III DAILY PROCEEDINGS

OPENING SESSION - TUESDAY MORNING, JUNE 7, 1960

Opening Worship—The Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church met in the ninety-fifth session (the fifty-first since the division from the old Northwest Texas Conference, and the twenty-second since unification) at the First Methodist Church in Fort Worth, Texas at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday morning June 7, 1960, Bishop William C. Martin, presiding.

Hymn No. 2, "Come, Thou Almighty King," was sung and Bishop Martin led the Conference in the Apostle's Creed. Dean Eugene B. Hawk led the opening prayer.

Roll Call—J. D. F. Williams gave instruction to the delegates and visitors concerning registration.

Bishop Martin told the Conference that he had just been informed of the death of J. U. McAfee.

Hayden Edwards, Secretary of the cabinet, nominated Nick H. Kupferle, Jr. to replace J. D. F. Williams as the Conference Secretary. He was elected.

Nick H. Kupferle nominated the following secretarial staff: Minutes, B. Thomas Tribble and Morgan Garrett; Roll, Roy F. Johnson; Reports, John Dowd; Disciplinary Questions, R. A. Brooks, Jr.; Press, Wm. L. Hankla; Quadrennial Organization, H. F. Meier, Jr. They were elected.

Glenn C. Bowman was nominated and elected Conference Statistician, after which he made the following nominations for assistant statisticians: Milton Slayden, Nolan M. Fisher, S. A. Baker, Ernest D. Piott, Edward H. Otwell, C. A. Mangham, Ray Elliott, W. L. Milner, and George Lunday. They were elected.

Welcome—Gaston Foote, host pastor, welcomed the Conference.

The lower floor of the sanctuary was designated as the bar of the Conference, and the printed program was accepted as official.

Nominations—Hayden Edwards, Secretary of the Cabinet, nominated the Commissions and Committees. They were confirmed. (See Boards, etc.)

Personal Privilege—Bishop Martin recognized J. W. W. Shuler who will be celebrating his one hundredth birthday on October 29, 1960.

Courtesies and Agenda—Hubert C. Smith, chairman of the Committee on Courtesies and Agenda, introduced the following visitors to the Conference.

C. L. Brewster, W. E. Fisher, Uel D. Crosby, and Walter Towner.

Conference Entertainment—B. L. McCord moved the adoption of the Report from the Committee on Conference Entertainment. The report was adopted. (See Reports)

Announcements—Bishop Martin reminded the Conference that the afternoon session would convene promptly at 2:00 o'clock.

Oron Stephens made a motion that the District Superintendents have the authority to inform Conference Secretary concerning the men who had to return to their churches for funerals, etc. The motion was adopted.

Bishop Martin made reference to the three morning devotionals to be held at 8:30 a.m.

Holy Communion—Bishop Martin gave general instructions for the serving of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Hymn No. 148. "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross," was sung. Bishop Martin, assisted by the District Superintendents and other Elders, led in the service of Holy Communion.

Memorial Service—C. C. Sessions presided and Hymn No. 213, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee," was sung. The scripture lesson was read by Conrad Himmel. The prayer was led by D. F. Renshaw, Jr.

Nick H. Kupferle, Conference Secretary, read the names of those who had died during the Conference year, and members of the Conference stood in silent tribute.

"Still, Still With Thee," was sung as a solo by M. Conrad Himmel.

C. C. Sessions gave the memorial address.

Adjournment—Bishop Martin pronounced the benediction.

SECOND SESSION—TUESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 7, 1960

Opening—The Hymn No. 238, "Blessed Assurance," was sung.

Floyd Boulware led the Conference in prayer.

Nominations—Hayden Edwards, Secretary of the Cabinet, presented the nominations for clerical and lay members of the Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees. They were elected. (See Boards, etc.)

Survey Of The Quadrennial Emphasis—H. Brawn Loyd spoke of the importance of evangelism to the local church and the individual pastor, and the necessity of leadership from the local pastor in the interpretations of the quadrennial program to the local congregation.

Thomas B. Granger, Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, spoke on "Holy Habits Through Bible Study."

The Conference was divided into three groups. Each group was addressed in turn by Dr. Edwin A. Briggs on the subject of Stewardship, J. B. Holt on the subject of Recruitment for the ministry, and Walter Towner on the subject of organizing new Church Schools.

The District Superintendents in charge of each of the groups dismissed the groups with prayer.

THIRD SESSION—WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 8, 1960

Courtesies and Agenda—Hubert Smith introduced the following visitors to the Conference: J. C. Mann, William C. Finch, and J. C. Hearn.

Composite Report—J. W. Whitefield read the Composite Report of the District Superintendents. (See Reports)

Administrative Council—Brown Loyd presented Report No. 1 of the Administrative Council.

C. C. Sessions presented Report No. 2 of the Administrative Council.

The entire Report of the Administrative Council was adopted. (See Reports)

Board of Education—Carroll H. Thompson, Chairman of the Conference Board of Education, directed the report of the Board of Education.

Law Sone, President of Texas Wesleyan College, reported for the Commission on Higher Education.

William C. Finch, President of Southwestern University, spoke on behalf of the five Methodist Colleges in Texas.

Roy Farrow, Executive Secretary of the Texas Methodist College Association, handed out printed reports to those attending the Conference, and spoke to the Report of the Commission on Higher Education. W. W. Dees, Brownwood, also spoke.

Bob Breihan, State Director of the Texas Methodist Student Movement, reported on the work of Wesley Foundations and introduced the Wesley Foundation Directors who were present.

D. L. McCree moved the adoption of the plan of the Texas Methodist College Association for raising thirty two million dollars in capital funds. The motion carried.

Bishop Martin spoke concerning the needs of our Methodist Colleges and Universities.

Thomas B. Granger, Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, spoke of the work of his office and introduced the other members of the Conference Education Staff.

Mrs. George M. Greebon, Conference Director of Children's Work, reported concerning her work.

VI—REPORTS

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Bishop Martin, Members of the Conference, and fellow Methodists: It is my privilege to give the Composite Report which is a summary of the accomplishments of the Central Texas Conference for the past year. This report was made possible by the effective leadership and help given by our Bishop, the ten District Superintendents, the ministers, and the loyal membership of our churches. It is true that a Composite Report merges all the individual efforts into one whole. It consists of reports from small struggling churches to the largest and richest in the Conference. We are ending the quadrennium that placed special emphasis on the local church and we believe this report shows the fruits of such an emphasis. In reality, it shows not only the work and effort expended by men, but reveals the encouragement and inspiration of a gracious and merciful God. With these things in mind, it is my sincere hope that this report will be of interest to everyone.

In this year of total enlistment, it has been the goal of our churches to reactivate the inactive, also to seek a deeper consecration on the part of ministers and laymen that they might be more effective in winning people to Christ. The results are indeed gratifying as 3,795 came into the church by profession of faith and vows; 5,474 by transfer of membership. Prospects of future growth in our churches are evidenced when we note that 1,247 infants were baptized this year. We rejoice in the fact that 22 were licensed to preach this year and 218 committed themselves to part or full time Christian service. There are 363 Church Schools with an enrollment of 79,421 and an average attendance of 41,850, guaranteeing a healthy spiritual and mental atmosphere for the future. There are 350 MYF and MIF groups with a membership of 8,773 and an average attendance of 4,949. The total church membership of the Central Texas Conference is 112,439. The average morning attendance has been 39,933, with an average evening attendance of 18,101.

There are 250 Woman's Society of Christian Service groups in the Conference with a membership of 12,453. The Wesleyan Service Guilds number 107 with a membership of 2,280. Add this mighty army of consecrated women to the 159 Methodist Men's Clubs with their 6,236 members and you can see why this great throng of dedicated people can be such a force for good in our Conference.

Laymen's Day was observed in 352 churches and 229 churches had an every member canvass indicating the efficiency and loyalty of our Methodist laymen. For this, we owe sincere gratitude to our Conference Board of Lay Activities for their leadership.

Vacation schools form a vital part in the work of our church and it is encouraging to know that 238 vacation schools were held during the year with an enrollment of 16,877. There were 191 training schools held with an enrollment of 5,294 showing in a concrete way that our people are interested in a trained staff of workers and teachers. The camping program of the Methodist Church has been a healthy and growing thing with 3,478 attending camps, retreats, and assemblies.

There is renewed interest in our church periodicals with the "Texas Methodist" having 13,582 subscribers and the "Together" magazine having 3,820 subscribers.

The desire for more adequate and attractive places of worship is evidenced in 27 new churches being built at a cost of \$1,676,234.00. There were 159 churches repaired during the year at a cost of \$221,917. Our people are to be congratulated for providing more comfortable parsonages for ministers and their families, and there were 11 new parsonages built during the year at a cost of \$156,083; 113 parsonages were repaired at a cost of \$58,836.00. The Central Texas

Conference has paid \$1,000,816.00 on debt retirement this year. It is interesting to note that two new churches were organized during the year and four were relocated.

This report would not be complete if we did not mention the unselfish work and devotion of our chaplains and their families serving in our Armed Forces throughout the world. The brevity of this report will not permit us to tell of the individual activities of each man, but we trust you will follow them with your prayers and good will wherever they serve.

There is another important group closer home who we may have tendency to forget and these are the dedicated men and women who are serving in our colleges and universities and in our conference educational program. The Conference as a whole wishes to thank them for their leadership in training and guiding our youth.

Our Conference has reason to be proud of the record we have made in giving to the various worthy causes here and abroad. We have contributed \$234,316.00 to World Service and Conference Benevolences. In the program of Advance Specials, the churches have contributed \$107,210.00. Another significant advance locally has been our giving to higher education (\$1.00 per member) which totals \$98,714.00, and Wesley Foundation, (30 cents per member) which totals \$31,470.00. There was \$43,826.00 contributed to our conference special.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

Report No. 2

Resolution of Appreciation and Commendation

WHEREAS certain highly prejudiced and untrue statements have been made against the Administration of Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, in recent months, and

WHEREAS our own Bishop William C. Martin has been singled out and personally abused by certain uninformed or malicious persons, and

WHEREAS Doctor Willis M. Tate, President of Southern Methodist University has been falsely accused or maliciously misrepresented for his stand on academic freedom.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Central Texas Methodist Annual Conference, meeting on June 8, 1960 at First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas go on records as follows:

I. That we re-assure our chief-pastor and episcopal leader, Bishop William C. Martin of our growing appreciation of his courage and devotion to duty in the face of insults by very unprincipled, uninformed and confused people. We note with great pride and appreciation the high honor that has come to Bishop Martin in being chosen by the Council of Bishops of The Methodist Church to bring the Episcopal Address of the recent session of the General Conference meeting in Denver, Colorado on April 27.

II. That we give a vote of confidence and pledge our wholehearted support to President Willis M. Tate and the administration of Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas.

III. That this resolution be approved by a standing vote and that it become a part of the report of this Conference and that copies of the same be sent to Bishop and Mrs. William C. Martin, President and Mrs. Willis M. Tate, Bishop A. Frank Smith, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Southern Methodist University, to the press and to such other persons that this Conference would deem proper.

IV. That the following editorial appearing in the evening edition of the Fort Worth Star Telegram of June 2 be reprinted in the Conference Journal in recognition of the outstanding leadership of Bishop Martin.

A World Christian

We regard it a privilege to join those paying tribute to Bishop William C. Martin as he enters the last four years of his leadership of the 111-County Dallas-Fort Worth Area of the Methodist Church. His zeal, his boundless energy and his wise and courageous conduct in every church office he has occupied have earned him the devotion of the Methodist ministry and laity and the admiration and respect of Christians of every denomination.

Those who have recognized the extent and importance of Bishop Martin's influence in America and around the globe have at times described him as a "world Christian." The scope and nature of his endeavors clearly justify such a description. He has labored tirelessly for interdenominational co-operation on a local, state, national and worldwide level in the advancement of the faith and the betterment of mankind. In the face of often bitter opposition he has clung to his conviction that there should be no conflict between membership in a particular church and in "the universal church, which is the body of Christ."

Bishop Martin's concern for the world has not, however, resulted in neglect of matters close at hand. He has kept closely abreast of the needs and problems of his denomination, and Christians in general, at home. As minister and pastor to 800 Methodist ministers in his area, he has won the hearts of the Methodist clergy by providing a constant example of physical vigor and religious consecration.

Perhaps the secret of Bishop Martin's dynamism as a Christian and a leader of Christians lies not in his world view but in his recognition of the importance of individuals. This, it seems to us, he has spelled out in two statements. One, made in 1954, was that Americans must recapture "the faith of our fathers" if the world is to be led to peace. The other, last January, termed a "deep concern for the spiritual welfare of others" as the key to the establishment of that faith as the foundation for lasting peace.

But his deeds, rather than his words, are the greatest testimony of his faithfulness to his Master's commandment—"as I have loved you . . . ye also love one another."

BROTHERHOOD

Report of Secretary-Treasurer

Many of the people who have been the beneficiaries of the Brotherhood checks this year have been dependent on these checks to take care of their burial expenses. However, the Brotherhood must not be thought of as a burial insurance policy. It is a group of ministers and their wives and widows banded together to express our love and concern to our fellow ministers and their families when death enters their homes. For this reason we urge all ministerial members of this conference and their wives to become participants in the Brotherhood.

During this conference year there were fifteen deaths in our ministerial families. Three calls in the 1958-59 conference year were also settled in this conference year. Each of the beneficiaries of those who died in this conference year received at least \$450.00 from the Brotherhood.

We have 888 possible participants in the Brotherhood. Of the 888 possible participants 525 participated in one or more of the Brotherhood calls. Three hundred and sixty six participated in all of the calls. Three hundred and sixty three did not participate in any of the calls.

At the 1959 Annual Conference our Brotherhood was granted a \$1,000.00 subsidy and with it we hope to pay each beneficiary \$500.00 in this coming year.

One of the questions facing our Brotherhood at the present time is, "What is our obligation to those who refuse to contribute to the Brotherhood?" In an effort to remedy the situation, the officers and directors have proposed an addition to the Constitution whereby those who refuse to participate in the Brotherhood calls over a period of two calendar years shall only receive one half the benefits of the Brotherhood.

One of the long time members of the Brotherhood, Dr. P. E. Riley, said, "I never saw a Methodist preacher in my life upon whose grave I would not put a flower. This dollar is my flower." We sincerely hope that more of the members of this conference will begin to feel this way about their fellow ministers and their wives and widows and become a part of the Brotherhood.

Proposed Constitutional Change of the Brotherhood of The Central Texas Conference

The officers and directors of the Brotherhood propose the following addition to Article VI, "Benefits,"

Provided, further, that if a member makes no payment for two calendar years benefits shall be one half the amount agreed upon annually by the officers and directors of the conference Brotherhood, the other one half shall be placed in the Reserve Fund and that this provision be retroactive to begin June 1, 1959.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Today, it seems, it is more than ever a matter of vital concern that The Methodist Church encourage its most capable youth to consider the choice of a church career. It is also of the greatest importance, since we believe that every vocation taken up should be Christian, that the church help all young people in their interpretation of their vocational choice, preparation and practice in terms of Christian leadership, approval, and service.

At the national level, our commission is named the Interboard Commission of Christian Vocations. Its genesis lay in the need of participating boards to enlist personnel to work throughout the church. The need today is greater than when the commission was instituted by our church.

The next decade, we are told, is to be a decade of Dynamic Discipleship in our church. In order to reach the need of replacements and meet the need for workers in our expanding national and world-wide population increases, Methodism desperately needs more young men and women who are dedicated and thoroughly trained for the challenging world about them that above all needs the Christ and the Christian Way of Life.

This need of recruitment is too vast a task for any one agency. It is a

church-wide task. The understanding of its urgency must filter down in Christian homes and the local church. We believe God has a will for every life, and further, that the individual finds only in that will complete fulfillment of his or her happiness and capabilities.

That guidance might be given for the next quadrennium, a committee has been appointed to study a possible program that will best fit our needs.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Schools and Colleges Committee

The Board of Education submits its report for 1959-1960:

Because The Methodist Church has long recognized the importance of trained Christian leadership, our educational institutions are receiving much more attention at the hands of the Church than has been formerly the case. There are effective programs of expansion of properties on the campuses of all the educational institutions within the bounds of our Conference. The effective work of the Texas Methodist College Association has not only brought the needs of our schools to the attention of Methodists throughout the area, but it has made all of us as individual Methodists feel we are participants in the total program of higher education in our church.

By Conference action we of the Central Texas Conference are committed to the opportunity of raising a dollar per member for our colleges and universities. While many of our churches are regularly meeting this obligation, the average for all church members in our Conference is around 80 cents per member. We urge every district superintendent and minister to encourage every official board in the church to see that this dollar per member item is paid each year to give support which these institutions desperately need.

The standard of giving to our Wesley Foundations is 30 cents per member. This, too, is a sacred trust for all of our churches. It is the effort of the local church to follow its students with religious influence during their college days. We must not forget that a much larger percentage of our young people are on college campuses not operated by our church; thus the importance of the Wesley Foundation cannot be exaggerated.

Southern Methodist University has an enrollment of around 6,000 students with 625 preparing for full-time Christian service. Southwestern University has an enrollment of 658 students with 99 preparing for a full-time Christian vocation. Texas Wesleyan College has an enrollment of over 1,200, of whom 106 are preparing for full-time Christian service. These figures indicate the healthy growth of all educational institutions.

Your Board of Education, through its Committee for Schools and Colleges, has made a serious study of the movement known as the "Committee for Ecumenical Campus Christian Life in Texas, Inc." Since it provides an effective means of developing the ecumenical and Christian spirit on our campuses and would be a helpful vehicle for improving the physical properties of the various Wesley Foundations, we recommend that the Central Texas Conference approve the plan in accordance with the approval granted by the other Annual Conferences in the state of Texas.

The recommendations for the Boards of Trustees are as follow:

Interconference Board of Trustees, Texas Methodist Student Movement: Central Texas Conference Representatives: W. M. Greenwaldt; Dr. Harold Burman Member at large: Jackson C. Oglesby; Student Member: to be elected.

Local Church Committee

A. Broadly Connectional:

The Methodist Church has an effective plan of organization for the program of Christian education, which links together the work in this field on the General, Jurisdictional, Annual Conference, District and Local Church levels. We recommend that the Commission on Education of each local church seek to familiarize the members with the overall program. If questions remain after available materials are exhausted, direct contact with the conference staff is urged. The members of the staff are informed and anxious to render assistance. We urge participation of local church representatives of all age groups in activities on all the above levels.

B. District Connectional:

In each district a Christian Education Staff is charged with the responsibility of planning and directing the program of Christian education within the district. This staff consists of the district superintendent, a director of general church school work, a director of adult work, a director of youth work, a director of children's work, the district secretary of youth and the district secretary of children's work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the district and sub-district president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship and corresponding officers of other district age group organizations. In district, subdistrict and local church Christian Worker's Schools and Workshops opportunities for leadership training will be given. Consultation with the Conference Staff in setting district program is urged.

C. The Local Congregation:

In each local church the oversight of the program of Christian education is committed to the Commission on Education. At the organizational meeting or soon thereafter, the Chairman will want to lead his commission in a careful and detailed study of its functions and duties as listed in Paragraph 233 of the Discipline. Since Christian education is a channel for effective implementation of all the emphases of the Church, we recommend that the Commission on Education work and cooperate very closely with the other commissions.

The Christian education program should include training opportunities for all age groups beyond the Sunday morning sessions, such as a two-weeks Vacation Church School, A Christian Adventure Week for intermediates, a Youth Activities Week, Day Camps, Junior Missionary Units, Membership Classes, Methodist Youth Fellowships, Young Adult Fellowships, Adult Bible Studies, Missionary Studies, Family Life Studies, Forums, and Choirs.

Church School Rally Day is a special time for lifting up the significance of Christian education. We recommend its well planned observance. With today's increasing costs there is the need for additional funds for district and conference staff expense provided by the Rally Day Offering. Therefore, we urge each local church to make every effort to attain the five cents per church member minimum goal for this offering.

Camping Committee

We are glad to report growing interest and attendance at Glen Lake and Rainbow Camps. The numbers at each camp exceeds the years of the past. The total attendance at all camps during the past twelve months is beyond 5,200. Those who come to our camps share in some great experiences in the growth and development of the Christian life. Many of our youth and young people have re-dedicated themselves to Christ and the church as they came to the altar.

Under the leadership of the camp directors, many have come to new meaning in life as found in Christ Jesus. We feel this is worth all the efforts and money invested in our camps.

Our new Rainbow Camp offers a type of camping which is enjoyed by great numbers of youth. As a rustic camp it is not designed for large numbers at any given time, but is suited to smaller groups. A number of young adults have taken training in conducting such camps as our future leaders in this field. We are going along carefully in this new type camping until such time as we have the program well planned. Some improvements have been made in equipment for this camp and more is being provided as needed. We are building a headquarters building for the general meeting place for many of the activities. This building will be completed for this summer.

The Board of Education has contracted for the Shaw property adjacent to Glen Lake, which will serve as additional room for large gatherings and to protect us from an undesirable element which has been there at times in the past.

Since our swimming pool will not be opened this year, due to unsanitary conditions, and the request of the state and local health departments, we have made temporary arrangements for the use of a commercial pool for this summer on a very limited basis.

In view of the foregoing conditions, we face the necessity of building and equipping a new pool as soon as possible. We want to maintain the highest standards for Glen Lake and make it one of the best in this area. If we are to attract the boys and girls and youth to our camps in increased numbers, it is imperative that we provide the facilities for swimming and other recreation for their health and enjoyment.

The Board of Education has appointed a Swimming Pool Committee to prepare preliminary plans and the estimated cost for a pool which will meet the needs of Glen Lake Camp for years to come. This committee will present a report to you of their study and the recommendations concerning the important project. The Central Texas Conference will be asked to provide funds for the pool and to make necessary improvements and repairs.

We commend the fine work being done by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Voss in supervising the camps and the courteous manner in relation to all campers and visitors. Glen Lake is loved by all who have contact with it. May we continue to tell people of our Conference camping program.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

The theme of the evangelistic outreach of our conference this year was in cooperation with our Area program "Find Them — Win Them — Lead Them — Keep Them." This was a program to stimulate the spiritual thinking of every church with a direct goal of not only finding and winning people to Christ but educating them to their fullest capabilities so they would not be lost to the use of the church. When the final results are known this promises to be one of the greatest years in the outreach of the Christian church. This program originated in the creative mind of our own Bishop William C. Martin and is a program whose final results cannot be tabulated in one year, but will be like the swelling of the sea, reach greater momentum the farther it goes.

Part of the training which was given to those in positions of leadership in the field of evangelism was the sending of the District Secretaries and Conference Board Officers to the Council of Evangelism which met in Los Angeles, California from October 14-20. These men sat in workshops with other evangelistic leaders from across the nation. After moments of inspiration they were assigned to local churches to put into practice the principals of winning people to Christ. Southern California and Arizona will long remember the concern of The Methodist Church for those who are outside the fold of God.

The next few years will be fruitful for the growth of The Methodist Church if we are diligent in the spread of the gospel. Human souls are hungry for the truth in a world that can only offer a secularistic base for society. They look to the church for the answer and the church dare not fail. To arouse our people to the great possibilities we recommend cooperation and attendance at the special session of the annual conference which will be held on September 27. Since the afternoon is scheduled for the **Convocation on Evangelism** we recommend the following tentative program:

It is recommended that Charles Whittle serve as Director of the Enlistment Mission for our Conference.

During the Christmas holidays of 1958 a Christmas Conference was held at Glen Lake to train young men in the practical aspects of evangelism. The results were so far reaching it was felt great benefit would come from another conference during the next Christmas season under the leadership of Quay Parmer. This conference is to be for college and seminary students and other young preachers to be chosen by the District Superintendents.

We would especially call to the attention of our fellow ministers to encourage all non resident members to transfer their membership to a church that is close to their residence. We remind them of a form published by the General Board of Evangelism to save time and to expedite this noble cause. A non resident membership adds little either to the person or the church retaining that membership.

We thoroughly appreciate the leadership given to our Area and Conference by Quay Parmer. His concern has been great and his unselfishness real. His help has made much of our work possible this year.

We recommend the same budget for the Conference Year 1961-62 as was approved for 1960-61.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

At the last session of the Annual Conference your Historical Society Committee recommend that the Conference establish a room at Glen Lake for the purpose of housing items of historical value to Methodism in our Conference. We have been informed that at the present, no room is available.

During the year we have approached The First Methodist Church, through its pastor, Dr. Gaston Foote, to provide space for such a Historical Room, and also Mr. Hubert Johnson of the Methodist Home, for similar space. Both are interested in the project and have expressed an interest in working with the Committee. Therefore, we request the Historical Society Committee for 1960-64 to explore these and other possible locations.

We request the Commission on World Service and Finance to include in its 1961-62 Budget an amount of \$500 to be added to that in the present Budget, with which to provide necessary equipment for such a Historical Room.

COMMITTEE ON HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

We are glad to report that our experience with the Ministers Life and Casualty Union in our group hospitalization insurance program has continued most satisfactorily. There have been no complaints of any nature come to the attention of the Committee during the year, while several members have expressed appreciation for the service given by the program.

We note that during the year, without any increase in premium, the disability benefits have been increased. The payments have been lifted from \$100.00 a month to \$150.00 for total disability from ministerial work, and the time limit extended from 15 months to 2 years.

Many ministers of the conference have asked if they can now become members. We have regrettably informed them that no new members are received after the first 90 days of eligibility from the time the plan was started or after they become new members or supply pastors in the conference. We urge all new pastors, conference members and supplies, to enter this Hospitalization Plan immediately upon receipt of the application form, which will be sent them after annual conference. If they do not become members within this first 90 day period they may never again have the opportunity.

We also call attention that members of the group who marry may enroll their wives in the plan without any limitations provided application is sent to the Company within sixty days after marriage.

Ministers who leave our group for any reason, and who continue in full-time religious work, need not lose their insurance. Upon application to the Company, they will be issued insurance on an individual basis.

We are happy that the day when we shall have a Home for Older Persons in operation is approaching in the foreseeable future. We recommend the appointment of M. Howard Knox as Executive Director of Wesleyan Homes.

During the quadrennium there has been a growing closer relationship between the Board of Hospital and Homes and our institutions. From this relationship we are happy to represent them more adequately to the Annual Conference.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES**Report No. 2****Harris Hospital — Annual Report — 1960**

The Board of Trustees and the Administrator respectfully submit a Report of the operations and activities of Harris Hospital for the Fiscal Year ended September 30, 1959. Since eight months have elapsed following the end of our Fiscal Year, the members of the Conference will realize that all of the statistics are based on the 1958-1959 Fiscal Year, but many of the other improvements and developments reported upon have accrued during the Hospital's 1959-1960 year in order to give a current report.

Patient Care Factors

The occupancy for the Fiscal Year, excluding newborns, was 84.7% as compared to 87.5% the previous year.

The lowered occupancy of the Hospital is reflected in a decrease of 6,282 adult patient days and a decrease of 1,427 newborn days reflected in 288 fewer births.

This decrease in Hospital service was not unexpected, for the Trustees and the Administration had foreseen this problem in view of the additional beds which were opened in Fort Worth during the Summer of 1959.

Another influencing factor on lowered occupancy has been the development of smaller hospitals on the fringe areas of Fort Worth and in Arlington. It is expected, however, that the steadily increasing population of the area will change the occupancy trend in the next several years.

The lowered occupancy also is reflected in the 414 fewer surgical procedures done this year as compared with last year. The largest amount of decrease in surgical procedures is found in the minor surgical classification.

9,484 emergency cases were treated and more than 4,500 electro-shock therapy treatments were given to patients.

This lowered occupancy factor is in many ways a healthy condition, for although last year our occupancy was 87.5%, the medical and surgical divisions of the Hospital most of the time were operating at close to 100%. Such a crowded condition, of course, is critical from the standpoint of having flexibility for handling emergencies of any nature.

New Improvements and Construction

1. Student Nurses' Residence Building

On February 15, 1960, the Student Nurses' Residence Building was occupied.

The total cost of this Building, including equipment and landscaping was \$798,518.48. Of this construction cost, the Central Texas Conference has contributed \$200,000.

The old Nurses' Home property on Rosedale Avenue has been placed on the market for sale, and, when sold, the proceeds will be applied to the cost of the new Student Nurses' Residence Building.

2. Hospital Auxiliary Building

The Hospital Auxiliary Building was occupied in October, 1959, and is functioning very efficiently.

The Conference will remember that the capacity of this Building is such that it will be able to supply services to the present Hospital buildings, and to those that can be reasonably expected in the future.

3. Water Well

Concurrent with the construction of the Student Nurses' Residence Building and the Auxiliary Building, a new water well has been completed on the corner of Seventh and Pruitt Street. The water from this well is piped back to a storage tank in the new Auxiliary Building. This well plus the old well will furnish the Hospital with sufficient water to supply our needs. This is particularly important in times of local disaster, for it tends to make the Hospital self sufficient in this respect.

4. Acquisition of Land

During the last Fiscal Year the Hospital has purchased 6,869 square feet of nearby property at a cost of \$19,500. With the purchase and improvement of this property and other property already owned, 109 additional parking spaces will be made available shortly.

5. New Equipment

During the period under consideration, the Trustees have authorized the purchase of \$74,931.03 worth of Movable Equipment, and \$39,622.05 of Fixed Equipment.

6. Airconditioning

The Trustees recently let a contract for 800 Tons of airconditioning equipment, and certain electrical changes in the amount of \$279,628.00. This airconditioning equipment will help to handle the new Student Nurses' Residence, the new Children's Hospital, the new Maternity Hospital and the expanded ancillary facilities.

7. Elevators

The Trustees have also authorized plans and specifications to be prepared for the modernizing of the two existing passenger elevators and the addition of a third one.

This is a much needed and long delayed improvement that all of us who are familiar with the Hospital will recognize.

8. Switchboard

At a cost of approximately \$22,000.00, the Hospital switchboard was relocated on the 10th Floor of the Building, and its capacity was greatly increased.

Future Plan For Expansion

1. Expansion of Ancillary Facilities

Last year it was reported to the Conference that plans were proceeding for the enlargement and relocation of the Operating Room, Surgical Recovery, Laboratory and X-ray Departments. This relocation will occupy the basement area in the wedge in the front of the Hospital, as well as the space under Cannon Street and under the entire property immediately South of the main Hospital building.

Area then will be released in the present building to enlarge the services of Dietory, Central Supply, Phormocy, Business Offices and Library.

It is expected that by the Summer of 1960 the working drawings for this expansion will be completed. The addition of these facilities is presently estimated to cost in excess of \$2,900,00.

2. Maternity Hospital Building

By the Summer of 1960, the working drawings for a new Maternity Hospital building will be completed. As reported previously, this building will be located immediately South of the main Hospital building, and will be above the Operating Room, Surgical Recovery, Laboratory and X-ray Departments, which were mentioned under "Expansion of Ancillary Services."

This building is presently estimated to cost \$2,200,000.

3. Parking Garage

Because of the congestion around the Hospital, thought is being given to the future construction of a modern multi-storied parking goroge to accommodate at least 400 outomobiles.

Finoncing of Construction

1. Fund-Raising Campaign

It is now possible to report that more than 50% of the fund-raising goal of \$3,077,142 has been reached. There have been very generous local contributions, and one single contribution from the Houston Endowment Inc. in the amount of \$750,000.

2. Grants in Aid

For the purpose of expansion of ancillary facilities, \$750,000 has been received from the Federal Government.

The opplicotìon is now pending for on additional grant for the Moternity Hospital in the amount of \$1,000,000.

If this application is acted upon favorably, and, with funds in hand and anticipated from the fund-raising drive along with the borrowing power given to the Hospital by the Conference, the construction of these facilities will be possible.

Thirtieth Anniversary

The Hospital celebrated its Thirtieth Anniversary on March 1, 1960. An Anniversary Dinner was given in the Hospital for over 125 people, including the Bishop and his Cabinet, Trustees, Medical Board representatives, and Departmental Heads.

Scholarships

Harris Hospital needs more graduate nurses. Our Personnel Director advises the Administrator that today we need fifty (50) R. N.'s to properly staff every area of the nursing service in the Hospital. When we open the proposed Maternity Hospital two years hence, we will need an additional fifty registered nurses. **The best source of nurses is to train them.** It requires four years to train a nurse. We are having many inquiries from young women desiring to enroll in our College of Nursing, but in almost every application is the request for financial assistance in the way of scholarships.

During the past four years, we have developed a fairly good program of student scholarships. Adult Sunday School classes and individuals have provided funds to help our students, but the amount is very inadequate to meet the demands made upon the Hospital. We are now in the process of reaching more church groups and individuals.

The cost of nursing training has sky-rocketed like everything else. Harris Hospital now annually contributes to the College of Nursing budget the sum of \$14,000 plus the expense of maintaining the Nurses Residence just recently completed. For the Hospital to provide additional funds for the educational and clinical training of nurses would mean to place this expense upon the patients of the Hospital who are sick and have to meet a hospital bill of their own. We do not feel that such a procedure would be fair. We need to seek assistance elsewhere.

Harris Hospital is not only engaged in the teaching of nurses, but it is engaged in the teaching of other paramedical personnel, such as medical technologists, X-ray technicians and nurse anesthetists. A very large number of these individuals, who are trained for paramedical purposes, including nursing, find their way into hospitals in communities which are located in the Central Texas Conference.

Therefore, The Board of Trustees of Harris Hospital respectfully requests that the Central Texas Conference place in its annual budget, for the use by the Hospital in the form of student scholarships for the training of nurses and other paramedical students, the sum of \$6,000 (effective in the 1961-62 Budget).

Nominations and Appointments

Since the Board of Trustees does not have their Annual Meeting until April 27, 1960, it will be necessary to submit a Supplementary Report of nominations for Board members for the coming year.

The Board of Trustees requests the Bishop and his Cabinet to appoint Reverend James B. Ansley as Commissioner-Chaplain for the coming year.

The Board of Trustees, the Medical Staff and the personnel of Harris Hospital have worked long hours to improve the care of the patient in the present operation, and have worked equally long to plan as adequately as possible for the future. Without the continued support of the ministers and laymen of the Central Texas Conference, these efforts cannot come to the expected successful conclusion.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES**Report No. 5****Commissioner-Chaplain, Harris Hospital****The Chaplaincy**

It has been my privilege to serve as Chaplain of Harris Hospital since my appointment at the 1959 session of the Central Texas Annual Conference. The 18 months prior to that appointment, I served as Associate Chaplain under Chaplain W. W. Ward. The months of work with Chaplain Ward were rich in terms of guidance, information and Christian inspiration. I prayerfully hope my labors at Harris Hospital shall, at least in part, measure up to his dreams, his tireless labors and his complete dedication. All these are so clearly evidenced by the footprint of human concern and love that he has made throughout our healing institution.

The work of Chaplain presents a unique challenge.

The service that he renders is limited only by time and the dedication of the Chaplain. We feel that our first concern should be for those who are critically ill, all pre-operative patients and their families. It is extremely difficult for a patient to accept illness until the family can accept it, therefore, a very important part of our work is with families of patients. We see all out-of-town patients referred to us by their doctor. Because of my training in the pastoral ministry and my training at The Menninger Foundation, part of my time is allotted to counseling with personnel in our Hospital.

It has been my privilege to fill many pulpits throughout the Conference. I hope such will continue to be true in the future as the need arises.

We are thrilled with the expansion program that is before us. The large and more accessible Chapel with an electric organ and intercommunication system will make it possible for each patient to tune in our Chapel service at will. This will greatly increase the effectiveness of our ministry.

Golden Cross Service

Our Golden Cross program is not charity but the arm of Christian concern of persons who **have** to make possible the ministry of healing to those who **have not**. The report below will actually give the measure of our Christian concern for those who are less fortunate than we.

The individual church and pastor alone can determine whether their gift to this important service is adequate.

This report covers the period of June 1, 1959 through May 31, 1960.

At the close of May 31st, the cost of 43 church-referred patients amounted to \$19,647.10. The total amount received from the churches of our Conference for the some period of time amounted to \$13,467.28, leaving a net cost for church-referred patients to the Hospital \$6,179.82 beyond that which the churches have contributed.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES**Report No. 7****Texas Mission Home and Training School****San Antonio, Texas**

The Texas Mission Home is completing its sixty-fifth consecutive year of operation, and during this Conference Year has rendered it's largest volume of individualized service to unwed mothers and their babies. The Board of Trustees, the Administrator and the Staff join in thanking the Methodists of Texas for their increasing support of this agency of redemption.

During these first eleven months of this 1959-60 Conference Year, we have admitted the same number of girls as during last Conference Year but our Home has been full most of the year and thus our days-of-resident-care has been much higher this year than last. Approximately 75% of our residents come from Texas and the balance from other states. They usually stay in the Home about four

months. This year a much larger number of our residents have been Methodist—approximately 40% as compared to only 27.5% last year and this is likely to continue as our Home becomes better known. Only about 7% of our residents this year have been Catholic. Our residents are younger this year as compared to previous years.

Our agency has also placed a total of 106 babies in choice Christian homes, 96.3% of which have been Methodist. Only 4 non-Methodist homes have been used during this eleven month period and three of these were Catholic. The 102 babies were shared Conference-wise as follows: Central-16; North-16; Northwest-14; Rio Grande-2; Southwest-29; and Texas-25.

Because the special brochure on the Home "This, Too, is Our Business" is costly to produce, we are asking every Pastor to use these on a very selective basis—perhaps a copy for each member of your "official family." We want to continue to help in every way we can to develop larger interest and support within each congregation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We respectfully request that the Conference act favorably upon the following recommendations:

FIRST: That Sunday, September 25, 1960 be designated as the SPECIAL DAY for each church in the Central Texas Conference to receive an offering for the Texas Mission Home. If a Church has placed the support of the HOME in its budget, we earnestly request that the Pastor make a statement to his congregation on the above date, explaining the services rendered by the HOME and also explain how the church supports the HOME;

SECOND: Because the unmarried mother is a frightened, confused and emotionally upset young woman, seeking desperately for an answer to her problems of medical care, secrecy and a good plan for her baby, she often turns to unscrupulous persons. A careful understanding of the policies of this HOME will enable any Pastor to be of great help to such girls and their families in such emergencies. The Local Church Key Woman of the Conference Woman's Auxiliary of the HOME can be an invaluable aid to her Pastor in helping to create concern and understanding of this vital program of Christian restoration. If a Key Woman has not already been selected in your church, we urge that this be done so that we can help her to understand how she can help you.

THIRD: We request that the Central Texas Conference re-elect The Rev. Hayden Edwards and Mr. "Mel" Faulk as Trustees of the HOME for the next year, and that approval be made of the following persons as Trustees at large as provided by the Charter of the HOME, each to be elected for one year: The Rev. H. H. Hollowell, Mr. Clarke Core, Mrs. S. J. Rieger, Mrs. O. P. Schnabel, and Mr. Llayd Knowlton.

We further request that The Rev. Ervin M. Gathings be elected as the Conference Commissioner for the Texas Mission Home and Training School for the ensuing Conference Year.

Report of Wesleyan Homes, Inc.

Gathering momentum in the Nation concerning services of older people has been reflected in every Church undertaking where the older constituent is concerned. This is reflected in the local church program of activities and services.

It is reflected in proposals before National and State legislatures. Service clubs have heeded the challenge facing communities to gear their activities to the needs of an aging population. At the County and State level, studies are now being made for the White House Conference on Aging for January, 1961. In view of all of this, it would be strange indeed if the Methodist Church did not take note, and assume its place of leadership for the benefit of older people.

We are indebted to the Churches, the ministers and laymen, the Bishop and his Cabinet, for leadership and encouragement that has enabled us to proceed to a point where the first Home for the Aged in the Central Texas Conference is about to become a reality. In March, we revealed to the Board of Hospitals and Homes and to the Administrative Council, a plan for a modified and selective program of solicitation which we felt would yield \$100,000 and thus enable the Corporation to proceed with final plans of construction. Although it has been a physical impossibility to carry this challenge to every area of the Conference, the results thus far show almost \$79,000 accounted for, and specific plans laid for intensive work in those sections not already touched. This solicitation to take place within six weeks after the Annual Conference.

With this encouragement, we feel secure now in ordering the architects to prepare plans for distribution to bidders, and we feel that within forty-five days, we can be ready for the opening of bids. We had hoped to be able by this session of Annual Conference to announce the date of ground breaking, but obviously this would be premature. We trust that such date can shortly be announced and that it can be made to coincide with other Methodist functions in a way that will create a healthy and optimistic atmosphere as the first spade full of dirt is turned for a structure which will be home to 150 people.

After extensive study of operations of homes across the country, we have projected a tentative operating budget which will enable us to render a high level of service and meet the obligations of debt retirement.

Concerning finances, we have furnished the necessary certified audit of fiscal affairs to the proper Conference authorities. The Administrative Budget adopted for the current year is the same as last year, as follows:

We request the Conference to again approve Mother's Day as a special observance with an offering in the Churches for Wesleyan Homes, Inc. We express appreciation of the Board to all the Churches who assisted us by taking this special offering and trust that others will find a place in their Church calendar to give emphasis to this unique service.

We request authority to apply for an FHA Loan to cover construction costs at a figure not to exceed \$1,250,000.

We pledge our continued devotion to this neglected cause in our Conference and firmly believe that our activities will merit your confidence and will result in a service that lives up to the high traditions of the Central Texas Conference.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES**Report No. 10****Methodist Home**

One of the great opportunities of the church today is that of helping to meet the needs of the more than a quarter million youngsters — neglected, disturbed, dependent, delinquent, and retarded — who live in children's homes. Whether these needs can best be provided through continued group care, through placement in foster or adoptive homes, or through assistance to children in their own homes is the question which daily faces the staff of the progressive child-care agency. We are indeed grateful for the encouragement and support which continue to be extended by the pastors and laymen of the Central Texas Conference for the growth and development of the expanded program of services for children at the Methodist Home.

During the past year, there has been steady growth in the expansion of foster home and adoptive services, while the group care program has been greatly implemented by experimental projects bringing trained workers in some of the areas in which the children have greatest needs. Small groups selected for group therapy, remedial teachers helping to tutor children with educational deficiencies, classes in creative activities which seek to discover and develop hidden abilities, and an accelerated athletic program are a few of the special services being used in the treatment of boys and girls disturbed by the circumstances which have removed them from their own homes and families.

The excellent health record of the children was marred this year by the epidemic of influenza which swept the state during the past two months. Approximately one-third of the children were affected, and a large number of the staff. The untiring efforts of the medical and nursing staff brought the children through the epidemic safely, though taxed heavily by this emergency.

The Willson Lectures, presented for the fourth time on the Methodist Home campus, proved to be the most outstanding Lectures thus far. Bishop W. Angie Smith of the Oklahoma-New Mexico Area, spoke twice daily, and inspired staff and visitors alike as he depicted the mission of the church to serve humanity both at home and abroad. Lecturer to the staff on child care services was Dr. Morris F. Mayer of Cleveland, Ohio, who directs one of the nations outstanding services for emotionally disturbed children.

Methodist Home — Waco

The recently held White House Conference on Children and Youth, called by President Eisenhower for the purpose of promoting opportunities for children and youth to realize their full potential for a creative life in freedom and dignity, has focused the attention of the American public on the importance of our children as never before. Running through all of the reports and addresses given at the conference were threads of many general tendencies such as our increased mobility, family rootlessness, growing metropolitan areas, and the number of mothers who work outside the home. As an example, it was revealed that twelve million children moved in the year of 1957, which was found to be a typically average year. Almost half of the American children do not now live where they were born. The average family has moved eight times during its existence. In downtown Detroit, the educational system had to be adjusted to a child population which changed on the average 120% each year during the 1950's.

The Child Welfare League of America points out today "forty percent of the mothers of school-age children work outside the Home." These twenty-two million women comprise one-third of the nation's entire labor force. Opinions differ as to whether mothers should work or not, but while this discussion continues, it is disclosed by a report of the Children's Bureau, published in August, 1959, that two million children under six had mothers who worked full time. One-half million pre-teen youngsters were left in the care of other children whose ages range from twelve to seventeen; four hundred thousand "latch-string" children under twelve were cared for by no one, neither father, relative, neighbor, friend, teen-ager, baby-sitter, nor a maid. Because business and industry cannot release these twenty-two million working women, the nation will be called upon to make adequate plans for the security and full growth of more than seven million children of working mothers during the next decade.

Today, one out of every ten children is affected by family tragedies of divorce, desertion and mental illness. As a result, there are approximately seven million children with parents away from the home, separated or divorced; over three million children require public assistance to stay with their remaining families.

The children's home at Waco is the Methodist Church's response to the needs of children who come under its care in the area comprising the states of Texas and New Mexico. Both ministers and laymen have shown interest and taken pride in the development of the Home. Special care has been given to the development of a program to meet the needs of the more than four hundred who live at the Home, and through the special services of foster homes, adoptions, and the treatment center for the emotionally disturbed children, more children are being served.

The purpose of the Methodist Home is not only to provide a home which will best meet the child's needs, but give him help to reduce the harmful effects of separation, to overcome the harmful effects which necessitated placement, to enable him to function as a part of the new family group and the new community. Not only psychiatric, psychological, and casework services are recognized as essential to achieve these ends, but an understanding of the cultural influences in the child's life. In other words, every phase of the Home's program contributes to the development of a multi-discipline approach in the solving of the children's needs.

We covet the continued understanding and the prayerful concern of all in the development of a program that will meet the needs of all children who must have help. No ministry of the church could be greater than what is done in this particular area of its services. Statistics reveal that one out of every three people is a child, and it is imperative for the church to capture the minds of this potential group, even down to the last child, if the world is to be saved from its own destruction.

We use this means to thank the members of the Central Texas Annual Conference for the gift this year of \$86,854.04 in cash, \$39.10 in supplies, and \$350.00 in designated gifts.

We recommend the appointment of the following as Directors-at-Large for a term of three years: Mr. J. C. DeShong, Mr. Dewitt T. Hicks, Mr. Roy Furr and Dr. L. L. Keyser.

We recommend that the month of December be designated as Methodist Home Month, and that a free-will offering be taken in each of the churches for the support of the Methodist Home.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 11

Trustees of Homes For Retired Ministers

The Board of Trustees of Homes For Retired Ministers is happy to note with appreciation the response of pastors and churches to need of providing homes for our retired ministers, their wives and widows. Yet many churches have evidently given only token offerings. We feel that if proper emphasis were given this cause there would be a far better response.

The Board of Trustees has constantly been faced with a steadily increasing need. The following study might indicate the reason for our earnest concern:

In 1954 there were 32 residents in 27 homes

In 1955-56 there were 40 residents in 25 homes

In 1956-57 there were 43 residents in 29 homes

In 1957-58 there were 44 residents in 29 homes

In 1958-59 there were 47 residents in 32 homes

In 1959-60 there were 51 residents in 34 homes

During this six year period the churches have contributed \$180.15 for each resident per year, or approximately \$15.00 per month. This would seem rather economical housing for our retired ministers and their wives and widows if it were not for the fact that many repairs and improvements have had to be postponed or sometimes just forgotten.

Many of our homes have been improved, but there is an ever increasing need for new homes. We have at least seven homes which ought to be replaced, because of the type of construction or age become very expensive to keep up.

Four years ago we received the approval of the World Service Commission and the Administrative Council to ask for a capital fund program, but due to other programs presented we withdrew our request and resorted to a special offering day. This plan is not meeting the needs of our homes.

In consultation with Bishop Martin and the Cabinet, the Board was assured that the strong support of these men would be given in the promotion of the Special Offering on the second Sunday of July. The Board hopes that from this offering at least \$2,000.00 will come from each district. The Board appreciates this splendid action on the part of Bishop Martin and the District Superintendents. However, as is always true, the burden of this responsibility rests upon what happens in each local church. It is the considered conviction of the Board that if this cause is laid on the hearts of the people and on opportunity to make an offering provided, the people of our Conference will respond generously to this call. We

earnestly hope that no pastor will allow this cause to be buried in the budget of his church.

The Board respectfully resrequests the re-appointment* of Rev. Hubert Crain as Superintendent of Retired Ministers Homes for the year 1960-61.

COMMITTEE ON INTERDENOMINATIONAL COOPERATION

Report No. 1

"The ecumencial conversation is still full of misunderstandings, contradictions, and cross-purposes. But those who have engaged in it know full well that it must go on. We are drawn together by our common concern for the Church, and it is in that concern that we discover our unity in relation to the Lord and Head of the Church. 'There is but one Lord and one Body. Therefore we cannot rest content with our present divisions. Before God, we are responsible for one another.' (Section I Report, Amsterdam 1948)" This statement was taken from the Report of the Message Committee, Texas Council of Churches, March 9, 1960, Midland, Texas.

World Council of Churches

The World Council of Churches now includes more than 170 branches of Christendom within its membership. Its provisional structure was set up in 1938. The first General Assembly was held in Amsterdam, Holland in 1948. The Second Assembly was held in Evanston, Illinois in 1954. The Third Assembly is scheduled to be held in New Delhi, India, in December of 1961.

National Council of Churches

Due to the recent criticism directed toward the National Council of Churches, it seems wise to review the purpose of this group as set up in its constitution.

1. It is an agency through which Protestant and Orthodox Churches in the United States express their common faith in Jesus Christ as Divine Lord and Savior, and cooperate to focus the light of that faith on all phases of American life.

2. The churches act through the 70 program units of the Council in a spirit of evangelism to encourage Christians to the use of prayer, to the acceptance of personal responsibility, and to study in all matters affecting the life of the nation.

3. The Council is an expression of its member churches' belief that, in spite of diversity of form and doctrine, they are one in their faith in Jesus Christ. It does for the churches such cooperative work as they authorize it to carry on in their behalf.

In light of recent criticism of the NCC we would like to reassert our faith in the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. and its leaders as devotedly upholding the best democratic and religious ideals of the American way of life.

Texas Council of Churches

The "Teamwork of Churches" was the theme for the seventh annual assembly of the Texas Council of Churches, meeting in Midland's First Christian Church.

Dr. G. Paul Musselman, Executive Director of the Department of Evangelism, National Council of Churches, called for a solid front of Christianity against outside pressures, in a sermon delivered during the Service of Ecumenical Worship.

Dr. Willis Tate, President of the Texas Council, called the Council to be a voice above the limitations of denominations, "for the deep concerns of our times." Dr. Tate cited three major causes for active Christian concern to men of faith: (1) A specific concern for justice for all men; (2) to find opportunity for the better grasp of eternal truths in a time of great change; and (3) the challenge of communism. "I call you to be more than a collection of individual Christians with your individual causes and concerns," he said. "This will mean among other things that you will continue to seek the active participation of the real leadership of our participating denominations in our Council's boards and committees."

We would like to commend Dr. Tate for his address and reaffirm our faith in the Texas Council of Churches as following the ideas he presented.

Areas of Cooperation with Councils

Areas of cooperation with the National Council of Churches includes: Christian education; mission study material, schools of missions, leadership training; evangelism; film, radio and TV ministry; United Church Women.

The Texas Council of Churches is growing in strength and usefulness and we would encourage cooperation on the parts of our churches in such areas as: CROP; migrant ministry; trick or treat; clothing drives; leadership training for camps and recreation; research and planning department.

Many churches find avenues of cooperation available on the local council level which include: city or area council of churches; council of United Church Women; use of vacation church school material through the Texas Council of Churches; cooperation in local CROP program; cooperation in youth "trick or treat" emphasis; church planning and research committees; and work of the migrant ministry.

We encourage local churches to participate in cooperative endeavors of those projects which express our common Christian responsibility and our common faith in our Lord and Savior Christ Jesus.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Report No. 1

The Board of Lay Activities has continued its program throughout the year by following generally the format that has become well established in recent years in this Conference. The accomplishments, though far from what they should be, have been significant. The purpose of an active program of organized lay activities — to deepen the spiritual life of the layman and to make him a more active servant of his church has been the constant aim of the Board and has been accomplished in some small measure.

Shortly after the annual meeting of the Board in Fort Worth, at the time of Annual Conference, the committee to write the specific goals for the year, met on the campus of Southwestern University and adopted for the Board, the following:

Goals For the Year of Enlistment 1959-60

1. Having a dedicated, well informed and active Church Lay Leader in every church;
2. Having a 100% participation in Laymen's Day Services October 18th together with a continuing certified Lay Speakers Bureau in each District;
3. An increase in the number of newly chartered Methodist Men's Clubs and the membership of Chartered Clubs of 10% — also to develop the activity and productivity of these established Clubs as well as having a Methodist Men's Club member in every Church;
4. Cooperation fully with the Program of the Texas Methodist Stewardship Movement to the extent of having an **Every Member Canvass** in each Church by the use of this and other proven stewardship guides.
5. Assuming the Laymen's share of the **Total Enlistment Program**, committing ourselves to **"Find Them" — "Win Them" — "Lead Them" — "Keep Them."**
6. Publicizing and giving enthusiastic support to Wesleyan Homes, Inc., in their new area of service in the construction of a home for the Elderly in Georgetown; together with such other programs of the Board and Commissions of this Conference where our support can be helpful.

It cannot be said that any single one of the goals was completely fulfilled; much was accomplished in connection with each goal and in many instances, we came tantalizingly close to complete fulfillment. For example, only four or five churches in the Conference failed to participate in Laymen's Day by having special services on October 18th. It is believed that the perennial goal of having a dedicated, well informed and active church Lay Leader in every church is nearer complete realization than ever before.

The 11th annual Layman's Retreat was held at Glen Lake Camp on August 21-22 and 23, and as usual, furnished not only the high spiritual point of the year's activities, but served as the kick-off event for the ten District Boards of Lay Activities, which began their yearly activities soon thereafter. Two Conference Lay Leaders, R. H. (Red) Bond from the Memphis Conference and Robert P. Lay from the Louisiana Conference, upheld the tradition of strong, effective lay speakers at the Retreat. The music, devotional periods, and group meetings were unusually stimulating and the closing sermon by Dr. Edmund Heinsohn was truly inspiring. Attendance at the Retreat was 932 men, a new record.

Each District Board of Lay Activities was organized and active. District-wide rallies, banquets and workshops were held in many of the Districts and in some, the meetings were broken down on a sub-district basis.

At a meeting of the District Lay Leaders, District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader, in Waxahachie, during the summer before the Retreat, it was again agreed that each District Lay Leader would also serve as District Director of Stewardship and the work of the Texas Stewardship Movement in this Conference has been carried on by this Board.

A close study of Methodist Men's Clubs in the Conference reveals much work needed in this area. Some of the clubs have become inactive, others have lost contact with the General Board of Lay Activities and its division of Methodist Men, and even some of the clubs in larger churches have become delinquent in the payment of dues. While there are many wide-awake, aggressive clubs in the Conference and while there were some new clubs chartered during the Conference year, it is believed that more concerted action in this field is called for in the year ahead if the Board is completely to fulfill its obligation to the total lay program of the Church. The Board calls on all its members and on all ministers and laymen alike to plan for a year of greater activity and accomplishment during 1960-61 in connection with our Methodist Men's Clubs.

The mid-year meeting of the Board was held in Fort Worth with Bishop Martin, all District Superintendents, but few members of the Board in attendance. The icy condition of the roads throughout Texas on the morning of the meeting took a heavy toll in attendance, but proved that District Superintendents are a hardy lot, taken as a whole.

Though the Board can take pride in many accomplishments throughout the year, the task, like all phases of the Lord's work, is never done and the Board faces the new year with a steadfast determination to improve upon that of the year that will soon pass.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY SUPPORT**Report No. 1**

Your Commission on Minimum Salary Support recommends the following change in the 1959 Conference Journal on Page 116, under **Administrative Procedure**, Article No. 1, Strike out (b) and (c) and replace the following:

(b) For a single man rendering full time service, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$2,300.00 per year shall be added.

(c) For a married man rendering full time service, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$2,700.00 per year shall be added.

Our Commission is glad to assume what was formerly coming from the Conference Board of Missions as salary supplement to the Minimum Salary Charges.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT

Report No. 2

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Annual Conference, under the direction and management of a Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, hereinafter, for the sake of brevity, called the Commission, to be composed of nine (9) persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Five of this number shall be ministers, and four laymen. The term of service shall be for three years, so arranged that three (3) shall be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support Program.

Vacancies in the membership of the Commission, caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference, shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the ensuing session of the Annual Conference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regular way.

The Commission shall organize at that session of the Central Texas Annual Conference held at the beginning of each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee on the Commission, and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. All subsequent elections of officers and executive committee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Commission held prior to the meeting of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Administrative Procedure

1. (a) The basic minimum basis for pastoral support shall be \$1,500.00 per year, exclusive of any parsonage provision that may be made by the Charge.

(b) For a single man rendering full time service, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) percent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$2,300.00 per year shall be added.

(c) For a married man rendering full time service, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$2,700.00 per year shall be added.

The benefits of the Fund are not to be thought of as annual subsidies designed solely to enable a pastoral charge to pay the minimum salary of the conference. The Fund should do that, and more. Basically, the purpose of the Fund is to aid a pastoral charge in its efforts to raise its own salary apportionment to the figure set as the established minimum salary of the conference.

2. The benefits of the Fund are available to ministers in the Central Texas Annual Conference who are rendering service as pastors, as follows: Preachers in Full Connection; preachers on trial appointed to pastoral charges; student pastors, and approved supply pastors who are recommended by their District Superintendents.

(a) The benefits of the Minimum Pastoral Support Fund are not available to any minister having any appointment other than that of preacher in charge within the bounds of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

(b) In cases of appointments between sessions of the Annual Conference, and after the apportionments have been made by the Commission, no member of the conference, preacher on trial, student pastor, or full time approved supply pastor, shall share in the benefits of the Fund, unless the Charge to which he may be appointed shall meet the conditions hereof, and then his sharing shall be on a pro rata basis for that part of the year served in the Charge to which he may be appointed.

3. No pastor shall share in the benefits of the Fund who receives income from other employment than the regular work of the ministry.

4. A pre-requisite for any pastor to receive the benefits of the Fund is the agreement, by vote of the Quarterly Conference of the Charge he serves, to pay to the Commission an amount equal to fifteen (15) per cent of the amount necessary to bring the salary up to the computed minimum; provided, however, that this requirement, and the five (5) per cent increase in salary over that paid the previous year, as set forth in Paragraph 1, sections (b) and (c) above, may be waived upon unanimous vote of the Commission. The fifteen (15) per cent paid to the Commission shall not be considered a part of the salary apportioned and paid.

5. No pastor shall receive the benefits of the Fund if the Charge he serves reduces the salary below that paid the previous year, unless this reduction is recognized by the Commission as justifiable, and approved by its unanimous vote, and unless the Charge made during the previous year an Every-Member canvass for local church budget support.

6. In accordance with Paragraph 826, Discipline 1956, when a preacher in full connection, on trial, or an approved supply pastor, is appointed to a Charge apportioning less salary than \$1,500.00 per year, such appointee shall not receive the benefits of the Fund except on the basic minimum basis of a \$1,500.00 per year salary apportionment, and the usual participation of the Charge in the Minimum Pastoral Support Plan.

However, to aid and encourage Pastoral Charges in the \$1,200.00 to the \$1,499.00 salary brackets to move toward the \$1,500.00 basic minimum, the benefits of the Fund, on the basis of the salary apportioned will be granted annually, provided the salary has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent. All Charges that have not reached the basic minimum basic salary should indicate their purpose of doing so.

7. Funds for the work of the Commission shall be secured in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 826, Discipline 1956, and the apportionments shall be made to the Charges as hereinafter set forth, and payments by the Churches on such apportionments shall be made regularly to the Conference Treasurer.

(a) No apportionments shall be made to Charges apportioning less salary than the basic minimum basis. In those cases where the fifteen (15) per cent requirement is less than the apportionment required by the regular scale, the proper adjustment shall be made by the Commission.

(b) The total apportionment of a Charge determines the percentage scale that is applicable. In all cases, however, \$800.00 of the salary paid is exempt. The apportionments shall be figured on a percentage scale, as follows:

(c) Two and one-half (2½) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,000.00 or less;

(d) Three (3) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,001.00 to \$2,500.00;

(e) Three and one-half (3½) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$2,501.00 to \$3,000.00;

(f) Four (4) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$3,001.00 to \$4,000.00;

(g) Four and one-half (4½) per cent shall be apportioned to all Charges apportioning salaries of \$4,001.00 and up.

8. The Commission shall gather necessary information throughout the Conference for the computation of the apportionments of the Charges, and the amounts to be paid to those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and that information will be given to the District Superintendents and Pastors, and by them to the Quarterly Conferences of the Charges. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective Districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and the collection of the amounts from the Churches listed in their respective Districts.

General Provisions

9. Payment on the apportionment to the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payment to those receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same percentage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.

10. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, and all payments to those receiving benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for the work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund; and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals en route, to all meetings of the Commission, except such meetings as are held while the Annual Conference is in session, shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be computed on the basis of seven (7) cents per mile each way.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference is in session, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payment for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid is limited to those who receive the benefits of the Fund, and not more than ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available for such emergency appropriation. All unexpended portions of such available emergency funds, shall, at the close of the year, remain in the general fund, subject to disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this plan.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 1

Your Conference Board of Missions closes a most successful year's work, and the crowning one for the quadrennium. Your Board started the quadrennium with several loan commitments outstanding but without sufficient funds to complete them. We have honored all previous loan commitments and operate now on a current basis, and though we do not have large sums readily available for loans, we would not be totally unprepared should an emergency need arise.

By effecting a change in policy whereby our limited resources were conserved for loan purposes, chiefly in new church situations, we have been able to do a more satisfactory service, and we are wanting to believe, a more far-reaching and effective work.

Through the establishment of The Methodist Foundation of the Central Texas Conference for Church Extension, which operates primarily as a "Revolving Loan Fund," we have been able to extend our service in the field of church extension. In addition to the increased resources from the Foundation, derived chiefly through the membership of the Conference Builders Club, the National Division of our General Board has been appreciative of our efforts to permanently strengthen our church extension program, and has manifested its approval by making available larger loans to provide adequate first units in new church situations. The total assets of the Foundation now approximate \$150,000.00. Though the strength of the Foundation has not shown the rapid growth desired, the long-look reveals the wisdom of this or a similar program. The record reveals that where enthusiastic endorsement, adequate planning, and intelligent presentation has been made in any area of the conference the laymen have responded in goodly numbers.

Another aspect of our work has been greatly strengthened during this quadrennium as a result of these added resources. We have more than doubled the total amount granted in salary supplement for new church situations. Covering a period of three years we make \$4,800.00 available to each new charge for pastor's salary; this, of course, is a gift. Your board has requests for gifts for next

year totalling \$20,000.00. This almost doubles the amount donated in previous quadrenniums. Our treasurer's report will account for our complete operations this year, both as a Board of Missions and for the Methodist Foundation.

The population growth for the next decade in our conference presents a great challenge. Our church must be at its best if we are to minister to our constituency, and we ought to plan for a margin of growth. We bespeak for the incoming board for the new quadrennium your finest cooperation, for in this area of church extension our church will either move forward courageously in providing new churches or adopt a policy of "holding our own" which is actually a policy of retrenchment.

We submit the name of Hubert C. Smith, as nominee for membership on the Board of Trustees of Lydia Patterson Institute, El Paso, Texas. Term to expire in 1964, provided this does not violate an established policy, in which case this term will correspond to the established policy.

We submit the names of Hubert C. Smith, (1963), C. H. Sisserson, (1963), and W. W. Dees, (1963) for membership on the Board of Directors for The Methodist Foundation of the Central Texas Conference, terms to expire in 1963.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 2

The Board of Missions requests the substitution of the following in place of paragraph 3, of the Board of Missions report No. 3, page 117, the 1957 Annual Conference Journal.

Builders Club There shall be in the Central Texas Conference **A Builder's Club**, under the auspices of the Board of Missions; organized for the purpose of securing funds for the Central Texas Conference Methodist Foundation and for work within the Districts under the direction of the District Board of Missions or the District Board of Church Location.

Membership The members of the Builder's Club shall be those persons or groups who agree to contribute \$10.00 or multiples thereof, semi-annually upon calls of the Board of Missions, said calls to be made before November 1, and March 1 of each year. It is not unreasonable to expect that, in addition to individual memberships, each local church Commission on Missions will assume one or more memberships.

Method of payment Payment will be made to the local church, which will forward the money to the Conference Treasurer before December 31 and April 30 of each year.

Promotion (1) The Board of Missions shall prepare the materials for promotion of the Builder's Club in the local church. The Bishop and the cabinet will agree on the exact date in each September that these materials are to be in the hands of the District Superintendents. It will then be the responsibility of the District Superintendent to see that they are distributed to the churches and that the laymen of the churches have an opportunity to enroll as members of the Builder's Club.

(2) The First Sunday of November of each year shall be known as **Kingdom Extension Sunday**. At this time the responsibilities and privileges of Connectional Methodism in building the Kingdom at home and abroad shall be presented to our people. An opportunity for enrollment in the Builder's Club will be presented the people, on forms supplied by the Board of Missions. These forms,

when signed, shall be forwarded to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Missions. Pastors should use due diligence in seeing that these lists of members are both added to and kept up to date.

Individual notices of the pending call will be sent to each member whose name is on file in the Conference office by the Conference Board of Missions, in addition to the Fall promotion. It would be expected that each pastor would do some cultivation of the top 5% of contributors in his church, prior to Kingdom Extension Sunday.

District Goals: The minimum goals for membership in each district shall be 2% of the membership of the district for each of the two semi-annual calls.

The Conference Treasurer will divide the money; one half will be placed in the permanent funds of The Methodist Foundation, and one half shall be sent to the appropriate responsible body in the district in which the funds were raised, to be administered by the Board of Church Extension within that district.

Loan Funds Permanent Funds of the Methodist Foundation received from each District through the Builder's Club shall be allocated for a period of two Annual Conference years following their receipt of first use within the forwarding district, for such loans as may be designated by the District Board of Missions or the District Board of Church Location and Building, as the case may be. Such loans will be made on the usual terms and subject otherwise to such rules of the Foundation as then may be in effect.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 3

The divine imperative to witness boldly "by declaration and deed, to the Lordship and power of Jesus Christ over all life," is a continual reminder of the Church's mission. Opportunities and challenges of the missionary enterprise are recognized in the following areas:

Local Church Commission On Missions

We recommend: (1) That an effective program of missionary education be projected in the local church through the Commission on Missions. (2) That each pastor lead the Commission in the organization and study of its responsibility and opportunities. (3) That the available audio-visual materials, pamphlets, mission study course, World Outlook, Christian World Facts, and the Conference "Advance Specials" Brochures be employed to create a vital interest in the mission opportunities of the church. (4) That World Service leaflets be distributed each fourth Sunday.

World Service

Increased World Service giving enables the seventeen Boards and Agencies of the Methodist Church to more effectively perpetuate the Gospel message. While the response has been gratifying, increased needs necessitate increased financial support.

World Mission Study Course

The Church-Wide Mission Study Course has proven to be an annual highlight in many congregations. Every local church Mission Commission and Pastor should avail their membership of the opportunities of the Church-wide mission study.

Advance Specials

The need for "Advance Specials" is especially urgent in areas where people are confronted by rival and militant faiths which demand the total loyalty of men.

Financial support for missionaries, Church and school buildings, youth camps, educational equipment, medical supplies, and scholarships, has been directed to the World Division for the lands of Angola, Central and Belgian Congo, Southern Rhodesia, Hong Kong, Japan, Korea, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Peru, Argentina, Uruguay, Philippines, South India and Sarawak.

Additional financial support has been received to aid the North Point Church in Hong Kong.

In the area of Notional Missions financial support has been directed to the Rio Grande Conference for pastor and teachers salaries as well as to educational institutions.

The need for support of the Indian mission work in our country continues. Financial support is needed in their effort to provide training and adequate salaries for a native ministry.

The following are Advance Special needs for maintenance and building of the Oklahoma Indian Mission Conference for the Quadrennium 1960-64: (1) to pay a minimum salary of \$2400., (2) to provide scholarships for full-time Christian service students. (3) to build fourteen churches. (4) to build seventeen parsonages, and to build a district assembly center for the Northeastern District.

The Central Texas Conference has been extended the Advance Special goal of \$7000. to help provide the needs. Each district will want to assume its share of this responsibility.

Methodist Committee For Overseas Relief

The Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief is part of the General Advance program of the church. It is an open invitation to the benediction of shoring as Christ shored. MCOR provides cash grants for food, clothing, bedding, medicine and shelter to victims of disaster, aid to widows and food for boys and girls in hostels, in destitute areas.

Week of Dedication and World Wide Communion

The spiritual value of these two observances continues to unite Christian people throughout the world. The financial support associated with these observances undergirds our initial missionary interests and helps to meet emergency need. The response to these special occasions continues to be significant in spreading the spirit of Christ.

The Jurisdictional Missionary Conference

The Jurisdictional Missionary Conference will be conducted at Mt. Sequoyah, August 23-26. Each District Missionary Secretary is urged to attend this conference. We suggest that each District enlist a young person and provide the necessary money to attend this conference.

COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

As we make our last report for this quadrennium the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation, which is charged with the promotion of the program of World Service and Conference Benevolences, has great cause for rejoicing.

World Service, the very heart of Methodism, is up 1.10% over one year ago. Our Annual Conference is up \$5,784.51 over the same period of last year.

Advance Specials, with which our Bishop Martin has had such significant leadership, was projected in 1948 with the hope that \$4,000,000 could be raised annually. For the 11¾ year period ending January 31, 1960, \$87,370,358 had been raised — already nearly twice the goal. Our Conference has continued to give generously to Advance, "Personalized" Specials, giving \$303,719.99 during the past 3½ years. For the first nine months of this year we have given \$86,031.50 to Advance to lead the Area and rank fourth among the eighteen conferences in the Jurisdiction. The churches of the conference have, and are now, giving special emphasis to the North Point Church in teeming Hong Kong. All the districts are cooperating and we hope to reach a goal of \$50,000.00. **T V Ministry** giving is up 12% in the conference. **Fellowship of Suffering and Service** Offerings have increased while **Week of Dedication** is about the same as last year.

Our local churches are making increasing use in their Mission Program of the excellent promotion and cultivation tools provided by our connectionalism. The **Methodist Story** is a good guide in the Program of **Enlistment** and the **Local Church** Emphasis, particularly as it relates to our World Service and Benevolence causes. The **World Outlook**, a magazine for the entire church, is commended for wider circulation. **The Texas Methodist**, with its new look and approach, is one of our finest avenues of promotion for benevolence causes, and when each district meets its subscription goal we believe missionary interest will immeasurably increase.

Large Wall Calendars for pastors and local churches will be provided again this year. Our Annual Conference Display, in Fellowship Hall so ably handled by Reverend Charles Whittle, has many new aids, and we ask you to view it and use it.

Thank you, Central Texas Methodists, for your support of World Service and Conference Benevolences this quadrennium. We are especially thankful for the leadership given by our District Superintendents and Pastors and the faithful support of our laymen. Let us face the probable increased World Service askings of the new quadrennium as a glorious opportunity to share with Christ in fulfilling His World Mission.

COMMITTEE ON PROPORTIONAL PAYMENTS

During the eight years of this committee's existence, there has been a drastic curtailment in the number of churches failing to pay the proper amount on the four items proportioned on ministerial salary. We have been pleased to see this amount of deficit drop from more than \$10,000 in 1952 to a perfect record last year. However, this year we note the record of a few churches indicates a failure to pay the amount apportioned. We feel these cases could have been prevented with more stress from the District Superintendent and closer supervision by the pastor.

We propose that each District Superintendent personally check each charges' record and the four proportional items at the time the report is submitted to the Statistician and bring any deficiencies to the attention of the minister.

It was revealed, also, that some churches over paid their apportionments

in these four items. This was noticeably true in the Cisco District, where eight churches overpaid a total of \$219.00 on minimum salary fund alone.

RESERVE PENSION STUDY COMMITTEE

Review

In 1944 the Central Texas Annual Conference appointed a special committee to bring in recommendations concerning better support of our retired ministers. The following year the committee reported concerning an additional endowment. This report was not adopted and the committee was asked to make further study. In 1946, on the recommendation of this committee, the annual conference adopted a three-fold program to set up a full reserve system for ministers coming into the annual conference (new entrants), a partial reserve system for ministers then in effective relation with the conference (previous entrants), and a fund out of which the annuity payments to men already retired might be increased. This called for the raising of \$500,000. The campaign was conducted under the direction of Dr. P. E. Riley.

In 1952 sufficient funds had been raised to justify putting the reserve pension program into operation. It followed the Pension Plan in the 1952 Discipline. However, after one year of operation, it was discovered that the actuarial calculations had been made obsolete by the unanticipated increase in salaries and the larger number of ministers entering into the conference membership. So, in 1953, three special recommendations, different from the original program and from the Disciplinary plan, were made by the Pension Committee and approved by the Annual Conference. These were: (1) That the Partial and Full Reserve Pension Systems of the Central Texas Conference use as the base line, for contributions on the part of the ministers, and allocations on the part of the conference, the average salary in the Conference at the time the program was adopted, namely \$2,300.00. It was stated that to do otherwise would deplete the reserve funds by allocations to individual accounts before the 25-year period it was originally intended to cover. (2) If a minister elected not to participate in the Partial Reserve System by not paying the 3% of the average salary each year, that the Conference make no allocation to his account. (3) That only the interest of the \$106,000 raised to supplement the annuity to ministers already retired be used, keeping the original amount as an endowment.

Findings

After eight years of operation of the reserve pension program in our conference, the following findings are reported by your Study Committee:

a) The emphasis on the reserve pension program has resulted in a greatly increased interest in pensions for the men already retired and who have retired since 1952. The percentage apportionment for the support of the conference claimants has risen from 10% in 1944 to 17% now, and the annuity rate from \$10.50 per year of service in 1944 to \$46.00 now. This is exclusive of any payments from the reserve pension program. Since 1944 the annuity responsibility for retired ministers rose from 2,721 service years to 3,048 and the annuity responsibility for widows from 2,123 service years to 2,150.

We commend the Board of Pensions and the Conference for this accomplishment.

b) In 1952 there were 194 effective ministers eligible to enter the Partial Reserve program. While adoption of the program made it mandatory that all ministers participate, our annual conference made it optional in the Partial Reserve Fund. The first report shows that 131 ministers entered into the Partial Reserve program in 1952. Since that time, with retirements and transfers, we now have 110 ministers eligible for participation in the Partial Reserve program. Of this number 60 participated last year. This indicates that about the same percentage of eligible ministers are participating.

We point out that, with the "frozen" average salary and the non-participation of about 35% of the eligible ministers, the reserve for the Partial Reserve program is becoming larger because the annual interest received exceeds the annual allocation to individual accounts.

c) In 1952, the first year of the program, 21 ministers entered the Full Reserve Pension program. This number has now increased to 116. This year, funding from the Full Reserve has been made to cover the years on trial for all those in this program, and to cover all others as they are admitted on trial. This means that there will be 158 members in the Full Reserve program next year. This is 55% of the ministers, now effective and on trial, in our conference.

The "freezing" of the average salary in 1953 at the \$2,300 level has resulted in practically eliminating the "full reserve" feature of this program and converting it into a second and different partial reserve program, because at the present level it will provide a service annuity of only approximately \$31.00 per year of service while the conference is now paying \$46.00 per year of service out of current income. This means that instead of having a "full reserve" program which will need no pension payments from current income, we shall have to continue pension payments from current income to maintain even the present annuity level to all new entrants. This will be necessary until such time as we "thaw out" the present average salary level and adopt the Disciplinary average salary level and provide sufficient additional reserve funds to make the annual allocations to the individual accounts of members of the Full Reserve program.

The "freezing" of the average salary figure has protected the reserve program but it is defeating the purpose of the full reserve program which is to allow compound interest accumulating during the thirty or forty years of the member's active ministry to provide approximately one-half of the total pension payments. An annuity payment of \$31.00 per year of service sounded good when the conference was paying only \$10.50. But now \$31.00 per year of service does not favorably compare with the present annuity payment of \$46.00 per year of service.

To do this, all should realize, calls upon the churches and the conference, to carry for a period of at least forty years the double load of paying pensions for which no reserves or only partial reserves have been set up, and the funding of the full reserve as the ministers serve. It was to this program that the annual conference committed itself in 1946 and in 1952.

Recommendations

We recommend that the Presiding Bishop be requested to appoint a Pension Study Committee for the quadrennium, 1960 to 1964, to consist of 15 members and to include members of the Cabinet, ministerial and lay members

of the Conference Board of Pensions and of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and the Conference at large. This committee shall continue the study of the total pension program of the Conference, and report annually to the Annual Conference its findings and recommendations with respect to revisions of the pension program of the Conference. The Resident Bishop shall be an ex-officio member of the Pension Study Committee.

RULES COMMITTEE

Report No. 1

The cabinet recommends the following changes in the Conference standing rules:

Rule 1. There shall be an ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL to formulate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference. The **Administrative Council** shall be composed as follows: The Cabinet, the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Chairman and one other member of each Conference Board and Commission one of whom should be a lay person and the other a minister except where there is no authorized lay person on the Board or Commission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each District to be nominated by the Cabinet, the Conference President and the Promotional Secretary of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, The president of the Conference Youth Organization and one other young person, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missions, the Chairmen of all standing committees, the Conference Chairman of the Texas Methodist College Association, all General and Jurisdictional Board members and General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates not otherwise holding membership on the Council, and such other members as may be nominated by the Executive Committee. All paid employees of the Conference and its agencies shall have the privilege of the floor but without vote.

Rule 3. Add new sentence "Members appointed to fill unexpired terms of less than two years shall be eligible for re-election for 8 years. The amended rule will then read: **No member of any Board,** Commission and Committee shall be eligible for membership thereon longer than eight consecutive years and shall not become eligible again for such membership until one full conference year has passed. The membership of quadrennial boards, and commissions shall be divided by the board or commission into two groups, one group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of one quadrennium, and the second whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the succeeding quadrennium. Members appointed to fill unexpired terms of less than two years shall be eligible for re-election for eight years.

BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

Report No. 1

"If Christianity does not begin with the individual, it does not begin. But if it ends with the individual, it ends." The Methodist Church was founded upon belief in individual salvation. Recognizing the society is a collection of individuals, The Methodist Church formulated and adopted a Social Creed which speaks for the church upon social issues. We feel that in the tensions of current social conflicts the Methodist Social Creed deserves and demands application as well as acceptance. We urge that the laity be informed of the nature and meaning of this creed.

We deplore the tendency to equate Christianity and nationalism. "We espouse no particular economic system, and refuse to identify Christianity with any economic system." We reaffirm our belief in the separation of Church and State. At the same time, we express equal belief in the necessity of cooperation between Church and State, and the necessity of mutual recognition of their responsibilities one to another. There is a need for good citizenship on the part of every Christian. This good citizenship must consist of a vital interest which calls the individual to work for that which is good, and to condemn and seek to rectify that which is bad within the framework of our society.

We, therefore, condemn any form of thought control which would seek to make individuals adhere to pre-set patterns and which would make men automatons of conformity. We object vigorously to those who by implication and innuendo would defame and castigate any individual or group without due process of both legal and moral law. We do not believe that a good result justifies the use of non-Christian principles in its attainment.

We are grateful for the free and democratic spirit of The Methodist Church. We are proud of Methodism's interest in hearing every voice of its membership. On the local church level, the Quarterly Conference has been organized for this very purpose. We hope every Methodist, after careful study with scrupulous care, will use this privilege.

We recognize, further, that Methodism is more than the collective voice of its constituency. As a member of the body of Christ, it has the divine imperative to speak with the prophetic voice and to relate the gospel message to social and economic issues of our contemporary lives.

COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION**Report No. 3**

1. There shall be a program of sustentation in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of a Committee on Sustentation, to be composed of six persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference. The members of this committee shall be selected for their fitness for service on this committee and may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Three members of this committee shall be ministers and three shall be laymen. These shall serve during the quadrennium.

This committee will have charge of and promote all the interests of the Committee on Sustentation and shall be the determining factor in the final approval of any candidate for participation in this program. Vacancies caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference in the membership of the Committee shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Conference. However, the committee is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment will be made with the approval of the Bishop. Such appointment is to apply only until the season of the Annual Conference following, and then the vacancy will be filled in the regular way. The committee shall meet and organize by electing a Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the executive committee and shall serve for the quadrennium.

2. We recommend that the amount of sustentation granted to an applicant shall be the amount of the current minimum salary.

3. We recommend that the following shall be eligible for participation:
 - (1) All ministers of the Central Texas Conference that have been admitted on trial or have been received into full connection provided they have not reached the age of voluntary retirement which is sixty-five (65) years of age.
 - (2) An approved supply pastor who shall have rendered not less than ten (10) years of full time approved service as pastor of a charge in the Central Texas Conference.
 - (3) Any minister, meeting the above requirements, who is relieved of his pastoral duties and is granted a leave of absence from his charge by the Bishop and Cabinet during any Conference year for physical or psychological reasons shall be eligible for sustentation for that portion of the year that remains until the next meeting of the Annual Conference.
4. We recommend the following procedure:
 - (1) The applicant shall make his desire known, in writing, to the Committee on Sustentation.
 - (2) The applicant must submit to a complete examination at the Clinic of Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas, and the Certificate of Disability must be completed by the examining physician. Emphasis shall be placed upon question number (8) which asks: "Do you unreservedly feel that one year leave of absence would be conducive to the restoration of health so that the claimant might continue an effective ministry."
 - (3) In extreme emergencies, the Committee on Sustentation will consider the diagnosis and recommendation of a duly qualified physician, but not the claimant's personal physician.
 - (4) When the application is approved by the Committee on Sustentation the name of the applicant shall be submitted to the Committee on Conference Relations with a request that a leave of absence be granted for a period of one year. With this approval of the Committee on Conference Relations and the favorable action of the Annual Conference the applicant shall be eligible for the benefits of this program.
 - (5) We unreservedly recommend that no person be eligible for sustentation funds for a period exceeding twelve (12) months running consecutively.
 - (6) All payments shall be made to the claimant quarterly at the first of each quarter of the Conference year.
5. We recommend the following financial plan:
 - (1) The Committee on Sustentation shall be given authority to draw upon the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference such amounts as are necessary during any given Conference year to meet the needs of the applicants in accordance with the above suggested practice.
 - (2) After the amount expended during a Conference year has been determined, the Committee on Sustentation will make a request of the World Service and Finance Commission for the inclusion of that amount in the Conference Budget for the ensuing year. This procedure will be most practical for there is no way of actually determining the full amount which will be needed in any Conference year and if this plan is followed there will be no possibility of having surpluses or deficiencies in the money available for the Sustentation Committee.

TELEVISION, RADIO, AND FILM COMMISSION

Television offers the Church a way to reach the multitudes. The mass audience includes many church members, but there also are sixty million unchurched people who urgently need the gospel.

The Methodist Church is awakening to the opportunity which has come with the amazing growth of radio and television—a development which in a few years has replaced the family hearth with a TV screen and has put radio receivers everywhere.

Across Methodism we have given to the Television Ministry Fund an amount equal to two and one-half cents per member. When this amount is compared to millions paid by the commercial world for the right to come into our homes, can we say we are doing our best? In addition to this thought is a wonderful fact—the Church can get more for the radio and TV dollar than can the world of commerce. For every four dollars given to the Methodist Television Ministry Fund for use in preparing scripts and meeting production costs, stations contribute air time worth approximately nine dollars.

We request the support of the Churches of this Conference to the Children's TV Series—o World Service Special. This series is ready for immediate production as soon as funds are available.

The Audio Visual Workshop, Southwestern University, September 6-9 offers the very best training in this field. It is essential that the church keep pace with the new developments in bringing the message of Christ through film production. Each District is urged to have a strong representation in this workshop.

We wish to give our deep appreciation to Bishop William C. Mortin for his splendid vision and leadership of the Methodist Television Ministry Fund. It is worthy of notice that the Dallas-Fort Worth Episcopal Area has for the past four years led all other such areas across all of Methodism in giving to this Fund. We prayerfully request the continued support of each district and Church within our Conference.

We request \$100.00 for expenses of this Commission.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Report No. 1

Today as never before we stand in need of consecrated action on the deadly evil of the alcohol problem. Your Conference Board of Temperance recognizes this problem, and for the past four years has endeavored to present a constructive program of Christian action on this social problem. Knowledge, though, must always precede conviction, and without conviction there can be no successful social action. We, therefore, as a matter of major importance call upon our churches to vigorously declare and teach the truths concerning the personal and social evils resulting from the use of alcoholic beverages. To do this, we ask them to use and support all forms of educational processes, to use every educational agency of the Church, and to urge and support beverage alcohol education in the public schools. The Church must continue by this process of education and by all other available means to combat the liquor traffic. It is necessary that laws be enacted controlling and prohibiting the traffic in alcohol. The right of the people to enact such legislation to protect their homes and communities from the evils of the liquor traffic is a fundamental legal and moral right.

Coming to the close of our tenure of this Board, we therefore adopt this report to the Annual Conference: :

(1) Last Conference we set up plans for District Schools on Alcohol Studies in the several districts of our Conference. We managed to accomplish this goal through Youth Seminars in several of the Districts. We felt that the reception was good and some valuable information was given to the youth of our Conference. We urge that in the coming Quadrennium that District Directors of Christian Social Relations make definite arrangements to have Seminars on Christian Social Relations, preferably as soon after this Annual Conference as possible.

(2) We also recommend that the new Board plan and have a Conference School on Social Relations and again we recommend that this be held soon after Conference. With the emphasis on a combined Board of Christian Social Relations we believe it is necessary that everyone become coordinated about the job in order to do as effective a job as possible. We then recommend that this school be held this fall at Glen Lake Camp.

(3) We urge your continued support of Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education Inc. We appreciate the aggressive leadership of Dr. Albert Tucker and all the staff of this state organization. Our churches should welcome T.A.N.E. speakers into their pulpits to present this problem, and should be conscious of their financial needs in order that this program can continue to be effective.

(4) We urge continued attendance on the part of Temperance personnel to the many and informative Seminars held at Conference, Jurisdictional and National levels. Especially would we call attention to the South Central Jurisdiction Briefing Conference on Christian Social Relations at Mt. Sequayah on August 1-4, 1960. A fine opportunity is offered here for members of the new Board. Those who have been sent to these specialized seminars should be utilized in programs in this area.

(5) Your Conference Board urges a new awakening on the matter of alcohol legislation. Too long have we been silent when the liquor forces have swayed legislators to their will. It is high time that we throw our support to legislation and legislators who will stand up and be counted on good moral, and social legislation. Write your congressman, send telegrams, call them by phone, but whatever you do be sure he knows your feelings concerning pending liquor legislation.

(6) Commitment Day in The Methodist Church offers a unique opportunity to present the Temperance cause. Utilize this day to its greatest advantage. Give your people an opportunity to pledge themselves to this high call of abstinence and sobriety. Your church will be stronger when you do.

(7) We are appalled at the terrible war that the merchants of filth are waging in our country. We commend Postmaster Summerfield for his active campaign against pornographic literature in the mails. We urge parents to be ever diligent in reporting to proper authorities when this type of filth invades your homes and the lives of your children. We urge continued resistance to this organized filth campaign and to para-mutual betting in our state.

(8) Your Board has been able during the past four years to purchase numerous helpful films in the field of Temperance. These films are now being booked out of the offices of the Conference Board of Education, and we suggest that churches make use of this free service.

(9) We respectfully request the World Service and Finance Commission to grant the Conference Board of Temperance a sum of \$1,750.00 for its work in 1961-62.

The longer we live the more we become convinced that the only sure way of handling the liquor problem is the abstinence way. Alcohol itself is not the problem . . . it is the person after he drinks alcohol who becomes the problem. Therefore once again, we call our people to the high doctrine of abstinence. This

plague must be overcome . . . with the help of God and a militant and informed clergy and laity this can be accomplished.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

Each year there is an increased evidence of the interest in the work of our Town and Country churches. Not only are there more individual churches recognizing their opportunities and potentialities, but there is an awareness among these churches of their inter-relatedness.

This could easily be proven by the amount of work done co-operatively by the churches in the South Limestone Project. In September, 1959 Mrs. Nan H. Wright was assigned to this area to work with the District Superintendent, pastors, and laymen of the following churches: Ben Hur, Big Hill, Groesbeck, Thornton and Odds. Since D. L. McCree had been anticipating this move and had requested the establishment of such a project, many of the preliminary details had been cared for before Mrs. Wright's arrival. The pastors of the churches had been working closely with the laymen and as a consequence we have here a fine example of our Methodist fellowship.

We wish to commend the churches of the Hood County Project and J. W. Sprinkle for their continuous good work in this area.

Nineteen representatives from our conference attended the National Methodist Town and Country Conference in Wichita, Kansas July 21-24, 1959. The theme for this conference was 'Emerging Patterns In Town And Country Methodism.' As a result of this conference we feel that our commission leadership is more informed and has a renewed challenge to deal with our problems more effectively.

We feel that the study on Town and Country Work by the Woman's Society of Christian Service will awaken our entire church to this area of concern. Our Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service under the leadership of Mrs. Joel W. Hooper has been very helpful. The laymen, under the leadership of Jarrard Secrest, have assumed much responsibility in carrying out the program of The Methodist Church in our Town and Country churches. We are indebted to Bishop William C. Martin and the members of his cabinet for their interests and encouragement.

Mrs. Nan H. Wright and Robert Haynes have given quality leadership in the work of Town and Country. Robert Haynes has been serving a full-time pastoral charge and given many hours to the office of Executive Secretary for our commission. The latter was without salary; just a token expense account. We want to commend the laymen of his church, Euless, on their fine spirit in permitting him to do this additional work.

We further recommend that every church in the bounds of our annual conference observe Rural Life Sunday which comes in May each year. We also feel that there would be a great value in some observance of a Harvest Festival in the fall of the year.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

As we approach the end of this quadrennium and review the record, which is only a partial accounting, we rejoice that progress is indicated in every area.

A new heart of enthusiasm has come to many groups because of the stimulating and challenging programs.

Each year more women are taking advantage of educational opportunities on every level: local, district, conference, and jurisdiction, as missionary education continues to captivate their hearts and minds. Thirty attended the Jurisdiction School of Missions held at Mt. Sequoyah, 272 were present for the Conference School held at Southwestern University, Georgetown and 1,467 attended the District Educational Seminars.

It was our privilege to have representatives at the first great Methodist Conference on Human Relations which was held in Dallas in the fall. Here our attention was focused afresh on our responsibilities as Christian citizens as we faced the perplexing issues of race relations in regard to housing, education, and employment, and sought to find ways to aid in the solution of these problems.

Another great concern of the church today is the disturbing situations that are arising in family life because of the number of women, especially married women, who are employed outside the home. In order to bring this subject to the attention of the churches and church people, the Woman's Division proposed that, during September and October of 1959, a study be made in each district across the nation on "Employed Women and the Church." This plan was carried out

in eight of the ten districts in our conference and as a result we hope each community will reap rich rewards, as they strive to meet the needs of families everywhere.

This has been a significant year in the lives of many youth of our conference. In July, eighteen of our young people participated in an interracial work camp, where they spent an entire week in work, play, and worship as they helped with the program of activities at Bethlehem Center and Wesley Community House. The interracial fellowship and the tasks accomplished meant much to all.

The latest successful venture was a Seminar on World Peace which was held at Glen Lake on April 1 and 2. There were 68 youth and adults registered, and the interest and response were wonderful. Words are inadequate to express appreciation for the fine work done by Mrs. Roy Johnson and Rev. Bob Robertson as they have guided the activities of our youth.

Special emphasis has been given to the work with children this year. The Conference Secretary of Children's work, Mrs. Paul A. Mason, attended the Quadrennial Regional Training Conference in Kansas City in May, spent two entire weeks in special training at Mt. Sequoyah, and has taught in a number of District Training Schools, in addition to the regular work.

Missionary recruitment continues to be of utmost importance. In an effort to present the needs and challenge the young people to find their places of richest usefulness and development, a conference on Christian Vocations was held at Texas Wesleyan College in April. A group of some 50 to 60 students, along with several missionaries are deaconesses, spent two days discussing the needs and considering the opportunities. It is our hope and prayer that rich results may come from this conference, and also from similar ones which will be held in the future.

The conference Secretary of Christian Social Relations reports that every district in the conference has now ratified the Charter of Racial Policies. The TV Monitoring in the fall sent calls and letters to networks, sponsors, and local stations commending the good and protesting the bad in the programs and commercials. The Role of the United Nations in World Affairs was a most popular study and was well presented in many societies and guilds.

Our rural worker, Mrs. Nan Wright, continues to do excellent work. On September 1st., her area of service was changed from the Cleburne District to the Corsicana District. She is now well established there and busily engaged in sparking an interest in every phase of the work of the church throughout the area.

There are so many interesting features about each line of work, one is reluctant to close. However, we must include a few statistics. We rejoice that six new societies and seven new guilds have been organized this year, an addition of 1022 new members in the Woman's Society and 313 in the Guild, a total of 1335.

The record in regard to finance indicates that this will be the greatest year in history. Last year we ranked second in the Jurisdiction in per capita giving, the amount being \$7.42; Louisiana Conference ranked first with \$7.43. This year the financial support has been more systematic and generous than ever before. It will be May 15th before we can record a final accounting of this year's stewardship, but we do know that there has been an increase along all lines. Last year, the women of this conference gave over \$132,000 on appropriations, more than \$7,000 for Week of Prayer and Self-Denial, over \$10,000 in cash for Supplies, over \$2,000 in Supplementary giving, such as Crusade Scholarships and other special interests, a grand total of \$151,283.29. For this we are humbly grateful. We are confident that because of the growing knowledge of increased needs and with the contributions from the 1335 new members, the total giving for this year will show a substantial increase.

As we look toward the new quadrennium, we are challenged by the theme: "Our Mission Today." We will study the following topics:

1. The faith that compels us.
2. The factors that confront us.
3. The frontiers which call us.
4. The program which unites us in witness and service.

We have a rich heritage and a challenging future. We face the new quadrennium with hope and confidence knowing that Methodist women will continue to "Serve the Lord with Gladness."

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

Report No. 1

In view of the legislation of the General Conference which has established the consolidation of the Board of World Peace, the Board of Temperance, and the Board of Social and Economic Relations into one general board, the following recommendations are offered:

1. We heartily endorse the consolidation of these General Boards into one board. We believe that this pattern of organization should be followed at all levels in the organizational structure of The Methodist Church.
2. We are in complete accord with the recommendation of the Conference Council on Christian Social Relations that our Committee on World Peace, the Board of Temperance, and the Board of Social and Economic Relations be reorganized into one Board at this Annual Conference session.
3. We express the hope that the causes of world peace, temperance, and social and economic relations continue to receive their proper and proportionate emphasis by maintaining within the organizational structure of the Conference Board committees charged with these specific responsibilities.
4. We urge the new Conference Board to continuously seek to lead the people of our Church toward Christian solutions to the political, social, and economic problems of our time, and that they not allow prejudice against any one concern to compromise the work of the Board and the Annual Conference in the other areas of responsibility delegated to it.
5. We commend to the new Board the annual reports of the Conference Committee on World Peace as being possible material for the development of an effective program for peacemaking during the ensuing years. Also, we commend to the Board and every pastor the "Workbook on World Peace" which has been prepared by our Committee for your use this conference year.
6. We urge that the new officers of the Board and at least three other members at large attend the South Central Briefing Conference, at Mount Sequoyah, Arkansas, August 1-4, 1960. We ask that the Annual Conference provide funds for this as this will be the most important training of the General Board.
7. We also urge that representatives of the new Board be sent as delegates to the Methodist Conference on Christian Social Concerns, January 31 to February 3, 1961, in Washington, D. C.
8. We ask that the Commission on World Service and Finance transfer to the new Conference Board the funds allocated to the Committee on World Peace for the Conference Year 1960-1961.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE**Report No. 1**

1. The World Service and Finance Commission requests that no Board, Committee or Commission of the Central Texas Conference expend any money for any purpose which has not been authorized in the original budget request. We further request that every Board, Committee and Commission submit an itemized request in their Annual Conference report.

2. We recommend as a part of operational procedure that all Annual Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees which receive annual appropriations from the Conference budget shall remit to the Conference Treasurer a check covering the unused portion of their annual allocation. This money shall be deposited to the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference and the check shall be mailed not later than June 20th and the report shall be mailed to the Secretary of the Commission. This request is made with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer, with the consent and cooperation of the Commission on World Service and Finance, will honor all necessary monthly expenses.

3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to invest the temporarily unused funds of the Conference Treasury in "Ninety-one (91) Day Treasury Bills" only. These are to be purchased through banking sources alone and the yield therefrom shall revert to the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference.

4. We recommend that the apportionment of 10½% of the salaries of ministers, associates and approved supplies serving churches in the Central Texas Conference be assessed for the support of the District Superintendency. This amount shall be divided equally between the ten (10) districts of the Conference and shall cover all costs of the office including salary, operational expense, office expense and District Parsonage rental allowance, to the extent expended for utilities. No other amount shall be levied against the churches of the District for the District Superintendent's office and expenses except for the provision and maintenance of the District Parsonage.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE**Report No. 2**

1. We approve and recommend that special offerings be taken in all the churches of the Central Texas Conference this year on the dates designated by the various Boards and Committees having them in charge, as follows: Methodist Home at Waco, Golden Cross, Methodist Student Day, World Service Sunday, College Day, Texas Mission Home and Training School, Church School Rally Day, Veteran's Day for Retired Minister's Homes second Sunday in July and Mother's Day for Wesleyan Homes, and Mission Festival Sunday, second Sunday in November.

2. We authorize the treasurer to pay from the total receipts for Benevolences the expense of the Conference and the following items before the distribution of any money is made:

- (1) Expense of printing the Journal.
- (2) Expense of the Conference Secretarial Staff.
- (3) The printing expense and secretarial help for the Conference Treas-

urer in such amounts as shall be agreed upon by the Treasurer and the Commission on World Service and Finance.

(4) The expense of bonding all treasures of Boards and Commissions who handle Conference Funds, including the Conference Treasurer.

(5) The expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, and the Treasurers of Boards and Commissions as they shall be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. We recommend that all funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer to be received no later than May 31st of each year in accordance with the action of the Conference which makes the fiscal year June 1 to May 31.

4. All funds received by the Treasurer in excess of General Conference and Annual Conference askings shall be distributed in accordance with the Disciplinary provisions. After the Annual Conference expenses have been met the percentage of the balance which is due the General Conference Treasurer shall be remitted immediately. All over payment of World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be remitted to the General Treasurer for World Service on the percentage basis. The balance shall be held by the Conference Treasurer in the Contingency Fund for distribution by the World Service and Finance Commission.

5. We request that all Boards and Commissions make requests for annual appropriations to the Commission on World Service and Finance at the time of the meeting of the Administrative Council before the meeting of the annual conference.

6. We recommend that every church continue to support the work of the Radio and Television Ministry with a special offering at the time most convenient for the Districts.

GEORGE WAVERLY DAVIS

Dr. George Waverly Davis was born February 8, 1873 in Lauderdale County, Mississippi. On September 4, 1912 he was united in marriage to Miss Anne Stokes.

Dr. Davis attended Mississippi A & M College, Baylor University and Southwestern University. In 1901 he received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Southwestern University and in 1922 that university conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Dr. George Waverly Davis was licensed to preach in 1896. He was admitted on trial to the Texas Conference in 1899 and into full connection in 1903. Churches served by him in the Texas Conference were First Methodist Church at Texarkana, Huntsville, Crockett and Rockdale.

Dr. Davis gave unceasingly of himself as he served as Presiding Elder in the Texas Conference, serving in the Marlin District from 1915 to 1917 and in the Houston District from 1920 to 1923.

In 1928 Dr. Davis transferred to the Central Texas Conference and served as pastor to the Meadowbrook Methodist Church in Fort Worth and churches in Mexia, Taylor, Olney and Moody. Although he retired from the active ministry in 1945 while serving the First Methodist Church in Moody, Dr. Davis continued to serve where needed in the Central Texas Conference as Supply Pastor.

At his retirement, Dr. and Mrs. Davis purchased a home in Moody and enjoyed a home of their own within walking distance of their beloved church. Mrs. Davis continues to reside in the home with their younger daughter, Miss Mary Stokes Davis. Other surviving children are a daughter, Mrs. Wall C. Kutzschbach, and a son, George W. Davis, Jr.

Dr. Davis' death came at the age of eighty-six on November 11, 1959 in a hospital in Temple, Texas. He had suffered a cerebral hemorrhage at his home several months before and had been hospitalized since that time.

The memorial service was held in the First Methodist Church of Moody and was conducted by Dr. Oran Stephens, assisted by Rev. Walter G. Black and Rev. Marion Ford, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Moody. Burial was in the Moody Cemetery.

As Dr. Davis would fondly recall his experiences, his most treasured memory was that while serving as Presiding Elder of the Houston District he gave our Bishop, William C. Martin his first appointment.

Dr. Davis was a handsome man who enhanced the dignity of any pulpit he might have filled. He seemed to radiate from within because of his capacity for understanding and his love for all of God's children. His study light burned nightly as he increased in the knowledge of God and on the morrow he transmitted to men in all walks of life the message of life eternal that God has to offer each of His children. Vitally interested in youth and its promise, Dr. Davis inspired many young men to surrender their lives in His service. Can any greater tribute be paid a man than to say that the work he started is being carried on in many fields white for harvest as he looks on from his eternal home.?

ROBERT C. EDWARDS

Robert Cleveland Edwards was born October 13, 1890, in Hazlehurst, Mississippi, to Jesse Madison Edwards and Sarah Elizabeth Ainsworth. On November 9, 1916, he and Ruth Spellman Byars were married beginning the ideal and exemplary Christian home which through the years has been an inspiration for all those who knew "Bob and Ruth."

He united with the Church in 1904 and three years later began to preach at the age of seventeen. He attended Mill-saps College at Jackson, Mississippi, S.M.U. at Dallas, Texas. He was graduated from New Mexico State Teachers College. He taught school two years before he was admitted into full connection. He was licensed to preach May 12, 1909 by the Natchez District Conference of the Mississippi Annual Conference; admitted on Trial in 1916 in the Southwest Missouri Conference and into full connection in 1920. He transferred from the New Mexico Conference to the Central Texas Conference in 1935.

His appointments were: Grandview-Martin City and Garden City in the Southwest Missouri Conference. Transferring to the New Mexico Conference he served as Chaplain of the Veterans Hospital for five years at Fort Bayard, New Mexico. Other churches served in the New Mexico Conference were Fort Stockton and First Church, Roswell. Coming to Central Texas Conference he served in turn First Church, Graham, and then First Church, San Marcos in the Southwest Texas Conference. Returning to the Central Texas Conference he served the following appointments: Fort Worth, Meadowbrook, Mexia, Ranger, Arlington, First, Superintendent of the Georgetown District, Hillsboro First, Weatherford First, Stephenville First, and Cisco First.

Death came on August 8, 1959, at Baylor Hospital, Dallas, Texas. Dr. Edwards had taken ill only two weeks before not knowing that he had acute leukemia. Just a few weeks before his death on June 14, 1959, he baptized his grandson, Robert Guy Custer, the son of Dr. and Mrs. Judson S. Custer, in First Methodist Church, Georgetown, and was not only serving effectively as pastor of First Methodist Church, Cisco, Texas, but was also giving careful leadership throughout his Annual Conference and Church as Chairman of the Commission on Minimum Salary, a Trustee of Texas Wesleyan College, a Trustee of Wesleyan Homes, Inc., and a member of the Board of Pensions.

Funeral services were conducted August 10, 1959, in First Methodist Church, Georgetown, with burial in Capitol Memorial Gardens near Austin, Texas. Officiating ministers were Reverend Richard R. Smith, pastor, Reverend J. W. Whitefield, Supt. of the Brownwood District, Dr. A. A. Peacock, Supt. of the Cisco District. Pallbearers were Rev. M. H. Knox, Rev. J. D. F. Williams, Rev. C. H. Cole, Dr. Stanley Williams, Dr. W. V. Bane, Dr. A. S. Gafford. Surviving him were his wife, Ruth, and one daughter, Mrs. J. S. Custer of Georgetown, two grandchildren, Eileen Louise and Robert Guy Custer, three sisters and four brothers of Hazlehurst, Mississippi and Port Arthur, Texas.

Dr. Edwards belongs to that endless line of splendor, those who have served their God and Savior without reservation. His memorial is written in the hearts and

lives of countless men, women, and children who have been privileged to know him as pastor, preacher, administrator, and Christian friend. His love of God through Christ Jesus was the basis of his call as a minister. His love of his fellow man was the basis of his deep understanding and wise and sympathetic counsel. His monument is the Church of his Lord Jesus Christ which he served with diligence and honor all his life.

During his ministry he was the Secretary of the New Mexico Conference and also a Delegate to the General Conference meeting in Dallas, Texas. He was honored by Southwestern University with the Doctor of Divinity Degree for his outstanding leadership in The Methodist Church and from 1930-1934 he was a member of the General Board of Education.

God has called home another of His own. His going directs us to the one great Hope of his calling. We are ever grateful for Bob Edwards pointing The Way. As a young minister on my first work, Ruth's "Robert" laid his hand on my shoulder and became in every sense of the word "my father in the ministry." I am only one of many who look back with abiding appreciation for his life and ministry and who look forward to the day when we will all be together again in God's eternal and glorious heaven.

ARCHEY WATSON GORDON

Archy Watson Gordon was born at Bono, Texas, Johnson County, in 1883. His parents, Cyles Monroe and Louisa Gordon, provided for him a Christian home where God was loved and honored.

The Reverend A. W. Gordon established his own home when, in 1914, he was united in marriage to Miss Evelina Messenger. To this union were born three sons and two daughters.

In 1902, A. W. Gordon was graduated from old Polytechnic in Fort Worth and later from Vanderbilt University in Nashville, Tennessee and Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

After retirement, A. W. Gordon lived in his own home in Fort Worth until, with his wife, he went to live in Eugene, Oregon.

Funeral services, with Bishop William C. Martin, the Reverend L. B. Craven, the Reverend J. C. Mann, and the pastor officiating, were held at Burleson Methodist Church on Sunday afternoon, October 25, 1959.

A. W. Gordon is survived by his wife, three sons: Marshall, Grady, and Glenn, and one daughter; Mrs. J. C. Pollard.

This man of God served pastorates in three different conferences in Texas and did it creditably. He loved his church and was a conscientious, Christian gentleman who made many friends wherever he went. He helped build several churches and parsonages. Because of his love for young men, he was able to influence several to hear God's call to the Christian ministry. He loved his family and was loved in return.

He is survived by his wife, Sarah, who lives at 2709 Cumberland, Waco. He is also survived by his three sons and two daughters and ten grandchildren.

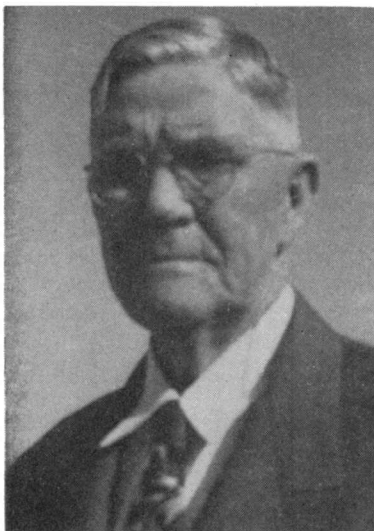

E. R. PATTERSON

The Rev. Everett R. Patterson, son of Nathaniel Smith and Mary Jane Gill Patterson, was born February 1, 1872 near Waxahachie, and grew to manhood there. In November 1891 he was married to Leona Curry and to this union two children were born: J. Fred Patterson and Mrs. Bess Patterson Miller.

The Rev. Mr. Patterson was converted in early childhood, and early in life he felt the call to preach. However, he did not yield to that call until about 1898 when he was licensed as a Local Preacher. His education was secured in the Waxahachie schools and old Marvin College in Waxahachie. In 1900 he attended Polytechnic Institute in Midlothian, and in 1902 he was admitted on trial in the Northwest Texas Conference.

When the Central Texas Conference was formed in 1910 he remained in Central Texas and continued the rest of his ministry within the bounds of that Conference.

Charges that the Reverend Mr. Patterson served included Lovelace, Bardwell, Ovilla, Ranger, Salado, Palmer, East Waco, Desdemona, Moody, McGregor, Clay Avenue in Waco, Valley Mills, Bethel and Eddy. After his retirement he served the Waxahachie Circuit as a supply pastor for four years.

One of twelve children the Reverend Mr. Patterson with his brothers and sisters gathered around the old organ almost every evening and sang the great gospel songs, and through out his ministry, he loved to sing and led the song service in many of his revivals.

The ministry of "Brother Pat," as he was known by most of his parishioners, was fruitful and hundreds of souls were led into the Kingdom under his preaching.

In 1938 he took the superannuate relation because of the failing health of his wife, and they moved to their old home town, Midlothian. In 1949 he built a home in Troy and moved there to be near his daughter, Mrs. Rayburn Miller, and in March of 1950 Mrs. Patterson died.

For several years he made his home, alternately, with his son and daughter, and in April of 1956 he was married to Dr. Bertha McDavid, who died in October of 1959. After two months of suffering "Brother Pat" fell asleep on December 18, 1959 in King's Daughters Hospital, Temple, and his tired body was carried back to Midlothian where funeral services were held in First Methodist Church.

The Reverend D. L. Barnes and the Reverend R. W. Walker conducted the services. Interment was in Midlothian Cemetery.

C. E. WADE



Charles Edward Wade was born December 25, 1891 in Joy, (Clay County) Texas to Charles and Lizzie Wade. He was reared in the atmosphere of a Christian home and joined the Methodist Church at an early age, which he never regretted. While still a young man, Charles attended an evangelistic meeting in his church which led him to publically profess these similar words, "I like John Wesley, have felt my heart strangely warmed, that I feel that I do trust in Christ for salvation and that he has taken away my sins." From this religious experience, he desired strongly to help others to come into the same knowledge of his Lord. Following this deep religious experience, Charles Wade was asked to lead the singing at revival meetings, not

Those who visited in their home could always sense that this home, from its beginning, was founded upon the principles of those vows.

During his ministry, Brother Wade served appointments at Personville, Aledo, Gordon, Millsap, Graham, Hewitt, Prairie Hill, Big Hill, Bruceville, China Springs, Elm Mott, Iredell, and Hutto. Due to illness which occurred February 4, 1959, Brother Wade resigned as pastor of the Hutto Methodist Church and accepted the retired relation with the Annual Conference.

After a long siege of illness, death came to him on October 16, 1959 at the Hillcrest Hospital, Waco, Texas. On October 19, memorial services were conducted at the Conally Funeral Home by Dr. Stanley Williams and Charles J. McAfee. Interment was held at the Rosemount Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Sarah "Betty" Wade, who resides at 2709 Alexander, Waco, Texas; three sons, Cecil Edward Wade, James Maurice Wade, and George Melvin; two daughters, Mrs. N. V. Null and Mrs. Hampton Clay.

I have known Brother Wade for several years. I know something of his devotion to God and his thoughtful consideration for others. It was out of this loyalty to God and to his fellowman that led him many times to go the second mile.

The effects of his ministry will live as long as eternity in the lives of those he touched for Christ's sake. In every church he served, he realized that there was a great opportunity to serve the Master and to advance Christ's work on earth. Brother Wade not only loved his church, but he loved his fellow ministers in Christ and always wished for them his very best.

My life has become spiritually enriched because I have had the wonderful privilege of sharing a few days on earth with a Christ-like man. Then, pursuing her academic work, in Nashville, Tennessee, she graduated with the degree: Master of Arts, from Price's College, which later was completely merged with Vanderbilt University, which validates degrees from Price's College as its own.

Miss Era Monk was united in marriage to the Reverend Gid J. Bryan on November 14, 1907, in Louisville, Kentucky. The young couple immediately came back to Texas, to Alvarado, where they served four years. Mrs. Bryan was destined for leadership in the Church. Her conspicuous gifts for services, larger than the field of the local church, were quickly recognized and for four years

she served as Study Superintendent of the Central Texas Conference Woman's Missionary Society. She was then elected President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society, and of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, in which offices she served for nine years.

She was a member of the General Board of Missions for a number of years. She was elected to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1938, and again to the great Uniting Conference in 1939, when the Northern and Southern Churches and the Methodist Protestant Church were merged into one, the largest single English speaking religious body in America. In the united Church, she was elected to the General Conference in 1940 and again in 1944.

When her husband retired in 1950, they moved to their home at 3436 Normandy in Dallas, one block from the S. M. U. campus. Mrs. Bryan placed her membership in the First Methodist Church in Dallas, where her husband has now served on the ministerial staff for eight years. She was active in church work until two months before her death, September 3, 1959, serving as a teacher of a great woman's Sunday School class.

Her funeral service was held in First Methodist Church on September 5th, with Bishop William C. Martin, Dr. Robert E. Goodrich, Sr. and Dr. Robert E. Goodrich, Jr. conducting the service. She was laid to rest in Hillcrest Memorial Park, Dallas, September 5, 1959.

She has now rejoined her husband in that "land of no separation," where they will continue their journey together forever. The angels, no doubt, joined her husband in rejoicing at her "home-coming."

X—MISCELLANEOUS

STANDING RULES

1. Organization

1. There shall be an **Administrative Council** to formulate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference. The Administrative Council shall be composed as follows: the Cabinet, the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Chairman and one other person of each Conference Board and Commission one of whom shall be a lay person and the other a minister except where there is no authorized lay person on the Board or Commission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each district to be nominated by the Cabinet, the Conference President and the Promotional Secretary of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Conference Youth organization and one other young person, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missions, the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, the Conference Chairman of the Texas Methodist College Association, all General and Jurisdictional Board members and General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates not otherwise holding membership on the Council, and such other members as may be nominated by the Executive Committee. All paid employees of the Conference and its agencies shall have the privilege of the floor but without vote.

There shall be an **Executive Committee** of the Administrative Council to be composed as follows: the three officers of the Council, the Chairman of the Cabinet, the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Conference Lay Leader, and the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

2. **The District Superintendents**, at the beginning of the quadrennium shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no member of the Conference shall be nominated on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Conference, except where otherwise provided by the Discipline. This rule is not applicable to the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation. The District Superintendents shall also nominate at the end of any normal term members of any Board, Commission, or Committee.

Vacancies on all such Boards, Commissions and Committees occurring thereafter, shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference. Nevertheless, no nominations shall be made which would allow a member to be on more than one Board, Commission or Committee which must meet during the session of the Conference.

3. **No member of any Board, Commission, or Committee** shall be eligible for membership thereon longer than eight consecutive years and shall not become eligible again for such membership until one full conference year has passed. The membership of quadrennial boards, and commissions shall be divided by the board or commission into two groups, one group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of one quadrennium, and the second whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the succeeding quadrennium. Members appointed to fill unexpired terms of less than two years shall be eligible for re-election for eight years.

4. No person shall be a member of a Conference Board, Commission or Committee, if he is in the salaried employ of that Board, or of an institution which derives financial support from said Board; or appointed a Trustee of such institution.

5. The appointment of any member of the Conference to the **District Superintendency** shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees to take effect at the time

of his appointment, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission or Committee. The Bishop is asked to notify such group in time to fill the vacancy before the Conference adjourns.

Retirement from active itinerancy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board or Commission, effective at the end of the term of the quadrennium, which ever date is applicable.

6. Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two successive annual meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

7. The Bishop and his Cabinet shall **nominate** to the Annual Conference next preceeding the meeting of the General Conference a **Conference Secretary** to be elected by the Conference for the Quadrennium. Whenever there is to be a change in Secretary, the one newly elected shall assume his official duties at the session following General Conference.

8. **The District Conference** shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate.

II. Financial

9. **The fiscal** year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries of the clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

10. **Remittances from a pastoral charge** to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Commission on World Service and Finance. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which remittance is made. The **Conference Treasurer** shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the **District Superintendent** for each remittance. The Pastor shall enclose these voucher receipts with his Annual Conference report as verification of items reported in table II.

11. **The appointments for World Service** and Conference Benevolences shall be based on the total money raised (item 75 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness (item 42 in Report to Annual Conference) and less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 43 in the Report of Annual Conference). It shall be the duty of the World Service and Finance Commission to compute the appointment annually, using the statistics of the last published journal (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. District Superintendents will use the best possible approach in distributing the askings to the individual churches of the Districts.

12. **The Auditing Committee** appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

13. Annually, **each Board** or special interest, shall make **request** to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any **Special Day Offering**, except where set by the Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause or institution, nor shall such a day be listed in the printed Conference Calendar unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit including current annual income and expense, to the Board having supervision of its work.

14. Any request from a Board or institution or special interest of the Methodist Church asking for a special campaign for funds or a Special Day Offering shall first be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and recommendation. If such recommendation is made to the Annual Conference it must show that the object of enterprise is wholly owned by The Methodist Church; that the detailed use of funds is reasonable; that proper safeguards have been set up for the use of the funds.

15. Any recommendation from a Board, Commission, or Committee, including the Commission on World Service and Finance, asking for an increase that will effect the Budget of the local church, if approved, shall not become effective for one year from that date.

III. Administrative

16. **The statistics** of the Annual Conference shall be based upon the reports in the hands of the Statistician on the fourth day prior to the opening of the Annual Conference; provided further that if the Annual Conference meets prior to June 4 then the deadline shall be the earlier of the two dates, June 1 or the day before the opening session.

17. The Annual **report of the Conference Treasurer** shall be based on the funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer on June 1st.

18. Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Committee on Proportionate Payments any Church in the District that has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, or World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrowed must be made a part of the record.

He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attention during the year, and had not been reported.

19. All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

20. All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary **before** they are presented to the Conference.

21. **All Bonds** required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

22. **The Conference Committee on Entertainment**, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of Retired Ministers.

Each charge in the Annual Conference is expected to defray the expense of its minister and lay delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

Per diem allowances will be granted to ministers and lay delegates from minimum salary charges in an amount recommended by the Committee on Entertainment and voted by the Conference.

23. There shall be a permanent **Committee on Memoirs** composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The Minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

24. It shall require a two-thirds vote to suspend or amend any of these rules.
