DAILY PROCEEDINGS**SPECIAL SESSION****Opening Session—Tuesday Morning, September 27, 1960**

Opening Worship—The Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church met in called session September 27, 1960 in the Polytechnic Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, at 9:30 a.m. with Bishop William C. Martin, presiding.

Hymn No. 4, "O Worship The King" was sung and Bishop Martin led the Conference in the "Apostles' Creed." Maggart B. Howell, host pastor, led the opening prayer.

Bishop Martin led the Responsive Reading for the 46th Sunday, "Reconciled to God." The Gloria Patri was sung. Hymn No. 382, "Glorious Things Of Thee Are Spoken" was sung.

Roll Call—Bishop Martin extended greeting to the Conference.

Nick H. Kupferle, Jr., Conference Secretary, asked the delegates to register their attendance.

Welcome—Maggart B. Howell, host pastor, welcomed the Conference. He announced that Dr. Law Sone would give instructions concerning the noon meal later on.

Nominations: Hayden Edwards, Secretary of the Cabinet, recommended that the committees which served at the last session of Annual Conference be the committees for this called session. He made nominations for various boards and committees. The report was accepted. (See reports).

Administrative Council—Bishop Martin announced the organization and election of officers of the Administrative Council. Chairman, L. Stanley Williams; Vice-Chairman, H. A. Brookshire; Secretary, C. C. Sessions.

L. Stanley Williams, Chairman of the Administrative Council, directed the report of the Council.

Board of Education—Bruce Weaver, Chairman of the Conference Board of Education, reported on the swimming pool project at Glen Lake. He asked the Conference to authorize the expenditure of necessary funds to complete the project. He moved the adoption of Report No. 1. It was approved. (See reports).

Report No. 2—B. F. Jackson, Jr. was elected to the Board of Education.

Thomas B. Granger, Conference Executive Secretary, presented Mrs. George M. Greebon, who has resigned as Conference Director of Childrens work.

Bishop Martin asked for report on attendance at Sunday School. It was pointed out that although Church School enrollment has increased, attendance has decreased.

Robert L. Robertson, Conference Director of Youth Work, spoke concerning the Adult Worker With Youth Training Program to be held at Glen Lake, October 7-8. Bruce Weaver presented Dr. Roy L. Farrow, Director of the Texas Methodist College Association. Dr. Farrow referred to a printed report which had been distributed.

Dr. Farrow reported on the "Capital Fund Campaign" to raise thirty-two million dollars for higher education in Texas.

Board of Evangelism—Carroll Thompson, Chairman of the Board of Evangelism, presented Charles Whittle, Executive Secretary of the Board.

Charles Whittle reported that a Christmas Conference for Young Ministers under the direction of Quay Parmer would be held December 27, 28, and 29. Place to be announced.

The Enlistment Mission is to be held February 11-16 and 18-23. The Mission is to present a three fold emphasis; Pulpit, Pew, and Pavement.

Hospitals and Homes—Richard E. Millsap, Chairman of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, presented M. Howard Knox, Executive Director of Wesleyan Homes.

Charles H. Cole, reported for the Board of Trustees of The Retired Ministers Home.

Personal Privilege—Bishop Martin mentioned that J. W. W. Shuler will be one-hundred years old on October 29, and will observe his birthday in Hillsboro.

Board of Ministerial Training—Wilson Canafax, Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, reported for the board.

Board of Missions—Hubert C. Smith, Chairman of the Board of Missions, spoke concerning Church Extension, and "Preaching the Gospel Around the World."

James H. Ellison, Conference Missionary Secretary, gave the report for the Board of Missions.

Hubert C. Smith pointed out that we are switching our Conference support from Brazil to Southern Rhodesia. He presented Leonard Bloomquist, a missionary, who spoke to the Conference about his work.

The Chairman announced that Conference Builders Club Sunday will be observed the first Sunday in November.

Courtesies and Agenda—Bishop Martin presented Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Sprinkle, visitors from the North Texas Conference.

Recess.

Opening—Hymn 238 "Blessed Assurance" was sung.

Church Music Conference—Fred Bigelow, Director of Music at the Central Methodist Church, Fort Worth, announced a Music Conference to be held January 14, 1961, in the Central Church.

Personal Privilege—D. L. McCree, Chairman of the Cabinet, asked that C. C. Sessions and Hayden Edwards escort Mrs. Wm. C. Martin to the chancel as the Conference stood. An electric organ was presented to her on behalf of the Conference. Mrs. Martin expressed her gratitude to the Conference.

Board of Lay Activities—Roy J. Grogan, Conference Lay Leader, announced that over one-thousand men registered for the Lay Retreat last August.

Woman's Society of Christian Service—Mrs. R. S. High, Conference President, lifted the part of the Womans Society of Christian Service in the Stewardship Emphasis. Mrs. High announced that Mrs. Jael Hooper has been elected to the Jurisdictional Board of the Womans Society of Christian Service. There are ninety-eight churches which do not have organized societies.

Board of Pensions—E. R. Gordon, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, presented J. D. F. Williams, Chairman of Pension Study Committee, who in turn presented S. A. Baker, Secretary of the Committee, who read the report. The report was approved. (See reports)

S. A. Baker, Secretary of the Board of Pensions, reported that Robert Lincoln Meyers of the Kentucky Conference, was Pastor of the College Heights Church, Fort Worth, for one year. Rev. Meyers needs to certify this appointment

in order to clear his pension record. Baker stated that Floyd E. Johnson has confirmed the fact that Rev. Meyers served the College Heights Church from April 1924 to November 1925. Baker moved that the Conference approve this report. It was approved. (See Reports)

Christian Social Concern—Erwin F. Bohmfalk, Chairman of Christian Social Concern, reported that the commission is sending the Sub-committee Chairman on World Peace, Walter Black, to the National Seminar at United Nations Building, N. Y.

He reported that the commission was cooperating in the Annual Mission Study recommended by the Board of Missions.

Conference Entertainment—B. L. McCord, Chairman on the Committee on Conference Entertainment, reported that the committee will no longer pay expenses of laymen attending Annual Conference.

Conference Relations—Leroy Brown, Chairman of Committee on Conference Relations, recommended that George Cassis, Jr., be discontinued as of June 8, 1958. It was approved. (See report on page 54, of the 1960 Conference Journal)

Committee on Rules—M. Howard Knox, Chairman of the Committee on Rules, read a report concerning required attendance at meetings of Quandrennial Boards. The report was adopted unanimously. (See reports).

Joint Board of Publications and Methodist Informations—C. H. Sisserson nominated Dub King, of First Methodist Church, Waco, to replace I. E. McWhirter, deceased. He was elected.

Committee on Resolutions—Bishop Martin proposed that the Committee on Resolutions be allowed to frame a report and send copies to the proper persons. This was approved.

Announcements—Low Sone made an announcement regarding the noon meal. This was being served by T.W.C. with the aid of the women of the host church.

Morning Worship—Hymn 144 "Beneath of the Cross of Jesus." Sermon was given by Bishop Martin.

Adjournment—Bishop Martin pronounced the Benediction and Conference was adjourned until 2:00 P.M.

Second Session—Tuesday Afternoon, September 27, 1960

Opening—Hymn No. 244, "My Hope Is Built" was sung.

W. C. Taylor, Sr., led the Conference in prayer.

Workshops on Evangelism—Bishop Martin presented the workshop leaders. They were: Dr. Albert C. Outler, Dr. James S. Chubb, Dr. Eugene F. Jud.

Maggart B. Howell announced the place for group meetings. Sanctuary; Fort Worth East and West, and Cleburne. Fellowship Hall; Corsicana, Georgetown, Waco and Waxahachie. Chapel: Brownwood, Cisco and Gatesville.

Adjournment—Each group was dismissed from the workshop meeting and the Conference stood in adjournment.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

In setting forth the Quadrennial emphasis "Christ is Lord," the recent General Conference adopted a very strong statement on the Missionary Program of the Methodist Church. "Let us serve Him by intensifying our missionary obedience. In face of Christ's commission 'go ye into all the world,' and the constant growth of non-Christian population, we must in every Central and Jurisdictional Conference, intensify our efforts to enlist a large number of missionary candidates, increase the interest and concern of our people for the evangelization of the world and provide means whereby many more missionaries may be sent. The goal must be every Methodist supporting our missionary outreach by his prayers and gifts."

Recognizing an increase of 150% in "Advance Special" giving of the Central Texas Conference in the past four years we have cause for rejoicing. However, in both National and World areas there exists challenges that demand our attention.

National Missions

Our neighbors of the Oklahoma Indian Missions continue in their effort to provide a native ministry. However, this is difficult when their place of worship is a tent, a tar-paper shack, an abandoned roofless store building, or a dilapidated old house. In addition to places for worship and church school there is a need for parsonages and money to maintain a \$2,400.00 minimum salary. Money is needed to defray room and board cost for native Indian Christian service students.

Methodism's continuing interest in Latin American work and particularly among our brothers of the Rio Grande Conference are zenith opportunities for "Advance Special" support. The maintenance of a pastoral ministry for Latin American Missions within the geographical bounds of our Conference is a constant challenge. To aid in affording educational opportunities toward the develop-

ment of a native Spanish speaking ministry is our high privilege. The rapidly growing population of these citizens of our state increases the necessity for an adequate proclamation of the "good news" through the Methodist Church. It is through Methodism that they find a new freedom in Protestantism. This mission is at our very doorsteps and we must not fail!

Other National Advance Special opportunities exist in Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Alaska, Henderson Settlement, and Lydia Patterson Institute.

World Missions

"The Great Commission" and the several "Macedonian calls" continue to remind us of the divine imperative to witness boldly "by declaration and deed, to the Lordship and power of Jesus Christ over all life." In response the churches of this conference have reached out to give partial and total support to fifty-nine different projects. This is a healthy sign of Christian enthusiasm. However, perhaps a joint endeavor and concerted effort would result in a more significant Christian impression.

To this end our attention is directed to two recommended conference supported projects: to one of the New Lands of Witness and Decision, Southern Rhodesia and to India. Southern Rhodesia, like other African countries is preparing its national leadership, surely it is God's will that it be a Christian leadership. Therefore, the mission schools and compounds of the Methodist Church are God's instruments in this endeavor.

India remains a country of tremendous world influence. In the midst of Moslem and Hindu influences Christianity continues its witness. Through educational, health, welfare, and worship opportunities God, the Father and Jesus Christ, the Savior are constantly lifted to draw men into new and abundant life.

Because of the inadequate physical plant of Parker Intermediate College at Moradabad, India, our witness does not measure to its potential. Due to the lack of a science laboratory the curriculum is without a Christian interpretation of the natural and physical sciences. Inadequate student housing and furnishings necessitates crowded conditions and sleeping on the floor. The lack of teacher housing prevents the employment of Christian teachers and therefore necessitates the use of Moslem and Hindu resident teachers.

A dormitory, laboratory, and housing for Christian teachers would greatly enhance the Christian witness opportunities of our missionary endeavor in India.

Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief

The Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief (M.C.O.R.) continues to provide food, clothing, shelter, and medicine for destitute areas and victims of disaster.

M.C.O.R. is enlisted and urging financial support of the multi-purpose food program, "Meals for Millions," as a means of supplying missionaries with food to distribute to hungry people and those suffering from malnutrition.

Mission Study Course

The Christian Mission is everywhere. Christian concern for people knows no limits; therefore, our mission study course, concerning beverage alcohol and the text, "Stumbling Block." Why an alcohol study? Because of our concern and the desire to free individuals from alcohol and alcoholism to a life of spiritual peace.

The Christian Mission incorporates the whole salvation of the whole man. Our society witnesses to the need for factual and complete understanding of alcohol and its effects upon our society, economy, national health, and spiritual witness. We commend this study to every congregation.

The Conference Program

That we may "Serve Him by Intensifying Our Mission Obedience," your Conference Board of Missions proposes a definite educational program and financial goals.

The Conference Program includes:

- I. An original Mission Commission in each local church to present:
 - A. An adequate program of education and cultivation.
 - B. A challenging goal for "Advance for Christ" financial support including:
 1. Participation in whatever District Program for National and World Advance Projects are agreed upon by the District.
 2. One or more additional Advance Special Projects in each church.
- II. The Church-wide study course, "Stumbling Block," used in each church.
- III. 100% payment of World Service and use of World Service Leaflets.
- IV. Observance of and an offering received for:
 - A. M.C.O.R. with offerings on World Wide Communion Sunday and The Great Hour of Shoring.
 - B. "Meals for Millions," multi-purpose food project of M.C.O.R. (A minimum of \$200.00 per district or a minimum of \$6.00 per church).
 - C. Conference Builder's Club to be presented in each church.
 - D. All fourth Sunday and Benevolent causes approved by the Conference.

The Financial Goals

It is recommended that the Conference set as its goal for the quadrennium, the sum of \$450,000.00 to be paid to National and World Advance Specials, exclusive of any payments to M.C.O.R. This would be roughly divided, 21% to National and 79% to World Specials.

The amount of \$121,000.00 annually which we would hope to reach each of the last two years of the quadrennium would be designated as follows:

National Advance Specials

Latin-American Work	\$13,400.00
Indian Missions: Our Conference Project; a church building, personage and equipment for the Emerson Mission of the Comanche Tribe near Walters, Okla.	6,000.00
Other National Advance Specials: Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico, Henderson Settlement, and Lydia Patterson Institute	5,600.00
Total of National Mission Specials	\$ 25,000.00

World Advance Specials

Conference Project: A dormitory at Parker Intermediate School, Moradabad, India for two years and then another project	\$20,000.00
Missionaries' Salaries now carried directly and to be continued	35,000.00
Scholarships and other world wide interests of various churches	26,000.00
A new "Land of Witness and Decision:" New projects to be selected and old projects switched to this land—Southern Rhodesia	15,000.00
Total of All World Advance Specials	\$ 96,000.00
Grand Total of All Advance Projects	\$121,000.00

These goals would be distributed among the districts to provide a basis of work for each district superintendent as he leads pastors and people in the quadrennial program.

The Education, Cultivation, and Promotion

That this Advance for Christ program may be effectively promoted within our Conference, we recommend:

I. That the Annual Conference now in session on September 27, 1960 adopt the goals set out herein and declare its willingness to work at the task of preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ around the world, furnishing a minimum of \$450,000.00 during the quadrennium for this purpose.

II. That the Bishop of the Conference and the Board of Missions implement this program in such ways as they find feasible, to the end that it will be accomplished and that every soul of God's creative universe may be assured the opportunity of abundant life in Jesus Christ and a rendezvous with eternity.

PENSION STUDY COMMITTEE**Resolution**

The Pension Study Committee, appointed at the 1960 session of the Central Texas Conference, in its meeting at First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, September 8th, 1960, adopted the following resolution:

WHEREAS, at the 1960 session of the Central Texas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, the Reserve Pension Study Committee presented a report in which it was recommended that the Reserve Pension program of the Conference be strengthened by certain changes and by the granting of a Pension Special of \$50,000 annually for three years, 1961-64, and

WHEREAS, this report, after considerable discussion, was never voted upon by the conference, but referred for further study to a new and larger Pension Study Committee, and this new Committee (with only 4 members of the previous

study committee and 12 new members) has had opportunity for only one meeting, and in this meeting, it was revealed that new members had need for much further study before they were willing to vote on any recommendation, and

WHEREAS, if some other agency of the Annual Conference, at the coming special session of the Annual Conference, should be granted approval for any continuing Conference Special, it would seriously jeopardize the possibility of the annual conference approving any request for a Pension Special, should the Pension Study Committee decide to make such a request and the Conference of a mind to approve it,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Annual Conference, in its special session, defer action on any and all requests for consideration and approval of any Conference Specials to the 1961 session of the conference. Such action would cause no delay in the effective date of any Conference Special, because it would require only the same two-third vote to waive the rules at the 1961 session as would be required for consideration at the coming special session.

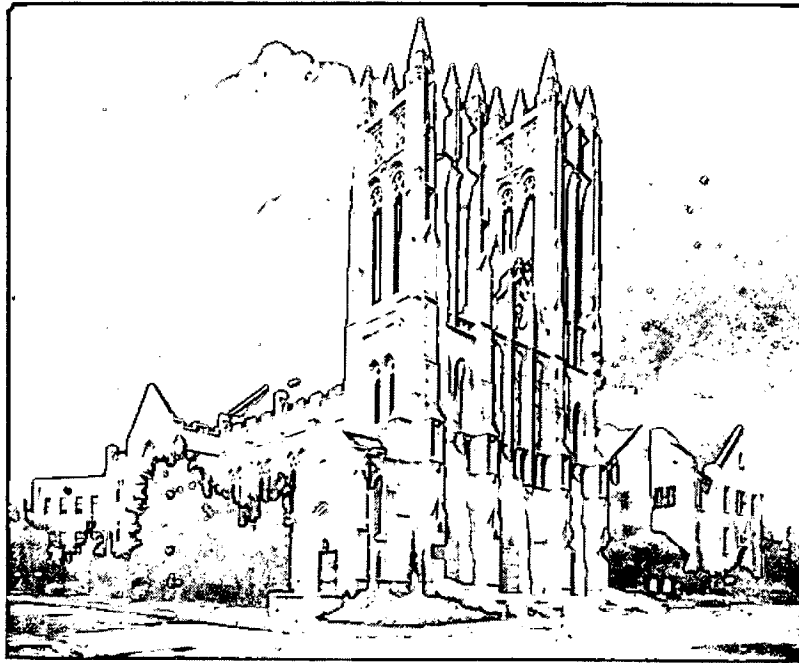

SECOND SESSION - TUESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 6, 1961

THIRD SESSION - WEDNESDAY MORNING, JUNE 7, 1961

Gilbert Ferrill and Leslie W. Seymour presented two Pastors from the Philippines who are in our Area, on a training basis for five months. They are Leopoldo T. Nicholas and Adriano V. Cobataje.

Composite Report—D. L. McCree read the Composite Report of the District Superintendents, and the report was adopted. (See Reports)

Administrative Council—L. Stanley Williams distributed copies of the Constitutional Amendment No. 12.

Report No. 1 of the Administrative Council was read and approved. (See Reports)

Reports No. 2, 3, 4, 5 of the Administrative Council were read and approved.

Reports concerning finance were referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Hayden Edwards presented an amendment to report No. 5 concerning the Study of the Districts, and it was adapted. (See Reports).

Personal Privilege—Hayden Edwards spoke words of appreciation for Conference Secretary, Nick H. Kupferle, Jr., and reported that the Secretary had tendered his resignation. The Secretary, in turn, thanked the Conference for entrusting him with the office.

Special Committee Report on the Employment of a Fulltime Secretary-Treasurer—Wayne Reynolds reported for this committee and referred the Conference to the preliminary reports, page 37, with the amendment, "Secretary's salary to be \$2400," making the new total \$14,900, after discussion the report and amendment were adapted. (See Reports)

C. C. Sessions moved that the word "Treasurer" be substituted for Secretary of Minimum Salary as given on page 38 of the preliminary reports. Motion carried.

Words of Appreciation—Bishop Martin and the Conference expressed their appreciation to the outgoing Conference Secretary, Nick Kupferle, Jr.

J. D. F. Williams spoke to the Conference concerning the new office of Conference Secretary-Treasurer.

Board of Education—Bruce Weaver, Chairman of the Conference Board of Education, discussed the report of the Board of Education. Thomas B. Granger,

Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, spoke of the work of the office and introduced the other members of the staff.

Patsy Brown Elder was presented as Office Secretary. Mrs. E. D. Campbell, Conference Director of Children's Work, reported concerning her work. The Children's Workers Conference is planned for September 7, 8, and 9.

Robert L. Robertson, Conference Director of Youth Work, spoke concerning youth activities and passed out M.Y.F. brochures for summer youth opportunities.

Tom Voss, Superintendent of Glen Lake Methodist Camp, reported on the Conference camp program with special mention of our new swimming pool.

Dr. William C. Finch, President of Southwestern University, spoke on behalf of the Texas Methodist College Association, handed out printed reports to the Conference and reported on the Association's progress in stewardship, education, and financial support.

Dr. Durwood Fleming, President-Elect of Southwestern University, spoke on the United Capital Funds Drive for the Methodist Colleges of Texas. (See Reports.)

Bishop Martin pointed out that the 24 hour vigil is now in progress in the Prayer Chapel. The Conference bowed in silent prayer.

Bruce Weaver presented Report No. 1 with additions. This was adopted. (See Reports)

Sidney Roberts, Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, read the report of the Committee on Higher Education. (See Reports)

Dr. Low Sone, President of Texas Wesleyan College, spoke relative to the work of the Commission on Higher Education.

Report No. 2 was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Report No. 3 was presented by Sidney Roberts, and was approved. (See Reports)

Floyd Baulware presented those who received certificates as Directors of Education and Music. (See Reports)

The Treasurer's Report of the Board of Education was approved without reading. (See Reports)

Charles Loing, State Director, reported for the Texas Methodist Student Movement. He presented the Wesley Foundation Directors.

Personal Privilege—Bishop Martin presented Reverend and Mrs. T. S. Ogle and W. W. Ward to the Conference and the Conference stood and sang "Happy Anniversary."

Announcements—After announcements were made the Conference went into the morning worship service.

Adjournment—Bishop Martin declared the Morning Business Session adjourned.

FOURTH SESSION - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 7, 1961

Opening Worship—After the singing of a hymn, J. Marris Bailey led in prayer.

Courtesies and Agenda—Sidney Roberts reported for the Committee on Courtesies and Agenda.

Board of Education—Sidney Roberts read the Board of Education report dealing with the Texas Methodist Student Movement, and amended the report to read; "And the local churches will contribute on the basis of \$.50 per member."

G. Alfred Brown presented a substitute amendment, after closing sentence of \$.50 per member add new sentence; "this is in lieu of the present appropriations for Methodist Student Work from Conference Benevolences."

Report of Woman's Society of Christian Service—Mrs. R. S. High, Conference President of the W. S. C. S., reported for this group. The report was adopted. (See Report)

Report of the Committee to Study Pension Program—J. D. F. Williams, Chairman, introduced this report which was read by S. A. Baker, Secretary of the Pension Study Committee. Irvin S. Motz, of the General Board of Pensions, spoke to the Conference. The report was adopted. (See Report)

J. D. F. Williams gave Report No. 2, and it was adopted. (See Report)

Board of Pensions—E. R. Gardan, Chairman, introduced the report from the Board of Pensions.

Nolan M. Fisher, Secretary, read Reports No. 1 and 2 and they were approved. (See Reports)

S. A. Baker, read Report No. 3, sections 2 and 3; and Report No. 5, and the reports were adopted. (See Reports)

Television, Radio, and Film Commission—Richard R. Smith, Chairman, moved the adoption of this report without reading, and it was done. (See Reports)

The Conference stood and sang the hymn, "O Zion Haste."

Board of Missions—Hubert C. Smith, Chairman of the Conference Board of Missions, directed the report of the Board of Missions.

J. Morris Bailey, Secretary of the Board of Missions, read Report No. 2 with the following changes: Waco District, Robinson Road, salary supplement was changed from \$1200 to \$2400. The total was revised to \$7800. The report was adopted. (See Reports)

J. Morris Bailey presented Report No. 4 which was approved. (See Reports)

A substitute to Report No. 5 was presented. Hubert C. Smith spoke to the report and the report was approved. (See Reports)

Report No. 6 was given by J. Morris Bailey and he moved that it be referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance and it was done.

Hubert C. Smith, read Report No. 3 and the report was adopted. (See Reports) He made a motion that Reports No. 8, 9, and 10 be adopted without reading and it was done. (See Reports)

James H. Ellison, Conference Missionary Secretary, presented Report No. 1 and the report was adopted. (See Reports)

Personal Privilege—Dr. C. W. Lokey was presented and spoke to the Conference concerning Latin American Work in Texas.

Christian Social Concerns—E. F. Bohmfalk, Chairman of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, referred to printed Report No. 1. He presented Dr. Albert F. Tucker, Executive Secretary of T.A.N.E., to the Conference. Report No. 1 was adopted. (See Reports)

Report No. 2 was given and after much debate the report was amended by deleting the opening two sentences, and the amended report to begin with the statement, ". . . we urgently suggest that before laws are repealed to gain

the abolition of capital punishment that sufficient new legislation be enacted . . ." Report No. 2, with the change, was then adopted. (See Reports.)

James H. Campbell read Reports 3 and 4 and they were adopted. (See Reports)

E. F. Bahmfalk read Report No. 5 entitled, "RESOLUTION—THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES." The report was adopted. (See Reports)

The Chairman then read Report No. 6 and it was also adopted. (See Reports)

Announcements:—Upon recommendation of the Bishop, and vote of the Conference, the Secretary was instructed to send greetings to Dr. J. W. W. Shuler.

J. D. F. Williams pointed out that each resolution must be identified as to origin and purpose.

Adjournment—After the singing of the Doxology the Conference was closed with prayer by Gid J. Bryan.

FIFTH SESSION - THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 8, 1961

Opening Worship—Hymn No. 8, "Let All The World In Every Corner Sing," was sung and the leader, James D. Bales, led the prayer. Responsive Reading No. 589, "The New Covenant," was read. Bishop Martin spoke on the topic "Who Through Faith Conquered Kingdoms." Hymn No. 533, "O God, Our Help In Ages Past," was sung and the benediction was pronounced.

Minutes—C. D. Waaten reported that the minutes had been read and were in good order. They were approved.

Courtesies and Agenda—Sidney Roberts asked Hayden Edwards to introduce Mrs. Wm. C. Martin to the Conference, and she was presented an archid.

Monroe Vivian was presented.

Spencer Stackwell was introduced.

Plez Todd requested that greetings be sent from the Conference to J. D. Smoot. This was done.

Sidney Roberts, reporting for the Committee on Courtesies and Agenda, recommended that the proposed Constitutional Amendment be considered this morning, and that the printed program be followed otherwise.

J. D. F. Williams reported that Dr. J. W. W. Shuler was unable to attend the Conference session, and that this would be his first absence in seventy years.

Spencer L. Stackwell, Administrator of the Methodist Mission Home of Texas, presented the report for the Home. (See Reports)

W. P. Earngey, Jr. Administrator Harris Hospital, presented Report No. 1 as printed, and read Report No. 2 concerning nominations for trustees. (See Reports)

W. W. Ward, Field Representative for Harris Hospital, presented student nurses from Harris School of Nursing and distributed literature.

Richard E. Millsap presented the members of the Board of Trustees of Harris Hospital.

James B. Ansley, Commissioner-Chaplain of Harris Hospital, presented the report on Golden Cross. The report was presented as printed with one correction in the offerings of the church. The amount of \$13,000.77 was changed to \$14,238.66. (See Reports)

M. Howard Knox, Director of Wesleyan Homes, Inc., presented the report of the homes; and read a resolution as printed in the report concerning changes in the charter. The resolution was adopted. (See Reports)

O. C. Armstrong, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Trustees, spoke for the Board of Trustees of the Home.

Thomas F. Sterck, Chairman of the Building Committee, spoke concerning the progress of the building program. The reports were approved. (See Reports)

Texas Methodist Foundation—Dr. Monroe Vivion spoke on the work of the Texas Methodist Foundation.

Proposed Amendments to the Constitution (No. 12)—L. Stanley Williams led in giving this report.

J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, read the proposed amendment to the Conference. After debate amendment No. 12 was voted on. The number of members of the Annual Conference present and voting was 279; the number voting AYE was 6; the number voting NO was 273.

Town and Country Commission—Robert Haynes, Chairman, presented Ed H. Otwell who recognized the two outstanding Rural Pastors of the year. They were: Jack Hopkins, Holders Chapel, Millsap, Cleburne District; Eugene B. Robertson, Sardis, Waxahachie District. Their District Superintendents spoke words of appreciation to the two Rural Pastors being honored.

Mrs. Nan H. Wright was recognized for her outstanding work and was presented a plaque.

Board of Lay Activities—Louis H. Pitcock asked the Conference to confirm the election of Roy J. Grogan as Conference Lay Leader and he was elected.

Roy J. Grogan presented Reports No. 1, 2, 3. The reports and nominations were approved. (See Reports)

Stewardship—Bishop Martin called on Eugene F. Jud to speak to the Conference on Stewardship.

Personal Privilege—Hayden Edwards presented J. M. Bond of the Conference with words of appreciation and recommended the book, "Keeping the Charge," by J. M. Bond.

Gaston Faate also spoke words of appreciation and recommended the book.

J. D. F. Williams requested permission to place a copy of this book in the archives of the Conference. This was granted.

Announcements—Bishop Martin called a meeting of the Cabinet immediately after the adjournment and announced the ministerial session would be in the Sanctuary and the Layman's session would be in the Chapel—both at 2:00 p.m.

W. L. Hankla asked that ministers coming into or leaving the Fort Worth Districts go to the Star Telegram for pictures.

Bishop Martin adjourned the session.

SIXTH SESSION—THURSDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 8, 1961

Opening Worship—The afternoon session opened with the singing of Hymn No. 238, "Blessed Assurance," after which the Conference repeated the 23rd Psalm and the Lord's Prayer.

Ministerial Session—Bishop Martin declared the Ministerial Session to be in order and suggested that any laymen present would possibly like to attend the Lay Session, meeting in the Chapel.

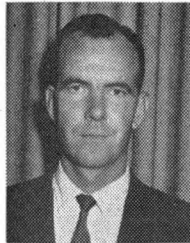

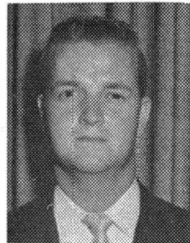

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

We all rejoice that the South Central Jurisdictional Conference honored our unanimous request to have Bishop and Mrs. William C. Martin continue as our chief pastor and wife for this climactic quadrennium of their episcopal career.

To all the dedicated pastors and laymen, who have given their best to make this year's record possible, we express our profound gratitude.

1,296 infants were baptized; 3,943 united with our Churches on profession of faith; 4,975 came by certificate. Our total membership is now 114,858. This is a net gain of 1,858, which is 1.64%. 21 were licensed to preach and 184 young people committed themselves to Christian vocations. There are 365 Church Schools, with an enrollment of 73,708, and an average attendance of 42,038. There are 327 MYF groups, with 8,678 members and an average attendance of 4,934. Average attendance at morning Church services has been 40,845; evening Church attendance, 17,540.

338 Churches observed Laymen's Day. 257 had an every member canvass. There are 147 Methodist Men's Clubs with a membership of 5,837.

We have 237 Woman's Societies of Christian Service, with a membership of 11,991. There are 111 Wesleyan Service Guilds, with 2,469 members.

235 Vacation Church Schools were held, with an enrollment of 15,643. 188 Leadership Schools had an enrollment of 4,239. There were 2,935 at camps and assemblies.

14,477 subscribe to the Texas Methodist and 3,296 to Together.

23 new Churches were built at a cost of \$1,420,619.00; 10 new parsonages cost \$168,717.00. There were 159 Churches repaired at a cost of \$189,714.00. The cost of repairing 113 parsonages was \$50,292.00. Church debts were reduced by \$826,823.00. Two Churches were relocated and 5 were merged.

CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

Report of Secretary-Treasurer June 6, 1961

We received a total of \$4,767.00 from the ministerial members and the wives and widows of our conference Brotherhood to be applied on the eleven deaths originating this conference year. This is an average of \$433.00 per death. The cost of sending the calls totalled \$227.10 making the average to be applied on the calls \$412.72. In order to meet the amount set by the Board of Directors of the Brotherhood of \$500.00 to each beneficiary, we had to take \$828.10 out of the Reserve Fund of the Brotherhood.

The average amount sent to the eleven beneficiaries this Conferenc year was \$488.00. Some of the beneficiaries did not receive the full amount set by the Directors because of the Constitution rule which states "that in the payment of death benefits, an amount equivalent to the calls not paid shall be deducted and placed in the Reserve Fund."

There are 843 persons eligible to participate in the Brotherhood. Of these: 373 or 44% participated in all the calls, 131 or 15½% participated in some of the calls, and 339 or 40% of those who could participate did not participate in any of the calls of the Brotherhood this year. Therefore, it needs to be stressed in this report that the constitution provides that if a member makes no payment for two calendar years, the benefits to the beneficiary shall be only one half the amount agreed upon by the Board of Directors.

An audit of the Brotherhood has been given to the President of the Brotherhood. The audit shows \$1,279.73 to be in the Brotherhood Fund with \$1,240.73 in the Reserve Fund, which is used to pay an advance upon notice of a death, and \$39.00 in the Advance Credit Fund.

Let us say, in closing this report, that the Brotherhood is a bargain any way you look at it—even those who refuse to participate by sending in their dollar shall, upon their death, receive a benefit from The Brotherhood. Where else can you get a "bouquet of flowers" to send to your fellow parsonage family in their time of sorrow for only \$1.00? The next time a notice of death from the Brotherhood comes to your door, please let us hear from you by return mail!

The secretary further requests that a complete copy of the Constitution of the Brotherhood be printed in this year's Conference Journal.

CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD**Constitution****ARTICLE I**

Name

This organization shall be known as The Brotherhood of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church.

ARTICLE II

Purpose

Our purpose is to express materially the spirit of Brotherhood by making a financial contribution at the time of death of any member.

ARTICLE III

Membership

All ministerial members of the annual conference on trial and in full connection, and all approved supply pastors serving charges, together with their wives or widows shall be considered members of this Brotherhood.

Non-payment of the call does not eliminate any of the above persons from participation in the Brotherhood either from receiving notices of the call or from death benefits.

Any other members of our division of the former Methodist Ministers United Brotherhood in good standing as of June 1, 1958, shall be members of this Brotherhood so long as they continue to make Brotherhood payments.

Members of the Brotherhood transferring to another annual conference shall be members of the Brotherhood so long as they continue to make regular payments.

ARTICLE IV

Beneficiaries

Each member will have the privilege of designating a beneficiary, filing it with the secretary of the Brotherhood. In lieu of such designation, the beneficiary shall be the surviving spouse, or if the spouse has previously died, it shall be the estate of the deceased member.

ARTICLE V

Organization

Upon nomination of the cabinet, the annual conference at its ministerial session, shall annually elect a president, vice-president, secretary-treasurer, and four additional directors. The elected officers and directors shall constitute the executive committee.

Provided, further, that in the case of the death or resignation of either of the above named officers, the remaining officers of the Brotherhood shall have the authority to appoint a successor for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE VI

Benefits

At the death of any member benefits shall be paid, in an amount agreed upon annually by the officers of the Conference Brotherhood, provided that at the close of the Conference year the total amount received from all calls in excess

of the amount agreed upon shall be divided equally among the beneficiaries.

Provided, further, that the payment of death benefits, an amount equivalent to the calls not paid, shall be deducted and placed in the Reserve Fund.

Provided, further, that if a member makes no payment for two calendar years benefits shall be one half the amount agreed upon annually by the officers and directors of the Conference Bratherhood, the other one half shall be placed in the Reserve Fund and that this provision be retroactive to begin June 1, 1959.

ARTICLE VII

Assessments

The amount of the call will be one dollar for single men and two dollars for married men.

ARTICLE VIII

Amendments

This constitution may be changed by a majority vote of the members present and voting at the ministerial session of the annual conference, provided that a set of the amendments have been presented at the time of the Administrative Council meeting.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

**Proposed Amendment No. 12 to the Constitution of The
Methodist Church Concerning the Jurisdictional System.**

At its sixth quadrennial session held in Denver, Colorado, April 27-May 7, 1960, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2/3) vote, on Monday evening, May 2, 1960, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

1. Division Two, Section 1, Article 1 (Par. 5) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article 1.—The General Conference shall be composed of not fewer than 900 nor more than 1400 delegates, one half of whom shall be ministers and one half lay members, to be elected by the Annual Conference.

2. Division Two, Section IV, Article IV (Par. 14) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article IV.—Each Jurisdictional Conference shall convene (a) at the time and place of the General Conference, or (b), not more than sixty days prior to the date of the General Conference at such time and place as the preceding session of the Jurisdictional Conference, or its delegated committee, by a two-thirds vote, may determine.

3. Division Two, Section V, Article III (Par. 18) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article III.—Each Central Conference shall meet within one year preceding or one year following the meeting of the General Conference at such times and places as shall have been determined by the preceding respective Central Conferences or by commissions appointed by them.

4. Division Two, Section VII, Article III (Par. 23) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article III.—The Annual Conference shall elect ministerial and lay delegates to the General Conference and to its Jurisdictional or Central Conference in the manner provided in this section, Articles IV and V, at the session preceding the Jurisdictional Conference. The persons elected, up to the number determined by the ratio for representation in the General Conference, shall be representatives in the body, and also in the Jurisdictional or Central Conference; provided that Annual and Provisional Annual Conferences of a Central Conference shall elect delegates for such Central Conferences to complete the number determined by the General Conference for representation in the Central Conference. The Annual Conference shall also elect reserve ministerial and lay delegates to serve both at the General Conference and the Jurisdictional or Central Conference as it may deem desirable.

5. Division Three, Article II (Par. 35) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article II.—The bishops shall be elected by the respective Jurisdictional and Central Conferences, and consecrated in the historic manner of episcopal Methodism. The bishops elected by the respective Jurisdictional Conferences shall be consecrated at the General Conference which meets concurrently or immediately following. The bishops elected by Central Conferences shall be consecrated at the electing Central Conference or at the next succeeding General Conference, as the Central Conference may determine.

6. Division Three, Article V (Par. 38) shall be amended to read as follows:

Article V.—There shall be a General Conference Committee on Episcopacy composed of all the members of the Committees on Episcopacy of the several

Jurisdictional Conferences, which:

1. May make proposals involving the transfer of bishops from one jurisdiction to another where said transfer
 - a) has been approved by a two-thirds majority of the members of the Committee on Episcopacy of the jurisdiction to which the transfer is to be made;
 - b) has not been disapproved by a two-thirds majority of the members of the Committee on Episcopacy of the jurisdiction out of which the transfer is to be made; and
 - c) has been consented to by the bishop involved.
2. Shall receive and accept the assignment of bishops as made or finally approved by the several Jurisdictional Conferences after all transfers, if any, have been acted upon.
3. Shall announce to the General Conference the assignments made, or finally approved, by the respective Jurisdictional Conferences of all bishops, and no official announcement of the assignments of bishops shall be made prior thereto.

The General Conference upon receiving the announcement of its Committee on Episcopacy may not change the assignments within a jurisdiction. The General Conference upon receiving the announcement of its Committee on Episcopacy may not change transfers as announced by its committee or initiate proposals for transfer except

- a) by a majority vote of the General Conference, and
- b) by a majority vote of the Jurisdictional Conferences which are involved in the proposed transfer.

A bishop may be assigned by the Council of Bishops for presidential service or other temporary service, not to exceed a year, in another jurisdiction than that which elected him, provided request is made by a majority of the bishops in the jurisdiction of the proposed service.

In the case of an emergency in any jurisdiction through the death or disability of its bishops, the Council of Bishops may assign one or more bishops from other jurisdictions to the work of the said jurisdiction with the consent of a majority of the bishops of that jurisdiction.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS**Report No. 1**

The Board encouraged active participation within the Conference in a campaign of letter-writing, phone calls, etc., to defeat the parimutuel betting bill in the House. The force of public opinion resulted in tabling the bill for the time being.

The Board shared in creating public opinion against the Carling Brewery bill before the State Affairs Committee of the Senate. An effort was made to get an advertising bill introduced by a Senator or Representative within the bounds of the Conference but failed in this matter.

Through local church Boards of Christian Social Concerns the Conference Board gave encouragement to the series of alcohol studies sponsored by the General Board of Missions and the General Board of Christian Social Concerns. Eighty-eight churches reported schools of missions. This is still incomplete.

The Chairman of the Division on Peace and World Order attended the United Nations Seminar in New York City. The Board was represented at the Race Relations Seminar held in Louisville, Kentucky. Eight members of the Board, including five district directors, attended the Briefing Conference under auspices of the Jurisdiction Board of Christian Social Conference in Mount Sequoyah.

Additional audio-visual resources have been made available to be distributed through the Conference Board of Education.

Encouragement was given to all local church Boards to provide resource materials for the teaching of courses in beverage alcohol in all public schools.

"Christmas for Christ" stumps to preserve Christ at Christmas rather than the complete commercialization of the sacred event were provided to every pastor to be used by himself and his Commission on Christian Social Concerns. Text books prepared for public school classes in alcohol studies were sent to all pastors to be used in the local communities.

The Conference Board had seven official delegates to the National Convocation of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns in Washington, D. C. April 24-28. This was the first major effort by the new General Board to project its program for Conferences and local churches.

Recommendations

All local church Boards of Christian Social Concerns assume the leadership in providing alcohol study courses in public schools for all age groups. Resources are available.

We urge wholehearted support for Texas Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc., our only denominationally representative organization in Texas. The contributions by Methodists in 1960 totaled \$29,000 over against \$119,000 contributed by another denomination in the state. We urge every church to either place an adequate amount in their budget for the support of our state organization or open the doors for an accredited speaker to present the cause and receive an offering.

We urge every local church Commission to cooperate and to help finance the attendance of one public school teacher to the Boylson Seminar on alcohol studies next February. This is a joint enterprise conducted by Texas Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc. and Boylson University.

We urge the careful observance of all special days called for in the Discipline and placed in the program of the Central Texas Conference. These include such days as Temperance Sunday, United Nations Day, World Order Sunday, Commitment Day, Race Relations Day.

We urge the support of this Conference in the program already approved by the Texas Planning Commission to provide its share (\$1020) of the \$6,000 requested annually for four years to pay off the indebtedness of the TANE headquarters building, make necessary repairs, and add additional equipment. One other major denomination has agreed to provide a similar amount of Methodism will carry its proportionate share.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Report No. 2

We urgently suggest that before laws are repealed to gain the abolition of capital punishment that sufficient new legislation be enacted to make life imprisonment what its name implies, eliminating the possibilities for parole after seven years as is now being done. A life-long period of incarceration with no possibilities for parole may prove to be a greater deterrent to capital offenses than quick death in a gas chamber.

We deplore the growing tendency on the part of well-intentioned but grossly misinformed people to align themselves with the several hate groups which are continuously attacking the National Council of Churches, denominations, ministers, and laymen who do not concur with them in their conservatism, thus branding the accused as Communist sympathizers. We warn those who are becoming dupes of these hate groups that the dictatorship of the Rightists is just as dangerous as that of the Leftists. The motives of both groups are in question.

We rejoice in the birth of new nations in our world. The struggle for dignity and self-determination by underprivileged, uneducated, untrained tribes and new national entities deserves the mature guidance of nations who have already attained their freedom. Our own inability to cope adequately with race in America is proving to be an almost insurmountable obstacle to effective leadership in the world; therefore, we urge that this Conference give more attention to finding solutions to racial tension and conflicts within our borders. This can be done by encouraging our churches to provide study opportunities and the sharing of experiences in the areas of world policies, disarmament, racial conflicts, etc. in an effort to find a Christian solution.

We rejoice in a growing concern by many Methodists about the increasing menace of alcoholism. Social drinking, which is the original causation factor in alcoholism, is losing much of its popularity as a social custom. People are finding that the time spent over a coffee cup or a non-alcoholic fruit drink can provide social fellowship far more enriching. We note an increasing concern about putting more restrictions around beverage alcohol and thus further regulating an industry that has no inherent right to operate because its product is a poison and is harmful to the human body, and is a contributing factor to crime, and an economic waste. We urge Methodists to beware of falling victim to liquor propaganda that convinces that the industry is an economic asset to a community. We deplore that many of our leading citizens have let themselves be persuaded by unfounded logic so as to consent to align themselves with and give lip-service to such a devastating industry.

As long as we have a voice to speak out against the social evils caused by beverage alcohol, we urge all Methodists to join with other Christians to rid ourselves of the curse of alcoholism. No person ever became an alcoholic who did not use alcohol. Total abstinence, the official position of The Methodist Church, is the only sure preventative.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Amendment IX of the Constitution, the recommendations of the 1960 General Conference, and the urging of the Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations in its first report to the Council of Bishops, The Conferences, and the Church:

BE IT RESOLVED, that,

1. That the Central Texas Annual Conference join the Southwest Texas Annual Conference in requesting the other Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction to join us in an invitation to the Louisiana, Texas and West Texas Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction to merge as a possible new area in the South Central Jurisdiction:

2. That the same invitation be extended to the Southwest Conference of the Central Jurisdiction and those portions of the Central West Conference of the Central Jurisdiction situated within the geographical boundaries of the South Central Jurisdiction, under such realignment of annual Conferences and Episcopal Area boundaries as may be approved by the Colleges of Bishops of the Central and South Central Jurisdictions, the Council of Bishops, and the Commission on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations.

Report No. 4

Resolution

The National Council of Churches

The need for an agency through which denominations can work together, and through which an impact might be made on our national life where clear-cut ethical and moral concepts are involved, resulted in the creation of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U.S.A.

Wherever and whenever judgments are made that effect the thinking and actions of people, there will be favorable and unfavorable reactions, just and unjust criticisms. Any churches, groups of churches, or Councils of Churches who speak out on ethical and moral issues join the great company of prophets of old whose every judgment brought forth much criticism.

Here the structure of the National Council of Churches should be understood. Citing a few articles from the Constitution of the Council is relevant to the problem.

1. Article IV, section d, states—"All representatives of a communion **shall be elected by that communion** in such manner as it shall determine. Of the total number of representatives at least one-half shall be nominated by the boards and agencies of that communion cooperating in the work of the divisions of the Council, on such basis **as the communion shall determine**; having regard to the interests of the several age groups and the various functions of the Council."
2. Article VII, section 2, states—"The Council shall have **no authority or administrative control over the churches** which constitute its membership. It shall have no authority to prescribe a common creed, or form

of church government, or form of worship, or to limit the autonomy of the churches co-operating under it."

3. Article IX, section 4, states—"Each member of the General Board shall be **a member in good standing of a communion** which is a constituent member of the council."

These articles show that the intent and purposes of the Council are in fact controlled by the member communions. If the members of the communion do not represent the view of the constituent churches the task of clarifying that situation lies not in the Council but in the member communions. Members of the Council are elected by their own denominations and no one can continue to be a member of the Council if he is not in good standing in his own communion.

Any measure that would change the nature of the Council, whenever deemed necessary, must be taken by the constituent members, because the Council without such members has no identity or factual corporate personality.

In theory and practice Methodism has had a tradition of genuine social concern. On a National level this can best be expressed and made more effective through a Council of Churches.

Therefore, in keeping with the spirit of genuine concern, which is the historic tradition of our church, we recommend that the Central Texas Conference adopt the following resolutions to be forwarded to the General Conference of The Methodist Church and to other proper church bodies whose decisions become a matter of record:

1. That the Central Texas Conference reaffirms its support to the aims and purposes of the National Council as set forth in this Constitution. As Methodists we are committed to a spirit of cooperation with Christians of other denominations as outlined in paragraphs 1596 and 1597 of the Discipline.
2. That the Central Texas Conference requests the Council to refrain from speaking with a voice of finality and ultimate authority on any issue. As a constituent member we do encourage the council to speak to any social, political, or economic problem which confronts our nation, but we urge the Council to refrain from endorsement of specific solutions when alternative answers can be held by Christians. Whenever prophetic insight is needed, where clear-cut ethical and moral concepts are involved, some voice must be heard. However, here we must insist on the right of individual Christians to find their own involvement in accordance with their own responsiveness to Almighty God.
3. That the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church requests that our representatives take their full responsibility to attend all significant meetings of study conferences, policy making bodies and all executive sessions of the various councils and departments, and to vote on all matters brought before them in accordance with their conscience and their Methodist heritage.
4. Rather than censure the National Council for its actions in any specific area, we must urge our membership in the Council, which is the largest single constituent group, to help safeguard the prerogatives of the Council to speak to social, political, economic, and moral issues without speaking with finality and authority for members of constituent churches. The National Council of Churches is not a church, nor a super-church. It is a Council as the name implies and as such can speak only to constituent denominations and not for them.

WHEREAS, the Beverage Alcohol Industry, which as no right to operate except as that privilege is extended by the sufferance of the people, is using all mass media such as newspapers, magazines, radio and television, billboards, neon and other electric signs, coming into the homes of our people, convincing many of our children that they, the Industry, are dispensing a useful product, all of which is untrue, and,

WHEREAS, no country in the world is granting such freedoms to advertise beverage alcohol as is done in America;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the Honorable Price Daniel, Governor of Texas, include in his recommendations to the Special session of the State Legislature, on July 10th, a request that said legislature enact restrictive legislation to curb the advertising of beverage alcohol.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The General Conference of 1960 selected Christian Vocations as one area to receive special emphasis during this quadrennium. A study of the need for young men and women to serve in church-related vocations, particularly as ministers and missionaries, shows why the entire body of people called Methodists have been alerted to the task of recruitment. Youth and adults who are qualified to serve God and His Church most effectively are now a part of the local congregations throughout Methodism. Your Conference Commission on Christian Vocations desires to help every charge discover and encourage those whom God might call to full-time Christian service. Many will never know of the divine imperative upon their lives unless they receive careful guidance. We do not propose that

anyone "call" young people to preach; God alone does this. We do believe that pastors and laymen can make God's call, when it comes, more intelligible and personal by keeping the need for dedicated Christian servants before all church members.

We recommend that every local church organize a Committee on Christian Vocations as authorized by the 1960 General Conference. The Discipline names the following persons for membership on this committee: the pastor; a layman elected by the quarterly conference; a representative of the W. S. C. S.; Church School Superintendent; a representative of Methodist Men; superintendent or a representative of the youth division; and superintendent or a representative of the adult division. The pastor should initiate organization of the committee, but if he overlooks doing it, any of the other ex-officio members could properly suggest it to him.

We also recommend that every district have a Committee on Christian Vocations, the members to be selected by the District Superintendent. Such a committee could give valuable assistance to local church groups, helping them organize, distributing literature and generally promoting recruitment.

We also suggest that every pastor consider the importance of presenting Christian Vocations from the pulpit. If he can conscientiously discuss the need for ministers, missionaries and other workers in a sermon, we recommend that he preach on this subject at least once during the year.

We appreciate the cooperation given by pastors and laymen, especially in getting young people to attend the Church Careers Conference. With your continued support, this conference can be a tremendous aid in meeting our need for full-time Christian workers.

BOARD OF EDUCATION**Report No. 1****Camp Committee**

Camping continues to be a very vital part of our Conference's program of Christian Education. Our two camps, Glen Lake and Rainbow, make it possible for us to offer opportunities for many different types of camping experience which will enhance the lives of children, youth, and adults.

During the past year, two additions have been made at Rainbow. A beautiful rustic lodge has been constructed. It has a kitchen, dining or assembly area, and restrooms. It is available to local churches or districts for small group meetings when not in use by a camping group. The other addition is the caretaker's house which was constructed from two cabins moved from the Shaw property.

It is with a sense of pride we note that Rainbow has been selected as the site for the National Training Camp for Church Camp Leaders, which begins November 13. This will be the first time this Camp has been held in Texas or in this area of the nation.

The Swimming Pool at Glen Lake has been completed and is ready for use in this Summer's camping program. It is of the very finest quality in material and workmanship and adequate to accommodate all the swimmers of a fairly large camp session at one time. Ross Greenwood of Temple, a member of the Conference Board of Education, served as Chairman of the Special Swimming Pool

Committee. The members of this committee put in many hours planning and overseeing the construction. Mr. Greenwood and his committee are to be commended for this fine service to the Conference and the Church. We express our appreciation to all local churches that have paid their askings on the Conference Special and earnestly request those who have not completed their payments to do so in the near future.

Local Church Committee

A. Broadly Connectional:

Historically Methodism has emphasized Christian education. In keeping with this emphasis the church is organized on General, Jurisdictional, Annual Conference, District and Local Church levels, for guidance and supervision of Christian education. It is therefore recommended that the Commission on Education of each local church continually be informed of the general educational program of the church, and actively encourage participation of their representatives in the activities in all of the areas of the church.

B. District Connectional:

A District Staff on Christian Education shall be responsible for the supervision and direction of a Christian education program in each district. The aforementioned staff shall consist of the district superintendent, a director of general church school work, a director of adult work, a director of youth work, a director of children's work, the district secretary of youth and children's work from the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the district President of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, and the Presidents of any other District age group organizations.

The District Staff shall plan, in consultation, with the Conference Staff, workshops, Training Schools, Bible Conferences, and other Educational opportunities for their districts.

C. The Local Congregation:

In each local church the Commission on Education is responsible for the program of Christian Education. Paragraph 233 of the Discipline gives a detailed outline of the functions and responsibilities of this commission. As Christian Education is closely related to all of the emphases of the church, it is most desirable that the Commission on Education work closely with the other commissions.

Training opportunities on the Local Church level should include: A two-weeks Vacation Church School; A Christian Adventure Week for Junior Hi groups; Youth Activity Week; Day Camps; Junior Missionary Units, Membership Classes, Methodist Youth Fellowships; Young Adult Fellowships, Adult Bible Studies; Missionary Studies Forums, Choirs and Family Life Studies. Recognizing the function of group and congregational singing as a means of education and worship we strongly urge its use and promotion in all local congregations.

The teaching ministry and the Church School continue to be one of the most effective methods of reaching persons for Christ and His Church. The Board of Education recommends full cooperation in the Quadrennial program, "Jesus Christ Is Lord," by emphasizing Evangelism through the Church School.

We call to the attention of the Annual Conference the Methodist Adult Convocation for the Dallas-Fort Worth Area to be held at the Boker Hotel in Mineral Wells, September 28-30, 1961.

Committee on Higher Education

The Board of Education through its Committee on Higher Education in accordance with paragraph 1452, 1960 Discipline, was charged with the responsibility of undertaking the consideration of the total approach of the Central Texas Conference to its support of Christian Higher Education through the Texas Methodist College Association and the Texas Methodist Student Movement. The Committee has spent many hours in this study which involves many facets of this concern of the Methodist Church, including the per member support of both the College Association and the Student Movement.

At this point let it be said that it is with a sense of pride that we report that the Central Texas Conference has led Texas Methodism in this vital matter of reaching the goals of \$1.00 per member for colleges and 30c per member for Student Centers. This achievement is a tribute to the leadership of Bishop Martin, the District Superintendents, to Mr. Roy Farrow of the Texas Methodist College Association, to Mr. Law Sone, who last quadrennium was chairman of the Commission on Higher Education, and to a host of laymen and pastors who are the grass roots of the Church have encouraged, informed and secured the support of the people. Now the Central Texas Conference, counting the support given through the Schools and Colleges Budget of the Board of Education, has reached the above goals. For this magnificent achievement, we are humbly grateful.

The Conference having reached these goals now needs to consolidate the gains and move the enlarged scope of responsibility as set by the action of the General Conference, and as that responsibility is seen in the needs for betterment of the program, securing of better Student Workers and the discovery of more and better ways of reaching the student and involving him in the ministry the Church seeks to provide. In the light of these demands, the Board of Education presents its findings and makes its recommendations for Conference action.

1. Schools and Colleges

Under the direction given in the above mentioned paragraph in the 1960 Discipline, which directs the Committee on Higher Education to, "Recommend annually to the Board (of Education) for presentation to the Annual Conference, a minimum goal for the support of educational institutions and Wesley Foundations." and further upon the recommendation of the Texas Methodist College Association, we submit the following resolution:

Whereas the Central Texas Conference has led the way in Texas in the one dollar per member giving to the Texas Methodist College Association; and

Whereas for the conference year 1959-60, they paid \$112,039.81 counting the amount appropriated from Conference Benevolences, meaning in fact that they paid the one dollar per member;

Therefore be it resolved, that in lieu of the other Conference Benevolences, apportionments now being paid to the colleges, the Central Texas Conference appropriate, as a conference college apportionment, beginning with the conference year 1962-63, one dollar per member for the work of the Methodist Colleges in Texas.

The Board of Education heard this resolution at its Mid-year meeting, November 28, 1960, and unanimously approved its recommendation to the Central Texas Conference. Representatives of the Texas Methodist Colleges Association will speak concerning this action as it is presented to the Conference.

2. The Texas Methodist Student Movement

It is at the point of the work of the TMSM that the Committee on Higher Education has spent the bulk of its study. Representatives, which in most cases were local directors, of each unit have been called for conference. The State Director, and the Associate State Director have worked faithfully with us. Local budgets have been carefully screened, local programs have been evaluated, questions have been asked as to the nature of the local programs, and the number of students on each respective campus who are Methodists, and the percentage of these that are involved in the local programs.

After careful consideration of all the facts and figures compiled in this study, and in keeping with what the Committee believes the Central Texas Conference will want to do as it seeks to understand and undergird the Texas Methodist Student Movement, we present the following resolution:

"In view of the fact that the Central Texas Annual Conference has never approved any procedure regarding allocation of the Methodist Student Movement and Wesley Foundation Special Funds (present 30c per member fund).

"Resolved that the Central Texas Conference authorize the Conference Board of Education, through its Committee on Higher Education, to allocate and direct the disbursement of this appropriation as recommended by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance and finally adopted by the Annual Conference.

"It shall be understood that these allocations shall be determined by vote of the Annual Conference upon recommendation of the Board of Education after giving due consideration to the recommended budgets of the local Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations and Methodist Student Movements and the recommendation of the District Superintendent. It shall be further understood that this program will not begin until the Annual Conference year 1962-63; and that local churches will contribute to this fund on the basis of 50c per member; this is in lieu of the present appropriations for Methodist Student Work from Conference Benevolences."

3. General Items of Concern

The Committee recommends the full promotion of the annual Race Relations Day in each of our Churches, and that appropriate offerings be given to the support of the Negro Colleges.

The Committee notes with regret the departure of Dr. William C. Finch from the president's office at Southwestern University to become Dean of the Vanderbilt School of Religion. Further we regret the resignation of Reverend Bob Breihan, who has served so effectively as the State Director of the Texas Methodist Student Movement, to become the Director of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Texas.

We would like to go into records of the Central Texas Conference with a word of commendation and congratulation for Dr. Law Saine, who recently has

completed a quarter of a century as president of Texas Wesleyan College.

Finally, the Committee on Higher Education has received the initial materials from the General Board of Education relative to the promotion of Higher Education Specials in the Conference. These matters will receive careful attention and appropriate action will be referred to the Conference as this program is correlated with the program of Christian Higher Education already in motion in the Conference.

Committee on Family Life

We are glad to report the appointment of a Committee on Family Life in our Annual Conference. The responsibility that is to be assumed by this committee has largely been held by the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education and the Director of Family Life of the Conference. On January 23, 1961, there was a bi-district seminar on pre-marital counseling held at the First Methodist Church in Waxahachie for the ministers of the Corsicana and Waxahachie Districts. Other such seminars are being planned. The quadrennial emphasis on the family will come September through December, 1962. It is the hope of our Board of Education to have representatives from our conference at the Seminar on The Church and Families, June 19-July 7, 1961, at Iliff School of Theology, Denver, Colorado, and at the National Conference on Family Life, October 19-21, 1962, in Chicago.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

The heart of the quadrennial emphasis on spiritual enrichment, (see Discipline, paragraph 222.2) is the responsibility of the Conference Board of Evangelism. Accordingly three major challenges are being lifted:

1. Proclamation of the Faith — "Jesus Christ is Lord."
2. Enlisting every Methodist to witness to this faith.
3. Winning individuals and families for Christ.

To accomplish these goals the Board urges that each local Church in our Conference continue steadfastly in the three great channels of Evangelism:

1. The Pulpit — Preach for Christian commitment
2. The Church School — Teach for Christian Commitment
3. The Church as a Whole active in evangelism under the commission on membership and evangelism — Witness for Christian Commitment.

"The Enlistment For Christ Mission" as a program of cooperative evangelism in the local churches of our Conference was held in eight of the Districts of our Conference this past year. Group evangelism and visitation evangelism were combined to bring a vital challenge for "Total Enlistment for Christ," for Worship, for Witnessing, for Stewardship, for Missions, and for Churchmanship in the life of each local congregation. Good and significant results were reported by all those participating. The Enlistment for Christ Mission was projected as a joint effort with the General Board of Evangelism, with Dr. Lawrence Lacour of that Board as the planning leader, and our Conference Secretary of Evangelism, Charles Whittle as the coordinating leader.

The **Convocation on Evangelism** was held on the afternoon and night of September 27, 1960 as a part of the special session of the Annual Conference. The evening session of this Convocation, with Bishop Arthur J. Moore preaching—and under the evangelistic leadership of our own Bishop William C. Martin—will long be remembered by thousands of Methodists as a challenging and inspiring hour for renewed evangelistic zeal.

The Quadrennial Program for Evangelism Calls For Every Local Church in our Conference To:—

1. Note the Recommended Major Program of Evangelism for next year—Visitation Evangelism—Dates to be announced later.
 - a. A pilot training project to be held on a Conference level
 - b. A pilot training project to be held on a District level.
 - c. A week or week-end of intensive visitation evangelism in every Church.
2. Note carefully and plan wisely the program of Evangelism in your Church School:
 - a. To plan the year's evangelistic program of the church, school, the commission on membership and evangelism and the commission on education should meet together to insure a carefully thought out program for maximum effectiveness. "Evangelism Pocket No. 8408-B," available from the General Board of Education is recommended as the guide for this planning.
3. Note the three important weeks in 1962.
 - a. March 11-18—Week of preparation for every Methodist to become a personal witness for Christ.
 - b. March 25-30—Week of Personal Evangelism
 - c. April 15-22—Week of Worship, baptism, reception of new members.

Each Local Church Commission on Membership and Evangelism should plan to have:—

1. Functioning units of "The Twelve" for evangelistic witnessing
2. An organized group of persons responsible for the care of members
 - a. Confronting every member with the responsibility to witness for Christ.
 - b. Set a goal for the number of persons the church should reach for Christ.
 - c. Give encouragement to classes in church membership for boys and girls, youth and adults.
 - d. Seeking habits of individual worship and family devotions for every individual and family in the church
 - e. Reactivating the lax and indifferent church members.
3. At least one concentrated period of evangelism during the year which will include public services, group evangelism and visitation evangelism.
4. Observance of Special Days for Evangelistic outreach
 - a. World Wide Communion Sunday—October 1, 1961
 - b. Watch Night—Sunday, December 31, 1961
 - c. Aldersgate—Thursday, May 24, 1962
 - Pentecost—Sunday, June 10, 1962
5. A Prayer Vigil
6. A Church attendance crusade—recommended periods:
 - a. World Wide Communion Sunday to Christmas
 - b. January to Easter _____ Easter to Pentecost.

Training Opportunities Offered by the board last Year

1. Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism at Mt. Sequoyah, attended by the District Secretaries and the Board Officers.
2. Evangelistic Mission in Illinois, sponsored by the National Council on Evangelism—attended by the Board officers.
3. Christmas Conference held at Glen Lake under the leadership of Quay Parmer, to train our young preachers in the practical aspects of evangelism.

Training Opportunities in Evangelism for the coming year

1. Jurisdictional Conference at Mt. Sequoyah—August 14-17.
2. National Council Conference on Evangelism at Asheville, North Carolina in July.
3. As a part of the Spiritual Life Retreat in September, Training sessions in Evangelistic Preaching, making the Altar Call and other practical aspects of evangelism.
4. Christmas Conference at Glen Lake during the Christmas holidays for the young preachers of the Conference.
5. Visitation Evangelism pilot training project on a Conference level and on a District level—dates to be announced later.
6. July 14-15—Conference wide Conference on Evangelism for Undergraduates to be held at Texas Wesleyan College.

Church Extension is Recognized as our Greatest Evangelistic Opportunity.

Our greatest evangelistic opportunity lies in the establishment of **Outpost Sunday Schools and New Churches**. It is strongly recommended that every District should set a goal for "Outpost Sunday Schools" and "New Churches" for each of the remaining years of the quadrennium.

We recommend Quay Parmer as Conference Evangelist—and also recommend Frank Turner, Sr., and W. B. Morton as supply evangelists, retired, for the Conference year 1961-62.

COMMITTEE ON HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

Our Group Hospitalization Insurance program with MINISTERS LIFE AND CASUALTY UNION continues to serve our conference members most satisfactorily. This is another year in which there has been no complaints of any nature concerning the service by this company.

Experience, however, has made it necessary to define more precisely the eligibility of our group. It has been discovered that there are not enough student pastors or ministers with special appointments living outside our annual conference with sufficient interest in such insurance as to justify their eligibility and the resultant higher percentage requirement of participation. Therefore, by agreement with MINISTERS LIFE, our eligibility clause will read specifically: "Full-time ordained or licensed ministers residing in and actively serving a church or special appointment in the geographic location of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church."

However, we hasten to point out that none, already members of our group and who will thus lose their eligibility, will lose their insurance protection. They will be continued automatically on an individual basis at the same cost.

This new agreement lowers our membership slightly below the required 70% participation of the entire group. This does not in any way effect our present members' protection. The group insurance continues in full force. It does mean that we can not accept any new members until we have a waiting list of applicants that will bring the membership up to the required 70% participation.

In the light of our present situation, MINISTERS LIFE has agreed graciously to open membership again to our entire group effective with the quarter which begins with October 1st, 1961. This means that there are now 84 members of our conference, not now members of our group insurance plan, who are now again eligible.

MINISTERS LIFE has further agreed that if 46 (55%) of these 84 now eligible members will join our group by sending their application and check for one quarter's premium to the Chairman of our Committee before September 12th, 1961 (our new closing date) they will not be required to furnish proof of insurability. But if less than 46 make application, all new applicants must submit proof of insurability. This is necessary to protect our insuring company from a rush of applications from just those who expect hospitalization soon.

Letters will be sent to all eligible members within the next thirty days. We urge all who are eligible to take advantage of this new opportunity to unite in our group hospitalization insurance plan, so this valuable protection may be extended to all our ministers and their families.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 1

The Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church takes great pride in presenting this report to this 96th session of the Annual Conference, June 6-9, 1961.

Methodism entered the field of health in an active way eighty years ago with the founding of the Methodist Hospital at Brooklyn. Since that historic date in May 1881, 236 hospitals and Homes have been added. While we are proud of this achievement, we must all recognize that in comparison with what some others are doing, we are far behind.

We would most humbly point out to our various institutions that if there are any large stumbling blocks coming between our churches and our Hospitals and Homes, it may well be lack of good communication. By this we mean that the language of one is not always fully understood by the other; or, there may be too little communication. We, therefore urge our Institutions to take the necessary steps to continuously improve in these areas.

It is also very imperative that our Institutions take care that the Personnel Staff shall be composed of persons sympathetic to the Church, and its aims and ideals.

Our hope is that you will read and re-read the reports of all our Hospitals and Homes. We are especially proud of the progress being made on the construction of Wesleyon Home at Georgetown. You would also be glad to know that construction will probably begin soon on our new Moternity Hospital and expanded oncillary facilities at a cost of approximately \$5,850,000. We congratulate Mr.

W. P. Earngey, Jr., and the Board of Trustees on this far sighted and important step.

These reports represent human life being touched in many different ways by the healing and helping of a dedicated Church that doesn't run away, when those who have themselves contributed so much in the past, need a helping hand. This is a part of our calling. This is one of the reasons for our being.

Harris Hospital

The Board of Trustees and the Administrator respectfully submit a Report of the operations and activities of Harris Hospital for the Fiscal Year ended September 30, 1960. Since eight months have elapsed following the end of our Fiscal Year, the members of the Conference will realize that all of the statistics are based on the 1959-1960 Fiscal Year, but many of the other improvements and developments reported upon have accrued during the Hospital's 1960-1961 Fiscal Year, in order to give current report.

Patient Care Factors

The occupancy for the Fiscal Year, excluding newborns, was 77.2%. The average occupancy, while 7.5 percentage points lower than the previous year, reflects almost exactly the national experience in a short-term general hospital.

Fort Worth, in past years, has been experiencing a dangerously high occupancy; dangerously high, because very few beds were available for emergencies.

When all of the projected expansion programs of the various hospitals in this area are completed, we may have, for the first time in many, many years, an excess of hospital beds.

However, if the growth of population continues, at its expected rate, and if the number of newborns increase as is expected, within approximately four years this Community will again find itself in a position of having to increase its bed capacity.

Although our total average occupancy for the Fiscal Year was only 77.2%, occupancy by type of service was an entirely different picture. The average occupancy on the Obstetrical Division was 78.5%; the average occupancy on the Pediatric Division was 55.8%; and the average occupancy for all medical and surgical divisions was 84.3%.

It is interesting to note that as your Hospital becomes more departmentalized, higher occupancy levels become less possible.

As reported last year, there has been the continuing development of smaller hospitals in different areas of the City, as well as in the Greater Fort Worth area and Tarrant County.

8,542 patients were treated in the Emergency Room, and 4,208 patients underwent electroshock therapy. There were 113,087 patient days of care rendered, and 4,261 babies were brought into the world.

New Improvements and Construction**1. Additional Airconditioning and Electrical Equipment Capacity**

During this year, we added 800 Tons of airconditioning to the existing 425 Tons in order to have capacity available not only for the new Fort Worth Children's Hospital, but also for the projected construction of ancillary and maternity facilities. At the same time, the electrical capacity of the Hospital was expanded to handle additional loads. This was authorized by the Board of Trustees at a cost of \$280,756.11.

2. Elevators

Last year it was reported to the Conference that plans and specifications for the modernizing of two existing passenger elevators and the addition of a third elevator had been approved by the Trustees.

Contracts have been let and work has begun on this program, which will cost \$313,153.27. The expected completion date is June, 1962.

3. Acquisition of Land

In order to alleviate the very crowded parking conditions surrounding the Hospital, the Trustees have authorized the purchase of 11,448 square feet of land at a cost of \$72,500, including improvements to the land. This addition to the parking facilities brings the off-street parking capacity to 398 spaces.

4. New Equipment

During the period under consideration, the Trustees have authorized the purchase of \$129,557.94 worth of Movable Equipment, and \$268,853.88 of Fixed Equipment.

Future Plans for Expansion**Expansion of Ancillary Facilities and Construction of the
Maternity Hospital Building**

Last year two programs were reported to the Conference separately. This year these two programs have been combined. The total cost of these programs, which will produce 138 additional beds, and will expand all of the supporting services, such as Operating Room Surgical Recovery, Laboratory, X-ray, Pharmacy, Central Supply, Accounting, etc. is estimated to cost slightly less than Six Million Dollars, including Architect's fees and equipment.

The construction of these facilities should begin prior to May 30, 1961, and should be completed prior to May 30, 1963.

Financing of Construction**1. Fund Raising Campaign**

The Fund Raising Campaign has now reached \$1,902,396.30. This is 61.82% of the total goal of \$3,007,142.

2. Interim and Long-Range Financing

The Board of Trustees has arranged interim financing of Two Million Dollars and has secured a commitment for long-term financing of Two Million Dollars. The balance of the funds needed for the construction of these facilities will come from two sources:

- A. Two Million Dollars from the Fund Raising Drive.
- B. \$1,850,000 from the Federal Government under the Hill-Burton Act.

Scholarships

The Board of Trustees of Horris Hospital requests the Conference to consider placing in the 1962-63 Budget the sum of \$6,000 for scholarships for nurses and other paramedical personnel. As the number of beds increase, there is a very obvious need for an increase in the number of nurses. Hospitals, as all of us know, are not just structures of mortar and stone, but rather they are structures in which well-trained and dedicated people minister to their fellowmen.

Nominations and Appointments

Since the Board of Trustees does not have their Annual Meeting until April 26, 1961, it will be necessary to submit a supplementary report of nominations for Board membership for the coming year.

The Board of Trustees requests the Bishop and his Cabinet to appoint James B. Ansley as Commissioner-Chaplain for the coming year.

The Board of Trustees, the Medical Staff and the personnel of Horris are extremely appreciative of the continued support and interest of the Central Texas Conference.

With the beginning of this construction program we, the Trustees, Medical Staff, personnel and the members of the Central Texas Conference, are beginning to realize the consummation of approximately ten years of dreaming, and concrete planning.

Our Hospital is destined to become a medical center, and it will require the interest and support of every member of the Conference in order for this endeavor, to succeed.

Report of Commissioner-Chaplain, Harris Hospital

The Chaplaincy

Each of us should be deeply grateful for those whose vision and courage is so fittingly symbolized by our institutions of healing. This symbol in the Central Texas Conference is Harris Hospital. These men could not escape the great command "go preach, teach and heal," nor can we escape His great command if the gospel is real in our lives. Harris Hospital is not just another institution we as Methodists must support. It is an institution through which we are privileged to serve. My work as Chaplain is but a part of this total ministry. My ministry as Chaplain is that of a servant of Christ and His Church. When you call upon us to help some needy person, you are not asking a favor of us. It is your institution and in asking you are granting us the privilege of serving.

Training Program

During the past year we have initiated a program of supervised experience in ministering to the sick for graduate Theological students, in cooperation with Brite College of The Bible, Texas Christian University, and the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Like programs elsewhere, the purpose of ours is to prepare ministers for a more effective ministry of the sick, to promote a better understanding of the emotional and spiritual factors that are present in illness, and to give ministers the opportunity to learn more about the cooperative team effort of Physicians, Hospital Administrators, Clergy and Hospital Personnel, so essential to the care of patients.

Individual students participate in four hours a week of assigned supervised calling on patients, and in a one-hour seminar of the entire group for a period of 18 weeks. Each student is required to present a verbatim description of every call he makes for evaluation.

Credit is given by Brite College of The Bible, Texas Christian University, or Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, for the successful completion of the course.

We have had twelve students in this program this year.

Golden Cross Service

This report covers the period of June 1, 1960 through May 31, 1961.

At the close of May 31st, the cost of thirty-five church-referred patients amounted to \$15,589.23. The total amount received from the churches of our Conference for the same period of time amounted to \$13,000.77, leaving a net cost for church-referred patients to the Hospital \$2,588.46 beyond that which the churches have contributed.

The Methodist Mission Home of Texas (formerly known as the Texas Mission Home and Training School) continues to render a much needed Christian service of rehabilitation and restoration in a vital area of social need—that of helping unwed mothers and finding good adoptive homes for many of their babies. Methodists of Texas have reason to be proud of the high standards maintained by this their Agency and the Board of Trustees. Administrator and Staff join in thanking all those throughout this great State who have helped make this service possible.

During the first eleven months of this sixty-seven consecutive Conference Year of operation we have had 147 new admissions and begun the year with 54 in the HOME making a total of 201 residents served. The average stay in the HOME is four months or more. Forty-five percent of our residents this year have been Methodist, almost 25% are Baptist and the balance come from a wide variety of other Protestant backgrounds. We still serve a few Catholic girls although most of these are referred to the Catholic Welfare Bureau. The problem of unwed motherhood in our society appears to be on the increase and very little is being done to help our youth find more Christian, mature and wholesome ways of handling their growing-up problems.

Our Agency has also placed 109 babies in fine Christian homes during this some period of eleven months. 92.6% of these homes used have been Methodist; two have been Catholic and six non-Methodist homes have been used. Conference wise the placements thus far for this Conference Year have been as follows: Central—12; North—7; Northwest—19; Rio Grande—2; Southwest—33; and Texas—28.

Recently every pastor has received a mailing from the HOME which includes a new statement of intake policy, some Request for Admission forms, and a revised statement on adoption policies. We urge every Pastor to become familiar with these policies in order to be of more help to the families in his congregation and to assist in developing greater understanding of this Methodist service in the name of Christ.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We respectfully request that the Conference act favorably upon the following recommendations:

FIRST: That Sunday, September 24, 1961, be designated as the SPECIAL DAY for each church in the Central Texas Conference to receive an offering for the Methodist Mission Home of Texas. If a church has placed the support of the HOME in its budget, we earnestly request that the Pastor make a statement to his congregation on the above date, explaining the services rendered by the HOME and also explain how the church supports the HOME. We earnestly invite the attention of all pastors and laymen to the fact that the Texas Planning Commission has approved 50c per capita as the goal-in-giving for the Methodist Mission Home of Texas.

SECOND: We request that this Conference approve the recently voted changes in our HOME's By-Laws which provides for two ministers and two laymen to be representative Trustees from this Conference to be nominated by the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes and the selection of six additional Trustees-at-large to be nominated by the Board of Trustees of the HOME. The revised By-Laws also provides for terms not to exceed four years and two consecutive four-year terms to be the maximum years of service for any Trustees. The change in our Corporate Name is also provided for in the revised By-Laws.

In view of the increasing demand for the repair of existing homes, and in order to insure the Conference that homes will be available in the future for men who retire and need a place to live, and in view of the fact that efforts to provide an adequate annual income for the work have continued to fall far short of the needs, the Board respectfully requests that this cause be included in the Conference Special for the remaining years of the quadrennium for \$15,000.00 each year.

The Board respectfully requests the re-appointment of Hubert C. Crain as Superintendent for 1961-62, and that he be highly commended for the excellent service that he renders in this work.

With a sense of regret, the Board reports the resignation of Raymond Burton, who has served faithfully as the treasurer of the funds. We request the election of Marvin Bledsoe, with term to expire in 1963.

We nominate for re-election as trustees, Cecil Pemberton, T. Wesley Hook, and Thomas W. Holmstrom, with terms to expire in 1964.

We ask for the privilege of making the annual appeal for funds on the fourth Sunday of July, and earnestly request every District Superintendent to encourage the pastors to distribute the literature that will be provided; and give the people an opportunity to contribute to this Special Offering.

Wesleyan Homes, Inc.

On December 21, 1960, contracts were signed for construction of the Home at Georgetown. Construction work began promptly and Ground Breaking Ceremonies were conducted at the site by Bishop William C. Martin on January 3, 1961.

General contract, awarded to the J. C. Peterson Company of Austin, is for \$1,015,680.00. This project is under Section 231 of the Federal Housing Act, with mortgage insurance by the Federal Housing Administration, and the Temple National Bank, Temple, Texas, is mortgagee. As of May 1, 1961, a total of \$222,779.49 had been expended on the project, of which in excess of \$40,000 was from the General Fund. Tentative completion date is April 9, 1962.

By action of the Board of Trustees, we wish to make certain requests, the first having to do with Charter revision. In making application to the Treasury Department for tax-free certification, changes of wording of the Charter were necessary in order to conform to Internal Revenue Service demands, and upon advice of legal counsel, the following resolution was introduced at a Board meeting with a request that the Charter revisions herein suggested be ratified by the Central Texas Conference:

"BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Trustees of WESLEYAN HOMES, INC., duly assembled at Salado, Texas, on this 3rd day of January, 1961, that in order to meet certain requirements of the Internal Revenue Code, the Charter of the Corporation be and the same is hereby amended in the following respects, to-wit:

1. ARTICLE II of the Charter, as amended by Charter Amendment filed in the Office of the Secretary of State on July 6, 1959, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting from the first line of Subparagraph a) the words "benevolent and," and by adding in said line immediately following the words "charitable purposes" the word "exclusively:"

2. That ARTICLE V of the Charter as amended by Charter Amendment filed July 6, 1959, in the office of the Secretary of State be and the same is hereby amended by deleting the words "benevolent and" and by adding immediately after the words "charitable purposes" the words "exclusively as;"

3. That ARTICLE VI of the original Charter be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom the words "the benevolent and" and by adding after the words "Charitable purposes" the word "exclusively," and

4. That the Charter be and the same is hereby amended by adding ARTICLE VIII thereto which shall read as follows:

"ARTICLE VIII. In the event of the dissolution of the corporation, all of the assets and property will go and vest in the Trustees of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church, to be used by them exclusively for charitable purposes, and no member of the Methodist Church shall have any right, title or interest therein."

We are requesting no change in financial arrangements. We earnestly solicit your support of the Mother's Day offering for Wesleyan Homes, Inc., and request that Mother's Day, 1962, be designated on the Conference calendar for this

special cause. Thus far, Mother's Day Offerings have been used to help defray administrative and promotional expenses. When the Home is in operation, these expenses will be absorbed in staff and operational budget, and we hope to be able to help several needy people each year with the Mother's Day Offering. Currently, however, because of the heavy pre-construction expense, we face a real need for a genuinely generous offering this year in order that our cultivation and educational program may be effectively carried on.

We request your cooperation and influence in bringing the message of Wesleyan Homes to the Churches of the Conference. We have been given a new sound film entitled, "Right At Home." This film runs 28 minutes and is a good interpretation of the dilemma faced by many couples who must plan their retirement residence. It was prepared for Pacific Homes, Inc., and will prove interesting and informative to adult church groups. It will help your Church to better appreciate the trend toward modern retirement communities.

Although applications have been received in increasing number since Ground Breaking, it is important that we be continually in touch with people for whom this type of retirement living might be a service. While it should be noted that the Board has spelled out a policy for assisting needy cases, it is obvious that for the time being, we shall have to depend heavily upon residents who are able and willing to pay their full share of expenses. It is our belief, however, that individuals and Church groups will come forward with special gifts to help needy applicants. Meanwhile, the local Church leaders, ministers and laymen alike, can render a real service by helping to put the Home in touch with those

who need its facility. A letter or a call to one of our Board members or to the Executive Director will receive prompt response and will be appreciated.

We wish to make a three-fold request: (1) That Mother's Day be a designated calendar event for an offering in the local Church; (2) That the World Service Commission continue their contribution toward expenses of the Board, and (3) That M. Howard Knox be nominated as the Executive Director.

The Methodist Home

For seventy-one years, the Methodists of Texas have taken a free-will offering during the Christmas season for the support and maintenance of the boys and

girls who live at the Methodist Home. Because of this personal interest on the part of Methodists everywhere in the boys and girls of the Home, it has become affectionately known as "The Heart of Methodism." The boys and girls at the Home are truly, in a Christian sense, an extension of the love and interest of every Methodist family.

We feel a sense of great pride in the accomplishments in the program for the children at the Home. For a number of years, the main emphasis was to build comfortable homes that were fireproof in which the children lived. For the last several years, the emphasis has been upon the development of a program that would meet the needs of the children who come to the Home.

We are glad to report that the foster home program is developing very satisfactorily, and a plan is made for all children under school age to be placed in foster homes, as well as older children where this seems to be the best plan for them. When children are available for adoption, they are being placed in good Christian homes. For the children who have reached their peak in school and are finding it difficult to continue their education, a part-time work program is in operation which provides them with learning experiences and vocational avenues for the future. This program of service is working very well. For the boys who find it difficult to adjust or work out in the group program at the Home, a loosely structured program similar to a boys' ranch is being developed where they might find interest and satisfaction, and ultimately, their way in life. We are fortunate to have psychological and psychiatric services available for the training of the staff and for service to the children when needed.

We believe that every Methodist would be proud of the program of his Home if it was known what is being done, and we hope that everyone who hears or reads this report will be a messenger to tell the story of the work at the Methodist Home to someone else.

Upon the request of the Board of Directors of the Methodist Home, we recommend that the Chairman of the Central Texas Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes be approved as a member of the Board of Directors of the Methodist Home.

In keeping with the tradition of seventy-one years, we ask the Conference to designate the month of December as "Methodist Home Month," and ask each pastor to advise his members about the work of the Home and request their support of the Christmas offering.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Report No. 1

The Board of Lay Activities has tried throughout the year to carry out a full program in the area of its responsibility. Our major emphasis has been in training laymen in the field of Stewardship, Lay Leadership and Methodist Men's Clubs that they might be more aware of their responsibility in the total program of the Church and better able to discharge their obligation in this respect.

Nine District Lay Leaders, all District Superintendents and the Conference Lay Leader met in Mineral Wells shortly after Conference for a two-day Planning Session. The following goals for the Conference Year 1960-61 were adopted at this Meeting:

1. To recruit and train one or more lay speakers from every church.
2. To have 100 per cent participation in Laymen's Day Services in October.
3. To continue existing and establish new Lay Speaker Bureaus in each District.
4. To have dedicated, well informed and active Church Lay Leaders in each church.
5. To increase the number of Methodist Men's Clubs by ten per cent and to increase the activity and productivity of established Clubs.
6. To have District-wide Workshops and training programs for:
 - (A) Church Lay Leader
 - (B) Methodist Men Officers
 - (C) Stewardship Directors
 - (D) Lay Speakers
7. To publicize and give enthusiastic support to the Texas Stewardship Movement, October 1 through Thanksgiving 1960.
8. To increase each District's participation in Annual Laymen's Retreat.

The Twelfth Annual Laymen's Retreat was held at Glen Lake in August with nearly 1,000 men in attendance. The Retreat proved to be a tremendous success. Our featured speakers were Gardan Danielson from the General Board, Dr. Lester Keyser of Southern Methodist University, and Herschel Fisher, architect, of Dallas.

In September workshops were held in each District of the Conference in the field of Lay Leadership, Stewardship and Methodist Men's Clubs. The leadership for these workshops was furnished by the Conference Board. We are especially indebted to Morris Walker, Eugene Jud, T. A. Adams, Jr., Clyde Miller and Joe Mixan for their inspiring leadership in conducting the workshops. The workshops were well attended by Church Lay Leaders, Directors of Stewardship, Stewardship Commission Chairmen, and Officers of Methodist Men's Clubs within each District.

All District Boards were effectively organized, met regularly and generally carried out a well organized program on the District level. Each District Board has sponsored informative and inspirational District-wide Meetings which have been well attended.

Laymen's Day was observed throughout the Conference, with approximately 100 per cent participation. To our knowledge, there were less than five churches throughout our Conference that did not observe Laymen's Sunday. We are grateful for this co-operation.

At the Mid-Winter Meeting of this Board in Cleburne in January, it was generally agreed that our program of Methodist Men in the Conference is very weak and that this should be our main area of concentration throughout the balance of the Conference Year. We have found many Clubs to be inactive and others to have completely disbanded. We are attempting at this time to establish new clubs and to reorganize and revitalize those in existence. In this regard our Board sent Tim Williams as our representative to the National Workshop for Methodist Men in Chicago in February. This Workshop was conducted in the area of training leadership on a Conference and District basis so that similar workshops will be held in each District within the Conference to assist local officers and committee chairmen of Methodist Men to be well grounded in their responsibilities. We will conduct a workshop for Methodist Men at Glen Lake in September of this year.

We are planning to be well represented at the Third National Conference of Methodist Men at Purdue, Indiana, in July and have set a goal of 100 men from the Central Texas Conference to be in attendance at this Meeting.

The Executive Committee of this Board has recommended that training sessions be held at Glen Lake for all Church Lay Leaders, Officers of Methodist Men's Clubs, and Stewardship Chairmen in September. We believe that our Board can fully discharge its responsibilities only through an effective program of education. The training sessions contemplated will be one-day sessions on a Conference-wide basis.

We are deeply indebted to Bishop Martin and our own District Superintendent for their inspiration and leadership throughout this Conference Year. We believe much progress has been made toward reaching our goals, but there is still much to be done. We are striving to make the Board of Lay Activities an effective organization in strengthening the total program of the Church by having a dedicated and well trained laity.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT**Report No. 1**

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Conference, under the management of a Commission on Minimum Pastoral support, hereinafter, for the sake of brevity, called the Commission, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Five of this number shall be ministers, and four laymen. The term of service shall be for three years, so arranged that three shall be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support Program.

Vacancies in the membership of the Commission, caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference, shall be filled by the nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the ensuing session of the Annual Conference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regular way.

The Commission shall organize at that session of the Central Texas Annual Conference held at the beginning of each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Commission, and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. All subsequent elections of officers and executive committee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Commission held prior to the meeting of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Administrative Procedure

1. (a) The basic minimum basis for pastoral support shall be \$1,800.00 per year, exclusive of any parsonage provision that may be made by the Charge.

(b) For a single man rendering full time service or a Student Pastor receiving no other employment income, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$2,400.00 per year shall be added.

(c) For a married man rendering full time service, or a Student Pastor receiving no other employment income, provided the salary of his pastoral charge has been increased over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent, the sum necessary to make the salary \$3,000.00 per year shall be added.

(d) The sum necessary to raise the salary to the established minimum salary to the Conference shall be computed on the basic minimum salary of \$1,800.00 per year, or on the salary apportioned by the pastoral charge, whichever is the higher figure, and in no case shall the sum so required be in excess of \$1,200.00.

The benefits of the Fund are not to be thought of as annual subsidies designed solely to enable a pastoral charge to pay the minimum salary of the Conference. The Fund should do that, and more. Basically, the purpose of the Fund is to aid a pastoral charge in its efforts to raise its own salary apportionment to the figure set as the established minimum salary of the conference.

2. The benefits of the Fund are available to ministers in the Central Texas Annual Conference who are rendering service as pastors, as follows: Preachers

in full connection; preachers on trial appointed to pastoral charges; student pastors, and approved supply pastors who are recommended by their District Superintendents.

(a) The benefits of the Minimum Pastoral Support Fund are not available to any minister having any appointment other than that of preacher in charge within the bounds of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

(b) In cases of appointments between sessions of the Annual Conference, and after the apportionments have been made by the Commission, no member of the Conference, preacher on trial, student pastor, or full time approved supply pastor, shall share in the benefits of the Fund, unless the Charge to which he may be appointed shall meet the conditions hereof, and then his sharing shall be on a pro rata basis for that part of the year served in the Charge to which he may be appointed.

3. No Pastor shall share in the benefits of the Fund who receives income from other employment than the regular work of the ministry.

4. A pre-requisite for any pastor to receive the benefits of the Fund is the written application of his District Superintendent for the sum needed to bring the salary up to the established minimum, filed with the Secretary of the Commission. With this application the Superintendent shall furnish the information as to whether the Every Member Canvass for the local Church budget has been made, and the salary raised over that paid the previous year by not less than five (5) per cent.

5. No pastor shall receive the benefits of the Fund if the Charge he serves reduces the salary below that paid the previous year, unless this reduction is recognized by the Commission as justifiable, and approved by its unanimous vote.

6. Funds for the work of the Commission shall be secured in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 826, Discipline 1960, and the apportionment to each pastoral charge shall be a sum equal to four per cent of the salary apportionment for pastoral support.

7. The District Superintendents shall be made responsible for making this program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and the collection of the amounts from the churches listed in their respective districts.

General Provisions

8. Payment on the apportionment to the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payment to those receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31st, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same per centage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.

9. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, and all payments to those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for the work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund, and the

traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals enroute, to all meetings of the Commission, except such as are held while the Annual Conference is in session, shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be computed on the basis of seven cents per mile each way.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payment for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid is limited to those who receive the benefits of the Fund, and not more than ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available for such emergency appropriation. All unexpended portions of such available emergency funds, shall at the close of the year, remain in the general fund, subject to disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this Plan.

On April 12, 1952, Hal H. Cherry, the former treasurer of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, executed on assignment to me as Trustee for the use and benefit of the Commission in partial restitution for sums due from him as treasurer for the Commission. The only properties which were ever received by me as Trustee consisted of a house and lot in Brownwood, certain insurance policies, and certain certificates of shares of stock in the business known as Gold Star Food Products Company, of Fort Worth, Texas. The last named company was defunct, and its stock was valueless. All assets heretofore have been accounted for by me, except Policy No. 1117,851, issued by the Pacific Mutual Life Insurance Company of Los Angeles, California, on the life of Harrell H. Cherry as a fifteen-year endowment maturing February 19, 1961. The proceeds of that policy in the amount of \$6,017.82 now have been collected by me and turned over to the Conference Treasurer. In due course I received from the Conference Treasurer a deposit slip showing that the \$6,017.82 from the Pacific Mutual Insurance Company had been placed to the credit of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

Since I hold no other assets, the trust is terminated, and with this account my duties as Trustee are finally discharged.

BOARD OF MISSIONS**Report No. 1**

There are four lanes in the "second mile" giving opportunities of Advance Specials, i.e., World Missions, National Missions, Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief (M.C.O.R.), and the Conference Builders' Club. Our conference has one or more special projects in each of these areas of concern.

In the Division of World Missions our Advance Special emphasis is upon building dormitories at Parker Intermediate College in India, and at Old Umtali in Southern Rhodesia. The special emphasis for the National Division Advance giving is to the building program of the Emerson Indian Mission in Oklahoma and Latin American work of the Rio Grande Conference, including Lydia Patterson Institute. M.C.O.R. special emphasis of the Multi-Purpose Food program, "Meals for Millions," deserves our continued and increased support. The fourth lane in "second mile" giving concerns Church Extension through our own Conference Builders' Club.

In addition to those emphasis named, there are many opportunities and challenges to "widen your world through the Advance." An Advance Guide has been prepared and distributed to local churches to provide detailed information of specific missionary needs. The Central Texas Advance Guide contains project suggestions for individuals, church school classes, women's groups, men's clubs, and youth organizations, as well as suggestions for district cooperative programs.

Every local church should be participating in each of the four lanes of "second mile" giving afforded through Advance Specials. Some are and others are moving toward that achievement. A reasonable minimum goal for local churches is suggested on a salary basis as follows:

Churches paying \$8,000 and above	\$2.00 per capita
Churches paying \$6,000 to \$7,999	1.35 per capita
Churches paying \$4,000 to \$5,999	1.00 per capita
Churches paying \$2,700 to \$3,99975 per capita
Minimum Salary churches40c to 50 per capita

Many churches are commended for exceeding this goal. The suggested goal is not intended to deter their generous support.

Each local church is encouraged to make a true advance in "second mile" giving. Through an informed people this can be realized. The Central Texas Advance Guide for 1961-1964 is commended as the source of information, education, and cultivation for Advance Special giving.

BOARD OF MISSIONS**Report No. 3****Changes in the By-laws of the Methodist Foundation of the
Central Texas Conference****Section Seven**

Change this section to provide a change in the time of holding the Annual meeting of the Board of Directors, so that it will read:

Regular meetings—The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held within thirty days following adjournment of the Annual Conference. The Board of Directors may provide by resolution the time and place for the holding of other regular meetings of the Board.

Section Fourteen

Add a sentence to provide for the president of the Board of Directors to be a working member of the Board of Missions, so that it will read:

Officers—The officers of the Foundation shall be a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. It is advisable that the president be a working member of the Board of Missions. The offices of secretary and treasurer may be held by the same person. The Board of Directors may elect or appoint such other officers and agents as it may deem desirable with such authority and duties as it may prescribe.

Section Fifteen

The changes in this section reduce the loan committee from seven to five; provide that the president of the Board of Missions and the chairman of the Church Extension Committee of said Board be members of the loan committee; and provide that loans can be made only on prior approval of the Board of Missions. As amended the section will read:

Committees—There shall be a loan committee of five members, composed of three directors elected by the directors of the Foundation and two members elected by the executive committee of the Board of Missions of the Central Texas Conference; provided that this loan committee must include the chairman of the Board of Missions and the chairman of the Committee on Church Extension of said Board; and further provided that no more than three of such committee shall be either clergy or laymen. The loan committee shall receive applications for loans upon such forms as may be approved by the Directors of the Foundation, all applications having had prior approval of the Board of Missions. The committee shall have authority to make loans to such applicants . . . etc. (continue the quite long paragraph as it now stands.)

PENSION STUDY COMMITTEE**Report No. 1**

The majority of your Pension Study Committee are convinced that the ultimate solution of our pension program is in the area of the reserve funding procedure. However, to make the full transition from the current-income distribution plan to the complete reserve program would require our annual conference to increase its payments for pensions an amount of over \$100,000 each year for at least thirty years, and that amount would probably have to be increased periodically as the average salaries of the pastors of the conference increased. Even to continue our present Ministers Reserve Pension Fund for the new entrants since 1952 will require payments of more than \$75,000 annually within the next four or five years. It is the opinion of your Committee that such financing at the present time would not receive approval of a majority of the members of the annual conference.

It is the further opinion of the majority of the Pension Study Committee that at some future time the annual conference should be in position to approve and provide for the full transition to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund.

In the light of this situation, your Pension Study Committee makes the following recommendations:

1) That, effective June 1, 1961, the present Partial Reserve Pension program (hereafter called the PRPF), and the Ministers Reserve Pension program (hereafter called the MRPF) be suspended until such time as the annual conference may decide otherwise.

2) That the balances in the initial reserve funds of the PRPF and MRPF remain intact with the General Board of Pensions, and that one-half of the annual interest therefrom shall be paid to the Central Texas Conference Board of Pensions for current distribution on pensions, and that the other one-half of the interest each year be added to the principal of the initial reserves of the PRPF and MRPF.

3) That the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to consider the recommendation to the Annual Conference that \$50,000 of the present Conference Special be designated annually for the Pension Fund and that the receipts therefrom shall be remitted annually to the General Board of Pensions to be added to the initial reserve of the MRPF of the Central Texas Conference, and that the interest therefrom shall be used as set forth in the preceding paragraph.

4) That all service annuity credits and all income annuity credits which have been placed in individual accounts remain intact with the General Board of Pensions and continue to draw interest compounded annually, and upon retirement the total amounts in such individual accounts shall be converted into annuities in accordance with the PRPF and MRPF plans and with the original intentions of these funds.

a) It is understood that in the PRPF both the income annuity and the service annuity shall be paid in addition to the regular per-year-of-service annuity that the annual conference may be paying at that time.

b) In the MRPF the income annuity shall be in addition to the regular per-year-of-service annuity, but the service annuity shall be a part of the regular per-year-of-service annuity that the annual conference may be paying at that time.

c) It shall be understood that the recommendations set forth in this paragraph shall be subject to reconsideration at any time the Annual Conference may vote to make the full transition to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund.

5) Any minister a member of the PRPF or the MRPF shall have the privilege of continuing his contributions toward income annuity during the period of

suspension of the Reserve program in this conference, as set forth in paragraphs 1646.6 and 1656.c of the 1960 Discipline.

6) In the year following the General Conference each quodrennium the Conference Board of Pensions, or a special pension study committee as requested by the Conference Board of Pensions, shall make a review of our entire pension program in the light of new legislation and new developments and report its findings and recommendations to the annual conference.

Your Pension Study Committee recommends that, in keeping with the 1956 and 1960 pension legislation more clearly defining the various classifications of supply pastors and granting annuity credit to **full-time** supply service only, the Conference Board of Pensions be directed to study and correct our previous records of supply service annuity claims and eliminate all previous authorizations for annuity claims for any other than "full-time" supply service, and to report to the annual conference of 1962 its findings and recommendations for its approval. It is further provided that this action shall have no effect upon the pension payments of those now retired.

Standing Rules

I. Organization

1. Administrative Council

There shall be an Administrative Council of the Central Texas Conference, The Methodist Church, to initiate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference.

2. Membership

The Administrative Council shall be composed as follows: the Cabinet, the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Chairman and one other person of each Conference Board and Commission one of whom shall be a

lay person and the other a minister except where there is no authorized lay person on the Board or Commission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each district to be nominated by the Cabinet, the Conference President and the Promotional Secretary of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Conference Youth Organization and one other young person, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missions, the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, the Conference Chairman of the Texas Methodist College Association, all General and Jurisdictional Board members and General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates not otherwise holding membership on the Council, and such other members as may be nominated by the Executive Committee. All paid employees of the Conference, its agencies, and the chief officer of institutions shall have the privilege of the floor but without vote.

3. Officers

Officers of the Administrative Council shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary. They shall be elected at the first meeting of the Council in each quadrennium. The Chairman shall be elected by ballot without nomination. Other officers may be elected by show of hands. The officers shall serve throughout the quadrennium.

4. Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Administrative Council to be composed as follows: the three officers of the Council, the Chairman of the Cabinet, the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Conference Lay Leader, and the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

II. Boards, Commissions and Committees

5. Nominations

The District Superintendents, at the beginning of the quadrennium shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no person may be nominated on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Annual Conference, except where the Discipline provides for membership because of an office held. This rule is not applicable to the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation. The District Superintendents shall also nominate at the end of any normal term members of any Board, Commission, or Committee.

6. Eligibility

No member of any Board, Commission or Committee shall be eligible for membership thereon longer than eight consecutive years and shall not become eligible again for such membership until one full conference year has passed. The membership of quadrennial boards, and commissions shall be divided by the Board or Commission into two groups, one group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of one quadrennium, and the second whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the succeeding quadrennium. Members appointed to fill unexpired terms of less than two years shall be eligible for re-election for eight years.

Employees and Trustees of institutions, or employees of Conference Boards and Commissions, shall not be eligible for membership on the Board, Commission, or Committee through which financial support is derived. (Re-worded)

The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commission, or Examining Committees to take effect at the time of his appointment, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual

Conference Board, Commission, or Committee. The Bishop is asked to notify such group in time to fill the vacancy before the Conference adjourns.

7. Vacancies

Vacancies on all Boards, Commissions, and Committees occurring during the quadrennium shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference. (One sentence deleted)

Retirement from active itinerancy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board or Commission, effective at the end of the term or the quadrennium, whichever date is applicable.

Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two consecutive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board. (Word "Annual" is deleted)

III. Financial

8. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st, and salaries of clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

9. Remittances

Remittances from a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Commission on World Service and Finance. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which remittance is made. The Conference Treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the District Superintendent for each remittance. The Pastor shall enclose these voucher receipts with his Annual Conference report as verification of items reported in table II.

10. Apportionments

The apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be based on the total money raised (item 75 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness (item 42 in Report to Annual Conference and less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 43 in the Report of Annual Conference.) It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to compute the apportionments annually, using the statistics of the last published journal (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. District Superintendents will use the best possible approach in distributing the askings to the individual churches of the Districts.

11. Annual Audit

The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

Annually, each Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause or institution, nor shall such a day be listed in the printed Conference Calendar unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit including current annual income and expense, together with its report, to the appropriate Board. (Rewarded)

12. Special Days and Campaigns

Any request from a Board or institution or special interest of the Methodist Church asking for a special campaign for funds or a Special Day Offering shall first be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and recommendation. If such recommendation is made to the Annual Conference it must show that the object or enterprise is wholly owned by The Methodist Church; that the detailed use of funds is reasonable; and that proper safeguards have been set up for the use of the funds.

Any recommendation from a Board, Commission, or Committee, including the Commission on World Service and Finance, asking for an increase that will effect the Budget of the local church, if approved, shall not become effective for one year from that date.

IV. Administrative**13. Conference Secretary**

The Bishop and his Cabinet shall nominate to the Annual Conference next preceeding the meeting of the General Conference a Conference Secretary to be elected by the Conference for the Quadrennium. Whenever there is to be a change in Secretary, the one newly elected shall assume his official duties at the session following General Conference.

14. District Conference

The District Conference shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate.

15. Reports

The statistics of the Annual Conference shall be based upon the reports in the hands of the Statistician on the fourth day prior to the opening of the Annual Conference; provided further that if the Annual Conference meets prior to June 4 then the deadline shall be the earlier of the two dates, June 1 or the day before the opening session.

The Annual Report of the Conference Treasurer shall be based on the funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer on June 1st.

Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Committee on Proportional Payments any Church in the District that has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, or World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrowed must be made a part of the record.

He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attention during the year, and had not been reported.

16. Conference Procedure

All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commission, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

All papers, resolutions, abituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary before they are presented to the Conference.

All Bonds required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

17. Conference Expense

The Conference Committee on Entertainment, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of Retired Ministers.

Each charge in the Annual Conference is expected to defray the expense of its minister and lay delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

Per diem allowances will be granted to ministers from minimum salary charges in an amount recommended by the Committee on Entertainment and voted by the Conference. ("Lay delegates" deleted.)

18. Memoirs

There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

19. Amendments

Any of the above rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference. (Reworded)

**SPECIAL COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE EMPLOYING OF
A FULL TIME SECRETARY-TREASURER**

At the request of Bishop Martin and the Cabinet, the committee has been meeting for several months and has been studying four specific areas, which we have concluded could be incorporated into the proposed office of Secretary-Treasurer. These four areas are: Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, Treasurer of Pensions, and Treasurer of Minimum Salary. The offices of each of these areas have been contacted; and they have given their full cooperation to this study.

Our study has included the investigation of several banking institutions relative to the central treasury depository and office facilities. Their full interest and cooperation has been expressed.

In the light of our studies we recommend:

1. That this Annual Conference create the office of a full-time Conference Secretary-Treasurer and that it be under the Supervision of the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance; and that J. D. F. Williams be appointed to this office and that it become effective June 1, 1962.

2. Due to the resignation of the Conference Secretary, we recommend the nomination and election of J. D. F. Williams as Conference Secretary for the ensuing year.

3. We recommend that the Commission of World Service and Finance approve the following budget effective June 1, 1962:

COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION**Report No. 3**

1. There shall be a program of sustentation in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of a committee on sustentation, to be composed of six persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference. The members of the committee shall be selected for their fitness for service on this committee and may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and commissions. Three members of this committee shall be ministers and three shall be laymen. These shall serve during the quadrennium.

This committee will have charge of and promote all the interests of the Committee On Sustentation and shall be the determining factor in the final approval of any candidate for participation in this program. Vacancies caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference in the membership of the committee shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Conference. However, the committee is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointments will be made with the approval of the Bishop. Such appointments are to apply only until the session of the Annual Conference following, and then the vacancy will be filled in the regular way. The committee shall meet and organize by electing a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall serve for the quadrennium.

2. We recommend that the amount of sustentation granted to an applicant shall be the amount of the current minimum salary.

3. We recommend further that following shall be eligible for participation:

(1) All ministers of the Central Texas Conference who have been admitted on trial, or have been received into full connection, provided they have not reached the age of voluntary retirement, which is sixty-five (65) years of age.

(2) An approved supply pastor who shall have rendered not less than ten (10) years of full time approved service as pastor of a charge in the Central Texas Conference.

(3) Any minister, meeting the above requirements, who is relieved of his pastoral duties and is granted a leave of absence from his charge by the Bishop and Cabinet during any Conference year for physical or psychological reasons shall be eligible for sustentation for that portion of the year that remains until the next meeting of the Annual Conference.

4. We recommend the following procedure:

(1) The applicant shall make his desire known, in writing, to the Committee On Sustentation.

(2) The applicant must submit to a complete examination at the Clinic of The Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas, and the Certificate of Disability

must be completed by the examining physician. Emphasis shall be placed upon question number (8) which asks: "Do you unreservedly feel that one year leave of absence would be conducive to the restoration of health so that the claimant might continue an effective ministry?"

(3) In extreme emergencies, the Committee On Sustentation will consider the diagnosis and recommendation of a duly qualified physician, but not the claimant's personal physician.

(4) When the application is approved by the Committee On Sustentation, the name of the applicant shall be submitted to the Committee On Conference Relations with a request that a leave of absence be granted for a period of one year. With this approval of the Committee On Conference Relations, and the favorable action of the Annual Conference, the applicant shall be eligible for the benefits of this program.

(5) We unreservedly recommend that no person be eligible for sustentation funds for a period exceeding twelve (12) months running consecutively.

(6) All payments shall be made to the claimant quarterly at the first of each quarter of the Conference Year.

5. We recommend the following financial plan:

(1) The Committee On Sustentation shall be given authority to draw upon the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference such amounts as are necessary during any given Conference Year to meet the needs of the applicants in accordance with the above suggested practice.

(2) After the amount expended during a Conference Year has been determined, the Committee On Sustentation will make a request of the World Service and Finance Commission for the inclusion of that amount in the Conference Budget for the ensuing year. This procedure will be most practical for there is no way of actually determining the full amount which will be needed in any Conference Year, and if this plan is followed, there will be no possibility of having surpluses or deficiencies in the money available for the sustentation committee.

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

The audio-visual training responsibilities of the Conference TRAFCO may be grouped into three categories: (1) coordinating opportunities, (2) providing leadership, and (3) conducting training events. The duties of the District and local church TV-radio and film committees should take a similar course.

Among the many opportunities now open to us are the many radio and TV outlets which do provide public service time to religious groups if the programs meet the required standards of such broadcasts. The Conference Commission is seeking to coordinate the programs of conference meetings such as the annual conference with such public service opportunities so that the radio-TV audience will have an opportunity to hear more and to see more of what the Methodist Church is doing.

The Commission recommends that the District Directors and local church committees make greater use of broadcast and television opportunities within the market areas of the entire conference.

In providing leadership we ask that each district have a district director of radio-television and seek to organize a district TRAFCO, thus providing leadership both to the district and to each local church.

The principal training event of the year will be the annual Southwestern Audio-Visual Workshop, July 5-8, 1961, in Georgetown, Texas, on the campus of Southwestern University. The Workshop this year will serve as an excellent seminar in teaching techniques and materials. There will be study groups and work sections for those who teach (1) Children's Division Courses, (2) Youth Division Courses, (3) Adult Division Courses, and (4) The General Courses. Dr. Walter Holcomb of Boston University School of Theology will be the Fair Lecturer.

We urge the churches to continue in their support of the Television Ministry Fund. Special envelopes are available on request to help raise these funds for the production of new programs for national and local presentation.

We also urge your special help in such projects as the Children's TV Series—a World Service Special.

We ask that the World Service Commission to increase our Commission's administrative fund from \$100 to \$300 in 1962-63 in order that we may conduct a more adequate TRAFICO program in this Conference.

We promise this year to work diligently to obtain a complete list of audio-visual materials now owned by the local churches, districts, church schools, and agencies of our conference that we may establish lending libraries and interchange to augment the excellent service now provided by the Conference Board of Education. Furthermore, we will put in to the hands of every pastor lists and sources of materials now available upon request. In every way we seek to proclaim Jesus Christ is Lord and urge your support in making use of the modern electronic means of doing this.

In keeping with the constructive proposals of the National Department of Town and Country, we seek to achieve the following working goals:

1. To provide parish arrangements under which every town and country Methodist member will be under the care and leadership of a trained and ordained effective minister.
2. To provide town and country parish arrangements under which every town and country minister will secure an adequate salary.
3. To provide every Methodist minister with a full work load and challenging opportunities for growth and development.
4. To adjust parish arrangements to specific conditions in town and country communities after a careful study of each local situation.
5. To provide for town and country people as good a program and Christian opportunity as is available in any Methodist parish.
6. To hold Methodism's present strength in town and country America and to develop into an ever stronger spiritual force in the years ahead.

In order to meet these long range working goals, the Commission recommends:

1. District Secretaries of Town and Country Work be appointed by the District Superintendents in each district to aid the Executive Secretary.
2. Greater stress upon "Attainment Standards for the Town and Country Church."
3. Attendance and participation in sub-district town and country workshops.
4. Cooperation with the Board of Lay Activities in promotion of stewardship, every member canvas, and other stewardship emphasis. In this connection the use of the Lord's Acre Program is highly commended.
5. Further development in the "Extended Charge," "Enlarged Charge," "Group Ministry," and "Larger Parish."
6. The observance of Rural Life and Soil Stewardship Sunday on the date stated in the Conference calendar.

7. Participation in all Jurisdictional and National Workshops and Conferences as may be held during the quadrennium.

8. In-service training for new ministers as they are appointed to serve in the rural community.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK**Report No. 6****Work and Activities during the Conference Year 1960-61:**

1. General Promotion of Town and Country Work.

48,620 miles have been driven during this Conference Year promoting our work throughout the Conference. Personal contacts have been made by the Executive Secretary with pastors and congregations. Presentation of Town and Country work was made in four sub-district rallies, preachers meetings, Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service groups, and to local church congregations. Promotional literature and development films were sent out to congregations over the conference. The new Town and Country Newsletter "Crossroads" was printed every other month and sent out to pastors and laymen as a means of keeping all informed as to the work and progress of the Commission.

2. The Development of Lord's Acre Programs.

We now have 41 Lord's Acre Programs throughout the Conference with 31 of these being started during this Conference Year. When the Harvest Festival Ingatherings are held next October and November, these churches will witness a new strength in the spiritual lives of the people.

3. The Development of "Extended" and "Group" Ministeries.

27 Extended Ministeries have been proposed to begin with the new conference year 1961-62. This is where a full time church extends its ministry to a near-by open country church. This new type of ministry is catching on in many of our small town and country churches as a new way to strengthen the church as a whole. We now have two Group Ministeries and a third one proposed for the

new conference year. Other areas are under study for group ministries. It is our goal to start at least one new Group Ministry each year.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

As we look back on this first year of the Quadrennium and review the record, we rejoice that progress is noted in most areas.

It is most gratifying to see the high level of programs which are being planned by the local committees on program. These devoted women, led by the vice presidents, are setting a high standard for Christian leadership.

Missionary Education remains one of the most popular areas of work. This is evidenced by the whole hearted participation in all educational opportunities. Eighteen of our women attended the Jurisdictional School of Missions at Maunt Sequayah, 229 were present at the Conference School of Missions at Southwestern University, Georgetown, and 1,871 attended the District Educational Seminars.

Missionary Education as a part of the total program of Christian Education of children has been strengthened this year. Many workers with children have at-

tended leadership training schools and have led the children to express their concern for others in many ways.

Methodist Women are seeking a deeper spirituality. The Times Apart held by both the Woman's Society and the Wesleyan Service Guild were well attended and they were times of spiritual enrichment. For some time we have been concerned about the decrease in the number of societies observing the Week of Prayer and Self-Denial. But in Oct. 1960 there was a marked increase in the number observing this special week.

Much emphasis has been placed on Christian Social Relations this year. In October the conference secretary went to New York to attend a United Nations Seminar and a co-operative Seminar on "The Family in a World of Rapid Social Change." The "Seminars in Minature" expected to be an outgrowth of this last meeting are eagerly anticipated. In April the secretary will go to Washington to attend the Convocation of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns.

This has been a significant year in the lives of many of our youth. Last summer a Rustic Inter-Racial Camp was held and 493 young people were in summer camps, assemblies and/or Schools of Missions. The need for trained, consecrated personnel is more urgent than ever before. To help the youth see the need a Christian Careers Conference is to be held in April, 1961. We trust that rich results may come from this conference.

Our Rural Worker, Mrs. Nan Wright, continues to do excellent work. More and more her services are sought, not only in her assigned area, but in other parts of the conference and in areas outside the conference. Both Wesley House and Bethlehem Center are doing extension work thus adding to the effectiveness of their service.

We rejoice in the organization of two new societies and two new guild units, and in the securing of 806 new members. Local societies and guild units were 100 per cent in reporting in November.

Each year our record of finance increases. Last year we led South Central Jurisdiction on per capita giving on pledges. The women gave more than \$145,000.00 on appropriations. Adding to this the Week of Prayer and Self-Denial offerings, Cash for Supply Work and Supplementary giving such as to Crusade Scholarships and other interests, they gave more than \$154,000.00. With 94 per cent of the societies meeting their Supply Work Askings our conference led South Central Jurisdiction this last report period. It will be May 15 before we can record the final accounting of our stewardship, but I am happy to say that at each quarter we have been able to pay one-fourth of our \$100,000.00 pledge.

For all this we are truly thankful and give God the glory. We face the coming year with confidence and hope knowing that the women of Central Texas Conference will continue seeking to understand "Our Mission Today."

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

1. The World Service and Finance Commission requests that no Board, Committee or Commission of the Central Texas Conference expend any money for any purpose which has not been authorized in the original budget request. We further request that every Board, Committee and Commission submit an itemized request in their Annual Conference report.

2. We recommend as a part of operational procedure that all Annual Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees which receive annual appra-

priations from the Conference budget shall remit to the Conference Treasurer a check covering the unused portion of their annual allocation. This money shall be deposited to the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference and the check shall be mailed not later than June 20th and the report shall be mailed to the Secretary of the Commission. This request is made with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer, with the consent and cooperation of the Commission on World Service and Finance, will honor all necessary monthly expenses.

3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be authorized to invest the temporarily unused funds of the Conference Treasury in "Ninety-one (91) Day Treasury Bills" only. These are to be purchased through banking sources alone and the yield therefrom shall revert to the Contingency Fund of the Central Texas Conference.

4. We recommend that the appointment of 10% of the salaries of ministers, associates and supply pastors serving churches in the Central Texas Conference be assessed for the support of the District Superintendency. This amount shall be divided equally between the ten (10) districts of the Conference and shall cover all costs of the office including salary, operational expenses, office expense and District Parsonage housing allowance, to the extent expended for utilities. No other amount shall be levied against the churches of the District for the District Superintendent's office and expenses except for the provision and maintenance of the District Parsonage.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 2

1. We approve and recommend that special offerings be taken in all the churches of the Central Texas Conference this year on the dates designated by the various Boards and Committees having them in charge, as follows: Methodist Home at Waco, Golden Cross, Methodist Student Day, World Service Sunday, College Day, Methodist Mission Home of Texas, Church School Rally Day, Veteran's Day for Retired Minister's Homes fourth Sunday in July and Mother's Day for Wesleyan Homes, and Mission Festival Sunday second Sunday in November.

2. We authorize the treasurer to pay from the total receipts for Benevolences the expense of the Conference and the following items before the distribution of any money is made:

- (1) Expense of printing Journal.
- (2) Expense of the Conference Secretarial Staff.
- (3) The printing expense and secretarial help for the Conference Treasurer in such amounts as shall be agreed upon by the Treasurer and the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- (4) The expense of bonding all treasurers of Boards and Commissions who handle Conference Funds, including the Conference Treasurer.
- (5) The expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, and the Treasurers of Boards and Commissions as they shall be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. We recommend that all funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer to be received no later than May 31st of each year in accordance with the action of the Conference which makes the fiscal year June 1, to May 31.

4. All funds received by the Treasurer in excess of General Conference and Annual Conference askings shall be distributed in accordance with the Disciplinary provisions. After the Annual Conference expenses have been met the percentage of the balance which is due the General Conference Treasurer shall be remitted immediately. All over payment of World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be remitted to the General Treasurer for World Service on the percentage basis. The balance shall be held by the Conference Treasurer in the Contingency Fund for distribution by the World Service and Finance Commission.

5. We request that all Boards and Commissions make requests for annual appropriations to the Commission on World Service and Finance at the time of the meeting of the Administrative Council before the meeting of the annual conference.

6. We recommend that every church continue to support the work of the Radio and Television Ministry with a special offering at the time most convenient for the Districts.

7. We request that every local church note that the rearrangement related to Methodist Student Movement and Wesley Foundation funds through the 50c per member apportionment requires a study to relate this matter properly to World Service askings in the local church budget.

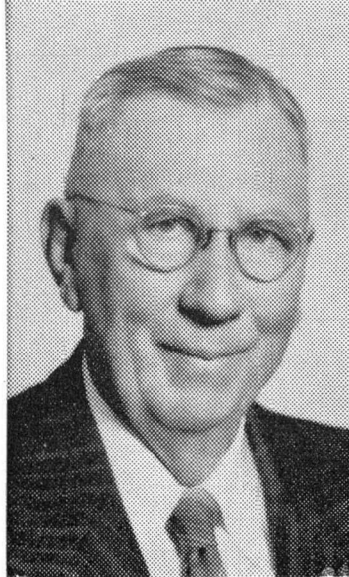

W. E. ANDERSON

Reverend W. Ed Anderson was born in Prescott, Arkansas, September 29, 1877. He moved to Rising Star, Texas as a young man and became a business partner in the Anderson-Jacobs Department Store. In 1899 he married Miss Anna Cooper and of this union were born four children: Charles Newton (deceased); Mrs. Nettie Burnett; Mrs. Augusta Dupree; and Mrs. Clauda Mae Watkins.

Brother Anderson attended Southwestern University before receiving his license to preach at Cisco, Texas in 1915. He joined the Central Texas Conference in 1918 and, except for one year as pastor of Bandera in the Southwest Texas Conference, served throughout his entire ministry in the Central Texas Conference.

This included ten years in the Brownwood District with pastorates at Cross Cut, Bronte, Gorman, Strawn, Thurber, Desdemona, and Eliasville. His first wife died in 1939 and in 1942 he married Mrs. Etna Willis.

After retiring from the active ministry in 1940 because of ill health he was asked by the Superintendent of the State Farm Colony in Austin, Texas to work in that institution where he was engaged for eight years. During this time Brother Anderson led in the organizing of a Methodist Church in the Govalle section of Austin. He served this church as a supply pastor and on completion and dedication of the new building the church honored their leader by naming it "Anderson Chapel." A plaque at the church carries the following inscription: "Anderson Chapel, honoring Rev. W. E. Anderson, Sainly founder and first pastor of this church. With loving self-denial he 'maintains the spiritual glow' and discloses for us the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. His life is light, for his one thought is God."

When Brother and Mrs. Anderson retired they moved to Brownwood and became actively related to the Central Methodist Church. Because of his modest and kindly spirit he endeared himself to the membership of our church.

On February 2, 1961 he entered through the Everlasting Portals and his funeral was held in the First Methodist Church, Rising Star, with Rev. Norman Purvis and Dr. V. Cyrus Barcus conducting the service. Brother Anderson's tired and worn-out body was laid to rest in the Rising Star Cemetery where he rests from his labors.

WILLIAM BROWN ANDREWS

In every generation, in every community, we may always find a man on whom God has set His hallmark and the seal of His divine approval. More than 98 years ago God sent His Messenger to a pure mother, in the hills of Tennessee, and said to her, "Rear for Me a child, whose life shall be a light to shine for my glory. Rear for me a child, who shall be destined to lead others in the paths of righteousness, and establish them in the faith of the fathers."

And so, when the child was born on August 12, 1863, God called to His side one of heaven's favorite angels—the angle of experience. Laying William Brown Andrews in the angel's arms He said, "Take this boy, and through his parents make him a man after mine own heart, a noble man among men. Strew his path with thorns and brambles of opposition. Spare not his young feet from the rocks of adversity. Test his growing shoulders with the heavy burdens of experience. Break his heart on the anvil of life until forged and tested like steel. Then, when he is strong through burden bearing and responsibility; when his every footprint has been stamped with the mark of worthy endeavor bring him to Me, that I may give him to men, to be their champion, to be their inspiration, their benediction and their guide, to all that is noble and worthy."

So through his parents, Rev. William T. and Elizabeth Catherine Andrews, God gave us all, the beloved father, the devoted husband, the loyal citizen, the great minister of the gospel, Dr. W. B. Andrews. Dr. Andrews was converted in 1881, at the age of 18 years, in Holly Springs, Miss. God called him into the ministry shortly thereafter. On June 17, 1882 he was licensed to preach by the Scottsboro Quarterly Conference, in the Huntsville, Ala. District. Immediately he set out to get his education. By working as a reporter on newspapers he earned enough to get through the State Normal College at Florence, Ala. From here he entered Vanderbilt University in the fall of 1885. In November of that same year he was admitted on trial to the North Alabama Conference.

While serving the Mayesville Cr. he met and married Miss Maggie Morton of Vernon, Ala. This happy event took place on June 5, 1888. To this union five children were born. Two sons and three daughters. Roy and Edward, Dorothy, Margaret and Charlotte, all survive his home going.

After several appointments outside the state, he was assigned to First Methodist Church, Quanah, Texas, in 1897. He immediately set to work to build a beautiful new church and parsonage. The Church stands today as a monument to his farsightedness.

He was appointed to the Church at Salado in 1900. From there he was sent to First Church Brownwood in 1902. In 1905 he was sent to Main St. Cleburne. In 1908 he was sent to Austin Avenue, Waco. During his 57 years of active ministry he served First Church Waxahachie, Mexia, Breckenridge, District Superintendent of the Georgetown and Waco districts.

In 1922 Dr. Andrews was asked to supervise the Superannuate Endowment Work of the Central Texas Conference. He was the father of the Superannuate

Endowment and Home idea. This work was instituted by the Central Texas Conference in 1905. Dr. Andrews became its Full time Director in 1927. Under his very efficient leadership both the Endowment Fund and the Superannuate Homes became a great blessing to each retiring Minister. He served as the Director until his retirement in 1939.

On January 13, 1939 Mrs. Maggie Morton Andrews, his beloved helpmate and life companion, passed to her heavenly reward. Dr. Andrews found life lonely and difficult without the companionship of a good woman. The answer of his loneliness and heartbreak came in the person of Mrs. Lura Knight. This lovely lady he married on August 7, 1940. They lived together in peace and happiness at 1614 St. Louis, Fort Worth, where Mrs. Lura Andrews still makes her home.

On February 6, 1961 Dr. Andrews slipped out of this life in answer of Christ's call "Come ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

Funeral service was conducted at St. Mark's Methodist Church by Rev. Warren A. Flynn, assisted by Rev. Hayden Edwards. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery, Fort Worth, Texas.

Pat Brown was born September 30, 1905 at Burns City, Texas (near Gainesville) to Calvin W. Brown and Rachel Lowery Brown. He was converted in a revival meeting in Oklahoma and upon his return home he joined the Methodist Church at Spring Creek at the age of sixteen. In 1924 he moved to Sivells Bend Community, where he met and married Nola Gibson, May 23, 1931. In 1932 he surrendered his life to the ministry and was licensed to preach in the Sivells Bend Methodist Church.

In 1934, with a wife and two daughters, he started to college at Howard Payne and received his A.B. degree in 1938. Pat was admitted on trial in 1938, received into full connection in 1940 and ordained an elder in 1943. "Brother

Pat," as he was called by so many friends, was a hard worker in the church and always sought to be an effective minister of Jesus Christ, a good father and a faithful husband.

All of "Brother Pat's" appointments were in the Central Texas Conference, where he served with devotion and deep loyalty as follows: Sipe Springs; Cross Cut; Wingate; Big Hill-Ben Hur; Abbott-Vaughn; Copperas Cove; Line Street, Hillsboro; Blooming Grove; St. Paul's, Cleburne; Joshua; Red Oak and Itasca.

After several months of serious illness he passed away in the Cleburne Memorial Hospital November 26, 1960. Funeral services were conducted Novem-

ber 27, 1960 in the Joshua Methodist Church with the following ministers sharing in the service—T. L. Wharton, Jr., Conrad Himmel, L. S. Williams, and H. B. Loyd.

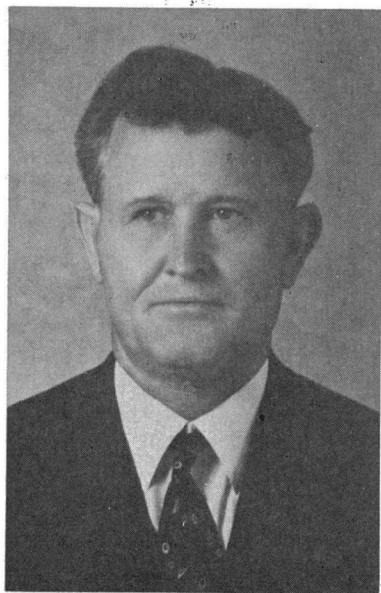

On May 22, 1904, he was married to Annie Reeves of Ringgold, Louisiana.

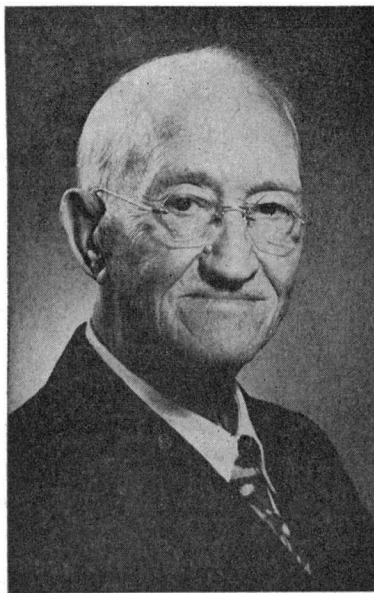

WILLIAM J. MORPHIS

William James Morphis was born February 26, 1870, in Atkins, Arkansas, as the first child of Murray Monroe and Mary Susan Morphis. He was married January 2, 1906, in Lexington, Kentucky, to Elizabeth Raine Smith, granddaughter of Rev. Joseph Rand. Funeral Services were conducted at Mottell's & Peek Funeral Home, Long

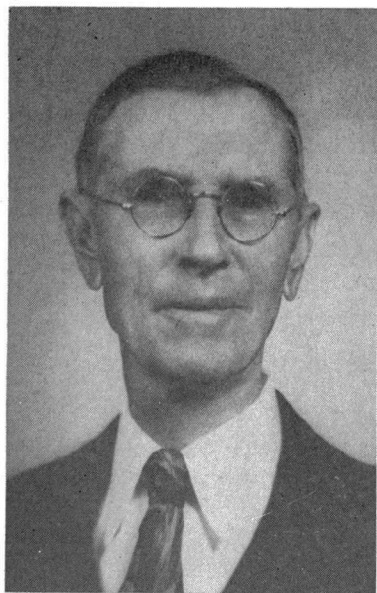

SAMUEL PETERSON NEVILLE

Samuel Peterson Neville, son of Joseph and Martha Carpenter Neville, was born November 7, 1867 at Duquoin, Illinois. When he was two years old his father died and his mother was married to William J. Marshall a year later. His public school education was received in Mulkytown, Ill. just outside Duquoin. He would attend school five months out of the year between the ages of 7 and 15. When he was sixteen the family moved to Texas and settled at Alvarado for two years. They moved to Marlin for two years and then to Tehuacana.

While living in Limestone County he met Lula Mae Brown in 1890 and the meeting culminated in marriage December 11, 1892. This fine wife was always at his side encouraging and helping him till the time of her death January 15, 1957.

As a young man Brother Neville had felt that God was calling him to preach. He professed his faith in Jesus Christ at an early age, but it was not until he was about twenty-one years of age that he united with the Methodist Church. A few years later he was licensed to preach. He did much evangelistic singing in revivals and other services. He was ordained a Deacon in 1900, admitted on trial in this conference in 1902 and ordained an Elder and admitted into Full Connection in 1904. He attended a small college at Blooming Grove and did all his theological studies by attending Pastors Schools at Southwestern and Southern Methodist Universities.

With the exception of one, all the appointments he served were in the Corsicana, Cleburne and Waco Districts as Follows: Wortham, Dawson, Blooming Grove Circuit, Grandview Circuit, Brazos Avenue Cleburne, Godley, Coolidge Cir-

cuit, Mt. Calm, West, Malone, Walnut Springs, Oglesby, Bruceville, Rice, Rising Star, Clay Avenue Waco, Elm Mott-Lakeview, and after retirement Riesel and Perry. The Nevilles retired in 1935 and moved into their own home at 2401 McKenzie in Waco where they lived until the times of their death.

During these years of retirement he was always assisting other ministers in services and was a joy and inspiration to all who served in the Waco District. About three weeks before his death he said to a fellow minister in retirement, "If I have any goodness in me it is because of these nine men," and he named them. He always appreciated his fellow ministers and was concerned for the effectiveness of their ministries. His life was always lived with a genuine devotion to his Christian commitment and ministerial calling. Children and adults marvelled at his keen sense of humor and ability to relate his experiences with joy and excitement. He remained active in the Austin Avenue Methodist Church and the Men's Fellowship Bible Class until about two years ago.

His health had been failing and a fall resulting in a head injury just a few weeks before his death possibly hastened his death at 11:25 a.m. Sunday, June 4, 1961. He had lived for 93 years 6 months and 27 days. The funeral was held in the Wilkerson-Hatch Funeral Chapel in Waco at 2:00 p.m. Monday, June 5. Officiating in the service were the Reverends R. Herman Boyd, W. F. Smith, and Arnold D. Feller with burial in Waco Memorial Park.

He is survived by two sons; J. L. Neville of Waco and Frank M. Neville of Hubbard; two brothers, Thomas Marshall of Merkel and Charles Marshall of Comanche and two sisters; Mrs. Oscar Frasier of Royce City and Mrs. Tom Swaringen of San Angelo.

A few days before his death he put these words of the Apostle Paul into his own language because he did believe this, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have loved his appearing." II Tim. 4:6-8

X—MISCELLANEOUS

STANDING RULES

I. Organization

1. Administrative Council

There shall be an Administrative Council of the Central Texas Conference, The Methodist Church, to initiate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference.

2. Membership

The Administrative Council shall be composed as follows: the Cabinet, the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Choirman and one other person of each Conference Board and Commission one of whom shall be a lay person and the other a minister except where there is no authorized lay person on the Board or Commission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each district to be nominated by the Cabinet, the Conference President and the Promotional Secretary of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Conference Youth Organization and one other young person, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missions, the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, the Conference Choirman of the Texas Methodist College Association, all General and Jurisdictional Board members and General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates not otherwise holding membership on the Council, and such other members as may be nominated by the Executive Committee. All paid employees of the Conference, its agencies, and the chief officer of institutions shall have the privilege of the floor but without vote.

3. Officers

Officers of the Administrative Council shall be a Choirman, a Vice-Choirman, and a Secretary. They shall be elected at the first meeting of the Council in each quadrennium. The Choirman shall be elected by ballot without nomination. Other officers may be elected by show of hands. The officers shall serve throughout the quadrennium.

4. Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Administrative Council to be composed as follows: the three officers of the Council, the Choirman of the Cabinet, the Choirman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Conference Lay Leader, and the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service.

II. Boards, Commissions and Committees

5. Nominations

The District Superintendents at the beginning of the quadrennium shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no person may be nominated on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Annual Conference, except where the Discipline provides for membership because of an office held. This rule is not applicable to the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation. The District Superintendents shall also nominate at the end of any normal term members of any Board, Commission, or Committee.

6. Eligibility

No member of any Board, Commission or Committee shall be eligible for mem-

bership thereon longer than eight consecutive years and shall not become eligible again for such membership until one full conference year has passed. The membership of quadrennial boards, and commissions shall be divided by the Board or Commission into two groups, one group whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of one quadrennium, and the second whose eligibility for membership expires at the end of the succeeding quadrennium. Members appointed to fill unexpired terms of less than two years shall be eligible for re-election for eight years.

Employees and Trustees of institutions, or employees of Conference Boards and Commissions, shall not be eligible for membership on the Board, Commission, or Committee through which financial support is derived. (Re-worded)

The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commission, or Examining Committees to take effect at the time of his appointment, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission, or Committee. The Bishop is asked to ratify such group in time to fill the vacancy before the Conference adjourns.

7. Vacancies

Vacancies on all Boards, Commissions, and Committees occurring during the quadrennium shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference.

Retirement from active itinerancy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board or Commission, effective at the end of the term or the quadrennium, whichever date is applicable.

Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two consecutive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

III. Financial

8. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st, and salaries of clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

9. Remittances

Remittances from a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Commission on World Service and Finance. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which remittance is made. The Conference Treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the District Superintendent for each remittance. The Pastor shall enclose these voucher receipts with his Annual Conference report as verification of items reported in table II.

10. Apportionments

The apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be based on the total money raised (item 75 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness (item 42 in Report to Annual Conference) and less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 43 in the Report to Annual Conference.) It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to compute the apportionments annually, using the statistics of the last published journal (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. District Superintendents will use the best possible approach in distributing the askings to the individual churches of the Districts.

11. Annual Audit

The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

Annually, each Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause or institution, nor shall such a day be listed in the printed Conference Calendar unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit including current annual income and expense together with its report, to the appropriate Board.

12. Special Days and Campaigns

Any request from a Board or institution or special interest of the Methodist Church asking for a special campaign for funds or a Special Day Offering shall first be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and recommendation. If such recommendation is made to the Annual Conference it must show that the object or enterprise is wholly owned by The Methodist Church; that the detailed use of funds is reasonable; and that proper safeguards have been set up for the use of funds.

Any recommendation from a Board, Commission, or Committee, including the Commission on World Service and Finance, asking for an increase that will effect the Budget of the local church, if approved, shall not become effective for one year from that date.

IV. Administrative**13. Conference Secretary**

The Bishop and his Cabinet shall nominate to the Annual Conference next preceeding the meeting of the General Conference a Conference Secretary to be elected by the Conference for the Quadrennium. Whenever there is to be a change in Secretary, the one newly elected shall assume his official duties at the session following General Conference.

14. District Conference

The District Conference shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate.

15. Reports

The statistics of the Annual Conference shall be based upon the reports in the hands of the Statistician on the fourth day prior to the opening of the Annual Conference; provided further that if the Annual Conference meets prior to June 4 then the deadline shall be the earlier of the two dates, June 1 or the day before the opening session.

The Annual Report of the Conference Treasurer shall be based on the funds in the hands of the Conference Treasurer on June 1st.

Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Committee on Proportional Payments any Church in the District that has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, or World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrowed must be made a part of the record.

He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attention during the year, and had not been reported.

16. Conference Procedure

All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary before they are presented to the Conference.

All Bonds required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

17. Conference Expense

The Conference Committee on Entertainment, appointed quodrenniolly, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of Retired Ministers.

Each charge in the Annual Conference is expected to defray the expense of its minister and lay delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

Per diem allowances will be granted to ministers from minimum salary charges in an amount recommended by the Committee on Entertainment and voted by the Conference.

18. Memoirs

There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

19. Amendments

Any of the above rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference.
