story of his Lord and his love, is silent. The heart of the man, who dared to say and to do what was true for his people, is still forever. The transcendent character is not longer in its home of clay, but at home in one "Whose maker and builder is God."

The memoir of Mrs. Gaston Hartsfield was read by A. D. Porter:

MRS. GASTON HARTSFIELD

At an early hour on Sunday, April 10th, 1932. Ethel Moore Hartsfield, beloved wife of Dr. Gaston Hartsfield, departed this life, after an illness of only a few hours.

On Monday Bishop Sam R. Hay, assisted by Dr. A. D. Porter and Rev. E. R. Stanford, conducted a service in Waco, where Dr. Hartsfield is pastor of the Austin Avenue Methodist Church.

The burial was on Tuesday, from the Methodist church in Seguin, where she spent her girlhood, where she was married to Dr. Hartsfield, and where, as a bride, she began a career of great usefulness as the wife of a minister.

The writer conducted burial service, with Dr. H. E. Draper, Rev. S. L. Batchelor and Rev. R. S. Pierce assisting. Many other ministers were present, and a large number of friends from the churches in San Antonio, San Marcos, San Angelo, Corpus Christi and other places where Dr. Hartsfield has served as pastor and presiding elder.

Mrs. Hartsfield was richly endowed by nature; God gave her a winsome personality, a lovely voice, a loving heart, and all these qualities she used in utmost devotion to her husband and children, to her mother, to the people to whom her husband ministered, to the church, and to her Lord, to whom her life was surrendered.

Surviving her are her husband, a son, Warren Moore, of Kerville, a daughter, Margaret Ellen, and her mother, Mrs. Maggie E. Moore. A great multitude of friends cherish her memory.

The memoir of Mrs. J. A. Walkup was read by J. W. Bergin:

MRS. J. A. WALKUP

The subject of this obituary, Mrs. J. A. Walkup, was born in Collinsville, Tennessee, in 1847. She was married to Rev. J. A. Walkup, a Methodist minister in 1868. She had lived in Texas for 61 years. She died in Ennis, Texas, June 23, 1932, in the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. P. McClain with whom she had lived for 8 years, having been an invalid for 16 years. Her body was buried by the side of her husband in Waxahachie, Texas. Sister Walkup was converted early in life and joined the Methodist Church.

Being the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher for 48 years, she led a devoted, busy, useful and consistent life, and without stint gave of her time and means to the support of the church she loved. Being an efficient worker in all departments, she wielded a savory influence for good. Her home was a household of faith and prayer where God was honored and the Holy Spirit was manifest. Having been her pastor for six years, I am prepared to say that I have never known a more beautiful and consistent life in home, in church, and the walks of life.

All that loving hands of her children could do in the home of Mrs. McClain, who had listened to every call for 8 years, was done. Now that mother is gone, the heavenly home is more attractive.

She is survived by one son and four daughters: James A. Walkup of Fort Worth, Mrs. J. P. McClain of Ennis, Mrs. Lee Suttle of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Mrs. K. D. Holland of Evanston, Illinois, and Mrs. Will Wylie of Sweetwater. "She hath done what she could."

The memoir of Rev. J. W. Bowden, long time faithful local preacher, was read by R. J. LaPrade commemorating his life and service among the membership of our church.

Dr. J. W. Bergin read the memoir of Mrs. (Abe) Louisa Mulkey, whose life was a benediction to Texas Methodism, particularly the work

of the Methodist Home. (These not being members, but lives worthy of recognition).

Mrs. R. P. Dudley and Miss Hope rendered a beautiful duet.

A number of the brethren gave eulogies to the lives of the ones mentioned above.

Bishop Hay assumed the chair and ordained the following elders: C. M. Crowe, C. C. Henson, C. D. Wooten, J. W. Whitefield, D. L. Barnes.

The ordination benediction was given by Bishop Hay.

SUNDAY EVENING SESSION

Conference convened at 7:00 P. M., after the singing of several hymns, and a prayer by Rev. J. A. Siceloff, Bishop Hay in the chair.

The Journal of the Saturday morning and afternoon sessions was read and approved.

Alonzo Monk Bryan announced a plan for the gathering of College Students from twenty-five Colleges, to take place at Weatherford College on the next Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Dr. P. E. Riley spoke to the report of the Board of Christian Literature, explaining the plan for placing the Southwestern Christian Advocate into a fuller circulation. The Bishop stated that at all the Conferences in the State this proposition had been heartily adopted. This effort is to establish a one dollar paper.

The preachers who would pledge to raise their quotas by the 15th of December were asked to rise, and the Laymen who would back the movement were requested to stand. This met with an encouraging response.

Question 9—Who are received by transfer from other Conferences was called, and the Bishop announced the transfer of V. Cyrus Barcus, in the class of the second year, from the North Texas Conference, and appointed a student in Southern Methodist University, and J. D. Ramsey a transfer from the West Texas Conference. C. B. Diltz was announced as transferred to the West Texas Conference, and stationed at Bloomington.

A resolution of thanks and appreciation was read by T. Wesley Hook, and was adopted with applause.

On motion by Dr. J. W. Bergin, it was ordered that the Conference adjourn sine die, after the approval of the minutes and the reading of the appointments, answering question 45.

The minutes were approved. The Bishop delivered a most impressive address, filled with timely advice and wise suggestions. He then read the appointments, the Doxology was sung and the Bishop pronounced the benediction, and the Conference stood adjourned.

41. How many churches and parsonages have been damaged or destroyed during the year, what is the amount of damage, and what has been collected thereon? Churches damaged, 10; parsonages damaged, 3; amount of damage, \$4,732; collected, \$4,719.

42. What is the number of superannuate homes, and what is their value? Homes, 18; value, \$57,000.

VIII. MISCELLANEOUS

43. Who is elected Conference Lay Leader? J. R. Edwards, Fort Worth, Texas.

44. Where shall the next session of the Conference be held? First Methodist Church, Corsicana, Texas.

45. Where are the preachers stationed this year? See list.

APPENDIX

CONFERENCE RULES

1. The District Steward, the Charge Lay Leader and the Recording Steward of each charge, the District Lay Leader, the District Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the District Trustees are ex-officio members of the District Conference. Besides these, each church is entitled to one delegate for every one hundred members, or two-thirds fraction thereof, to be elected by the Church Conference, provided that every church shall have at least one delegate.

2. The Presiding Elders are a standing committee to nominate all the boards and regular standing committees at each session of the Conference except quadrennial boards.

3. The Presiding Elders are required by Conference resolutions to send to the Statistical Secretary of the Conference, immediately after the meeting of their respective boards of District Stewards, a copy of the apportionments made on each charge, and these apportionments are to be recorded by the Statistical Secretary as the official apportionments against the several charges of the Conference.

4. The Conference shall elect a Statistical Secretary and an assistant Statistical Secretary who shall serve until the close of the Conference following. The Conference shall also elect two assistant Statistical Secretaries for each of the several districts. The two District Assistant Statistical Secretaries for each district shall be nominated as follows: The Statistical Secretary shall nominate one man and upon his election he shall nominate the second man. It shall be the duty of the District Assistant Statistical Secretaries to collect the statistical reports from the preachers in charge within the several districts and see that such reports are properly edited, properly entered upon the sheets provided for that purpose and to turn the finished sheets over to the Statistical Secretary in the evening of the second day of the Conference session.

5. The Chairman of Committee on Admissions shall make written report to be filed with the Secretary of the Conference, concerning each one admitted to the Conference. This report shall embrace: Full name, name of parents; date and place of birth, conversion and license to preach; date of marriage; name of wife, and such other facts of his life as may be deemed important.

6. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the presiding eldership shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.

7. The Conference Commission on Budget shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special apportionments to be levied upon the churches, unless such new or special apportionments shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the M. E. Church, South, or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so intrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust had been executed and how.

8. The Conference Commission on Budget in its report shall give the contrasts between the several apportionments for the present year and the proposed apportionments for the ensuing year so that the Conference can act on the report with clear knowledge. It shall be the duty

of the Commission to furnish the "Table of Apportionments" for the ensuing year arriving at the scale for the districts by finding what per cent the total church membership in the individual district is of the grand total church membership in the Conference, and by finding what per cent the total salaries in the district are of the grand total of salaries paid in the Conference, and then dividing the sum of these two decimals by 2.

9. All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports, except the statistical reports, coming before the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk, the original copy to be retained by the Secretary in the archives, one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Texas Christian Advocate, and one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Central Texas Conference Journal.

10. Each preacher in charge shall, on the first morning of the Conference session, hand his complete statistical report to one of the Assistant Statistical Secretaries for the district in which his charge is situated.

11. All requests by boards, commissions, or individuals for dates for special campaigns to secure money shall be submitted to the Commission on Budget, whose duty it shall be to work out a schedule for said campaigns so that as far as possible, overlapping may be prevented. The Commission shall submit its report to the Conference for approval.

12. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference Work an amount sufficient to meet the expense of printing the Minutes and also provide for the Treasurer's Bond. These estimates are to be furnished by the Editor of the Journal, through the Commission on Budget.
