Opening—The Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in the seventy-third session (29th since division), at 2 P. M., November 9, 1938, in the Austin Avenue Church, Waco, Texas, with Bishop Ivan Lee Holt, D. D., LL. D., presiding.

Programs—A printed program, "The Book of Worship," compiled by Bishop Holt, was distributed for general use during the entire sessions of the Conference.

Communion—The Communion was administered by Bishop Holt using the entire Methodist ritual, assisted by the nine presiding elders, Dr. E. J. Kulp of Kansas City, and the robed choir of Southwestern University.

Roll Call—Bishop Holt stated that upon the death of Dr. A. D. Porter, Bishop Boaz had appointed Dr. P. E. Riley to serve as Secretary ad interim. Dr. Riley was asked to call the roll. (See roll.) Prior to calling of the roll, Dr. Riley paid tribute to the services of Dr. Porter, Secretary to the Annual Conference for 24 years. The Conference stood and was led in prayer by W. W. Ward.

Organization—P. E. Riley nominated W. W. Ward for Secretary, and he was elected by unanimous vote. The former secretarial assistants were requested to serve until a permanent staff could be formulated.

J. T. Gardner was elected Statistical Secretary, and on his nominations the following were elected: Assistant, Fred G. Benkley; **District Auditors:** Brownwood District, Hubert Crain, John Meritt; Cisco District, B. L. McCord, L. S. Williams; Cleburne District, U. A. Schulze, W. J. Shelton; Corsicana District, W. V. Bane, Horace Poteet; Fort Worth District, Ross G. Smith, T. S. Ogle; Georgetown District, Eugene D. Bennett, M. Howard Knox; Waco District, D. L. Barnes, J. W. Morphis, Jr.; Waxahachie District, Thad E. Son, J. R. Carruth; Weatherford District, T. D. Ellis, D. E. McVey. **Report Collectors:** Brownwood District, M. L. Nelson; Cisco District, J. M. Bailey; Cleburne District, C. C. Sessions; Corsicana District, M. Dick Lowry; Fort Worth District, J. Fred Patterson; Georgetown District, Vernon Perry; Waco District, A. G. Standing Committees and Boards—W. W. Ward, Secretary of Cabinet, read the list of nominations for Quadrennial Boards, Standing and Examining Committees. They were elected. (See list.)

Order of the Day—R. C. Edwards offered a motion that following the acceptance of the Class in full connection, a ballot for delegates to the Uniting Conference be taken, the ballots to be sealed and placed in the hands of Bishop Holt to be delivered to the Tellers Thursday morning. Motion carried.

Bishop Holt requested the Committee on Admissions and the Class of the Second Year to withdraw, and bring in their report as soon as possible.

Procedure—The Bar of the Conference was designated to be the lower floor as far back as the front part of the Balcony.

The hour of morning sessions was adopted from 9 A. M. to 12:30 noon.

Welcome—Dr. Anthony, pastor-host, presented Mr. George C. Jones, Mayor of Waco, who brought words of welcome. Bishop Holt responded appropriately.

Greetings—J. W. Bergin moved that the Secretary be instructed to send a telegram to the Texas State Baptist Convention conveying greetings from the Central Texas Conference. Motion carried.

R. J. LaPrade moved that the Secretary be instructed to send a message to Dr. Humphrey Lee, newly elected President of S. M. U., pledging to him our love and cooperation. Motion carried.

Order of the Day—Dr. F. P. Culver moved that the order of the day for Friday, 10 A. M., be set to hear the report No. 1 from the Board of Missions. Carried.

Personal Privilege—C. O. Shugart called attention that he had been elected on the Budget Commission, and also as a Trustee of the Superannuate Homes. W. B. Andrews stated that inasmuch as the Board of Trustees of Superannuate Homes does receive an appropriation from the Budget Commission, that it was not advisable to have the same person on both boards. Bishop Holt sustained Dr. Andrews.

By motion by W. W. Ward the matter of Trustees of Superannuate Homes was referred back to the Cabinet for restudy.

Boards—P. E. Riley raised the question as to which boards functioned at this Conference. Dr. Culver stated that the custom had been for the old boards to function until adjournment of Annual Conference. J. I. Patterson stated that the new Board of Christian Education had assumed charge immediately at the beginning of the past two quadrenniums. E. B. Hawk stated that the new boards began to function at once. O. F. Sensabaugh asked when the Conference year closed. The Bishop replied, "Upon the reading of the appointments," and ruled that the old boards function through this session.

Entertainment—Chet C. Henson made announcements regarding entertainment.

Evening Session—E. H. Lightfoot announced that the Committee on Admissions could not report for another two hours. J. W. Bergin moved that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 7.30, at which time the ballot for delegates to the United Conference shall be taken. Carried.

Statistical Secretaries to Vote—J. D. F. Williams moved that when the ballots are spread for the voting of delegates to the Uniting Conference that the Statistical Secretaries be given the right to vote in their room. Motion carried.

Editor—G. Alfred Brown was elected Editor of the Conference Journal for the next quadrennium.

Question 14—Bishop Holt called question 14: What Preachers have died during the year? Answer: W. N. Curry, M. C. Hays, J. S. Huckabee, J. W. Patison, A. T. Plunkett, A. D. Porter, F. O. Waddill, Casper S. Wright, Marsh Boiles. The Conference stood while O. F. Sensabaugh led in prayer in memory of these fallen comrades.

Question 5—Who are Discontinued? Answer: No one.

Question 12—Who have withdrawn or been expelled? Answer: No one.

Motion to Adjourn—Motion prevailed to adjourn after announcements had been made.

Announcements—Dr. Anthony announced that Dr. E. K. Kulp, pastor of Grand Avenue Temple, Kansas City, Mo., would be the Conference preacher, and that the first message would be delivered tonight at 8 o'clock, Bishop Holt presiding.

The Texas Wesleyan College Choral Club was announced to sing at 7:15 P. M.

Introductions—The following were introduced to the Conference: Rev. Don Harwell of M. E. Church, Denison; Rev. J. J. Morgan, American Bible Society; Rev. G. A. Schlueter, New Mexico Conference; Rev. J. W. Shepherd of Northwest Texas Conference; Rev. Sam Yancey of Mt. Sequoyah; Dr. A. J. Weeks, Southwestern Advocate; Mr. J. K. Berry and Mother Culberson of the San Antonio Mission Home; Harry S. Denman, of the Board of Missions, Nashville.

Benediction—J. B. Curry pronounced the benediction.

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY EVENING

After the concert by the Choral Club of Texas Wesleyan College, Bishop Holt called the Conference to order.

Full Connection—The Chairmen of the Committee of the Second Year and of Admissions were called forward; the Bishop called the roll of the Class of the Second Year. The names of Urban A. Schulze, John R. Meritt, Cleo Carl Sessions, Milton Slayden, John Washington Morphis, Jr., Eugene Deles Bennet, Jr., Raymond Matthew Burton were read. Their characters were passed, the committees recommended them, and they made their reports. The name of George D. Atkins was called, his character passed, and he was continued in the Class of the Second Year.

Those recommended by the committees were called to the bar of the Conference and the disciplinary questions were asked by the Bishop. After satisfactory answers to these questions, Dr. E. B. Hawk led in prayer. By vote of the Conference they were admitted into full connection, answering Question 6, "Who are admitted into full connection?" as follows: Urban A. Schulze, John R. Meritt, Cleo Carl Sessions, Milton Slayden, John W. Morphis, Jr., Eugene D. Bennett, Jr., Raymond M. Burton.

Committee on Minutes—R. A. Crosby made a motion that the Chair appoint a committee of three to examine the minutes and report at the opening of each session. The motion carried, and the Bishop appointed the committee as follows: R. A. Langston, R. J. LaPrade, and M. M. Chunn.

Tellers—The Secretary nominated the Secretaries and Tellers for the election of delegates to the Uniting Conference as follows:

Substitutions—Substitutions and announcements of late arrivals for lay delegates were made. (See Roll.)

Ballots Spread—The clerical delegates were asked to be seated in the east and center sections of the auditorium and the lay delegates the west section. The ballots were spread and then placed into the keeping of the Bishop.

The Conference stood and sang, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," and Rev. Gid J. Bryan led in prayer. The Conference then went into the worship service, at which time Dr. E. J. Kulp was to preach.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY MORNING

Opening—Bishop Holt opened the Thursday morning session of the Conference with the singing of "God of Grace and God of Glory, On Thy People Pour Thy Power."

Devotional—Professor R. W. Goodloe, of the School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, led the devotional, based upon Psalm 121. His theme was "Man's dependence upon God, and God's sufficiency for man." He closed the devotional with prayer.

J. N. R. Score was appointed to lead the Armistice Day devotional.

Lay Tellers—M. L. Williams and M. A. Elliott were appointed to supplement the staff of lay tellers.

Secretaries—The Secretary announced his staff of assistants as follows: J. D. F. Williams, for the Journal; E. R. Gordan and Oran Stephens, Condensed Minutes; Floyd Johnson, Reports and Resolutions; and Paul Utley, Blackboard Secretary.

Publishing House—Mr. John Huckabee, the representative of the Methodist Publishing House, spoke concerning the book display in the basement of the Church and presented the Conference with a check for \$4,248.40 for the support of our Superannuates.

Communications—Communications from the General Boards were distributed by Bishop Holt to the proper Boards and Committees.

Superannuate Endowment—W. B. Andrews made a statement and a call concerning the Superannuate Endowment and payments on the same.

Question 4—Who else is in the Class of the Second Year? Answer: Geo. D. Adkins.

• **Admitted on Trial**—Question 1 was called: "Who are admitted on trial?" It was answered as follows: Pat Brown from the Brownwood District, J. W. Sprinkle from the Cleburne District, Clyde Warren Pittman and Jack Hester from the Waco District, and Archie N. Boyd from the Weatherford District.

Who Remain on Trial—Question 3: "Who remain on Trial?" was called. It was answered as follows: Marion Luther Nelson, John Morris Bailey, Luther Hill, Garland Tolan Lavendar, Auburn Spencer Neeley.

The name of John Beal Duncan was called, his character passed and he remained in the Class of the First Year.

Deacons of One Year—Question 15: "Who are the Deacons of one year?" The names of Ross Gillean Smith, Benjamin Franklin Jackson, Jr., Donald Monroe Risinger, Burton Henry Coleman, Bruno Carl Schmidt, and Levi Stanley Williams were called and their characters passed, and they were advanced to the class of the fourth year.

The name of Vernon Perry was called, his character passed and he remained in the Class of the Third Year, answering Question 7: "Who remain in the class of the third year?"

Elders Orders—The names of the Class of the Fourth Year were called, their reports were made, their characters passed, and they were elected to Elders' Orders, as follows: Wilfred Viriliss Bane, Fred George Benkley, Hugh Brown Loyd, Alton Woodson Ferrell, Madison Dick Lowry, Quay Parmer, James Robert Carruth, Wallace Jack Shelton, and James Culpepper.

Educational Institutions—Dr. E. B. Hawk, Acting President of Southern Methodist University, and Dean of the School of Theology, spoke concern-

ing the work of this institution. Dr. J. W. Bergin, President of Southwestern University, spoke concerning the place of this institution in the educational field.

Ballot—The results of the first clerical ballot was read: 212 ballots, 208 valid, 105 necessary to elect. E. B. Hawk, P. E. Riley, W. W. Ward, R. W. Goodloe, J. N. R. Score and F. P. Culver having received a majority of the votes cast, were declared to be elected.

The results of the first lay ballot were announced: 76 ballots, 75 valid, 38 necessary to elect. Hal Cherry and Mrs. Gid J. Bryan having received a majority of the ballots cast, were declared elected.

Substitutions for Lay Delegates—The roll of absent lay delegates was called and substitutions announced. See roll.

Ballots—The second clerical and lay ballots were spread; one clerical delegate and five lay delegates to be elected.

Educational Institutions—Mr. G. C. Boswell, President of Weatherford College, Weatherford, Texas, was presented and addressed the Conference. Mr. Law Sone, President of Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, Texas, was presented and told of the retirement of the entire indebtedness of T. W. C. by the gift of \$120,000.00 from the Southern Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

American Bible Society—Rev. J. J. Morgan, the field secretary of the American Bible Society in the Southwest region, spoke concerning the depository at Dallas, and the program for Bible Sunday.

Bishop Boaz—The presence of Bishop H. A. Boaz was noted and he was called to the platform to sit with Bishop Holt.

Visitors—The following visitors were introduced: H. L. Munger from the Texas Conference, J. B. Cox from the Texas Mexican Conference, T. H. Browning from the North Texas Conference, C. B. Diltz from the West Texas Conference, J. H. Shark from the Northwest Texas Conference, L. J. Rode, William Makowsky, Brother Frochner, O. F. Kaltner, H. M. Hopkins, Brother Wrigley, O. F. Reeke and Lee Geedmeir from the Southern Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and W. L. Hunter.

Ballot—The results of the second clerical ballot was announced. 192 votes cast and valid, 97 necessary to elect. There was no election. The ballots were spread for the third clerical ballot.

Mount Sequoyah—Rev. Sam Yancey, Superintendent of the Western Methodist Assembly at Mount Sequoyah, Arkansas, represented the work and progress of our general assembly.

Southwestern Advocate—Dr. A. J. Weeks, editor of the Southwestern Advocate, addressed the Conference in his usual pleasing way.

Ballot—The results of the third clerical ballot was announced: 135 votes cast and valid, 68 necessary to elect. There was no election, the ballots were spread for the 4th clerical ballot.

The results of the second lay ballot were announced: 85 votes cast and valid, 43 necessary to elect. Law Sone, Nat Harris, J. R. Edwards, and G. C. Boswell, having received a majority of the ballots cast, were declared elected. The ballots were spread for one lay delegate.

San Antonio Home—Rev. J. K. Barry, Superintendent of the San Antonio Home, addressed the Conference and presented Mother Culbertson.

Ballot—The results of the fourth clerical ballot were announced. 174

votes cast and valid, 88 necessary to elect. M. M. Chunn, having received a majority of votes, was declared elected.

The results of the third lay ballot were announced: 84 ballots cast, 82 valid, 43 necessary to elect. No election.

Order of the Day—Upon motion of Hubert C. Smith it was ordered that a ballot for four clerical alternates be taken after the devotional service Friday morning. Upon motion of G. T. Leonard it was ordered that at the same time a ballot be taken for the remaining one lay delegate.

Minutes—The Committee on Minutes reported that they had read and approved the minutes of the preceding sessions.

Entertainment Checks—It was announced by Oran Stephens that Conference Entertainment checks would be given to the pastors of charges paying less than \$1200.00 last year.

Announcements—Announcements of various meetings of boards and committees were made.

Board of Christian Education—A request was made the old and the new Boards of Christian Education meet together during this session of Annual Conference.

Service of Worship—After the service of worship conducted by Bishop Holt, the conference adjourned.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY MORNING

Opening—Bishop Holt called the Conference to order at 9:00 o'clock Friday.

Devotional—Dr. J. N. R. Score led the devotional. The selection entitled "Peace" from the Methodist Hymnal was read responsively. Bishop Holt led in prayer for peace. Dr. Score spoke using a scripture selection from I. Peter. The devotional closed with the singing of "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name."

Ballot—In keeping with the order of yesterday, ballots were spread for clerical alternates and one lay principal delegate.

Tellers—W. N. Dunson was appointed a clerical teller in the place of D. A. Chisholm.

Minutes—R. J. LaPrade reported that the Committee had read and approved the minutes for yesterday's session.

Substitutions—Substitution and seating of principal lay delegates were announced. (See roll.)

Expenses of Uniting Conference—Bishop Holt read portions of a letter from Whitmore and Smith, treasurers of the fund for the Uniting Conference. Upon motion of J. W. W. Shuler it was ordered that the amount of \$2,552.65, the amount apportioned to our Conference, be referred to the Budget Commission for apportionment to the Districts, and each Presiding Elder would determine how the fund would be raised in each district.

Question 22—Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration? The name of S. W. Williams was called, his character passed and he gave the report for the Brownwood District. The names of the preachers in this district were called and their characters passed. The name of J. B. Curry was called and his character passed, and he gave the report for the Cisco District. The names of the preachers in this district were called and their characters passed.

Personal Privilege—Asking personal privilege, Dr. Anthony presented Mrs. Ivan Lee Holt. The Conference rose in welcome.

Ballot—The results of the fourth lay ballot were announced. 72 votes cast and valid, 37 necessary to elect. No election. The ballots were spread for another vote.

Substitutions—Further substitutions were made in the roll of lay delegates. (See roll.)

Reports No. 1 Board of Missions—The order of the day having arrived, Bishop Holt requested Dr. F. P. Culver, the President of the Board of Missions, to preside during the reading of the report. J. L. Oliver, secretary of the Board of Missions, read the report. Motion was made to adopt. Bishop Boaz addressed the conference concerning the work of the Hospital. Motion carried.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 1

Your Board of Missions herewith submits its report Number One concerning your Hospital in Fort Worth.

At the last session of the Conference Dr. Casper S. Wright was appointed Hospital Commissioner. He moved to Fort Worth at once and with joy and enthusiasm entered upon his work. During the latter part of December he became ill and was confined to his bed until the fourth day of July last when he took his departure for the better world. The Board of Missions acknowledges its loss in the home-going of this distinguished servant of the Church. Suitable memorial will no doubt be considered at a later session of the Conference. At the next meeting of the Board of Trustees, Bishop H. A. Boaz, recently retired from the active list of bishops, was elected to serve as Commissioner and Ambassador of Good Will. This he has done with his usual faithfulness and efficiency and has been re-elected to this position for the ensuing year.

During the year two of our most useful members of the Board of Trustees have gone to their final rewards: Dr. A. D. Porter and Judge W. Erskine Williams. We record our deep sorrow in the loss of these valuable friends of the Hospital.

We are pleased to report the Hospital in a very hopeful condition. Since the last session of the Conference, two new operating rooms have been completed on the eighth floor with the best possible equipment. Two new floors have been completed also, the fourth and the seventh, providing a psychopathic ward with forty-five beds and an obstetrical ward with thirty-five beds. This gives the Hospital room for two hundred and twenty-five beds with as good equipment and service as can be found anywhere.

The necessary improvements have been made at a cost of \$146,000, which was advanced by Dr. Chas. H. Harris. In adjusting this obligation Dr. Harris has accepted a note for \$100,000 at 3% on the annuity basis. He has voluntarily signed a written contract with the Trustees to cancel this note at the expiration of twenty years, provided the interest is paid promptly. The Conference is asked to make an assessment that will make adequate provision for this interest. The remaining amount of \$46,000, less \$2,000 which has recently been paid, we owe and must pay as soon as possible. We earnestly urge that generous and public spirited citizens throughout the Conference assist in liquidating this debt. We ask also that the month of May be set apart as Hospital Month throughout the Conference and that every congregation in accordance with the law of the Church be urged to take an offering for Golden Cross, the goal to be not less than ten cents per member from all our churches. This fund to be used, after our sick who are not able to pay expenses have been provided for, to help in the liquidation of this just debt. For several months from one to three patients have been in the Hospital a good part of the time chargeable to the Golden Cross Fund. We rejoice in being able to render this sorely needed help to

our deserving poor. We express our sincere appreciation of the co-operation given by the Northwest Texas Conference in Golden Cross Movement and ask their continued assistance in this Christ-like service.

The Hospital has what is known as the Methodist Hospitalization Insurance Plan. It now has in effect about 2,500 live contracts insuring hospitalization. We commend the Methodist Hospitalization Plan to those who are interested in carrying hospital insurance.

The patronage of the Hospital during the last six months has about doubled that of the corresponding time last year. From Nov. 1, 1937 to Nov. 1, 1938 there have been treated in the Hospital 4,905 patients, making a grand total of 23,935 patients since the opening of the Hospital March 3, 1930. During the present year 802 babies have been born in the Hospital, making a total of 3,316 since its opening.

During the present year Dr. Harris has deeded to the Church the property at 1028 Fifth Avenue, formerly known as the Harris Clinic and Sanatorium, to be used as a Home for the Fannie M. Harris Nurses' Training School.

The property has been renovated and repaired so that it furnishes a lovely home for the 150 nurses who are there in training for a life of useful service. The Nurses' Training School is correlated with Texas Wesleyan College, its credits being accepted there. We regard this Training School for Nurses as one of our best assets for the Hospital and the Church.

The Trustees of the Hospital and the Board of Missions can not find suitable words to express our profound appreciation of the generosity of Dr. Harris. He has done far more than he promised at the beginning. At the outset he gave his check for \$53,000 as first payment of the purchase price of \$253,000 to the bondholders and became guarantor of the remaining \$200,000 of the bonded indebtedness. This enabled the Church to regain the title to the Hospital. For the \$146,000 advanced by him for improvements he has accepted as part payment a 3% note for \$100,000, this note to be canceled if interest is paid promptly at the expiration of twenty years. He is giving his time and thought to the Hospital as Superintendent without financial compensation: simply for the joy of serving. In addition to all this he has made generous provision in his will for the Hospital. This provision, when available, will care for perhaps a dozen charity patients at all times. This will make the Hospital a truly beneficent institution. In appreciation of what he has done and is doing we ask that you authorize the Trustees to change the name of the Hospital from "Methodist Hospital in Fort Worth" to "The Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital" in memory of William Harris, father of Dr. Chas. H. Harris.

The financial outlook is encouraging. The property is valued at about \$1,500,000. There is a bonded indebtedness of \$190,000 and notes outstanding for \$144,000, making a total of \$334,000. If the Conference will continue its generous support and individuals will make contributions as they have done, we believe the debts can be met as they mature. We request that the same assessment that was made last year for all Hospital purposes, namely \$7,500, be made for the ensuing year and the budget committee be instructed to make this assessment.

At your last session you elected the following Trustees to serve until November 1940: Bishop H. A. Boaz, Dr. Chas. H. Harris, Dr. Shelton Barcus, Dr. R. L. Grogan, Ward B. Powell, H. N. Peters, Boyce Martin, Rev. P. E. Riley, D. D., Dr. Joe White.

The following Trustees were elected to serve until November, 1939: Rev. A. D. Porter, John Collier, Jr., Stanley Thompson, Rev. J. N. R. Score, D. D., W. H. Slay, Jr., Geo. Peyton, Dr. G. E. Beavers, Dr. C. P. Schenck, Dr. Geo. R. Enloe.

The Rev. A. D. Porter having died, we nominate in his place Bishop Ivan Lee Holt to serve until November, 1939.

The following were elected to serve until November, 1938: Rev. L. L. Felder, Leon Gross, Dr. Will S. Horn, Chas. A. Lupton, Dr. Judge M. Lyle, J. R. Edwards, W. Erskine Williams, Frank P. Culver, Jr.

Frank P. Culver, Jr., has resigned and W. Erskine Williams has gone to his reward. We nominate to serve until November, 1941, the following: Rev. L. L. Felder, Marvin D. Evans, Dr. Will S. Horn, Chas. A. Lupton, Dr. Judge M. Lyle, W. D. Smith, J. R. Edwards, Geo. W. Scaling, Ed Landreth.

It was voted to incorporate in the minutes the following letter, which was read by Bishop H. A. Boaz:

Fort Worth, Texas
November 4, 1938

Bishop H. A. Boaz,
Fort Worth, Texas.

Dear Bishop:

At your request and suggestion I have examined the title papers, abstract of title and minute books, including the contract between the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital and Dr. Charles H. Harris. As I understand it you would like to have an expression of my opinion on three questions:

1. Does title to the hospital property rest securely in the church? As to this question, as you understand, the legal title to the hospital property is vested in a corporation. This corporation is governed by a Board of Trustees, 75% of whom must be members of the Methodist Church. Since the board for that reason is and will continue to be constituted largely of Methodists I am of the opinion that the control of the hospital property so far as the title is concerned will be in the hands of the Church. It should also be mentioned in this connection that the title to the hospital property as it stands under the present arrangement is the same as it was before the foreclosure. In other words, the church now has the same title to the property and the same rights to control the hospital property that it did under the old arrangement.

2. The second question that you asked me to express an opinion on is: Could Dr. Harris, single-handed and alone, take over the hospital property? To this question I would say no. The property is now being managed under the terms of a contract entered into between the trustees and Dr. Harris, which contract provides for the appointment of an executive committee to manage the property. This committee, while it is selected by Dr. Harris, must be approved by the Board of Trustees. In that was a voice in the management of the hospital is retained by the trustees.

Dr. Harris under the provisions of the contract has a second lien on the hospital property and the nurses' home which he has deeded to the hospital to secure him in the payment of notes which have been given him for about \$146,000.00 in money which he has personally spent in improvements and equipment for the hospital. As you understand, \$46,000.00 of this money is to be repaid to Dr. Harris in annual installments of \$8,000.00 each and the \$100,000.00 is to be a gift to the hospital at the end of twenty years, provided 3% interest is paid on that amount during the 20 year period.

Of course, in the case of default in the payment of interest on either of these notes Dr. Harris would have the right to foreclose his second lien, but the contract further provides that even in the event the trustees would have six months in which to pay Dr. Harris and stop foreclosure.

3. The third question was in the event of the death of Dr. Harris what would be the status of the hospital?

The contract with Dr. Harris covers this question specifically and provides that in the event of Dr. Harris' death his executor or the trustee of his estate shall continue in the same relationship to the hospital that Dr. Harris now holds under the contract, that is, the executor or trustee would have the right to name the executive committee and to be a member of the committee and to continue with the management of the hospital in the same way Dr. Harris does now.

The contract with Dr. Harris further provides that all funds arising from the operation of the hospital shall be used for payment of interest on the bonded indebtedness of \$200,000.00 held by a bank in New Orleans and

to pay annual installments on the principal of such indebtedness and to pay the interest on the \$100,000.00 note above mentioned and interest and installments of principal on the \$46,000.00 note. In this way the church is protected in so far as the use and application of funds arising from the operation of the hospital are concerned.

I trust the above answers the questions that you have in mind. If I can be of further service to you please feel free to call on me.

In recognition of the noble philanthropy of Dr. Chas. H. Harris in behalf of our great Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital of Fort Worth, we, the members of the Central Texas Conference desire to offer our deep and sincere appreciation for his magnanimous gifts and service and pledge to Dr. Harris our confidence and support in the constructive, far-reaching program he is putting into operation in behalf of sick and suffering humanity.

Hospital Trustees—By separate vote the Hospital Trustees as recommended in Report No. 1, Board of Missions, were elected.

Appreciation—Boyce Martin made a motion that the Conference express its appreciation to Bishop Boaz for his splendid services for the Hospital. Motion carried. Bishop Holt also expressed his appreciation for Bishop Boaz.

Ballot—The results of the fifty lay ballot were announced. 69 votes cast and valid, 35 necessary to elect. No election. Ballots were spread for the sixth time.

The results of the first ballot for clerical alternates were announced. 173 ballots cast, 168 valid, 85 necessary to elect. J. W. Bergin and T. Edgar Neal were elected alternates. Ballots were spread for the second ballot.

Resolution Ministerial Support—Dr. J. N. R. Score, for the Commission on Ministerial Support, gave a report on Church Ministerial Day and the voluntary Fellowship Fund and read a resolution. F. P. Culver moved that consideration of the resolution be postponed until a report of the Board of Missions dealing with this matter could be presented. This was postponed.

Leave of Absence—The Conference granted leave of absence of J. N. R. Score, E. B. Hawk, and D. A. Chisholm.

Ballot—The results of the sixth lay ballot were announced. 76 votes cast and valid, 39 necessary to elect. Boyce Martin was elected.

Special Committee—Upon motion of F. P. Culver, the chair was requested to appoint a special committee of seven to whom would be referred the resolution offered by Dr. Score on Ministerial Day and the report of Board of Missions. (See below.)

Question 22—Question 22 was resumed. The name of E. H. Lightfoot was called, his character passed and he gave the report for the Cleburne District. The names of the men in this district were called and their characters passed.

A telegram was ordered sent J. C. Mann who was absent on account of illness.

Leave of Absence—Leave of absence was granted Homer Vanderpool.

Wesley Foundation—Dr. Glenn Flynn, chairman of the Wesleyan Foundation of Texas was presented by W. H. Cole, President Board of Education. James Carlin of Texas A. & M. Church, and Dr. C. W. Hall, of the Bible Chair at Austin, spoke concerning their work.

Board of Christian Education—Report No. 1, of Board of Christian Education was read and adopted.

Postponement of Order of Day—Motion was made and carried that the order of the day be postponed until the report for the Weatherford District could be made.

Question 22—A. W. Hall gave the report for the Weatherford District and his character was passed. The names of the preachers in the district were called and their characters passed.

Bishop Holt expressed appreciation for the services of those who had prepared the blackboard reports.

Place of Next Conference—Question 47, Where shall the next session of the Conference be held? Upon motion of M. M. Chunn, this matter was referred to the Cabinet.

Presentation—Geo. C. French of the North Texas Conference was introduced.

Readmission—Question 8, Who are readmitted? A. B. Curry presented the name of Lloyd Sanders, a deacon of one year. By vote he was readmitted.

Question 10—Who are received from other Churches as traveling preachers? The answer was no one.

Locations—Question 11, Who are located this year? was called and answered, no one.

MINISTERIAL SUPPORT

Your committee, appointed to study sundry resolutions and efforts being made for the help of superannuates and underpaid preachers, offer the following plan, to be followed this year:

1. All preachers receiving an annual salary of \$1,000 or more pay one per cent of such salary.
2. That a special offering for this cause be taken in each congregation on Sunday, January 29, 1939, or as near thereto as is practicable; it being understood that this public collection is not to cover or be related in any direct way to the one per cent paid by the preacher.
3. That these two funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer, Mr. Leake Ayres, who shall divide the total amount, fifty per cent to the Board of Finance, and fifty per cent to the Board of Missions.

Program Committee—Bishop Holt suggested the appointment of a committee of three, to whom might be referred such matters as worship services, introductions, special interests for the next Annual Conference. On motion of J. N. Rentfro, such a committee was authorized.

Bishop Holt told of his plan to visit every pastoral charge in his episcopal area during the year, and of his desire to know personally of the problems of each preacher and his family.

Texas Methodist Foundation—Boyce Martin addressed the Conference concerning the organization and plans of the Texas Methodist Foundation.

Treasurer's Report—Raymond Burton read the report of the Conference Treasure. It was received.

Budget Commission—Gid J. Bryan made an explanation of the report of the Budget Commission and the increases that it contained. J. R. Edwards read the report, which was adopted.

Attention is called to the fact that an increase over last year of about \$500.00 was given to the Board of Church Extension and about \$250.00 to the Board of Lay Activities. An effort has been made to maintain last year's ratio between the Conference and General askings. This necessitated an increase in the Conference askings of between 44 and 45% over last year.

Christian Education—L. W. Seymour read Report No. 3 of the Board of Christian Education and moved adoption of the report. J. A. Siceloff was asked to speak to the report. The report was adopted.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION NO. 3

Regarding our schools and colleges the board is happy to report that whereas two years ago there was an indebtedness of approximately three quarters of a million dollars on the three institutions within the bounds of our Conference: Southwestern University, Texas Wesleyan College and Weatherford College, today all three of them are entirely free of debt and the endowment at Southwestern has been increased substantially. We want to express our gratitude to the Southern Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church for the generous transfer of \$120,000 from the former Texas Wesleyan Academy at Austin to Texas Wesleyan College at Fort Worth.

We had before us the report of the Wesley Foundation of Texas showing gratifying development in its work and making two requests requiring the action of our Conference.

First: That its constitution be altered so as to change its name to the Methodist Student Movement of Texas; and to add to its membership the executive secretaries of the five participating conferences, and five to seven

additional members to be selected from the State at large by the Commission itself. We recommend concurrence in this request and the adoption of its constitution as amended.

Second: That this Conference give its endorsement to and co-operation with a movement on the part of the Wesley Foundation to raise for its work within the next few years the sum of \$500,000.00; \$200,000.00 of which is to be used for building and equipment for its work, and \$300,000.00 for endowment. We recommend that this Conference pledge its co-operation in the effort to raise this sum of money.

We want to call the attention of the Conference to

Ministers' Week at S. M. U. Feb. 13 to 17,
Southwestern Pastors' School beginning June 7,
S. M. U. Pastors' School beginning June 19,
Young People's Assembly at Southwestern June 19 to 24.

We again remind the Conference that under satisfactory conditions the Texas State Department of Education permits the teaching of Bible courses for credit in public high schools. We suggest that pastors who are interested in such a course in their communities confer with the Executive Secretary, Rev. J. A. Sicheloff.

Youth Crusade

We urge the pastors and all leaders of young people to become thoroughly familiar with the developing plans for the Youth Crusade and to give large place in the church program to this most significant forward movement of youth.

Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise

No finer way has been found to grow a missionary-minded Church than that of the **Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise**.

Its regular appeal to unselfish sharing with a magnificent cause develops a passion for Christlike achievement, as well as a high loyalty to the Church program for Kingdom building.

We are glad to report that a goodly number of our churches, large and small, are making use of this missionary special for this purpose. About half of our 448 church schools in the Conference are carrying out this program of education each fourth Sunday and making contributions. The years 1937 and 1938 show about the same number of churches participating and there is an encouraging increase in the total amount contributed to the cause. We would urge that every church in the Conference make this a regular part of its missionary education of the entire membership of the Church.

Church School Day

Church School Day can be made a vitally religious service in the local church. The purpose of this special day observance as given in the discipline is to "provide for presentation to the church of the work of Christian Education," and the purpose of the offering is to promote, "Church School work within the territory of the Annual Conference." A little more than one-fourth of the Church Schools of our Conference are making contributions for this purpose but a very much larger number than that are observing the day and receiving its spiritual values.

Rural Work in the Conference

Thorough going studies of rural conditions within the Conference have been made during the year in Rural Church Institutes, Group Conferences of Rural Pastors, Local Church Visitation, and in the Rural Life Conference at John Tarleton College at Stephenville. In this Conference six denominations participated, also allied agencies of the church in the rural field, and a second session of this Conference is to be held during the coming summer. For a better trained ministry and local membership, we would

urge attendance upon this Conference, the Ministers' Week at S. M. U. School of Theology in February and full courses at Pastors' Schools in June. Sunday evening Training Services for the training of the local membership in continuous evangelism have been carried on by a goodly number of circuit churches. Your Board has named the following persons for membership on the Rural Work Commission: Miss Mary Shipp Sanders and Rev. J. B. Curry. These are in addition to the Conference Secretary, who is an ex-officio member.

Evangelism

Your Board has emphasized the training of the entire membership of the local church in continuous evangelism. We feel that every adult and young people's class should be an evangelistic unit and every organization of the church should make this its chief purpose in its planning for the year. We are delighted to see an increasing number of churches using the Master's method of visitation evangelism in which the entire membership of the local church share in this responsibility, but the field is white unto harvest and we have only begun the great task of training our people in this supremely important work in building the Kingdom. We would estimate that there are 300 schoolhouse communities within the boundaries of the Central Texas Conference which are without a religious ministry. Your Board most heartily cooperates with the purposes of the Annual Conference Commission on Evangelism and has elected Rev. John A. Siceloff as its representative.

Increased Enrollment in the Church School

A clear expression of the need for increased enrollment is found in the words of our own Bishop Holt, "The Church School has furnished for years a large percent of the additions to our Church" (ranging from 62% of our additions to the Church from the Church School in 1921 to 80% in 1937.) Continuing in the words of Bishop Holt, "The future of the Church is at stake when the church school enrollment decreases and the leaders of the Protestant Churches in America are concerned about the situation. No greater service to the church can be rendered than the increase of the numbers in the Church School. I will support with all that is in me the effort to build up the membership of the Church Schools."

Beginning with last year our enrollment in the Central Texas Conference showed a slight increase and we believe it is the beginning of a constantly increasing enrollment through the years. We would urge the hearty cooperation of every pastor in this work. The net increase this conference year is 2,896.

Lay Activities—Nat Harris read Report No. 1, of the Board of Lay Activities, which was adopted.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES NO. 1

We, your Committee, appointed to prepare a report for the Board of Lay Activities on Temperance and Social Service, beg leave to submit the following:

That, notwithstanding the assurances given as an inducement to repeal the prohibition amendments, both Federal and State, the consumption of intoxicating liquors would be decreased, and practical temperance be affected, we find that, since 1933, the use of vinous liquor has increased 3000%; that the use of beer has increased 800%, and the use of distilled liquors has increased 2200%.

This increase, based in percentages, is, perhaps, not so striking as when we see that the record shows the American public spent for alcoholic beverages, during the year 1937, \$3,602,555,706.00 in consideration for 1,939,869,030.00 gallons of alcoholic beverages consumed.

Breaking these figures down, it will be seen that on an average, each citizen of the United States consumed 15.8 gallons of alcoholic beverages, for which he paid \$29.35.

That the increase in the use of alcoholic beverages is startling, as is disclosed, the increased consumption of beer and ale, for the year, 1937, over the year 1936, is 4,172,289 barrels, and that for hard liquors there was an increase of 22,182,945 gallons.

The direct result of this tremendous increase in the use of alcoholic beverages is not reflected alone in the consumption of alcoholic beverages, but is directly reflected in the mounting crime bill in the United States, and the loss of lives on the highway.

It is estimated that the crime bill of the United States runs from \$15,000,000,000.00 annually, while traffic deaths increased to a total of 40,000 during the year 1937, an increase of nearly 14,000 as compared with the last year of prohibition, 1932-1933.

J. Edgar Hoover, of the Department of Justice, has stated that the three years following prohibition were, "the most terrible period of criminal history in the life of America." This, notwithstanding the repeated assertions that the underworld would be curbed, and that crime would be reduced to a minimum, if we would but repeal the prohibition amendments.

That Mr. Hoover did not exaggerate the crime condition in the statement above referred to; we find that during these three years, a murder was committed each 45 minutes, while the figures for the year 1937, show a murder was committed each 39 minutes. During 1937, 1,415,000 felonies were committed, and there are now approximately 4,400,000 citizens of the

United States enlisted in the army of crime. Of this total, 700,000 are boys and girls under age.

The juvenile delinquency is such as to startle thinking people—700,000 boys and girls entering upon lives of crime—and the only thing that we are doing now to stop this tremendous destruction of young lives, is the establishment and maintenance of reformatories, and other semi-penal institutions. We respectfully submit that the hour has struck for the church, in some practical way, to devote its energies to the saving of the youth of our land from a life of crime and give them to the States as upright, honorable citizens.

The legalized sale of intoxicating liquors is making further inroads on our social system, in that, under the old liquor system, the handlers of intoxicating liquors were men, but now, 90%, or perhaps a larger per cent, of intoxicating liquors is dispensed by girls and young women, in drug stores, soda fountains, cafes, hotels and other places where the public congregates,—there being approximately four times as many girls engaged in the business of dispensing alcoholic liquors as are now enrolled in all of the colleges and universities of America.

A close second in the forces destructive of our social, economic and moral conditions, is the gambling spirit. There is in Texas, at this time, a strong concerted move to legalize horse race betting again, and to liberalize all of our gambling laws, while there is also strong propaganda for the re-introduction of the lottery system in order that we might meet the old age pension payments.

We do not believe that the Church can shut its eyes to the conditions now existing, and without an heroic effort, permit these destructive forces to continue in an ever increasing vicious circle; that the Church should, without hesitation, or mental evasion, take its stand against these evils, and exhaust every possible avenue open to it to stamp out these major social evils—alcohol and gambling and crime. This is the imperative duty of the Church if it is to continue the champion of righteousness.

Therefore, be it resolved by the Central Texas Conference, that it pledge itself to an heroic effort, by education and propaganda, to oppose the return of race track gambling, the liberalizing of our present gambling statutes, and the liberalizing of the laws now enacted regulating the sale of intoxicating liquors by the use of every legitimate means, by unequivocal demands made upon our law makers, and the enforcement officers of our counties to regulate and restrict, the sale of intoxicating liquors, and the exhibition of gambling devices of every kind and character, until such time as that, by the use of every Constitutional provision, the repeal of laws legalizing the sale of intoxicating liquors, and the abolishment of gambling may be accomplished.

Lay Activities—Hal H. Cherry read Report No. 2 of the Board of Lay Activities, which was adopted.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES NO. 2

We your Conference Board of Lay Activities wish to submit the following general report:

Stewardship

Stewardship is a primary factor in the development of spiritual life. The tremendous issues that face us in our life today will find their successful solution only through a Christian Church of great spiritual power. This will not come through conversion alone, though this is a necessary beginning; it will come as we train the members of our Church to be genuine Christian Stewards. The Board of Lay Activities has been a real pioneer in the field of Christian Stewardship, for the Methodist Episcopal Church South, since the General Conference of 1926, made this one of our major duties. We have never lost the conviction that Christian Stewardship is the very heart of our program, the trunkline of its contribution to the spiritual welfare of our Church.

We recommend that our efforts be broadened and intensified, in the pro-

motion of Stewardship, and to accomplish this purpose, we suggest:

- To circulate free, or at a nominal cost, leaflets on Stewardship;
- To conduct Stewardship Conferences and Institutes;
- To promote series of Sermons on Stewardship;
- To provide for addresses on Stewardship in conferences, group meetings, and local congregations;
- To furnish Lay Speakers who are charged with the responsibility of presenting different phases of Stewardship in public addresses;
- To co-operate with the Board of Christian Education in promoting Stewardship courses in Leadership Schools, standard training schools, standard training classes, and for use as an elective in the organized classes of the church school.

Benevolences

The Benevolent program of the Methodist church is all-inclusive and world wide in its scope and influence. We believe no other church has a more efficient benevolent program than has Methodism, and one of our continuous tasks is to keep alive and active a sentiment throughout our Church in favor of our connectional program.

We express our appreciation of the action of the last General Conference, in its effort to focus the thinking of the membership of our Churches on the importance of the Benevolences, by providing for the employment of a full time leader in this field. We congratulate the Church on the selection of Dr. C. K. Vliet for this leadership, and we pledge to him our hearty co-operation and support, and submit the following recommendations as coming from Dr. Vliet, and commend them as being worthy of our careful and prayerful consideration.

That the askings of the Budget Commission be according to actual need and not according to expectancies, and then inasmuch as all Boards will ask for their actual needs, that the determined goal of every District and Church be one hundred per cent of the askings.

That the Pastor preach each quarter on the various causes represented in the Benevolences.

We quote from the Discipline of our Church Paragraph 279, as adopted by the last General Conference:

"It shall be the joint responsibility of the Pastor and Charge Lay Leader of each Charge to present to a meeting of each congregation in that Charge the program of our Benevolences, and our explanation of the various causes supported by them together with a statement of the amount of the Benevolent askings of that congregation and how this amount was determined. This presentation to each local congregation shall be made before the Quarterly Conference of that charge shall set the amount of their acceptance."

We urge the compliance with the foregoing provision of our Church law.

Evangelism

We are glad that the last General Conference voted to place special emphasis on Evangelism during this quadrennium, and are gratified that the Church has selected Bishop C. C. Selecman, and Dr. Harry Denman, chairman and secretary, respectively, of the "General Commission on Evangelism."

We pledge to them our full co-operation and assistance.

We feel that every Board of Stewards should create a Committee on Evangelism. This committee should assist in securing members for the personal workers group, to be known as the "Fellowship of Evangelism" (an ample supply of blanks for pledges and certificates of membership in this "Fellowship of Evangelism" can be secured by writing Dr. Harry Denman, Doctors' Building, Nashville, Tennessee).

The pastors should make every possible use of this personal workers group in promoting Evangelism in the local church.

A Sound Financial Program, and Adequate Support of the Ministry

Recent surveys of financial systems as now used in our churches reveal certain outstanding facts, viz.: That about half of our Ministers are inadequately supported; that there is a low tide of paying to the Benevolences of the Church; that about 60% of the membership of the church is not making any contribution toward the financial support of the Church; that over 50% of our Boards of Stewards are not organized for effective service; that not more than 30% of our churches are conducting Every-Member Canvass of its membership; and that too many of our churches are still using the old "hit-or-miss" methods of financing our church programs.

In the face of these facts we want to suggest that any sound financial plan or system in a local church shall include the following items:

- 1st. Regular weekly offerings on the part of every member as an act of worship.
- 2nd. A program of statement that will give to every offering an educational value.
- 3rd. That every contribution be brought to a stewardship basis, a basis of spiritual sharing.
- 4th. A thorough annual Every-Member Canvass seeking some contribution from each member.
- 5th. A careful follow-up, during the year, of all pledges.
- 6th. A monthly balancing of the budget.

We realize the fact that a very large percent of our ministers are not properly supported, and that our Church must continue to maintain pastoral charges in areas where it will be impossible for the pastor to receive a living for himself and his family without outside help, therefore we recommend the following practical suggestions of procedure:

- 1st. The fixing by the Annual Conference of a minimum salary scale.
- 2nd. The adjustments of charge lines, wherever possible, so as to produce an adequate salary.
- 3rd. A careful study of the local conditions in each charge that needs help, by a committee, and after due consideration, in the light of all the information available, this Committee to offer a practical plan to relieve the situation in each charge.

Lay Speaking and Laymen's Day

The continued success of the Church will depend in no small degree on the discovery and development of Lay Speakers to be used by the pastors and Presiding Elders as they may direct. Their work should be something more than lay preaching; they should be capable of assisting smaller churches in organizing for more effective service; of course, careful selection and training will be essential. Presiding Elders and the District Boards, with the co-operation of the pastors, can and should develop a group of effective Lay Speakers.

For the past ten years, Laymen's Day has come to have a regular place on the calendar of nearly every Methodist Church. It presents an opportunity to our Board for bringing to the attention of the whole Church, certain important phases of its work. It is certainly a potent factor in discovering and developing Lay Leadership. We recommend therefore the continued observance of the day, and endorse the action of our General Board in again setting the second Sunday in June for the observance of Laymen's Day, and in selecting the subject "Adequate Support of the Ministry" for our consideration and discussion for June 11th, 1939.

Training of Official Boards

We wish to place special emphasis on the importance of the office of steward in the Methodist Church.

We therefore recommend that each pastor give more serious attention to the selection of those who will constitute this Board. It seems to us that they should be selected after prayerful consideration, from the following standpoint:

1. Christian Character; 2. Natural Ability; 3. Loyalty to the Church and its program; 4. Willingness to study for the task.

Every good Steward will want to know more about his Church and its work, and should be willing and eager to receive the proper training. We therefore recommend the holding of District and Bi-District Institutes for Stewards, led or directed by the District Lay Leaders and the Presiding Elders.

Classes for Stewards in each charge, taught by the pastor or the Charge Lay Leader, and heartily recommend that "A Steward in the Methodist Church" by Morelock, be the text book used in these institutes and classes. This book by Dr. Morelock will revolutionize the financial and spiritual outlook of any church, if carefully read and studied. Pastors and Charge Lay Leaders are urged to see that this book is placed in the hands of their Stewards.

We suggest that each pastor appoint a wide-awake layman to assist him in placing the Christian Advocate, The Southwestern Advocate, and the World Outlook, in the homes of our people, another means of increasing Church Loyalty, and training Church officials and Church leaders.

Conference Lay Leader—Upon recommendation of the Board of Lay Activities, Hal H. Cherry was elected Conference Lay Leader, answering Question 43.

Ordering of Conference Sessions—Upon motions a session this afternoon at 2:30, tonight at 8:00 o'clock, and the Memorial Session tomorrow at 2:30 o'clock were ordered. Bishop Holt appointed O. F. Sensabaugh to preside for the afternoon session, and M. K. Little for the Memorial Session.

Methodist Home Program—Dr. Anthony announced that the orchestra of the Methodist Home would play this evening at 7:00 o'clock.

Worship Service—Bishop Holt led the Conference in the fourth order of worship from the Book of Worship on the theme of "The Spirit of Unity."

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY AFTERNOON

Opening—The Conference was called to order at 2:30 by Dr. O. F. Sensabaugh. The Conference stood and sang "Stand Up for Jesus." E. R. Patterson led in prayer.

Question 22—The name of each superannuate member of the Conference was called, their characters passed, and privilege given to those present to speak. These names were then referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the same relationship.

The name of each supernumerary member was called, their character passed, and referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the same relationship. This completed Question 22.

Greeting to Superannuates—Upon motion of R. J. LaPrade, it was ordered that a letter, signed by the Bishop and the Secretary, be sent to each Superannuate absent from the Conference.

Leave of Absence—J. W. W. Shuler requested leave of absence from the Conference. It was granted.

Conference Relations—J. C. Adams made a statement that the Committee on Conference Relations had approved the names of W. B. Gilleland and E. R. Patterson for the Superannuate Relation.

Board of Finance—Paxton Smith read the report of the Board of Finance. The Report was adopted.

BOARD OF FINANCE

The following honored superannuate brethren have died during the year: W. N. Curry, J. W. Pattison, M. C. Hays, A. T. Plunkett, Marsh Boiles. Mrs. J. W. Fort, the widow of one of our deceased preachers, also died during the year.

The amount appropriated to each claimant the ensuing year is the same amount as distributed the past three years, namely, \$6.50 per year of service for superannuated preachers, and \$4.50 per year of service for the widows of preachers. There was a small decrease in the amount received from the General Board of Finance at St. Louis and the Conference Benevolences this year, but the amount received by the Board from Church Ministry Sunday enabled us to keep the distribution up to the level of former years.

The Board reorganized for the new quadrennium by electing the following officers: J. W. Sharbutt, chairman; E. J. White, vice-chairman; Paxton Smith, secretary-treasurer. Application should be made personally to this executive committee for special grants to claimants from the emergency fund.

Due to the promise of funds received from Church Ministry Sunday, should the Conference so order it continued, we are again granting the sum of \$50 to each preacher superannuating at this session of the Conference for moving expenses, thus saving the time and expense of special offerings from the floor of the Conference.

We desire to thank Dr. Walter Anthony, pastor-host, Austin Avenue and other Methodist churches of Waco for their kindness and hospitality shown the superannuates during this session of the Conference. We ask the pastors of the Conference to invite the superannuate preachers to fill their pulpits occasionally. We receive letters from some of the brethren who are able and "hungry" to preach, who have not had an invitation during the calendar year. We call attention to the pastors to paragraph 170 in the 1938 Discipline calling upon the preacher-in-charge "to make a written report to each Annual Conference of the condition of all the claimants on the Conference collection within his pastoral charge, to be submitted to the Conference Board of Finance." Any special emergency or need arising during the year should be reported to the executive committee. We appreciate the thoughtfulness of many of our laymen, especially the Woman's Missionary Society, in caring for the needs of these worthy claimants.

All claimants upon the fund are required to communicate with the Conference Board at least once a year, but we regret that a majority fail to comply with this request. If physically unable to write, we are sure there are those who would, if called upon, render this service. All changes of address should be sent immediately to the secretary, or it may cause delay in receiving the quarterly checks.

We are, as our custom, distributing the available funds to claimants this year, according to the provisions in paragraphs 559, 563 of the 1938 Discipline, reserving a small per cent for emergency relief and mortuary fees. Claimants of our Conference were paid directly by the General Board of Finance in July of this past year the sum of \$6,457.65. Your Conference Board has paid out the sum of \$21,568.21 to claimants in the year just closing. We received \$1,084.00 from the Church Ministry Sunday special fund.

Orphanage—The report for the Orphanage Committee was read by E. R. Patterson. It was adopted.

ORPHANAGE BOARD

Your Board met in regular session at a luncheon at the Methodist Home, and we submit the following report:

We are very happy to report that the management is placing an especial emphasis on religious training in the program of education for the children of the Home. In addition to the regular academic training, every child in the Home that is old enough is receiving some kind of vocational training, according to his or her talent. Particular attention is also being given to the social life of the children. We note with appreciation that various organizations of the city of Waco, as well as interested individuals from over the state, are cooperating with the Home in this commendable program.

Your Board wishes to take this opportunity to thank the presiding elders, pastors, and laymen for their hearty cooperation and support, which have materially aided in making possible the good report which the Home has made this year.

In view of the fact that Christmas and the offering for the Home have become so closely-associated in our program, we recommend that the month of December be again set aside for the cultivation and taking of the offering for the Home. We wish to express our appreciation for the fine administration of Superintendent Hubert Johnson and his staff of workers.

The conference has paid this year \$16,469.91 to this worthy institution, and your Board recommends that we join with the other supporting conferences in raising our part of the \$125,000 budget for the Home during the conference year of 1938-39.

We further recommend Dr. J. N. R. Score and Mr. Ed McCullough as our representatives on the Board of Directors of the Home.

Spiritual State of the Church—S. L. Culwell read the report of the Committee on Spiritual State of the Church. With slight changes suggested by F. P. Culver, the report was adopted.

SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH

Aldersgate Commemoration has been a great blessing to our church. It has increased our membership on profession of faith and revitalized the organization of our church.

We most heartily accept the challenge of "The Fellowship of Evangelism" as so ably presented to the Conference by Dr. Harry Denman. We recommend that both pastor and laymen earnestly and prayerfully unite our efforts on the Sunday evening church service to the end that it become the means of reaching in a more effective way the great number of unchurched people. Let us make evangelism the supreme effort of this year, in order that Aldersgate spirit may be perpetuated and its great benefit conserved to the Church. We wish to go on record with the West Texas Conference in asking our Governor-elect to take a strong and definite stand against gambling of every kind as well as a strong hand against the legalized liquor traffic and all other character destroying vices, and we pledge to him our united support in these efforts.

We recommend a more extended use of the "Upper Room," worship, public and private devotions, and all other means of developing the spiritual life of our membership.

Christian Literature—The report of the Committee on Christian Literature was read by Henry Price. The report was adopted.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

In this Aldersgate Commemoration Year when our thoughts have been turned back to John Wesley and early Methodism, we would remember the use Mr. Wesley made of the Press and Christian Literature. He provided for the Methodist Society a rich treasury of Christian Literature through abridgements, corrections, emendations, books, and original tracts. The Press was a powerful means in Mr. Wesley's hands of spreading and preserving his religious ideals. He realized the power that the printed page exerts in moulding the ideals and standards of a nation. If we are to be as wise in our day as he was in his, we will make larger use of the vast body of Christian Literature that comes from our church press.

Our church literature will compare favorably with any other literature to be found, and we think it is decidedly the best for all people called Methodist. Thus we urge a wider circulation of Christian Literature among our people.

We are pleased to note the increased circulation of the Upper Room, and heartily commend its daily use. Our advocates are ably edited and should be placed in every Methodist home. We express our appreciation to Dr. A. J. Weeks, Editor of the Southwestern Advocate, and Dr. W. P. King, Editor of the Christian Advocate for these splendid periodicals.

The annual statement of our publishing agents shows an increase of sales over last year of a little over a hundred thousand dollars, with a net profit of \$127,073.75. \$100,000.00 of the profit has been distributed to the various conferences, \$4,248.40 was the portion due the claimants of the Central Texas Conference.

We recommend that the uniting conference be memorialized to make Dallas the headquarters for publications of this jurisdiction. As Dallas is already the center of our publishing interests, and the seat of our University west of the Mississippi.

We urge that all church officials, stewards, and Trustees become subscribers and readers of the Southwestern advocate.

Also that our quota of one advocate for every twenty members be continued.

Church Extension—The report of the Board of Church Extension was read by J. J. Creed. It was adopted.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Your Board of Church Extension heartily commends the efforts being made to place a Methodist Chapel and Student Center at the A. & M. College of Texas. Methodism faces a great opportunity at this school.

We join hands with the Conference Boards of the other Texas Conferences in a request to our General Board of Church Extension that they grant a substantial sum of money for the erection of an adequate church plant at A. & M.

We would again call your attention to the fact that we have more money to loan than we have to donate. Therefore we advise that whenever it will at all answer the need, a loan be requested rather than a gift. It is also very imperative that more care and accuracy be observed in the preparation of the application blanks. This is particularly true with reference to the figures setting forth the exact financial status of your enterprise and the facts concerning titles. Any omissions make it difficult if not impossible for your Conference and General Boards to properly estimate your needs and thereby injure your prospects.

American Bible Society—The report of the Committee on the American Bible Society was read by W. T. Jones. It was adopted.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society is now nearing a century and a quarter of

Scripture distribution and reports a very successful year. In gratitude to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for her contributions of over thirteen thousand dollars last year it sends greetings to you through your committee.

The American Bible Society is continuously translating the Scriptures and giving them to those who have never had the Word in their own language or dialect. They have now reached the one thousand and eighth language or dialect into which they have translated the Scriptures or portions of Scriptures.

Despite handicaps occasioned by war in China and also conditions obtaining in Japan where there has been a decline also in Scripture distribution; yet, more than seven and one third millions of Bibles or portions, were distributed throughout these lands this last year.

In Latin America, in Brazil, in the Philippines, and in Siam notable gains were made though handicapped by lack of funds in many instances.

In the United States of America the Society has come to the rescue of the needy areas such as the Ohio Valley Flood where there were donations of ten thousand Bibles, and fifty thousand New Testaments or portions; also to the C. C. C. Camps where forty-one thousand portions were given. Federal institutions, hospitals, orphans homes, and the blind peoples have also received generous supplies.

Last year requests for material for the observation of Universal Bible Sunday were twice that of the preceding year. We call your attention to posters, pageants, and other aids for the proper observation of the day this year also.

Resolutions

Your committee respectfully presents the following resolutions:

First: That the Central Texas Conference records its satisfaction in the continued missionary work of the American Bible Society and its efforts to increase the circulation of the Scriptures, endeavoring to have them more widely used among all peoples.

Second: That our pastors support the work by encouraging the observance of Universal Bible Sunday on December 11 and call attention to the need of a more faithful use of the Book and more universal distribution of it among all classes and ages for which it is now so practically arranged and attractively printed and bound.

Minutes—R. J. LaPrade reported that the minutes for the morning session had been read and approved.

Permanent Meeting Place—A motion by T. S. Ogle that we recommend to the Cabinet that we plan for a permanent meeting of the Conference failed for the want of a second.

Resolution on International Relations—T. Wesley Hook presented a resolution on international relations. S. L. Culwell, C. O. Shugart, Atticus Webb, R. J. LaPrade spoke to the resolution. S. L. Culwell moved postponement of further consideration of the resolution until the opening of the evening session or until a suitable time for the Bishop. C. O. Shugart moved a second substitute that the matter be laid upon the table. T. Wesley Hook claimed privilege of closing the discussion. The motion to lay on the table did not prevail. D. K. Porter made a substitute that the matter be referred to a committee of three to be appointed by the chair. This was accepted by the maker and second of the motion to postpone consideration, but it failed to carry. R. A. Langston spoke to the question. Motion made to strike out all reference to boycotts carried by a vote of 20 to 16. Motion to strike all intimations that right was on one side alone was made. The motion failed. The resolution, as amended, was adopted.

RESOLUTION

Be it resolved that, We call upon our Representatives and Senators in the Congress of the United States, to vigorously and wholeheartedly throw their support to President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Hull, in their

efforts to extend the Good Neighbor policy to other nations. And that our President enforce our neutrality laws and our Congress amend their defects, so that we shall not supply nations invading the homelands of other nations, with munitions and materials for war. And that we call upon ourselves and all Christians everywhere to express in unmistakable manner our and their disapproval of the atrocities visited upon China. And that we commend wholeheartedly our missionaries and workers who have remained at their posts during these desperate days, and give them our increased support to minister to the increased needs they are called upon to supply. And that we daily, or as often as we remind ourselves, pray for their enemies, but especially pray for the suffering Chinese. And that we call upon our President, our Secretary of State, and the Congress, to again espouse in no uncertain or mistakable manner the principal of international law that such peace-loving and industrious nations as China shall not be broken up and allotted among greedy nations; but that her integrity shall be preserved, in conformity with the nine power treaty, and the principal of international law announced by our then Secretary of State Stimson, that territory taken from another nation by force, shall not be recognized as belonging to the invading nation.

Adjournment—Motion to adjourn carried. The Conference adjourned with the benediction by R. J. LaPrade, at 5:20 p. m.

FOURTH DAY—SATURDAY EVENING

Opening—Bishop Holt opened the evening session for the ordination of Deacons and Elders at 8:00 o'clock. The Conference stoid and sang, "Ye Servants of God, Your Master Proclaim."

Sermon on the Ministry—Bishop Holt took his text from the sixth chapter of Isaiah and preached on the Christian ministry.

The ordination hymn, "'Are Ye Able,' Said the Master," was sung. The choir of the Austin Avenue Methodist Church gave a special anthem.

Ordination of Deacons—The Secretary called the roll of those to be ordained deacons and presented them to the Bishop. The following were ordained: Traveling preachers: Eugene Deles Bennett, Jr.; John Ralph Meritt, John Washington Morphis, Jr., Cleo Carl Sessions, Milton Slayden, Raymond Matthew Burton. Local preachers: Irvin Eldridge Pilgrim and Robert Michael Studer.

The Conference Quartet sang, "The Wayside Cross."

Ordination of Elders—The Secretary called the roll of those elected to Elders' Orders and presented them to the Bishop. Benediction—The session adjourned with the benediction pronounced by Bishop Holt.

FIFTH DAY—SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Memorial Service—The Conference met in Memorial Session at 2:00 o'clock with Rev. M. K. Little in the chair. Hayden Edwards led in singing "Am I a Soldier of the Cross." O. F. Sensabaugh read the Scripture lesson from 15th chapter of I Cor. "It Singeth Low in Every Heart" was sung.

The Secretary read the roll of the pastors who had died during the year, namely: A. D. Porter, Casper S. Wright, M. C. Hays, J. S. Huckabee, J.

W. Patison, A. T. Plunkett, F. O. Waddill, W. N. Curry and Marsh Boiles. Also were read the names of wives or widows of preachers, who had died during the year, namely: Mrs. C. R. Gray and Mrs. J. W. Fort. J. J. Creed led in prayer.

The Scriptural selection, entitled "The Everlasting God" from the Methodist Hymnal, was read responsively.

Dr. Walter Anthony delivered the memorial address based upon the text, "Establish thou the work of our hands upon us, yea, the work of our hands establish thou it."

Oral tributes were paid by J. W. W. Shuler, J. D. Henrickson, Mac. M. Smith, J. J. Creed, R. A. Crosby, M. A. Turner, E. M. Wisdom, R. A. Langston, Mrs. Gid J. Bryan, R. W. Call, C. C. Henson, J. H. Baldrige, Seba Kirkpatrick.

Offering for Postmaster—At the suggestion of R. A. Langston an offering was taken for Rev. Ben S. Crow, the Conference postmaster, amounting to \$45.00.

Hayden Edwards led the Conference in singing "Lead On, O King Eternal."

Commission of Evangelism—F. P. Culver requested a meeting of the Conference Commission on Evangelism and it was called to meet for organization immediately after adjournment.

Resolutions—C. O. Shugart read a resolution of thanks and appreciation. It was adopted.

MEMOIRS

The following memoirs were presented at the Sunday afternoon session, and are presented here in abbreviated form.

REV. MARSH BOILES

Marsh Boiles, son of J. L. and Mary Boiles, was born at Steiner Valley, Texas, July 9, 1884. After a brief period of illness he quietly slipped away on the morning of February 11, 1938, at his home north of Whitney in the Fort Graham community.

Marsh Boiles was a choice spirit. He was genuinely a religious man. He possessed a compelling passion to serve his Master in the ministry, to proclaim the unsearchable riches of the Gospel of his Lord. And we should not wonder, for he came from a home of prayer. His mother died when he was very young, and when they found her cold form it was in the posture of prayer. He was converted at the tender age of eleven, and joined the Lane Methodist Church in Hunt County. As his years began to ripen into maturity he felt a definite call to preach. He was licensed in 1916, and was admitted on trial into the Central Texas Conference in 1918 when the Conference met at Mineral Wells, Bishop A. N. Ainsworth presiding. He was assigned to the Aquilla Circuit for one year, Talpa two years, Gustine four years, Carlton two years, and the Whitney Circuit for seven years. In 1936 he asked for a Sabbatical year leave of absence, at the close of which he asked for the Superannuate relation, and soon thereafter fell on sleep in death.

In May, 1902, he was married to Miss Flaus Holt. Theirs was a congenial and happy married life together. REVEREND WILLIAM NATHANIEL CURRY

Brother Curry was educated in the Bellbuckle School for boys. "Sonnie Webb," the head of the school, had a very great influence in molding young William's character.

When he was nineteen years old he married Ida Mae Sanders of Columbia, Tennessee. He said many times that all he ever became was due to her influence. The fever of coming to Texas struck him. Several of his brothers were already in Texas. So he sold his farm, took his family, which consisted of two boys, to Texas, settling near Waxahachie, at Sardis in Ellis County. Later he moved to the St. Paul community, seven miles from Mansfield. He lived there many years and at one time owned three farms in that community. Here two girls, Sadie and Elizabeth, were born.

Here, too, he ran for the Texas Legislature. He was defeated by two votes. How changed his life would have been had he been elected, for he had felt the call to be a minister but he was running from it (his own words).

However, the call was so strong that finally he offered himself as a preacher in the Methodist Church. He was admitted to the Conference in 1893 at Fort Worth, Texas. Bishop Key was the presiding officer. His first charge was Cresson, Texas; Dr. W. L. Nelms was the presiding elder.

At Cresson two children, Nelms and Pauline—were born; the boy was named for Brother Nelms. Bertie Lou was born at Grapevine.

Brother Curry served the following churches: Cresson, Grapevine, Arlington, Hewitt, Salado, Abbott, Morgan, Granbury, Mansfield, Burleson. His record of four years tenure was broken only twice in the forty-five years and he stayed at Granbury six years.

When the time came to lay down his life work, there were several preachers carrying on who were preachers because of him.

Brother Curry suffered a heart attack on June 21, and lingered but five days. He died on Sunday at six-thirty, June 26—on the day that was always a holy day, the day that meant so much to him. REV. J. W. PATISON

REVEREND ALBERT DAVIS PORTER

Albert Davis Porter was born in Jonesboro, Arkansas, to Reverend John H. and Catherine Elizabeth (Conklin) Porter. His father died when he was sixteen years of age, and two years after, his mother who had been his almost constant care since his father's death, took her departure, leaving him in his eighteenth year an orphan. Albert Porter in planning his life had first looked forward to entering the legal profession, but following the death of his mother, answered the call to the ministry, and began at once to prepare himself for his life's work. He won a scholarship in Hendrix College, and for two years he was a student in that institution. In the fall of 1898 he entered the Polytechnic College, and in 1902 he was graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. It was his privilege to attend several of the summer schools conducted by the Biblical Department of Vanderbilt University, and he was a well known figure at the Pastors' Schools at Southwestern and Southern Methodist Universities.

He was admitted on trial in the old Northwest Texas Conference in the fall of 1898. While a student in the Polytechnic College he was pastor of

the Glenwood and Trinity Methodist Churches, Fort Worth. His subsequent appointments were: Blum, 1902-'03; North Cleburne, 1903-'04; Mount Calm, 1904-'06; Hubbard, 1906-'08; Elm Street, Waco, 1908-'09; First Church, Waxahachie, 1909-'11; Morrow Street, Waco, 1911-'14; Main Street, Cleburne, 1914-'17; Presiding Elder, Corsicana District, 1917-'21; First Church, Hillsboro, 1921-'23; Presiding Elder, Brownwood District, 1923-'27; First Church, Mineral Wells, 1927-'30; Presiding Elder, Waco District, 1930-'34; Central Church, Fort Worth, 1934 to January 12, 1938.

He was happily united in marriage March 7, 1905, to Miss Emma Ger-tude Anduss. To this union two sons were born—W. A., and Lindley D., who, with their dear mother remain to mourn his loss.

In 1914 he was elected Secretary of the Central Texas Conference, and for the remaining twenty-four years of his life he continued in that office rendering a service that will be long remembered and appreciated. He was a delegate to the sessions of the General Conference of 1918; 1922; the Special Session of 1924; the sessions of 1930 and 1934, and was, at the time of his departure, delegate elect to the session of 1938.

He was Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Weatherford College; a trustee of the Superannuate Homes; a member of the Board of Managers of the Methodist Home; President of the General Pastors' Association of Fort Worth in 1935; Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of Texas A. F. & A. M., 1935. He was Vice-President of the Board of Managers of the Texas Pastors' School, Southern Methodist University, and a member of the faculty of the school from the day of its organization. The honorary and honorable degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by the Daniel Baker College of Brownwood, Texas, in the spring of 1925.

That he had an exquisite literary taste is made evident in the output of his own gifted pen. Many readers have been charmed with his "The Shepherd of Beth;" "Stephen of Nain;" "The Snow White Cross;" "The Fisher Lad of Galilee;" "Lazarus of Bethany;" and "The Lone Soldier" which was published in the Golden Jubilee Journal in 1916. A book of fiction entitled "The Yellow Wolf" lacked only the finishing touches at the time of his death. He was the composer of many poems—some of these he allowed a wider circulation by giving them to the world in papers and magazines; others he kept only for his intimate circle of friends and loved ones.

He lived nobly; he died well; his example is worthy of emulation; his memory is precious.

REV. F. O. WADDILL

Frederick Oldham Waddill was born in Fayette County, Texas, October 9, 1881; moved with his father to Pidcoke, Coryell County, at the age of five years. Brother Waddill served his Annual Conference as Statistical Secretary from 1923 to 1934 when he was relieved at his own request. He led the alternate delegation to the General Conference of 1930.

Brother Waddill was married to Mary Mayhew at Levita, Texas, August 23, 1905. Four children were born to this union: Turner and Eugene, of

Dallas; Mrs. John Yates, of Corsicana, and Sue, of Georgetown. He passed to his heavenly home, August 29, at 1:30 p. m., from his parsonage home at Groesbeck, Texas. Funeral services were conducted by his presiding elder, Dr. C. R. Gray, assisted by a number of other ministers of Corsicana District, from Groesbeck Methodist Church, on the afternoon of August 30, with interment at Dawson, Texas, same afternoon.

DR. CASPAR S. WRIGHT

Dr. Caspar S. Wright was born at White Plains, Georgia. His parents, John Wiley and Sarah Walker Wright, were a part of the old South in their religious devotion, high sense of honor, and culture. To the son these came almost as an inheritance. When he completed his college and theological studies he entered the itinerant ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, being ordained Elder in 1891.

He held pastorates in Georgia, Arkansas, and Missouri before entering upon his long and useful ministry in Texas, where his first charge was Trinity, El Paso. After three years in this border city he went to First Church, Galveston, and then to First Church, Houston. From 1915 to 1917 he was Vice-President of Southern Methodist University. He was minister at First Church, Austin, 1917-1920; Presiding Elder of the San Antonio District from 1920-24; and the Austin District 1924-26. From the Central Methodist Church, Fort Worth, which he served, 1926-29, he was appointed Presiding Elder of the Weatherford District, to be later assigned to the Corsicana District, where he labored from 1930-1934. He was pastor of First Church, Waco, from 1934-36. His last pastoral charge was Taylor from which he went to the Fort Worth Methodist Hospital to serve as its Commissioner until the Master called him home on July 4, 1938.

A study of the appointments held by Dr. Wright will indicate something of the ability, merit, effectiveness, and general character of this servant of the Lord. Only as you labored and associated with him, however, could you really know this unusual Christian man whose genial, wholesome, magnetic, and radiant personality enabled him to be a sympathetic, understanding, and helpful pastor.

Dr. Wright is survived by his companion who lives at 2000 Pembroke Drive, Fort Worth, Texas; and by a son of a former marriage, Dr. Walker Wright.

Funeral services were conducted by his lifelong friend, Bishop Sam R. Hay, Bishop H. A. Boaz, assisted by M. M. Chunn, P. E. Riley, J. N. R. Score, and E. B. Hawk. The large gathering of laymen and ministers at Central Church, Fort Worth, was in itself a worthy tribute to one whose life had been given to Christian service. Dr. Wright was a good shepherd to the flock of God; a preacher of unusual ability; an administrator whose insight, fairness, and initiative commended him to laymen and made him a worthy ministerial counselor. He is among the immortal and we carry on, made stronger and better because he was among us.

APPENDIX

CONFERENCE RULES

1. The District Steward, the Charge Lay Leader and the Recording Steward of each charge, the District Lay Leader, the District Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society, and the District Trustees are exofficio members of the District Conference. Besides these, each church is entitled to one delegate for every one hundred members, or two-thirds fraction thereof to be elected by the Church Conference, provided that every church shall have at least one delegate.

2. The Presiding Elders are a standing committee to nominate all the boards and regular standing committees at each session of the Conference except quadrennial boards.

3. The Presiding Elders are required by Conference resolutions to send to the Statistical Secretary of the Conference, immediately after the meeting of their respective boards of District Stewards, a copy of the apportionments made on each charge, and these apportionments are to be recorded by the Statistical Secretary as the official apportionments against the several charges of the Conference.

4. The Conference shall elect a Statistical Secretary and an assistant Statistical Secretary who shall serve until the close of the Conference following. The Conference shall also elect two assistant Statistical Secretaries for each of the several districts. The two District Assistant Statistical Secretaries for each district shall be nominated as follows: The Statistical Secretary shall nominate one man and upon his election he shall nominate the second man. It shall be the duty of the District Assistant Statistical Secretaries to collect the statistical reports from the preachers in charge within the several districts and see that such reports are properly edited, properly entered upon the sheets provided for that purpose and to turn the finished sheets over to the Statistical Secretary in the evening of the second day of the Conference session.

5. The Chairman of Committee on Admissions shall make written report to be filed with the Secretary of the Conference, concerning each one admitted to the Conference. This report shall embrace: Full name, name of parents; date and place of birth, conversion and license to preach; date of marriage; name of wife, and such other facts of his life as may be deemed important.

6. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the presiding eldership shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.

7. The Conference Commission on Budget shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special apportionments to be levied upon the churches, unless such new or special apportionments shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the M. E. Church, South, or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so intrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust had been executed and how.

8. The Conference Commission on Budget in its report shall give the contrasts between the several apportionments for the present year and the proposed apportionments for the ensuing year so that the Conference can act on the report with clear knowledge. It shall be the duty of the Commission to furnish the "Table of Apportionments" for the ensuing year arriving at the scale for the districts by finding what per cent the total church membership in the individual district is of the grand total church membership in the Conference, and by finding what per cent the total salaries in the district are of the grand total of salaries paid in the Conference, and then dividing the sum of these two decimals by 2.

9. All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports, except the statistical reports, coming before the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk, the original copy to be retained by the Secretary in the archives, one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Texas Christian Advocate, and one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Central Texas Conference Journal.

10. Each preacher in charge shall, on the first morning of the Conference session, hand his complete statistical report to one of the Assistant Statistical Secretaries for the district in which his charge is situated.

11. All requests by boards, commissions, or individuals for dates for special campaigns to secure money shall be submitted to the Commission on Budget, whose duty it shall be to work out a schedule for said campaigns so that as far as possible, overlapping may be prevented. The Commission shall submit its report to the Conference for approval.

12. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference Work an amount sufficient to meet the expense of printing the Minutes and also provide for the Treasurer's Bond. These estimates are to be furnished by the Editor of the Journal, through the Commission on Budget.

13. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive conference roll calls shall thereby forfeit membership on said board. The vacancy may be filled by nomination of the board and election by the Conference.

14. The lay members of the Annual Conference, one from each charge (Discipline Par. 45), shall be elected at the Quarterly Conference next preceeding the District Conference, and reported to the District Conference, the Secretary of which shall report a complete list of said Delegates to the Secretary of the Annual Conference.
