THE NATURE OF THIS JOURNAL

This is in reality two Journals in one, since it covers the final session of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the organizational session of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church.

In order to avoid confusion, the Quadrennial Boards and Annual Standing Committees of the old Conference are not listed. This has some precedent, in that when new Boards are elected at the beginning of a quadrennium, the old Boards were not listed in that Journal, even though in most cases they had served through that Conference.

Since the new Conference is the legal successor of the old Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which in turn was the legal successor of the old Northwest Texas Conference, prior to the division of that Conference thirty years ago, the Chronological Roll of Ministers is continued from those two Conferences, and added to this year. It is therefore included in the section of the Journal given to the new Conference, along with the complete Alphabetical Roll, and the Lay Delegates to both sessions.

To simplify matters, the Table of Contents for both sessions is given at the beginning of the Journal.

Due to the many changes and the rush for time, there will doubtless be many errors. While the Editor does not accept the blame for all of them, he does invite a communication on any matters that need to be changed for next year.—Editor.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS**WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON**

Opening—The Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in the seventy-fourth session (30th since division), at 2 p. m., November 8th, in the First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, with Bishop Ivan Lee Holt, Ph. D., D. D., LL. D., presiding.

Worship Services—A printed series of service, entitled "the Book of Worship," was distributed for general use for the worship services of the Conference.

Holy Communion—The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by Bishop Holt, assisted by the nine Presiding Elders.

Roll Call—Following a recess, the Conference was called into business session. W. W. Ward, secretary of the last session, called the roll. Two hundred and seventy in full connection, nine on trial, seventeen supplies, and 109 lay delegates answered to their names. (See Roll.)

Organization—W. W. Ward was elected secretary, and on his nomination of the following were elected assistants: J. D. Williams, Journal; Oran Stephens and E. R. Gordon, condensed minutes; C. C. Sessions, reports and resolutions; Paul W. Utley, blackboard.

J. T. Gardner was elected statistical secretary, and on his nomination the following were elected: General Assistant, Fred G. Benkley; Brownwood District, Hubert Crain, George Greebon; Cisco District, L. Stanley Williams, Lloyd Sanders; Cleburne District, U. A. Schulze, J. W. Sprinkle; Corsicana District, W. V. Bane, M. Dick Lowry; Fort Worth District, A. W. Hall, J. Fred Patterson; Georgetown District, Eugene D. Bennett, B. C. Schmidt; Waco District, J. W. Morphis, Jr., W. J. Shelton; Waxahachie District, Thad E. Son, G. T. Lavender, R. C. Calvert; Weatherford District, Horace Poteet, B. L. McCord. Report Collectors—Brownwood District, John R. Merritt; Cisco District, J. Morris Bailey; Cleburne District, Henry Price; Corsicana District, R. F. Johnson; Fort Worth District, W. R. Beaird; Georgetown District, Vernon Perry; Waco District, J. W. Whitefield; Waxahachie District, B. H. Coleman; Weatherford District, Roy L. Crawford.

Conference Program—J. N. R. Score, on behalf of the Entertainment Committee, moved the adoption of the printed program as the official program for the Conference subject to the special orders of the Conference and the desires of the Bishop and Cabinet. It was adopted, which set forth the hours of meeting and adjournment.

Bar of Conference—The Bar of the Conference was set as the main auditorium as far back as the third columns.

Welcome—Dr. C. P. Schenck, chairman of the Entertainment Committee, and of the Board of Stewards of First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, was presented and spoke words of welcome to the Conference. Bishop Holt responded graciously to the words of welcome.

Procedure—Bishop Holt spoke concerning the procedure of the two Conference sessions to be held this week. He requested the privilege of free guidance in the sessions. It was also requested that the preachers do not request personal conversations with the Bishop this week, but to consult with the Presiding Elders. He further stated that the real test of unification will come within the next two or three years as the adjustments come to the local churches. He also announced that the guest preacher for the Conference was Dr. Frederick F. Shannon, of Chicago.

Memoirs—Question 14, "What preachers have died during the year? was

called. Answer: Preston Broxton, J. G. Pollard, and A. W. Waddill. Their names were referred to the Committee on Memoirs.

Service of Union—H. P. Clark moved that when we adjourn that we adjourn to meet in regular session for the Service of Union tonight at 7:30. It was so ordered.

Order of the Day—F. P. Culver moved the adoption of a motion setting the order of the day tomorrow at 10 o'clock to hear a resolution concerning Conference property.

Superannuate Homes—P. E. Riley read a resolution on Superannuate Homes. It was adopted.

SUPERANNUATE HOMES BOARD OF TRUSTEES

WHEREAS the Northwest Texas Conference (of which the Central Texas was then a part) of the M. E. Church, South, adopted a paper (see printed Journal, 1905, pages 5 and 47), which instituted the work of securing homes for the Conference Claimants, and

WHEREAS the first item in the paper stated that the presiding elders shall nominate a board of trustees consisting of NINE members, to be elected by the annual conference, and

WHEREAS this work had continued successfully thirty-three years under the direction of a board of trustees of NINE members, and

WHEREAS the last session of the Central Texas Conference, held in Waco, 1938, upon nomination of the presiding elders, changed the number of trustees to SEVEN without first repealing the action of 1905, therefore be it

RESOLVED: FIRST, that we re-affirm the action of the conference of 1905 making the board of trustees consist of NINE, rather than SEVEN, members; and declare that the action taken by the conference of 1938 is null and void; and we declare further that the following are legal trustees, being those in office prior to the action of the conference in 1938: P. E. Riley, E. W. Bridges, W. B. Andrews, O. O. Odom, W. W. Ward, W. R. Walker, Mrs. Leila, S. Peyton, and J. D. Seiders.

RESOLVED: SECOND, that the District Superintendents be requested to nominate someone to fill the vacancy caused by the death of A. D. Porter.

RESOLVED: THIRD, that we hereby instruct the above trustees to redraft the original paper as adopted in 1905, making necessary corrections to bring it into harmony with the new legislation of the Methodist Church, same to be presented to the conference of 1940 for ratification.

RESOLVED: FOURTH, that we re-affirm the permission given to the board of trustees by the Central Texas Conference held in Eastland in 1930 (see printed Journal of that year, page 58), that when, in the judgment of the board of trustees they think it advisable to exchange or sell any property held in trust by them, they are hereby given authority to do so.

Introductions—Dr. C. Q. Smith, the District Superintendent of the St. Louis District, was presented and represented the Board of Finance.

Standing Committees—J. M. Bond, secretary of the Cabinet, read the nominations of the Cabinet for Standing Committees. These were elected.

Announcements—Announcements concerning Board meetings, Conference Entertainment were made.

Personal Privilege—It was stated that C. O. Shugart was delayed from the Conference on account of a funeral.

Adjournment—Upon motion of J. W. W. Shuler the adjournment of the afternoon was ordered. Bishop H. A. Boaz pronounced the benediction.

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY EVENING

Opening—Bishop Holt called the conference to order at 7:30 p. m. Three songs, "We Gather Together to Seek the Lord's Blessing," "O for a Thousand Tongues to Sing," and "God of Grace and God of Glory" were sung by the congregation. Prayer was offered by O. F. Sensabaugh.

Announcements—J. N. R. Score made several announcements concerning the conference program and entertainment. The evening offering was taken.

Address—Bishop Holt presented Dr. Frederick F. Shannon, who spoke on "The New Methodist Church."

The Declaration of Union—Using the service as used in the Uniting Conference in Kansas City, the conference pledged its allegiance to the Methodist Church. The choir of First Methodist Church sang the anthem, "God So Loved the World."

The congregation sang, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past."

Greetings from Bishop John M. Moore were extended by Bishop Holt.

Benediction—The Conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. Shannon.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY MORNING

Opening—Bishop Holt called the Conference to order Thursday morning at 9:00 o'clock. The Conference stood and sang "God of Grace and God of Glory." E. B. Hawk led in prayer.

Roll—List of clerical absentees was called by the Secretary. (See Roll.)

Committee on Journal—Upon motion of the secretary it was ordered that a committee of three be appointed to approve the Journal.

Visitors—The following visitors were introduced to the Conference: G. A. Schlueter, New Mexico Conference; Tom W. Barcus, Northwest Texas Conference; Albert R. Peterson, Southern Conference, M. E. Church; R. E. Goodrich, Southwest Texas Conference; W. D. Thompson, transferring from Oklahoma Conference; C. F. Bohmfalk, Southwest Texas Conference; A. G. Elley, Southern Conference, M. E. Church.

Admission on Trial—Question 1, "Who are admitted on trial?" was called. It was answered as follows: Cleburne District, Alonzo Monk Bryan; Fort Worth District, Floyd Arch Boulware; Georgetown District, Robert Earl Martin.

Who Remain on Trial—Question 3, "Who remain on Trial?" was called. It was answered as follows: Pat Brown, Julian William Sprinkle, Clyde Warren Pittman, John Beal Duncan. These made their reports, were passed by the Committee of the First Year and advanced to the class of the second year.

Discontinuance—Question 5, "Who are discontinued?" was called. It was answered, no one.

Full Connection—Marion Luther Nelson, John Morris Bailey (Deacon), Luther Allen Hill, Garland Tolar Lavender, Auburn Spencer Neely, John Beal Duncan (Elder). These made their reports, were approved by the Committee of the Second Year, approved by the Committee on Admissions for full connection, and advanced to the Class of the Third Year.

The name of George D. Adkins was called. It was stated that he had transferred to the East Oklahoma Conference and that he had passed his work for the class of the second year.

Deacon's Orders—Question 17, "What traveling preachers are elected deacons?" was called. It was answered, Marion Luther Nelson, Luther Allen Hill, Garland Tolan Lavender, Auburn Spencer Neely.

Readmission—Question 8, "Who are readmitted?" was called. From the Cisco District, Harold Owen Bennett, who located in the Missouri Conference, a deacon, was upon vote readmitted. It was stated that he had passed the work of the classes of four years.

From the Cisco District, the name of B. M. Calloway, who located in this conference seventeen years ago, was presented. It was stated that his name would be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the Superannuate Relationship. R. A. Langston, Ed. R. Barcus, C. O. Shugart, G. Alfred Brown, O. F. Sensabaugh, J. W. Sharbutt spoke to the motion. A division vote was called for. He was readmitted by a vote of 90 to 82.

Transfers In—Question 9, "Who are received by transfer from other Conferences?" was called. It was answered, W. H. Coleman, an elder from the Southern California-Arizona Conference; W. J. Fenton, an elder, North Texas Conference; W. M. Bowden, an elder, Northwest Texas Conference; E. D. Landreth, an elder, Northwest Texas Conference, and W. D. Thompson, an elder, Oklahoma Conference.

From Other Churches—Question 10, "Who are received from other churches as traveling preachers?" was called? It was answered, no one.

Locations—Question 11, "Who are located this year?" was called. It was answered, no one.

Withdrawals—Question 12, "Who have withdrawn or been expelled?" It was answered: withdrawn, no one; expelled, no one.

Transferred Out—Question 14, "Who are transferred to other Conferences?" was called. It was answered, J. B. Curry, an elder, to the Southern California-Arizona Conference; N. L. Linebaugh, an elder, to the North Texas Conference; Paul W. Evans, an elder to the Northwest Texas Conference; Homer Vanderpool, an elder, to the Oklahoma Conference; Geo. D. Adkins, in the class of the second year, to the East Oklahoma Conference.

Deacons of One Year—Question 15, "Who are the Deacons of One Year?" was called. Urban August Schulze, John Ralph Merritt, Cleo Carl Sessions, Milton Slayden, Raymond Matthew Burton, John Washington Morphis, Jr., Eugene Deles Bennett, Jr., and Vernon Perry made their reports, their characters were passed, the Committee of the Third Year passed them, and they were advanced to the Class of the Fourth Year.

Elder's Orders—Question 19, "What traveling preachers were elected elders?" was called. Ross Gillean Smith, Benjamin Franklin Jackson, Jr., Donald Monroe Risinger, Burton Henry Coleman, Bruno Carl Schmidt, Levi Stanley Williams made their reports. They were passed by the Committee of the Fourth Year, and elected to Elder's orders.

Missions—Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions was read by W. N. Dunson. F. P. Culver spoke to the report. It was adopted.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 1

Your Board of Missions herewith submits its Report Number One.

After careful consideration the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, the union of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church has been duly and legally consummated and the name of such united Church is the Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church is the legal successor to the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

NOW THEREFORE, Be it resolved that title to all properties, both real and personal, and of every kind and character now owned or held in trust by the Board of Missions of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are hereby vested in the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church to be owned and held in trust by it and administered in accordance with the laws, rules and regulations adopted by the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church and the General Conference of said Church.

Presiding Elders' Reports—Question 22, "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and administration?" was called. S. W. Williams, Brownwood District; Roy A. Langston, Cisco District; L. L. Felder, Cleburne District; R. Otis Sory, Corsicana District; S. A. Barnes, Fort Worth District; Ed. R. Barcus, Georgetown District; J. N. Rentfro, Waco District; T. H. Burton, Waxahachie District, and J. M. Bond, Weatherford District, made the reports for their districts. Their characters were passed. The names of the preachers in the District were called, one by one, and all characters were passed.

Personal Privilege—It was stated that W. A. Flynn was delayed from attending the conference on account of the illness of his son. L. R. Vanderpool was granted leave of absence on account of a funeral.

Christian Education—Report No. 1, of the Board of Christian Education, was read by L. W. Seymour. It was adopted.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Report No. 1

The Conference Board of Christian Education met and heard reports from the various educational institutions drawing support from our funds. All papers, audit records and requests were referred to the new Board to be elected by the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church. The Executive Secretary, Rev. J. A. Sicheloff, and his staff of conference workers gave a resume of the work for the year just closing, making some recommendations which were passed on to the new Board. A special committee was named to consider possible arrangements for a conference camp site, and to make suggestions to the new Board.

A proposed budget was formulated, this also to be referred to the new Board for consideration.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Christian Education was read and adopted.

REPORT No. 2, BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

ON HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONARY ENTERPRISE

WHEREAS, the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise in the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has been a most impressive and successful agency for the promotion of Christian Missions at home and abroad; and

WHEREAS, it has provided education in missions for hundreds of thousands of our people through the Church School; and

WHEREAS, through the regular systematic contributions made on this Sunday approximately \$240,000 per annum, or \$20,000 per month, has been collected in small amounts and without pressure;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the members of the Central Texas Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, do hereby earnestly petition the General Conference to make provision for the

continuance of this special day and that the Board of Education, through the Division of the Local Church, be charged with the responsibility of promoting this day.

Report No. 3 of the Board of Christian Education was read and adopted.

**REPORT No. 3, BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION
RESOLUTION**

WHEREAS, the union of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church has been duly and legally consummated and the name of such united church is the Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church is the legal successor of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South;

NOW THEREFORE, Be it Resolved that title to all properties, both real and personal, and of every kind and character now owned or held in trust by the Board of Christian Education of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and all records and archives are hereby transferred and vested in the Board of Education of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church, to be owned and held in trust by it and administered in accordance with the laws, rules, regulations and usages adopted by the General Conference of the said Methodist Church and by the Central Texas Conference of the said Methodist Church.

Report No. 4 of the Board of Christian Education was read and received.

REPORT No. 4, BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Attached hereto are papers of the Board of Christian Education of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to be deposited with the Secretary of the Conference for delivery to the Board of Education of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church.

American Bible Society—R. A. Crosby read the report of the Committee on the American Bible Society. It was adopted.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Your Committee is pleased to report that almost 7,000,000 volumes of Scripture went to forty different countries in 174 different languages and dialects. Practically as many volumes were sent abroad as were distributed in the United States.

War-torn China is a fertile field where more whole volumes of Scripture were distributed than in any previous year. Latin America has been among the countries showing large increase in the Bible distribution.

In the United States 3,500,000 volumes have been placed in circulation. CCC Camps and the blind have been taken care of with this supply. Our own Southwestern District distributed 331,574 copies which is a substantial increase. Missions, rescue homes, prisons, hospitals, poverty-stricken, and destitute have been recipients at the hands of 75 paid workers in as many different localities.

Five new translations for parts or all the Scriptures are on the press and now translations in process for nine other languages, with revisions also for five languages. There is nothing that the Church can do to project itself into the hearts of men or to change the social order, like the circulation of the Scriptures. It is still true as it was in the day William Tyndal observed, "I had perceived by experience, how that it is impossible to stabilize the lay people in any truth except the Scriptures were plainly laid before their eyes."

Your committee presents the following resolutions for adoption: Whereas the spread of Christianity by means of the Holy Scriptures is a responsibility resting on the Church, and the American Bible Society is an agency for extending the Kingdom of God, be it resolved:

First: that the Central Texas Conference endorses the work of the American Bible Society since it has been as unflinching as untiring in its task to meet every emergency, and to carry the Truth to the very last man.

Second: that we observe December 10 as Bible Day, using the theme, "The Truth That Makes Men Free." The material is already in the hands of the pastors. Since the Church cannot evade the responsibility for molding Christian character; and, since the Bible is fundamental as a basis of personal and national life, that we as preachers and Church workers make it basic, in so doing, we further human freedom.

Third: that since the needs of the Bible Society will be enlarged with the war now in progress—adding responsibilities and increasing the difficulties with enlarged financial obligations—that we unhesitatingly meet this responsibility.

Committee on Journal—The chair appointed the Committee on Journal as follows: R. W. Goodloe, W. H. Coleman, and H. E. Stout.

Retention in Classes—Questions 2, 4, 5, 7, and 16 were called, and answered, None, indicating that all undergraduates had passed their courses of study during the year.

Lay Activities—Judge Nat Harris read Report No. 1 of the Board of Lay Activities. It was adopted with slight amendments.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES—TEMPERANCE

Since the report made to the last annual conference on this subject, notwithstanding there has been a rather large increase in the use of intoxicating liquors, some hopeful signs pointing to the ultimate prohibition of the legalized liquor traffic have been noted. Perhaps the most promising of these indications is the fact that the disregard of law and of moral ideals by the vendors of intoxicating liquors in their methods and practices is creating, even in the minds of those who have been opposed to prohibition, the conviction that prohibition must return in order to prevent the excesses now present in the conduct of the sale of intoxicating liquors.

With the return of legalized liquor, we were assured that the depression would be shortly ended, and that the taxes paid by the liquor industry to the state and Federal governments would be sufficient to take care of a vast army of unemployed. It is needless to say that this promise remains unfulfilled. The number of unemployed has increased rapidly. The total taxes, State and National, paid by the liquor traffic, to-wit: \$273,192,458.29 paid to the Federal Government, have been entirely inadequate to meet the expenses of prosecuting the crimes that have been committed incident to its return. During the year 1938, the Federal Government paid out more than \$10,000,000,000.00 for relief, a very large per cent of this going to provide food and clothing for the families of drunkards. Thus, not only has the liquor traffic failed to relieve us of the tax burden of caring for those who are unable to care for themselves, but it has actually increased our tax burden in order to provide protection to our law-abiding citizens from the crimes resulting from the legalized sale of intoxicating liquors. The arrests for drunkenness in 1938 show an increase of 80.6 per cent over the arrests for this offense in 1932, and these arrests and subsequent prosecutions have immeasurably increased the costs of crime.

It is estimated that 33 per cent of the accidents on our highways are directly attributable to drunk driving and that an additional 32 per cent of such accidents result indirectly from drunk driving. Aside from increased crime and accidents, the liquor traffic has multiplied, beyond computation, disease, premature deaths, inefficiency, and lowered living conditions resulting from poor and insufficient food, clothing and shelter.

That the purchasing power of the masses has been tremendously reduced since the legalization of liquor, cannot be questioned, for money spent for drink cannot be used for the purchase of a home, on automobile, food, clothing and education.

We were told that with the return of the legalization of the sale of liquor, the saloon would be a thing of the past. Before the adoption of the 18th Amendment, we had in the United States approximately 177,000 saloons, whereas, today we have approximately 500,000 places where intoxicating liquors are sold. We no longer use the appellation "saloon" to designate a place where intoxicating liquors are sold; we now call them "cocktail lounges," "soda fountains," "cafes," and "roadside inns." It is questionable whether the change in the name has made such places smell any sweeter. In the days before prohibition there were a few hundred thousand bartenders, whereas today we have approximately one and a half million barmaids, women and girls, who dispense intoxicating liquors.

However, in the midst of such chaos, there are a few hopeful indications. Our Legislature, during its last session, largely because of vigorous "lobbying" on the part of church groups, refused to re-establish legalized betting on horse racing and refused to permit the sale of liquor by the drink. Further, there have been temporary, sporadic attempts to enforce our gambling statutes, particularly with reference to marble machines and other gambling devices of a similar nature. During the past year, we have seen some attempts to enforce the gambling laws by raids on gambling houses and bookie dives. These efforts should be encouraged, and our officers, whose duty it is to enforce the law, should be made to feel that right-thinking people are back of them in these efforts, and unhesitatingly support them in an honest, honorable effort to enforce the gambling laws to the letter, and that no less is expected of them than a faithful execution of all such laws.

While the Church should be primarily responsible for education in morals, we should not overlook the fact that legislation is essential to the protection of morals and that obedience to law is one of the primary elements of citizenship.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH FOR THE CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE, that we, as a united church, not only condemn the liquor traffic and gambling in every form, but that we make it plain to the clergy and the laymen that their obligations to support the institutions of the Church apply as strongly against the liquor traffic and against gambling as to other institutions of the Church; and that the laymen and the clergy should educate against such evils, should encourage legislation (and the enforcement of such legislation) to prohibit the use of alcohol as a beverage and to prevent gambling, and should, in every lawful way, bring pressure to bear upon our enforcement officers to see that the laws, as written, are enforced, to the end that our Christian civilization may not be undermined by these two evil influences.

Conference Relations—The Districts were called for the reference of names to the Committee on Conference Relations for superannuation: Cisco District, R. M. Calloway; Corsicana District, R. T. Capps and J. M. Wynne; Georgetown District, B. W. Kramer; Fort Worth District, M. Phelan, J. T. Wilson, H. E. Stout, and W. B. Andrews; and Weatherford District, W. J. Cloud.

Local Deacons' Orders—Question 17, "What local preachers have been elected deacons?" was called. Brownwood District, Estill Allen, Jr.; Fort Worth District, Hubert Harold Barnett; Georgetown District, Luther Allen Hill.

San Antonio Training and Mission Home—Robert E. Goodrich was presented and spoke in behalf of the San Antonio Training and Mission, soliciting the continued support by this conference.

Conference Sessions—It was announced by the Bishop that the session of the conference ordered by the adoption of the printed program yesterday for this afternoon and tonight would not be held.

Announcements—W. H. Cole announced that there would be a banquet tonight in the Banquet Hall for the S. M. U. graduates.

F. P. Culver announced that the Conference Board of Missions would hold their anniversary tonight at 7:30, with Dr. H. D. Myers, of the General Board of Missions, as the speaker.

Deacon's Orders—The secretary read a communication from the Secretary of the St. Louis Conference giving authority for Bishop Holt to ordain Raymond Alexander Brooks a deacon, the St. Louis Conference having elected him a deacon. This was so ordered.

District Conference Records—Quay Parmer read the report of the Committee on District Conference Records, which was received.

COMMITTEE ON DISTRICT CONFERENCE RECORDS

Your Committee on District Conference Records submits the following report. Only five records were available for examination by the Committee. These records were from the Cisco, Corsicana, Waco, Waxahachie, and Weatherford Districts. The available records were in excellent condition with this exception: the Waco and Cisco records were unsigned by the President.

We had no records from the Fort Worth, Georgetown, Brownwood, and Cleburne Districts.

Service of Worship—Bishop Holt led the noon-day service as contained in the Book of Worship. Bishop Holt spoke on "The Church and the Ecumenical Movement in its Relation to War." The session adjourned with the benediction pronounced by the Bishop.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY MORNING

Opening—Bishop Holt opened the conference at 9:00 o'clock Friday morning, November 10th. The conference stood and sang "Faith of Our Fathers." R. J. LaPrade led in prayer.

Minutes—R. W. Goodloe reported minutes had been read and approved.

Distributing Committee—It was stated that the Board of Finance should nominate a Distributing Committee of three to adjust the claims of the superannuate members of the former Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Finance—Paxton Smith read the report of the Board of Finance. It was adopted as amended.

BOARD OF FINANCE

Your Conference Board of Finance desires to submit its final report as follows: We enter the new church with sixty-two retired ministers and eighty-eight wives of deceased preachers. This gives us the largest list of Conference Claimants in the entire connection of Southern Methodism.

Two of our honored superannuate brethren have died during the year: Rev. J. G. Pollard and A. W. Waddill. Mrs. J. A. Whitehurst and Mrs. T. S. Armstrong, the widows of two of our deceased preachers, also died during the year.

Although the amount received from the General Board of Finance in St. Louis was decreased for the second consecutive year, the amount received from the publishing house was the same as last year, and from the conference benevolences approximately the same, according to the Conference Treasurer. By your action nine were added to the list of retired ministers at this session, with one widow of a deceased preacher, making a total of ten additional claimants. We are, nevertheless, recommending to the new Board of Conference Claimants of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church that the amount appropriated to each claimant be the

same as during the past quadrennium, namely, \$6.50 per year of service for every retired minister, and \$4.50 per year of service for the widows of preachers.

We desire to thank Dr. J. N. R. Score, pastor-host, the entertainment committee, First Church and Methodists of Fort Worth, for the splendid way in which they have entertained the Conference claimants at this, the closing session of our annual conference. We also appreciate the thoughtfulness of many of our laymen, and the splendid contributions made throughout the year by the Woman's Missionary Society, in behalf of those who have served the church long and loyally in the past.

Your Conference Board has paid out the sum of \$19,902.16 to the Conference Claimants in the year now closing.

We also suggest to the New Board of Conference Claimants that, following the suggestion of Dr. Tadlock, the Executive Secretary of the Missouri Corporation of the Board of Pensions, in charge of the southeastern and south-central jurisdictions' claimants, that a member of the new Board be elected, or as many as seem advisable, to confer with other representatives of other Conference Board of Claimants in the Southwestern Jurisdiction at Dallas or Tulsa as called by Dr. Tadlock.

Andrews has rendered efficient service for the retired preachers of this Conference, and we, the members of the Board and members of the Central Texas Conference, express to him our sincere thanks for this valuable service.

WHEREAS, the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has been merged into The Methodist Church with the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Protestant Church, and,

WHEREAS, the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, holds certain properties in trust for Conference Claimants of the Central Texas Conference,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that we, the Board of Trustees for Conference Claimants' Homes of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, hereby transfer all of these properties to the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Church, to be held in trust by them for the benefit of Conference Claimants of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church.

Church Extension—J. J. Creed read the report for the Board of Church Extension. It was adopted.

Joint Board of Publication—P. E. Riley stated that there would be no report from the Joint Board of Publication to the conference.

Rural Commission—O. F. Sensabaugh made a statement concerning the work of the Rural Commission and moved reference of the entire matter to the new conference. It was so referred.

Christian Literature—J. O. Whittaker read the report of the Committee on Christian literature. It was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

We have had before us the Circulation Comparison Summary issued by our Sunday School Board relative to the Sunday School periodicals published by our Church. Said report covers the past quarter of the present church year.

The total net increase for all of our Church School periodicals for this last quarter was 12,011.

While other denominations report great difficulty in holding the circulation of Church School literature to past levels, we see that the circulation of ours has been increased.

Our Sunday School literature deserves our continued study and usage, for more effective results.

As it now appears, our Church School literature may prove a unifying force to our new Methodism. It seems no radical changes will be necessary in our Church School literature in the merging of our three Methodisms.

Each church is to continue to purchase its literature from that branch of the Publishing House which it has previously patronized.

We believe our church papers are well edited. They are: "The Christian Advocate," "The Southwestern Advocate," and "World Outlook." We commend the increased usage of these periodicals by our people, fixing as our goal one subscriber for every twenty members.

We respectfully suggest that in the consolidation of our Church papers that careful consideration be given to an idea now being widely discussed, namely: a church-wide organ to be published to meet the need of the minister and another to meet the needs of the laity.

The annual statement of our publishing agents is most encouraging. It shows a profit of \$201,159.00, \$100,000.00 of this being appropriated to Conference Claimants. Of this amount our Conference has been paid \$4,248.40.

Sabbath Observance—Auburn S. Neely read the report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance. It was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE

We find:

1. That there is a wide spread neglect and even abuse of the Sabbath Day.

2. That the attendance of Church services is being neglected, especially the evening service. The reason for this neglect is in part due to Sunday visiting; business practices, excursions, amusements and sports.

We recommend:

That our members in their general practice in word and deed uphold the spirit of the Sabbath and support those Christian business men who close their businesses on Sunday. And, furthermore, that we ask our people to make amusements, sports, trips, business and the like at least secondary to Church attendance, remembering that the Christian Movement depends upon Sabbath observance.

Spiritual State of the Church—There was no report ready from this committee. Upon motion reference was made to the new conference.

Evangelism—There was no report from the Commission on Evangelism.

Statistics—J. T. Gardner read the resolution prepared by the committee appointed at the last annual conference. Oran Stephens, W. W. Ward, F. P. Culver spoke to the resolution. J. W. W. Shuler moved the reference to the new conference. By division count reference lost by vote of 134 to 92. By division count the original motion lost, 149 to 82.

Statistics—The statistical questions 25 to 45 were called and answered by the Statistical secretary. (See Condensed Minutes.)

M. A. Turner protested the statistical report as incomplete as the report from the Bazette Circuit had not been accepted because it was received late. Upon motion the statistical secretary and editor of the Journal were asked to include the report.

Treasurer's Report—Leake Ayres read his report as Conference treasurer. It was received.

Budget Commission—The following report from the Budget Commission was adopted.

BUDGET COMMISSION

We, the Budget Commission of the Central Texas Conference, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, present the following report:

In completing the plans for a united Methodism, the expense of setting up the machinery of the new church is necessary. We, therefore, have assessments, or allotments, to the Central Texas Annual Conference for ex-

penses of General Conference of \$1,780.26, for Jurisdictional Conference of \$1,416.08; making a total of \$3,196.34.

This amount is to be prorated only to the churches and charges of the old Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

We respectfully call attention to the fact that this apportionment is a prior claim and the full amount apportioned is required under action of the Uniting Conference. The sum allotted to an annual conference, a district, or a charge is not to be reduced as an acceptance.

We also recommend that March 15, 1940, be set by this conference as the final date for payment of this claim.

We further request our successors, the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, in the handling of the general funds to confine their appropriations to the calls of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Hospital—W. N. Dunson read Report No. 2 of the Board of Missions on the Hospital. It was adopted.

BOARD OF MISSIONS REPORT NO. 2

After looking carefully into the situation of your Hospital, we find that it has enjoyed a year of larger service than during any year of its previous history; that in the institution we have a staff of 128 officers and nurses, as splendid and efficient as is to be found in any like institution; that during the year closing 4,906 patients have been treated, including babies; and that \$294,515.76 has been expended. We report property valued at \$1,500,000.00.

We are also gratified to note that under the leadership of Bishop H. A. Boaz, as Commissioner, more money has been collected than formerly and this means more hospitalization extended to those who could not otherwise secure it.

It is the standing offer of the Hospital to give one dollar for each dollar raised for Golden Cross.

We commend the work of the Hospital and pledge to it our continuous support.

Lay Activities—B. E. McGlamery read a resolution from the Board of Lay Activities. It was adopted.

LAY ACTIVITIES

Be It Resolved, That the Conference Board of Lay Activities of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, be instructed to make the nomination for Conference Lay Leader for the year 1939-40 and to complete the business of the Conference Board of Lay Activities for the present year.

Orphanage—J. Fred Patterson stated the Orphanage report had been prepared but he did not have it to read to the Conference. The askings for the Orphanage are the same, and the December offering was requested. The report was referred to the new conference.

Bishop Holt requested the approval of the change in the By-Laws of the Orphanage by this conference. It was approved.

Incomplete Business—Upon the motion of W. T. Whiteside it was ordered that any unfinished business of the conference after adjournment be committed to the Bishop and the Cabinet.

Deed—J. W. W. Shuler moved that the Bishop execute a deed to all property now held by the conference to the new conference. This deed should also be signed by the secretary of the conference, and should be recorded in the county clerk's office of all counties in which there was conference property. It was adopted as follows:

Be It Resolved by the Annual Conference of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, That its Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Reverend Ivan Lee Holt, and the Secretary of this Conference, the Reverend W. W. Ward, be, any they are hereby authorized and empowered to execute a deed, in the name of the Conference, conveying to The Methodist Church all real property owned and held by this Conference, wherever situated, to be owned and held by The Methodist Church in accordance with the Discipline of The Methodist Church, and that we now here ratify and confirm, all and singular, the acts of the Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Reverend Ivan Lee Holt, and the Secretary, the Reverend W. W. Ward, done in pursuance of this resolution; and, be it further

Resolved, That the Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Reverend Ivan Lee Holt, and the Secretary of the Conference, the Reverend W. W. Ward, be, and they hereby are authorized and empowered to transfer all rights of nomination and election of trustees or directors to institutions or boards in which this Conference has any legal right and the election of which has not been otherwise provided for to the said Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church.

Full Connection—The class to be received into full connection stood at the bar of the conference as Bishop Holt read the disciplinary questions. J. W. Bergin led in prayer. By vote they were received into full connection. This answered Question 6, "Who are received into full connection," Marion Luther Nelson, John Morris Bailey, Luther Hill, Garland Tolan Lavender, Auburn Spencer Neely, and John Beal Duncan.

Recognition of Orders—Question 21, "Who have been recommended by a District Conference for recognition of their orders as local deacons or local elders?" It was answered, no one.

Conference Relations—R. B. Hooper read the report of the Committee on Conference Relations, answering Question 23, "Who are supernumerary?" and Question 24, "Who are superannuated?" The report was adopted.

Closing of the Conference—At the request of the Bishop, M. K. Little and O. F. Sensabaugh spoke to the conference concerning the early years of the Central Texas and Northwest Texas Conference.

The secretary read the names of all effective preachers in the conference who have been members for at least twenty-five years. The superannuated preachers were also asked to stand, while the conference applauded.

As the conference sang "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" an offering was taken for the men superannuating at this conference.

Bishop H. A. Boaz, after a few personal remarks, offered prayer.

W. B. Andrews moved that the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, do now adjourn sine die. It was seconded by J. W. W. Shuler. By unanimous vote, the Conference was declared adjourned sine die.

MEMOIRS

The following memoirs were presented at the Saturday evening session of the new Conference, but since they relate to the old Conference only, they are given here in abbreviated form.

REV. PRESTON BROXTON

Preston Broxton was born January 9, 1878, in the state of Georgia. He grew to manhood an orphan, his father dying before he could remember. He came with his mother and her people to Texas at the age of three. They resided in eastern Texas until he was twelve years old. They then came to Comanche County and made their home near Sidney. He was married in 1906 to Miss M. F. Maehen and joined the Conference in 1910. His first appointment was Norton. He served this charge two years. The other places he served were Munger in Limestone County. He went from there to the Weatherford Circuit and served two years. Then to Whitt and Peaster four years, during which time he attended the Weatherford College. From there the Conference sent him to Peoria, where he served two years. He went from there to Proctor and served three years. Then he was sent to Dresco and served two years. From there to Rockwood, where he served four years. The other places he served were Gustine, Comanche Circuit, Twelfth Street, Cisco, and his last appointment was Bluff Dale in 1938. He served one year at this place, and had made his first round on his second year's work when he had a stroke December 20, and died August 13, 1939. His wife, and two daughters, Mrs. Walter Patterson of Plainview, Texas, and Mrs. Charles Singleton of Houston, are left to mourn their loss.

REV. J. G. POLLARD

John Glover Pollard was born to Benjamin C. and Mittie Pollard on November 29, 1873, near Wesley Chapel in Van Zandt County, Texas. Shortly afterwards the parents moved to Tunnells Chapel community in the same county, and there he was nurtured in this Godly home and in the environment of the famous camp meetings of old Tunnells Chapel.

He became a member of the church at an early age and was licensed to preach on April 23, 1892, at the quarterly conference at Edom in Tyler District, Rev. T. P. Smith, Presiding Elder. At the old East Texas Conference in Marshall on December 20, 1896, he was ordained Deacon, Bishop Eugene R. Hendrix, presiding. And at the conference at Tyler in 1901 he was ordained Elder, Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson, presiding.

He was married to Miss Lura Marler on June 15, 1899. To this union came two daughters and one son.

In addition to his own children, he shared his home with, and helped to educate six orphan children. All these filled places of honor in school and the church.

He served the following charges in the old East Texas Conference: Henderson Circuit; Sabine Pass and Port Arthur; Jasper; Lindale; from Jasper he entered Southwestern University as a student, then after two years he was appointed to Hutto and Round Rock, in the Central Texas Conference; to Rogers; Holland; Seventh Street, Temple; Alvarado; Gorman; Strawn. During his closing year at Strawn on account of failing health he asked for and was granted the superannuate relation and moved with his family to San Antonio. After a year of rest and care he recovered his health sufficient to accept work as Assistant Educational Secretary of Y. M. C. A. at Kelly Field. The following year he was appointed Supply Pastor of Los Angeles Church, San Antonio. After serving this church a little more than three years his health failed again, and after another period of rest he did missionary work in and out of the city for some two years. For the next five years he operated a book exchange in the city, specializing in Bibles, Training School books, and other religious literature.

In 1933 he organized and promoted what was perhaps the outstanding work of his life; the Whosoever Mission, corner Matamoras and Pecos Streets. He felt he was going into the biggest job one could hope to have—the cleaning out of a city slum.

He laid a complete life on the altar of service and today there are men and women up and down the land telling the story of redeeming grace they experienced in the Whosoever Mission and many of these found shelter in his own home at various times.

The aroma of that great love he lavished so freely upon the church and its great work; upon the friendless and underprivileged; upon the man or woman who was deepest down in sin; upon little children; upon his family; upon every interest that concerned the great heart of God, will forever remain a most precious heritage.

His funeral service was held at Woodlawn Methodist Church by Brother R. F. Curl, pastor, assisted by Brother S. L. Batchelor, District Superintendent San Antonio District, and Brother John K. Beery, Superintendent Texas Mission Home and Training School. Besides a host of other friends, men, women and children from the Mission were present and stood in a body and sang, "What a Friend We Have in Jesus," and as these passed by to look once more upon his dear face some one in the audience remarked, "There go that many stars for his crown."

His body was laid to rest in the beautiful Roselawn Cemetery.

REV. ALFRED WALLACE WADDILL

Rev. Alfred Wallace Waddill was born in Fayette County, Texas, 1877, and moved with his parents at an early age to Levita, Coryell County, where he grew to manhood.

His father, Rev. Sam Waddill, was a local Methodist preacher of deep consecration and a passion for the salvation of men.

His mother, Rebecca Iazard Waddill, was of an outstanding family whose history included men and women of influence and leadership in many of the higher stations of life; and whose gentleness of spirit and sweet consecration, was an example which helped to lead all their children into a life of Christian service.

Brother Waddill inherited this gentleness of spirit, and with an early cultivation of the Christian graces added faith unshakable.

Joining the old Northwest Texas Conference in 1897, he began in the central part of the state, later serving in the farflung circuits of the Texas Panhandle for several years; subsequently to Chillicothe, Baird, Anson, Snyder, Stamford and Quanah, Texas; Monroe and Lake Charles, Louisiana; Malvern, Warren, De Witt and De Queen, Arkansas, during which time he served his church and Conference in many capacities. He always felt that this part of the world was home, so, when he realized that his work was drawing to a close, transferred to the Central Texas Conference near where he began. Retired from the active ministry in 1937 and established his home in Snyder.

He was married to Josie Taffinder of Levita, Coryell County, in 1898, who labored untiringly by his side until 1932, when she was called to her heavenly home. To this union was born four children: Alfred and Joe of Houston, Mrs. Reginald Baird of Stamford, and Hugh of Chicago.

He was married again in December, 1933, to Mrs. Cullen C. Higgins of Snyder, who, with his children, several grandchildren, and a group of brothers and sisters survive to mourn his loss. He died suddenly March 9, 1939. His pastor, Rev. I. A. Smith, S. H. Young, C. R. Hooten and M. W. Clark officiating in the funeral which was conducted at the Methodist church of which he had formerly been pastor, with interment in the Snyder cemetery. He has joined the church triumphant and entered into fellowship with the saints.

J. T. Gardner was elected Statistical Secretary, and G. Alfred Brown was elected Editor of the Journal.

Nominations—The Cabinet was authorized to nominate the membership of the Boards, Committees and Commission for the Conference.

Order of the Day—It was ordered that immediately after the organization of the Conference that the order of the day be to take the first ballot for delegates to the General Conference. It was also ordered that the time for adjournment be extended until the first ballot had been taken.

Nominations—J. M. Bond, the Secretary of the Cabinet, read the nominations of the Cabinet for the following Boards, Commissions and Committees: Board of Conference Claimants, Board of Education, Board of Hospitals and Homes, Board of Lay Activities, District Boards of Church Locations and Buildings, Board of Missions and Church Extension, Board of Trustees, Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, Commission on Evangelism, Conference Auditing Committee, and the District Committees on Qualifications of Local Preachers. These were elected. See list.

The Board of Ministerial Training and Committee on Investigation was nominated by Bishop Holt and elected. See list.

It was stated that Board of Deaconesses was optional, and was not deemed necessary in this Conference, and that the Town and Country Commission would be constituted by nominations from the various Boards. This completed the organization of Boards, Commissions and Committees.

Communications—Communications from the former conference were delivered by the Secretary into the hands of the convenors of the Boards.

Ballot—J. W. W. Shuler moved that the Conference vote for four delegates to the General Conference. After the rearrangement of the seating of the clerical and lay delegates, the ballots were spread. W. H. Cole led in prayer.

Personal Privilege—C. W. Irvin presented to Bishop Holt for the new Conference a gavel made from the wood of the old Waxahachie Methodist Church in which the old Northwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was organized by Bishop Marvin in 1866. Bishop Holt made fitting response.

Hour of Meeting—It was ordered that when we adjourn that we adjourn to meet again at 3:00 o'clock. All new Boards, Commissions, and Committees were requested to meet for organization at 2:30.

Committee for Standing Rules—E. B. Hawk moved the appointment of a committee to formulate the Standing Rules of the Conference. It was so ordered.

Adjournment—By vote the Conference adjourned with the benediction pronounced by E. R. Barcus.

FIRST DAY—FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Opening—Bishop Holt called the Conference to order at 3:00. A. J. Weeks led in prayer.

Assistant Secretaries—W. W. Ward nominated the following additions to his secretarial staff: M. B. Howell and G. Weldon Gatlin. They were elected.

Journal Committee—Upon nomination of the Secretary, R. W. Goodloe, W. H. Coleman, H. E. Stout, were elected as the committee to examine the Journal.

Results First Lay Ballot—The results of the first ballot for lay delegates to the General Conference were announced: 106 votes cast, 9 defective, 49 necessary for election. Hal H. Cherry was declared elected. The second ballot was spread.

Results First Clerical Ballot—Results of the first ballot for clerical delegates to the General Conference were announced: 226 votes cast, 114 necessary for election. J. N. R. Score was declared elected. The second ballot was spread.

Hospital—Bishop Boaz presented Dr. Charles H. Harris who read a detailed report concerning the work of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital. The report was referred to the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

Results Second Lay Ballot—The results of the second ballot for lay delegates to the General Conference were announced: 86 votes cast, 2 defective, 43 votes necessary for election. Boyce Martin and Nat Harris were declared elected. The third ballot was spread.

Results Second Clerical Ballot—Dr. Eugene B. Hawk was declared elected as the result of the second ballot for clerical delegates to the General Conference. The third ballot was spread.

Education—C. H. Sisserson read Report No. 1 of the Board of Education, reporting the organization, which was received.

Greeting—S. A. Barnes moved that the conference request the Bishop to appoint a representative to go before annual conference of the Colored

Methodist Church which is in session in Fort Worth to convey our greetings. It was so ordered.

Devotions—Dr. Frederick F. Shannon brought a splendid devotional message to the Conference.

Results Third Lay Ballot—The results of the third ballot for lay delegates to the General Conference were announced. Ninety-two votes cast, 3 defective, 47 necessary for election. There was no election. The fourth ballot was spread.

Results Third Clerical Ballot—The results of the third ballot for clerical delegates to the General Conference were announced: 200 votes cast, 4 defective, 99 necessary for election. There was no election.

Conference Treasurer—Upon motion of E. B. Hawk, Leake Ayres was elected Conference Treasurer.

Introductions—The following were presented to the Conference; B. L. Pool, Texas Conference; A. T. Shirkey, Southwest Texas Conference; J. W. Simmons, transfer from the Maine Conference; C. A. Sutton, from the Texas Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church.

Committee on Rules—The Bishop appointed the following committee to formulate the Standing Rules of the Conference: C. O. Shugart, Theodore Moberg, C. R. Gray, H. W. Williams, and C. A. Sutton.

Representative—T. Edgar Neal was appointed by Bishop Holt as the representative for the Conference to the Colored Methodist Church.

Church Extension—B. L. Pool spoke to the conference concerning the new legislation concerning the work of the former Board of Church Extension.

Visitor—Dr. A. J. Weeks, North Texas Conference, was presented and made a few remarks concerning the Advocate.

District Conferences—F. P. Culver moved that the conference order that District Conferences continue to be held in this Conference. It was so ordered.

Lay Delegates—W. H. Vanderpool moved that the election of lay delegates to the Annual Conference be on the annual basis. It was so ordered.

Results Fourth Lay Ballot—The results of the fourth ballot for lay delegates to the General Conference were announced. 77 votes cast, 2 defective, 38 necessary to elect. Mrs. Gid J. Bryan was declared elected. Ballots were spread for the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. By order of the conference the secretary opened the first ballot for lay delegates to the General Conference and read the results.

Physical Examination—The conference ordered that the matter of physical examination requirement for those desiring admission on trial or into full connection be referred to the Committee on Standing Rules.

Minimum Salary—It was moved by E. R. Stanford that the matter of minimum salary scale be referred to the Town and Country Commission. It was so referred.

Support of District Superintendents—After an explanation by Bishop Holt it was moved by J. W. W. Shuler that the conference continue for one year the plan of support of District Superintendents through the District Stewards. It was so ordered.

Conference Claimants—Attention of the Conference and of the Board of Conference Claimants was called to the new legislation affecting this work, as contained in the Discipline of 1939, Paragraphs 1313, 1314, and 1341.

Number of Districts—L. W. Seymour made the motion that the Conference have ten districts. W. W. Ward, W. M. Justice, E. R. Stanford, and T. H. Burton spoke to the motion. It was so ordered.

Results of Fourth Clerical Ballot—The results of the fourth ballot for clerical delegates to the General Conference were announced. 169 votes cast, 3 defective, 84 necessary for election. P. E. Riley was declared elected. Ballots were spread for one name.

Hour of Meeting—It was ordered that when we adjourn that we adjourn to meet in business session tonight at 7:30.

Public Worship—S. A. Barnes read the report of the Committee on Public Worship assigning the members of the Conference to preaching appointments for Sunday.

Evangelism—J. D. F. Williams read Report No. 1 of the Commission on Evangelism, reporting its organization.

Accepted Supplies—W. W. Ward read the report of the Committee on Accepted Supply Preachers, giving its officers as S. L. Culwell, Chairman, and Floyd W. Thrash, Secretary.

Results Lay Ballot—The results of the first ballot for lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference were announced. 65 votes cast, 10 defective, 28 necessary for election. E. J. White, J. R. Edwards, B. E. McGlamery, and Leake Ayres were declared elected.

Leave of Absence—Leave of absence was granted Brother Pittman.

Results Sixth Clerical Ballot—The results of the sixth ballot for clerical delegates to the General Conference were announced. 189 votes cast, 1 defective, 95 necessary for election. There was no election. Motion carried that another ballot be taken and reported at the night service.

Executive Ministerial Session—In keeping with the new Discipline an executive session of ministerial members of the Conference for the purpose of considering matters of conference relations was ordered, and the lay members were excused.

Readmission—Question 8, "Who are readmitted?" was called. Upon the approval of the Quarterly Conferences and of the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, Ivan Olden Donaldson and Robert Glenn Bergin were readmitted. The vote was taken by ballot.

Adjournment—The Conference session adjourned at 6:50 p. m.

FIRST DAY—FRIDAY NIGHT

Opening—Bishop Holt called the Conference to order at 7:40 Friday evening, November 10th, 1939. J. C. Oglesby led in prayer.

Report Second Lay Ballot—The Bishop announced the report of the second lay ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: 55 votes cast, 1 defective, 28 necessary for election. W. H. Gibbs and Mrs. B. B. Wedemeyer were declared elected.

Report Sixth Clerical Ballot—The results of the sixth ballot for clerical delegates to the General Conference were announced: 170 votes cast, 2 defective, 85 votes necessary for election. F. P. Culver was declared elected.

Alternates to Jurisdictional Conference—By vote it was ordered that there be elected three alternates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Secretary to Tellers—R. C. Edwards was elected secretary to the Clerical

Tellers in the place of C. H. Sisserson, resigned. J. Fred Patterson was appointed teller in the place of R. C. Edwards.

Missions—Dr. Elmer T. Clark, of the General Board of Missions, was presented and spoke on the program of The Methodist Advance, announcing the meeting for this Conference at Fort Worth on February 8th, 1940. He also reported concerning our missionary work in the war areas of Europe.

Privilege—J. N. R. Score requested general privilege for S. A. Barnes. Dr. Barnes, with fitting words, presented Mrs. Ivan Lee Holt to the Conference.

Report First Lay Ballot—The Bishop reported the results of the first ballot for lay alternates to the Jurisdictional Conference: 33 votes were necessary for election. G. L. Robertson, Bruce Neely, and Judge Ballard George were declared elected.

Hours of Adjournment and Meeting—J. N. R. Score offered the motion that the Conference adjourn after taking another ballot for clerical delegates. And when we adjourn that we adjourn to meet in the morning at 10:30.

Budget Commission—C. O. Shugart moved the election of Hubert Smith to the Budget Commission in the place of F. L. Turner, transferred.

Superannuate Homes—Bishop Holt requested P. E. Riley as one of the trustees of the superannuate homes to bring a statement to the Conference for action in regard to ownership of the Homes.

Southern Methodist University—Dean Eugene B. Hawk addressed the Conference concerning the work of Southern Methodist University.

Southwestern University—Dr. J. W. Bergin, President of Southwestern University, told of the progress of the University during the last four years and of the plans for the 100th anniversary of the institution.

Result First Clerical Ballot—The result of the first ballot for clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was announced: 153 votes cast, 9 defective, 73 necessary for election. R. W. Goodloe was declared elected. The ballots were cast the second time.

Adjournment—After announcements, the Conference adjourned with the benediction pronounced by J. L. Davenport.

SECOND DAY—SATURDAY MORNING

Opening—Bishop Holt called the Conference to order at 10:40 a. m. Saturday morning, November 11th, 1939.

Lay Activities—B. E. McGlamery read the report of the Board of Lay Activities. It was adopted.

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities submits herewith its annual report:

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Stewardship

The study, practice and promotion of Christian Stewardship are essential to the highest individual holiness as well as to the fullest realization of the mission of the Church. Stewardship is primarily spiritual. Suitable acknowledgment of our Stewardship can be made only as we set aside for God's service such measure of time, possessions, and vital energies as a scripturally enlightened judgment demands.

In order that this may be done we want to suggest the holding of Stewardship Conferences and Institutes throughout the church. We urge the

free distribution of literature relating to Stewardship, and in spite of the many calls made on our pastors for sermons on special subjects, we want to urge occasional sermons on this theme. So important is this matter that the General Board of Lay Activities has chosen Stewardship as the theme for the Laymen's Day program for next year.

Our Financial Program

Studies recently made of our financial systems as used in the local churches show some marked improvements in methods being used to finance the local budget. In spite of this fact there are still far too many places where hit-or-miss, haphazard methods are being used in caring for the financial needs of the church. We want once again to say that we feel that no church program can be adequately financed which does not include the following activities: 1—Regular weekly offerings on the part of every church member as an act of worship. 2—A thorough annual every-member canvass, asking some contribution from each member. 3—A careful follow-up during the year of the pledges made and an honest effort to balance the budget monthly.

We further believe the above program cannot be carried out in the local church without some very definite training of church officials and we recommend that training classes, where such information may be had, be conducted by each large church and by groups of smaller churches. We want particularly to lay this responsibility on the charge lay leaders in each church.

Benevolences

"Methodism's greatness and glory have been her passion for a world redemption." The benevolences are the concrete expression of this inner spirit and program of work. They represent a united cooperative effort of every Methodist man, woman and child to bring the world under the dominion of the spirit of Christ. Such being true, we again recommend such a program of education in each church as will acquaint its membership with the purposes for which the benevolent askings are made. We want to further recommend the full acceptance of the askings as made by the Conference, and urge the payment of not less than one half of the amount accepted by session of the District Conference or at the end of the half year.

Evangelism

We want once again to place emphasis on the subject of Evangelism, the major task of the Church. We urge the pastors and laymen to continue the program of personal evangelism as recommended by the General Conference at Birmingham in 1938. We pledge the cooperation of the Conference Board of Lay Activities toward the end that this may be a year of widespread evangelistic effort. We think our pastors should continue to make use of committees on Personal Evangelism and believe that there should be in every church a group of laymen working side by side with the pastor in winning souls for the Kingdom.

Lay Speaking and Laymen's Day

We believe that the experience of the past several years has thoroughly demonstrated usefulness of lay speakers in putting over any church program and we want to urge the continued use of such speakers wherever the opportunity affords. We feel sure that if our laymen are given an opportunity to discuss with the church membership the several causes for which the benevolent askings are made that there will be a more ready response to the needs of the church as revealed in the Benevolent Program.

The observance of Laymen's Day has become so well fixed as a part of the yearly program of the church that it seems hardly necessary to again call the matter to your attention; but we believe that since the theme of Stewardship is to be our subject this coming year that it would be wise to urge pastors and laymen throughout the church to universally observe the day, second Sunday in June, or as close thereto as is convenient. Let it be

a real laymen's day in which you use as many of the laymen in each church as possible.

Conference Lay Leader—The Board of Lay Activities nominated Hal H. Cherry as Conference Lay Leader. He was elected, answering Question 50.

Results Second Clerical Ballot—The results of the second ballot for clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference were announced. 189 votes were cast, 2 defective, and 94 necessary for election. C. A. Sutton, Roy A. Langston, W. W. Ward, and S. A. Barnes were declared elected. Ballots were spread for one delegate.

Southwestern Advocate—Dr. A. J. Weeks addressed the Conference concerning the Southwestern Advocate and the Church papers.

Texas Methodist Foundation—By vote J. C. Oglesby and Boyce Martin were re-elected as the members from this Conference to the Texas Methodist Foundation.

Program Committee—Bishop Holt announced that the Program Committee, consisting of R. W. Goodloe, C. R. Gray and Hayden Edwards, had prepared the Book of Worship. Upon motion it was ordered that they be continued as the Committee for next year.

Worship Service—At 11:00 the Conference paused for worship service. The second noonday service in the Book of Worship was used. Bishop Holt spoke on the Duty of Christians in a World of War.

Missionary Society—Mrs. Gid J. Bryan, President of the Central Texas Conference Woman's Missionary Society was presented to the Conference and given opportunity to represent her work.

Results Third Clerical Ballot—The results of the third clerical ballot to the Jurisdictional Conference were announced. 218 votes cast, 110 votes necessary for election. There was no election. Ballots were again spread.

Conference Entertainment—W. H. Vanderpool read a resolution on Conference Entertainment. J. I. Patterson moved that the resolution be considered, paragraph by paragraph. The resolution was read and adopted, paragraph by paragraph, and then as a whole. This answered Question 51, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas.

FUTURE CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

Whereas, The Central Texas Conference is now composed of the former Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and portions of the Texas Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church and of the Southern Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, and

Since, The new law providing for a lay delegate from each pastoral charge is now in effect, and the present membership of the Central Texas Conference, clerical and lay, is now in excess of five hundred (500) members, and

In View of the Fact, That the Bishop and his Cabinet had difficulty in finding a place where the conference might be entertained this year, and since it is our judgment that it will be difficult for the conference to be entertained in the years to come in any of our smaller towns and cities,

Therefore, Be It Resolved

1. That the Central Texas Conference designate First Church, Fort Worth, as the permanent meeting place for the Conference;

2. That an assessment sufficient to pay a per diem of two dollars (\$2.00) to every preacher receiving less than \$1,500 per year salary and every lay delegate from charges paying less than \$1,500 a year preacher's salary be

levied by the Budget Commission of the Conference, and distributed in the usual fashion to all of the churches in the Conference, Providing, That the provision of this paragraph shall not make any ministerial or lay delegates in the Fort Worth District the beneficiary of this fund.

3. That all ministers and lay delegates from churches paying more than \$1,500 per year pastor's salary be asked to make their own arrangement for entertainment and that the Conference hereby requests the churches involved to take steps to pay the expenses of their pastor and delegates on the per diem basis given above.

4. It is our understanding that First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, will undertake to provide full entertainment for the Superannuated preachers at our Conference sessions without cost to the Conference.

Education—C. H. Sisserson read Report No. 2 of the Board of Education. J. N. R. Score spoke to the report. It was adopted.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 2

Whereas, For a number of years there has been a growing interest and participation in religious camps for young people, conducted under the auspices of the Conference Board of Education, and

Whereas, The camp sites used for this purpose have been rented at a cost of above \$500.00 per year, and

Whereas, the camp sites have not been specifically arranged and equipped for the type of work carried on in these religious camps, and

Whereas, A suitable camp site at Glen Rose, Texas, can be purchased from Mr. Jess B. Alford of Paris, Texas, for the sum of \$6,000.00, payable \$500.00 cash and notes for \$5,500.00, bearing 5 per cent interest from date, and payable \$500.00 per year, plus the accrued interest, and

Whereas, After full investigation of the property and the terms of purchase, the Conference Board of Education unanimously approved such purchase.

Therefore, Be It Resolved That, This Conference authorize the Conference Board of Education to purchase the Glen Rose camp site offered us by Mr. Jess B. Alford, and to nominate to the Conference for confirmation nine trustees of said property.

Results Fourth Clerical Ballot—The results of the fourth ballot for clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference were announced. 218 votes were cast, 110 necessary for election. There was no election.

Extension of Time—The time for adjournment was extended until 1:00 p. m.

Presentation—J. N. R. Score presented Hon. Fritz Lanham, Member of Congress, to the Conference. Mr. Lanham extended greetings.

Educational Interests—The educational interests were represented as follows: Texas Wesleyan College, by Theo Moberg; Weatherford College, by G. C. Boswell; Westminster College, by C. A. Sutton; McMurry College, by F. L. Turner; Texas Wesley Foundation, by Glenn Flynn; the Youth Crusade, by Leon Mathis.

Results Fifth Clerical Ballot—The results of the fifth ballot for clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference were announced: 197 cast, 99 necessary for election. T. Edgar Neal was declared elected.

Orphanage—Hubert Johnson spoke concerning the work of the Methodist Home at Waco. Upon motion of R. Otis Sory it was ordered that the proposed changes in the By-Laws of the Trustees of the Orphanage, previously approved by the other four Texas Conferences, be approved without reading.

RESOLUTION ADOPTING AMENDED BY-LAWS OF THE METHODIST ORPHANAGE AT WACO, TEXAS

Whereas, The Central Texas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, is one of the patronizing Conferences in the ownership, control and management of The Methodist Orphanage of Waco, Texas, and as such patronizing Conference is represented on the Board of Directors by two members of said Board, duly elected by this Conference; and,

Whereas, The present By-Laws and rules for the governing of said Methodist Orphanage have not been changed or revised for a number of years, and in the opinion of the present Board of Directors of said Institution and its officers, it would be to the best interest of said Institution to have a revision in said By-Laws; and,

Whereas, Said institution is incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas, and holds a Charter from the State and by the provisions of said Charter and the Laws of the State of Texas, the authority to amend and alter the By-Laws of said Institution is given entirely to the patronizing Conferences, and such By-Laws cannot be altered or amended by any other authority; Therefore, be it

Resolved by The Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church, at its regular session held in the City of Fort Worth, Texas, on the 11th day of November, 1939, That the following be the amended and present existing By-Laws for the management and control of The Methodist Orphanage at Waco, Texas, to-wit:

BY-LAWS OF THE METHODIST ORPHANAGE OF WACO, TEXAS

Article I.

This corporation shall be owned and controlled by the following patronizing Conferences of The Methodist Church, to-wit: The Texas Conference, North Texas Conference, Northwest Texas Conference, Central Texas Conference, Southwest Texas Conference, and New Mexico Conference, and such other Conferences as may be hereafter admitted.

Article II.

Should any of the patronizing Conferences at any time, desire to withdraw as such, then such patronizing Conference shall cease to have any interest or control in the affairs of this corporation and cease to elect representatives as members of the Board of Directors. Should any additional Conferences desire to become patronizing Conferences, they may become such by making application, provided a majority of the Board of Directors shall vote to accept such Conferences.

Article III.

The business affairs of this corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors elected as follows, to-wit:

Each of the patronizing Annual Conferences shall elect one minister and one layman for a term of three years and until their successors are elected, provided that, in the Annual Conference sessions of 1939, the following order shall be observed:

The North Texas and the Southwest Texas Conferences shall elect one minister and one layman each for a term of one year; the Central Texas and Northwest Texas Conferences shall elect one minister and one layman each for a term of two years; the New Mexico and Texas Conferences shall elect

one minister and one layman each for a term of three years; thereafter all elections by the Annual Conferences to be for a term of three years, thus providing for one-third of the board to be elected each year.

The Directors thus elected by the patronizing conferences shall constitute the Board of Directors of this Institution.

Should any patronizing Conference withdraw from this Institution, as is provided for in these By-Laws, then the representatives from such Conference shall cease to be Directors, and the affairs of the Institution shall be governed and managed by the remaining members of the Board.

Article IV.

The Board of Directors shall have and hold in trust, for The Methodist Church and the patronizing Conferences, all property in lands, houses, funds or of whatever character, belonging or appertaining to this Institution, whether obtained by donation, gift, bequest, purchase or otherwise; and said Directors shall use, control and manage the same in carrying out the purposes of this Institution as provided for in its Charter.

Article V.

The Directors shall meet annually in regular session, at its office in the City of Waco, Texas. The time of the annual meeting of the Board shall be fixed from year to year by the President, after consultation with the General Superintendent. The General Superintendent shall mail a notice of the annual meeting to each member of the Board at least two weeks prior to the date fixed for the meeting. The President shall call special meetings of the Board, upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee, at any time it is considered necessary and advisable, and the General Superintendent shall mail a notice of any special meeting to each member of the Board, at least one week prior to the date fixed for the meeting.

Article VI.

A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business.

Article VII.

The Officers of the Board shall be a President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer. The President and Vice President shall be elected by the Board at its regular annual meeting, and shall hold office for one year. The General Superintendent shall be ex-officio Secretary-Treasurer.

Article VIII.

The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board, see that the Minutes are duly authenticated and signed and cause due notice to be given to the members of the time and place of all meetings of the Board.

Article IX.

The Vice President shall discharge all duties of the President in the absence of that officer.

Article X.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep a faithful record of all meetings of the Board, and preserve the same in a well bound book which shall be kept in the office of the Orphanage in the care of the General Superintendent.

Article XI.

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Board which shall consist of the President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer, along with two other members of the Board to be chosen by the Board of Directors, annually. The Board shall have the right, if at any time it should deem it wise to do so, to select a local advisory committee, in such manner and under such conditions as may be determined by said Board, and such Advisory Committee shall serve at the will of said Board.

Article XII.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to advise with the General Superintendent, and to attend to any details in regard to the management of this Institution, not inconsistent with these By-Laws. Regular monthly meeting of the Executive Committee shall be held at the office of the Orphanage in Waco, Texas, and such special meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held as may be called by the President. Correct minutes of all the business transacted at all of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be carefully kept and entered of record, and a copy of such proceedings shall be mailed to each member of the Board by the General Superintendent, immediately after each session of such Executive Committee.

Article XIII.

The Board of Directors shall elect annually, a General Superintendent of this Institution who shall hold office at the will of the Board of Directors, and who at all times shall be under the direct control and supervision of said Board. The salary of the General Superintendent shall be fixed by the Board of Directors at its annual meeting, and shall be paid as directed by the Board.

Article XIV.

The General Superintendent shall have the immediate charge and management of the property and affairs of this Institution, and shall make written report to the Directors at their regular annual session, of all of the moneys and property received, and of the disposition of all moneys and property received, with such details in regard to the management of the affairs of this Institution as may be called for by the Board of Directors. In the interval between sessions of the full Board, the General Superintendent shall be subject to the orders and direction of the Executive Committee, and shall make a written report to the Executive Committee at each meeting thereof, when required by said Executive Committee.

Article XV.

The General Superintendent shall select and receive into this Institution, subject to the approval of the Directors, such white orphan children and such others as he may think deserving of the benefits of this Institution, and provide them with such maintenance, protection, care and education, as the means and resources of this Institution will justify.

Article XVI.

The General Superintendent shall have the right, and it is his duty, subject to the approval of the Board of Directors, to select any and all employees which he considers necessary for the proper management and operation of this institution. Such employees to be under the full control and supervision of the General Superintendent, and to continue such employment at his will. He shall have the right to fix the salaries of all such employees of this Institution, and to pay the same. The General Superintendent shall receive all moneys belonging to this Institution coming from gifts, donations or otherwise, and shall pay out said moneys under the general supervision of the Board as provided for herein. The Board shall require the General Superintendent to execute a bond with some good solvent bonding company as security, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties as General Superintendent and Treasurer of this Institution, which bond shall be in such an amount as is fixed by the Board of Directors, and shall be approved by the President of the Board.

Article XVII.

In the establishment, maintenance and operation of this Institution, neither the Board of Directors, nor the General Superintendent shall have any right or authority to involve the Methodist Church or any of the patronizing Conferences in any debt or financial obligation whatever. The General Superintendent shall not incur any debts or borrow any money on behalf of

this Institution unless he is authorized to do so, either by the Board or the Executive Committee.

Article XVIII.

These By-Laws are intended as the full and complete By-Laws of this Institution, and take the place of any and all By-Laws or Amendments thereto heretofore adopted, and shall become effective upon the approval of a majority of the patronizing Conferences, by action of said Conferences at their annual sessions; and any amendments or alterations in these By-Laws shall also be made by the consent and approval of a majority of said patronizing Conferences.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Conference as a patronizing Conference in the ownership, management and control of the affairs of said Institution, shall select at this session of the Conference two members of the Board of Directors of The Methodist Orphanage at Waco, Texas, consisting of one minister, and one layman, who shall hold office for two years and until their successors are elected, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the By-Laws of said Institution here adopted, shall become effective as the Amended By-Laws of said Institution when the same have been adopted by a majority of the present patronizing Conferences of said Institution, and the Secretary of the Conference is directed to notify the President of the Board of Directors of said Institution of the action of this Conference in regard to this Resolution.

The foregoing preamble and resolution was duly and regularly adopted by The Central Texas Conference, at its regular session held at Fort Worth, Texas, convening on the 10th day of November, 1939.

Secretary's Records—W. W. Ward read resolution concerning the records and documents held by the Secretary. It was adopted as follows:

Whereas, The records of the Annual Conference should be properly preserved for future and historical reference, together with other valuable papers and documents filed with the Secretary of the Annual Conference, and

Whereas, The Methodist Church, in its 1939 Discipline, requires certain forms for permanent records, which will require installment of a record system, and

Whereas, A movable and substantial cabinet is now needed for preserving current records.

Therefore Be It Resolved, First, that the Chair be instructed to appoint a committee of three to work with the Secretary and make a thorough examination of the needs and requirements for safely preserving the records of the Conference,

Second, that this committee make a report to the next Annual Conference of such needs and cost of same.

The Committee called for in this Resolution was appointed by the Bishop as follows: T. Edgar Neal, W. H. Coleman and W. H. Vanderpool.

Results First Clerical Ballot—The results of the first ballot for clerical alternates to the Jurisdictional Conference were announced: 161 votes cast, 3 defective, 80 necessary for election. C. W. Bergquist and L. L. Felder were declared elected.

Conference Claimants—Paxton Smith read the report of the Board of Conference Claimants. It was adopted.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

Your Board of Conference Claimants desires to submit its first report as follows: We are entering our work with sixty-seven retired ministers and ninety widows of preachers. Appropriations have been made from the Conference funds, subject to your approval, upon the basis of \$6.50 per year of service for retired ministers, and \$4.50 per year of service for widows of preachers. Ninety per cent of the funds received were distributed upon basis of years of service, according to Paragraph 1341 of the Discipline. Ten per cent of the Conference funds has been set aside as a reserve fund, from which relief of emergency and more necessitous cases, mortuary fees, and expenses of the Board will be paid. Application for such special help must be made to the executive committee consisting of the officers of the Board.

The Board was organized with the following officers: J. W. Sharbutt, chairman; Chet. C. Henson, vice-chairman; Paxton Smith, secretary-treasurer.

Our chairman, Rev. J. W. Sharbutt, was elected to meet with representatives of other Conference Boards of Conference Claimants of the South Central Jurisdiction at a meeting to be called early in 1940 by Dr. C. W. Tadlock, the executive secretary of the Missouri Corporation, of the Board of Pensions, for a discussion of methods, plans, and objectives and exchange of experience, his expenses to be met by the Board.

A memorial from the Upper Iowa Conference concerning its memorial to the coming General Conference to organize, coordinate and consolidate all the pension provisions and funds of all the annual Conferences as speedily as possible, was read and endorsed.

We respectfully call the attention of the Conference to Paragraph 1313, Sections 3 and 4 of the Discipline which directs that an annual service be held during the session of the Annual Conference for the promotion of the interests of Conference Claimants. Also that each pastor and congregation shall observe annually one Sunday in the interest of Conference Claimants, which shall be known as "Veterans' Day." We feel that both of these services should be held.

The financial statement of the former Conference Board of Finance of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was adopted and transferred to the credit of your Board of Conference Claimants. All funds disbursed will be from this account until after the meeting of the Distributing Committee of the three former churches.

We request the Budget Commission to apportion \$14,400.00 for the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital for the year 1939-1940.

ACTION PROPOSED FOR THE SEVERAL ANNUAL CONFERENCES OF THE METHODIST CHURCH RELATIVE TO CHURCH EXTENSION WORK

Whereas, Section 2 of the Report I of the Committee on Enabling Acts, page 367 of The Daily Christian Advocate of the Uniting Conference, states that all Annual Conferences are to, "elect the Boards which the Discipline requires to act until their successors are elected following the Jurisdictional Conferences, to adopt the programs and plans of service for its Boards;" and,

Whereas, All the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, except the Arizona and Northwest Conferences have loan funds which under the Constitution of the Board of Church Extension, paragraph 507 of the 1938 Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are to be administered by the General Board of Church Extension, the Conference Boards having the right of appropriation; and,

Whereas, It will be necessary for the Annual Conferences to take action authorizing the Board of Missions and Church Extension to approve applica-

tions from churches within the Conference to the General Board and do all the work heretofore done by the Conference Board of Church Extension as auxiliary to the General Board; and,

Whereas, the Constitution of the Board of Mission and Church Extension adopted by the Uniting Conference, paragraph 855, Article 6, provides for the Section of Church Extension as a part of the Division of Home Missions and Church Extension; and,

Whereas, The Section of Church Extension of the Board of Missions and Church Extension is to administer the work of Church Extension in The Methodist Church; therefore, be it

Resolved: 1. That the Central Texas Annual Conference does hereby instruct its Board of Missions and Church Extension to name certain members of said Board as a Section of Church Extension;

2. That the Section of Church Extension be and it is hereby authorized by the Central Texas Annual Conference to perform all the functions formerly exercised by the Annual Conference Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as set out in paragraphs 506 and 507 of the 1938 Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Evening Session—An evening session for ordination of deacons and elders and for further business was ordered to convene at 7:30.

Publishing House—R. A. White represented the Publishing House and its book display.

Colored M. E. Church—T. Edgar Neal reported his visit to the annual conference of the Colored Methodist Church. C. C. Neal of the Colored Methodist Church spoke concerning the work of Texas College at Tyler. An offering of approximately \$26.00 was taken for this work.

Adjournment—The session adjourned at 1:30.

SECOND DAY—SATURDAY EVENING

The Service of Commemoration—The Conference was called to order at 7:30 Saturday evening with Dr. M. K. Little in the chair.

The Service of Commemoration in the Book of Worship was conducted by Bishop Holt.

Local preachers, Luther Allen Hill, Estill Allen, Jr., and Hubert Harold Barnett. This answered Question 18.

BOARD OF EDUCATION—REPORT NO. 3

The Board is happy to welcome Westminster College into its institutional family and know they will contribute greatly to the educational program of our Conference. All our educational institutions have reported progress for the fiscal year.

In accordance with the request of the Wesley Foundation, we are designating the first two weeks in April as A. & M. Church Weeks. We recommend that this Conference pledge its continued cooperation in the efforts of the Wesley Foundation in raising money throughout the church for this important work.

Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise

No finer way has been found to grow a missionary-minded church than that of the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise. We would urge that every church in the Conference make this a regular part of its missionary education of the entire membership of the church.

Church School Day

Church School Day can be made a vital religious service in the local church. Only a small per cent of our Church Schools are making contributions for this purpose, but a very much larger number than that are observing the day and receiving its spiritual values.

In compliance with the action of the Uniting Conference, we place in nomination the names of Dr. J. N. R. Score and Hal H. Cherry to be members of the Jurisdictional Board of Education.

Rules—C. R. Gray read the report of the Committee on Rules. It was considered rule by rule and adopted as a whole.

CONFERENCE RULES

1. In addition to the exofficio members of the District Conference, each church is entitled to one delegate for every 100 members, or two-thirds fraction thereof to be elected by the Church Conference, provided that every church shall have at least one delegate.
2. The District Superintendents are a standing committee to nominate all the boards and regular standing committees and tellers at each session of the Conference.
3. On nomination of the Secretary the Conference shall elect a Statistical Secretary and an Assistant Statistical Secretary who shall serve until the opening of the next succeeding Conference. The Conference shall also elect

upon nomination of the Statistical Secretary two Assistant Statistical Secretaries for each of the several districts. It shall be the duty of the District Assistant Statistical Secretaries to collect the statistical reports from the preachers in charge within the several districts and see that such reports are properly edited, properly entered upon the sheets provided for that purpose and to turn the finished sheets over to the Statistical Secretary by the evening of the second day of the Conference session.

4. The Chairman of the Conference Board of Ministerial Training shall make a written report to be filed with the Secretary of the Conference, concerning each one admitted to the Conference. This report shall embrace: Full name, name of parents; date and place of birth, conversion and license to preach; date of marriage; name of wife, and such other facts of his life as may be deemed important.

5. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the district superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.

6. The Conference Commission on Budget shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special apportionments to be levied upon the churches, unless such new or special apportionments shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the Methodist Church or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so intrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust had been executed and how.

7. The Conference Commission on Budget in its report shall give the contrasts between the several apportionments for the present year and the proposed apportionments for the ensuing year so that the Conference can act on the report with clear knowledge. It shall be the duty of the Commission to furnish the "Table of Apportionments" for the ensuing year arriving at the scale for the districts by finding what per cent the total church membership in the individual district is of the grand total church membership in the Conference, and by finding what per cent the total salaries in the district are of the grand total of salaries paid in the Conference, and then dividing the sum of these two decimals by 2.

8. All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports, except the statistical reports, coming before the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk, the original copy to be retained by the Secretary in the archives, one duplicate to be furnished the Advocate, and one duplicate to be furnished the editor of the Central Texas Conference Journal.

9. Each preacher in charge shall, on the first morning of the Conference session, hand his complete statistical report to one of the Assistant Statistical Secretaries for the district in which his charge is situated.

10. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference work an amount sufficient to meet the expense of printing the Minutes and also provide for the Treasurer's bond and the necessary expense of the Conference Secretary.

11. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said board. The vacancy may be filled by nomination of the board and election by the Conference.

12. The names of the lay delegates and alternate lay delegates from each church shall be certified by the District Superintendent to the Secretary of the Annual Conference not later than thirty days before the convening of the Annual Conference.

13. No person shall be a member of a Conference Board if he is in the salaried employ of that board or of an institution which derives financial support from said board.

14. It shall require a two-thirds vote to suspend any of these rules.

C. R. Gray moved the appointment of a Committee on Rules to report to the next Annual Conference. It was adopted. The Bishop reappointed the same committee: C. O. Shugart, C. R. Gray, H. W. Williams, C. A. Sutton, and Theodore Moberg.

Ministerial Training—C. W. Bergquist reported the organization of the Committee on Ministerial Training. It was received.
