## DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Opening--The Central Tcxas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the sixty eighth session (which is the 24th since the division), at 7:30 p. m., November 8th, 1933, in the First Methodist Church, Corsicana, Texas. Bishop Samuel Ross Hay, D. D. LLD., presiding.

Hymn 146 "Faith of Our Fathers" was sung, followed by the recital of the Apostles Creed. Rev. M. K. Little, the oldest surviving member of the Conference in point of service, led in prayer.

The local choir rendered a beautiful anthem, "Nearer My God to Thee".
Psalm 103 was read responsively.
Organization-The secretary of the former session called the roll and the following answered, (see list).
A. D. Porter was elected secretary and on his nomination the following assistants were elected: R. W. Nation, R. A. Crosby, A. C. Haynes, Roy L. Crawford, W. N. Dunson, and C. H. Sisserson. Marcus M. Chunn was elected editor of the Conference Journal and a member of the secretarial staff.
F. O. Waddill was elected statistical secretary and on his nomination the following assistants, C.O. Hightower, first assistant, and the following in order as District assistants: E. W. Swearingen, C. A. Wilkerson, J. L. Oliver, T. D. Ellis, W. G. Gwaltney, Alvin Mauldin, Horace Poteet, A. K. Marney, Paxton Smith, F. A. Ray, J. B. Weathers, A. G. Standlee, J. U. McAfee, J. L. Davenport, Oran Stephens, J. Fred Patterson, J. T. Gardner, J. L. Ray, C. E. Wade and W. E. Shipp.

Hours of Meeting-Dr. J. W. Bergin made a motion that the hours of meeting and adjourning be $8: 30 \mathrm{a}$. m. and $12: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. respectively with the main auditorium as the bar of the conference and the motion prevailed.

Order-Dr. Bergin moved that immediately following the receiving of the class into full connection and announcing the transfers into the conference we proceed with the election of delegates to the General Conference. This was ordered.

Welcome-Mr. Boyce Martin and Mrs. J. S. Callicut gave words of welcome in a cordial manner. Dr. P. M. Baker, pastor of the 3rd Ave. Presbyterian church, welcomed the visitors on the part of the Corsicana Ministerial Association. Bishop Hay in a gracious way responded to the hospitable welcome.

Nominations-Rev. R. O. Sory read the report of the presiding elders nominating the standing committees, which was adopted as read; (see Standing Committees).

Greetings-_Rev. J. W. Chisholm brought tender words of greetings from Rev. C. H. Ellis, who on his 90 th birthday is active and thinking of his former relation with this body. On motion of Dr. F. P. Culver the secretary was instructed to send response.

Memorials-Dr. J. E. Crawford moved that a committee of three clerical and two laity be appointed to receive and report all memorials to the General Conference and the committee appointed follows: Dr. Gaston

Hartsfield, J. A. Siceloff, T. E. Bowman, W. Erskine Williams and Hal H. Cherry.

Introductions-Among those introduced to the conference were J. W. Chisholm, W. B. McKeown, W. L. Hankla, G. A. Morgan, J. D. Farmer and Dr. Chas. C. Selecman.

Nominations-P. E. Riley and E. W. Bridges were placed on the board of trustees of superannuate homes to fill vacancies.

Adjournment-With announcements being completed, the doxology was sung and Dr. P. M. Martin pronounced the benediction.

## SECOND DAY, THURSDAY MORNING

Opening-The Conference was called to order promptly at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Hay presiding. After a song, "Revive Us Again", was sung, led by Hayden Edwards, Dr. W. H. Coleman read part of I John 3rd chapter and following brief comments led in prayer.

Journal-The Journal of the previous session was read and approved.
Roll-The names of all who were not present at the previous session were called and they answered as the roll will indicate.

Various alternates were seated (see roll).
Admission-Who are admitted into full connection was called and the following made their reports and were received into $\cdot$ full connection: Wallace W. Pittman, B. L. McCord, H. W. Crain, H. R. McDaniels and V. Cyrus Barcus; made their reports, and after being called to the altar Bishop Hay gave a very fitting address and these men were received by unanimous vote into the Central Texas Conference.

When the names of R. F. Stone, Alvin Mauldin and A. B. Nichols, members of the class of the second year, were called, they asked for discontinuance and it was so ordered.

Order of the Day-As ordered at the previous session, the hour for election of delegates to the next General Conference had arrived, and the clergy and laity were divided for the election.

Judge H. C. Shropshire made a motion that all ballots must contain the exact number of votes or be cast out and it was so done.

Methodist Hospital-Dr. Truman Terrell addressed the conference on the work of the Methodist Hospital. The conference arose as a token of thanks for the work of the speaker. Bishop Hay stated that after earnest requests had come he had agreed to appoint Dr. C. R. Wright the Hospital Commissioner.

Southern Methodist University-Dr. C. C. Selecman addressed the audience on the work of Southern Methodist University.

Lay Ballot-The first lay ballot was announced as follows: 89 votes cast, 45 election, Roy Anderson 57, Hal H. Cherry 52, J. R. Edwards 47 and B. E. McGlamery 46 and they were declared elected. Second ballot spread.

Question 21, was answered in part when the names of W. H. Coleman, W. E. Fisher, R. B. Hooper, Edmund Heinsohn, R. C. Edwards, A. L. Scales, J. S. Cook, E. H. Maddox and J. D. Jordan. were called, they had their characters passed and the ones present made reports.

Fourth Year-The class of the fourth year composed of W. C. Craig, Paxton Smith, E. R. Walker, and P. W. Walker was called and they were elected to elders orders.

San Antonio Home-Mrs. R. L. Culberson, superintendent of the San Antonio Mission and Training School, represented this work and presented a beautiful rug made by one of the inmates of this home, which was received for Central Texas by Mrs. J. W. Spivey to be placed in the Woman's building at Mt. Sequoyah. H. B. Thompson spoke favorable to the institution.

Publishing House-The Methodist Publishing interest was presented by Mr. Pierce, the manager of the Dallas branch.

Leave of Absence-Rev. D. A. Chisholm was granted a leave of absence to attend a funeral.

Lay Ballot-The second lay ballot reported 90 .votes cast, 46 to elect with Judge Nat Harris 52 votes and Roy G. Boger 49 votes and both were elected,

Clerical Ballot-The first clerical ballot was read. Two hundred and twenty-three votes were cast. Necessary to elect, 112. J. E. Crawford received 160 , F. P. Culver 130 , A. D. Porter 115, P. E. Riley 115, and they were elected.

Afternoon-The conference was ordered by motion to adjourn upon casting another ballot, to meet at $3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.

Adjournment-The doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. A. J. Weeks.

## SECOND DAY, THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Opening-Bishop Hay called the conference to order at $3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.
"Amazing Grace" was sung, after which Dr. J. H. Groseclose led in prayer.

Introductions-The following were introduced, Dr. J. H. Groseclose, G. C. French, T. S. Barcus and S. W. Williams.

Lay Ballot-The third lay ballot was read as follows: 84 votes cast, 43 to elect, Mrs.J. W. Spivey 44 and Boyce. Martin 43 and they were elected.

Anti-Saloon League-Rev. Atticus Webb addressed the conference.
Ballot-The fourth lay alternate elected Mrs. W. C. Guggolz.
The fifth clerical ballot resulted in the election of J. W. Bergin and C. Q. Smith, completing the list of delegates. The ballot was spread for clerical alternates.

Superannuate-Rev. W. B. Andrews spoke concerning superannuate homes and endowment.

Question 21 was again called with the preachers of the Brownwood, Cisco, and Cleburne Districts having their characters passed and they reported.

Ballot-The first clerical alternate ballot resulting in the election of $T$. Edgar Neal and R. O. Sory. Second ballot spread.

The second ballot elected L. L. Felder.
Adjournment--J. M. Neal was granted leave of absence. Dr. J. W. Johnson was announced to preach at 7:30 p. m. After other announcements the conference adjourned with the benediction pronounced by Bishop Hay.

## THIRD DAY, FRIDAY MORNING

Opening-The Conference stood singing "In the Cross" after which Rev. P. T. Stanford led in prayer. Bishop Hay called for the reading of the previous day's Journal, which was done.

Vacancies-S. L. Culwell was elected on the Board of Missions in the place of Edmund Heinsohn, and C. M. Crowe was elected to fill the vacancy of J, S. Cook on the Board of Finance.

Orders-Hubert W. Crain wàs elected to elders orders.
Motion-Rev. W. B. Andrews moved to send a letter to Rev. W. S. P. McCullough, who is very sick, and it was done by the secretary.

Memorial-Rev. J. N. Rentfro read a memorial to the General Conference from the Brownwood District concerning changing of dates of meeting of Annual Conferences from November to June and the memorial was defeated.

Ministerial Supply-Dr. J. E.Crawford read a report of the committee on ministerial supply and training. Dr. F. P. Culver made a motion to amend.

## REPORT OF COMMISSION ON MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND SUPPORT

We, your Commission on Ministerial Supply and Support, beg leave to submit our report as follows:

The first responsibility of a church is to provide worship and religious instruction for its own members and constituents, and the prime requisite in meeting this responsibility is the pastor, who is free to devote his time and energies to his ministerial duties. This necessitates provision for an adequate support for him and his family.

## Elements Involved in. Adequate Support

While the needs of preachers vary with geography, dependents, and other factors, nevertheless there are certain fundamental elements in an adequate ministerial support that apply to all. These elements are (1) material needs, such as food, clothing, shelter, and travel; (2) cultural needs, including books, magazines, attendance upon training schools, conferences, and institutes, and the education of children; (3) giving-the minister has many calls for help to which he should be able to make a reasonable response and should be in position to set a worthy example of liberality before his people; (4) saving-a modest provision for a rainy day, emergencies, retirement and old age are a legitimate part of a support that is adequate and equitable.

In view of the sharp rise in the price of commodities, and in harmony with the appeal of the President of the United States concerning the increase of wages, we urge every charge in the conference to make an honest and faithful effort to provide an adequate salary in the light of all the elements involved.

## Minimum Salary Standard

Our investigation of the needs of our under-paid men and of experiments being conducted in other communions, particularly in a large number of conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, leads us to the conviction that it is a wise policy for an annual conference to establish a basic minimum salary standard for its members who are on the effective list. We recommend, therefore, that our conference fix $\$ 1000$ and a house as the minimum standard of support for its effective members. Looking toward the realization of this goal we recommend:

1. The encouragement and stimulation of sub-standard charges to measure up to the minimum, and the re-grouping of churches as far as practicable to aid in attaining this end.
2. The payment of the highest possible percentage on the benevolences by every charge that the largest returns may be realized on the apportionment for Conference Missions.
3. The Commission has had placed at its disposal the sum of $\$ 1000$ to be administered in behalf of the most necessitous cases that may arise in the interim of the annual conference according to the plan of contributing to each District one-tenth of the amount raised by each District for this purpose.

Fourth: The Commission will receive voluntary contributions to a Fellowship fund, on the following basis: from preachers occupying stations or charges which paid their pastors more than $\$ 1,000.00$ and less than $\$ 1,499.00$ the preceding Conference year, $1 / 2$ of $1 \%$ of said whole- salary; from preachers occupying stations or charges which paid their pastors more than $\$ 1,499.00$ and less than $\$ 1,999.00$ the preceding Conferance year, $1 \%$ of said whole salary; from preachers occupying stations or charges which paid their pastors more than $\$ 1,999.00$ and less than $\$ 2,999.00$ the preceding Conference year, $1 \% / 2 \%$ of said whole salary; from preachers occupying stations or charges which paid their pastors more than $\$ 2,999.00$ the preceding Conference year, $2 \%$ of said whole salary; the Commission to distribute from said Fellowship fund to the most necessitous cases in each District.

## Ministerial Efficiency

While better support will make possible and stimulate better work, it must not be overlooked that ministerial efficiency is absolutely essential to the solution of the problem of adequate ministerial support. The

Church demands and has a right to demand a more uniformly efficient ministry to go with a better financial support. This demand cannot be ignored as an integral part of the problem of adequate support. The two are inseparably linked together. There is no stimulus that can permanently maintain a ministry that is not itself effective. No vocation makes greater demands upon those who follow it than the ministry, or requires more diversified gifts. It is imperative, therefore, that candidates for the ministry make the best possible preparation for their work, and that those in active service continue to read and study and use every available means of increasing their efficiency.

## Stewardship Cultivation

In conclusion, we call upon our pastors and official boards to present and practice regularly and faithfully the great truths of Christian Stewardship in every congregation; and to lead our people to contribute not merely out of what they can spare but into the joyous experience of sharing a definite and worthy proportion of their incomes for the support of the ministry and the great connectional causes of our Church.

## RESOLUTION

Texas Methodist Centenn:al
Whereas-We have come to the one hundredth anniversary of organized Methodist work in Texas and in this time our Church has grown from a few scattered and unorganized Methodist people to more than 400,000 communicant members, with more than 2,000 houses of worship valued at approximately $\$ 30,000,000$, and educational institutions, hospitals, an orphanage, and other church property valued at several million dollars more, and

Whereas-It is fitting that we at this time honor the labors of the worthy and devoted men and women who planted and built our Methodism in this State by reviewing this hundred years of history, by calling our own generation of Methodists to a deeper consecration to God, to historic Methodist principles, and that we seek to recapture for ourselves the religious passion of those who made our history what it is,

## Therefore Be It Resolved:

(1) That this the Central Texas Annual Conference in session at Corsicana, Texas, hereby pledges its full co-operation with the other conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Texas, in celebrating during 1934 of the Centennial of Texas Methodism.
(2) That a committee of three be appointed by this Conference, on nomination by the Cabinet or as may be determined by the Conference, to serve with committees to be appointed by the other Texas conferences,
the whole number to constitute the Joint Commission on the Texas Methodist Centennial. This Commission together with the Bishops in charge of the Texas conferences shall outline and put forward plans for the Centennial celebration.
(3) That this Centennial celebration shall not be a money raising campaign except that local churches may utilize the occasion for raising funds to be directed by themselves. It is our purpose to make it a year of evangelism within and without the Church, a period of spiritual cultivation, and a time when we face our tasks and put ourselves in position to meet them.
(4) That we favor holding the 1934 sessions of the Texas conferences in one city or community at the same time with united inspirational meetings each afternoon and evening, provided arrangements can be made to do this without unduly burdening the members of the conferences. In order that this may be done it is agreed that this conference will meet in 1934 at such place as the Commission may select as the meeting place of all the Texas conferences.
(5) That to take care of necessary expenses in organizing and promoting the Centennial celebration this conference will provide as its share the sum of $\$ 500$.

Hospital-W. Erskine Williams gave the report of the Hospital Board and at the same time represented the General Board and it was adopted:

## TO THE PRESIDENT AND MEMBERS OF THE CENTRAL TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE, IN SESSION AT CORSICANA, TEXAS, NOVEMBER $9,1933$.

The Conference Hospital Board makes the following report:
We had before us a communication from Chas. C. Jarrell, General Secretary of the General Hospital Board. This department of our general work is now of great service to humanity.

At the last session of this Conference a contract was entered into between the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Hospital, Fort Worth, and Dr. Truman C. Terrell was unanimously indorsed and confirmed. Under that contract, Dr. Terrell guaranteed the operating expenses of the hospital before he received any compensation, he to have any profits made up to February, 1934. The contract further provided that during the period from February, 1934, until October, 1937, Dr. Terrell will pay all operating expenses and all interest on the bonded indebtedness. The report made by Dr. Terrell through the Board of Trustees indicates that the hospital receipts have been sufficient to pay the expenses but that there has been no profit thus far. His report shows that during
the period from October 1, 1932, to September 30, 1933, that 1,372 patients were admitted, and that 322 babies were born in the hospital.

Rev. Frank L. Turner, Hospital Commissioner, has filed with the Hospital Board a report showing collections and disbursements as follows:

The receipts from all sources for the year have been $\$ 5,051.25$. This amount has been disbursed under the order of the trustees leaving a balance of cash on hand of $\$ 130.82$.

The outstanding statement is his report that during the year a ward has been fully equipped for Negroes in the sub-story of the hospital building, and that already they have received eight patients, and are now in a position to bid for a portion of the hospitalization service from the industrial concerns in Fort Worth. It is his belief that this additional equipment will be of large value to the hospital. The Board believes that he has done a very worthwhile service during this conference year, and extends to him a vote of thanks.

We recommend that the Disciplinary Golden Cross program be vigorously prosecuted and to that end we recommend that the month of May be set aside as Golden Cross Enrollment Period.

The terms of the following members of the Board expire at the end of this conference, namely, J. B. Baker, Leon Gross, E. A. Landreth, W. H. McCullough, C. O. Shugart, H. H. Simmons, and J. H. Barwise. We nominate them to succeed themselves.

We further nominate L. L. Felder to take the place of Joseph B. Cook as a member of the Board. His term will expire in 1934.

We recommend that Rev. C. R. Wright be appointed Hospital Commissioner and Golden Cross Director for the ensuing year at a salary of $\$ 100.00$ per month.

The Hospital Board desires to extend its thanks to Dr. Truman C. Terrell for his splendid work as Superintendent of the Hospital, and although it may not be necessary under the contract with him, we request that he be elected as Superintendent for the ensuing Conference year.

Question 21, resumed--The names of all preachers in the Weatherford District were called, characters passed and they made reports.

Missions-J. F. Rawls made a very impassioned appeal for the cause of benevolences. Bishop Hay exhorted to the appeal.

Wesley Bible Chair-Dr. C. W. Hall of the Wesley Bible Chair at Austin represented this important work

Introductions-Drs. O. T. Cooper, F. M. Richardson and President King Vivion were introduced.

Announcements-The announcements were made, including the fact that at $7 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. the Methodist Home children would present a program, followed by a sermon by Dr. C. M. Bishop.

Adjournment-The doxology was sung and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. F. M. Richardson.

## FOURTH DAY, SATURDAY MORNING SESSION

Opening--The conference convened with the singing of "My Jesus I Love Thee", with Bishop Hay presiding. Rev. Roy A. Langston led in prayer.

Journal-The journal of the previous day's proceedings was read and approved.

Resolution-J. I. Patterson offered a resolution regarding the apportionments. This was discussed by R. A. Langston, A. C. Haynes, C. Q. Smith, J. W. W. Shuler, W. W. Ward, E. R. Stanford and F. O. Waddill.
W. W. Ward moved to table the resolution. The motion to table was lost.
C. R. Wright, Gid J. Bryan, and Boyce Martin spoke.
E. R. Stanford offered a substitute motion which was lost and the original motion was adopted and reads:
"Be It Resolved: First; That for the year 1933-34 this Conference set as a goal the payment of $75 \%$ of the total apportionments.

Second: That we instruct the Commission on Budget to distribute all apportionments to the Districts according to the same scale as that of 1932-1933."

Information-Dr. A. D. Porter moved to have the analysis of the report printed in full and it was so ordered.

Presiding Elders-The following presiding elders had their names called, their characters passed and they reported for the respective D istricts, R. O. Sory, C. Q. Smith, D. K. Porter, C. S. Wright.

Introductions-The following were introduced, Dr. S. S. McKinney, of Texas Conference, J. J. Mason, H. D. Marlin, R. G. Percival and Dr. Hall of the First Presbyterian Church.

Reports-The names of the following presiding elders had their names called, their characters passed and they reported, F. P. Culver, R. A. Langston, T. Edgar Neal.

Auditor-J. R. Banes read the auditor's report as follows:
Your auditor submits the following report:
The account of the Conference Treasurer of Central Texas Conference, Treasurers on Entertainment, Board of Missions, and Board of Finance have been submitted to me for audit. I have verified these accounts and found them to be in proper balanice and well kept.

Reports-The remaining presiding elders had their characters passed and they reported, C. R. Wright, L. L. Felder, and A. D. Porter.

Vacancy-M. K. Little nominated A. W. Hall to fill a vacancy on the committee on memoirs and he was elected.

Christian Literature-J. M. Wynne moved that the Christian Literature anniversary be held and the report was read by P. W. Evans. The report was spoken to by P. E. Riley and adopted as read:

Your Board of Christian Literature presents the following report and recommendations:

Our Publishing House suffered further loss of business this year, having operated at a loss of $\$ 14,839.56$, but the reserve fund enabled it to appropriate $\$ 50,000.00$ for the Superannuates, this Conference receiving its part of this appropriation.

Attention is called to the death, March 27, 1933, of Dr. A. J. Lamar, one of the Publishing Agents for about thirty years and a strong factor in the development of the Publishing House and its very large and extensive business.

The minimum of 25,000 subscribers, or one subscriber to every 20 members of our Church in its territory, was not obtained for our Southwestern Advocate, but the editor and publishers announce it was published and delivered to its increased number of subscribers for $\$ 1.00$ per year each at a slight profit the past year. While costs of labor and material have increased recently and further such increase is anticipated, the publishers offer to publish the Advocate at the subscription price of $\$ 1.00$ for the coming year on a guarantee of a minimum circulation of one subscriber to every 20 miembers of our Church served by it.

## We recommend:

1. That our pastors urge the larger circulation and reading of our Church periodicals, particularly the Southwestern Advocate, The World Outlook, and the Nashville Christian Advocate.
2. We endorse and accept the proposition of the publishers to continue the subscription price of the Southwestern Advocate at $\$ 1.00$ per year under our guarantee of a minimum of one subscriber for each twenty members of our Church in this Conference and pledge ourselves to live up to our guarantee; and, we set the second Sunday, the 10th day of December, as Southwestern Advocate Day and will undertake to complete securing our pledged quota of Southwestern Advocate subscribers by Friday night, December 15, 1933.
3. We endorse the editorial policy of Dr. Weeks and especially commend his vigorous stand and efforts to maintain State and National Prohibition.
4. We urge the more general use of all our own Church and Sunday School literature and advise extensive use and distribution of tracts and leaflets issued by our Publishing House either free, or at very small cost, affording valuable information about Methodist teachings and practices.

Memorial-E. R. Stanford read a memorial which was adopted and is in the report of the committee on memorials. The chair ruled all other such matters must be brought by the committee.

Education-The Board of Education submitted their report but it was referred back for further orders.

Temperance and Social Service-The Committee on Temperance and Social service read their report. G. W. Shearer submitted an amendment, which was spoken to by J. W. Bergin, R. A. Langston, W. N. Curry, Mac M. Smith, D. K. Porter, J. T. Gardner, O. F. Sensabaugh and R. W' Call.

The amendment was lost.
E. R. Stanford moved the previous question and the report was adopted without amendment as follows:

Your committee on Temperance and Social Service report as follows:
The general let down in moral standards in recent years has imperiled every department of moderin life.

The supreme battle of religion has always been that of sustaining high moral standards.

The stampede produced by the millionaire brewers has resulted in the destruction of the Eighteenth Amendment.

In the minds of upright thinking people this was the most benevolent and valuable piece of social legislation ever enacted in any country.

We face the liquor traffic, well-organized, well-financed, and brutally aggressive.

We place ourselves on record as taking up the battle and waging ceaseless warfare against the legalized alcohol business in all its alluring and seductive forms.

We seek the indomitable spirit of the great Dr. George C. Rankin, who led the forces of righteousness and dealt deadiy blows to this iniquitous traffic.

We endorse the work of the Anti-Saloon League, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and the United Forces for Prohibition.

We further endorse the movement under way to unify all these forces under the direction of the committee on Co-operation and pledge them our loyal support.

We call attention to our pastors and people that the discipline provides for an organization of a Temperance and Social Service Committee in each congregation.

This Committee should function through programs provided by the Woman's Missionary Society, The Young People's Division, and the General Sunday School.

We recommend the appointment of Dr. Atticus Webb as superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League.

We deplore recent legislation permitting race-track gambling. We enter our protest against the gambling craze which is now being carried on in our State. This practice is perversive of morals and degrading to our Citizenship.

The Legion of the Youth of America organized to study and advance the interest of good Citizenship merits our heartiest support. We welcome this timely movement and recommend the appointment of Rev. R. E. Nollner as its Exccutive Secretary.

We are in deepest sympathy with the work of Mrs. A. T. Culbertson and ask our pastors to place the San Antonio Mission and Rescue Home before their people.

We recommend the same assessment as last year to this Christ-like work.

We remind our people of the continued deadly influence of the immoral movies and the contagion of vice produced by them.

The eyes of millions of American youth gaze upon movie screens every week to their infinite hurt.

The Church of Jesus Christ must reach these great nerve-centers of the modern world.

It must no longer be said that "The forces which are moulding the future of Civilization lie largely outside of the Church."

The time is ripe for a Crusade in the interests of individual and civic righteousness. The youth of today might be hurled against the pernicious evils undermining the foundations of personal and national life, if only the Church had the dauntless spirit of the Crusaders.

We would back up and support the efforts of our President in his attempt to secure a more righteous distribution of the National income.

The money getting philosophy of life has driven the Nation into perilous waters. Over against the torn and distracted world is the Statesmanship of Jesus. Only a great religious awakening moving life in its deepest centers and transforming the hearts of men can save our decaying civilization.

Christian Education-W. W. Ward read report No. 1 of the Board of Education. Dr. C. M. Montgomery was introduced and spoke at length to the report. Dr. Culver offered an amendment to the report. Hon. H. C. Shropshire offered another amendment, retaining Weatherford College. ,E. R. Stanford offered an amendment to the amendment. R. G. Boger spoke against the amendment to the amendment. The time was extended. E. R. Stanford moved that when we adjourn it be to meet at 2 p. m.

Announcements-Announcements were made, among them was the fact that Dr. S. S. McKinney would speak at 7:30 p. m.

Adjournment-Bishop Hay pronounced the benediction.

## SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening-The Conference opened promptly at 2 p. m.., Bishop Hay presiding. "Blessed Assurance" was sung and Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh led in prayer.

Journal-The Journal of the morning session was read and approved.
Discussion Resumed-The chair stated that R. G. Boger was on the floor at the close of the morning session and he now had the privilege of the floor. Mr. Boger concluded his address.
E. B. Hawk spoke to the amendment.

Re-Reading-The chair called for the re-reading of the report which was done. Dr. Hawk requested that the word "recommend" be substituted for "instruct", and "reasonable time" be inserted for exact date and it was agreed upon.

Point of Order-E. R. Stanford rose to a point of order which was sustained.

Vote-The amendment to the amendment was lost.
The amendment was adopted which requested the Commission to "Preserve Weatherford College and to give the other Colleges a reasonable time to dispose of or meet the demands."

Gid J. Bryan-Rev. Gid J. Bryan spoke.
Addresses--Dr. King Vivion and T. W. Brabham each addressed the Conference.

Points of Order-Dr. Hawk raised a point of order as did C. Q. Smith and they were sustained.

Original Question-Dr. Bergin moved the previous question and the joint resolution was read and adopted as follows:

## REPORT NO. 1

BOARD CHRISTIAN EDUCATION
Your Conference Board of Christian Education has had before it the Report of the Joint Commission on Methodist Educational Work in Texas. In handing you this Report, we beg leave to make the following two Recommendations:

1. That the Report of the Joint Commission of Methodist Educational Work in Texas be received by the Conference.
2. That the Joint Resolution offered the five Conferences of Texas be adopted by the Central Texas Conference and the new Joint Commission be appointed as ordered in the joint resolution.

Whereas, there exists the possibility that the Report of the Joint Commission on Methodist Educational work in Texas may not be satisfactory in every detail to all of the five Conferences of Texas,

And, Whereas, it is absolutely essential that the vital features of the report be preserved and safeguarded, even though some amendment affecting minor features prevail in one or more Conferences.

Therefore, it is hereby agreed that any minor deviations from the report by amendment or substitution shall be referred for final settlement to a Joint Commission to be created as follows:

The Presiding Bishop of each of the five participating Annual Conferences, on nomination by the Conference Board of Christian Education, shall appoint from within the bounds of such Annual Conference six members, three ministers and three laymen, neither of whom shall be a paid employee of any Church College in Texas, who, with an equal number of members similarly appointed from each of the four other Annual Conferences in Texas, shall constitute the Joint Commission on Methodist Educational work in Texas, which Commission shall have plenary powers, and is hereby instructed to act finally in these matters for the several Annual Conferences. It shall also, when necessity arises, function as a Joint Board of Trustees for the Southwestern University System, and is hereby directed to carry out, or modify if necessary, the provisions of this Report.

The adoption of this Joint Resolution by all of the five Conferences empowers the Joint Commission to take final action in all matters incorporated in such amendments to and (or) substitutions for sections of the Report.

Fraternal-Dr. R. A. Corn brought fraternal greetings as an official representative from the recent Methodist Protestant Conference held at Wortham, Texas. Bishop Hay fittingly responded.

Introduction-Rev. A. T. Miller, local Baptist pastor, was introduced.
Orphanage-D. A. Chisholm read the Orphanage report and it was spoken to by the recently elected superintendent of the Methodist Home, Hubert T. Johnson, and the adopted report reads:

## REPORT OF ORPHANAGE BOARD

We, your Orphanage Board, submit the following:
The Orphanage has weathered the storm of financial distress as well as could be expected, considering. There are now four hundred children in the Home and an average of more than this number have been maintained in the Home during the year. The urge for admission is far greater now than at any other time in th ehistory of the institution. There is now a waiting list of worthy children of more than one hundred and fifty names, who cannot be received into the Home because of financial conditions. Of course, the general conditions of the country have been the cause of this urgent call for help, and since the number seeking admission is above the average, it is an opportune time for the church to arise to the emergency and assist in the care of these dependent and neglected orphan children in our territory.

The General Board, at its last regular meeting, set the needs for the Home for the next year at $\$ 100,000.00$ for the six patronizing conferences. The superintendent will get in touch with the various pastors and set the estimates for next year. This will give the General Board some idea as to whether or not it will be necessary to reduce the number of children in the Home and to make other adjustments in order that the Orphanage may be operated within its income. It is hoped that the reports from the Pastors will be so encouraging that the General Board will feel justified in operating the Home on the same efficient basis and with the same number of children as during the past years.

Therefore, it is requested that the patronizing conferences set aside the month of December as a special time to present the needs of the Home to the various congregations, and that the offering to the Home be taken before any other collection in the month of December.

Memorial Session-Dr. Bergin moved that the memorial service be held Sunday afternoon at $2 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., and it was granted.

Final Session-A. D. Porter moved that the final session be held at 7 p. m. Sunday evening, and this was ordered.

Board of Finance-C. N. Morton read the report of the Board of Finance which was adopted as read:

Your Board of Finance submits its annual report as follows:
The hand of death has rested heavily on the roll of Conference Claimants during the past year. The following have answered the roll-
call of the Church Triumphant during the year and their names automatically pass to the list of "Our Sainted Dead," R. C. Armistrong, Horace Bishop, J. H. Braswell, J. F. Clark, J. W. Cowan, J. W. Holt, A. C. Lackey, C. S. McCarver, C. V. Oswaldt, C. E. Statham, C. S. Field and Mrs. W. F. Lloyd.

We are going into the new conference year with 52 Superannuates and 78 Widows on our list.

We have received from all sources for distribution this year, sums as follows:

After setting aside $20 \%$ of this amount to take care of the more needy cases, we found that we could appropriate $\$ 4.00$ per year of service for the superannuates and $\$ 2.66$ for the widows and distribution has been made to the claimants on this basis.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. W. B. Andrews as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment and earnestly request the Presiding Elders and Pastors to give him an opportunity to present this worthy cause to the people.

Rev. S. A. Ashburn conducted the devotional, announcing the opening hymn "Faith of Our Fathers," which was sung, and he then led in prayer. He then read from the 4th chapter of 2nd Timothy.

Question 14, "Who have died during the year" was called and answered as follows: The honored and beloved brethren, A. C. Lackey, Horace Bishop, C. V. Oswalt, C. S. McCarver, C. E. Statham, R. C. Armstrong, J. F. Clark, J. H. Braswell, J. W. Cowan, C. S. Fields, J. W. Holt, S. G. Thompson and J. W. Fort.

The memoirs were read in order as called by Revs. E. M. Wisdom, M. K. Little, Dr. Culver, A. W. Hall, Dr. W. D. Bradfield, J. J. Creed, Dr. Culver, J. J. Creed, T. E. Bowman, G. W. Shearer and Dr. A. D. Porter.

## REV. A. C. LACKEY

Rev. A. C. Lackey was born in Lawrence County Alabama, January 22, 1870, and died at his home near Carlton, Texas, December 12, 1932.

His parents came to Texas when he was six years of age and they settled near McGregor. He was converted at the age of fifteen and united with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. He joined the Waco Presbytery at a Call Session held at McGregor in August, 1896.

He was licensed to preach at Temple, Texas, December, 1900, and was ordained at Coryell City, July, 1902. In November, 1909, he joined the Northwest Texas Conference at Stamford. His first appointment was Oglesby, where he built a church and spent four years. His next appointment was at Crawford where he built a Church at Evergreen and a Church and Parsonage at Crawford, here he spent four years. . In November, 1917, he took the Superannuate relation on account of broken health. Brother Lackey was one of the best informed ministers of our church on the doctrines of Methodism and he preached them, sang them and shouted wherever he went and his whole meat and drink was preaching the Gospel with a rejoicing which brought converts and members into the church in great numbers.

After his Superannuation he moved to Carlton, where he held all of the official positions in the Church, with his last duty as superintendent of the Sunday School. His name is a household word in the homes of that little city, and no man was more highly respected than he. Just before his passing he called all of his children to his bedside and gave them a personal parting blessing which was like an angel's message from that Heavenly clime. The funeral was conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. A. Flynn, pastor at Carlton, assisted by Revs. H. H. Nance and E. M. Wisdom, pastors of Hamilton. He was married to Miss Lola B. Byrd, July 22, 1900. To this union were born eight children, three boys, and five girls, all of which survive him. An invalid wife also survives him. Edgar M. Wisdom

## DR. HORACE BISHOP

Rev. Horace Bishop, D. D., LLD, was born in Montgomery County, Virginia, August 19, 1843. He was the youngest of eight children of William Phelps Bishop and his wife Lavinia (Schoolfield) Bishop of Lynchburg, Virginia.

At the age of eighteen, he enlisted in the Confederate Army. He was engaged in three battles as well as in a number of skirmishes. After the
war, he taught school in Butler, Freestone County, for three years. He joined the Army Church, March 7, 1864, under Dr. J. C. Keener (later Bishop), Superintnedent of Methodist Army Missions. He was licensed to preach by Rev. John S. McCarver, in March, 1867.

When he went into the Army he carried a Bible, given him by his mother, Abercrombie's Philosophy, and Bacon's Works. When he was not traveling or fighting he spent his time in reading and studying. During the war, while he was at home wounded, he read Blackstone's Commentaries and Chittie's Pleading, expecting to practice law with Reagan and Ward, but he declined to ask for license to practice when a "Scalawag" government took things over in Texas, and he soon found that the Lord had another work for him.

He joined the Northwest Texas Conference in Springfield, Texas, November 15, 1868. He married Miss Sally Powell, daughter of Thomas D. and Tabitha Powell of Hearne, Texas, April 11, 1872. To them were born three daughters who are now Mrs. H. E. Jackson of San Angelo, Mrs. R. W. Baird, and Mrs. L. G. Tong of Dallas. The grandchildren are: Sara Bishop Baird (Mrs. Speight Jenkins); William Leroy Baird (deceased); Mary Eleanor Baird; Roy William Baird and Horace Bishop Baird.

Dr. Bishop was on the effective list in the ministry for fifty-one years. During this time, he served four years on circuits; twenty years in stations; twenty-four years as presiding elder; one year as Agent for Southwestern University, and three years as Missionary Secretary for Northwest Texas Conference. Elected as delegate to the General Conference five times. With the assistance of Dr. Chapman of Missouri, and Dr. D. C. Kelly of Tennessee, he wrote the first paper ever offered to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, seeking re-union of the two Methodisms in 1886.

For thirty-two years, a trustee of Southwestern University, for nineteen years chairman of the Board of Directors of the Methodist Orphanage at Waco. A member of the Texas Board of Publication for the church twelve years; for a like number of years, a member of the General Board of Missions of the Church. For thirty-two years chairman of the Annual Conference Board of Missions. Vice-President of the Commission on Education which established Southern Methodist University.

In 1890, Polytechnic College, Fort Worth, conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. In more recent years, Southern Methodist University conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Laws.

Dr. Bishop was my close personal friend and a real brother. We walked and worked side by side for fifty-four years, and for the last several years we have roomed together at our Conferences-here it was that we talked and prayed and felt the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. In his going I feel a loneliness that I have never felt but once before.

He died Monday night. March 12, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. E. Jackson, surrounded by his entire family. The funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church of San Angelo, by his pastor, Rev. Grady Timmons. In the midst of those present was his Sunday school class of fifty young teachers and business women who for years had sat under his ministry. His remains were carried to Dallas and placed beside his wife in Restland Memorial Park, where the final rites were conducted by Bishop Sam R. Hay.

## REV. C. V. OSWALT

Rev. C. V. Oswalt, one of the pioneer preachers of the Central Texas Conference, passed to his reward on January 24, 1933. He was born in Water Valley, Mississippi, July 27, 1856. When a small boy he moved with his family to Bell County, Texas. After reaching young manhood he taught school successfully in various points of the state. On November 23,1879 , he was married to Miss Eliza Rogers in Bell County. To this union were born three children; one died in infancy and the other two, Mrs. H. M. Cochran and Mrs. Joe Hubert, are now living. His wife lived only a few years and he was married the second time to Miss Willie Ann Le Grone, on April 16, 1885. To then were born ten children. Three of them died in infancy, the other seven are now all grown to manhood; Cecil, Charles, Albert, Robert, Donivan, Melton, and Harris.

In early life Bro. Oswalt was converted and joined the Methodist Episcoal Church, South. In his youth and young manhood he lived a consistent Christian life. He was prominent and useful in all the activities of the church. When at last convinced that he was called to be a minister, he was licensed to preach and was received on trial in the old Northwest Texas Conference in 1885. For thirty-three years hew as an itinerant preacher, doing his work joyfully and well. In 1917 he was given the superannuate relation. He bought a home near Polytechnic, where he lived until he went to join the triumphant host of the redeemed. His beloved wife had preceeded him to the better world by only about eighteen months.

Among the charges which he served during his itinerant career were: Goldthwaite, Coleman, Comanche, Mt. Calm, Gatesville, Dublin, Mineral Wells, Ferris, Handley, and Missouri Avenue, Fort Worth. In every charge he proved himself to be a man of God and left a multitude of friends.

## REV. C. S. McCARVER

Constantine S. McCarver, son of Hubbard D. and Pervilia E. McCarver was born in Drew County, Arkansas, April 11th, 1851. He passed away from this earth in the home of his daughter, Mrs. L. G. Hagard, Whitewright, Texas, March 19th, 1933, after a brief illness.

Coming to Texas in October 1870, he spent the major portion of his life and all of his active ministry in this State. He came from a Christian home, one with a family altar, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in August 1865, living a most consistent and godly Christian life unto the end. He heard and answered the call to preach, and was licensed at Sunshine Church of the Fairfield Ct., October 10th, 1874, with W. W. Jared P. C., and George W. Graves P. E. He was admitted on trial into the old North West Texas Conference November, 1876, at Calvert, Texas, with Bishop. D. S. Doggett presiding. He remained in this Conference all his active ministry. Anong the charges he served were Bethel, Alvarado, Abilene, Clarendon, Memphis, Claude, Amarillo, Eastland, et al. Suffering a nervous breakdown he asked for the superannuate relation making his home for several years in Fort Worth and Pecos. For the past few years he has been with his children, especiaily his daughter in Quanah, Texas.

He was married to Miss Annie Jackson October 3rd, 1878. To this union were born ten children, only four of whom survive. These are Mrs. A. B. Jones of Quanah, Texas; Mrs. L. G. Hagard of Whitewright,

Texas; Mrs. P. R. Underwood of Amarillo, Texas, and Mrs. V. V. Beck of Plainview, Texas. There are also nine grandchildren, among whom are Mrs. King Sides and Cecil Bickley of Lubbock, Texas, children of his oldest daughter, the late Mrs. C. A. Bickley. One brother, Mr. Z. B. McCarver of Whitesboro, Texas, and a sister, Mrs. Maude Hobbs of E1 Paso, Texas, survive him. His companion preceded him into the Father's home November 10th, 1925, leaving him lonely and brokenhearted, and yet thoroughly resigned to the heavenly Father's will.

His body was taken to Plainview, Texas, where services were held in the home of a daughter, Mrs. V. V. Beck. The services were conducted by two sons-in-law, Rev. C. A. Bickley of Lubbock, and the writer. He was laid to rest by the side of his companion in the cemetery in Plainview.

Probably in no better way could his life be summed up than in the words of St. Paul:-"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day."

## REV. R. C. ARMSTRONG

Ramsey Clark Armstrong, son of Dr. John E. and May Armstrong, was born in Wilcox County, Alabama, October 4, 1842. With his parents he removed to Texas in 1849 and settled in Jasper County. He was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, at Jasper, about 1855. He was licensed to preach at Jasper, February 9, 1861.

He farmed, taught school, and preached as occasion offered. He was married to Miss Matilda Smythe, May 11, 1865, and together they lived and wrought for fifty-six years. As the years came they were blessed with six children, five of whom survive both father and mother.

Brother Armstrong was ordained Deacon at Kascuisko, Mississippi, Nov. 8, 1863, by Bishop Janles O. Andrew. He was at this time chaplain of the 9 th Texas cavalry. Ordained Elder by Bishop H. H. Kavanaugh at San Augustine, Texas, Dec. 6, 1868.

In Dec., 1872, Brother Armstrong was admitted on trial in the East Texas Conference, at Tyler, Texas. He served the following appointments in this conference: Newton Circuit and Jasper Circuit. During the three years on Newton Circuit he reported 330 additions to the church on profession of faith and he baptized 150 children.

In November, 1876, Bro. Armstrong was transferred to the Northwest Texas Conference. The following appointments were held in this Conference: Milford Circuit; Ennis \& Palmer; Dresden Circuit; Mexia Circuit; Waxahachie Station; Waxahachie District; Corsicana Station; First Church, Fort Worth; Waco District; First Church, Weatherford; Mulkey Memorial, Fort Worth.

Let us summarize these twenty-six fruitful years in Bro. Armstrong's own language, given to the Texas Christian Advocate, under date February 2, 1917:
"On the Milford Circuit I had for the two years more than 200 additions on profession of faith. At Ennis and Palner about 200 additions for the one year. On the Dresden Circuit more than 100 additions on profession of faith. At Mexia more than 200 additions for the two
years on profession of faith. At Waxabachie about 100 additions. At Corsicana about 200 additions for the two years. At Fort Worth 186 additions for the year. At Weatherford I think about 500 for the four years. At "Mulkey Memorial between four and five hundred for the four years."

His pastorate at Mulkey Memorial (1899-1902) was his last regular appointment: Of this he wrote the Advocate: "I had reached my sixtieth year. I decided to retire from the regular pastorate. So I built a home and moved into it. Only a few weeks had elapsed when he accepted the Financial Agency of the Polytechnic College, which position he held for six years (1903-1908 inclusive). During these six years he turned over to the treasurer of the Polytechnic College $\$ 10,500$ - 'without a cent of cost to the school'." In 1909 be received the appointment of State Secretary of the Sunday League of America.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Lenora McDonough Armstrong, and five of bis children: Judge Geo. W. Armstrong, Mrs. Mittie McCammon, R. C. Armstrong, Mrs. Emma Shannon, all of Fort Worth, and Mrs. Lolah Flanary, of Dallas.

Brother Armstrong's second marriage was on April 6, 1921, to Mrs. Lenora McDonough, who made for bim a home from which he continued to go forth preaching. It was not until six years later that he consented to take the superannuate relation, at the ripe age of 85 years.

Younger brethren in the ministry he will continue to point to the "old paths," saying, "This is the way; walk ye in it."

## REV. J. F. CLARK

Rev. James Franklin Clark was born at Kingston Springs, Tennessee, some 25 miles west of Nashville, on Dec. 23, 1870, and died in his good superannuate home in Grandview. Texas, June 7th, 1933. He was well preserved physically, and being only a little more than sixty two years of age, might have been reasonably expected to reach a much riper age before his going. His parents were James P. and Amanda Hannah Clark, whose sturdy and pious training contributed much to the moral and religious development of their children. From earliest childhood, Bro. Clark seems to have been naturally good, and he was almost a lifetime member of the Methodist Church.

His immediate family life began with his marriage on Oct. 26. 1907, to Miss Ida Bynum of Oneonto, Alabama. This was a happy union and out of it grew a domestic life which, in all its bearings, was well-nigh ideal. God gave them one son, JJ. Frank Clark, Jr., who remains to comfort and care for his devoted mother. In addition to these, he is survived by two brothers and two sisters: Jno. H. and Robert T. Clark and Mrs. Janie Mays and Mrs. Maggie Owens, all of Nashville, Tennessee.

Bro. Clark was a faithful itinerant Methodist preacher for thirty six years, fifteen in the North Alabama Conference and twenty one in the Central Texas Conference. In this Conference he served the following appointments and in the order named: Stpehenville, Iredell, Oglesby, Winchell, Holland, Bardwell Kennedale, Turnersville. Tolar, DeLeon, Nolanville, Moshiem, Penelope, Aquilla, Moody and Gatesville Circuits.

He made a successful superannuate preacher. He and his family fitted into the local situation at Grandview almost perfectly. "I came to help and not to hinder' was his introductory statement upon coming to live among us and right well did he live up to this beautiful goal. The people all loved him.

Brother Clark was widely read and his mind was stored with a wealth of knowledge far above the average. On the occasion of his last illness he had walked only a short distance from the church where he had taken an active part in the prayer meeting service when he was stricken down in the street. Many people attended his funeral, including some ten or twelve of his ministerial bretheren, four of whom made beautiful addresses. His ashes sleep in the beautiful Grandview cemetery, awaiting the resurrection morning. We shall meet him again in the land of the unsetting sun.

## J. H. BRASWELL

Rev. J. H. Braswell, son of George and Minervia Braswell. was born in Guinette County, Georgia, April 16, 1858. While a member of these Conferences he served the following charges; Meridian, Knox City, McGregor, Venus, Lampasas, Whitney, Crawford, Mart, Clifton, Hico, Italy, and Alvarado.

Near Center, Georgia, on December 26, 1878, he married Miss Mary Lou Culver. In their union they found strength and solace. To them were born four children: Mrs. Lena Blackburne, Mena, Arkansas; Sam M. Braswell, Clarendon, Texas; Mrs. Stella Galahar, Ft. Worth, Texas, and Mrs. Vivian Cole, Amarillo, Texas. These splendid children bear ample testimony to the love and care of their noble father. Brother Braswell was a good preacher.

As a pastor he had few superiors. His life was beautiful and his death triumphant. Into that "sunset land" he has gone where we shall one day go and walk again by his side.

## REV. JOHN WILLIAM COWAN

Rev. John William Cowan was born in Rome, Georgia, April 1, 1862. His parents were devoutly religious and under their fostering care he was led to accept Christ and seek membership in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at the early age of seven years. How his life gave the lie to that false conception that a boy must "sow his wild oats"! Brother Cowan never sowed any wild oats.

His first marriage was to Miss Edith Blanton of Jasper, Alabama, on February 3, 1884. To this happy union were born six children: Mrs. L. S. Evins, Birmingham, Alabama; Gordon, Atlanta, Georgia; Thermon, Luke, who was lost during the world war; John of Mineola, Texas; Pearson, who died at the age of eight years. The mother of these children died September 7, 1897. On April 5, 1898, Brother Cowan was married to Miss Elizabeth Howell in Gordo, Alabama. Four children were born to them, Mrs. J. B. Slaughter, Jr. of Post, Texas, being the only one living, the other three having died in infancy.

Brother Cowan heard the call to preach at the age of 19 . He served in the local ranks and was assigned to several charges as supply. He became a member of the North Alabama Conference in 1893 and was appointed to the Warrentown Circuit. Following is a list of his appointments in North Alabama Conference: Warrentown Circuit, Oakland Circuit, Newbery Circuit, Gordo Circuit, Woodstock \& Johns, Northport, Blockton, and Dora. In 1907 he transferred to the West Texas Conference where he served the following appointments: Cuero, Miles, Lampasas, presiding elder Lampasas District, Midland, and Brady. In the North Texas Conference he served Grand Prairie, 1920-21. He again transferred in 1921 and served the following appointments in the Central Texas Conference: Gorman, DeLeon, Italy, Killeen, Frost, and McGregor.

In the fall of 1930 his health was so completely broken that he took the Superannuate relation and moved into a Superannuate Home in Fort Worth. There he identified himself with the activities of the Trinity Methodist Church. His funeral services were held in the Trinity Methodist Church at 10 A. M., October 3, 1933. The pastor, assisted by Dr. F. P. Culver, Rev. A. W. Hall and Rev. W. B. Andrews conducted the services. In a beautiful mausoleum in East Oakwood Cemetery, Fort Worth, Texas, his body was laid to rest. He is gone but we know where to find him. May God richly bless his noble wife, who so bravely faces the future. May rich blessings rest upon his children and friends everywhere.

## CHARLES STANTON FIELD

Charles Stanton Field was born in Lynchburg, Virginia, November 6, 1860, and passed to his reward, in the month of October, 1933. Mrs. Field, the faithful and brilliant wife of Brother Field; preceding him to to "Land of Delight" by only a few years. Brother Field was married October 28, 1885, to Miss Josephine Goode. At the age of twenty-two Brother Field was licensed to preach the "Unsearchable riches of Christ." In a quarterly conference held in a little town of Lorena, Brother Field, this energetic son of a Virginia parsonage, was made an "Ambassador of God." Rev. J. B. Allison, presiding elder, and Rev. W. J. Barcus, secretary. Brother Field found himself easily at home in the Methodist Itineracy. He was a son of the ministry. His father was one of the brighest lights of the Virginia Conference. Brother Field must have had a great mother. In my association with him I often detected the beautiful after-glow of a refined and consecrated home.

Brother Field was a church builder. He erected the new brick church at Temple, not the present structure, but the first brick that was built. He also erected the splendid edifice at Merkel, Texas. He was a builder of churches and parsonages. He held some of the best appointmints in the old North West Texas Conference. Temple, Hillsboro and Merkel being among the largest pastorate held during his active ministry. For about twenty-five years Brother Field was in the active pastorate, holding pastoral charges during this long period without a break. For about fifteen years he was secretary of the State Sunday School Board, being appointed to this task by his Bishops. He was a man of great courage. For yet a little while we shall not see him. In a little while we shall see him because he had gone to the Father.

## REV. SAMUEL GUY THOMPSON-1866-1933

Rev. Samuel Guy Thompson was born in Center Grove, Bradford County, Tennessee, February 6th, 1866. He was converted at Blankinship's Chapel, at the age of thirteen years. He was licensed to preach in 1887, by Rev. Thomas J. Duncan (who was later so well known and loved in Central Texas). Brother Thompson was admitted into the Tennessee Conference, October, 1891; Bishop A. W. Wilson presiding over the Conference, meeting in West End Church, Nashville. He was ordained deacon in October, 1891, by Bishop Wilson, and ordained elder by the same Bishop in 1895.

The charges he served in the Tennessee Conference were: Lynchburg and Mulberry one year; Tullahoman Station, two years; Farmington and Verona, two years; Lewisburg Station, one year, and Waverly Place, Nashville, one year.

In 1898 he was transferred to the Oklahoma Conference and stationed at First Church, Muskogee, two years; Oklahona City District, four years; Chickasha Station, one year; McAlester District, four years; and Tulsa District, two years.

In the year 1911 he was received by transfer into the Central Texas Conference and stationed at Missouri Avenue, Fort Worth, two years; Dublin Station, two years; Brownwood District, four years; Mexia First Church, three years; Arlington, one year; Cisco District, one year; Georgetown District, three years; First Church, Weatherford one year; Graham First Church, two years; Coleman First Church, two years; and he was coming to the close of his first year in Eastland First Church at the time of his death.

On July 29th, 1903, he was happily married to the cultured and refined Miss Lillian Agnes Perkins.

To them were born two lovely daughters, Miss Lillian and Miss Mary Elizabeth Thompson, gifted and highly educated young ladies.

As a Presiding Elder his preachers trusted him. He both knew and loved the doctrines and dicipline of the Methodist Church. As a member of several General Conferences he was a worthy representative in the great Law-Making Body.

Brother Thompson read extensively the best books. The cheap and shoddy never appealed to him. His preaching was of a high order, his sermons being well thought out and forcefully delivered. He reveled in great themes and delighted to preach the saving Gospel of God's Dear Son. As a presiding officer he was calm, well poised, courteous and considerate. Preachers and laymen alike were ready to follow his leadership.

He was a true husband and a loving father, and his love and devotion were heartily reciprocated. The "Thompson Home". was a charmed and sacred spot.

When his last illness came upon him he was taken to the Scott and White Sanitarium, Temple, Texas, where he received the best of medical skil: and careful nursing. For a number of days he waged a heroic battle against disease, but on the 20th day of October, 1933, while his wife and daughters were by his side, the summons cane and he went home to make his final report to the Great Head of the Church, to the Bishop of his soul.

His funeral was held in the First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, under the direction of his Presiding Elder, Dr. C. Q. Smith, assisted by the Reverends W. R. Beaird, J. B. Curry and R. O. Sory; the address
being spoken by A. D. Porter, the writer of this memoir. His honored remains were laid away in the picturesque Park Hill Cemetery to await the resurrection of the just.

We are richer for his life and saddened by his death. We shall miss his genial presence at our Conferences, be poorer without his counsel and lonesome in the absence of his fellowship, but, please God, we shall see him again in the country that lies just beyond the sunset. Until Heaven's bright morn, dear friend, good-bye!

## A. D. PORTER

REV. JOSEPH WILEY FORT-1872-1933
The subject of this sketch, Reverend Joseph Wiley Fort, was born in Magazine, Logan County, Arkansas, on June 20th, 1872. He came to Texas with his parents when he was a small boy. He was converted at Turnersville, Texas, and joined the Methodist Church, when seventeen years of age. His conversion took place in the home of his elder brother, Rev. George Fort, a local preacher.

He was licensed to preach on April 23rd, 1891, at the age of nineteen years; Rev. A. B. Roberts being his pastor and Rev. George Graves his Presiding Elder at that time.

On November 24th, 1894, in the city of Hillsboro, he was admitted on trial into the old Northwest Texas Conference, Bishop H. K. Hargrove president. He was ordained a deacon by Bishop J. C. Granbury at Weatherford in 1897, and an elder by Bishop Hargrove at Cleburne in 1899.

Brother Fort served the following charges: Brookhaven Mission, 1895; Proctor Mission, 1896; Bluffdale Circuit, 1897; Blanket Circuit, 1898-99; Whitney Station, 1900; Lorena Circuit, 1901-2-3-4; Comanche Station 1905-6; Quanah Station, 1907; Financial Agent Polytechnic College, 1908; Abilene First Church, 1909-10; Mart Station, 1911-12; Corsicana First Church 1913-14-15-16; Central Fort Worth, 1917; Presiding Eider Hillsboro District, 1918; First Church Hillsboro, 1919-20. He transferred to the North Texas Conference and was stationed at Oak Lawn Dallas, 1921-22; Kavanaugh, Greenville, 1923-24. He came back to his home Conference and was stationed at Temple First Church, 1925-26; Polytechnic, 1927-28; Main Street Cleburne, 1929, where in his second year his health failed and he was superannuated for one year. Being placed on the effective list in 1931 he was stationed at Lorena, returned in 1932, and had served almost the full year when on the 21st day of October, 1933, he was called by death.

On March the 23rd, 1893, he was united in matrimony to Miss Mollie Drusilla Simpson. They were blessed with five children, who with his wife survive him. They are as follows: Mrs. Tom Grimland, Rev. Homer T. Fort, pastor of Waples Memorial Church, Denison, North Texas Conference; Mr. Horace B. Fort, principal of one the high schools in E1 Paso; Mrs. James Goodwyn and Mrs. J. M. McKinley. There are eleven grandchildren. This is a family of whom Brother and Sister Fort were worthily proud.

He held a number of large and important appointments, but perhaps his pastorate at Mart reached the high-water mark of his ministry, as it was there he conducted a revival lasting four weeks which resulted in more than four hundred conversions, and which laid the predicate for driving the saloons out of that city.

He was brotherly in his nature and disposition, loving his friends and appreciating being loved by them. He loved life, but was not afraid to
die. Criticism pained him deeply. He looked well after the financial affairs of his churches. He gave his children good educational advantages, much better than he had ever received himself. Soon after breakfast on the morning of October 21st, he was stricken, and in ten minutes time thereafter in his right mind, on his own bed, in the parsonage, with his wife and daughter ministering to him he was gone.

On Sunday afternoon, October 22nd, 1933, his funeral was held in the Methodist Church at Lorena. The church was crowed with members and sorrowing friends. His Presiding Elder, Dr. A. D. Porter, directing the services, requested the twenty or more brother pastors present to stand and repeat together the Pastoral Psalm; Dr. J. W. Bergin read a portion of the 14th chapter of the Gospel of John; Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh led in prayer, and Dr. C. C. Selecman, President of Southern Methodist University, preached an appropriate funeral sermon.

At 9:00 o'clock on Monday morning, October 23rd, his body was laid to rest in the beautiful and well kept cemetery of Lorena. It was fitting that his resting place be in this town where he had served in his early manhood and where he spent the 38 th and 39 th years of his life as a Methodist Preacher.

Brother Fort was a good man. He served long and well and his reward is abundant in the land where the spirits of just men are made perfect.

## REV. C. E. STATHAM

Charles Edgar Statham was born in Alabama, February 15th, 1852, and came to Texas in early life. While a mere lad he was converted and said he was called to preach, but did not answer until he was past thirty years of age. During these years he was an active laymen in his church. He became one of our very best old-time circuit preachers and knew all his people even to each child. He prayed in the homes and had many conversions. Evangelistic in his preaching, looking for results and having it. This man built a number of churches and parsonages, giving a. great deal of his time to the western part of our early church. This good man was a superannuate for twelve years and was indeed a picture of a lovely sunsetting life. God called him on June 5th, 1933. His funeral services were conducted from the Arlington church with his pastor in charge, assisted by a number of others.

He was married to Miss Hallie Hughes in 1874, but the heavy duties of frontier life pressed upon her and she died at Santa Anna, 1895.

To this union six children were born and survive him.
Again in 1899 Brother Statham married and two sons were born who live today with his wife whose mainden name was Miss Jennie Haley. His last days were in visiting from house to house, cheering the sick and doing good. Truly we can say, he was a good man.

P. E. Riley read the Report of the Board of Missions which was received for record as follows:

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Mid-Year meeting of this Board, while of a very quiet nature, was one of the most interesting and helpful gatherings we have had. For some time we sat together and studied our problems, and sought methods for advancing the sacred interests committed to our care.

During our sessions at this Conference we have heard with much pleasure and profit, Dr. J. F. Rawls, Treasurer of the General Board of Missions, and we have a deep sense of appreciation of his helpful and stimulating address to this Conference.

Our Pastors are asked sometime during the year, at such a date as may be designated, to present to their congregations the work our Church is doing among the Negroes, and to take a collection for Payne College, the funds so secured to go into the endowment fund of that institution.

In accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 474 of the Discipline, we nominate Judge W. Erskine Williams and Dr. J. E. Crawford for membership on the General Board of Missions, which Board is to be elected by the General Conference at its meeting in 1934.

We commend most heartily the work of our Conference Missionary Secretary, Rev. S. A. Ashburn, and request his appointment to that work for the ensuing year.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. John M. Neal as General Evangelist, and Rev. J. D. Smoot as Conference Evangelist.

In connection with our work of cultivation of the rural church, and in order that this important work may be more efficiently carried on, we recommend an increase of our efforts toward an adequate support of the rural ministry, with whom the rural church succeeds or fails. To further this and other desired ends, we advise and plan for Conferences on rural church planning which will reach all rural pastors and laymen. Further, we recommend the following places and dates for one day conferences for the winter of 1934.

At May, Brownwood District, Tuesday, February 28th, for Brownwood and Cisco Districts.
At Granbury, Cleburne District, Wednesday, March 1, for Cleburne, Fort Worth and Weatherford Districts.

At Hubbard, Corsicana District, Tuesday, March 7, for Corsicana, Waxahachie and Waco Districts.

At Troy, Georgetown District, Wednesday, March 8, for Georgetown and Gatesville Districts.

We wish here to express our appreciation for the very. fine work which the Rev. Jno. A. Siceloff, Chairman, and his Committee on Rural Church, of this Board, have been doing in connection with the important problems connected with the task of solving the problem of the Rural Church.

Hal H. Cherry read the report of the Board of Lay Activities and it was adopted, as follows:

## REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Conference Board of Lay Activitics recommends the following:

1. Stewardship: (A) That the unit on Stewardship be included in at least one standard training school in each district. (B) That a minimum of six classes of young people, or adults, in each district be enlisted to study stewardship for one quarter in the Sunday School. (C) That each minister and each Lay Leader, Conference, district, charge, and church, be encouraged to take the stewardship course in a training school or class, or by correspondence. (D) That every Lay speaker study any approved texts on Stewardship in order that he may have the proper view point when he speaks on this subject.
2. The Benevolences: (A) The use of the intensive Every-Member Canvass in every charge in our Church. (B) Each charge is urgently requested to make monthly payments on Benevolences to the Conference Treasurer to the end that fifty per cent be paid by date of the District Conference. (C) That in stations all claims be paid on a weekly basis through the envelope system and in circuits on a monthly basis.
3. That the Second Sunday in June or as near to as possible be designated as Laymen's Day. The theme for 1934 is "Layman and Evangelism."
4. That institutes for Stewards be held in every district; since in a vast majority of our churches we have Stewards who, for the most part, are distressingly ignorant of the program of the church, the scope of the work, and the causes fostered and supported by the Church. The reports of the results accomplished so far indicate that continued and expanded emphasis upon this phase of the work will yield returns surprisingly valuable. We pledge ourselves to the carrying out of the plan for institutes in every district during the coming year.
5. Spiritual Life: We urge that the laity of our Church avail themselves of the privilege of witnessing for Christ and becoming soul winners. Too many in the churches have depended entirely on the pastor to do all the evangelistic work and to be the sole agent in increasing the membership of the church and enlisting for service in God's Kingdom. It was not so in the early Church, and should not be today.

It will be a new day for the Church and Christ's kingdom in the world when every Christian man realizes this responsibility and in the power of the Spirit goes forth to meet it.
6. We nominate J. R. Edwadrs for conference Lay Leader.
W. W. Ward read report No. 2 of the Board of Christian Education, and it was adopted as follows:

## REPORT NO 2 OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We had before us the representatives of the following educational institutions as named: Dr. C. C. Selecman and Dr. Eugene B. Hawk of S. M. U., Dr. King Vivion of Southwestern U., Rev. T. W. Brabham of T. W. C., Mr. R. G. Boger of Weatherford College, and Rev. R. L. Jackson and Rev. C. W. Hall of the Wesley Foundation, and Mr. B. M. McKeown representing the General Board of Christian Education.

While the report of the Joint Commission on Educational Work of Methodist Schools in Texas is being presented directly to the Conference, yet this Board wishes to express its appreciation for the splendid work done by our representatives on that Commission.

The decreased income of the Board necessitates a drastic cut in the salaries of both our secretaries.

This coming year is the last in which we are asking our churches to contribute the first Fifth Sunday Offering to the District Work.

Though we took a loss of $\$ 140.00$ in the Christian Education Day Offering this past year, yet we are again combining the three former anniversary days into one known as Christian Education Day, the 3rd Sunday in April. We ask that the offerings be sent to Rev. G. A. Schlueter, 2616 University Drive, Fort Worth.

We urge every Presiding Elder and pastor to secure the observance of Missionary Sunday (the 4th Sunday) by every church in the Conference and send the money to Rev. G. A. Schlueter.

This year we are placing the Extension Secretary's Budget in the general budget, and thereby our Board will have two sources of income, viz., the regular channels of the Benevolences and our share of $40 \%$ of the monthly missionary offering. This is the same as heretofore, but assists your board in its bookkeeping by making our report as one. There is no increase whatsoever upon the Conference.

We call attention to the fact that the first five items in our appropriations above is not subject to scale. This has to do with maintaining our own Conference program.

J. J. Creed read the report of the Board of Church Extension and it was adopted as follows:

## REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

## November 11, 1933.

Your Board of Church Extension has had several applications to consider, but most of them were to be passed on to the General Board, only two small grants being made to the churches at Malone and Smithfield, bu our Board.

We will receive from the Conference Treasurer only about $\$ 350.00$ and consequently could render very little aid to anyone where a donation was asked. Somewhat more than $\$ 7,000,00$ has accumulated in the Loan Fund, and we therefore recommend that in the future loans be applied for rather than donations:
T. E. Bowman read the report of the Cominittee on Memorials to the General Conference and it was adopted as follows:

## MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

## No. 1

Whereas there has grown up in our Church a multiplicity of Boards with much duplication of effort, overlaping and needless expense:

Therefore be it resolved that the Central Texas Conference memorialize the approaching General Conference as follows:

First, That the General Boards be reduced to not more than four in number and that the functions of the recent General Boards be distributed in such a way as to conserve all the interests of the Church.

Second, That all Special days calling for special collections be eliminated and that all our efforts be concentrated on the Benevolences or Conference Collections, and that the term "Apportionment" be eliminated from our Methodist terminology.

Third, That the General Conference and the General Boards outline a suitable program for the Church and that the Bishops and Presiding Elders be charged with the responsibility of carrying out this program thus eliminating as far a spossible all traveling Secretaries.

## No. 2

The Central Texas Conference respectfully petitions and requests the General Conference to instruct the Board of Finance, Saint Louis, Missouri, to put into force and effect a participating plan of provision for the use and benefit of the traveling Methodist Preachers to the end that they may more adequately provide for their old age and for their dependents. The Authority for doing this is found in the Discipline of 1930, paragraph 358, which reads as follows:
"The Board shall have authority to establish co-operative, participating, annuity or other plans, for the use of traveling prachers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, looking to better provision for their old age and for their families: Provided, it shall not place in jeopardy the permanent or endowment funds of the Board."

No. 3
In view of the responsibility resting upon laymen in the temporal affairs of the Church, we memorialize the General Conference to encourage and emphasize the movement inaugurated by the General Board of Lay Activities to train the boards of Stewards of our churches for their task, and to charge this Board the coming quadrennium with giving primary attention to the promotion of the Benevolences, and adequate support for the Ministry, and a sound financial system in every local church.

No. 4
Whereas the problem of providing an adequate support for the ministry is church-wide, and whereas inadequate support tends toward ministerial inefficiency and ministerial inefficiency in turn tends toward inefficiency in the work of the Church;

Therefore, be it resolved that we memorialize the next General Conference to give this problem careful consideration and inaugurate plans looking toward its ultimate solution and immediate relief for our underpaid men.

Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh offered an amendment to the Standing Rules. Dr. J. W. Bergin spoke in favor of it. On motion of A. D. Porter the amendment was laid on the table.
F. E. Singleton read a resolution creating Standing Rule No. 13, and it was adopted. (See Standing Rules)
F. E. Singleton read the report of the Commission on Benevolences and it, was adopted as follows:

## REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON BENEVOLENCES

Your Conference Commission on Benevolences has labored faithfully in trying to carry out its objectives.

Kingdom Extension Institutes have been held in each district, which were well attended and, we believe, very profitable. A representative from the General Commission and one from the Conference Commission were in attendance. The Presiding Elders promoted and carried out this work. Mr. G. L. Morelock, Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, represented the General Commission, and Dr. C. R. Gray, Rev. Frank E. Singleton and Rev. J. W. W. Shuler represented the Conference Commission.

Representatives of the Conference Commission attended the District Conferences, doing what they could to promote our work. Letters were sent out, literature distributed, books sold, executive meetings held, and much other work was done.

There has been reported to us somc $\$ 3,500.00$ raised for Kingdom Extension special, and a substantial increase in the benevolent offerings for which we are devoutly thankful.

Plans are being made for Bishop Arthur J. Moore to represent the General Commission in our Conference at Fort Worth, February 1, 1934.

In order that the commission may carry on its work for the ensuing year, we recommend that the conference direct its treasurer to pay to our secretary-treasurer the sum of $\$ 100.00$ before distributing its funds to the several boards.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH

We, your committee on the spiritual state of the Church, beg to make the following report:

After a careful study of conditions, as reflected by the reports of the pastors, we are led to the conclusion that the spiritual state of the Church is better than for some years.

We believe that supervised forms of recreation, organizing of spiritual life groups, vacation Bible schools, our young people's assemblies, and the summer schools for our pastors have all contributed to the upward trend of the spiritual state of the Church. Therefore we would give our hearty support to each of these.

Our only way to maintain a forward movement is from our knees. It is prayer that will enable us to discover our needs and lead us to the Source of supply. Therefore we would call upon all our people to wait before God in prayer.

The Church needs to unite as a great prayer league. The first call is to the ministry. A praying ministry will awaken and lead a praying people. A praying ministry and a praying people, we believe, will bring a revival of the message of the cross. The cross is the center of our gospel. A bloodless gospel means a lifeless Church.

## SUPERANNUATE HOMES

The annual report of the Agent of Superannuate Homes was before the Board and we find that the interests of the superannuates and the homes are being taken care of.

We commend Dr. W. B. Andrews for the fine work he has done.

## APPENDIX

## CONFERENCE RULES

1. The District Steward, the Charge Lay Leader and the Recording Steward of each charge, the District Lay Leader, the District Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the District Trustees are exofficio members of the District Conference. Besides these, each church is entitled to one delegate for every one hundred members, or two-thirds fraction thereof, to be elected by the Church Conference, provided thaevery church shall have at least one delegate.
2. The Presiding Elders are a standing committee to nominate all the boards and regular standing committees at each session of the Conference except quadrennial boards.
3. The Presiding Elders are required by Confercnce resolutions to send to the Statistical Secretary of the Conference, immediately after the meeting of therr respective boards of District Stewards, a copy of the apportionments made on each charge, and these apportionments are to be recorded by the Statistical Secretary as the official apportionments against the several charges of the Conference.
4. The Conference shall elect a Statistical Secretary and an assistant Statistical Secretary who shall serve until the close of the Confer-- ènce following. The Conference shall also elect two assistant Statistical Secretaries for each of the several districts. The two District Assistant Statistical Secretaries for each district shall be nominated as follows: The Statistical Secretary shall nominate one man and upon his election he shall nominate the second man. It shall be the duty of the District Assistant Statistical Secretaries to collect the statistical rejorts from the preachers in charge within the several districts and see that such reports are properly edited, properly entered upon the sheets provided for that purpose and to turn the finished sheets over to the Statistical Secretary in the evening of the second day of the Conference session.
5. The Chairman of Committee on Admissions shall make written report to be filed with the Secretary of the Conference, concerning each one admitted to the Conference. This report shall embrace: Full name, name of parents; date and place of birth. conversion and license to preach; date of marriage; name of wife, and such other facts of his life as may be deemed important.
6. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the presiding e!dership shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.
7. The Conference Commission on Budget shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special apportionments to be levied upon the churches, unless such new or special apportionments shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the M. E. Church. South, or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so intrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust had been executed and how.
8. The Conference Commission on Budget in its report shall give the contrasts between the several apportionments for the present year and the proposed apportionments for the ensuing year so that the Conference can act on the report with clear knowledge. It shall be the duty
of the Commission to furnish the "Table of Apportionments" for the ensuing year arriving at the scale for the districts by finding what per cent the total church membership in the individual district is of the grand total church membership in the Conference, and by finding what per cent the total salaries in the district are of the grand total of salaries paid in the Conference, and then dividing the sum of these two decimals by 2 .
9. All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports, except the statistical reports, coming before the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk, the original copy to be retained by the Secretary in the archives, one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Texas Christian Advocate, and one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Central Texas Conference Journal.
10. Each preacher in charge shall, on the first morning of the Conference session, hand his complete statistical report to one of the Assistant Statistical Secretaries for the district in which his charge is situated.
11. All requests by boards, commissions, or individuals for dates for special campaigns to securc money shall be submitted to the Commission on Budget, whose duty it shall be to work out a schedule for said campaigns so that as far as possible, overlapping nay be prevented. The Commission shall submit its report to the Conference for approval.
12. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference Work an amount sufficient to meet. the expense of printing the Minutes and also provide for the Treasurer's Bond. These estimates are to be furnished by the Editor of the Journal, through the Commission on Budget.
13. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive conference roll calls shall thereby forfeit membership on said board. The vacancy may be filled by nomination of the board and election by the conference.
