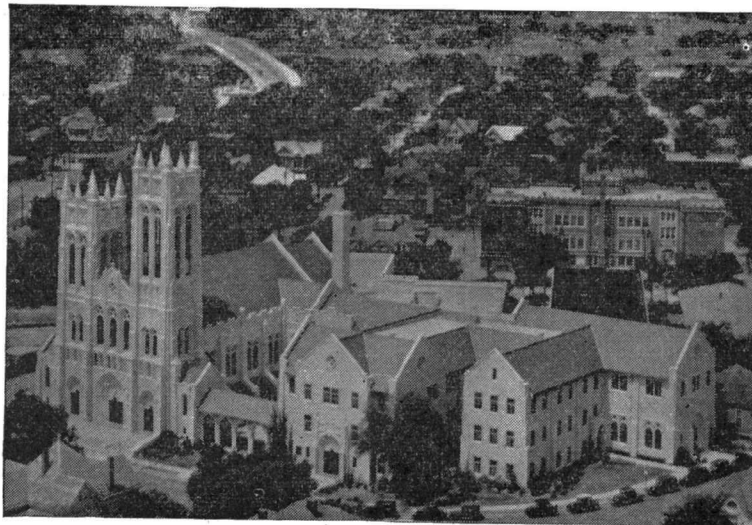

DAILY PROCEEDINGS**Opening Session—Thursday, June 5th, 1947**

Opening—The Central Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church met in its eighty-second session (the thirty-second since the division from the old Norwest Texas Conference and the ninth since unification) at 10:00 o'clock, Thursday morning, June 5, 1947, in First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, with Bishop A. Frank Smith, D.D., LL.D., in the chair.

The hymn, "Holy, Holy, Holy" was the opening song, followed by the recitation of the Apostles Creed as the Affirmation of Faith, and the Responsive Scripture selection, "An Unfaltering Trust."

The Bishop offered prayer, concluding with the Lord's Prayer in unison. The conference stood and sang four stanzas of the hymn, "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?"

Roll—W. W. Ward, the Secretary of the last session of the annual conference, was requested to perfect the roll of the conference. This was done by the distribution of cards, on which the clerical and lay members registered their attendance. (See Roll.)

Organization—W. W. Ward was elected Secretary of the Conference. Upon his nomination, the following assistant secretaries were elected: J. D. F. Williams, Journal; H. M. Hopkins, Conference Business; Fred Benkley, Reports; Roy L. Felder, Roll; W. L. Hanla, Press; G. Alfred Brown, Editor of the Journal; W. V. Bane, Statistical Secretary. The Committee on minutes was approved; Urban Schulze and E. C. Carter.

Point of Order—M. A. Turner raised the point of order that the Secretary of the Annual Conference had no right to function as the Secretary after the adjournment of the Annual Conference. The point was not sustained by the Bishop.

Organization—G. Alfred Brown nominated C. C. Sessions and J. B. Holt as Assistant Editors of the Journal. W. V. Bane nominated as his assistants R. E. Briggs, W. A. Flynn, J. T. Gardner, Milton Slayden, Albert Peterson, and S. A. Baker. These were elected.

Passage of Character—E. R. Gordon, Chairman of the Committee on Ministerial Qualifications reported that there was nothing against the character of any clerical member of the annual conference.

Bar of the Conference—Warren Johnston, Pastor host, moved the hours of the business sessions be set from 8:30 A.M. to 12:15 P.M. He also moved that the bar of the conference be set as the lower floor as far back as the third tier of columns. These items were adopted.

Order of the Day—C. C. Henson moved that we begin balloting for delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences after the passage of the undergraduates and the reception of the class into full connection. This was adopted.

Conference Entertainment—A. G. Standlee moved the suspension of Rules 17 and 18 and the adoption of a special report on conference entertainment. It was so ordered. (See Reports.)

Nominations—W. W. Ward, as Secretary of the Cabinet read the nominations for vacancies on Boards and Commissions and Committees. These were elected. (See List.)

Undergraduates—E. H. Lightfoot, the Chairman of the Committee on Ministerial Training, and Ross G. Smith, the Chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations, reported for the undergraduates.

First Year—James Morris Cooper, Ernest Sanford DeWald, Homer Lee Fort, John Harper, Charles Edward Lutrick, Richard Earl Millsap, Richard Russell Smith, and Harry Cletus Walz were advanced to the class of the second year.

Homer Sanford Cox and Bert Marvin Gillis had not completed their course of study and were retained in the class of the first year.

Third Year—Marvin Cockrell Bledsoe, Roy Lee Felder, Ervin Miles Gathings, Nicholas Henry Kupferle, Jr., and Frank Lowell Turner, Jr., were advanced to the class of the fourth year.

Fourth Year—Kester Maurice Hearn, Leon Caldwell Mathis, John James Norris, Paul Edward Pfeiffer, Lowell Randall Rogers, Plez Todd, Robert Welcome Walker, and Vernon Grant White have completed their courses of study for the four years.

Location—W. H. Cole moved that Paul E. Pfeiffer be granted an honorable location at his own request. It was granted.

Personal Privilege—M. A. Turner raised a point concerning the pastor's annual report. The Bishop ruled that a pastor could withhold the annual report until the first day of the conference, although such action would seriously interfere with the work of the statistical secretaries.

Conference Relations—Ross G. Smith moved that the names of all men now retired (except those retired by age-limitation) and those now supernumerary be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the same relationship. It was so ordered.

Upon the motion of the District Superintendent of the minister named, the following were referred to the Committee for the retired relation: Seba Kirkpatrick (personal request), W. G. Gwaltney (doctor's certificate), F. H. Ingram (doctor's certificate), B. E. Kimbrow (doctor's certificate), E. W. Swearingen (doctor's certificate) and J. F. Isbell (doctor's certificate). Geo. W. Kornegay was retired by age-limitation.

Orders—Ross G. Smith reported for the Committee on Conference Relations that the following were recommended for Deacons' Orders: As members on trial in the course of study: Wayne Ballew Dunson, Kenneth James Cooper. As Seminary students: Charles Edward Lutrick, Harry Cletus Walz. As a Local Preacher: Henry John Hansen, Jr. These were elected to Deacons' Orders.

The following were recommended to Elders' Orders: As conference members in the conference studies: Plez Archie Todd, John James Norris, Robert Welcome Walker, Vernon Grant White. As Seminary students: Gilbert Lee Ferrell, John Watt Lindsey, John Barcus Moore, Harvey Griffith Williamson, Robert Bruce Weaver, Roy Lee Felder. As Local Preachers: Frank Taylor Fisher and Ethelbert Peyton Goodman. These were elected to Elders' Orders.

Point of Order—The Secretary raised the point of order that the conference could not pass upon such recommendations without the recommendations from the District Conferences and the certificates of recommendation filed with the Secretary of the Conference, and that no such certificates had been received. The point was sustained. These certificates were then presented in due form.

Second Year—Ross G. Smith and E. H. Lightfoot reported that the members in the class of the second year had completed their work and were recommended for admission into full connection as follows: Kenneth James Cooper, Wayne Ballew Duncan, Gilbert Lee Ferrell, John Watts Lindsay, John Marcus Moore, Robert Bruce Weaver, Harvey Griffith Williamson.

Hollis Shook and John Nelson Russell Score II were reported that their courses of study had been passed but because of their absence could not be received into full connection.

Deceased Ministers—The Secretary read the names of the following ministers who had died during the conference year; D. K. Porter, Atticus Webb, and D. T. Knight. These names were referred to the Committee on Memoirs. He also read the names of the following ministers' wives who had died during the year: Mrs. W. G. Graves, Mrs. D. T. Knight, Mrs. I. F. Haris, Mrs. W. J. Lemons, Mrs. J. G. Grimes, Mrs. L. G. Rogers, Mrs. W. D. Gaskins, and Mrs. N. E. Gardner.

Received from Other Churches—P. E. Riley presented the name of John Edward Brown to be received as traveling preacher from the Baptist Church. Brother Brown spoke to the Conference. Having met our educational requirements, he was received in the course of studies, and that his orders would be recognized when he took the vows without the reimposition of hand.

Admission on Trial—Joseph Weldon Butler, from the Gatesville District, Henry John Hansen, Jr., from the Waxahachie District and George Walter French, Jr., from the Georgetown District were represented by the district superintendents, spoke to the conference and received the approval of the committees, and were admitted on trial.

Full Connection—The following: Kenneth James Cooper, Wayne Ballew Dunson, Gilbert Lee Ferrell, John Watts Lindsay, John Barcus Moore, Robert Bruce Weaver, and Harvey Griffith Williamson were called to the chancel, and after answering the Disciplinary questions satisfactorily, were admitted by vote into full connection.

Election of Delegates—The Bishop explained the procedure for electing the delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences. J. R. Edwards moved that we proceed by voting first for delegates to the General Conference and after these were elected to vote for the delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. It was so ordered.

The Bishop read the paragraphs in the Discipline in relation to the election and qualifications of delegates.

The Secretary reported that the conference had 229 clerical members in full connection and that we were entitled to four clerical delegates to the General Conference and an addition six delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference and an equal number of lay delegates.

A motion was passed that we elect three alternate delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

The first ballot for four clerical and four lay delegates was spread. The ballots were closed and the tellers retired.

Adjournment—After announcements and the sing of the Doxology, the session adjourned with the benediction by the Bishop.

Second Session—Thursday Afternoon

Opening—Finis A. Crutchfield called the conference to order at 2:30 Thursday afternoon. Hayden Edwards led the conference in singing "Saviour, More Than Life to Me." Ed. R. Barcus offered prayer. Bishop Smith took the chair.

Personal Privilege—Oran Shephens moved that the Conference send a telegram to Dr. J. W. Bergin, who had just suffered a stroke. E. R. Barcus moved that greetings be sent to B. E. Kimbrow. C. H. Cole moved that a message of sympathy be sent to W. D. Gaskins in the death of Mrs.

Gaskins, and to W. G. Gwaltney. A. S. Gafford moved that greetings be sent to D. L. McCree and R. B. Young. The Secretary was so instructed.

Ballot—The results of the first clerical ballot was announced: 215 votes cast, 4 defective, 211 valid votes, 106 necessary to elect. J. N. R. Score having received 144 votes was declared elected.

The result of the first lay ballot was announced: 122 votes cast, 12 defective, 110 valid; 56 necessary to elect. Hal H. Cherry having received 73 votes was declared elected.

The second ballot for three clerical and three lay delegates was spread.

McMurry College—Dr. Harold G. Cooke, President of McMurry College, Abilene, spoke of the work of this college.

Deacons' Orders—J. N. R. Score II was elected to Deacons' Orders, as a Seminary student, to be ordained later.

Planning Committee—J. D. F. Williams read the report of the Planning Committee. Item 7 was withdrawn with the consent of the Committee.

R. J. LaPrade and Hubert C. Smith spoke concerning item 2. An amendment offered by R. J. LaPrade was accepted by the Committee.

Ballot—The result of the second clerical ballot was announced: 181 votes cast, 4 defective, 177 valid, 89 necessary to elect. There was no election. A third ballot for three clerical delegates was spread.

Planning Committee—J. I. Patterson and J. N. R. Score spoke to item 3. An amendment offered by Dr. Score was accepted. The report as a whole as amended was adopted. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The result of the second lay ballot was announced: 120 votes cast, 21 defective, 99 valid, 50 necessary to elect. Mrs. B. B. Wedemeyer having received 67 votes, and Hubert Johnson having received 60 votes were declared elected. A ballot for one lay delegate was spread.

Personal Privilege—J. W. W. Shuler spoke to the conference, and was granted leave of absence after tomorrow's morning session.

Extension of Time—Time was extended to take the fourth clerical ballot.

Leave of Absence—At the request of P. E. Riley, leave of absence was granted to Paul K. Deats, Jr.

Conference Entertainment—Hubert C. Smith, as chairman of the local entertaining committee, moved reconsideration of the action taken this morning on Conference Entertainment. It was reconsidered. He moved that \$4.50 per diem be allowed the retired ministers attending the conference and that the housing committee be allowed sufficient amount to pay for hotel accommodations reserved by them for retired ministers. The report was adopted as amended. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The result of the third clerical ballot was announced: 197 votes cast, 3 defective, 194 valid, 98 necessary to elect. A. S. Gafford having received 101 votes was declared elected. The fourth clerical ballot for two delegates was spread.

The result of the third lay ballot was announced: 132 votes cast, 132 valid, 67 necessary to elect. There was no election. A fourth lay ballot for one delegate was spread.

Adjournment—The session adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Smith.

Third Session—Friday Morning

Opening—Bishop Smith called the conference to order at 8:30 Friday morning, June 6th, 1947. Quay Farmer read Acts 22 and led in prayer.

Minutes—Urban A. Schulze reported that the minutes were in good order and they were approved.

Roll—Opportunity for the registration of late-arriving members was given.

General Privilege—J. N. R. Score announced the Pastors' School at Southwestern University July 7-12 and the Town and Country Conference, August 20-27.

Publishing House—The representative of the Publishing House at Dallas called attention to the book display and announced that the usual checks would have to be delayed until after the meeting of the Board of Publication.

Ballot—The result of the fourth clerical ballot was announced: 184 votes cast, 4 void, 180 valid, 91 necessary to elect. P. E. Riley receiving 91 votes was declared elected. The fifth clerical ballot for one delegate was spread.

The result of the fourth lay ballot was announced: 107 votes cast, 107 valid, 54 necessary to elect. There was no election. The fifth lay ballot for one delegate was spread.

Board of Education—H. C. Smith, the President of the Board of Education called on C. C. Sessions to read Report No. 1 of the Board of Education. He moved adoption of the report. Pending the adoption of the report, J. B. Holt, the retiring Executive Secretary reported on his work for the past six years. Bishop Smith commended Brother Holt for his fine services.

The staff for the ensuing year was presented and each spoke of their plans.

Dr. Warren Johnston, the Conference Director of the Crusade for Christ, spoke about next years' emphasis upon Church School enrollment and attendance.

Rev. Horace Williams, representative of the General Board of Education, addressed the conference.

W. H. Coleman, our Trustee for the Western Methodist Assembly, Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas, told of the progress and plans of this institution.

Report No. 1 was adopted. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The results of the fifth clerical ballot was announced: 197 votes cast, 1 defective, 196 valid, 99 necessary to elect. There was no election. The result of the fifth lay ballot was announced: 118 votes cast, 1 void, 117 valid, 59 necessary to elect. There was no election. The sixth clerical and sixth lay ballot was spread.

Board of Education—C. C. Sessions read report No. 2 of the Board of Education and moved adoption of the report.

Dr. Law Sone, President of Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, Texas; Dr. J. N. R. Score, President of Southwestern University, and Dean Eugene B. Hawk, representing the Southern Methodist University and the Perkins School of Theology, addressed the conference. Mrs. Karl E. Downs, the wife of the President of Sam Houston College, at Austin, represented that

institution. H. C. Smith urged the observance of College Day. The report No. 2 was adopted. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The results of the sixth clerical ballot was announced: 199 votes cast, 199 valid, 100 necessary to elect. Floyd E. Johnson receiving 103 votes was declared elected. The result of the sixth lay ballot was announced: 118 votes cast, 118 valid, 60 necessary to elect. There was no election. The seventh clerical ballot for six jurisdictional delegates was spread. The seventh lay ballot for one general delegate was spread.

Boyce Martin was appointed supervisor of the lay tellers in the place of Hubert Johnson.

Hospitals and Homes—W. D. Smith, the Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital, read the report for the trustees. Dr. Chas. H. Harris, Director of the hospital, read his report. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The result of the seventh lay ballot was announced: 120 votes cast, 120 valid, 61 necessary to elect. W. B. Rider receiving 69 votes was declared elected. The eighth lay ballot for six jurisdictional delegates was spread.

Lay Activities—Hal H. Cherry asked Sam Braswell to read the report of the Board of Lay Activities. He moved adoption of the report. He then presented Mr. S. E. McCreeless, Conference Lay Leader of the Southwest Texas Conference, who represented the General Board of Lay Activities. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The result of the seventh clerical ballot was announced: 197 votes cast, 10 void, 187 valid, 94 necessary to elect. W. W. Ward receiving 103 votes and R. W. Goodloe receiving 96 votes, were declared elected.

Board of Missions and Church Extension—Warren Johnston called on W. N. Dunson to read Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

G. Alfred Brown read Report No. 2 concerning the Church Extension section. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Dr. C. W. Lokey, of the General Board of Mission, spoke concerning the work of the Board and especially of the National Methodist Rural Life Conference to be held at Lincoln, Nebraska in July. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Meyers, who had given their life-savings in an endowment to the Board of Missions, were presented to the conference.

Ballot—The results of the eighth lay ballot was announced: 96 votes cast, 3 void, 93 valid, 47 necessary to elect. Mrs. Joel Hooper receiving 70 votes and Walter B. Amsler receiving 60 votes were declared elected. The results of the eighth clerical ballot was announced: 160 votes cast, 7 void, 153 valid, 77 necessary to elect. Eugene B. Hawk receiving 77 votes was declared elected.

Adjournment—The session adjourned until 2:00 o'clock this afternoon.

Fourth Session—Friday Afternoon

Opening—Finis A. Crutchfield called the conference to order at 2:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon, June 6th, 1947. E. C. Carter led the conference in singing, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Dr. W. H. McKenzie led in prayer. Bishop Smith assumed the chair.

Ballot—The ninth clerical ballot for three jurisdictional delegates and the ninth lay ballot for four jurisdictional delegates was then taken.

Woman's Society of Christian Service—Mrs. B. B. Wedemeyer, President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, reported for the work of that organization. (See Reports.)

Minimum Salary Support—J. N. R. Score read suggested changes in the constitution on the Minimum Salary Support Commission. These were adopted. (See Reports.) He then moved a special authorization to the Commission concerning payments to Accepted Supply Pastors for the year now closing. This was granted. (See Report.)

Board of Temperance—The report of the Board of Temperance was read by W. P. Cunningham. A telegram was read and the Secretary was instructed to send it to Governor Jester.

Dr. W. H. McKenzie, Superintendent of the United Texas Drys, addressed the Conference. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The results of the ninth clerical ballot was announced: 147 votes cast, 2 void, 145 valid, 73 necessary to elect. There was no election. The tenth clerical ballot for three delegates was spread. The results of the ninth lay ballot was announced: 81 votes cast, 3 void, 78 valid, 40 necessary to elect. Miss Mary Moody receiving 54 votes and Clive Pierce receiving 49 votes were declared elected. The tenth lay ballot for two delegates was spread.

Leave of Absence—Without objection leave of absence was granted J. N. R. Score.

Visitor—The Bishop presented Finis A. Crutchfield, Jr. to the Conference.

Harris College of Nursing—Student nurses from the Harris College of Nursing distributed literature to the conference.

Wesley Foundation—C. H. Cole, Conference Director of the Wesley Foundation campaign reported that the campaign was well along, and most districts had completed their quotas. Dr. Glenn Flinn told of the state-wide work. The report of the committee was adopted. (See Reports.)

Ballot—The results of the tenth lay ballot was announced: 97 votes cast, 2 void, 89 valid, 45 necessary to elect. Mrs. Charles E. Culbertson, receiving 49 votes, was declared elected. The eleventh lay ballot for one delegate was taken.

Allied Youth—Dr. Asa Bridges, Executive Secretary of the Allied Youth of Texas, spoke to the conference.

Ballot—The results of the tenth clerical ballot was announced: 147 votes cast, 147 valid, 74 necessary to elect. G. Alfred Brown having received 82 votes was declared elected. The eleventh clerical ballot for two delegates was taken.

Privilege—Chaplain (Major) Thad E. Son spoke to the Conference and requested the renewal of his appointment as Chaplain.

Ballot—The result of the eleventh lay ballot was announced: 95 votes cast, 1 void, 94 valid, 48 necessary to elect. There was no election. The twelfth ballot for one delegate was taken.

Adjournment—The session adjourned.

Fifth Session—Friday Night

Ordination Session—After the regular worship service and the sermon by Dr. Albert P. Skirkey on Friday night, June 6th, 1947, the conference met in the ordination session.

W. W. Ward, the Secretary of the conference, presented those who were to be ordained deacons and then who were to be ordained elders. The Bishop requested the wives of the ministers who were to be ordained to come with their husbands.

Ordination of Deacons—The Bishop ordained as Deacons: Wayne Ballew Dunson, Kenneth James Cooper, Charles Edward Lutrick, Harry Cletus Walz, and Henry John Hansen, Jr.

Ordination of Elders—The Bishop, with the assistance of selected elders ordained the following to be Elders: Robert Welcome Walker, Plez Archie Todd, John James Norris, Vernon Grant White, Gilbert Lee Ferrell, John Watt Lindsey, John Barcus Moore, Harvey Friffith Williamson, Robert Bruce Weaver, Roy Lee Felder, Franklin Taylor Fisher and Ethelbert Payton Goodman.

John Wesley Jones and William Earl Johnston, members of the South-west Texas Conference and having been elected to Elder's orders by that conference were also ordained elders.

The Secretary presented the ordination parchments.

Adjournment—The session then adjourned with the benediction.

Sixth Session—Saturday Morning

Opening—W. H. Coleman called the conference to order Saturday morning, June 7th, 1947. He read selections (John 20:21, 22 and Acts 1:8) and led in prayer. The conference sang "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing." Bishop Smith assumed the chair. The hymn, "Amazing Grace," was sung.

Minutes—E. C. Carter reported that the minutes were in order and they were approved.

Ballot—The results of the eleventh ballot was announced: 149 votes cast, 2 void, 147 valid, 74 necessary to elect. There was no election. The twelfth clerical ballot for two delegates was taken. The results of the twelfth lay ballot was announced: 92 votes cast, 1 void, 91 valid, 46 necessary to elect. There was no election. The thirteen lay ballot for one delegate was taken.

World Service and Finance—T. F. Sterck, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, moved that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to pay all deficits which had arisen out of the seven-month conference year. It was adopted.

W.C.T.U.—Mrs. C. C. Jenson, representing the State W.C.T.U. spoke to the conference.

Methodist Home—Hubert Johnson, Superintendent of the Methodist Home, told of the work of that home for the past year.

Ballot—The results of the fourteen lay ballot was announced: 81 votes cast, 3 void, 78 valid, 40 necessary to elect. Joe Witherspoon receiving 43 votes was declared elected.

Hospitals and Homes—J. W. Sprinkle read the report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. It was adopted. (See Reports.)

Reserve Pension Plan—P. E. Riley read the report of the Commission on the Reserve Pension Plan, and moved the adoption of the report. While this was pending a ballot was received.

Ballot—The results of the twelfth clerical ballot was announced: 162 votes cast, 9 void, 153 valid, 77 necessary to elect. C. H. Cole having received 89 votes was declared elected. The thirteenth ballot for one clerical delegate was spread.

Oran Stephens moved that when all delegates had been elected that the next three receiving the highest number of votes be declared the alternates to the Jurisdictional Conference. The Bishop ruled this motion was out of order.

Pension—Dr. B. L. Schubel, representing the General Board of Pensions, discussed the recommendation. J. I. Patterson, H. C. Bowman, and L. W. Seymour spoke to the motion. J. R. Edwards spoke as a layman supporting the plan. W. W. Ward moved to amend the report by substituting a new paragraph for item 2, thus eliminating any assessment against the local churches. This was accepted by the Commission and the Conference. R. A. Langston, E. R. Stanford, J. N. R. Score, G. C. Boswell, Hubert C. Smith, Hal H. Cherry, and W. H. Coleman spoke to the motion. W. H. Cole moved the previous question. It was so ordered. The recommendations were adopted. (See Reports.)

Conference Claimants—Lloyd Sanders read the report of the Board of Conference Claimants. The report was adopted. (See Reports.)

Conference Relations—Ross G. Smith read the report of the Committee on Conference Relations recommending the same relation to all who were referred to the Committee. Report No. 1 named the retired men and Report No. 2 named, the Supernumerary. These reports were adopted. (See Reports.)

Jim Clark gave testimony to the fine work of A. E. Turney. R. J. LaPrade spoke about J. F. Isbell. W. W. Ward spoke of the situation concerning F. H. Ingram, A. E. Turney and Geo. W. Kornegay.

Ballot—The results of the thirteenth clerical ballot was announced: 197 votes cast, 197 valid, 99 necessary to elect. There was no election. The fourteenth clerical ballot for one delegate was spread.

Committee on Inter-Board Council—The Bishop announced the Committee to study the manner of the Inter-Board Council: Warren Johnston, H. C. Smith, J. W. Sharbutt, T. F. Sterck, W. B. Rider, Hal H. Cherry, Mrs. B. B. Wedemeyer, L. L. Felder, and E. H. Lightfoot.

Time—At the suggestion of the Bishop, time was extended to take another ballot and to transact further business after the service of commemoration.

Town and Country Commission—H. B. Lloyd recommended that J. D. F. Williams be confirmed as the Chairman of the Town and Country Commission. It was adopted.

Recess—The conference recessed for ten minutes.

Memorial Service—After recess, the conference entered into the service

of commemoration, using the printed order of worship. Dr. Shirkey brought the sermon. The names of the ministers who had died during the year were called, and then the name of the wives of ministers who had died were called.

Ballot—The results of the fourteenth clerical ballot was announced: 175 votes cast, 175 valid, 88 necessary to elect. R. C. Edwards receiving 88 votes was declared elected.

The results of reserve lay ballot was announced: 65 votes cast, 1 void, 64 valid, 33 necessary to elect. Boyce Martin receiving 57 votes, Mrs. E. L. Reid receiving 52 votes and J. R. Edwards receiving 49 votes were declared elected as the reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Adjournment—The session adjourned to meet tomorrow at 3:00 o'clock with the benediction pronounced by C. A. Sutton.

We the Joint Board of Publication of the Southwestern Advocate beg leave to submit the following report.

1. We note with pleasure that the Advocate appears to be growing in favor with the constituency. While the increase in subscriptions, which is about 33 1/3 per cent increase over what it was on November 1st of last year, is not quite what we had hoped it might be, we are pleased with the increase and are confident that a very considerable increase will be secured this year.

Rev. Edwin A. Hunter, the Editor, expresses his appreciation of the fine cooperation that has been given him throughout the area. He regrets that it has been necessary to carry as much commercial advertising as has been found on the pages of the Advocate, but we want to call the attention of the Conferences to the fact that in assuming the Editorship, he had to assume a number of outstanding liabilities. He has greatly reduced these liabilities during the last six months and expects, with the cooperation of the Conferences, and at least with no more advertising to completely liquidate all of these liabilities during the coming Conference year. He believes that with an increased subsidy that in a short time we shall be able to practically discontinue commercial advertising, at least on a large scale.

2. We recommend that Sunday, November 9th, be observed in all of our churches as Southwestern Advocate Sunday, and that each pastor accept as a subscription goal a list of subscribers equal to one for every twenty active members. We urge our pastors, if necessary, to carry through on this Advocate subscription campaign until his goal has been reached.

3. We recommend that the Central Texas Conference provide a subsidy of \$1000.00 for this Conference year to be used in the publication of The

Southwestern Advocate. All of the Texas Conferences are being asked for the same subsidy.

4. The Board expressed its very genuine appreciation of the work of Rev. E. A. Hunter as Editor of The Southwestern Advocate and unanimously elected him to the Editor for another year.

4. That Standing Rule No. 19 be amended so as to include the Chairman of the Commission on Social Action in the membership of the Conference Planning Committee.

6. That there be appointed a committee to study the advisability of an Inter-Board Council and the employment of a Conference Executive Secretary and staff and to bring its recommendations to the 1948 session of the Annual Conference.
7. That Standing Rule No. 17 be amended by inserting after the phrase, "a per diem of \$3.00 for every retired minister attending the Conference," the words, "the hotel expenses of retired ministers and their wives attending the Conference shall be paid by the Conference Entertainment Committee through the local entertainment committee."

The Crusade for Christ

The far-sighted wisdom of the General Conference in projecting the four year plan of the Crusade for Christ is bearing rich fruit for our church. The results of our year of Stewardship emphasis are not yet evident, but will be revealed in the years ahead. The reports coming to us of the work in the church at large are very encouraging.

Glen Lake Camp

During the seven months of this conference year construction of new buildings at Glen Lake has continued. There are now eleven new buildings ready for use this summer, thus doubling the capacity of the camp.

Construction of the other needed buildings will be resumed as rapidly as funds are received.

It is urged that funds for District projects be secured as rapidly as possible, so that these needed buildings may be brought to completion after September 1st. To this end we request that the Conference approve the District financial campaigns be continued until these District projects be completed.

The regular camping season will begin June 2 and continue through September 1st. Every week is filled with camps for our Methodist people.

Howard Sego, Camp Superintendent, is well acquainted with the work and is doing a splendid job preparing the camp for more efficient operations.

Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's Report shows that the Board has operated within its budget and will come to the end of its fiscal year with a very small balance. The Treasurer's Report and the financial report of Camp operations and Building Fund are being filed with the Conference Secretary and will be printed in the Journal.

Budget

We are requesting the World Service Commission to divide into two separate and distinct items of appropriations the money granted to the Board; one to be headed "Board of Education Operating Expense" and the other to be known as "Funds for Schools and Colleges." With this request in mind, we are filing with your Conference Secretary the two budgets—one for operating expenses totaling \$12,050.00 and the other for our schools and colleges, these to be printed in the Journal.

Conference Staff

It is with deep regret that we announce the resignation of Reverend J. B. Holt as the Executive Secretary of the Board. Reverend Holt has done a splendid and efficient job during his years of service in this field. He now feels that it is time for him to leave this field of service and to receive an appointment to a pastoral charge. The good wishes of the Board go with him as he enters this work.

The Board has elected Reverend William H. Cole as the new Executive Secretary and requests the Bishop and the Cabinet to appoint Reverend William H. Cole to this position.

The Board has elected Reverend Charles Lutrick to the position as Director of Youth Work and request that the Bishop and Cabinet appoint Reverend Lutrick to this position. He also will receive the scholarship to Southern Methodist University from the Board of Education of this conference.

The Board has elected Mrs. Wm. H. Cole as Director of Children's Work.

The Board has also elected Hal H. Cherry as Director of Adult Work, Reverend J. W. Sprinkle as Director of Young Adult Work, Reverend Cleo Wooten as Director of Intermediate Work. These men to serve without salary.

The Camp Committee, with the approval of the Board, has elected Howard Sego as Camp Superintendent.

EDUCATION, NO. 2**Schools and Colleges**

The reports from our Educational Institutions continue to show large enrollments. All schools and colleges report that they have operated within their budgets. There is a very imperative need for increased funds, both from increased endowments and Annual Conference contributions. For this reason we have requested of the World Service Commission to increase our appropriation for these institutions to \$15,000.00. The increase, if granted, will be distributed proportionately to all the agencies receiving money from the Board. The budget will be filed with the Secretary as a part of this report when allocation is made.

We again urge that all churches observe College Day in order that this observance will bring an increased revenue for our schools and colleges. The financial campaign for Texas Wesleyan College carried out in the city of Fort Worth has been very encouraging and this increase in funds for this school will mean that the future is brighter than it has been for many a year. The local financial campaigns in the cities in which colleges of the Southwestern University System are located have greatly eased the financial situation for the maintenance of these schools and colleges.

Methodist Student Movement

We must continue to take the church to our students at our state schools and colleges. An increase in funds for this most important work must be in hand if this program is to continue to help our students. To this end we urge that all churches give their members the opportunity to understand this work and also to have a part in the FIVE DOLLAR PLAN. Universal observance of this PLAN will greatly increase the needed funds to carry on this work at our state educational institutions.

Inter-Conference Commission

The Board requests that the Commission study ways and means for a more adequate support for our Methodist colleges be continued for another year with the same personnel; namely, Erwin F. Bohmfalk and C. H. Sisserson.

EVANGELISM

Definite progress has been made in promoting the cause of Christ through special Evangelistic efforts during the past conference year. 5636 new members have been added to our rolls. 2102 have been received on profession of Faith. Considering the fact that this has been a short conference year and that many of our Churches conduct special summer campaigns, we feel that the report is encouraging.

Eight districts have drawn \$100.00 each from our Board for special evangelistic efforts. Two new churches have come as an outgrowth of this project—one at Coleman in the Brownwood District and one at South Purmela in the Gatesville District. The prosecution of this project has not been completed and we feel that more results will materialize.

We recommend that wherever possible the pastors begin the Conference year with a revival meeting.

We recommend that the pastors use our approved evangelists.

We recommend that the program of visitation evangelism be continued.

We recommend that the District Directors encourage and assist the pastors in planning the program of Evangelism in every charge.

We further recommend that the pastors continue to encourage the

use of the "Upper Room," "The New Life Magazine" and other periodicals designed to deepen the spiritual life of the people.

We have received the following reports from our approved Evangelists:

Rev. John M. Neal has conducted revivals in four southern states and reports 50 additions to church on profession of faith.

Rev. Frank L. Turner reports 8 meetings with 200 presenting themselves at the altar of the Church.

Rev. G. P. Comer reports 8 revivals in six states with 600 conversions and reclamations, 200 additions to the church, 200 new tithers, and 650 individuals pledging to erect family altars.

Rev. Quay Palmer reports 9 revivals, 400 conversions and reclamations, 131 family altars, 85 additions to the church on profession of faith, 32 additions by certificate.

We recommend as approved evangelists the following:

John M. Neal, Frank L. Turner, P. G. Comer, Quay Palmer, W. B. Morton and L. Bowman Craven.

HOSPITALS AND HOMES, NO. 1

Your Board of Hospital and Homes met June 4, 1947 and received the reports of the various Homes and Hospitals and other interests of the Central Texas Conference.

Reverend Roy F. Johnson made a report covering the Golden Cross donations of our Conference. \$4,939.22 was contributed by the Methodist Churches of the Central Texas Conference which materially aided the Hospital in its charity work. We appreciate the cooperation given this institution and request that during the ensuing year every church observe Golden Cross Sunday. We further recommend the appointment of Reverend Roy F. Johnson as Hospital Commissioner for another year.

One of the outstanding features of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital is the College of Nursing. We recommend that individual and churches do all that they can to provide \$100.00 scholarships to aid young women in preparing themselves for this worthy profession. We further hope that every pastor will encourage suitable young women to prepare themselves for the nursing profession and take advantage of the splendid training made available by this institution.

We submit as an appendix the report of the Methodist Home submitted by Hubert Johnson, Superintendent of the Home. Our Church is fortunate to have Mr. Johnson, as the Superintendent of the Home, and we appreciate the wonderful work the institution is doing to provide care for orphan children. Every church is urgently requested to observe Methodist Home Month in December and continue the splendid financial assistance which has been so generous in the past.

Rev. George F. Kornegay, Superintendent of the Retired Ministers Homes, submitted an excellent report of the years activities. \$5,240.39 was expended in repairing and purchasing homes for the Superannuates. We commend Brother Kornegay for his work and request his reappointment as Superintendent of Retired Ministers Homes for one year.

Rev. Robert L. Armor, Superintendent of the Texas Mission Home and Training School, submitted an excellent report. This is a worthy institution and is deserving of our cooperation. We sincerely urge every charge in the Central Texas Conference to observe the 12th of October 1947 as a special day for the Texas Mission Home and Training School.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF HARRIS MEMORIAL METHODIST HOSPITAL

To the Bishop and members of the Central Texas Annual Conference:

In order that the Board of Trustees may keep in close touch with the hospital, it has been decided to hold two meetings each year instead of the one meeting as formerly held. Accordingly, the first semi-annual meeting of the Board was held in April of this year, and hereafter the meetings will be held in April and November.

The April meetings of the Board was well attended and members of the Board continue to manifest a great deal of interest in the work of the hospital. It is very gratifying to know that the special committees, have been prompt in attending to the special work assigned to them, thus showing a willingness to give individual time and service in the interest of the hospital.

Due to the fact that the terms of the Trustees do not expire until the November meeting of the Board, there are no Trustees to be confirmed by the conference at this session.

The hospital continues to render a very fine service to Golden Cross patients. During the six months period from October, 1946 through April, 1947, the cost of service rendered under the auspices of the Golden Cross was \$37,683.83. Of this amount \$3,362.59 was contributed by the Golden Cross. This service covered 2,857 days of charity rendered to a total of 646 patients during the six months period. The major improvement to the plant during the period under consideration has been the completion of a new laundry at a cost of \$47,000.00. It is believed that the savings on laundry by the operation of our own laundry plant will repay the total investment in a period of about two years, to say nothing of the convenience of having all of our laundry done in the hospital.

The Harris College of Nursing, made possible through the income from the Harris Foundation, which has been set up and organized under the generosity of Dr. Charles H. Harris, Director of the Hospital, began its first

term on January 26, 1947. The college is now in full operation in connection with the hospital and the Harris School of Nursing, and offers courses leading to standard college degrees in the field of nursing.

There is still a serious shortage in trained nurses and in girls entering the nursing profession; not only in our hospital but throughout the entire United States. The situation has become so serious that it is being made the subject of comment by editorial and magazine writers as well as educators and social workers. Our hospital is putting on a program of publicity to encourage girls to enter the nursing profession, and we feel that our ministers and church people can render a service to the hospital, to girls and young women of their congregation and to humanity by presenting the appeal of the nursing profession as a field of endeavor in which a fine service can be rendered on a basis of fair remuneration.

Scholarships are available for girls desiring to enter the nursing school at our hospital, and if desired funds are available for student loans on notes bearing no interest. Further details of this service may be obtained by writing the Administrator of the Hospital.

We feel that our hospital is rendering a very fine service to Fort Worth and surrounding territory and we ask your continued interest as we endeavor to administer to the sick and the wounded in the name and for the sake of the Great Physician.

Bishop Smith, Members of the Central Texas Methodist Conference and friends:

This is a supplementary report of the Executive Board of your Hospital given by me to the Board of Trustees of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital at its April meeting. At that time I reported a few improvements—the construction of the incinerator in the hospital, making a two-way shaft for the exit of smoke and the other for installation of refuse from the hospital preventing choking which had before caused considerable discomfort in the hospital by smoke spreading out through the building.

We also reported the revamping of two approaches, one to the Northeast and one to the Northwest entrance to the hospital, concreting these approaches in order that trucks might easily approach the building for unloading supplies and taking away refuse which previously had to enter through the ambulance driveway. This construction removed the objectionable passage of trucks from the driveway crowding the ambulance entrance. We think these are great improvements to the building.

We are happy to report, at last, the installation of our long wished for \$50,000 laundry equipment, filling one of the greatest needs of hospital and it is now being operated.

Through the efforts of Miss Lucy Harris, Dean and her efficient staff, the CHAS. H. HARRIS COLLEGE OF NURSING is now accredited by the National League of Nursing Examiners, the only one receiving such accreditation in Texas, and the only one in the Southwest, Vanderbilt University in Tennessee is the only other in the South with such accreditation.

In order for our hospital to reach the present high standard set up by the hospital accrediting agencies, we will have to accept the higher standards to acquire accreditation for continuing to teach nurses, interns, and residents which is part of the duties of any high class hospital; and the rapid advances in the science of medicine and surgery for the care of the sick and injured place many new responsibilities on the hospital. New and modern equipment, better trained nurses, better tarined personnel, better trained medical and surgical staffs are essential.

Warning: With the tendency of damage suits in all business endeavors of this day, hospitals must be alert to meet all requirements to the public with all of the efficient scientific care possible to our patients. In order to avoid criticism and to insure early recovery the institutions offering

hospital care accept moral, if not legal, responsibility for the conduct of its personnel, including, nurses, medical and surgical staffs, and this responsibility is placed on the hospital by its selection of its staffs qualified to meet the high standards set up by the hospital accrediting agencies. These standards are set up for eliminating unnecessary treatment and surgical operation, a protection to the public.

I advise that the Board of Trustees of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital to set up new by-laws and constitution in cooperation with the hospital medical and surgical staffs meeting such standards as will insure the greatest protection to the sick and injured that come under hospital care. Such standards can not be met under the present by-laws and constitution of the Harris Memorial Methodist Hospital. Consequently, they should be revised for the protection of the hospital, the patients, and the staff and personnel.

I also advise that the sixth floor of our hospital should be finished for patients as soon as materials are obtainable; that a home for the intern and resident staffs should be procured outside the hospital building; and that our pediatric department should be maintained on the ninth floor which was planned in the reconstruction of that floor two years ago. This would take care of our overcrowded pediatric department and leave more space for the medical section.

And now, I believe that the Administrator's report will be interesting to this body is as follows:

This statistical report covers operations from October 1, 1946, through March 31, 1947, and is made on a comparative basis with the same period ending March 31, 1946.

The bed capacity of the hospital at this time is 299 adult and pediatric and 69 bassinets. 368 in all compared to March 1946 there were 16 beds more in use and the same number of bassinets. These totals do not include miscellaneous beds used in the treatment of patients.

Admissions to the hospital as of March 31, 1947, were 6,736. At the same date last year there had been 5,114 admissions. In addition, there have been 1,869 newborns in this period compared with 1,250 newborns last year.

Ending March 31st there was a total of 168 deaths and as of March 1946 there were 154 deaths. There have been 45 autopsies performed compared to 50 for the same period last year.

The percentage of occupancy of available hospital beds has been 92.5% compared to 93.5% last year. The decrease of 1% in occupancy is based upon two factors: First, there was a total of 16 beds added. Second, we have maintained such a large occupancy in the newborn nursery and newborn days are not included in computing occupancy percentage. As of this six months period, the hospital has rendered 61,051 patient days of service compared to 57,788 days in the comparative period.

Included in the respective totals are 2,857 charity days of service against 7,076 charity days of service as of March 31, 1946. The decrease in charity days can be explained by the decrease of people eligible under the government programs which are effective during the war period and immediately thereafter. Even though we received part pay for these cases, recommendations were followed charging the total days of service into the total of charity days. The value of charity, based on charges, has amounted to \$33,070.31 for this period against \$29,514.43 for the comparative period. On a cost basis the 2,857 days amounted to \$37,683.83.

The average length of stay was 6.9 days compared to 8.4 days in the previous period. The average daily number of patients, including newborns, has been 337 for this period and 312 for the comparative period. The average daily number of patients, excluding newborns, has been 269 for this period and 261.5 for the comparative period. A total of 10,334 patients have received care as in-patients compared to 8,203. A total of 5,949 out-patients treated against 5,485.

Cost per patient day of service, excluding newborn days, averages \$13.19 compared to \$10.69 for the respective period last year. Average daily income, excluding newborn days, has amounted to \$14.88 per day against \$11.02 per day.

The average total personnel for the six months period as of this March is 560.3 compared to 566.3 last year.

There has been a total of 243,308 meals served compared to 259,268 meals during the comparative period. The finished meal cost for this six months period was 56½ cents compared to 43½ cents each. The raw food cost for this period is 35.2 cents compared against 26.1 cents.

Accounts receivable charges for this period have amounted to \$799,406.94 and during the comparative period they were \$579,907.70. Accounts receivable credits for this period have been \$760,949.18 compared to \$579,143.71. The average collections have been 97.7% for this period and were 100.5% for the comparative period.

The operating profit for this six months has been \$77,524.52 and for the comparative period was \$35,229.70.

I would like to comment further to the extent that many of our problems of administration are not as trying at this time as they have been in the immediate past. The quality of personnel is improving daily and the supply of personnel at this particular time is as good as it has been during the past five or six years. The administrative personnel group has met regularly each week and has completed many worthwhile projects and has improved the cooperation among employees to a great extent.

The medical staff has been cooperative and there is every reason to believe that their cooperation will be greater in the future. The governing board has met regularly and proceedings of most of the meetings have been mailed to each of you.

TEXAS MISSION HOME AND TRAINING SCHOOL

Report by Rev. Robert L. Armor, Superintendent

During the first six months of this seven months Conference Year, (Oct. 1, 1946—March 30, 1947) we have had an average of 45 patients. Several times we have had to improvise beds. Last year only 25 per cent of our patients were wholly charity, this year 40 per cent have been charity. A charity patient is one that lives in the Home eight months and does not pay any fee.

Mrs. Maymie Malone directs our Training Program which consists of a Daily Chapel, two courses in the Teachings of Christ, sewing, cooking, food handling, nursing, etiquette and music. Each girl is thoroughly trained as a housekeeper and home maker.

Since September 1, 1945 we have received several hundred patients. Not a single mother has died, three babies were born dead, and only a few of the mothers have been seriously ill. This good record has been commended by the State Welfare Board and the Board of Health. This excellent record is due to the care our patients receive from the M. & S. Hospital and in our own hospital.

There were 120 patients in this Home in 1946, 95 made a definite decision for Christ, 10 were already Christian, and 3 out of the other 15 have written us since leaving the Home that they have accepted Christ and united with a Church.

We receive \$10,000.00 from the World Service Budgets of four of the five Annual Conference; \$4,000.00 from the S.W. Texas; \$1,500.00 Central Texas; \$1,500.00 N.W. Texas and \$3,000.00 Texas Conference. We receive an average of \$5,000.00 in fees each year. The balance needed for the operating expenses and the upkeep of the property must come from special days and special gifts. The North Texas Conference gave us a special day this year, result \$3,038.53. We are asking each Conference to place a special amount for the Home in its budget for next year.

The increase of the total number of patients over last year, and the increase in the number of charity patients, and the high price we have to pay on all the necessary things of living has of course increased our operating expenses. Yet we are able to keep the cost down to an average of \$2,078.35 a month for 50 people. Our budget must carry from \$3,000.00 to \$5,000.00 to care for replacements and new equipment and emergency repairs such as the flood item above. (We cannot buy flood insurance in San Antonio.) We have been ordered by the Fire Department of the City of San Antonio to put in a new fire escape, extra exits, cut off the stair case at each floor and change all doors to open out which will cost us at least \$4,000.00. This work is now in progress.

We recommend that \$1,500.00 be placed in the World Budget of the Central Texas Annual Conference for this Home and that September 28, 1947 be designated as Special Day for the TEXAS MISSION HOME AND TRAINING SCHOOL. We further recommend that literature describing the work of the Home be distributed, (literature to be furnished by the Home), to each family on Sunday, September 21, by the pastor, and that on Sunday September 28, the pastor make a statement of the work of the Home and receive a free-will offering to assist in its maintenance.

LAY ACTIVITIES NO. 1

Our common experience in the several phases of the Crusade for Christ thus far brings us a more profound conviction that the movement is God's will for Methodism in ministering to suffering humanity, for strengthening of our agencies of service in the missionary fields, both at home and abroad, for awakening and stimulating our call and zest for personal evangelism, for calling the laity to the knowledge, understanding and acceptance of stewardship—the personal dedication of time and talents as well as money.

We cannot serve humanity, society and the Christian World Order, for which we pray, in a more effective way than to pursue to the limits of our faith and energies the providential strategy unfolded step by step in the Crusade for Christ program.

We continue our plea for an enlarged and intensified movement to accent religion in the home. No nation can remain Christian without the nurturing of its children in the homes where religion is taught and practiced, where Christ is reverence and worshipped. Here lies one of the greatest challenges that faces the Church and God's Kingdom.

This is no time for weak, uncertain sounds from God's children. These days call for a positive, confident faith. In our literature and our preaching we need to hear less of doubts and more of the everlasting grace, and mercy and love of a Savior who yearns to be the Elder Brother of all men and women everywhere.

In evaluating the results of the Crusade for Christ thus far, we feel that the laymen of the Central Texas Conference have done a good piece of work, in some instance somewhat notable. It has been proven that laymen will give over and above their usual offerings to the church if the appeal is worthy and timely. It has been proven that laymen will talk to the unsaved about their souls as witnessed by the visitation evangelism effort. Scores of laymen have faced up to the matter of Stewardship in almost

every congregation, and their experience is contagious. We know that there is yet much room for improvement, but that improvement can be quickly realized has been demonstrated before our eyes.

Brethren, let us take courage from our experiences and from the record of our Church in the Crusade. Let us not be content with a return to the B. C. level of living and working and giving. (That B. C. means Before the Crusade.)

Rather, let us plan to accelerate our standards for all our activities next year and every year.

Laymen of the Central Texas Conference, we have a great opportunity to help set a new standard for what Methodists can do for God, for humanity and for the church.

May we measure up to our opportunity in every call and interest in our great Church, and under God may we set a new standard and effectiveness in the coming conference year.

MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT NO. 1

As amended by the 1947 Central Texas Conference)

1. There shall be a program for minimum pastor support in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of a commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission and who may be members of other Annual Conference boards or commissions; five of this number shall be ministers and four laymen, and three of the total number shall be clerical or lay members of the Conference Board of Missions. These shall serve during the quadrennium. The others shall serve for three-year terms, two to be elected each year. The duties and responsibilities of this Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support program in the closest cooperation with the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extensions. Members of the Commission, in addition to the one-third who shall be members of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, may be chosen from the membership of that Board and if they are not so chosen, they shall be expected to attend the meetings of said board but shall not have a vote except on matter directly affecting the Minimum Pastoral Support Program. The Minimum Pastoral Support Program and that part of the work of the Board of Missions and Church Extension that has to do with local Conference work and appropriations shall be considered one general program. This program shall become a part of the program of the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Vacancies caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference in the membership of the Commission shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet and elected by the Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between the sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the session of the Annual Conference following, then the vacancy will be filled in the regular way.

We recommend that the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support shall organize at the time of meeting of each Annual Conference, electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary and a Treasurer, and that these officers shall constitute an Executive Committee for the Commission and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected.

2. We recommend:

(a) That the basic minimum basis for pastoral support shall be \$1,200.00 per year, exclusive of any parsonage provision that may be made in the charge.

(b) That to this amount \$300.00 shall be added when the pastor has a wife and no children;

(c) That \$25.00 be allowed in addition to the above for each child in the home under 16 years of age, or under 21 years of age if in school or college;

(d) That \$25.00 be allowed to claimants on this fund if a child is born into the home during the year.

All missionary appropriations shall be considered a part of the salary received, in computing both the amount of help to be given from the fund and in determining the amounts of apportionments to charge and pastor.

3. We recommend that no part of these funds paid to claimants be apportioned to the support of district superintendents, and, further, that no part of these funds so paid to claimants shall be made the basis for any assessment for General Conference, or special purpose.

4. We recommend that the provisions of this plan shall apply only to members in full connection in the Central Texas Conference and no provision shall apply to any member of the Conference retired, supernumerary, under appointment to school, as a Conference evangelist, or employed by any Annual Conference Board, or any other appointment save that as preacher in charge within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference. We further recommend that in case of change of appointment between sessions of the Annual Conference and after the apportionments have been made by the Commission, no member of the conference shall share in these funds unless the charge to which he may be appointed shall meet the conditions of this paper, and then his participation shall be on a pro rata basis for the part of the year served in the charge to which he is assigned.

"The benefits of these provisions may be extended to 'accepted supplies' providing (1) the supply is recommended as meeting the requirements by his District Superintendent, (2) the supply and his Church or pastoral charge shall participate in the provisions of the apportionment as hereinbefore outlined, (3) supplies who are student pastors may receive two-thirds of the benefits on recommendation of his District Superintendent and providing the Church or pastoral charge served by the student pastor shall participate in the provisions of the plan, (4) the Board of Missions continuing to cooperate in this program."

"Members on trial have share in these benefits on the same basis as members of the Conference."

5. We recommend that no pastor shall receive help from the fund who receives income from other employment than the regular work of the ministry, if such income brings his total income up to the minimum basis, the amount of help in that case shall be figured from the amount of his total income.

The provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to accepted supplies who hold student pastorates and who are receiving benefits from the Veterans' Administration, for nothing in this paper shall be construed as voiding any rights veterans have under the public laws of their country and the benefits of this paper shall be applied as indicated above on the basis of assistance to these men by reason of the travel involved in the serving of their charges.

6. We recommend that as a prerequisite for any pastor to receive help from this fund, the charge which he serves must agree by vote of the official board to pay the Minimum Pastoral Support Commission an amount equal to 25 per cent of the amount necessary to bring the salary up to the computed minimum basis except on the unanimous vote of the Commission. The 25 per cent paid to the Commission shall not be considered a part of the salary assessed and paid.

7. We recommend that no pastor shall participate in this fund if the charge he serves reduces the salary below that paid the previous year, unless this reduction be deemed justifiable by unanimous vote of the Commission.

8. We recommend, in accordance with paragraph 811 of the Discipline, 1940, that whenever a member of the Conference in full connection is appointed to any charge assessing less than a \$600 salary per year, such an appointee shall not participate in this fund except on the basis of a \$600 salary assessment and the usual participation of the charge in the Minimum Support Plan.

9. We recommend that funds be secured for the work of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support in accord with Paragraphs 810 and 813 of the Discipline and that apportionments be made to the charges as herein-after set forth, that payments on such apportionments shall be made quarterly to the Treasurer of the Commission.

The apportionment be figured on the percentage schedule as outlined below:

(b) That 3 per cent be apportioned to all charges assessing \$2,000.00 or less.

(c) That 3½ per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$2,001.00 to \$2,500.00.

(d) That 4 per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$2,501.00 to \$3,000.00.

(e) That 4½ per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$3,001.00 to \$4,000.00.

(f) That 5 per cent be apportioned to charges assessing \$4,001.00 and up.

The above percentages to be figured on the salaries paid less the original minimum of \$800.00.

"We further recommend in accordance with Paragraph 813 of the Discipline, that the following apportionments be made and assessed against pastors in this Conference.

(b) That ½% be assessed on all salaries to \$2,000.00 excluding the original minimum of \$800.00 and excluding also any part of the salary paid by the Minimum Pastoral Support Commission and/or the Conference Board of Missions.

(c) That ¾% be assessed on all salaries between \$2,001.00 and \$2,500.00 less the original minimum of \$800.00 which shall not be subject to assessment.

(d) That 1% be assessed on all salaries between \$2,501.00 and \$3,000.00 less the original minimum of \$800.00 which shall not be subject to assessment.

(e) That 1¼% be assessed on all salaries between \$3,001.00 and \$4,000.00 less the original minimum of \$800.00 which shall not be subject to assessment.

(f) That 1½% be assessed on all salaries above and in excess of \$4,000.00 less the original minimum of \$800.00 which shall not be subject to assessment."

All Conference employees under appointment of the Bishop who are members of the Conference in full connection, including officers and others shall be assessed for and support this program on the same basis and in the same proportion as pastors of charge. In this connection, allowances for rent now established and other allowances made by the Commission with the consent of the Conference shall be exempt from the salary scale. This places every conference appointee under the same obligation to and in the same relationship to this program.

10. We recommend that the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support gather necessary information throughout the Conference to compute the amounts of apportionments to charges and pastors and the amounts of apportionments to be paid the claimants and that the information be handed down to the district superintendents and the pastors and by them to the official boards of the charges. The district superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts due from Churches and members of the Conference whose appointments are listed in their respective districts.

We respectfully suggest and recommend that the values in Church

Ministry Sunday, which has been the fifth Sunday in January, be conserved in so far as is possible and we recommend to the district superintendents that the month of January be set aside and designated as Minimum Pastoral Month; and that if at all possible the total amount to be raised by the charges be raised and paid to the treasurer of the Commission during this month.

Monies so paid are to apply on apportionment. If not paid as suggested above, payments on apportionments shall be made quarterly to the Treasurer of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, and the commission shall make payment at the end of each quarter of the year on the same percentage basis, without discrimination in any case whatsoever, and the last quarterly payments shall be made at the meeting of the Annual Conference after all remittances have been made to the treasurer.

11. The treasurer of the commission shall be adequately bonded and the expense of the bond shall be charged against the fund. A complete financial statement shall be filed at each session of the Annual Conference showing all receipts from charges and pastors during the year and from all members of the Conference and those holding appointments other than pastoral charges, and of all payments made to claimants on the fund, this statement to be placed on record with other financial reports of the Conference.

Expense for the work, et cetera, shall be allowed from the fund and traveling expense of the members of the commission to one mid-year meeting together with cost of meals shall be allowed. The traveling expense shall be computed on the basis of 2 cents per mile each way.

We suggest that three-fourths of the amount normally allowable be allowed until the meeting of the commission at the next session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from apportionments and assessments, the total amount contemplated herein shall be paid.

We recommend further that the provisions relating to dependents other than wives shall be paid at the session of the Annual Conference if a sufficient amount of money has been realized to make such payment.

We further recommend that not less than 5 per cent and not more than 10 per cent of gross receipts shall be held within the treasury of this fund at the conclusion of business each year for emergency appropriations.

MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT NO. 2 RESOLUTION

In the constitution as published on pages 80 to 83 of the Journal, 1946, paragraph 2(d), the statement was made "that basic salaries for accepted supplies shall be \$1,000.00." This was an error in writing the report, and it was contemplated that the benefits of the Minimum Pastoral Support Commission were to be extended to accepted supplies in keeping with the second paragraph of Section 4, on page 81. Since this provision reduces the support of supplies \$100.00 under that which was contemplated, the Commission requests the following resolution be adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Central Texas Conference authorizes the Minimum Pastoral Support Commission to pay a bonus to accepted supplies in sufficient amount to do away with the inequality occasioned by the sentence in error in the 1946 report.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION, NO. 3

Division of Church Extension

Your Board of Missions and Church Extension is happy to report that splendid progress is being made in the extension of the Kingdom, through the establishment of new churches, and through the improvement of facilities in churches already established.

During the Year of Evangelism, our Episcopal Area not only led the Church in the number of additions, and the percentage of additions. It also led the entire Church in the number of new churches organized. This work is continuing with several additional churches either in the process of organization, or soon to be started.

A conference-wide building and improvement program is also well under way. Your Division of Church Extension is happy to have a part in this fine forward movement in Methodism.

We are thoroughly convinced that attractive facilities are just as important to the success of a church enterprise, as it is to a commercial enterprise. We are also convinced that in these days of shifting population, we must take the Gospel to the people where they are.

During the past two years and seven months, which is the period thus far in the Crusade for Christ, your General Conference Division of Church Extension has made 64 donation and loan grants to assist in church and parsonage, construction and improvement, in the General Texas Conference. This includes at least fifteen new parsonages, where no parsonage existed before, enabling each of these 15 churches to become full stations. It also includes the organization of nine new churches, in areas that Methodism was not able to serve before. These 64 grants include \$24,700.00 in donations, from our Boards, and \$105,950.00 in loans, for a total of \$130,650.00 which our Boards have made available for Church Extension in our Conference during these 2½ years.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION, NO. 4

Woman's Society of Christian Service

Mrs. B. B. Wedemeyer, President

Many worthwhile activities have filled the past seven months in the Woman's Society of Christian Service, as its work advanced along all lines. This report represents the interest and efforts of ten thousand members in 235 societies and 43 Wesleyan Service Guilds, directed by 160 district and 16 conference officers.

We are grateful to our presiding Bishop, the District Superintendents and to many of the pastors for encouragement and definite promotion of the work entrusted to the Woman's Society. We covet the full cooperation of all our ministers, not only in perfecting the organization, but in stimulating and developing better work.

At the close of 1946 your Conference Society recorded the largest financial statement in its history. Taking into consideration gifts to missions at home and abroad, cash for supplies to institutions and to needy ministers, cooperation with other welfare agencies, and the tremendous amount of Christian Social Relations work done in the local churches, the total expenditures last year amounted to \$116,606.36; which is per capita gift of \$11.66. We hope to surpass these figures by the end of this year. When the proposed budget for 1947 was presented at the recent annual meeting Mrs. George Peyton made an addition gift of \$2,000.00 to the cause of missions.

At the annual meeting of the General Board of Missions at Buck Hill Falls, Pa. last December, we were deeply impressed with the sense of urgency which prevailed in all reports and was reflected in many of the actions taken. Therefore we took as the theme for our annual meeting, "Now Is the Time" and sought to impress our membership with the necessity for action today. Among the several urgent needs being emphasized during the current year are:

1. Reaching a much larger number of women with our comprehensive program of study and action.
2. Meeting the unprecedented opportunities for Christian service in all fields.
3. Enlisting full time workers in Christian service.

As you well know there is a critical shortage of preachers and missionaries throughout our land on every foreign field. We are happy to report however, that three new missionaries have gone this spring to foreign fields as representatives for Central Texas Conference. Mary and Frances Bowden, daughters of Dr. and Mrs. Jalmar Bowden, (former members of this conference), went in March to Rio De Janeiro and to Piracicaba, Brazil to do Christian Education work. Their salaries are being provided by the Austin Avenue Society and Church at Waco. Last month Frances Hackler sailed for Southern Rhodesia, Africa and will be supported by the Fort Worth District. In addition to these three new and very promising young women, our conference society is supporting eight other missionaries—two in China, two in Cuba, two in Brazil, one in Mexico, and one in the Philippines.

The outstanding feature of the past quarter was the itineration throughout the conference of Mrs. W. B. Landrum, field-worker for the Woman's Division. She spoke on the work of the Board of Missions on 35 occasions to district-wide meetings of women, to Sunday morning local church congregations, to high schools, to youth fellowships, to local societies and Wesleyan Service Guilds. These dynamic missionary messages were highly inspirational and will no doubt bear much fruit in the days and months that follow.

Our conference officers will take advantage of various leadership training opportunities this summer. Ten of them will attend the School of Missions at Mt. Sequoyah. Mrs. J. K. Wilkes will go to De Pauw University to a national seminar on "The Status and Responsibility of Women in the World Today." Mrs. E. F. Bohmfolk will cooperate in the children's Workers Conference in August, under the supervision of the Conference Director

of Children's work in the Board of Education. Our conference treasurer Mrs. R. M. Orgain is meeting, this week, the other Conference and Jurisdiction treasurers from the entire church in a national work shop at Greenboro, North Carolina.

Our youth and student work has gone forward in a fine way under very able conference leadership. However, the line of work which has perhaps made the most phenomenal growth, has been the Wesleyan Service Guild, which offers opportunity to gainfully employed women. This group has made rapid progress, not only in the number of units organized but in its widened horizons and generous gifts to missions.

Our latest venture is the setting up of our own Missionary Institute, under the guidance of the Conference Committee on study and action, composed of Mesdames E. L. Reid, Wm. H. Cole and Charles E. Culbertson. The three recommended Bible and mission study courses for next year will be offered by accredited teachers, at this Institute at Southwestern University August 12 to 15.

This is but a mere glimpse into the challenging activities of the Woman's Society. We are appreciative of the opportunities of service which our great church has opened to its womanhood. Thus through consecrated action, unified effort, and willing service, we pray that spiritual forces may be released with compelling power to move our organization forward to meet the needs of the world, for we believe now is the time.

METHODIST STUDENT CENTER CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE

We are pleased to bring you a report made possible only by the loyal cooperation and generous giving of our pastors and people.

On a quota of \$50,000.00 there has already been raised in cash \$46,205.00, with over \$5,000.00 reported by District Superintendents as assured or provided for making it possible for our conference to report final receipts of over \$51,000.00.

The Brownwood, Cisco, Cleburne, Gatesville, Georgetown, and Waxahachie Districts have each already paid in more than the quotas assigned to them, and the other Districts of the Conference report sufficient amounts provided for to put our Conference well along in the plus column. This is a most satisfactory achievement, and your committee is deeply grateful to Bishop Smith, our District Superintendents, pastors, and people for their inspiring leadership and response.

We call your attention to the fact that money raised in excess of our Conference quota will be spent at Arlington and Stephenville, both within the bounds of our Conference, and we recommend that no efforts be spared to collect in full such amounts as have been reported as provided for or assured.

RESERVE PENSION FUND COMMISSION, NO. 1

1. Historical Statement

A careful study of the question of pensions for ministers has, on the order of the Central Texas Conference, been in process for the past three years. At the 1944 session, held in Mineral Wells, the Board of Conference Claimants presented proposals for a more adequate support for our retired men. After full discussion the proposals were withdrawn, and a motion was made and carried, requesting Bishop A. Frank Smith to appoint a special commission of seven (four ministers and three laymen, and the Chairman of the Board of Conference Claimants) to study the whole question of the support of our Conference Claimants, and to bring its report to the next annual session.

Bishop Smith appointed this commission, and it entered upon its task, and brought its report to the 1945 session, held in Fort Worth. An

advanced step in the direction of a better provision for the days of retirement of the men now active as well as those who are now retired.

The Conference recommitted this report for further study, and for the development of a plan of operation which would separate the sum required for Conference participation from immediate connection with the minister's salary, and for report at the next annual session. The membership of this Commission was, at the request of its Chairman, increased by the Bishop's appointment to it of three of the District Superintendents.

The labors of this Commission were completed, and its report mimeographed, and copies were mailed to the Bishop, to the ministers and delegates, and the report itself was presented to the 1946 session at Fort Worth. The report was discussed, amended and adopted. (See Journal, 1946, Pages 95-97.)

The recommendations of that report are:

1. The inauguration of a campaign to raise \$500,000.00 as the basis of an adequate annuity for our retired ministers;

2. The appointment by the Bishop of a Reserve Pension Fund Commission, composed of three ministers and two laymen, "who shall be empowered with the responsibility of developing the campaign program, setting forth the rules and regulations as to how the fund shall be administered and distributed after careful study of the most efficient methods in cooperation with the Pension Board at St. Louis"; and,

3. Participation by all ministers, on Trial and in Full Connection, by the payment of 2% of their full salary, less any rental allowance.

In carrying out its instructions to separate the annual contribution of the Conference from immediate connection with the minister's salary, the Commission chose the alternative of funding in advance, for a period of twenty-five years: 1. Those entering the Full Reserve System; 2. Those entering the Partial Reserve System; and 3. An increased annuity for those now retired as follows:

\$243,821.00 for the "New Entrants"—Full Reserve System,
 \$120,709.00 for the "Previous Entrants"—Partial Reserve System,
 \$106,808.00 for the lifting by as much as \$2.00 per year of service, the annuity rate now obtaining, or a total of \$471,338.00.

The figure of \$500,000.00 set as the goal of the campaign gives a margin of \$28,662.00. This sum plus the increased rate of payment from the ministers, and accumulated interest across a twenty-five year period, would produce a substantial amount that could be used in funding the succeeding eleven (11) years that are within the cyclic period of change in annual conference membership.

The sum of \$364,530.00, as indicated above, is required to fund the "New Entrants" and the "Previous Entrants." This amount of money would be deposited with the Missouri Corporation of the General Board of Pensions, St. Louis, Missouri, to the credit of the Central Texas Annual Conference, and from this deposit and its accumulating interest, would be taken the annual contribution of the Conference for each minister in the system, for deposit to that minister's individual account. The minister's successive annual contributions would also be deposited to his account, and at the time of his retirement this total, plus accumulated interest, would be used as the purchase price of an annuity which would remain constant during his life, and would be reduced to 70% when payable to his widow. There would be no exhaustion, in the commonly understood meaning of that expression, of the total sum of money deposited to the credit of the Central Texas Annual Conference with the Missouri Corporation of the General Board of Pensions, but there would be a transfer annually from that deposit of the contribution of the Annual Conference to the individual accounts of the ministers in the system, and it is calculated that within the twenty-five year period of operation the transfer of the total sum would be complete.

The sum of \$106,808.00 designed to lift the annuity rate by as much as \$2.00 per year of service for the present retired men would be totally exhausted in the common understanding of that term within a twenty year

period. By that time the annuity load now carried by the Conference would begin to be relieved by the benefits of the reserve system.

The Full Reserve Pension Plan would provide approximately a monthly support for those in it, as follows:

35 years of service.....	\$ 62.60
40 years of service.....	78.00
45 years of service.....	96.00
50 years of service.....	116.00

The Partial Reserve System would increase, approximately, the pensions of the men now in active service, as follows:

10 years of service.....	\$ 5.50 per month additional
15 years of service.....	9.00 per month additional
20 years of service.....	13.00 per month additional
25 years of service.....	17.71 per month additional
30 years of service.....	23.10 per month additional
36 years of service.....	30.72 per month additional

The benefits accruing to the present claimants from the sum of \$106,808.00 provided to raise their annuity rate, would be:

35 years of service.....	\$ 8.75 per month additional
40 years of service.....	10.00 per month additional
45 years of service.....	11.25 per month additional
50 years of service.....	12.50 per month additional

Paragraphs 1642 to 1655 inclusive, Discipline, 1944, set forth in detail the provisions of the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund.

When and where the Full Reserve System, or the Partial Reserve System, or both, are in operation, the minister and the conference join in building the pension, and the contributions from each are based on either the minister's salary, or the average salary of the conference, whichever is lower. This is at once the least expensive and the most efficient way of caring for the conference claimants. Eventually the Churches would be able to discharge this responsibility by exchanging the 10% levied on the minister's salary for Superannuate Support, to a 9% apportionment on the minister's salary, or on the average of the conference, whichever is lower. However, until the Full Reserve Pension System is in operation, the present method of raising the support of the Conference Claimants must continue.

Historical Statement

Reserve Pension Fund Commission

Bishop A. Frank Smith appointed to membership on the Reserve Pension Fund Commission called for in the report adopted in 1946, P. E. Riley, Thomas F. Sterck, E. F. Bohmfalk, W. D. Smith, and Clyde Hayes. In addition to the duties for which this Commission was especially constituted was referred also the question of Group Insurance for the Conference, as presented in the Resolution on page 70, Journal 1946. The report on that phase of our work is Report No. 2 of this Commission.

The Commission met early in the present Conference year and was organized by the election of a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer. A number of meetings have been held, and each phase of our responsibility has had consideration. We were charged with "the responsibility to develop the campaign programme." It certainly seemed to be our duty to apportion the \$500,000.00 to the districts; to set an over-all time limit for the campaign, and to announce the date when solicitation is to begin.

Studies were made of the distribution on the scale used in apportioning the World Service Askings; on the two-fold basis of district membership and salary; on the three-fold basis of membership, salary and total finances; and on the four-fold basis of salaries, membership, world service acceptance, and total finances raised in the several districts. It is our considered opinion that the basis last mentioned is the most equitable for the apportionment of the \$500,000.00 and we present herewith the results of our studies:

Recommendations

1. We recommend the adoption of the above apportionment of the \$500,000.00 to the districts.
2. We recommend, that the Bishop, Cabinet, and members of the present Commission, be authorized to give guidance to the campaign for the 4 year period. Further, that no assessment be made against any church.
3. We recommend that the period of time to be devoted to this campaign be from the adjournment of the present session of the Conference to the adjournment of the session of 1951, or a total of four years.
4. We recommend that active solicitation for the funds begin the first of October 1947, and continue through that month and until the cause has been presented to each church.
5. We further recommend that pledges be taken payable one-fourth in cash: one-fourth in October 1948; one-fourth in October 1949; and one-fourth in October 1950; and that the period of time between the final date of collection in 1950 and the session of 1951 a period of some eight (8) months be used for rounding up and completing the financial phase of the campaign.
6. We recommend that no phase of this program of Reserve Pensions and of increased annuity rates be put into operation until collections are sufficiently advanced to indicate that the total sought will be secured, and then on the recommendation of the commission and the approval of the Annual Conference, such funding of the Reserve Systems, seem proper, shall be put in operation. It is to be understood, of course, that the Annual Conference may at any time it deems proper set in operation any one of the points of the three-fold program, that it may desire.
7. We recommend the continuance of a Reserve Pension Commission, either the present or such other as the Conference may desire, throughout the period of the campaign.
8. We request the Commission on World Service and Finance to continue our appropriation for the carrying forward of the campaign.

Further Proposals

To aid in the campaign this Commission proposes the creation of a body of literature, for general distribution over the Conference, that will be factual, information and inspirational. We do not offer a particular type of campaign, as it is our understanding that each District Superintendent is to implement and direct the campaign in his own district, but we are prepared to offer the plans of organization used by other annual conferences; to hold district set-up meetings where desired; and to secure the advice and counsel of the General Board of Pensions, when such is needed and asked for.

It was tacitly understood when this Commission was set up, that the present conference year of 7 month, and the State-wide Student Center Campaign would make it inadvisable for the Reserve Pension Commission to do anything other than get ready for the Conference Year 1947-48. Looking to that end our efforts have been directed toward study and research and to District Conference visitation.

Conclusion

In conclusion, let us say that the program which we have outlined, is one that will take time. It cannot be put into operation in a day or a year. All who have worked at such tasks bear testimony to that fact.

It should be kept in mind, however, that it is within the power of the Annual Conference to take up, one at a time, the three points of the authorized program, and to concentrate on that. It can, if it so desires, raise as soon as possible \$106,808.00 to be the basis of lifting the annuity rate for the retired men by as much as \$2.00 per year of service. Such a task has its own immediate and earnest appeal. But should our efforts cease with the accomplishment of this desired end, we would have rendered temporary and needed aid, but we would not have a reserve pension system.

Should it seem desirable to put the "New Entrants"—men admitted into full connection—into the Full Reserve System, and provide a method of raising the 9% contribution of the average salary or of the minister's salary, whichever is lower, this could be done on an annual program. Such a procedure, however, would be inefficient and expensive, and it is not recommended. The burden of funding the Conference portion would grow heavier each year, and the danger is that the undertaking would break of its own weight.

Or, the Conference can concentrate on the Partial Reserve System, and bring all the active ministers into it, and carry it forward by a 2% contribution from the minister and a 2% contribution from the Annual Conference, the scale being determined by the minister's support, and is based on his salary or the average salary of the Conference, whichever is lower. There is merit in this proposition and as it already is an integral part of this report, it is recommended provided the initial reserve is secured.

It should be understood, too, that this plan can be inaugurated without the raising of the initial reserve, though this is the least desirable and the most expensive way. To implement such a program each minister must conscientiously contribute the 2% asked of him, and each church must provide its contribution regularly and continuously.

Finally, however, we must say that for "long range economy, and the best results, both for the churches and the ministers, the establishment of the Full Reserve Pension Plan must be our major goal."

RESERVE PENSION FUND COMMISSION. NO. 2

The Reserve Pension Fund Commission, created by Bishop Smith, was charged with the further responsibility of making a study of group insurance needs of the Central Texas Conference. See resolution on Page 70, Journal, 1946.

A survey was made of the insurance needs of the conference. One hundred seventy members reported on their present insurance status. These represented approximately 70% of the entire conference membership. Of this number 11% reported that they carried no insurance of any kind. The presumption is that they are uninsurable. Another 10% reported that their total protection was less than \$1,000.00. 79% of those reporting indicated in their replies that they have as much as \$1,000.00 or more in protection. 70% of all those who reported indicated that they are interested in some plan of group insurance. If this average were maintained for the entire conference, it would mean that 30 members of the conference carry no insurance at all, and 15 have less than \$1,000.00; furthermore, that approximately 175 members of the conference would be interested in having some group insurance plan that will give adequate protection to every member of the conference regardless of his insurability.

Your commission has made an extensive study of various plans for low cost group insurance. We recommend the following as being the most feasible:

You will note from the above that the maximum amount that any minister can pay is \$0.70 per month per thousand or \$8.40 per year per thousand. This includes not only insurance protection in the amount of the face of the policy but provides for double indemnity in case of accidental death; also, provision is made in case of dismemberment by accidental means.

The indicated amount of insurance will be payable, in addition to any other benefits, if an employee while insured under the plan sustains bodily injuries solely through violent, external and accidental means, and within 90 days thereafter, as a direct result of such bodily injuries and independently of all other causes, he suffers any one of the losses specified below.

Provision is made for the participation of the conference in whatever dividends accrue with the company; in other words, if deaths in any one year have not consumed the amount of premiums paid in, after adequate expenses have been deducted, an amount will be refunded to the conference. In some years this may run as much as 2500 to 3000 dollars. This can be applied on the premiums of the following year.

In any group insurance plan the conference becomes the employer and the minister is the employee. A part of the cost has to be borne by the conference itself; in the plan used by annual conferences in the Methodist Church, this cost passes on to the local church. For every \$1,000.00 of protection the cost to the church would be \$1.11 per month, or a total of \$13.32 per year. The maximum amount that any church could pay under this plan would be \$39.96 per year. That is possible only where the minister is entitled to \$3,000.00 of insurance protection.

The group insurance program provides for every active member of the conference to receive protection in the maximum amount indicated by his salary status. Every person serving as the pastor of a church, regardless of physical condition or insurability, is entitled to receive the maximum amount as indicated by his income bracket. This will enable 30 men in our conference who cannot receive insurance otherwise to have the full amount of protection.

The life insurance of a minister who, on the date of his retirement or attainment of age 65, whichever is later, is insured for more than \$1,000.00 under the plan, will be reduced to \$1,000.00 on such later date, and no further contribution will be required thereafter. Ministers who are insured for \$1,000.00 of life insurance on the date of retirement or attainment of age 65, whichever is later, will continue to be insured for that amount of life insurance, and commencing on such later date, no further contributions will be required. The insurance for death or dismemberment by accidental means will be discontinued upon retirement.

A brochure is being prepared for distribution at the annual conference. This will set forth further details of the plan.

Your commission unanimously recommends that the Central Texas Conference participate in some group insurance plan like that which is presented above. We feel that this will provide insurance for the least amount of money and make it possible for every member of the conference regardless of age or insurability to participate in a large way. We earnestly request the conference to vote 100% participation in the plan. If that is done, the plan will become operative as soon as 75% of the conference membership has signed the application and paid the first premium.

Your commission has studied this program in detail and now presents to you its findings for the year's work.

SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE

The members of the Committee on Social Action consider this a new field and not merely the successor to the following committees:

1. Spiritual State of the Church
2. Sabbath Observance
3. American Bible Society
4. Christian Literature

We do, however, recognize the importance of these committees and we want to do all these committees have done but we feel this committee embraces far more than the work done by these committees.

The committee assumes that the name SOCIAL ACTION implies what we are supposed to do. We recognize that Sabbath Observance; American Bible Society; Christian Literature, and the Spiritual State of the church are included here.

We feel that since this a new committee that we need time to formulate plans and organizations before we attempt to launch the program. We earnestly call the attention of our Conference to the work that has been done by our General Conference in this field. The "Social Creed" as printed in the 1944 Discipline is a clear statement of what we consider to be a large portion of the work of this committee. We suggest that each minister and church take this as an outline for social action. Paragraph 20 page 558 states, "We recommend that this Social Creed be read to our congregations at least once a year or placed in their hands in printed form. We further recommend that in every local church there shall be a committee to encourage the study of our Social Creed and to seek in every possible way to apply its principles."

We believe that the church should take action on these things:

1. Any legislative program that affects the morals or social welfare of our people.
 - a. As for example temperance legislation
 - b. Legislation to improve the living conditions of the people.
2. The whole social impacts of the Church on the community and social organization.
 - a. Calling attention to the failure of the church to reach disinherited groups and the rise of the sects.
 - b. Emphasizing the high calling of the church to reach all the people; not to shut ourselves up in artificial and beautiful temples becoming exclusive organizations; but may we let the warm heart beat of the church reach every person in whatever social condition.

With future study and thought we hope to be able to present to the Conference a plan of Social Action that will be both helpful and challenging.

Following is the report of the American Bible Society.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

During the year 1946, three major achievements of the American Bible Society are noteworthy—two in Germany and one in Japan.

In order to meet the needs of the ever-increasing demand in Germany for spiritual guidance, the American Bible Society encouraged by gifts from churches and individuals continued its work in supplying Scriptures to the people of Germany. During the year 1946, it published in the United States and shipped to Germany a total of 1,052,657 Bibles, Testaments and Gospels, at a cost of \$262,500.

Although Germany had equipment to produce her own Scriptures, certain raw material were lacking. In an effort to meet this need during the year 1946, the Bible Society purchased and shipped to Germany a total of 576 tons of paper, cellulose, and other raw materials to be used in print-

ing the Scriptures. These raw materials represented an expenditure of \$750,000.

Considerable has been accomplished in bringing about a distribution of the Gospels in Japan, although there is no possibility of printing Scriptures in Japan because of destruction of printing presses and lack of paper.

General MacArthur wrote a leading Churchman in America that in Japan today Christianity has an opportunity "without counterpart since the birth of Christ."

Responding to this call, the American Bible Society printed and shipped 743,356 New Testaments and Gospels to the Chief of Army Chaplains in Tokyo and to the Japan Bible Society during the year 1946, at a cost of \$109,200. So great was the call for these Gospels that by the end of the year only 200 copies were left in the office of the Japan Bible Society.

Although the work of the American Bible Society has been concentrated on the distribution of the Gospels in the war-stricken countries during the year 1946, the regular work of the Society has not been neglected. During the year 1946, in addition to the Gospels and Scriptures distributed at home and abroad, a total of 11,394,200 volumes, which includes Bibles, Testaments, and portions of the Scriptures. It distributed 16 million reading lists and other pieces of literature in connection with world-wide Bible reading.

The opportunities ahead beckon the churches and Christians of America. The following resolutions are therefore, prepared:

That each individual church be requested to set aside Sunday, December 14, 1947, or some other suitable Sunday as Bible Sunday, on which day the importance of the Bible in the rehabilitation of the world is clearly emphasized and the responsibility of the church for Bible distribution is laid upon the consciences of the people.

That the churches urge their members to join in the daily reading of the Scriptures during the period of time allocated for emphasis on Bible reading between Thanksgiving and Christmas.

That each church appoint an American Bible Society Committee or representative to work with the District Secretary of the American Bible Society, in promoting the total program of the American Bible Society in the local church.

TEMPERANCE

Called to prayer by the Council of Bishops and challenged to service by the General Board of Temperance, "We are awakening to the gravity of the situation. Again we are marching against this great enemy of humanity." We would pledge the hearty support of the churches of our Central Texas Conference to the program of action being formulated by the General Board of Temperance; and call upon District Superintendents, pastors, our lay leadership and members, both men and women, to cooperate in every way possible.

We recognize the fact, that to successfully attack the entrenched beverage liquor traffic, Methodists with other Christians, together with organizations of like purpose must unite for concerted action. In Texas, we note the fine work being done by the United Texas Drys, inter-denominational, non-partisan, but correlating and coordinating all dry forces. Dr. Walter H. McKenzie, the efficient Executive Secretary commends the militant cooperation of Bishops A. Frank Smith and Chas. C. Selecman, with the Methodists of Texas for the work achieved in behalf of dry legislation and opposition to the Pari Mutual Bill at the 1947 session of the state legislature.

We would therefore recommend that our churches give practical support to the United Texas Drys, among whose directors, officers and representatives, more than a score of Methodist leaders are actively serving:

1. By opening our pulpits to the representatives of the United Texas:

Drys; and by placing some definite sum in the local Church budgets or taking up a free will offering, that each local church may have a share in the responsibility for the progressive program of this organization. This is an "ought" and should be a "must" for our Methodists.

2. By contacting the United Texas Drys when a local option election is contemplated, for the benefit of experienced guidance and council.

The movement is on—138 Texas counties are dry; 82 are partially wet and partially dry; only 34 counties are totally wet.

At a recent hearing in Washington, D. C., Bishop Hammaker said, "All thoughtful persons will agree that liquor sales ought not to be increased; if that is the case, there is no need for and it is bad public policy to permit liquor advertising."

We, therefore, urge our people to write at once to U. S. Senator Wallace H. White, Jr., Chairman, Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, U. S. Senate Bldg., Washington, D. C., requesting that Senate Bill (The Capper Bill forbidding liquor advertising) be favorably reported.

Let us pray, let us teach, let us set right examples, let us work with all of like mind, let us be steadfast—and the victory can and will be won.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Commission on World Service and Finance has received the following assessments for this Conference from the General and Jurisdictional Boards:

For World Service.....	\$32,618.00
For General Administration.....	1,073.00
For Jurisdictional Expense.....	1,980.00

For Episcopal support there is assessed an amount equal to one and three-fourths per cent (1¾%) of the current pastor's salary in each pastoral charge. The items for World Service, General Administration, and Jurisdictional Conference are non-scalable.

The ratio between Conference and World Service for 1947-1948 is Conference 65%, World Service, 35%.

We approve and recommend that special collections be taken in all the Churches of the Central Texas Conference this year on the dates designated by the various boards and committees having them in charge, as follows: Methodist Home at Waco, Golden Cross, Methodist Student Day, Church School Rally Day, Race Relations Day, World Service Sunday, and College Day, and the Texas Mission and Training School Day.

We approve the five dollar (\$5.00) plan for the support of Student Work in our Church schools and state colleges. We approve the campaign for the improvement of Glen Lake Camp.

We authorize the Treasurer to pay from the total receipts for Benevolences the expense of the Conference, and the following items before the distribution of any monies is made, as follows:

1. Expense of printing the Journal.
2. Expense of the Conference Secretary.
3. The printing expense and secretarial help for the Conference Treasurer in such amount as shall be agreed upon by the Treasurer and the Commission on World Service and Finance.
4. The expense of bonding all treasurers of Boards and Commissions who handle Conference Funds, including the Conference Treasurer.
5. The expense of auditing the books of the conference Treasurer, and the Treasurers of Boards and Commissions as they shall be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

6. All boards and agencies applying for funds to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall submit to the World Service Commission a financial statement showing receipts, distributions, obligations and total cash balance on hand.

7. We recommend that all funds shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer to be received no later than May 31st of each year in accordance with the action of the Conference which makes the fiscal year June 1 to May 31.

We recommend that a fund equal to one-half of one per cent ($\frac{1}{2}$ of 1%) of the pastor's salary be raised in each pastoral charge for the Missouri Corporation of the General Board of Pensions to create a fund to be used in aiding weaker Conferences to reach the minimum level for the support of retired ministers.

DEWITT TALMADGE KNIGHT

Dewitt Talmadge Knight was born July 5, 1884 at Avery, Texas and departed for that city that hath foundations, whose Builder and Maker is God, the morning of May 13, 1947. In 1918 he married Miss Eula Lee Thomas of San Marcos, whose fidelity to him and whose courageous spirit helped to make him the faithful pastor of the several charges he served. Her death on December 31, 1946, no doubt, hastened his.

In his early manhood he was a farmer and a carpenter. Then responding to the call of the Carpenter of Nazareth to do more noble building, he attended the Oklahoma Baptist University at Shawnee and prepared for the ministry. And in Texas he held pastorates at Paris, Round Rock, Valera, Anna, Sunset, Ringgold, Joy, Cuthand, Fairlie, Woodland and Pattonville.

His last work was at Wingate where his work was finished in November, 1943, when he suffered a stroke. This closed twenty-four years in the active ministry. The following year he and his family moved to Joshua where he lived until his death.

He is survived by two children, Mrs. Bill B. Palmore of Tyler and Thomas Knight of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

It was always a pleasure to visit with him, whose cheerful spirit always rose above his adverse circumstances and whose desire to preach the Good News continued until his death. The spirit of this unselfish servant of God remains to inspire all who knew and loved him.

DR. DAVID KNOX PORTER

On May 7, 1947, the veil of life was lifted suddenly for Dr. D. K. Porter and he was ushered peacefully into eternity. "Dr. Porter was one of the great preachers and Christian statesmen of his generation" said Bishop A. Frank Smith. A most devout spirit, Dr. Porter dedicated his life very early to the Methodist Church and served it almost one-half century. He believed wholeheartedly in the itineracy of the Church and always went willingly and uncompromisingly to whatever charge he was assigned.

Dr. Porter was educated at Southwestern University, where he graduated with honors and where, after many years of distinguished service he was honored with the degree of Doctor of Divinity. He remained faithful to his training and was a scholar to the end of his days.

Dr. Porter served all types of churches as pastor and never in any way spared himself in his arduous devotion to his pastoral duties. Among the many churches served by this consecrated soul were those at Coleman, Breckenridge, Cleburne, Corsicana, Waxahachie, Austin, Fort Worth, Dallas, and Houston. So vital were his services at critical times, he might be considered the founder of the University Methodist Church at Austin, Oak Lawn in Dallas—noble monuments to his memory.

In addition to his being distinguished pastor, Dr. Porter was an excellent District Superintendent, serving efficiently and faithfully many districts in Texas and being of the greatest service in the cabinet.

In the passing of Dr. Porter the Methodist Church has lost one of its finest ministers. His devout spirit was strengthened and supported by sound scholarship, and his strength of character was supplemented by strength of mind. Even into the days of his retirement he was a fearless searcher after truth. A man of high principles and great sympathy, he was at the same time a man of strong convictions, never, even to his own hurt, compromising with forces he considered evil. Dr. Porter loved men, and he loved life intensely and lived it to the fullest to his last hours and earned his reward of entering into the joy of his Lord, leaving behind him devoted loved ones and a host of friends that treasure the memory of knowing one of the sweetest spirits that ever looked with human eyes.

ATTICUS WEBB

Atticus Webb was born February 6, 1869 near Fulton, Kentucky. At 2 years of age he was taken to Arkansas by his parents and lived near Little Rock.

In 1888 he came to Texas to teach in the rural schools and was licensed to preach in Pecan Gap in 1889 by the Methodist Church. He was educated for the ministry at Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas and did his graduate work in the University of Chicago where he received his M. A.

He joined the North Texas Conference of the Methodist Church, South in 1896 and served in the pastorate.

In 1907 he changed to the Central Texas Conference and became the president of a small Methodist College in Granbury. In 1911 he accepted a district superintendency with the Texas Anti-saloon League, becoming the State Superintendent in 1917. He preached in every town above 500 population in Texas.

As Superintendent of the Anti-saloon League he led the fight for the adoption of the 18th amendment by Texas and also a campaign to write a dry amendment to the State Constitution.

He wrote "Crime Our Nation Shame," "Face the Facts," and "Dry America," three books dealing with various phases of the liquor question and law enforcement. For 12 years he was editor of the "Home and State," a weekly journal.

His name appeared in "Who's Who in America," in "Who's Who in North American Writers," in "Who's Who in the Clergy," and in "Who's Who in Texas." He was elected to the American Academy of Political and Social Science.

He was Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Texas from 1917-34; held pastorates until 1937; conducted radio and other educational campaigns in Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Arkansas, and Texas; was Superintendent of the Anti-caloon League of Florida 1938-41; of the Anti-saloon League of Georgia 1941-43; and of the Anti-saloon League of Wisconsin, 1943-45.

He retired from active work in Wisconsin January 31, 1945, because of ill health and died in Dallas, December 11, 1947.

He married Mattie E. Fugitt December 25, 1896; to this union three children were born, two of whom survive: Charles G. Webb of Tulsa, Okla., and Mattie Dell Webb of Dallas. His wife preceeded him in death February 22, 1942.

He is also survived by two brothers; B. L. Webb of Santa Anna, Texas; and N. B. Webb of Rochester, Texas; and by one sister, Mrs. J. T. Phillips of Fort Towson, Okla.

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

1. The Conference shall elect annually a Secretary. On his nomination, assistants shall be elected as follows: Minutes, Conference Business, Reports, Roll, Press. He shall also nominate, and the Conference elect, an Editor of the Journal, who may nominate an Assistant Editor; and a Conference Statistician who shall nominate his assistants.

2. The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st.

3. The Secretary of the Conference shall mail report blanks to all pastors, not later than thirty days prior to the meeting of the Conference.

4. Upon arrival at the Conference, each pastor shall report immediately to the Conference Treasurer all monies due, and deliver to the Conference Treasurer or his agents, the treasurer's envelope with financial report properly filled in as paid.

5. The District Superintendents are a Standing Committee to nominate all the Boards and Regular Standing Committees and the Tellers at each session of the Conference and provide mimeographed copies for distribution, provided that no member of the Conference shall be nominated for membership on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the sessions of the Conference.

6. No person shall be a member of a Conference Board if he is in the salaried employ of that Board, or of an Institution which derives financial support from said Board.

7. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session.

8. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board. Vacancies on all Quadrennial Boards and Standing Committees shall be filled by nomination of the Board or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference.

9. All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees, shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

10. All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except the statistical reports, coming to the Conference must be typewritten in triplicate before reaching the Secretary's desk. The Secretary is authorized not to receive them unless so presented.

11. The lay delegates to Annual Conference shall be elected at the First Quarterly Conference. The name and address of the lay delegate and alternate lay delegate from each charge shall be certified by the District Superintendent to the Secretary of the Annual Conference, not later than four months preceding the convening of the Annual Conference.

12. All Boards which are empowered by the Discipline to make nominations for General and Jurisdictional Boards shall include such nominations in their reports to the Annual Conference at the session prior to the meeting of the above Boards.

13. The Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications shall furnish the Secretary of the Conference with a report concerning

each one admitted to the Conference, using an information blank to be agreed upon by the Committee and the Conference Secretary.

14. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications to inquire carefully into the physical health of all candidates for admission into the Conference. The Committee may, at its discretion, require the health of the applicant to be certified by a physician.

15. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall not be authorized to offer to the Annual Conference any new or special apportionment to be levied upon the Churches, unless such new or special apportionment shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by the Methodist Church or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so entrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust had been executed and how.

16. It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to furnish the Table of Apportionments for the ensuing year, arriving at the scale for the districts by determining what per cent of the grand total of World Service funds has been paid by each District for the current year, and, on this percentage, base the Table of Apportionments for the ensuing year.

17. The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

18. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference work an amount sufficient to meet the expense of printing the Minutes, the Treasurer's bond, and the necessary expense of the Conference Secretary.

19. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall include in its Budget a sufficient sum for the following: a per diem of \$2.00 for every pastor and every lay delegate attending the Conference from Charges paying less than \$1,500.00, except those of the city in which the Conference is held; a per diem of \$3.00 for every Retired Minister attending the Conference; the hotel expenses of retired ministers and their wives attending the Conference shall be paid by the Conference Entertainment Committee through the local entertainment committee, and \$300.00 to care for the necessary expenses in holding the Annual Conference, such items to be sanctioned by the Chairman of the Commission of World Service and Finance.

20. Churches assessing \$1,500.00 or more shall care for the Conference entertainment of their pastors and lay delegates.

21. The Conference Planning Committee shall be composed of the Bishop, the members of the Cabinet, the Chairmen of the following Boards and Commissions (Education, Evangelism, Hospitals and Homes, Ministerial Training, Missions and Church Extension, World Service and Finance, Conference Claimants, Minimum Salary Support, Social Action and Temperance) the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, one lay representative from each District to be named annually by the District Superintendent, and ten members at large to be named by the Presiding Bishop.

This Planning Committee shall act as an advisory, correlating, and policy-finding body, and as a steering committee for advance planning for

the Annual Conference sessions, may receive recommendations from the various Boards and Commissions, and give advance information (with or without its endorsement) to the members of the Annual Conference. This Committee does not have the authority to prevent any Board, Commission or individual from presenting any recommendation directly to the Annual Conference.

THE DISTRICT:

22. The District Conference shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the 1944 Discipline, Paragraph 666; the Recording Stewards of the several charges; and one delegate for every 100 members, or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate.

23. Each District Superintendent, in reporting upon the work of his District, shall indicate if any Church in the District has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary or benevolences for the year just closing, stating the name of the Church and the amount borrowed.

24. All bonds required by the laws of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

25. All votes, except when otherwise ordered by the Conference, shall be by show of hands.

26. It shall require a two-thirds vote to suspend any of these Rules.
