DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Thursday Afternoon, September 15, 1966

Opening Worship—The Central Texas Conference met in called special session at First Methodist Church, Ft. Worth, Texas at 4:00 p.m., September 15, 1966, Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, presiding. He called the conference to order. The people stood to sing "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing," Hymn No. 1 in the new **Methodist Hymnal**, after which Bishop Pope led the prayer of invocation and the Lord's Prayer.

Call to Order—Bishop Pope called the conference to order, stating the purpose of this session, to take action on the pension program of the conference and to determine the plan of raising and allocating funds for the proposed Glen Lake Camp construction program.

Special Study Committee—Bishop Pope appointed a special committee to study the financial support of the District Superintendents and the method of distribution of all appartianments to districts and local churches. The committee is to report to the World Service and Finance Commission. Members of the committee are C. C. Sessians, Chairman of the Administrative Council, Raymond Burton, Representative of the World Service and Finance Commission, W. V. Bane, Cabinet Representative, Marris Walker, Board of Lay Activities Representative, Sidney Roberts, a pastor. Wayne Reynolds was appointed convener of the committee.

Pension Program—Homer S. Cax, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, presented W. H. Sindt, a lay member of the board, who spoke to the conference. He then read a resolution from the Conference Board of Pensions. He moved the adoption of the resolution. The motion was seconded. (See Reports)

W. H. Sindt presented Dr. Claire Hoyt of the General Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church. Dr. Hoyt addressed the conference.

Urban A. Schulze spoke to the conference, offering a motion that the vote on the resolution be by secret ballot. The motion was passed.

An amendment to paragraph 1 of the resolution, as printed in the 1966 Annual Journal of the Central Texas Conference, was proposed. The sentence near the end of the paragraph would then read as follows: "At same time during that ten-year period the Annual Conference shall adopt the Full Transition plan, an extension of the New Entrant plan or such other plan or alternate plans as may be presented for an additional period of years." The amendment was defeated.

The ballot was then taken, and the tellers retired to count the ballot.

Roll Call—Roll cards, which had been distributed at the entrance to the conference room, were collected.

Resolution—Floyd Johnson presented a resolution that the Conference Board of Pensions be authorized to pay to the Retired Ministers of the conference a pension based on the sum of \$65.00 per service year. The motion was made and seconded. (See Reports)

The motion was made and seconded that this motion be tabled. The motion carried.

Ballot—The results of the ballot on the Board of Pensions proposal were read. 313 votes were cast; 149 for, 164 against. Bishop Pope announced the vote and declared that the resolution failed to carry.

Glen Lake Development Fund—Raymond Burton, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, presented Report No. 1 to the Special Session of the Annual Conference and moved its adoption.

Floyd E. Johnson moved that we rescind the action of the conference of June 1966 which adopted section (3) b. of Report No. 4 of the Board of Education concerning the funding of the Glen Lake project. The motion carried.


J. W. Sprinkle, Cabinet Secretary, offered a substitute motion. (See Reports)

Announcements—Wayne Reynolds called a meeting of the committee to study the salaries of District Superintendents in the Central Texas Conference to meet immediately upon adjournment of the conference.

Adjournment—Bishop Pope asked W. W. Ward to pronounce the benediction. After the benediction the conference was adjourned.

CABINET RECOMMENDATION**(Adopted September 15, 1966)**

The World Service and Finance Commission has offered the Central Texas Conference conscientious guidance in the temporal administration of the Church. We are appreciative of their stewardship of office and the brotherly manner in which they have handled the many difficult questions that have come before the commission. We are not attempting to dictate policy, but as the Cabinet we ask for reconsideration on a matter of extreme importance to our Conference.

It is our feeling that the Conference Special was conceived as a means of undergirding and financing Conference projects that were demanding attention and did not have adequate financial support from the normal funds. Through the years this fund has been a real help to many worthwhile causes approved by the Conference.

The Cabinet feels that the Glen Lake Improvement Program, approved by the last session of the Central Texas Conference, falls into the above category. In an endeavor to fulfill the financial obligations that have been approved, we recommend the following procedure and ask the concurrence of this Annual Conference that the World Service & Finance Commission might know the thinking of this body, as well as that of the Cabinet:

1. The Conference Special be continued as a significant part of our basic financial program for the foreseeable future at relatively the same amount that the Conference has assumed the past few years. This figure has been \$65,000.

2. For the next six (6) years \$40,000 should be allocated for the Capital Improvement Program of Glen Lake Camp and continued until \$240,000 has been raised. Should the Improvement Program cost less the Conference Board of Education should so inform the World Service and Finance Commission and only the needed funds be distributed.

3. The remaining portion of the Conference Special will be adequate to cover the tentative commitment of \$25,000 to the Wesley Foundation Building Program at Arlington State University over a period of years and the funds to be allocated to the Trustees of Retired Ministers Homes. In addition, some \$10,000 each year would be available for other worthwhile causes that may be presented to and adopted by the Annual Conference.

We feel that this procedure would be received with eagerness on the part of every Official Board and assure the success of these and other causes that are worthy of our best effort.

Your Cabinet submits this resolution and asks for the concurrence of the Conference and the sincere consideration of the World Service & Finance Commission.

AND WHEREAS the Central Texas Conference is considerably below other Methodist Conferences of Texas in per service year payments to Conference Claimants.

AND WHEREAS this session of the Central Texas Conference has been called for the specific purpose of considering the cause of pensions in the Central Texas Conference.

THEREFORE be it resolved, by favorable vote of the Conference, that the Board of Pensions, Central Texas Conference, be directed to pay to Conference Claimants for the Conference Year 1966-1967 the amount of \$65.00 per service year.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL**Report No. 2****Proposal to the Central Texas Conference:****(Adopted June 5, 1967)**

Texas Wesleyan College wishes to take this opportunity to express her gratitude to the Central Texas Conference for its magnificent leadership on behalf of the Methodist colleges of this state. The results of these efforts have benefited T.W.C. materially and continue to make it possible to present quality higher education in the atmosphere of Christian responsibility.

T.W.C. wishes now to point out a present trend in denominational administration which we consider desirable and also to express our willingness to cooperate with our conference in this regard.

We would ask the conference to consider the possibility of a Central Texas Conference Methodist Headquarters Building on the campus of Texas Wesleyan College. Such a center could place in one central location the offices of our conference secretary-treasurer, conference educational officers, our social concerns, missions and evangelism interests, our visual-aids facilities and resources, possibly offices for the Fort Worth District Superintendents, or any combination of these mentioned. Such a building might appropriately house the valuable and irreplaceable documents and accumulated materials of our conference historical society.

We offer the following items as evidence that a study of this possibility would be desirable:

1. The Southwest Texas Conference has such a Headquarters Building in San Antonio; The Texas Conference has such provisions in Houston in their newly constructed Methodist Headquarters Building.

2. Several conferences have found the college campus an ideal location for such a center, as evidenced by the Louisiana Conference offices located on the Centenary College campus.

3. Many of our student pastors attend classes on the campus of T.W.C. The availability of resources — in conference personnel leadership and in program materials and aids — would be of large advantage to these young men in adequately serving their churches.

4. Texas Wesleyan College is located in Fort Worth which is the largest population center of the conference.

5. Fort Worth has been the seat of the annual conference for many years with few exceptions.

6. There already has been an ever increasing recognition of the convenience of the T.W.C. campus for conference-wide meetings, as evidenced by the annual meetings of the youth Annual Conference and other numerous meetings of conference committees.

Believing the possibility of such a center is worthy of this Conference's attention and investigation, we use this opportunity to offer the ground for such a building, on or adjacent to the Texas Wesleyan Campus, at a location suitable to the conference.

We would welcome an opportunity of conferring with any group appointed to look into the advisability of this project, should the conference wish to explore this possibility.

The Administrative Council goes on record expressing appreciation to Dr. Law Sone and Texas Wesleyan College for their sincere interest in the future plans for a Conference Center and their offer to give a site for the same.

We would suggest that a Planning Committee for a Conference Headquarters be appointed at the 1967 session of the Central Texas Conference to give consideration to this offer and any other proposal that might be forthcoming.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

Report No. 3

(Adopted June 5, 1967)

The Administrative Council and its Executive Committee have sought to be a clearing house, a sounding board and a unifying structure for the work of our Central Texas Conference. We have made strides forward in coordinating our work and planning together as a team. We are grateful to Bishop W. Kenneth Pope and Dr. Leighton Farrell for their wise council and helpful suggestions.

In this exciting world of the 20th century we should be alert to the changing problems and circumstances that involve us all. In the second place we must make available all the resources of God, which are more than enough when dedicated to his purposes. Thirdly, we should seek to produce more and better ministerial leadership and use it more effectively in special appointments as well as routine assignments. For our church to be relevant in our day it must be willing to restructure itself to meet constantly changing cultural patterns. Its ministry must be open and pliable enough to be used wherever the need to serve people is the greatest.

In the area of ministerial recruitment and training our Conference continues to move ahead. Financially our giving shows an increase of one-third over last year for the Ministerial Education Fund. For the first time in several years there is an upturn in pre-enrollment at our seminaries. This has been no accident. One very vital factor in this changing picture is the able leadership of Bishop Pope. The Bishop's Conference on the Ministry held at Arlington this year revealed an attendance of 88 young men interested in the outreach of the Methodist ministry. Since the laity have accepted the challenge of producing a better trained ministry, our sons are also responding to the need. In seeing our sincerity of purpose they will give an ever increasing consideration to entering the Methodist ministry.

To reassure our young men of our honesty and faithfulness to their ministry we will have a chance to tell them we are with them to the end by putting into operation the New Entrants Pension Program. This will be a reasonable and dependable way for this Conference to say to the young men this year and to those in years to come, we are providing for you a pension when retirement time rolls around.

With the united action of the Commissions on Missions and Christian Social Concerns in local churches throughout the conference the study on "Affluence and Poverty" has produced many outgrowths. From this study, along with many other cries for help from needy and neglected people, has come the projection of our Inner-City Ministry, starting in this new Conference year 1967-68, in both Fort Worth and Waco. All of the related agencies of the General Church and the Conference, as well as the Metropolitan Boards are sharing in this thrust forward in the interest of human need. The recently acquired property for the extension of the work of the Bethlehem Center in Fort Worth is another expression of concern for people where they are.

With these guidelines clearly before us, coming out of many hours of study, discussion and reflection, we are confident this Conference will implement these purposes and plans with wholehearted acceptance and support.

Underlying this year's thrust in education and action is the searching question, "What is the role of the Church in developing social values?" In harmony with this question, we recommend the Joint Mission Study, "Ecumenicity" for every local Church. In support of this, we suggest attendance at the Conference School of Christian Missions, sponsored by the Conference Board of Missions.

Office of Director of Education and Christian Social Concerns

The Board has been pleased by the work of the new Director of Christian Education and Social Concerns and gives full support to the continuance of the office. We commend Gordon Dennis for his work and leadership in this new Office.

Special Days and Causes

We encourage all churches to observe all the Special Days and causes as recommended by our Annual Conference and outlined in The Methodist Story. We suggest that the churches follow the dates on the Conference Calendar for Special Days listed on the back of the Journal. Those Special Days are: World Order Sunday, October 22nd, with emphasis on the United Nations Week, October 22-28; World Temperance Sunday or Commitment Day on October 15th or November 12th, the first being recommended by our Conference Calendar, the latter recommended by the General Board; Race Relations Sunday, February 11, with an offering for Huston-Tillotson College.

Briefing Conference

We recommend that each local Church seek to send their Choirmon, or at least one representative member of the local Commission, to the Regional Briefing Conference at Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas, July 21-23, 1967.

Report No. 2

Alcohol Problems And General Welfare

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

A. The section of report on Alcohol Problems deals mainly with our continuing efforts against the passage of legislation of what we consider unhealthy legislation pertaining to alcoholic beverage.

Your Division Choirmon, H. Don Hitt, joined the united efforts of the legislative committee of TANE in their factual presentation before the House Committee on Revenue and Taxation in Austin. The legislative committee of TANE was led by the Reverend Mr. Iro Galloway, the Pastor of Walnut Hills Methodist Church of Dallas.

We acknowledge with special appreciation the stand taken by our Methodist Bishops of Texas on the Liquor By The Drink issue and the Gambling issues. We appreciate the support we have received from the Conference Secretary of Education and Social Concerns' Office and all the District Secretaries.

We urge your continued support and interest in all phases of alcohol problems. Each pastor and local church commission could well spend some time in acquainting themselves with the alcoholic rehabilitation programs which are available in their vicinities. We urge you to do so. There is an ever increasing need for alcohol education among our youth. With this in mind, we urge those responsible for planning Youth Activities Weeks to plan at least one session on the subject of alcohol. We hope every church will observe Commitment Day in October or November.

B. Work in the area of General Welfare this year has been wide and varied. We have sought to gain some understanding of the government poverty programs and especially "operation headstart." We feel that each local church commission should spend some time in studying the new Social Security changes and the Medicare programs.

There are numerous activities and programs that can be carried out among the aged and less fortunate in every community.

One of the most pressing problems we have had is the combating of the proposed legislation to legalize pari-mutual gambling in Texas. We feel this legislation is not only immoral but highly discriminatory as well.

Many of our urban and more metropolitan areas are becoming increasingly concerned about the sharp increases in juvenile delinquency problems. We believe the church has a social responsibility and ministry here. We urge discussions between parents and youth, perhaps arranged by local church Commissioners on Social Concerns.

Other ministries which challenge our ingenuity and deepest concerns are in the fields of mental health problems, criminal rehabilitation, birth control and planned parenthood needs. We cannot say to you that we should be doing certain things in these vital areas of need but we urge you to use the talents and imagination which each local church has at its command.

C. We commend the program of Texas Alcohol-Narcotic Education, and especially its efforts through the TANE Seminar held each year at Baylor University in Waco. We urge your continued financial and prayerful support of this group.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Report No. 3

Human Relations and Economic Affairs

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

1. We cannot be faithful to Jesus Christ our Lord nor to the Wesleyan tradition if we are less than an inclusive church. Therefore, we lift before the congregations and institutions of our conference these guidelines:

a. The General Conference has said unequivocally that no one is to be denied attendance at worship or membership in a Methodist Church on the basis of race. We believe this is a mandate not only of the General Conference, but of the New Testament. But token integration is an accomplishment with which we cannot be content. We aim at an inclusiveness that seeks, welcomes, and involves in concerned fellowship men of all races, so that in our interior life as a church we may witness to our oneness in Christ.

b. We call upon every institution related to our Annual Conference to bring its policies fully into line with the clear teaching of the New Testament and the official pronouncements of The Methodist Church. No policy of racial discrimination is any longer tenable.

c. We recommend to our churches a forthright involvement in the move of minority groups toward full citizenship rights. We rejoice in the progress toward complete public school desegregation, equality of job opportunity and remuneration, and the guarantee of the right to vote. Now let our churches lead courageously to insure a citizen's right to purchase property and live where he chooses.

2. We cannot be faithful to Jesus Christ our Lord nor to the Wesleyan tradition if we ignore areas of acute human need and accept less than the whole world as our parish. Therefore:

a. We rejoice in the greatly extended work of Bethlehem Center and Wesley Community House in Fort Worth, in the prospect of the projection and development of inner city ministries in Waco and Fort Worth, and in the proposal which would create the office of Director of Urban Planning for our conference. We believe we should utilize our connectional strength in a total urban mission, and pledge the concern and resources of this board toward such mission.

b. Let us continue an unrelenting focus on poverty, which has special claim upon the church whose Lord described his mission as a calling to "preach the good news to the poor . . . to set the down-trodden at liberty." The causes and circumstances of poverty are complex. To understand them demands open, uninhibited and extended inquiry; to rectify them will require the combined powers and ingenuity of government, church, organized charity, business and labor. The 1966-67 study of affluence and poverty proved to be a useful vehicle for sensitizing our people to the need. Let us now look for specific points of engagement; e.g., tutoring programs, community organization, head-start kindergartens, employment aid, and other practical roles as the servant people of God.

c. Because we can only foresee an acceleration of social and technological change and an intensification of emotional stress, we plead with our churches to be specially alert and lovingly responsive to the mentally ill, the alcoholic, the addict, the errant youth, the single parent, the aged, and others upon whom pressures are particularly erosive.

3. "What is the role of the church in developing social values?" This is the theme-question for the last year of the 1964-68 quadrennium. We urge the congregations of our conference to grapple with this question in forum and discussion. Even a cursory glance at the materials available will dispel the idea that the subject is nebulous. It has to do with the rapid disintegration of old value systems and our floundering after new ones, and it affects our lives directly, daily and intensely.

Report No. 4

Peace and World Order

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

The Central Texas Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns sponsored a United Nations Seminar in October, 1966. Twenty-four persons from this Conference attended the Seminar that was directed by the Reverend Heacock of the Division of Peace and World Order, General Board of Christian Social Concerns.

Participants found the Seminar to be informative and stimulating. Many of the participants have made presentations throughout the Central Texas Conference informing members of the work in the United Nations. It is the consensus of the group that although the United Nations faces great problems, it is a necessity in today's world.

Allan Brackway, Editor of **CONCERN** magazine has written about the U. S. involvement in the 1966 U. N. General Assembly: "The Methodist Church believes strongly in the peaceful settlement of disputes, in peace-keeping, and in disarmament. On these issues the United States voted with the angels. It reached an agreement with the Soviet Union on the peaceful uses of outer space,

embodying the most important arms control measures since the Partial Test Ban Treaty of 1963. The Treaty was endorsed unanimously by the Assembly.

Expressing the conviction that non-proliferation of nuclear weapons was an urgent need, the United States urged the Eighteen-Nation Committee on Disarmament at Geneva to adopt a treaty that would give non-nuclear states acceptable guarantees and provide for the reduction of nuclear weapons now possessed by nuclear powers. Since the U.S. is one of the eighteen nations, in voting for this measure it was speaking of itself. The vote was 110 for, 1 against and 1 abstaining.

Another resolution, supported by the United States, called upon all states not only to adhere to the provisions of the Partial Test Ban Treaty but to suspend nuclear tests in all environments. The Geneva Committee was urged to arrange a treaty banning underground tests. The vote on this was 100 for, 1 against, and 2 abstaining.

It must be said that the Methodist Church is at work in every possible way to help find a solution to the Vietnam War. Every church member has a part in finding this solution since peace actually begins with the individual. What can we do? "(a) Declare that war is contrary to the will of God and a betrayal of the way of Jesus; (b) be ready and eager to take calculated risks for peace; (c) be as diligent and sacrificial in the pursuit of peace as the nations have been in the prosecution of war."

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS**Report No. 1****(Adopted June 6, 1967)**

The **Discipline** of the Methodist Church issues a Mandate to the Annual Conference Commission on Christian Vocations when it charges that it shall "promote among youth and adults a philosophy of Christian vocation that recognizes the potential Sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian life service." Thus, the mandate is two-fold; to challenge every person to view his work as a Christian calling, and to instill in our people a sense of that special call of God to full-time Christian service which results in life service commitments to church related occupations.

Your Commission on Christian Vocations has taken seriously its two-fold responsibility as it has offered positive programs toward the fulfillment of both areas in its charge. The Vocational Intern program, offering trainee placement in nursing, the local church ministry, and institutional services, has been an effective tool for the challenging of high school and college youth who are considering career opportunities in these areas. The Conference on Christian Vocations, held at Glen Lake, offers a broad spectrum of vocational opportunities as it points up the call of God on every man in his life work. The Commission oversees the work of all district directors and committees, and offers its guidance and counsel to each in order for this important work to be promoted in each district and local church. District Superintendents are offered access to the commission's complete file on those in our conference committed to full time Christian service who are not yet under the auspices of the Board of Ministerial Training.

We recognize the tremendous need that exists in the area of recruitment to church-related occupations. We urge every pastor, every local church committee, district superintendents, and district directors, to develop creative programs of challenging and inspiring gifted persons with the opportunities of real service through these occupations. If we are committed to this task, many will come to hear and know the imperative of service, who, without our counsel, would never have recognized this concern as a field for their personal life-fulfillment. As pastors and laymen, we can clarify the issues before our young people, that the clear call of God may be heard within the discordant noises of daily circumstance.

It is our hope that each local church will elect an active committee on Christian Vocations and provide training for that committee to do its work. Every District Superintendent should appoint a District Secretary of Christian Vocations to facilitate this work in this district. Finally, every pastor can so orient his life and work that the call of God may, through him, be clarified and defined by those in his charge.

The fruits of our faithfulness in this essential area of our concern, will be evidenced in a vigorous and renewed spirit in the church in the years ahead.

BOARD OF EDUCATION**Report No. 1****General Church School****(Adopted June 7, 1967)**

Any church that is not aware of the changes and upheavals occurring in Christian Education will find itself unable to meet the demands of the people it is seeking to serve. Pastors, teachers, laymen of all sorts are in for a shocking experience unless they are working to be adequately prepared for the New Day in Christian Education.

The Central Texas Conference is blessed with leadership which is aware of what is taking place. Our leaders, particularly N. P. Stephenson, have been working with tools available to reach adult workers with an understanding of the demands that will be placed upon them.

These items are evident:

1. The Methodist Church is working with fervor and with prayer to present materials in keeping with biblical study in depth, present day understanding of theology, and a practical application of the gospel to present day man.
2. The Methodist Church has placed adequate leadership at our disposal on a scale that is applied to general meetings as well as local church leadership.
3. The new adult curriculum is now upon us. Any church that is not now adequately prepared will have to go through a necessary adjustment to receive the materials and use them to the best advantage.

Continued approval comes from the use of the Children's Division material which was introduced almost three years ago. And, anticipation continues high over the use of Youth Division materials to be introduced in 1968.

While there will be some rather severe adjustments in most Church School adult classes over method, ways, and content of teaching and pupil materials it is hoped that each pastor and teacher will use prayerful patience in putting them to the best use. There is strong confidence that an up-dated experience in Christian Education will come if new ways of study and teaching are employed with sincerity.

Tom Voss, who has served as Superintendent of the Camp since 1956, has assumed responsibility as Superintendent for the Northwest Texas Conference Camp, and has gone with our blessing and with our appreciation for eleven years of dedicated service. Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Gann, of Fort Worth, have been selected to replace Mr. and Mrs. Voss. They come with highest recommendations.

Total attendance at Glen Lake has been down slightly this year. Attendance figures fluctuate slightly from year to year, however the number is negligible, and thus is not a cause for concern.

The use of Rainbow Camp as compared to previous years showed a surprising increase. Float Trip Camping has proved to be attractive and beneficial. An increased program at Rainbow will be in operation this summer, and it is the committee's feeling that the program there should be kept geared to the demand.

With an increase of cost-of-living on a nation-wide scale, the cost of operating the camp has increased to the point that we find it necessary to raise the price for the use of the camp.

A comparative study of camping in the various conferences of the Jurisdiction has been made by Reverend Gordon Dennis.

Committee on Family Life

The Family Life Committee of the Central Texas Conference Board of Education has many important facets of operation. In this age we are aware that the family must be responsible in the Church Community and in the World. Responsible participation in the Christian faith and life begins in our families. Therefore we are a separate committee of the Board of Education, but we are not to believe that this is the only work in the church that includes families. We believe that the church as a community of faith is composed of Christian families.

National Conferences: This conference year was the year of National Conferences. The Chairman of the Committee attended a two-week seminar at St. Paul School of Theology in Kansas City, Missouri, last summer. This seminar was for all conference committee chairmen west of the Mississippi River, and was conducted by the auspices of the General Committee on Family Life of the General Board of Education.

In October nine delegates from the Central Texas Conference attended the National Conference on Family Life at Chicago, Illinois. This quadrennial conference had as its theme, "The Responsible Christian Family: In the Home, Church, Community and World." It was led by outstanding people from all over the world. Each Annual Conference was admonished to filter the inspiration of the national conference back into each area and Annual Conference. Representatives from our conference (beside the chairman) were: Mr. and Mrs. Billy Laughlin of First Church, Waco; Mr. and Mrs. Paul Damanavsky from First Church, Arlington; Mr. and Mrs. Charles Martin and Mr. and Mrs. Jahn Marrow, both of St. Mark Church in Cleburne.

Conference Family Camp: Officers and planning committee for this year's camp are: Mr. and Mrs. David Harkrider, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Ruscoe, Mr. and Mrs. Byron Miller, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Damanavsky, and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Steinert. The dates for this camp are September 2, 3 and 4.

Conference Participation: The delegates to the National Conference and the officers of the Family Camp met jointly this spring to outline larger conference participation in programs of Family Life and local churches and districts, as well as the Labor Day Weekend Camp. Some of the recommendations were:

1. A District Director of Family Life in each district.
2. A re-organization of the Family Life Committee through the Commission on Education in each church.
3. Family courses to be taught in each District Training School.
4. Wider use of the existing materials published by our church to enable our people to have a better family life. Some materials are: MATURE YEARS, THE CHRISTIAN HOME, and special Thanksgiving, Christmas and Lenten worship and devotional guides.
5. Encouragement should be given to Pastors to work more closely with the Area Counselor and then in turn guide the families in his care in a more stable Christian Family Life.
6. Suggest that each District select a family to promote the Family Camp in that District.
7. Realize that many of the programs already in existence are in reality geared to separate the family from each other and seek ways to make the church not an alienating force but a uniting force.

General Statements: We must re-examine our relationship in the home which is the setting for the formation of an authentic Christian style of life. We must help parents provide in the family a free forum for the exploration of moral and spiritual values that encourage the curious inquiries of young minds to explore the values of the good life in the Christian context. Good books on family life must be made more readily available in every church library. Study experience on courtship and marriage, the "new morality," freedom and responsibility, sex and the whole person must be provided for our youth. Communications between teen-agers and parents must be strengthened.

It is our task to relate our families to our families in trouble, those who live in sub-standard situations in our communities and even in the world. We know that what hurts families in one part of the world, hurts all of us. Families are called to fulfill their Christian destiny in God's new age.

Your conference committee offers no cure-all nor magic programs. It simply stands ready to assist the conference, districts and the local churches to strengthen families wherever they are. It is only when the family is right that the world becomes right.

Committee on Higher Education

The following excerpts are taken from Chapters I and VII of the summary report entitled, "The Campus Ministry of The Methodist Church." This report is the result of a three-year study authorization by the Board of Education. Research was directed by the Reverend Samuel N. Gibson, now director of the Wesley Foundation of Greater Pittsburgh. It was submitted to the recent annual meeting of the Board of Education by Bishop James K. Mathews, Chairman of the Committee on Consultation which was appointed to direct the study.

The Wesley Foundation is not an "arm," not an "agency," of the Church. It is **the Church** of independent and state colleges and universities. It must be considered the equivalent of the local parish and, like all local parishes, engages in the connective mission of The Methodist Church. It is **the Church** serving a distinctive task in the academic community.

This understanding of the campus ministry must be affirmed in the beginning; for in our study the nature of the Church has been revealed as the central issue facing The Methodist Church in the university community. An inadequate understanding of the doctrine of the Church lies at the heart of Methodism's failure to realize its full potentialities in the community of higher learning. It feeds the fires of misunderstanding and tension between local churches and the campus ministry. It inhibits the Church's efforts to see its task as one, uniting the student's home church, the near-campus congregation, the campus ministry, and conference and general agencies in mission to the university campus. An insufficient concept of the Church often prevents our acting in concert with other Christian bodies. It blocks the clear vision of our purpose, which is to serve not just Methodist students but the whole university community.

To serve the total university community, the Methodist Church must approach the campus as servant of the whole Gospel of Christ which wills to reconcile, discipline, and unite all groups that bear the Christian name for united effort. The Methodist Church is committed to the ecumenical ministry upon the university campus.

The Methodist Church is a member communion of the Church Universal. It will find its true destiny in the university community when, freed by Christ from anxious self-concern, it participates in the risks, the hardships, the triumphs and the joys of an ecumenical ministry. If the Methodist Church does its job well, it will find itself increasingly engaged in cooperative ministries; for it, like other denominations, will find an ever growing percentage of its members on college and university campuses. Here the sectarian approaches of the past will not work.

During this conference year the Committee on Higher Education has been primarily concerned with the continuation of efforts for all churches to reach

the conference goal of \$1.50 per member for the Texas Methodist College Association and 60c per member for Wesley Foundations.

Most churches have moved near the goals and our conference has the best record of per-capita support for these two causes among all the conferences of the state.

While most churches are endeavoring to reach the per-capita goals, our conference is not supporting the work of campus ministers and the work of our Methodist Church-related colleges and universities as it should. No Wesley Foundation received more than 90% of its conference allocation this year! While Central Texas Conference leads the state in Texas Methodist College Association per-capita support, we are still shy of the \$1.50 per member goal. The Committee feels we should and we will continue toward these objectives.

This year, in addition to the regular conference approved program of support, the committee has developed a "Wills and Bequests" folder to encourage support of Texas Wesleyan College and Southwestern University. This attractive file-piece has been mailed to more than 150 attorneys and others who might have occasion to help persons formulate their wills. A bulletin insert encouraging the remembering of these institutions was sent in quantity to every pastor in the conference, also.

We also recommend that a more satisfactory arrangement be made for paying the Wesley Foundation budget at a regular scheduled time.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM**Report No. 1**

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

This is the Year of Preaching Evangelism. That we may become effective Evangelists, Sunday by Sunday, of the Good News that Jesus Christ is Lord and Savior, let us pray daily that we shall receive the power of the Holy Spirit.

The Board feels very strongly that every pastor and every church will benefit from the impact of a Conference wide program in this year of preaching evangelism. To this end we submit the following schedule of activities:

1.) **Workshop for District Secretaries of Evangelism**, Tuesday, June 20, 9:30 A.M. to 3:00 P.M. at First Methodist Church, Fort Worth.

2.) **October — Lay Witness month!** Witnessing through Prayer — Visitation and Lay Preaching. Let every pastor plan with his Membership and Evangelism Commission in September for October to be for every layman a special time of personal witness. Materials for guidance in preparing for this lay-witness mission will be available through the office of the Conference Director of Evangelism. Every District Secretary of Evangelism will be thoroughly briefed on the availability and use of all resource materials.

3.) **Ministers Spiritual Life Retreat**, January 11-12, 1968 at Glen Lake Camp. Register, Thursday, January 11, 10:00 A.M. until 12:00 noon. The program with outstanding leaders for inspiration and spiritual renewal, from noon Thursday through noon Friday, January 12th.

4.) **Laymens Spiritual Life Retreat**, January 13, 1968. This is on Saturday at Glen Lake from 9:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. The same resource people from the Ministers Retreat will provide the leadership for the Laymens Retreat.

5.) **Simultaneous Revivals — March 1968**

March 3-8, 1968: Brownwood, Temple, Waco and Waxahachie Districts.

March 17-22, 1968: Cisco, Cleburne, Fort Worth East and Fort Worth West Districts. Each Church is to select its own Evangelist and make all of its own arrangements. If a Church is unable to find an Evangelist, that Church is urged to seek help from the Cabinet.

Following these periods of simultaneous missions, we urge an intensive **period of cultivation and assimilation**. HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

We have a good policy with a good company and this is reassuring to the 182 participating ministers and their families. The need for and the benefit of our Central Texas Methodist Conference plan of Group Hospitalization Insurance may be seen clearly by the latest annual statistics of our Group, October 1, 1965 to September 30, 1966: Total Premiums we paid to MLCU, \$34,100.00; Total Claims MLCU paid to us, \$36,000.00. We regret to have illnesses and accidents, but how helpful to have insurance coverage.

Our insuring agency is Ministers Life and Casualty Union, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55416. We are completing ten years of happy relationship with them. Our Group plan is available to **all fulltime ministers**, both conference members and supply pastors, who serve within the bounds of the conference. (While this plan is not open to student pastors, MLCU has special policies with lower rates for the student years.)

The committee urges each qualifying minister to make careful study of the benefits of the Conference Group. We invite each one to enroll. Some examples will indicate the extent of our **Protector Policy**: \$15.00 per day on Hospital Room, 80% of certain other items while hospitalized, 80% of Out-patient emergency accident treatment, up to 36 months disability income at \$150.00 per month and up to \$3,000.00 maximum hospital benefit per person per case. We may keep these benefits, but effective July 1, 1967 the increase in premium rates will change from \$22.00 to \$23.50 for a single male, Quarterly; the family rate from \$47.50 to \$51.25, Quarterly. (See Report No. 2 for comparison of this coverage and increased premium with the \$10,000.00 major medical and the premium rate to reach that stronger plan.)

It is important that each minister in our Central Texas Conference understand that while we have a Group Hospitalization Insurance plan, each in-

dividual minister must act for himself. By his action to join the voluntary Group he helps to create the percentage of Eligibles necessary to keep the doors open for all "newly eligible" fulltime ministers to be received into the Group on a non-medical basis simply by registration and payment of the first Quarterly Premium, providing he does this within the 90-day limit required by MLCU and agreed upon by our Annual Conference. It is especially needful for each of us to remind every new minister of this opportunity. A few guidelines include these:

1. Each minister who receives an appointment for fulltime work within the bounds of the annual conference, whether an approved supply pastor, an trial, or in full connection, has a limit of 90 days from the date of said appointment to apply for membership in this hospitalization program without any restrictions, without the necessity of providing a certification of insurability, and without any questions or limitations of previous health conditions.

2. Each eligible minister who waits 91 days or more to make application for the Group Insurance may join by filling out the "long form" and by furnishing evidence of insurability satisfactory to MLCU.

3. Any minister who marries subsequent to becoming a participating member of the Conference Group may enroll his wife in the program without limitations or restrictions, provided he makes written application within 60 days after his marriage. One who waits 61 days or more after marriage to enroll his wife may do so by filling out the "long form" and meeting actuarial standards of MLCU.

4. Any minister who allows his policy to lapse through failure to pay the quarterly premium within one month after the due date, may reinstate his policy by paying the current quarterly premium and by furnishing an acceptable certificate of insurability, provided he does so within one year after the lapse of the policy.

5. Any minister who leaves our group by transfer or other reason, who continues in fulltime religious work, need not lose his insurance protection. He may make application to MLCU for individual coverage with the same benefits and no evidence of insurability is required if continuous insurance is desired.

6. Our agreement with MLCU includes provision for continued coverage for dependent children to age 25, for widows, and for retired ministers. The MLCU **Simplex 65** is designed by MLCU for the minister and his wife when age 65 is achieved. Our Group coverage will not duplicate provisions of Medicare. MLCU will continue to write the highest level of our Group coverage for those under age 65.

HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

Report No. 2

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

Present day health and hospital costs have soared up and up and likely will continue this way. Your committee is quite aware of the varying needs and interests of our ministers. We seek to find the best level of premium dollar and potential benefit. When we find usage of our current program (claim dollars paid back to us) in excess of 100% of our Group Premium payments we know that something has to change. In seeking the wisest course for our Conference Group

we have worked out two choices with Ministers Life and Casualty Union, our insuring agency. These are:

1. Keep the coverage we have, paying the increased quarterly premium: Single Male, 23.50; Single Female (no childbirth benefit), \$26.00; Family (Minister, wife, and children under age 19), \$51.25; Male and children under age 19, \$35.50; and Female and children under age 19, \$38.00.

2. Change from our current "Franchise Group" to what is known in the insurance trade as a "True Group" basis. This would be the step by which we would move from our Protector Benefit with a \$3,000.00 maximum hospital benefit per person, per cause, to a \$10,000.00 maximum lifetime benefit. Obviously, this is a stronger policy and it will require more premium, but less increase than one would think.

Some new features stemming from this "True Group" basis are: Cost the base policy at levels adequate for average length of illness, then have a flexible reserve to help—the \$10,000.00 major medical—as needed. Coverage for prescriptive drugs and medicines; private nursing in the Hospital; Doctor calls in the office and to the home; Diagnostic and laboratory work done while other than hospital confined. Children covered to age 23 if after 19, they are students. This does have a \$100.00 cash deductible per calendar year, and it has an 80% co-insurance percentage. Out of deference for holding premiums down the committee requested MLCU to delete the monthly disability income benefit of \$150.00 up to 36 months, (saving \$5.00 per quarter), but with clear understanding that any present participating member may continue this benefit, individually, for \$6.70 per quarter. Premium levels are indicated by the example of \$56.41 for the Family; \$20.17 for Member only.

Some Guidelines Which Are Essential

Whether we keep our current coverage or vote to go to the "True Group" with major medical of \$10,000.00 ordered procedure is a must to be sure we have insurance in force.

1. Each one who is currently participating in our Group Hospitalization Insurance must pay the Quarterly Premium due 7-1-1967 if he desires to be insured. This will cover you to 10-1-1967 at least, and allow for prorating any changes.

2. Any minister who becomes newly eligible may join the Conference Group immediately as provided in Report No. 1, guideline 1.

3. If the Conference authorizes this effort to change to a "True Group" basis—and we hope the Conference does—this action will be an automatic "Re-Opening" for our Group. This will mean that we must certify every full-time minister serving within the bounds of the Central Texas Methodist Conference, under appointment of the Bishop. Each of these ministers will be eligible to join the Group and to enroll their families on a non-medical basis, without any exclusions. In order for this "Re-Opening" to be successful on a non-medical basis 75% of the certified eligibles must enroll in the Group.

4. Due to the brief time from the June Conference to July 1, MLCU has agreed to change our closing date from 7-1-1967 to 8-1-1967. If the Conference approves the effort, and if 75% of the eligibles enroll and pay, then the effective date of the new coverage will be 8-1-1967. Ministers Life will then prorate the July 1 premium and our future anniversary date will be August 1 with quarterly premium dates November 1, February 1, and May 1. If a successful "Re-Opening" is not achieved, our Conference Group Hospitalization Insurance coverage will remain at the level we have had in 1966-1967 with the only change being the

increase in premium rates outlined in Choice number one, above; and Quarterly premium date would remain July 1, October 1, January 1, and April 1.

Committee and Caucus Recommendations

Out of two Committee Meetings with representatives from MLCU we voted to recommend to a Caucus of the 182 participating ministers that we change to the "True Group" basis. The Caucus was held March 28, 1967 in Fort Worth with Mr. Charles M. Romsey, Jr., Group Department Manager of MLCU and Mr. Paul E. Webb, MLCU Field Representative of Weatherford, present. After discussion and questions, unlimited, 39 voted to change to "True Group" and 5 voted to keep the current coverage. We recommend that the Conference authorize the effort to change.

Report No. 3

Harris Hospital

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

The Board of Trustees and the Administrator respectfully submit a Report of the operations and activities of Harris Hospital for the Fiscal Year ended

September 30, 1966. Since six months have elapsed in this Fiscal Year, members of the Conference will realize that all of the statistics are based on the 1965-66 Fiscal Year, but in order to give a current report, many of the improvements and developments reported upon have occurred during this time.

Patient Care Factors:

During the Fiscal Year 1965-66, 165,686 days of adult care were given; this was an increase of 6,242 days over the previous Fiscal Year.

Nationwide, the number of obstetrical patients entering hospitals has declined sharply over the last five years, and this has been true of Harris Hospital. There were 3,244 deliveries in the last Fiscal Year, which was an increase of only 97 over the previous Fiscal Year. The occupancy of the medical-surgical divisions of Harris Hospital has been almost 100% the last twelve-month period.

Each year finds us with increasing numbers of patients presenting themselves to our Emergency Room facilities for care, as well as an increasing number of requests for Laboratory and Radiological examinations. During the past year, 268,238 Laboratory tests were performed and 40,319 Radiological examinations were performed.

Purchase of Equipment:

During the year, the Board of Trustees of the Hospital authorized the purchase of Movable and Fixed Equipment in the amount of \$392,467.07.

A special mention of some of the pieces of equipment, the purchase of which was authorized by the Board, will be of interest to the Conference. In May of last year, the Tarrant County Heart Association donated \$5,000 to Harris Hospital toward the establishment of a cardiac care unit. Last summer, also, the Board authorized the establishment of a ten-bed Cardiac Care Unit at a cost not to exceed \$25,000. This cost included the remodeling of an existing wing adjacent to our Intensive Care Unit and the installation of piped oxygen, piped suction, compressed air and patient-to-nurse intercommunication. Additionally, in this Unit, each room is capable of monitoring the patient's heart waves and the patient's pulse rate continuously; also, each room has conduit provided for closed circuit television for the constant observation of the patient. In this connection, the Bell Helicopter Company Employee's Humanity Fund donated approximately \$4,000 for four closed circuit television units.

The Woman's Auxiliary has donated \$6,140 for the central cardiac monitoring unit located in the nurses' station.

In the way of new diagnostic equipment, O. C. Armstrong, past President of the Board of Trustees, and his wife donated \$15,200 for the purchase of monitoring equipment which is used at the time of diagnostic cardiac catheterization and at the time of open heart surgery.

Expansion Program:

New Construction and Modernization—Last year, we reported to the Conference that the Board of Trustees was considering a two-phase expansion program, both phases of which were partially dependent upon Hill-Burton participation; in December, 1966, we were advised by the Texas State Department of Health that our application for funds in connection with Phase II had been approved on a fractional basis in the amount of \$850,000.

The cost of this project is presently estimated to be \$2,873,746.00.

The financing of this project will be from three sources — Hill-Burton funds, Hospital reserve funds and long term financing.

Last year, we reported to you that the Board of Trustees had authorized a parking garage, East of the Mall which separates the Main Building from the Women's Building.

At that time, the Trustees authorized three levels with foundations adequate to go two levels higher. The cost of this project which is now completed is \$805,000. In December, 1966, at a special meeting of the Board of Trustees, they authorized the completion of the final two additional levels, at a cost of \$723,000. The garage will be complete in July, 1967 and will provide for the parking of 950 cars.

Presently, Phase II is being prepared for submission to the contractors for bids. Hopefully, bids will be taken in May and construction will start on Phase II not later than July 1, 1967. This Project will provide 112 additional beds, relocation of the storeroom and other physical changes, and will take approximately 18 months to complete.

During this period of time, we will need to consider the acquisition of funds to accomplish Phase III. Phase III, as reported last year, can begin immediately upon completion of Phase II, for this completion will allow us to take 100 beds out of service in the Main Hospital Building for renovation without reducing the bed supply to the Community.

Nominations and Appointments:

The preparatory meetings of the Board of Hospitals and Homes and the Administrative Council of the Central Texas Conference will precede the Annual Meeting of the Board of Trustees of Harris Hospital and, therefore, it will be necessary for us to submit a supplementary report listing nominees for Trusteeship, following this Annual Meeting.

Wage and Salary Reclassification:

Hospitals for the first time have been included under the Minimum Wage Law and although the requirement for new services and institutions being included for the first time is \$1.00 per hour, Harris Hospital is now at the rate of \$1.15 per hour. This became effective last October 15 and was authorized by the Board in July, 1966. The cost of this wage and salary reclassification for some 1200 employees amounts to \$465,000 — or expressed another way, \$3.63 per patient per day.

On July 1, 1966, the rates were increased \$3.00 per patient per day and on January 1, 1967, the rates were increased \$2.00 per patient per day. The Conference will realize that approximately 60% of the cost of hospital care can be found in payroll. Harris Hospital and all hospitals are faced with a built-in increased cost per patient per day per annum of \$4 until 1971. This increased cost is compounded because all business and industry already covered under the wage and hour law went to \$1.40 per hour in February, 1967 and will go to \$1.60 in 1968. Harris Hospital is a customer of most of these businesses and services.

Appreciation:

Members of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church are to be commended for the continued interest and support which is given to Harris Hospital.

The Board of Trustees, the Medical Staff, the Personnel of Harris Hospital and the Patients whom they serve are quite aware and appreciative of this interest which is centered in the ministry of healing.

The Board of Trustees would like to request the Bishop and his Cabinet to appoint the Reverend James B. Ansley, D.D., as Commissioner-Chaplain of the Hospital for the coming year; and further to appoint the Reverend Robert L. Davis as Assistant Chaplain of Harris Hospital for the coming year.

Report of Commissioner-Chaplain, Harris Hospital

The Chaplaincy

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

The witness of The Methodist Church from its inception has been the incarnation of Christ in ministry to the physical needs of all people and especially to those who, through no fault of their own, were unable to pay for their medical care. Harris Hospital is proud of this noble tradition.

In every area Harris Hospital is pushing toward excellence in equipment and service. It has a right to church support only if it serves the needy and sets a higher standard of service measured by essential ministry of human life. Harris Hospital stands tall by these measurements.

This has been a wonderful year for us. Chaplain Robert L. Davis is rendering an outstanding service for us in patient, doctor and employee relationships.

Our pledge for the coming year is "To Better Serve."

Clinical Training Program

Harris Hospital became the first nationally accredited center for Clinical Pastoral Education in the Fort Worth-Dallas area last September. It is now accredited to accept students from any accredited Theological seminary for post-graduate study in pastoral care and counseling. While the goals and purposes of our program remain essentially the same as last year's, we are attempting to develop a fuller and more intense experience for the student to learn, under supervision, the methods and techniques of good pastoral care and to articulate and incorporate into his theology a healthy and feasible philosophy of pastoral care.

Currently we offer two types of clinical programs: (1) Individual students participate in six hours a week of assigned, supervised calling on patients, and in a two-hour seminar of the entire group for a period of 18 weeks. (2) The first quarter of clinical pastoral education in which the student participates in an 8 to 12 week, 40 hour a week experience as an attempt to take him from seminary, or the minister from the parish, and place him in a supervised setting, wherein he begins to become more aware of the confronting instances of life and death. He begins to look at the nature of man not only theologically, but also psychologically, i.e., man's relationship to God, to himself, and to his fellow man. Credit for the successful completion of either of these two courses is given by Brite Divinity School, Texas Christian University, Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, or Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Beginning June 1, 1968, we plan to offer a year's internship in Clinical Pastoral Care. The clinical year of training in a hospital setting is a modern development of theological education. An applicant for this year of training must have completed four years of college, three years of theological education, and must demonstrate himself to be psychologically sound. Throughout the year he functions as a chaplain in the hospital, experiencing many kinds of problems and situations that call for spiritual courage and psychological maturity. Under the direction of a chaplain supervisor he learns to understand the emotional and spiritual needs of the patients. He also begins to appreciate, anew, himself and his role as a minister. He learns the importance of inter-personal relationships and he begins to more fully trust the Holy Spirit to give impetus to that relationship.

Few men are able to stand in the presence of intense emotion, suffering and heartache without a personal involvement that causes him to lose his objectivity. The clinical year is designed to bring this maturity to the chaplain intern. He eventually learns to stand with confidence in the midst of crisis. He gains strength to stand in overwhelming situations, not being threatened by the intense fear-ridden emotions of his patients. He is able to bring security and understanding to the relationship which allows each person involved to discover new grace in the midst of struggle.

We limit each of the one day a week classes to eight students, the summer class to six and the year's internship to three.

Golden Cross Service

This report covers the period of June 1, 1966, through May 31, 1967.

At the close of May 31st, the cost of 21 church-referred patients amounted to \$9,909.98. The total amount received from the churches of our Conference for the same period of time amounted to \$11,114.70.

Trustees of Homes for Retired Ministers

The Board of Trustees of Homes for Retired Ministers is pleased to announce the completion of our first new multiple dwelling unit for retired Methodist

ministers. The home is located in Stephenville and was dedicated this spring by Bishop W. Kenneth Pope. This unit is the first in a new stage of building for the Central Texas Conference. The home is located on a corner lot in a new housing addition providing adequate completely separated living facilities for two families. All the conveniences of a modern home are included in the design with the addition of a roofed and skylighted patio living area. Applications have been received requesting the use of the home.

Plans are now near completion for the second multiple dwelling unit to be located in Fort Worth. The same plan as used in the Stephenville Home will be used in the new Fort Worth Home.

Again, this year as in the past, the Board has given attention to the repair and re-conditioning of our existing homes. Some of them are rather new and need little repair. Others are requiring much care because of their age and stage of deterioration. The Retired Minister's Homes Offering received through the special observance on the Second Sunday in July have largely been used for this repair work. It is no small task, nor inexpensive operation, to keep these homes in an adequate state of repair. In many cases the minister occupying the home has been generous with his own time and resources regarding certain needed repairs. For this we offer our thanks.

We ask the continued support of our concerned Methodists in the Central Texas Conference and respectfully request that **Sunday, July 9, 1967** be recognized as **Retired Minister's Homes Sunday**. Let there be a special offering for this cause, brochures placed in the hands of every Methodist, and the preacher take due note of this special observance.

At the present time the Board of Trustees is responsible for 29 homes, 27 of which are occupied by retired preachers or widows of retired preachers. Two homes are now rented or are available for occupancy. Some of these homes are listed for sale and upon their sale the receipts will be invested in new homes in order that we might raise the standard of homes for our deserving retired men and widows.

The Methodist Home

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

The Methodist Home has now completed its seventy-sixth year of providing a good Christian home for boys and girls in need, and we believe we have made much progress this year and are looking toward a more promising future. Beginning at the present Conference year, the Home had 430 children in its care.

In addition to this beginning total, we have admitted 58 children and released 47 children, making a total of 535 children being served through the date of February 22, 1967, of the present Conference year. Twelve families and twenty-six children from this total are children we have served from the New Mexico Conference, and of course, the remainder of the children have been served from the Conferences in the Texas area. We now have a total of 441 children in the Home's care.

Because of the great need and demand for foster homes and because we cannot secure enough foster homes for pre-school age children seeking admission, we have extended the geographical area from which we will accept foster homes to a 40 mile radius. This gives us the advantage of the Temple area from which to have foster homes. At times during the past year, we have had as many as 10 pre-school age children admitted to the Home, but we could not actually receive them because we had no foster home ready for them.

Our Houston out-post program has begun as an extension of the services of the Home in that area. Our Board of Directors has approved the program for the setting up of two small group homes to serve boy and girl adolescents who need full casework services, along with psychiatric and psychological service on occasion, while living in a closely supervised group setting. This will help to meet a pressing need for services of this kind in the Houston area, as well as extend the services of the Home for children from other areas who we cannot receive at the present time.

Here on our campus, we have redecorated our Infirmary for the medical confinement of the children, enlarged our Maintenance Building to help us provide for the many needs of the children, completed our baseball fields and our tennis courts to go along with our beautiful swimming pools for additional recreational activities of the children, planned for a gymnasium to be built in the near future to complete the recreational facilities, and we are also in the process of building a Zimmerman Cottage, which will make a total of 21 home units for the boys and girls.

We are requesting the Conference to continue designing the month of December as the Methodist Home month, and we are leaning heavily upon each pastor to help us tell the story of the Methodist Home to his people, presenting our financial needs to them as he has graciously done in the many years past.

The **Home** is providing a realistic and effective ministry to unwed mothers and their families. The unwed mother in our culture needs many things: First, the most important—acceptance, love and understanding, in spite of her serious moral mistake; second, a place where she can obtain confidential and expert help on her medical, psychological and social problems; and third, an opportunity with the help of sensitive counselors to re-orient herself to life's meaning, to accept God's forgiveness, and to make a mature and realistic decision about her baby. All of this your **Home** provides in an increasing measure.

Counseling:

In keeping with the **Home's** desire to fulfill its healing ministry, certain areas are being strengthened. Continuing and effective counseling is basic in our service.

A heavy emphasis is being placed upon both group work and casework services. Girls are being seen weekly in a group setting with a male and female social worker present, or once a week in private interviews.

We are working also toward strengthening our consultive program to reinforce our casework and counseling services. In addition to our psychological testing program, a Consulting Psychiatrist is being added to our staff. Eventually opinionians representing other disciplines of competence will be added, since we believe this will be beneficial to the girls. Periodically, we have a visiting Nurse to hold classes with the girls centering around prenatal care.

As we prepare to move into new quarters additional guidance will be given to the entire staff relative to their involvement with the girls, as the **Home** seeks to be of help to the girls on a day-to-day basis. This is especially true of the Housemothers who will bear greater responsibility with the girls' welfare.

Adoption:

In order to provide good Christian homes for many of the babies born to the residents the **Home** is also a licensed adoption agency. The demand for Anglo babies continues to be steady and quite adequate whereas it is very difficult to find good Latin-American and Negro adoptive homes. Our service to Latin-American and Negro girls is limited by this scarcity of good homes for their babies. We are constantly re-evaluating our adoption policies and procedures to make them more flexible and helpful, and we try to help as many couples as possible. We are always glad to have couples write to us about adoption possibilities.

Building Program:

Following the Groundbreaking Ceremonies last November 2, 1966, construction was begun on the seven building complex that will provide the totally new facilities for the **Mission Home** on a 20 acre tract in the northwest quadrant of the city. The new construction is moving along well and as of February 28, 1967 the report of the architect and contractor was that the project was 25% complete.

The original contract which was let provided for 400 calendar days for completion. At the moment the project continues to be "on schedule" and plans

are beginning to be formulated for moving into the new facilities early in 1968.

The new plant is designed to accommodate 120 girls in residence as compared with the present limit of 60. This will double the available space and will make possible an enlarged ministry to persons in time of need.

The Building Program continues to progress well and still needs the support of both the churches through the asking distributed to each church through the office of the district superintendent as well as through the special gifts of interested individuals and friends of the Home to help secure the balance of funds needed to complete so great a undertaking.

The original proposal for the Building Program of \$1,250,000 has been maintained. The first \$700,000 is to be raised through the asking to the local churches; the balance of \$550,000 is to be raised through Special Gifts over the quadrennium. Both are essential if this plant is to be completed and funded on schedule.

Report No. 8

Wesleyan Homes, Inc.

(Adopted June 7, 1967)

Four years and six months ago . . . 18 residents and \$8,000 per month deficit spending . . . the Wesleyan showed a net loss of \$90,000. The loss in 1966 was reduced to \$14,000. This progress has been made possible in a

large measure through a population growth which has reached a capacity "house." Another strong factor has been our inheritance from the Highnote Estate, which netted the Home some \$14,000 from dividends and royalties in 1966. The aforementioned figures are not to be misconstrued, however. The Wesleyan ended the fiscal year with total revenue exceeding total expenditures. Mother's Day offering, individual gifts and Highnote revenue made this possible.

The Finance Committee has set the 1967 budget at \$244,367.00. This includes an increase in the Food Service and Nursing Departments, in addition to a general payroll increase of \$12,000—as a result of the new Wage and Hour Law, with a minimum of \$1.00 per hour. The committee, also, examined possible sources of income thoroughly and estimated a total revenue of \$244,480.00 of which \$204,000.00 will be received from resident service charges.

Sale of stock in late January produced \$40,044.86. This money has been used to pay the following obligations: Central Texas Conference, \$15,900, leaving a balance of \$15,000 for one year at 4% interest; \$9,365.62 note paid in full to First National Bank, Georgetown; one delinquent building mortgage payment, \$6,445.22; insurance premiums, \$2,581.38; and two Founder Fee refunds, \$3,319.41. The balance of some \$2,500.00 was deposited in the General Fund. In addition, sale of the dwelling in Corsicano was completed and \$3,179.61 was received for the property.

Presently, the Highnote Estate consists of the same oil and gas production as was originally transferred; 50 acres of river bottom pasture land; 1569 shares of Diversified Investment Fund; 300 shares of AT&T; and 140 shares of General Motors. (Stock value as of 3-1-67 was approximately \$43,000.)

The rate increase which went into effect January 1 met with little opposition. No one moved as a result and only a few "hardship" cases have been revealed. Even the Welfare Department has made it possible for 12 recipients of Old Age Assistance to pay the new rate. (The Welfare Department now has a ceiling of \$175.00 for recipients of OAA.)

It's difficult to be objective, but it is your administrator's firm belief that resident-relations and "image" remain "normal." Mal-contentment concerning food service is the most prevalent problem. Complaints originate with a small group, who prefer cafeteria-style serving. A registered dietitian is employed on a consulting basis in an attempt to satisfy and pacify the complainers.

The Wesleyan staff now totals 29 full time and five part time employees and one full time volunteer, Mrs. Roy Stakes. An added fringe benefit was recently adopted; employees with two or more years service receive two weeks paid vacation; less than two, but more than one, one week vacation. All employees with more than 90 days employment are entitled to sick-leave, not to exceed seven days during their respective fiscal years. One of the part time employees is a woman who is working on a degree at Southwestern University with the intention of specializing in social counseling work. She is acting as the Wesleyan's social service worker. This is a therapeutic facet of service that is becoming a necessary function of the Home.

Physical condition of building and grounds remain good; a preventive maintenance program was initiated last year. Our replacement fund, 80% of which has been transferred into U. S. Treasury bonds, now totals better than \$9,000.00. The Lalo Wright Foundation, which donated \$7,500.00 in 1966 for our Memorial Garden and sprinkler system throughout the entire grounds, recently added \$1,500.00 for maintenance purposes. This money, however, is earmarked for "garden work" altogether. Separate accounting records are kept on this project.

A simple ceremony — attended by Messrs. Bob Gladney, Dan Scarbraugh and relatives of the late Mrs. Margaret C. Highnote — was conducted in early

March for the purpose of unveiling a portrait of Mrs. Highnote, which hangs in the entrance lobby of the Wesleyan. The portrait was painted by Georgetown artist, Frank Callcott.

Our Admissions policy continues to set an age ceiling of 80 years with some latitude allowed when an applicant over 80 in good health agrees to an extra nursing charge. This practice, however, is kept to a minimum because of the "supply and demand" formula. The Health Center (Infirmary) has been increased from 7 to a total of 16 complete infirmary units; the maximum under present available space is 20. The Wesleyan has been approved for Medicare participation as an Extended Care Facility. Licensed nurses are employed around the clock. This is the basic requirement of Medicare.

The Wesleyan's application for a grant to implement therapeutic services to residents and members of the existing XYZ Club was denied. Reason given was that the Home failed to show enough matching funds, either in direct money or services provided by the Wesleyan. It will be determined at a later date by the Finance Committee if advisable to re-apply.

Other disappointments came in the same manner. Five foundations which had been petitioned to make contributions disapproved our applications. One, however, indicated that the Wesleyan would be considered in 1968; another, although turning us down in 1966, encouraged us to try again in 1967.

The Methodist Home Foundation is dedicated to the purpose of building,

in the name of the church and for the sake of children, a reserve which will make possible the best program of child care that can be accomplished.

Concern for children has been basic in the interests of the Methodist Church, particularly those children whose own homes were inadequate for their needs. Being a part of the effort to meet the needs of an increasing number of troubled children, requiring new and more expensive patterns of care, is no less the concern of Methodists today.

In the current budget of the Methodist Home, the Foundation has provided \$493,622. To meet future needs of the Home, an increasing amount will be required annually from the Foundation. During the past year, a goal to increase the permanent endowment fund by one million dollars was set. It is gratifying to report that through gifts and bequests from interested friends, considerable progress has been made toward reaching this amount.

We take this occasion to express our thanks to all for their interest and support of the Foundation. We hope a word will be spoken in its behalf whenever the opportunity is presented, and that continued efforts will be made to strengthen the Foundation until there will be available funds to make possible a program that will meet the needs of those children who call upon the Home for help.

COMMITTEE ON INTERDENOMINATIONAL COOPERATION

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

We rejoice in the continued understanding being achieved by every honest and forthright effort in the broad area of interdenominational cooperation: a national, state, and local levels. The Methodist Church has long whole-heartedly participated in ecumenical endeavors. It is an important meaningful part of our heritage.

In such an ecumenical spirit, your Committee on Interdenominational Cooperation has sought to carry out its responsibilities. Beyond encouraging all our pastors and churches to participate in worthy cooperative efforts with other Christian Churches, we have participated in the program and projects of the Texas Council of Churches. In this ecumenical effort, 21 participating bodies representing 1¼ million persons work together in a significant program of Christian faith and witness.

We are pleased that our own Bishop W. Kenneth Pope was elected president-designate of the Texas Council of Churches at the General Assembly held March 13-15, 1967, in Austin. We look forward to the continued participation of many denominational groups in the significant tasks that face us all. Your delegates to the Texas Council of Churches continue to be enthusiastic about its work.

Significant programs and projects of the Texas Council of Churches were reported as follows at the recent General Assembly:

Division of Christian Education

... sponsored a conference at Lake Sharon on the "Church's Ministry with Children."

... sponsored two state-wide conferences for youth leaders.

. . . collaborated with the N. C. C. Committee on Campus and Conferences in sponsoring a Regional Training Camp for camp and conference leaders.

. . . sponsored a campus ministry conference in Austin.

. . . held the annual seminar for public school administrators in cooperation with Southwestern University, and several other week-end conferences for public school teachers.

. . . was involved in planning for the Assembly of the Division of Christian Education of the National Council of Churches, held in Dallas in February of 1967.

Division of Christian Life and Work

. . . drafted a statement of Legislative Principles which was adapted by the Texas Council of Churches this year.

. . . has distributed literature on international and world affairs, including N. C. C. policy statements on China, South Africa, and Viet Nam, which the Texas Council of Churches has recommended for study by local groups.

Division of Christian Mission

. . . has continued study of Spanish-American work and needs, and has served as consultant on denominational programs relative to the Latin-American population.

. . . served as resource and consultant to local migrant ministry committees and their problems.

. . . continued joint sponsorship of the United Ministry at Lake Texoma, with a year-round chaplain, and two students in the summer, as well as many volunteers.

. . . made plans for Institute For Institutional Chaplains to be held in May of 1967 in Austin.

. . . cooperated with the Texas Catholic Conference in sponsoring the Faith and Order Conference last November, with plans for the third annual Faith and Order Conference for next Fall already underway.

. . . supervised state-wide program of collecting commodities and cash for the world relief series of Church World Service, in the amount of \$184,000.

We commend all our local churches for the practical work they are doing in the area of interdenominational cooperation. We rejoice that so much is being done through local Councils of Churches and Ministerial Associations.

The Board was organized according to the Discipline, with all nominated members elected by the Annual Conference in session, June 9, 1966 at McFarlin Auditorium on the Campus of Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas. June 18 at First Methodist Church in Fort Worth the District Lay Leaders and District Directors of: Methodist Men, Stewardship, Lay Speaking and Lay Leadership Training met with the Conference Directors for information and program planning.

These men met with the Executive Committee of the Board in the afternoon session on June 18 for the purpose of projecting programs and coordinating the work before the total membership for the ensuing year.

The 18th Annual Retreat was attended by over 800 ministers and laymen at Glen Lake, August 26, 27 and 28, 1966. The general theme of meditation and information was, "Methodism in Focus."

Dr. Robert E. Goodrich, Jr., Pastor of First Methodist Church, Dallas used as his subject: "Methodism is Alive" R. H. "Red" Band, a dynamic Methodist Layman from Tennessee, used as his subject, Saturday morning, "The Relevance of Our Methodist Gospel." Saturday night his subject was: "Methodism Looks to the Future." Dr. J. Woodrow Hearn, Executive Director of Fort Worth Area Council of Churches, talked on the theme: "This I Believe."

These men, and the messages they brought, were most challenging. Discussion of these messages and other facets of the subject, by the men in attendance was most lively.

Evening Vespers and Morning Watch Devotions were brought by Dr. Margan Garrett, Dr. Wm. M. Greenwaldt, Dr. Hayden Edwards and Dr. Wayne Reynolds. Singing and music under the inspiration of Bill Mann of First Methodist Church, Dallas and Oris Baldwin of First Methodist, Hurst, was most stimulating.

The cooperation on the part of District Lay Leaders, their associates, the Conference Directors and men on the Committee Assignments, all working together and getting others to work on this Retreat made it a success in a new Christian experience.

Dr. William A. Ward, the Conference Director of Methodist Men, has sought to bring new purpose and new vision to our Methodist Men's Clubs.

Elbert Prince, the Conference Director of Lay Leadership Training, has worked with our District Leaders to set up training sessions in each district in such areas as training, Church Lay Leaders, Official Board Members, Commission members, Nominating Committee, and Lay members to the Annual Conference.

Ray Stokes, the Conference Director of Stewardship, assisted by Dr. Eugene F. Jud and working through our District Directors and District Officers, has conducted and developed workshops and programs in Stewardship education through-out our Conference, some District wide, some Sub-District and many in local churches.

Max Mabley, the Conference Director of Lay Speaking, assisted by District Officers and Directors, has planned and set up and conducted classes and workshops for the training of lay people in the art "Communicating." Many have received certificates after completing this very fine course in Lay Speaking. The purpose of this training is to assist Christians to be better Witnesses in all areas of living.

September 24 and 25, 1966 our General Board of Lay Activities conducted a clinic in Grand Prairie, Texas. This Clinic was for the Laymen from an eleven Conference area. It was planned and taught by the specialist from our General Board in the responsibility subjects of Lay Leadership Training, Lay Speaking, Mens Work and Christian Stewardship.

The members of Central Texas Conference Board of Lay Activities were outstanding in numbers and quality, for this Clinic, and received much benefit and direction to help in the years program.

Laymen's Day, October 9, 1966 was observed in practically all our churches. This day is set aside to give laymen and laywomen the privilege and opportunity to Witness to their belief and faith in God before others.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT**Report No. 1****(Adopted June 5, 1967)**

The program on Minimum Pastoral Support has operated most satisfactorily this conference year with the rather sweeping changes enacted at the 1966 Session of the Central Texas Conference proving to be seemingly wise and timely. Therefore we recommend no changes in our present schedule of plan of operation.

The Commission recommends that the apportionments for the Minimum Salary Fund be an amount equal to 1% of the salaries apportioned for the pastor and associate pastors of the Central Texas Conference.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT**Plan of Operation****(as Amended June 8, 1966)**

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Conference, under the management of a Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, hereinafter, for the sake of brevity, called the Commission, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Five of this number shall be ministers, and four laymen. The term of service shall be for three years, so arranged that three shall be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support Program.

Vacancies in the membership of the Commission, caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference, shall be filled by the nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the ensuing session of the Annual Conference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regular way.

The Commission shall organize at that session of the Central Texas Annual Conference held at the beginning of each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Recording Secretary. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Annual Conference shall be the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Commission. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Commission, and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. All subsequent elections of officers and executive committee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Commission held prior to the meeting of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Administrative Procedures

1. The following conditions shall be met by a pastoral charge to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for its pastor to receive salary supplements from the Fund:

(a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted an Every Member Canvass for the local church budget of each of its churches during the previous conference year.

(b) The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall have been accepted and paid in full for the previous conference year.

(c) The salary for the pastor and all other items of ministerial support included in the Connectional Ministry Fund shall have been paid in full and proportionally for the previous year, and

(d) The churches of the pastoral charge shall not reduce the salary below that paid the previous conference year, unless such reduction shall be explained and presented in writing to the Commission, and approved as justifiable by the unanimous vote of the Commission.

2. The following conditions shall be met by a pastor to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for receiving salary supplements from this Fund:

(a) He shall be a pastor in effective relation, a pastor on trial, an approved full-time supply pastor, an approved student supply pastor, or a supply pastor who has not previously served a pastoral charge. He shall not be eligible for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund if his appointment is other than pastor of a charge within the Central Texas Conference, if he receives salary aid from the General or Conference Board of Missions, if he is classified as a part-time supply pastor, if he is a retired minister, or if he receives income from any other employment than the regular work of the pastoral ministry. Receiving a scholarship for college or seminary work shall not restrict his eligibility.

(b) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this Fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in his present appointment.

3. A prerequisite for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund shall be the filing with the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Commission a writ-

ten application by the District Superintendent. This application shall indicate the classification of the pastor, the salary set by the charge, and shall contain the certifications by the District Superintendent whether or not the pastoral charge has met each of the requirements set forth above in Section 1.

4. In cases of appointments, or changes of appointments, between the sessions of the Annual Conference, all the above requirements are applicable and the District Superintendent shall file a new application for each charge concerned. Such salary supplements, if approved, shall be paid on a pro rata basis for the part of the year actually served.

5. The salary supplements shall be computed at \$1800.00 per year, or the salary and travel expenses apportioned by the pastoral charge, whichever is the higher figure, according to the following classifications:

(a) For married or unmarried conference member in the effective relation, or on trial and not enrolled as a student during the year, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$4,500.00 per year, but in no case shall the sum required be more than \$1,200.00.

(b) For a married or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who is an ordained elder, and who for the previous five consecutive years has served as a full-time approved supply pastor within the Central Texas Annual Conference, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,750.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,200.00.

(c) For a married or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who does not meet all the qualifications of section (b) above, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,600.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,200.00.

(d) For married ministers, who are either student pastors on trial, approved student supply pastors, or supply pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,300.00, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1200.00.

(e) For unmarried ministers, who are student pastors on trial, approved student supply pastors, or supply pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$2700.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1200.00, and

(f) In addition to the above schedule and above the limitation of aid, seminary students who are serving pastoral charges and receiving Minimum Pastoral salary supplements, may receive \$1.00 per mile, one way, one time, per year, for the distance from the seminary to the pastoral charge. This extra allowance shall be computed by the Commission, and paid in one payment to the seminary student pastor serving the charge at the end of the third quarter of the conference year.

6. Funds for the work of the Commission shall be secured in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 826, Discipline 1964, and the apportionment of each pastoral charge shall be the sum equal to one per cent of the salaries apportioned for the pastor and all associate pastors appointed to the charge. This amount shall be included in the Connectional Ministry apportionment.

7. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts apportioned to the churches in their respective districts, and for the rearrangement of pastoral charges, as necessary, to provide that the salary for the pastor to be paid by the charges be not less than \$1800.00 per year.

General Provisions

8. Payment on the apportionment to the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payment to those receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31st, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same percentage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.

9. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, all payments of those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund, and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals enroute, to all meetings of the Commission except such as are held while the Annual Conference is in session shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be paid in accordance with the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payment for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid is limited to those who receive the benefits of the Fund, and not more than ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available for such emergency appropriation. All unexpired portions of such available emergency funds shall at the close of the year remain in the general fund, subject to the disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this Plan.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS**Report No. 1****Jurisdictional Ministerial Education Fund****(Adopted June 7, 1967)**

Numerous testimonies to the good being done by the Jurisdictional Ministerial Education Fund have been given. One young man wrote, "It has been a wonderful aid to my seminary training to receive this grant." Another said, "It would have been impossible for me to continue in seminary without it."

This year will probably see a ten per cent increase in the churches' contribution to the fund. This has been a real boost in strengthening the seminaries and has made it possible for the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications to give additional needed assistance to our seminary men. Three-fourths of all monies received is forwarded to Perkins School of Theology. One-fourth is administered by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications. Grants from the Board during the year closing are as follows:

On the basis of need, we are now seeking to meet the cost of tuition, fees, and books for every seminary student related to our conference. Some additional aid has been given in emergency situations and as funds are available more will be given.

Recruitment for the Ministry

There are three encouraging signs appearing in the field of recruitment for the ministry.

In the first place the Bishop's Conference on the Ministry, held in Arlington on March 4, was most rewarding in attendance and response. Out of the 88 boys who registered from the Central Texas Conference, there were 48 who recorded a definite interest in the ministry. This is a great challenge to every pastor and layman to make available the best possible climate for these decisions to come to full maturity.

The second indication of real concern has been the response of our people in their support of Ministerial Education Sunday in October. The giving of our people and their genuine interest in the preparation of our ministers is being reflected in many areas and in many ways.

In the third place, there is a 25% increase in admissions to the beginning class at Perkins School of Theology as of April this year as compared with last year at the same time. This is the first reversal of a downward trend in theological education in some six or eight years. C. C. Sessions, Chairman of the Committee for Recruitment for the Ministry, thinks we are over the hump,

and urges us to continue moving ahead in the field of recruitment for the Methodist ministry.

Guidance Program

The Guidance Program which was approved by our Central Texas Conference has completed its first year of operation. The battery of psychological tests was administered to ten men on March 18 at Harris Hospital, and to nine men on April 8 at Austin Avenue Methodist in Waco. Information from these tests and inventories has been used as the basis of follow-up conferences with each individual participant.

Of the 19 participants, 12 are approved supply pastors and 7 are local preachers. Of the 19, 11 are now in college, 6 in the conference courses of study program, and 2 are in seminary.

The emphasis of the guidance program is upon helping the individual to clarify his vocational calling and to respond to it more adequately. The test results serve only as a guide in subsequent counseling with the individual, not as a screening device. The tests are similar to those now in use in our area seminaries.

The results of these tests and inventories for specific individuals are strictly confidential, and will be released to authorized persons only with the written consent of the individual candidate involved.

Additional testing days will be scheduled during the 1967-68 conference year. It is hoped that every local preacher, approved supply, and all individuals who are in any way considering the ministry as a vocation will participate in this guidance program. Pastors and District Superintendents are urged to encourage these individuals to participate in the guidance program. High school and college students and persons now in other vocations may participate.

Additional information about the testing program may be secured from Richard Hunt, Dept. of Psychology, SMU, Dallas 75222 or from Dee Wiksten, c/o Methodist Hospital, Dallas. James Ansley, Hiram Johnson, and Tony Campbell have also contributed to this program.

Continuing Education

Continuing education is no longer an optional luxury. Twentieth century man lives in the midst of an unprecedented knowledge explosion which has likewise expanded the horizons of human possibility and the experience of being human. Theological seminaries provide elaborate programs in continuing education for ministers. Our committee has assumed the responsibility for making such programs more accessible to ministers in this conference.

Perkins Outreach Seminars have served an increasing number of ministers through the five sessions scheduled at selected geographical centers in the conference. These one-day activities bring the resources of the theological seminary to the parish minister through faculty members from Perkins who spend a day in lectures and discussions with the participants in the seminars. Bob Robertson, seminar chairman, reports that attendance at each seminar has been somewhat less this year when compared with last year; however, the total number of persons attending the seminars has been greater. Perkins Outreach Seminars are planned to continue on a similar basis in the conference year 1967-68.

The committee plans at least two Perkins Reading Programs as pilot projects in the two Ft. Worth districts. Reading programs planned for the current conference year were no longer available at the time of our inquiry because

of the overwhelming demand for all over the jurisdiction on the part of individual and groups of ministers.

An innovative approach to continuing education through the use of electronic media has been discussed by the committee. The proposal is that taped material be made available to ministers along with tape machines that can be installed in automobiles for use by ministers while they are driving. Certain data concerning the availability of machines and appropriate programming are now being gathered for the committee's consideration. We plan to implement this highly innovative and imaginative program to continue education during the 1967-68 conference year.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Report No. 1

Adopted June 6, 1967

Your Conference Board of Pensions reports that the annuity rate for payments to the Conference Claimants of the Central Texas Conference was raised from \$55.00 per service to \$56.00 at the beginning of the conference year 1966-67, and in November another raise in the rate was made of an additional \$2.00 per service year. This was retroactive to the beginning of the conference, thus making the total annuity rate stand at \$58.00 per service year.

The Board of Pensions petitions the World Service Commission to be included in the unallocated portion of the Conference Special for the conference year 1967-68.

The 1966-67 conference year began with a conference claimants roll of 82 retired ministers, 81 widows, 5 dependent children of deceased ministers, and 9 special claimants, a total of 177 persons directly related to our annual conference. In addition to these, there were on our Outside Responsibility List 81 retired ministers, 97 widows, and 6 dependent children of deceased ministers, a total of another 184 persons, for whom our conference is responsible for pension payments for service rendered in this conference prior to transferring to another annual conference. Our annual conference, at the last report of the General Board of Pensions is responsible for pension payments for 4,740 net years of service. This is 109 net years of service less than that for which we were responsible last conference year. We paid to the Clearing House of the General Board of Pensions for pensions \$28,103.65.

During the conference now closing the following conference claimants have died, their names being thus removed from the temporal roll to the roll which is eternal: Rev. J. E. Buttrill, Rev. W. H. Cole, Rev. R. H. Davenport, Rev. Robert W. Goodloe, Rev. John R. Meritt, Rev. O. A. Morton, Rev. O. B. Herring; Mrs. Herman F. Bahmfalk, Mrs. J. S. Bawles, Mrs. E. W. Bridges, Mrs. B. M. Callaway, Mrs. C. O. Hightower, Mrs. W. P. McMickin, Mrs. D. E. McVey, Mrs. W. W. Mass, Mrs. H. A. Nichols, Mrs. J. T. Ferguson.

Committee on Annuity Responsibility

Attention is called to the action of our annual conference in 1963, which is still in effect, that the Central Texas Conference assumes no pension responsibility for service rendered outside the bounds of the annual conference unless special authorization is recommended by the Board of Pension and granted by the vote of the annual conference. It is presumed that all chaplains in the armed services and in institutional services are participating in the pension programs available to them. No responsibility for such service is assumed by our annual conference unless especially authorized by vote of our annual conference.

Committee On Annuity Claims for Approved Supply Service

Answering the Disciplinary Business Question No. 22, "What full-time approved supply pastors are credited with annuity claim on account of full-time service during the year?" the following report is given.

No annuity claim can be credited to part-time supply service (pastoral services with any other employment during the year), to student supply pastors, to retired ministers serving as supply pastors, nor to those serving pastoral appointments for less than one full year. It is also a requirement of the Central Texas Conference that a prerequisite for consideration by the Conference Board of Pensions for annuity credit for full-time approved supply service be the inclusion of the name of that individual in the classification of Full-Time Approved Supply Pastors in the report of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications at the preceding conference session.

We recommend that annuity claim be credited to the following full-time approved supply pastors for the annual conference year ending in 1967: Rollo Herrington, Dan Johnson, Marian F. Johnson, Harmon W. Keelin, Geo. M. Seipp.

BOARD OF PENSIONS**Report No. 4****Enabling Act for New Entrant Plan****(Adopted June 6, 1967)**

If Report No. 3 of the Board of Pensions is approved by the Annual Conference, the following resolution must be adapted as an Enabling Act for entering into the New Entrant plan of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of The Methodist Church.

Therefore, your Board of Pensions recommends the adoption of the following resolution as an Enabling Act:

Be it Resolved:

1. That, in accordance with Par. 1644.1 and Par. 1644.3 of the Discipline of 1964, the Central Texas Annual Conference does hereby authorize and establish a New Entrant plan of entering into the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of The Methodist Church, which will fund the future pensions of all new entrants as they serve in the ministry. New Entrants shall be those received on trial during the session of the Annual Conference in which this New Entrant plan becomes effective, and those received on trial thereafter, and those received by transfer into the Central Texas Conference on or after the entry into the New Entrant plan; provided that those members received after forty years of age shall not be accepted as members of the Fund unless an initial provision for service annuity shall be made by or for them in such manner or amount as shall be satisfactory to the executive offices of the general board. This New Entrant plan will become effective at the annual conference of 1968, and specifically as of July 1, 1968, and shall continue for a period of not more than ten years.
2. That each new entrant, under the rules and regulations of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, shall be required to contribute annually into his personal (income annuity) account an amount equal to 3% of the average salary of the Annual Conference, as determined by the General Board of Pensions each year, or, if he so chooses each year, 3% of his ministerial support, which ever is the lesser of the two figures.

3. That the amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the Annual Conference, as determined by the General Board of Pensions each year, for each of the new entrants in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, shall be paid for the Annual Conference by the Conference Board of Pensions from the Conference Claimants Fund.

4. That the cost of funding the pensions for the new entrants on a ten-year-level-payment plan, and for payment of the pensions of those conference claimants not in the New Entrant plan, shall be met by increasing the apportionment for the Conference Claimants Fund for each local church to an amount equal to 21% of the salary apportioned for the pastor and associate pastors.

5. That the action recommended by the Pension Study Committee and adopted by the Annual Conference in 1961, and recorded on pages 163-164 in its 1961 Journal, is hereby ratified and declared to remain effective, except as it may conflict with this New Entrant plan to become effective in 1968.

And Be It Further Resolved:

That the Conference Board of Pensions of the Central Texas Annual Conference be and hereby is authorized, empowered and instructed to effect all arrangements with the General Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church and to do all things necessary to give full force to the intent and purpose of this resolution.

RESOLUTION

For the Elimination of Racial Structure and the Development of Greater Understanding and Brotherhood in The Methodist Church

(Adapted June 6, 1967 by vote of 324 For, and 2 Against)

(As amended and adapted by the General Conference of The Methodist Church in its special session November 10, 1966, Chicago, Illinois. Presented to the

Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for consideration and vote in their 1967 Annual sessions)

1. By the adoption of this Resolution each Annual Conference, each Jurisdictional Conference, the General Conference, each College of Bishops and the Council of Bishops pledge their best efforts to eliminate as soon as possible all forms of racial structure from the organization of The Methodist Church, and further pledge to do everything possible to develop greater understanding and brotherhood in all aspects of church life and work.

2. Each Annual Conference and Jurisdictional Conference which has been part of a merger of churches or Conferences formerly separated by racial distinctions pledges its best efforts to work out all remaining adjustments, to use the ability of both clergy and laymen wherever they can be most effective in the work of the Church, and to serve all people without regard to race.

Where such mergers have not yet been realized, each such Conference expresses its earnest determination to work toward such merger at the earliest possible date and hereby pledges to establish a Committee on Inter-Conference Relations composed of an equal number of ministers, laymen and youth to implement the recommendations and resolutions of this report and recommendation of the Plan of Action for the elimination of the Central Jurisdiction adapted by the 1964 General Conference and that each board and agency of the Church be alert for opportunities to assist each Committee in every possible way.

3. Whenever such mergers hereafter take place the continuing Annual Conference will:

a. Accept into its membership, with all the same rights, privileges, status and obligations, all ministerial members (whether on trial or in full connection) appointed to charges located geographically within the continuing Conference, and all ministerial members under special appointment or retired ministerial members who hold Quarterly Conference membership in a local church located geographically within the boundaries of the continuing Conference.

b. Insofar as possible, the ministerial and lay persons now serving on boards and agencies of both of the merging Conferences shall serve during the current quadrennium on like or similar boards and agencies of the continuing Conference, and thereafter membership in all such Conference boards and agencies shall be open to all persons on the basis of their qualifications without regard to race.

In the event any disciplinary provision limiting the number of members of a board or agency should prevent the continuation of all members during the current quadrennium, the Cabinet shall determine which members shall continue, in the spirit of this Resolution, being careful to provide for a continuing representation of both of the former Conferences.

c. Within the boundaries of such a continuing Conference opportunities for spiritual and intellectual growth in Christian service shall be made available to all without regard to race or color. Such equal opportunities shall be provided particularly in such aspects of Conference programs as activities of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Wesleyan Service Guild, youth work, leadership training enterprises and the Board of Lay Activities.

4. Upon the adoption of this Resolution by the requisite vote in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference, each of the Western North Carolina, North Carolina and Virginia Conferences, all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and all of the Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the North Carolina-Virginia Annual Conference will be dissolved. Each church far-

merly part of the North Carolina-Virginia Conference shall thereupon be merged with and become part of the other of said Annual Conferences within the geographic bounds of which it is located.

5. Upon the adoption of this Resolution by the requisite vote in the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference, in each of the Holston, Tennessee, Memphis, Kentucky and Louisville Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, in all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and in all of the Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the Tennessee-Kentucky Annual Conference will be dissolved. Each church formerly part of the Tennessee-Kentucky Conference shall thereupon be merged with and become part of the other of said Annual Conferences within the geographic bounds of which it is located.

6. Upon the adoption of this Resolution by a 2/3rds vote of those present and voting in each of the Louisiana, Southwest, Texas and West Texas Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, in all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction, and in all the Annual Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction, the bishop formerly serving the Southwestern Area of the Central Jurisdiction shall be transferred to the South Central Jurisdiction for residential and presidential service, and the Louisiana, Southwest, Texas and West Texas Conferences formerly part of the Central Jurisdiction will be Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction.

7. Upon the adoption of this Resolution by a 2/3rds vote of those present and voting in each of the Central Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, Upper Mississippi and South Carolina Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and in all of the Annual Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction and all the Annual Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction, the bishops who are then serving the Atlantic Coast and Nashville-Carolina Areas of the Central Jurisdiction shall be transferred to the Southeastern Jurisdiction for residential and presidential service, and the Central Alabama, Florida, Mississippi, Upper Mississippi and South Carolina Conferences formerly part of the Central Jurisdiction will be Conferences of the Southeastern Jurisdiction. The transfer and merger of Conferences under paragraphs 4 and 5, and the transfer of Conferences under paragraphs 6 and 7 will be effective upon the close of a special session of the Central Jurisdictional Conference of 1967, and the Central Jurisdiction will thereupon be dissolved.

8. By the adoption of this Resolution by the Southeastern and South Central Jurisdictional Conferences and by the Colleges of Bishops of Southeastern and South Central it is determined that beginning in 1968 the episcopal residences and Areas will be so arranged that no Area will be composed solely of Annual Conferences formerly part of the Central Jurisdiction.

9. By the adoption of this Resolution the Council of Bishops evidences its readiness to transfer bishops across Jurisdictional lines in order to effectuate the purpose of this Resolution, and the bishops individually affirm their readiness to serve wherever they can be of greatest use.

10. By the adoption of this Resolution each Annual Conference, each Jurisdictional Conference, the General Conference, each College of Bishops and the Council of Bishops express their determination to do everything possible to bring about the elimination of any structural organization in The Methodist Church based on race at the earliest possible date and not later than the close of the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1972. They further express their earnest determination to do everything possible to develop greater understanding and brotherhood in Methodism as well as in the world.

RESOLUTION**Relative to Proposed Constitution of the
United Methodist Church and Enabling Legislation**

(Adopted June 5, 1967 by a vote of 403 For and 3 Against)

Whereas the 1966 adjourned session of the 1964 General Conference did, by a vote of 749 in favor and 40 opposed, approve the Proposed Constitution of The United Methodist Church and Enabling Legislation, and

Whereas in accordance with Paragraph 10 of the 1964 Discipline of The Methodist Church, said General Conference has submitted the Proposed Constitution of The United Methodist Church and Enabling Legislation to the Annual Conferences for approval,

Therefore, be it Resolved that Central Texas Annual Conference in session at Fort Worth, Texas on June 5, 1967 does hereby approve the Proposed Constitution of The United Methodist Church and Enabling Legislation.

COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION**Report No. 1**

(Adopted June 7, 1967)

Again this year the Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information has taken an active role in the work of promoting a spirit of co-operation between the various agencies concerned with promotion and public relations in the church. A highlight of our year was a joint mid-year meeting and workshop held February 1 at Texas Wesleyan College. A panel presented the subject: Methodist Information in Urban Centers and Rural Areas.

There are several items that we would lift up for consideration by the Annual Conference. The first deals with the District program. We would urge a District Director of Communications be appointed to represent the district in all of the areas of communication and not just Methodist Information. This would include Television, Radio and other news media. Now that our plan for district organization has been used for several years, we want to stress that District Directors will carry a more important role this year. We want to urge the District Superintendents and pastors to use these persons as specialists in the field of Methodist Information. We propose in each district a training program for specific persons in each local church giving them some insight into how news is handled with field trips to newspaper offices and Radio and Television stations. We urge that more time in district pastor's meetings be given to the promotion of the work of Methodist Information with plans being made for discussion and cultivation of news programs. At the request of the District Superintendents we are requesting that more money be made available for the District Directors and their work.

Another area of our Methodist Information program is the area of our special coverage of Annual Conference. We have special persons assigned from many of the local radio and television stations as well as newspapers to cover the sessions for that particular news outlet. At the Conference session we have a news room with equipment and personnel to assist in preparing news for release. These persons release to the outlets matters of news that deal with personalities and churches from a particular area, and this makes it possible for a much broader coverage of news to be presented.

We have also developed what we have chosen to call our "hot-line" news programs. These "hot-line" outlets have agreed to accept long distance calls

and special releases on some of the meetings and gatherings of the Methodist church which are being attended by persons from these respective communities. We are able to place stories and recording on many outlets throughout the conference with this plan and it gives coverage throughout the entire year.

Because of the response we have had to our work from the various representatives of the news media, we recommend across the conference an Appreciation Day, on a local church basis, for the various news media and persons in each area. Let the purpose for this day be to recognize and express gratitude for these persons and the generous help they give the church in telling her story.

We also want to emphasize the importance of the work of the **Texas Methodist** and urge that a time be set for stressing more local church editions, and a wider subscription list for the **Texas Methodist**. All official and every family plans are particularly emphasized. We feel that the **Texas Methodist** is a vital resource for the church and should be found in every Methodist home.

Your Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information is in its infancy as it seeks to creatively be the channel of communication for the connectional Methodist Church. However, it is engaged with related groups in a program to improve the total scope of effectively communicating the Gospel to a complex culture to which the Church is called to minister.

The Commission has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference the following askings for the operation of our Commission for the Conference year 1968-69: The sum of \$1,620 for our expenses according to the budget submitted to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

JOINT BOARD OF PUBLICATIONS**Report No. 2****(Adopted June 7, 1967)**

In April 1965, the Joint Board of Publications meeting in Houston authorized that a study be made concerning the effectiveness of the present program of communications within Texas Methodism. Under the leadership of the editor of the Texas Methodist, this study was made and a report was made to the Texas Planning Commission. The following is a list of requests made to the Planning Commission:

1. That the Texas Methodist Planning Commission recommend to the annual conferences that a Council on Communications be authorized by the annual conferences related to the Texas Methodist Planning Commission, and that 6 representatives from each annual conference be elected by said conferences upon appointment by their respective cabinets.

2. That the chairman of the Texas Methodist Planning Commission name a convenor from those elected by the annual conferences, and that said convenor call the council to meet in the summer of 1967 for the following purposes:

- (1) Choose a permanent name and organizational structure and membership;
- (2) Elect officers for the council;
- (3) In consultation with the five basic communications committees of the annual conferences (TRAFCO, Methodist Information, Publishing Interests, Pro-

motion and Cultivation, Joint Board of Publications) and such other annual conference organizations as it may deem wise, complete the consultation begun by the Joint Board of Publications and the ad hoc Texas Methodist Communications Council (originally brought together to prepare a joint report for the Joint annual conferences held in Dallas in June 1966 and produce a TV documentary of the conference), and suggest to the annual conferences a "Master Plan of Communications for Texas Methodism." The Master Plan would take into consideration:

- (a) Staff and facilities needed at the conference level.
- (b) Staff and facilities needed at the state level.
- (c) Relationships between state and conference level.
- (d) State and conference structures needed for coordinating work of various groups involved in communications, especially the five basic groups mentioned above.

3. That each annual conference make the following contributions to the council for the purposes of the consultation and Master Plan Study.

4. That the West Texas and Texas Conferences of the Central Jurisdiction be invited to participate in the consultations.

5. That communications, including funds for staff, program and facilities as outlined and adopted by the annual conferences following the completion of the Master Plan be made a high priority for the 1968-72 Quadrennium across the state.

These requests were endorsed by the Texas Planning Commission meeting at Lakeview Methodist Assembly in Palestine, February 20, 21.

Therefore, your Joint Board of Publications makes the following recommendations to the Annual Conference:

1. That we give our endorsement to the creation of a Council on Communications, and that six representatives from our conference to the Council be elected after nomination by the cabinet.
2. That we request a contribution of \$300.00 from our conference to the council for the purpose of the Master Plan Study for the year 1967-68.

Your Committee on Rules recommend the following changes in the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference:

RULE 5 AREA EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

The last phase of Paragraph 2 should be deleted and shall then read, "He shall be Chairman of the Executive Secretaries in the Annual Conference and have general oversight over the Annual Conference program."

RULE 7—ELIGIBILITY, PARAGRAPH 5

There shall be added the following sentence, "This shall not apply to membership on the Commission on World Service and Finance, except in cases in which a Board receives direct appropriation of funds from the Conference Benevolent Budget, or, other funds allocated by the Commission."

RULE 16—DISTRICT CONFERENCE, FIRST LINE

The words "where held" shall be inserted following the word Conference and the rule would then read, "The District Conference, where held, shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every church shall have at least one delegate."

RULE 16—DISTRICT CONFERENCE, ADD PARAGRAPH

"District Conference records, where kept, are not to be reported to the Annual Conference Session."

RULE 18—CONFERENCE PROCEDURE, ADD PARAGRAPH

"Lay members and reserve lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected at the Fourth Quarterly Conference and the term shall begin with the ensuing regular session of the Annual Conference and continue until the next regular session of the Annual Conference."

COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION

The Committee on Rules concurs in the request of the Committee on Sustentation to replace paragraph (2) under 4., page 193, Central Texas Conference Journal 1965, with the following statement:

COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION

Report No. 3

Plan of Operation

(Amended June 6, 1967)

1. There shall be a program on sustentation in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of a Committee on Sustentation, to be composed of six persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference. The members of the committee shall be selected for their fitness for service on this commission and may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Three members of this committee shall be ministers and three shall be laymen. These shall serve for the quadrennium.

This committee will have charge of and promote all the interests of the Committee on Sustentation and shall be the determining factor in the final approval of any candidate for participation in this program. Vacancies caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference in the membership of the committee shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and his Cabinet and elected by the Conference. However, the Committee is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointments are to apply only until the session of the Annual Conference following, and then the vacancy will be filled by the regular manner. The committee shall meet and organize by electing a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall serve for the Quadrennium.

2. We recommend that the amount of sustentation granted to an applicant shall be the amount of the current minimum salary.

3. We recommend further that the following shall be eligible for participation:

(1) All ministers of the Central Texas Conference who have been admitted on trial, or have been received into full connection, provided they have not reached the age of voluntary retirement, which is sixty-five (65) years of age.

(2) An approved supply pastor who shall have rendered not less than ten (10) years of full-time approved service as pastor of a charge in the Central Texas Conference.

(3) Any minister, meeting the above requirements, who is relieved of his pastoral duties and is granted a leave of absence from his charge by the Bishop and Cabinet during any Conference year for physical or psychological reasons shall be eligible for sustentation for that portion of the year that remains until the next meeting of Annual Conference.

4. We recommend the following procedure:

(1) The applicant shall make his desire known, in writing, to the Committee on Sustentation.

(2) The applicant must submit to a complete physical examination at the Clinic of The Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas; and, should the examining physician's diagnosis reveal difficulty in the area of the emotional, or the psychological, then the applicant shall submit to an examination by a duly qualified psychiatrist, or psychologist. In any case, the examiner shall give special attention to the following question in making his recommendation to the Committee on Sustentation: "Do you unreservedly feel that one year leave of absence would be conducive to restoration of health so that the claimant might continue in an effective ministry?"

(3) In extreme emergencies, the Committee on Sustentation will consider the diagnosis and recommendation of a duly qualified physician, but not the claimant's personal physician.

(4) When the application is approved by the Committee on Sustentation, the name of the applicant shall be submitted to the Committee on Conference Relations with a request that a leave of absence be granted for a period of one year. With this approval of the Committee on Conference Relations, and the favorable action of the Annual Conference, the applicant shall be eligible for the benefits of this program.

(5) We unreservedly recommend that no person be eligible for sustentation funds for a period exceeding twelve (12) months running consecutively.

(6) All payments shall be made to the claimant monthly.

5. We recommend the following financial plan:

(1) The Committee on Sustentation shall be given authority to draw upon the Operating Reserve of the Central Texas Conference such amounts as are necessary during any given Conference Year to meet the needs of the applicants in accordance with the above suggested practice.

(2) After the amount expended during a Conference Year has been determined, the Committee on Sustentation will make a request to the Commission on World Service and Finance for the inclusion of that amount in the Conference Budget for the ensuing year. This procedure will be most practical for there is no way to actually determine the full amount which will be needed in any Conference Year, and if this plan is followed, there will be no possibility of having surplus or deficit in the money available for the Sustentation Committee.

The Commission has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference the following askings: A total of \$700.00, including mailings and other office expenses \$200.00, ConTRAFCO meetings \$100.00, Training Seminars and other ways of promoting the knowledge and use of audio-visuals \$200.00, and Scholarships to A-V Workshops \$200.00.

The Church has on its hands the problem and the opportunity of what to do with a miracle. The modern medio of communication presents possibly the greatest opportunity for Christian advancement that the world has known since the first century. The potentials are so great that we are tempted either to stand in awe and do almost nothing or to take another avenue of retreat and look on television, radio and films as something in the modern realm of entertainment and of no significant concern of the Church. But if we do this the thousands of commercially vested interests and the fringe groups of religion will take over these terrific ways of communicating. Indeed they almost have done this already. This is a day and an era wherein we must be doers of the Word and not hearers only. And there are great signs of progress if we will see them and each of us seriously set about to do the best we can with these opportunities that we now have to go into the **world, where the world is and as the world is**, with the redeeming message of our Lord.

Let us look upon ten cents per member as our minimal giving each year to the Methodist TV-Radio Ministry Fund. Let us do all that we can to encourage our people in our local churches to see the potential in these new and current methods of communication, to better understand them and to better make them useful to our Christian calling.

The Conference T.R.A.F.C.O. wishes to join with the other communications commissions in urging an ever closer relationship with the other communications groups both in our conference and in the state. Our commission has acted in this regard in cooperating with other conferences in recording statements expressing appreciation to Dr. Carl Keightley. We are now in conversation with the Conference Board of Ministerial Training seeking to jointly develop a plan to aid in the continuing education of our ministers.

In the past year our Commission has encouraged the use of TRAFCO productions and material. We have cooperated in adding to our Conference Film Library

a copy of the Film Documentary produced at last years Conference session. The Commission joined with the Commission on Methodist Information in hosting a seminar-workshop on TRAFCO production **Word and Music**. In the coming year we hope to place this outstanding radio program in as many as possible of the twenty-nine radio markets found within the geographical bounds of our Conference. It is also hoped that we can utilize outstanding professional talent that we have on our Commission in locally producing copy which can be beneficially used by the mass media in promoting Christ in our area.

TEXAS METHODIST PLANNING COMMISSION

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

The Texas Methodist Planning Commission met at the Lokeview Assembly, February 20, 1967. The following resolutions were presented which are to be voted on by each Annual Conference:

1. BE IT RESOLVED that a state-wide Committee on Continuing Education be set up to correlate the total program of continuing education. The Committee to be comprised of either the Chairman of the Committee on Continuing Education or a representative of each of the eight Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualification, Richard Murray and Alsie Carleton of Perkins School of Theology, and the Chairman of the Boards of Managers of the two pastors' Schools. The Chairman of this Committee to be appointed by the Chairman of the Texas Planning Commission.

2. BE IT RESOLVED that a proposal for a change in the Constitution of the Texas Methodist Planning Commission be submitted to the participating annual conferences for approval at their 1967 sessions as follows:

Section 3. The membership of the Texas Methodist Planning Commission delete—"two lay persons from each Annual Conference chosen annually by the Conference Board of Lay Activities"

substitute for the deletion—"the district lay leaders of the participating annual conferences and two women from each annual conference selected by the Conference Executive Committee of the Woman's Society of Christian Service."

And add—"The Chairman of the Conference Council or Inter-Board Council of those annual conferences in which such a council exists."

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

The rapid cultural, social, and economical changes taking place in rural America make new demands upon the church. The blending of the rural and urban societies have produced a new culture throughout our land. It is not rural as we once knew rural; neither is it urban according to the traditions. It is a social culture seeking bigger, better, and more satisfying climate.

The church in town and country is challenged to face the impact of this new social culture, to reconstruct its thinking as a living church of Christ should, so as to meet the human needs of the changing times.

Before 1960 more than one-third of our churches were served by part time pastors and the minimum salary for a married pastor serving full time was \$2,700. Through an extensive program of developing cooperative parishes (Extended Ministry) most of our town and country churches are now served by fully trained and ordained ministers and the minimum salary has been raised to \$4,500. This has been made possible by combining small churches with larger churches and without additional funds being raised for the Minimum Salary Fund.

Before 1960 many rural and small town churches were in desperate need of repair, many laymen had lost pride in their houses of worship. Through the Lord's Acre-Hour Program, we presented a way in which new buildings could be constructed or remodeled. As a result of this concentrated effort more than 100 churches and a number of parsonages have been built or remodeled with Lord's Acre-Hour funds.

Now we see this program being carried on under the direction of Dr. Stanley Williams with the help of the District Secretaries of Town and Country Work. We have experienced a well rounded and successful program in our areas of responsibility.

The Town and Country Commission recommends:

1. Participation of our Conference in the 6th Quadrennial National Methodist Conference on the Church in Town and Country by sending a representative delegation to attend this meeting in Columbus, Ohio in September 1967.
2. The continued effort to define the boundaries of each parish in the Conference in order that no person in the entire geographical area will be without the spiritual aid of pastor and church.
3. Continued education and development of the ministry and laity of our Conference in the increasing need of churches to cooperate in arrangements such as Extended Ministry and Larger Parish.
4. That the Cabinet continue to move in the direction of favorable policy toward full-time trained ministers who must serve a parish appointment with more than one church.
5. That each pastoral charge have enough members to make it financially able to obtain and hold capable pastoral leadership.
6. The promotion of workshops in Districts where needs are greatest in meeting the goals of this Commission and the Conference Program.
7. That "Charge Line Standards," as shown in the 1965 Journal, page 200, continue to be followed in setting up cooperative parishes.

8. Continued explanation of the possibilities of special ministries in Town and Country such as the ministry to resort and vacation areas.
9. Cooperation with the Board of Lay Activities in promotion of stewardship with special emphasis and helps for small churches served by student and part-time pastors.
10. Continuation of emphasis on the Lord's Acre-Hour Plan as a means to provide funds for building programs and special mission projects.
11. Continued emphasis upon Property Improvement and Church Beautification Programs.
12. Continued use of District Secretaries of Town and Country Work for assistance in carrying out the Commission's program and goals.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

(Adopted June 6, 1967)

"When the line of human need crosses the line of our ability to respond to that need, there comes to us, at the point of intersection, the call of God in our lives." From the meeting of the Church and Community Workers Conference at Scarritt College comes this provocative statement. It is like a new explanation of the reason and service of the woman's society and the Wesleyan Service Guild. It is in response to that need that the 13,582 members of our woman's organizations seek to take up the "fellowship of the cross." Somehow this fellowship is strangely appealing.

The mission study theme, "Affluence and Poverty: Dilemma for Christians," has been carried out in many hundreds of people attending study classes in our local churches. District workshops for the preparation of leaders and directors were well attended. The woman's society secretary of missionary education and service has been a member of this local committee to prepare for the studies as well as the district secretaries. The joint work together of those interested in missions, education and of social concerns have all combined efforts and shared materials and plans for the involvement of our people in the call of Christ for the peoples of these various areas.

As a result of the African Workshop of 1966 our conference secretary is

planning a meeting for a follow-up of this endeavor. In the fall there will be workshops in the districts and going on to the local churches. She attended a "Hub-City" workshop in El Paso early in the year. Seeking to bring understanding and acceptance for all the world's people, our women will study the issues now confronting the country of Africa. This is a most complicated area of work. The church is here and serving in many and varied ways to testify to the Lordship of Christ.

The women have used the books of James and First Peter as a basis of learning anew the fact that Christian being and doing naturally follow each other. The text book, "Christian Being and Doing" was used by other groups in the churches, too. The Time A Part, Day A Part and Retreats are some of the results of our studies. Our spring Retreat for the conference usually brings some 200 women together for a study and prayer. All of the special days touches several hundred women in the cultivation of the spiritual life.

Miss Thelma Stevens, Assistant General Secretary, Section of Christian Social Relations, impressed upon us anew our opportunity to become involved with all of our people, at home and around the world. What joy as well as what suffering await those of us who take up the "Cross of Compassion or Caring; the Cross of Confrontation or Claim and the Cross of Controversy or Conflict!" During the Annual Meeting the guest speakers as well as all of the officers and secretaries spoke of the many ways and times we can "Thank God" for work done and yet there are countless challenging and stimulating areas to be touched. All are aware of the tension which exists in the Christian life because of the strain between what we believe and what we do. God helping us, we plan to move in the direction of the needs of our society and strong Christian witness and work. Such is the reason for being a society of Christian Service.

Our women, through their interest in the University World, in missionary education, in recruiting, in interesting other women in the activities and opportunities of our society, through giving to the total budget of the Board of Missions, and supplying money and materials for the various institutions, have made a tremendous mark in the journey toward our goal. They have worked with courage, enthusiasm and devotion. Both society and guild members are engaged in difficult tasks, and tremendous responsibility. Yet they have this assurance that Christ will companion them when they constantly abide in Him and come to know His will as their will.

The joy of assuming a share of the support of the two new couples from our conference, the Harold Crows and the Robert Walkers, has encouraged us to launch a campaign for \$1.00 per member more in pledge giving. Our women know the resources are available and we need to just let the need be known and our Christ-bid women will respond most generously. We know as a Christian family we are a minority in the world, and to have these added to the other world missionaries as well as those who serve in our home-land, but we strive to make this group a leaven in this critical time which heals the hurts, feeds the hungry, clothes the naked and enlightens the mind.

This year has been an exciting journey thus far. Most of those who started together have learned to work as a coordinated team. A part of this team attended the Assembly in Portland, Oregon, and the fifteen who attended received such inspiration and joy created by some 8,000 women, that now they serve with renewed vigor.

Our pledge for the new year is \$132,000.00. Our goals in membership and recruitment are still set high. We have this to guide us as we attempt great things for our church through the Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guilds.

The road stretches toward the horizon, beckoning to new, exciting, unknown vistas ahead. So as we began we say again. where human deeds meet his

brother's needs, there we serve as a call from God. This "Incendiary Fellowship" is worthy of our best efforts and talents. Pray we may continue in the "fellowship of the cross."

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

Special Offerings and Financial Procedures

(Adopted June 7, 1967)

1. The Commission on World Service and Finance approves and recommends that the following offerings be taken in all local churches of the Central Texas Conference on or near the dates designated in the Discipline, or herein designated:

World Service Sunday, on the fourth Sunday of each month.

Methodist Student Day, on the second Sunday in June

Homes For Retired Ministers, on the second Sunday in July.

Christian Education Sunday (formerly Church School Rally Day), on the fourth Sunday in September.

Methodist Mission Home of Texas Sunday, on the third Sunday in October.

World-Wide Communion Sunday, on the first Sunday in October.

Jurisdictional Ministerial Education Sunday, on the third Sunday in October.

Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday, during the month of November.

The Methodist Home, during the month of December.

Reece Relations Sunday, on the second Sunday in February.

One Great Hour of Sharing, on the fourth Sunday in Lent.

Wesleyan Homes, on the second Sunday in May (Mothers' Day).

While no special days are designated for the **Television-Radio Ministry Fund**, and for the **Texas Alcohol-Narcotic Education program**, we approve these special causes for either an appropriation from the budget of the local church, or a special offering taken at such time as the local church determines.

2. The Conference Treasurer once a month shall distribute the receipts from local churches for World Service and Conference Benevolences among the six funds included in the annual budget for the Annual Conference in proportion to their apportionments. Any overpayment at the end of the conference year for World Service shall be remitted by the Conference Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance. Any overpayments in the other five funds (General Administration, Temporary General Aid, Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, Jurisdictional Administration and Conference Benevolences), shall be transferred into the Operating Reserve, subject to the direction of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. All boards, commissions and other agencies, one year in advance, shall make their requests for appropriations from the Conference Benevolences budget, presenting in writing their proposed budget, in detail. This request shall be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance not later than 30 days before the meeting of the Administrative Council.

4. No board, commission, or agency of the Central Texas Conference shall expend any money for any purpose that has not been included in the original budget as approved by the Commission on World Service and Finance, as printed in the Conference Journal, without the specific approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

5. The fiscal year of all boards, commissions, and other agencies operating through the Central Treasury of the Conference shall begin June 1 and close May 31. The treasurers of all boards, commissions, and other agencies of the Annual Conference shall file with the Conference Treasurer a financial statement of receipts and disbursements for the Conference year just closed within seven days after the close of the year.

6. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies, into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempted by the Commission on World Service and Finance), making allowance for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer, if notified in advance, will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new conference year within the limits of the appropriation.

7. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to pay from the Operating Reserve the following items:

- (1) Expense of printing the Journal, which may exceed the budget appropriation,
- (2) Expense of the Conference Secretarial Staff,
- (3) Expense of fidelity bonds for the Conference Treasurer, and others who handle Conference Funds, as determined by the Commission,
- (4) Expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, and the treasurers of boards, commissions, and other agencies of the Conference, as may be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance. Such audits are to be made by the Conference Auditors, the firm of Leatherwood and Ward.
- (5) Other expenditures as may be decided by the Commission on World Service and Finance,

8. The Conference Treasurer is authorized:

- (1) To consolidate the various funds of the annual conference and of its agencies into one or more bank accounts.
- (2) To write all checks for the agencies of the Conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency.
- (3) To invest, at his discretion, such funds not needed for immediate disbursement, in the Texas Methodist Foundation, as may be approved by the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- (4) To purchase, as investments, from the funds of the Conference in its general and subsidiary accounts United States Treasury bills, and to borrow on, or dispose of, these investments at, or prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in the accounts of the Conference at his discretion.
- (5) To deposit funds for specifically designated purposes with Savings and Loan Associations with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

1. The goal for the contributions by local churches for the support of the Methodist Colleges in Texas is \$1.50 per member.

2. The goal for contributions by local churches for the support of the Wesley Foundations shall be 60 cents per member. Such contributions shall not be designated by local churches for any particular Wesley Foundation, but shall be distributed proportionately by the Conference Treasurer in accordance with the recommendations of the Conference Board of Education and approved by the vote of the Annual Conference.

3. Each district is committed to raise an apportionment equal to \$10.00 per pastoral charge for one more year (1967-68) for the Mount Sequoyah Building Fund, at the Western Methodist Assembly, Fayetteville, Arkansas.

4. We rejoice that our Conference has overpaid its three-year Lydia Patterson Institute Emergency Building Fund. We commend continued support of the operating expense of the Institute.

5. The Building Fund Campaign for the Methodist Mission Home of Texas should be completed by March 31, 1969 on the basis of apportionments to the local churches. Payments made by individual church members as part of the Special Gifts program in this building fund should be remitted directly to the Mission Home rather than to the local church and the Conference Treasurer. Such payments do not apply on the quotas assigned to the local churches.

Financial Recommendations

(Adopted June 7, 1967)

1. The Commission recommends that the apportionment for the support of the District Superintendents shall be an amount equal to 8% of the salaries of the pastors and associate pastors, including supply pastors. This amount shall be divided equally among the District Superintendents and shall cover all costs of the office, including salary, operational expense, secretarial and travel expense, and shall include a housing allowance to the amount expended for district parsonage utilities, and shall be paid to each District Superintendent \$1,000.00 per month at the end of each month for the first eleven months of the conference year, and the balance received during the year shall be paid at the end of May. No other apportionment shall be levied against the churches of the district for the work of the District Superintendent except for the provision and maintenance of the district parsonage, as recommended by the District Trustees.

2. The Commission, in consultation with the supervisory committee, has approved the following Executive Secretaries Budgets for 1968-69.

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The salary and office fund for the Area Executive Secretary shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer in monthly payments to the Area Executive Secretary. The salaries for the two Conference Directors shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer in monthly payments to the Conference Directors. Other portions of their budgets shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer by check upon requisitions by the Conference Directors as the funds are needed.

3. The apportionment for Connectional Ministry for the conference year 1967-68 shall be an amount equal to 31% of the salaries of the pastor and associate pastors, including supply pastors. The Conference Treasurer shall distribute funds received for Connectional Ministry according to a scale based on the following percentages: District Superintendents 8%, Episcopal Fund 2%, Minimum Salary Fund 1%, and the Conference Claimants Fund 20%.

The apportionment for Connectional Ministry for the conference year 1968-69 shall be an amount equal to 32% of the salaries of the pastors and associate pastors, including supply pastors. The Conference Treasurer shall distribute funds received for Connectional Ministry in 1968-69 according to a scale based on the following percentages: District Superintendents 8%, Episcopal Fund 2%, Minimum Salary Fund 1%, and the Conference Claimants Fund 21%.

4. The Commission concurs in the recommendation of the Bishop and the Cabinet that the Jurisdictional Ministerial Education goal be that adopted by the Jurisdictional Conference — 1% of the regular budget of each local church (excluding building and other capital improvement items).

5. The Annual Conference in its 1966 Session approved a Conference Special of \$65,000.00 for the year 1967-68. In the Special Session of September 1966 of this amount \$40,000.00 was designated to go to the Glen Lake Expansion Program. The Commission therefore recommends the following allocation of the Conference Special for 1967-68:

JOHN E. BUTTRILL

Reverend J. E. Buttrill, son of Harrison Taylor Buttrill and Bethenia Louise Buttrill, was born December 4, 1888 in Chamber County near Fredonia, Alabama. He married Miss Lena Neal of Temple, Texas, December 14, 1909. To Reverend and Mrs. Buttrill was born one son, Lee R. Buttrill. He survives Brother Buttrill and lives in Fort Worth.

He was converted and joined the Methodist Church in Mansfield in 1902. He attended the Lone Star High School and Southwestern University. Following this he took courses at various times during the summers at Southern Methodist University. While he was attending Southwestern University, he was given his first pastoral appointment at Rogers, in Bell County, in 1908.

Brother Buttrill was licensed to preach April 25, 1907 in the Georgetown District. He was approved as a Supply Pastor in November 1907 in the Central Texas Conference. He joined the Oklahoma Conference on Trial in 1910 and was admitted into Full Connection in the Texas Conference in 1912. He was ordained a deacon in the Texas Conference on November 30, 1913 by Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon and an elder on November 15, 1915 by Bishop James H. McCoy.

During his career as a minister Brother Buttrill served in several Annual Conferences including Oklahoma, Texas, Central Texas, East Oklahoma, West Oklahoma, and Northwest Texas. He transferred into the Central Texas Conference in 1944 and served the following appointments before his retirement in 1952; Hamilton, Trinity in Fort Worth, Comanche, St. Mark in Cleburne. Following his retirement he served Little River and Salado churches as a supply pastor. After his retirement in 1952 Reverend and Mrs. Buttrill made their home in Temple, Texas, until they moved to The Wesleyan Home in Georgetown a few months before his death.

After a rather lengthy illness, he died in a Georgetown Hospital on Tuesday, July 19, 1966. The funeral was held in the First Methodist Church of Temple on July 20 at 10:00 a.m. with Reverend Ervin Gathings of Temple and Reverend Wallace Chappell of Georgetown officiating. The interment was at the Pendleton Cemetery. Surviving him are his wife; a son, Lee R. Buttrill of Fort Worth; and three grandchildren, Mrs. Ron Carmichael of Dayton, Ohio, Robert L. Buttrill of Austin, and Don A. Buttrill of Fort Worth.

Brother Buttrill spent forty-eight years as a minister in the Methodist Church. During these years he endeared himself to many people over the states of Texas and Oklahoma. During his years of retirement, he assisted in a very cooperative way in every manner in the First Methodist Church of Temple.

WILLIAM H. COLE

On Monday, February 20, 1967, a congregation of friends and fellow ministers gathered in the Austin Avenue Church in Waco to share in the service which honored the memory of Reverend William H. Cole. For half a century he had preached the Gospel and had faithfully fulfilled the ministry to which he was called fifty years ago.

William Cole was born in Terrell, Texas, on January 19, 1892 to Richard Hugh Cole and Mattie A. Cole. In 1919, in preparation for the Methodist ministry, he graduated from Southern Methodist University after having attended Baylor University. That same year he and Miss Nettie Lee Hill were married and then began a ministry rich and rewarding which blest the Church for more than forty years. The pastorates to which they were assigned were all within the

bounds of the Central Texas Conference: Riesel and Axtel, Kerens Mission, West and Elm Mott, Ferris, Lorena, Moody, Bartlett, Dublin, Groesbeck, Fort Worth Trinity, Cisco First, Arlington First, Fort Worth Arlington Heights, Stephenville First, Georgetown First, and Waco Service Memorial. Brother Cole served one year as president of Meridian College, five years as Superintendent of the Cisco District and for eight years was Executive Secretary of the Board of Education of his Conference. At the time of his death he attended the Austin Avenue Church in Waco where he had continued a voluntary but greatly appreciated association in the life of the local Church.

Dr. Maggart Howell spoke of the esteem in which Brother Cole was held by the members of the Conference, Dr. Erwin Bohmfalk gave testimony referring to his personal appreciation which had grown through the years in intimate and affectionate association with the Cole family.

To the W. H. Coles were born four children: a daughter, Mrs. T. W. Britt of Waco, and three sons, Hugh S. Cole of Idaho Falls, Idaho; W. Edward Cole of Abilene, and Dr. Richard D. Cole of Lubbock. William's mother, nearly approaching her 100th birthday is living in Waco as is one sister, Mrs. E. G. Hitchcock.

The pastor of Austin Avenue Church conducted the memorial service and spoke of the integrity and sincerity which marked the character of his friend. He quoted a chronicler of another generation and applied the word to William Cole: "In active mind and loving heart and disciplined will, he was not ill prepared for the kingdom to which he has come at the last." His life was a blessing to us all.

Robert Howell Davenport was born September 6, 1894 in Comanche County, Texas, son of James Robert and Amanda Virginia Sudolath Davenport. He attended Comanche High School, Meridian College, Southern Methodist University and Southwestern University.

He was licensed to preach by the Brownwood District in 1923 and was admitted on trial to Central Texas Conference on November 12, 1924. He was received into full connection November 18, 1926, ordained deacon November 21, 1926 and elder November 18, 1928 in Central Texas Conference by Bishop John M. Moore.

On July 2, 1919, he was married to Mary Velma Millican and they were parents of six children, Alma Ruth, Robert Herbert, Ruby Fay, Reta Mae, Mary Virginia and Dorthea Jean.

ROBERT WESLEY GOODLOE

Robert Wesley Goodloe, son of Henderson Clark and Ella Norton Goodloe, was born in Burleson, Texas, February 23, 1888.

He was licensed to preach in the spring of 1914 by the Georgetown District Conference, and was admitted on trial in 1919 and into full connection in 1921 by the West Oklahoma Conference. He was ordained Deacon and Elder under the war emergency regulation in 1918. In 1926 he transferred to the Central Texas Conference.

On December 23, 1919, he was married to Lola Calhoun.

Dr. Goodloe earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from Polytechnic College in 1912, and his Master's degree from Southern Methodist University, where he was president of the first graduating class, in 1916. He received his Bachelor

of Divinity degree from Yale in 1918, and his Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago in 1929.

During World War I he served as chaplain with the AEF, and was decorated with the Chaplain Service Medal.

After a brief career as public school teacher and itinerant minister in the West Oklahoma Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (Fredrick, Ok., 1919-1921), he joined the faculty of the School of Theology of Southern Methodist University as professor of Church History, which post he held with distinction until his retirement in 1956.

During these years he served at various times as delegate to the jurisdictional and general conferences of the Methodist Church, and as a member of several important committees and commissions. He served on the Commission on Course of Study of the Methodist Church; the Committee on Revision of the Ritual; the commission looking toward the union of several branches of Methodism (Methodist Episcopal, Methodist Episcopal, South, and Methodist Protestant); he was a member of the conference which effected this union in 1939. He was also a member of the Federal Council of Churches.

For several years he was Dean of the Texas Pastors' School, and the Director of the Correspondence Schools of the Methodist Church; he was the author of several books dealing with Methodism, its principles and church government, and with the Sacraments; he was a frequent contributor to ecclesiastical journals. In 1933, and again in 1936, he served as interim pastor of Highland Park Methodist Church, Dallas.

Following his retirement from Perkins School of Theology, Dr. Goodloe spent three years on the mission field in the Philippines. Subsequently he taught in Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, in Hendrix College in Conway, Arkansas, and in Centenary College in Shreveport, Louisiana.

He was a trusted and influential leader in both regional and national Methodist Circles.

He died at his home, 3440 Haynie, Dallas, Texas, on Thursday night, September 22, 1966. Funeral services were conducted in the Highland Park Methodist Church on September 25 by Dr. William H. Dickinson, Pastor, Bishop William C. Martin, and Dr. Wesley C. Davis. Burial was in Restland cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lola Calhoun Goodloe; a daughter, Mrs. Leroy S. Moody of Dieren, The Netherlands; a son, Dr. Robert W. Goodloe, Jr., of Conway, Arkansas; and five grandchildren.

In the tribute at the memorial service, Bishop Martin said, "Some of you know that he continued his studies, his writing, his preparation for teaching, up to the very end of the journey. The books he was using and his writing materials are on his desk, even at this moment, just as he left them. His 'Interpreter's Bible' is open at the Letter to the Romans—the fifth chapter. This is the section of that letter, you will recall, which begins: 'Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have obtained access to his grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in our hope of sharing the glory of God.' What better summary of his quiet, confident, faith could have been found from which to move out into that eternal world of the Spirit where he is already 'sharing the glory of God.'"

ANDY KENNETH MARNEY

The story of every life reveals joys and sorrows, defeats and victories. As we think of the joys of life, we think of our homes, our companions and the children born into our home.

The home of Elijah and Mary Marney in Grapevine, Texas was over flowing with happiness on May 22, 1879, when they were blessed by the arrival of a baby boy who was christened Andy Kenneth (better known to his friends as Jack). A few years later, the Marney family moved to Arlington, Texas. Jack graduated from the Arlington High School and attended Southern Methodist University and Texas Christian University where he received his B.A. degree in 1928. He attended Perkins School of Theology, S.M.U., and Brite College of the Bible, T.C.U.

While attending S.M.U., he met a young lady, Bennie McMillan. This acquaintance ripened into a romance which led to the marriage altar on February 2, 1925. For forty-two years the spirit of Christ flowed from this home into the community wherever they were called to serve.

He officially retired on June, 1962, but supplied the Lingleville Charge until the time of his death.

After several years of illness and much suffering, Brother Marney transferred his membership to the Church Triumphant on May 25, 1967. The services were conducted by James H. Ellison, Wm. M. Greenwaldt, and Chas. H. Cole. His earthly body was laid to rest amid his loved ones and friends in the Park Dale Cemetery, Arlington, Texas. Survivors are: his wife and two sons: Mac Andrew and Rev. Benjamin Barton Marney; three sisters: Mrs. I. I. Isbell, Mrs. E. G. Martin, and Miss Bess Marney; six grandchildren; and a host of friends whose lives were blessed by his ministry.

JOHN R. MERITT

John Ralph Meritt was born Sept. 18, 1904 in Smith Grove, Kentucky, and died March 9, 1967 in Cisco, Texas. He was buried in the Scranton Cemetery in Scranton, Texas, where his father and mother came when John was a small boy. His father was Embrey A. Meritt and his mother was Ella Snoddy Meritt.

Brother John married Iva May Bailey July 21, 1923 and they have one son, John Loyd Meritt, and two grandchildren.

Officiating ministers were Rev. J. Morris Bailey, Rev. Vernon Whittington, Rev. J. Lester Davenport, and Dr. S. Wayne Reynolds.

Rev. Meritt attended Scranton High School, graduating in May, 1923; attended Randolph Junior College, Cisco 1932-34; from Randolph he went to Daniel Baker College in Brownwood

1934-36, receiving his B. A. degree in 1936.

John was licensed to preach Nov. 1932 by the Cisco District Conference and was an approved supply pastor in the Central Texas Conference Nov. 1935. He served the Cross Cut Circuit, Brownwood District for one year, as a student supply pastor.

He was admitted on trial Nov. 1936 in the Central Texas Conference and into full connection Nov. 12, 1938. He was ordained Deacon Nov. 12, 1938, in the Central Texas Conference by Bishop Ivan Lee Holt and also was ordained Elder Nov. 10, 1940, in the Central Texas Conference by Bishop Holt.

The following appointments were served by John during his ministry: 1936, Cross Cut; 1937-38, Wingate; 1939-41, Norton; 1942, Talpa-Crews; 1943-47,

Ft. Worth, Lake Worth; 1948-1950, Meridian; 1951-52, Cleburne, Anglin St.; 1953-54, McGregor; 1955-57, Midlothian; 1958, Waco, Sparks Memorial; 1958-60, Taylor, First; 1961-63, Grapevine (to Sept. 14, 1964); 1963, Sabbatical Leave; 1964, Retired.

John Meritt had fought a good fight and had kept the faith; and now had found the true crown of righteousness. John dedicated his entire life to God, The Methodist Church, and was a real soldier of the cross. In all the years this writer knew him, he never knew him to be a well man, physically, but never did he know of this minister to complain. He was always cheerful, a devoted husband and father, and a soul-winner for Christ and His church. In checking his records, he always won souls for Christ and never came to conference with a barren charge, but always had additions on profession of faith.

John will not stand before God empty-handed, but can say he planted the good seed and reaped a harvest. A favorite poem sums up some of this minister's thoughts when we read "Crossing The Bar" by Alfred Tennyson.

Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call for me!
And may there be no mourning of the bar,
When I put out to sea,
But such a tide as moving seems asleep,
To full far sound and foam,
Where that which drew from out the boundless deep
Turns again home.

Twilight and evening bell,
And after that the dark!
And may there be no sadness of farewell,
When I embark.
For tho' from out our bourne of Time and Place
The flood may bear me far
I hope to see my pilot face to face
When I have crossed the bar.

To those of us who are left behind, may we let Mr. John L. McCreery speak to us through his poem.

"There is no Death"

There is no death! The stars go down
To raise upon some other shore,
And bright in heaven's jeweled Crown
They shine for evermore.

There is no death! The forest leaves
Convert to life the viewless air;
The rocks disorganize to feed
The hungry moss they bear.

OSCAR ANDREW MORTON

Oscar Andrew Morton was born February 16, 1882 at Dublin, Texas. His parents were Rev. John Early and Elizabeth Culwell Morton. On September 25, 1901 he was united in marriage with Miss Jimmie Eudora Gray and they settled on a farm in Erath County where they were to make their home for four years. It was then that the Call to Preach came and in September 1905 he was granted the License to Preach by the Dublin District. In December 1908 he was appointed as a supply pastor on the Bluff Dale Circuit and three years later was admitted on trial in 1908. He was admitted into full connection in 1913 to the Central Texas Conference; ordained Deacon in 1910 by Bishop Atkins and Elder in 1916 by Bishop McCoy.

Thus began the long road of the ministry which proved to be a blessing to countless lives of men and their families across the years until the time of his death on November 4, 1966 in the Graham General Hospital. He was surrounded by those who loved him and those who had cared for him in the tedious hours of his suffering. It was altogether fitting that when the moment came, he lifted his feeble hand as though pronouncing the Benediction upon those who were waiting. Then with his face shining as with a heavenly light, his soul departed to that better country to meet his Maker and to be reunited with his companion and one of their sons, Thomas Charley Morton and other loved ones who preceded him there.

The Service of Memorial was held in First Methodist Church, Graham, Texas and his body was laid to rest in the Pioneer Cemetery of that City. Those who participated in the service were: Dr. D. L. McCree, his pastor; Dr. S. Wayne Reynolds, his District Superintendent; Rev. William M. Greenwaldt, a kinsman and former pastor. They were guided by the detailed plan that Brother Morton had long since worked out for his own funeral service.

This account would not be properly done if the writer failed to add some insight into this magnificent but unassuming life. The measure of a man is often best seen after he is gone. Brother Morton had a firm grip upon the reality of God which enabled him to be a source of stability and inspiration to those with whom he lived and worked. He stood erect in the world as a child of God, humble and unafraid. He was a man of sterling character, whose convictions were determined not by the pressures of those about him but by those lessons of life he learned at the instruction of God's Holy Spirit.

Such a stalwart life was presaged by both heredity and environment. The majesty of it, however, is not to be found in what these contributed to him but rather in what he has done for the lives of others. His children can give the best testimony of this truth. Those who survive are: Rev. J. E. Morton, member of the Central Texas Conference; Mrs. Alda Daniell of De Leon; Mrs. Louise Rose of Graham; Mrs. Loree Huey of Gustine; Mrs. Katherine Whitten of Fort Worth; Mrs. Marjorie Carpenter of Argyle and Paul Morton of Wichita Falls. These are joined by twelve grand-children and fifteen great grand-children and three sisters.

This man of God has left a rich heritage in the communities where he and his family lived. Both he and his family were good examples of the quality of people the Gospel of Christ enables people to become. His faith was as simple as the sort of life surroundings from which he came and from which he never moved for. But that faith was profound in its simplicity. Perhaps it is best expressed in the language of the hymns he chose to be sung by Mrs. Gretchen Smith at his funeral. "Amazing Grace," "Just as I Am," "How Great Thou Art" and "In the Sweet By and By." It was with a note of glory and victory that the congregation joined in singing, "we shall meet on that beautiful shore."

The following are the charges that Brother Morton served: Bluff Dale Circuit, Kokomo Mission, Sipe Springs, Corleton, Groford (twice), Woxohochie Circuit, Bosqueville, Prairie Hill-Kirk, Gustine-Lomkin, Rockwood, Cisco Wesley, Millsop-Brozos, Tolpo-Crews, Troy-Pendleton, Groham Circuit, Aledo, Morgan-Kopperl, Bethel and Gustine. Following his retirement in 1948, he and his companion lived for a time in the Home for Retired Ministers in Blanket. After moving to the home in Groham he served on the staff of First Methodist Church of that city as the Minister to the shut-ins.

Retirement for him never meant idleness. Beyond his active connection with the church, he spent his time making the Retired Minister's Home provided for him by the Conference a place of beauty. He insisted to the very last that "church property ought to be the best kept property in any town." He had the gift of making things grow and was tireless in providing the necessary cultivation to make this come to pass. This was the real secret of his ministry. He loved people and sought to cultivate them so that they would find the Christian life a growing experience. Thus he nurtured his children, his people and all who knew him in the faith that was for him his way of life.

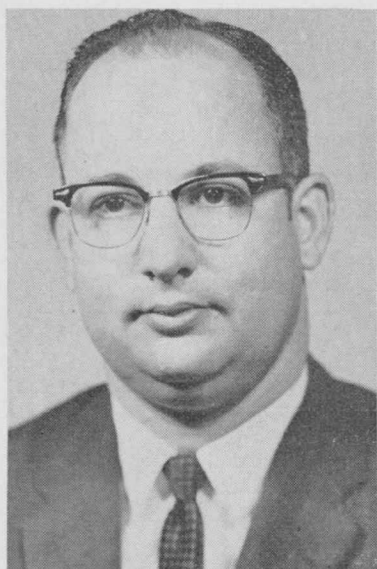
A long time friend of Brother Morton, Mrs. Mary Lillian Blockstock of Groham penned these lines in his memory:

Robert Lynn Oglesby was born January 31, 1926 in New Haven, Connecticut, the son of Jackson C. and Florence Oglesby. He attended High School in Groesbeck, Mart, and Denison, graduating in 1943. He received his college education at S.M.U., Schreiner Institute, and Southwestern University, graduating from the latter with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1950. Robert's death occurred May 20, 1967, in an automobile accident near the Lake Whitney dam. He is survived by his wife and two sons, his mother and father, and a sister, Dorothy May Perkins. A service exalting God and honoring Robert's life was held in the First Methodist Church of Meridian, Texas, Monday, May 22, 1967, with Bishop W. Kenneth Pope bringing the message, Dr. L. In 1943 the greatest challenge of her life came. She was sent to establish a "Community Center" in Robstown, Texas. For twelve years she laboured in love, and left lovely and adequate buildings on the vacant lots she had been assigned to.

She came home in poor health, but worked part time in the Latin American center in Waco. The following year the Woman's Division persuaded her to go to Elroy, Arizona for three years to direct the work in another Welfare Center.

Miss Ollie came home very ill and needing to retire, but the Church called again. The Wesley House in Houston had been taken in by the Freeway and a new one must be built. No one was more qualified for the job. She answered the call and built a lovely Wesley House in Houston.

Few people in our great church have laboured more zealously, and overcome more handicaps than Miss Ollie. She was always concerned about her church, the Woman's Society, and others.

The writer, assisted by Rev. T. S. Ogle, officiated at the funeral service, and her body was laid to rest in the East Waco Cemetery.

We feel that the Lord has said to Miss Ollie, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

MRS. HERMAN F. BOHMFALK

Mrs. H. F. Bohmfalk (nee Louise Emma Homburg) was born May 4, 1875 at Phillipsburg, Texas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Homburg. As a child the family moved to Perry, Texas where, after her confirmation at the age of 13, she became a full member of the Methodist Church. At 15 years of age she was forced by circumstances to go to work. She secured employment as a maid and served in that capacity for several prominent Waco families.

As a young woman she met and married the Rev. Herman F. Bohmfalk, then a student in theological school at Blinn Memorial College, the Methodist training center for ministers in the Methodist Episcopal Church. Their first pastoral charge was the Perry Methodist Church. Then followed in succession the appointments of Rose Hill, Guadalupe

Volley, Riesel (now Meier Settlement), and Franklin Street Church (now Napoleon Avenue) in New Orleans, La. In 1908 her husband's health became impaired with tuberculosis. The family moved to Hondo, Texas to regain his health; then moved to Copperas Cove. His health continued to fail so after moving to Long Grove, Texas, he died on January 6, 1910.

Mrs. Bohmfalk moved with her four small sons to Mart, Texas where all four boys were later graduated by the Mart High School. While pastor at Riesel, her husband had organized a new Methodist Church at Mart and built the church and parsonage. The latter was never occupied by a pastor and it became the home of the Bohmfalk family after his death.

All of her husband's ministry was in the Southern German Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. German was spoken in the home and German services held until his appointment to New Orleans to a bi-lingual Church.

Her home was always a haven of religious life and influence. Family prayers were the order of the day. Under desperate circumstances at times, she managed to hold her home together. As a result, all four sons became, in later life, active members of the church. One of her sons after a few years in the banking business, became a Methodist minister, thus completing three generations of ministers in the Methodist Church as her father-in-law, the late Rev. Friede Bohmfalk, having also been a minister. Her interest in the church and in the world were kept alive at all times. Her mind stayed clear to the last though nearly 92 years of age. Always her interests were in the church and her family.

After the unification of the three branches of Methodism in 1939, she was assigned to the Central Texas Conference as a preacher's widow. Although confined to a wheel chair for several years, she maintained her own apartment in Waco, Texas until it became necessary for her to be moved to the Hillhaven Nursing Home in that city. In 1965 she was moved to the Park Plaza Nursing Home, Mart, Texas. Following serious surgery on Feb. 11, 1967, she lived for five weeks and died on March 17, 1967 in Hoven Manor, Waco.

Mrs. Bohmfalk is survived by A. W. Bohmfalk, Sr., New Orleans, La.; Dr. Erwin F. Bohmfalk, retired and living in Estes Park, Colo.; Lorenz H. Bohmfalk, Dallas, Texas. Her youngest son, Homer L. Bohmfalk, preceded her in death in 1958.

Funeral services were held in the Connally Funeral Chapel, Waco, Texas on March 18, 1967. Officiating were the Rev. John Harper, her pastor at the time of her death; Dr. Moggort Howell, District Superintendent of the Waco District; the Rev. Wolter L. Froehner, Son Antonio, Texas, her brother-in-law. She was buried in the Cemetery of the Perry Methodist Church.

MRS. JOSEPH S. BOWLES

Mrs. Joseph S. (Flora Gatlin) Bowles, daughter of A. J. Gatlin and wife Lula Lonis Gatlin, was born August 31, 1881 near Lockhart, Texas. Her pioneer father and mother, natives of Missouri and Tennessee respectively, were soon to move to Bozar in Brown County where they engaged in ranching, and in 1889 to Goldthwaite where Mr. Gatlin established a mercantile business which he was to operate for many years, expanding to other communities in which he opened stores. At the age of 17 young Miss Gatlin became a clerk in her father's general Mercantile Store in Goldthwaite.

In 1901 Miss Gatlin entered the senior class in the Sam Houston Normal Institute, Huntsville, Texas, by examination since her preparatory studies had been in the unaffiliated schools of Mills County. Upon receiving her diploma she entered the teaching profession and taught in the public schools of Texas for thirty years. In 1922 she received her B. A. degree from Texas Woman's College, Fort Worth, and in 1928 her Master's Degree from the University of Texas.

In 1910 she was married to the Rev. Joseph S. Bowles III, a Methodist minister. Mrs. Bowles led a very active life, working with young people in the public schools and with adult and youth groups as a wife and helpmate of her minister husband. The Bowles served together in his pastoral appointments at San Saba, Cuero, Midland, Brownsville, Santa Anna, Italy, Line Street in Hillsboro, and Haslet. Two children were born and reared in their parsonage home: a son Joseph S. Bowles, Jr. now living in Grand Prairie and a daughter, Mrs. Mary B. Piccione who resides in Media, Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Bowles, a woman of letters, was author of two books: "A No Man's Land Becomes a County," being the history of Mills County published in 1958, and "The History of Trinity County," published in 1966.

A lifelong church member and devoted Christian, Mrs. Bowles was active in the church and the Woman's Society of Christian Service until her last illness. She was also active in the Mills County Historical Society and in the Goldthwaite Self Culture Club as a charter member since its organization in 1905. Following the years of service in the pastorate Mrs. Bowles resided in Fort Worth after moving there in 1936 with her husband who had retired because of ill health. Her husband preceded her in death on December 29, 1948. Funeral services for Brother Bowles were held in the Trinity Methodist Church where he and Mrs. Bowles had been active and devoted workers and participants in the life and fellowship of that congregation. Mrs. Bowles was a member of Trinity Methodist Church until 1960 when she moved back to her home community of Goldthwaite and transferred her membership to the church there. Following a period of declining health and illness Mrs. Bowles died on Sunday, February 26th, 1967 in the Colonial Manor Rest Home in Fort Worth where she was receiving nursing care the last few weeks.

X—MISCELLANEOUS

STANDING RULES

I. Organization

1. Administrative Council

There shall be an Administrative Council of the Central Texas Conference, The Methodist Church, to initiate and promote the quadrennial program of the Conference. The Council shall be the Executive Committee of the Conference. It shall meet within 30 days after the annual session and at such other times on call of the Chairman.

2. Membership

The Administrative Council shall be composed as follows: the Cabinet, the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, the Chairman and one other person of each Conference Board and Commission one of whom shall be a lay person and the other a minister except where there is no authorized lay person on the Board or Commission, the Conference Lay Leader and the District Lay Leaders, one pastor from each district to be nominated by the Cabinet, the Conference President and Vice-President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Conference Youth Organization and one other young person, the Conference Secretary-Treasurer, Conference Statistician, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Secretary of Missions, the Chairmen of all Standing Committees, the Conference Chairman of the Texas Methodist College Association, all General and Jurisdictional Board members and General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates not otherwise holding membership on the Council, and such other members as may be nominated by the Executive Committee. All paid employees of the Conference, its agencies, and the chief officer of institutions shall have the privilege of the floor but without vote.

3. Officers

Officers of the Administrative Council shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Secretary. They shall be elected at the first meeting of the Council in each quadrennium. The Chairman shall be elected by ballot without nomination. Other officers may be elected by show of hands. The officers shall serve throughout the quadrennium.

4. Executive Committee

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Administrative Council to be composed as follows: the three officers of the Council, the Bishop, the Area Executive Secretary, the Cabinet, the Chairmen of the Boards of Education, Missions, Evangelism, Christian Social Concerns, Lay Activities, Hospitals and Homes, Pensions, the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

The minutes of all meetings of the Executive Committee shall be mailed to all members of the Administrative Council within ten days after each meeting.

5. Area Executive Secretary

There shall be an Area Executive Secretary, to be selected and appointed in the same manner as the Discipline outlines for the appointments of a District Superintendent, that is, by the Bishop. The said Area Executive Secretary shall be appointed at the 1965 session of the Annual Conference. The term of office shall be limited to eight years.

The Area Executive Secretary will be responsible to the Bishop and to the Executive Committee of the Administrative Council. His duties in the Central Texas Conference shall be to initiate, to coordinate, and to implement the program of the conference in cooperation with the boards and agencies of the Conference. He shall be the Chairman of the Executive Secretaries in the Annual Conference and have general oversight over the Annual Conference program.

After consultation with the Bishop of the area, the portion of the Area Executive Secretary's budget for the Central Texas Conference shall be provided by the Commission on World Service and Finance, it being understood that the total amount from this Conference shall not exceed \$13,000 for the Conference year 1965-66.

A liaison committee composed of the Bishop, the Chairman of the Administrative Council, and a member of the Cabinet, chosen by the Bishop, shall serve along with a like committee from the North Texas Conference as a coordinating policy committee of the area to work with the Area Executive Secretary.

II. Boards, Commissions and Committees

6. Nominations

The District Superintendents at the beginning of the quadrennium shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no person may be nominated on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Annual Conference, except where the Discipline provides for membership because of an office held. This rule is not applicable to the District and Associate District Lay Leaders, the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation. The District Superintendents shall also nominate at the end of any normal term members of any Board, Commission, or Committee.

All executive secretaries of the boards and agencies of the Annual Conference, beginning in 1965, shall be limited to a term of eight years.

7. Eligibility

"The period of eligibility of membership on the Boards, Committees, and Commissions of the Annual Conference shall not exceed two consecutive quadrenniums, a total of eight years, except as set out below. When a person is elected to fill an unexpired term, he shall be given an expiration date for the end of the quadrennium that is not less than six years nor more than nine years in the future.

A member who has served two full quadrenniums on any Board, Commission, or Committee shall not be eligible for membership on the same Board, Commission, or Committee until a full quadrennium has passed. If a member has served less than two full quadrenniums, he shall be eligible again for membership after one full Conference Year has passed.

In appointing new Quadrennial Boards, Commissions, and Committees, the Cabinet shall have the power to appoint new members for only four years, in order to equalize the number who are eligible to serve four years with those eligible to serve eight years.

Nevertheless, the above shall not apply to membership on the Board of Lay Activities as it relates to the nomination of a Conference lay leader. A Conference Lay Leader is eligible for a term of no more than eight consecutive years.

Employees and Trustees of institutions, or employees of Conference Boards and Commissions, shall not be eligible for membership on the Board, Commission, or Committee through which financial support is derived. This shall not apply to

membership on the Commission on World Service and Finance, except in cases in which a Board receives direct appropriation of funds from Conference Benevolences budget or other funds allocated by the Commission.

The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees to take effect at the time of his appointment, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission, or Committee. The Bishop is asked to notify such group in time to fill the vacancy before the Conference adjourns.

8. Vacancies

Vacancies on all Boards, Commissions, and Committees occurring during the quadrennium shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference.

Retirement from the active itineracy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board or Commission and on all Institutional Boards, effective on the date such relationship is taken.

Boards, Commissions and Institutions related to the Annual Conference shall not take any action that in effect shall nullify this rule.

Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two consecutive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

III. Financial

9. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from June 1st to May 31st, and salaries of clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

10. Remittances

Remittances from a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Commission on World Service and Finance. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which remittance is made. The Conference Treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the District Superintendent for each remittance. The Pastor shall enclose these voucher receipts with his Annual Conference report as verification of items reported in Table II.

11. Requests for Appropriations

At the beginning of the paragraph in the report of any board, commission, committee or agency, which presents a proposed budget or asking as an appropriation from Conference Benevolences, or any other conference fund, there shall be printed the following statement: "The board (commission, committee, or agency) has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference, the following askings:"

12. Apportionments

The apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be based on the total money raised (item 99 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness (item 51 in Report to Annual Conference) and less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 52 in the Report to Annual Conference.) It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to compute the apportionments annually, using the statistics of the last published journal (corrected, if necessary) and

furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. District Superintendents will use the best possible approach in distributing the askings to the individual churches of the districts.

13. Annual Audit

The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

Annually, each Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed Conference Calendar unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit including current annual income and expense together with its report, to the appropriate Board.

14. Special Days and Campaigns

Any request from a Board or institution or special interest of the Methodist Church asking for a special campaign for funds or a Special Day Offering shall first be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and recommendation. If such recommendation is made to the Annual Conference it must show that the object or enterprise is wholly owned by The Methodist Church; that the detailed use of funds is reasonable; and that proper safeguards have been set up for the use of funds.

Any recommendation from a Board, Commission, or Committee, including the Commission on World Service and Finance, asking for an increase that will effect the Budget of the local church, if approved, shall not become effective for one year from that date.

IV. Administrative

15. Conference Secretary-Treasurer

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Commission on World Service and Finance after consulting with the Bishop and his Cabinet, the Board of Pensions, and the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be under the supervision of the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. He shall also serve as the Treasurer for the Board of Pensions and the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

The term of office of the Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily be a quadrennium and a newly elected Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily assume his official duties at the session following the General Conference.

16. District Conference

The District Conference, where held, shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate. District Conference records, where kept, are not to be reported to the Annual Conference Session.

17. Reports

The reports of the pastors to Annual Conference (Tables I and II) and final payments to the Conference Treasurer for all connectional items shall be presented at a district meeting to be held within two weeks of the opening date of the Annual Conference. The Conference Statistician shall set the time and place for the district meetings, and shall appoint a District Statistician for each district, who shall receive, audit, and compile the pastors' statistical

reports into the district report, and shall receive and forward the same day final remittances from the local churches to the Conference Treasurer. The District Statisticians shall forward the district statistical tables to the Conference Statistician within one week after the district meeting. No change in the statistical tables will be made after the district meeting.

Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Committee on Proportional Payments any church in the district that has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, or World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrowed must be made a part of the record.

He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attention during the year, and had not been reported.

18. Conference Procedure

Lay members and reserve lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected at the Fourth Quarterly Conference and the term shall begin with the ensuing regular session of the Annual Conference and continue until the next regular session of the Annual Conference.

All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary before they are presented to the Conference.

All bonds required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

19. Conference Expense

The Conference Committee on Entertainment, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of retired ministers.

Each charge in the Annual Conference is expected to defray the expense of its minister and lay delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

Per diem allowance will be granted pastors receiving a total salary of, or less than, the amount recommended year by year by the Committee on Conference Entertainment and approved by the Annual Conference.

20. Car Expense

For the quadrennium 1964-1968, all Boards, Commissions, and Committees, of the Conference shall allow six cents per mile car expense, or eight cents when two or more members ride in the same car, for necessary travel within the Conference or adjacent territory. Five cents per mile shall be allowed for out of the state travel. Members of Conference Agencies are urged to use car pools wherever possible.

21. Memoirs

There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

22. Amendments

Any of the above rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference.
