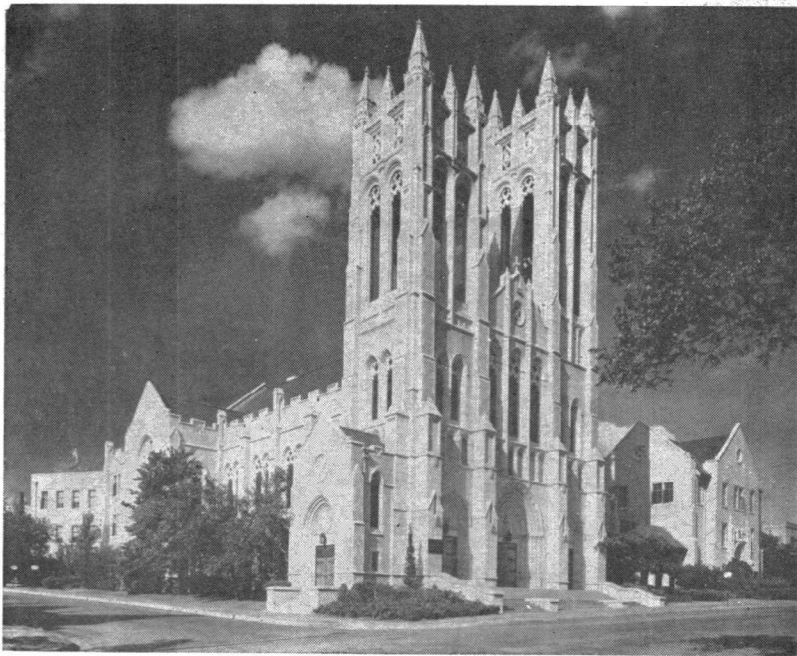

III—DAILY PROCEEDINGS

OPENING SESSION—WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 6, 1956

Opening Worship—The Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church met in the ninety-first session (the forty-seventh since the division from the old Northwest Texas Conference, and the eighteenth since unification) at First Methodist Church in Fort Worth, Texas at 10:00 a. m. on Wednesday morning, June 6, 1956, Bishop William C. Martin, presiding.

Hymn No. 2, "Come Thou Almighty King," was sung, the Apostle Creed was recited and Bishop H. A. Boaz led the prayer. For the Responsive Reading a portion of the Communion Ritual was used after which Bishop Martin made a devotional statement.

Roll Call—The Conference Secretary, J. D. F. Williams, supervised the taking of the roll. He then nominated the following secretarial assistants: Minutes, M. Howard Knox and John K. McKee; Roll, Charles Whittle; Disciplinary Questions, R. A. Brooks Jr.; Organization of Boards, Jack Payne; Press, William L. Hankla.

Glenn C. Bowman, Statistical Secretary, nominated the following staff: Milton Slayden, R. E. Briggs, Horace Poteet, Nolan M. Fisher, S. A. Baker, Kenneth Bledsoe.

Bar Of the Conference—W. V. Bane, Secretary of the Cabinet, moved that the bar of the Conference be the lower floor of the Sanctuary. It was so ordered. He then moved that the printed program be accepted as the agenda of the Conference. It was approved. Next, he nominated the following committee on Courtesy and Agenda: Oran Stephens, Law Sone, and Richard Smith III and they were elected.

Illness—Bishop Martin announced the transfer to this Conference of D. E. McVey and stated that Bro. McVey is ill, requesting that the secretary convey the greetings and best wishes of the Conference. Other members of the Conference reported ill included W. B. Andrews, W. H. Coleman, Willard Shipp, and T. G. Story.

Elmer C. Carter moved that the secretary also send a message of comfort to Mrs. C. W. Meyer. Motion carried.

Welcome—The pastor-host, Gaston Foote, was invited to the platform for a statement in which he welcomed the Conference and visitors to First Methodist Church. On behalf of the Conference, Bishop H. A. Boaz responded briefly.

Holy Communion—Hymn No. 148, "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross," was sung following which Bishop Martin and Bishop Boaz, assisted by the District Superintendents, led the service of Holy Communion.

Memorial Service—The Conference stood to sing Hymn 533, "O God, Our Help." Wilson Canafax read the 103 Psalm and led the prayer. J. D. F. Williams called the roll of eight ministers and five wives of ministers who have died during the year. (See List) and the Conference stood silently in their memory. H. Brown Loyd delivered the memorial address. Miss Mary Beth Murphy sang "My God And I" accompanied by Robert R. Clarke, organist. Bishop Martin pronounced the benediction.

SECOND SESSION—WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 6, 1956

Opening—The Conference was called to order with the singing of Hymn No. 238, "Blessed Assurance." E. B. Hawk led the prayer.

Composite Report—Leslie W. Seymour, Superintendent of the Cisco District, read the report summarizing the year of activity and service. (See Report) The report was ordered received for the record.

Resolution—W. V. Bane read a resolution of appreciation of Bishop Martin's leadership and requesting the Committee on Episcopacy of the South Central Jurisdictional Conference to return Bishop Martin to this Area. (See Resolution) It was adopted by a rising vote and ovation.

Bishop Boaz added his word of commendation of Bishop Martin.

Courtesy—Oran Stephens presented Mrs. William C. Martin and expressed appreciation of the Conference for her presence among us.

Other introductions included Chaplains Paul Robins and Thad E. Son, Dr. Horace Williams of the General Board of Education, Missionary Sid Anderson, and Miss Mildred Young of the Texas Christian Advocate.

Conference Entertainment—Raymond Burton presented Report No. 1 of the Conference Entertainment Committee. (See Reports) It was adopted.

Publicity—William L. Hankla announced that radio station K.F.J.Z. will carry the appointments on Sunday 6 p. m. newscast. Morris Bailey added that station K.S.T.V., Stephenville, Texas, will carry the Sunday afternoon session beginning at 2:30 p. m.

Administrative Council—J. D. F. Williams, Secretary of the Administrative Council, read the report. (See Report) Chairman, H. B. Loyd, spoke concerning the report.

Jackson C. Oglesby moved to amend by adding to the Committee on Higher Education the clerical and lay member of the Inter-Conference Commission on Wesley Foundation. The amendment was accepted and the amended report adopted.

Christian Vocations—W. H. Cole read the report of the Commission on Christian Vocations. (See Report) It was adopted.

Committee On Sustentation—J. W. Sprinkle moved adoption of Committee's report (See Report) It was adopted.

World Service and Finance—Report No. 3 was read and it was moved that this report be referred to the Committee on Rules. It was so ordered. (See Report)

District Parsonages—W. M. Greenwaldt presented the special report on Equities in District Parsonages. (See Report) It was adopted.

Temperance—The report of the Board of Temperance was presented by James Ellison. (See Report) It was adopted.

Legislation—E. F. Bohmfalk made the following motion, "That the Central Texas Conference go on record as commending the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce for lifting out of Committee the Bill against the serving of alcoholic beverages on commercial airlines in order to permit the Congress to vote on the bill; and secondly, that this Conference request its members to communicate with their Congressmen urging their favorable vote on the bill." The motion carried.

Rules Committee—Chet C. Henson moved a change in Standing Rule No. 1 relating to membership on Boards and Committees as follows: the last sentence shall read, "All paid employees of the Conference and Agencies shall have the privilege of the floor but without vote."

Concerning rule No. 13 as referred to in report No. 3 of the World Service and Finance Commission that the last sentence should be made to read, "It is suggested that the same method of apportioning be considered in apportioning the District allocation to the various charges of the district." The report was approved.

Visitors—Dr. Horace Williams of the Board of Education and Missionary Sid Anderson each addressed the Conference.

Nominations—W. V. Bane read the list of Cabinet nominations for Boards, Commissions, and Committees. (See Nominations) They were approved.

Organization—Bishop Martin announced that Cabinet members would be assigned as conveners of Boards and Agencies.

Visitor—President C. Q. Smith of Oklahoma City University was presented and spoke of work on this Methodist Campus.

Closing—Announcements were made; the Doxology was sung and the Conference stood for the Benediction by J. W. W. Shuler.

THIRD SESSION—THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 7, 1956

Morning Worship—James Ellison presiding. Hymn No. 4, "O Worship The King" was sung, opening the 8:30 Worship Service. After prayer the Responsive Reading entitled "Messiah's Reign" was used. Bishop Wm. C. Martin spoke on the theme, "Into All The World" and Hymn No. 507, "In Christ There Is No East Nor West" was sung.

Opening—The Conference was in order at nine o'clock, and Bishop Martin commented on the gavel used to call for order. It had been made from a whale's tooth and presented with the following note:

"This gavel is presented to you by the Anchorage, Alaska Methodist College Committee in behalf of the people of Alaska in the hope that you will use it in presiding over your annual conferences.

"Fashioned from a whale's tooth with a handle cut from a walrus tusk, this gavel was made by Eskimo craftsmen, noted for their fine ivory work.

"We sincerely hope that you will tell the conference delegates that this gavel bespeaks the sincere gratitude of the people of Alaska to the Methodist Churches of your area for their support of the Alaska Methodist College through Advance Specials."

Minutes—J. Lester Davenport reported that the minutes of the previous day have been examined and found in proper order. The report was accepted.

Agenda—Richard Smith III suggested the agenda for the morning, and noted the illness of C. T. Brockett, retired. The report was approved.

Hospitals and Homes—J. C. Oglesby, Chairman of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, introduced the reports of the Board. Report No. 2 was called first, and W. W. Ward, Hospital Commissioner-Chaplain, was asked to discuss nurse's training, Golden Cross, and the Nurse's Home Campaign. (See Report)

W. P. Earngey, Hospital Administrator, presented Report No. 3, dealing with (1) Charter Amendment, (2) nomination of Trustees, and (3) plan for construction financing. (See Report) It was approved, item by item, and as a whole.

Boyce Martin moved that a letter of appreciation be prepared by the Conference Secretary for the Ford Foundation, and the Greater Fort Worth Hospital movement for their generous contributions. It was so ordered.

J. C. Oglesby moved adoption of the Board of Hospitals and Homes Reports No. 2, 3, 4, 5, and Supplement 10. They were adopted.

Report No. 6, Wesleyan Homes Inc. was presented by M. Howard Knox who moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Report)

Report No. 7, Texas Mission Home and Training School was presented by J. C. Oglesby. Attention was called to the fact that Dr. R. L. Armour is retired and the Conference tendered a vote of thanks for his services. The report was adopted. (See Report)

Report No. 8, The Methodist Home was presented by Hubert Johnson and was adopted. (See Report)

Methodist Home Commissioners were nominated and elected. (See List)
 Trustees for the Methodist Home were nominated and elected. (See List)
 Directors at Large for the Methodist Home were nominated and elected.
 (See List)
 Report No. 8 as a whole was adapted.

Resolution—J. C. Oglesby read a resolution from the Chamber of Commerce of Mineral Wells, Texas assuring the Conference of the interest of Mineral Wells in establishing a home for the aged. The resolution was filed for record. (See Resolution)

Report No. 1 of the Board of Hospitals and Homes was presented and approved. (See Report)

Report No. 9, Retired Minister's Homes, was presented by C. H. Cale. Hubert Crain spoke to the report. (See Report) it was adopted.

Recess—The Conference stood and sang "Holy, Holy, Holy."

Church School Literature—Bishop Martin introduced Dr. Henry M. Bullock, Executive Editor of Church School Literature, who spoke of the high quality and variety of Methodist literature. Mr. J. F. Albright was presented, and told of the Publishing House operations in general, and of the Dallas branch, of which he is Manager, in particular. He presented a check amounting to \$8,068.76 for the Conference Claimants' fund. Bishop Martin responded appropriately.

Woman's Society of Christian Service—Mrs. Joel Hooper, President of the Conference WSCS gave an account of their work. It was received for record. (See Reports)

Temperance—The Reverend Albert Tucker, Executive Director of Texas Alcohol and Narcotic Education, Inc., gave an account of his work.

Texas Council of Churches—Mr. Harold Kilpatrick, Executive Director of the Texas Council, spoke briefly of the Council's work.

Closing—Announcements were made and the Conference stood to sing Hymn No. 381, "The Church's One Foundation," in preparation for the sermon by Dr. Harold Bosley on the subject, "Why Did They Listen?"

FOURTH SESSION—THURSDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 7, 1956

Opening—The Conference was called to order with the singing of "O Zion Haste" and the prayer was led by Chet C. Henson.

Board Of Missions—Gaston Foote, chairman, moved adoption of Reports Nos. 1 and 2. They were adopted. (See Reports)

Report No. 3, with minor changes, was adopted. (See Report)

Report No. 4 was then read proposing the Spanish-speaking ministry of Texas as a home mission Advance Special. It was adopted. (See Report)

Chet C. Henson called attention to the fine record made by the Lydia Patterson Institute.

Bishop Martin introduced Bishop Shot Mondol of India who addressed the Conference with a challenge to Christian Missions.

Bishop Martin then invited the people to give scholarships for Indian work of \$100.00 each and 30 were pledged. In addition, an offering for this work amounted to \$360.00.

Miss La Doris Morgan, returned missionary from India, was introduced and spoke of her work in India.

Board Of Evangelism—Garland Lavender, chairman, proposed adaption of Reports Nos. 1 and 2.

He then introduced the new chairman of the board, J. Lester Davenport.

John Wesley Ford spoke to the reports and called to the chancel several

pastors whose churches had outstanding records in evangelism. The report was adopted. (See Reports)

Texas Methodist College Association—W. W. Dees, Conference Chairman, pointed out the objectives of College Day.

Southern Methodist University—Dr. Neal McFarland was introduced by Bishop Martin and told of the work of the church on the campus of the University and Perkins School of Theology.

Chaplains—Bishop Martin invited the chaplains present to come to the chancel and Thad E. Son and Beal Duncan each told of their work with the Armed Services. Bishop Martin spoke highly of the work of the Methodist Chaplains and called attention to the fact that 16 members of this Conference are serving in this field. Hayden Edwards pointed out the opportunities in the chaplaincy.

World Service And Finance—J. W. Sprinkle proposed an amendment to Standing Rule No. 4 which was referred to the Committee on Rules.

Reports Nos. 1 and 2 were presented and their adoption moved. They were adopted. (See Reports)

Bishop Martin expressed appreciation to Thomas Sterck for 12 years service as chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Town And Country Work—S. A. Baker called attention to the report of the Commission of Town and Country work, and presented M. Howard Knox who spoke to the report.

The outstanding rural church of the year was Red Oak Church of the Waxahachie District and awards were received by the pastor, A. B. McCown, and layman, R. C. Lowrance.

Selected for the award to a circuit church was Cranfills Gap of the Gatesville District and present to receive the award was the pastor, C. Bruce Baker, and layman, B. T. Hamby. Bishop Martin made the presentation. The report was adopted. (See Report)

General Board of Temperance—Richard Irwin of the Board of Temperance described the work of the board at the nation's capital.

Conference Claimants—A. W. Franklin presented the report of the Board of Conference Claimants and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Report)

A resolution of gratitude for the services of Dr. P. E. Riley was presented and adopted. Dr. Riley spoke to the Conference.

Committee On Rules—Chet C. Henson presented the following proposed Standing Rule as Rule No. 5 in lieu of amendment to Rule No. 4 as proposed by the Commission on World Service and Finance;

"The annual report of the Conference Treasurer shall be based on funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer on the second day prior to the opening of the Annual Conference." It was adopted.

Closing—The Conference stood to sing the Doxology and receive the Benediction by Gid Bryan.

FIFTH SESSION, FRIDAY MORNING, JUNE 8, 1956

Morning Worship—Morgan Garrett presided at the devotional service. Opening the worship with Hymn No. 31, "When Morning Gilds The Skies," Morgan Garrett led the prayer, and after the Responsive Reading and the Gloria Patri Bishop Martin addressed the Conference on the subject, "Contend For The Faith."

Opening—Conference was in order at nine o'clock. Bishop Martin noted that gavel used to call the session to order had been sent him by H. T. Maclin, Missionary to Africa. It was carved from an elephant tusk. He called attention to the

fact that H. T. Maclin was a former member of the Host Church, and that his grandmother was seated in the congregation. She was asked to stand.

Minutes—Ben Feemster reported that the Committee had examined the minutes of Wednesday's sessions, and found them correct. The report was accepted.

Courtesy—Oran Stephens recognized the presence of visitors, and proposed the agenda for the morning. The report was accepted.

Hospitals and Homes—J. C. Oglesby presented the final report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, consisting of nominations of Trustees of Wesleyan Homes, Inc. They were elected. He also moved a debt limit for Wesleyan Homes, Inc. of \$20,000 for the ensuing year. It was approved. The whole report was approved (See Report)

Board Of Education—Hubert C. Smith proposed adoption of Report No. 1, the Board of Education. It was adopted. (See Report) Report No. 2 was presented with minor corrections, and the addition of necessary institutional Trustees.

H. B. Loyd moved to amend the Budget section of this Report by adding \$1400 to the appropriation of Southwestern University. Motion seconded by C. H. Sisserson. The amendment prevailed.

Thomas B. Granger, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, was presented, and introduced the Conference Staff, and the Camp Staff.

Bob Briehn, Director of the Texas Methodist Student Movement, represented the work of Wesley Foundations in the State, and introduced the workers present.

President Wm. C. Finch of Southwestern University addressed the Conference, and on behalf of the Church Colleges thanked the Conference for support and consideration.

Amendment—It was moved to amend the report of the Administrative Council to list the name of the Conference Director of the Texas Methodist College Association, W. W. Dees as a member at the Conference Committee on Higher Education. Motion carried.

Report No. 2, the Board of Education was adopted. (See Report)

Report No. 3, the Board of Education, was presented by Board President-elect, Carrall H. Thompson, who moved the report be referred to the Administrative Council for study and coordination with financial objectives at a special session of Annual Conference. Motion carried. (See Report)

Report No. 4, the Board of Education, concerning approval of Directors of Christian Education, was adopted. (See Report)

Lay Activities—Bishop Martin introduced the nominee for Conference Lay Leader, Eugene F. Jud. He was elected. Mr. Jud presented Report No. 1 of the Board of Lay Activities, noting minor corrections, and moved adoption. It was adopted. (See Report)

Report No. 2, nominations of District and Associate District Lay Leaders was read, and nominees were elected. Report No. 2 adopted. (See Report)

Texas Methodist Stewardship Movement—Mr. Jud read a recommendation of the Texas Planning Commission suggesting setting up a permanent Conference Stewardship Committee, and an Inter-Conference Stewardship Committee. Since this recommendation carried a request for funds, it was moved that the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance be reconsidered to include this item. The motion carried. It was then moved to amend the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance to provide for the above mentioned expense. The motion carried. The recommendation was then adopted. (See Report)

Visitors—The presence of Dr. Marshall Steel, and his son Bill of Dallas, and of Dr. and Mrs. Herbert Minga of Denton was noted.

Joint Board of Publications—W. W. Ward proposed adoption of the report of the Joint Board of Publications. It was adopted. (See Report)

Proportional Payments—Jack Payne read the report of the Committee on Proportional Payments, and moved its filing for record. It was done. (See Report)

Correction—J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, asked permission to correct the records of the Conference as concerning the name of Eugene Frank Leach. Permission granted.

Social and Economic Relations—Michael Patison presented the report of the Committee on Social and Economic Relations and moved its adoption.

Oran Stephens spoke in opposition to the report. The time for the morning session having been used up, Bishop Martin said the matter would be taken up at a later session.

Closing—Opportunity was given for the announcements of various meetings and events. The Conference stood and sang Hymn 483, "The Kingdom Is Coming" in preparation for the sermon by Dr. Harold Bosley who spoke on the subject, "Why Did Some Believe?" Dr. Bosley pronounced the benediction after the singing of the Hymn No. 164, "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name."

Minimum Support—R. C. Edwards moved adoption of Report No. 1 of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support. It was adopted. (See Report).

Report No. 2, the financial Schedule, was presented, and adoption moved. It was adopted. (See Report)

Conference Claimants—A. W. Franklin moved adoption of Report No. 2 of the Board of Conference Claimants. It was adopted. (See Report)

Brotherhood—A report was heard from the Nominating Committee of the Brotherhood, and on the election of officers. It was confirmed. (See Report)

Closing—After announcements the Conference stood adjourned with the singing of the Doxology and the benediction by P. E. Riley.

SEVENTH SESSION—SATURDAY MORNING, JUNE 9, 1956

Interdenominational Cooperation—Eugene F. Jud read the report of the Committee on Interdenominational Cooperation. It was adopted. (See Report).

Report No. 2, consisting of nominations of the committee to various agencies, was read by G. Alfred Brown. They were elected. (See Report).

Conference Entertainment—Report No. 2 of the Committee on Entertainment, a financial report, was read by Homer Cox. It was accepted. (See Report).

Board of Education—Report No. 5 of the Board of Education, nominations, was read by Carroll Thompson. It was adopted. (See Report).

Committee On District Conference Records—Boyce Vardiman reported on District Conference Records. Report adopted. (See Report).

Pastors' School—Ervin Gathings gave report No. 3 of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications naming James Ansley and Bruce Weaver to the Board of Managers of the Texas Pastors' School. Report adopted. (See Report).

Hospital Field Representative—The appointment of Chet C. Henson as Field Representative for Harris Hospital was announced and he made a statement concerning plans for his work.

Conference Treasurer—Walter B. Rider, Conference Treasurer, gave his report. Thomas Sterck commended Mr. Rider for his excellent work. Report adopted with applause. (See Report).

Statistical Report—Glenn C. Bowman pointed out notable items in the statistical report. Report adopted. (See Report).

Brotherhood—R. A. Brooks, Jr. read the annual report of the Brotherhood. It was adopted. (See Report).

Abandoned Property—Leslie W. Seymour proposed that the Conference declare abandoned the property of the Eliosville Church, Cisco District, and a parcel of ground attached to the Quarterly Conference of First Methodist Church, Graham, Texas. Both items were approved. (See Reports).

1957 Session—Bishop Martin asked, "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" James Ansley extended an invitation from First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, which was accepted.

Bishop Martin suggested that the schedule of meeting of Annual Conference be referred to the Administrative Council for study. So ordered.

Nominations—W. V. Bone submitted revised nominations of the Cabinet to the Commission on World Service and Finance. They were elected. (See Nominations).

Administrative Council—J. D. F. Williams read the list of members of the Administrative Council.

He then proposed amendment to Standing Rule No. 1 to include the Conference Director of the Texas Methodist College Association in the membership of the council. It was adopted. (See Rule).

Personal Privilege—As a matter of personal privilege, A. S. Gafford offered as a gift the book, "To Fulfill This Ministry," by Bishop Wm. C. Martin to each member of the class admitted on trial.

Organization—All boards, committees, and commissions were urged to complete organization before the adjournment of Conference.

Full Connection—Bishop Martin called the class, elected yesterday into full connection to the chancel. (See Minutes, Friday, June 8, 1956). In addition, Darrell Paul Patton, a transfer, was called to join the class and elected to full connection.

Thus completing the class, the Bishop asked the disciplinary questions which were properly answered.

At the conclusion of this ceremony, the Bishop asked the Conference to stand as a symbol of their fellowship in the ministry. The Conference sang, "Bless Be The Tie." Bishop Martin pronounced the Benediction.

Offering—W. W. Ward announced the amount of the offering for the retiring ministers, \$464.87.



VI-REPORTS

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' COMPOSITE REPORT

This is in truth a synopsis of the story of living and loving and serving this year on the part of some 112,000 Methodist lay women and men, nearly 300 Methodist pastors, a corps of officials doing special work in the conference, ten district superintendents, and our honored and esteemed Bishop William C. Martin, all under the benevolent providence of God who blesses us as he has blessed all who through the ages have marched in the "Endless Line of Splendor." We are at once made humble and glad to find ourselves in the holy company of saints through whom God works his purpose among men and by whom he establishes his Kingdom of Righteousness.

Remembering that our Lord Jesus admonished us to love God and to love our neighbor we have sought to make provision for both of these basic principles of Christian living. To foster and nurture love for God we have nearly 400 places of worship where our people gather, some 40,000 of them on a given Sunday morning and 20,000 on a given Sunday evening, to have fellowship with God and to seek his forgiveness and his guidance. Out of the rich blessing of these services 1470 infants have been dedicated to God in Holy Baptism, 3873 individuals have joined the church on Profession of Faith, 5352 have joined by transfer of letter from churches in other places, 32 young men responding to the call of God to the ministry have been licensed to preach the Gospel. Supplementing the glory of these sanctuary services of worship we have 371 established Sunday Schools wherein an enrolled membership of some 77,000 women, men and youth find help as they grow in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, an average attendance of nearly 42,000 being present on a Sunday. As further means of spiritual growth and service we have 313 Methodist Youth Fellowship groups with a membership of 7989, Methodist Men's Clubs 160 in number and a membership of 5,563, Woman's Societies of Christian Service numbering 253 with a membership of 12,108 and 99 Wesleyan Service Guilds with a membership of 2,146. We have had 239 Vacation church schools with an enrollment of 15,818 children, and 104 training schools serving 4,713 teachers and workers seeking to prepare themselves for more effective service.

By way of providing adequate housing for the activities of the church 16 new church buildings have been erected this year at a cost of \$1,284,000.00, 13 new parsonages have been constructed costing \$155,000.00 and another \$1,640,000.00 has been expended on repairs and improvements of churches and parsonages, and \$531,729.00 paid on church debts.

Seeking to develop and give expression to our love for our neighbors, as our Lord commanded us to do we have maintained a benevolent program of service represented in part by these figures: \$167,747.00 for World Service and Conference Benevolences; \$71,000.00 for World and National Advance Mission Specials; \$90,000.00 for the establishment of a home for girls in training at Harris Hospital School of Nursing; over \$7,000.00 to help build a Methodist College at Anchorage, Alaska; \$9000.00 to assist our Latin American brothers of the Rio Grande Conference. We have contributed \$74,000.00 to the support of the more than 400 orphan children in our Methodist Home in Waco. \$10,000.00 has been sent to the Texas Mission Home and Training School in San Antonio. On World Communion Sunday we contributed \$8000.00 for special overseas relief and for the work of chaplains among our military forces. More than \$8000.00 was contributed during the Week of Dedication for the distressed people in various parts of the world who look to us for some assurance of hope and opportunity. For religious work among Methodist students on college campuses we contributed \$12,000.00 through the Wesley Foundation funds and another \$21,000.00 was raised on College Day in October for the support of our Methodist schools and colleges. As a special ministry to the sick we contributed to Golden Cross a little more than \$7,000.00 and for retired ministers' Home we have a total of \$6,000.00. The grand total of all money raised both for ministering to our own

spiritual needs and as a service of love to our neighbor is well beyond \$6,000,-000.00.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

The Administrative Council reports to the Annual Conference as follows:

1. In reference to the Quadrennial Program, attention is called to the four emphases adopted by the General Conference in the Local Church program.

- a) Christ and Ourselves.
- b) Christ and Our Resources.
- c) Christ and Missions.
- d) Christ and Our Freedoms.

To implement these emphases the following special activities and time schedules are recommended. But in setting forth these scheduled emphases, it is to be understood that, during such scheduled periods, other activities of the local church are not to be neglected. There is to be continued annually a full program

of local church activity as outlined in reports of the Boards and Commissions, as approved by the Annual Conference.

From this Annual Conference until September 15th, or the time of the special session of the Annual Conference, there shall be a period of thorough study and analysis of each local church's organization and program.

From September 15th, or the time of the special session of the Annual Conference to Easter, 1957, there is to be a special emphasis on Evangelism. Detailed plans and execution are to be under the leadership of the Bishop and his Cabinet and the Conference Board of Evangelism.

From Easter, 1957 through September, 1957, there is to be a special emphasis on Education, under the leadership of the Bishop and his Cabinet and the Conference Board of Education.

From October 1, 1957 through January, 1958, there is to be a special emphasis on Missions, under the leadership of the Bishop and his Cabinet and the Conference Board of Missions.

From February 1, 1958 through the end of the Conference year, there is to be a special emphasis on Stewardship, under the leadership of the Bishop and his Cabinet and the Conference Board of Lay Activities.

2. Whereas the General Conference authorized the setting up of a Quadrennial Committee for the Annual Conference for this program, and whereas the personnel as designated by the General Conference are already members of our Administrative Council, we recommend that this Annual Conference declare the Administrative Council to be the Quadrennial Committee.

3. It is further recommended to the Bishop and his Cabinet and to the Executive Committee of the Administrative Council that a special session of the Annual Conference be held sometime in the Fall to present the details of this program.

4. In order that we may assist in the integration of this program of the Church, and to further the spirit of a co-ordinated program of action between the three conferences in the Dallas-Fort Worth Area, we would lend our encouragement to the creation of an Area Quadrennial Program Committee, the number of members from each annual conference to be equal in number and the number to be left to the wisdom of the presiding Bishop and appointed by him. The presiding Bishop is to serve as the chairman of that body, and shall preside at its meetings, or designate a member to preside. The Area Quadrennial Program Committee would meet on call of the Bishop, and at such times as it may set for regular meetings.

5. In regard to the second phase of the Quadrennial Program, namely the emphasis upon our Institutions of higher learning, in keeping with the General Conference legislation and the needs of our colleges and universities in our Conference and State and of the Wesley Foundations, it is recommended:

That the Central Texas Conference accept the General Conference recommendation, namely, that each local Church in the Conference be urged to accept as its proportionate share of the sustentation fund for higher education the minimum amount of \$1.00 per church member for the colleges and 30 cents per member for the Wesley Foundation work for each year in the ensuing quadrennium. The implementation of this emphasis shall be the responsibility of the Administrative Council. And to work under the Administrative Council, we recommend the setting up of a Quadrennial Commission on Higher Education, the membership of such Commission to be composed as follows: the District Superintendents, the Chairman and Secretary of the Conference Board of Education and the Chairman of the Schools and Colleges Committee of this Board; the Conference Secretary, one pastor and one layman from each district in the conference, the College Presidents of each of the colleges of which the Central Texas Conference is co-owner; the Conference Chairman of the Texas Methodist College Association, and the two Conference Representatives on the Interconference Commission on Methodist Student Work of Texas, making a total of 42 members. It is further recommended that an Executive Committee of this Quadrennial Commission on Higher Education shall be set up, and the membership of such committee be constituted as follows: two District Superintendents as recommended by the Cabinet, two

ministers and two laymen nominated by the Cabinet; three representatives from the Conference Board of Education, nominated by the Board of Education, the College Presidents from the colleges of which the Central Texas Conference is co-owner, and the Chairman and Secretary of the Quadrennial Commission, if not otherwise members, with the Chairman of the Commission as the Chairman of the Executive Committee—making a total of 12 members.

6. We recommend the following financial goals for the ensuing year:

a) Recognizing that World Service is basic to the structure of our Church, we recommend that our World Service apportionment be accepted in full and that its payment shall receive prior claim upon every local church budget.

b) We recommend that there be given continued support of the Advance Program of our Church (World, National, Conference and M. C. O. R.). Let every local church accept some Advance Special. We especially recommend attention to the Specials for the Rio Grande Conference, for Alaska College, and for the completion of our \$500,000 program for the Nurses Home at Harris Hospital.

c) That we approve as our goal for the support of our Conference Board of Education's special activities five cents per member for Church School Rally Day.

d) That we provide for the payment of this Conference's share (\$18,000) in the cost of the Wesley Foundation building at Austin.

e) That generous support be given to church extension in each District Missionary program.

f) That we give generous financial support to the Methodist Home at Waco and the Texas Mission Home and Training School at San Antonio.

g) That each charge give support to the funds for our T. V. Ministry.

h) That we seek to increase the support for our retired ministers by raising the service-year payments each year, looking toward the goal of \$50.00 per service-year.

i) That 25 cents per member be fixed as our minimum support for Golden Cross.

j) That a special offering be taken on Mother's Day for Wesleyan Homes

7. We request the Board of Missions and Minimum Salary Commission to check before making final appropriations or payment to insure observance of conference rules regarding basic salary a charge must pay.

8. It is recommended that the matter of any new Conference Advance Specials or other financial campaigns presented to the Annual Conference for approval be referred to the Administration Council for study and recommendation to the special session of the Annual Conference.

9. That we give approval to the request of the Texas Planning Commission that the Rio Grande Conference be given representation on the Board of Directors of the Texas Methodist Foundation.

The remainder of our \$400.00 allowance was sent to student centers for books and materials on vocations.

We ask for an appropriation of \$300.00 each year for the ensuing quadrennium.

BOARD OF EDUCATION**Report No. 2**

The Board of Education submits herewith our report of the work accomplished for the year 1955-56:

Glen Lake Camp

Your Camp Committee can proudly report that the Camp has had one of its best years in its history during the Conference year just closing.

The very highest type of Christian camping experiences has characterized the full program and every camping week has moved forward in excellent manner.

More than 2500 campers participated in regular camping activities during the past year. The age range extended from Junior boys and girls to the Golden Agers. We are anticipating an even larger number to enjoy Glen Lake this year.

Your Camp Committee is moving steadily toward meeting every requirement of the camp standards set by the General Board of Education and of the American Camping Association.

The books of all funds of Camp Operations and Building Enterprise are audited regularly by the Conference auditing firm.

It was with regret that during the year just closing Mr. and Mrs. Howard Sego decided to terminate a long and useful tenure of outstanding leadership as superintendent and dietician at Glen Lake. The entire Conference will always be in their debt for the loyal and devoted work of these two fine people. The Board feels most fortunate in the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Tom Voss were available for these positions and were employed as our Camp Superintendent and dietician. We also feel strongly that the work will continue to be well supervised because of the training, experience and high Christian character of our new directors at Glen Lake.

The following nominations are made for Trustees of Glen Lake Camp, Inc.: Mrs. E. L. Reid, (1957), in the place of Mrs. Leila Peyton Hall; D. L. McCree, (1958); Clyde Weatherby, Hamilton, (1958); F. E. Johnson, (1959); Mrs. Ned Lydick, 2428 Colonial Parkway, Fort Worth (1959). The Chairman of the Board, the Chairman of the Camp Committee and the Executive Secretary of the Board are ex-officio Trustees.

Schools and Colleges

Reports have been received from Southern Methodist University, Texas Wesleyan College, and Southwestern University indicating progress in each Institution. Southern Methodist University, Southwestern University, and Texas Wesleyan College shared in the Ford Foundation grants, for which we are grateful, the money to be used to increase teacher's salaries. Martin Ruter Dormitory at Southwestern, which this conference helped build with the Southwestern and Texas Wesleyan College \$100,000 campaign, was dedicated February 5, 1956. All pastors are asked to attend the Texas Pastor's School at Southwestern University July 30-August 2, 1956. Southern Methodist University dedicated Umphrey Lee Student Center, started Boaz Hall, and a new girl's dormitory, and has 5,200 students with 370 in the School of Theology. Texas Wesleyan College has 1,136 students. Ground is soon to be broken for the new library, to which Central Texas Conference has given in the \$100,000 campaign. The following nominations are made:

We support the Budget committee's recommendation that the Schools and Colleges Budget for the ensuing year remain the same, but we urge the World Service and Finance Commission to grant \$1,200 to Navarro College for its new Methodist Student work if at all possible because we consider this an emergency.

We recommend the excellent Methodist Student work being done on the campuses of Texas Wesleyan College; Southwestern University; Arlington State College; John Tarlton College; Baylor University, and the newly organized work at Navarro College.

As a substitute for the \$5 plan, we recommend as a goal for our annual conference the following Plan of the Interconference Commission:

"30c PER MEMBER MINIMUM, A recommended minimum of 30c has been suggested by the Texas Methodist Planning Commission in November, 1955 to

be used, unless increased by General Conference action in 1956 or by Annual Conferences. (This is a minimum only. Churches exceeding this amount are encouraged to continue.)

Each local church is urged to include on item, **at least equivalent to this minimum**, in their annual budget. Churches are urged to follow these suggestions:

A. Designate up to 70% (70c of every dollar raised) to specific center or centers of their choice.

B. Designate at least 30% (30c on every dollar raised) to "state-wide" responsibilities (which include State Office; state-wide centers—A&M, University of Texas, TSCW-NTAC, Texas Tech; and "new work" grants). Any excesses will be refunded to local centers on a fair share basis.

A local church is free to **designate the entirety of any amount raised over this minimum of 30c per member** to whatever center it chooses. Local churches are encouraged, where there is interest and/or ability, to make direct grants to specific centers **provided this amount is over and above the 30c minimum**. In order to preserve unity in approach and method, it is recommended that **all funds** raised for student work be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer with appropriate designation instructions. He will then in turn forward them to the State Office of student work, where they will be promptly disbursed, as received, on the basis of the designated instructions. It is strongly recommended that grants from Annual Conference Boards of Education be continued, increasing amounts where possible. The dependability of these funds is a necessity for adequate program operations at the present time. It is hoped that the time will come when local churches will include sufficient amount in their budgets as to make further dependence upon these grants unnecessary. Local churches are urged to designate funds to centers geographically nearby.

We ask the conference to adopt the proposed quadrennial program to be presented to the General Conference, namely, that the coming quadrennium be set aside for emphasis upon the church's part in higher education and that a Conference Commission of Education, or some agency corresponding to the Quadrennial Commission on Education, be appointed, with a conference goal of \$1.00 annually per member for the support of the colleges of The Methodist Church.

Our conference owes a debt of gratitude to The Texas Methodist College Association for the marvelous services of Mr. Roy Farrow, under whose leadership our average giving has risen from \$27 per member in 1948-49 to \$55 per member in 1954-55. We regret that only 18 churches in our conference are giving a minimum of 50c per member to Texas Methodist College Association and sincerely hope that all churches will strive for the goal of \$1.00 per member. We believe this amount should be placed in the local church budgets whenever possible. October 14, 1956 will be observed as College Day with each local church lifting up the inestimable value of our Institutions of higher education.

The Local Church

We thank all District Superintendents, District Stoffs, Pastors, and Local Church Commissions on Education for the excellent support given the cause of Christian Education during the Conference Year. In order to make further progress, we recommend the following steps:

1. That there be in each District a staff of Christian Education which will include the District Superintendent, a Director of General Church School Work, a Director of Adult Work, a Director of Youth Work, a Director of Children's Work, District and Sub-District Presidents of the M.Y.F. and any corresponding officers of other age groups. We urge that an annual meeting be held as soon as possible after Annual Conference of all District Stoffs together at the same time and place, with the Conference Staff, at which time the stoffs will be oriented and given guidance. District and Sub-District Leadership Training Schools may be set up at this time.

2. Stress the important opportunities afforded in Leadership Training through Local, District, Sub-District Schools, Assemblies, Conferences, Comps and

Workshops. We request that all Pastors and Local Church Commissions on Education do everything possible to get workers to take advantage of Leadership Training.

3. Every church shall endeavor to have a two weeks' Vacation Church School.

4. Since attitudes and actions of Pastors determine the effectiveness of Leadership Training, we submit the challenge to **all** Pastors to take the lead in setting up and guiding Leadership Education and to call upon the Conference Staff, for assistance only in work that Pastors and Local Church School Workers cannot do. Let Pastors help more Local Workers become accredited instructors for Leadership Schools. Interested persons should notify our Conference Board of Education Office, which will assist them in the process of becoming Accredited Instructors.

5. Every local Church shall pay a minimum amount equal to 5c per church member for Rally Day offering, looking towards the employment of a full time Conference Director of Adult Work and to increase the effectiveness of District Work. We ask, that in connection with this offering, a thorough observance of Rally Day be held in every Local Church in order that all our people may know what Rally Day means to Christian Education.

6. At least one Workshop in each District each year, and preferably a Workshop in each Sub-District, which shall include Workers in all age groups, under the direction of the District Staff assisted by the Conference Staff.

7. All Pastors and Laymen should prayerfully encourage all young people to participate in Sunday night services in the Youth Choir, in Ushering, and in all phases of evening worship.

8. That each Pastor urge the election of a Youth Delegate from each Local Church to the Annual M.Y.F. Conference on Annual Conference Saturday and that all Youth in each Church be encouraged to attend the Youth Rally that night.

9. Courses for Laymen and Ministers in doctrines and organizations of the Methodist Church to be taught in every Local Church.

10. That every Church, considering building, or remodeling of Christian Education facilities, consult the Conference Board or General Board of Education for plans and suggestions.

11. All Pastors and Local Church Officials see that Methodist Church School literature, the Methodist Hymnal and Methodist published Song Books are used in all our Churches.

12. All Church School Teachers are urged to work with their Ministers in striving to lead all pupils into a meaningful Christian experience, and those above the Primary Department into vital Church Membership. Every Minister is called upon to make the most of the Preparatory Class and Decision Day each year.

13. We commend the large number of Churches which have active Commissions on Education, meeting each month. We hope all other Churches will organize Commissions this year. Workers' Conferences should be held regularly.

Observance of Special Days

For the enrichment of the entire program of our Church, we direct attention to the observance of special days as set forth in the Discipline and as authorized by the Annual Conference, with a view of the educational possibilities of these days.

Methodist Student Day—2nd Sunday in June, or as near thereto as possible.

Wesley Foundation Day—2nd Sunday in September. We urge that every Church place an amount equal to thirty cents per member in the budget for Wesley Foundation Work.

Church School Rally Day—3rd Sunday in September.

Texas Methodist College Day—3rd Sunday in October. \$1.00 per member per year for Methodist Colleges.

Area Wide Adult Convocation—Nov. 29-Dec. 2, 1956. First Methodist Church, Fort Worth.

Student Recognition Day—Last Sunday in December.

Race Relations Day—2nd Sunday in February, the offering to be designated for Huston-Tillotson College, Austin, Texas.

National Family Week—1st to 2nd Sunday in May.

Children's Day—1st Sunday in May.

World Service Sunday—4th Sunday in each month.

The committee arrived at the percentage scale used in the distribution of the funds to the three districts involved by using the total amounts contributed to the purchase of the house by the various churches in the former Weatherford District. These were then grouped into their present respective districts and the calculation made. The distribution is as follows:

Most of our institutions send representatives to this convention, where the attendants learn the latest developments in the field of Hospitals and Homes, and are briefed on the best known methods of carrying on work in this field.

We commend the churches which have raised their part on the campaign for the construction of a Nurses Home, and we encourage others to complete raising their part to provide this much needed facility for our healing ministry.

We call upon our conference for a much more adequate support of the Golden Cross to provide the healing ministry of our hospital to the needy sick. We commend the proposal that the standard of 25c per member for Golden Cross be recommended to local churches by our annual conference.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 2

Harris Hospital

The Board of Trustees and the Administrator respectfully submit the following report of the major activities of Harris Hospital for the Fiscal Year ended September 30, 1955, as well as accomplishments from that date to March 31, 1956.

Patient Care Factors:

This past fiscal year was the busiest in the 26 years of the operation of Harris Hospital. The average stay of the patient decreased 0.14 days, as compared with last year, resulting in a heavier load to all Departments of the Hospital. The adult admissions increased by 1,322 patients, and the newborn admissions decreased by 69. Major and minor surgical operations increased by 600. It is interesting to note here that the proportion of major operations to minor has steadily increased, so that now the largest number of operations is in the major classification. This means that the procedures are more lengthy and more involved, thereby utilizing a larger proportion of the surgical time available.

A shorter length of stay means to a hospital that all the necessary procedures demanded by the physicians for their patients must be accomplished in a shorter length of time. Therefore, an increased number of admissions with a shortened length of stay may present an unreal picture when expressed in terms of patient-days. Harris Hospital handled 102,206 adult patient-days and 17,595 newborn days during the last fiscal year—a total of 119,801 patient-days of care.

The Board of Trustees and the Administration of the Hospital thoroughly appreciate the conditions under which the personnel and the doctors have had to work this year, because of the extensive construction and remodeling program. It must be said that good patient care has been given in spite of many operational difficulties.

New Improvements

1. **Completion of Construction—Phase I:** Completion of Phase I of the construction program was accomplished after the end of our Fiscal Year. This new construction, which was mentioned in the last Annual Report, has added over \$1,000,000.00 to the capital plant and structure of the Hospital.

2. **Air Conditioning:** The air conditioning program mentioned in the last Annual Report, although completed after the end of our Fiscal Year, was completely paid for out of the General Funds of the Hospital in March of 1956. The Board is extremely proud of this accomplishment, for we had originally anticipated that we might have to borrow funds for this project. This program has added \$264,000.00 to the capital plant fund structure of the Hospital. The program has accomplished the air conditioning of the entire building, except for the Southeast and Northeast Wings of the Ground Floor, and the Ninth Floor. These areas must be considered in our future planning.

3. **Children's Hospital:** The Fort Worth Children's Hospital received bids for the construction of their new building on March 29, 1956. It is anticipated that it will take approximately one year to complete this building.

4. **Fort Worth Laboratory for Surgical Research:** It is anticipated that this Research Building will be completed during 1956.

5. **Acquisition of Land:** During this last Fiscal Year, the Trustees of Harris Hospital have purchased 14,000 square feet of property close to the Hospital, at a cost of \$30,000.00.

6. **Educational Program:** The Board of Trustees has authorized the establishment of a School for the training of X-Ray Technicians. This program will be in addition to the other educational programs which encompass the training of professional and vocational nurses, nurse anesthetists and medical technologists.

The Conference will remember that Harris College of Nursing offers both a Degree Program and a Diploma Program. The Board of Trustees of the College this last year changed their three-year professional nurses program (the Diploma Program) to cover a two-year clinical instructional program, and a one-year working program at Harris Hospital.

7. **Hospital Accreditation:** Harris Hospital has been given Full Accreditation after an inspection by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals. This Commission is concerned with the standardization and adequacy of hospital services in the United States and Canada, and is comprised of the following organizations:

- American College of Surgeons.
- American College of Physicians.
- American Medical Association.
- American Hospital Association.
- Canadian Medical Association.

New Equipment:

During this last Fiscal Year, the Trustees authorized the purchase of \$20,000.00 worth of Fixed Equipment, and \$85,000.00 worth of Movable Equipment, for a total of \$105,000.00. These expenditures covered highly-technical equipment for service to patients, as well as lesser items of equipment for service to such Departments as Dietary, Laundry, Maintenance, etc.

Ford Foundation Grant:

Harris Hospital has become eligible to receive from the Ford Foundation the sum of \$190,800.00 for improvement to physical plant or improvement to hospital services. These funds may not be used for operating purposes.

Report on Interim Financing:

It may be remembered by the Conference that Harris Hospital was authorized (in 1953) to borrow up to \$500,000.00 for interim financing, providing the amount borrowed was paid back from the first one million dollars received from the Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, Incorporated.

At present writing, we have borrowed \$268,125.00, and have paid back \$184,140.00, leaving an outstanding debt of \$83,985.00, plus outstanding commitments of \$38,550.00. This total amount outstanding, \$122,535.00, should be paid by the end of 1956 through contributions from the Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, Incorporated.

The Conference may remember that the amount borrowed is less than we estimated in last year's report. The reason for this is lodged in the fact that we have received quarterly payments from the Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, thereby enabling us to reduce not only the interest, but also to reduce the principal of the loan.

Nurses Home Campaign:

The campaign to raise \$500,000.00 for the construction of a new Nurses Home has been progressing very nicely. We should like to express our sincere appreciation to the Conference for its excellent cooperation in this endeavor.

Golden Cross Service:

One of the programs of Harris Hospital which touches closely the personal lives of many people in the Conference is our Golden Cross Program.

During the past year, the gross cost of this program to the Hospital was \$136,150.00. We received part-pay receipts from the patients amounting to \$16,500.00, and contributions from individuals and the Central Texas Conference of \$8,000.00, making a net cost to the Hospital of \$111,650.00.

This amount represented the care of 3,536 out-patients, and 642 patients who received in-patient care.

The cost of this program is increasing each year. Each year we are able to serve a larger number of patients. We again should like to emphasize that we appreciate very much the support of the Conference in this worthwhile service to humanity, and we sincerely hope it will be possible for the Conference to increase its support to this healing work of the Church.

Future Planning:

In order to plan adequately for any organization, it is necessary to project such planning not only for immediate needs, but also for long-range needs. The plans of Harris Hospital which we wish to present to you, and which we hope will stir your imagination, will be concerned with three definite areas: immediate; five years in the future; and ten years in the future.

These immediate, short-range and long-range plans cover two distinct considerations:

One: The completion of the construction program in the present Hospital building, and the renovation of the present Hospital facilities.

Two: The construction of new facilities adjacent to the present Hospital building.

Current operating conditions, in spite of the addition of 82 beds within the past year, present the necessity for considering immediately the completion of our presently-planned expansion program. This program calls for the addition of 60 adult beds, and the enlargement of all services necessary to supply these beds. The Conference will remember it was pointed out last year that the first Phase of our Expansion Program, in which we added 82 beds, knowingly overloaded all the other services in the Hospital. In spite of these additional beds, we have been operating between 85% and 90% of capacity. This percentage expression does not mean that we have as much leeway as it might indicate, for our Hospital is departmentalized into Medicine, Surgery, Pediatrics and Obstetrics. The demand for any one or all of those services may not be the same at the same time. In addition to the fluctuating demand for the various services, there must be a certain number of beds available for unanticipated emergency conditions.

The Conference will also remember that much of Harris Hospital is 26 years old, and therefore needs to be redesigned, refurnished and refurbished in an effort to modernize the old sections to conform with new construction and equipment similar to the Sixth Floor which has just been completed. While month after month we replace equipment and furnishings of the Hospital, a systematically planned replacement program is necessary in order to modernize completely.

This area of future planning might be considered to be both "immediate" and "five-year" in scope, and will cost between three and one-half and four million dollars.

In the second area, consideration must be given to the construction of additional hospital facilities adjacent to and adjoining Harris Hospital by means of

tunnels or overpasses. This new construction represents additional facilities which are badly needed by not only the community, but also by the State.

1. The need for psychiatric facilities, I am certain, is well-known to most of the Ministers of the Conference, as well as to a majority of the Laymen. No longer can a hospital or a community say that they are giving adequate care when they provide no acute diagnostic facilities for mental cases. Too long have hospitals failed to assume their responsibility to their respective communities by considering psychiatric care as a custodial proposition, rather than recognizing it as an early diagnostic service which results in a high rate of recovery.

Authorities have long recognized that the most practical and economically feasible method of providing these short-term psychiatric facilities is to construct them adjacent to and connecting with a general hospital. The reason for this association of facilities is lodged in the fact that it prevents duplication of services common to both types of care. The general hospital must have these facilities for all patients, while the psychiatric hospital needs them for few patients. Such an association tends to reduce the cost of construction of the psychiatric facility and to decrease the overhead of the general hospital facility, through increased utilization.

2. Almost any time one discusses hospital care, the conversation tends to dwell upon the high cost of that care. While it is true that the cost per patient-day of general hospital care has doubled in the last ten years, it is also true that the average length of stay of the patient has been cut in half, thereby presenting a cost-per-patient-stay which has not markedly increased.

Boards of Trustees of all hospitals are constantly searching for methods by which the cost of care to the patient can be reduced without impairing the quality of the service.

Although the average patient's return to work is fairly immediately, the cost of an illness does not necessarily stop with the dismissal from the hospital, because more members of families are working, in this day, and more families are individually housed or separated by distance. Facilities are necessary, therefore, to:

- a. Further reduce the average stay of the patient; and to
- b. Provide the sort of "home-nursing" care that used to be available to the patient when families were differently housed or less members were employed.

Structures to provide the solution to this problem are often called "convalescent facilities." If these facilities are constructed adjacent to and connected with a general hospital, and provide a minimal type of nursing care, the cost to the patient can be halved, in most instances. Another advantage is found in the ease of supervision by the same attending physician who is in charge of the hospitalization. Still another advantage is found in the proximity of the services of the general hospital, should they be needed, or should a relapse necessitate readmission.

3. In this age of the automobile and ever-increasing span of life, there is great need—and it will be an ever-increasing need—for the provision of chronic and rehabilitation facilities; rehabilitation facilities to restore to productivity people who have had either accidental injuries or chronic debilitating illnesses, and chronic facilities to complement the rehabilitation aspect and also to provide low-cost accommodations for the long-term illness.

The association of chronic and rehabilitation facilities with the general hospital again provides advantages in the utilization of the services provided by that hospital, as well as the conservation of medical manpower, because of the location of the hospital.

The Long Look:

It is fully realized that this look into the future is ambitious, but the needs for the projected programs which we have covered cannot be considered imagin-

otive, because the facts concerning those needs are already with us and have been well-demonstrated. If we do not plan now, the public pressure will one day make into an emergency a situation which can now be thoughtfully considered.

The Board of Trustees particularly wishes to express this year its appreciation to the personnel and medical staff of Harris Hospital for the splendid patience, cooperation and assistance during the period of operational stress which was caused by the construction and remodeling program.

The Board of Trustees wishes to express its appreciation to the Central Texas Conference for the support of its Ministers and Laymen in helping the Board to provide a steadily-improving quality of service to the patients which Harris Hospital serves.

Since this report is submitted to the Administrative Council prior to the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees, there may be supplemental material which will need the attention of the Annual Conference.

Charter Amendment

The Board of Trustees recommends that the following Resolution, covering an amendment to the Charter of Harris Hospital, be approved by the Conference:

BE IT RESOLVED that Article V of the Charter of HARRIS HOSPITAL, property of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church, be amended by deleting therefrom the following sentence:

"Each year two new members shall be added to the Board of Trustees, and thus if, during the year there have been no vacancies filled for unexpired terms, two of the 9 members whose terms expire at the end of the year shall not be eligible for re-election to succeed themselves.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution be presented to the Annual Conference of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church for approval.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, after approval of this resolution, if approved by said Annual Conference of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church, that such officers and directors as may be required for effectuating such charter amendment be and they are hereby authorized and directed without further action of this Board to certify such charter amendment to the Secretary of State of the State of Texas for filing so as to make such charter amendment effective.

Construction Financing

Three years ago, the Board of Trustees requested the Central Texas Conference to grant to the Trustees of the Hospital the privilege of borrowing a sum not to exceed \$500,000.00, if needed, securing such loan by the Hospital building. It was agreed at that time that this loan would be repaid from the first one million dollars received from The Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, Incorporated. To date, as our previous Report indicates, we have borrowed \$268,125.00, which will be repaid by the end of this year, 1956, from funds to be received from The Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, Inc.

It was pointed out three years ago that the overall cost of our proposed expansion program, in order to meet the needs of your Hospital, would be approximately \$3,000,000.00. Thus far, \$1,000,000.00 has been expended. It will take approximately \$2,000,000.00 more to round out the overall expansion program of the Hospital building proper. As is pointed out in Report No. 1, the most immediate demand of the community was for additional beds. These beds were added at the sacrifice of overloading all of the service facilities, such as Laundry, Central Supply, Emergency Room, Operating Rooms, etc.

We now have these beds in service for community needs, and it is extremely important that we complete the remaining phases of our projected expansion program.

We estimate that it will take approximately two million dollars to modernize the older sections of Harris Hospital, installing adequate plumbing, nurses' call systems, and other necessary changes.

To do this above-mentioned work, we have foreseeable funds in the amount of \$450,000.00 from the Greater Fort Worth Hospital Fund, Inc., and a grant from the Ford Foundation in the amount of \$190,800.00. This gives us \$640,800.00 with which to start on a \$4,000,000.00 project.

The Ford Grant has been aptly referred to as "seed money." We sincerely hope that this will prove to be the fact, and that funds will be forthcoming from the community to enable us to answer the Hospital's needs.

It is very necessary that we complete our detailed planning for the above-mentioned phases, so that we will be prepared to make the improvements as funds become available.

Many times in construction, in order to complete a certain phase, it is necessary to provide financing. The Board of Trustees, therefore, would like to request permission of the Annual Conference to encumber the Hospital property in an amount not to exceed \$500,000.00.

I do not have to emphasize to the Conference the character and interest of the Board of Trustees of Harris Hospital—the members are well-known to all of you. I believe also that the Hospital's record of operation speaks for the character of Trusteeship which these gentlemen have performed.

We sincerely hope that the Conference will see fit to grant this request.

This report covers the first six months of the hospital fiscal year of 1955-1956. For this period, we have had fewer patients sent to us by pastors and churches.

Pamphlet: A pamphlet has been prepared for distribution among our pastors and interested laymen setting forth the policies and rules that govern Golden Cross Service. It is the result of a composite study by the Medical Staff and those who attend patients in the Out-Patient Clinic and in the hospital. If used properly, pastors and laymen will acquire a working knowledge of Golden Cross Service, and save time when requesting admission for a patient.

Offering: The offering for Golden Cross will likely be the same as last year. The drought has affected the amount sent to our office, which is understandable. However, let it be said that the Central Texas Conference is lagging far behind other Conferences of the State in its support of its charity program. We would encourage our pastors to make public presentation of this worthy cause to their congregation and take an offering rather than place a small amount in their budgets. Methodist people have always responded liberally to a needy cause when opportunity is offered them.

Chaplain's Report:

The greatest satisfaction that comes to a chaplain is from his bed-side visitation. Persons admitted to the hospital, of course, are sick and oftentimes their morale is low. This is especially true prior to an operation. Anxiety and worry depress them, and a visit from the chaplain helps them. When death comes, usually the chaplain is the first minister to attend the family and assist them in their grief. Altogether, the work as chaplain of Harris is worthwhile, and truly representative of the Church serving those in need at the right time.

I have had the privilege of speaking in many pulpits during the year upon invitation of our pastors. Such opportunities are appreciated, and helps us to briefly present the services of our hospital. Our people need to realize more and more that Harris Hospital is their own institution of healing, and one they can appreciate. In 1955, Harris was the seventh largest Methodist Hospital in the United States, and rated fourth in number of admission, which is indicative of its large place in the field of healing service. It is free of debt, but needs more funds for extending its service.

Commissioners:

The office of Commissioner serves as a channel of Public Relations on behalf of the hospital. Much of the public relation work, in and out of the hospital, is

channelled through our office. We have the responsibility of supervising and editing several hospital publications, and also working with the local newspapers by furnishing them news items of public interest.

Our chief work as Commissioner this past year, of course, has been devoted to the campaign for funds to construct a new Nurses' Home. (See Report.)

Golden Cross Month:

We respectfully request that the month of November be designated as Golden Cross Month, with Sunday the 18th as Golden Cross Sunday.

Report No. 5

Nurses' Home Campaign

The Conference at its called session in the fall of 1953, authorized a campaign for raising funds for the construction of a new Nurses' Home at Harris Hospital set within the year of 1955. Later, this time was extended through June of 1956. We will have reached the end of that period with the meeting of this Conference.

It will be recalled that the total project was for \$500,000.00. Of this amount, \$200,000.00 to be provided by the Methodist churches of the Central Texas Conference, and \$300,000.00 from large personal gifts. The churches have responded in a magnificent way. As of April 1st, the Conference Treasurer has sent to the Commissioner's Office approximately \$94,000.00. That leaves April and May payments to be added at Conference time, which should bring the total to approximately \$150,000.00. The two Fort Worth Districts were one year late in assuming their askings, and are paying regularly, mostly by the month. We are confident that by June 1957 the full amount of \$200,000.00 will have been paid by the churches.

The campaign for larger gifts has been retarded, and for two reasons. First, the drought conditions have created an economic situation throughout the Conference that has caused a slow-down in the campaign. However, plans are to be presented to this Conference outlining an intensive campaign for these additional funds. Second, it was discovered that no general campaign for hospital or nurses home funds can be projected within Fort Worth until the present five-year contract with the business men of the city expires on September 1, 1956. This contract is part of the recent campaign for \$4,000,000.00 for the hospitals of the city, of which Harris Hospital is to receive \$1,450,000.00. Already we have expended \$1,000,000.00 of these funds on our expansion program. Consequently, we will have to wait until the proper time to seek funds for the Home in Fort Worth.

Extension of Time:

Most of the churches of the Conference outside of Fort Worth will have paid their askings in full by Conference time. However, some few will require more time and most of the churches in the two Fort Worth Districts will require another year at least. Therefore, we are requesting that the Conference extend the time for payment of the Askings for any and all churches until each and all shall have paid in full the amount asked of them. This request does not in any way open the door for another campaign to the churches per se but to enable those churches who are in arrears to meet their payments in due time.

Furthermore, let it be said that no campaign is anticipated for the Nurses' Home to the churches. The seeking of personal gifts, of course, will be sought from individuals until we shall have raised sufficient funds to insure the construction of the badly needed Nurses' Home.

We sincerely trust that the Conference will meet this request for extension of time.

This has been a year of exploration and education. Every agency of both Church and State concerned with human welfare is becoming aware of the rapid rate at which America moves toward a nation of older people. Current figures reveal that more than 14 million of us are over 65 years of age. By the year 1980, at the present rate, we will number more than 20 million.

The skill of science has added years to life—now we must add life to years. Methodism has 69 Homes devoted to this cause. There are 8 additional agencies which care for retired ministers. Last year 2,572 persons applied for admission to these homes. Approved, and awaiting room for admission are 1,912 other persons. These homes represent assets of over 76 million dollars, and incurred operating expenses of almost 7 million dollars. They received from the churches almost 2 million dollars, most of it for capital investment.

To meet the growing demand, 21 homes have started additional housing; 17 are planning expansion; 14 have added the "cottage" plan, and 17 have future plans calling for apartments.

The 7,206 people in these homes are not there because they have been "sent away." They have entered voluntarily because they saw in the home family an atmosphere of Christian culture, and an opportunity for a full life. It is our purpose to have such a place in the Central Texas Conference. Within our Conference there are 81,235 people more than 65 years of age. Many of them are Methodists. Some of them are in need. Others are financially comfortable. Those who feel the need of a church home in retirement should be made to know that Methodism is not indifferent to their need.

In proceeding toward this objective we have sought to move with due caution, but without undue delay. In the course of the year a proposal to purchase the Crazy Water Hotel in Mineral Wells has been under consideration. The wisdom of a large representative Committee has been applied to the proposal. First the Executive Secretary of the National Board of Hospitals and Homes, Dr. Karl P. Meister, brought a group of men who made a thorough inspection of the facility, and rendered a favorable opinion. An engineering firm was asked to complete an inspection. Their report was favorable as to structural soundness. Auditors were employed to summarize the hotel's fiscal performance over a 3-year period. If an offer is to be made for purchase of this property, it will be based on still another report from realtors' appraisal. In many respects this property is highly desirable.

Since acquiring the Belton property our studies of the need of homes in our area have revealed the fact that this site will be totally inadequate for our purposes, and the officers of the Board have been authorized to dispose of this property.

Foreseeing the administrative responsibilities that will rest upon Trustees, once a program is in operation, we request the Board of Hospitals and Homes to ask approval for increasing the size of our Board from 12 to 21 members; one-half of whom should be laymen, and one-half ministers, one of whom should be the Bishop of the Area.

Our Board has taken note of the fact that aggressive prosecution of a program to provide homes for the aged in our Conference will require the full-time energy of an executive director. However, at the present time we feel that the Trustees, together with the fine assistance and support of other interested persons, will be able to carry forward studies that will determine a proper course to pursue. We hope to continue to enlist support, both by personal contacts, and informational material which can be prepared and mailed throughout the Conference.

In view of the foregoing, we are requesting an appropriation of \$1,500 for expense of the Board the coming year. We further request that the Commission

on World Service and Finance continue their policy of last year; namely that we be given an opportunity to present requests for emergency financing from contingency funds, should such emergencies arise.

We respectfully ask that Mother's Day be set aside as a day for a special offering for Homes for the Aged. This Day represents the perfect opportunity for such a cause, and has been widely accepted by many Conferences for this purpose.

Our gratitude is expressed to all those who have responded to the pioneering challenge of this cause, and we feel that with continued understanding and growing concern we are moving toward a service that will not only meet a need, but one of which the Conference will be proud.

At a called meeting of the Executive Board of the Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce, Friday, June 1, a discussion was held regarding the possibility of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church purchasing and operating

the Crazy Water Hotel of Mineral Wells as a home for Christian men and women, and

WHEREAS, the resolution adopted by the board of directors of the Mineral Wells Chamber of Commerce on October 3, 1955, was discussed by the Executive Board, and

WHEREAS, the sentiment of the community of Mineral Wells is appropriately expressed in the resolution adopted by the Chamber of Commerce on October 3rd, now

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES**Report No. 7****Texas Mission Home and Training School**

The goal of a completed unit of the Christian and scientific care of the expectant unmarried mother and her baby will be reached when our Maternity Ward and other necessary improvements have been finished and dedicated some time in June 1956. If we had not received the loyal and very liberal support of the Central Texas Conference, these achievements could not have been possible.

Those with authority to supervise, approve or disapprove our physical property, equipment, program of Rehabilitation and our program and procedure for Adoption, would if requested explain that our HOME will have become by July 1956, the outstanding HOME doing our type of service in Texas, or perhaps in the U.S.A. There has not been a debt on the HOME the past 11 years and when the improvements are completed now under construction there will not be any debts.

As of April 1, 1956, the HOME had received from the Central Texas Conference \$8,470.60. The grand total received last year was \$9,804.52. Mr. W. A. Harrison, a Certified Public Accountant will audit our Treasurer accounts, Mr. E. C. Jolly, 932 Esses Street, San Antonio, Texas, a certificate of the Audit will be mailed to each Bishop, District Superintendent and Minister. The final report from the Conference Treasurers are never received in time to have the Audit made in time to get it in the minutes of the Conference. Mr. Jolly is under a \$25,000.00 bond.

The Home Requests:

FIRST: Sunday, September 30, (fifth Sunday) be designated as the DAY for each Church to receive an offering for the support of the HOME.

SECOND: Because the expectant unmarried mother and her parents are ashamed to ask their pastor or friends for help, in their desperation they seek help blindly like seeking one's way in the dark, and so often accept help from inexperienced persons or an unethical organization, and as approximately 95% of our patients, their parents or friends discover the services offered by this Home by reading the literature published by the HOME and distributed by our Pastors. We actually know that the distribution of our literature is perhaps of the greatest importance—you can't help these unmarried mothers unless we receive them in the HOME. Therefore, we pray and fervently urge each pastor to place our literature in every home in his church.

THIRD: We ask that the Rev. Hayden Edwards, a minister, and Mr. Mel Faulk, a layman, be elected as Trustees from your conference.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES**Report No. 8****The Methodist Home**

It is my personal privilege to express appreciation to you and the Central Texas Annual Conference for the gift of \$75,970.10 in cash and \$924.21 in supplies, and \$20.00 in designated gifts, making a total of \$76,914.31. Your generosity, interest, and gifts to the Home have helped make it possible to provide 154,086 days of free care to the children who lived at the Methodist Home during the past year.

I am glad to report that considerable and satisfactory progress is being made on the development of an expanded program of services to the children. In addition to a more efficient program of care and training for the children in the Home, the use of foster homes where needed and far what seems to be the best interest of the children is being utilized. Children are also being placed for adoption as they are available. It is the opinion of the Directors of the Home that this program will greatly extend the service to children in our area. In order to operate this

type of service efficiently, it has been necessary to bring in new and professionally trained staff members. These people are adding much to the efficiency of the services to the children.

I am glad to report that beginning in June, a pastor will be an full-time duty at the Home. He has had special training in counseling and with children, and is coming to us unusually well prepared for a great Christian ministry among the children and the staff.

INTERDENOMINATIONAL COMMITTEE

Report No. 1

Formation of Local Councils has proceeded rather slowly with only three new councils launched during the year. The El Paso, Midland, and Pampa councils were organized in 1955. The executive secretary of the state council participated in the organization meeting of the El Paso Council. He has cooperated closely with local councils in various program areas. There are now nine city councils of churches in Texas; (in chronological order) Austin, San Antonio, Houston, Dallas, **Fort Worth**, Wichita Falls, Midland, El Paso, and Pampa.

The Ministry to Migrants under the joint sponsorship of the Division of Home Missions of the National Council, United Church Women, and the State Council greatly expanded its program during 1955. Projects were held in 16 communities. An estimated 16,000 migrant laborers were ministered to in some way during the season. About 850 volunteers assisted the staff personnel in the great variety of socio-religious activities.

The Churchmen's Conference on State Government was held in Austin February 7-9 during the regular session of the Legislature. Meetings were held with state officials, visits were made to the Legislature, and many discussion groups convened as the group studied problems of state government. Co-sponsor was the state Council of Methodist Women.

The State Council assumed responsibility for the Christian Rural Overseas Program at mid-year and the office was moved from Fort Worth to Austin. Denominational units named representatives to constitute the new State CROP Committee. Mr. John Gillies, San Antonio radio-TV and advertising agency man, was elected state director. His first task was to handle the Halloween "Trick-or-Treat" program. 161 communities participated and a grand total of \$38,905.52 was collected for relief goods. A shipment of 22,000 pounds of whole powdered milk was dispatched immediately for use in Korean tuberculosis hospital.

An emergency shipment of seed rice, grain sorghum, beans, and vegetable seeds, along with five tons of Texas sulphur was made to Haiti to help rehabilitate hurricane and drought victims.

Two Texas Council Representatives in November participated in the National Conference on Religion and Public Schools held in St. Louis. A committee of the State Council has set up three retreats for public school administrators and teachers to be held in March and April. Theme of the retreats is CHRISTIAN VALUES-IMPERATIVES FOR TODAY. The teachers will be guests of the State Council, made possible through a grant provided by the Fair Foundation of Tyler. The schedule:

March 23-25: Camp Allen. For Houston, Galveston area.

Director: Dr. John W. McFarland, Supt. Vernon Public Schools.

Seminar Leader: Dr. Wm. C. Finch, president Southwestern University.

April 6-8: Presbyterian Mo-Ranch Assembly. For Austin-San Antonio Hill Country.

Director: Dr. Otto Nielsen, dean School of Education, T.C.U.

Seminar Leader: Dr. Kyle M. Yates, professor of Bible, Baylor.

April 20-22: Glen Rose Methodist Assembly. For Dallas-Fort Worth areas.

Director: Dr. L. D. Haskew, Dean School of Education, Univ. of Texas.

Seminar Leader: Dr. H. Kerr Taylor, First Presbyterian Church, Dallas.

Christian Social Relations: This committee has been represented in various statewide conferences in the social welfare field. These have included State Vol-

unteer Council for Mental Hospitals, Volunteer Council for Tuberculosis Hospitals, Texas Social Welfare Association.

This committee is offering non-partisan information about candidates for state office and suggested questionnaires for qualifying candidates for the state legislature for use by local councils and ministers associations.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Report No. 1

No longer can it be said that laymen are not interested and are not participating in the work of our church. On the contrary our laymen are responding in large numbers to study and understand their church and church program better and they are participating in the church program to a greater extent. The results of the efforts of the Board of Lay Activities as it attempts to undergird the whole program of the church are evident in increased attendance at the various services and meetings of the church, increased giving, increased evangelism, and increased interest in the whole wide reach of the Church. The laymen now have a feeling that "this is my cause too" and are soying by their increased interest and participation that "We want to do our share in helping to bring the Kingdom of God here on earth." The whole church needs to take cognizance of this increased interest and participation. We dare not miss this opportunity to utilize this tremendous resource of strength for our course.

As proof for the above opinion, the Board of Lay Activities under the leadership of the ten District Boards of Lay Activities has given some vigorous leadership to the laymen of the church which makes possible these very fine results:

1. There were a total of 35 meetings in which the District Lay Leaders, the District Superintendents and the Associate District Lay Leaders planned the program of the Boards.

2. There were 26 district-wide and 98 sub-district meetings held by the District Board of Lay Activities. The attendance at these meetings ranged from small group meetings of 10 to large meetings where over 600 laymen were in attendance. The combined total of these meetings was over 7300.

3. All but 3 churches participated in Laymen's Sunday, October 16. This is one of the best recards in the nation.

4. All ten of our District Boards of Lay Activities have an organized program of lay speaking. Many of these lay speakers are in a regular schedule to circuit churches in the district where the pastor is present only once a month. Many more laymen are ready to speak anywhere and any time at the call of the District Superintendent or the local pastor.

5. We now have a total of 160 chartered Methodist Men's Clubs in our conference. Of course, these clubs vary in strength and results from the very active clubs that are doing amazing things in the local church to those clubs that are all but dead. The organization, the materials, the needs for Methodist Men's Clubs are present and in many cases awaits only the proper stimulation and leadership.

6. The story of the Stewardship of Possession Program is a startling one. Under the leadership of the District Boards of Lay Activities 102 churches used the complete Stewardship program and 131 used part of the program as outlined by the Texas Stewardship Movement and the General Board of Lay Activities. Our number of tithers in the conference is now estimated at 7500. Our per capita giving has increased 100% and the tithe has again attained a place of respectability in our church vocabulary and church practice.

7. Although the Every Member Canvas program has just begun in our conference, there is good reason to believe by the enthusiastic reception of the program by laymen and pastors alike, that within a short time there will be very few churches in our conference that will not have made provision for an annual Every Member Canvas.

8. The Laymen's Retreat held at Glen Lake, August 26, 27, 28 was the largest and the best yet sponsored by the Board of Lay Activities. A total of 571 laymen registered, over 600 laymen attended part of the retreat, and several hundred were turned away because of lack of facilities for all who wished to attend.

Excellent leadership and inspiration were furnished specifically by Dr. J. Clinton Howkin, Conference Lay Leader, St. Louis Conference, in the field of Methodist Men's Clubs and general lay activities; by Dr. Earl G. Hamblin, St. Paul's Methodist Church, Abilene, in the field of Stewardship of Possession; by Dr. C. C. Sessions, District Superintendent of the Gatesville District, on the Discipline; and by Dr. Glen Johnson, Director of Music, First Methodist Church, Dollos, in the field of music and singing for the Retreat.

Additional inspiration was added by the fine devotionals led by the various District Superintendents of our conference and by the fine leadership of our District Lay Leaders as they presided for the various meetings.

It should be noted too that other laymen purchased over \$315.00 worth of religious books, and took with them several boxes of free materials that were available including over 400 tithing coins.

Indeed, the work of the Board of Lay Activities has become a great factor in the program of our church. In just the past few years it has grown from a small group of men who met once or twice a year to a large force of men of over 7500 who attended 159 meetings; from a force of men that had only a few scattered "Brotherhoods" to 155 chartered Men's Clubs; from a Laymen's Retreat attended by only 32 men to one attended by over 600 men with several hundred being turned away because of lack of room; and from a small group of laymen who understood the program of the church to a mighty army of men who now understand better and are ready to take responsible tasks as they have become "doers of the word and not hearers only."

Your conference Lay Leader has attempted to give such leadership to the whole program of Lay Activities so as to cause more and more laymen to see their responsibility as Christians and to stimulate them to a more sincere loyalty to the Cause to which all of us whether clergy or laymen owe a common allegiance. It has been an inspiration to see the laymen respond to the challenges and help strengthen the power and influence of our cause. It has been an encouraging and a

rewarding task to see pastors and laymen tackle anew the problems of our church with better understanding of each others' duties and areas of responsibilities and with a new zeal to do a tremendously bigger job than we ever dreamed was possible.

Goals for 1956-57

1. To give continued enthusiastic leadership in the field of stewardship with particular emphasis on the Every Member Canvass Program.
2. To have a well-informed and active Church Lay Leader in every Church.
3. To have a Lay Speakers Bureau in each District, which shall include provisions for a service in every Methodist Church every Sunday.
4. To have 100% participation in Layman's Day Service, October 21.
5. To keep our present Methodist Men's Clubs strong and active, and set as our goal 200 chartered clubs by the end of this conference year.
6. To sponsor the annual Laymen's Retreat at Glen Lake.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Recommendations of the Texas Methodist Planning Commission concerning the Texas Methodist Stewardship Movement:

1. That the program of stewardship education and promotion be continued throughout the 1956-60 quadrennium in order that we may not lose any part of what has been gained, but, rather, continue to build on the foundations already laid.
2. That a State-wide Stewardship Committee be set up for the purpose of directing and administering the program by whatever means at their command, especially through the production and distribution of Stewardship literature, films, and other materials, and by giving assistance whenever possible to the Conference, District, and Local Church activities. This Committee to be constituted as follows:
The Presiding Bishops of the Areas involved, the Conference Lay Leader, and one District Superintendent, one Minister, and one Layman, and be appointed by the Bishop of each Conference.
3. That in order that this program may be adequately financed, an annual appropriation of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000.00) be made and that it be divided among the conferences of Texas on the decimal formula customarily used for the purpose, and that such conferences be asked to make their proportionate amounts available through World Service appropriations. This apportionment is \$3,246 annually for the Central Texas Conference.
4. That each Annual Conference set up a competent and active Stewardship Committee, whose responsibility it shall be to cooperate with the Texas Methodist Stewardship Movement and other agencies in the promotion of the Stewardship Program in their respective Conferences.
5. That the Central Texas Conference Committee on Stewardship consist of the Bishop, Conference Lay Leader, the ten District Superintendents and ten District Lay Leaders.

METHODIST MINISTERS UNITED BROTHERHOOD**Report of Secretary-Treasurer**

There were fifteen deaths in the Brotherhood this year, the numbers being divided among the divisions as follows: Central Texas Division, seven; North Texas Division, three; and, Southwest Texas Division, five.

There are now 293 members in the Central Texas Division. We have received eight new members this past conference year and have the promise of several others during this next Conference year. The net gain for the past year was one member. (We have added five others during this conference session.)

The Central Texas Division and the Southwest Texas Division are adding new members each year to replace the ones that are removed. The North Texas Division has done nothing for years about adding new members. Their roll is steadily decreasing. They now have less than 100 members. This secretary recommends that this division and the Southwest Texas Division withdraw from their group if they refuse to make any effort to secure new members to help keep the Brotherhood alive.

We could put on a drive in our Conference that would more than make up for the loss of this North Texas Division. Most of the young men of our conference do not know what the Brotherhood is nor why we have it. We could put on an educational campaign that would greatly increase our membership in the Central Texas Division. Most of the active members of our conference have come into the conference since 1941. Many of them do not know that the Brotherhood exists. If we can reach them through a program of education many of them would become members of the Brotherhood. This secretary urges each District Superintendent to present the cause of the Brotherhood to the preachers in their districts at one of their preachers meetings this summer or fall.

The average benefit paid to beneficiaries of the Central Texas Division this year was \$591.00.

The Committee appointed to audit the books of Rev. R. A. Brooks, Jr., Secretary-Treasurer of the Methodist Brotherhood, reports that the books, checks, and bank statements were examined by the Committee on June 7th, 1956, and were found to be in excellent order. The balances on hand were verified by the bank statements.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT

Report No. 1

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the General Texas Annual Conference, under the direction and management of a Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, hereinafter, for the sake of brevity, called the Commission, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Five of this number shall be ministers, and four laymen, and three of the total number of nine shall be clerical or lay members of the Conference Board of Missions. These three shall serve during the quadrennium. The remaining six members shall serve for three year terms, two to be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support Program, in the closest cooperation with the Conference Board of Missions. Members of the Commission, in addition to the one-third who shall be members of the Conference Board of Missions, may be chosen from the membership of that Board, and if they are not so chosen, they shall be expected to attend the meetings of that Board, but shall not have a vote except on matters directly affecting the Minimum Pastoral Support Program. The Minimum Pastoral Support Program, and that part of the Conference Board of Missions that has to do with appropriations for pastoral support in the Annual Conference, shall be considered one general program.

Vacancies in the membership of the Commission, caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference, shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and the

Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the ensuing session of the Annual Conference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regular way.

The Commission shall organize at that session of the Central Texas Annual Conference held at the beginning of each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the executive committee of the Commission, and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. All subsequent elections of officers and executive committee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Commission held prior to the date of the meeting of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Administrative Procedure

1. (a) The basic minimum basis for pastoral support shall be \$1,500.00 per year, exclusive of any pension provision that may be made by the Charge.

(b) For a single man rendering full time service, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$2,000.00 per year shall be added.

(c) For a married man rendering full time service, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$2,400.00 per year shall be added.

(d) The benefits of the Fund are not to be thought of as annual subsidies designed solely to enable a pastoral charge to pay the minimum salary of the Conference. The Fund should do that, and more. Basically the purpose of the Fund is to aid a pastoral charge in its efforts to raise its own salary apportionment to the figure set as the established minimum salary of the Conference.

(e) All missionary appropriations shall be considered a part of the basic salary received in making the computation for the amount of the benefit to be given from the Fund, and in determining the apportionment to the Charge.

2. The benefits of the Fund are available to ministers in the Central Texas Annual Conference who are rendering full time service as pastors, as follows: Preachers in full connection; preachers on trial appointed to pastoral charges; student pastors who are on trial; and approved supply pastors who are recommended by their District Superintendents.

(a) The benefits of the Minimum Pastoral Support Fund are not available to any minister having any appointment other than that of preacher in charge within the bounds of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

(b) In cases of change of appointment between sessions of the Annual Conference, and after the apportionments have been made by the Commission, no member of the Conference, preacher on trial, or full time approved supply shall share in the benefits of the Fund, unless the Charge to which he may be appointed shall meet the conditions hereof, and then his sharing shall be on a pro rata basis for that part of the year served in the Charge to which he may be appointed.

(c) The Board of Missions shall continue its cooperation in this program.

3. No pastor shall share in the benefits of the Fund who receives income from other employment than the regular work of the ministry.

4. A pre-requisite for any pastor to receive the benefits of the Fund is the agreement, by vote of the Quarterly Conference of the Charge he serves, to pay to the Commission an amount equal to twenty-five (25) per cent of the amount necessary to bring the salary up to the computed minimum; provided, however, that this requirement, and the five (5) per cent increase in salary over that paid

the previous year, as set forth in Paragraph 1, sections (b) and (c) above, may be waived upon unanimous vote of the Commission. The twenty-five (25) per cent paid to the Commission shall not be considered a part of the salary apportioned and paid.

5. No pastor shall receive the benefits of the Fund if the Charge he serves reduces the salary below that paid the previous year, unless this reduction is recognized by the Commission as justifiable, and approved by its unanimous vote.

6. In accordance with paragraph 826, Discipline 1952, when a preacher in full connection, on trial, or an approved supply pastor, is appointed to a Charge apportioning less than a salary of \$1,500.00 per year, such appointee shall not receive the benefits of the Fund except on the basic minimum basis of a \$1,500.00 per year salary apportionment, and the usual participation of the Charge in the Minimum Pastoral Support Plan.

However, to aid and encourage Pastoral Charges in the \$1,200.00 to the \$1,499.00 salary brackets to move toward the \$1,500.00 basic minimum, the benefits of the Fund, on the basis of the salary apportioned will be granted annually, provided the salary has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent. All Charges that have not reached the basic minimum basis salary should indicate their purpose of doing so.

7. Funds for the work of the Commission shall be secured in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 826, Discipline 1952, and the apportionments shall be made to the Charges as hereinafter set forth, and payments by the Churches on such apportionments are to be made regularly to the Conference Treasurer.

Scale of Apportionments

(a) No apportionment shall be made to Charges apportioning less salary than the basic minimum basis, including missionary appropriation, nor to any Charge whose pastor is receiving the benefits of the Fund—it being understood that the twenty-five (25) per cent payment to the Commission by the Charge in accordance with the provisions of this Plan, is and shall be in lieu of any other apportionment against the Charge for this work; except, in those cases where the twenty-five (25) per cent requirement is less than the apportionment required by the regular scale. In all such cases the Commission will make the proper adjustment.

(b) The total apportioned salary of a charge determines the per centage scale that is applicable. In all cases, however, \$800.00 of the salary paid is exempt. The apportionments shall be figured on a per centage scale, as follows:

(c) Three (3) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,000.00 or less;

(d) Three and one half (3½) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,001.00 to \$2,500.00;

(e) Four (4) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,501.00 to \$3,000.00;

(f) Four and one half (4½) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$3,001.00 to \$4,000.00;

(g) Five (5) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$4,001.00 and up.

8. The Commission shall gather necessary information throughout the Conference for the computation of the apportionments to the Charges, and the amounts to be paid to those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and that information will be given to the District Superintendents and Pastors, and by them to the Quarterly Conferences of the Charges. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective Districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts from the Churches listed in their respective Districts.

General Provisions

9. Payment on the apportionment to the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payment to those receiving the benefits of the Fund, at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same per centage basis as that on which the funds come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.

10. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, and of all payments to those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for the work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund; and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals en route, to all meetings of the Commission, except such meetings as are held while the Annual Conference is in session, shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be computed on the basis of seven (7) cents per mile each way.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time, if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payment for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid is limited to those who receive the benefits of the Fund, and not more than Ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available for such emergency appropriation. All unexpended portions of such available emergency funds, shall at the close of the year, remain in the general fund, subject to disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this Plan.

We urge each District Superintendent to present this matter to his District and urge acceptance of proportionate amounts.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PROPORTIONAL PAYMENT OF
MINISTERIAL SUPPORT**

For four years the Committee on Proportional Payments has had the duty of examining the financial reports of the churches of Central Texas to ascertain which, if any, were failing to pay the funds due the four items proportionate to ministerial support, i.e., District Superintendents Fund, Episcopal Fund, Conference Claimants Fund and Minimum Salary Fund.

During the first year of the quadrennium, we discovered a great indifference on the part of many churches, large and small. They were paying other items, including the minister's salary, but leaving these items unattended. The first year of the quadrennium revealed that the proportional payment on some \$33,000.00 was not made. Each successive year the amount has been reduced, yet still in too many cases, churches fail to pay the four proportionate items. This year the deficit amounts to \$2,749.00.

This is a serious thing and we feel many churches are not aware of the full consequences of their action, nor are all ministers aware. On one hand, when we fail to pay the proportionate items, we are taking support from at least two of our most needy groups—our retired ministers and our ministers who are on minimum salary support. These two groups need every dollar allotted them. On the other hand, there is a severe penalty imposed against the minister whose church fails to pay its proportionate items. According to paragraph 1613 of our Discipline, all deficits in these items shall be deducted from the retirement benefits of the pastor serving the charge at the time the deficit occurs. This means that at the time of retirement, when that minister will most need his pension benefits, that amount his church failed to pay will be deducted from his income!

This Committee has given a report each year of the quadrennium to the Committee on Conference Claimants, and will this year report to the new group handling its work. We presume they have taken the action prescribed by the Discipline.

We encourage every local church to face up to its responsibility in making the payments to the District Superintendents Fund, Episcopal Fund, Conference Claimants Fund and Minimum Salary Fund. We encourage each pastor to thoroughly check his report to Annual Conference to make certain each item has been met

in full. We request that each District Superintendent also check his reporting of apportionments and also encourage his district pastors to be more diligent in this matter.

JOINT BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS

In the 1955 calendar year the Texas Methodist Information office sent over 100 releases to the 884 Texas news media, with many to the 35 church papers across the nation.

The staff has covered major Texas Methodist events with gratifying cooperation with the news agencies. Seven press relations seminars were conducted and local slanted stories were provided from 29 conference meetings.

The public relations program is being carried on with three full-time and one part-time persons, combined with the responsibility for the Texas Christian Advocate. The two programs often complement each other.

Circulation of the Advocate is over 65,000, with about 175 churches having the paper come to each home.

Cultivation for increasing circulation has been a major emphasis for the past year, and we have had the full cooperation of All Church Press, Fort Worth, printers of the Advocate. Circulation as a supplement in its editions of Church Week, Dallas World, Fort Worth Tribune, and Houston Times makes it possible to reach many Methodists with important features of the program.

Bishop A. Frank Smith and Bishop William C. Martin have given unstinted support to the total program.

Each Conference is asked to name an Advocate representative who will work closely with the editor-business manager in increasing circulation. Since it will be valuable to have a member of the Board of Publication to serve from this Conference, we recommend that Oran Stephens be named as that representative.

Each district is asked to select an Advocate agent-reporter, who will support circulation and serve as news reporter.

The Board is asking for an increase of 25% in subsidy for the total program. The increase will make it possible to purchase needed equipment for Methodist Information work, as well as increases for postage, supplies, travel, and seminars on public relations. The amount asked for the Central Texas Conference is \$2,705.

Additional Payments on Apportionments

Payments on the original apportionments for the \$500,000.00 three point program, where there is an unpaid balance, continue to be made. The principal amounts that have been received have come from the original apportionment made to the Fort Worth District. These payments have made possible, this conference year, an addition to the Capital of the Fund, of \$5,800.00 as this amount of money has been sent this year to the Missouri Corporation of the General Board of Pensions.

What the Fund is Doing

In the three full years that our pension program has been in operation, namely the Conference Years, 1952-1953; 1953-1954; and 1954-1955, the Board of Conference Claimants has received interest on its \$106,808.00 portion of the Fund, in three equal annual installments, totaling \$13,618.02. In the same period of time allocations of \$15,740.74 have been made to members in the Partial Reserve System, and allocations of \$24,539.85 have been made to members in the Full Reserve System.

Present Status of the Fund

It is a source of satisfaction to the Commission to report to you that after the allocation of \$40,280.59 to the members in the Partial and the Full Reserve Pension Systems, the St. Louis office of the General Board of Pensions informs us that the Full Reserve System has a cash balance of \$249,777.86, and the Partial Reserve Pension System has a cash balance of \$119,981.45. The original askings for the Full Reserve and the Partial Reserve Systems were \$243,821.00 and \$120,808.00 respectively. Our present favorable position shows an increase in the Full Reserve System of \$5,956.86, or a total of \$249,777.86, and the total cash balance of \$119,981.45 in the Partial Reserve System, lacks but \$828.00 of being the original sum asked for.

Benefits and Options Offered by the Fund

The thoughtful attention of the active members of the Conference is directed to the distinct advantages provided in the Full and Partial Reserve Systems. Paragraph 1652, Discipline 1952, sets forth clearly the benefits offered in the Disability, Widows' and Children's Fund. On pages 106 and 107, Journal of the Central Texas Annual Conference, 1954, an explicit statement of the "additional benefits and options" available to members of the Fund is made. Every active preacher in the Conference should fully understand and evaluate the advantages that membership in the Fund of the Reserve Pension Program provides.

AND WHEREAS, we have come to love, honor, and respect Bishop Martin for these and other Christian virtues;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Central Texas Conference do hereby respectfully request the Committee of Episcopacy and the South Central Jurisdictional Conference, in its session in New Orleans, Louisiana, June 28-July 2, 1956, to assign Bishop William C. Martin to the Area that will include Episcopal Supervision of the Central Texas Conference.

BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

The Methodist Church had its beginnings in a time of great social, economic, and religious upheaval. The established Church from which it sprang had become lax in its ministrations to all men who were in need of the transforming Gospel of Christ. "Temperance in all things" had become its watchword; complacency characterized much of the clergy; "respectability" characterized its adherents. John Wesley and his band of evangelicals brought the Gospel of God's grace to those who were spurned by the Church. They brought the prophetic voice into the hearing of the people. Disregarding criticism and persecution, they launched into unpleasant tasks and took unpopular stands because they knew they were taking the Christ-like way.

This is our heritage. Yet the Church ever stands in peril of duplicating the lethargy of the Church from which John Wesley came rather than the zeal for truth which gave rise to The Methodist Church.

These, too, are times of great social, economic, and religious upheaval. We believe that The Methodist Church should duplicate the spiritual and moral vigor of its forefathers in taking definite Christian stands on all issues affecting the spiritual and moral natures of men.

Abstinence

We commend our Conference and General Boards of Temperance which have furnished such active and able leadership in combating the evils of beverage alcohol. We urge that the Boards and their activities be given complete support. We further recommend that such organizations as the Texas Alcohol and Narcotic Education and the Women's Christian Temperance Union be commended and supported. In order that the Church might make the power of its opinion felt, we feel that every Methodist should be given an annual opportunity to sign an Abstinence Commitment Card, and that vigorous action should be taken in behalf of all legislative opportunities to restrict and abolish liquor sales and advertising.

Race Relations

We, the Central Texas Conference support the plan of the General Conference of our Church in dealing with the matters of race relations and pray God's blessings upon His people everywhere!

Evangelism

Christianity is no longer the world's fastest growing religion. If it is to maintain its leadership in the world, evangelism by consecrated Christian people must continue and increase. Emphasis must be given to special evangelistic programs, Church School evangelism, and other suggested methods. But no comparable method has ever displaced personal witness by individual Christians.

American Bible Society

Because of the wide and unselfish service of the American Bible Society in providing the Word of God to millions throughout the world, we do recommend its continued and strengthened support.

Christian Advocate

The Christian Advocate and the Texas Christian Advocate are powerful mediums for advancing and propagating Christianity and The Methodist Church. Their excellent coverage of religious affairs merits the approval and support of all Methodists. It is our suggestion that every congregation should be given ample opportunity to subscribe to both publications.

Spiritual State of the Church

Many things indicate an increasing spiritual hunger on the part of contemporary society. A proportionate increase in the use of the Bible in both public and private is one way of meeting this need. This Board further urges the use of such supplementary aids as the Upper Room in deepening spiritual insight. We feel that the Church can be further led into more meaningful worship experience by the use of the calendar of the Christian year in forming the program of the Church, and that the use of the ritual and liturgy of The Methodist Church in its proper and prescribed form will help effect such a suitable program.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The Conference Board of Temperance can report that progress has been made in its field of service during this year. We have seen a large number of our conference leaders taking active part in the work of temperance education in the local church and to some degree within the district program. The national Board has given wise leadership in the training of these persons. Perhaps the greatest single advance in the field of abstinence training has been in the realm of visual education. Our conference has helped provide funds for the making of better visual aids and we feel the recently released movie, "**Far from Alone**" surpasses all previous efforts in this field. This film should have wide circulation not only with church groups but also at public schools and other city activities.

While it is pleasing to count the victories gained in this important field, we realize that the greatest battles lie ahead. Beverage alcohol continues to make headway in its relentless effort to enslave new customers. It continues to gain

new converts in the guise of moderation and it continues to destroy souls, lives and happiness of a large segment of our church and civic population. The alcoholic beverage industry continues to exert pressures upon the ministry and the laymen of our great church. They seek to sell the destruction of many homes and individuals lives, spiritual and physical, for the mere sake of the revenue they might gain. They exert pressure through advertising media seeking to convince the public that "their product belongs to the home." They seek legislative privileges and they fight with tremendous force any legislative effort to limit the distribution of their damnable product. It is their purpose to legalize the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages in every county and precinct of our land. They do not cease from this effort.

The Central Texas Conference Board of Temperance calls upon every minister and layman of this great area to be an example of abstinence and to be a fighter for the great principle of total abstinence so clearly held by our great church. Only by our wholehearted efforts in this direction can we spare future generations the curse of alcohol.

Your Conference Board of Temperance will cooperate with every effort to abolish the alcohol problem in a lawful and sensible way. We shall share in the leadership of promoting attendance at the National School of Alcohol Studies to be held soon at S.M.U. We shall help in maintaining a conference youth workshop on the alcohol problem. Because we feel the proximity of the National Schools to our conference will enable us to trim expenses this year, we are asking for a reduction in appropriations to a total of \$950 to be used for the work of this board this year.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

A Methodist Research Committee published last year a study in which it is stated that the highest per capita giving to World Service and benevolences among Texas Methodists comes from churches serving communities of less than 2,500 population, \$1.98 per capita. The same work reveals that communities of less than 10,000 population contain the highest percent of Methodists—15.1% of total population.

Of the 1547 ministerial students in seminaries questioned, 48.3% came from town and country when they decided to enter the ministry. Sixty per cent of them were born in rural areas, and 17.4% had fathers who were farmers. Only industrial craftsmen ranked higher; 17.5% had fathers in this category.

Last summer our Commission assisted in sending 24 people from the Central Texas Conference to the National Methodist Town and Country Conference in Bloomington, Indiana. We believe the impact of this will continue to leaven rural areas through the years.

We are gratified that a Department of Town and Country Work has been developed at Southwestern University with Professor Horvey Watts as director. It should be noted that there will be a Seminar on Town and Country work at Postors' School this year, led by Professor Marvin T. Judy of Perkins School of Theology.

We shall continue to cooperate in placing a Rural Worker in the Conference. This is a joint project with the Woman's Division.

It is our conviction that we can best serve the interest of the Conference as an advisory Commission, assisting in gearing the program of the rural church into the larger task of the Church—Evangelism, Missions, Education, Lay Activities—these are all our concern as they concern the rural church.

We feel keenly the prospect of rejuvenation through the Every Member Campaign in the small church. It will be the means of helping many churches discover resources heretofore overlooked. And new resources are always stimulating.

It is our purpose to continue awards at Conference to two outstanding churches and pastors each year—one a circuit church, and one a station church.

We are confident that as results of this year are tabulated we shall witness some outstanding accomplishments. Churches have been built, parsonages erected, Lord's Acre plans are increasing, and a wholesale attitude toward the important work of the small church prevails. But above, lives have been claimed for Christ.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church was incorporated and the Secretary of State of the State of Texas issued a Charter of Incorporation to such Board on the 4th day of October 1955.

The Board of Trustees still has in its possession the property and home in the city of Belton in Bell County, Texas, which was donated by Mrs. Robert Penn of Dallas, Texas, for use as an old folks home. This property is not being used for any purpose whatsoever at the present time. Inasmuch as Wesley Homes, Inc., has been incorporated under the laws of the State of Texas, it is the recommendation of the Board of Trustees that the Annual Conference authorize the Board of Trustees to convey such property to Wesley Homes, Inc., in order that they might have it in their possession and control for the uses desired and specified by the donor. This Board of Trustees is unable to use this property and feel that it should be put to an immediate use by Wesley Homes, Inc.

During the past year, the Board of Trustees completed the transaction for the purchase of a home in Cleburne, Texas, for use by the Secretary of the Board of Education. The cost of this property was \$16,190.00, of which \$11,800.00 of the purchase price was borrowed from the Cleburne Savings & Loan Association of Cleburne, Texas, with interest at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum, and payable in monthly installments of \$77.88, inclusive of interest and principal. This loan is being paid by the Board of Education and the transaction has been completed.

A Sub-committee of the Board of Trustees acted during the past year for the purpose of partitioning and dividing funds in connection with the sole of the District Parsonage at Weatherford, Texas, and for the purpose of adjusting the matters concerning the District Parsonage as between the East Fort Worth and West Fort Worth Districts. W. M. Greenwaldt, of this Board, acted as Chairman of this Sub-committee and has full information on all of the decisions of the Sub-committee in his possession.

The Charter which was issued by the Secretary of State of the State of Texas to the Board of Trustees is attached hereto for filing with the Conference Secretary.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Concern for others and a desire to share Christ and His message have been impelling forces in the hearts and minds of Methodist women as they have made investments of life and money in thirty nations of the world.

"Every area a mission field; every church a mission; every Christian a missionary." To this achievement the Woman's Division of Christian Service, building on the foundation, laid through more than a hundred years, has committed itself. Not that this has been achieved. It has not, but it is the goal clearly seen and strides are being taken to reach it.

As we approach the close of this quadrennium, we pause for a backward look. Statistics are often cold and impersonal. May we see them as the answer of Methodist women to the challenge given at the beginning of this four year period.

In 1952 there were 255 Societies and 80 Guild units with a combined enrollment of 14,040. With the close of the third quarter of this year (1955-56) there are 256 Societies and 99 Guild units with an enrollment of 14,681. This being a net increase of 640 to date.

In 1952 study classes showed an enrollment of 14,303 and Mission Study Specials amounted to \$2,670.13. In 1955 there were 550 Jurisdiction Recognition Study Classes with an all time high enrollment of 16,608 with Mission Study Specials amounting to \$3,696.36. To date only 267 study classes have been reported for the current year, but there is every indication that new goals will be attained.

Spiritual growth is shown by an increase in the number of Prayer Groups and enrollment in the Fellowship of Intercession. In 1952 the Week of Prayer and Self Denial was observed by 219 Societies with an offering of \$6,770.15. Last year 239 Societies observed this special occasion with the offering amounting to \$7,207.44. The goal for this year has been 100% observance of the Week of Prayer with an increase in offering.

Second mile giving (Cash for Supplies) has increased from \$6,617.54 in 1952 to \$9,871.31 in 1955.

Giving to missions has increased from \$110,845.00 in 1952 to \$122,208.00 in 1955. A budget of \$96,200.00 was approved for the current year. With the close of the third quarter giving to Missions amounted to \$84,072.00. Special Memberships totalling more than \$10,000.00 were announced at the Annual Meeting. Indications are that there will be a substantial increase in total giving for the year 1955-56.

Workers with Children, Youth and Students have availed themselves of every opportunity to lead the youth of the church into a fuller realization of their individual responsibility to missions.

Mrs. Nan Wright, rural worker, continues to undergird the total program of The Methodist Church as she works with children, youth and adult groups in the Sid Anderson Sub-district of the Cisco District.

During the quadrennium the Charter of Racial Policies has been signed. Concern for community, state and world affairs has increased as Seminars on 'Alcohol Education' and 'Things That Make For Peace,' and Workshops on World Understanding have been held on conference and district levels.

Miss LaDoris Morgan, one of the three missionary recruits, has completed her tenure of service in India and is now enrolled at Syracuse University, Syracuse, New York, where she is majoring in Religious Journalism. Doris Bennett in Angola, Africa, and Ruth Jones in the Belgium Congo write of their deep satisfaction in being privileged to serve in these areas.

Completion of two additional cabins at Glen Loke Camp, thus bringing the total to four, is an achievement to which we point with pride. The enlarging and re-building of Vesper Point is but another evidence of the interest of Methodist Women in the youth and children of the church. This represents an investment of approximately \$14,000.00, the Guilds having made substantial gifts to this project.

The theme for the new quadrennium—**The Spirit of Christ—For All of Life**—will send us forth to enlist those who should share in this rich fellowship; to work and pray for Missionary Recruits—this being our greatest need; to a continuation of the emphasis on World Understanding in order that the Christian message shall be strengthened in the mission fields around the world; to the sharing of our material possessions as we think in terms of unmet needs both at home and abroad.

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

"The primary conditions of peace lie in the attitudes of men. Since the Church in a unique way holds in its keeping the moral and spiritual forces for a peaceful world, the Church has a unique and God-given responsibility.

"Among the fertile causes of war are: the failure of nations to apply moral law and justice in international negotiations and actions; the cancelling of distinctions of right and wrong, as more and more barbarous forms of cruelty are held to be legitimate; self-righteousness; the treating of persons as things; the condoning of human bondage; economic self-interest; the distortion of the truth by propaganda and deliberate falsehood; reliance on military force as the sole arbiter in conflict and instrument for the restraint of evil.

"To each of these factors the Christian gospel has an answer. No earthly state, but God alone, is ruler of the universe. To his righteous law nations as well as individuals are subject, and no claims of military necessity can make what is

evil good. By him all men are judged and called to repentance. All men are children of God and however sinful are infinitely precious in His sight . . . God wills all men to be free to work out their destinies in a just society amid conditions compatible with truth, and to share in the resources of the earth that He has provided for all. To us He has committed, not implements of destruction for the arrest of evil, but the words of reconciliation and love.

"The Church can be an agency of great power for the establishment of a 'Christian' world community, as has been demonstrated by the missionary and ecumenical movements." We recommend that the tools that are available within our Church be used for peace. "It is not enough for the churches to proclaim that war is evil. They must study afresh the Christian approaches to peace," taking into account all of the factors involved. Christians must seek out, analyze, and help to remove the psychological and social, the political and economic causes of war.

This cannot be done by oratory and resolve alone. It will come only as Christians organize for action. On this basis your Conference Committee on World Peace recommends:

1. That there be organized within each local Church a Committee on World Peace with the expressed responsibility of giving leadership in the Church in the study, education, and action of both individuals and groups in the program of World Peace advocated by the General Conference in its 1956 meeting.
2. That responsibility for World Peace action be assigned to one of the Commissions should a Church deem it advisable not to have a separate committee on peace.
3. That each district give serious consideration to having workshops on World Peace, and/or the teaching of courses on World Peace recommended by General Board of Education in the annual leadership training school.
4. That both laymen and pastors be encouraged to attend the annual United Nations Seminars held in New York each year under the auspices of the General Board of World Peace.
5. That the Annual Conference grant through the Commission on World Service and Finance the sum of \$250 again this year for the committee's work.

We are happy to report our work this conference year has been most gratifying. We had four persons represent our Conference this year in the United Nations Seminar which included a pastor, a lay-woman, a district superintendent, and the Conference Secretary of our Board of Missions. We have participated in several leadership training schools. We have held workshops on peace and distributed a considerable amount of literature among our people. We believe that the people of Central Texas are becoming more aware of how important it is to be concerned and active in the affairs of our world and are finding that there is a very definite place for them to bear witness to the Prince of Peace in obtaining what we can sincerely call a just and enduring peace among all men.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

1. The World Service and Finance Commission requests that no Board, Committee or Commission of the Central Texas Conference expend any money for any purpose which has not been authorized in the original budget request unless it is approved by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. We further request that every Board, Committee and Commission submit an itemized budgetary request in their Annual Conference report.
2. We recommend as a part of operational procedure that all Annual Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees which receive annual appropriations

from the Conference budget shall remit to the Conference Treasurer a check covering the unused portion of their annual allocation. This money shall be deposited to the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference and the check shall be mailed in time for the transaction to be recorded in our Annual Audit. This request is made with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer, with the consent and cooperation of the Commission on World Service and Finance will honor all necessary monthly expenses.

3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to invest the temporarily unused funds of the Conference Treasury in "Ninety-one (91) Day Treasury Bills" only. These are to be purchased through banking sources alone and the yield therefrom shall revert to the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference.

4. An amount equal to 11½% of the salaries of ministers, associates and approved supplies serving churches in the Central Texas Conference is assessed for the support of the District Superintendency. This amount shall be divided equally between the ten (10) districts of the Conference and shall cover all costs of the office including salary, operational expense and office expense. No other amount shall be levied against the churches of the District for the District Superintendent's office and expenses except for the provision and maintenance of the District Parsonage.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE COMMISSION

Report No. 2

1. We approve and recommend that special offerings be taken in all the churches of the Central Texas Conference this year on the dates designated by the various Boards and Committees having them in charge, as follows: Methodist Home at Waco, Golden Cross, Methodist Student Day, World Service Sunday, College Day, Texas Mission Home and Training School, Church School Rally Day, Retired Minister's Home Day and Mother's Day.

2. We authorize the treasurer to pay from the total receipts for Benevolences the expense of the Conference and the following items before the distribution of any money is made:

- (1) Expense of printing the Journal.
- (2) Expense of the Conference Secretarial Staff.
- (3) The printing expense and secretarial help for the Conference Treasurer in such amounts as shall be agreed upon by the Treasurer and the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- (4) The expense of bonding all treasurers of Boards and Commissions who handle Conference Funds, including the Conference Treasurer.
- (5) The expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, and the Treasurers of Boards and Commissions as they shall be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. We recommend that all funds shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer to be received no later than May 31st of each year in accordance with the action of the Conference which makes the fiscal year June 1 to May 31.

4. All funds received by the Treasurer in excess of General Conference and Annual Conference askings shall be distributed in accordance with the disciplinary provisions. After the Annual Conference expenses have been met the percentage of the balance which is due the General Conference Treasurer shall be remitted immediately. The balance shall be held by the Conference Treasurer in the Contingency Fund for distribution by the World Service and Finance Commission.

5. We request that all Boards and Commissions make requests for annual appropriations to the Commission on World Service and Finance at the time of the meeting of the Administrative Council before the meeting of the annual conference.

6. We recommend that every church continue to support the work of the Radio and Television Ministry with a special offering at the time most convenient for the Districts. Through our special offerings we have raised approximately \$3600 each year. Certainly we could not do less for this important phase of our church's ministry.

It shall be the duty of the World Service and Finance Commission to compute the apportionment annually and furnish this table of apportionment to the Districts. It is suggested that the same method of apportioning be considered in apportioning the District allocation to the various charges of the District.

J. J. CREED

In the vast processional of human life it is the lot and privilege of all to touch the varying types of characters who form the fabric of current times. The great, the small, the wise, the unwise, the known, the unknown, the good, the bad—all are in that endless caravan forever moving across the horizons of life. The days of one's journeys are pages in the book of life's pilgrimage, and on these pages one writes, in indelible characters, the story of what one is and does. These brief lines endeavor to relate, in epitome, the story of one such pilgrim.

On November 25, 1873, in Petty, Texas, there was born to Mr. and Mrs. J. T. G. Greed a son to whom they gave the name John Jefferson. On that day John Jefferson Creed began an earthly pilgrimage that was to last eighty-two years and eleven days. On December 6, 1955, at journey's end, he entered into "that rest that remaineth to the people of God." Compassed between that beginning and that ending was the life of a normal boy, a serious minded youth and a man devoted through religious zeal to the service of God and through the grace of God to the service of his fellow man.

He grew up inured to the hard and honest toil of life on the farm. His eager mind sought knowledge through the reading of the scant number of books that usually come within a farm boy's reach. In early life at the age of nine he was converted and joined the church. In later adolescence he felt his call to the ministry, and in the spring of 1898 he was licensed to preach at Grapevine, Texas. In that year he entered old Polytechnic College to prepare himself for his life's work. He graduated in 1900, having completed the academic work required for the Bachelor of Arts degree. Later on, when Polytechnic ceased to be, Southern Methodist University recognized the validity of his diploma and conferred upon him the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1925. He was admitted on trial in 1890 by the North Texas Conference, and was immediately transferred to the Texas Conference, and the next year was transferred to the old Northwest Texas Conference which later was named the Central Texas Conference. He was ordained a deacon in 1901, and an elder in 1903.

Brother Creed was married to Miss Nola Brown in 1900. She passed away in 1928. Of this union were born eight children, all of whom survive him. They

are three daughters—Mrs. R. C. Knight of Fort Worth, Mrs. George Feightman of Los Angeles, California, and Miss Ruth Creed of Houston; five sons—David, Steven, Buford, John and James.

In 1937 Brother Creed was married to Miss Kate Reilly, who also survives him.

In his long ministry Brother Creed served the following churches; Bay Shore Mission, Marine Methodist Church (now Boulevard) in Fort Worth, Kenedale Circuit, Ferris, Bethel Circuit, Elm Street in Waco, Taylor, Winters, Stephenville, McGregor, Midlothian, Anglin Street in Cleburne, Sylvania Heights in Fort Worth, Coolidge, Grandview, Weatherford Street in Fort Worth, Rogers, Clay Street in Waco, Wortham, Couts Memorial in Weatherford, and Englewood in Fort Worth. He retired in 1946; however, he supplied the Springtown Circuit for the year 1946-47; then moved to Dallas.

Funeral services were held December 7, 1955. This writer, with Dr. Gid J. Bryan and Dr. W. W. Ward, conducted the services in the presence of a large congregation of sorrowing friends. The immense floral offering bespoke the sincere love in which he was held by all who knew him.

So rounded out the earthly life of a faithful man of God who, as is said of David, "served his generation by the will of God, and fell on sleep." His redeemed spirit has passed on from the toils of time, the labors of life and the shadows of earth into the great white light forever. There, by the redemption of our Lord, we hope to meet again.

SAMUEL P. GILMORE

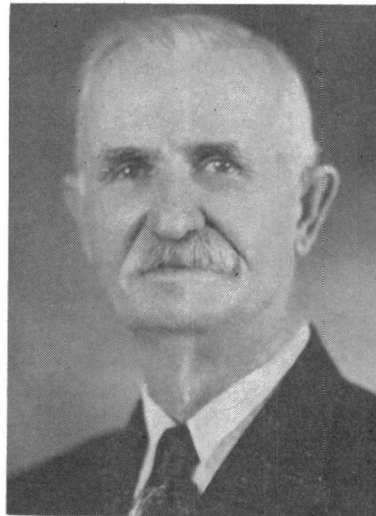

Brother Gilmore received his formal education in the Copperas Cove School, and at Southwestern University at Georgetown. It was from the Copperas Cove Church that he was licensed to preach. His Local Preacher's License bears the date of March 27, 1902. He was ordained as a Local Deacon in 1907.

It was on September 24, 1907 that he was married to Miss Willie Mae Lee of Gatesville, who survives him.

During the years that followed, Brother Gilmore spent much time as song leader, evangelistic singer, and supply preacher. In November, 1912, he was admitted on trial into the membership of the Central Texas Conference. He was received into Full Connection and ordained an Elder in 1915. He served pastorates at May, Desdemona, Sipe Springs, Gordon, Prairie Hill, Peoria, Whitt, Jonesboro, and Mosheim.

In November, 1931, his health having failed, the Annual Conference granted him the honored Superannuate relationship. Since retirement, he and his family



have lived in Waco, where he has continued as a faithful worker, not only in the Austin Avenue Methodist Church, but in the other churches of the district. He was a great help to many of the younger pastors, often taking part in services of Holy Communion.

On March 23, 1956, having parted this dwelling place, God took him home. Funeral services were held on Monday, March 26th, at the Connally Funeral Chapel in Waco. Services were conducted by his pastor, Dr. G. Alfred Brown, and Reverend Len Layne, pastor of the Brookview Methodist Church of Waco. Burial was in Waco Memorial Park.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Willie Mae Gilmore, their two daughters, Mrs. H. K. Highsmith of Lubbock, and Mrs. Lucille Jackoskie of Waco, three grandchildren, and one great grandchild.

Through the years, he has been motivated with a great desire to serve his Lord. His life has been an inspiration to many, and his memory a benediction.

R. H. HEIZER

Richard Hezekiah Heizer, son of Rev. Robert S. and Annie B. Heizer, was born July 7, 1877 in Virginia. His father was a Methodist minister. Brother Heizer was converted under the ministry of his father at the age of twelve years and immediately joined the Methodist Church. He later attended Polytechnic College, but did not graduate.

As a young man he practiced paper hanging for a while. Then he heard the call to ministry and was licensed to preach about 1895. He was admitted on trial in the old Northwest Texas Conference in November 1897. Later he was transferred to the New Mexico Conference, meeting at Albuquerque.

Brother Heizer was twice married. He was married to Miss Henrietta Martin in 1899. She died in 1917. Then in 1920, September 13, he was married to Miss Hattie Lee Haynes. He retired from the active ministry in November, 1941. He bought and moved to a farm near Dublin, Texas, and lived there happily and successfully until his death March 30, 1956, following a heart attack.

Brother Heizer was active in the Dublin Methodist Church from the time of his retirement until his health prevented him from working. He loved his church and assisted his pastor in sacramental and other services as long as he was physically able.



Brother Heizer served the following appointments: Putnam Circuit, Alamogordo Circuit, (New Mexico) Hope Circuit (New Mexico) Alibene Circuit, Wortham Circuit, Coolidge Circuit, Horn Hill Circuit, Irene Circuit; Kirk Circuit, Bruceville and Eddy, Mount Calm, Valley Mills, Oglesby, Jonesboro, Turnersville, Godley, Hamilton Circuit, Mosheim, Glen Rose Mission, Granbury Circuit, Nolanville, Purdon-Harmony, Chatfield, Bazette and Cisco, Twelfth Street.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. R. H. Heizer, by four sons, W. R., R. P., W. C., and L. W., and by two daughters, Mrs. John Hathcock, and Mrs. John Parrack. The children are shining examples of the rectitude of the parsonage home and teachings.

He was buried in the New Dublin Cemetery by his pastor, Rev. D. L. Barnes, assisted by a former pastor, Rev. E. L. Craig.

O. F. SENSABAUGH

On July 10, 1859, at Waynesville, North Carolina, was born Oscar Fitzgerald Sensabaugh whose life, as was said of the first Methodist preacher in America, "has beautified the earth with salvation and increased the joys of heaven." His parents were Leonidas Franklin Sensabaugh and Mary C. Fitzgerald, both of whom died during his early childhood. Dr. Sensabaugh was married first to Miss E. Caroline Faucette and later to Miss Daisy Lane. He attended the best private schools of his childhood, and in 1926 received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity from McMurry College.



Licensed to preach in 1877, Dr. Sensabaugh was admitted On Trial in the Holston Conference in 1878, received into Full Connection and ordained Deacon 1880. After serving two years in North Carolina he was transferred to the Denver Conference where he was Methodism's earliest spokesman in southwest Colorado and northern New Mexico. In 1893 he came to the old Northwest Texas Conference. During twenty-seven years as Presiding Elder he was stationed in communities such as Brownwood, Cisco, Abilene, Fort Worth, Oklahoma City, and Dallas. From 1879 through 1955 he missed Annual Conference Roll-call but one time. Having been under continuous appointment for fifty-eight years he retired in 1936 and took up residence in University Park, Dallas, where he died on March 19, 1956. Burial was in Oak Grove Cemetery. He is survived by Mrs. Sensabaugh; three sons, Leon, Oscar, and Gerald; and one daughter, Mrs. Mai S. McCleskey.

Among the services rendered by Dr. Sensabaugh were his influence in leading capable young men into the ministry, his concern for education, and his far-seeing provision for a growing and expanding Church. As chairman of the Board of Trustees for Polytechnic College, in Fort Worth, he sought out administrators and teachers, and through them gave the institution such standing as that when time came for the building of Southern Methodist University the traditions of Polytechnic became in measure the foundation of the new and larger school. Almost single-handed he saved Epworth University, now incorporated as Oklahoma City University. A delegate to the General Conference in 1906 and 1926, he represented his Communion at the World Missionary Conference at New York

in 1900 and at Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1910. As member of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America he found joy in promoting fellowship among the denominations and in laying foundation for the later World Council of Churches.

Dr. Sensabaugh bore major part in the establishment of the Highland Park Methodist Church, in Dallas, now the largest congregation in world Methodism. Long before these communities of Highland Park and University Park were populous enough to support a minister, he saw in vision an increased constituency, and realized that both the Church and the University could be best promoted by a congregation near the campus. When his strength was no longer sufficient for the pastorate he served as official representative of the School of Theology, traveling from place to place, presenting its cause to the people of our denomination.

In his passing, as exemplified during his active years, the Scripture fits him, as it records: "Moses my servant is dead; now therefore arise, go over this Jordan. Only be thou strong and very courageous, that thou mayest observe to do all the law, which Moses my servant commanded thee; turn not from it to the right hand nor to the left, that thou mayest prosper whithersoever thou goest."

E. M. WISDOM

Edgar McGee Wisdom, son of Alexander Pierce and Ann Mathis Wisdom, was born in Carrol Co., Georgia, Sept. 20, 1876 and entered into rest Nov. 4, 1955. Survivors include his wife, who has been a faithful companion and helpmate for forty-nine years in a life devoted to the ministry; two sons, L. M. Wisdom, Dallas, Texas, and W. P. Wisdom, San Antonio, Texas; a daughter, Miss Ruth Wisdom, Memphis, Tennessee; one brother, Frank L. Wisdom, Dallas, Texas; three sisters, Mrs. Mary Higginbotham and Mrs. Ira Smith, Mabank, Texas, Mrs. Walter M. Monroe, Dallas, Texas and three grandchildren.

He came with his family to Mabank, Texas, when he was nineteen years old and stayed on the farm assisting his father. Being reared in a Christian home, he entered into Christian life and service in early life, became a steward, choir leader and was active in the work with young people. From this background, he began to feel a call to the ministry. He answered the call and entered Meridian College, Mississippi and while in college he continued his Christian service, filling preaching appointments and leading singing in revival services.

Brother Wisdom was licensed to preach at Phalba, Texas, in 1900. In 1904 he joined the Gulf Conference of M.E. church and served in that conference until 1910 when he transferred to the Central Texas Conference, received as a deacon by credentials and was ordained elder by Bishop Atkins in 1912 at Cleburne, Texas.

He began his ministry by organizing Colonial Hill Mission at Dallas, Texas before entering the Gulf M.E. Conference under which he served Dallas Thornberry, Friberg and Chestnut St., Fort Worth, Texas. Appointments served after coming to the Central Texas Conference were Thurber, Rising Star, Iredell,



Ranger, Moody, Italy, Whitney, Seventh Street in Temple, Hubbard, Hamilton, Bartlett, Cleburne, Bangs, Malone, Venus, Joshua, Eliasville and Graford. His health failing, he took the retired relation in 1948.

On April 8, 1906, Bro. Wisdom married Miss Adeline Conkling of Dallas, Texas and thus entered into a beautiful home life. In example and service, they have walked together, rendering a blessed service in the church and community life where they were assigned. It was my privilege to be associated with this fine family for forty-five years in the Central Texas Conference.

After retirement, he came to Dallas where he had kin people and where he started his ministerial career. He made Elmwood Methodist Church his church home, where Sister Wisdom took an active part in the woman's work of the church and Brother Wisdom was active in the service and work of the church as far as his strength permitted. In his quiet and unintrusive way, and without whine or complaint, Brother Wisdom won the deepest affection of the church.

When this writer moved to Dallas, he and his wife made this same church their home, joined the same Sunday school class and later became teacher of the class. We watched the faithful attendance of Brother Wisdom, his deep interest in the class and the entire work of the church, often coming when he was hardly able. In the last few weeks of his life, when his family knew he was not able to go, he wanted to go, anxious to render any service he could.

Brother Wisdom and wife were very greatly appreciated and beloved by Elmwood Methodist Church and so his funeral was held in this church, the service being led by Rev. Fitzhugh Talbot, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. W. J. Hearon, Rev. J. T. Gardner and Brother Wisdom's nephew, James Higginbotham. The pall bearers were his nephews. The principal funeral address was made by Rev. J. T. Gardner, a long time special friend. Brother Gardner's words were beautiful and delightful, in keeping with the character and life of our departed friend, which brought hope and blessing to all who heard. He was buried in Grove Hill Memorial Park, Dallas, Texas.

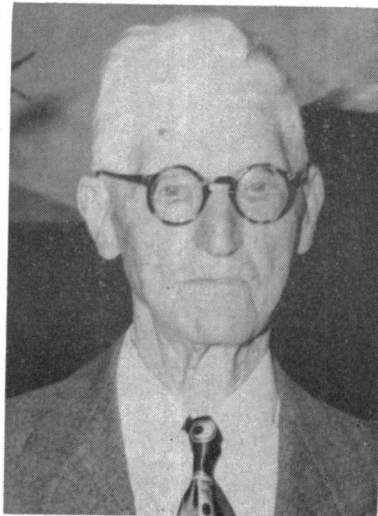

JOHN W. A. WITT

John William August Witt was born September 1, 1865 in Mecklenburg, Germany. He was baptized in the Lutheran faith and confirmed at the age of fourteen. When sixteen years old he went to Hamburg, where he became acquainted with the Methodist Episcopal Church. After a year he was converted, united with the church, and like John Wesley felt his heart strangely warmed, and felt the call to preach.

A year after his conversion he was appointed superintendent of one of Hamburg's four Methodist Sunday Schools. At the age of twenty-two he emigrated to America, landing in New York on a Sunday in 1887. That same evening he attended services in the Fortieth Street Methodist Church, where a guest minister from Texas, by name William Pfaffle, preached the sermon. A few days



later Mr. Witt had an interview with the Texas minister, who recommended that he go to Texas and there enter Blinn Memorial College at Brenham and prepare for the ministry. Brother Witt took the advice and took a steamboat to Galveston and then overland to Brenham.

Rev. Carl Urbantke was president of the college, and received the young student from Germany who had his Quarterly Conference recommendation from Hamburg, and a letter of introduction from Rev. Pfaffle.

After three years Brother Witt was given his first appointment—Gonzales and Manthalia. He was then twenty-five years old. On February 7, 1891 he was married to Dora Einfeld and to this marriage five of his children were born—Helen, Ida, Willie F. and Herman A. His wife died May 30, 1902.

His second marriage was to Emma Wehring of Perry on June 4, 1903. Of this union four children were born—Agnes, Esther, Erna and Milton.

During his ministry Brother Witt served faithfully the following charges: Gonzales and Manthalia, Phillipsburg, Bracken and Wetmore, Guadalupe Valley, Industry, Riesel and Mart, Bracken, Shertz and Wetmore, for the second time Gonzales, Mason and Art, and Meier's Settlement. He became ill and had to retire. This was in the fall of 1928. He moved to his own home in Riesel.

His health improved and for two years he supplied the Moody-Leon Charge under the superintendency of Rev. C. F. Bohmfalk of the San Antonio District. After the Conference of 1935 the Witts moved back to their home in Riesel.

In 1948 they moved to Fredericksburg in order to be near some of their children. Their home was at 511 Cora St. Because of the infirmities of old age special care was needed during his last year or more, and the couple moved to the Moellendorf Rest Home, where Brother Witt passed away on April 24, 1956. The funeral service, attended by many ministers of the Southwest Texas Conference, and by Rev. R. R. Willingham and Rev. H. M. Hopkins, from his own Conference, was conducted by the pastor of Edison Street Methodist Church of Fredericksburg, the Rev. George Ricker.

Surviving Brother Witt are his widow, Mrs. Emma Witt, of Fredericksburg, five daughters and four sons: Mrs. F. H. Boehme of Waco, Mrs. C. A. Boehme of Orange, Mrs. P. C. William of Marble Falls, Mrs. S. M. Loeffler of Sonora, and Mrs. T. J. Neffendorf of Fredericksburg; W. F. Witt of Gonzales, Herman A. Witt of Wichita Falls, and Milton P. Witt of Eagle Pass. There are also twenty-three grandchildren and forty-one great-grandchildren.

X—MISCELLANEOUS**STANDING RULES**

1. There shall be an Administrative Council to formulate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference. The Administrative Council shall be composed as follows: The Cabinet, the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Chairman and one other member of each Conference board and commission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each district to be nominated by the Cabinet, the President of the Conference Women's organization and the Conference Promotional Secretary, the President of the Conference Youth organization and one other young person, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missions, the Chairmen of all standing Committees, the Conference Chairman of the Texas College Association, and such other members as may be nominated by the Executive Committee. All paid employees of the Conference and its agencies shall have the privilege of the floor but without vote.

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Administrative Council to be composed as follows: the three officers of the Council, the Chairman of the Cabinet, the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Conference Lay Leader, and the President of the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service.

2. The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries of the clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

3. The Conference Treasurer, and other Treasurers of special funds, upon receipt of any money from a pastoral charge, shall mail promptly to the pastor of that charge a voucher-receipt, showing the date, amount received, account credited, and how to be reported to annual conference. The pastor shall enclose these voucher-receipts with his annual conference report, as verification for items reported in Table II. Duplicate voucher-receipts shall be mailed monthly to the District Superintendent.

4. The statistics of the Annual Conference shall be based upon the reports in the hands of the Statistician on the second day prior to the opening of the Annual Conference.

5. The annual report of the Conference Treasurer shall be based on the funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer on the second day prior to the opening of the Annual Conference.

6. Each District Superintendent, in reporting upon the work of his District, shall indicate if any Church in the District has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, or benevolences for the year just closing, stating the name of the Church and the amount borrowed.

7. No member of any Board, Commission, or Committee shall be eligible for membership thereon longer than eight consecutive years and shall not become eligible again for such membership until one full conference year has passed. The membership of quadrennial boards and commissions shall be divided by the board or commission into two groups, one group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the present quadrennium, and the second group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the succeeding quadrennium.

8. The District Superintendents, at the beginning of the quadrennium, shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no member of the Conference shall be nominated on more than one Board, Commission or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Conference, except where otherwise provided by the Discipline.

This rule is not applicable to the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation.

Vacancies on all such Boards, Commissions and Committees occurring thereafter, shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference. Nevertheless, no nominations shall be made which would allow a member to be on more than one Board, Commission or Committee which must meet during the session of the Conference.

9. No person shall be a member of a Conference Board, if he is in the salaried employ of that Board, or of an institution which derives financial support from said Board; or appointed a Trustee of such institution.

10. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees, to take effect at the opening of the ensuing session, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission or Committee.

11. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

12. All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

13. All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary BEFORE they are presented to the Conference.

14. The apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be based on the total money raised (item 75 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness (item 42 in Report to Annual Conference) and less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 43 in the Report to Annual Conference.) It shall be the duty of the World Service and Finance Commission to compute the apportionment annually and to furnish the table of apportionments to the Districts. It is suggested that the same method of apportioning be considered in apportioning the District allocation to the various charges of the District.

15. Annually, each Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline.

16. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall not be authorized to offer the Annual Conference any new or special apportionment to be levied upon the Churches, unless such new or special apportionment shall comply with the following requirements: First, it must be for an object or enterprise either owned by The Methodist Church or one over which this Conference has full and sole control. Second, it must provide for the perfect execution of the funds so entrusted to the Conference and for a report at the next Annual Conference showing in detail that the trust has been executed and how.

17. The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

18. It shall be the duty of the Conference Treasurer to set aside out of the funds collected for Conference Work an amount sufficient to meet the ex-

pense of printing the Minutes, the Treasurer's band, and the necessary expense of the Conference Secretary.

19. All bonds required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

20. The Conference Committee on Entertainment, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of Retired Ministers. Per diem allowances shall be granted to ministers and lay delegates from charges assessing salaries of not over \$1,500, except where the committee shall recommend and the Conference approve, a higher figure.

21. All churches not coming under the above rule will be expected to defray the expenses of their minister and delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

22. The District Conference shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate.

23. The Bishop and his Cabinet shall nominate to the Annual Conference next preceeding the meeting of the General Conference a Conference Secretary to be elected by the Conference for the Quadrennium. Whenever there is to be a change in Secretary, the one newly elected shall assume his official duties at the session following General Conference.

24. There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

25. It shall require a two-thirds vote to suspend any of these rules.
