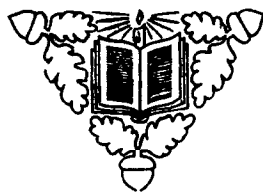

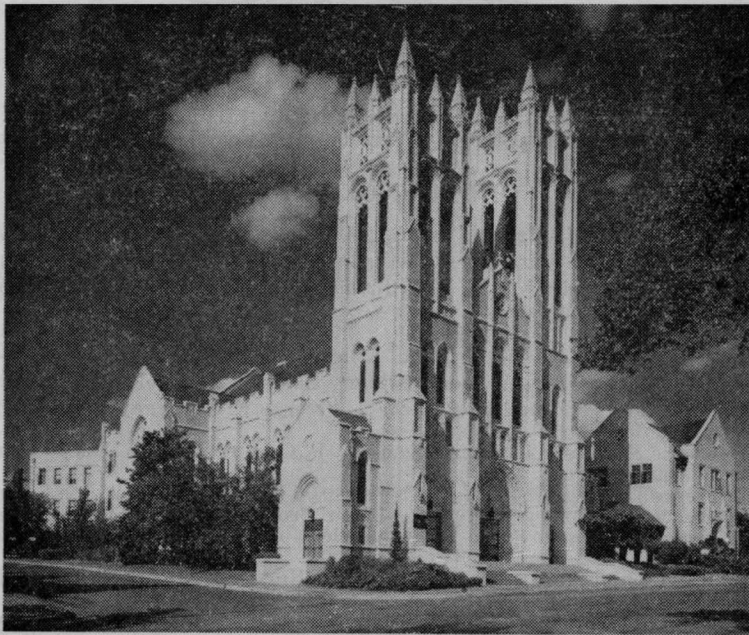

DAILY PROCEEDINGS**Opening Session—Tuesday, October 30th, 1945**

Opening—The Central Texas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church met in its eightieth session (the thirtieth since the division of the old Northwest Texas Conference and the seventh since unification) at 7:30 o'clock, Tuesday evening, October 30th, 1945, in First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, with Bishop A. Frank Smith, D.D., LL.D., in the chair.

Worship Service—A printed order of worship for the evening services of the Conference was distributed. Dr. Warren Johnston, the pastor-host, announced the hymn, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing." The Chancel Choir of the church sang the anthem. Rev. W. H. Cole led the congregation in the responsive scripture (hymnal selection, entitled, "The Armor of God"). Dr. Chet C. Henson read the scripture lesson, Isaiah 6:1-6. Dr. P. E. Riley led in prayer, concluding with the Lord's Prayer, the congregation uniting.

Organization—Bishop Smith called the Conference to order. W. W. Ward, the Secretary of the last session of the annual conference, was elected Secretary for this session. Upon his nomination, J. D. F. Williams, Journal; H. M. Hopkins, Conference Business; Fred G. Benkley, Reports; Roy L. Felder, Roll; W. L. Hankla, Press; G. Alfred Brown, Editor of the Journal; C. C. Sessions, Assistant Editor of the Journal, and W. V. Bane, Statistical Secretary, were elected to their respective places.

Roll Call—The roll call was completed by the distribution of registration cards to clerical and lay members of the Conference (See Roll.)

Nominations—W. W. Ward, as Secretary of the Cabinet, read the nominations for vacancies on Boards and Committees, and the names of the Standing Committees. These were elected. (See List.)

Rules of Meeting—Upon the motion of Warren Johnston, pastor-host, the bar of the conference was set as the lower floor of the sanctuary. The hours of meeting were set at 8:30 for the morning devotional and 9:00 for the conference business session, with adjournment at 12:30.

Board of Education—C. H. Sisserson read Report No. 1 of the Board of Education, filling certain vacancies. (See Boards.)

Announcements—Various announcements of meetings of Boards, Committees and other groups were made.

Preaching Service—After the singing of the hymn, "Lead On, O King, Eternal," Bishop Smith introduced Dr. Albert Edward Day, of the Board of Evangelism, who brought the sermon of the hour.

Adjournment—After the sermon, the Conference sang, "God of Grace and God of Glory," and Bishop Smith pronounced the benediction.

Second Session—Wednesday Morning, October 31st, 1945

Opening—The Conference was called to order at 9:00 o'clock by Bishop Smith. Hayden Edwards led in the singing of the hymn, "Come, Thou Fount."

Committee on Minutes—The Secretary nominated R. W. Goodloe and Oran Stephens as the Committee on Minutes. They were elected.

Conference Relations—J. W. Chisholm and W. H. Steinman, under doctors' certificates, were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the retired relation. George W. Davis, by age limitation, and D. K. Porter, by personal request, were also referred for the same relation.

Conference Entertainment—Cecil Taylor read a motion, waiving the Standing Rules and changing the per diem for this session of the Conference. The motion was adopted. (See Reports.)

Leave of Absence—On the request of W. H. Cole, leave of absence to attend a funeral was granted E. H. Lightfoot, and on the request of A. S. Gafford leave was also granted to W. R. Beaird.

Ministerial Qualifications—E. R. Gordon reported for the Committee on Ministerial Qualifications that no complaints had been filed with the Committee and the Bishop announced that the character of every clerical member of the Conference was passed.

Conference Claimants—Lloyd Sanders read Report No. 1 of the Board of Conference Claimants. It was adopted. (See Reports.)

Planning Committee—W. W. Ward moved that the Bishop be empowered to appoint a committee of five to serve as a "Planning Committee" looking forward to pre-conference sessions of the Conference Boards and Committees that their major work may be organized to be presented in mimeographed or printed form and sent to the members and delegates to the conference upon the convening of the Conference.

Lay Activities—B. E. McGlammery read Report No. 1 of the Board of Lay Activities, nominating Hal H. Cherry as Conference Lay Leader. Mr. Cherry was elected.

Mr. McGlammery read Report No. 2 of the Board of Lay Activities which was adopted. (See Reports.)

Mount Sequoyah—Rev. Sam Yancey, the Superintendent of the Western Methodist Assembly, at Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Ark., was presented and reported to the conference on the plans and activities of the Assembly.

Jurisdictional Work—Rev. Paul D. Womeldorf, the Executive Secretary of the South Central Jurisdiction, was presented and spoke concerning coming events of the Jurisdiction.

Abandonment—W. H. Cole moved that the Okra church be declared abandoned. This was adopted. He then moved that the Conference Board of Trustees be requested to attach this property to the Carbon Quarterly Conference. Upon further information that the Conference Board of Trustees of this Conference had not been completely organized, the Bishop ruled that the Conference was competent to take action upon this matter. It was ordered that the Okra church property be attached to the Carbon Quarterly Conference.

Undergraduates—Ross G. Smith, the Chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations, and E. R. Gordon, the chairman of the Committee on Ministerial Qualifications reported that they were ready to pass the report on the undergraduates.

First Year Class—Marvin C. Bledsoe, J. Alvis Cooley, Roy L. Felder, Frank L. Turner, Jr., Derward O. Deaver, Ervin M. Gathings, Nicholas H. Kupferle, Jr., Billy Rhodes Martin, James A. Williamson, and Earl Sumner Yokley had completed their studies and they were advanced to the Class of the Second Year.

Hollis Shook and Chas. P. Godbey were retained in the Class of the First Year.

Third Year Class—Hubert H. Barnett, Glenn C. Bowman, Paul K. Deats, Jr. (Elder) Thomas B. Granger, Wm. M. Greenwaldt (Elder), and

Lewis E. Tucker had completed their studies and were advanced to the Class of the Fourth Year.

It was announced by the Secretary that the record printed in the Journal of last year that Kester M. Hearne was transferred to the Louisiana Conference was in error. He is still a member of this conference. Being in the Chaplaincy and not before the Committee, he was continued in the Class of the Third Year.

Leon C. Matthis, a Chaplain, was continued in the Class of the Third Year for the second time.

Vernon Grant White had not completed his course of study and was continued in the Class of the Third Year.

Fourth Year Class—John B. Holt (an elder) and Clarence W. Canafax (an elder) had completed their course of study in the Class of the Fourth Year.

Second Year Class—John James Norris, Plez Todd, and Robert Welcome Walker had completed the studies and were elected to Deacons' Orders. Lowell R. Rogers (a deacon) had also completed his studies. These were passed to the Class of the Third Year.

Deacons' Orders—J. Alvis Cooley and Charles Perry Godbey were elected to Deacon's Orders under the Seminary rule.

Richard Fisher Blanton, Franklin Taylor Fisher, and Ethelbert Peyton Goodman were elected to Deacons' Orders under the Local Deacon rule.

Admission on Trial—By vote the following were admitted on trial: Kenneth J. Cooper, Brownwood District, Gilbert Ferrell from the Fort Worth District, John Watts Lindsay and John Nelson Russell Score II from the Georgetown District, Robert Bruce Weaver from the Waco District, John Barcus Moore and Harvey Griffith Williamson from the Weatherford District.

Southwestern University—Dr. J. N. R. Score, President of Southwestern University, distributed a printed report and spoke concerning the work of this Institution.

McMurry College—Dr. Harold G. Cooke, President of McMurry College, Abilene, presented the work of that institution.

Minimum Pastoral Support—J. N. R. Score read a report from the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, recommending certain amendments to the rules of this Commission. J. I. Patterson moved adoption of the report. It was adopted.

Dr. Score moved that the Editor of the Journal be instructed to print the standing rules of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support in accordance with the recommendations of the Commission and that the amended report be published in the Journal. It was so ordered.

Full Connection—Plez Todd, John James Norris, Lowell Randall Rogers, and Robert Welcome Walker were called to the bar of the conference. After answering satisfactorily the Disciplinary questions they were admitted by a vote of the clerical members of the conference into full connection.

Announcements—Various announcements of meeting were made.

Publishing House—R. S. Tate, the representative of the Publishing House, presented the Board of Conference Claimants for this conference with a check for \$5,587.34.

Visiting Bishops—Bishops Charles C. Selecman and Bishop H. A. Boaz were presented and brought words of greeting to the conference.

Sermon—The Conference sang "Faith of Our Fathers." Bishop Selecman offered prayer. Dr. Albert E. Day brought the second of his sermons.

Adjournment—The morning session adjourned with the Benediction.

Third Session—Wednesday Night, October 31st, 1945

Opening—Dean Eugene B. Hawk, of the Perkins School of Theology, S. M. U., presided at the opening of the evening session on Wednesday. After the singing of a hymn, Finis A. Crutchfield offered prayer.

The Seminary Singers, under the direction of Prof. Fred Gealy, brought a special message in song.

Dr. Albert E. Day then brought the fourth in his series of sermons. After the sermon the Conference sang stanzas of the hymns, "Down in the Human Heart," and "Let the Lower Lights Be Burning."

Call to Order—Bishop Smith called the session to order and spoke concerning the significance of ordination in the Church.

Minutes—Ross G. Smith, Chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations, moved that the action of the Conference in the morning session be rescinded and all references to action concerning Wilford Marshall Provo be stricken from the record. It was so ordered.

Recognition of Orders and Admission on Trial—Ross G. Smith moved that the ordination of Wilford Marshall Provo in the Baptist Church be recognized and that he be received on Trial in the Conference in the Class of the First Year as a Deacon. It was so ordered.

Recognition of Orders—Ross G. Smith also moved that the ordination of Erwin Wolford Holt in the Baptist Church be recognized as a local deacon in The Methodist Church. It was so ordered.

Ordination of Deacons—John James Norris, Plez Todd, Robert Welcome Walker, Joseph Alvis Cooley, Franklin Taylor Fisher, and Ethelbert Peyton Goodman were ordained Deacons. Wilford Marshall Provo took the ordination vows. The Secretary presented the ordination parchments.

Adjournment—After the singing of the Doxology, the session adjourned with the Benediction pronounced by Bishop Boaz.

Fourth Session—Thursday Morning, November 1st, 1945

Opening—Bishop Smith called the Conference to order Thursday morning at 9:00 o'clock.

Minutes—R. W. Goodloe reported that the Committee had read the minutes of the preceding sessions and that they were approved.

Leave of Absence—Without objection, leaves of absence were granted to B. F. Jackson, Jr., Paul K. Deats, Jr., D. R. McCauley, and Marvin Bledsoe.

Time of Annual Conference—W. W. Ward moved that the Bishop be empowered to appoint a committee of three to meet with similar committees from the other Annual Conferences of Texas to consider the time of the annual conference sessions and to report back to the next annual conference. It was so ordered. The Bishop appointed P. E. Riley, W. W. Ward, and Hal H. Cherry as the Committee.

Brotherhood—J. D. F. Williams, Secretary-Treasurer of the Central Texas Division of the Methodist Ministers United Brotherhood, made a report concerning the activities of the Brotherhood and solicited others to become members.

Re-Admission—W. W. Ward presented the name of J. E. Watkins to be presented to the Committee on Conference Relations for re-admission and then for the retired relation. It was referred.

Sugar Loaf Property—Geo. W. French made a final report concerning the disposition of the Sugar Loaf Church property as purchased by the U. S. government. The report was received. (See Reports.)

S. M. U.—Dean Eugene B. Hawk, of the Perkins School of Theology, S. M. U., addressed the conference concerning the work and future plans of that institution.

United Texas Drys—Dr. W. H. McKenzie, the Executive Secretary of the United Texas Drys, addressed the conference on the work of this organization.

T. W. C.—Dr. Law Sone, President of Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, presented a report of the work of this college to the conference.

Hospitals and Homes—L. L. Felder read Report No. 1 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. It was adopted. (See Reports.)

Order of the Day—Hubert C. Smith moved that the order of the day for Friday morning at 9:45 be set to hear the Report No. 2 of the Board of Education. It was so ordered.

Board of Missions and Church Extension—W. N. Dunson read Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Chair—Bishop Smith requested Bishop H. A. Boaz to occupy the Chair.

Board of Missions and Church Extension—Warren Johnston, the President of the Board, spoke to the report and presented Mrs. C. W. Meyer, who this year purchased \$58,000 Annuity Bonds from the General Board of Missions, the proceeds of which is to be used for foreign missionary projects.

J. I. Patterson, W. N. Dunson, G. Alfred Brown and R. J. LaPrade spoke to the report. J. I. Patterson moved that the report be amended by substituting the figures \$1,800 in the place of \$1,500. The amendment lost. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

G. Alfred Brown, the President of the Church Extension Section of the Board, read Report No. 2. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Warren Johnston requested permission for the Board to attach the list of appropriations to the report at the close of the conference. Permission was granted.

Personal Privilege—Bishop Smith presented Dr. A. W. Martin, the new professor at the Perkins School of Theology, who spoke briefly to the conference.

Bishop Smith called Rev. and Mrs. Durwood Fleming to the bar of the conference and announced that they were being transferred to the Texas Conference and would be assigned to River Oaks, Houston, a new congregation to be organized there.

The Secretary called attention that news had just been received of the death of a brother of Rev. T. S. Ogle. The Bishop extended sympathy on behalf of the conference to Brother Ogle and leave of absence was granted him.

Warren Johnston presented Mrs. A. Frank Smith to the conference.

J. B. Holt presented Rev. Charles Luttrick, the newly elected Conference Youth Director of the Board of Education.

Evangelism—Bishop Smith presented Warren Johnston, the Conference Director of the Crusade for Christ, for the order of the day. After the singing of the hymn, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name," Dr. Dawson Bryan, the Area Director, presented plans for the evangelistic phase of the Crusade.

Chair—Bishop Smith resumed the Chair.

Dr. Johnston requested E. F. Bohmfalk to lead the conference in singing "The Son of God Goes Forth to War." Dr. Kenneth Pope led in prayer.

Dr. Albert Day brought another stirring sermon, emphasizing the New Life Movement.

As a service of dedication was concluded with prayer by Bishop Smith, the session adjourned.

Fifth Session—Friday Morning, November 2nd, 1945

Opening—Bishop Smith called the Conference to order at 9:00 o'clock Friday morning, November 2nd, 1945:

Minutes—Oran Stephens reported that the minutes of the preceding session had been read and were approved.

Reports of District Superintendents—The reports for the work of the districts were made by A. S. Gafford for the Brownwood District, W. H. Cole for the Cisco District, C. H. Cole for the Cleburne District, Finis A. Crutchfield for the Corsicana District, W. W. Ward for the Fort Worth District, D. K. Porter for the Gatesville District, R. C. Edwards for the Georgetown District, Chet C. Henson for the Waco District, R. J. LaPrade for the Waxahachie District, and P. E. Riley for the Weatherford District. Each District Superintendent asked the preachers and laymen present from the district to stand.

Board of Education—Report No. 2 of the Board of Education was read by Hubert C. Smith.

J. B. Holt presented and spoke words of appreciation for the work done in the past by Mrs. C. W. Kent, Wm. M. Greenwaldt, and Carroll H. Thompson. Miss Moye Anne Bratton, the new Conference Director of Children's Work was presented.

The Executive Secretary stressed the expansion program of Glen Lake Camp, at Glen Rose, Texas. W. H. Cole told of the plans to build the John A. Siceloff Memorial Lodge as being sponsored by the Cisco District. A collection to aid in this project was taken.

F. L. Turner spoke to the memory of Brother Siceloff and made a personal gift of \$25.00 to the Memorial Lodge.

Hubert C. Smith and Glenn Flinn presented the plans for the campaign for the Wesley Foundation work. Report No. 2 was adopted. (See Reports.)

Hospitals and Homes—W. D. Smith, the chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital, Fort Worth, was introduced and spoke to the conference. Dr. Chas. H. Harris, the Director of the Hospital, read the annual report of the Hospital. Hayden Edwards, Golden Cross Commissioner, reported for his work. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Conference Planning Committee—The Bishop requested permission to add the names of the Cabinet to the Committee of five, authorized yesterday. He named as the Committee, the Cabinet, Mrs. Gid J. Bryan, Hubert C. Smith, Hal H. Cherry, Warren Johnston, and J. D. F. Williams.

Christian Advocate—Dr. Otto Nall, Managing Editor of the Christian Advocate, was presented and spoke concerning this paper.

Personal Privilege—The Bishop presented Rev. and Mrs. Jesue Gonzales, of the Mexican Methodist Church at Fort Worth.

Order of Conference Session—At the request of the Bishop, the final session of the conference was ordered to meet this afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

Board of Missions and Church Extension—W. N. Dunson read Report No. 3 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Ordination—The Secretary announced that the Bishop had ordained Richard Fisher Blanton a deacon last evening, and presented the parchment.

Auditing Committee—The Secretary of the Cabinet nominated Noel D. Patterson in the place of Geo. Greebon and C. A. McClinton in the place of Grady Mahew on the Auditing Committee. These were elected. (See List.)

Service of Commemoration—The Conference observed the Service of Commemoration. The Secretary called the names of the ministers who died during the year: G. W. Bounds, O. O. Odom, J. A. Siceloff, C. E. Simpson, G. R. Wright, and I. D. S. Lee. He also called the names of the wives of ministers who died during the year: Mrs. Ed. R. Barcus, Mrs. W. B. Wilson, Mrs. J. H. Sandstrom, Mrs. G. W. Kincheloe, Mrs. J. E. Walker, Mrs. L. A. Clark.

Dean Eugene B. Hawk brought the address of the hour.

After the singing of a hymn, the Conference session adjourned with the Benediction pronounced by the Bishop.

Sixth Session—Friday Afternoon, November 2nd, 1945

Opening—Bishop Smith called the session to order. The conference sang a hymn and the Bishop offered prayer.

Committee on Conference Claimants—Hubert C. Smith read Report No. 1 of the Special Committee of Support of Conference Claimants. This report was adopted. (See Reports.)

A second report of the Committee was read and a motion made that it be studied during the year and be voted upon at the next annual conference. P. E. Riley moved that the paper be referred back to the Committee for further study and another report be made at the next session of the Conference, and that an allotment for the expense of the Committee be allowed. The substitution carried, and the substitute motion was adopted.

Treasurer's Report—W. B. Rider, Conference Treasurer, read the report, which was received for record. (See Reports.)

Auditing Committee—J. Fred Patterson read the Report of the Auditing Committee, which was received for record. (See Reports.)

W. S. C. S.—Mrs. Gid J. Bryan reported on the work of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Hospitals and Homes—L. L. Felder read Report No. 2 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, which concerned the Methodist Home. Hubert John-

son, the Superintendent of the Home, addressed the conference on the work being done there.

Conference Relations—Ross G. Smith reported that the retired relationship has been recommended for J. W. Chisholm and for W. H. Steinman. The Bishop stated that the retirement of Geo. W. Davis and D. K. Porter were automatic. C. H. Cole reported on the condition of Brother Chisholm and R. C. Edwards on that of Brother Steinman.

D. K. Porter made a veiledictory address to the conference on the occasion of his retirement. J. I. Patterson moved that this address be printed in the Journal. It was so ordered.

Offering—A love-offering of appreciation and sincere affection was taken for the retiring brethren and for the conference Postmaster, R. W. Nation. (Offering, \$250.00.)

Siceloff Memorial—Wm. H. Cole reported that the offering made this morning for the Siceloff Memorial Lodge at Glen Lake Camp amounted to \$972.00.

TO THE CENTRAL TEXAS METHODIST ANNUAL CONFERENCE,
Assembled in First Methodist Church, Ft. Worth, Texas, October 30-
November 1st, 1945:

Dear Brethren:

I herewith submit my final report with reference to the Sugar Loaf-Killeen matter:

Your 1943 session authorized Bishop Holt or some one appointed by him to act for the Central Texas Conference in closing up the matter with the U. S. Government and the Methodist Church, relative to the Sugar Loaf church property. Due, I suppose, to the fact that I was the pastor at Killeen at the time the Government took possession of the property, and was supposed to be more familiar with all the issues involved, Bishop Holt duly designated me to act for him and you in arranging for a final settlement with the Government and to see that all funds so derived were used for new improvements at First Methodist Church, Killeen.

I am now ready to file with whatever agency you designate my final report, showing that the sum of \$1,850.00 was received from the Government and that it has been used as follows:

- (1) \$ 350.00 as a compromise to clear with the Federal Court
- (2) 47.75 for my personal expenses, and to Killeen Church
- (3) 1,452.25, making a grand total of

\$1,850.00; and for each of these items, I submit canceled check as vouchers.

Many people in non-Christian nations are learning to read, there is the urgency that the Word of God should be made available to them.

The Bible must be woven into the fabric of the new world if it is to endure in freedom and peace.

We join with the request of the American Bible Society that there be observed by all the Denominations a daily Bible reading period extending from Thanksgiving to Christmas.

We urge our Churches to meet the challenge of the world's dire need with a constantly increasing circulation of God's Holy Word.

We commend the use of The Methodist Church's literature in our church schools. We believe that greater use should be made of the numerous tracts and pamphlets now available on every phase of our work. We suggest that where possible church tracts be placed in bus stations and other public places.

We note with praise the excellent service rendered by the Woman's Society of Christian Service in the distribution of The Methodist Woman, The Upper Room, The World Outlook and much other good literature.

In this year of Evangelism we feel that a wider distribution of the Christian Advocate and the Southwestern Advocate would increase the Christian outlook and understanding of our people. We note with pleasure an increase of 844 more Christian Advocates this year than last year. We trust that the increase in 1945-46 may be much greater.

We call attention to and endorse the report of The Joint Board of Publications, Dr. P. E. Riley, chairman, in connection to the Southwestern Advocate. We recommend that we set our goal this year for 50,000 Southwestern Advocates rather than 15,000 as of this year, and that the month of November be observed as Advocate month. We wish to call attention to the fact that Dr. Whaling has asked that some person in each District be designated to send in news of District interest.

We recommend that the Bishop and his Cabinet appoint a Director of Christian Literature in each District.

We further suggest that a wide use be made of The New Life Magazine and all special literature in keeping with this important movement.

The Crusade for Christ

Emphasis will be continued on Church school enrollment and attendance, which we believe will show a slight increase in the Central Texas Conference this year.

The financial condition is also somewhat improved, although an increase in endowment must be had within the next few years.

Glen Lake

Some 1,400 young people attended camp at Glen Lake this past summer. Because of the lack of facilities many more were turned away. Permanent improvements are being made as funds are available. The past summer program again showed profit, which will be used for promotion and buildings at Glen Lake.

We are indeed happy to report that we have secured the services of Mr. Howard Sego of Waco, Texas to serve full time at the Camp as Superintendent.

We ask Conference approval of a financial campaign to be launched this Conference year to raise funds for buildings and improvements that will make this property one of the best youth camps in the country.

The financial reports of the Promotion and the Building Funds are being filed with your Conference Secretary, and will be printed in the Journal.

EVANGELISM

When Methodism launched the Crusade for Christ, we did not undertake some new enterprise. Our church has been engaged in these various efforts from the time the Methodist movement began. The main and traditional objective and effort of the Methodist Church from its beginning has been Evangelism. It would appear that none of us would need exhortation on that line, but we fear that many have been diverted in these latter days from the purposes of our founders. It should be remembered that it has always been and still is an evangelistic movement. We are still obligated to spread Scriptural holiness over the land, with the world as our parish.

As we face the task now assigned us by our leaders, and consider that we live in a world of sin and pain and heartbreak, we know that first of all we need a genuine revival within the church before we are fitted to make an effort to lift up this world toward God. Multiplied thousands of our people have evidently lost the sense of God's presence, if indeed they ever had such an experience. Christian standards have been abandoned, and an onlooker may find it difficult to distinguish between an outsider and a church member. We must call the church back to prayer and con-

secration of life as our first effort. God will lead us. He said, "Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts and let him return to God, and He will abundantly pardon."

We recommend:

First, That our pastors make a new dedication of their lives to Christ, engaging in earnest prayer until the Holy Spirit gives them fresh assurance of His presence and power.

Second, That our pastors promote the New Life Movement in their churches.

Third, That they preach to the people the cardinal doctrines which made Methodism great, such as Repentance, the New Birth, the Atonement, Sin and its Danger, Prayer, the Holy Spirit and His Work, Witness-Bearing, Faith in Christ, the Plan of Salvation, Forgiveness of Sin, etc.

Fourth, That a survey be made of every church community under the plans given.

Fifth, That Family Altars be established in the homes of our people.

Sixth, That classes in Personal Evangelism be formed in every church, and they be trained to win souls.

Seventh, That Prayer Groups be formed also in every church to pray God's power down on the church and the ministry.

Eighth, That revivals, or preaching missions, be conducted in every church. Let us not be content with a series of services continuing perhaps for a week, but let the effort proceed until victory comes.

Ninth, That consideration be given to the generous offer of the Womans Society of Christian Service to assist in this phase of the Crusade.

Tenth, That our District Directors enter heartily into this task, offering themselves to the pastors and churches to assist in every possible manner.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. G. P. Comer as Conference Secretary of Evangelism, and of Rev. John M. Neal, Rev. Frank L. Turner, Rev. W. H. Coleman, Rev. Quay Parmer as Evangelists. We urge that these workers be used in our Conference whenever possible.

Amounts of Checks Paid Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital by the Board of Hospitals and Homes From October 1, 1944 to October 1, 1945

General

Interest payments for this year had to do with the following notes due by the hospital:

One \$100,000.00 note bearing 3% interest with two interest bearing dates, those dates being February 2 and August 2.

One \$41,604.90 note bearing interest at 4% with two interest due dates of February 2 and August.

One \$33,060.31 note with interest at the rate of 4% with one interest due date of October 31.

By action of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital at its meeting on June 9, 1945, the \$41,604.90 note and the \$33,060.31 note were consolidated into a note amounting to \$74,665.21, bearing interest at 4% with one yearly interest due date of June 9.

The interest payments this year had to do with all of the above and were in payment of due interest, past due penalty interest, and past due penalty interest on principal.

On March 12, check in the amount of \$1,580.56 was issued to the hospital, which was current interest on the \$100,000.00 note at 3% and on the \$41,604.90 note at 4% from September 30, 1944 to February 2, 1945. A note of explanation is to the effect that all interest both current and penalty was paid in full as of September 30, 1944.

On August 21, 1945, check was issued to the hospital in the amount of \$3,489.88 which was in payment of current interest on the \$100,000.00 note at 3% covering the period from February 2, to August 2, and on \$74,665.21 at 4% through May 31, 1945. A note of explanation in regard to the note of \$74,665.21 is that 4% interest was paid for six months on \$41,604.90 and on \$33,060.31 from October 31, through May 31.

On October 15, 1945, check was issued to the hospital in the amount of \$5,219.81 which was in payment of a bill rendered September 11, 1945, and thus included on this report which carries the following explanation:

Penalty interest on \$10,000.00 past due principal of the \$33,060.31 note from September 30, 1944 to October 31, 1944 in the amount of \$50.00.

Penalty on \$20,000.00 past due principal of \$33,060.31 note from October 31, 1944 to June 9, 1945, \$735.93.

Interest paid Dr. Harris on open accounts payable as authorized by the Board of Trustees at its meeting June 9, 1945, on \$55,536.00 at 4% for 196 days, May 27, 1943 to December 10, 1943, \$1,189.72. Open account at 4% on \$50,000.00 for 592 days, December 10, 1943 to July 25, 1945 \$3,244.16.

The total of the three checks issued to the hospital have amounted to \$10,290.65 and the amounts paid to the hospital satisfies all outstanding interest as of the dates included in the above information. Outstanding notes on which interest is due since dates of last payments are on the \$100,000.00 note and on the \$74,665.21 note. Interest paid will be in the form of current interest or penalty interest of payments not made on interest paying date, but the note which also had penalty interest on past due principal has been cleared up. Also, the accounts payable item has been paid to Dr. Harris by the hospital, so that item will not be outstanding at any future date.

HARRIS MEMORIAL METHODIST HOSPITAL

Report of the Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees of the Hospital met twice during the year, at the called meeting on June 9, 1945, and the annual meeting on October 23, 1945.

At these meetings the following business was transacted:

1. The purpose of the called meeting was mainly to consider the report

and recommendations of two special committees appointed at the regular meeting in October, 1944. These committees made a joint report, copy of which is attached, and which was adopted by the board.

2. At the annual meeting of the Board a substantial change was made in the organization of the Golden Cross, copy of the recommendations for reorganization of the Golden Cross, which were adopted by the Board, is attached to this report.

3. The committee previously appointed to investigate and make a recommendation as to the purchase of certain property surrounding the nurses' home made its report, and upon recommendation of the committee, the following property was purchased at a cost of \$36,000.00.

- (a) House west of the Nurses' Home, known as Elizabeth Lodge.
- (b) Two vacant lots north of the Nurses' Home on which is located the artesian well and pump which furnishes water for the nurses' home.
- (c) Duplex house on lot immediately north of the two vacant lots.
- (d) House north of Elizabeth Lodge.

The Trustees authorized the use of the proceeds of the Crider property amounting approximately to \$10,000 as the initial payment on these properties, with the understanding that Mrs. Crider's name would in some way be memorialized in the use of the property.

4. Two vacancies were reported on the Board of Trustees. The Board elected the following persons to fill these vacancies, subject to ratification of the Conference:

8. Dr. Harris will report such statistical items as may be necessary, and they will not be referred to in my report.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR RE-ORGANIZATION OF GOLDEN CROSS

(Editors Note: Referred to in above report. Filed for information without reading or action.)

I. Department of Hospital:

- a. Hospital Commissioner to be a department head the same as any other department in the hospital organization.

- b. Hospital Commissioner to be a member of the Administrative Personnel of the hospital.

II. Golden Cross Offerings:

- a. All Golden Cross offerings to come directly into the hospital's operating income the same as payments for patients services.
 - 1. The Golden Cross Department to be receipted for amount of offerings received and so stated on the receipt from whom the offering was received.
- b. Records of income as to each church or individual kept in Golden Cross office.

III. Expenses of Golden Cross:

- a. Hospital checks issued for all expenses, using as any other department the hospital's voucher system of payment.
- b. Hospital Commissioner to write purchase orders for all purchases to be paid for by hospital, these purchase orders to be approved by the hospital administrator.
- c. Transfers of office supplies and any other items kept in the hospital store room to be controlled by requisitions, so that the Golden Cross office may be charged with the proper expenses.

IV. Golden Cross and House Service Patients:

- a. All charity patients within the hospital to be referred to as Golden Cross patients, and the term "House Service" to be dropped completely.

V. Employees of Golden Cross Office:

- a. All employees, including Commissioner, to receive the same benefits as all other hospital employees and to accept all obligations the same as other hospital employees.

VI. Admission control of Golden Cross Patients:

- a. The admission control of Golden Cross patients to be an absolute charge of the hospital resident, any information regarding patients that have come through the Golden Cross office to be furnished him any time.
- b. All patients referred through the Golden Cross office to the resident physician to be given preference.

VII. Regulations governing resident on Golden Cross admissions:

- a. No case to be admitted unless in the opinion of the resident the case can be rehabilitated in approximately two weeks.

VIII. Regulations governing the Hospital Commissioner before recommending Golden Cross patients for admission:

- a. Proper certifications from their local pastors to Golden Cross office.

IX. Other duties of Golden Cross Office:

- a. Complete duties of office to be set up by the Commissioner and the hospital administrator, the same as the duties in any other department within the hospital.

X. Duties of Hospital Commissioner:

- a. To serve as Director of Golden Cross within the Central Texas and Northwest Texas Conferences.
- b. Hospital Chaplain.
- c. Chaplain to the Harris School of Nursing .
- d. Other duties to be defined by Golden Cross Committee, composed of Fort Worth District Superintendent, Hospital Director, Hospital Administrator, and Hospital Commissioner.

HOSPITALS AND HOMES—HOSPITAL

Report to Board of Trustees October 23, 1945

(Filed for record without reading or action.)

This statistical report covers the period from October 1, 1944 through September 30, 1945.

The bed capacity of the hospital has been constant during the past year. We have operated 279 adult and pediatric beds and 89 bassinets. In addition to the beds provided for patient care, we have operated 2 treatment beds, 8 nursing arts beds, 25 recovery beds, 1 B. M. R. bed, 10 lying-in beds and 3 bassinets in the delivery rooms. The only increase this past year over the year before is in regard to bassinets which shows a total increase of 30 bassinets.

The total admissions to the hospital during the past was 12,867, of which 2,452 were newborns. This is an overall increase of 3,832 patients over last year. There was a total of 280 deaths, 108 of these deaths took place within 24 hours after admission to the hospital and 172 of the deaths were over 42 hours. A total of 84 autopsies was done.

The percentage of occupancy of available beds during the past year was 94.3. This percentage excludes available bassinets and is an increase of 7.3% occupancy over last year. The hospital rendered a total of 113,101 patient days of service. This total was an increase of 17,589 over last year. Included in the patient days of service rendered were 14,804 charity patient days, and this total of charity patient days is an increase of 3,449 over the year 1943-1944. The number of charity patients receiving this service was 1,367, which was an increase over last year of 407. The cost to the hospital for rendering this service was \$52,042.98 and amounted to \$12,453.49 more than the year before.

The average length of stay of all patients in the hospital was 8.1 days. This is an interesting fact, since it shows definite cooperation of the doctors in taking care of the acutely ill patient. This fact is that the average length of stay was 3.3 days shorter than that during the year 1943-1944. The hospital had a daily average number of patients of 310 which is an increase of 49 patients daily over that of last year. In addition to the daily average number of patients, service was rendered to 8,470 out-patients. This is an increase of 5,453 out-patients over last year. All out-patient departments within the hospital showed increased totals. This average daily cost per patient was \$8.26. This cost was a daily increase of \$1.76 over the daily cost for last year. The average daily income per patient amounted to \$8.33. In arriving at this daily cost and income, patient days of service rendered to newborns was counted. For many reports, these patient days of service are excluded and in both instances the cost and income would be raised.

There was a total of 536,798 meals served. The cost of the finished meal amounted to 39½ cents and was an increase in cost of 7.7 cent for each meal served compared to the cost for last year. The cost of the raw food alone for these meals amounted to 24.7 cents, and is an increase of 3.8 cents over the raw food cost of last year. It is interesting to note that the raw food cost and the finished meal cost advanced in almost identical amounts.

The total of accounts receivable charges rendered amounted to \$1,079,919.54. This was an increase of \$251,687.12 over the charges for last year. Accounts receivable credits amounted to \$1,042,312.87. Credits showed an increase of \$208,458.77 over the credits for last year. The collection average during the past year was 96.5% and this shows a decrease in the collection percentage of 4.5 from that of 101% last year.

Capital Accounts and their increases are:

Food and General Supply Inventories, \$6,632.48.

Hospital Building, \$17,505.32.

Furniture and Fixtures, \$20,655.35.

Equipment, \$56,423.88.

Following authorization by the Board of Trustees, the account payable due Dr. Chas. H. Harris was paid in full and all due and penalty interest has been paid to date. The amount of accrued interest now shown on the ledger account is \$1,472.97. This represents accrued interest of the \$100,000.00 note at 3% and on the \$74,665.21 note at 4%. Payment of interest on the \$100,000.00 note will be due on February 2, 1946, and on the \$74,665.21 note on June 9, 1946. The amount of interest paid out during the past year has been returned to the hospital, in full by Rev. H. O. Bennett, Secretary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

The net profits for the year, verified by Ernst & Ernst, amounted to \$68,491.38. This is a decrease from profits of last year of \$91,786.32. This difference can be explained in part by the items listed in the audits as expense increases over last year. They are salaries, food and supplies consumed, discounts and allowances and charity, repairs and maintenance, provision for depreciation which amounted to \$34,191.86 representing 2% depreciation as authorized by this Board of the hospital building and Fannie M. Harris Hall, Laundry, student nurses hospitalization, and several miscellaneous expenses.

The total personnel as of September 30, was 635. This total includes 203 student nurses. The personnel has worked hard, since there has been a great demand for hospitalization. All in all, the personnel situation is improved and we have a very optimistic viewpoint in regard to its continual improvement.

The Medical Staff has shown splendid cooperation and without that cooperation it would have been impossible for the hospital to render service to the increased number of patients, since we had only one additional bed available over the total available as of September 30, 1944.

The staff has been very considerate of the mistakes made by all of us and its cooperation is appreciated.

The Governing Board has met regularly with the exception of the month of May, and copies of the minutes, with the exception of those items dealing directly with the Medical Staff, have been mailed to all of you.

This report has been influenced by everyone interested in the hospital, particularly Dr. Chas. H. Harris, Mr. W. D. Smith, The Governing Board, the Medical Staff, the personnel, and individual members of this Board.

HOSPITALS AND HOMES—HOSPITAL

(Read to the Conference by Dr. Chas. A. Harris)

Bishop A. Frank Smith, Rev. L. L. Felder, Chairman of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, and Members of the Central Texas Conference:

This report embraces the complete retirement of the bonded issue of \$200,000 which was executed by the Trustees of the Hospital and endorsed by myself with the donation by me of \$53,000, to the re-purchase price in May, 1937.

The Hospital building at that time of re-purchasing and refinancing in 1937 as of the auditor's report and for legal purposes, was valued at \$253,000.

This audit report was brought about by the actual purchase price of the building from the bond-holders who had sold the building under the closing suit of the former bond-issue of \$500,000 long past due and by default.

For the same legal and accounting purposes, this valuation remained on the books until the bonded indebtedness making up the \$253,000 was retired.

At the present time the hospital building is valued at \$1,241,356.25.

During this period, the total cash improvements, in addition to the re-valuation of the building, has amounted to \$450,569.89.

The valuation of the Fannie M. Harris Hall in 1937 was \$200,000.

Improvements on that hall during this same period of time amounted to \$20,505.22, making this a most excellent dormatory for the nurses.

The total valuation of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital and the Fannie M. Harris Hall is now \$1,461,861.47.

Furniture, fixtures, and equipment previous to 1937, as of the auditor's report, amounted to less than \$20,000.

As of September 30, 1945, those amounted to \$166,780.91.

In addition to these items, the total increase in valuation of passenger elevators is \$28,697.09. The total improvements for furniture, fixtures, and equipment amount to \$195,478.00.

When I moved from the Harris Hospital to this hospital, there were no inventories of operating supplies of any kind on hand. As of September 30, 1945, inventories on hand amounted to \$43,371.28. In addition to these inventories, operating supplies now in use on the floors are in excess of \$3,000, making an addition to the above valuation of \$241,849.28.

Not including depreciation, this brings the total value of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital, according to the audit report of September 30, 1945, to \$1,708,710.73.

Since our report to the last Conference in November 1944, a number of valuable improvements have been made, among them, the most spectacular is the erection of two modern passenger elevators adding greatly to the facility of transporting visitors through the hospital.

Many additions have been made on the ground floor in the culinary department, first, an elegant special diet kitchen for the preparation of special diets for individual patients. This kitchen is connected with an electric dumb-waiter, making the kitchen accessible to all floors in the building.

A big addition has been made in space for the nurses library as well as many valuable books have been added to the library. Several additional temporary rooms have been erected on the sixth floor for laboratories and teaching rooms for the School of Nursing.

The bed capacity of the hospital has been constant during the past year.

The total admissions to the hospital during the past year was 12,867, of which 2,452 were newborns. This is an overall increase of 3,832 patients over last year.

The percentage of occupancy of available hospital beds during the past year was 94.3. This hospital rendered a total of 113,101 patient days of service. This total was an increase of 17,589 over last year. Included in the patient days of service rendered were 14,804 charity patient days, and this total of charity patient days is an increase of 3,409 over the year 1943-44. The number of charity patients receiving this service was 1,367, which was an increase over last year of 407.

The cost to the hospital for rendering this charity service was \$52,042.98, and amounted to \$12,453.49 more than the year before.

In the beginning of these transactions, I promised your Board of Trustees that I would manage and help to operate this institution without compensation to myself. This, I have done, with the exception of board and room, most of this time being spent in the institution that I gave you for a nurses home.

My obligation to you has been completed and now I think other arrangements should be made for furthering this great work of the institution by the employment of a Hospital Director with a stated salary commensurable to a capable man for this character of work.

Let me acquaint you with the fact that the time has passed when the obligation of the hospital is satisfied by only taking care of the sick and injured, but the time is here when an added important obligation is confronting the hospitals, that of teaching the public the prevention of diseases and the nurses and young doctors the scientific care of the sick and injured.

In view of these facts, I recommend to the Medical Staff that a great improvement could be made in the educational departments of the hospital,

first, by the addition of a fulltime medical instructor and the organization of the departmental heads for the assistance of this fulltime instructor for teaching young doctors as interns and residents.

For progress in furthering the educational departments of the hospital, efforts are being made now for organizing a College of Nursing with an endowment that will greatly assist in the financial operation of this College of Nursing and with the collaboration of the hospital with a university, the hospital can be put in the fore-front as one of the great educational institutions of the State as well as one of the great institutions for the care of the sick and injured.

In closing, let me make acknowledgment of my appreciation for the help and service of some of those who have stayed with the institution, who started in its lean days on small salaries and long hours with cooperating, earnest, and definite determination to see the hospital succeed, and their help is unspeakable in the progress the institution has made:

These people are:

Toll Terrell, our very efficient business administrator;

Mrs. Lizzie Berry, my sister, who has charge of the large part of the purchasing of hospital supplies, and care of the linens;

Miss Maybelle Hudgins, who has organized one of the great Medical Record Libraries in the State, and one which we should all be proud of;

Miss Maurine Bridwell, who was very helpful in the successful management and conducting of our School of Nursing which has been taken over by Miss Lucy Harris, who is now helping to organize our College of Nursing;

Miss Ila Mershon who has conducted the best floor in the entire institution and who has been faithful from our beginning to now;

Miss Dorothy Headley, who has the very difficult position of heading and conducting the Department of Anesthesia, which calls for all hours of the day and night;

Mrs. Judy Moore, who has held down one of the most difficult positions in her duties as night superintendent; and

Mrs. Lillian Pressley who has acted as night dietitian, has been ever faithful and economical in her duties.

These people, I feel under many obligations to and appreciate more than words can express, the value of their faithful service.

Let me add in this connection, little of this could have been accomplished had it not been for the faithful, diligent, and helpful work and spirit of the Medical Staff for whom we all should be thankful. Personally, I want to thank the Executive Committee for its help, and for the cooperation and confidence expressed by the Board of Trustees.

With the welfare of children greatly neglected because of the emergency circumstances during the four war years, the Methodist Home feels a sense of pride in the service it was able to render during this time for approximately four hundred boys and girls by providing them with a comfortable home and the best available training. This Christian service to homeless children was made possible by the generosity of the members of the Methodist Church, and other interested friends.

The accomplishment was not without its complications, involving as it did, greatly increased demands for the admission of children, and particularly so from that group who had, directly or indirectly because of the war, become a problem in their local community. Although the staff of trained and experienced personnel was greatly reduced because they were able to obtain more lucrative positions, a minimum of the services and activities for the children were curtailed. Due to the gifts of different commodities from friends, the Methodist Home family was affected less than the average family by food shortages.

We are very grateful for the gift from the Central Texas Conference of \$58,379.11 in cash and \$382.30 in supplies, which was received as follows from the respective districts:

Because of the generous support from this conference and others, the Directors of the Home decided to add fifty additional children to the population of the Home, with these children being selected from those who

were experiencing some difficulty in their local communities. I am glad to report that as of this date, this new venture has proved highly successful.

Because the month of December has been the time of the year when the people have been accustomed to hearing about the work of the Home, and then making a free will offering for its support, we request that the month of December be designated as "Methodist Home Month," during which time the pastors and leaders of each congregation will inform the people about the training for life program of the Home, and take a free will offering for its support for the year.

Because of the importance of child welfare in our present generation, we request that the Board endorse the Five-Point Program recommended by the Board of Directors as the future plans for the Home, which are as follows:

1. Re habilitation of present buildings and equipment where it is practical to do so.
2. Obtaining of additional buildings which are needed for the efficient operation of the Home.
3. The establishment of an adequate vocational school on the campus.
4. Obtaining of adequate endowment to safeguard the continued and efficient operation of the Home.
5. Create a department of research in child welfare in order to determine policies for the Home, and training the staff in keeping with the policies.

We recommend the appointment of Mr. J. C. DeShong as Director-at-Large of the Methodist Home for a term of three years.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES, No. 1

We are all profoundly grateful to the Membership of the Central Texas Conference for the magnificent response in the first phase of the Crusade for Christ. We approach the next steps with a firm belief that the Crusade is in harmony with God's program for the world, that our whole church is minded to bring to full completion the greatest task it has ever undertaken in a four year period. We believe it would be tragic to stop now and thus encourage the belief—that by simply paying our money we can discharge our obligation to a war-torn world. Since we do not accept that idea, we will continue to Crusade for Christ until all phases of the program have been brought to fullest fruition.

From this time the Crusade will be concerned with persons close at home and with their spiritual needs. Evangelism will seek to win people to Christ and His Church. Stewardship will aim at the dedication of time and talents as well as money. The Church School will attempt to increase its enrollment and attendance. All these activities will be directed at persons. Toward the accomplishment of these ends your Conference Board of Lay Activities urges the laymen of the church to do these things:

1. To enter wholeheartedly into the program of Evangelism for the coming year. We want the laymen of the church to stand shoulder to shoulder with the pastors in an effort to re-enlist every inactive church member in the work of the church and to reach and win for Christ all non-church people. We especially urge upon our laymen a greater manifestation of loyalty to the church by being regular attendants upon its services.

2. To engage in a church-wide campaign of Stewardship cultivation which aims to inculcate in the minds and hearts of the members of the Methodist Church a deep sense of their Stewardship of the Gospel and their obligation to spread the Kingdom of God over all the earth in accord with the spirit and directive of the Great Commission; and which aims further to secure such an acceptance of the principle of Stewardship as will ultimately result in a complete dedication of all resources to service in the Master's Kingdom. We believe such a program will bring, to individual members and to the church as a whole, a new sense of stewardship for community welfare, for a better economic and social order, for the ultimate Christianization of business and industry, a responsibility for the underprivileged and dependent people of the earth and for the creation of a Christian World Order.

3. To secure an increase of Enrollment and Attendance in the Church School commensurate with the community needs. This will not be easy but it can be done. The Church School is our principal agency for laying the foundations of Christian character and for increasing our church membership and it must be utilized to its fullest extent by bringing into its membership and under its influence both the youth and the adults of every community.

4. To bend our efforts toward the giving of relief and aid in the reconstruction of the millions of people of the earth who are still foodless, homeless, workless, churchless and who must have our continuing post-war aid.

5. To help the church again to put the accent on Religion in the Home, until this land of ours shall be known throughout the world as a land of Christian Homes. This basic unit of society is the key to scores of complicated problems with which our social reform is concerned, and we believe with all our hearts, that the final solution of many of these problems is to be found in the reestablishment of the Christian Home in all that the term implies.

In this connection we desire to commend to you for use in your homes the recently published "Book of Worship for Church and Home" by the Methodist Publishing House.

6. We believe that all phases of the Crusade for Christ will be more

intelligently carried out if our church membership will read our church publications and we commend for your consideration: The Methodist Layman, The Christian Advocate, The Southwestern Advocate and the World Outlook. We also urge upon both the pastors and the laymen of the church the universal observance of Laymens Day and the increased use of lay speakers whenever a speaking date may be secured.

MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT NO. 1

(As amended by the 1945 Central Texas Annual Conference)

1. There shall be a program for minimum pastor support in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of a Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission and who may be members of other Annual Conference boards or commissions; five of this number shall be ministers and four laymen, and three of the total number shall be clerical or lay members of the Conference Board of Missions. These three shall serve during the quadrennium. The others shall serve for three-year terms, two to be elected each year. The duties and responsibilities of this Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support program in the closest co-operation with the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension. Members of the Commission, in addition to the one-third who shall be members of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, may be chosen from the membership of that board and if they are not so chosen, they shall be expected to attend the meetings of said board but shall not have a vote except on matters directly affecting the Minimum Pastoral Support Program. The Minimum Pastoral Support Program and that part of the work of the Board of Missions and Church Extension that has to do with local Conference work and appropriations shall be considered one general program. This program shall become a part of the program of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Vacancies caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference in the membership of the Commission shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet and elected by the Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between the sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the session of the Annual Conference following, when the vacancy will be filled in the regular way.

We recommend that the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support shall organize at the time of meeting of each Annual Conference, electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer, and that these officers shall constitute an Executive Committee for the Commission and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected.

2. We recommend:

(a) That the basic minimum basis for pastoral support shall be

\$1,000 per year, exclusive of any parsonage provision that may be made by the charge;

(b) That to this amount \$200 shall be added when the pastor has a wife but no children;

(c) That \$25 be allowed in addition to the above for each child in the home under 16 years of age, or under 21 years of age if in school or college;

(d) That \$25 be allowed to claimants on this fund if a child is born into the home during the year.

All missionary appropriations shall be considered a part of the salary received, in computing both the amount of help to be given from the fund and in determining the amounts of apportionments to charge and pastor.

3. We recommend that no part of these funds paid to claimants be apportioned to the support of district superintendents and, further, that no part of these funds so paid to claimants shall be made the basis for any assessment for General Conference, or other special purpose.

4. We recommend that the provisions of this plan shall apply only to members in full connection in the Central Texas Conference and no provision shall apply to any member of the Conference retired, supernumerary, under appointment to school, as a Conference evangelist, or employed by any Annual Conference Board, or any other appointment save that as preacher in charge within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference. We further recommend that in case of change of appointment between sessions of the Annual Conference and after the apportionments have been made by the Commission, no member of the Conference shall share in these funds unless the charge to which he may be appointed shall meet the conditions of this paper, and then his participation shall be on a pro rata basis for the part of the year served in the charge to which he is assigned.

"The benefits of these provisions may be extended to 'accepted supplies' providing that (1) such supply is a full time pastor of a church or churches, (2) he is recommended as meeting the requirements by his District Superintendent, (3) the supply and his church or pastoral charge shall participate in the provisions of the apportionment as hereinafter outlined. The Board of Missions continuing to cooperate in this program."

"Members on trial may share in these benefits on the same basis as accepted supplies."

5. We recommend that no pastor shall receive help from the fund who receives income from other employment than the regular work of the ministry, if such income brings his total income up to the minimum basis in his case. If the total income thus computed falls below the minimum basis, the amount of help in that case shall be figured from the amount of his total income.

6. We recommend that as a prerequisite for any pastor to receive help from this fund, the charge which he serves must agree by vote of the official board to pay the Minimum Pastoral Support Commission an amount equal to 25 per cent of the amount necessary to bring the salary up to the computed minimum basis, except on the unanimous vote of the Commission. The 25 per cent paid to the Commission shall not be considered a part of the salary assessed and paid.

7. We recommend that no pastor shall participate in this fund if the charge he serves reduces the salary below that paid the previous year, unless this reduction be deemed justifiable by unanimous vote of Commission.

8. We recommend, in accordance with paragraph 811 of the Discipline, 1940, that whenever a member of the Conference in full connection is appointed to any charge assessing less than a \$600 salary per year, such an appointee shall not participate in this fund except on the basis of a \$600 salary assessment and the usual participation of the charge in the Minimum Support Plan.

9. We recommend that funds be secured for the work of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support in accord with Paragraphs 810 and 813

of the Discipline and that apportionments be made to the charges as hereinafter set forth, that payments on such apportionments shall be made quarterly to the Treasurer of the Commission.

The apportionment be figured on the percentage schedule as outlined below:

- (b) That 3 per cent be apportioned to all charges assessing \$2,000 or less.
 - (c) That 3½ per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$2,001 to \$2,500.
 - (d) That 4 per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$2,501 to \$3,000.
 - (e) That 4½ per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$3,001 to \$4,000.
 - (f) That 5 per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$4,001 and up.
- We further recommend, in accord with paragraph 813 of the Discipline, that the following apportionments be assessed against pastors in this Conference:

- (b) That an apportionment of 1% be levied on all salaries to \$2,000 excluding any part of said salary paid by the Minimum Pastoral Support Commission and/or the Conference Board of Missions.
- (c) That an apportionment of 1¼ per cent be levied on all salaries from \$2,001 to \$2,500.
- (d) That an apportionment of 1½% be levied on all salaries from \$2,500 to \$3,000.
- (e) That an apportionment of 1¾% be levied on all salaries from \$3,001 to \$4,000.
- (f) That an apportionment of 2% be levied on all salaries in excess of \$4,001.

All Conference employees under appointment of the Bishop who are members of the Conference in full connection, including officers and others shall be assessed for and support this program on the same basis and in the same proportion as pastors of charge. In this connection, allowances for rent now established and other allowances made by the commission with the consent of the Conference shall be exempt from the salary scale. This places every Conference appointee under the same obligation to and in the same relationship to this program.

10. We recommend that the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support gather necessary information throughout the Conference to compute the amounts of apportionments to charges and pastors and the amounts of apportionments to be paid the claimants and that the information be handed down to the direct superintendents and the pastors and by them to the official boards of the charges. The district superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the church, and for the collection of the amounts due from churches and members of the Conference whose appointments are listed in their respective districts.

We respectfully suggest and recommend that the values in Church Ministry Sunday, which has been the fifth Sunday in January, be conserved in so far as is possible and we recommend to the district superintendents that the month of January be set aside and designated as Minimum Pastoral Support Month; and that if at all possible the total amount to be raised by the charges be raised and paid to the treasurer of the commission during this month.

Monies so paid are to apply on apportionment. If not paid as suggested above, payments on apportionments shall be made quarterly to the treasurer of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, and the treasurer of the commission shall make payment at the end of each quarter of the year on the same percentage basis, without discrimination in any case whatsoever, and the last quarterly payment shall be made at the meeting of the Annual Conference after all remittances have been made to the treasurer.

11. The treasurer of the commission shall be adequately bonded and the expense of the bond shall be charged against the fund. A complete financial statement shall be filed at each session of the Annual Conference showing all receipts from charges and pastors during the year and from all members of the Conference and those holding appointments other than pastoral charges, and of all payments made to claimants on the fund, this statement to be placed on record with other financial reports of the Conference.

Expense for the work of the commission, such as stationery, stamps, necessary secretarial work, et cetera, shall be allowed from the fund and traveling expense of the members of the commission to one mid-year meeting, together with cost of meals shall be allowed. The traveling expense shall be computed on the basis of 2 cents per mile each way.

We suggest that three-fourths of the amount normally allowable be allowed until the meeting of the commission at the next session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from apportionments and assessments, the total amount contemplated herein shall be paid.

We recommend further that the provisions relating to dependents other than wives shall be paid at the session of the Annual Conference if a sufficient amount of money has been realized to make such payment.

We further recommend that not less than 5 per cent and not more than 10 per cent of gross receipts shall be held within the treasury of this fund at the conclusion of business each year for emergency appropriations.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION NO. 1

Your Board of Missions and Church Extension, in facing up to the challenge of the Crusade for Christ and the Evangelistic emphasis of the Crusade, has the feeling that certain things are of vital importance:

First of all, we need to hold our present membership and help them to find full expression for their Christian life.

In the second place, we need to reach additional people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ wherever they are to be found. This requires that pastors be supplied for every church, however small or large, and that they be provided with sufficient means to effectively carry on their work.

During this period of the Crusade your Board has adopted the policy of allocating twenty-five percent of its total income to the work of establishing new churches and opening new territory within the Conference, in harmony with the Crusade goal for the establishment of five hundred new churches.

We are happy to report that Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Meyer of Hamilton, Texas, have purchased \$58,000 in annuity bonds of the General Board of Missions. This is to be known as the C. W. and Hazeltine Meyer Endow-

ment Fund for Foreign Missions. This purchase is in addition to the \$20,000 gift made last year to the General Board. This generous act on the part of the Meyers is but a further evidence of their interest in missions.

The report of Mr. J. R. Edwards, Trustee of Properties and Treasurer of Permanent Funds for the Conference Board, revealed our holdings to be in excellent condition and net earnings of \$400 from these sources have been transferred to the General Fund of your Board for appropriation to mission charges.

Your Board of Missions and Church Extension wishes to incorporate in its report the following statement of policy:

1. We work in close harmony with the Commission on Minimum Salaries in the newly established policies of said Commission. It is our understanding that in those cases where the provisions of the Commission on Minimum Salaries meet the needs, any appropriation granted by this Board of Missions will not apply.

2. On established charges, when the total salary of the pastor reaches a ceiling of \$1,500 and house, it shall cease to be regarded as a Mission Charge, and it will not be the policy of the Board to use missionary money to go beyond this figure.

3. In the event the pastor is giving part time to work other than that of his charge, any income from such work shall be included in arriving at his total salary.

4. In the event of any changes in the course of the year which involve the matter of ministerial support, the necessary adjustments may be worked out by the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions and Church Extension and/or the Commission on Minimum Salaries, and the District Superintendents.

With the consent of the Annual Conference, the apportionments to missionary charges will be filed with the Secretary, and published in the Conference Journal.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION NO. 2

Division of Church Extension

In keeping with the Crusade of Evangelism, and the primary purpose of Methodism, we are entering upon the new Conference year with a vastly expanded program of Missions and Church Extension for the Central Texas Conference. Our primary purpose in this Crusade of Evangelism, is to reach the largest number of people, in the most effective way; then to put tools in their hands and put them to work for the Lord.

There are many phases to this Crusade of Evangelism. Among other things they include:

1. The organization of 500 new churches.
2. The re-opening of abandoned churches where needed.
3. The relocation of weak or abandoned churches where advisable.
4. The improvement of present buildings and equipment to improve the effectiveness of existing work. We must not abandon our people when they move away from the old church. And we must not abandon the people at the old church because some of the people have moved away.

A recent survey conducted jointly by your Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension, and the District Superintendents, reveals 16 places in the Central Texas Conference where new churches need to be organized now, or in the very near future. Some churches are being relocated, and others need to be. There are congregations without buildings; and charges without parsonages. There are a great many churches, par-

ticularly on Mission Charges that are in need of rebuilding, repair and improvement, or enlargement programs.

We are happy to report that your Board of Missions and Church Extension is assisting in the organization of new churches at Fort Worth, Waco, and Coleman at the present time. Lots have been secured for three others, and it is hoped that we shall be well along the way toward meeting the total challenge by the close of the year.

We are recommending:

1. That some type of District Board of Missions and Church Extension be organized in every District, with a budget.

This may be an incorporated board. It may be an unincorporated board. It may be your District Board of Church Location and Building, perhaps with additional members.

There should be a budget, perhaps with suggested quotas assigned to the charges, with the bulk of it coming from the larger stations.

2. We recommend that the local churches re-examine their own fields, and the equipment with which they are to labor, with an eye to strengthening the effectiveness of their efforts for the Lord.

3. We urge an increase in World Service Giving, and that a worthy portion of it be channeled into this primary work of Kingdom building.

RETIRED MINISTERS

Report of the Special Committee Appointed to Study the Proposal For An Endowment For Retired Ministers

At the last session of the Annual Conference, a proposal was made to raise a fund for an endowment to increase the amount of pension paid to retired ministers. As proposed it would mean about \$100,000.00 a year to be raised over a period of several years.

This matter was referred to a special committee. We have given very thorough study to this matter and find that each \$100,000.00 of endowment would raise the retired minister's pay only \$1.00 per service year.

In view of this fact, we do not believe the plan to be feasible and do not recommend it.

We ask the Conference to accept this report and then to allow the committee to present a second paper that has resulted from our studies.

We feel that a greater interest may be aroused through the proper presentation of this vital matter through our Church Schools, and other Church organizations.

We must make certain that this begins, continues, and ends as a spiritual movement. A distinct peril of the hour is that with a million new names on our rolls we and the world shall be in no better condition than at the present moment.

Spirituality must be all of life or it is none of life. For it there is no substitute. Its essence is the humble and grateful realization of the presence of God. That Presence shames indifference, rebukes sins, and banishes fears. May this be a year of fellowship with God as we seek in all life's relationships to do His will.

TEMPERANCE

In Texas, today there are 140 counties which are entirely dry, and only 36 which are entirely wet. The other 78 have either dry precincts or serve only beer. One radio station, WFAA, Dallas, has recently eliminated all liquor advertising broadcasts. Three stations, WHAS, KWKH, KTHS are broadcasting the daily "VOICE OF TEMPERANCE," (Rev. Sam Morris). We heartily commend the above stations, and urge our people to send their protests to such other stations as continue the practice of liquor broadcasting.

BUT, with a national drink bill for one year of Seven Billion Dollars (more than the annual interest on the Public Debt), with upwards of Forty Million Drinkers (equal to the membership of the Protestant churches of the country). Is it not high time for the church to exercise its God given responsibility of "CONSCIENCE MAKER" in the rebuilding of a sane and healthy public opinion for the solution of the problem of beverage alcohol?

We record our appreciation that Methodists throughout the state are showing an increasing interest in the growing influence of the Texas United Drys, under the leadership of its efficient, Executive Secretary, Dr. Walter H. McKenzie. Believing that the members of our churches in the Central Texas Conference should cooperate with those of other Texas Conferences in the work of this organization.

We endorse the five fold program of the United Texas Drys, Viz:

1. To inform, arouse and educate the people.

For this purpose the reading of Christian Crusader, 8-page organ of UTD is recommended. The cost one cent per week. Send \$1 for two years of concrete information.

2. To encourage total abstinence. As one effective means, it is suggested that through homes, church and church school groups, signers be secured for total abstinence pledges during this year. Such cards may be obtained from UTD headquarters.

3. Organize our forces, precinct, county, state.

4. Promote elections, where hope may be reasonably had for making wet areas dry.

5. Enforce present laws, enact better ones.

For the above program and that Methodists may have their worthy and proportionate share, we urge that this cause be provided for in our local churches by what ever means may be best suited. It has been suggested that if this item may not be included in local budgets, that "Father's Day" June 1946—be set aside for a special sermon on Civic Righteousness and an offering taken or that our pulpits may be made available to Dr. McKenzie or one of his associates to present such appeal at a time locally convenient.

Finally, we urge, that as Christian Citizens, all our Methodists prepare for any emergency, by at least being eligible to vote, through the possession of a current poll tax receipt or exemption, which must be secured not later than January 31, 1946.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

The first meeting of the Town and Country Commission was held during Annual Conference last year at Mineral Wells. This was a short meeting and was held for the purpose of setting up a temporary organization. Rev. John A. Siceloff was elected Secretary for the interim term until the first meeting was called by the Chairman, Bishop A. Frank Smith.

The second meeting of the Town and Country Commission was held

in DeLeon, Texas, Monday, April 16, 1945. This meeting was arranged by Rev. Siceloff and Dr. W. H. Cole, District Superintendent of the Cisco District. This meeting was preceeded on April 15th by a "Community Conference on Saving Soils and Souls." Speakers for this occasion were, Mrs. Emma L. Bond, Dr. C. W. Lokey, Dr. Ide P. Trotter, Dr. A. J. Spangler, and Mr. W. R. Heizer. On April 16th, discussions were led by Dr. Ide P. Trotter, Bishop A. Frank Smith and Dr. C. W. Lokey. An excellent lunch was served by the local W. S. C. S. under the leadership of Mrs. W. D. Stephenson, President. After lunch Dr. Lokey discussed "The Group Ministry" and explained the "Farmer-Missionary Plan" for rural areas in the United States. At the open meeting which followed Dr. Lokey's discussion, Rev. John A. Siceloff was elected Chairman and Walter Evans, Jr., of Lorena, Texas was elected Secretary of the Commission. After ample discussion, the Commission decided that only two points would be adopted and to work hard to accomplish these two purposes before expanding further. The two points adopted were; 1st, The Group Ministry, 2nd, Charge Boundries.

Some of the districts have made more progress than others and since the program for the "Crusade for Christ" fits in so closely with the development of Charge Boundries all of the districts in the Conference have taken or are taking a census in an effort to increase Church School attendance. In the Cleburne District every pastor in the district has a map with his charge boundries marked. These maps show every resident in the rural sections. A blue circle around a resident indicates they are Methodist with resident membership, red mark indicates Methodist with non-resident membership, black mark indicates no church affiliation. This map with all information secured by the census is charge property and will be left in the pastors office for his successor. It is recommended that each district in the Conference follow this plan where it is practical for them to do so. In the Cisco District the district was divided into 5 districts and meetings were held for the purpose of working out and fixing the boundries for each charge. These type of meetings have met with some success.

Last December the Cleburne District started some exeriments that were suggested by the Commission. This district was divided into 3 sub-districts for the organization of adult and youth work. Each Youth group met monthly and the average attendance was over 200 with the exception of one month. Twelve churches in the district have organized and maintained youth organizations. Barnville, on the Alvarado Circuit with Rev. W. N. Byrd as pastor has a program in this rural church every Sunday evening for the entire family. Two other station pastors have taken over rural churches. Outstanding work has been done by Rev. Van P. Morrison, pastor at Grandbury, who is serving also the people of Mambrino. Since he has taken over, these people have bought a piano and are remodeling their building and will be ready to take their place as an active church on the Glen Rose Mission this fall.

In the Cisco District, Rev. Roy Johnson assisted in two revivals within his group. Rev. Stanley Williams assisted in a revival and helped in the building of a church within his group. Rev. W. A. Flynn assisted in the redeccorating of a parsonage in his group.

The Cisco District is attempting to establish a "Farmer-Missionary" at Eolian. It is hoped that this project can be completed during the next year.

The Cisco District under the leadership of Rev. W. H. Cole and the Cleburne District under the leadership of Rev. C. H. Cole have contributed a great deal to the work of the Town and Country Commission and we are grateful for the progressive attitude taken in establishing the existing relations between the town and rural folk and for the work that has been done in their districts. We are hoping that other districts will have a great deal more to report next year.

THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION SUFFERED A GREAT LOSS IN THE PASSING OF OUR REVERENED BROTHER JOHN A. SICELOFF. We had looked to him as the leader of the Town and Country Commission. He was intensely interested in the rural church and knew more about what to do in the rural situation than the rest of us. We will miss him as our Chairman, but still more we will miss his enthusiastic guidance in this difficult field. He had the conviction and the experience that made him our outstanding advocate for a Rural Church Program. We miss him for what he might have done, but we miss him more what he was. He lived his ideas; he was a doer as well as a preacher. We hereby resolve that we will be more alert to the challenge of the Rural Church because of the contribution which he made to the cause.

The Commission on World Service and Finance had before it the representatives of all the Conference interests as well as the communications from the General and Jurisdictional Boards.

There have been assessed against this Conference, for the ensuing year, by the General and Jurisdictional Commissions of World Service, the following:

The ratio between Conference and World Service is: Conference 65%, World Service 35%.

We approve and recommend that special collections be taken in all the churches of The Central Texas Conference this year on the dates designated by the various boards and committees having them in charge, as follows: Methodist Home at Waco, Golden Cross, Methodist Student Day, Church School Rally Day, Race Relations Day, World Service Sunday, and College

Day. We approve the five dollars (\$5.00) plan for the support of student work in our church schools and state colleges. We approve the campaign for the improvement of Glen Lake camp.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

We approve the report of the Denton Committee, and the campaign being projected by the Inter-Conference Commission in Texas. The quota for the Central Texas Conference has been set at \$30,000.00 to which the Board of Education of this Conference recommends the addition of \$20,000.00 for use in student work at Arlington and Stephenville. None of this money is to be raised prior to 1947.

We authorize the Treasurer to pay from the total receipts for Benevolences the expense of the Conference, and the following items before the distribution of any moneys is made, as follows:

1. Expense of printing the Journal.
2. The expense of the Conference Secretary.
3. The printing expense and secretarial help for the Conference Treasurer in such amount as shall be agreed upon by the Treasurer and the Commission on World Service and Finance.
4. The expense of bonding all Treasurers of Boards and Commissions who handle Conference Funds, including the Conference Treasurer.
5. The expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, and the treasurers of Boards and Commissions as they shall be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

We recommend that a fund equal to one-half of one per cent ($\frac{1}{2}$ of 1%) of the pastors' salary be raised in each pastoral charge for the Missouri Corporation of the General Board of Pensions to create a fund to be used in aiding weaker Conferences to reach the minimum level for the support of retired ministers. This is for the purpose of getting ready for the dividend annuity method of paying pensions, which is mandate of the General Conference.

We recommend that the support of the District Superintendents be on the basis of an assessment equal to twelve and one-half per cent ($12\frac{1}{2}\%$) of pastor's salaries and that the District Stewards together with the District Trustees be authorized and empowered to furnish a place of residence for the District Superintendents. The distributions to districts shall be made by the Conference Treasurer on the following basis:

OBITUARIES

GEORGE WASHINGTON BOUNDS

George Washington Bounds was born January 25, 1854 near Hickory Station, Newton County, Mississippi. He came to Texas with his family in ox wagons in 1864 and settled in Freestone County where he spent the remainder of his life.

Brother Bounds was converted and joined the Methodist Protestant Church at Tehaucana Valley in 1870. He helped to found the Methodist Protestant Church at Wortham and was the last surviving charter member at the time of his passing.

1880 he preached his first sermon at Broad Tree. Ten years later he was ordained and has been a faithful minister of the Gospel, filling appointments and doing evangelistic work until recent years. During these many years of service, he missed only three Annual Conference sessions.

Brother Bounds was one of the most influential men in this section of the state and was greatly loved by everyone in this and surrounding communities. Couples came from far and near for Brother Bounds to unite them in marriage as their parents, and often their grandparents, had done before them.

Brother Bounds was even progressive and interested in young people and their work, and he was loved by young and old. He was a strong advocate of union and exerted a tremendous influence throughout this section in cementing together the people called Methodist. He was a tireless worker, a great soul winner, never weary in the work of the church, never weary of loving and living. He spent not his days in idleness but earned each night's repose.

On Monday evening at 6:30, November 13, 1944, at the age of 90, Brother Bounds left the church militant to join the Church Triumphant. The funeral services were held in the church he helped to found at Wortham, Texas, November 15, 1944. The officiating ministers were Revs. W. V. Bane, L. W. Shivers, W. S. Fisher, and Dr. A. R. Corn.

May God's richest blessings rest upon the good wife and children of our departed brother.

IRA D. SANKEY LEE

Ira D. Sankey Lee was born August 17, 1884 in Wharton County, Texas, near what is now Bay City. His father was a pioneer settler of that region of Texas. When a very young man he was gloriously converted and called to the ministry. He immediately began to preach, holding a revival in his home town of Bay City which had known him as a rather wild young man, the youngest city marshal anywhere around and afraid of nothing. He held revivals all over south Texas and central Texas. God blessed his evangelistic work in a wonderful way and he saw a multitude of souls converted to Christ under his ministry. He preached an old fashioned religion that convicted men of sin, caused them to repent, restore and consecrate their lives to the service for God. Though sometimes ridiculed for his old fashioned views on sin he never compromised or betrayed his calling. As a preacher he will never have to face a man in judgment, lost because he failed to preach the truth.

He volunteered in World War I, serving in the war as a pilot of a bombing plane. He served overseas thirteen and one-half months, receiving the Legion of Honor from the French Government for conspicuous bravery. He not only served this country in war but in peace, enlisting in the early fight for the outlawing of the liquor traffic. In any fight where a moral issue was at stake he was found on the right side though often he suffered personally for his stand.

The Wesleyan Methodist Church in Clovis stands as the most fitting

memorial to him. It stands for the old John Wesleyan Methodism in which he believed. He established it in spite of opposition, and discouragement, several preachers having attempted to organize a second church there and failing to do so. He served it for six months on fifty dollar a month salary and furnished his own home. The great sacrifice he made there broke his health and caused him to have to move to another climate.

He served as pastor at Grady, New Mexico; Hagerman, New Mexico; La Grange, Texas; Nixon, Texas; El Campo Texas; Cotulla, Texas; Rye, Colorado; Clovis Circuit, Clovis, New Mexico; Wesleyan Methodist Church, Clovis, New Mexico; May, Texas, and Perry, Texas.

Shortly after moving to Perry he was taken suddenly ill, living a week. He died on January 1, 1945.

Six children survive him. Leyland, Donald, Doris, Annabel, David, and Mary Carolyn.

He served his church faithfully and unselfishly. A host of redeemed souls will be the stars in his crown. In the Judgement Day he can meet his Master with the words of Paul which he liked so well to quote, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith; Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give at that day, and not to me only but unto all them that love his appearing." II Timothy 4:7-8.

O. O. ODOM

In the death of O. O. Odom on November 22, 1944, the Central Texas Conference lost one of its most faithful and successful ministers. He was a native Texan, born in Johnson County June 1, 1881. During his twenty-seven years as an itinerant preacher he brought to the churches to which he was appointed an intelligent and helpful service. He was a good preacher. His message was Christ-centered. Sinners responded to his appeal and it was his privilege to receive 1,146 into the church on profession of faith and by baptism. In his pastoral work no needy one was overlooked. He brought sympathy, understanding, and practical suggestions to the unfortunate or defeated.

Highland Park and Trinity in Fort Worth and the church at Dublin were freed from debt under his leadership. During his pastorate at Riverside the beautiful church building was completed. He launched the campaign for the erection of the first unit of our Wesley Church at Waco. His consecration, which led often to an over-giving of himself to his work, inspired those whom he served to a larger loyalty and the dedication of their lives and substance to the building of the Kingdom.

For the past fifteen or more years he had struggled against physical weakness. He could not "take out," and doubtless he shortened his days in his effort to fulfill the ministry to which he had felt a divine call. His radiant, cheerful spirit enabled him to keep in the background his own bodily ills, saying to his friends, "You know, I used to think of life in terms of years and months, but I have come to live a day at a time." At the session of the Annual Conference in Mineral Wells in 1944 Brother Odom asked to be placed on the inactive list. He felt that he might again take up his work, but almost unexpectedly the summons came, and one of the Lord's elect spirits entered into the world beyond.

Brother Odom's life was blessed by his marriage on April 6, 1902, to Martha Emma Bast. She shared with him the work of the church and at the same time was a most wonderful wife and mother. The three children born to the home, Mrs. Carl E. Graner of Fort Worth, Mrs. Otto R. Voss of Grand Prairie, and Olin O. Odom, are all devoted Christians. It is their privilege in the loss that has come to be partakers of the comforting assurance which is ours through the Risen and Ascended Christ.

JOHN ANDREW SICELOFF

John Andrew Sicheloff was born in the Methodist parsonage at Butler, Mo., December 7, 1884, into an unusually devout home. He joined the church at five years of age, and has been devoted to the Church from earliest childhood.

He heeded the call to the ministry under the pastorate of Dr. H. D. Knickerbocker at First Church, Ft. Worth, and was admitted on trial in November 1907. He was ordained deacon in 1909 and was admitted to full connection that year, and was ordained elder in 1914. After answering the call to the ministry, he returned to school, and took part of his theological work at Vanderbilt University; then took his A.B. degree at Columbia University and two years seminary work at Union Theological Seminary, both of New York. While there, he served as assistant pastor of The Church of Sea and Land, and pastor at Cold Springs Harbor, Long Island, successively.

He had served as assistant pastor at First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, and of First Methodist Church, Dallas, and was pastor of the Methodist Churches at Bartlett, Belton, Hemphill Heights of Fort Worth, First Church of Weatherford and Coleman, before taking the position of Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Christian Education of The Methodist Church, which place he held five years. Following this, at his request for work connected with rural areas, he was appointed to the pastorate of Midlothian, and then DeLeon, from which happy pastorate he was called up higher.

During World War I he served as Chaplain of the 315th Engineers of the 90th Division, and offered his services again during World War II, but was ineligible.

He was considered by the leaders of the church as an authority in the rural work and but few knew the high esteem given to his contributions to this field, not only by leaders in his own church, but other denominations and secular rural leaders, because of his aversion to personal publicity.

It was a source of gratification that the Board of Christian Education of the Conference during his term as Executive-Secretary, whole-heartedly supported his desire to see the Conference own a camp for the training of children and young people of this area. Under his leadership, and as a result of his untiring efforts, the outstanding Methodist Camp to be owned by a Conference in Texas, was secured near Glen Rose, Texas, properly known as "Glen Lake Camp." This Camp was opened in June of 1940. Since that day of opening, each summer hundreds of youth and youth leaders, have been trained here at this Camp. During the past year (1945) more than a score of young men have surrendered to the ministry as a result of the Christian program of this great Camp.

The greatest contribution of John A. Sicheloff was his Christ-like ministry and his tireless and enthusiastic service which he carried into every pastorate. No one ever doubted his earnestness, his zeal and his devotion to the cause of his Lord and Master. He was loved by laymen throughout the Conference. His brethren of the ministry loved him, and he warmed their hearts by his presence and unselfish spirit. The Conference lacks that something which his presence always gave to an annual session of the Conference.

He leaves a wife, two daughters and two sons, each of whom serves the church he loved, and two of them in full time ministry. I served his family two years as pastor, and they were always active in the church making a distinctive contribution to the Kingdom of God. Their home life was beautiful, with full Christian unity in all things.

CHARLES EDWARD SIMPSON

Charles Edward Simpson was born at Fairfield, Texas, February 25, 1866 and passed to his heavenly home on July 14, 1945, at Itasca, Texas. His last words were "Jesus here I am."

He was admitted to the Texas Conference in 1892 and assigned to Mt. Vernon charge. In 1895 he was ordained a deacon and in 1898 an elder. Other appointments served in the regular itinerant ranks were Lott, Kosse, Waller, Davilla, and Woodville.

In 1906 he transferred to the Central Texas Conference, serving Barry, Milford, Gordon, Diamond Hill, Walnut Springs, Weatherford (Couts Mem.) Ballinger, Temple (Seventh St.) Palmer, Granbury, Crawford and China Springs.

After giving 41 years to the active ministry, Bro. Simpson took the retired relation in 1933 and made his home in Itasca. Out of 53 Annual Conferences during his ministry he missed only one in the active period and one during his retirement; both due to illness.

He was married July 22, 1896 to Miss Bessie Walkup, at Eddy, Texas, who survives him, together with two sons and two daughters. These are Mrs. Bessie Jo Johnson of Penelope, Mrs. Winna Mae Garner of Austin, John Edward Simpson of Yorktown, and Cpl. Hartzell A. Simpson of Itasca. The latter was with the 88th Signal Corps in Italy at the time of his father's final appointment.

Bro. Simpson's presence is missed in the community where he lived, in the congregation where he was always in his pew twice on Sunday. The memory of his loyalty continues to be an inspiration. Because of his faithfulness many Love the Lord and serve Him better. His presence is no longer with us, but his works do follow after him.

He served five charges in Missouri, and in 1906 transferred to the West Oklahoma Conference. His one appointment there was a station.

In 1917 Brother Wright transferred to the Central Texas Conference, for two reasons: to educate his children in Southwestern University, and because of Mrs. Wright's ill health. He retired in 1932, living from that time until his death in his own home in Georgetown.

In the pulpit G. R. Wright was a man's man, virile and courageous. In the home, a Christian gentleman: In the pew, he was to the preacher an inspiring listener, and an expert visitor in the homes of the sick and shut-ins.

During his residence in Georgetown Brother Wright helped in the Mexican Mission, and at Northside Church. His last social function was to attend a Mexican wedding party, and his last ministerial act was to baptize his great-grandson, having also baptized the granddaughter and

her mother. It was a climactic moment of his ministry, just a few weeks before his death. Seated inside the chancel of First Methodist Church in Georgetown, receiving the child into his arms, Brother Wright passed on to the fourth generation of his own family by the administration of baptism the spiritual heritage with which so many other lives had been blessed throughout his fruitful ministry.

Recall this conversation between Evangelist and Pilgrim in John Bunyan's immortal allegory—"Then said Evangelist, 'Why standest thou still?'" Pilgrim answered "Because I know not whither to go." Then said Evangelist, pointing with his finger over a very wide field, "Do you see yonder wicket-gate?" The man said "No." Then said the other, "Do you see yonder shining light?" He said, "I think I do." Then said Evangelist, "Look always at that Light and go up directly thereto; so shalt thou see the Gate; at which when thou knowest, it shall be told thee what thou shalt do."

When a lad I saw that Light, brighter than the noon-day sun. I did not see the wicket-gate. In after years the Light led me thereto. I knocked upon it and was told what to do. In humble penitence I ask forgiveness wherein I have fallen short of the heroic words spoken to me at the Gate. I did not see all that lay beyond that Gate, not the high joys nor the oft broken heart, but looking backward in this hour, I thank God he led me thereto and gave scope to my aspiration and vision far out beyond the narrow horizons of life.

The colorful story of wrestling Jacob is packed with useful teaching for both the saint and the sinner. Jacob the supplanter, the crafty one, always trying to trip up some one—when he took the road back home after a profitable sojourn with Laban, he came to a very rough stretch. At the ford of Jabbok he wrestled with an antagonist in the dark. He did not know his name, whether demon or angel, but with the coming of day there dawned the terrifying consciousness that his antagonist was God. A new Jacob was born, new values, new sense of moral obligation; a new "sun rose upon him" but in body he was crippled and "halted upon his thigh." The impact of catastrophe had done its noblest work. Through it and in it Jacob found a greater God.

As sure as life lasts we have an appointment with old age and Father Time will see that the engagement is kept. Shall we be meeting an evil messenger out of the dark, an antagonist to push us along into a deeper night, an angel to bless us or a foe to curse us? "I will not let thee go, except thou bless me." Wrestling Jacob, lead us to find the source of power by which thou didst prevail, that glorious mystic power of mutation we so often need, to change minus to plus and weights to wings. "I will not let thee go, except thou bless me."

The God of Jacob is our God, whose being we now more fully comprehend. At all our border-lines we shall find Him. He meets us at Jabbok and transforms it into Peniel. Tho we go with a limp He is ever near.

"Grow old alone with me;
The best is yet to be,
The last of life for which the first was made;
Our times are in his hand
Who saith, 'A whole I planned,
Youth shows but half;
Trust God; see all, nor be afraid.'
My times be in thy hand!
Perfect the cup as planned!
Let age approve of youth
And death complete the same."

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER**THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE:**

1. The Conference shall elect annually a Secretary. On his nomination, assistants shall be elected as follows: Minutes, Conference Business, Reports, Roll, Press. He shall also nominate, and the Conference elect, an Editor of the Journal and a Conference Statistician who shall nominate his assistants. These nominations shall include two assistant Statistical Secretaries for each of the several Districts, who shall work under the direction of the Conference Statistician.
2. The Secretary of the Conference shall mail report blanks to all pastors not later than thirty days prior to the meeting of the Conference.
4. Upon arrival at the Conference, each pastor shall report immediately to the Conference Treasurer all monies due, and deliver to the Conference Treasurer or his agents, the Treasurer's Envelope with financial report properly filled in as paid, and enclosing Table II properly filled in. The Conference Treasurer shall stamp his OK on Table III if money and report tally. If not, he shall make note of any differences. The Treasurer shall deliver Table III to the Conference Statistician.
5. The District Superintendents are a Standing Committee to nominate all the Boards and Regular Standing Committees and the Tellers at each session of the Conference and provide mimeographed copies for distribution, provided that no member of the Conference shall be nominated for membership on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the sessions of the Conference. (This provision to become effective after the 1940 session of the Conference.)
6. No person shall be a member of a Conference Board if he is in the salaried employ of that Board, or of an Institution which derives financial support from said Board.
7. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.
8. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board. Vacancies on all Quadrennial Boards and Standing Committees shall be filled by nomination of the Board or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference.
9. All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except the statistical reports, coming to the Conference must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk. The Secretary is authorized not to receive them unless so presented.
10. The names and addresses of the lay delegates and alternate lay delegates from each charge shall be certified by the District Superintendent to the Secretary of the Annual Conference not later than July 1st, next preceding the convening of the Annual Conference.
11. The Secretary of the Conference is instructed to print in the Journal only the names of Lay Delegates who are present at the sessions of the Conference.
12. All Boards which are empowered by the Discipline to make nominations for General and Jurisdictional Boards shall include such nominations in their reports to the Annual Conference at the session prior to the meeting of the above Boards.
13. The Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications shall furnish the Secretary of the Conference with a report concerning each one admitted to the Conference, using an information blank to be agreed upon by the Committee and the Conference Secretary.
14. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications to inquire carefully into the physical health of all

candidates for admission into the Conference. The Committee may, at its discretion, require the health of the applicant to be certified by a physician.

15. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special apportionment to be levied upon the churches, unless such new or special apportionment shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the Methodist Church or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so entrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust had been executed and how.

16. It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to furnish the Table of Apportionments for the ensuing year, arriving at the scale for the districts by determining what percent of the grand total of World Service funds has been paid by each District for the current year, and, on this percentage, base the Table of Apportionments for the ensuing year.

17. The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

18. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference work an amount sufficient to meet the expense of printing the Minutes, the Treasurer's bond, and the necessary expense of the Conference Secretary.

19. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall include in its Budget a sufficient sum for the following: a per diem of \$2.00 for every pastor and every lay delegate attending the Conference from Charges paying less than \$1,500.00, except those of the city in which the Conference is held; a per diem of \$3.00 for every Retired Minister attending the Conference, and \$300.00 to care for the necessary expenses in holding the Annual Conference, such items to be sanctioned by the Chairman of the Commission of World Service and Finance.

20. Churches assessing \$1,500 or more shall care for the conference entertainment of their pastors and lay delegates.
THE DISTRICT:

21. The District Conference shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the 1940 Discipline, Paragraph 482; the Recording Stewards of the several charges; and one delegate for every 100 members, or two-thirds fraction thereof, to be elected by the Church Conference, provided that every church shall have at least one delegate.

22. Each District Superintendent, in reporting upon the work of his district, shall indicate if any church in the district has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary or benevolences for the year just closing, stating the name of the church and the amount borrowed.

23. All bonds required by the laws of the Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

24. All votes, except when otherwise ordered by the Conference, shall be by show of hands.

25. It shall require a two-thirds vote to suspend any of these Rules.
