III—DAILY PROCEEDINGS

OPENING SESSION—WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 8, 1955

Opening Worship—The Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church met in the ninetieth session (the forty-sixth since the division from the old Northwest Texas Conference, and the seventeenth since Unification) at First Methodist Church in Fort Worth, Texas, at the ten o'clock on Wednesday morning June 8, 1955, Bishop William C. Martin presiding.

Hymn No. 2, "Come Thou Almighty King" was led by Thomas B. Granger, and the Apostle's Creed was recited. Bishop H. A. Boaz led the prayer. The Responsive Reading for the 33rd Sunday, "God Our Refuge" was used, and Bishop Martin spoke briefly of the work of the Conference before calling attention to the fact that O. F. Sensabaugh was present for the 77th Roll Call, and J. W. W. Shuler for the 63rd.

Roll Call—The Conference Secretary, J. D. F. Williams, was called to the platform to give instructions regarding roll call. The roll was taken by signed cards.

The pastor host, Gaston Foote, extended a hearty welcome to the Conference on behalf of First Methodist Church.

Nominations—The Conference Secretary nominated his secretarial staff, and they were elected. (See Conference Staff) Glenn Bowman, Statistical Secretary, nominated his assistants, and they were elected: Milton Slayden, R. E. Briggs, Horace Poteet, E. D. Piott, Nolan M. Fisher and S. A. Baker.

W. V. Bane was called for nominations from the Cabinet of Board, Commission, Committee members. They were confirmed. (See List) He then moved that the Bar of the Conference be the lower floor of the Sanctuary. It was done. He moved that the printed program be adopted as the agenda for the Conference sessions. It was done.

Jackson C. Oglesby, Chairman of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, presented the names of six ministers and six laymen in nomination as Trustees of Wesleyan Homes, Inc. They were confirmed. (See Trustees) Nominations were then presented to fill vacancies on the Board of Hospitals and Homes. They were confirmed. (See Boards.)

Introduction—Bishop Martin introduced members who have been transferred into the Conference since the last session: Estill Allen, Jr., C. J. Roberts, and A. G. Hulme. He also introduced visitors from other Conference including C. W. Lokey, Southwest Texas Conference, and Oran Carter and H. P. Landrum of the Northwest Texas Conference.

Announcements—Notices concerning Conference activities were made.

Holy Communion—Hymn No. 148, "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross" was sung, and the Communion Service was led by Bishop Martin and Bishop Boaz, assisted by the District Superintendents.

Memorial Service—P. E. Riley, presiding for the Memorial Service, announced Hymn No. 315, "How Firm A Foundation." The Scripture from the 17th chapter of the Gospel according to St. John was read by B. C. Huddleston. As the Conference Secretary read the name of each minister or minister's wife who had died during the year an evergreen wreath was placed at the base of the cross in memory. Hymn No. 318, "O Love That Will Not Let Me Go" was sung and R. C. Edwards gave an appropriate Memorial Address. Bishop Martin pronounced the benediction.

SECOND SESSION—WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 8, 1955

Opening—The Conference was called to order at two o'clock with the singing of Hymn No. 238, "Blessed Assurance," led by Thomas B. Granger, after which Bishop Martin led in prayer.

Composite Report—H. Brown Loyd, Superintendent of the Brownwood District, presented the Composite Report detailing attainments of the year. Leslie W. Seymour moved that the report be received for record and it was done with hearty applause. (See report).

Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications—Report No. 1 of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications was read by Margan Garrett, acting registrar. This report listed the candidates for admission into full connection.

The following men were called to the chancel where Bishop Martin addressed them briefly and upon answering the disciplinary questions satisfactorily they were admitted into full connection:

Kenneth Edward Bass, Guy Barnett Birdwell, Kenneth Clyde Blackford, Gene Donald Brannan, Otis Franklin Brown, Gene Austin Chamness, Gaither Lee Day, Charles Edward Dennis, John Edward Dowd, John Nelson Flynn, Hiram Edwinson Johnson, Jr., Robert Vance Lindsey, Luster Marion Lockett, Benjamin Barton, Marney, William Olin Ramsey, Wilbur Thomas Reynolds, Cyril Jacques Roberts, Lawrence Earl Terpstra, Gerald Wayne Young.

It was announced that Lawrence Alford Zellers was transferred back into this conference after accommodation transfer to the New York Conference where he was admitted into full connection May 15, 1955.

Balloting—Bishop Martin called the conference secretary for a report in preparation for balloting for delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conference. J. D. F. Williams reported 323 clerical members of the Central Texas Conference warranting election of five ministerial and five lay delegates to General Conference and six additional ministerial and six additional lay delegates to Jurisdictional Conference.

The ballot was spread by the tellers after which they retired to make the count.

Administrative Council—H. Brown Loyd, Chairmon of the Administrative Council, presented the report which was received for record. (See Report).

Commission on World Service and Finance—Report No. 1 of the Commission on World Service and Finance was presented by Thomas Sterck and it was adopted. (See Report)

Special Committee on Redistricting—Floyd E. Johnson, Chairman of the Committee on Redistricting read the report and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded.

H. Brown Loyd moved that the vote when taken be by secret ballot. The motion was seconded by A. S. Gafford and carried.

Oran Stephens proposed a substitute motion:

"First, that the Fort Worth district boundaries remain in substance as they are.

"Second, that a committee be appointed by the chair to study the feasibility and possibility of readjusting the boundaries of the other nine districts, studying specifically with the thought of eliminating one district, making a total of nine districts in the Central Texas Conference.

"Third, if and when a workable and acceptable plan of readjustment has been found whereby the districts have been reduced to a total of nine, the assessment against pastors' salaries for the support of district superintendents shall be reduced from 12½ percent to 10 per cent."

The substitute motion was seconded.

Generous discussion followed and in order to complete the matter the time for the business session was extended by voice vote.

The previous question was moved and since the tellers were absent from the conference the vote was held in abeyance while other matters were considered. Announcements were made.

Committee on Conference Entertainment—Report No. 1 of the Committee on Conference Entertainment was presented by Raymond M. Burton. It was adopted. (See Report.)

Commission on Christian Vocations—W. H. Cole presented the report of the Commission on Christian Vocation which was adopted. (See Report)

Substitute Motion—The tellers having returned to the bar of the conference, the vote was taken on the substitute motion concerning redistricting. It was defeated.

Main Motion—The ballot was spread and the vote taken. Results to be announced at the following session.

Results of Balloting—The tellers reported clerical ballot No. 1 cast 236, invalid 8, valid 228, necessary to elect 115, No election.

Lay ballot No. 1—Ballots cast 120, invalid 14, valid 106, necessary to elect 54. Eugene F. Jud was elected with 62 votes.

Standing Rules—Chet C. Henson proposed an additional phrase to Standing Rule No. 1, paragraph 1 as follows: "the chairmen of all standing committees" to be inserted in the rule setting forth membership of the Administrative Council. The proposal was adopted.

Balloting—The conference ordered that the second ballot for delegates be taken to be sealed by the tellers, opened and counted tomorrow, and reported to the morning session. Accordingly, lay and clerical ballots were spread, collected, and sealed.

Closing—After the singing of the Doxology the benediction was pronounced by J. W. W. Shuler.

THIRD SESSION—THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 9, 1955

Opening—The session was opened at 8:30 with Lamar Smith presiding. Hymn No. 34, "When Morning Gilds The Skies" was used, and the Responsive Reading for the 16th Sunday titled, "The Law Of The Spirit" was read, followed by the singing of the Gloria Patri. Lamar Smith led the prayer.

Bishop Martin addressed the Conference with the first in a series of meditations on the general theme, "Living In Two Worlds." The Worship Service closed with the singing of Hymn No. 179, "Spirit Of God" and the benediction.

Ballot No. 2—The results of Clerical Ballot No. 2 were: Ballots cast 205; invalid 3; valid 202; necessary to elect 102. There was no election. The third ballot was taken.

Ballot No. 2—The results of Lay Ballot No. 2 were: Ballots cast 96; invalid 2; valid 94; necessary to elect 48. Mrs. E. L. Reid was elected with 68 votes. The third ballot was taken.

Ballot on Redistricting—The results of the ballot on the proposal for redistricting were announced; For, 238. Against, 69, and the proposal was adopted.

Minutes—Ben Feemster reported for the Committee on Minutes that the minutes of the preceding sessions had been read and found to be correct.

Agenda—J. W. Sprinkle, chairman of the Committee on Courtesy and Agenda, suggested that the printed program be the agenda for the day. He introduced Dr. A. T. McIlwain, Executive Secretary of the Board of Pensions.

Publishing House—Mr. Bert Holcolm of the Cokesbury Book Store in Dallas was introduced for a statement concerning the progress of the Publishing House and presented a check in the amount of \$6608.46 to be added to the Super-annuate Fund.

Texas Methodist Student Movement—Robert Breihan, Director of the Texas Methodist Student Movement, was introduced for a statement regarding the work throughout the state. He introduced Richard Clemens, Director of Wesley Foundation at East Texas Teachers College in Commerce, and D. Orval Strong, Director of Wesley Foundation at Tarleton State College in Stephenville.

Hospitals and Homes—Jackson C. Oglesby presented Report No. 2 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. Mr. W. P. Earngey, Jr., Administrator of Harris Hospital, pointed out the high lights of the report. (See Report).

Report No. 3 of the Board of Hospital and Homes concerning Golden Cross and the work of the Commissioner-Chaplain was discussed by W. W. Ward, Hospital Commissioner-Chaplain. (See Report)

Report No. 4 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes concerning Morris Hospital Nurses Home was presented by W. W. Word, Hospital Commissioner, who introduced a group of student nurses to distribute pamphlets. (See Report).

Report No. 5 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes concerning Blue Cross enrollment pointed out the need for conference wide participation. (See Report)
Reports 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes were adopted.

Ballot No. 3—The results of Lay Ballot No. 3 were: ballots cast 94; invalid 4; valid 90; necessary to elect 46. There was no election.

Board of Hospitals and Homes—Report No. 9 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes concerning the Methodist Home in Woco was presented by Hubert Johnson. (See Report)

Report No. 7 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes was introduced by Jackson C. Oglesby who requested that M. Howard Knox discuss the work of the special committee to investigate Homes for the aged. (See Report)

Report No. 1 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes was discussed by Jackson C. Oglesby, chairman of the Board, who requested its adoption subject to action of the Commission on World Service and Finance concerning the financial items involved. (See Report)

Reports 1, 7, and 9 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes were adopted.

The ballot was spread for two names.

Board of Missions—Goston Foote called attention to Report No. 3 of the Board of Missions and made corrections in the printed preliminary report and moved adoption of the corrected report. (See Report)

Resolution—Gaston Foote proposed a resolution as Report No. 5 of the Board of Missions authorizing the transfer of the Central Texas Conference Loan Fund from the Board of Church Extension in Lexington, Ky. to the Division of National Missions, the Board of Missions, New York.

C. W. Lokey, of the Division of Notional Missions, was introduced to speak in behalf of Spanish Speaking Methodists.

The reports 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the Board of Missions were adopted. (See Reports)

Preaching Service—The business of the conference was suspended for the preaching hour and Dr. Harold Case, president of Boston University, Boston, Mass., brought the message, and gave the benediction.

FOURTH SESSION—THURSDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 9, 1955

Opening—Hymn No. 346, "O Thou In Whose Presence" was sung and the prayer was led by W. A. Flynn.

Ballot No. 4—The results of clerical ballot No. 4 were: ballots cast 223; invalid 4; valid 219; necessary to elect 110. There was no election. The ballot was spread for two names.

Ballot No. 5—The results of lay ballot No. 5 were: ballots cast 92; invalid 3; valid 89; necessary to elect 45. Morris Walker with 52 votes was elected. The ballot was spread for one name.

Introductions—J. W. Sprinkle introduced visitors present, Dr. C. W. Hall of the Wesley Foundation Work, and Albert Tucker, Executive Secretary of Texas Alcohol and Narcotics Education.

Woman's Society of Christian Service—Mrs. E. L. Reid, Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, gave an excellent report which was received with enthusiastic applause.

Board of Evangelism—Garland T. Lavender proposed adoption of Reports No. 1 and 2 of the Board of Evangelism. No. 2 proposed approval of the following conference evangelists: Frank L. Turner and Quay Parmer and as an approved supply evangelist W. B. Morton. John W. Ford spoke to the report. Both were adopted. (See Reports)

Ballot No. 6—The results of Lay Ballot No. 6 were: ballots cast 96; invalid 1; valid 95; necessary to elect 48. There was no election. The ballot was spread for one name.

Joint Board of Publications—W. W. Ward proposed adoption of the report of the Joint Board of Publications and asked that Dr. Earl Hoggard, pastor of Floral Heights Methodist Church in Wichita Falls, speak to the report. He then introduced Miss Mildred Young, associate editor of the Texas Christian Advocate, and W. L. Hankla, Conference press representative; both of whom spoke briefly. The report was adopted. Methodist Giving—Bishop Martin read a telegram from Dr. E. Harold Mohn outlining the excellent increase in benevolent giving. The conference responded with applause.

Ballot No. 7—The results of Lay Ballot No. 7 were: ballots cast 102; invalid 1; valid 101; necessary to elect 51. There was no election. The ballot was spread for one name.

Town and Country Work—S. A. Baker presented the report of the Commission on Town and Country Work. He introduced Mrs. Nan H. Wright, Conference Rural Worker, who interpreted her work in the Cisco District.

M. Howard Knox, Conference Executive Secretary of Town and Country Work, was asked to present the outstanding rural pastors and churches of the year. He introduced the Reverend J. W. Sellers, pastor of the Ireland Circuit, Gatesville District; and the Reverend Robert Haynes, pastor of Bethel Church, Waxahachie District. Mr. J. H. Sims, chairman of the Official Board of Bethel Church, was also introduced. Bishop Martin presented awards in recognition of the excellent work done by both the pastors and the people. He asked the large delegation of members of the Bethel Church to stand and be recognized.

The report was adopted.

The ballot was spread for one name.

Board of Temperance—James Ellison presented Report No. 1 of the Board of Temperance and introduced Richard Irwin of the General Board of Temperance who addressed the conference. Albert F. Tucker, Executive Secretary of the Texas Alcohol and Narcotic Education, spoke urging defeat in the Texas Legislature of House Bills 602 and 628.

James Ellison proposed the following telegram as Report No. 2:

Trustees—C. H. Cole nominated as trustees of Retired Ministers Homes with terms to expire in 1958 Thomas W. Holmstrom, Cecil H. Pemberton, and T. Wesley Hook. They were elected.

Ballot No. 7—The results of Clerical Ballot No. 7 were: ballots cast 198; invalid none; valid 198; necessary to elect 100. There was no election.

Ballot was spread for one name.

Board of Conference Claimants—A. W. Franklin moved adoption of reports No. 1, 3, and 4 of the Board of Conference Claimants. They were adopted. (See Report)

He then referred to Report No. 2 of the Board of Conference Claimants and moved that the report be adopted without reading. It was done. (See Report)

Social and Economic Relations—Michael Patison read portions of the report of the Board of Social and Economic Relations and moved its adoption.

Erwin Bohmfalk moved to amend the report by deleting the second sentence of paragraph 3 so that the paragraph would read: "The Supreme Court ruling on the unconstitutionality of racial segregation is but a legal assertion of the position of the Christian Church. We urge that all Methodist people . . ." etc. to the end of the paragraph. The amendment was accepted.

Elmer C. Carter proposed a resolution relating to the matter. It was defeated.

The report as amended was adopted.

World Peace—Richard Smith III proposed adoption of the report of the Committee on World Peace. Leslie W. Seymour spoke to the report. It was adopted. (See Report)

Ballot No. 9—Results of Lay Ballot No. 9 were: ballots cast 78; invalid 5; valid 73; necessary to elect 37. Those elected were: Mrs. Joel Hooper 53 votes; Jarrard Secrest 50 votes; Law Sone 46; Hubert Johnson 37.

Ballot was spread for two names.

Ballot No. 8—The results of Clerical Ballot No. 8 were: ballots cast 192; invalid none; valid 192; necessary to elect 97. There was no election.

The ballot was spread for one name.
Announcements were made.

Closing—Gid J. Bryan pronounced the benediction after the singing of the Doxology.

FIFTH SESSION—FRIDAY MORNING, JUNE 10, 1955

Opening—The Conference assembled at 8:30 o'clock with Nick H. Kupferle, Jr. presiding. Hymn No. 60 "Praise Ye The Lord" was sung; Responsive Reading No. 601 "Incorruptible Inheritance" was read followed by the prayer.

Bishop Martin addressed the conference on the subject "God's Sovereignty and Man's Responsibility." Hymn No. 301 "Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah" was sung and the benediction followed.

Journal—J. Lester Davenport reported for the Committee on Minutes that the minutes of the preceding day had been read and found correct. The report was approved.

Agenda—J. W. Sprinkle proposed the agenda for the day after reminding the conference that we were far behind schedule.

Ballot No. 9—Results of Clerical Ballot No. 9 were: ballots cast 181; invalid none; valid 181; necessary to elect 91. Erwin F. Bohmfalk was elected with 95 votes.

The ballot was spread for 6 names.

Ballot No. 10—Results of Lay Ballot No. 10 were: ballots cast 59; invalid 7; valid 52; necessary to elect 27. Mrs. B. B. Wedemeyer was elected with 29 votes.

The ballot was spread for 1 name.

Interdenominational Cooperation—Eugene F. Jud read the report of the Committee on Interdenominational Cooperation and moved its adoption. It was adopted.

Board of Education—Hubert C. Smith, chairman, introduced Report No. 1 of the Board of Education and moved its adoption. He commended Wm. H. Cole for 8 years of valuable service as Executive Secretary of the Board of Education. Wm. H. Cole emphasized the summer program of training opportunities.

Board of Education—Hubert C. Smith continued the report of the Board of Education with Report No. 2 dealing with budget and the treasurer's report and other matters.

Nominated as trustee for Southern Methodist University, Tommy Vandergriff. The report was approved. (See Report)

Executive Secretary—Thomas B. Granger, Executive Secretary Nominee, was presented and spoke briefly.

The entire report was adopted. (See Report)

Pensions—Bishop Martin introduced Dr. A. T. McIlwain, Executive Secretary of the Board of Pensions, who spoke concerning the pension program.

Bible Society—Dr. Frank W. Langham, of the American Bible Society, was introduced for a statement concerning his organization.

Lay Activities—Bishop Martin presented the name of Eugene F. Jud as the Nominee for Conference Lay Leader. He was elected.

Chisholm presented her with a check of \$1,000, the gift of Central Texas Conference Methodists, to enable her to accompany her husband to Switzerland on World Council business. She responded gracefully and Bishop Martin added his thanks.

Announcements were made.

Preaching Hour—The business of the conference was halted for the mid-day sermon by Dr. Harold Case.

SIXTH SESSION, FRIDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 10, 1955

Opening—The Conference assembled at two o'clock with W. V. Bane presiding. Hymn No. 379 "I Love Thy Kingdom Lord" was sung and Jerry Jay Smith led the prayer.

Ministerial Session—Bishop Martin called the Ministerial Session to order and stated the purpose of the session.

SEVENTH SESSION, SATURDAY MORNING, JUNE 11, 1955

Worship—James Haldridge called for the singing of Hymn No. 67 "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" after which was the Responsive Reading on page 614 "Confidence in God" and the singing of the Gloria Patri. He then led in prayer and introduced Bishop Martin who spoke on the subject "The Continuing Struggle and The Eternal Hope." Bishop Martin announced the death of the father of L. Stanley Williams and asked for a period of silent prayer. After the message Hymn No. 533 was sung and Brother Haldridge pronounced the benediction.

Minutes—Nolan Fisher reported for the Committee on Minutes that the record for the preceding day was correct. The report was approved.

Agenda—J. W. Sprinkle, chairman of Committee on Agenda and Courtesy, outlined procedure for the morning, and introduced Miss Frances Burns, Missionary to Brazil, home on furlough.

Reserve Pension—E. F. Bahmfalk, chairman of the Reserve Pension Fund Commission, presented the report and moved that men wishing to withdraw from the Reserve Pension Fund Plan be allowed to state their position before Annual Conference. H. B. Loyd moved to amend the report by deleting the suggestion that men wishing to withdraw to appear publicly. The amendment was carried. The report was adopted as amended. (See Report)

Memorial To General Conference—E. F. Bohmfalk read a memorial proposed to General Conference which would shift the detail work of Reserve Pension from the conference committee to the Board of Pensions in St. Louis. It was adopted. (See Memorial)

The ballot was spread for one name.

Chaplains—Bishop Martin read the roll of conference members serving in the chaplaincy and told of the heroic work being done by these men. Greetings from chaplains unable to attend the conference were heard. Chaplain Pat McClatchy led the prayer.

Conference Treasurer—W. B. Rider, Conference Treasurer, read the report for the conference year 1954-55. It was accepted and ordered to record.

Bishop Martin commended Mr. Rider for his excellent work and asked the conference to reaffirm by voice vote the election of Mr. Rider as Conference Treasurer for the coming quadrennium.



VI-REPORTS

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S COMPOSITE REPORT

It is a privilege to present this Composite Report from the ten districts of the conference for the year ending May 31, 1955. For here is represented the labor and love of thousands of consecrated laymen and hundreds of devoted pastors for a period of one year. So, we present the facts and figures in giving account of our stewardship. What is seen in this report, like all others, is dependent upon the knowledge and insight of the hearer into the affairs of the church. Adroitly woven into the record of achievement is the struggle of churches, large and small, to attain worthy goals. To the unseeing eye it will be cold and uninteresting statistics—but to the seeing eye it will be thrilling and drama packed. For every figure will be seen as evidence of a vital faith, every fact as an emblem of sacrifice and love and devotion. As we view, in retrospect, the journey along the King's Highway we shall walk in sunshine and in shadow; we shall rejoice in the lofty altitude of the mountain peak, but we shall come down on occasion into the valley. But we are justly proud of the journey travelled by this marching army of God's children, for through it all, and in it all, there is the note of triumphant faith and victory.

The record reveals that large numbers are crowding the altars of our churches. Between three and four thousand adults—parents, grandparents, and sponsors stood in our altars this year as they presented 1,552 babies for infant baptism. An additional 4,284 come to our altars to profess faith in Christ and to be received into the fellowship of The Methodist Church. Still another 5,933 came to our altars to authorize the transfer of their certificates of membership in the church to their new places of residence. Joyfully do we report that 45 of the finest of our youth stood in our altars to give testimony to the reality of God's call to men to preach the gospel and of their affirmative response. In granting to them Local Preacher's License the church has set them out on the journey that will lead to full preparation for their life's work.

The crowded altar of the Methodist church is not surprising when one considers the fact that we have a working force of 382 church schools with a membership of 73,457, and an average attendance of 40,954. Our church membership now totals 112,366 which is a net gain of 1,693 over last year. Each Sunday morning will find an average of 38,195 worshipping in our churches, while the evening worship hour has an average of 18,681 in attendance. To this we add 130 chartered Men's Clubs with a membership of 5,987; 259 organizations of the Women's Society of Christian Service with a membership of 12,259; 98 Wesleyan Service Guilds with a membership of 2,097; and 329 Evening Fellowships in the youth department with a membership of 6,978.

The labors of this vast group of workmen has resulted in vast improvement to our church plants. During the year we have erected 18 new churches at a cost of \$2,073,502.00. We have built 10 new parsonages at a cost of \$113,775.00. We have repaired a total of 164 churches at a cost of \$309,727.00. Parsonage repair to 132 homes amounted to \$69,954.00. Thus the year has seen 28 new structures erected and 296 structures repaired at a total cost of \$2,566,598.00. While many congregations have busied themselves in building an adequate church plant, others have been diligent in paying for plants previously built. Our record here shows a total of \$508,978.00 have been paid on building indebtedness.

The record of our church in its general financial program reveals the fine results of our Stewardship of Possessions program headed by our laymen in which 301 churches have participated. The record shows that 5,885 laymen have signed the tithing covenant this year. As we look to our record of achievement in World Service and Conference Benevolent giving we are not surprised to learn that five districts exceeded the amount apportioned to them; five districts reached their goal. The World Service Commission apportioned \$158,919.00 to the districts, \$164,250.00 was Accepted by the local churches, on which they paid \$164,609.00. Our regular Advance For Christ giving this year shows \$50,610.00 paid to World Advance Specials, \$17,803.00 paid for National Advance Specials, and \$4,701.00 paid to M.C.O.R. In addition our churches responded to the Bishop's Appeal for Korea by contributing \$19,650.00. This makes a total Advance gov-

ing of \$92,764.00, exclusive of our own Nurses Home funds which shows \$38,-503.00 having been paid in to our treasurer. The latest figures available for this report shows \$95,000.00 plus already paid on the T.W.C.-Southwestern University campaign.

As to the record made in observance of Special Days and offerings received, it is gratifying to note that our Home at Waco received through the Christmas offerings \$79,338.00. There were 294 churches that observed World Communion Sunday with a offering of \$6,806.00. The Week of Dedication was observed by 318 churches with an offering of \$9,102.00. Layman's Day was observed by 334 churches in which 437 lay speakers were used. Race Relations Day was observed by 225 churches; the offering was \$3,165.00. The Home at San Antonio received \$9,747.00 from our churches. Support of the College Day program amounted to \$16,881.00 as 211 churches observed the day. Golden Cross work received \$6,778.00, while the work of our Superannuate Homes was supported to the extent of \$4,702.00.

Rally Day was observed in 211 of our churches and report a total offering of \$2,488.00. Methodist Student Day received an offering of \$1,899.00, and the Wesley Foundation work was supported with an offering of \$6,467.00. The grand total of our financial contributions raised for all purposes this year amounted to \$5,589,242.00.

We are happy to report that there were 254 Vacation Bible Schools held in our conference this year with a total attendance of 15,034. There were 93 Leadership Training Schools held with 3,525 attending.

Total subscriptions to our Advocates are as follows: Texas, 17,168—National 1,551.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

As we come to the close of the third year in our quadrennial program, the Administrative Council reports with justifiable pride on the progress and attainment achieved during this period. In formulating, and presenting to the Annual Conference, a program of goals and a schedule of action, we sought to make it difficult enough to challenge the best of our abilities, yet not so heavy as to injure conference morale. The program was presented and adopted in the faith that each district and local congregation would respond by doing its fair share.

The first financial goal was the raising of \$75,000.00 for the expansion and improvement of our Glen Lake Camp. We have every reason to believe that this amount will be paid in full by June 8, 1955, since there was only a \$1,300.00 unpaid balance on this amount one year ago.

In like manner we were within \$5,000.00 of full payment of the \$100,000.00 goal set for our College Campaign as of Feb. 25th, 1955. Since eight of the ten districts have already reached their goal, we believe that the full amount will be in the hand of the conference treasurer by June 8, 1955.

We have launched the third phase of our financial program on schedule and have made an excellent beginning. Any attempt to report now on the \$500,000.00 Nurses Home project would be fragmentary and misleading. A detailed report will be given to the conference one year hence.

All other areas of achievement in the quadrennial program give cause for rejoicing. The increased 'stewardship consciousness' of our people is heartening. We are especially grateful for the progress made in caring for our members who

bear the 'Retired' relation to our conference. Our goal for this quadrennium of \$38.00 per service year has been achieved.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Each pastor has a splendid opportunity in helping to enlist proper young people for Church related vocations and to help all people to select and interpret and practice their vocational choice in terms of the Christian faith.

Perhaps many of us feel inadequate in our preparation for this very important task. Here The Methodist Church stands ready to be of help. The annual booklet of Methodist Service Projects is available from the Conference Board of Education office for any one who does not already have a copy. There is a splendid little book entitled "Counseling for Church Vocations" available from the same office. Likewise, there are filmstrips and other aids that can be had for the asking at little or no expense.

All pastors are asked to send in the names of their young people who make decisions for Church related vocations to Mr. Jim Flynn, our Conference Youth Director. Likewise each pastor is encouraged to always leave for his successor a list of the names of all those who have made such decisions. Proper interest of the proper time can help many boys and girls toward their goals in vocations under the employment of the church either at home or abroad. There is an ever growing field of choices in this area. About 5000 new people are needed each year to carry on the work of those employed by the church and every pastor should be ever alert to properly encourage young people at this point.

Each district superintendent is asked to plan to have the interests of counseling for church vocations and the Christian interpretation of all useful vocations included in at least one pastors' meeting or retreat during the year, preferably in the summer or fall. A member of the conference commission will be glad to come and present the cause on invitation.

We cannot refrain from urging again and again the need for pastors to give larger support to this matter, this tremendous field of Christian Vocations. Let each church organize its local committee on Christian Vocations and use it throughout each year, realizing also that the pastor must lead in these activities so vital to church leadership recruitment both in the lay and ministerial fields of service.

Perhaps there is no more important interest of the Christian Church today. If this be true, may God help us to see it.

BOARD OF EDUCATION**Report No. 1**

The Board of Education submits herewith our report of the work accomplished for the year 1954-55.

The Local Church

We thank all District Superintendents, District Staffs, Pastors, and local church Commissions on Education for the excellent support given the cause of Christian Education during this Conference Year. In order to make further progress, we stress the following plans:

1. That there be a complete staff in each district, with emphasis on regular meetings; that all District Superintendents make every effort to have their complete staff in the Conference-wide meetings of district staffs; that the members of each district staff forward to the Conference Office a quarterly report, which will include expense items; that District Superintendents help the Conference staff in determining which local churches are in need of greatest help.
2. We continue to highlight opportunities afforded in leadership training through local and district leadership schools, assemblies, conferences, camps and workshops. Every local church is urged to set up and carry on a training class for workers to be held each Sunday during the church school hour. We request all pastors and local church commissions on education to do everything possible to get workers to take advantage of leadership training. Our Conference-wide questionnaires sent out in March 1955 revealed that more churches are interested in local church leadership training schools. Pastors of these churches are invited to write the Conference Executive Secretary immediately after Annual Conference and set dates for local leadership training schools and classes.
3. We emphasize the importance of a vacation church school in every church in the Conference. They should have at least ten sessions.
4. We call upon our pastors and local church officials to see that Methodist literature is used in every church school. World wide Methodism depends upon our people being spiritually informed as to needs and opportunities.
5. We urge that all church school teachers work with their ministers in striving to lead all pupils into a meaningful Christian experience, and those above the primary departments into vital church membership. Every pastor is called upon to make the most of the preparatory class each year.
6. We commend the large number of churches which have active Commissions on Education, meeting each month. We hope every local church will have an active commission this coming year. Workers' Conferences should be held regularly.
7. In order to increase church school attendance and interest, we urge every local church to have an active assistant church school superintendent.
8. We recommend that more and better use be made of visual aid materials. Our Conference office has many excellent materials.
9. We deplore the fact that only 60 churches in the Conference reported reference libraries for officers and teachers. Many of these were referred to as "small and inadequate." Eighty-five churches reported no libraries at all. We urge every pastor and local church commission to start a church library at once and build it up with new books and magazines each month.
10. Eighty-five churches reported youth groups functioning satisfactorily. Fifty-four churches reported unsatisfactory functioning of youth groups. We prayerfully request that all pastors and local church commissions recruit more and better youth workers and select the best materials in guiding our young people.
11. We recommend that all pastors and local churches organize committees on Christian Family Life and encourage Christian Family Life and Study.

Glen Lake Camp

Once again, we can report that the Camp has had one of its best years in its history during the Conference Year just closed.

The very highest type of Christian Camping Experience has characterized the full program and each camping week has moved forward in excellent manner.

We now have just completed the building program and have done most of the needed landscaping of the grounds. Thirty-one permanent type rock buildings now dot the fifty-five acre camp site. This year has seen the erection of the Ladies Lounge building and two modern cabins. Also the paving and lighting facilities, all costing approximately \$16,000.

More than 2500 campers participated in regular camping activities during the past year. The age range extended from Junior boys and girls to the Golden Agers, and we are anticipating an even larger number to enjoy Glen Lake this year.

Your Camp Committee is moving steadily toward meeting every requirement of the camping standards of the General Board of Education and of the American Camping Association.

The books of all funds of camp operations and building enterprises are audited regularly by the Conference Auditing firm.

We rejoice in the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Howard Segoe continue with us as our efficient and faithful superintendents.

It is the plan to ever keep Glen Lake on the basis of a camping religious experience for all who shall attend. To accomplish this we recommend the purchase of additional land adjacent to the present camp site.

Committee on Schools and Colleges

We have received the audit reports from each of our colleges; Southern Methodist University, Southwestern University, and Texas Wesleyan College, and find them in good order.

Southwestern University reports a full and busy year with enrollment of 530 students, including 59 ministerial students and 62 life service volunteers. Current construction, totaling \$800,000.00 including the Alma Thomas Fine Arts Center, Martin Ruter Dormitory, the Brown Swimming Pool, and the Kurth Golf Course and Recreation Center. Faculty salaries have been substantially raised and new staff members added. The University is operating for the fifth consecutive year

without a deficit. Pastor's School will be held June 27-30th with Dr. Dan Miller, the Robertson Professor of New Testament, Union Theological Seminary, Richmond, Virginia, as the Southwestern lecturer and Bishop Gerald Ensley as the Pastor's School preacher. The Audio-Visual Work Shop will be held August 29th-September 2nd.

Texas Wesleyan College reports that plans are being drawn for the new library, all funds being in hand except the Sells Fund, which will be available by January 1, 1956, at which time ground breaking exercises will be held. Freshman enrollment is up 20 percent. The school has had a profitable and growing year.

Southern Methodist University reports the Student's Union Building near completion, a dream of long standing becoming a reality. The new coliseum building is under construction, as well as many other improvements to the physical plant. Enrollment is holding around the 5,000 mark. Perkins School of Theology continues to serve the South Central Jurisdiction in a most efficient manner in the training of our young ministers.

We note with joy that \$96,783.86 has been raised in the \$100,000.00 campaign for Southwestern University and Texas Wesleyan College with the following amounts being paid by the Districts:

We suggest that October 16, 1955, be set as College Day with each church lifting up the inestimable value of our colleges, not only in development of Christian Character, but in providing ministerial and lay leadership of our church. Each church is asked to raise a minimum of 50 cents per member for the Texas Methodist College Association either as a special offering on College Day, or preferably by putting that amount in each local budget. We commend the Texas Methodist College Association, under the dynamic and talented leadership of Mr. Roy Farrow, for the marvelous work being done, not only for our colleges, but in helping lift the level of giving in increased local church budgets, having served over 700 local churches. \$20,781.76 was raised for the 1953-54 year.

We recommend as Trustee for Southern Methodist University for a term of four years ending in 1959, Mr. Tommy Vandergriff, of Arlington. Mr. Vandergriff takes the place of Mrs. Peyton Hall, who has removed from our Conference and has been confirmed as Trustee at large.

GLEN LAKE PROPERTY

The Board of Education has under consideration the purchase of 154 acres of land adjacent to Glen Lake Camp. In looking for funds with which to make a down-payment on this piece of property, we find that we have \$10,000 still unexpended from the building funds. We asked authority of the Annual Conference to spend any portion of this amount for this additional property that seems to the Board wise and expedient, if and when, final decision is made to purchase this additional property.

A RESIDENCE FOR THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The Board of Education has gone on record several times in the past as favoring the purchase of a residence by the Conference for the Executive Secretary of the Board. We ask authority of the Conference to purchase such a residence in the name of the Trustees of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church at such time in the future as funds can be provided and when it is finally determined what place in the Conference would be best suited as headquarters for the Board.

We call attention to the paragraph that will be contained in the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance, calling attention to the obligation of the Conference to support with its money this building. We feel that the churches of this Conference should have a part in this purchase.

Within the field of Hospitals and Homes the Central Texas Conference is operating Harris Hospital, 28 Homes for Retired Ministers, and is sharing in the operation of the Methodist Home at Waco, and The Texas Mission Home and Training School at San Antonio. Our Conference has recently received property at Belton to be operated as a Home for the Aged.

The rapid growth in each of these institutions is indicated in the reports that follow.

We request that a \$20,000.00 debt limit be allowed to make possible the interim operations that may develop within the field of Homes for the Aged.

We request that Mother's Day, the second Sunday in May be designated as a special day for Wesleyan Homes for the Aged, authorizing a special offering on this day, unless the local church prefers to provide for this cause otherwise.

We request that the Administrator of the Wesleyan Home Inc., be authorized to raise funds within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference.

We request the World Service Commission to allow the Board of Trustees of Wesleyan Homes, Inc., to draw from the contingency fund for the development of their program as the need arises.

We request the following appropriations as last year.

Harris Hospital

May 1, 1955

The Board of Trustees and the Administrator respectfully submit the following report of the major activities of Harris Hospital for the Fiscal Year ended September 30, 1954, as well as accomplishments from that date to March 1, 1955.

Patient Care Factors:

The only reason for the existence of a hospital is the care of the patient. All of the seventeen departments were busier this year than the Annual Statistics indicate, because of a shortening of the length of the hospital stay. The stay decreased, from the Fiscal Year 1953 as compared to the Fiscal Year 1954, from 6.4 days per patient to 6.06 days per patient. Although there were 165 less admissions during this last Fiscal Year than the previous one and 6,861 less patient-days resulting in an average occupancy of 84.8 per cent, the fewer number of admissions accounted for only 1,056 of the 6,861 less patient-days, while the balance of 5,805 patient-days was accounted for in the shortening of the length of patient-stay by 0.34 of one day.

A shortened length of hospital stay means to a hospital that an increased work load, because of the acuteness of the patient care, is very definitely felt by all the departments.

From a patient-care standpoint, we feel that this year has been one of the busiest and most satisfactory to the Board and to the personnel of any yet experienced.

New Improvements:

1. **The opening of the Sixth Floor:** Although the opening of the Sixth Floor was accomplished after the end of our Fiscal Year, it was felt that this opening should be reported to the Conference at this time. On April 1, 1955, thirty days after the twenty-fifth anniversary of the opening of this Hospital, sixty-four additional beds were placed in service. The value of these long-awaited beds to the Conference and to the Community has already been felt in an upsurge of admissions and consequent service to our patients. Eighteen additional beds will be opened by May 15, making 82 additional beds available to the Community.

2. **Kitchen:** Very little enlargement of our kitchen facilities had been accomplished since Harris Hospital had 120 beds; therefore, in the planning it was necessary to greatly expand and remodel our kitchen facilities. This improvement should be available for complete use by June 1, 1955.

The cost of the 82 beds plus the expanded kitchen facilities will approximate \$1,000,000.00.

3. **Air Conditioning:** The Board of Trustees, at its meeting on March 18, 1955, voted to air condition the balance of Harris Hospital with the exception of the Ninth Floor, a portion of the Ground Floor and the Basement area, at cost of \$264,000.00. It is felt by the Medical Staff and the Board of Trustees

that this improvement will enable us to much better serve our patients during the hot summer months.

4. **Children's Hospital:** As was reported to the Conference last year, the Fort Worth Children's Hospital is in the process of constructing their new facilities adjacent to Harris Hospital proper. This project has now proceeded into the architectural planning stage and a consultant has been employed to implement its progress.

5. **The Fort Worth Laboratory for Surgical Research:** This Laboratory, which was reported to the Conference last year, is now within 60% of completion. The Laboratory will be used for research in both heart and cancer problems.

6. **Acquisition of Land:** During this last Fiscal Year, the Trustees of Harris Hospital have purchased 18,448 square feet of property adjacent and close to the Hospital, at a cost of \$70,000.00.

7. **Parking Facilities:** Realizing the ever-growing need for additional parking facilities, the Trustees have authorized hot-topping of two additional parking lots during the Fiscal Year and the installation of a unique parking lot control system on one of them. This Control System allows the Hospital to designate the use of the lot without the expense of a full-time attendant.

New Equipment:

During the last Fiscal Year, the Trustees authorized the purchase of \$56,000.00 worth of fixed equipment, covering such items as elevators, air conditioning on the Maternity wing and many smaller items. The Trustees also authorized the purchase of \$48,000.00 worth of movable equipment covering items from washers for the Laundry to microscopes for the Laboratory, to operating tables and operating lights for the Surgical Suite.

Report on Interim Financing:

It may be remembered by the Conference that Harris Hospital was authorized in 1953 to borrow up to \$500,000.00 for interim financing providing that the amount borrowed was paid back out of the first million dollars received from the Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, Inc.

At present writing, it appears that it will be necessary for the Hospital to borrow \$293,120.00 in order to complete Phase I of the construction program. This amount should be repaid by the end of 1956.

Future Planning:

The first phase of the construction program of Harris Hospital is virtually 90 per cent complete, as reported above. This phase has provided badly-needed beds to the community; these badly-needed beds were provided at the expense of seriously overcrowding many ancillary departments, such as Medical Records, Laboratory, Central Supply, Pharmacy, and Operating Rooms.

The next step which must be taken is one which will alleviate the present overloading of the departments mentioned and which will provide adequate facilities for the addition, in the future, of 60 beds.

This program is ambitious and long-range, but it is fully within the realm of possibility, and, if realized, will round out the physical facilities of your Hospital to the extent of providing 595 adult beds and 100 bassinets.

The Conference should understand that the \$450,000.00 remaining from the Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, Incorporated will not be nearly sufficient to handle this long-range program. The Board of Trustees has a Committee studying these future plans, and it is very possible that there will be need of future action of the Conference in this connection.

Nurses' Home Campaign:

As all of the members of the Conference are aware, we are now in the process of attempting to raise \$500,000.00 for the erection of a new and a more adequate Nurses' Home. We should like to report that this campaign is going very well, and we should like to extend to the Conference our appreciation for their splendid and enthusiastic cooperation.

Golden Cross Service:

One of the prime interests of Harris Hospital, and an interest that is closely

connected with its teaching program for interns, residents and nurses, is its Golden Cross Service. Harris Hospital, during this past Fiscal Year, expended \$115,729.57 for charity work. We received part-pay receipts from the patients amounting to \$12,536.16, contributions from the Central Texas Conference of \$7,572.38, and contributions from the Northwest Texas Conference and individuals amounting to \$3,975.75. The net cost to the Hospital was \$87,333.51.

This amount represented the care of 3,927 outpatients and 600 patients who received inpatient care.

It is of some concern to the Board of Trustees that this amount is increasing each year. We again should like to emphasize that we appreciate very much the support of the Conference in this worthwhile endeavor, and we hope that it will be possible to support this healing work of the Church in an ever-increasing amount each year.

Trustees:

We have been fortunate during the last year in not losing the services of a single Trustee either by death or by resignation.

The people who serve Harris Hospital have been loyal and steadfast in their undertaking; the Board of Trustees has given freely of its time and its counsel; the Medical Staff has given unstintingly of its time and professional guidance. It is greatly appreciated by all of these groups that there is a feeling that the Central Texas Conference is solidly behind this service to humanity.

Hospital Commissioner—Chaplain's Report

Golden Cross

Receipts on Golden Cross have lagged throughout this Conference year. However, receipts at Conference may bring the total up to the amount it was last year. As of April first, the churches of the Conference had remitted \$2,688.89 less money than at the same period a year ago. As of this same date, the hospital had spent on Golden Cross patients referred to us by pastors and Methodist Churches \$1,367.00 more than we have received. We feel that the shortage to date is caused largely by the drouth conditions throughout the Conference.

For the first six months of the Hospital's present fiscal year, we have admitted 331 Golden Cross patients at a total cost of \$72,490.34. Of this number, 22 were church-referred patients.

This is an increase of \$20,738.01 for the same period of a year ago. The demands for medical care are heavy. We cannot take care of all applications, but we do make a program for them elsewhere so that no one suffers from lack of care. This Social Service phase of the Hospital is an arm of the healing ministry of the Conference, and one of which we all can be proud.

Chaplain's Report

Our work as Chaplain is one that requires constant service every day. Two factors increase the work: First, the rapid turn-over of patients adds to the actual number of patients to be visited. Second, the opening of the sixth floor and the Cubicle adds 82 more patients to be seen. Pre-operative patients get priority visits each day, as well as those who are critical. The families offer an opportunity for service, because oftentimes they are worried or disturbed and words of counseling helps them to adjust themselves.

I have responded to every call from pastors to fill their pulpits, except when two or more calls come for the same date.

Commissioner's Report

Gifts: The \$2,000.00 gift from Mrs. Leila Peyton Hall of last year has been used to place a pillow radio for each bed on the newly completed sixth floor. These radios give to patients needed equipment to help pass the hours away while convalescing.

Nurse Recruitment: The hospital is needing some fifty more student nurses to properly care for the increased patient services by 82 additional beds. We urge every pastor to become a recruiting agent for us that we may secure more fine young women to enter the profession of nursing.

Twenty-Fifth Anniversary

March 1, 1955 marked the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of Harris Hospital. Twenty-five years ago we had an indebtedness of \$500,000.00 and 100 beds. Soon thereafter the nation-wide depression made its effects felt everywhere. The depression, the huge debt for such a small number of beds, and a newly organized hospital staff and personnel made it difficult to weather the financial storm, ending in the loss of the hospital. We are indebted to Doctor Charles H. Harris for his most generous leadership in assuming the indebtedness and management of the re-organized institution and establishing the hospital upon a sound financial basis.

Today instead of 100 beds, we have 470 beds. Instead of a small city, we now have an ever expanding city and county of more than 500,000 population to support the hospital. Fort Worth is a strategic city from the Federal Government's standpoint. Heavy industries, especially of the aircraft type, insures the future of this growing city and county. We have a splendid Board of Trustees who give of their time and thought in the direction of the business affairs of the hospital, working through our efficient Administrator.

Our Twenty-fifth Anniversary but speaks for the future of our institution of healing. Harris Hospital is the hub of the growing Medical Center of Fort Worth. This city of Fort Worth has shown faith in its hospitals by providing \$4,000,000.00 for their expansion and by allocating to Harris Hospital \$1,450,000.00 for its expansion purposes. The Nurses' Home being sponsored by our Conference indicates the confidence of our Methodist people and their friends for their institutions. There will always be a call upon our Conference and Fort Worth for an ever expanding medical service through Harris Hospital.

Golden Cross Month

We respectfully request that the month of November be designated as Golden Cross Month, with Sunday, November 20th as Golden Cross Sunday.

We deem it a privilege to serve our Church through the offices of Commissioner-Chaplain. We enjoy our work.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES**Report No. 4****Harris Hospital Nurses' Home**

The campaign for funds to construct a new Nurses' Home at Harris Hospital was inaugurated last January. During February and March meetings of pastors and laymen were held in each of the ten Districts in behalf of the project. The spirit and cooperation of the District Superintendents, pastors and laymen was gratifying. Bishop William C. Martin was the principal speaker at each meeting, and rendered most valuable service in behalf of the Home. We shall ever be indebted to him for his messages, and his willingness to give us a part of his crowded program.

The need for the Home is most pressing. The present facilities can care for 80 students, under pressure we can crowd in 95. At the present we have 115 student nurses, some of the Freshman students live in their homes or on the campus and move into the Home as Senior students graduate and move out. Harris itself needs about fifty more nurses to properly care for its services and we have an additional responsibility to keep the demands of other hospitals of our Conference supplied with graduate nurses.

In keeping with former announcements, we are seeking \$500,000.00 for the construction of the Nurses' Home. This amount is being sought as follows:

Churches of the Conference	\$200,000.00
Personal Gifts	300,000.00
Total Minimum Needed	\$500,000.00

During the District meetings, reports of many pastors was most encouraging. Several churches have already paid their askings in full, while many others will have paid one-half of their askings at this Conference session. For the most part, pastors and Official Boards have placed their askings in the church budget, planning to pay in full by June 1956. We should remember, however, that the budgets in our churches for 1954-1955 had already been established prior to the starting of the campaign, consequently the bulk of the funds will not be forthcoming until the close of the year ahead.

The campaign for the \$300,000.00 from individuals will require more time. We need friends who will give generously to this worthy project. To that end, we request our pastors and laymen to assist us by speaking to those who are able to give large amounts, and also to invite the Commissioner into their parishes to present the Nurses' Home to such people.

The Campaign is moving along, we believe, in a fine way. Faith and hard work on the part of all of us means success in the end. Work of construction is not contemplated until funds are in hand.

Many pastors of the Central Texas Conference now carry Blue Cross Hospital Insurance through some District Group. It is proposed that a Conference-wide Group be established and thus discontinue the smaller groups. This can be done through the courtesy of the Golden Cross Office at Harris Hospital assuming the central collecting agency for the group.

Blue Cross (Hospital Group Service, Inc.) has agreed to this plan on the following basis:

This fee is retained by the Golden Cross Office for the expense of sending out notices, postage, etc.

Blue Cross has announced that it is seriously contemplating dropping all ministers because to date, the cost of such insurance is costing the Company more than they receive from the ministerial groups in premiums. However, they are willing to allow all groups within the Central Texas Conference to unite as an experiment. They are anxious that we carry on provided they do not lose money on our ministerial group. What is true of Methodist, is true of all ministerial groups.

We will be required to enroll 75% of the effective ministers of the Conference plus those On Trial to secure the Conference-wide Group. This means, we must have 160 pastors to subscribe for Blue Cross, and also 75% to secure Blue Shield. However, we can have Blue Cross without Blue Shield. We are not forced, as a Group, to take both.

If we fail to adopt a Conference-wide Group, then those who wish to have the Blue Cross Hospital Insurance will be forced to take out Blue Cross on an individual basis and send the premiums to the Dallas Office of Group Hospital Service, Inc., 2208 Main Street, Dallas 22, Texas.

Individual rates will be substantially higher than group rates. On the Conference-wide basis only Effective Ministers and those On Trial will be eligible. Supply Pastors not On Trial and Retired Ministers will not be eligible.

In the meantime, if you are now a member of a District Group you should continue to pay your premiums until the Conference acts upon the larger group. Thereafter, your insurance will continue to the end of the Quarter for which you have paid, or else a refund will be made should you not take it out on an individual basis. Please give this serious consideration so that at Conference we may decide the matter without delay.

Texas Mission Home and Training School

As the Methodist people, the physicians, and the general public become better acquainted with the work of the Texas Mission Home and Training School, the interest in this worthy institution increases. Each of the last ten years has seen an increased number of patients admitted. This continued increase is evidence of the high quality of service being rendered by the Home and the increasing favorable publicity for the HOME.

The Maternity Ward will increase the maximum capacity from fifty patients to sixty. If this space for ten additional girls is not provided by June 1, 1956, the HOME will be forced to turn patients away—assuming that the present rate of increase continues.

The construction of the new building depends upon the final receipts from all conferences. This cannot be determined until all Annual Reports are made. The total amount received from the Central Texas Conference as of May 1, 1955 is \$8,528.39.

The Board of Trustees of the Home requests:

FIRST—That Sunday, September 25, 1955 be designated as the day for

each church in this conference to take an offering for the support and expansion of the HOME.

SECOND—That one week prior to the Sunday the offering is taken the pastor mail literature (provided by the HOME) to each family of his church. If he deems it advisable, the pastor may place the literature in his church bulletins the Sunday prior to the Sunday the offering is taken.

THIRD—That it be understood that all money from all sources be pooled and any balance above operating cost be used as follows:

- A. To furnish and equip first floor of new building—kitchen and dining room.
- B. To furnish and equip the second floor.
- C. To furnish the space now used as hospital and nursery.
- D. To furnish dormitory space for an additional ten patients.
- E. To equip class rooms for the training program.
- F. To paint the present building and make minor repairs.
- G. To landscape the grounds.
- H. To build a retaining wall for the new channel of the river.
- I. Purchase new elevator cage.
- J. Remodel administrator's apartment building.

FOURTH—That this conference approve the request of the Rio Grande Conference to share in the ownership and support of this HOME. Such action to become final when approved by the five Conferences which now share in the ownership of the Home. Any necessary charter change will be taken care of by the trustees through the HOME'S attorney.

Report No. 7

Committee to Investigate Homes for the Aged

Our Committee has sought to gather such information as would provide guidance in formulating a policy for future action regarding care of our aging population within this Conference. In doing so, certain interesting discoveries were made. We shall try to summarize these, first, as general trends; and secondly, as local developments.

As to the general trends; it is well known that we are part of a society whose average age is increasing. There are two great contributing factors: first, infant deaths have been reduced by more than fifty percent in the last half-century; second, people are living longer with improved health care. Today there are thirteen million Americans over sixty-five years old. It is estimated that by 1980 this figure will stand at thirty million.

Of this aging population, about one-third are completely dependent; one-third independent; one-third partially dependent. The major question to be faced is: Who shall care for those who require care? The State, or the Church? Our church is coming increasingly to feel that those who really care are best fitted to care for them.

The Methodist Church maintains 61 Homes for the Aged under the guidance of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes. The first one, still in operation, was established in 1850. In these Homes there are 5,800 residents. Add to these 244 cottage units for Retired Ministers and the grand total of residents stands at 525 men; 4,982 women; and 446 couples, or 6,459. There are 1,636 on the waiting list for admission. These homes range in capacity from 435 to 8 guests. There are 18 whose capacity is less than 50 guests. Five have a capacity of 25 or less; 26 can accommodate 100, and 9 have a capacity of 200 and above. Assets stand at almost \$59½ million; and indebtedness is just over \$1½ million. The average operating cost per resident is \$1,106 per year.

Now to the question: What about the Central Texas Conference? It would be an expensive and tedious process to make a complete age-group survey of the Conference. We have used existing studies, and with assistance of statistics from the General Board of Hospitals and Homes have arrived at the conclusion that

this section of the country conforms fairly closely to the national average—about eight percent of the population are of retirement age. By this process of reasoning, using the 1954 Journal figures there would be 8,833 members of the Methodist Church in the Central Texas Conference who are retired. It might be noted that this same source reports just under 3,000 members enrolled in the Home Department of the Church School.

There are four basic needs to be considered in any plan to care for aging citizens: Physical, including care during sickness; Emotional, with an eye to a permanent home-like atmosphere; Social, offering an opportunity for self-expression and outreach; and Spiritual. These could be expanded far beyond the proper limits of this report.

How are existing homes financed? The chairman of this Committee has corresponded widely with homes, and devoted a week to study in Chicago during the Methodist Convention of Hospitals and Homes. He gathered that these are the principal sources of income for building and maintaining a home: Founder's Fee; Admission Fee; Guests' regular payments; Old Age Assistance and Social Security; Annual Conference appropriations; Gifts and Devices; and Annuities.

What are the admission policies being used? Here, just as in the case of size and type of home, there is no established, inflexible rule. The tendency seems to be in the direction of consideration of each case on the basis of the merit, as interpreted by the Admissions Committee.

Your Committee has met often and worked diligently in an effort to bring before you the results of our study, thought and prayer. We are indebted to the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes for patience and understanding, for we have not wished to proceed with undue haste. This year there were approximately four hundred former students and their children back home for the Easter week-end, and the President of the Alumni Association presented the Home with a gift of eight thousand dollars which was given in memory of the eight boys from the Methodist Home who lost their lives in World War II. I know that every Methodist who is interested in the Home and who has helped develop it to its present state appreciates the sentiment expressed in this memorial gift from the former students.

During the past week, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Willson of Floydada presented the Home with a gift creating the Willson Lectures, with which each year a notionally recognized leader in the field of child welfare will be brought to the campus to lead a discussion on the subject of child welfare for the staff and friends of the Methodist Home. This could well be the beginning of one of the most worthwhile advances that has come to the Home. The program of services for the children of the Methodist Home should be among the best, and this will definitely be an improvement to the quality and type of services your Home will be able to give the children who come there to live.

The Administration Building, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Perkins and Mr. J. S. Bridwell, is rapidly being completed. It will probably be ready for occupancy and dedication in the fall.

Your Methodist Home is now providing an expanded program of services to the children in need who call upon it for assistance. In addition to the usual services of care and training, the Home is now using the services of foster homes for children who have a need for this particular kind of assistance, and children are being adopted in instances where it is obvious that this is the best plan for them. There is also provided care and treatment for confused and disturbed children who need and must have this unusual service in order to be able to live a normal life later. The Directors of the Home are giving many hours of time and study to the development of the best possible program for children, but this effort would be wasted without your interest and cooperation. We sincerely appreciate the affection and the generosity of this conference in developing a good, well-rounded program for the children of the Methodist Home.

COMMITTEE ON INTERDENOMINATIONAL COOPERATION

The Central Texas Conference was well represented at the Second Annual Meeting of the Texas State Council of Churches held at University Christian Church, Fort Worth, Texas, January 5-7, 1955. Denominations represented were A. M. E., Congregational Christian, Disciples of Christ, Episcopal, Evangelical, and Reformed, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian U. S. and Presbyterian U. S. A. and United Church Women.

Dr. G. Alfred Brown, Waco, led the morning worship, using as his topic "From Calvary to Evanston." In a six part message to the Churches of Texas, the Second Annual Meeting hailed the progress of state and national councils but urged closer cooperation in the local community. Areas of concern treated in the message included migrant ministry, mental health, and adequate institutional care, preventive work in juvenile delinquency by restoration of Youth Development Council funds, abolition of common-law marriages and religious values in public education.

Dr. R. F. Curl, superintendent of the San Antonio District of the S. W. Texas Conference of The Methodist Church, was re-elected to a second term as president of the Texas Council. Eugene Jud is representative from Central Texas Conference on Finance Committee of State Council. Reverend Floyd Johnson represents Central Texas Conference on the Executive Committee of State Council of Churches. Reverend Wm. Cole continues to serve as Chairman of Committee on Christian Education. Mrs. Lacy Goostree, President of United Church Women of Texas, is also a Vice-President of State Council.

Recognizing that Methodism has given outstanding leadership in the matter of interdenominational cooperation, we recommend and urge that members of this Conference continue to give full and wholehearted support to the Texas State Council of Churches.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES**Report No. 1**

The Board of Lay Activities has worked diligently at its task of helping the pastors arouse the laymen of our churches to their full responsibilities in the great tasks of The Methodist Church and has attempted in an effective way to help inform and train laymen as they assumed the responsibilities of their particular calling. We feel very definitely that in the final analysis only an informed and active laity can give our church the impetus to move forward at its maximum power and influence. It is our hope that in this brief report of the Lay Activities program that pastors and laymen alike will see the vast potential power of the laymen's movement and will join our Board in the development and utilization of this power.

Specifically, most of the work of our Board of Lay Activities was done by the ten separate district boards of Lay Activities in the ten districts of our conference. These district Boards under the fine leadership of the district lay leaders held the following meetings: 24 meetings where only the immediate members of the Boards were present; 18 meetings where all the pastors and charge lay leaders met with the district Board; 17 district wide laymen's meetings at which a cam-

bined total of over 4000 men were present for instructions of various types and for inspiration for more consecrated discipleship; and 40 sub-district meetings.

It is significant to point out that in the Cleburne District, under the fine leadership of Doyle Stalcup, the District Board of Lay Activities sponsored 30 sub-district meetings at which an average of 95 laymen and pastors were present for instruction and inspiration concerning all phases of the Church's work.

This past year as in the last four years, we had a very exceptionally fine participation in the observance of Laymen's Sunday, October 17. In seven of our ten districts 100% of the churches cooperated. Only 14 churches in our whole conference did not observe Laymen's Sunday.

At the present time there is organized in every district of our conference a lay speaking program, making it possible for a pastor to secure at any time a layman to fill his pulpit or to assist in the other phases of the Church program. Progress is being made in many of the districts toward the goal of having a service in every Methodist Church every Sunday.

We now have a total of 138 Men's Clubs in our conference, ranking 14th in the Nation in reference to total number of chartered clubs in the conference. It is significant to note that only three of our Methodist Men's Clubs have ceased to function since they were chartered. Space does not permit the listing of the many accomplishments of these fine clubs in our conference, but if we could give these positive proofs of the worth of a Methodist Men Club in the local church, there would not be a pastor or a layman that would not be moved to form such a club in his local church.

There are now only approximately 12 mens groups or brotherhoods in our conference that have not affiliated with this national program of our church. This is indeed a small number but it is difficult to understand that why in the tradition that is ours as Methodist we should have even one such group remaining in our conference.

The Stewardship of Possessions program made a great impact on both the spiritual and financial life of our churches. Under the leadership of our District Boards of Lay Activities the program was carried on in a specific organized manner. At last report 123 churches carried out the full program and 102 of our churches partially participated in the campaign to tell every Methodist that the minimum standard of giving for Methodist is a tithe. According to the best figures available we now have some 6000 tithers in the Central Texas Conference.

The largest attendance ever had at Glen Lake Camp was reached when over 532 laymen and their pastors attended the sixth annual Laymen's Retreat August 27, 28, and 29.

The program for the Laymen's Retreat was packed with information and inspiration. The three general discussion groups of Lay Speaking, Methodist Men's Clubs, and the Stewardship of Possessions program were under the leadership of Mr. Charles Stuck, North Arkansas Conference; Robert Williams, Department of Methodist Men, General Board of Lay Activities; and Mr. Eugene F. Jud, Central Texas Conference Lay Leader respectively. The District Superintendents and District Lay Leaders gave wonderful leadership as they led in the devotions and took charge of the general assembly programs and devotions.

Our Conference was well represented at the first National Conference of Methodist Men held at Purdue University. Thirty-three of our men, including four district lay leaders, Dr. Erwin Bohmfalk, Fort Worth District Superintendent, and your Conference Lay Leader.

Your Conference Lay Leader has attended such national, jurisdictional, conference, or district meetings which he was called to attend. He has spoken to numerous Methodist Men's Club Meetings, "kick-off" dinners, district and sub-district laymen meetings, and to numerous Sunday morning and evening services. He has attempted to give such leadership to the lay program of the church that more and more laymen might respond with a deeper loyalty to their church and accept their responsibility in helping carry forward the whole program of the Church.

The Board of Lay Activities has set up for itself the following goals for the 1955-56 conference year:

1. To continue to give leadership and assistance to the Stewardship of Possessions Program.
2. To provide a program in each district for the instruction and training of church lay leaders.
3. To sponsor a program that will keep our present Methodist Men's Clubs active and strong and to continue to organize and charter clubs until we have a chartered club in every charge of the conference.
4. To provide for a lay speaking program in each district so that provision can be made to have a Sunday morning service in every Methodist Church in our conference every Sunday.
5. To plan for a 100% participation of all churches of the conference in Laymen's Sunday, October 16.
6. To sponsor the Laymen's Retreat at Glen Lake Camp, August 26, 27 and 28.

To The General Conference of The Methodist Church, to be convened April 25, 1956, in Minneapolis, Minnesota:

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

WHEREAS, Twelve hundred men each year during 1952-53 and 1953-54 were separated from the active membership in the Annual Conferences through death, retirement, withdrawal, location, etc., and

WHEREAS, Eight hundred sixty-four Methodist men were graduated from the accredited seminaries of the United States (679 from Methodist schools; 185 from non-Methodist schools) in 1953-54, and,

WHEREAS, An increase in theological schools enrollment of 50% is necessary if The Methodist Church is to meet the minimum number of ministerial replacements needed with trained ministers, and,

WHEREAS, The ten existing Methodist theological schools are at near capacity with 2967 students and cannot accommodate the 4450 men (50% increase) needed in seminary training annually;

THEREFORE, We respectfully memorialize the General Conference of The Methodist Church, now in session, to take immediate steps to make provision for on expanded program of theological education.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT**Report No. 1**

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Conference, under the direction and management of a Commission on Minimum

Pastoral Support, hereinafter, for the sake of brevity, called the Commission, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Five of this number shall be ministers, and four laymen, and three of the total number of nine shall be clerical or lay members of the Conference Board of Missions. These three shall serve during the quadrennium. The remaining six members shall serve for three year terms, two to be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support program, in the closest cooperation with the Conference Board of Missions. Members of the Commission, in addition to the one-third who shall be members of the Conference Board of Missions, may be chosen from the membership of that Board, and if they are not so chosen, they shall be expected to attend the meetings of that Board, but shall not have a vote except on matters directly affecting the Minimum Pastoral Support program. The Minimum Pastoral Support program, and that part of the work of the Conference Board of Missions that has to do with appropriations for pastoral support in the Annual Conference, shall be considered one general program.

Vacancies in the membership of the Commission, caused by death, or removal from the Annual Conference, shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the ensuing session of the Annual Conference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regular way.

The Commission shall organize at that session of the Central Texas Conference held at the beginning of each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the executive committee of the Commission, and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. All subsequent elections of officers and executive committee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Commission held prior to the date of the meeting of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Administrative Procedure

1. (a) The basic minimum basis for pastoral support shall be \$1,500.00 per year, exclusive of any parsonage provision that may be made by the Charge.

(b) To this sum the amount of \$200.00 shall be added if the pastor is a single man.

(c) To this amount the sum of \$700.00 shall be added if the pastor is married.

(d) For each child in the home of the pastor, under sixteen years of age, or twenty-one years of age if in school or college, an allowance of \$25.00 shall be made.

(e) When a child is born during the year into the home of a pastor participating in the Fund, an allowance of \$25.00 is made. This allowance is available to the parents upon request to the Secretary of the Commission.

All missionary appropriations shall be considered a part of the basic salary received in making the computation for the amount of help to be given from the Fund, and in determining the amount of the appropriation to the Charge.

2. The provisions of this Plan shall apply to preachers on trial who are appointed to pastoral charges; to student pastors who are on trial; to ministers in full connection in the Central Texas Annual Conference; and to full time approved supply pastors who are recommended by their District Superintendents.

Participation in the Funds of the Commission shall not be granted any minister—in full connection, on trial, or full-time approved supply—who has received

any appointment other than that of preacher in charge within the bounds of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

In cases of change of appointment between sessions of the Annual Conference and after the apportionments have been made by the Commission, no member of the Conference or full time approved supply shall share in the Fund unless the Charge to which he may be appointed shall meet the conditions hereof, and then his participation shall be on a pro rata basis for that part of the year served in the Charge to which he may be appointed.

(a) Full time approved supply pastors, recommended by their District Superintendents, and their Churches or Pastoral Charges shall participate in the provisions of the Plan exactly as do the men on trial or in full connection in the Annual Conference.

(b) The Board of Missions is to continue its cooperation in this program.

3. No pastor shall receive help from the Fund who receives income from other employment than the regular work of the ministry, if such help brings his total income up to the level of the minimum salary established by this Plan. If his income from other employment does not bring his total income up to the minimum salary figure established, then the amount of help given shall be figured from the amount of his total income.

4. The provisions of Paragraph 3 shall not apply to those men, appointed to pastoral charges, who are receiving benefits from the Veterans' Administration, for nothing in this Plan shall be construed as voiding any rights Veterans have under the public laws of this country, and the benefits of this Plan shall be applied as indicated above on the basis of assistance to them by reason of the travel involved in serving their charges.

5. A pre-requisite for any pastor to receive help from the Fund, is the agreement, by vote of the Quarterly Conference of the Charge he serves, to pay to the Commission an amount equal to twenty-five (25) per cent of the amount necessary to bring the salary up to the computed minimum; provided, however, such requirement may be waived upon unanimous vote of the Commission. The twenty-five (25) per cent paid to the Commission shall not be considered a part of the salary apportioned and paid.

6. No pastor shall participate in the Fund if the Charge he serves reduces the salary below that paid the previous year, unless this reduction is recognized by the Commission as justifiable, and approved by its unanimous vote.

7. In accordance with Paragraph 826, Discipline 1952, when a minister in full connection, on trial, or a full time approved supply, is appointed to a Charge apportioning less than \$1,500.00 per year, such appointee shall not participate in the Fund except on the basis of a \$1,500.00 salary apportionment and the usual participation of the Charge in the Minimum Pastoral Support Plan.

However, to aid and encourage Charges in the \$1,200.00 to the \$1,499.00 salary brackets, to move toward the \$1,500.00 basic minimum, participation in the Fund on the basis of the salary apportioned, will be granted annually, provided the salary has been increased over that of the previous year, by not less than five (5) per cent. All Charges that have not reached the basic minimum salary should indicate their purpose of doing so.

8. Funds for the work of the Commission shall be secured in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 826, Discipline 1952, and apportionments shall be made to the Charges as hereinafter set forth, and payments by the Churches on such apportionments are to be made regularly to the Conference Treasurer.

Scale for Apportionments

(a) No apportionment shall be made to Charges apportioning less salary than the basic minimum basis, including missionary appropriation, nor to any Charge whose pastor is receiving aid from the Fund—it being understood that the twenty-five (25) per cent payment to the Commission by the Charge in accordance with the provisions of this Plan, is and shall be in lieu of any other apportionment against the Charge for this work; except in those cases where the twenty-five (25) per cent requirement is less than the apportionment required by the

regular scale. In all such cases the Commission will make the proper adjustment.

(b) There shall be a minimum of \$800.00 in the total salary paid that shall not be subject to the per centage scale.

The apportionments shall be figured on a per centage scale, as follows:

(c) Three (3) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,000.00, or less.

(d) Three and one half (3½) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,001.00 to \$2,500.00;

(e) Four (4) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,501.00 to \$3,000.00;

(f) Four and one half (4½) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$3,001.00 to \$4,000.00;

(g) Five (5) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$4,001.00 and up.

9. The Commission shall gather necessary information throughout the Conference for the computation of the apportionments to the Charges, and the amounts to be paid to the participants in the Fund, and that information will be given to the District Superintendents and Pastors, and by them the Quarterly Conferences of the Charges. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective Districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts from the Churches listed in their respective districts.

General Provisions

10. Payment on the apportionments to the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payment to the participants in the Fund, at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, and March 1; payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same per centage basis as that on which the funds come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.

11. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, and of all payments to participants in the Fund and for all other purposes. The record of such payments shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for the work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund; and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals en route, to all meetings of the Commission, except such meetings as are held while the Annual Conference is in session, shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be computed on the basis of five (5) cents per mile each way.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to participants in the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time, if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionments, payment for the fourth quarter and for dependents shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency Aid is limited to those who are participants in the Fund, and not more than ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available for emergency appropriation. All unexpended portions of such available emergency funds, shall, at the close of the year, remain in the general fund, subject to disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this Plan.

BOARD OF MISSIONS**Report No. 1**

This report can only give some high points in the program being carried on by your Board of Missions.

(1). **World Service:** World Service giving has increased materially during this quadrennium. This is due to two things: A good program of Missionary Education and Cultivation on the District and Local Church Level; and the willingness of Christian people to respond when presented with a real challenge.

(2). **Advance Specials:** Advance Specials have maintained a prominent place in the Benevolent program of the Churches of the Conference. Scarcely a charge now remains without some kind of Advance Special and some Churches have as many as three or four.

Advance Specials are available to any Church, class, or individual desiring one.

(3). **Week of Dedication:** Observance of the Week of Dedication is becoming more and more a part of the Missionary Program of our Churches. Its values are being realized in spiritual enrichment and in meeting existing needs in areas where help is not otherwise provided. We recommend that all Churches make the Week of Dedication a part of their program.

(4). **Korean Relief:** We call attention to the gratifying response of the Churches to the Bishops Appeal for Korean Relief. This made possible an unprecedented ministry. We can continue help for our Korean friends with our prayers as well as our money.

(5). **Church Extension:** The work of establishing new congregations and building new Churches and Personages has gone forward at a rate unequalled by any other like period in the history of our Conference. Many projects are now under way and others soon will begin. These new projects, in the main, are in rapidly growing areas in the Cities of the Conference. They speak of the vision and interest of the people living in such areas and of District and City Boards of Missions.

(6). **Missionary Education & Cultivation:** Each year sees the Board of Missions doing a better job of Missionary Education. For still greater results we recommend a wider use of missionary materials and information provided by our Church—such as leaflets, visual aids, mission study books and Missionaries home on furlough.

(7). **Recommendations:** We shall soon enter the last year of this quadrennium. As we do so we shall be faced with unparalled opportunities in the field of World Service and Church Extension. Therefore, we prayerfully recommend that every Church in the Central Texas Conference accept the challenge presented by these opportunities in the Spirit of Jesus Christ Our Lord.

We recommend the appointment of Reverend Bruce Weaver as Conference Missionary Secretary for the year 1955-1956.

Report No. 5

Resolution

WHEREAS the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a Corporation of the State of Kentucky, holds and administers for the Central Texas Annual Conference a loan fund which at April 30, 1955, amounted to \$42,198.42. Regular Loan Fund \$31,334.90 Cisco District Loan Fund.

WHEREAS the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, a Corporation of the State of New York, through its Section of Church Extension, is authorized to carry on the Church Extension work of the Methodist Church (Paragraph 1299-5);

WHEREAS it is desirable to further integrate the work of Church Extension by the transfer of the Central Texas Conference Board loan funds to the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church; and said Corporation and the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are agreeable thereto;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Central Texas Annual Conference that the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, is hereby authorized to transfer the Central Texas Conference Board loan fund amounting

to \$42,198.42 as of April 30, 1955, to the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, a Corporation of the State of New York, and to assign to said Division the mortgages representing outstanding loans.

Said Division of National Missions will continue to administer the conference loan fund as heretofore in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline.

JOINT BOARD OF PUBLICATION

The expanded program adopted last year by the Joint Board of Publication to give more adequate reports about Methodist events to the public is proving to be advantageous.

Approximately 100 general releases have been sent to the 660 Texas newspapers on a Conference or State-wide basis and the church press since June 1954. Releases are also sent to the wire services and radio and television stations. Several hundred local stories have been mailed from various Conference meetings.

We have covered major Texas Methodist events during the 12 months with gratifying cooperation with news agencies. We are including at least five major meetings in each Conference on the staff schedule each year.

Five workshops on church press and public relations have been with youth and other groups. Others are on the summer schedule.

Circulation of the Texas Christian Advocate has moved up to nearly 70,000. Over 160 churches have the paper coming to each family.

At the February meeting of the Joint Board of Publication plans were adopted to increase circulation of the Texas paper, since informed Methodists are stronger church members. The Texas Methodist Planning Commission supports the every family idea and commends the state paper to official boards as worthy of being a budget item. Bishop William C. Martin and Bishop A. Frank Smith are giving strong support to the plan.

Each Conference is asked to name an Advocate representative who will work closely with the editor-business manager in increasing circulation. Since it will be valuable to have a member of the Board of Publication to serve from this Conference, we recommend that Oran Stephens be named the representative.

Each district is asked to select an Advocate agent-reporter, who will support circulation and serve as news reporter.

We are requesting the same amount of subsidy as in 1954-55 (\$12,000) for the support of the office. (The General Commission on Methodist Information is contributing \$1,000 per year.) The amount for the Central Texas is \$2,170 and \$375.00 for the Central Texas page, as it was last year.

RESERVE PENSION FUND COMMISSION

In our campaign to raise the sum of \$500,000.00 to implement a three fold program of aid in the amount of \$106,808.00 for our present retired ministers, and \$120,709.00 for the partial, and \$243,821.00 for the full reserve pension systems, a total of \$456,923.74 was secured. By June of 1954, the Fund had earned interest in the amount of \$64,604.88. Of this earned interest \$29,977.59 has been paid to our Conference Claimants, and \$34,627.29 has remained in the Fund. While the campaign was in progress, on the order of the Annual Conference, interest earned, beginning May 20, 1949, and ending May 31, 1951, was paid to our Claimants. This amounted to \$20,898.91. From the date of May 31, 1951 the Claimants have received the interest earnings of the \$106,808.00 set up for them, amounting to \$9,078.68, making the total, as above set forth, of \$29,977.59.

The \$106,808.00 raised for our retired ministers is quite helpful in maintaining the annuity rate of the current income plan of support for the Conference Claimants.

After setting aside the \$106,808.00 for the retired men, the balance in the fund, including earned interest, is \$384,743.03, from which the allocations to the ministers participating, for the conference years 1952-1953 and 1953-1954, has been taken, as set out below. The sum of \$364,530.00 was set up in our original program for the partial and the full reserve systems, \$120,709.00 for the former, and \$243,821.00 for the latter. It will be observed from these figures, that there is a margin in these funds of \$20,213.00.

These reports for the conference years 1952-1953 and 1953-1954, show that a total of \$24,690.50 has been allocated in both the partial and the full reserve systems to ministers who are members. It will be observed that the margin of \$20,213.00 in the partial and full reserve systems lacked only \$4,477.50 of providing enough money to meet the allocations for two full years.

Date for Beginning of Operation of the Pension Program

Occasionally the question is raised as to whether the Conference ever designated a date for the beginning of the operation of this Pension Program. Attention is called to the following facts:

Conference Journal, 1951, Pages 94-95, Reserve Pension Fund Report No. 1, Roman numeral II, "We recommend that the Plan in its entirety, be put in operation at the session of this Conference to be held in June 1952."

Conference Journal 1952, Reserve Pension Plan Report, Page 111, in its first paragraph repeats the statement of the previous year, and adds these words: "We now recommend that the Plan be set in operation, in its three phases, and in line with the legislation passed at the recent General Conference affecting the Pension Program. This means that all active ministers in the Conference will be enrolled in the Full Reserve System, or the Partial Reserve System, depending on their classification of being either "New Entrants" or "Previous Entrants."

On page 112, of the same Journal, in report No. 2, a resolution was adopted authorizing the Executive Secretary, Dr. A. T. McIlwain, of the Missouri Corporation of the General Board of Pensions, to set up our Pension Plan in its three phases, and to allocate to each phase of the program its proportional part of the money transferred to the Missouri Corporation by this Conference for the purposes for which it was raised.

We ask that the office of Executive Secretary be continued on a voluntary basis, without salary, for the assistance it can give the Commission, the Conference, and the Board of Pensions, in carrying forward the Ministers Reserve Pension Plan program, and that P. E. Riley be appointed to that office.

BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

The Methodist Church owes part of its unique position in the religious life of the world to its emphasis upon the hearts of men being individually warmed by the grace of God. Another part of its unique heritage is based upon its understanding of the reality that the individual cannot live apart from society. Thus it is incumbent upon The Methodist Church of today, clergy and laity alike, to lead in changing the lives of individuals and through them changing the society in which they live. Such changes cannot be made unless we of The Methodist Church take the steps necessary to effect them. The Methodist Social Creed, page 631 in the 1952 Methodist Discipline, sums up the Church's stand on social issues. Our Church as a whole and its individual congregations and members still have far to go in putting this creed into actual practice. Much of this failure is due to a lack of familiarity with the Church's position. Your Board of Social and Economic Relations earnestly recommends that every pastor acquaint himself with this Creed and endeavor to lead his congregation into an understanding and appreciation of it.

The General Board of Social and Economic Relations, 740 Rush Street, Chicago 11, Illinois, has made resources in the form of films and printed materials available upon request. These deal with specific matters such as labor and management, race relations, civic liberties, and business ethics. Your Board recommends liberal use of these aids.

Race Relations

The Supreme Court ruling on the unconstitutionality of racial segregation is but a legal assertion of the position of the Christian Church.

We urge that all Methodist people graciously and gracefully accept the Supreme Court ruling; that in personal, religious, and social activities they practice the conviction that no one should be discriminated against because of

race or color; that they actively strive to preserve and improve the ministrations of the public schools to children of all races; that they create right attitudes toward other races in homes and church schools; that they practice and preach the belief that all are children of the same Heavenly Father and all equal in His sight.

Evangelism

The evangelistic imperative of Christianity is essential to its life. The increased use of laymen in evangelistic programs, both special and continual, is a healthy sign and it is commended for more widespread use.

American Bible Society

Because of the wide and unselfish service of the American Bible Society in providing the Word of God to millions throughout the world we recommend its continued and strengthened support.

Christian Advocate

We are fortunate in having both the Christian Advocate and the Texas Christian Advocate available in our Conference. Because of their great value in educating and interesting all readers we urge that both these periodicals be given the support of all churches. We suggest that every congregation be presented with sufficient and guided opportunity to subscribe to both.

Liquor Traffic

The Methodist Church has traditionally stood in active opposition to the liquor traffic and the use of beverage alcohol. We reassert that the only sure stand for Christian people is that of total abstinence. Toward complete attainment of this stand by all Christians we join with the Conference Board of Temperance, of whose work we are justly proud, in urging that all churches in the Central Texas Conference observe Temperance Sunday and Commitment Day.

Spiritual State of the Church

The spiritual state of the Church is dependent upon the spiritual life of its individual leaders and members. The perpetual use of the Bible is an obvious necessity in maintaining and enriching this spiritual existence. This Board further urges the use of such supplementary aids as the Upper Room in deepening the spiritual perception. We feel that the Church can be further led into more meaningful worship experiences by the use of the calendar of the Christian year in forming the program of the Church and the use of the ritual and liturgy of the Methodist Church in its prescribed form to effect such a worship program.

COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION

1. There shall be a program of sustentation in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of a Committee on Sustentation, to be composed of six persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference. The members of this committee shall be selected for their fitness for service on this committee and may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Three members of this committee shall be ministers and three shall be laymen. These shall serve during the quadrennium.

This committee will have charge of and promote all the interests of the Committee on Sustentation and shall be the determining factor in the final approval of any candidate for participation in this program. Vacancies caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference in the membership of the Committee shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Conference. However, the committee is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment will be made with the approval of the Bishop. Such appointment is to apply only until the session of the Annual Conference following, and then the vacancy will be filled in the regular way. The Committee shall meet and organize by electing a Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the executive committee and shall serve for the quadrennium.

2. We recommend that the sustentation granted be in accordance with the following scale:

- (1) When the recipient is unmarried the amount will be \$1600.00.
- (2) When the recipient is married the amount will be \$2000.00.
- (3) That \$25.00 be allowed in addition to the above for each child in the home under 16 years of age or 21 years of age if in school or college.

3. We recommend that the following shall be eligible for participation:

- (1) All ministers of the Central Texas Conference that have been admitted on trial or have been received into full connection provided they have not reached the age of voluntary retirement which is sixty-five (65) years of age.
- (2) An approved supply pastor who shall have rendered not less than ten (10) years of full time approved service as pastor of a charge in the Central Texas Conference.
- (3) Any minister, meeting the above requirements, who is relieved of his pastoral duties and is granted a leave of absence from his charge by the Bishop and Cabinet during any Conference year for physical or psychological reasons shall be eligible for sustentation for that portion of the year that remains until the next meeting of the Annual Conference.

4. We recommend the following procedure:

- (1) The applicant shall make his desire known, in writing, to the Committee on Sustentation.
- (2) The applicant must submit to a complete examination at the Clinic of Morris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas and the Certificate of Disability

must be completed by the examining physician. Emphasis shall be placed upon question number eight (8) which asks: "Do you unreservedly feel that one year leave of absence would be conducive to the restoration of health so that the claimant might continue an effective ministry."

- (3) In extreme emergencies, the Committee on Sustentation will consider the diagnosis and recommendation of a duly qualified physician, but not the claimant's personal physician.
 - (4) When the application is approved by the Committee on Sustentation the name of the applicant shall be submitted to the Committee on Conference Relations with a request that a leave of absence be granted for a period of one year. With this approval of the Committee on Conference Relations and the favorable action of the Annual Conference the applicant shall be eligible for the benefits of this program.
 - (5) We unreservedly recommend that no person be eligible for sustentation funds for a period exceeding twelve (12) months running consecutively.
 - (6) All payments shall be made to the claimant quarterly at the first of each quarter of the Conference year.
5. We recommend the following financial plan:
- (1) The Committee on Sustentation shall be given authority to draw upon the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference such amounts as are necessary during any given Conference year to meet the needs of the applicants in accordance with the above suggested practice.
 - (2) After the amount expended during a Conference year has been determined, the Committee on Sustentation will make a request of the World Service and Finance Commission for the inclusion of that amount in the Conference Budget for the ensuing year. This procedure will be most practical for there is no way of actually determining the full amount which will be needed in any Conference year and if this plan is followed there will be no possibility of having surpluses or deficiencies in the money available for the Sustentation Committee.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Report No. 1

The Board of Temperance of the Central Texas Conference is aware of the increasing pressures of various alcohol beverage interests and moderation groups upon the ministry and laity of our great church and we feel the only method of meeting the problem victoriously is through an awakened church. Never before has such a financial backing been given by alcohol forces to the crusade to enlist more users of beverage alcohol. Never before has greater pressure been exerted on legislative representatives to cause laws to favor the traffic. In the face of this effort, we believe the Church must actively stand for abstinence.

Progress has been made in our conference in the cause of abstinence. Eight representatives attended the Jurisdictional School of Alcohol Studies at Mt. Sequoyah. They are Rev. Paul Wiseman, Dr. W. V. Bane, Rev. A. G. Standlee, E. C. Carter, R. E. Briggs, S. A. Baker, James Campbell and James Ellison. Attending the National School for Youth was Dick Lord, and the National School for adults had Mrs. Leighton Farrell and Dr. E. F. Bohmfalk as our representatives. These persons stand ready to assist in District Institutes on the Alcohol Problem. The Board of Temperance has also purchased two film strips and one movie for use in presenting the work of abstinence. These strips, "Not My Community" and "Of Cats and People" and the sound film, "How to Say No," are available free of charge from the office of our conference Board of Education.

We respectfully request of the World Service and Finance Commission an appropriation in the amount of \$1365.00, \$800.00 of which we request be deposited to the account of the Board of Temperance for immediate use. The above funds are to be used for scholarships and expenses for delegates to the National

Adult and Youth Schools of Alcohol Studies, District Temperance Programs, Commitment Day promotion and follow-up, general temperance education, and cooperation with allied organizations in legislative efforts.

The Board of Temperance also stands ready to cooperate in the task of presenting the need for more and better films in the temperance field. Our conference has sent more than \$400.00 to this cause during the first nine months of this year, and more is forthcoming. Dr. E. F. Bohmfalk is conference "key man" for the rising of these funds.

While several districts have had active promotion by the District Secretary of Temperance, it is evident that some have done little in the field. We believe that careful selection of persons to lead this effort will help offset such failure. We believe also that local churches expect and appreciate their minister's stand for abstinence and will cooperate with him in any logical effort toward that goal. We feel the cause of Christ will be strengthened by proper presentation of the challenge and proper invitation to total abstinence commitment. Last year report was made of 3666 commitments to abstinence as a result of Commitment Day. Four districts did not report any commitments.

We are grateful for the active participation in this cause by the other divisions of the Church. Especially do we acknowledge our appreciation to the Woman's Division and the Youth groups. We shall continue to cooperate with organizations outside the Church which advocate abstinence, yet we stress that we are not as a board affiliated with any outside group and not responsible for their methods or program.

We encourage continued active support of every legislative effort to limit the manufacture, advertisement and sale of Alcoholic liquors and we urge support with prayer and action, of Dry Forces wherever elections concerning the sale of intoxicants are held.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Report No. 2

A Resolution

Whereas, the 1952 Discipline of The Methodist Church, Paragraph 246, 5, authorizes for Local Church organization, a Committee on Temperance, whose responsibility it shall be to "promote a vigorous program of temperance education in the local church, with special emphasis on the appeal that individuals pledge themselves to total abstinence from all alcoholic beverages," and "shall also, in cooperation with the pastor, promote in the local church the observance of such special temperance days as the General Board of Temperance and other church authorities may designate," and

Whereas, the alcohol traffic is imposing every form of media and means in a concerted bid for the economy, body and souls of individuals to be committed to the alcohol way of life which is contrary to Christian living, and

Whereas, the General Board of Temperance of The Methodist Church has designated the first Sunday in December as Commitment Day.

Be It Therefore Resolved: That, as nearly as possible to this Commitment Day date, every local church in this conference have forcefully and positively presented to it by the pastor, an opportunity for individual commitment to total abstinence from alcoholic beverages.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

In reporting the progress of work for the year, we feel it appropriate to remind the Conference that the work of this Commission is geared into every agency of the church which deals with the smaller community. We are not set

apart to promote independently any given program or project, but seek to offer cooperative assistance wherever possible. To this end, the objectives of the Conference may best be achieved by considering the Commission on Town and Country Work as liaison and advisory in nature. This is the reason all major Boards and Commissions are represented on the Commission on Town and Country Work.

If you will follow other reports before the Conference, you will note the evidence of a growing confidence and aggressiveness on the part of small congregations. Some of them are nothing short of heroic in achievement. For these evidences of a resurgence of spiritual power, we give thanks to Almighty God.

We have responded to many calls to assist in setting up and carrying forward Lord's Acre projects. While the immediate result of such a plan is financial, its ultimate objective is spiritual. It focuses attention on the basic Christian concept that man is a steward, and accountable to God for his use of possessions and produce. It emphasizes the Biblical principle of devoting "first fruits" to the Lord's work, and unifies the church in a common purpose with the end result of spiritual, financial and social gain.

We have conducted studies of communities in cooperation with Perkins School of Theology and Professor Marvin T. Judy. Results of these studies indicate that our Conference will profit, in long-range planning, by further studies and surveys. We hope they may be useful to the Board of Education, the Board of Missions, the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support and other agencies.

We sent a delegation of four ministers and one layman to the National Convocation on Town and Country Church in Salina, Kansas, in October. This afforded an opportunity to compare our plans and progress with other leading denominations.

We have continued a cooperative project with the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service by placing a Rural Worker in the Conference.

The National Methodist Town and Country Conference convenes at Bloomington, Indiana, July 22-25, 1955. We recommend that each District plan a delegation to attend this Conference. It should be noted that registrations are to be forwarded through the Chairman of the Commission. The Commission hopes to assist with the travel expense of a car pool from each District. A representative group, returning from this event to their own churches, will do much toward sparking enthusiasm with good ideas for activity and service in a small church.

The awards for this year for the outstanding pastor of the circuit church and the pastor of the station church is an all-expense trip for him and his wife to the National Methodist Conference. We recommend the appointment of M. Howard Knox as the Executive Secretary of the Commission on Town and Country Work for the year 1955-1956.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES**Report No. 1**

The Board of Trustees has had one meeting during the year which was held on December 23, 1954, at the office of Earnest E. Sanders at 1507 Oil & Gas Building, Fort Worth, Texas, after due notice to all of the Trustees, the following Trustees being in attendance, Hal O. Woodward, W. M. Greenwaldt, John W. Ford, George M. Greebon and Earnest E. Sanders, such Trustees constituting a quorum of the nine members of the Board of Trustees.

The following officers were duly elected: Chairman Hal O. Woodward, Vice Chairman, George Greebon, Secretary-Treasurer, Earnest E. Sanders.

At such meeting, the Chairman outlined to the members present, the most generous offer of Mrs. Robert R. Penn of 1114 Fidelity Union Life Building, Dallas, Texas, to convey to the Trustees certain properties in the City of Belton, Texas, and being Lot 3 of Block 50 of said City, to be used by the Central Texas Conference in the establishment of a home for the aged. It being contemplated that a charitable corporation will be organized and set up by the next annual Conference to operate such a home for the aged. At such time the property was encumbered by a lien securing a \$10,000.00 note payable to the First National Bank in Dallas, upon which there was a payment due on December 29, 1954 of \$2400.00 including interest. The Chairman pointed out that Mrs. Penn had of-

ferred to transfer to the Trustees 45 shares of Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation common stock as a gift to the Trustees for the use and benefit of such home and that it would be advisable to sell such stock in order to meet the payment due on such note.

It was resolved by the Board of Trustees that due thanks be given to Mrs. Robert R. Penn for her most generous gift to the Methodist Church of such real and personal property. It was further authorized that the Board of Trustees sell the 45 shares of stock in Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation, and that a sufficient amount of the proceeds thereof be used to meet a \$4400.00 payment due on the note to First National Bank in Dallas; and that the Board of Trustees be authorized to open an account in the name of the Board of Trustees of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church in the First National Bank of Fort Worth, Texas, authorizing the Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer to write checks thereon when such checks are signed by the Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer. It was further resolved that there be paid to the First National Bank in Dallas the said sum of \$4400.00.

Subsequent to such meeting the shares of stock in Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation were sold for \$4428.00 and \$4000.00 thereof was paid on the principal and \$400.00 thereof was paid on the interest of the note due First National Bank in Dallas.

Subsequent thereto and in the latter part of January, 1955, Mrs. Penn assigned to the Board of Trustees additional shares of stock in Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation, which were sold for the sum of \$5883.99. Such sum of money was paid forthwith to First National Bank of Dallas to be applied upon the remaining obligation due said bank and secured by lien on the Belton property. After paying such sum of money to said bank there remained unpaid as of February 15, 1955 on the original \$10,000.00 obligation the sum of \$141.47 as principal and interest. It was considered inadvisable to request Mrs. Penn to make the payment of this small balance and suggestion was made that the Commission on World Service and Finance might make the payment of such small balance and also pay the premium of an insurance policy upon such property due Messrs. Lewis & Cowthon of Dallas. The Commission on World Service and Finance authorized such payments to be made and Mr. Walter B. Rider, Conference Treasurer, issued checks therefor. Thereafter, a full release of the liens of the First National Bank was secured and filed for record, with the County Clerk of Bell County.

Accordingly, the Board of Trustees now holds for the use of the Methodist Church this very excellent property situated at Belton, Texas, free and clear of all encumbrances. We wish to thank Reverend Howard Knox for his splendid efforts in negotiating with Mrs. Penn for the acquisition of the property.

We further report that there is now on deposit in the First National Bank of Fort Worth, Texas, the sum of \$28.08 in the account of the Board of Trustees of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church.

The Board further wishes to report that the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Hal O. Woodward, has prepared a form of Charter to be used for incorporating the Board of Trustees as is directed by the Discipline of the Church. We recommend to the Board and to the Annual Conference that the Board be permitted to become incorporated, all in accordance with the terms of such proposed Charter.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Charter

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:

That We, Hal. O. Woodward, Earnest E. Sanders and G. M. Greebon, all citizens of the State of Texas, under and by virtue of the laws of this State, do hereby voluntarily associate ourselves for the purpose of forming a private corporation under such laws and upon the following terms and provisions.

I.

The name of the corporation shall be: BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

II.

The purpose of this corporation shall be both benevolent and charitable as authorized by subdivision 2 of Article 1302 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 and particularly the corporation shall receive, collect, and hold in trust for the benefit of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church, any and all donations, bequests or devices, of any kind or character, real or personal, that may be given, devised, bequeathed or conveyed, to said Board or to the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church for any benevolent, charitable, or religious purpose, and shall administer the same and the income therefrom in accordance with the directions of the donor, trustor, and in the interest of the Church, society, institution, or agency contemplated by such donor, trustor, or testator, under the directions of the Central Texas Conference. Such corporation shall have the power to invest, reinvest, buy, sell, transfer, and convey any and all funds and property which it may hold in trust, subject always to the terms of the legacy, devise, or donation; subject to the Discipline of The Methodist Church, as from time to time authorized and declared by the General Conference of said Church and by direction of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

III.

The place where such business of the Corporation is to be transacted is in Tarrant County, Texas, and elsewhere within or without the State of Texas in accordance with the law of said State, and its principal place of business is to be in Tarrant County, Texas.

IV.

The term for which it is to exist is 50 years.

V.

The affairs of this Corporation shall be under the direction of a Board of nine trustees a majority of which may act for the whole Board which Board shall hold the property of the Corporation in trust, that such property and premises shall be used, kept, and maintained and disposed of for religious and educational purposes, and subject to the Discipline of The Methodist Church, as from time to time, authorized and declared by the General Conference of said Church and at the direction of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Said trustees shall be divided into three groups of three members each, the terms of one group to expire each year and the regular term of office for each group to be three years or until successor trustees are elected. The present members of the Board of Trustees, their residence and the expiration of their present terms of office are as follows:

Group one in the year 1958:

Hal O. Woodward, Coleman, Texas.

Group two in the year 1956:

W. M. Greenwaldt, Killeen, Texas.
Kenneth Sparks, Hamilton, Texas.
John W. Ford, Corsicana, Texas.

Group three in the year 1957:

G. M. Greebon, Hillsboro, Texas.
Clyde Hays, Waco, Texas.
Earnest Sanders, Fort Worth, Texas.

The trustees shall be elected by the Central Texas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church at its annual session from a list of nominees selected by the Conference Cabinet of the Central Texas Conference.

Vacancies in office before the normal expiration of the three year term caused by death, resignation, or removal without the bounds of the Central Texas Conference shall be filled for the unexpired part of said term in the manner as set forth in the preceding paragraph.

VI.

The value of the goods, Chattels, lands, rights and credits, owned by the corporation is estimated at \$20,000.00. The corporation is and is to be continued to be without capital stock and has no intention of having capital stock.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

'Dedicated to Kingdom building tasks' has been the motivating power behind the achievements of members of the Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guilds. While we have rejoiced in numerical gains, there is also cause for rejoicing over the depth of understanding of the purpose of this great organization. Methodist women are alert to local, community and world needs and have joined hands with others in interdenominational and inter-faith cooperation.

At the beginning of the year a budget of \$93,400.00 was adopted. With the close of the third quarter receipts have exceeded \$80,000.00. Special Memberships in excess of \$10,000.00 were announced during the Annual Meeting of the Conference Woman's Society. This leads to the belief that the pledge to missions will again be overpaid.

Twelve representatives, including a youth delegate, attended the Fourth Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. The impact of this great meeting has been felt in the promotion of each line of work.

Prior to the opening of the camping season it was my pleasure to participate in the dedication of Vesper Point at Glen Lake Camp. The enlarging and beautifying of this place of worship was made possible by the love gifts of members of the Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guilds. This represented an investment of approximately \$2,000.00.

Believing that a continuous program of study and action is necessary, twenty women from this conference attended the Jurisdiction School of Missions. Attendance at the Conference School of Missions was most gratifying. Of the 194 enrolled, 157 received Board of Education credit.

In the early fall Educational Seminars were held in each of the ten districts. Even though attendance was slightly less than that of the previous year, reports reveal that splendid study classes have been conducted. At the close of the third quarter showed 52 more study classes, 64 more Jurisdiction Recognition classes and 1149 more members in study classes than at this time last year. Mission Study Specials amounted to \$2,326.94.

Under the splendid leadership of Mrs. Jasper Wright work with Children, Youth and Adult Groups in Sid Anderson Sub-District, Cisco District, has brought about a stimulation of participation in all activities of the total church program.

At the suggestion of Bishop Martin, and under the direction of Reverend D. A. Chisholm, the Conference Deaconess Board was organized November 3, 1954. Dr. E. F. Bohmfalk was elected chairman and Miss Lucy Gist, secretary.

Reports from Conference Officers reveal the following interesting facts: Gain in number of subscriptions to church periodicals; \$6,703.80 cash for Supply Work; Workshop held where the structure and work of the United Nations was studied; Increase in the M. Y. F. Fund—about \$6,000.00 for the Conference; Children's Work has taken better root with the training through secretaries attending Children's Workers' Conference; More Student Recognition cards sent than ever before; Increase in Prayer Groups from 86 in first quarter to 106 in third quarter; Programs improving in quality; Women serving on church boards and commissions; Approximately \$65,000.00 spent on local work.

Perhaps the greatest satisfaction has come through the securing of three missionary recruits, bringing our total of special workers to fourteen in the foreign field, and nine in the homeland. Our goal is four new workers in 1955-56.

As we face the future, the 14,213 members of the 255 Woman's Societies and 90 Wesleyan Service Guild units bring their devotion, their interests, their talents and their treasure to a task that requires the strength of ALL.

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

Since our Committee on World Peace was reorganized two years ago after having been defunct for several years, the two reports of our committee to the Annual Conference have been mainly suggestions.

This year we are for the first time able to report on progress made as well as our hopes for further progress.

Let us review for you the things your committee has done this year:

1. The program of the General Board of World Peace has been presented in practically every district conference. The Chairman of our committee, Rev. Richard Smith of Fort Worth, has spoken in four districts and Rev. Jock Oglesby of Eastland has spoken in three districts of our conference. We have been told that our cause has been presented by others on our committee and by other interested persons in the other three districts of our Conference.

We believe that the Crusade for World Order conducted last February has been fairly successful in that the Methodist people of Central Texas are better informed and therein are better prepared to serve and help the cause of World Peace without their being intimidated by false propaganda, which seeks to neutralize their Christian influence.

We believe that as a result of this Crusade many of our people realize that peacemaking according to the Christian point of view is not a watered down passivism but a dynamic Christian activism which seeks to intelligently influence people both at home and abroad by Christian ideals that work for a peaceful world.

We believe that our people now realize that the program of World Peace as understood by the Methodist is a two-way approach. We know that the Christian Mission to our world is the road to peace, for evangelism in the foreign fields will ultimately convert the mind of the world to think only in peaceful ways. Yet we are realistic enough to know that international politics, economics, and social conditions have a definite effect upon the missionary's success or failure. Thus, we have found in the United Nations an organization that paves the way politically, economically, and socially for the democratic and Christian ideals that we know will give us a lasting peace. Inasmuch as the UN does this in the name of sixty nations of the world means that no nation can accuse us of using dollar diplomacy in international affairs. The Christian Church has an effective international tool that is not only healing the blind, the lame, and the halt but is also giving the technical assistance and guidance that many nations need in order that they may stand on their own feet.

2. Members of our Committee have been sent to the Jurisdictional Workshop on World Peace at Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas, July 12-16, last year and also to the Seminar on the United Nations in New York last October. We believe that this training will bring great rewards to the leadership of our conference in the area of world peace.

3. We are pleased with the numerous reports we have received concerning the courses on World Peace that have been presented in W.S.C.S. study groups, in camps and assemblies, and in the local churches. We believe that it is here that the most lasting and effective work is being done. An aroused consciousness on the part of every one of us that we can do something about the threat of war is as important a step as has been taken up to this time.

Our Recommendations for This Year

In the light of the progress already made may we submit the following suggestions and requests:

1. We hope that each local church will not only have an active Committee on World Peace but that it will select able leaders to head these committees and will enable these leaders to attend the seminars in New York this coming fall

that will be announced at a later date. Trained leaders will give us an effective program.

2. We also suggest that seminars be established on a local church or district basis and that qualified persons be enlisted to conduct these seminars. In this connection members of the General Board are available for both leadership training schools and seminars.

3. We suggest that all Methodists interested in peace establish an active correspondence with the Conference Committee and with the General Board of World Peace. We have available all kinds of materials, visual aids, and suggestions that will be helpful in any effort or study you would like to make. We are anxious to assist you as long as funds and time last in creating a positive, sensitive, and sensible program of World Peace both for our Conference and every individual living within its boundaries.

4. We recommend the reading of our report to the Conference last year as is found on page 119 in the Annual Journal of the Central Texas Conference 1954. This report is simply an expansion of last year's report and the general program we have already suggested should be carried on this year.

5. Again, we request from the Commission on World Service and Finance an appropriation of \$250.00 for the program of World Peace in our conference. Our funds this year were carefully expended and a report of the expenditures has been submitted to the Conference Auditor for review and approval.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

1. The World Service and Finance Commission looks with disfavor on the action of any Board, Commission or Committee that uses appropriated funds for any cause that is not explicitly stated in the budgetary request. We, therefore, recommend that no group expend any money for any purpose which has not been authorized in the original budget request unless it is approved by the Commission on World Service and Finance. In addition, every Board, Commission and Committee must submit an itemized budgetary request in their Annual Conference report.

2. We recommend as a part of operational procedure that all Annual Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees which receive annual appropriations from the Conference budget shall remit to the Conference Treasurer a check covering the unused portion of their annual allocation. This check shall be mailed when the work of the Conference year is complete and should be mailed in time for the transaction to be recorded in our Annual Audit. This shall be done with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer, with the consent and cooperation of the Commission on World Service and Finance, will honor all necessary monthly expenses.

We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to invest the temporarily unused funds of the Conference Treasury in "Ninety-one (91) Day Treasury Bills" only. There are to be purchased through banking sources alone and the yield from such investments shall revert to the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference.

4. In view of the above action and in recognition of his excellent leadership and untiring service, we recommend that Mr. Walter B. Rider be re-elected as Conference Treasurer for the ensuing quadrennium (1956-1960) and that the Ennis State Bank be approved as the Conference Depository.

5. An amount equal to 11½% of the salaries of ministers, associates, accepted supplies serving churches in the Central Texas Conference is assessed for the support of the District Superintendency. This amount shall be divided equally between the ten (10) districts of the Conference and shall cover all costs of the office including salary, operational expense and office expense. No other amount shall be

levied against the churches of the districts for the District Superintendents office or expenses except for the provision and maintenance of the District Parsonage.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE COMMISSION

Report No. 2

1. We approve and recommend that special offerings be taken in all the churches of the Central Texas Conference this year on the dates designated by the various Boards and Committees having them in charge, as follows: Methodist Home at Waco, Golden Cross, Methodist Student Day, World Service Sunday, College Day, Texas Mission Home and Training School, and Church School Rally Day, and Retired Minister's Home Day.

2. We approve the five-dollar (\$5.00) plan for the support of Student Work in our Church Schools and State Colleges.

3. We authorize the treasurer to pay from the total receipts for Benevolences the expense of the Conference and the following items before the distribution of any money is made:

- 1) Expense of printing the Journal.
- 2) Expense of the Conference Secretary.

3) The printing expense and secretarial help for the Conference Treasurer in such amounts as shall be agreed upon by the Treasurer and the Commission on World Service and Finance.

4) The expense of bonding all treasurers of Boards and Commissions who handle Conference Funds, including the Conference Treasurer.

5) The expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, and the Treasurers of Boards and Commissions as they shall be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

4. We recommend that all funds shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer to be received no later than May 31st of each year in accordance with the action of the Conference which makes the fiscal year June 1 to May 31.

5. All funds received by the Treasurer in excess of General Conference and Annual Conference askings shall be distributed in accordance with the disciplinary provisions. After the Annual Conference expenses have been met the percentage of the balance which is due the General Conference Treasurer shall be remitted immediately. The balance shall be held by the Conference Treasurer in the Contingency Fund for distribution by the World Service and Finance Commission.

6. We request that all Boards and Commissions make requests for annual appropriations to the Commission on World Service and Finance at the time of the meeting of the Administrative Council before the meeting of the annual conference.

7. We note that the Conference has duly authorized the incorporation of the Wesleyan Homes and has elected the Trustees. When and if necessary funds are needed for the promotion and execution of this work, the Trustees will have the same right as other duly constituted Boards, Commissions, and Committees to make requests for funds from the World Service and Finance Commission.

We are in sympathy with the idea of our Conference to provide sheltered care for the aged. However, we do not feel that, at the present time, in the light of information at hand, it is a project sufficiently established to be included in our Conference benevolent budget. Moreover, the World Service and Finance Commission would suggest that, if the Conference should approve the request of the Board of Hospitals and Homes with regard to this project, that it be made a matter of a "Conference Advance Special" and the money be raised by special contribution.

8. The Deaconess Board has been organized in our Conference. They are authorized to draw up to \$100 for this Conference year from the Contingency

Fund in order to defray whatever expenses are incurred in the operation of the Board.

9. The Texas Planning Commission requests that \$1500.00 be appropriated annually to cover the expenses of its operation. The total amount shall be prorated among the different Annual Conferences. The amount requested of the Central Texas Conference is 16.1% of the total which amounts to \$241.50. We recommend that this amount be approved as a part of our Conference Administrative Budget.

10. The World Service and Finance Commission, in response to a request by the Radio and Film Commission, has approved a church-wide appeal for a special fund to support the "Methodist Television Ministry." The total amount needed is \$296,000.00. Each Annual Conference is requested to take a fair share of this amount and accept it as a goal of endeavor to secure "Special Gifts" for the remaining year of this quadrennium. This amount is not to be regarded as an apportionment but as the acceptance of responsibility to reach an objective which is most vital and significant. Our fair share would be \$3,284.00. "World Service Specials" credit will be given churches for their contributions. Each District Superintendent shall select the most advantageous time for promotion in his respective District.

11. We commend the work of the Wesley Foundation and its ministry to the college students of Texas. We look with favor upon their endeavor to complete the Wesley Foundation Building on the Campus of the University of Texas and recommend that the churches of the Central Texas Conference cooperate with the Methodist Student Movement leaders in securing \$18,000.00 as our conference's share of the \$100,000.00 which is so needed in this undertaking.

W. T. KINSLOW

On February 11, 1869 Walter Thomas Kinslow was born to John and Martha Kinslow at Appleton, Arkansas. On November 9, 1954 Brother Kinslow entered into his reward. When funeral services were held in Corsicana, Texas, the following day and he was buried at Hubbard, Texas, the Lord, indeed, buried one of his workmen.

The fourscore years and more of his life were years of integrity, devotion and consecration. One cannot sum up the life of a good man in few words. For fifty six years he was a follower of the lonely Nazarene, and preached the Word in the Church, in the homes, and on the street for fifty years. His strength in the ministry was in his evangelistic fervor, his love for the "man of low estate," and his consecrated ministry to the sick and the aged.



Brother Kinslow was converted and saved in a revival meeting conducted by the late Bishop Sam R. Hay in a little church near Mexia, Shiloh, in 1898. On November 1, 1900, he was married to Sarilda B Wright, and in 1904 he was licensed to preach at Dawson, Texas. He was admitted on trial into the Central Texas Conference in 1909 and into full connection in the same conference in 1911. During his active ministry he served the following charges: Penelope Circuit, Riesel Circuit, West and Elm Mott, Mount Calm, Troy and Pendleton, Glen Rose, Milford, Mertens and Irene, Oglesby, Pioneer, China Springs, and Barry.

Brother Kinslow superannuated in 1930 and lived in Cleburne until 1947, when he came to Corsicana to live the remainder of his earthly life. He is survived by his good wife, two daughters, Mrs. Mable Sammons and Mrs. Mary Beth Scott, both of Hubbard; and two sons, James Paul Kinslow of Corsicana, and Thomas N. Kinslow of Beaumont, and four grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted by his pastor, John Wesley Ford, and by two of his life-long fellow-laborers, Jack Adams and E. M. Daily.

GEORGE F. KORNEGAY

George Floyd Kornegay, son of Edward A. and Lucinda Jane Kornegay, was born December 8, 1874, in Coryell County, Texas. He was married to Lula Turney April 3, 1900 at Blanket, Texas. Brother Kornegay was converted on July 5, 1908 and surrendered his life to the Christian ministry shortly thereafter having been admitted on trial in the old Northwest Texas Conference at Brownwood November 1909. His appointment being in the section assigned to the new Central Texas Conference at division in 1910, he became a member of that conference. He was admitted into full connection in 1911. In the Central Texas Conference he served appointments as follows: Gustine, Talpa, Britton, Milford, Grapevine, Troy and Pendleton, Clifton, Palmer, Big Hill and Ben Hur, Burleson, Riverside in Fort Worth, Blooming Grove, Eleventh Avenue in Corsicana, and Anglin Street in Cleburne. In 1932 he transferred to the North Texas Conference and in the following six years served Trinity in Denison, Garland, Brandon Avenue in Dallas, and Bowie. In 1938 he transferred back into the Central Texas Conference, where he served Diamond Hill in Fort Worth and then for the following fourteen years was Superintendent of the Homes for Retired Ministers.

Brother Kornegay was a newspaper publisher prior to his surrender to the ministry. This aptitude was a help to him throughout his ministry. He retired in

June, 1947. Death came April 2, 1955 after several months illness and the funeral was held April 4, 1955 in Meadowbrook Methodist Church and the body was interred in the Garden of Memories in Fort Worth, Texas. He is survived by his wife; one son, R. J. Kornegay; one daughter, Mrs. Isl Cox; one brother, J. B. Kornegay, and two grandsons.

Brother George will long be remembered for his devotion to duty and his contribution to our conference.

JOHN MARVIN NEAL

"When the Saints go marching in," there will be many who owe their spiritual life and salvation to Reverend John Marvin Neal. Through twenty years as a pastor and twenty-six years as a conference evangelist, he was a faithful minister seeking to win souls for the Lord. Members of, and visitors to, the Annual Conference during these past twenty-five years will remember two things about Brother Neal, and miss them: the big, white Stetson hat, and the ready smile with a hearty laugh. He was a genial Christian soul, loved and respected.

John Marvin Neal was born April 14, 1879 in Subligna, Georgia, son of W. K. Neal and Matilda Shropshire Neal. He was converted at the age of twelve, and united with the Bethel Church in Parker County. It was here that he was licensed to preach June 12, 1900 while attending Weatherford College.

In November of 1902 he was admitted on trial in the Texas Conference where he served two years. Midway Mission and the Iola-Bediaz charges were his appointments. He was received into full connection and ordained an elder in 1904. A transfer to the Montana Conference in 1904 sent him to two charges, South Butte-Boulder, and Bozeman. In 1906 he transferred to the old Northwest Texas Conference, remaining in the Central Texas Conference when the division came in 1910. His first assignment was to Godley. This was followed by pastorates at Aledo, Winters, Alvarado, McGregor, Anglin Street in Cleburne, and Midlothian. From this last appointment he went into the evangelistic field, serving twenty-five years as conference evangelist, taking the Retired relationship in 1948.

In 1904 he was married to Miss Eula Tharp, and after retirement, they moved to Lucedale, Mississippi. On a visit to relatives in Brownwood, Texas, he was taken ill, and died in the hospital here November 26, 1954. He was laid to rest in Greenwood Cemetery in Brownwood. The writer was assisted in the service by Rev. W. H. Bowden.

Mrs. Neal will make her home in Brownwood. They have four surviving children: James L. Neal of Dallas, Mrs. H. H. Weaver of Waco, Mrs. W. A. Boden of New Orleans, and Mrs. E. G. Nance of Marshall.

Harry Burton Thompson was born in New York City, October 28, 1872, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Thompson. He was converted and joined the Methodist

On June 28, 1917, he was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Breyer of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. To them were born four children: Grace Elizabeth, Harry Ainsworth, Paul Arthur, who died in infancy, and John Breyer, who was killed in action over France on August 10, 1944.

In February, 1917, he became Associate Pastor of First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, and united with the Central Texas Conference at its annual meeting in Georgetown the same year. Brother Thompson had been admitted on trial in New York. He was admitted into full connection by the Central Texas Conference.

During his twenty-five years of service he had been pastor of the following churches: Whitney, Herring Avenue in Waco, St. Paul's in Fort Worth, Comanche, Coolidge, Moody, Wesley in Waco, Meridian, and Line Street in Hillsboro.

He retired in November, 1941, and since that time resided in Waxahachie. About three years ago he suffered a stroke and was then confined to his home. He passed away August 8, 1954 quietly at his home after suffering an attack.

Funeral services were held in Waxahachie by C. D. Wooten, and L. S. Williams. He was buried in the Waxahachie Cemetery. He is survived by his wife, a daughter, Grace Elizabeth, and a son, Harry Ainsworth.

Brother Thompson was completely dedicated to the task of bringing in the Kingdom. After his retirement he served for a time as pastor of Bristol-Trumbull. He was active as a teacher in First Church, Waxahachie. Endowed with a great mental ability, he was interested to the end in reading and studying and trying to find some way to win another soul to Christ. His family and many friends find comfort in his great faith.

He treasured the following poem and asked that it be used at his funeral.

Saved

I ask Thee, Lord,
 That when my days are done,
 And I have gone
 Beyond the setting sun,
 Grant that Thy angels welcoming me
 May say not:
 "Lo, here comes a saint of God!"
 I then would blush,
 Knowing the way I trod.
 But this one thing

 Who fought and lost,

MRS. W. P. CUNNINGHAM

Mrs. Jennie Charlotte Cunningham was born to Mr. and Mrs. Stubbs on April 7, 1878 in Chicago, Illinois. She received most of her education in the schools of Chicago. The summer months she spent with her grandparents in Minnesota and Wisconsin where her grandfather served as pastor to Swedish Evangelical churches. Here she helped to organize young people's societies and English classes, and played the church reed organ.

It was in the old Wicker Park Methodist Church of Chicago that she met Walter Phinney Cunningham, and like many Methodist romances, hers and Walter's began in the Epworth League. He was president of the League and she was both secretary and pianist.

On August 22, 1900 they were married while Brother Cunningham was employed by the Transcontinental Passenger service.

Four years later, after much prayer and serious thought by both, Walter and Jennie Cunningham entered the ministry together. Together expresses their lives, for her devotion to The Methodist Church was as great as his. The first charge was First Methodist Church of North Freedom, Wis. His last was as Associate Pastor at Central Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, where they had celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on August 22, 1950.

After Brother Cunningham's death, Mrs. Cunningham continued her work in Central Church until her death of a heart ailment on October 28, 1954, at her home at 2905 Lipscomb St. Her funeral was held at Central Methodist Church, Fort Worth, on October 30, 1954, with Rev. MRS. B. B. EDMIASTON

Ella Allen was born April 21, 1882, near Frankfort, Kentucky. She was the daughter of J. M. and Mollie Allen. She was reared in Texas, her father's family moving here when she was still an infant. Most of her childhood and youth were spent in Childress County, near and in Childress. She was converted under the preaching of the late Rev. Abe Mulkey, at Childress, Texas and joined the Church at that time. In this public acceptance of Christ as her Savior, and many times otherwise, she stated that she could not remember when she first loved and trusted the Heavenly Father.

Mrs. Edmiaston was educated in the public schools, and took special training in journalism, newspaper work, and training for special work in the church. She became editor and publisher of The Chillicothe Times, Chillicothe, Texas; and she had the distinction of being the first woman in Texas to edit and publish a paper. She met B. B. Edmiaston at Chillicothe, Texas, while she was doing newspaper work. She disposed of the paper, and was married to Mr. Edmiaston November 8, 1905.

To this couple was born a son, Don. Mrs. Edmiaston, her husband, and son were members of the First Methodist Church, Waco, Texas, when in the year 1920, Mr. Edmiaston accepted the call to the pastorate and entered the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, where they served for 28 years. The following were their pastorates: Waco, Axtell-Riesel, Talpa, Robert Lee, Hutto, Bangs, Strawn, Venus, Milford, and Tenth Street in Taylor, and at Carbon, after his retirement in June, 1948.

After retirement, Mrs. Edmiaston with her husband resided most of the time in Midlothian, Texas; but the last three months of her life were spent in Bronte, Texas. She died January 8, 1955 in the Bronte Hospital from chronic leukemia, from which she had suffered since before their retirement from the pastorate. Her funeral service was held in First Methodist Church, Bronte, January 10, 1955, the pastor, Rev. W. C. Craig, officiating. Burial was in the Bronte cemetery.

In addition to her husband, Mrs. Edmiaston is survived by one son, Don Edmiaston, of Bronte, and one grandson, Bobby Edmiaston, of Snyder, Texas.

Mrs. Edmiaston was truly a talented woman. Her poems, religious writings, and religious programs were rather widely read and used. She was an accredited instructor of several courses released by the Board of Education of The Methodist Church. She was a life member of the Womans Society of Christian Service. She was truly a helper of her husband and others in the work of the ministry in the church. In all the groups of the church, she was an active worker, and especially in the Woman's Society, organizing this group where it did not exist, in the places of their labors. This service, she said, always gave added strength and blessing to her life. Her greatest joy was in helping others to understand God's messages, and to apply them to daily life. The service was not always easy, yet, as she often stated, if through her labors some soul was helped, her life was not in vain.

This poem, composed by her and published while she lived, expresses her spirit:

IF

If I have failed to greet the morning
 With praises for its new adorning;
 And in my haste I did not pray;
 The lovely flowers will fail to cheer me,
 The singing birds all seem to fear me;
 Joy will pass me all the day.
 If I have shunned some weaker brother,
 In selfishness to greet another,
 Who has much and some to spare;
 Then I have missed a deed of duty,
 And failed to show the Christ-like beauty
 In the life I have to share.
 If I have made some burden lighter,
 And darkened days to seem much lighter,
 Shared some sorrow, eased some pain;
 If I have led some soul from sadness
 To the sunlit paths of peace and gladness,
 Then, my life has not been vain.

Truly Mrs. Edmiaston was a good Christian; and her life, undergirded by deep Christian faith, was spent in doing good. The world is much better because she lived.

X—MISCELLANEOUS STANDING RULES

1. There shall be an Administrative Council to formulate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference. The Administrative Council shall be composed as follows: The Cabinet, the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Chairman and one other member of each Conference board and commission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each district to be nominated by the Cabinet, the President of the Conference Woman's organization and the Conference Promotional Secretary, the President of the Conference Youth organization and one other young person, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missions, the Chairmen of all standing Committees, and all paid employees of Conference and agencies (with privilege of the floor but without vote).

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Administrative Council to be composed as follows: The three officers of the Council, two district superintendents, the Chairman and one lay member of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Conference Lay Leader, the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the chairmen of the quadrennial boards.

2. The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries of the clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

3. The Conference Treasurer, and other Treasurers of special funds, upon receipt of any money from a pastoral charge, shall mail promptly to the pastor of that charge a voucher-receipt, showing the date, amount received, account credited, and how to be reported to annual conference. The pastor shall enclose these voucher-receipts with his annual conference report, as verification for items reported in Table II. Duplicate voucher-receipts shall be mailed monthly to the District Superintendent.

4. The statistics of the Annual Conference shall be based upon the reports in the hands of the Statistician on the second day prior to the opening of the Annual Conference.

5. Each District Superintendent, in reporting upon the work of his District, shall indicate if any Church in the District has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, or benevolences for the year just closing, stating the name of the Church and the amount borrowed.

6. No member of any Board, Commission, or Committee shall be eligible for membership thereon longer than eight consecutive years and shall not become eligible again for such membership until one full conference year has passed. The membership of quadrennial boards and commissions shall be divided by the board or commission into two groups, one group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the present quadrennium, and the second group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the succeeding quadrennium.

7. The District Superintendents, at the beginning of the quadrennium, shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no member of the Conference shall be nominated on more than one Board, Commission or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Conference, except where otherwise provided by the Discipline. This rule is not applicable to the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation.

Vacancies on all such Boards, Commissions and Committees occurring thereafter, shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference. Nevertheless, no nominations shall be made which would allow a member to be on more than one Board, Commission or Committee which must meet during the session of the Conference.

8. No person shall be a member of a Conference Board, if he is in the salaried employ of that Board, or of an institution which derives financial support from said Board; or appointed a Trustee of such institution.

9. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission or Committee.

10. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

11. All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

12. All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary BEFORE they are presented to the Conference.

13. It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to furnish the table of apportionments for the ensuing year, arriving at the scale for the Districts by the following procedure; 60% of the total askings shall be distributed among the Districts on the basis of Membership, 20% of the total askings shall be distributed on the basis of Total Non-Building Budget, 20% of the total askings shall be distributed on the basis of Pastors' Salaries.

14. Annually, each Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline.

15. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall not be authorized to offer the Annual Conference any new or special apportionment to be levied upon the Churches, unless such new or special apportionment shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by The Methodist Church or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so entrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust has been executed and how.

16. The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

17. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference Work an amount sufficient to meet the expense of printing the Minutes, the Treasurer's bond, and the necessary expense of the Conference Secretary.

18. All bonds required by the laws of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

19. The Conference Committee on Entertainment, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of Retired Ministers. Per diem allowances shall be granted to ministers and lay delegates from charges assessing salaries of not over \$1,500, except where the committee shall recommend and the Conference approve, a higher figure.

20. All churches not coming under the above rule will be expected to defray the expenses of their minister and delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

21. The District Conference shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate.

22. The Bishop and his Cabinet shall nominate to the Annual Conference next preceeding the meeting of the General Conference a Conference Secretary to be elected by the Conference for the Quadrennium. Whenever there is to be a change in Secretary, the one newly elected shall assume his official duties at the session following General Conference.

23. There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

24. It shall require a two-thirds vote to suspend any of these rules.
