Report No. 3

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

Throughout this centennial year we have been mindful af aur rich heritage as Methodist Christians. We are groteful to the Historical Society and so many others who are making this time together a meaningful experience for us all.

The wark of the Central Texas Annual Canference continues to mave ahead with closer caoperotian and a mare unified effort than we have ever experienced in previous years.

Several progressive moves have been made to accomplish this growing spirit of oneness of purpose, specifically, to give God's will the best possible chance for fulfillment in every area of Christian cancern.

In the first place the ministry of our Canference has received a "shot in the arm" from Bishop W. Kenneth Pope. He and Mrs. Pape have tried to come to know and understand the needs and hapes of our ministers and their wives through over-night retreat experiences. The Baard of Ministerial Training continues ta make a very fine contribution to the ministerial life of our Conference. One of the outstanding events of the year is the Conference on the Ministry, which presents the call and respansibilities af the ministry to the young men of our day. The ministry of today and tomorraw is strengthened and will continue its preparation because of the wholehearted support of our laymen's response to the Ministerial Education Fund. With the setting up of the Area Counselling Program, help, guidance and odjustments to the demands and pressures of our day can be more readily accepted and understood. A very thorough and thoughtful study of our pension respansibilities has been made and will be presented to our Annual Canference at the proper time.

We see a great potential in the appointment of a Director of Evangelism and Missions. With the uniting of our witness in the closely related fields of Evangelism, Missions and Tawn and Country Work, our Annual Conference will have a greater chance to move ahead. With the elimination of the office of Secretary of Town and Cauntry Work goes the deep appreciation of the entire Conference to Edward H. Otwell, who has served so effectively in helping hundreds of churches and dozens of preachers to a larger ministry.

Outstanding in the missions area has been the purchase and use of two mobile church units to meet temporarily the need of our new and growing urban congregations.

The thrust in evangelism has been in the area of renewal in the local church, using well prepared turn-over charts in the house to hause visitation of the membership of the parish.

Another very encouraging sign of our united effort is the setting up af a Conference Committee on Mission Studies, using all the related boards and agencies to implement and strengthen this leading opportunity for our people.

The joining of farces by the Board of Education and the Baard of Sacial Concerns with a Director of Education and Social Concerns will give new vitality to the understanding and involvement of our people in the pressing social issues of the 20th century.

One of the outstanding developments of the year has been the plans of the Board of Education for the renovation and enlarging of the facilities at Glen Lake Camp. This planning is in keeping with our ability to accomplish this project without threatening other needs of our Conference Program.

The Board of Lay Activities has emphasized the Lay Speakers Program through out the Conference, seeking to make available better informed and trained laymen far leadership in the Church. The reading program in the area of Christian stewardship has been widely used. The Woman's Saciety of Christian Service continues to inspire us all with their devotion to spreading the "Good News" locally and around the world.

The challenge given to us in the building of a new Mission Hame of Texas in San Antonio is meeting with a ready response in the churches of our Conference.

Undergirding all of our deams and plans for a better world and a greater witness for Jesus Christ is the work of the Commission on World Service and

Finance. This Annual Conference is grateful for the understanding and caaperation of such a Cammission in times of progress and adjustment.

The Administrative Cauncil and its Executive Cammittee want ta express our sincere appreciation ta Bishap W. Kenneth Pape far his wise caunsel and dedicated leadership. Our Area Executive Secretary, Dr. Leightan Farrell, has been invaluable in bringing similar interests of both Conferences together far grawth, understanding and future prajection.

We are canvinced aur "One Witness in One Warld" is stranger for having experienced this year tagether under the leadership of Jesus Christ, Our Living Lard.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 9, 1966)

Underlying this year's thrust in education and action is the searching question, "Haw should the Church relate itself to government?" In harmony with this question is the Jaint Missian Study, "Affluence and Poverty: Dilemma for Christians," which we recommend for every local church. In support of this we suggest attendance at the Conference School of Christian Missian to be held at Southwestern University, Georgetawn, Texas, July 18-22, 1966.

United Nations Seminar

In continuation of our search for peace and understanding and support for the United Nations, your Board will sponsar a United Nations Seminar at the Methodist Center, United Nations, New York, October 18, 19, 20.

A brachure is available and reservations will be received beginning at this conference. We have invited the North Texos Conference and the West Texos Conference of the Central Jurisdiction to participate with us in this Seminar. We will be able to accept 40 reservations, so get yours in soon. We hape the Conference W. S. C. S. will send their President and/or Secretary of Christian Social Relations. Also we are osking each District W. S. C. S. to raise funds to send the District Secretary of Christian Social Relations and each of the eight Districts of the Conference to raise funds to send the District Secretaries of Social Concerns.

District Workshops

In keeping with the request of the Executive Committee of the Administrative Council, we are sponsoring Dr. Carl Soule from the General Board to be available to the eight Districts upon their request from June 20-28, 1966. The District Superintendents and District Secretaries of Social Concerns

are responsible for setting up a one day or night meeting and requesting a date during this week of June 20-28.

Eighth Annual Baylor-TANE Seminar on Alcohol

The Board spansored H. Dan Hitt, Chairman of the Division on Alcahal Problems and General Welfare, as a delegate to the Seminar.

H. Dan Hitt and the Board Chairman have cooperated with TANE and other Conference Boards and agencies in wark far temperance, antigambling legislation and against pari-mutual horse race betting in our state. Excellent calor film strips are being made avoilable to all District Secretaries and Churches, dealing with beverage alcohol by the drink and pari-mutual betting. It is haped that these will be used in every church. They are suitable for evening services, family-night meetings, os well as groups, classes and arganizations.

New Ofice of Executive Secretary

The Board gives full support to the recommended expansion of the Office of the Executive Secretary of Education to include the responsibility of Executive Secretary of Christian Social Concerns. We believe this will greatly help and facilitate the work of our Conference in Christian Social Concerns.

Special Days and Causes

We are encouraging all churches to observe all the Special Days as recommended by our Annual Conference and outlined in the Methodist Story. We suggest that the Churches follow the dates on the Conference Calendar for Special Days listed on the back of the Journal. Those Special Days are: World Order Sunday, October 23rd, with emphasis on the United Nations Week, October 23-29; World Temperance Sunday or Commitment Day on Octaber 16th or November 13th, the first being recommended by our Conference Calendar, the latter recommended by the General Board; Race Relations Sunday, February 12th, with an offering for Huston-Tillotson College.

Briefing Conference

We recommend that each local church seek to send their Chairman, or at least one representative member of the local Commission, to the Regional Briefing Conference at Mt. Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkonsas, July 22-24, 1966.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Report Na. 2

(Adopted June 9, 1966)

The Division of Alcohol Problems and General Welfare has spent most of its efforts in the Alcohol Problems area of our four area program. Most of our divisional report will deal with that area.

(1) In the Social Health area we would like to urge each local church to take official action supporting state and federal rehabilitation programs being offered in your communities. There are many good pieces of literature available from the Conference Board as well as the General Board describing the functions of these various organizations. One of the best pieces of material we have run across has been the "Blueprint For Rehabilitation." It contains

many suggestians and ideas far actions which any local church commission might use.

- (2) The area of Social Welfare has come in for a great deal of ottentian from the Federal government in the past few manths. Each lacal church cammissian might seek ways and means it could be of assistance to the oged in its community. We feel that actually this is a wide apen field af opportunity. There are a tremendous number of actions which, if carried out by local commissians would prave to be both rewarding and beneficial. This area in one sense af the ward is an area of pianeering. We urge each commission to do its awn lacal planning using its local people and ingenuity at its disposal.
- (3) As I stated abave, Alcohol Problems is where we have spent mast of aur time warking during this year. We have sought continued ways and means af helping aur state pragram in alcohol problems. There have just recently become available to us two new pieces of material which we hope will have some far reaching effects upon aur peaple. Texas Alcohol Narcatic Education has recently published a set of filmstrips with a recard. There are two of the filmstrips. The titles are "The Truth About Liquar By The Drink" and "Gambling Is Far Suckers." This writer has previewed these two filmstrips and I wauld commend them to you highly. We feel they might best be used by the local cammissian in educating our peaple concerning the race track gambling issues and the liquor industries proposals for the sale of liquor by the drink. We are already aware of what is ahead for us in the approaching sessions of the State legislature. These materiols are available from TANE Press ot o very reasonable price. We trust you will secure them and plan for their use in and by your church and then use them wisely and to fullest advantage.
- (4) In Education and Research we encourage the support of a pragram of alcohal education in the public schools. Texas Alcohal Narcatic Education has many materials available in this area. All we need to do is just use them to the best advantage. The local church commission might suggest that the youth include in their youth activities week at least one session of study an alcohol problems and maral concerns.

We urge each lacal church to plan discussians an juvenile delinquency, mental health, public welfare, criminal rehabilitation, the aging, and papulation control problems. There are resource lists available in all of these areas.

Again we seek and urge the support of Texas Alcohol Narcotic Education. Several years ago we asked to have as aur goal at least twenty-five cents per member. The suggestion was made that we begin with ten cents per member, increasing five cents a year until we reach the twenty-five cents goal. This may seem like a small amount, and it is, but this continuing program of education cauld be much more effective if we all jained forces in helping carry on this worthy program.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Report No. 3

Human Relations and Economic Affairs (Adopted June 9, 1966)

(1) We cannot be faithful to Christ our Lord nor to the Wesleyan tradition if we are less than an inclusive church. Therefore, we lift befare the churches and institutions of our conference these guidelines:

- (a) The General Conference hos said unequivocally that no one is to be denied attendance at worship or membership in a Methodist Church on the basis of roce. We believe this is a mondate not only of the General Conference, but of the New Testoment. Furthermore, token integration is on accomplishment with which we cannot be content. We aim at an inclusiveness that seeks, welcomes, and involves in concerned fellowship men of all roces, so that in our interior life as a church we may witness to our oneness in Christ.
- (b) We coll upon every institution reloted to our Annual Conference to bring its policies fully into line with the clear teaching of the New Testament and the official pronouncements of The Methodist Church. No policy of rocial discrimination is any longer tenable.
- (c) We recommend to our churches o forthright involvement in the move of minority groups toward full citizenship rights. We rejoice in the progress toward complete public school desegregation, equality of job opportunity and remuneration, and the guarantee of the right to vote. Now let our churches lead courageously to insure a citizen's right to purchase property and live where he chooses.
- (2) We cannot be foithful to Christ our Lord nor to the Wesleyon tradition if we ignore acute areas of human need and accept less than the whole world as our parish. Therefore:
- (a) We propose that we utilize the connectional strength of our conference to mobilize a mission to the inner city, from which we have so long ignobly fled. The central and fringe areas of Fort Worth particularly challenge our rural and suburban security. Here are masses of people to whom the church must come in new shopes and with new words, with a courage to experiment, risk, and, perhaps, frequently to fail. No one doubts but that such a mission will test severely both our sincerity and our ingenuity. The Methodist United Service and Training program (M. U. S. T.) projected by the General Board of Missions offers exciting possibilities in special training, financial oid, and continuing guidance. This board pledges its full cooperation with the Board of Missions, the Board of Evangelism, and other agencies of our conference in planning and instituting such a venture.
- (b) We propose on unrelenting focus on poverty, which hos special cloim upon the church whose Lord described his mission as a colling to "preach the good news to the poor . . . to set the down-trodden at liberty." The causes and circumstances of poverty ore complex. To understand them demands open, uninhibited and extended inquiry, for which the 1966-67 joint study will, we believe, be a useful vehicle. Proy God it may create in us a sensitive conscience and coll us irresistibly to proctical tales as a servent people of God.
- (c) Because we can only foresee on acceleration of social and technological change and an intensification of emotional stress, we plead with our churches to be especially alert and lovingly responsive to the mentally ill, the alcoholic, the addict, the erront youth, the single parent, the aged, and others upon whom pressures are particularly erosive.

Report No. 4

Peoce and World Order

(Adopted June 9, 1966)

Within the General Board of Christian Social Concerns of The Methodist Church there is the section called the Division of Peace and World Order. Involved in this area of concern are the relationships of nations with nations, parties and individuals, which have to do with attitudes of heort and mind, social and economic problems, and ideological and religious questions which tend to unite or divide mankind.

We as Christians, while we are interested ond deeply concerned in human relations around the world, must not arbitrarily set ourselves to judge or direct or even referee in offairs in which we are not directly involved or to which we have not been invited. However, we must occept the responsibility of advantage and shore with our fellow man our superabundance to alleviate suffering caused by his direct need. We should in all our relationships stand for the promotion of good will, the relief of suffering, and we must support organizations such as the United Notions in the combined and concerted effort to relieve the tensions which contribute to world disorder.

Of special interest now is the effort of the United States and members of the United Notions to settle the international conflict in southeost Asia. We commend the executive department of our government and the Congress for every effort and device and plan which they in good faith employ to bring about the cessation of all military operations and to arrive ot a sane and sensible solution to this grave international situation. Our concern is not limited to the matter of military activities. We are concerned with the economic and sociol conditions within nations across the world. Particularly there is the call of need from the multitudes in Indio. The Indian government has estimated that up to one hundred million people will be severely affected by the faod shortage coused by the worst drauth in seventy years. The estimate is that 11 to 12 million persons are in danger of storvation. In the light of the superabundance of food production in the United States, we may well accept this troubled time as an opportunity to express in a practical woy our willingness to be involved in that upon which the necessity of others depends. Peace and world order, so closely associated, hinge upon the response of the people of the world to the challenge of the Christion faith to make neighborliness real, even brotherhood, under the fatherhood of Gad.

From The Methodist Social Creed we take this reminder: "We must actively and constantly create the conditions of peace. We stand for the pramation of understanding, reconciliation, and good will; the relief of suffering, the lifting of living standards around the world . . ."

It is not irrelevant nor trite to recall the counsel of the great Apostle, "Let us therefore follow after the things which make for peoce. And the peace of God which passeth oll understanding shall keep your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." (Romons 14:9, Philippians 4:7.)

Resolution

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

A Resolution opproved on June 8, 1966 at a joint session of eight Texas Annual Conferences meeting in Dallas, Texas. Central Texas, North-west Texas, Southwest Texas, Texas, Rio Grande, Texas (C. J.) and West Texas (C. J.) Annual Conference.

We, as members of the Body of Christ universal, as citizens of the Kingdom of our sovereign Lord, and we, as citizens concerned for the well-being of the life of all America and the lives of each American, hereby express aur deep anxiety and concern at the injury inflicted upon James Meredith. This is but another symptom of our social sickness affecting not only every citizen af America, but also the life of our nation among all nations.

As pastors and laymen representing our part of Christendom, we canfess afresh that we, at home and abroad, have not made the imperatives of brather-hood as clear and convincing os we must, and we have not made democracy as precious and as pervasive as is necessary.

We send our sympathy and best wishes to James Meredith and his family, praying for speedy recovery of health and return to his Law School studies.

We send to Aubry James Norvell and his wife our word of concern to share in their present suffering, distress, and agony.

We have discovered that our deepest depths of onxiety lie in our separation from our fellowman and aur defionce of Gad's purpose far peace and gaadwill among men. All such outward acts of violence but reflect the silent but known rejection of other men and their place in a free society which too many of us harbor in our thoughts and uphold in our heorts. As we share the guilt of attitude, we feel the great need of a love big enough to forgive us and to make us forgiving and to lead us into a life guided by God's love and truth, and empowered by His Spirit.

As administrators, postors, leaders, we send to Gov. Poul Johnson of Mississippi our word of oppreciation of everything he has done and will do toward the full enfranchisement of all citizens there not only as American citizens but also as human beings who seek jay, safety, and fulfillment. We pledge to him aur commitment to these same goals among our several peoples and places in our section of this, our one nation, under God.

To the President of the United States of Americo we send greetings and would ossure him of our desire to be led through the wisest and best possible means of government, as well as through the increasing cooperation of all religious forces in our country, into that brighter day when all men shall forsake the hurtful and seek out the helpful in the relationships of all the citizens of a great country now placed in responsibilities of tremendous world leadership for justice, righteousness and peace.

A copy of this statement shall be sent to the Meredith family, the Norvell family, Gov. Paul Jahnson of Mississippi and the President of the United States, and be spread upon the minutes of each of these Annual Canferences.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 9, 1966)

The Cammissian an Christian Vacations has as its primary aim so to interpret the claim of God laid upon every person, that the Divine Imperative may be clearly heard and understaad by all. The naises of the world that so aften drawn aut the clear call of God to service within the individual life must never be allowed to negate the challenge of faith to specific areas of Discipleship. With this awareness, your Commission has sought in numeraus ways to present, first, the overall claim of God upon all of life in a clear understanding of Christian vocation. Secondly, we seek to affer as a live alternative for our people, especially our youth, the possibility of entering a Church related occupation.

A study of the need for young men and women in various church related occupations alerts us to the responsibilities in the tasks of recruitment. There are those in every local cangregation who possess the innate gifts for Church related occupations. The Commission, through its district directors and local Church Secretaries, desires to help every church discover and encourage those whom Gad may call to full-time Christian service. Through our faithfulness, many will came to know of the imperative of service, who, without careful guidance would never have recognized this cancern as a field for the fulfillment of their lives. No one, save God, can issue the "call" to any form of Christian service. Nevertheless, we do believe postors and laymen can make that call mare intelligible by being mindful of the need for Christian servants and by confronting men with the possibilities in the varied fields of Church related occupations.

To this end, your Commission has sponsored, an o conference basis, the Vocational Intern program, the Church Careers Conference, various leadership enterprises, and has maintained a file of those who have made definite commitments in the area of church careers. In addition, Commission personnel have been available throughout the Canference for youth camps, Institutes, and rollies, to speak and to counsel in behalf of this concern.

We strongly urge that each lacal church elect a Cammittee on Christian Vacatians and provide training for that cammittee to do its work. Every district should have appointed by the District Superintendent a Secretary of Christian Vacatians to act as liaison between the Commission and local cammittees. Finally, let every pastor utilize his contact with the people in preaching, teaching, and counseling, to allow the call of God to be clarified and defined by those in his charge.

As we are faithful workmen in the essential area of interpreting Christian Vocations to our people, so shall we see the fruits of our labors in a vital and challenging church in the years to came.

AREA COMMITTEE ON COUNSELING

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

In a paper presented to the Central Texas and North Texas Conferences in June, 1964, a request was made far the Bishop to appoint a steering committee and that funds be made available for the purpose of setting up a counseling pragram for ministers and their families in the Dallas-Fart Warth Area of The Methodist Church. The Conferences approved the request, a committee was appainted by Bishop W. Kenneth Pope in February, 1965, and plans were made to implement a Caunseling Pragram.

The committee, in cansuitation with Dr. Seward Hiltner, Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, and the Executive Committees of the Administrative Councils of the twa Conferences, prepared a statement setting forth the Purpose, Structure, Design

ond Stages of Development, as a basis for the introduction and adoption of the Counseling Program. Excerpts from the statement as follows:

"The need for a ministry within the framework of the Church to help ministers understand themselves and the various aspects of their rale in the octual responsibility that modern life and the modern church places upon them, has been a felt need for some time in the Dollos-Fort Worth Areo . . . There is evidence that this need is not now being met in the organizational structure of the Church, Methodist postors have no better friend than the district superintendents and their fellow ministers, yet many ore still unwilling to share the deepest concerns of their heorts in the realm of personal, family or morital problems, because of the unfavorable posture in which they believe it places them with regard to movement within the itinerant system. The unspoken spirit of disopprovol is o powerful influence felt through the ministerial fellowship when a need for growth or inadequacy of almost any nature is observed or suspected. This is unjust and unfoir in many cases and unhelpful in every cose. The director of a counseling program would be an avenue of help ond understanding for men caught in the web of forces beyond their control. In addition to serving the personal needs of the minister, it is envisioned that such o counseling program would include o ministry to his immediate family. It would further be an instrument through which direction and training could be given to enable the minister himself to become o better counselor and, consequently, a more effective postor with deeper concerns and care for the needs of his own congregotion.

In regard to the qualifications set forth by the committee for the Director of the Counseling Program the paper further stated, "The Director must of necessity have training and qualifications combining a knowledge of the bosic spiritual resources of the scriptures, with proctical experience in the field, and the insights and techniques of the behavioral sciences so that he could adequately cope with the complex needs of the modern minister. He must have the mind and heart of a pastor, and he must have a deep concern for meeting the minister as a person with the deepest possible understanding in evaluation of his role and tosk os shepherd of the flock of God and minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ . . . He must have a primary concern for the pastoral ministry ond o clear vacational identity as a minister, with ordination and proper ecclesiostical endorsement . . . He must have a graduate degree, preferably o doctorote, in counseling or o reloted field. He must have had supervised training in counseling in a recognized program which included supervised experience in intoke, individual and group counseling, referrol and termination. Such experience would represent the obility to utilize inter-disciplinory resources for consultation and a knowledge of referral policies and procedures. This training should include experience in vocational and morriage counseling . . . Such pastorol experience in a local church setting as to understand the context from which individuals come to him . . . Sotisfoctory theropeutic experience to assure odequote self-aworeness and moturity . . . Administrative competence . . . Ability to develop programs of continuing education and research.

The committee addressed itself to the task of seorching for o person to meet these qualifications and, furthermore, who would fit into the open atmosphere in the church found in the Southwest, particularly the Dollas-Fort Worth Areo. An announcement and job analysis brochure was mailed to hospitals, seminories, postoral counseling training centers, and denominational boards and ogencies. More than thirty inquiries come from as far away os Mossochussets, Michigan, Illinois, South Carolino, Colifornia, Missauri, Oklohamo, Virginia, New Mexico, and New Zeoland. We discovered that there was a great amount of interest in our program and already have had requests for assistance from other annual conferences who contemplate setting up a similar program.

After interviewing several of these persons, your Area Committee on Counseling, in consultation with Bishop W. Kenneth Pope and the Executive Com-

mittees of the Administrative Councils, make the following recommendations to the Central Texas and North Texas Conferences comprising the Dallas-Fort Worth Area of The Methodist Church:

- (1) That Bishop W. Kenneth Pope appoint a director of the Dallas-Fort Worth Area Counseling Program beginning with the Conference year 1966-1967.
- (2) That the budget for this program be shared equally by the North Texas and Central Texas Conferences, and the Committee has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference the following budget request: that it be set at \$21,000.00 with the following designated expenditures:

Salary for Director\$	10,000
Housing Allowance	2,000
Receptionist-Secretary	4,200
Office and Program Expense	4,800

- (3) That the Central Texas and North Texas Conference place \$10,500 each in their Conference budgets from the World Service and Conference Benevolence fund,
- (4) That the Counseling Program be administered by an Area Caunseling Committee composed of two elected members from each of the conferences nominated by the Bishop and the Cabinets, and the following ex-officio members from each of the Conferences: A District Superintendent, Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training, Chaplain from the Methodist Haspital; and one representative from Perkins School of Theology appointed by the Bishop.
- (5) That the Area Counseling Director shall be responsible to the Area Counseling Committee and the Bishop for the implementation of the program in accordance with the policies set forth by the Committee, and shall report to this Committee his program and activities, with the understanding that he is to maintain all personal confidences and privileged communications.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

General Church School

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

The work of the General Church School Committee is primorily concerned with the local Church School in its program of Christian Education. We submit the following report and recommendations.

1. There is general acceptance of the Church School materials of the Children's Division. Experience of a year and a holf has shown us that most of our Church Schools have found it to be very effective. We do recommend that teachers continue to train themselves and take advantage of every training apportunity in the use of the materials.

- 2. The call for a New Day in Christian teaching is most challenging. We recommend that districts and local churches participate in training opportunities as they arise.
- 3. On December 14, 1965 representatives from 20 churches met in Cleburne to hear plans for the new Adult Curriculum that is being formulated. The Foundatians Course for the new adult materials will be ready in September of 1967. Already 20 churches of aur conference have participated in questianaires that lead up to the formulation of these new materials.
- 4. Let it be nated that the Foundatians Course far the youth materials will be ready by September of 1968, and that full use for both the adult material and the youth material will be ready by September of 1969.
- 5. We wish to continue the emphasis on Church School Evangelism, noting the genuine need for teaching in the local church for a decisian for Christ. While our plans for a Church School conference on Evangelism for this year have not materialized we da recammend that this possibility be remembered far a future date.
- 6. Let it be nated that the committee recommends every effort to use the training that is given at Mount Sequoyah throughout the year. We believe that the investment made in sending qualified personnel to various training times will pay rich dividends in the conference, district and local church activity.
- 7. We suggest that in the training sessions far Junior Age Children that five conference wide Junior Camps be conducted instead of district camps as we have had them in the past.

The Cammittee recommends to the Board of Education that the following persons be certified as listed: Jahn E. Taylor, Director of Music; David F. Stewart, Minister of Education.

The Cammittee recommends for renewal of Certification of Directors and Ministers of Christian Education the following: Barbara Leonard, Sharon Mc-Intyre, Richard Hunt, Geneva Chadwick, Ken Rayar, Alice Wonders, Ernal Greenwaldt, Raybon Porter, Jim Flynn, James L. Seuser, Kathryn Clark, Charles Schneider, Margie Shuler, Ann Fox.

The Committee recommends far renewal of Certification as Directors and Ministers of Music the following: William Hamilton Miller, Donald Ed Tyler, Ben Branch, Mrs. Walter Geyer, Jr., Lewis R. Holze, Franklin V. Matula, Jerry Alden Grant Weaver, Ray A. Redman.

Camping

Charged with the responsibility for the development of camping policies in our annual conference, the Cammittee on Camping is particularly grateful far a conference staff dedicated to Christian education and visionary in its approach to the ever-changing needs af those we seek to serve; a staff which eagerly capperates with us in trying to find better ways to serve. We are aware that as times change and as needs change there must be changes in the approach to camping if it is to remain a vital activity. Some af the tentative changes with which we experimented last year have been so successful that the Camping Committee recammends they be cantinued. Among these are:

- 1. A camp deans' training session early in the year.
- 2. A camp for ninth-grade youth.
- 3. Camps programmed on a small, cabin-group basis instead of an a camp-wide activity basis.

In the past our seventh and eighth grade camps have been held on district or combination-of-district bases. Some districts have regularly filled their camp and have been forced to turn away praspective campers. Other districts have regularly been unable to have a large enaugh camp to meet their expense.

Therefore, the seventh and eighth grade camps this summer will be held on a canference-wide basis as are the senior high, ninth grade and childrens' camps.

The Camp Cammittee recommends that in addition to aur program at Glen Lake we continue ta pramote camping at Rainbow Camp. The property which we own there continues ta increase in value and is cansidered by the committee ta be a very valuable asset. While realizing the limitations which both the terrain and the weather farce on camping at Rainbaw, we feel it still a good feature of our averall activity.

Committee on Family Life

The Committee an Family Life recommends the abservance of the following activities:

National Family Week: It is suggested that each Commission an Education in the local church reactivate the committee an Family Life within the church. Many af aur churches have effective family week, bath with activities at the church and at home, but this number is far too few. Mature Years and The Christian Home have excellent suggestians far this annual abservance.

Glen Lake Family Camp: Our Central Texas Labar Day week-end camp far families has an appeal far many. Even though the camp had fewer in attendance this past Labor Day than in previous years, the spirit was excellent. There are same families that spend this last week-end before school at home.

Last year, far the first time, there were planned sessians for all children's groups and extended session literature for the Church School was used. This assured the families that their children were getting mare than custadial care, and this was an improvement over previous years.

Plans for the camp, September 3-4-5, 1966, will be formulated in caoperatian with aur cammittee and the afficers of the camp. The camp afficers for this year are Dr. Ed Lancaster of Grapevine as President; Dr. Grady Gardan of Waca as Vice-President; Mr. Harry Steinert of Fort Worth as Vice-President; Dr. Minnie Lee Lancaster of Grapevine as Secretary and Mr. Tam Vass of Glen Rose as Treasurer.

National Family Life Conference: The Fifth National Conference an Family Life of the Methodist Church will be held at the Canrad Hiltan Hatel, Chicaga, Illinais, an the week-end of Octaber 14-16 of this year. The theme is "The Respansible Christian Family in the Hame—in the Church—in the Cammunity—in the World." There will be 36 work and discussion groups considering the four aspects of the theme. Praminent speakers include: Mr. Haward E. Butt of Texas; Dr. Evelyn Duvall of Chicaga; Vice President of the United States, Mr. Hubert Humphrey; Dr. Roy Nichols of California; Bishop Kenneth W. Capeland of Nebrasko and Bishap Hazen Werner of Hang Kang.

Delegates of this Canference are being registered through the Executive Secretary's affice. Quatas have been limited to three couples per District. (Any local church can send delegates to maintain balance.) These quatas will be held until August 1st, then registrations can be made on a space available basis. The cammittee urges postars to encourage participance in this canference.

General Statements

Each pastar is urged to make himself available to all of the community, conference-wide resources in counseling, especially in pre-marital caunseling. It is the hape that Family Life caurses will be taught in all leadership schools, that retreats or seminars can be held for engaged cauples and coaching conferences for ministers might be conducted in order to better equip them for their wark with families. It is felt that the Canference proposed program of employing a Counselar for the Minister and his family will benefit not only the parsonage hame, but those of the parish as well.

The hame is the dwelling place of the Family. The Family is the plan af Gad. In twentieth century America, we find the hame facing many prablems. Urbanizatian, mechanizatian, mass communication and transportation, technical advances in science, the war, and the pill, and many other pressures are brought to bear an the family. It is the wark of this cammittee to work through all agencies of the church, especially the Conference Board of Christian Education to enable the families of Central Texas Methadism to be "The Responsible Christian Family in the Hame, Church, Cammunity and the Warld."

Committee on Higher Education

The Committee on Higher Education is aware of two major concerns. Our Methodist Calleges and Universities need more support in order that they might meet increasing costs of running a quality education program. Our Campus Ministries need more funds with which to aperate their program effectively.

The matter of increasing support to our Methodist Colleges must of necessity be a long range program. Gradual increase in per-capita support is desirable, but no ''crash program'' in this area is wanted. The committee feels that we need to give serious study and concern to finding more Methodists who will put these institutions in their wills.

Report No. 2

By-Laws of National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians (Adopted June 8, 1966)

The Conference Cammittee on General Church School recommends that the annual canference approve and accept the by-laws of the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians:

By-Laws Central Texas Conference

National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians

- 1. Name: The name of the arganization shall be the Central Texas Canference NaFOMM Cauncil.
- 2. Purpose: The purpose of the cauncil shall be the promotion of the ideals of the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians in the Central Texas Canference of the Methodist Church. The ideals as described in the current membership brachure 9054-B are:
 - -ta establish o fellowship of service to the Church
- —ta insure that the ministry of music be primarily to enrich persons, not to "make beautiful music" only
 - -to stress the impartance that each church musician is first a "Churchman"
 - -ta lead aur cangregations from being spectators to being participants
- —to make more positive the rale of music in Christian nurture, worship, and witness
- —ta encaurage the camposition of new music for use in that Christian nurture, worship, and witness
- —to encourage educational institutions of the Methodist Church to place greater emphasis on the training in and appreciation of great church music and its witness to the Christian Gaspel

This will include promotion and assisting in the farmatian of district ar area chapters of NaFOMM, and the sponsaring of warkshops and activities for the musicians of the Central Texas Conference.

3. Relationship: The Central Texas Canference NaFOMM Council is sponsored by, and under the direction of the Canference Board of Education.

- 4. Organization: The Conference NaFOMM Council shall include the conference NaFOMM chairman, who is appointed annually by the executive secretary of the Board of Education; and a director from each district which shall be appointed annually by each district superintendent, in consultation with the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education.
- 5. Duties of the Canference Choirmon: The Conference Choirmon sholl make sure that there has been a district representative appointed each year by the District Superintendent. He may suggest the names of NaFOMM members in each district which he recommends for appointment. He shall convene the conference council early in the conference year to plan for the year's work, and os many other times as necessary, as decided in consultation with the executive secretary of the Board of Education. He shall make all requests for operating funds through the Board of Education. Finally, he shall report periodically to the Jurisdictional NaFOMM representative, and once a year to the Annual Conference, telling of the work of NaFOMM in the Conference.
- 6. Duties of the District Representatives: The district representatives shall cooperate with the District Superintendent in all activities. He shall supply a mailing list, including names and addresses, of all musicions in his district early in the conference year. He shall be respansible for the formation of a district chapter of NoFOMM, or an area chapter, in cooperation with another district director. He shall seek to enlist every person, employed or valunteer, who has a responsibility for the music in a local church as a member of the local chapter of NaFOMM, which includes membership in the National Fellowship. Standard membership forms shall be used, and all forms and regular dues shall be turned in to the national office.

The district director shall promate regular meetings and activities of the local chapter. He shall organize the local chapter with officers and by-lows necessary to corry out its work. Operating funds shall be obtained through workshop registrations, or by offerings taken at the various activities.

Recommendation on Glen Lake Camp

(Adopted June 9, 1966)

The 1965 session of the Central Texos Annual Conference directed the Board of Education to loy plans for a copital improvement program of Glen Loke Camp and to present a definite proposal for a special compoign to the 1966 session of the Conference. In order to take advantage of the ideas and experience of many within the Conference, each local church was invited to send its minister and at least one laymon to a special meeting at Glen Loke Comp in the fall of 1965. The response was gratifying in both numbers and participation, for there were many fronk and exciting suggestions made by the group. A tope recording of all suggestions formed the basis for the Board's further action. Every suggestion was given coreful consideration.

The Boord, ofter heoring the suggestions, through two sub-committees on development and finance, consulted with two orchitects and retained one of them for ossistance in development of the development program.

After considerable study, consultation, and projection of the plans for use of Glen Loke Comp, the Board of Education makes the following recommendation to the Annual Conference for capital improvement and development at Glen Loke Comp:

- (1) That the amount of \$250,000.00 be set as the gool for the Moster Plan and Construction Program.
- (2) That the Construction Program be in accordance with the following estimated costs presented by the architect and approved by the Board of Education upon recommendation by the Committee on Comping:

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

It is the unanimous opinion of the Board of Evangelism that the new office of Executive Secretary of Evangelism-Missions and Town and Country Work, is one that has long been needed and will perform a most effective and farreaching work. The experience of this Board, through the last two quadrenniums, has been that a full time person was sorely needed in promoting, planning and projecting a Conference wide program of Evangelism alone. We commend to the Annual Conference the absolute necessity for a full time person to promote the work of these fields.

The Board reminds the Conference of the projected program of Evangelism for the remainder of this quadrennium:

No conference-wide program will be initiated by our board for 1966-67, but each district will be encouraged to plan its own program. To initiate this planning the Inter-Board District Workshops, beginning Monday, June 20 and continuing through July 1 will be held in each District, with Charles Whittle from the General Board of Evangelism as the resource leader from our Board, available for these workshops.

In the fall of 1966 "The Mission To America" program is offered to the local churches and districts of the Conference. Outstanding Christians from other lands will be in America, helping observe the "Bicentennial of American Methodist Preaching." The dates for this Mission are: September 11 to December 9. Sixteen "Missioners" from fourteen countries will be coming to make their witness for Christ to the Methodist Church in the U. S. A. These Methodist ministers and laymen from these other lands will be available for six and eight day missions in local churches. The names and the expenses and costs will be publicized through the District Secretaries of Evangelism.

1967-68—The Year of Simultaneous Ingathering on Conference Level. We propose a lay-witness mission during the month of October, 1967 in every local church—and a preaching mission in every local church during the spring of 1968 as follows:

March 3 to 10th a simultaneous preaching mission in four districts.

March 17 to 24 a simultaneous preaching mission in the other four Districts.

Following this period of simultaneous preaching missions, we urge an intensive **period of cultivation and assimilation.** The Board will provide help to the local church in properly assimilating the new members received and in the cultivation of those who are inactive.

We recommend the appointment of Reverend Quay Parmer os Conference Evangelist.

The Board has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference, the following askings:

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Central Texos Conference had its beginning one hundred years ago, and thus in an unusually significant sense participants in the historical jaint session of the annual conferences of Texos, at Southern Methodist University, in its Fiftieth anniversary and in the Bicentennial Year of the Beginnings af American Methodism.

This annual conference, under the name of the Northwest Texas Conference was organized in Woxohochie, Texas, on September 26, 1866, with Bishop E. M. Marvin presiding. In 1910 this old Northwest Texas Canference was divided into the Central Texas Canference and a new Northwest Texas Conference. Central Texas was afficially declared to cantinue as the ariginal conference arganized in 1866 and the present Northwest Texas Conference dates its organization to 1910.

The Historical Society has given attention for several years toward a proper observation of this centennial accosion, and many of its plans were loid aside to participate in this joint celebration. However, the Society has continued its plan to prepare a special historical section to be included in the 1966 Journal of the Conference. The Reverend Edward H. Otwell has accepted the responsibility of requesting the ministers of the conference to send in their pictures that they might be printed in this journal. He succeeded in getting pictures from all the ministers, except sixteen. We wish we cauld have had a hundred percent response, but it seems that the ministers of our conference are too individualistic to be one hundred percent on anything.

The Reverend Rabert W. Sanders has given mony hours to campiling and editing a complete ministeriol service record. Far the first time aur Journal will record for every living minister now in this conference, the date of his admission on trial, reception into full connection, and the date of every ministerial appaintment. This will be of interest to many loy members os well as ministers.

Dr. W. W. Ward accepted an invitation to prepare a detailed historic account of the events, movements and developments within this annual conference during the century naw closing. We have been fortunate in having the service of this devoted and well informed minister, and former secretary of the annual conference, to prepare this record.

The 1966 Journal, we are canfident, will became a treasured issue as the years ga by. It is an expensive undertaking and we are grateful to the Commission an Warld Service and Finance for additional funds received during the past two years which make passible this historical edition. The Commission has decided that the free distribution of this 1966 Journal will be definitely limited, as fallows: six copies shall be sent without charge to every postor and district superintendent; two copies to each special appointee, each associate pastor, retired minister, and lay conference officer, one free capy to the widows of ministers, to Methodist institutions within the state, and to the long-established exchange list within the jurisdiction. Beyond this free distribution, additional capies will be available at \$2.00 each. To be assured of receiving a copy of this journal, arder blanks for lay members and ministers will be made available and must be received before the clasing date (June 9) of the conference session. Orders after that date will be filled, at \$2.00 each, as long as capies remain in the original printing.

Yaur Society has given special attention within the past three years in determining which Methodist church in our conference has the longest continuous existence. This has not been easy to determine, but from research in available records, this distinction belongs to Richland Methodist Church, Navarro County. At this session of the conference, special recognition is given to the pastar and representatives of this church as the earliest established Methodist church with continuous service to the present day within the Central Texas Conference.

The Society urges local churches and postars to make local arrangements for abservance of this historic year with historical sermons, the preparation and up-dating of local church histories, and the encouragement of our members to collect and danate historical dacuments and records to established Methodist historical depositories.

We have presented to the Commission on Warld Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the annual conference a request for aur 1967-68 appropriation the amount of \$500.00 for the expenses of the Society, the securing of historical materials, and our annual contribution of \$150.00 toward the publication of the critical edition of John Wesley's warks.

HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

We are now campleting nine years with Ministers Life and Casulty Unian, Minneapalis, Minnesota 55416, as the insuring agency for aur Central Texas Methadist Conference plan of voluntary Graup Hospitalization Insurance far aur ministers and their families. This plan is available to all full-time ministers, both conference members and supply postars, who serve within the bounds of the conference. The cammittee urges each qualifying minister to make careful study of the benefits of the Conference Graup and invites each one to enroll. Each minister decides for himself about joining the Group; he pays his own

premium, quorterly, direct to the Compony; ond he receives his own individual policy.

Words of satisfaction and prompt settlement on individual claims as provided in our policy are encouraging. We find that MLCU goes "the second mile" to help ministers recover from their own failures or oversights. We find from our study that our premium dollar continues to buy maximum benefits through MLCU. A few examples of our present coverage are:

\$15 per doy on Hospitol Room

80% of Certoin Other items while hospital confined

80% Out-potient emergency occident treotment

36 Months Disability Income at \$150 monthly

\$120 up to this in Childbirth

\$300 up to this for highest surgical benefit

\$3,000 up to this Moximum hospitol benefit per person per couse

\$22 Quarterly premium for single mole

\$47.50 Quorterly premium for minister, wife and children under oge 19

We recommend that our Central Texas Methodist Conference Group Hospitalization Insurance be continued at its present level for 1966-1967, understanding that MLCU, like all insurance companies, will have to design their policies around Medicare at age 65. See Report No. 2 for details on MLCU and Medicare in relation to our Conference Group.

While it is not a port of our Conference Group program we are glod to call to your attention that MLCU has developed a "Hospital Indemnity Policy" which pays \$15.00 and day per person, (doubled to \$30.00 and day for cancer), and poys this in addition to your other hospital insurance coverage. The quarterly premium is \$7 for an individual, \$14 to insure the entire family.

The plon for reopening our Conference Group os authorized by the Annual Conference, June 2, 1965, was successfully completed and become effective on July 1, 1965 for those who applied. With our Conference Group strengthened by this enrollment each "newly eligible" full-time minister, (both conference member and supply postor), may be received into the Group on a non-medicol bosis simply by registration and payment of his premium, provided he exercises his option within the 90-day limit required by MLCU and agreed upon by our Annual Conference.

While we hove a Group Hospitalization Insurance plan each individual minister must act for himself; and by his action he helps create the Group. We need to remind ourselves, and especially each new minister, that our Conference has a valuatory Group Hospitalization Insurance plan. A few basic guidelines which will help you and, perchance, a brother minister include these:

- 1. Each minister who receives on oppointment for fulltime work within the bounds of the onnuol conference, whether on opproved supply postor, on triol, or in full connection, hos o limit of 90 doys from the effective dote of said oppointment to opply for membership in this hospitalization program without ony restrictions, without the necessity of providing o certificate of insurobility, and without ony questions or limitations of previous health conditions.
 - 2. Each eligible minister who woits 91 days or more to make application

for the Group Insurance may join by filling out the "long form" and by furnishing evidence of insurability satisfactory to MLCU.

- 3. Any minister who marries subsequent to becoming a participating member of the Conference Group may enroll his wife in the program without limitations or restrictions, provided he makes written application within 60 days ofter his marriage. One who waits 61 days or more after marriage to enroll his wife may do so by filling out the "long form" and meeting actuarial standards of MLCU.
- 4. Any minister who allows his policy to lapse through foilure to pay the quarterly premium within one month after the due date, may reinstate his policy by paying the current quarterly premium and by furnishing an occeptable certificate of insurability, provided he does so within one year after the lapse of the policy.
- 5. Any minister who leaves our group by transfer or other reason, who continues in full-time religious work, need not lose his insurance protection. He may make application to MLCU for individual caverage with the same benefits and no evidence of insurability is required if continuous insurance is desired.
- 6. Our agreement with MLCU includes provision for continued coverage for dependent children to age 25, for widows, and for retired ministers. See report No. 2 for details on MLCU and Medicare in relation to our Conference Group.

COMMITTEE ON HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

Report No. 2

(Received June 9, 1966)

The new Social Security Amendments and Medicare as passed by Congress and signed into law by the President of the United States on July 30, 1965 will affect all types of Health Insurance Campanies. Ministers Life and Casulty Union, Minneapolis, Minnesota, the insuring agency of our Conference Group Hospitalization Insurance, accelerated its research program to find the needs of ministers and their families in this field and to affer suggestions on ways to meet such needs. Your Conference Cammittee has studied possibilities and prapasals available to our group. Feeling that we should keep abreast of the times in hospitalization insurance we requested MLCU to work up at least three proposals for our Canference Group as follows:

- 1. Leave our present Group Policy as it is, except as Medicare provisions would require change.
- 2. Show how a little increase in premium would buy a corresponding increase in benefits.
- 3. Show us the maximum type of benefits in a MLCU Group Policy if the amount of premium were no factor.

Ministers Life did this in a very helpful way showing how various segments may be selected to provide a strang, basic group insurance program. We recommend further study regarding improvements in our Conference Group. A very important phase of Group Hospitalizatian Insurance inheres in what happens to one's coverage when he retires, reaches age 65, or continues as an active minister beyond age 65. In view of a diversity of situations for ministers MLCU will frame policy provisions around benefits covered by Medicare, but nat duplicating Medicare. On this basis our Graup Policy will cantinue to provide full strength Group Coverage for all under age 65 and to provide designated "Member Benefits" for the active minister to age 70 as specified in our Group Cantract with MLCU.

Since Medicare will became effective as national law an July 1, 1966 Ministers Life, like other insuring agencies, will terminate all hospital and surgical "riders" of members age 65 ar over and new caverage will be affered an a non-medical basis. Ministers Life has designed the **Simplex 65** policy for individual coverage at age 65 far policies stemming from our Conference Graup level. We recommend it far thase who are now age 65 ar alder and far others who will saan be 65. This is a very simple pravision for a \$10 daily haspital indemnity plan. Under this policy MLCU pays \$10 far each day a member (or his wife) is in the haspital. There is no limit to the number of days a man can receive this \$10 benefit under the Simplex 65 and it may be continued for as long as one wishes. The premium for this Simplex 65 is just \$10 a quarter for two.

Policy conversions will be simple relating to this age-65-factor and they will be made by MLCU as aften as necessary to maintain maximum coverage for each minister and his family related in any way to our Canference Group. Keep in mind that aur Group caverage will not duplicate pravisions of Medicare. Several possible situations might include these:

1. Man and wife over 65, no other dependents:

They will be given the Simplex 65 at family rates (\$20 quarterly).

- 2. Man and wife over 65, dependent children under age 19:
- The man and his wife will be given the Simplex 65 (\$20 quarterly).
- b. Children under age 19 will be given a palicy with coverage identical ta what they had under the father's policy. (The rates will vary depending upon what coverage the father had).
 - 3. Man over 65, wife under 65, no other dependents:
 - a. The man will be given the Simplex 65 (\$10 a quarter).
- b. The wife will be given haspital and surgical caverage equal to what she naw has (at member rates). This caverage will be combined under her husband's policy. (They will receive ane policy and one premium notice.)
- c. When the wife reaches age 65, we'll change this cambination to the family Simplex 65 (\$20 per quarter).
 - 4. Man over 65, wife under 65, dependents age 19:
 - a. The man will be given the Simplex 65 (\$10 quarter).
- b. The wife and children will be given a separate policy with coverage identical ta what the family naw has. (The premium will be reduced ta "ane-parent family" rates).
- c. When the wife reaches age 65, this palicy will be terminated. Her husband's Simplex 65 will be changed to family caverage (\$20 a quarter) to include her.
- d. If there are still dependents under age 19, they'll be given a palicy with coverage comparable to what they had.

5. Any man who has a **Protector Policy** at present and is still actively engaged in a full-time religious vocation will be allowed to keep the Disability Incame and Accidental Deoth and Dismemberment benefits of his policy until retirement or age 70, whichever occurs first. (The Protector and Simplex 65 will be separate policies).

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

Our nation is recognizing as never before the necessity of a better health and welfare program for its citizens. It is our privilege, as a church, to be a leader in this great field in which Christ, Himself, set the example. His program is now carried on in 268 hospitals and homes of Methodism and it is significant these institutions served last year 1,783,037 people which was an increase of 34,963 over the previous year.

With justifiable pride we call attention to the aid our belaved Church gives to the sick, the aged, the youth and children in distress, and in the care of unwed mothers and their babies.

We call attention also to the clinical training of ministers offered by the chaplains of our institutions with the aid of visiting speakers and teachers. This training is invaluable to our young ministers in giving them the "know how" of ministering to the sick.

Another wonderful asset to aur ministry of healing is the program of recruitment and training of nurses. The Harris Hospital School of Nursing sponsored jointly by the Hospital and Texas Christian University has made a tremendous contribution to the health needs of the people of our day. This program deserves our fullest coaperation by giving assistance in locating and directing prospective young women to take advantage of this marvelous vacational training.

Surely, we could never evaluate the good done by the Galden Cross assistance. It grieves us that same churches ignore the call far funds in this vital area. When we consider the fact that the charity program of these Methodist institutions last year was \$25,580,905 and that the churches supplied only 6,647,917, ar one fourth of the amount, we baw our heads in shame. May we never forget "we are our brother's keeper." We urge our people to make Galden Cross a "heart cancern" every year.

Distributing thoughts come from the fact that:

The mentally ill accupy fifty percent of the haspital beds taday.

The increase of births of babies born out of wedlock in the past twenty years is three hundred percent.

Of aur national population—one hundred ninety-three million—eighteen million are over 65 and the number is increasing at the rate of one thousand per day ar approximately 400,000 annually. The church must nat be found wanting in meeting the needs in these vital areas of aur responsibility. All of this means that the church does have a great ministry to perform and that we need to "be about our Father's business."

Let us remember, the health and welfare institutions of our church are Christianity in action as the New English Bible interprets 1 John 3:18: "Lave must not be a matter of words or talk—it must be genuine, and show itself in action."

This Board urgently recommends that every church follow the program of the General Conference and form a strong Hospital and Homes Committee and elect a Hospital and Homes Steward who would be Chairmon of the Committee. We heartily recommend the use of the Hospitals and Homes Manual by every member of these Committees, far in the wards of Dr. Olin E. Oeschger, General Secretary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes: "If we are to meet the challenge for expanded and improved services, we must wark more intensively on the Local Church level."

Methodist Home Administrative Changes

The Central Texas Conference Board of Hospitals and Hames commends the Board of Directors of the Methodist Hame at Waca for their recent action which brought about administrative changes at the Home.

The Board jains Methodists across the State in expression of appreciation for the seventy-five years of wanderful service to homeless and needy children.

The Board of Directors of the Hame is also commended for the honor and recognition given to Mr. Hubert Johnson for his many years of devoted service. We, therefore, express appreciation of the fact that Mr. Johnson will be Executive Vice-President of the Foundation where his unusual talents and background may serve Methodism in a much greater way.

Cammendation is further given the Board of the Home for their careful selection of Mr. Kennard B. Capeland as Administrator to succeed Mr. Johnson. Mr. Capeland is an autstanding churchman and layman. He is a man of genuine character and integrity and is well qualified to fill this position.

It is our strang belief that these changes will greatly enhance the future of the Hame.

We believe also that Mr. Jahnson will enlarge and improve the Faundation and that Mr. Capeland will strengthen the Hame as he gives leadership to its daily aperation.

Methodist Home Commissioners

It is the concensus of the members of the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Central Texas Conference that the use of Cammissioners at the Methodist Hame serves a warthwhile purpose and should be continued. Therefore, we heartily endorse the following plan suggested by Administrator Kennard B. Capeland:

"That each District Superintendent will, in advance of the spring meeting of the Board of Haspitals and Hames, recommend ane layman and ane minister from his District to serve as Commissioners of the Hame, and their terms would be far one year unless re-naminated."

It is the feeling of the Board of Haspitals and Hames that it should have authority to approve or reject these naminations. When approved, the names of the Commissioners should then be presented and recommended to the Annual Conference for election after which they will be listed in the Conference Jaurnal with proper address and identification.

Should a Commissioner move out of the bounds of his District he will terminate his tenure and the District Superintendent should then recommend to the Executive Committee of the Board of Hospitals and Homes a successor.

We, therefore, recommend that this plan become effective with the Conference Year 1966-67.

Report of Commissioner-Chaptain, Harris Hospital 1966

The Chaplaincy

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

It is, indeed, a challenge to be a part of an institution that is dedicated to the alleviation of human pain and suffering, and the restaration of health. It is good to be a part of an institution that dares to be abreast, and pravide the best for all who need its services. It is then with a sense of real pride that one can say, "Harris Haspital is a Methodist institution."

In September of 1965, Chaplain Robert L. Davis was added to our staff. His training, professional competence, and his personality make his ministry a blessing to both the patients and the members of our staff.

Our mutual goal is to so structure our work that we will render maximum service to the potient, the postors, and to the church. You compliment us when you ask us to serve you.

Clinical Training Program

During the past year we have expanded our program to clinical pastoral education; a pragram of supervised experience in ministering to the sick for graduate theological students, in co-operation with Brite Divinity School, Perkins School of Theology, and Southwestern Boptist Theological Seminary. While the goals and purposes of our program remain essentially the same, we are attempting to develop a fuller and mare intense experience for the opportunity of dialogue between the student-minister and those others who work so closely with the sick person.

We offer two types of clinical programs: (1) Individual students participate in six hours a week of assigned, supervised calling an patients, and in a two-hour seminar of the entire group for a period of 18 weeks. (2) The first quarter of accredited clinical postoral education in which the student participates in a 12 week, 40 hour a week experience as an attempt to take the student from seminary, or the minister from the parish, and place him in a supervised setting, wherein he begins to become more aware of the confronting instances of life and death. He begins to loak at the nature of man not only theologically, but also psychologically, i.e., man's relationship to God, to himself, and to his fellow man. Credit for either of these two courses is given by Brite Divinity School, Texas Christian University, Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, or Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, for the successful completion of the course.

We limit each of the one day a week classes to eight students and the summer class to six.

Golden Cross Service

This report covers the period of June 1, through May 31, 1966.

At the close of May 31st, the cost of 28 church-referred patients amounted to \$8,482.51. The total amount received from the churches of our Conference for the same period of time amounted to \$11,111.16.

Harris Hospital

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

The Board of Trustees and the Administrator respectfully submit a Report of the operations and activities of Harris Hospital for the Fiscal Year ended September 30, 1965. Since six months have elapsed since the end of our Fiscal Year, members of the Conference will realize that all af the statistics are based on the 1964-65 Fiscal Year, but in order to give a current report, many of the improvements and developments reported upon have occurred since that time.

Patient Care Factors:

During the Fiscal Year 1964-65, 143,990 days of adult care were given; this was an increase of 18,488 days over the previous Fiscal Year. In addition, 15,454 days of newborn care were given.

Nationwide, the number of obstetrical patients entering hospitals has declined sharply over the last five years, and this has been true of Harris Hospital. There were only 3,115 deliveries in the last Fiscal Year, while in 1960-61 there were 3,873. Conversely, the occupancy of the medical and surgical divisions of Harris Hospital has been almost 100% for the last twelve-month period

Each year finds us with increasing numbers of patients presenting themselves to our Emergency Room facilities for care, as well as an increasing number of requests for Laboratory and Radiological examinations. During the past year, 242,267 Laboratory tests were performed and 40,033 Radiological examinations were performed.

Purchase of Equipment:

During the year, the Board of Trustees of the Hospital aurthorized the purchase of Movable and Fixed Equipment in the amount of \$133,408.60.

Fund Raising Report:

Expansion Program:

New Construction and Modernization—Last year, we reported to the Conference that the Board of Trustees was considering a twa-phase expansion program, both phases of which were partially dependent upon Hill-Burton participation; last Fall, we received ward that aur priority was not high enough for the State ta grant us approval an our application for Hill-Burton funds, but that our application could remain active for the next year.

Since our projected new construction and modernization programs will caver at least a four-year period, and since, because of lack of Hill-Burton approval, our program has been delayed by at least one year, the Board of Trustees in February, 1966 authorized the construction (Phase I) of a parking garage to be located immediately East of the Mall which separates the Main Building from the Wamen's Building.

This garage will have three levels with foundations adequate to go two levels higher. The initial construction will provide 580 parking spaces, thereby increasing the averall parking capacity of the Hospital to 846. The cost of this construction will be in excess of \$600,000. Funds for this project are immediately available.

Phase II, which encompasses new construction, is being resubmitted for Hill-Burton participation in September of this year. This project will be an addition South of and connected to the new Women's Building and will contain 112 additional medical and surgical beds.

Immediately upon completion of Phase II, Phase III should begin. This Phase, which will be accomplished by sections (100 beds per section), will be the complete remadeling of the facilities in the Main Hospital Building.

The completion of this entire pragram is tentatively set for February, 1970. Upon completion, Harris Haspital will have 617 beds, which will essentially be as modern as any new beds built taday. The assets of Harris Hospital will then be, an a replacement basis, \$20,000,000.

Interim and Long Term Financing:

In order for the Board of Trustees to accomplish the New Construction and Madernization Program, as autlined, consideration must be given to interim financing and long term financing.

In 1960, a time when the Plant Assets (Building & Equipment) of the Hospital were \$6,836,576.00, the Conference set the interim financing latitude at \$4,000,000 and the permanent, long term financing latitude at \$2,500.00.

At the present time, the Plant Assets of the Hospital are in excess of \$14,-263,822 and the long term indebtedness is \$2,000,000.00, ar a ratio of Assets to Debt of 7:1.

The Board of Trustees requests the Conference to increase the interim financing latitude to \$5,000,000 and the long term financing latitude to \$3,500,000.00, realizing that the Plant Assets of the Hospital will, upon completion of this program, be in excess of \$20,000,000. If the total long term financing latitude were to be used the ratio of Assets to Debt would still be 7:1.

Commendation:

The Board of Trustees would like to recognize the service of a ministerial member of this Conference, the Reverend Dactor Thomas Sterck, who has served as a member of the Board of Trustees since 1948.

Reverend Sterck has been a member of numerous committees of the Baard, including the Finance Committee and the Building Cammittee. The latter cammittee he has chaired for 13 years.

Since Reverend Sterck has retired ond, therefore, is not eligible for nomination for re-election as a Trustee, the Board wishes to express its mast sincere appreciation for the valued, dedicated and untiring service of this ministerial member of the Conference.

Recommendation for appointments:

Additionally, the Trustees had respectfully requested the Bishop and his Cabinet ta reappoint the Reverend James B. Ansley as Commissioner-Chaplain of the Hospital for the caming year; and they had further requested the Bishop and his Cabinet ta reoppoint the Reverend Robert Lee Davis as Assistant Chaplain of Harris Hospital for the coming year.

Appreciation:

Members of the Centrol Texas Conference of The Methadist Church are to be commended for the continued interest and support which is given to Horris Hospital.

The Board of Trustees, the Medical Staff, the Personnel of Harris Haspital and the patients whom they serve ore quite aware and appreciative of this interest which is centered in the ministry of healing.

Homes For Retired Ministers
(Adopted June 8, 1966)

The Board of Trustees of Hames for Retired Ministers hos experienced o year of transition. The foundation that was laid several years ago by a forsighted and thorough-planning body is beginning to now know some amount of forward movement. Several of the inadequate hames that had previously been listed with a realtar for the purpose of selling have now been sold. The Board has made a thorough examination of the type and location of future building and has determined that the homes should be af multiple dwelling type, and, has set in motion plans to begin the immediate construction of such a unit in Stephenville, Texas. Further development of this concept of housing for our retired ministers in the Central Texas Conference will be seen as time goes an.

We have at present 30 homes, 28 af which are naw occupied by retired preachers ar widaws af retired preachers. Two units are naw rented ar are avail-

able far accupancy. One additional unit is listed with a realtor for the purpose of selling. A continuing program of repair and improvement has been carried out by the Superintendent of the Hames, Reverend Hubert Crain. The general condition of the homes is at this time as good as before and in many instances much improved.

Report No. 6

The Methodist Home

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

The Methodist Home has just passed a milestone in its long history of service to children in need of a home. The Seventy-Fifth Anniversary of the founding of the Home was observed and plans set in motion for a new era of growth and development with the extension of its services to children of Texas and New Mexico.

During this seventy five year history, the Home has served nearly 9,000 children. In the present Conference year alone, nearly 600 boys and girls will have received the benefits of the helping hand extended by the Home. At the present time, there are nearly four hundred children in the group care program of the Home, seventy five in the foster homes of the orea, and eleven boys and girls in college under the supervision of the Home.

Plans have been initiated to extend the services of the Home in a very tangible way to large centers of population in Texas and New Mexica. This satellite program could well be the beginning of a program that would serve many more children than are being served at the present time. It could also open up many more facilities for the care of emotionally disturbed children which are not now available.

During the past year the Foster Home program was expanded to such an extent that oll pre-school age children are now cared for in this manner. We are now trying to expand this program to boys and girls of older ages who are having difficulty adjusting to the group care program of the Home.

Perhaps the greatest need in the post in the physical plant, hos been that of recreational facilities. The Edwards Swimming Pool Complex was opened in August last year and plans are underway for two baseball fields and two tennis courts to be completed by this summer.

We should like to request that the churches of the Central Texas Conference designate December as Methodist Home Month and during that time tell the story of the Home to each congregation. The commissioners from each district will be ready to serve any church which needs help during this time in presenting the needs of the Home.

It is with deep oppreciation that we report the total contributions from the Central Texas Conference \$97,138.34 for the care of the boys and girls in the Methodist Home during this Conference year. This is a small increase in support over the lost Conference year and we are grateful for it.

Methodist Mission Home of Texos

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

This yeor, 1966, marks o number of significant milestones in Methodism; 200 years of American Methodism; 100 years of Northwest Texos Conference; 100 years of Central Texos Conference; and 50 years of Southern Methodist University; all of which will be jointly celebrated os the Texos Annual Conferences convene together in Dollos June 6-9.

The year marks other equally significant if not outstanding milestanes in Texos Methodism. The Methodist Mission Home of Texos is completing its 70th year of providing a redemptive and rehabilitative ministry to un-wed mathers and

their babies. From its early beginning in what was formerly a brothel, until its owner, a Madame Volino, was converted and had her life tronsformed by the power of God, the Mission Home hos ministered to countless numbers of girls, their fomilies, their babies, and young adaptive couples.

Great strides have been made in many areos in these seventy years. The number of girls cared for hos grown almost olormingly as the problem of the unwed mother hos grown into our society. From six girls and one baby cared for the first year, the ministry of the Home hos grown to provide care for over 200 girls and their babies onnually. (In the first nine months of the present Conference Year, 168 girls hove been admitted to the Home, 84 of which were Methodist, and 150 bobies were placed for odoption.)

In its early beginning, the Mission Home was the San Antonio Rescue Mission, supported and gaverned by local Methodists. Tadoy, the Methodist Mission Home of Texas is corporately owned and operated by six Annual Conferences in Texas and under the auspices of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes of The Methodist Church.

For years now the work of this ogency has been only nominally recognized as a ministry of the church. It must be said that we wish our world were not the kind of world that made such o ministry necessary, but one can hardly say this in the face of today's lorgely sex-oriented society.

Consequently, the Home has evolved from a "refuge" where the un-wed mather might hide during her pregnoncy, to o home in which she might find the love of Christ through the campossianate but highly skilled ministry provided for her by the Methodist Mission Home of Texas.

The growing-up process has not been eosy nor has it come quickly. No longer a "step-child" af the church, the Home today under the direction of its Administrator, Dr. Spencer L. Stockwell, is providing leodership in many oreos in the field of ministering to un-wed mothers and their babies.

For exomple, the Home has participated this year in helping to secure new state legislation pertaining to the licensing of maternity homes in Texas and the Hame's Administrator served on the Tosk Force to establish the minimum standards far Moternity Home care in cooperation with the State of Texas Department of Health.

At the church level, Dr. Stockwell spoke to the General Board of Hospitals and Homes of The Methodist Church meeting in Dollas cancerning "The Church and Services to Un-wed Porents," pointing out the inadequocy of our church's ministry in this whole area moking specific recommendations that would provide a storting point to a more enlarged concern in this field of service.

This year morks onother milestone at the Methadist Missian Home as the Building Comping continues to move with measured but progressive strides. This Campaign marks the first request that hos been made by the Home for Copital Fund support in its long 70 years' service to the church. Such a record accomplishment merits the support that the Campaign is currently receiving both in church and individual participation across the six Annual Conferences. The Board of Trustees of the Home have wisely set a minimum figure of \$200,000 which must be in hand before construction on the \$1,250,00 project can begin. The Board of Trustees in their meeting on April 25 voted to break ground for the buildings an Wednesday, November 2, 1966, and construction will begin then on the entire seven building compus complex.

These enlorged facilities will provide a ministry to twice as many girls os may currently be cored for at the Home.

Recommendations

- 1. That Sunday, September 25, be designated as Special Emphasis Sunday for the Methodist Mission Home of Texos and that each postor be encouraged to use this Sunday to lift up the need for his people to be generous in their support of this work. (If a church places the support of the Home in its budget, we earnestly request that the postor make a statement to his congregation on this Sunday relative to the Home, explaining its services and letting his people know that their church is, through its budget, supporting this ministry of compossion.)
- 2. That each church be prepared to accept and roise their "foir shore gool" for the Copital Funds Compaign distributed to them by the District Superintendent.
- 3. That care be taken to see that every church continue its support of the aperation of the home throughout the period of the building fund compaign to insure the on-aging of this redemptive ministry in these urgent days.
- 4. We earnestly invite the attention of all pastors and loymen to the fact that the Texos Methodist Planning Commission has approved 50c per member as the Goal-in-Giving for the Methodist Mission Home of Texos and we suggest that churches undertake to increase their giving by at least one third each year of three period of until this goal is reached.
- 5. The Trustees elected by the Annual Conference at its lost session be continued and re-elected for another year.

Report No. 9

Wesleyan Homes, Inc.

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

Helping people who need help hos been the bosic function of the Wesleyon Home during this Conference year. Now in its fourth year of service os a helping orm of the Church, the Wesleyon program is designed to minister to the over-oll need of its residents. And that need is not olways financial.

There is the need of being needed, of being wanted, of being useful . . . of being Christian. The Wesleyan is engaged in the task of meeting these needs, whether they be sociological, physiological or theropeuticol.

This responsibility is being achieved, in port, through the efforts of knowledgeoble friends who continue to tell the Wesleyon story, its purpose and its contribution in the field of sheltered care.

Some need—either financial, sociological or therapeutical—has been given to 151 residents since the Home's formal opening in September, 1962. This service has been made possible through the combined efforts of skilled staff members, qualified consultants, national workshops and financial aid goined from benevalent givers.

The otmosphere of the Wesleyon continues to be that of active retirement instead of nursing home care. We do have, however, a functional Infirmory served by on RN, LVNs, and well trained practical nurses. Eleven residents, now infirm, "live" in the health center. Adjacent property—future site of Wesleyon Health Center—has been purchosed by the Board of Trustees.

All residents are encouraged to be participants instead of spectators in the "main stream of life." We, also, advocate civic involvement on the part of aur residents, and several are active in outside social, service and civic affairs. We do not intend to be "an island unto ourselves." To better attain this goal of active service within the community, the Wesleyan has become a Day Center for retired citizens, who have organized an XYZ (extra years of zest) club for the Georgetown area.

In the past year, the Wesleyan has served 118 residents whose average age is 79 years, two months. Eleven of these passed away during this same period.

As reflected in the financial statement, it is indicative that the Wesleyan continues to show an increase in assets and a decrease in liabilities. The Home, however, is not completely self sustaining from operating income. Total cost of care in 1965 was about \$120.00 per resident per year more than was received from total service charges paid by residents. A nominal amount of deficit spending will likely continue until the cost of living drops or until a "capacity house" is realized on an annual basis.

The Wesleyan, by design of charter and tax exemption affidavit, is pledged to meet its responsibility, to serve where service is needed. This task to which we are committed will become easier as the Hame is remembered in Wills, Memorials and Gifts.

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

Be it resolved by the Board of Directors of the Methodist Hame that:

Article III of the By-Laws of Methodist Home be amended so that it shall hereafter read as follows:

ARTICLE III

The business affairs of this carparation shall be managed by a Baard of Directors campased as fallows, ta-wit:

- (1) The presiding Bishaps of all patronizing Annual Conferences.
- (2) One minister and ane layman to be elected by each of the patronizing Annual Conferences to serve for a term of three years and until their successors are elected.
- (3) The Chairmen of the Boards of Hospitals and Homes of all patronizing Annual Conferences during their tenure as Chairmen of such Conferences Boards.
- (4) Six Directors at Large from the territory of the patronizing conferences wha shall be ministers ar lay members of The Methodist Church and whase naminations shall be submitted by the faregoing Directors of the Hame to the patronizing Annual Canferences. Directors at Large thus nominated shall be elected by acceptance by a majority of such Annual Conferences. Directors at Large shall serve for a period of three years and until their successors have been naminated and elected.
- (5) The Executive Director of Methodist Home Foundation and the District Superintendent of the Waco District of Central Texas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church.

The Directars and the Directars at Large elected as set aut in the faregoing provisions shall constitute the Baard of Directars of the Methodist Home at Waco, Texas.

Na Director or Director at Large elected for the first time to the Board after January 1, 1964, shall be eligible to serve more than four consecutive three-year terms as a Director, provided, however, that any former Director or Director at Large may be elected by action of the Board of Directors to either an honorary or advisary membership upon the Board or to membership upon any standing committee of the Board without tenure limitations.

Shauld any patranizing Conference withdraw from this Institution, as is provided for in these By-Laws, then the representatives from such Conference

shall cease to be Directors, and the affairs of the institution shall be governed and managed by the remaining members of the Board.

Article XI of the By-Laws of the Methodist Home be amended so that it shall hereafter read os follows:

ARTICLE XI

There shall be on Executive Committee of the Boord which shall consist of the President, Vice President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, the Administrator, the Executive Director of Methodist Home Foundation, the District Superintendent of the Waco District of Central Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, and seven other members of the Board of Directors to be chosen by the Board of Directors annually. The Board shall have the right, if at any time it should deem it wise to do so, to select a Local Advisory Committee in such a manner and under such conditions as may be determined by said Board, and such Advisory Committee shall serve of the will of soid Board.

COMMITTEE ON INTERDENOMINATIONAL COOPERATION

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

The Preamble of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. affirms that "in the providence of God, the time has come when it seems fitting to more fully manifest oneness in Jesus Christ as Divine Lord and Savior, by the creation of an inclusive cooperative agency of the Christian Churches of the United States."

In this spirit, your Committee and other representatives from this Conference participate in various areas of ecumenical, cooperative endeavor with other Christian groups in the work of the Texas Council of Churches.

The Texos Council of Churches is an agency of eleven member denominations that provides services and programs in a wide variety of fields. It offers the practical means of real cooperation with other denominational groups. We of this Committee are pleased that our own Bishop W. Kenneth Pope is now serving on the Board of Directors of this significant interdenominational body in Texos We feel that the ecumenical participation of many varied groups, including our brethren of the Roman Catholic Church, is a chollenge to Methodists everywhere to express their ecumenical tradition and calling through faithful participation in cooperative activities such as those of the Texas Council of Churches.

Your Conference was represented by several delegates to the recent General Assembly of the Texas Council of Churches on March 14-16, 1966 at Marvin Methodist Church in Tyler. Reports of past and projected activities, and recommendations to the Churches were received as follows:

Division of Christian Life and Work

---Recommended full participation of oll races in every level of government, and the elimination of discriminatory practices using such means as city ordinances or effective local committees.

—Encourages local groups such as Churches, Postor's Associations, Councils of Churches, and United Church women to recognize human need and support the Community Action Program under the Economic Opportunity Act, thus developing opportunities for real help.

- —Recommends to its member denominations for study and consideration for action the recent policy statements of the General Board of the National Council of Churches, and further urges that in this and all instances where there are policy statements of the N. C. C., the original statements themselves should be used as a source of information, rather than relying on other sources.
- —Urges that the responsible leadership of each member denomination of the Texas Council of Churches reaffirm the participation of that denomination in its activities, porticipate personally, and see that the delegates from that member denomination are representative, informed, responsible, and in full numbers at the meetings of the Texas Council of Churches.
 - Endorse o proposed legislation for implied consent for a test on intoxication.

Division of Christian Education

- —Sponsored the following events last year: (1) Seminar on Moral and Spiritual Values for public school educators, (2) Texas Ecumenical Youth Canference, (3) "Canversations" between seminary professors of Christian Education, denominational Education executives, and leading pastors (attended by one of our Committee), and (4) Consultation on the Campus Ministry.
- —Projected the following future events: (1) Seminars for Public School Teachers, (2) Conference on the Church's ministry with children, (3) Consultation on Youth Ministry, (4) Pilat Lay Institute, (5) Group Life Lab school, and (6) Family Life Conference.

Division of Christian Mission

- —Urged the hiring of a professionally trained person to coordinate a Radio-TV office on a part-time bosis, with each denomination participating in its work by sending knowledgeable laymen in this field to the next General Assembly of the T. C. C.
- —Recommended that the Conference on Evangelism be held during the next year.
- —Endorsed the expansion of the U. S. "Food For Peace" program and expanded agricultural production in this country to oid this.
- —Recommended that more significant institutional ministeries be undertoken cooperatively, such as the one in the County Joil and Hospital System in Tarrant County.
- —Recommended that the Texas Council of Churches co-sponsor with the Texas Catholic Conference a second Faith and Order Conference.
- —Urged the continued observance by all churches of the Week of Proyer For Christian Unity.
- —Recommended that new Migrant Ministries be established, and that regional planning meetings be held for these ministries.
- ---Recommended a continuation of the support that the Churches give C. R. O. P. through Halloween projects, United Clothing Appeals, and gifts of commodities.

We urge all our churches and pastors to interpret locally in a positive manner the work and nature of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the U. S. A. The most reliable and up-to-date information avoilable concerning

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 9, 1966)

The Board was organized occording to the Discipline with all nominated members elected by the Annual Conference in session, June 1, 1965. June 11, 1965, o planning session was held at Lake Whitney, in the home of Dr. and Mrs. C. C. Sessions, for the Executive Committee of the Board, comprised of: all District Lay Leaders, District Superintendents, Conference Directors of Methodist Men, Stewardship and Lay Speaking, the Presiding Bishop, the Area Executive Secretary and the Conference Officers.

The Christian attitude, the enthusiastic spirit in planning and seeking to discover methods and ways to better activate the laymen and his responsibilities in the local church was heartening and inspiring. The cooperative effort that was exemplified by all present, will stimulate the promotion and training of key people in the local church and Board of Lay Activities in the many areas of opportunity for Christian service and witnessing for our Saviour.

The Seventeenth Annual Laymen's Retreat was held at Glen Lake, August 27-29, 1965, using as a General Theme: "One Witness—One World." Inspirational and challenging messages brought by Dr. Leighton Farrell, Area Executive Secretary—Dr. William R. Cannon, Dean of Candler School of Theology, Emory University—and Mr. Everett Lindsey, Industrial Relations Manager of Gulf Oil Company, set the spiritual attitude for this year's Retreat. The inspiration of music and singing under the direction and leadership of the world famous Bill Mann, of First Methodist Church, Dallas, and our own great talented Oris Baldwin, Director of Music, Hurst First Methodist Church, kept us stimulated and in tune.

Evening Vespers and Morning Watch Messages of devotions were brought by Dr. C. C. Sessions, Dr. W. V. Bane, Dr. Hayden Edwards and Dr. J. W. Sprinkle. The Conference Director of Methodist Men, Dr. William A. Ward, conducted a training session for the District Directors of Methodist Men. The Conference Director of Stewardship, Ray Stokes, assisted by the Executive Director of the Texas Methodist Stewardship Movement, Dr. Eugene F. Jud, conducted a training section with the District Directors of Stewardship. The discussion groups led jointly by the District Superintendents and District Lay Leaders were most interesting and effective, in getting opinions from the men in ottendance about such subjects as: "What Christ Means to Me"—"What Can I Mean to the Church?"—"My Witness for Christ Beyond the Local Church." All this plus all the District Lay Leaders and their associates taking the responsibilities of the committee assignments and getting cooperation from many others, made our Retreat a Christian witnessing success.

Training programs and workshops for local church leaders in each District of the Conference were attended in large numbers and served to communicate to and through many laymen and ministers in a tremendous way, to better utilize the man power of our church, to better serve God in a challenging world.

The Conference Director of Stewardship, Ray Stokes, assisted by Dr. Eugene F. Jud, Executive Director of Texas Methodist Stewardship, developed programs and training workshops for Stewardship emphasis on District, Sub-District and local church levels.

The Executive Committee in June, adopted a Reading Program for this year's special attention to help carry on our program of teaching Stewardship.

Dr. William A. Ward, the Conference Director of Methodist Men, has headed our program of re-vitalizing our Men's Clubs and is helping to establish new Methodist Men's Clubs across our Conference.

The Conference Director of Lay Speaking, Levon Chaney, is reporting many schools on Lay Speaking throughout the Conference. Certificates have been issued to large numbers of qualified laymen in our Conference. These men, because of their interest and care, will be better able to communicate in church, in work and at play, the message of Christ.

Elbert Prince has accepted the responsibility of Canference Director of Lay Leadership Training and is emphasizing training of our lay people in the areas of lay members to the Annual Conference, Nominating Committee, Church Lay Leaders, Official Board members and Commission members.

October 10, 1965—Layman's Day was observed in all but seven churches in our Conference. Reports indicate the response ond participation was most gratifying. This was another opportunity for laymen to witness their faith.

We had, as for as we know, 34 men from our Conference to attend the National Convocation of Methodist Men in Perdue. Methodist Men's Club of Meadowbrook Methodist Church sponsored a bus to Perdue. 26 of our men enjoyed this fellowship of riding together to Perdue.

Jonuary 15, 1966 in Waco, the Conference Board hod a briefing and refresher session. Attendance was good.

The mid-year meeting of our Board was held at St. Mark in Cleburne, February 17, 1966. This meeting too, was well attended with all Districts reporting their progress in the various areas. The Conference Officers and Directors reported results of their work up to this date and plans to reach goals before Conference. Dr. Leighton Farrell challenged us with the message, "To Care, to Get Involved, to Love as God's Children."

District rallies and banquets have been held on the District level. These have been informative and inspirational.

The Board again this year, was privileged to help in financial support along with Bishop and Mrs. Kenneth Pope, with an overnight Retreat for young ministers and their wives. Many letters have been received from those in attendance indicating a very successful and helpful time at Glen Lake.

To Bishop Pope, his cabinet, to the dedicated ministers of this Conference ond to the many laymen who are devoted to their God, and concerned for the church and its out-reach, to those who have diligently worked with zeal and ferver, so that this report could be possible, we express our gratitude and deepest appreciation.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

The progrom of Minimum Pastorol Support hos operated most satisfactorily this conference year with the increased benefits authorized by the lost session of this Annual Conference. This is the first year in which the Annual Conference, through this Commission, hos given any financial assistance for travel expenses for student approved supply postors, who are attending theological schools of the same time. A special appropriation, above the \$1200.00 limitation for solary oid, of \$1.00 per mile, one way, one time during the year, for the distance from the seminary to the postoral charge, was paid for the first time this year. Additional payments totaling \$921.00 for this purpose were included in the solary supplement checks mailed on February 28.

Your Commission hos studied the minimum solory progroms of the other onnual conferences in Texos, and finds that the present program of the Central Texos Conference is the equal or better for the minimum solory programs operating in Texos, with one exception. Therefore, to bring our minimum solory program up to equal that of any other conference in our state, the Commission recommends these changes in our present Plan of Operation:

Amend the Plon of Operation at Paragraph 5, section (a) by substituting the figure 4,500.00 for 4,000.00. The omended section will read:

"(a) For a married or unmorried conference member in the effective relotion, or on triol and not enrolled as a student during the year, the solary sup-

plement shall be the amount necessory to make the solary \$4,500.00 per 'ear, but in no case shall the sum required be mare than \$1,200.00."

In order to give special recognition to and to encourage our full-time opproved supply postors to continue their service within the Central Texas Conference, the Commission recommends this change:

Insert o new section in Porogroph 5, following section (o), this new section shall become section (b), and the present sections (b), (c), (d), and (e) shall become sections (c), (d), (e), and (f) respectively. The new section shall read os follows:

"(b). For a married or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who is an ordoined elder, and who for the previous five consecutive years has served os a full-time approved supply pastor within the Central Texas Annual Conference, the solory supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the solory \$3,750.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,200.00."

The section presently designated (b), and which will become (c), shall be omended by inserting in the first line of the section ofter the words, "supply postor" these words, "who does not meet all the qualifications set forth in section (b) obove," and the omended section shall then read:

"(c) For a morried or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who does not meet all the qualifications of section (b) above, the solary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,600.00 per year, but in no cose shall the amount required be more than \$1,200.00."

With widening occeptonce of the extended ministry plon of serving rural churches, and the general increases in solaries for postors in the last several years, the Commission reports, even with the increased benefits this year, that the income of the Commission is much greater than is needed to finance the minimum salary program. The Commission is convinced that further increases in solary supplements at this time are not justified. We come to the annual conference with a bolance on hand of more than \$140,000.00. Since it has been the expressed opinion of some members of the annual conference, that this balance should not be used for any purpose other than that for which it was specifically designated, the Commission is convinced that the appropriation for the Minimum Solory Fund should be reduced even below our annual expenditures, and the present large balance be reduced by expenditures for the Minimum Solory program.

To this end, the Commission recommends that the apportionments for the Minimum Solory Fund be reduced from the amount equal to 4% of the solory apportioned for the postor and associate postors to an amount equal to 1% of the solories apportioned for the postor and associate postors.

The Commission further recommends to the Commission on World Service and Finance that the remaining 3% of the apportionment for the Minimum Solory Fund be ollocoted to the Conference Cloimonts Fund for pension purposes. Since this recommendation does not effect the total in ony local church's budget, and thus would not be in conflict with Standing Rule 14, the Commission recommends that this change shall become effective with the conference year 1966-67.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT

Plan of Operation

(as Amended June 8, 1966)

There shall be a pragram of minimum postaral support in the Central Texas Canference, under the management of a Cammissian an Minimum Pastaral Support, hereinafter, far the sake of brevity, called the Cammissian, to be camposed of nine persons to be naminated by the Bishap and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Canference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Cammissian, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Cammissians. Five of this number shall be ministers, and four laymen. The term of service shall be far three years, so arranged that three shall be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Cammissian shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Minimum Postaral Support Pragram.

Vacancies in the membership of the Cammissian, caused by death ar remaval fram the Annual Canference, shall be filled by the nomination of the Bishap and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Canference. Hawever, the Cammissian is authorized to fill vacancies between sessians of the Annual Canference when it is deemed advisable. Such appaintment is to apply anly until the ensuing sessian of the Annual Canference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regular way.

The Cammission shall arganize at that sessian af the Central Texas Annual Conference held at the beginning af each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Recording Secretary. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Annual Canference shall be the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Cammissian. These afficers shall constitute the Executive Cammittee of the Cammissian, and shall serve far ane year, ar until their successars are elected. All subsequent elections of afficers and executive cammittee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Cammissian held prior to the meeting of the Central Texas Annual Canference.

Administrative Procedures

- 1. The fallowing candidates shall be met by a pastaral charge to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for its postar to receive solary supplements from the Fund:
- (a) The pastaral charge shall have conducted an Every Member Canvass far the local church budget af each af its churches during the previous canference year.
- (b) The appaintment far Warld Service and Canference Benevalences shall have been accepted and paid in full far the previous conference year.
- (c) The salary far the pastar and all other items of ministerial support included in the Cannectional Ministry Fund shall have been paid in full and prapartianally far the previous year, and
- (d) The churches of the postaral charge shall not reduce the salary below that paid the previous conference year, unless such reduction shall be explained and presented in writing to the Commission, and approved as justifiable by the unanimous vate of the Commission.
- 2. The fallowing canditians shall be met by a pastar to became eligible for consideration by the Cammissian far receiving salary suppplements from this Fund:

- (a) He shall be a pastor in effective relation, a pastor on trial, an approved full-time supply pastor, an approved student pastor, or a supply pastor who has not previously served a pastoral charge. He shall not be eligible for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund if his appointment is other than pastor of a charge within the Central Texas Conference, if he receives salary aid from the General or Conference Board of Missions, if he is classified as a part-time supply pastor, if he is a retired minister, or if he receives income from any other employment than the regular work of the pastoral ministry. Receiving a scholarship for college or seminary work shall not restrict his eligibility.
- (b) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this Fund who has been offered appaintments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in his present appointment.
- 3. A prerequisite for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund shall be the filing with the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Commission a written application by the District Superintendent. This application shall indicate the classification of the pastor, the salary set by the charge, and shall contain the certifications by the District Superintendent whether or not the pastoral charge has met each of the requirements set forth above in Section 1.
- 4. In cases of appointments, or changes of appointments, between the sessions of the Annual Conference, all the above requirements are applicable and the District Superintendent shall file a new application for each charge concerned. Such salary supplements, if approved, shall be paid on a pro rata basis for the part of the year actually served.
- 5. The salary supplements shall be computed at \$1800.00 per year, or the salary and travel expenses apportioned by the pastoral charge, whichever is the higher figure, according to the following classifications:
- (a) For married or unmarried conference member in the effective relation, or on trial and not enrolled as a student during the year, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$4,500.00 per year, but in no case shall the sum required be more than \$1,200.00,
- (b) For a married or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who is an ordained elder, and who for the previous five consecutive years has served as a full-time approved supply pastor within the Central Texas Annual Conference, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,750.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,200.00.
- (c) For a married or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who does not meet all the qualifications of section (b) above, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,600.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,200.00.
- (d) For married ministers, who are either student pastors on trial, approved student pastors, or supply pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,300.00, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1200.00,
- (e) For unmarried ministers, who are student pastors on trial, approved student supply pastors, or supply pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$2700.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1200.00, and
- (f) In addition to the above schedule and above the limitation of aid, seminary students who are serving pastoral charges and receiving Minimum Pastoral salary supplements, may receive \$1.00 per mile, one way, one time, per year, for

the distance from the seminary to the pastorol charge. This extro ollowance shall be computed by the Commission, and paid in one payment to the seminary student pastor serving the charge at the end of the third quarter of the conference year.

- 6. Funds for the work of the Commission shall be secured in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 826, Discipline 1964, and the apportionment of each pastaral charge shall be the sum equal to one per cent of the solaries apportianed for the pastar and all associate postors appointed to the charge. This amount shall be included in the Connectional Ministry apportionment.
- 7. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the pragram effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and far the callection of the amounts appartioned to the churches in their respective districts, and for the reorrangement of pastorol charges, as necessary, to provide that the salary for the pastar to be paid the charges be not less than \$1800.00 per year.

General Provisions

- 8. Payment on the apportionment to the Churches shall be made at leost quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payment to those receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31st, shall be made on Moy 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same per centage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference ore not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.
- 9. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, and all payments of those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for work of the Commission, such os stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund, and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals enroute, to all meetings of the Commission, except such as are held while the Annual Conference is in session, shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be paid in accordance with the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

Three-faurths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time is a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payment for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid is limited to those who receive the benefits of the Fund, and not mare than ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available for such emergency appropriation. All unexpired portions of such available emergency funds shall at the close of the year remain in the general fund, subject to the disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this Plan.

Report No. 1

Ministerial Education Sunday and Ministerial Education Fund

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

Ministerial Education Sunday was observed October 17, 1965, with sermons on the ministry being preached by almost every minister in the Conference. The preaching of these sermons has stimulated a new interest and concern in the ministry among laymen and a new appreciation for their call and ministry among the preachers of the Conference.

We recommend and urge that Ministerial Education Sunday be observed October 16, 1966, with sermons on the ministry being preached by every preacher in the Conference.

It is recommended that the churches of the Conference participate fully in the Jurisdictional Ministerial Education Fund, and this be cared for either by the budgeted item ar by a special offering in each lacal church on Ministerial Education Sunday. It is further recommended that every local church increase its giving or offering to this Fund over the previous year's giving or affering until the goal adopted by the Jurisdictional Conference, in its 1964 session, is reached. The goal is 1% of the total money expended by each local church less the amount spent for building, debt retirement and interest on debt.

The Central Texas and North Texas Conferences have led out in the program in a way that has challenged the entire Jurisdictian. We heartily urge that the Conference go forward in this work in such a way as to reach the goal by the end of the Quadrennium and thus continue to stimulate other Conferences in the Jurisdiction to do the same.

Report No. 3

Guidance Program

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

The Central Texas Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications continually seeks for more effective ways to guide, encourage, and help men who are called of God into the clerical ministry of The Methodist Church in our Conference to achieve their highest potential of service of Christ and man. A number of improved procedures have been instituted by the Boards during the past several quadrenniums.

The present Board now proposes to institute another such improved procedure. The proposal is that the Board be allowed to require men who have been licensed to preach to take a battery of psychological tests under the direction of capable members of the Board. At present the program would be under the direction of Richard Hunt and James Ansley, both troined and experienced men in the field. The tests would be of such a nature as to help the person who has been licensed to preach to more adequately understand his own interests, abilities, and personality as they compare to men now effectively serving Christ in a ministerial capacity. The test results would be used by the person and the administering members of the Board but would not be released to others without the knowledge and permission of the licensed minister, although general statements about the results could be made to the entire Board if deemed wise.

The proposed program would also be used to supplement present testing programs being carried on in Schools of Theology. That is, candidates for admission to the Annual Conference on-trial who are not seminary students, would be given tests to provide information now available to officers of the Board, through the Schools of Theology, on students who are attending seminary. This information would also be used primarily as a tool for guidance, and rarely as a basis for suggesting to the candidate that he should seek other avenues of Christian service than the ministry. This procedure has been followed for years in regard to certain seminary students during their on-trial years, and is being followed now.

The proposed program might also be extended at a later time to giving another battery of tests to men as they complete their formal theological training, and prior to their admission into full membership in the Annual Conference. It is the desire of the Board that this be understood as a part of the proposal althaugh it is not the intention of the Board to implement this part of the program immediately.

We recommend that the Central Texas Conference authorize the institution of these proposed procedures.

Perkins Outreach Seminar Committee

(Adopted June 7, 1966)

The Perkins Outreach Seminar has completed its fifth year. During its existence Perkins Outreach Seminar has consistently held before itself one goal: continuing theological education for ministers in the Central Texas Conference, especially those who have been out of seminary for five years or more.

Under the direction of the Central Texas Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, and with the cooperation of the faculty and staff of Perkins School of Theology, we have been able to offer a kind of program that focuses attention upon the common task of the Parish minister and the Theological seminary, in a continuing theological dialogue. This one aspect of the program in and of itself may well be one of the most significant accomplishments. Aside from that, however, there is evidence to indicate that theological awareness and conversation is increased as a direct result of the Perkins Outreach Seminar, issuing in a more effective and relevant ministry.

Five years ago some of the seminars were attended by only four or five ministers. By direct comparison our 1965-66 enrollment was eighty-one, with an average attendance of about 35. We of the committee take this as concrete evidence of a vital interest in Perkins Outreach Seminar both as to general direction and specific content and format.

We also observe that in the seminars there is general mixing of ministers from the large and small parish, rural and urgan areas, district superintendents and campus ministers, and other specialized ministers along with the parish ministers. It is deemed good that dialogue can take place with some degree of depth in a group that encompasses those various categories of ministry.

Plans are being completed far the 1966.67 series of Perkins Outreach Seminar. These plans will include the consideration for two possible academy centers for the new series. Also, advanced sessions of the Perkins Outreach Seminar are being considered; with the pre-requisite of participation in an earlier seminar period to enrollment. The final plans will be announced later in the summer in time for preparation before the fall session. Your Perkins Outreach Seminar Com-

mittee will seek to continue working with the faculty and staff of Perkins School af Thealagy and praject plans that will campliment the newly emerging Cantinuing Education Pragram of the school.

Committee on Pension Education

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

The 1965-66 conference year began with a conference claimants roll of 84 retired ministers, 84 widows, 3 dependent children of deceased ministers, and 9 special claimants, a total of 180 persons directly related to our annual conference. In addition to these, there was an our Outside Responsibility List 83 retired ministers, 94 widows, and 6 dependent children of deceased ministers, a total of another 183 persons, for whom our conference is responsible for pension payments for service rendered in this conference prior to transfer to another annual conference. Our annual conference is responsible for pension payments for 4,849 net years of service. This is 53 net years of service over that for which we were responsible lost year. We poid to the Cleoring House of the General Board of Pensions for pensions poid by the General Board \$21,067.00.

During the conference year just closed the following members of the roll of conference cloimonts have answered their roll call in heaven and have been removed from our roll: W. T. Jones, O. W. Milburn, J. F. Isbell, J. A. Wolkup, Mrs. Eugene B. Howk, Mrs. C. N. Morton, Mrs. E. O. Hearn, Mrs. A. C. Smith, Mrs. Pot Brawn is removed because of her marriage to Mr. D. M. York. To the roll of widows on our conference cloimonts list there has been added the names of Mrs. W. T. Jones, and Mrs. James M. Cooper. Added to the rolls of dependent children are the children of the late Rev. James M. Cooper: Jomes Poul, Stephanie, and John Norman.

Emergency aid has been granted during this conference year to widows as follows: to Mrs. W. J. Cloud, \$100.00; to Mrs. E. M. Daily, \$150.00; and to Mrs. J. J. Creed, \$150.00, a total of \$400.00. Emergency aid has been granted during the conference year to ministers as follows: to Rev. Wallace Dunson, \$179.00 per month for 5 months at the recommendation of the cabinet; a total of \$895.00. This makes a grand total of emergency aid during this conference year of \$1,295.00.

During this conference year the Board of Pensions has continued the study of bringing our conference into full transition of the Minister's Reserve Pension Program. We also studied the Ten Year New Entrant plan of entering into the Minister's Reserve Pension Program. You have received information prior to this conference concerning our studies and our recommendations to this session of the annual conference.

Committee On Annuity Responsibility

By vote of the annual conference in 1963, our Board of Pensions assumes no pension responsibility for services rendered outside the bounds of the conference unless special authorization is granted by the annual conference. It is presumed that all chaplains in the armed forces and in institutional services are participating in the pension programs available to them. No responsibility for such service is assumed by our annual conference unless especially authorized by our annual conference.

Committee On Annuity Claims for Approved Supply Pastors

Answering the Disciplinary Business Question No. 22, "What full-time approved supply pastors are credited with annuity claim on account of full-time service during the year?" the following report is given.

Na annuity claim can be credited to part-time supply service (pastoral services with any other employment during the year), to student supply pastors, to retired ministers serving as supply pastors, nor to those serving pastoral appointments far less than one full year.

We recommend that annuity claim be credited to the following full-time approved supply pastors for the annual conference year ending in 1966: H. H. Barnett, Jr., Albert Leslie Cronk, Rollo J. Herrington, Dan Johnson, Harmon Keelin, James L. Peppers, and G. M. Seipp.

We call attention to the fact that it is now a requirement of the Central Texas Annual Conference that a prerequisite for consideration by the Conference Board of Pensions for annuity credit for full-time approved supply pastoral service be the inclusion of that individual in the classification of Full-Time Supply Pastors in the report of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications at the preceding Annual Conference.

Recommendation of Pension Study Committee

(Referred to Special Session, September 15, 1966)

It is the strong conviction of your Conference Board of Pensions that the best program for meeting the present and future pension responsibilities of the Central Texas Conference is in the ultimate adoption of the Full Transition plan of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of The Methodist Church. Since to enter the Full Transition plan now would require greatly increased askings for pensions over the current income program, your Conference Board of Pensions has given serious consideration to a plan of "stepping-up" toward our goal of Full Transition.

To this end, your Conference Board of Pensions is presenting a Ten-Year Level-Payment New Entrant plan:

Resolution

Be It Resolved:

1. That, in accordance with Por. 1644.1 and Par. 1644.3 of the Discipline of 1964, the Central Texas Annual Conference does hereby authorize and

establish a New Entrant plan of entrance into the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of The Methodist Church, which will fund the future pensions of all new entrants as they serve in the ministry. New Entrants shall be those received on trial during the session of the Annual Conference in which this New Entrant plan becomes effective, those received on trial thereafter, and those received by transfer into the Central Texas Conference on or after the date of entry into the New Entrant plan; provided that those members received after forty years of age shall not be accepted as members of the Fund unless an initial provision for service annuity shall be made by or for them in such manner or amount as shall be satisfactory to the executive officers of the general board. This New Entrant plan will become effective at the annual conference of 1967, and specifically as of July 1, 1967, and shall continue for a period of not more than ten years. At some time during that ten-year period the Annual Conference shall adopt the Full Transition plan or an extension of the New Entrant plan for an additional period of years.

- 2. That each new entrant, under the rules and regulations of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, shall be required to contribute annually into his personal (income annuity) account an amount equal to 3% of the average salary of the Annual Conference, as determined by the General Board of Pensions each year, ar 3% af his ministerial support, whichever is the lesser of the two figures.
- 3. That the amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the Annual Conference, as determined by the General Board of Pensions each year, for each af the new entrants in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, shall be paid far the Annual Conference by the Conference Board of Pensions from the Canference Claimants Fund.
- 4. That the cost of funding the pensions for the new entrants on a ten-year level-payment plan, and far payments of the pensions of those conference claimants not included in the New Entrant plan shall be met by increasing the apportionment for the Conference Claimants Fund far each local church to an amount equal to $23\,\%$ of the salary apportioned for the pastor and associate pastors.
- 5. That the action recommended by the Pension Study Committee and adapted by the Annual Conference in 1961, and recorded on pages 163-164 in its 1961 Journal, is hereby ratified and declared to remain effective, except as it might conflict with the New Entrant plan to become effective in 1967.

And Be It Further Resolved:

That the Conference Board of Pensions of the Central Texas Annual Conference be and hereby is authorized, empowered and instructed to effect all arrangements with the General Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church and to do all other things necessary to give full force to the intent and purpose of this resolution.

COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

The main obligation of the Annual Conference Commission on Promotion and Cultivation is to promote World Service and other general benevolent causes. These include: World Service, Advance Specials, One Great Hour of Sharing, The Methodist Television-Radia Ministry Fund, The Fellowship of Suffering and Service, and The Interdenominational Ca-operation Fund.

The center of attention in the Methodist Church is the local church. The commission is directed to carry out its work "in the pastoral charges of the conference in co-operation with the central promotional office." The life and work of the Methodist Church is possible only through its connectional system, "all for one, and one for all." While the General Conference sets up the program guidelines, and cammits the planning to its respective boards and agencies, the actual work is done by the members of each local congregation, to its own and its denomination's credit. The Conference Commissian on Promotion and Cultivation, in co-operation with the central promotional office, stands ready to give assistance to each of the pastoral charges of the Canference in the promotion of the benevolence causes.

We wish to commend the pastors and congregations of the Central Texas Conference for the work that has been done in the area of missions. A good Commission on Missions is the key to missions in the local church. The Annual Conference Board of Missions has done an excellent job thus far in this quadrennium in leading us in doing our Lord's Great Commission. We lift up the Advance Specials selected by our Conference Board of Missions for our special consideration.

The major portion of our work this year has been in conjunction with five other agencies of the Conference concerned with promotion and communication. We have participated in sponsoring the Communications Workshop at the Inn of the Six Fiags and in other co-operative communications projects. Especially do we call your attention to the presentation to be made at the Wednesday afternoon session of the Conference. Each pastor who requests it will be sent the 1966-67 wall display calendar with the special days of the church included. We invite your attention also to the special display which shows many of the materials available to promote the program of the church.

We have presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for its consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference a request for \$200 from the Conference for the work of this Commission in 1967-68.

COMMITTEE ON PROPORTIONAL PAYMENTS

(Received June 9, 1966)

The Committee on Proportional Payments would like to encourage the pastors and laymen of the local churches to study the principles of proportional payments.

We feel that a few pastors and churches are not aware that a lien for the unpaid amount is placed against the pastar's pension at the time of his retirement. The General Conference hos made it clear that the bishops, district superintendents, retired ministers, and pastors shall share proportionally in the payment by the local church of the claim for ministerial support.

No one item should take precedence over another. Each asking should be paid in full. However, when this is impossible because of lack of funds, the amount for ministerial support shall be paid according to the principle of proportional payment.

Should the treasurer of the lacal church fail to observe this principle, it is the responsibility of the pastor to adjust his cash salary accordingly to the proper ratio. (1624.3 Methodist Discipline, 1964)

We are reminded that only o few years ago Proportional Payments in this Conference were not paid on \$30,000 of pastor's salaries. This amount has been reduced tremendously by improvement in our conference treasurer's system and by the supervision of our District Superintendents.

Unfortunately, we have had an increased deficit over the past year by a substantial margin. We call this to the attention of the Conference with the hope that this will not be repeated again next year.

THE COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION Report No. 1

Adopted June 8, 1966)

Beginning with the current 1964-68 quadrennium, the office of Texas Methodist Information; the Conference Television, Radio, and Film Commission; and the Conference Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information came together for a co-operative planning session. From this session, it was felt that these three agencies have enough in common, at the point of public relations, to make them more productive, less over-lapping, and less expensive to operate by planning co-operatively and engaging in some joint projects. The direct result of such planning and programming was the recommendation that other "public relations" boards, commissions and interests could well be invited to engage with them in this experiment. To the above nomed boards we have added this year in this co-operative endeavor the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation and the Committee on Publishing Interests. We would like to report on some of these joint projects.

The highlight of this year was the joint communications Seminar at the Inn of the Six Flags in Arlington. Representatives from all of the agencies and the District Directors of Methodist Information from the North and Central Texas Conferences attended this meeting with help from the national agencies of the Church.

Another ospect of this co-operative venture is the organization of the Texos Methodist Communications Council. This group is made up of the five communications ogencies in each of the onnual Conferences in Texas. A major port of the work of this council will be reported on in the Wednesday afternoon session of the Conference. This will be in the form of a live audio-visual presentation.

District Methodist Information Program

Last year we reparted an the three district experiments in Methadist Infarmatian with special representatives to the various news media in each district. We are happy to repart that this set-up has been expanded to all the districts of the Canference and has warked very well. We feel that this program as it has been designed has worked very well. Additional autlets in each district will be added as the pragram can be expanded. One of the major items that was pointed out by the Cammissian is the need for additional funds for this pragram. It is our feeling that since this is a district pragram primarily, that funds might be secured from the district for these programs. When this program is perfected to the fullest extent, we feel that the entire Canference will be saturated with local outlets that are ready and willing to receive news from the Methadist Church and that we will have a local representative to provide this news to the autlet. This district information pragram is designed to promate the news in two directions. First, it provides excellent resources for news to be dispatched from the state office of Methodist Information and secandly, it pravides excellent resources for the news made at the local level to reach the state office and be disseminated in The Texas Methodist.

Another new part of aur Methadist Information program is the area of aur special caverage af Annual Canference. We have special persons assigned fram many of the lacal radio and television statians as well as newspapers to cover the sessians of Annual Canference for that particular news autlet. At the Conference sessian we have a news roam with equipment and personnel to assist in preparing news far release. These persons release to the outlets matters of news that deal with personalities and churches fram a particular area, and this makes it possible far a much broader caverage of news to be presented.

We have alsa developed what we have chasen to call aur "hot-line" news program. These "hat-line" autlets are both radio and television statians as well as newspapers which have agreed to accept lang distance calls and special releases an some of the meetings and gatherings of the Methodist Church which are being attended by persons from these respective communities. A good example of this pragram is the recently held Jurisdictional Conference at Galvestan. We were able to place stories and recardings on many outlets throughout the conference about this meeting.

Your Cammission an Public Relations and Methodist Information is in its infancy as it seeks to creatively be the channel of communication for the cannectional Methodist Church. However, it is engaged with related groups in a program to improve the total scope of effectively communicating the Gospel to a complex culture to which the Church is called to minister.

The Cammissian has presented to the Canference Commission an Warld Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference, the following askings for the aperation of the Cammission for the Canference year 1967-68: The sum of \$1440 for our expenses according to the budget submitted to the Commission on Warld Service and Finance.

- 3. The appaintment of these two Conference Directors shall be in accordance with outlined procedure in the Discipline.
- 4. Tenure in office far the aforenamed Directors shall not exceed eight years beginning June 1, 1966.
- 5. These two Directors shall be responsible to a committee camposed of the Bishop, a representative of the Cabinet appointed by the Bishop, and the Chairmen of the fallowing Boards: Education, Evangelism, Christian Social Concerns, Missians and Tawn and Country Cammission. It is recommended that this committee shall meet quarterly and must meet semi-annually.
- 6. The afarenamed Directars shall coardinate the Canference program, and conduct the affairs of the respective offices in cooperation with the Cabinet and the Area Executive Secretary. The duties of the aforenamed Directors shall be to implement the pragram as related to the Boards that he represents, and as adapted by action of the Central Texas Conference.
- 7. The salaries and ather financial cansiderations shall be on a camparable basis as designated in the following budget:
 - a. Director of Christian Education and Social Concerns:

- 2. Rule 4—Executive Committee—Add a new sentence at the end of this rule, which shall read, "The minutes of all meetings of the Executive Committee shall be mailed to all members of the Administrative Council within ten days after each meeting."
- 3. Rule 6—Nominations—After the words, "not applicable to" in the second sentence of the rule, insert the words, "District and Associate District Lay Leaders." The amended sentence would read, "This rule is not applicable to District and Associate District Lay Leaders, the Committee on Conference Relations, nor the Committee on Investigation."
- 4. **Rule 8:** Substitute the following for the second paragraph of Rule 8. Retirement from the active itinerancy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board or Commission and on all Institutional Boards, effective on the date such relationship is taken.

Boards, Commissions and Institutions related to the Annual Conference shall not take any action that in effect shall nullify this rule.

Let us do all that we can to encourage our people in our local churches to see the potential in these new and current methods of communication, to better understand them and to better make them useful to our Christian calling.

The Commission has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference the following askings: A total of \$700.00, including mailings and other affice expenses \$200.00, CanTRAFCO meetings \$100.00, Training Seminors and other ways of promoting the knowledge and use of audio-visuals \$200.00, and Scholarships to A-V Workshops \$200.00.

Our ConTRAFCO is this year joining with other information and communication agencies of our conference and the other seven annual conferences of Texas in a joint presentation before the conferences meeting together, and also we are cooperating with the documentary to be made at the site of the conference this year for use on television stations and in local churches.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 9, 1966)

The rapid cultural, social, and economical changes taking place in rural America make new demands upon the church. The blending of the rural and urban societies have produced a new culture throughout our land. It is not rural as we once knew rural; neither is it urban according to the traditions. It is a social culture seeking bigger, better, and more satisfying climate.

The church in town and country is challenged to face the impact of this new social culture, to reconstruct its thinking as a living church of Christ should, so as to meet the human needs of the changing times. In this report, we are making a needed proposal which we feel will strengthen the ministry and effectiveness of the total church.

In June of 1960 the leadership of the Central Texos Conference felt the need to give specific leadership in the area of town and country work. At that time a full time executive secretary was appointed. The purpose of this appointment was to heip lead the town and country churches through a period of transition and to bring the church's ministry in line with the changing times of the day. Basically, the problem was viewed as one of arranging parishes so as to provide the best possible ministry to all people regardless of where they happen to live and to challenge the best trained and talented men to serve such charges.

Before 1960 more than one-third of our churches were served by part time pastors and the minimum salary for a married pastor serving full time was \$2,700. Through an extensive program of developing cooperative parishes (Extended Ministry) most of our town and country churches are now served by fully trained and ordained ministers and the minimum salary has been raised to \$4,000. This has been made possible by combining small churches with larger churches and without additional funds being raised for the Minimum Salary Fund.

Before 1960 many rural and small town churches were in desperate need of repair, many laymen had lost pride in their houses of worship. Through the Lord's Acre-Hour Program, we presented a way in which new buildings could be constructed or remodeled. As a result of this concentrated effort more than 100 churches and some 35 parsonages have been built or remodeled with Lord's Acre-Hour funds.

We feel that we have now reached the point where these programs can be continued without the emphasis from a full time executive secretary of Town and Country Work. We feel that our conference can continue to promote the programs and goals of this Commission under another plan. Our cooperative parish program has been so successful that it will continue to move farward under the leadership of the district superintendents. The Lord's Acre-Hour Plan has been presented in more than 80% of the churches of the conference. Laymen and pastors have been trained to such an extent that this program can continue

on its own merit wherever needed. Other programs that have been carried on through the office of the Executive Secretary can be cored for through other proposed plans.

Therefore, the Commission on Town and Country Work desires that the present position of the full time Executive Secretary of Town and Country Work be dissolved beginning with the Conference Year, June 1, 1966 so that the funds can be directed towards the development of a new thrust that is now seen by the leadership of the conference as being the area of pressing need.

- 11. Continued emphasis upon Property Improvement and Church Beautification Programs.
- 12. Cantinued use of District Secretories of Town and Cauntry Wark far assistance in corrying aut the Cammission's pragram and gaals.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

There is a soying, "Our attitude determines our altitude." The oltitude of the women of our societies and guild units has been lofty and elevated! The reason for much of this exhiloration is our 25th Anniversory celebrations over the conference. In most of our groups programs have been held and offerings made for the goal of 25% increases in our giving. We are striving now for the attainment of the goal of \$148,000.00 for our giving for 1965-66.

The membership has increosed to 13,586; Womon's Society 11,126 and our Wesleyon Service Guilds 2,460. This is a gain of over 200. There has

been a depth Self-Study in every district and society. From this picture-taking of self, we do realize aur need to enlarge our concept of membership and recognize anew the responsibility that comes with membership in our woman's group giving Christian service.

The well-planned fall workshops and meetings resulted in 2,994 adults attending classes and 91 classes campleted at our mid-year time. By the close of this year these numbers will be increased greatly. In most of these classes the minimum goals were maintained. The co-aperation of the commissians on missians and secretaries of our group has resulted in very fine work done on missionary education in the local church. This next fall af 1966 we shall be working completely together as church commissian and women's groups. Our conference secretary has already sent out materials for us and wark is naw being planned. Very exciting!

Meetings have been taking place over the conference in the area of social concerns. Many af the recommendations of the board of missions, social concerns and woman's division have been the topic of discussion. Seeking to understand people in our culture as well as in others, brought about workshops as well as group meetings on the subject. The crisis and chaos calls for deepening our concern and search for truth in these matters. The secretary of Christian Social Relations of our conference, Mrs. Earle D. Button has been chosen for a member of a team of women to go from our country to Africa this summer. They will attend the World Federation and the World Council of Methodism in London and go to various parts of Africa far work. We are so excited for Mrs. Button. We know she will give much as she witnesses for Christ among our sisters in Christ in her area of North Africa and then in the two weeks meeting in Zambio.

A continuation of the Acts af the Apostles in aur time is being written as our women have studied anew the book that Dr. Luke left for our study. This has been and continues to be a most helpful influence in the spiritual cultivation of our group. Prayer groups and days spent in retreating for quietness and preparation have increased as well as plans now far a Retreat in the conference the last week of April under the direction of our secretary of Spiritual Life Cultivation. She has secured Dr. Alice Wonders af Texas Wesleyan Callege as our leader. This will be a most significant meeting for us.

The women are very appreciative of the help and assistance of our ministers. The District Superintendents have been most helpful in setting the dates of our meetings and giving helpful suggestions. We realize over and over again we are all one in the work of our churches. Bishop Pope and all leaders of the church have been helpful and attended meetings when possible.

Mrs. Glen E. Laskey, president af the Waman's Division of the Board of Missions, was our guest during the Annual Meeting in Waxahachie. She shared with us the many places of work of our board of missions as well os telling us of some of the very fine and dedicated workers. One-third of the total budget of the Board of Missions is raised by the women of our societies and guild units. She reminded us that these one and one-half million members of our societies have given 213 million dallars the past 25 years. For all of this we rejoice and give thanks.

To be able to have the attitude that lifts us as well as our fellow-men, we shall continue to know the Truth as given to us in Christ Jesus and to continue to study His will for us. May He continue to lead us, is our prayer. We seek His Approval and want His way to be our way. We are a people obliged to hope for what God has done for us in Christ. May He be able to speak to our day through us and to us.

Report No. 1

Special Offerings and Financial Procedures

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

1. The Commission on World Service and Finance approves and recommends that the following offerings be taken in all local churches of the Central Texas Conference on or near the dates designated in the Discipline, or herein designated:

World Service Sunday, on the fourth Sunday of each month,

Methodist Student Day, on the second Sunday in June,

Homes for Retired Ministers, on the second Sunday in July,

Christian Education Sunday, (formerly colled Church School Rally Day) on the second Sunday in September,

Methodist Mission Home of Texas Sunday, on the third Sunday in September,

World-wide Communion Sunday, on the first Sunday in October,

Jurisdictional Ministerial Education Day, on the third Sunday in October,

Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday, during the month of November,

The Methodist Home, during the month of December,

Race Relations Sunday, on the second Sunday in February,

One Great Hour of Sharing, on the fourth Sunday in Lent,

Wesleyan Homes, on the second Sunday in Moy (Mothers' Day).

Mission Festival Sunday, on the second Sunday in November, is opproved for the enrollment in the Builders Club, with the second call of the year to come in March.

While no special days are designated for the **Television-Radio Ministry Fund**, and for the **Texas Alcohol-Narcotic Education** program, we approve these special causes for either an appropriation from the budget of the local church, or of a special offering to be taken at such time as the local church may determine.

- 2. The Conference Treosurer once a month shall distribute the receipts from local churches for World Service and Conference Benevolences among the six funds included in the annual budget for the Annual Conference in proportion to their apportionments. Any overpayment of the end of the conference year for World Service shall be remitted by the Conference Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance. Any overpayments in the other five funds (General Administration, Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, Jurisdiction Administration, Temporary General Aid, and Conference Benevolences) shall be transferred into the Operating Reserve, subject to the direction of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 3. All boords, commissions and other agencies, one year in advance, shall make their requests for apportionments from the Conference Benevolences budget, presenting in writing their proposed budget. This request shall be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance not later than the day preceding the regular annual meeting of the Administrative Council.

- 4. No board, commission, or agency of the Centrol Texas Conference shall expend any money for any purpose that has not been included in the original budget as approved by the Commission of World Service and Finance, as printed in the Conference Journal, without the specific approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 5. The fiscal year of all boards, cammissions, and other agencies aperating through the Central Treosury of the Conference shall begin with the adjournment of the Annual Conference and continue through the next regular session. The treosurers of all boards, commissions, and other agencies of the Annual Conference shall file with the Conference Treosurer o financial statement of receipts and disbursements for the year just closed within seven days after the adjournment of Annual Conference.
- 6. The Conference Treasurer, within seven days after the adjournment of the Annual Conference, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions, and other agencies, into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempted by the Commission on World Service and Finance), moking allowance for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer, if notified in advance, will hanor the requisitions for all necessory expense of the new conference year, within the limits of the annual appropriation.
- 7. The Conference Treosurer is authorized to pay from the Operating Reserve the following items:
- (1) Expense of printing the Journal, which may exceed the budget oppropriation,
 - (2) Expense of the Conference Secretorial staff,
- (3) Expense of fidelity bonds for the Conference Treasurer, and others who handle Conference funds, os determined by this Cammission,
- (4) Expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treosurer, and the treosurers of boards, commissions, and other agencies of the Conference, as it may be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance. Such audits to be made by the Conference Auditors, the firm of Leatherwood and Ward.
- (5) Other expenditures as may be determined by the Commission on World Service and Finance.
 - 8. The Conference Treosurer is authorized:
- (1) To consolidate the various funds of the annual conference and of its agencies into one or more bank accounts.
- (2) To write all checks for the agencies of the Conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agencies.
- (3) To invest, at his discretion, such funds not needed for immediate disbursement, in the Texas Methodist Foundation, as may be approved by the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- (4) To purchase, as investments, from the funds of the Conference in its general and subsidiory occounts United States Treasury bills, and to borrow on, or dispose of, these investments at, or prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in the accounts of the Conference at his direction.

(5) To deposit funds for specifically designated purposes with Savings and Loan Associations with the opproval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Special Financial Programs

(Adopted June 8, 1969)

- 1. The goal af contributions by local churches for the support of the Methodist Colleges in Texas shall be \$1.50 per member, beginning with the conference year 1965-66.
- 2. The goal of contributions by local churches for the support of the Wesley Foundations shall be 60 cents per member, beginning with the conference year 1966-67. Such contributions shall not be designated by the local churches for particular Wesley Foundations, but shall be distributed proportionately by the Conference Treasurer in accordance with the recommendations of the Conference Board of Education and approved by vote of the Annual Conference.

- 3. Each district is committed to raise an amount equal to \$10.00 per pastoral charge each year for five years (1963-64 through 1967-68) for the Mount Sequayah Building Fund, at the Western Methodist Assembly, Fayetteville, Arkansas.
- 4. The three-year campaign far the Lydia Patterson Institute Emergency Building Fund is scheduled for campletion at this conference. Six of the ten districts, to which quotas were assigned three years aga, have paid their quotas in full. Three ather districts lack but a small amount. It is recammended that each district nat yet raising its quota in full continue its efforts to reach its district goal during the conference year 1966-67.
- 5. The Building Fund Campaign far the Methodist Mission Hame of Texas has been in progress ane year. The campaign is scheduled to be campleted by March 31, 1969. Adjustments in the appartionments to the districts must be made because of district realignments, but the quata assigned to local churches last year remain in effect unchanged far the entire period of the campaign. Payments made by individual church members as a part of the Special Gifts pragram in this building fund should be remitted direct to the Home rather than through local church treasurers to the Canference Treasurer. Payments on this Special Gifts do not apply an the quatas assigned to the local churches.

Financial Recommendations

(Adopted June 8, 1966)

The Cammissian on Warld Service and Finance presents the fallowing for the consideration of Annual Conference:

1. With the reduction of the number of districts in the annual conference from ten to eight within two years, it is the conviction of the Cammissian that the apportionment for the District Superintendents should be used exclusively for their work. It therefore recommends that the apportionment for the support of the District Superintendents shall be an amount equal to 8% of the solaries for the postor and associate postors, including supply postors. This amount shall be divided equally among the District Superintendents and shall cover all costs of their office, including solary, aperational, secretarial and travel expense, and shall include a housing allowance equal to the amount expended for district parsonage utilities, and shall be paid to each District Superintendent \$1,000.00 at the end of each month for the first eleven months of the conference year, and the balance received during the year shall be paid at the end of May. No ather apportionment shall be levied against the churches of the district for the work of the District Superintendents except for the provision and maintenance of the district parsonage, as recommended by the District Trustees.

It should be understood that the above recommendation is for conference year 1966-67. The Cammissian has requested the Bishap to appoint a special study cammittee on the support of the district superintendents and make a report with recommendations to Cammissian on World Service and Finance during the next conference year.

2. The Commission, in consultation with the special cammittee requested by the Cabinet, has approved the fallowing Executive Secretaries Budget:

The salary and office fund for the Areo Executive Secretary sholl be paid by the Conference Treasurer in monthly payments to the Area Executive Secretary. The salaries for the two Conference Directors shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer in manthly payments to the Conference Directors. Other portions of their budget shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer by check upon requisitions by the Conference Directors as the funds are needed.

3. The reduction of districts and the extension of responsibilities of the two Conference Directors has necessitoted on short notice considerable adjustment between the Connectional Ministry Fund and the Conference Benevolences Fund. Knowing that the local churches have already determined the amounts for these two funds in their budgets for 1966-67, the Commission recommends that these local church items remain as they are for the next conference year, and thot the necessary odjustment, for the conference year 1966-67, only, be mode by the Conference Treasurer by including a readjustment percentage in the Connectional Ministry Fund to be directed to Conference Benevolences.

The Conference Treasurer sholl distribute the receipts for the Connectional Ministry Fund during the conference year 1966-67, according to a scale based upon the following percentages: District Superintendents Fund 8%, Episcopal Fund 2%, Minimum Salary Fund 1%, Conference Claimants Fund 20%, ond Conference Benevolences Fund 11/2%. This total of 321/2% for the Connectional Ministry is the same as for the year now closing. Reports by the local churches to quarterly, district and annual conferences will be made for the Connectional Ministry Fund without breaking them down into their different categories.

4. The apportionment for Connectional Ministry for the Conference year 1967-68 shall be an amount equal to 31% of the salaries of the pastor and ossociote postors, including supply postors. The Conference Treosurer shall distribute the receipts for the Connectional Ministry Fund received for the year 1967-68 occording to a scale bosed on the following percentages: District Super-Interdents 8%, Episcopol Fund 2%, Minimum Salary Fund 1%, Conference Cloimonts Fund 20%. (Note: This paragroph is subject to change in keeping with the Annual Conference action on the recommendations of the Board of Pensions effective in 1967-68.)

- 5. The Commission concurs in the recommendation of the Bishop and the Cabinet that the funds for Jurisdictional Ministerial Education Fund be placed in the budget of each local church, rather than continuing to raise these funds through a special offering. The goal, as adopted by the South Central Jurisdictional Conference, is 1% of the regular budget of each local church (excluding building and other capital improvement items.)
- 6. The Annual Conference in its 1965 sessian approved a Conference Special of \$65,000.00 far the year 1966-67. The Commission recommends the following allocation of the Conference Special for next year:

- 7. The Commission recommends that the Conference Special for the year 1967-68 be set at \$65,000.00, and that the allocation of this amount be determined at the 1967 Annual Conference.
- 8. The Commission regrets to annuance that Dr. Walter B. Rider has resigned his membership on this Commission because of his inability to attend the meetings of the Cammission. JAMES MORRIS COOPER

James Morris Cooper was born January 16, 1923, in Deport, Texas, where his father, the Reverend John James Cooper, was the Methodist pastor. He attended public schools in Richardson, Texas, and Jacksboro, Texas. He received his college education at Weatherford Junior College, East Texas State College, and Texas Wesleyan College, graduating from the latter with the Bachelor of Arts degree in 1943. He then enrolled in Perkins School of Theology, from which he was granted the Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1948.

Licensed to preach in 1941 by the Denton District of the North Texas Conference, he was ordained and admitted on trial into the Central Texas Conference October 31, 1946. He was ordained elder and received into full connection in June, 1948.

Prior to joining the conference, he served the Azle, Ridglea, and Bruceville Circuit churches as a supply pastor. His appointments as a traveling preacher included Rosenthal-Mooreville, Lorena, Bangs, and Austin Avenue, Woco (associate). In June, 1955, he was appointed to organize the Cogdell Memorial Church in Waco, where he served until June, 1964. He became pastor of First Church in Euless at that time.

James was married to Miss Ruth Irene Neufeld on July 5, 1946. They have three children: James Paul, Stephanie, and John Norman.

James's death occurred March 1, 1966, at the New England Baptist Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts, following an illness of several months. He is survived by his wife and children, his mother, now Mrs. C. A. Fagg, and two sisters, Mrs. Beryl Teague and Mrs. Guy C. Ames, Jr. A celebration of his life was held March 3, 1966, at First Methodist Church, Euless, Texas. The worship was led by Kenneth Blackford, W. V. Bane, and Gilbert Ferrell. Interment was in Waco, Texas, with David Yates and A. Norman Evans officiating.



The following children were born to this family: Jefferson Fletcher, November 23, 1911; Robert Frederick, March 5, 1913; Louis Milton, June 22, 1914; and Clay Mc-Whirter, October 28, 1920, who was killed in action, November 23, 1942. Geneva died on November 22, 1947. He married Mrs. Nina Brabham in 1949. who survives him. He was accidentally killed in a traffic collision in Fort Worth, Texas, February 28, 1966.

Officiating Ministers were: Dr. L. Stanley Williams, Dr. W. W. Ward, Dr. P. E. Riley, and Dr. Hayden M. Edwards.

Colonel Isbell, as he is affectionately remembered, attended Clarendon College from 1902 until 1904, when he graduated. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Southwestern University in 1909, where he excelled as an outstanding athlete. He attended Texas Christian University following his retirement and was awarded a Master of Arts degree in 1954. As a seminarian he studied at Vanderbilt, Southern Methodist University and Yale. He was a student in Army School for many years. As a chaplain in the United States Army he attained the rank of Colonel and served with distinction.

Colonel Isbell was licensed to preach by the Georgetown District Conference, April 1, 1960. He was an approved supply pastor in the Northwest Texas Conference and was admitted on trial in the Central Texas Annual Conference in November, 1910, and was admitted into full connection two years later. He was ordained Deacon in November, 1912, an Elder in 1914. He retired from the active ministry June, 1947.

Following his admission on trial, Colonel Isbell served the following pastorates: Hillsboro—Line Street, Fort Worth—Riverside, Big Hill—Odds, Wortham, Kerens, Gorman, Field Secretary for Texas Women's College (TWC), Fort Worth—Forest Park, Cleburne—St. Mark, Agent of Texas Christian Advocate, Bluffdale Circuit, Godley—Cresson, Richland, Fort Worth—College Heights (Eastwood), Hico, and Whitney.

He was commissioned a chaplain in the United States Army in 1918 and was on active duty until 1921. Upon his return to the civilian pastorate he retained his active reserve status and commission. In 1940 he was called into active duty as a chaplain and remained in the chaplaincy until 1944. He was retired in 1947 with the rank of Colonel. Following a lengthy illness as a patient in Walter Reed Hospital, and after having been declared disabled by the Army Board, Fort Worth became his home until the accident took him away.

Colonel Jeff Isbell dedicated his entire life to God, the Methodist Church and the service of his country. He loved and had faith in people, the church and its mission. He was a true friend, a noble servant and trustworthy counselor

to youth. He cherished his family, loved the out-of-doors and maintained his interest in all sports, regularly participating in golf at Glen Garden Country Club, where he was a familiar and welcomed member.

He lives in the hearts of those who love him and in appreciation from countless numbers whose lives were blessed by his pastoral care. May the Lord bless his memory to our good and to the glory of the Church. Amen. Amen.

WILLIAM T. JONES

Reverend William Taylor Jones was born to James and Harriet Williams Jones near Mooreville, Texas on March 28, 1877.

At the age of 15 he surrendered his life to Christ, both as a member of the church and as one called to the ministry.

After attending public schools at Mooreville and Eddy, he attended Sam Houston Normal Institute, received a Teacher's Certificate, and taught School for four years before entering Southwestern University.

Brother Jones was licensed to preach by the Waco District Conference meeting at Mt. Calm on June 6, 1903. He was ordained Deacon in 1906, Elder in 1908, entered the Northwest Texas Conference On Trial in 1904, and was received into

Full Connection in 1907. With his appointment to Lometa and Mullin in 1905, he began a ministry which was in the highest tradition of the Circuit Riders.

In 1905 he was appointed to Olga in Coke County with special responsibility for securing property for churches and for organizing them along the Orient Railroad then under construction. In this appointment he secured part of a ranch and built the Blackwell Church while also preaching at Ft. Chadbourne, Hayrick, Decker, Oak Creek and New Hope. From this assignment he went on to serve the following churches in order: Pioneer, May, Blanket, Walnut Springs, Handley, Hamilton, Desdemona, Venus, Mertens-Irene, Walnut Springs-Iredell, Morgan-Kopperl, Red Oak-Ovilla, Blum-Rio Vista, Rogers, Temple Circuit and Blum-Rio Vista. He retired in 1949, and the effectiveness of his 47 year ministry may be seen by his being twice re-appointed to churches he had previously served at the request of the congregations. During this ministry he was responsible for the building of one church building, the building of two parsonages and the paying of three more.

On October 30, 1907, he was married to Miss Edna May Allen of Ballinger who shared 57 years of joy and service with him. To them were born four children: Edna Eloise, Frances May, Ruby Kathleen and William Elton. He is survived by his wife, by all four children, and by nine grandchildren.

After the close of his ministry, Brother Jones lived in Temple where he served faithfully as a Sunday School teacher in Seventh Street Church and as an aid

to all the pastors there. It was there in Seventh Street Methodist Church that final services for him were held on September 3, 1965 following his death on September 1 of a heart condition. The services were conducted by Rev. Michael Patisan and Dr. Hamer Fart with interment at Bellwaad Memorial Park in Temple. At the time of his death he headed the chronological roll of the Conference.

No more suitable epitath could be given that that which he penned in his memoirs, ''He lived—and—he loved.''

OBIE WADE MILBURN

The Reverend Obie Wade Milburn was barn an January 25, 1875 at Black Hills (Navarro County), Texas, the son of the Reverend and Mrs. Joseph (Sarah) Milburn. He passed to his heavenly reward on September 10, 1965 in Mexia, Texas at the age of 90 years, 7 months and 16 days. His memorial service was conducted fram the Methodist Church in Tehuacana, Texas an September 12, at 4.00 o'clock in the afternoon. Services were conducted by the Reverend J. Walter Browers, pastor of Travis Park Methodist Church, San Antonio, Texas and a nephew by marriage of Brother Milburn; assisted by the Reverend Rollo Herring, pastor at Tehuacana and the Reverend C. D. Wooten, pastor of First Methodist Church, Mexia. Burial was in Mexia.

Reverend Milburn was converted at an early age and entered the ministry of the Methodist Protestant Church at Corsicana, Texas in the fall of 1906, becoming a member of Texas Methodist Protestant Conference that year. He came into the Central Texas Conference of the Methodist Church in 1939 at the time of merger of the three major branches of Methodism. Brother Milburn served churches in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas, having served as President of the Oklahama-Fort Smith Annual Conference in 1920. Appointments he served throughout his ministry were as follows: San Angelo, Pike, Minter, Emhouse, Donie, Slocum, Tehuacana Valley, Rodney and Oletha, all in Texas and Quinton, Oklahoma and Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Mrs. C. N. Morton, 89, widow of a veteran Methodist minister, died October 3, 1965, in Big Spring, Texas, after a long illness. Services were held in Nalley-Pickle Rosewood Chapel on October 5, 1965, with burial at Trinity Memorial Park. Her pastor, the Reverend Leo Gee, minister of the First Methodist Church, Big Spring, and his associate, the Reverend Harold Rucker, officiated.

Mrs. Morton was born Bessie Howel Warner on August 10, 1887, in Montgomery, Alabama, to Brady Riley and Martha Howell Warner. She was living in Houston at the time she was married to the Reverend C. N. Morton on January 27, 1904, while he was pastoring his first charge in Galveston.

Together they lobored for the Lard on the Teneha circuit, at Kara, Brante, Glen Rase, Granbury, Bloaming Grave, Meridian, Cauts Memarial in Weatherfard, Mingus-Strawn, Rising Star, Callege Heights in Fart Warth, and Oglesby, when he taak his first retirement in 1936.

Hawever, Methadists prevailed upon him to accept accupancy of the Methodist Hame in Mexia, and they served there far another 14 years. Even when they came to Big Spring in 1950 with intentions of retiring, she again found herself in the role of a pastar's wife, far Mr. Martan became minister of visitation for the First Methadist Church until a disabling injury befell him in 1953. All her adult life she had been active in virtually all areas of church activity until six years ago when her health failed her. Mrs. Martan spent these last six years of her life as an invalid in the Baptist Geriatric Haspitol in San Angelo. One month before her death, she was moved to Big Spring Bennett House where she died.

It was not the privilege of the writer ta knaw personally Mrs. C. N. Martan. So ta give insight ta her personality, there are included these quatations from a tribute ta her mother by Mrs. Herbert G. Keatan, the daughter of Mrs. C. N. Mortan, which was read at a Mather's Day meeting af the Waman's Society of Christian Service at First Methodist Church in Big Spring in 1955, soon before she became an invalid.

"I remember Mama playing the old 'Pump Organ' at church, and I remember playing duets with her by the haur, far fun.

"I remember accampanying Mama as she sang 'Belaved It is Morn' at a wedding, when I was twelve and accompanying her when she and papa sang 'Invisible Lane' at church and when they sang 'Oh, That we Two were Maying.'

''I remember Mama helping us with aur Sunday Schaal lessans an Saturday afternaan, as she mended, potched, 'marked' long black stockings and 'gat ready for Sunday.'

"I remember saying my proyers at Moma's knee, befare kissing her gaadniaht.

"I remember Mama making me memorize Psalms and other passages while I churned. I said I hated to churn—she said the scriptures would keep my mind aff wandering 'when the butter would came!'

"I remember Mama making preserves and jelly and lightbread and teacakes and angel food—nane of your 'Betty Crocker' then—I remember her filling my little wicker lunch basket far school and always having enough fried chicken and hame-made ice cream far the whale Junior League to adjourn from the church to the parsanage, for supper.

"I remember the little ane-roam church, where I, in my carner, could hear Mama, aver in her carner, teaching her cauple's Bible Class and loter conducting Sunbeam Band at 3, Juniar League at 4, Seniar League at 6 and singing in the chair at 7:30. I remember her gloriaus voice singing in the Chair until she was past 70! and singing Salas, too, right here in Big Spring.

"I remember Mama teaching the League 'Thirty Studies About Jesus' and discussing 'Bay and Girl' problems (far ahead of her day).

"I remember Moma feeding the Presiding Elder, and the Evangelist wha always came to hald the summer meeting; and gaing to the Tabernacle every night armed with a 'pollet', a bottle of water, some cold biscuits and a little switch.

"I remember Mama painting old chairs and dressers and bedsteads and making any parsonage look 'homey,' having it nice and warm when we came in from school—on cold days the big kettle of oatmeal cooking on the wood stove—for supper. We could savor the goodness when we opened the door!

"I remember Mama dressing to go calling on Church Members while papa hitched up the horse and buggy, and I remember her nursing the sick friends' babies.

''I remember Mama making posters from 'The Missionary Voice' to illustrate the studies and going to 'Women's Meetings,' and memorizing the Bible and her 'talks' while she ironed.

"Love has many ways of expressing itself, the practical and the sentimental, and mother love is the perfect combination.

"It must express itself in clothes and cookies and castor oil, in jellies and preserves, and in Poems and Principles. And all the things we remember are bound up in love and tenderness, in confidence and sympathy and understanding and pride.

''Yes—I remember Mama—haven, refuge, comfort, shield, guide, teacher, example confidant, companion, friend, my most loyal Fan!''

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HISTORY OF THE CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE

1866 - 1966

W. W. Ward

The history of the Centrol Texas Conference is presented in five sections that certain phases of the Conference's progress might be better oppreciated and understood:

- 1. Chronological History

CHRONOLOGICAL HISTORY

The birth of a Conference is very important. Like that of a person eaple want to know the ancestry of the newborn. For those who came after 966, a brief record of the beginning of the Central Texas Conference needs to be autlined so that there might be continuity. This Conference is but one of many segments of our American Methodism, especially in Texas.

The Central Texas Canference had its raatage in thase days when there vas a spirit af Westward-Ha. Peaple were seeking new and wider harizans a settle and satisfy their adventurous spirit. It has been said that the Methodist Circuit Rider was the vanguard of the autreach of Americans wherever they vent.

The Early Days of Texas Methodism

The available records indicate that in 1812 the territary of Arkansas was created and same settlements were established south of the Red River in the far Nartheastern part of what is now Texas. Those people thought it was part of the United States rather than a part of the damain of Spain. A Methodist preacher by nome of William Stevenson traveled among those settlements south of the Red River, and preached the first Methodist serman, as well as the first Protestant serman in Texas. He arganized a Methodist Class at "Pecan Paint," but it did not last lang.

In 1821, Mases and Stephen F. Austin received a grant fram the Spanish Gavernment ta settle same 1500 families in what later became Texas. They settled along the banks of the Brazas River. This same William Stevenson, mentioned above, made a request to the Austins far permission to preach among the families. The request was denied because by the agreement with Spain, nane but Raman Cathalic priests were allowed to preach, baptize, and marry the people. It seems that Stevenson did not heed the refusal, for he travelled as far south as Nacagdaches with his ministry.

The basic beginning of Methadism in Texas really began in 1831, when Calonel Samuel D. McMahan, a layman fram Tennessee, moved to Texas and settled 12 miles east of San Augustine. In 1832, while he was riding through the brush cauntry, he paused far prayer. It was then that he was marvelously canverted. Saan thereafter, he saught for a Methadist minister ta preach ta his peaple. James Stevensan (nat to be canfused with William Stevenson) happened to be traveling out af Natchitaches, Lauisiana, and when he heard of the request, came to the cammunity of Calanel McMahan and canducted services. Stevensan arganized a Methadist Class in the hame of Calanel McMahan. (Not a church, because such was farbidden by the Spanish government.) Later, Calanel McMahan and his faur sans were licensed as lacal preachers. Thus, for the first time Methadism was established an a permanent basis in Texas.

In 1836, the General Canference of the Methodist Episcapal Church was meeting in Cincinnati, Ohia. When ward reached the seat of the Canference that Stephen F. Austin had defeated Sonta Anna at San Jacinta, the Canference authorized the Fareign Missian Board to send preachers as missianaries to Texas. Martin Ruter, Rabert Alexander, and Littletan Fawler were appainted.

In 1838, the Mississippi Canference, being the nearest Annual Canference ta Texas created the "Texas Missian" District with the fallowing appaintments:

The next year the District was divided, making the Texas (Son Augustine) and Ruterville Districts. Thus, Methodism was on the move as a permanent Church. Little did those pioneers realize what potential they possessed as reflected in the growth and strength of present-day Methodism as of 1966, in Texas.

The First Annual Conference in Texas

On December 25, 1840. the first onnual conference was organized in the state, and named the Texos Annual Conference, with Bishop Beverly Waugh presiding. It met in Ruterville. The importance of this Conference as it relates to the Central Texas Conference is the fact that it is the parent conference. Bishop Waugh sent a letter to the President of the Republic of Texas, Histophysical Conference, David G. Burnett, saying: "The objects of this organization are religion, morality, and literature." It was organized into three Districts: Son Augustine with four, Galveston with six, and Ruterville with six appointments. This same conference appointed Chauncy Richardson as the first President of Ruterville College. It opened its doors February 1, 1840, preceding Boylor University which was established in 1845, and the University of Texas, which was established in 1884. This college was merged with three other Methodist colleges to form Southwestern University in 1873.

The progress of the Texos Conference was handicopped by the controversy of slavery, which caused a division of national Methodism in 1844.

On April 4, 1866, the fifth General Conference of the southern branch of Methodism met in New Orleans. It faced many frustrating problems. The Conference was in session o whole month. It elected four bishops; abolished Class Meeting as a requirement; authorized laymen to be members of Annual, District and Church conferences; increased the tenure of postorates from two to four years (on advance!); and, authorized the organization of the Northwest Texas Conference. This new conference was to serve the great frontiers of the Northwest and Panhandle areas of Texas. However, at that time there were great oreas of that section still unknown and unpopulated.

One of the chief reasons for creating the new conference was the problem of transportation. Communities were small and far apart. The only means of travel was the horse. Presiding elders and pastors travelled mostly an horse back, o few in buggies. The mode was slow, and consumed much time os well as caused much inconvenience. Especially was this true during extremely hat or cold weather. Sessions of the Conferences did not start until Wednesdays because it required two or more days to travel after the Sunday services to reach the seat of the Conference, and to return home for Sundays after adjournment. Furthermore, the sessions of the conferences were held in November, because they had to be held after horvest time that the members might be oble to pay solaries and benevalences. Consequently, by that time the weather was often freezing on the Plains, and very disagreeable. Especially was this true when pastors and their families had to move, and they moved more frequently than in the 20th century.

Northwest Texas Conference

The first session of the newly outhorized Northwest Texos Conference met in Woxahochie on September 26, 1886, with Bishop E. M. Morvin, presiding, and Fountoin P. Roy os Secretary, who served for sixteen years as a very efficient secretary, his lost year being 1889. Nineteen postors answered roll coll. These had been members of the Texos Conference, and became charter members. Four were admitted an trial. It was announced that the Ruterville District had recommended two men to be ordained, one o white man and one o negro. There were 85 local preachers, and 3,890 white members, 526 negro members, making o total of 4,501 members.

The Conference created four districts and mode the following appointments:

Some of the appointments listed above have passed out of existence, while others have been transferred to our conferences, viz: Lamposos and Son Soba o the present Southwest Texas Conference; Cameron and Marlin to the present Fexas Conference.

The "Mission" of the Conference wos to evongelize the people of the Northwest as ropidly as the people moved into those areas of Texas. It needs to be remembered that those were the doys when the Indians roomed over he lond in the central and for west. They were found in and around the Gotes-ille territory many times, but their presence was waning. As the Indian problem assed, then came the severe draught which brought hardships of a different nature to the people who were seeking to establish themselves in the Western part of the state. Not one caunty was created in the far West prior to 1870. So t can be seen that the Northwest wos to have its future in the future.

The first year of the newly organized Northwest Texas Conference vas one of adaptation, chonge, and hordship. The Conference was young and rod no background of experience, for it was a new ship set to sail the future on a ough sea. It was a pioneering conference. As Dr. M. Phelan, in one of his olumes said, "It was to have less rain fall and fewer swollen streoms, more lrought, sandstorms, and northers; less forest and more prairie, and open country to the same time it shall be coming more and more into a railroad building ra, rise of towns and cities; the erection of schools and churches."

But taking up the thread of history of the 1860's, we were still primitive.

The year 1867 was the year of the dreadful scourge of the yellow fever pidemic. Many of our pastors died with the fever, depleting the ranks of men who were bodly needed to corry the message of Christ, and to strengthen Metholism. One of those who fell victim of the fever was Wm. M. Lambden, a disinguished minister. He joined the Texas Conference in 1857, and served louston and Fort Warth churches. He olso served, at one time, as President of he Waco Female Callege, and was a delegate of the General Canference of 1866. le died of the fever and is buried at Waco.

In addition to the fever epidemic, the preachers faced financial difficulties. 'ery few charges paid in full. Palo Pinta assessed \$647.00 and was the only harge to pay in full; Springfield assessed \$300.00, and paid \$40.00. The residing elders fared no better. The Waxahachie District paid \$500.00 in full. The Springville District \$248.00. Lampages \$240.00. Wasa \$105.00 lb is

difficult far us of 1966 to appreciate the many hardships experienced by those who served as postors of our Methodist churches of that era. They and their families lived close to the poverty line many times.

The third session of the Northwest Texas Canference was held at Springfield, November 11, 1868, and for the first time laymen were members, the law having been accepted by the whole Church. At this canference, Harace Bishap was admitted an trial and became a maving spirit of the Conference.

Speaking of Harace Bishap, he kept a recard of his life and ministry which was published, and from it we quote as an example of what many of the preachers of that day had to endure:

"I travelled the Fairfield Circuit two years, then Hearn, Marlin, Georgetown, and Mexia, each one year. When I was admitted on trial there were only two station preachers in the conference, Thomas Stanford at Waca and J. Fred Cox at Waxahachie. There was only one parsonage in the Canference, that at Waca. I was sent from the canference to the Fairfield Circuit, I went with enthusiasm. The Stewards estimated my support at one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Salaries were unheard of. I lived with the people. A few were in good circumstances . . . most of them were poor. I had fourteen regular appointments. I preached twenty-eight times a month. I never took breakfast and dinner at the same place, except Fridays which was laundry day. I spent my Fridays at the home of Colonel and Mrs. Philpot. Mrs. Philpot looked after my laundry and mending. My wardrobe was in one end of my saddlebag, and my library in the other end. My study was under a shade tree where my horse could graze. I visited every home on the circuit, and when appropriate I had a prayer before leaving. I slept wherever it was convenient, sometimes on a sheepskin, a Mexican blanket, occasionally on a dirt, or punchean floor. I preferred the dirt because it was not so hard."

In 1871, two new districts were created, Belton and Stephenville, to meet the growth and expansion of the conference.

This same year 1871 witnessed relief from the Indians, which had been a constant menace to the white people of our conference area. The U. S. Army drove the Indians further west, and this made possible further migration toward the West and Panhandle areas.

The railraads followed the exit of the Indians. The Houston and Texas Central railraad built its line from Houston as far north as Denison. This was a great asset to the central and eastern parts of the conference. The Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad extended its line from St. Lauis to Denison, thence to Dallas an south through Waco to San Antonia. Then, the Texas and Pacific railroad started from East Texas to Dallas, thence to Fart Warth and an west to El Paso. Along the lines of these railroads new communities sprang up, and our conference expanded its ministry to meet the spiritual needs of the maving people.

In 1873, Southwestern University was established. This was an important event in the history of the Canference, and for Texas. Texas Methodism had established four calleges prior to this date. These colleges and their records were merged to create the new University at Georgetawn, and to preserve their mission and to expand their potentiality in the new University. (See special section in Chapter III for further details.)

In 1874, a new ministerial element came to the Conference. Edward R. Barcus transferred from the Little Rock Conference to the Northwest Texas Conference, and brought with him a rare Methodist background. His grandfather was a notive of England, who came to, lived and died in Pennsylvania. His widow and four sons moved into Ohia, where Bishap Asbury visited their home. Edward was converted when 21 years old, later jaining the Little Rock

Conference. His first appointment in our conference was the Salado Circuit. Then ne taught in the Waco Female College. He died in 1896.

While active in the Conference, Edward R. Barcus and Thomas Stanford noved their families and settled on adjoining farms southwest of Waco, and stablished the Stanford Chapel community. This gave their families protection against the Indians when the men were away on preaching tours. Their bodies are buried in the Stanford Chapel cemetery.

These two families have given to Texas Methodism nine ministers and wo missionaries. Descendents of Thomas Stanford include three ministers: tenry Stanford, wha died in 1918 as a result of the flu epidemic, E. Rosemond and Porter Stanford, both living as of 1966. Also, Miss Sue Stanfard who served as a missionary in China fifteen years. Descendents of Edward Barcus include six ninisters: John M. Barcus, J. Sam Barcus, (one-time President of Southwestern Jniversity), Thomas Barcus and Edward R. Barcus, II, who himself had twin sons, idward R. III, presently pastor of Austin Avenue Methodist Church, Waco, and Lyrus, who presently is pastor of First Methodist Church, Hillsboro. Julia Barcus narried Jackson B. Cox, both of whom served as missionaries in Mexico for everal years. These do not include other sons and daughters who have served he Church effectively in many ways.

The year 1875 was one of growth. First Church of Fort Worth built o new frame church building. At Waco, Fifth Street Church constructed a brick hurch coasting \$20,000.00, a very large sum for those days. (This church was ater named First Church, which recently was relocated in the Northwest part of Waco to escape the industrial building around its downtown location.) At tillsboro, it was a different tale. J. Fred Cox reported that in Hillsboro there was one grocery store, three dry good stores, four saloons, an academy, and Masonic codge, but, no Church! The Methodist, Baptist, and Cumberland Presbyterian groups joined to build a union building for their services.

This same year the Fort Griffin Mission reports that its area embraced tephens, Shackelford, Throckmorton, and parts of Jones counties. What o harge to serve! The salary for the year was \$113.50, mission appropriation 550.00, making a total income for the pastor of \$163.50. The total membership vas only 187. Only a man who felt within, "Woe is me if I preach not the sospel" would travel such a large area, leave home for long periods of time, and receive such a pittance of salary.

Speaking of salaries, this is what the Presiding Elders received in 1878: Vaco District, \$815.00; Georgetown, \$625.00; Corsicana, \$596.00; Waxahachie, 642.00; Stephenville, \$365.00; Comanche, \$292.00; Weatherford, \$348.00; ort Worth, \$272.00, and Breckenridge, \$25.00.

Money was tight in those days everywhere. Horace Bishop reports that then he moved from Mexia to Fort Worth District as Presiding Elder there as a widespread prejudice against Bishaps and Presiding Elders. His reception in ort Worth was not very cordial. The preacher assigned to Fort Worth was lelayed in arriving, so the parsonage was cold and no one to receive the new lastor or Presiding Elder . . . At the Quarterly Conference, the question of salary as raised, and Brother Womack walked up and laid down twenty-five cents 25c). That was the total amount paid. So Horace Bishop said to the pastor, Take the 25c and make it go as far as you can." The next Quarterly Conference as at Cleburne, and the receipts there were zero. The third Conference was it another place, and a hard blizzard was blowing. He preached at 11 o'clock. To one invited him home for dinner. He said he did not go to a hotel for lack of funds. He held the Quarterly Conference at 3 o'clock that afternoon, and hey reported all the money had been paid to the preacher. He announced that we would preach the next day. No one asked him home for supper or to spend he night. It was freezing cold, too. He said he heard of a local preacher wha lived four miles out in the country, and drove out there and proposed to spend he night. The man refused to receive Horace Bishop. It was dark by that time.

He hod heard of a mon who hod been expelled from the church, so decided he must be the best mon in the community. He accepted Mr. Bishop ofter some difficulty.

The period of 1878-1887 was occupied with expanding Methodism further to the west, and strengthening it throughout the home base.

Two events occured during 1887 that offected the Conference. The first was the colomitous drought, especially in the western areo where it prevailed for two years, 1887 and 1888. A. E. Butterfield gove a personal interview to M. Phelan, historian, who reported the following, "I was appointed to the Lamposos Circuit in the fall of 1885, and the drought had already begun. My travels covered all of Lamposos, Homilton, and Son Sabo counties, and most af Mills county. It did not rain for 28 months. Little corn was raised in 1886, none in 1887. The work poid me \$35.00 in 1887, and I had my mother and sister to support. The Farmers Alliance shipped in corn to feed the people and their stock. The recipients had to sign an ooth that they had no money or things to sell. I refused to sign the ooth, and left in August to laok for work. Lots of horses and cows died from actual starvation. The draught was broken the lost doy of August, 1887, but come too late to benefit the crops that year."

The second event of the year was the state-wide prohibition compoign. The compoign was heated and divided many church memberships. However, it was the first social action of Christian people of the state against this evil of alcoholic beverages. The Wets wan the election.

The year 1891 was a historical year in that two important institutions were established: Polytechnic College in Fort Worth, and The Methodist Orphanage at Waco (later named The Methodist Home). These will be treated elsewhere.

The year 1892 was noted for the large number of admissions. Eighteen men were admitted on trial, and nineteen by transfer. These men added strength to the Conference.

The year 1893 brought another drought and mode it hard on preachers and churches. Some Presiding Elders requested the presiding Bishop not to move men because they would have difficulty in moving.

In 1897, the Conference lost onother of its volued charter members Mordicio Yell. Yell was born in 1809 in Tennessee, admitted on trial at Nashville in 1832. He transferred to the Texas Conference later where he served for many years. In 1849, he organized and was the Presiding Elder of the Springfield District. In 1866, when the Northwest Texas Conference was organized, he was one of the moving spirits urging such a new conference, and became a charter member.

The Twentieth Century Arrives

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{As}}$ we opproach the twentieth century period, several things were toking place.

The previous General Conference had passed a low, parograph 301, providing on explicit low against preachers, traveling or local, holding any kind of services in a postaral charge when requested not to do so by the preacher in charge.

A stote-wide conference of Presiding Elders was held in Fort Worth in March 1899. This was the first such meeting, and was a step forward, uniting all Texas Methodism through and by the top leaders.

The Twentieth Century Movement, organized by the northern branch of Methodism, was adopted by the southern branch. Its objective was to

aise a church-wide Thank Offering for the benefit of our schools, colleges and missions. This offering greatly assisted the church's work in education and nissions.

In 1901, a great missionary conference was held in New Orleans which asted six days and an offering of \$50,000.00 was raised for missions.

This same year, Southwestern University established the first Pastor's School. 16th Ward was made Dean, who later was elected a bishop. A good program was sutlined for undergraduates, and over sixty men enrolled. Two of the lecturers were ohn M. Moore of Travis Park, San Antonio, and E. D. Mouzon of Fart Worth. 3oth of these men were later elected Bishops.

It should also be noted for record that in 1900 the great Galveston Hurricane occurred, and is alleged to have killed 10,000 people. It did much damage to the area, and to our Methodist churches in that city and coostal area.

The matter of dividing the Northwest Texas Conference popped up at the conference meeting in Georgetown in 1900. The Vernon District presented a nemorial requesting the forthcoming General Conference to divide the Northwest Texas Conference. Their request was to take the Weatherford, Abilene, Vernan, Clarendon and part of the Fort Worth Districts north of Johnson county and reate a new conference with these districts as the nucleus. The debate that a ollowed was heated. An hour was set for debate and consideration of both eports. The final vote was: majority report 88, minority report 114 against division. Then a fine spirit was manifested, and the Conference voted unanimously tot to divide.

The West Texos Conference (now Southwest Texos), petitioned the General Conference to divide the Northwest Texas Conference by giving certain areas of the West Texas Conference in 1901, and agoin a petition in 1905. However, he Northwest Texos Conference petitioned the General Conference not to toke such action in both instances, and the Conference did not do so.

In 1901 the Committee on the Spiritual Stote of the Church made two important comments dealing with money and evangelism. First, it was noted hat the benevolences were for the most port paid in full, for which the Conerence was grateful. However, too many of the pastors' salaries were not paid. In the pastors collect their benevolences early in the year, of that the stewards would have more time to collect solary money. The Committee then stressed the need for more evangelistic effort to be made by the pastors and churches.

In 1904, the Conference took a step forward regarding social concern. A esolution was passed asking the state legislature to establish an industrial school or the coring of the "large number of so-colled incorrigibles, invincible offenders, and homeless outcasts, for whom no pravision is made for their relief, either y church or state. From this prolific source comes the majarity of the criminal ife of the country." (Phelan)

The year 1908 was important, for the question of division arose again, and ancrete action was taken toward ultimate division. The Conference adopted resolution which was presented by Horace Bishop, and signed by James campbell, J. M. Wynne, R. R. Bolton, J. S. Chapman, S. J. Rucker, T. S. Armtrong, Jerome Duncan, J. G. Miller, and John M. Barcus, asking that a committee be appointed composed of one minister and one layman from each listrict, "Whose duty shall be to select a line for the equitable division of the larthwest Texas Conference, arranging all prelimaries for such division and presore a Memorial to the General Conference requesting that the Northwest exas Conference be divided into two strong conferences and report to this Conference at it's next session." The vote carried by 162 to 107. This was the first efinite step looking toward the division of the Conference.

The appointed committee met at Cleburne, March 24, 1909, and agreed upon boundaries and the names of the two conferences. Their report was made to the Annual Conference in 1909, which met at Stomford on Navember 10, 1909. The report read as follows:

"The Committee recommends that the southern end of the Conference, when divided, be called the Central Texas Conference, and that the northern end be colled the Northwest Texas Conference, which recommendation we hereby make part of the request."

The Committee submitted certoin data to guide the Generol Conference in authorizing the division. It was further agreed that the Central Texas Canference retain the original Jaurnols (Minutes), but that a duplicate copy of the original Journal-Minutes be furnished the newly organized Northwest Texas Conference. This was done, and the Minutes copied. The original of the copied Minutes were to be sent to the Secretary of the new Northwest Texas Conference, and the corbon copy retained by the Secretary of the Central Texas Conference.

The 1909 session of the Northwest Texas Conference, onticipating the division to be authorized by the General Conference, chose two places for the next sessions in 1910. The Central Texas Conference to meet at Woxohachie, and the new Northwest Texas Conference to meet at Clarendon.

Central Texas Conference Organized

The year 1910 stonds out as a historical date. It gave birth to the new Central Texos Conference in keeping with the outhorization of the General Conference of that year. It met in Waxohachie, November 10, 1910, for its first session. Bishop James Atkins presided and John M. Borcus woo chosen os the Secretary. Jerame Duncon presented a revised set of Rules by which the Conference would be guided, and they were adopted. This same year was the beginning of bishops living within the bounds of the conferences and serving for a period of four years—a great improvement.

Membership of the Conference was established at the 1909 session of the former and old Northwest Texas Conference. All preachers were asked to remain at the places where they were to be appointed at that session, granting permission for any preacher to choose a Conference then and there if he desired. This was amicably done, so when the two new conferences met in 1910, they had their chorter members. However, after the Conferences met far the first time, a few clerical members shifted. Dr. P. E. Riley remained in the Northwest Texas Conference, later in 1914 transferred to the Central Texas Conference where he remained until retirement.

This division of the Conference was necessary for the best interest of Methodism in this section of Texas. However, it brought separation of preachers whose ties of friendship across the years were strong. Through all the years since 1910, there has been sustained o fine cordial relationship between members of the two canferences. The same Bishop presided over the two conferences until 1960 when the Jurisdictional Conference re-arronged the Episcopal Areas. This has caused another type of separation between the members of the conferences.

The Centrol Texas Conference started with twelve districts, in spite of the division: Brownwood, Cisco, Cleburne, Corsicano, Dublin, Fort Worth, Gatesville, Georgetown, Hillsboro, Waco, Woxahochie, and Weatherford. There were 227 ministers, 10 First-Year men, 22 Second-Year men, all under-graduates, 497 Sunday Schools with a membership of 55,211. There were 241 Epworth Leagues with 7,379 members. Property values of churches and parsonages amounted to \$1,771,204.00 (This does not include educational and orphanoge properties).

The Journal of 1914, for the first time, listed the number of years the preachers had been appointed to a charge, which has followed ever since.

The year of 1914 witnessed the closing of Polytechnic College as sucl The establishing of Southern Methodist University led the Educational Commission to create a Womans College, and located it on the Campus of Polytechnic College. The records of former Polytechnic College students were transferre to S.M.U. and the former students became part of the Alumni of that institution though little recognition was ever given to them, which was natural. Souther Methodist University did not open until 1915. Consequently, the Polytechnistudents had to go elsewhere, especially the men, to complete their education Many went to Southwestern University, some to the University of Texas, some local students enrolled at Texas Christian University, and many women students er rolled in the new Texas Womans College.

Fiftieth Anniversary

The year 1916 was the half-century mark of the Conference, and we named the "Jubilee Year." That year the pictures of all the preachers were printed in a Souvenir Journal, bound in a golden color binder. The Conference had come a long way since 1866, endured many difficult experiences, bot ministers and churches. Many fine structures had been built, growing memberships and all departments increasing, indicating a good healthy church life.

The first World War of 1917 found many Methodist youth in the battle fronts and many homes saddened by the news that husbands, sons, and swee hearts had been killed in battle. J. R. Nelson led a campaign and raise \$40,000.00 to provide spiritual services for our soldiers stationed in training camps in Texas. Many of our preachers enlisted as Chaplains. When Armistic Day arrived at 11 o'clock on the morning of November 11, 1918, there we much rejoicing in all the homes of the state and nation.

The same year of 1918-1919 witnessed another enemy of mankind, the great epidemic of flu which took so many thousands of lives of people through out the state and nation. Our Conference felt its fatal effects. Officials of the nation and state, even local communities, warned the people to stay out a crowds to help prevent spread of the serious illness and death. As a resulof this serious epidemic situation, the Annual Conference met at Mineral Wellstate November for only three days. Important business was dispatched with speed and adjournment closed the Conference at noon the third day. The presidin Bishop of that Conference was W. N. Ainsworth, who proved to be a great leader through his four years of presidency.

The Centenary Movement

The 1918 Annual Conference made plans to carry out the mandate of th General Conference of that year—projecting the Centenary Movement. It worum through five years, special emphasis being given to 1919.

The Development Of Harris Hospital

In 1919, the Conference was handed a new challenge—the building of great hospital in Fort Worth. In the early part of that year, Charles H. Harri M.D., of Fort Worth invited Bishop James Atkins and a few Methodist leader of the city for dinner. He advised them that there was "not a single Methodist Hospital south of St. Louis, or west of Memphis," and he felt the Methodist Church should build a hospital in Fort Worth. To start the movement, he offere to deed his own 50 bed hospital-clinic to the Conference, and promised an additional \$50,000.00 for the project. The proposition was presented to the Annual Conference that fall, and accepted. A Commission was appointed to push the project of adding to the small Harris-Clinic institution. During the next year

developed that the Torront County Medical Society stoted it would not endorse such o move if Dr. Horris was to mointain any connection with the proposed hospital. The Commission gove Dr. Harris this information, whereupon he osked the Conference to re-deed his hospital property ta him, and that he wauld work with the Commission to build a hospital adequate far the City, and pledged \$50,000.00 toward the new praject. The Commission osked the business men of Fart Warth to jain in a campaign to raise \$1,000,000.00 for a new hospital, half of which to be raised by the citizens of Fort Worth, and half by the Conference outside the city. The compoign was started, the City raising its port, but the churches failed to reach its goal of \$500,000.00. Hawever, the bosement contract was let, and loter the cantract wos let for the shell—campased of walls and windows, for the ten story structure.

W. H. Matthews had been oppointed the first Commissioner, and he did yeoman's wark in getting the campaign project and the building under construction. In 1927, he resigned and Reverend C. Q. Smith was oppointed Commissioner. Soon ofter his oppointment, he led the Baard of Trustees to secure o loan of \$500,000.00 with which ta complete ond open the haspital. On March 3, 1930, the Hospitol opened to receive its first patient, Mrs. Hugh Estell of Fort Worth, who gove birth to a daughter, Lucile Estell. Soon ofter the opening of the Hospitol, the financial crash of September occured, which affected the whale financial structure of the nation, state and conference. The Hospitol had a struggle for seven years, when finally it was sold to the bond holders because it was impassible to raise money ta pay the half-million loan. C. Q. Smith had resigned in 1932, and Dr. Truman Terrell had been chosen as the Director of the Hospitol.

Then o fine thing hoppened to save the Hospital. Dr. Chas. H. Horris, who had suggested the original idea of building the Hospital, came to the rescue of the Conference. He sent far Bishop H. A. Boaz, and proposed to buy the Hospital from the bond holders, paying \$50,000.00 cash and giving his personal note for the balonce. (They had offered ta sell the loan far holf price, \$250,000.00). This was agreed to, and the Hospital remained open. Dr. Horris managed the Hospital until August 1948, when he asked the Trustees to relieve him of the responsibility. During the years under Dr. Harris, he had completed oll floors except the sixth floor. His personal medical proctice, of course, became limited since this time was given mostly to managing the institution. He estimated that during the eleven years, while manager, he put into the improvements of the Hospital, \$1,000,000.00. In addition, in 1956, he established the Horris College of Nursing, and gove for its maintenance an endowment of \$1,000,000.00. After his retirement, and in appreciation for what he hod done for the Church, the Trustees nomed the Hospital Harris Hospital. (Property of the Central Texas Conference of the Methadist Church) and this change is recorded in the records of Tarrant County, making the change legal.

Tol Terrell, who had served as Administrator under Dr. Harris, for several years resigned the same month as Dr. Harris. Mr. Bill Hudgins was made Acting Administrator for a period until Mr. Horold Sayles was secured as Administrator. In August of 1950, Mr. Sayles resigned. In the meontime, W. W. Ward hod been oppointed by Bishop Wm. C. Martin to the Hospital as Commissioner-Chaplain, and the Trustees appointed him as Acting Administrator for one year. On September 1, 1951, Mr. W. P. Earngey, Jr., ossumed the position of Administrator and is presently serving in that copocity (1966). Under his very efficient leodership, supported by a loyal Board of Trustees, the Hospital has advanced until it stands as one of the great institutions of healing in the whole Southwest. The physical plant and parking area is at present valued at approximately \$15,000,000.00. During his administration, a new Nurses' Residence has been built of a cost of \$800,000.00, a new power plant, loundry, and maintenance department building has been built at a cost of \$800,000.00. The new Mary Gibbs Jones Women's Building has been built at a cost of \$2,200,000.00. Plans are on the drowing board to double the copocity of that building. All buildings are connected with underground tunnels. Furthermore, during this year of 1966,

a two story parking building is being built. Citizens and business men of Fort Worth have contributed millions of dollars to the improvement of Hospital facilities. Mention should be made that the Jesse Jones Foundation of Houston, contributed \$750,000.00 toward the construction of Mary Gibbs Jones building, this being done during her lifetime. The Fort Worth Childrens Hospital with 102 beds, has been built adjacent to Harris Hospital, though it is an independent institution, the entire complex is known as "The Fort Worth Medical Center."

At present, the Harris Hospital has 505 adult beds, and 98 bassinets. Ultimately, when new construction is completed, it will have 617 adult beds. It has an active Medical Staff of 250 physicians and about 200 physicians on the Courtesy Staff.

The period between 1920 and 1933 was a time of several events, but they had to do with certain changes and movements which are treated under other sections of this report.

Texas Methodism United

In 1933, the Annual Conferences of the State were brought together in San Antonio on September 4, 5, and .6 for a great inspirational convention. The convention was not restricted to members of the conferences, but all laymen, too. For the first time such on All- Conference gothering was made possible. The purpose was to plan for the 100th Anniversary of Methodism in Texas, and also to project a united campaign of evangelism throughout the State.

In 1934, the five Annual Conferences held their sessions as usual, but joined in publishing o joint Journal with the proceedings of each Conference printed therein. It was an excellent Journal, with a brief history of early Methodism in Texos, and pictures of all active ministers of the five Annual Conferences. Marcus M. Chunn was our Editor. Today, it is a rare and valuable book.

At the Convention in San Antonio, the five Annual Conferences sponsored o resolution calling for joint meetings of all the Conferences in one city.

A committee was appointed to work with similar committees of the other conferences to plan for such a statewide meeting. It was noted that on May 24, 1938, would be the 200th Anniversory of John Wesley's conversion. Thus, a joint meeting of all the annual conferences could emphasize the spirit of evangelism throughout the state.

In 1934, the Conference granted permission to Texas Womans College to admit male students to enroll; furthermore, if any person would liquidate the debt of the College, the name would be changed to suit the donor. This was never done, however.

In 1936, all five annual conferences of Texas met in the city of Houston for their annual sessions on November 4-8th. The sessions of the Central Texas Conference were held in the First Church with Bishop H. A. Boaz presiding. Other Conferences met in near-by churches of the city. Holding these five conferences at one time in the same city necessitated the importation of other Bishops, to preside over certain conferences. Bishop Boaz invited Bishop H. Hughes to preside over the Northwest Texas Conference, and Bishop Sam R. Hay over the North Texas Conference. Morning and afternoon sessions were held separately, but the joint night sessions were held in the City Auditorium. This event marked a closer unity between all of Texas Methodism.

In 1937, the Conference gove consideration to the matter of union of the three major branches of Methodism, which had been agitated for the past few years. The mood was in favor of union, and so voted for same. This was a forward step toward national unity of Methodism which was consummated in 1939. This same Conference took note that Bishop H. A. Boaz was closing his tenure os an active Bishop, and would retire at the next General Conference,

thereupon a resolution was adapted as an expression of appreciation for his leadership and services as the presiding elder of the Conference, and furthermare took note that he was a notive son of the Conference, having been born at Benbrook same ten miles west of Fort Worth.

The Uniting Canference met in Kansas City, Mo., May 1939, in a very historical meeting. It had been 95 years since the break over slavery. Naw again, Methodism became one in fact and heart. It has been amazing how easily the three branches have merged into one great Methodist Church. Mergers of lacal cangregations needed to be adjusted, tao.

Unification

When the Annual Canferences met in their sessians fallowing the adjournment of the Uniting Canference, much work had to be done before union actually become a fact. The matter of transferring funds and properties from the former three branches to the newly arganized Church had to be accamplished. Then, the matter of integrating certain churches in the same communities was necessary, at least determining their future relationship one to the other.

The Central Texas Conference was no exception. Two sessions were necessary at the same sitting. The first session conducted certain items of business related to the year clasing under the ald regime, while the second was guided by plans handed dawn by the Uniting Conference.

After certain details were worked aut, this session of the ald Central Texas Canference adjaurned.

Bishap Ivan Lee Halt called the second session of the Conference ta meet, and all farmer afficers and boards were chasen. The Conference amended the Rules to confarm with the new Church.

This second session adopted same amendments to the By-Laws of The Methodist Hame. These By-Laws were in keeping with Union pracedures.

This 1939 sessian of the new Conference was campased of the clerical and lay members of the following three Annual Conferences and were within the bounds of the former Central Texas Conference: Central Texas from the former Central Texas Conference, part of the Southern Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and part of the Texas Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church.

The former Methodist Episcapal Church served far the most part people af German and Swedish background. Far record, we list the churches that came into the new Central Texas Canference: **German**—Copperas Cove, Moody-Leon, Meiers Chapel, Perry and Reisel. **Swedish**—Colcord, Waco; Broadway, Fort Warth; St. Jahn, Geargetawn; Tenth Street, Taylar; and Hutta. Thase from the farmer **Methodist Protestant Church**— Isham Chapel (Ft. Worth), and Tehuacana near Mexia. Alsa, Westminster College at Tehuacana.

For recard we alsa list the ministers wha were members of these Conferences: The Methodist Episcopal Church—Active—C. W. Bergquist, L. L. Broughtan, Arthur C. Peterson, Weldan G. Gatlin, Arthur G. Elley, Lee Galdmeier, H. M. Hapkins, Theodore Moberg, Albert Peterson, W. H. Steinman, Wm. Makowski. Retired—Herman Schmalz, J. H. Sandstram, J. W. A. Witt. Thase fram the Methodist Protestant Church: Active—C. A. Calhoun, A. R. Corn, Lamar Caaper, T. L. Crenshaw, Ray Davis, J. S. Duffy, Herschel Hall, Sprigg Harwoad, W. H. Hagg, Maggart B. Howell, L. M. Lawhon, Anthany Marsh, C. A. Sutton, Roy Ward, and Odel Osteen, a student. Retired—J. W. Barrett, W. E. Black, G. W. Baunds, O. W. Milburn, J. W. Mills. C. A. Sutton became President of Westminister College. Kenneth Capeland, President of the Texas Canference of the Methodist Protestant Church, was at the Conference, but transferred to the North Texas Canference, and later was elected to the episcapacy.

This same 1939 conference voted to make Fort Worth the permanent neeting place to the delight of the members unless something special arose a cause another place for a session. Inadequate entertainment in smaller towns, nd the enlarged membership resulting from Union, led to this action.

The Uniting Conference at Kansas City had set May, 1940, for the first ieneral Conference of the new Methodist Church, therefore, delegates were lected at the 1939 session of the new Conference.

The Journal-Minutes of this important 1939 Conference were bound in one olume.

The Forties

This period of history started off with the 1940 Conference creating Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, as a means of supplementing salares of lowly paid ministers. (See Changes)

In 1941, the Seventy-Fifth Anniversary of the Conference was observed and a brief resume of the history printed in the Journal of that year.

In 1942, the Conference had before it a resolution by E. R. Stanford o change the time of meeting for Conference sessions. Because World War II was in progress, the resolution was laid on the table. However, in 1945, the natter of changing the time of meetings arose again, at which time the presiding ishop was authorized to appoint a committee to confer with him, and work ut a time of meeting with the other Conferences of the state, and report at he 1946 session.

The 1945 Conference created a Planning Committee whose duty was to eceive advance copies of reports from all boards, committees, and commissions, eview them and mail copies to members of the Conference one month prior to its innual session. Thus, members could be prepared to discuss and take proper iction on items at the conference. It made possible quicker dispatching of conference business. The name was later changed to the Administrative Council. Its membership was composed of board officials, cabinet members, and others elated to such work.

The 1946 Conference received the report of the special committee on hanging the time of meeting of the several Annual conferences of the state. The new time was to be within the period of May 15th and June 30th. The presiding bishop was asked to work out the "Short and Long Sessions" for a conference so as to protect the conference benevolences. The Central Texas conference was assigned the first week in June.

This same Conference of 1946 adopted the plan of helping the educational astitutians of the State. Previously, the Fort Worth District had been raising 15,000 per year for the benefit of Texas Wesleyan College. Its plan and helping ad been so successful, that the plan was adopted and extended over the ntire state in behalf of five educational institutions. Definite plans for starting he campaign in 1948 were worked out by the presidents of the five institutions vorking with a special committee. It was proposed and finally adopted that all nonies collected would be distributed as follows: McMurry College, Southern Aethodist University, Southwestern University, and Texas Wesleyan College vould each receive 20%, while Lon Morris would receive 15%, and Perkins ichool of Theology, 5%. The churches throughout the state were asked to conribute to this fund \$1.00 per member. Later, the churches were asked to conribute 30c per member for the benefit of the Wesley Foundation and its several 31ble Choirs at the various educational institutions of Texas. This type of cambaign to assist the educational institutions became so popular, that in 1965 he askings were for \$1.50 for the colleges and universities, and 60c for the Vesley Foundation. In the year 1965, funds collected for the colleges and

In 1949, for the first time in the history of the Canference, a woman, Miss Wilma Raberts, a local preacher, was appainted as a supply pastor, serving the Loving Charge, and later the Graham Circuit. Her services were acceptable and the churches praspered under her leadership. Later, she married Mr. George Carse, and lives at Graham and shares in his business. In 1950, Miss Roberts and Mrs. Alice Wonders, another local minister were ordained Local Deacans, Mrs. Wonders never served a Charge, but has been a Professor at Texas Wesleyan Callege, presently the Head af the Departments af Philosophy and Religion.

The Canference now has two deaconesses as members: Mrs. Nan H. Wright, serving as Church Cammunity Worker in Coryell Caunty of the Gatesville District. Miss Oma Mae Gee is a teacher in the Navaja School at Farmington, New Mexico.

The Fifties

The period of the Fifties brought further pragress to the Conference. In 1951, the five conferences of Texas authorized the publication of a Baak af History dealing with the period of 1900 through 1960, supplementing the two volumes published by M. Phelan who had written the history of Texas Methadism from 1814 through 1899. The cast for the Central Texas Conference's share was \$4,800.00. The book was issued in 1961 under the title "The History of Texas Methadism 1900-1960."

The 1952 session of the Conference was held in Waco at First Church. This was the last Conference to be held in that historic church, because it relacated soon after out of the downtown area.

The Canference at its session in 1954 adopted a Sustentation Fund program whereby members af the canference who might be farced ta take a leave of obsence because of illness, might secure partial support during that period. Married clerical members were granted \$2,000 per year, while single clerical members were granted \$1,600 per year. Such a pragram embadied the sympathetic spirit of the Conference toward such members.

A new venture in caring for the aged was adopted by the 1954 Canference, granting authorization for securing a charter for the Wesleyan Hame. This project was slaw in getting started, but its final culmination was due largely to the untiring efforts of M. Howard Knox, its first Commissioner, who finally led in the construction of a beautiful four stary Hame in Georgetown at an approximate cast of \$1,250,000, and provides for about 150 people. When the praject was first started, a move developed to buy the old Crazy Hatel in Mineral Wells, but careful appraisal revealed that it would cost too much to reconstruct much of the plumbing, etc. Then the Georgetown site was accepted, the city affering two blacks across from First Church, and pledged \$15,000 for four years to assist in getting the Home started. It was farmally opened in 1962. Unfartunately, Mr. Knox died saan thereafter its apening. Mr. Ray Stakes was appointed as Executive Director.

In 1955, district changes were mode. The Fort Worth District was divided into the Fort Warth-East District, and the Fart Warth-West District. The Weatherford District was eliminated and the charges divided among the Cisco and Cleburne Districts, the number remaining at ten districts.

In 1959, the Canference cammitted itself to share in the Texas Cauncil of Churches. The 1965 budget reveals that the Conference cantributes \$4,025 taward this important work.

The Sixties

Time morches on, so with the Church.

In 1961, the Conference took a decided step forward far more efficient

fiscal operations. It established the Joint-Office of Secretary and Treasurer. This was certainly a strategic move. The work of the secretary had grown to become a real burden since Union for the one serving as a pastor and also as secretary. J. D. F. Williams, who had served as secretary since 1952, with the exception of one year, at his request, was appointed to the office. The office is located in Fort Worth, and has proved successful.

The Office of Treasurer has always been a position of honor. Prior to 1914, the preachers brought their monies to canference and gave to a Teller, who distributed the funds to the various boards and agencies. The 1914 Conference created the Office of Treasurer, and F. F. Downs of Temple was chosen as the first treasurer. Since that day, only four men have served in this capacity, and the Conference is due them a tribute of appreciation for their untiring services, serving without pay, but for the actual expenses of canducting the office. We list their names as follows: F. F. Downs, Temple, 1914-1915; George E. Jester, Corsicana, 1916-1930; Leake Ayres, Gatesville, 1931-1940; Walter B. Rider, Ennis, 1941-1961. It was at this point that J. D. F. Williams assumed the Secretary-Treasurer office, giving full time to the work.

The 1962 Conference also received a report from a special committee that had been appointed to study District Administration. Several shifts in charges to better serve them was recommended. The minority report recommended the reduction of the number from 10 to 8.

No change was made until 1965 when the Corsicana District was eliminated, the charges being divided between the Waco and Waxahichie Districts. This district was recommended by the special committee and authority was granted to the Bishop to eliminate one other district when it can be done satisfactorily.

The Conference of 1964 closed the administration of Bishop Wm. C. Martin, who served the Conference for sixteen years, longer than any other Bishop, and under the new law of the Church, no one else will be permitted such an honor. The 1964 Journal was dedicated to this man of God whose personal life and fine spirit of brotherliness endeared himself to all of the pastors and laymen of the Conference. His emphasis on evangelism and his untiring travels ta give assistance to any and all churches is noted with deep and due appreciation. A part of the dedicatory statement in the Journal follows: "Bishop Martin's preaching of the eternal verities and abiding certainties has stimulated the minds of many to a deeper awareness of the love of God, a faithful acceptance of the redemption through Christ, and a sustaining confidence in the ultimate triumph of righteousness." His retirement brought a deep sense of loss to his wide circle of personal friends, but leaves abiding memories of the fine fellowship experienced with him and his gracious wife, "Miss Sallie," as she is affectionately known.

The year of 1965 brought to the Conference a new presiding officer in the person of Bishop W. Kenneth Pope. He was at one time a member of the conference, having served First Church, Breckenridge, transferring to First Church, Georgetown, thence to University Church, Austin, then to First Church, Houston from which appointment he was elected a bishop in 1962. His return to the Conference as Bishop was welcomed by his former friends. As his years of administration lengthen, he will find an increasing affection in the hearts of clergy and laymen for him and his lovely wife.

Bishop Pope has a warmth of friendliness about him that makes for congeniality, which is duely appreciated. He has shown a personal concern for every phase of the Conference program, and within the first year of his administration has initiated a new spirit for brevity in dispatching the business sessions.

The 1965 Conference added a new dimension to the administrative work of the Conference, sharing with the North Texas Conference in the support of an "Area Executive Secretary." This called for the enlargement of the Execu-

tive Cammittee of the Conference Administrative Cauncil under whose direction, along with the presiding Bishap, the Area Executive Secretary will perform his responsibilities.

The duties of this Executive Secretary will be "ta initiate, ta coordinate and to implement the pragram of the Canference with the boards and agencies of the Conference, and ta have general aversight over the Annual Conference program with special respansibilities in the areas of Missians and Evangelism." The first appaintment went to Leightan Farrell of the Central Texas Conference, with his office in the Publishing Hause in Dallas.

In the Fall of 1965, Bishap Pape with the two District Superintendents involved, called the meeting of ministers and laymen of the Fort Warth Districts for a dinner and the cansideration of creating the "Fart Worth Metrapalitan Baard of Missians," which was unanimously adopted. The purpose was to pool funds for the establishing of new congregations where mostly needed within the area of the twa districts regardless of the lacation, and to praject a campaign for the purpose of raising necessary funds. The grawing area demands such cansideration, and was a distinct step forward.

Note shauld be made as we close this chranalagical phase of the histary of the Canference relative to the "Recards" across the years. In daing research wark, it is regrettable that early records are so brief and lacking in much important information. The present-day Journal is almost perfect in furnishing information about the growth of the Canference, and tribute should be given to the present Secretary of the Conference, J. D. F. Williams, for his untiring work in providing permanent informative recards for the future historian.

It has been impassible to list all of the clerical and lay members of the Canference through the 100 years which is deeply regrettable.

CHANGES AND DEVELOPMENTS

This is a changing warld and the Methadist Church is no exception. Pragress requires change in church administration to meet the changing condition of the current times. There have been of necessity many changes over the post ane hundred years in the Conference and we list the important ones. These changes are not listed in their chronalogical sequences, rather under certain topics to give continuity to the changes in that area.

The Ministry

The tenure of pastarates has changed. In 1866, the length of a pastarate was changed from two to four years (an advance!). This held until 1918 when the limitation was lifted without restriction. E. B. Howk was the first pastor in our Canference to remain langer than four years. He was the pastor of First Church, Fort Worth, and remained there six years during which time he led in the construction of that beautiful edifice. A few years later J. N. R. Scare, then Warren Johnston, each remained eight years at the same church. The langest pastorate in the Conference was that of Thomas Sterck who was the pastor of Matthew Memorial Church, Ft. Worth, for twenty four years, during which time he led in the construction of that Spanish type of church plant. Presently, C. A. Sutton has been the pastor of the Arlington Heights Church, Ft. Worth, for seventeen, and Gastan Foote is now entering his sixteenth year at First Church, Ft. Worth. Others have remained for fourteen years down to eight years.

Priar ta 1938, the Presiding Elders could remain an a district for faur years, and aftentimes shift to another one. In 1918, Bishap W. N. Ainswarth, arbitrarily did a drastic thing! He advised the preachers no one of them could remain a Presiding Elder longer than a tatal af faur years at a time. This broke the vicious circle af a few men remaining in that position, thus making possible

other men becoming a Presiding Elder. The General Canference of 1938 passe the Law that did what Bishap Ainsworth had dane; na man cauld fallaw him self on another district. This held true until 1939 when the Uniting Conferenc established the law that a man cauld remain six years as a District Superintenden and had to be off of a district at least three years before being eligible again

Bishaps lived aut af the state until 1910, when the General Canferenc authorized resident Bishaps where passible. That year Bishap James Atkins wa appainted to aur Conference and lived at Waco, far faur years. All other Bishap followed him far faur years each, until Bishap Ivan Lee Halt became the Bishap and remained five years. This was caused by the Uniting Canference. Bishap Wr C. Martin remained sixteen years, but prabably was the last Bishap to remain sa lang since the General Canference of 1964 set a maximum limit of twelve years

Population

The shift of the population in nation and state has been affected by severa things. First, Warld Wars I and II, braught many yaung men to Texas for thei military training, when discharged returned to Texas to live. These same war also quickened the establishment of new industries in Texas, which required more employees, who moved to Texas, or came from the farms. The improved educational program thraughout the state led to the consolidation of rural schools which drew young people away from their church communities, and even tually to the larger towns and cities for employment. Furthermore, the intraduction of farming implements which did the work of many men, caused farm laborers to mave to the cities. As a result, this changing and shifting of the population had drastic effects upon the rural churches. And we need to mentior that the automabile has also effected the shifting of the population.

In 1960, the Bishap and his Cabinet began assigning a small rural church to some near, larger church, ar farmed a Parish Graup campased of severa smaller churches, and thus have been able to provide a trained ministry to churches which atherwise would have to close for lack of financial support. It is a fact that as we close the 100 years, Methodism is gradually moving out at the rural areas as our people have moved out.

This shifting from the rural areas has had the reverse effect upon the cities. The influx of the peaple from the farming areas created a problem for the city districts ta pravide adequate church facilities. In many instances, the local churches themselves were impraving their awn church plants, and creating debts. Ta meet the need, in the early 1950s, the Canference gave its suppart whereby District Boards of Church Extensian were arganized for the purpase of organizing new cangregations and assisting them in providing needed church edifices. Out af this mavement grew the Builder's Club plan far asking laymen ta cantribute \$10 twice a year for the purpases of building new church buildings. This plan has been very effective.

Conference Entertainment

For many years ministers and lay delegates to annual conference sessions were entertained in Methodist hames in the town where the session was held. But, as people have moved to the cities, they provided for the most part houses just large enough to care for their own families. Seldom was there a guest room to entertain Conference delegates. This led to the practice of many delegates providing his or her own entertainment at hotels, etc. Thus developed the program of "Entertainment," whereby those preachers and laymen from law-salaried churches were given a stipend to help defray their expenses. It started

Unification

The Union of Methodism in 1939 probably caused the greatest structural change of all. Eoch of the three branches, the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestont Church, were united in an historical Conference, May, 1939, in Kansas City, Missouri.

Union brought many definite changes in certain areas of the new organization, and each group had to share in those changes. Tenure: District Superintendents (name given former Presiding Elders) were given the privilege of remaining six years, after which they were not eligible for a district until three years lapsed. Finances: The financial system generally used by the northern branch was adopted for the new Church, which change definitely affected the local church. Christian Education: The educational program of the southern branch was accepted for the new church. Lay Activities: This work was used by all three branches, but the Methodist Protestant Church had stressed the use of loymen more, so this was their distinct contribution to the new church. Election of Bishops: Prior to Unian, Bishops were elected by the general Conferences of the north and south branches. (The Methodist Protestant branch did not have Bishops.) With Union came the creation of six Jurisdictional Conferences, (5 white and 1 negro) and to these Jurisdictional Conferences was given the right to elect their awn Bishops. Thus their election was brought closer to the people.

As we close the one hundreth anniversory of the Centrol Texos Conference, there is a movement to unite The Methodist Church with the Evongelical United Brethren Church to be acted upon in 1968.

Ministerial Support

It will be noticed in the Chronological Section that solaries for all travelling preachers in the earlier years were extremely meager, and mony times were paid in bacon and farm products rather than money. Texas was o farming stote until ofter the turn of the century. The discovery of oil, the groduol development of industry, the diversification of farm products, and other contributing causes led to the rise in salaries. It was not until ofter World War I that solaries began to grow better. Porsonoges for the most port were far from modern. So living conditions of the preachers and their families was just about enough to make ends meet.

Prosperity began to improve solories in the early farties, and they grew better with each year thereofter. It is noticeable that salories in 1936 which were \$3,000 for the choice station oppointments, are in most cases \$9,000 and \$10,000 in 1965. Many af the larger churches today are paying salaries of \$10,000 to \$14,000, and in many cases furnishing additional expense funds. It connat be said now that preochers, for the most port, are paorly poid. Some still ore under-poid in the rurol areas.

District Superintendents' salories hove olso benefited. Prior to 1941, their salaries were set an o percentoge basis by the District Stewards of each District, and most Presiding Elders did not receive the same salory. They collected their salaries when they held Quarterly Conferences. Some received very low solaries, and travelled large rural Districts. In 1941, the Conference established a definite scale of all District Superintendent salaries. This money was sent to the Conference Treosurer by local church treosurers. The Conference Treosurer paid each District Superintendent occording to the scale set by the Conference, and not all the same solary. In 1955, the scale was changed so that all District Superintendents received the same salary. The apportianment on the local churches at first was 12 1/2% of the pastor's solories, but by 1965 had been gradually reduced to 9 1/2%. For 1965, the District Superintendents each received for his solary and traveling expenses \$13,265.

World Service and Finance

In 1941, the Conference established the Commission of World Service and Finance. The duties of this Commission are many, the chief one being to consider the askings of the various Boards and Commissions and then present the Commission's recommendations to the Conference for final action. Members of the Commission are chosen for their business acumen. This method enables every such Board and Cammission to receive fair and ample consideration in relation to the whole financial program of the Conference. It has worked successfully.

Reverend Thomas Sterck served probably longer on the Commission than any other member, and under his efficient leadership the Commission has pravided a sound financial structure for the Conference. The Commission established the rule (sanctianed by Canference action) that all monies not expended during a year by the Boards and Commissions had to be returned to the Treasurer of the Conference. Thus, surplus each year gradually accumulated until a "backlog" of funds enabled the Commission to provide needed funds to all Boards and Commissions to start their new years work off early, whereas befare they had to borrow funds until the Churches remitted their money to the Conference Treasurer.

This Commission of World Service and Finance has the responsibility of guarding and protecting all funds of the Conference, therefore, they require all treasurers to be bonded, as well as the Conference Treasurer.

In 1952, it was discovered that there had occurred some irregularities in one small area, and as a result the Commission employed a reputable accounting firm to audit all books of the several treasurers each year. This report is mailed to each member of the Conference after adjournment. Thus, all monies of the Conference are safeguarded.

In 1932, a special committee reparted the need for supplemental payment for under-paid members of the Conference. Those who received better salaries were urged to contribute to a special fund on the basis of 1/2% ta as much as $2\ 1/2\%$ of their salaries. This special appeal to individuals did not function very well.

In 1946, in keeping with the General Canference legislation, a Committee was appointed composed of the District Superintendents, W. W. Ward, Conference Secretary, J. N. R. Score, and T. Edgar Neal to make a survey of the need for establishing a minimum salary support program. The committee reported the next year that 49 Charges of the Conference were paying as much or less than \$800 a year; that 49 Charges were assessing less than \$1,000 per year. The committee recommended that the Bishop nominate a minimum salary commission of nine members to be confirmed by the Conference whose duties would be to create a program of minimum salaries and give assistance to the members of the Conference receiving meager salaries.

The next year the Conference adopted the minimum salary support program as recommended by the special committee of nine. The methad adopted for securing the necessary funds was to ask the churches, large and small, to provide funds an a sliding scale of percentages, which they have done. The minimum salary established for married members was \$1,000, and for a single man \$800. This seems a very small salary, but it must be remembered that all salaries in that year were far below what they are in 1965. Though the minimum salary was set at \$1,000 for married men, through the years the minimum salary level has been lifted until in 1966 this has been raised to \$4,500. for a full-time conference member.

Pensions for days of retirement always have had an appeal. In 1944, the subject of a reserve pension plan for members of the Conference was lifted, and a special committee was authorized to study the subject and report to the

Conference at a later date. This committee made its report in 1947. It proposed that the Conference undertake to raise \$500,000 as the basis of an adequate annuity for retired ministers. The proposal would distribute the funds as follows: \$243,821 for new entrants. (Full Reserve System) \$120,700 for previous entrances (Partial Reserve System) and \$106,808 for lifting retired men \$2 per year. The \$500,000 askings were distributed to the several districts, to be paid in four years. The campaign was conducted under the leadership of P. E. Riley to a successful climax. (For details see Journal 1947.)

In 1952, there were 194 effective ministers participating in the program, and with sufficient funds collected, the Reserve Pension Plan was put into operation. The funds were deposited with the General Board of Pensions for their investment and handling of the Conference funds. Several unanticipated, but interrelated factors made the original plan unpopular and it was suspended. As we come to the 1966 Annual Conference a revised plan for the Reserve Plan will be considered.

There does not seem to be a real program of financial assistance to retired ministers in the early days of the Annual Conference. The records of the Annual Conference in the sixties reveal that sums of \$5 and \$36.25 per year were paid to some retired ministers or to wives af deceased ministers. The total amount so distributed in the conference year 1869 was only \$185.35. In the seventies, the Joint Board of Finance began to ask for larger amounts for the needy retired ministers and their widows. But, even though the amount increased, it was not a pension plan. It was a distribution of funds an the basis of need.

In 1925, the total amount apportioned to retired ministers, their widows and orphans, was a little more than \$22,000. For that was for one year, keep in mind. By 1966, the amount to be distributed each manth was approximately \$30,000. This is an admirable advance.

The emphasis on pensians, during the period of cultivation for the Reserve Pension System program has resulted in increased funds available for present-day pensions. The percentage apportionment for the Conference Claimants Fund has gradually increased from an amount equal to 10% of the pastors' salaries to 17%, and the salaries have been increased. But under this plan there is no apportunity far financial aid and campound interest. All maney raised in one year is expended the next and all interest on pension endowment funds are also expended each year. The current income pension program provides little disability or survivol benefits, other than based upon actual number of years the ministers have served. It should be noted, however, that this pension plan does receive a check each year from the Publishing House os part of the profits fram the Publishing Hause for the current year. In 1965 this amounted to \$9,698.92, which was distributed among the retired ministers and widows.

Christian Education

In 1866 when the Northwest Texas Conference was organized the training of the Methodist people in Christian living was done primarily from the pulpit, during revival meetings and in the home. The Sunday School of that day had a struggle ta survive. It held a small place in the thinking of the people. The literature for the children was composed of small picture cards on the back of which was a portion of the Scriptures, while adults studied the Bible.

In 1900, the General Conference gave a serious consideration of providing better programs for Christian training. It recognized the Epworth League as a means of developing Christian leadership among the youth.

The growth of the Epworth League was phenomenal. It had its own literature called the "Epworth Era," which offered guidance and program material. Young people accepted the organization with enthusiasm, as well as did the adults. A state-wide convention was held in Dallas in 1892 with 100 in attendance, with Bishop Joseph Key presiding and John M. Barcus as secretary. A second

tate-wide meeting was held with 219 delegates. The third convention was hel t Waxahachie with 300 in attendance, indicating the increased intereshroughout the state. The fourth convention was held at Houston with 3000 i ttendance, while the fifth was at San Antonio with 10,000 in attendance he rapid growth in attendance was so great that a delegated basis was estal shed for attendance, but there was no lagging of interest among the your eople. It produced a spirit of evangelism among the youth of the church, and we tailed by all as one of the really strong arms of the Church.

In 1895, a state-wide Camp was established at Corpus Christi known a Epworth-By-The-Sea." The Camp had 18 acres facing the Gulf of Mexical few permanent buildings, and tents to care for the delegates. In 1918, 8,00 oung people were in attendance, studying Bible, Missions, Evangelism, and O anization. It was electric! In 1919, a great Gulf storm swept the Campsital estroying all physical property, which led finally to closing the Camp.

The turn of the century brought an awakening to church leaders whecognized that revivals alone were not sufficient in reaching people for Christ or training of members, and adding to the membership of the churches. The hole person needed to be nurtured with an adequate program of Christia ducation in the local churches. This new approach resulted in planning a program of Christian Education, improving all literature which would meet the changing imes. This opened the avenue of what is known as a social application of the iospel in all areas of life. The Sunday School thereafter was made more effective iradually, serious study ultimately gave the Church a very comprehensive program of literature and produced a program of training teachers and leaders. The divance called for improved educational facilities such as educational buildings i onjunction with the sanctuaries to meet the needs of the people.

To facilitate the work of the Sunday School throughout the Conference, M. L. Nance of DeLeon was secured as a field worker. Following the success a sis work, in 1911 the Conference Sunday School Board created the office a field Secretary and employed Rev. Emmett Hightower for that new position n 1914, W. E. Hawkins, Sr., a layman of Fort Worth, and a very dynam nan, was asked to serve as the Field Secretary. He was followed in 1918 to lev. R. F. Brown, who with his wife, did most effective service throughout the Conference until his death in 1926.

In the meantime, the General Sunday School Board had created a verlaborate program of teacher-training, and also the Graded Literature for the hildren, as well improved all literature. They began by holding Training chools, and the pilot school in the Central Texas Conference was held in the Austin Avenue Church, Waco, in the spring of 1920. The novelty of such school appealed to Sunday School teachers and leaders throughout the Wac District, and more than 300 were enrolled. The School began at six o'clock with supper at 50c, followed by a 45 minute period, then a 20-minute assembly, ar losed with another 45 minute study period. It offered courses in Bible study vangelism, missions, church organizations, etc. This school proved such a successhat other schools were held in the Conference. At the close of each school, ce ificates were given to those who attended at least four of the five nights.

In 1962, the Conference Sunday School Board created the office of Superinendent of Sunday Schools for the purpose of promoting a better program throughout the Conference with Sunday Schools under the new venture of better teacher raining. C. R. Wright was appointed for 1922, followed by J. B. Berry, 1923-2! and G. A. Schlueter, 1926-29. This same Board introduced the office of Rura Vork in 1926 with James B. Curry as Executive Secretary, followed by Bruc Lox, 1929, and J. D. F. Williams, 1930-35.

In 1925, the Conference Board of Epworth Leagues created the offic of Field Secretary for the purpose of developing the work among the Epwort Leagues. L. D. Williams was the first full-time Field Secretary and served for or ear. He was succeeded by J. D. F. Williams, then a young layman, and Presider of the Canference Epworth League, who served through 1930. His wark with young people in a few manths led him into the full-time ministry of the Conference.

In 1930, the General Conference revamped the entire program of Christian Education of the Church by merging the three former Boards: Education, Sunday School and Epworth League, and created a new Baard of Christian Education, which combined all the functions of the three farmer baards.

The 1930 General Conference combined the work of Church Schools and rural work into ane affice, viz, Executive Secretary of Christian Education, which eliminated the field work. Those who served in this capacity were: G. A. Schlueter (making a combined 8 years of service with Church Schools), followed by J. A. Sicelaff, 1935-39; B. F. Jackson, 1940-46; W. H. Cale, 1947-54; Thomas Granger, 1955-61; Richard R. Smith, 1962; and Gordon Dennis, since 1963. Under the guidance and planning of these Executive Secretaries, the Church School pragram has been tremendously enriched and expanded. Training Schools are still planned and a constant stream of new and well trained teachers provided for the church activities.

Assemblies and Camps. Prior to 1925, the Epwarth League Board intraduced the halding Summer Assemblies to enrich the pragram of the League wark. The first such Assembly was held at Lampasas in 1923 where facilities were available. The second Assembly was held at Belton. In 1925, the Assembly was held at Lake Worth in the old Mosque, praperty of the Shriners. This proved to be the most papular to that date. In 1926, the Assemblies were held an the campus of Texas Wesleyan Callege, and remained there until 1938 when they were moved to Southwestern University as the permanent location.

In 1939, the Annual Conference granted the Board of Education the privilege af purchasing some property at Glen Lake for the purpose of establishing a permanent site for halding various camps during the summer far the yaung people of all ages. The property was farmerly a Health Center where hot baths were affered to the public and had clased. The property cast \$6,000, but the Conference stipulated that it would not assume any financial respansibility toward its purchase. Under the leodership of J. N. R. Scare, J. A. Sicelaff, Executive Secretary, and ather interested people, the property was bought. Through the years this has proved one of the best things that the Board of Education has done far the young people. A new swimming poal has been provided to replace the ald ane, a dining hall, an administration building, an assembly hall, a superintendent's residence, and small buildings have been constructed to house the men and wamen, besides bath hauses, etc. The property value as af this date, is approximately \$300,000. The name given the property is "Glen Lake Camp." In 1957, the Conference purchased 172 acres an the Brazas River, northeast of Glen Lake, knawn as "Rainbaw Camp," far future expansion and ta provide a different type of camping facilities. Glen Lake is sixty miles southwest of Ft. Worth.

Educational Institutions. Jahn Wesley, the Faunder of Methadism, believed in education, himself being a graduate of Oxford University, England. Paramount in his ministry was the spiritual man, but no less the intellectual man. He once stated these two-fald values in a terse statement: "Let us unite the two, so lang divided, knowledge and vital piety." When Methodism was being established in the New England states, Methodism established Cakesbury College. Likewise, when Methodism was being established in Texas, a college was established, Ruterville Callege, chartered in 1840. Then followed Wesleyan College (1844), McKenzie Callege (1854), and Saule University (1856).

The first callege established within the baunds of the Central Texas Canference was the Waco Female College in 1856. It was located an South Secand Street, not far from old Fifth Street Church (First Church-downtown). Later, the College was relocated in the northwest part of the city, near the present Methodist Home. A new administration building was constructed at a cost of

\$100,000, with a debt of \$40,000 against it. A national financial depression happened at that time, and loans were impossible, and the College was forced to close in 1895. The property was sold to the AddRan College at Thorps Spring, which was renamed Texas Christian University. The building burned in 1910, and Texas Christian University moved to Fort Worth.

In 1865, a female college was established at Fairfield, but did not exist very long.

In 1869, Marvin College was established at Waxahachie, and closed in 1885 for lack of financial support.

Southwestern University. Southwestern University was established by charter in 1873. In 1869 all the Conferences in Texas had united in a move to establish a central university, since Soule University seemed to be failing and nat properly located. Three conventions were held to settle the proper location for the new institution, Galveston, Waxahachie, and Corsicana. The one at Waxahachie almost settled upon that town since Marvin College was located there. However, upon the urgent request of Dr. Francis Asbury Mood the convention adjourned to meet later. When the next convention met at Corsicana, there were more applicants for the institution, so a committee was appointed with plenary power to settle the matter. This they did in August 1873, and chose Georgetown which had offered \$63,000 and a campus. A charter was secured from the State of Texas, uniting the four colleges—Ruterville, Wesleyan, McKenzie, and Soule—into one successor institution, Southwestern University.

Southwestern University is an educational institution for which all Methodism can be justly proud. It has contributed to the state of Texas and the nation, through its graduates, outstanding leaders in all professions: Law, Medicine, Science, Education, and the Ministry. It has provided the Church with three Bishops: E. D. Mouzon from its faculty, two brothers—A. Frank Smith, and W. Angie Smith.

The University has had very able men as its presidents: Francis Asbury Mood 1873-1884; John W. Heidt 1885-1889; John Howell McLean 1889-1897; Jahn R. Allen (Acting) 1897-1898; Robert Stewart Hyer 1898-1911; Charles McTyeire Bishop 1911-1922; Paul Whitfield Horn 1922-1924; James Samuel Barcus 1924-1928; King Vivion 1928-1935; John William Bergin 1935-1942; John Nelson Russell Score 1942-1949; William Carrington Finch 1949-1961; Lawrence Durwood Fleming 1961-.

About 1934, Southwestern University operated Blinn College at Brenham, which was owned by the Southern Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, which was later released and became Blinn Junior College of that city.

When Dr. J. N. R. Score was President, he conceived the idea of creating a Southwestern System with Westminster College of Tehuacana, Daniel-Baker College of Brownwood, and Weatherford College of Weatherford. This system had potentiality, but was dissolved because the requirements of the Southern Association of Universities stated that every college in the entire system must be fully accredited, or the accredition of all colleges of the system would be jeopardized, thus the system idea was dropped.

In 1873, Granbury College was opened, later was merged with Weatherford College.

In 1881, Weatherford College was established. It had keen competition from the Granbury College and also from the Parker Institute located at Whitt. However, Weatherford College proved the stronger, and eventually absorbed the other two. This college closed its doors in 1949 as property of the Central Texas Conference, and the buildings, grounds, and equipment given to the city of Weatherford for a municipal Junior College.

In 1883, there was a Stephenville school that lasted only a short time.

Palytechnic—Texas Wamans—Texas Wesleyan Callege. In 1891, Polytechnic College was established in Fort Worth, and had a splendid history until in 1914 when it became Texas Womans College upon the establishment of Southern Methodist University. In 1934, it became co-educational again and was named Texas Wesleyan College. Thus, its continuity has given the Church an excellent College with an ever grawing consistency of friends and students which is prophetic of its future. In 1966 it observed its Diamand Jubilee year . . . 75 years.

When it opened its doors in 1891, it had a faculty of 11, and a student body of 173. It had one building at the time, the south wing of the present Ann Waggoner Hall. The Polytechnic Methodist Church was arganized the same year in this building. Like many schools in that period, it had a rugged time for many years.

Dr. H. A. Boaz become the president in 1902, and under his efficient and vigorous leadership the college grew in prestige, faculty, students, and physical property. New buildings rose on the compus under his direction: the present Administration building, Mulkey Hall (boys), Boaz-Benbrook Hall, which housed the Fine Arts Department, a Science building, and the gymnasium. R. A. Hearon was the Dean, a very able man who stood for excellency in scholarship and lifted the quality of educational standards until the callege was recognized by practically all leading educational institutions of the nation.

Texas Woman's College was established in 1914, and took over the properties of Polytechnic College. This resulted because those who established Southern Methodist University felt the Church needed a school far young women, which was popular in that day, and there was no need, it was felt, for two co-educational schools 32 miles aport.

Texas Womans College served a need at the time for young wamen. Dr. H. E. Stout, the president, served from 1919-1934. In the spring of 1934, he announced that the college wauld close with the end of the spring semester because of a debt of \$244,000. However, when the trustees met for their annual session, there was strong opposition to closing the school. Rev. Thomas Brabham, a trustee, led the opposition, so he was elected President. He assumed a very difficult situation, for the college had practically no credit. By his ability and determination he operated the school for a year. During his administration, the college became co-educational again, gave it new life and changed the name to Texas Wesleyan College.

Texas Wesleyan College entered upon a new day with the election in 1935 of Dr. Law Sone, a layman, who had served as Dean the previous year. He was an educator, and an administrator of ability. Whatever the institution is today, to him goes the credit. He faced herculean obstacles with that heavy debt, but in 1942, it was paid through his excellent leadership.

At present, the College has twenty buildings, plus the two new ones; a faculty of 75, and a student body numbering 1,918. It has presently an endowment of \$3,416,063.

The following served as presidents for the three colleges:

Polytechnic College: J. W. Adkinson 1891-1894, W. F. Llayd 1894-1899, R. B. McSwain (Acting) 1899-1900, G. J. Nunn 1900-1902, H. A. Boaz 1902-1911, Frank P. Culver 1911-1912, R. A. Hearan (Dean-Acting) 1912-1914.

Texas Wamans College: H. A. Boaz 1914-1917, J. D. Young 1917-1919, H. E. Staut 1919-1931, Thomas Brabham 1931-1935, Law Sone since 1935.

In 1900, the University Training School was established at Blaaming Grave. After a few years it was clased because of financial difficulties.

In 1909, the Meridian College was established at Meridian, a venture of the Gotesville District. It served a valuable place during its existence, sendir forth some fine leaders in the Conference. It had three prominent president 3. F. Winfield, J. Holl Bowman, and W. H. Cole, who himself was a graduat of the institution. It closed in 1929 with a heavy debt against it while W. F. Cole was president.

Southern Methodist University—The establishment of Southern Methodi University is not a Conference institution, but inosmuch as it involved in a peginning Polytechnic College, it should have a place here for record.

Throughout the year of 1910, a movement was afout that would effer the future of Southwestern University and Polytechnic College. Dr. Robert 1 Hyer had plans to construct a building of Southwestern University, to be know as a "Memorial Building." For some years there had been growing in the thinkin of mony leoding Methodist over the state the time had arrived for Methodisi :o establish o great educational institutional to be located in some large city Dr. H. A. Booz, President of Polytechnic College had previously discusse with Dr. Hyer the possibility of such o move. However, when word reoche Georgetown of whot was brewing, the professors of the University and the pusinessmen of the town persuaded Dr. Hyer to drop the matter. So, when D 300z heard of what Dr. Hyer proposed at Georgetown, he realized that if suc 3 Memoriol Building were to be constructed it would deloy for years the establish ng of a great university in a large city, probably in North Texas. Therefore Dr. Booz contocted the business men of Ft. Worth, and they offered 10 acres for a campus plus \$3000,000 in cosh if such a university should be ocoted in Fort Worth. This started the fireworks. The Fort Worth press boosted th deo and the Texas Christian Advocate carried articles in fovor of a grecuniversity in Texas. Thus the issue was lifted into prominence throughout the itate. In the meantime, Dollos leaders became interested also, and began to mak similar offers for the proposed university to be located in that metropolis. As esult, the session of the Conference, meeting in Woxohochie, adopted a resolu ion constituting o Commission with representatives from each of the annual conferences in Texas to consider and determine the establishment of a Methodi: Jniversity in Texos.

Bishop H. A. Booz, in his book, Eighty-Four Golden Years, records the he Commission met in Austin, Jonuary 19-20, 1911. Bishops Jomes Atkins M. B. Murroh, and E. D. Mauzon, Dr. Robert S. Hyer, Dr. H. A. Booz, an eventeen Commissioners were present. Bishop Atkins was elected President c he Commission. The Commission met in Dollos, Texos, February 3, 1911, t determine what would be best and also determine the location. Prior to the neeting, Dollos had submitted its sealed bid. The next day, the Commission net in Fort Worth in the banquet hall of the Westbrook Hotel. At this meeting, th lity of Fort Worth submitted its seoled bid through Mr. Clorence Ousley, Edito of the Fort Worth Record newspoper. The next day, the Commission met ogoi n Dollos of the Publishing House to open and consider the two bids. Just os th aids were being opened, Mr. Fronk McNeny of Dollas wolked in and laid a chec on the Choirmon's desk for \$100,000 addition to the bid. Thereupon, a discussion prose over the legality of such on addition to a bid. Fort Worth business me vere present and anxious to learn of the decision. When they saw what had bee permitted on the port of Dollos, they were enroged, soying, "If that is the wo 'If thot is the wo ou mean to deal, we want no further business with you." The finale: Th Commission voted to locate the proposed University in Dollas.

It might be added for information, that the Commission named the new Januaristy "Dollos University." Imagine their surprise the next morning when the needlines stated that the Roman Cotholic School, the night before, had change he name of their school to "Dollos University." So, the Commission met again and named it Southern Methodist University.

Wesley Bible Chair. This is not o product of our Conference, but is jointly wined by oll of the Conferences of Texas, so we shore in its program. It was

established in 1914. As far back as 1910, under the pastars of the University Methodist Church near the campus of the University of Tcxas (D. E. Hawk, Robert P. Shuler, and A. Frank Smith), efforts were made by these men to establish a Chair of Bible related to the University. Harace King of the Sauthwest Texas Conference was secured and he enrolled 24 students. Then came the War of 1917-18. In 1919, Umphrey Lee was appointed to revitalize the Bible Chair and served until 1921 when he was followed by Dr. E. C. Webb who served until 1933 at which time Dr. C. W. Hall was appointed and served for twenty-five years. Dr. Hall is the one who really placed the Bible Chair upon a permanent and state-wide basis. The present, new, beautiful Student Building was constructed under his leadership, and an May 9, 1966, this Building was dedicated and named in his hanar. Reverend Jackson C. Oglesby of aur Canference is a product of the Bible Chair under the administration of Dr. Umphrey Lee.

Fort Worth University was an educational institution established by the farmer Methodist Episcopal Church to service its own constituency in Texas. It was lacated two blacks east of Harris Hospital on the lat now accupied by the Technical High School. It maintained a Medical School from which several prominent physicians were graduated. After several successful years, it was moved to Guthrie, Oklahama, and later merged with a small callege of the Southern Branch of Methodism, to form the present University of Oklahama City.

Westminster College was located at Tehuacana, near Mexia, and the property of the former Methodist Protestant Church. After Unian it was closed. Rev. C. A. Sutton was its last President.

The Methodist Home

The Methodist Home is the brain child of Bishap Joseph S. Key. While presiding over the session of the Northwest Texas Conference in Abilene in 1890, he presented the need of a home for orphans. His suggestion was accepted with enthusiasm. The Conference elected a Committee with power to establish such an orphanage. It met in Ft. Worth soon thereofter, and elected W. H. Vaughan as Agent. In 1891 it chase Waca as the site, and named the new institution, "The Texas Methodist Orphanage." The original property consisted of 28 acres and a lavely ald southern home, named "The Miller House."

The Orphanage had a hard struggle the first thirty years. The recards indicate that the Methodist people did not support it with any degree of generasity. Nevertheless, it gradually avercame its handicaps until taday it stands as one of the finest equipped Homes in the nation.

It was during this administration of W. H. Vaughan that the first Administration Building was constructed. It was the first big project presented to Texas Methodism. On the corner stone were these wards, "Preached, prayed, and song up by Reverend Abe and Lauisa Mulkey." After sixty years of service, it was replaced by the present modern Administration Building. W. H. Vaughan retired in 1908.

- J. H. McLeon (1908-1912) followed W. H. Vaughan. He strengthened the finances samewhat by persuading the Conference to include in its budget an amount for the Orphanage. The results were disappointing, though better than previous methods.
- R. A. Burroughs (1912-1918) served six years, and during his administration, he introduced the plan whereby each child was clathed by a Sunday School Class, which has warked successfully through the years.
- W. F. Barnett (1919-1933), better known as "Dad Barnett," succeeded R. A. Burraughs, and marked a turning point in management. For the first time a layman was chosen as Manager of the Orphanage. He had served as Superin-

tendent of the State Orphanage at Corsicana, and brought experience to the new position. He introduced some new ideos into the management. He published the Sunshine Monthly, at first a mere sheet, which has been one of the best nethods of reoching the hearts of Methodism. He increased the offerings to the Drphanage by toking bus loods of children to the larger Churches in December prior to the Christmas offering. He changed the name of the institution from 'Orphanage' to "The Methodist Home." This gave it a new and vital appeal. During his administration, six buildings were odded to the Campus. There were approximately 260 children in the Home during his administration. He died May 1933.

Hubert Johnson (1933-1966) was chasen Superintendent at an apportune time, and wisely built upon the splendid work of his predecessor, W. F. Barnett. He had an experienced and sympothetic Board of Trustees with whom to work, and was obly assisted by his wife in the management of the Home for hirty-three years. Briefly, we list some of the achievements under his administration which has given the Home outstanding recognition, as well as an advanced program in child care.

The Compus was increased to 144 ocres, and he secured a landscope archiect to lay out the Compus; intraduced the "Cottage Plan" of hausing the children thus providing a better home atmosphere in which they live; constructed wenty new buildings making a total to date of thirty-two, twenty-one of these are centered about a beautiful Chapel for religious services; increased the number of children to more than 400; enriched the Sunshine Magazine in such a way hat its messages from the Superintendent and the activities of the children has nade such an appeal that the Christmas offerings have oftentimes reached as much as \$450,000 annually; provided an enriched program of child care a keeping with modern advancement in the field of psychiatric counselling and oward coring for more children in the future. It should be said, he was many riends of wealth who have provided the many magnificent buildings on the Lampus.

Mr. Johnson was elected Executive Vice-President of the Home February 1, 966. His special duties are ta raise funds to increase the Foundation for the Home. Tubert Johnson has mode a tremendous contribution to the present and future are of children in need of a Home when their lives have been marred by the leath of porents, or from broken hames, and who need the core which is offered by the Methodist Home.

Mr. Kennard Copeland, a devoted Methodist layman, was chosen to suceed Mr. Johnson as Administrator. He comes from a successful background of vorking with children and youth as teacher ond public school administrator. Time alone will evaluate the quality of his administration. He began his new position with the blessings of all in authority for his being chosen.

Town and Country Work

Methodism has olways ministered in the rurol oreas. When the people began lrifting to the cities, o special effort was made to assist thase remaining in the ountry. The first organized work for rurol churches, as distinguished from he city churches, come in 1926 when, under the supervision of the Sunday chool Board, there was established the "Dual Extension Work," and was finaned by the fourth Sunday offering through the Sunday Schools. The first Dual xtension Secretary was Reverend J. B. Curry, who served three years. He as followed for one year by Reverend Bruce Cox. In 1930, under the program of the Board of Education, which assumed the work done by the Sunday School and the Epworth League Board, Reverend J. D. F. Williams became the xtension Secretary, and served five years. In 1935, because of the failure of the burth Sunday offering, during the difficult days of the depression to pravide ufficient support for the extension work, the work of the Executive Secretary and the Extension Secretary was combined into one office under the leadership f J. A. Siceloff.

Twenty-five years went by before another full-time worker for the town and country churches was put back in the field. During this period, emphasis and guidance was given through the semi-official Methodist Rural Fellowship, and later the Conference Town and Country Work. This new emphasis was really injected into the new program through the leadership of J. D. F. Williams when he served as chairman of the rural work back in 1947. In 1960, Edward H. Otwell was appointed the full-time Executive Secretary for the Town and Country Work. This work has reached the place where a full-time worker is not necessary. It was combined under the work of the newly created office of the "Executive Secretary of Missions, Evangelism, Town and Country Work," effective June, 1966.

The Brotherhood

The Brotherhood of the Conference was organized at a meeting held in the City Hall, Fort Worth, Texas on Navember 20, 1893. Its purpose was to provide a death benefit to the family of each deceased member of the Brotherhood. A constitution was adopted, which set the mortuary fees at \$2.00 for the death of each member. There were 155 charter beneficiary members with 14 non-beneficiary members. John R. Nelson was its first president and R. F. Dunn, its first secretary-treasurer.

In 1902, the Auxiliary of preachers' wives was organized with 29 charter members, and the mortuary fee for preachers' wives was set at \$1.00. In 1910, when the conference divided, it was agreed that a separate Brotherhood would be set up for each conference, but each should pay the calls for the members of both Brotherhoods for a period of ten years. In 1918 this was extended indefinitely. In 1934 during the difficult days of the depression, the Northwest Texas Conference withdrew its association with the Central Texas Brotherhood. There were 16 deaths during that year and the membership dropped below the 150 mark. But the officers of the Brotherhood were determined to save its worthy institution. The result was the organization of the Methodist Ministers United Brotherhood, composed of the Central Texas, North Texas and Southwest Texas divisions. The mortuary fee was set at \$1.00 rather than \$2.00, but with the greatly increased membership, the death benefit rose to nearly a thousand dallars.

The United Brotherhood continued until 1958, when the Central Texas division voted to withdraw from the United Brotherhood and a new plan for the brotherhood for the Central Texas Conference was adopted. The membership was enlarged to include all the ministers and wives of the conference and those who had been participating in the Brotherhood after their transfer to other conferences.

During these 73 years of activity the Brotherhood has never claimed to be an insurance plan, but it has proven itself to be a wonderful channel of "Brotherhood."

Homes for Retired Ministers

There are, at present, thirty such homes, with a total value of \$352,395. This is a remarkable advance for the Conference, and reflects the appreciation and care of the Conference for those men who have served so faithfully. Those who have supervised these homes are: D. L. Collie (1919-?); W. B. Andrews (1930-1940); George F. Kornegay (1940-1954); and Hubert Crain (since 1954). Hubert Crain, having had experience in construction work prior to entering the ministry, has accomplished much toward maintaining the homes and securing new ones.

Lay Activities

The use of laymen in the Church dates back to 1828 when a group within the Methodist Episcopal Church became dissatisfied with the rules governing the Methodist Episcopal Church, and withdrew to form the Methodist Protestant

Church in which laymen held a rightful share in the governing body. Then i 1866, the General Conference of our Church authorized that laymen shoul be members of all the Conferences, General down to the local church.

The first serious attempt in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to us laymen in wider fields, was in August of 1907 when a group of laymen met i Memphis, Tennessee, at which time Mr. John R. Pepper was chosen presider At the close of the meeting, a call was issued for a second such meeting to mee in Chattanooga, Tenn. in August, 1908. Out of this meeting came the "Laymens Missionary Movement." The General Conference in 1910 gave the Movement its recognition and blessings. The general Conference of 1914 provided for the election of Conference, District, and Church Lay Leaders, and made the General Secretary of the Laymens Movement a member of the General Boar of Missions.

In 1919, the Centenary Movement used laymen to a remarkable degree demonstrating their effectiveness as laymen serving the church. Consequently the General Conference of 1922 pravided for the creation of the General Boar of Lay Activities. The following August, the first meeting of the Board of Layme net at Junaluska, N.C., and elected Mr. W. Erskine Williams of Fort Worth, Texa: as its president. He retired in 1948. One of the members of this Board was Rev J. Earl Crawford, who later served as the Associate Executive Secretary from 1925 until his death in 1935.

In 1948, the Texas Methodist Planning Committee was organized of representatives from several Conferences of the State. This committee generally mest the Methodist Home, Waco. This Planning Committee supervised the organization of the Texas Methodist Stewardship Movement, and particularly the worst Mr. Roy Farrow, of the Texas Methodist College Association, who led Methodist Churches throughout the state to lift their giving to unprecedented amounts. This is purpose of this Movement was to stress proportionate giving, using the tithe as a working basis of giving. Mr. Pat Thompson of Bay City, Texas, became he Lay Leader of this Stewardship Movement, creating literature, speaking transferences and stressing larger gifts.

The Woman's Societies

There is no more fascinating story of the service done in the Conference than that which our women have accomplished across the years. M. Phelan, it is History of Texas Methodism, says: "The most important legislation of the General Conference of 1878 of church-wide importance was the provision for the Woman's Missionary organization whose primary object was the awaker and of foreign missions work among the women of the Church." From 1880 of 1910 it is the story of the birth of two organizations: The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and the Woman's Home Missionary Society, each group with its own special work. In 1911, the two organizations were combined to farm he Woman's Missionary Council. In 1939, with the coming of Union, the name was changed to "The Woman's Society of Christian Service."

The first organization had its birth in old Fifth Street Church, Wacc November 15, 1880. Rev. J. J. Ransom, a returned missionary from Brazil poke to the initial group of women, and the "Woman's Foreign Missionar lociety" was formed. Mrs. J. R. Henry was chosen as the first President, Mrs. C. Ellis, Vice-President, and Miss Sue Lambdin, Treasurer.

Mrs. Henry and Mrs. Ellis travelled over the sparcely settled conference peaking to groups of women and seeking to organize local societies. Their modification of travel was by horse and buggy. The first Annual meeting was held at Waxa tachie in November, 1881, and the total collections for the year amounted to 3215.85.

The 1887 Discipline of the Church states that "the funds of the Societhall in all cases be derived from private efforts, and in no case from public

collections during regular church services." Dues were set at 10c per month, with additional gifts accepted. Compared with dues and gifts af 1966, these collections seem very meager. But the women have been undaunted in their deep underlying purpose to carry the Gospel to the ends of the earth. By 1900, there were thirty Auxiliaries with a membership of 1,871. In 1904, their collections amounted to \$3,979.21.

The women established four hames during the century: The Rebecca Sparks Inn in Waco to serve the working girls (1900-1936); The Wesley House in Thurber, Texas (1906-1939) to serve the Italians who worked in the soft coal mines; The Jerome Duncan Wesley House in North Fort Worth (1911) to serve the Mexican people; in 1942, they established the Bethlehem Center to serve the Negroes of Fort Worth. The two latter Homes are still in operation.

The Women's Work is best reflected in the number of cansecrated women whom they have sent out and supported in the Foreign and Home Fields:

MOVEMENTS WITHIN THE CONFERENCE

Across any century many and voried causes will arise, some live for a period of time and pass, while others of merit will develop and survive. Such has been the case within the Central Texas Conference's first one hundred years.

The Holiness Movement

The movement that really rocked the Conference around the turn of the century was the "Second Blessing Movement," later called the Holiness Movement. For a period of time this emotional movement swept the entire church, and especially in Texas. Bishop Joseph S. Key, our resident bishop at the time lived in Waco, the very center of the Texas movement. He, himself, believed in the "Second Blessing," which added fire to the situation. He openly advocated sanctification, though he never was a fanatic on the subject. This type of

preaching appealed largely to an emotional type of people, including many ministers of the Conference. They claimed, many of them, having received the Second Blessing, that they were beyond committing evil. There was a Camp Ground established in Waca in the community of the present Bell-Mead, before it developed into its present town. People came from far and wide, pitched tents, and attended preaching services for a period of weeks. This movement gradually died

Doctrinal Debates

The rise of the Church of Christ denomination produced a very narrow and provincial doctrine far themselves, and they sought with vim to project into the whole Christian communities of the South. One of their chief doctrines essential to final and full salvation was baptism, and that by immersian anly. Cansequently practiced sprinkling as the mode of baptism. The ministers of this new church were always challenging the Methodists to debate, and they got it, too. The debates grew intense and fiery, and great crawds attended them. There was more heat than conviction, and few minds were changed. It, too, gradually died away.

Social Concern

In recent years, the Canference has became socially concerned. Hawever, the first maxement in that direction had to do with the Prohibition Maxement. The year 1887 was morked by a very heated statewide campaign against the liquar traffic. Methadism has always been for sobriety over against the alcoholic bevarages, so naturally became involved in this campaign along with the other Christian graups. Rager Q. Mills, of Corsicana, a very prominent Texan and a staunch member of the Methodist Church af his city, withdrew his membership because he deeply felt that the preachers were dabbling in politics. His action was very much regretted. The campaign arrayed Methadists against one another, and disrupted many churches in the state. When the election was held, the moral element was defeated, and the Wets wan. Hawever, the cause was not dead.

In the early 1900's, the use of alcaholic beverages become so wide-spread and its effects so damaging to society, that county after county vated it out of their areas. The fight against the liquar traffic was hard and bitterly faught. Dr. George C. Rankin, Editor of the Texas Christian Advocate became an ardent foe against the traffic. His battle cry was "On With the Battle." He was joined by the Editar of the Baptist Standard, and tagether they stirred the Christian forces of the state. Eventually, mare than half of the counties in Texas were voted dry, and a similar sentiment grew thraughout the nation.

The Junior Senator from Texas, the Hanarable Morris Shepherd, led the fight in the Senate of the National Cangress, and eventually gat passed an amendment to the Constitution to be voted on by the several states. Finally it was adapted by all but three states, and became the Eighteenth Amendment to the U. S. Canstitution. The Drys won, but they went to sleep, while the liquar farces of the nation began their work to repeal the amendment, which they did in 1934.

After the repeal of the 18th Amendment, the Dry forces of Texas organized the Anti-Saloan League with Rev. Atticus Webb, a Methodist, as its Executive nead. He was also an ardent foe of the liquar traffic and kept the issue alive sefore the people of Texas. At his death, his wark was re-arganized and presently s known as TANE, (Texas Alcohol-Narcotic Education) which organization gives the still the second of the secon

Evangelistic Movement

As the Nineteenth Century drew to a close, there arase an emphasis an rofessional evangelism, by which we mean, same preachers gave their whale

time ta canducting evangelistic revivals. Nat every preacher has the talent far evangelistic preaching, so these "roving" preachers were an asset to the preachers in need of their services. About this time there came from Georgia a man by the name of Sam Janes, and a great evangelistic preacher. The results of his preaching were phenamenal, so much so that great crowds attended his services, and hundreds of people converted. Those who heard him report that "He hit the devil hard," and was unmerciful in his attack against all kinds of sin. Other ministers jained the prafessional field of evangelism and gave excellent services to the churches

In the meantime, our schools of theology began to give to the church more educated and trained ministers, who brought with them into their ministry more content and less emotionalism in their sermons. Gradually, more formality in warship and later more ritual was introduced into their services which affected the loss of fervor and emotionalism.

Abaut 1944, Dr. Guy H. Black intraduced the method of Visitatian Evangelism whereby laymen and ministers visited in the hames of prospective members, corrying to these people an invitation to attend services in their churches, and aftentimes having conversions. Later, Dr. Dawson Bryan, postar of St. Paul Church in Houston, hoving used the method of Dr. Black to great advantage, published a book, "Visitatian Evangelism" using the unpublished materials and techniques of Dr. Black. This book became the pilat plan for visitation evangelism throughout the church and was effective, but gradually declined. However, an abridgement of this evangelistic plan is used today in many churches and is known os "The Fishermen's Club."

Modernism And Fundamentalism

A transition in theology arase during the clasing years of the nineteenth century which disturbed Christian people everywhere, and was carried aver into the present century . . . and still lingers samewhat. It was generally referred to as "Madernism." The advent of scientific research in many fields, also tauched the area of theology. There arase men who were liberal in their thinking, and they began to search out the background of the Scriptures and to separate the facts from myth and tradition. This movement really racked the church, and even to this day is challenged by many well-meaning Christian people.

In Texas a very bitter controversy arase over o baak written by Dr. Jahn A. Rice, ane-time pastar of First Church, Fart Warth, but at the time he was a Professor in the School of Theology of Sauthern Methodist University. What Dr. Rice said, far the most part, had been written by other writers. But, being so near the hame base of an extreme Fundamentalist Baptist preacher, Dr. Frank Narris of Fart Warth, Dr. Rice was challenged and branded as a "Madernist" who was out to destray the foith of the faithful. Far several months and years the cantroversy waxed bitter, and finally Dr. Rice resigned his position at the University. As the years passed the issue quieted down.

The Twentieth Century Movement

This Mavement taok its name from the entrance of the 20th Century. It had its arigin in the northern branch of Methodism, but the sauthern branch joined the mavement. The chief aim was to take a nation-wide affering for benefiting the schools and calleges with a goal of \$2,000,000 for aur Methodists. The assignment for the Narthwest Texas Conference was \$68,158, but only \$42,730 was raised. Another part of this Mavement was the Church-wide Missionary Conference held at New Orleans and \$50,000 was raised far mission wark.

The Centenary Movement

Hanoring the approximate date of 100 years since Methodism entered Texas, the General Canference of 1918 launched the "Centenary Mavement"

which was a three-pronged campaign in behalf of Missions, Education, and Superannuate Support. Three campaigns, each coming one year after each other, was projected on a five-year basis, and three such financial drives caused the two latter ones to dwindle, though much money was secured for each.

The campaign for Missions was launched in the Spring of 1919 with a goal of \$33,000,000, and when the pledges were reported, there had been \$53,000,000 underwritten. This thrilled the entire Church, and much good resulted. Over a million tithers were signed, and other benefits resulted.

HONORED MINISTERS AND LAYMEN

There are certain personalities that stand out across the century as having made definite contributions to the original Northwest Texas Conference, and the present Central Texas Conference. Their names are lifted up that we may become acquainted with them and their part in this history. It is regrettable that this number is limited, but space forbids a lengthy list.

Ministers

- **J. P. Mussett** was a charter member of 1866. Most of those who remember him at the turn of the century recall that he had one good limb, and walked with a wooden leg. When he became emotionally aroused at a service, he would shout and stomp his wooden leg against the floor and shout even more. A great Christian soul, his first appointment in the new Conference was Marlin, in 1866. He is buried in Fort Worth.
- **J. Fred Cox** was admitted on trial into the Texas Conference in 1860 and was a charter member of the original Northwest Texas Conference. Few men enjoyed the honors of leadership of his Conference as he did. His first appointment was Georgetown. He married Miss Mollie Vannoy, who survived him for many years, and was affectionately known as "Aunt Mallie" because of her devoted Christian life. He died May 21, 1891.

Thomas Stanford was a Conference leader for many years. A native of Arkansas, he transferred to the Texas Conference in the late 1840's. He served three important districts. He was a charter member of the original Northwest Texas Conference. His first appointment was Waxahachie. He died, September 18, 1892, and is buried at Stanford's Chapel, near Waco.

Horace Bishop was admitted to the Northwest Texas Conference in 1868. He was a most gracious man, brotherly, and a tireless worker in the Conference. He served some of the larger churches, and on several districts. He was a man who always looked ahead and planned for the future of the church. He was a delegate to five General Conferences. He was a leader in the establishing of Southern Methodist University, and served as a trustee of that institution many years. The main entrance to the Campus is named for him, "Bishop Boulevard." He is buried at San Angelo where he lived with his daughter.

- **E. A. Smith** was a quiet and yet a very effective minister. He was a man beloved by all who knew him, and had the confidence of his brethren. He was admitted on trial in 1879 into the Northwest Texas Conference. He served the Dublin and Abilene Districts prior to the Division, and afterwards the Cleburne and Corsicana Districts. During the end of his first year on the Corsicana District, and while attending a conference at Hillsboro, he had a slight stroke which finally led to his retirement. He served Ennis, First Church in Hillsboro, and First Church in Temple. His son, Hubert C. Smith, is a member of our Conference, who himself has served the Conference with distinction.
- M. K. Little was admitted on trial in the Conference in 1879. He was a man of large frame, and possessed a fine spirit toward all. He knew much of the hardships of the northwest area of the conference, and did pioneer service for

the church. He was appointed to the Vernan District in 1890, which was composed of 51 caunties—everything north and west of Wichita Falls. Seventy-five percent of the people of that area lived in dugaut hauses. He was a good administrator, serving many of our best churches, and several districts. He died at the age of ninety years in 1942.

John M. Barcus was admitted to the Narthwest Texas Canference in 1882. He was the alder of faur brother preachers. He was presiding elder of the Vernan, Hillsbara, and Carsicana Districts, the latter twice. He served same of the autstanding churches of the conference. He was a great singer of Christian hymns, and passessed a sweet vaice. He was a stalwart supporter of Sauthwestern University, and appased vigarausly the mave ta transfer the University to Dallas. He was the first "M.A." graduate of the University. He was a delegate to six General Canferences, and served as the Canference Secretary for twenty-ane years, indicating his popularity. He died June 12, 1928, at the age of 67 years.

Hiram Abiff Boaz is a name, without which this history would be incomplete. He was barn in Kentucky in 1866, maved to Benbroak, Texas at the age of 14. He lived an a farm, restless far an education, he entered Sam Haustan Institute at Huntsville. Later he graduated fram Sauthwestern University, and jained the Narthwest Texas Canference in 1889. He served First Church, Fart Warth, at one time, and was president of Palytechnic Callege from 1902-1911 where, under his leadership six buildings were constructed, and he laid the faundatian far the present Texas Wesleyan Callege. He was the first man to express publicly that Texas Methodism should build a great University in North Texas, and in a thriving city. He and Dr. Robert S. Hyer jained in the campaign to establish Sauthern Methodist University. In 1918, the General Canference elected him Executive Secretary of the General Board of Church Extension where he served two years. He was called to the presidency of Southern Methodist University in 1920, succeeding Dr. Robert S. Hyer where he raised \$1,000,000 to liquidate the indebtedness of the University. He was elected a bishap in 1922, and appainted to the Orient for a period of several years. He clased his episcopal duties as the presiding bishap of the Central Texas Conference in 1938. While serving the Central Texas Conference, he was instrumental, with Dr. Charles H. Harris, in persuading the band-halders to sell the Haspital (last May 1937) to Dr. Chas. H. Harris, who afterwards returned the institution to the Conference. Bishop Booz signed a note for \$10,000 at a local bank to tide over the purchase of the Haspital. After his retirement in 1938, he affiliated himself with Southern Methodist University in the capacity of raising maney to support the budget of that institution. He organized for the University what is known taday as the Sustentation Fund, and presently the citizens af Dallas cantribute same \$500,000 annually to the University. He died in 1962 at the age of 96 years, and is buried in Dallas. He was a man of wham the conference can feel justly proud for his untiring services of his church.

- W. H. Matthews was admitted an trial in 1892. He was a real leader of the Canference during the prime of his ministry. He served many of the larger churches, and also several districts with distinction. He was the first Cammissianer of the Methodist (Harris) Haspital, and led in the first campaign for \$1,000,000, and built the shell of the main structure. He was laved by everyane throughout the Canference because of his brotherliness. He died in 1929 and is buried in Ft. Worth.
- O. F. Sensabaugh was best known, probably, for his administrative ability. He was admitted an trial in the Halstan Canference in 1878, but came to the Narthwest Texas Canference in 1894. He served in the Oklahama Canference for a shart time after he came to this conference, but returned in 1918 and remained until he retired in 1936. He served more districts than any other member of the Canference: Brawnwood, Waxahachie, Fort Worth, Cisca, and Cleburne; besides ane in Oklahama. He was a friend of young men, and led many to enter the ministry. He died March 19, 1956, and is buried in Dallas.

- A. D. Porter was admitted on trial in 1898. He was a very brotherly man, and a tireless worker as a minister. He was an unusually good preacher, and possessed administrative ability. He served as the Secretary of the Conference for twenty-four years. He was a delegate to five General Conferences. He served several districts and no doubt would have been appointed to the Fort Worth District in 1933, but for the change in the law that prevented any member succeeding himself on any district. He was considered the "Poet" of the conference. He died in the vigor of his ministry in 1938, and is buried in Fort Worth.
- Eugene B. Howk will be remembered for his leadership in the conference and in the field of education. He was admitted to the Northwest Texas Canference in 1909. He served the Polytechnic Church in Fort Worth, First Church in Temple, the Waxahachie District and came to First Church in Fort Worth, where he had a pastorate of six years. While the postor of that church, he led in the construction of the present beautiful cathedral church. In 1931, he transferred to Fourth Street Church in Louisville, Kentucky for two years. In 1933, at the urgent request af Dr. Chas. C. Selecman, President of Southern Methodist University, Dr. Hawk became Dean of the School of Theology. He transferred his membership back to the Central Texas Conference. As Dean of the School of Theology, he won the friendship and canfidence of several people of means who provided more than six million dollars for the construction of the Perkins School of Theology Quadrangle, which stands as a monument to his untiring services to the University. He died in his sleep, October 12, 1963 and is buried in Dallas. He was a good minister of Jesus Christ.
- **J. E. Crawford** needs to be included in this list because of his contribution to the financial and lay activities work of the church. He served several churches as pastor until 1919 when he became the Executive Secretary of Missions in the conference. In 1925, he was elected to be Associate Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities until his death in 1935. He is buried in Cisca.
- Frank P. Culver transferred to the Central Texas Conference in 1911, and became the President of Polytechnic College for one year. He then served as pastor of the Polytechnic Church, Austin Avenue in Waco, and First Church in Fort Worth. He also served the Waco, Cisco and Fort Worth Districts. He was a strong advocate of Union of the three branches of Methodism. He was a delegate to nine General Conferences. When the annual conference met in Corsicana, soon after he came to Texas, he was the Conference preacher, but he never finished the sermon—the emotional element in his own nature and that of many preachers in the conference was so great, many began to shout, that he stopped and asked for the benediction. He died June 26, 1949 and is buried in Fort Worth.
- **John W. Bergin** transferred into the Central Texas Conference in 1915, and was appointed to First Church in Temple. He also served First Church in Corsicana and in Fort Worth. He was the first preacher in Texas to use the radio as a means of reaching an unseen audience. He also served the Waxahachie, and Georgetown Districts, and the Waco District twice.

His chief contribution, however, was the saving of Southwestern University when it was in a debt crisis. He was elected President of that institution in 1935. At the end of seven years he was able to liquidate the debt of \$420,000. He built the C. C. Cody Library and the West Gymnasium, and left the institution on a cash basis with \$200,000 endowment.

Dr. Bergin was really a great preacher. As he started to the session of the Conference in Fort Worth in 1941, where he was to deliver the Fiftieth Anniversary sermon, he was stricken and soon thereafter died in Marlin, where he then lived. Services were conducted in Georgetown.

John Nelson Russell Score transferred into the Central Texas Conference in 1934 coming direct from the St. Paul Church in Houston where he had built that beautiful cathedral church. He became pastor af First Church, in Fort Worth

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for eight years. Then he was elected President of Southwestern University where he remained until his death in 1949.

Dr. Score made a tremendous impact on the church at large, and especially in his own conference. An editorial in the Fort Worth Star Telegram appraised him as follows: "A brilliant mind troined by an adequate education and varied experiences and an abiding faith gave him the resources for a fruitful career as a pastor, educator, administrator, and a good citizen." He was a member of the General and Jurisdictional Conferences six times. He was one of the editors of the first Book of Prayer issued by The Methodist Church. He was considered twice for the episcopacy, and at the Jurisdictional Conference at El Paso in 1940, he and Paul Quillian tied several times in the balloting without either ever breaking the tie. Finally, both men generously asked the conference to cease voting for them and Dana Dawson of Shreveport was elected the bishop. He and P. E. Riley were the prime movers in developing the Minimum Salary Program of the conference. His death in 1949 of a heart attack was most untimely for the Church.

Philip E. Riley is probably the most outstanding of the present retired ministers of this annual conference. He was admitted into the original Northwest Texas Canference in 1907, and the time of division remained in the new Northwest Texas Conference until in 1914, when he transferred to the Central Texas Conference where he continued to serve until his retirement in 1953. Probably, no man has had the confidence of the bishops and preachers as did Dr. Riley, Quiet and studiaus in his habits, he gave himself wholly to the work of the church. His judgment and counsel were always sought and well accepted. He served prominent churches, and the Waco and Fort Worth Districts. He was a delegate to eight General Conferences. He served for a period as Editor of the Texas Christian Advocate. He piloted the conference through the adoption of its first Reserve Pension Plan. He served for several years as the efficient Chairman of the Minimum Salary Support program. Presently, he lives with a daughter in Fort Worth

Ben Crow is included in this list of honored preachers because of his unique character. He was admitted into the Northwest Texas Conference in 1906. He was not blessed with an education, yet he had notive gifts that endeared him to his parishioners and his ministerial brethren. He served as the Conference Post Master for many years prior to his death in 1941. He and Mrs. Crow had thirteen children. When their oldest daughter was within a few weeks of graduation from Southern Methodist University, she died suddenly leaving a broken-hearted family and a host of friends. All of their children have made good. One son, Dr. Porter Crow, is presently a professor at Texas Christian University and an active member of First Methodist Church in Fort Worth.

- J. W. W. Shuler is listed in this history because of his length of life, being 103 years of age at the time of his death in 1963. He transferred to the Central Texas Conference in 1913 from the Holston Conference. His immediate family has produced ten ministers, chief of whom was R. P. (Bob) Shuler of Los Angeles, California. Dr. Shuler is buried in Hillsboro.
- **R. M. Studer** was an unusual local preacher, never a member of the Conference, yet serving as Supply Pastor for twelve years. He was ordained a local Deacon in 1923. He served several small churches in the Gatesville District which could not affard to pay a full-time pastor. During his ministry, five young men were called to the ministry, and one of whom is Hayden Edwards, presently the district superintendent of the Fort Worth West District. Brother Studer preached his last sermon just a few days prior to his death in 1948.

Bishops have come from the ranks of the membership of the Central Texas Conference. Central Texas has been honored in having in its membership at ane time or another these honored men, who were elevated to the episcopacy: E. D. Mauzon, H. A. Boaz, and Sam R. Hay. Bishop Boaz was a member of this conference at the time of his election as bishop.

General Board staff members have also come from the membership of the lentral Texas Conference. Their names and the general board with which the erved are listed: Sunday School Board: E. Rosemond Stanford and Emme lightower; Education: Horace W. Williams, B. F. Jackson, and B. J. Stiles; Lc Activities: J. Earl Crawford; Evangelism: Charles D. Whittle and John K. McKer Aissions: Milo L. Thornberry.

Other honored ministers should be listed, but space forbids the listing all such members of the Conference, though many of them have done yeoman ervice for the Kingdom and the Church. However, there are three more name which must be mentioned because of their definite service: Cullom H. Bootle, H. Stewart, and C. R. Wright. Many other members across the years have ad their unique ways of imposing humor and good feelings during the session of the Conference whose memories linger with all who knew them. No Conference ever had as its members men whose lives were more dedicated to the day of the conference. Many of the conference whose nedured hardships. Their salaries have been meaging heir porsonages poorly furnished, with children who needed to be educate and all on borderline budgets for the most part.

In closing this section of honored ministers, it should be noted that of thos who were members of the newly created Central Texas Conference in 1910, th ollowing are still living and members in good standing: Gid. J. Bryan, E. Rosemor itanford, H. D. Huddleston, Roy A. Langston, and C. E. Wilkins, P. E. Rile hould be included since he was a member of the old Northwest Texas Conference in the time of division, and in 1914 came back into the annual conference which is had first been admitted.

Laymen

Dr. Robert Stewart Hyer should have a place in this history for his contribution in the field of education. He came to Southwestern University as a Professor of Physics. When a vacancy in the Presidency occurred in 1898, he was chose he President. He was the first President of Southern Methodist University. Haid out the present campus for a great university, which plans have been carried to ver the past fifty years. His high intelligence and vision typed the schola hip of the university.

While he was a professor of Southwestern University, he developed theory of wireless telegraphy. He actually made it work by sending a messag rom the University to the Court House downtown in Georgetown, with the aid construction, when he was elevated to the presidency, he laid aside his new invertion, when he was upon the threshold of worldwide fame. It is said Dr. Hye ctually shed tears when it was announced that Marconi had given to the worl its wireless invention, thus snatching the high honor from Dr. Hyer. Howeve the stands out as a great scientist.

- **C. C. Cody,** probably as no teacher in our Methodism during the peria f his profession at Southwestern, touched so many lives. His name is engrave 1 many hearts of graduates.
- **W. Erskine Williams** should be listed among the laymen of the conference ecause of his leadership as the Conference Lay Leader for many years, an also for his contribution in the establishment of the Methodist Hospital (Harris) cort Worth. It was his single vote that determined the present location of the dospital.

Hubert Johnson probably is better known in the Conference and also th tate, than any other layman, because of his thirty-three years as Superintender of the Methodist Home at Waco. He came to that position from the superir endency of the public schools at Gatesville. He inherited a small campus with few buildings of various designs. He secured a landscape engineer and has the future campus laid out, and then set out to secure additional land and fin

friends who would provide the necessory buildings to house the children of the Home. His contribution to the Home has been outstanding, and he will alwoys be remembered by the monumental services he rendered to that institution. In all his labors he was obly assisted by his wife, Mrs. Reba Johnson.

- Mrs. George Peyton Hall has been o generaus benefactor of the Conference. She contributed generausly to Glen Lake Camp. Her chief contributions have been to Southern Methodist University. Peyton Hall for girls was named for her late husband, George L. Peyton. She provided the pipe organ for Perkins Chapel, endowed the Peyton Lectureship, and established several endowed scholorships for students of Perkins School of Theology. She has served as a trustee for Southern Methodist University for more than twenty-five years.
- O. C. (Otho Clifford) Armstrong is recognized os a leader of the Conference as of 1966. He is a member of First Church, Fort Worth, having served on its official board for more than 25 years, and was chairman of the building committee when Wesley Holl was constructed. He is a trustee of Texas Wesleyan College, Wesleyon Homes, Georgetown, and Horris Hospital, where he has served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees for many years. He and Mrs. Armstrong provided \$300,000 toward the construction of the Elizabeth Means Armstrong residence for young women on the Compus of Texas Wesleyan College. They have contributed generously toward the expansion fund of Horris Hospital, and many other Methodist projects. He served as State Chairman of the Texas Methodist College Association. He was honored in 1959 by the Exchange Club as being the outstanding citizen of Fort Worth in 1958. He and his wife have shored together in all of his activities, and have made their gifts as Good Stewards of God.
- **Dr. Law Sone** belongs to the roster of outstanding loymen. The son of on educator, he has given his life to teaching and administrative work. He come to Texos Wesleyon College as the Dean. In 1935, he was elected President, which position he has occupied to date. He inherited a debt of some \$244,000 against the college, but during his administration has liquidated the debt, and roised an endowment fund of \$3,416,063.
- Dr. Sone was the leoder in promoting the state-wide campaign for the five colleges and universities by securing contributions from the churches of \$1.00 per member for these institutions. Presently, he is the oldest, in terms of office, president of the institutions of higher education in Texos. He is recognized in Fort Worth as "Mr. Texas Wesleyan," and a leader in all civic enterprises for the city of Fort Worth. He has been a member of several General and Jurisdictional Conferences.





X-MISCELLANEOUS

STANDING RULES

I. Organization

1. Administrative Council

There shall be an Administrative Council of the Central Texas Conference, The Methadist Church, to initiate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference. The Council shall be the Executive Committee of the Conference. It shall meet within 30 days after the annual session and at such other times on coll af the Chairmon.

2. Membership

The Administrative Council shall be composed as follaws: the Cabinet, the Conference Cammissian on World Service and Finance, the Chairman and ane other person of each Conference Board and Commission one of whom shall be a lay person and the other a minister except where there is no authorized lay person and the Board or Cammission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each district to be nominated by the Cabinet, the Conference President and Vice-President of the Canference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Conference Youth Organization and ane ather young person, the Canference Secretary-Treasurer, Conference Statistician, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missians, the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, the Conference Chairman af the Texas Methodist College Association, all General and Jurisdictional Board members and General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates not otherwise holding membership on the Council, and such other members as may be nominated by the Executive Committee. All paid employees af the Conference, its agencies, and the chief officer of institutions shall have the privilege of the floar but without vote.

3. Officers

Officers of the Administrative Council shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary. They shall be elected at the first meeting of the Council in each quadrennium. The Chairman shall be elected by ballot without nominatian. Other afficers may be elected by show of hands. The officers shall serve throughout the quadrennium.

4. Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Administrative Council to be composed as fallows: the three officers of the Cauncil, the Bishop, the Area Executive Secretary, the Cabinet, the Chairmen of the Baards of Education, Missions, Evangelism, Christian Social Cancerns, Lay Activities, Hospitals and Homes, Pensians, the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

The minutes of all meetings of the Executive Committee shall be mailed to all members of the Administrative Cauncil within ten days after each meeting.

5. Area Executive Secretary

There shall be an Area Executive Secretary, to be selected and appointed in the same manner as the Discipline outlines for the appointments of a District Superintendent, that is, by the Bishop. The said Area Executive Secretary shall be appointed at the 1965 session of the Annual Conference. The term of affice shall be limited to eight years.

The Areo Executive Secretary will be responsible to the Bishop and to the Executive Committee of the Administrative Council. His duties in the Central Texas Conference shall be to initiate, to coordinate, and to implement the program of the conference in cooperation with the boards and agencies of the Conference. He shall be the Chairman of the Executive Secretaries in the Annual Conference and have general aversight over the Annual Conference program, with special responsibilities in the areas of Mission and of Evangelism.

After consultation with the Bishap of the areo, the portion of the Area Executive Secretary's budget for the Centrol Texas Conference shall be provided by the Commission on World Service and Finance, it being understand that the total amount from this Conference shall not exceed \$13,000 for the Conference year 1965-66.

A lioison committee composed of the Bishop, the Choirman of the Administrative Cauncil, and a member of the Cabinet, chosen by the Bishop, shall serve along with a like committee from the North Texas Conference as a coordinating policy committee of the area to work with the Area Executive Secretary.

II. Boards, Cammissians and Cammittees

6. Naminations

The District Superintendents at the beginning of the quadrennium shall naminate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Stonding Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no person may be nominated on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the sessian of the Annual Conference, except where the Discipline provides for membership because af on office held. This rule is not opplicable to the District and Associate District Lay Leaders, the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation. The District Superintendents shall also naminate at the end of any normal term members of any Board, Commission, or Committee.

All executive secretories of the Boords and agencies of the Annual Conference, beginning in 1965, shall be limited to a term of eight years.

7. Eligibility

"The periad of eligibility of membership on the Boords, Committees, and Commissions of the Annual Conference shall not exceed two consecutive quodrenniums, a total of eight years, except as set out below. When a person is elected to fill an unexpired term, he shall be given an expiration date for the end of the quadrennium that is not less than six years nor more than nine years in the future.

A member who has served two full quadrenniums on any Board, Commission, or Committee shall not be eligible for membership on the same Board, Commission, or Committee until a full quadrennium has passed. If a member has served less than two full quadrenniums, he shall be eligible again for membership ofter one full Conference Year has passed.

In appointing new Quadrennial Boards, Commissions, and Committees, the Cabinet shall have the power to appoint new members for only four years, in order to equalize the number who are eligible to serve four years with those eligible to serve eight years.

Nevertheless, the above shall not opply to membership on the Board of Lay Activities as it relates to the nomination of a Conference lay leader. A Conference Lay Leader is eligible for a term of no mare than eight consecutive years.

Employees and Trustees of institutions, or employees of Conference Baards and Commissions, shall not be eligible for membership on the Board, Commission, or Committee through which financial support is derived.

The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Super-intendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees to take effect at the time of his appointment, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission, or Committee. The Bishop is asked to notify such group in time to fill the vacancy before the Conference adjourns.

8. Vacancies

Vocancies on all Boards, Cammissions, and Committees occuring during the quadrennium shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Canference.

Retirement from the active itineracy shall vacate a minister's membership an any Canference Board or Commission and on all Institutional Boards, effective on the date such relationship is taken.

Boards, Commissions and Institutions related to the Annual Conference shall not take any action that in effect shall nullify this rule.

Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two consecutive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

III. Financial

9. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st, and salaries of clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

10. Remittances

Remittances fram a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance farms supplied by the Commission on Warld Service and Finance. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which remittance is made. The Conference Treasurer shall return one receipted form to the postor and one to the District Superintendent for each remittance. The Pastor shall enclose these voucher receipts with his Annual Conference report as verification of items reported in Table II.

11. Requests for Appropriations

At the beginning of the paragraph in the report of any board, commission, committee or ogency, which presents a proposed budget or asking as an appropriation from Conference Benevolences, or any other conference fund, there shall be printed the following statement: "The board (commission, committee, or agency) has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference, the fallowing askings:"

12. Apportionments

The apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be based an the total money raised (item 99 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness (item 51 in Report to Annual Conference) and less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 52 in the Report to Annual Conference.) It shall be the duty of the Com-

mission on World Service and Finance to compute the apportionments annually, using the statistics of the last published journal (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. District Superintendents will use the best possible approach in distributing the askings to the individual churches of the districts.

13. Annual Audit

The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

Annually, eoch Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, far any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed Conference Calendar unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit including current annual income and expense together with its report, to the appropriate Board.

14. Special Days and Campaigns

Any request from a Board or institution or special interest of the Methodist Church asking for a special campaign far funds or a Special Day Offering shall first be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and recommendation. If such recommendation is made to the Annual Conference it must show that the object or enterprise is wholly owned by The Methodist Church; that the detailed use of funds is reasonable; and that proper safeguards have been set up for the use of funds.

Any recommendation from a Board, Commission, or Cammittee, including the Commission on World Service and Finance, asking for an increase that will effect the Budget of the lacal church, if approved, shall not become effective for one year from that date.

IV. Administrative

15. Conference Secretary-Treasurer

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Commission on World Service and Finance after consulting with the Bishap and his Cabinet, the Board of Pensions, and the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be under the supervision of the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. He shall also serve as the Treasurer for the Board of Pensions and the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

The term of office of the Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily be a quadrennium and a newly elected Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily assume his official duties at the session following the General Conference.

16. District Conference

The District Conference shall be composed of the ex-officia members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate.

17. Reports

The reports of the postors to Annual Conference (Tables I and II) and

final payments to the Conference Treasurer for all connectional items shall be presented at a district meeting to be held within two weeks of the opening date of the Annual Conference. The Conference Statistician shall set the time and place for the district meetings, and shall appoint a District Statistician for each district, who shall receive, audit, and campile the pastors' statistical reports into the district report, and shall receive and forward the same day final remittances from the local churches to the Conference Treasurer. The District Statisticians shall forward the district statistical tables to the Canference Statisticion within one week after the district meeting. No change in the statistical tables will be made after the district meeting.

Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Cammittee on Proportianal Payments any church in the district that has barrowed maney to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, ar World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrawed must be made a part of the record.

He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attentian during the year, and had not been reported.

18. Conference Procedure

All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

All papers, resalutions, abituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary befare they are presented to the Conference.

All bonds required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

19. Conference Expense

The Conference Committee an Entertainment, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of retired ministers.

Each charge in the Annual Conference is expected to defray the expense of its minister and lay delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

Per diem allaxance will be granted pastors receiving a total salary of, or less than, the amount recommended year by year by the Committee on Conference Entertainment and approved by the Annual Conference.

20. Car Expense

For the quadrennium 1964-1968, all Boards, Commissions, and Committees, of the Conference shall allow six cents per mile car expense, or eight cents when two ar more members ride in the same car, for necessary travel within the Conference or adjacent territory. Five cents per mile shall be allowed for out of the state travel. Members of Conference Agencies ore urged to use car pools wherever possible.

21. Memoirs

There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs camposed of the Secretary af the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

22. Amendments

Any of the above rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference.
