OPENING SESSION - MONDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 3, 1968

Opening Worship—The Central Texas Conference met in its one hundred third session (the fifty-ninth since the division from the old Northwest Texas Conference, and the thirtieth since unification in 1939 and the first as The United Methodist Church) in First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, at 4:00 P.M., Mondoy, June 3, 1968, Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, presiding.

Sidney Roberts, Worship Leader, led in the Memorial Service for the bishops of the church, wives and widows of bishops, and members of the Central Texas Conference and their wives or widows who passed owoy during the last Conference year. Following the singing of the Hymn No. 536, "For All The Soints," the Conference was led in prayer by C. H. Sisserson. Gory Huddleston sang a solo, "The Lord's Prayer."

J. D. F. Willioms, Secretary of the Conference, read the names of those who have departed this life in the past Conference year. As each name wos reod a condle was lighted in his or her memory. Acolytes were Yvonne Field and Becky Wiegand. The memoriol address was given by John Wesley Ford. The hymn No. 306, "Blest Be the Tie Thot Binds," was sung.

The Service of Holy Communion was observed, led by Bishop Pope. He was ossisted by the eight district superintendents. An offering was received for the choplains serving our men in Vietnam. The closing hymn No. 143, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee," was sung and Bishop Pope gave the benediction.

Report No. 2

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

Para. 738. In each Annual Conference af the United Methadist Church an Annual Conference Council shall be arganized.

1. **Purpose.** The purpose of the Canference Cauncil shall be: (a) to receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district agencies, the Annual Canference agencies, and the Jurisdictianal and General Pragram Cauncils; (b) to develop these recommendations into a comprehensive and unified program to be recommended to the Annual Canference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Canference program, and (c) to pravide implementation for an administration of the unified program as adopted by the conference.

1968

2. Membership. The membership of the Canference Council shall consist of the presiding bishop, the district superintendents, representatives of conference agencies as determined by the conference, the canference secretary, two representatives of the conference youth organization, ane layman from each district, chairmen af oge-level deportments, and such additional members as the Annual Conference may determine.

The following shall be members of the council without vote: solaried and volunteer Annual Conference staff, the conference treasurer, and one or more members af the Commission on World Service and Finance.

3. **Officers.** The officers of the council shall be a choirman, a vicechoirman, a secretory, and a treosurer. They shall be elected by the council.

4. **Executive Committee.** There shall be an **executive committee** cansisting of the officers, the bishap, at least one district superintendent chosen by the Cobinet, the director of the council, and other members as the Annual Conference moy determine. Approximately one half of the members of the executive committee shall be laymen. Total members not to exceed 30.

5. Committees, Task Forces, and Consultations. The council shall appoint o Committee on Interpretation, and o Committee on Television, Radio, and Film Cammunication. It may appaint such other committees, task forces, and consultations as may be deemed essential to the effective discharging of its responsibilities.

6. Age-Level Departments. The council may appoint age-level departments as it deems necessary to the performance of its duties.

7. **Director.** The cauncil shall elect, upan nomination by the bishop and district superintendents, an executive officer, to be known as the **conference program director.** He shall be in consultative relationship to the conference Cabinet on matters relating to correlation, implementation, and administration of the conference program.

8. **Staff.** All Annual Conference program staff shall be employed by, directed by, and omenable to the Conference Cauncil, and shall be known as the **Conference Council staff.** Ordained ministers on the staff are subject to being appointed by the presiding bishop, in consultation with the agency involved.

9. **Relationships.** The council shall have the following relationships including the omenabilities indicated:

a) All District and Annual Conference agencies shall submit the elements of program which are to be promoted in, supported by, or implemented by the local churches of the conference to the Conference Council for consideration, correlation into a unified pragram, and calendaring priar to submission to the lacal churches. The Conference Council may request District or Annual Conference agencies to implement a program for the entire conference.

b) The Conference Council staff shall be responsible, in cooperation with the district superintendents, for the implementatian of the conference program.

10. Function. The functions of the Annual Conference Council are:

a) To study the mission of the Annual Conference and the local churches of the conference and to determine program emphasis which will assist the canference and the local churches to perform their mission.

b) To describe, correlate, and organize opportunities to serve within the mission.

c). To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the District and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Program Councils, to evaluate these recommendations, and to formulate a correlated and unified conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for adoption.

d) To provide for implementation and administration of the program adopted by the conference.

e) To provide program resources and assistance in program planning and implementation for local churches.

f) To provide staff personnel far implementing and administering the conference program.

h) Ta give leadership in research and planning agencies.

1) To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the conference.

j) To study and correlate the budget askings of the conference agencies as they relate to conference program and to make recommendations regarding the same to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

k) To interpret the conference program to the local churches with a view of gaining financial support needed in order to implement that program.

Para. 739. In each Annual Conference Council, chosen by it and amenable to it, there shall be a Committee on Interpretation.

1. **Functions.** It shall, in cooperation with the Conference Council, promote the pragram of world service and other general benevolence causes in the pastoral charges of the conference in cooperation with the Division of Interpretation of the General Program Council. It shall coordinate the promotion of all approved general and conference benevolence causes, including general and conference Advance specials, the One Great Hour of Sharing, the Television-Radio Ministry Fund, the Fellowship of Suffering and Service, the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, and other general benevolence causes except as otherwise directed by the General Conference, and shall assign the responsibility for the promotion of approved causes that do not clearly belong to an existing agency.

2. **Finance**. The budget for the committee shall be provided by the conference through its Commission on World Service and Finance.

Para. 740. In each Annual Conference Council, chosen by it and amenable to it, there shall be a Committee on **Television, Radio, and Film Communication**, which, in cooperation with the program boards and other agencies in the conference, shall have for its purpose serving the conference in the field of Communication by:

a) Promotion of the principles of good communication.

b) Promotion of the use of mass-communication methods and materials by the local churches.

c) Promotion of the Television-Radio Ministry Fund in cooperation with the Committee on Interpretation. (See Para. 780)

d) Where necessary, establishment of audio-visual libraries and assistance in training audio-visual librarians.

Production and distribution of programs for conference-wide use. .e)

f) Cooperation with the Conference Board of Education and other conference agencies to provide training opportunities for leaders in the use of audiovisual methods and materials.

g) Service to other agencies of the conference, and close cooperation with the conference or area public relations office.

h) Cooperation with other agencies to organize and train local-church Intercommission Audio-Visual Committees.

i) Cooperation with the general Division of Television, Radio, and Film Communication in the promotion and placement of television and radio programs within the conference.

Report No. 3

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

The Administrative Council recommends that the Annual Conference authorize the holding of an annual meeting to be held within three weeks after the adjournment of the Annual Conference session for all ministers entering upon their first appointment in the Central Texas Conference, including approved supply pastors, ministers admitted on trial, or received by transfer.

The purpose of this meeting shall be to acquaint these new ministers of our annual conference in their personal and professional relations with the distinctive aspects of the Central Texas Conference. This meeting is not for the purpose of considering any aspect of the annual conference program.

The arrangements for this meeting shall be placed in the hands of a committee composed of the Chairman of the Annual Conference Council, the Chairman of the Cabinet, and the Conference Secretary-Treasurer.

AREA COUNSELING MINISTRY

The Area Counseling Program has completed two years of activity serving the ministers and their families of the North and Central Texas Conferences. In addition to this phase of the program, the director, the Reverend De Forrest Wiksten, has also worked in close relationship with the two Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualifications in serving as a counselor to candidates for the ministry.

The committee recommends to the Central and North Texas Conference Commissions on World Service and Finance that an amount of \$10,500.00 be placed in each annual conference budget for 1969 to underwrite the following Area Counseling budget:

CONFERENCE BROTHERHOOD

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

The Bratherhoad of the Central Texas Conference has served long and beneficially in its intended purpose. For several decades this arganizatian, through private and brotherly concern, has pravided many tens of thousands of dollars to survivors of ministers and their wives ar widows. It has been ready at a time of need and has assisted through the medium of uncommon concern.

As such, the Bratherhood now becomes part of the larger concern of the minister and his family. A new committee is to include expanded benefits. The spirit of brotherhood will continue in wider dimensions.

Figures show that this year 17 calls have been made in behalf of participants. 335 out of approximately 800 eligible persons have responded to some degree. An average of \$270.00 will go to survivors, some \$30.00 less than last year.

Further, 63 of those responding have been widows, 56 have been retired ministers, and 47 have been wives of retired ministers, a total of 166. This omounts to almost half of the respondents to the program.

We recommend that calls continue to be made in behalf of the pragram until a suitable death benefit plan is adopted by the conference.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

Looking back to the accomplishments of this quadrennium, many forward steps have been taken; but there is still much mare to be desired that we have left undone. There is room bath for rejoicing and confessional as we look to the new quadrennium of the United Methodist Church.

Looking ahead, it becomes evident that actual better human relations and social conditions come only with prayer, fasting, and by labors and even suffering. Before us lie the so-called "Hot Summers" with the threat of civil unrest and possible violence. These would call each of us as Christians and churchmen to a reevaluation of our own commitments to Christ and his way of active redeeming lave. The times demand clear thinking, serious meditation, calmness of spirit, and sober judgment. We of the church must "keep our heads when all about us

are losing theirs and blaming us." We should read again from Paul's second letter to Timothy, "Hence I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of timidity but a spirit of power and love and self-control." (II Timothy 1:6-7) It is in this spirit that we should move into the new quadrennium. Not to withdraw, but carefully and cooperatively we should move forward to a more just and inclusive way of life in church and society.

Office of Director of Education and Christian Social Concerns

The Board is pleased with the work of the Director of Christian Education and Social Concerns and gives full support to the continuance of the office. We commend Gordon Dennis for his work and leadership in this new Office.

Special Days and Causes

We encourage all churches to observe all the Special Days and causes as recommended by our Annual Conference and outlined in The Methodist Story. We suggest that the churches follow the dates on the Conference Calendar for Special Days listed on the back of the Journal. Those Special Days are: World Order Sunday, October 20th, with emphasis on the United Nations Week, October 20-27; World Temperance Sunday or Commitment Day on October 13th or November 10th, the first being recommended by our Conference Calendar, the latter recommended by the General Board; Race Relations Sunday, February 9th, with an offering for Huston-Tillotson College.

We recommend the Joint Mission Study, for every local church. In support of this, we suggest attendance at the Conference School of Christian Missions, sponsored by the Conference Board of Missions.

Briefing Conference

We recommend that each local Church seek to send their Chairman, or at least one representative member of the local Commission, to the Regional Briefing Conference at Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas, July 5-7, 1968.

Christian Social Concerns News Letter

The Board recommends the continuance of the Social Concerns News Letter to all the pastors of the Conference from the office of the Director. It will include a resume of the moilings from the General Board and locol and state issues of concern.

Alcohol Problems And General Welfare

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

A. Alcahol problems and many related problems of olcoholism continue to besiege our society ot o much more rapid poce thon ever before.

We have spent many, many hours this year with these problems. We recognize that those people charged with the responsibility of the enforcement of our lows relating to alcohol beveroge hove many problems in the enforcement of these lows. We recommend that the Liquor Control Board and oll low enforcement agencies give attention to the strict enforcement of all the laws of our state. We feel very definitely that we do need further reforms in the lows pertaining to olcoholic beveroges in this state, but we don't feel that reform need be sa drostic as to just scrop all the lows we now have. Some of these laws are good; others need reforming. We especially commend these people for the more recent strict enforcement af the lows governing "private clubs" in our state.

We feel that we have all come to the time and place where we must face squarely the issue of Liquar By The Drink in this great state. We have all soid quite a bit, some of us have spoken up and spoken out, but the time has now come to stand up and be caunted. By the time this report comes before the Annual Conference the May 4th Primories will be history, during which we will have voted on a referendum pertaining to Liquar By The Drink as well as another controversial issue. Most likely during this week of our Annual Conference, the state legislature will be in session and it may well be that this issue will come before the special session. Lost year Governor Connolly and the state legislature received more mail on this issue than they did on any other matter to come before the legislature. The Christian people of Texas were able to stop the passage of this legislation; but it remains to be seen whether we con continue to do so. We feel, that in order to stop this legislation, the people colled Methodist in this state ore going to have to stand together. We trust that we shall be able to do so. No local Methodist church, no pastor, or no local church Commission on Christian Social Concerns should leave any stone unturned in continuing and concerted efforts to keep this legislation from being passed and most especially under the disguise that it will raise additional revenue for our state. We have noted that the backers of this legislation have spent very little time or effort in telling us of the expected increases in crimes, accidents, deaths, broken homes, and all the rest of the by-products such as the increased number of state welfare recipients. This is not a speculative statement; it is based on facts gained from states where this kind of legislation has been approved in recent years such as lowa and Washington.

We ask you very sincerely, is it good business sense to pass legislation that will bring in additional revenues, but will cost us from \$3.00 to \$6.00 for every dollar we collect. Not only from a business sense, but how much is your life or mine worth ta our families, our businesses? Let's be sure we have counted the cost!

B. Activities in the General Welfare Area have been quite varied during the year. Here are a few highlights of those activities.

The Conference Board of Social Concerns sponsored a Conference-wide Seminar at Glen Lake Camp in February. We were deeply gratified by the response to our efforts. Most of the agenda offered was dealing with this area. We studied and discussed the new morality, social security, the inner city ministry, and crime and rehabilitation. We hope this endeavor can be continued in the future.

Most of our time has been spent in this area with the problem of Parimutuel legislation which was before the last session of the legislature. Several years ago pari-mutuel betting was legal in this state, but because of the delinquency in the collection of accounts receivable, the business men of this state sought and successfully got legislation passed to prohibit pari-mutuel betting in this state.

We feel that the proposals as outlined pertaining to this legislation are not only unsound on moral and religious grounds, but we feel they are highly discriminatory in nature. Under the proposed legislation only five cities in our state would have been eligible for horse racing. We would like to point out that there is no law in this state that prohibits horse racing, only wagering on the races.

C. We commend the work of our conference director of Education and Social Concerns for his leadership in all our oreas of work. We commend the continued leadership of Dr. Albert Tucker and Texas Alcohol Narcotic Education. We feel that the work of Rev. Gilbert Ferrell and others in the Inner City Ministry work of our conference is beginning to open an endless line of opportunities to present the gospel of Jesus Christ with all its many social implications. As St. Paul said, "Let us try to became all things to all men that we might win some for Christ." God grant us the courage and strength equal to our task.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

There are two primary foci of the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations. The first is to assist every local church to become aware of those within their constituency who possess the gifts and graces to enter into fulltime church related occupations. The grass roots contact of the local pastor and local church Committees af Christian Vocation with persons who have the innate talent and ability to enter into a church-related occupation as a life work is the essential relationship in such a task. Across the church, we are becoming increasingly aware of a manpower shortage which, if not checked, can become critical for the future of the church. Ministers for local parishes, educational workers, specialists in many fields that are essential to the life and work of the church are in greater demand than the present supply can meet effectively. Thus as one of its primary objectives, the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations seeks an effective and active lacal church Committee on Christian Vocations in every church, acting upon its Disciplinary mandate to challenge and inform Methodist people as to the opportunities in full-time Christian Service. The Commission stands ready to assist district superintendents, district directors af Christian Vocation and local churches in the development of a meaningful approach to church-related occupations which will offer them as a live option to our people.

The second focus of the Commission's work is to challenge every person engaged in ethical and honest toil to view his work as a Christian vocation. The witness of faith must be extended into the area of daily labor, if that faith is to be the motivating force in the life of the whole man. Thus, to chollenge Methodist people to see, in whatever task they are engaged, the opportunity to minister in Christ's name is ever the respansibility of the Church.

Implementing these two emphases, the Commission on Christian Vocations has offered programs emphasizing bath. The Vocational Intern Program, offering trainee placement in institutional ministries and nursing as well as in the parish ministry, has been a useful tooi in challenging the youth of our churches who are considering career opportunities in these areas. The Christian Vocations Conference, held at Glen Lake as part of the Mid-Winter Program, emphasizes the call of God on every man in his life work, and points out the opportunities for Church-related occupations. Through its district directors, the Commission offers its guidance and counsel to local churches at any time.

Finally, we urge every church to elect and train an active Committee on Christian Vocations. We request the District Superintendents to appoint a District Secretary of Christian Vocations to promote this important work in his district. And we challenge each pastor to devote himself to the task of interpreting and clarifying the call of God to those in His charge.

We ore pleased to report that the Conference Commission on Ecumenical Affairs has continued in the *I*Aethodist tradition of porticipating in motters of life and work which leads to Christian unity.

This year we have carried out a concerted effort to involve the local churches in Ecumenical endeavors. Many churches observed "A Week of Prayer for Christian Unity," January 18-25.

A banquet wos held, Jonuary 30, 1968, ot Matthews Memorial Methodist Church Fort Worth, Texas to hanor Bishop Pope as the President-elect of the Texas Council of Churches. Leaders of the Central Texas Conference, both lay and clerical, were present. Aware of the lack of direction, our delegates to the Texas Council of Churches met with Bishop Pope, March 19, 1968, and discussed the future role af the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs in the Texas Cauncil of Churches and our role as a Commission in the Conference. At this meeting come the suggestion from Bishop Pope that the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs be enlorged and an attempt be made to place our members more strategically in the divisions of the Texas Council.

Bishap Pope was installed os President of the Texas Council af Churches ot the onnual ossembly in San Antonio March 20, 1968 and will serve in this most responsible position for the next two years.

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

Report No. 4

Proposed Constitution of Texas Conference of Churches

Preamble

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

Jesus Christ has called His people to unity. In obedient response to that call and in recognition and affirmation to that essential unity, those churches in Texas whose members proclaim Jesus the Christ as their divine Saviour and Lord and that choose to express and bear testimony thereto in this manner do hereby constitute themselves into the Texas Conference of Churches.

Article I—Purposes

The Purpose of the Texas Conference of Churches is to clarify and strengthen our witness to Christ as Lord of Church and world by:

A. Acknowledging His Lordship in word and act as well as in worship.

B. Attempting to apply more effectively the substance and insights of the Christian Gospel to the structures and institutions of this state, reminding all that every structure exists to serve man and is accountable to God. Such an attempt will include efforts to curb demonic and destructive forces at work in our communities as well as a sustained effort to interpret and lay bare the relationship of gospel and world.

C. Providing means of cooperation with agencies and movements which further the common purposes of the member churches.

D. Providing a forum and a place of sharing the work of the churches and a means whereby duplication of offices and efforts may be lessened.

E. Doing together all things save those which we must in conscience and obedience do separately.

F. Promoting the spirit of ecumenism, cultivating interchurch fellowship in communities throughout the state and fostering dialogue in the realm of faith and order.

Article II-Membership

Section 1. The Texas Conference of Churches shall be composed of:

A. Ecclesiastical units of the various Christian communians within the State of Texas which ratify this Constitution prior to the constituting assembly shall be charter members. Church bodies which have statewide jurisdiction and also autonomous sub-judicatories serving specific regions of the state may choose which units shall hold membership.

B. Other ecclesiastical units and individual congregations of eligible communions not yet members of the Conference which may be voted into membership upon application.

Such additional ecclesiastical units and individual congregations may be elected to membership by the Board of Directors when appropriate afficials have natified the President af the Conference that the unit has approved this canstitutian.

Article III—Policies and Relationships

Section 1. The autonomy and integrity of each ecclesiastical unit will be respected at all times. The right of dissent or abstention in specific policies and programs of the Texas Conference of Churches is accorded to each member unit.

Section 2. The Conference shall be completely autonomous.

However, fraternal and consultative relationships may be maintained with local, national, and world ecumenical agencies.

Article IV—The Assembly of Representatives

Section 1. The Texas Conference of Churches shall be governed by an Assembly of Representatives elected or appointed by its constituent member units in such manner as each shall choose on the following basis:

A. Each member ecclesiastical unit shall be entitled to two representatives in the Assembly plus one additional of each 20,000 confirmed or adult members, or mojor fraction thereof, except that denominational units with jurisdiction embracing the entire State of Texas shall have the two basic representatives plus one additional for each 10,000 confirmed or adult members up to 400,000 and one additional representative for each 20,000 members in excess of 400,000. In no case shall the representation of a single demoninational group exceed onethird of the total Assembly. At least one-half of the elected or appointed representatives of each member unit shall be lay people.

B. In addition to the above designated representatives, members of the Board of Directors shall be members of the Assembly.

C. Provision for individual congregation member voting shall be determined by the Board of Directors.

Article V—Board af Directars

Section 1. There shall be a Board of Directors composed of the following:

- A. The highest ranking administrator of each member ecclesiastical unit,
- B. The president of the Conference, who shall be chairman of the Board.
- C. The president designate.

D. Ten lay members-at-large elected by the Assembly from its own membership, at least 2 of whom shall be women.

The Executive Director shall be secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The Boord of Directors shall meet at least semi-annually and shall be the policy and supervisory body between sessions of the Assembly. It shall also be responsible for other duties further described in this Constitution.

Section 3. Special sessions of the Board of Directors may be called by the president and shall be called upon request of two-thirds of its members.

Section 4. One-half of the membership of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5. The Board shall serve as the advisory body of the Assembly and the employed staff. It shall review periodically the work of the program units of the Conference. The Board also shall evaluate the programs of the Conference as they relate to those of the member ecclesiastical units in the light of the mission of the Church. The Board shall serve os resource and guide to the elected officers and staff.

Article VI-The Officers

Section 1. The officers of the Conference shall be a president, presidentdesignate, two vice-presidents (one of whom shall be a woman), a recording secretary and a treasurer.

Section 2. Officers must be members in good standing of a member ecclesiastical unit.

Section 3. Officers shall be elected for two-year terms by the Assembly at the annual meeting at which the respective officers become vacant, upon nomination by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. These officers shall serve until their successors have been elected. In case of deoth or resignation of an officer, the vacancy shall be filled by the Board for the unexpired term.

.

Article VII—The Employed Staff

Section 1. An Executive Director shall be appainted by the Baard of Directors at a salary to be fixed by the Baard. The Executive Director shall be the executive officer of the Canference and an advisory member of all divisions, departments, commissions, and cammittees.

Section 2. Additional administrative staff may be appainted by the Board of Directors upan namination by the Executive Director.

Sectian 3. Office personnel shall be employed by the Executive Director as needed within the limits of the budget.

Article VIII—Meetings

Section 1. The Conference year shall be the calendar year.

Section 2. The annual meeting of the Assembly shall be held at a time and place set by the Board. The purpose of the annual meeting shall be to provide inspiratian, worship, and fellowship; ta review the previous year's wark of the program divisians, committees and staff; to adopt plans and palicies for the program of the ensuing year; to elect officers; to adopt the annual budget, ta transact any ather business of the Conference.

Section 3. A special meeting of the Assembly may be held upon call by the president and must be held within 60 days upon majarity vote of the Board, ar upon petition signed by twenty per cent of the membership of the Assembly.

Section 4. Fifty members of the Assembly shall constitute a quarum, pravided that this number represents a majority of the member ecclesiastical units.

Section 5. Raberts' Rules of Order, Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority for the Conference.

Article IX—Program Units

Section 1. The program functions of the Canference shall be carried aut by four divisions as follows:

- A. Division of Education.
- B. Division of Church and Society.
- C. Division of Special Ministries.
- D. Divisian of Christian Unity.

Section 2. Each program divisian shall be campased of the members of each department, commissian, or committee within said division. Such persons shall be assigned by member ecclesiastical units representing their cognate corresponding boards, commissians, ar cammittees. This pravisian does nat preclude coapting of persons wha may be chosen by a particular program unit because af special campetence.

Section 3. A baard or agency af an eligible communion not a member af the Conference may have membership in any program unit if approved for participation by the Board af Directors.

Section 4. A division may establish or eliminate program units within the division upon approval by the Baard of Directors or the Assembly. The division shall delegate program responsibilities to the respective units and determine priorities as between such units.

Section 5. The Conference or any of its program units may serve as the agent of two or more member ecclesiostical units in canducting program activities, subject to the fallowing provisions:

A. Approval by the Baard of Directors or the Assembly.

B. That the privilege of participation be open to all member ecclesiastical units.

C. That participating ecclesiastical units agree to designate representatives as the directing committee for the program.

D. That financial support be provided apart fram and in addition to the regular financial support of the general budget of the Canference and that administrative service casts incurred in cannection with the program item be paid in an amount determined by the Baard of Directors.

Section 6. The chairman of each division shall be elected by the Assembly for a term of two years upon nomination by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. The division assembly may elect its own vice-chairman and secretary. These afficers, tagether with the chairman of each program unit in the division, shall compose a Division Cabinet.

Section 7. By-laws or standing rules of all divisions ar other pragram units must be approved by the Board of Directors. No program unit may commit the Conference financially beyond funds designated for it in the annual budget. This provision shall not apply to cooperative program activities described in section 5 of this article.

Section 8. Program division assemblies ardinarily shall be held annually, but at the discretion of the chairman the Division Cabinet may be convened in place of the division assembly to allocate programs and approve budget requests af program units within the division.

Article X—General Committees

1968

Section 1. Committees to serve administrative needs of the Conference shall be set up by the Board of Directors and shall be responsible to the Board. The chairman and personnel of each General Committee ore to be appainted by the president in consultation with the Executive Director except that the Naminating Committee shall be elected by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. The following General Committees shall be named for two-year terms to caincide with the term of the president:

- A. Budget and Finance Committee.
- B. Constitution and By-laws Committee.
- C. Personnel Committee.
- D. Nominating Committee,

Other General Cammittees may be established by the Baard.

Article XI—General Departments

Section 1. Church Wamen United in Texas shall serve as the Conference's general department of women's wark. This relationship, while not limiting autonomy of Church Women United, is designed to facilitate caardination of pragram, field service, and mutual support of state and lacal ecumenical relations.

Section 2. Other general departments may be established by the Assembly as need may develop.

Article XII—Finance

Section 1. Member ecclesiasticol units are expected to pay their fair share of the basic annuol budget which their representatives have had a part in odopting. The Board of Directors, upon advice of the Budget and Finonce Committee, shall determine ond communicate to member units a foir basis for their financial participation, but in no case shall such amounts be considered a tax or assessment.

Section 2. Member ecclesiastical units shall have the right to appropriate ond designate additional funds beyond their basic support of the Conference for special programs or ministries conducted through the Conference (as provided in Sec. 5, Art. IX), or to refroin from such participation.

Article XXIII—By-Laws

Section 1. By-laws to interpret or carry out the purposes of this Constitution may be enacted or amended by a two-thirds mojority of those present ond voting at any session of the Assembly upon recommendation of the Constitution and By-lows Committee.

Article XIV—Amending the Constitution

This Constitution may be amended in any way consistent with its preamble ot any regular meeting of the Assembly by a two-thirds vote of the representatives present, provided the proposed omendment shall have been submitted in writing to the representatives of the constituent units of the Conference ot leost 30 days before the Assembly. Such amendments shall become effective upon the announcement of the Board of Directors that two-thirds of the member ecclesiostical units have ratified same.

Article XV—Constituting the Texas Conference of Churches

Section 1. Inasmuch as the interchurch agency contemplated in this Constitution is to be a new structure, this Constitution will be submitted to the Texas judicatories of all Christian communions deemed to be eligible for membership through occeptance of the preamble. Upon notice to the secretary of this Joint Committee prior to July 1, 1970, of ratification by at least twenty judicatories of ten denominations or communions, o call shall go out for o constituting assembly composed of the representatives of the ratifying ecclesiastical units chosen by such units on the basis of representation provided by this Constitution.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

General Church School Committee

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

Church School Literature: The committee expresses appreciation of adult teachers, general superintendents, pastors, and district directors who have worked with purpose in understanding, making preparation, and presenting the new materials in the Adult Division of the local church.

We commend to all responsible persons the need for a continual effort to make the materials relevant ond meaningful to their porticular church school.

We anticipate the meaning and effectiveness of the proposed materials for the Youth Division and recommend unusual effort to see that proper plans are mode for their use.

Laboratory Training: Noting the effectiveness of laboratory training, we commend this in all church relations, but particularly on the **district level**. Strong support is given to participation by local pastars, general superintendents, and divisional superintendents. Much af the responsibility for making a church school effective rests now upon the imaginative work and resourcefulness of local church leadership.

Senior Assembly: For several summers the Senior Assembly, held on the campus of Southwestern University, has undergone adjustments and changes in the effart to be mare effective. Bold and imaginative activities are being used this summer which are more in line with needs and cancerns of today's high school yauth. Lacal church leadership is encauraged to send its yauth ta Seniar Assembly with a willingness ta do the unusual in personal development as related to Christian faith.

Conference Leadership: Appreciation is given for the faithful leadership given by our conference staff at all levels: Florence Campbell with the Children's Divisian, Wayne Batchelder with the Youth Divisian, N. P. Stephenson with the Adult Division (without salary), Gordon Dennis as our Executive Secretary, and the secretaries in the conference office.

Committee on Camps

The changing shape of the church's ministry to meet the changing needs of `people has demanded a dynamic approach to camping. This approach has made itself knawn in several ways.

Until a few years ago the camping program was limited to the summer months, with only rare opportunities offered during the other seasons. Naw the frontier af camping lies in week-end experiences. This becomes plain when the tatal attendance af 368 at twa senior mid-winter week-ends is compared with the total of 194 in the two week-long senior camps last summer. Since this type of camping has proved so popular and effective, opportunities far it will

be offered during the summer, and the number during the rest of the year will be increased.

Priar ta 1965 we offered camping on three age levels: 4-6 grades, 7-9 grades, and 10-12 grades. Three years aga we experimented with a separate ninth grade camp which immediately showed itself ta fill a definite need. With a cantinually changing canstituency we are instituting new age graupings this summer, graupings that are in keeping with the recagnized curriculum changes within the church. This year's groupings will be 4-6 grades, 7-8 grades (Juniar Hi), 9-10 grades (Mid-Hi), and 11-12 grades (Seniar Hi).

Facilities ta meet these changing, year-around requirements are being provided by the faresight af the members of the annual conference in establishing the building and improvements program now under way at Glen Lake. The new dining hall has not anly increased the capacity af the camp to serve and facilitated that service, but it has added flexibility ta what we can affer. The winterizing af all cabins has made it passible to meet the demand that growing activity has made. It is now possible to expand the camping pragram inta areas not previously practical.

Training for all camp deans in a spring session has proved highly profitable, and this program will be continued.

Our Rainbaw Camp praperty becames mare valuable every year. It will serve as the site far camping activity this year as well as provide the base af operatians far the Brazas River flaat trip.

This has been a busy year in impraving the Glen Lake facility. Work done this year includes:

1. Construction of the new dining hall with all new equipment and furnishings. This was consecrated an April 5.

2. Remadeling of existing cabins.

3. Installation of new heating units in all cabins.

4. Moving af the ald affice building and its transformation into a new cabin.

5. Updating af the public address system.

6. Installation of an intercom system.

In addition, wark is under way on transforming the ald dining hall into a classroom building which will include the stare and a craft room. The rebuilding af the bays' shawer house is soon to begin.

This cammittee is indebted to the Conference Educational Staff for guidance and for cantinual support, and we would highly commend Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Gann who have more than fulfilled our hapes for them as Camp Superintendent and Dietitian.

Committee on Higher Education

The Cammittee on Higher Education has saught to project increased support for the colleges and universities of The Methodist Church in our state and also for the campus ministries of the church on campus af the various institutions af higher education. This year has seen a better support than previous years, and we are grateful to Bishop Pape for his assistance. With an insistonce from our episcopal leader that Wesley Foundation support be given priority, there has been a decided upswing in receipts for the first nine months of this church year. The end of February a year ago had seen \$35,605.41 received for support of the Wesley Foundation program. February 29, 1968, saw \$45,579.50 received for the same purpose. The total received this year was \$56,672.17.

Perhaps even more notable is the increase in support of our Texas Methodist Colleges. This fund, without special push, saw \$72,268.98 received the first three-quarters of the 1966-67 conference year. This conference year the same period reported \$80,667.24. The total for the year was \$124,162.17.

It remains to be seen whether the increase in giving to these two causes will be reflected of the year's end or whether the increase is due to merely paying earlier in the year that which could be expected at the year's end.

This year in the Conference Journal, rother than reporting the total dollars allocated from Wesley Foundation funds to various interests, we plan to project the percentile. It is felt that this will be less misleading than to project dollar figures that are not actually expected or have ever been received in any year.

Your committee reports progress, but much work remains.

All requests were honored as adjusted and presented by the campus ministers except in the case of T.C.U. which received a sizeable increase but an amount \$588.00 less than it requested. It was suggested that T.C.U. raise this in special gifts from local sources inasmuch as its locally raised capital is less than any other campus ministry.

Committee on Family Life

The Family Life Committee of the Board of Education has a multi-faceted respansibility. The new concept of family life work now emerging in the life of

the church is colled "family ministry." It is a total ministry in that it seeks to bring the whole gospel to bear on all family life, both in the church and in the world.

This fomily ministry hos four essential elements and purposes:

1. The ministry of the church to families—to strengthen Christian family living throughout oll stages of the family life cycle.

2. The ministry of families to their own members—to improve Christion nurture in the home throughout the life spon of oll fomily members.

3. The ministry of families through the church—to increose fomilies' meoningful porticipation in the total life of the church.

4. The ministry of families to the world—to stimulate families to fulfill their mission in the world today.

The Fomily Life Committee should never be separated from the total program of Christian education in the local church, district or annual conference, and our interest in other areas of work indicate that many programs within our church ore geared and related to the family. In the month to month of activity this committee has had interest in:

Promoting of the observonce of Fomily Week.

The plonning of moilings to local churches.

Conference-wide meetings on fomily life.

Troining programs and schools for local church leaders.

District meetings on home and church cooperation.

Review: The Committee on Fomily Life this quodrennium hos seen chonge and interpretation in the activities relating to families. Whereas the Labor Day Week-End at Glen Lake Camp ance reached a major need, its appeal now lacks. With the advent of schools storting earlier, families already having had air-conditioned vocations, the success of other comping programs, including the Laymon's Retreat at Glen Lake, all blend to diminish the attractiveness of a final fling at Glen Lake on Labor Day with the family.

The program ond plonning of these post several comps hos been excellent. Through the cooperation of the Executive Secretary and the age-group staff personnel, a total closely graded program has been offered. The participation by these persons and of the Area Counselor, Rev. Deforest Wiksten, and Dr. Richard Hunt has been outstanding.

District Directors of Fomily Life hove been appointed in each district and with the re-organization of the committee for the new quadrennium, they will find more responsible tasks. The training courses on Family Life can be tought, wider use of the existing facilities and comps such as the Older Adult Comp, Young Adult Comp, etc., and the use of materials available such as MATURE YEARS, THE CHRISTIAN HOME, and the special Thanksgiving, Christmas and Lenten services.

Recommendations: The Fomily Life Camp this summer will be Soturdoy noon, August 31, through Labor Doy noon, September 2. A fine group of workers and leaders are being selected. However, we recommend that this comp cease as such and the new format be followed in the future. These recommendations for action by the Board of Education are: 1. Orgonize the Conference Family Life Committee according to Paragroph 1453 of the Discipline. This includes the Education and representatives from other boords and agencies ond groups within the conference. This new committee would farmulote the Family Life Program for the conference and then disseminate it through the District Director of Fomily Life in each district.

2. New structures of the Fomily Life Progrom suggested ore:

a. Week-End Conference for Engaged Couples.

b. Exploratory conference for one-parent families and those separated by death, divarce and desertion.

c. One day rally on fomily life in the conference.

d. Retreots for those morried less than two years.

e. Cooching conference for those interested in teaching in family life schools.

f. Emphosis on Fomily Counseling ond inclusion of these courses in Pastor's Schools, retreats for pastors ond wives.

g. Short-term seminors on morrioge counseling, using the focilities of the oreo counselor.

These ond mony other programs are urgent if the church is to minister to its families; the family minister to his own members; the family ministering through the church; ond to the families of the world.

We commend ond thank those of this committee that have worked during this quadrennium. They include: Roy Johnson, James Ansley, Floyd Boulwore, Elmer Glazener, Mrs. B. B. Wedemeyer, Mrs. Ray Horony and Bruce Oberhatzer. A special word of commendation goes to our faithful, potient, understanding and ever willing conference staff.

Report No. 3

Recommendations for Youth Ministry

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

In view of the changing patterns of youth ministry, and in keeping with the new curriculum, we recommend that the title, Conference Director of Youth Work, be changed and in the future referred to as Conference Director of Youth Ministry. Similarly, the office of District Director of Yauth Work should become District Director of Yauth Ministry.

We recommend a new conference level structure as it relates to youth ministry. The recommendation is that we form a Conference Council on Youth Ministry which will function with two standing committees and in coordination with the existing Camp Committee. The two standing committees shall be the Activities Committee composed of eight to twelve youth and six to eight adults (similar to the present Conference Senior High Methodist Youth Fellowship Council), and the Training Projects Committee composed of six to eight adults and four to six youth. The Council would appoint other committees as it deems necessary. If adopted, the Council on Youth Ministry would become the youthadult administrative body which at the conference level will assume total responsibility for the policy making and coordinating functions of the conference youth ministry as it relates to youth generational problems and issues.

The function of the committees will be as follows:

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

The Board recognizes and sincerely commends the eight districts of our Conference for their participation and involvement in the Simultaneous Revivals during March, 1968. It was a source of genuine encouragement to have all of the churches of six of the districts—and most of the churches of the other two districts participating in simultaneous evangelistic missions. Recognizing that the witness of the Church is changing, these missions took many forms. Some of them were small, face-to-face dialogue groups, and others took the form of singing revivals. Some were community wide, ecumenical efforts—and others were preaching services, directed to the church membership.

The program of Evangelism for the ensuing quadrennium for the churches of our Annual Conference will be structured and recommended to the new Board in June in accardance with the emphasis, plans and programs projected by the General Board af Evangelism, following the actian of General Conference. It is expected that any suggested program will seek in every way possible to broaden the base of our understanding of evangelism, so that evangelism would cease ta be understood as a week of special activities adopted by some Board or graup —but would be understood as every aspect of the Church's outreach in witness and involvement.

The Board heartily commends the Conference Director of Evangelism for the very fine way he has carried forward the program of Evangelism with the pastors and local churches of the Conference.

THE CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

The Central Texas Conference Federal Credit Union was chartered by the Federal Government, six months ago. Membership is open to all ministers of the Central Texas Annual Conference, their families, and to the salaried staff members of the United Methodist churches of the conference.

Present membership is 145. Share payments are slightly more than \$7,000, and outstanding loans total approximately half that amount. Loans are available up to \$700 at present and this amount will rise as the capital increases. Federal regulations allow loan maximum equal to 10% of the share capital. The interest rate is 1% per month on the unpaid balance. This will equal 61/2% per year on a 12 manth, regular monthly installment note.

The Credit Union offers some splendid advantages both as a system of saving and as a source of borrowing. Excellent insurance factors are provided at no additional cost both on deposits and on loans. Let me illustrate:

Pastor Jones, a member of the Credit Union can apply for a \$300 loan on his personal signature. He can pay it back in twelve equal monthly installments and the total interest he will pay will be \$19.50. If after borrowing the \$300, he should die before it is repaid, the loan insurance factor will pay the unpaid balance for him.

Here is an example of the savings feature. Pastor Jones makes share payments up to \$2,000 in the Credit Union prior to his 55th birthday. Shauld he die, insurance will pay his estate an extra \$2,000! or an amount equal to his deposit. Share payments made after 55 but before he is 60, the insurance is 75%, etc.

The Board of Directors of the Credit Union hope and anticipate being able to pay an interest of at least 5% on share payments within a year. This will of course depend upon increasing share capital and loans.

The nine Directors of the Credit Union are all members of this conference and serve without remuneration. During this year they have even borne the cost of their travel to the monthly meetings. Dr. J. D. F. Williams is Treasurer, and he is serving without remuneration.

The Central Texas Conference Federal Credit Union exists to help its members. We earnestly solicit additional members. It costs only a 25c one time fee and a minimum share payment of \$5 to belong.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

The Central Texas Conference Historical Society has been anxious to have a depository for a long time. We now have a special room that has been assigned in the remodeled old dining facility at Glen Lake Camp. A fire proof filing cabinet has been purchased, and a committee appointed to study the use of the Historical Room. Such items as: a complete file of conference journals, old disciplines, old pictures, and records will be included in the collection.

Guide lines for preserving the records of boards, agencies and organizations

in the church have been released from the Association of Methodist Historical Societies, and are as follows:

Records of Key Officers: (1) correspondence (omit routine matters such as correspondence colling meetings of the ogency or its committees, thonk you notes, ocknowledgments, etc.). (2) Memoranda, minutes of conferences, ond stoff meetings. (3) Directives, ond vorious other evidences of official oction. (4) Interdenominational correspondence, reports, and minutes.

Research and Investigative Records: (1) Stoff studies. (2) Regulor reports. (3) Special reports analyzing policies, developing plans, etc.

Legal: (1) Opinions ond interpretations. (2) Memorando of Iow. (3) Delegations of authority. (4) Documents providing background information of a legal nature.

Budgetary and Fiscal: (1) Books of final entry (legers especially). (2) Some intermediory entry (journols). (3) Auditor's reports. (4) Investments, payrolls, (5) Bequests, annuities, ond endowments. (6) Budgets (supporting popers).

Public Relations: (1) One record set of oll publications, bulletins, pamphlets, circulors. (2) Press ond radio releases. (3) Charts, posters, etc. (4) Film, recordings, copies of speeches, etc. (Items in this cotegory provide documentation of programs undertaken as interpreted to the public).

Committees: (1) Minutes and reports. (2) Lists of chairmen and members, terms served. (3) Correspondence (not routine).

Agency Secretary: (1) Constitution ond by-laws in original and revised farms, copy of charter. (2) Agency seal if incorporated, corporate charter. (3) Minutes of all meetings with working popers attached. (4) Annual reports. (5) Lists of officers and terms of office. (6) Deeds, bequests, annuities, endowments (unless with treosurer's records.)

We have presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the annual conference a request for our 1969 appropriation the amount of \$500.00 to be used as follows: \$150.00 for meeting expenses, \$50.00 for administration expense, and \$300.00 for Histarical Room.

HOSPITALIZATION INSURANCE

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

We have an adequate policy with a good company and this is reassuring to the 183 participating ministers and their families. The need for and the benefit of our Central Texas Methodist Conference plan of Group Hospitalization Insurance may be seen clearly by the latest semi-annual statistics of our Group, August 1, 1967 to February 1, 1968: Total Premiums we paid to MLCU, \$18,197.00; Total Claims MLCU paid to us, \$20,311.00.

Our insuring agency is Ministers Life and Casualty Union, Minneapolis, Minnesota 55416. We are completing eleven years of happy relationship with them. Our Group plan is available to all **fulltime ministers**, both conference members and supply pastors, who serve **within the bounds of the conference**. While this plan is not open to student pastors, MLCU has special policies with lower rates for the student years.)

It is important that each minister in our Central Texas Conference understand that while we have a Group Hospitalization Insurance plan, **each individual minister must act for himself.** By his action to join the voluntary Group, he helps to create the percentage of participating Eligibles necessary to keep the doors open for all "newly eligible" fulltime ministers to be received into the Group on a non-medical basis simply by registration and payment of the first Quarterly Premium, provided he does this within the 90-day limit required by MLCU and agreed upon by our Annual Conference. It is especially needful for each of us to remind every new minister of this opportunity. A few guidelines include these:

1. Each minister who receives an appointment for fulltime work within the bounds of the annual conference, whether an approved supply pastor, on trial, or in full connection, has a limit of 90 days from the date of said appointment, even when made between sessions of the annual conference, to apply for membership in this hospitalization program without any restrictions, without the necessity of providing a certification of insurability, and without any questions or limitations of previous health conditions.

2. Each eligible minister who waits 91 days or more to make application for the Group Insurance may join by filling out the "late entry" form and by furnishing evidence of insurability satisfactory to MLCU.

3. Any minister who marries subsequent to becoming a participating member of the Conference Group may enroll his wife in the program without limitations or restrictions, provided he makes written application within 60 days after his marriage. One who waits 61 days or more after marriage to enroll his wife may do so by filling out the "late entry" form and meeting actuarial standards of MLCU

4. Any minister who allows his policy to lapse through failure to pay the quarterly premium within one month after the due date, may reinstate his policy by paying the current quarterly premium and by furnishing an acceptable certificate of insurability, provided he does so within one year after the lapse of the policy.

5. Any minister who leaves our group by transfer ar other reason, who continues in fulltime religious work, need not lose his insurance protection. He may make application to MLCU for individual coverage with the same benefits and no evidence of insurability is required if continuous insurance is desired.

6. Our agreement with MLCU includes provision for continued coverage

far dependent children to age 19 ar to age 23 far thase attending callege, for widaws, and for retired ministers. The MLCU **Simplex 65** is designed by MLCU far the minister and his wife when age 65 is achieved. Our Graup caverage will not duplicate pravisians of Medicare. MLCU will cantinue to write the highest level of our Group caverage for those under age 65.

The authorization granted by the Canference last year, (see Repart No. 2, 1967 Jaurnal, pages 103-105), was successful and the provisions af percentages and prorated premiums were followed. There was an increase af participating ministers. The "True Group" program has been an excellent answer to the needs of thase who have needed it in time of crisis.

Features of the present policy provisions include these: The base policy is cast at levels adequate far average length of illness, then have a flexible reserve ta help—an additional \$10,000.00 per individual majar medical benefit as needed. There is caverage far prescriptive drugs and medicines; private nursing in the Hospital; doctor calls in the office and to the home; and diagnostic and labaratory wark dane while ather than hospital canfined. This majar medical provision daes have a \$100.00 cash deductible per calendar year, and it has an 80% ca-insurance percentage.

Out af deference for holding premiums down the monthly disability income benefit of \$150.00 up to 36 months was deleted fram aur Graup Program. Same have asked about restoring this feature at same future date. Ministers Life and Casualty Union will help wark this aut if and when our graup might desire it. Any minister may have this benefit, individually, far \$6.70 per quarter. Premium levels are indicated by the example of \$56.41 for the Family; \$20.17 far Member anly, and \$36.64 far a wife under age 65.

Present day health and haspital costs have soared up and up and likely will cantinue this way. Your committee is quite aware af the varying needs and interests of aur ministers. We seek to find the best level of premium dallar and potential benefit.

We call attentian to the annauncement of MLCU that a field representative has been established in Dallas, Texas. He is Mr. Bob W. Click, 7977 Raundrock, Dallas, Texas.

Each minister shauld have a Group Health Insurance Claim Form for use along with an identification card. If a claim is incurred, have the haspital write or wire Ministers Life far verification. If members af aur W N Group have questions, MLCU suggests that these be sent direct to the Hame Office.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 1

A General Statement

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

The Board of Haspitals and Homes is keenly aware of the many calls that are reaching aur churches daily. These calls are caming in behalf af human need in many areas of society. The response that comes from the churches and from Methodists individually is most gratifying. Our people are respanding in larger numbers to the Methodist institutions af Health and Welfare as will be indicated by the reparts from these institutions.

Sometimes the Church is criticized for its emphasis upon these special agencies. Such criticism, however, foils to recognize the thousands of persons whose lives have been touched, redeemed, and made whole as a result of dedicated dollars generously given in Christ's name.

Surely we are proud of the institutions related to our Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes and we are most appreciative of the wonderful leadership at each point. They represent men and women of unusual talent and dedication. The improvements in physical plants are indicative of the sacrifice and love of the people called Methodists. We are facing the challenge of this hour with full confidence that God will lead us to even greater depths of concern and to higher heights of joy in ministering to people in desperation. Together we go forward in the name of the Christ who came to serve and to heal.

We cannot all go to the "far away places with the strange sounding names" to lend a helping hand. However, we can make it possible for trained persons to go for us in the Lord's name. The need is not always at the far away places; it frequently is very close at hand—almost within the very shadow of the church we attend.

We believe that church related hospitals and homes, by their very nature, ought to be more benevolent and more charitable than nonchurch-related agencies. But we fail to realize that such charity and benevolence must be made possible by someone's gifts.

It was this belief that provided support which spawned the church hospitals and homes, but the initial gifts are not sufficient. The needs of an agency continue as the needs of persons who turn to it far help continue.

Agencies require people, highly skilled and professionally trained, ta minister to the hurts and needs of the sick and infirm. This requires money.

Agencies have had to absorb the normal increased cost of living which means that their dollar does not have the purchasing power it did a year ago, either in terms of buying commodities or services. This requires more money.

The Methodist Health and Welfare agencies within our area of the church need both the spiritual as well as the financial undergirding of our people.

Harris Hospital — Annual Report — 1968

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

In Memoriam:

Preceding any formal report to the Central Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church, we must regretfully advise the Conference of the passing of Trustees, W. L. Stewart of Fort Worth on July 10, 1967, Melvin J. Miller of Fort Worth on November 24, 1967, E. B. Ingram of Fart Worth on December 31, 1967, and Reverend Hayden Edwards, D. D., of Fort Worth on Januory 1, 1968.

The loss of these staunch supporters of Harris Hospital will be felt throughout the Church and Community, for their lives were devoted to the many avenues of service provided by the Church.

.

The Board of Trustees and the Administrator respectfully submit a Report of the operations and activities of Harris Hospital for the Fiscal Year ended September 30, 1967. Since six months have elapsed in this Fiscal Year, members of the Conference will realize that all of the statistics are based on the 1966-67 Fiscal Year, but in order to give a current report, many of the improvements and developments reported upon have occurred during this six-month period.

Patient Care Factors:

During the Fiscal Year 1966-67, 153,793 days of adult care were given; this was an increase of 2,590 days over the previous Fiscal Year. In addition, 18,447 days of newborn care were given—an increase of 3,162 over the previous year.

Although, nationwide the number of obstetrical patients entering hospitals has declined sharply over the past five years, the opposite has been true of Harris Hospital. During 1967, there were 4,010 deliveries, as compared to 3,303 in 1966. The occupancy of the medical and surgical divisions of Harris Hospital has been 98% for the last twelve months. Our occupancy during the Fiscal Year in the Intensive Care Unit and the Coronary Care Unit has been approximately 64%. It should be noted here, however, that in these special units, the occupancy may fluctuate from 60% to 100% within a 24-hour period. An example is a current occupancy figure for the first 21 days of March, 1968 — the Intensive Care Unit has had an average occupancy of 93.81%.

Each year finds us with increasing numbers of patients presenting themselves to our Emergency Room facilities for care — 11,583 Emergency Room patients were treated in 1967.

While the increased number of Radiological examinations has not been unusual, those examinations made by the Clinical and Surgical Laboratories increased markedly. During the past year, 283,776 Laboratory procedures were performed (an increase of 12,960), and 40,556 Radiological examinations were carried out (an increase of 247).

Purchase of Equipment:

During the year, the Board of Trustees of the Hospital authorized the purchase of Movable and Fixed Equipment in the amount of \$232,087.

Expansion Program:

New Construction and Modernization—Phase II of our Expansion Program has been under way since December 14, 1967. At present writing, March, 1968, the excavation for the new Storeroom facilities and the expansion of the Laundry and Linen areas has been essentially prepared.

The addition to the Mary Gibbs Jones Building has progressed to the point where the structural concrete has been completed through the second floor. This project, which will add approximately 114 medical and surgical beds to the total Hospital Complex, is scheduled to be opened for patient care by April 1, 1969. The total cost of this Project is estimated to be \$3,269,342.

The financing of this Project will be from three sources: (1) Hill-Burton Funds, (2) Hospital Reserve Funds, and (3) Long Term Financing.

Last year, we reported upon the construction of the Parking Garage; this Garage was opened for service on February 1, 1967. There are five levels in this structure, providing 972 parking spaces for cars. Although only three-fifths of the spaces are being utilized at present time, the fiscal arrangement is such that it is paying for the cost of operation; this point is made in order to

advise the Conference that this particular structure is not being operated on the basis of increasing the cost of hospital care for inpatients.

Phase III, ideally, should follow closely the completion of Phase II. It is the charge of the Board of Trustees that during the intervening time, between now and the completion of Phase II, that funds necessary to complete Phase III will be on hand, or at least in sight.

The scope of the Project will be to completely modernize the Main Building of the Hospital—the first floors of which were constructed and completed in 1930. As reported previously, it was necessary to have the additional beds provided by Phase II in order to do Phase III in 5 stages; stage-by-stage, going from the Second Floor to the Seventh Floor of the Building, and completing the Eighth Floor as a Patient area, will necessitate taking approximately 100 beds out af service during each of the five stages.

Population studies reveal, when projected to 1971, that the ratio of beds per thausand of population on a very minimal level, will not vary more than twotenths af ane percent when all known hospital construction in Tarrant County is considered.

Educational Activities:

RECAP Program—(Re-Enter the Core of Active Professionals) All of the general hospitals in the City of Fort Worth joined together during the last twelve manths in order ta pravide a refresher program for registered nuises who have been out of nursing for as many as 25 years. The purpose of the program was to bring these nurses in contact with changes which have taken place during their inactivity, and make them available, either on a full or part-time basis, for health care within the Community—be it hospital ar related facilities.

Concrary Care Courses—Fort Worth, at the present time, has three coronary care units.

These units are set up for the purpose of handling acute coronary conditions. Each unit has specially installed facilities, which include oxygen, compressed air, suction, heart monitoring, and closed circuit television. These units also have a very high ratio af nursing hours per patient day; this staffing is very similar to the staffing in the Intensive Care Units.

Because so much depends upon the nurse who is in constant attendance af the patient and, since the doctor cannot be present at all times, additional and continuing preparation of nursing personnel has become a fundamental consideration. Harris Hospital, in conjunction with other hospitals locally, has pravided one complete two-week course, taught by attending physicians, resident nurses, and others.

A second community-wide program for the continuing education of nurses, who will have the coronary care responsibility, is presently under way. Registrants for this program have come fram areas which are outside, as well as within, Tarrant County.

Wage and Salary Reclassification:

Last year, in some detail, the effects of the Minimum Wage Law covering hospitals was explained. The impact of this Law has not changed since the last Report.

Each member of the Central Texas Conference of The Methodist Church should be apprised of the fact that this Law will mean an increase in the cost per patient day of \$4 each year until 1971. In addition to this cost, the suppliers and providers of services from whom Harris Hospital purchases will also have an increased cost, thereby compounding the overall cost to the patient.

Medicare:

The effect of Medicare, as enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas, has been leveling. The number of patients covered by Medicare to our total patient load has been 19.33%.

The total Medicare patient days to the total adult patient day load has been 22.80%, as compared to 22.55% prior to Medicare.

Perhaps, the most important statistic has been the average length of stay of the patient prior ta Medicare and the average length of stay of the patient 65 years or older since Medicare: January 1965 through December, 1965 the average length of stay of the patient 65 years or older was 10.5 days while for the period from January 1967 through December 1967, the average length of stay for the Medicare patient was 9.03 days.

The Board of Trustees would like to request the Bishop and his Cabinet to appoint the Reverend James B. Ansley, D.D., as Commissioner-Chaplain of the Haspital for the coming year; and further to appoint the Reverend Robert L. Davis as Associate Chaplain of Harris Hospital for the coming year.

The Board of Trustees, the Medical Staff, the Personnel of Harris Hospital, and the Patients whom they serve are mast aware and appreciative of this continued interest centered in the ministry of healing.

Report of Commissioner-Chaplain, Harris Hospital

The Chaplaincy

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

Our Ministry at Harris Hospital is one of unusual possibilities. Most hospital patients and their families are afraid, uncertain and apprehensive. Christian love and concern are indeed for them the "Balm of Gilead." Behavior is the language of lave and since the need is so great, we see our work as a dare and a challenge to become specialists in this language. Only love can justify the support of our work.

Chaplain Robert D. Davis continues to give superior guidance to our several training programs. Chaplain Davis is uniquely qualified both by personality and training for his work at Harris Hospital. He has won for himself an outstanding place on our Hospital Staff.

Clinical Training Program

Clinical Pastoral Education provides a learning situation for a theological student and cantinuing education for a clergyman in which, under direct supervision, they may develap awareness of the theological, psychological and social concerns of persons in crisis situations. It supplies the process and setting wherein knowledge, insight, feeling and experience undergo assimilation and integration, and are transformed into understanding, skill and competence in the pastoral function.

At Harris Hospital we currently have three types of clinical training programs: 1. A seminar in the hospital ministry. The students in this seminar spend 18 Mondays in the hospital.

2. Unit I of Clinical Pastoral Education. Spring Unit: The students spend all day Monday, Wednesday and Friday in the hospital for 15 weeks. Fee \$50.00. Summer Unit: The students spend 5 days a week in the hospital setting for 11 weeks. Fee \$50.00.

3. Unit II (The Internship): The student spends 40 to 50 hours a week in the hospital setting and in academic work for a 9 month period. He is granted a \$200.00 month stipend for each of the 9 months.

Harris Hospital is a fully accredited training center far Clinical Pastoral Education by the Association for Clinical Pastoral Education.

This report covers the period of June 1, 1967 through May 31, 1968.

At the close of May 31st, the cost of 15 church-referred patients amounted to \$16,934.21. The total amount received from the churches of our Conference for the same period of time amounted to \$10,456.44.

Methodist Home

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

Beginning at the end of the Conference year on June 30, 1967, the Methodist Home had 460 children in its care of which 18 were attending colleges through the Home's scholarship program. Since then, we have released 61 children to go back to their respective families and placed 8 children for adoption. We have admitted 78 children into the Home, making the total number of 469 children now under the care of the Home. This shows a net increase of 8 children under the care of the Home during the Conference year. From the total number of children, 12 of them are under care in our Houston services, and we have 115 children from 54 families out of the Central Texas Conference. We are happy to report that our program of service to adolescent boys and girls in our Houston agency is progressing well. Here we are serving boys and girls who have great problems of emotional disturbance or behavioral problems. These boys and girls come primarily from the Houston area, but the Houston agency is an arm of Methodist Home and is open to any child served by Methodist Home. It is in its early infancy, but we are hopeful that as the program progresses, we will be able to serve more boys and girls who have great need for these services.

During the year, we have been able to work with parents of children more than at any time in the past. Our records indicate we have released 61 children to their families since this Conference year began. In all instances, our staff is trying to wark with these families to see the child's adjustment back into family life with them is secure.

This year has seen the completion and occupancy of the Zimmerman Home on the campus. This home unit provides care for 12 children and is a brothersister home unit where both boys and girls can live in a more family-like situatian.

The work of the children's home has changed greatly over the past years. As the needs for children have changed, we have had to change our concepts in the care of children to meet those needs. Originally, ours was a home for orphans. No longer is this the case because not even 5% of our children are orphans. Our children come from broken homes or from homes in which they can no longer function as normal children. They all have some emotional instability—some are severely emotionally disturbed. It is imperative that we provide a program of care which will treat and rehabilitate those who need this professional help. This is not an easy task, and it takes professionally trained staff members—many of them. It takes psychological, psychiatric, and medical services in ever increasing volume. Even though the cost is great, in the long run, it is very small when a boy or girl is saved for a constructive life of service.

We would never forget our work of administering to the spiritual needs of children. This stands at the very top of our priority service. Religious service, church schoal, and religious counseling are all given the rank of highest importance in our program.

We are grateful to the Central Texas Conference for its continued support through the years. In this Conference year, the Central Texas Conference has provided \$92,116.00 for the work of Methodist Home.

Methodist Mission Home of Texas

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

General:

This HOME is providing a realistic and effective ministry to unwed mothers and their families. The unwed mother in our culture needs many things: First, and most important—acceptance, love and understanding, in spite of her serious moral mistake; second, a place where she can obtain confidential and expert help on her medical, psychological and social problems; and third, an opportunity with the help of sensitive counselors to re-orient herself to life's meaning, to accept God's forgiveness, and to make a mature and realistic decision about her baby. All of this your HOME provides in an increasing measure.

Counseling:

In keeping with the HOME's desire to fulfill its healing ministry, certain areas are being strengthened. Continuing and effective counseling is one of these because counseling is basic to our service.

A heavy emphasis is being placed upon both group work and casework services. Girls are being seen weekly in a group setting with a male and female social worker present, or once a week in private interviews.

We are working also toward strengthening our consultive program to reinforce our casework and counseling services. In addition to our psychological testing program under the direction of a Clinical Psychologist the services of a Consulting Psychiatrist are available as needed. Periodically, we have a visiting Nurse to hold classes with the girls centering around prenatal care.

The move to the New HOME was made the last week in January and the Official Consecration was held on February 14th, 1968. Adjustments to the new and more adequate facilities are being made. Our capacity, at least until more budget funds are available, will be to a maximum of 90 residents.

Adoption:

In order to provide good Christian homes for many of the babies born to the residents, the HOME is also a licensed adoption agency. The demand for Anglo babies continues to be steady and quite adequate whereas it is very difficult to find good Latin-American and Negro adoptive homes. Our service to Latin-American and Negro girls is limited by this scarcity of good homes for their babies. We are constantly re-evaluating our adoption policies and procedures to make them more flexible and helpful, and we try to help as many couples as possible. We are always glad to have couples write to us about adoption possibilities.

Completion of Building Program:

On February 14th, 1968, the new seven building complex for the Methodist Mission Home of Texas was consecrated. With the actual building of the facility completed, every effort is being made to complete the campaign which will cover the \$1,250,000 cost. This is being done through the two phases of the campaign, the first \$700,000 through apportionment in the Six Annual Conferences and \$550,000 sought through special gifts. As of February 29th, 1968, some \$451,000 has been paid in on the apportionment and approximately \$325,000 in Pledges and cash on Special Gifts. Every effort to complete both phases must be made so that the new facilities can be paid for in full.

One wing of the new Dormitory has not yet been furnished and will not be until additional funds and Staff are available. Thus the HOME will operate below the 120 ultimate capacity to begin with. Additional operational funds are a necessity as the HOME moves toward its eventual full capacity.

Wesleyan Homes, Incorporated

Five years and six months ago . . . eighteen residents and \$8,000 per month deficit spending . . . the Wesleyan showed a net loss of \$90,000. This loss in 1966 was reduced to \$14,000. This progress has been made possible in a large measure through a population growth which has reached a capacity "house." Another strong factor has been our inheritance from the Highnote Estate, which netted the Home some \$14,000 from dividends and royalties in 1966. The aforementioned figures are not to be misconstrued, however. The Wesleyan ended the fiscal year with total revenue exceding total expenditures. Mother's Day offering, individual gifts, and Highnote revenue made this possible.

The finance committee set the 1967 budget at \$244,367. This includes an increase in the food service and nursing departments, in addition to the general payroll increase of \$12,000, as a result of the new Wage and Hour Law, with a minimum of \$1.00 per hour. The committee also examined possible sources

of income thoroughly and estimated a total revenue of \$244,480 of which \$204,000 will be received from resident service charges.

Our admissions policy continues to set an age ceiling of 80 years with some latitude allowed when an applicant over 80 in good health agrees to an extra nursing charge. This practice, however, is kept to a minimum because of the "supply and demand" formula. The Health Center (infirmary) has been increased from seven to a total of 16 complete infirmary units; the maximum under present available space is 20. The Wesleyan is approved for Medicare participation as an Extended Care Facility. Licensed nurses, are employed around the clock. This is the basic requirement of Medicare.

Report No. 11

The Methodist Home Foundation

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

The Methodist Home Foundation has experienced a year of gratifying participation in one of the important services to residents of the state of Texas and New Mexico which is provided by the Methodist churches of this area. Through its financial assistance to the program of the Methodist Home, the steady progress of this institution toward a more effective service to homeless children continues to move forward.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1967, appropriations to the Methodist Home amounted to \$593,622 for operating fund purposes, and \$230,053 for special purposes. The appropriation for operating expenses supplemented the funds received from the Christmas offering, thus making it possible for the Home to carry out the program of services to children as outlined in objectives adopted by its Board of Directors. Appropriations for special purposes included \$227, 429.15 for construction of the Motor Pool and Maintenance Center, the Greene-Willis Recreation Center, and part of the cost of the Zimmerman Home.

From the beginning of the Home in 1890, the Methodist Church has dedicated itself to an active role in meeting the crises experienced by boys and girls of succeeding generations whose potentials were threatened by economic and social problems beyond the control of themselves and their families. The interest of the church through its members, both personally and through financial assistance, in this program has been gratifying. The men and women who have served officially on its Board of Directors, as well as those who lent their support through many and varied unofficial capacities, have sought to justify and implement this interest by making more secure this purpose by setting up the Methodist Home Foundation as a means of insuring an uninterrupted operation by the Home in caring for children, while at the same time permitting the study and planning for more effective services in keeping with the current thinking in the child care field.

We take this occasion to express appreciation to all for their interest and support of the Foundation. We solicit your continued assistance in speaking a word in its behalf whenever the opportunity presents itself, so that the funds will be available to provide the best program possible for meeting the needs of children who will continue to call upon the church for help.

COMMITTEE ON INTERJURISDICTIONAL RELATIONS

Resolution

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

Whereas, all of the Annual Conferences formally part of the Central Jurisdiction have been transferred and are now a part of the South Central Jurisdiction; and

V/hereas, the Plan of Union as well as the desire and intent of The Methodist Church has for many years called for the merger of Conferences occupying the same geographical boundaries without regard to race or color at the earliest possible date, and

Whereas, though both Conference and State Committees, representatives of all Conferences involved have been involved in conversations and plans for merger since 1964, and

Whereas, the financial responsibilities and obligations of all Conferences involved have been carefully considered and reasonable solutions found for most problems;

Therefore, be it Resolved:

(1) That the Annual Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction within the State of Texas, namely the Texas of Bishop Paul Martin's area, the Texas of Bishop Noah Moore's area, the Southwest Texas, North Texas, Central Texas, Northwest Texas, and the West Texas Conferences, by the adoption of this resolution commit themselves to work faithfully for the development of a truly inclusive church at all levels of the church's organization and life in keeping with the procedures and ideals described and authorized by the General Canference of the former Methodist Church and the Plan af Union of The United Methodist Church; and

(2) By the adoption of this resolution it is determined that the Texas Conference of Bishop Naah Moore's area will be dissolved and merged with the Texas Canference of Bishop Paul Martin's area at the clase of the 1970 session of the two Canferences pravided that if the two Canferences shauld so determine the Texas Canference, presided aver by Bishop Moare, will be dissalved and merged with the Texas Canference, presided aver by Bishop Martin, at the clase of its 1969 session.

(3) By the adaptian of this resalution it is further determined that the West Texas Canference will be dissolved and merged with Annual Conferences having overlapping geographic baundaries. Far example: the Narth Texas, Central Texas, Sauthwest Texas and Northwest Texas Conferences, at the close of the 1970 sessian of the West Texas Conference pravided that if it shauld so be determined by the Conferences invalved that the West Texas Conference wauld be dissolved and merged with the overlapping Canferences at the close of its 1969 session.

(4) **Be it Resolved** further, that the Sauth Central Jurisdictianal Conference of 1968 will be requested to bring the baundaries af the twa Texas Conferences, namely those Conferences presided over by Bishap Paul Martin and Bishop Noah Maare, into harmony with each other.

(5) By the adaptian of this resolution by all of the Conferences cancerned, namely the Texas Conference of Bishop Martin's area, the Texas Conference of Bishop Moore's area, the Southwest Texas, the Narth Texas, the Central Texas, and the Narthwest Texas and the West Texas Conferences, will be a request to the South Central Jurisdiction to approve the merger of all Conferences in the State of Texas having overlapping boundaries.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

The Board was arganized according to the Dicipline with all nominated members elected by Annual Canference June 6, 1967. The Executive Cammittee held a planning session June 17, 1967, to program the years work.

The 19th Annual Laymen's Retreat was August 25, 26 & 27, 1967. The general theme was "Committed — To What?," Dr. Charles L. Allen, Mr. Everett Lindsey, Lea Baker, Dr. Alsie H. Carleton, Dr. Ira Gallaway, Max Mabley, Dr. Bruce Weaver and Dr. Maggart B. Howell inspired the more than 1,000 ministers and laymen that registered their attendance. Bill Mann and Oris Baldwin also brought us a real message in music.

The Mid-Winter meeting af the Canference Baard was held February 24, 1967 in Cleburne. Reports and plans for remainder of year were stimulating and enthusiastic.

Through the fine pragramming and gaad leadership of the ather Canference Officers, Conference Directors of the various special emphasis, district Lay Leaders and Associates and our district Superintendents much progress has been made in many areas of Christian Witness experiences.

In our Stewardship program, the emphasis was placed on Churchmanship and a complete Stewardship program rather than just finances.

Two Conference Workshops were held with Bishop W. Kenneth Pope the principal speaker at the first of these and the second featuring a discussion and idea session. Practically all of our District Superintendents attended both these workshops.

The program on Wills and Legacies is progressing in a majority of our churches. The past year was the first without guidance from the Texas Stewardship Movement. Three joint planning sessions were held with the North Texas Conference, each attended by Bishop Kenneth Pope and Dr. Sidney Roberts. Plans are working for a more effective program in the coming year.

Laymans Day was observed in about 88% of our churches. Reviewing the composite of our district Lay Leaders reports, many thoughts, ideas and stimulating facts are observed. 140 Methodists in our Conference received certificates in Lay Speaking this year, according to our records this makes about 718 certified Lay Speakers in our Conference.

These reports also indicate that 134 District, Sub-District, and/or Local Church training sessions in one or more of these areas: Church Lay Leader Training, every member visitation program, Lay Speaking, some phase of Stewardship, Wills and Bequest, Lay Member to Annual Conference Program, District and Associate District Lay Leaders, Nominating Committee, Methodist Men, Official Board Members, Adequate support of Ministry, Trustees, and Training Secretaries of Stewardship.

We wish to express our sincere gratitude to Bishop Pope, his cabinet, to the tireless, devoted ministers of our Conference and many, many sincere and concerned Christian laymen who united with the efforts of all to make this report a reality.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

The program on Minimum Pastoral Support continues to operate in a satisfactory manner. Our payment schedules compare favorably with the schedules of payments of other annual conferences in Texas. There have been no recommendations presented to the Commission for changes in the present procedures.

However, the use of the extended ministry plan has continued to expand, and as more charges are removed from the support of the Minimum Pastoral Support program, we find that we have been able to meet our financial responsibilities and our reserves cantinue large. Therefare, we recommend to the annual conference, that beginning with the fiscal year 1968 (last seven months) that all financial apportionments for the Minimum Salary Fund be eliminated until such financial apportionments again become necessary. If this recommendation is appraved by the annual conference, we further recommend that the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support be relieved of their responsibility of paying \$1,200 each year into the office of the Conference Secretary-Treasurer. The Conference Secretary-Treasurer then will issue checks upon the requisition of the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT

Plan of Operation

(as Amended June 5, 1968)

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Conference, under the management of a Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, hereinafter, for the sake of brevity, called the Commission, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. Five of this number shall be ministers, and four laymen. The term of service shall be for three years, so arranged that three shall be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support Program.

Vacancies in the membership of the Commission, caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference, shall be filled by the nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the ensuing session of the Annual Conference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regulor way.

The Commission shall organize at that session of the Central Texas Annual Conference held at the beginning of each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Recording Secretary. The Secretary-Treasurer of the . Annual Conference shall be the Executive Secretary-Treosurer of the Commission. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Commission, and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. All subsequent elections of officers and executive committee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Commission held prior to the meeting of the Central Texos Annual Conference.

Administrative Procedures

1. The following conditions shall be met by a postoral chorge to become eligible for consideration by the Commissian for its pastor to receive solary supplements from the Fund:

(a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted an Every Member Canvass for the local church budget of each of its churches during the previous conference year.

(b) The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall have been accepted and poid in full for the previous conference year.

(c) The salary for the pastor and all other items of ministerial support included in the Connectional Ministry Fund sholl have been paid in full and proportionally for the previous year, and

(d) The churches of the pastoral charge shall not reduce the salary below that paid the previous conference year, unless such reduction shall be explained and presented in writing to the Commission, and approved as justifiable by the unanimous vote of the Commission.

2. The following conditions shall be met by a pastor to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for receiving salary supplements from this Fund:

(a) He shall be a pastar in effective relation, a pastor on trial, an approved full-time supply pastor, an approved student supply pastor, or a supply pastor who has not previously served a pastoral charge. He shall not be eligible for consideratian for salary supplements from this Fund if his appointment is other than pastor of a charge within the Central Texas Conference, if he receives salary aid from the General or Conference Board of Missions, if he is classified as a part-time supply pastor, if he is a retired minister, or if he receives income from any other employment than the regular work of the pastoral ministry. Receiving a scholarship for college or seminary work shall not restrict his eligibility.

(b) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this Fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in his present appointment.

3. A prerequisite for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund shall be the filing with the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Commissian a written application by the District Superintendent. This application shall indicate the classification of the pastor, the salary set by the charge, and shall contain the certifications by the District Superintendent whether or not the pastoral charge has met each of the requirements set forth above in Section 1.

4. In cases of appointments, ar changes of appointments, between the sessians of the Annual Conference, all the above requirements are opplicable and the District Superintendent sholl file a new application far each charge concerned. Such salary supplements, if opproved, shall be paid on a pro rata basis for the part of the year octually served.

5. The salary supplements shall be computed at \$1800.00 per year, or the salary and trovel expenses apportianed by the pastaral charge, whichever is the higher figure, according to the following classifications:

(a) For married or unmarried conference member in the effective relation, or on trial and not enrolled as a student during the year, the solary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$5,000.00 per year, but in no case shall the sum required be more than \$1,500.00.

(b) For o married or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who is an ordained elder, and who for the previous five consecutive years has served as a full-time approved supply postor within the Central Texas Annual Canference, the solary supplement shall be the omount necessary to make the salary \$4,050.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00

(c) For o married or unmarried full-time approved supply pastor, who does not meet all the quolifications af section (b) above, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,900.00 per year, but in na case shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00.

(d) For married ministers, who are either student pastors on trial, approved student supply pastors, or supply pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,600.00 but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00.

(e) For unmarried ministers, who are student pastors on trial, approved student supply pastors, or supply pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,000.00 per year, but in na cose shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00, and

(f) In addition to the abave schedule and obove the limitation of aid, seminary students who are serving pastoral charges and receiving Minimum Pastoral salary supplements, may receive \$1.00 per mile, one way, one time, per year, for the distance from the seminary to the postoral charge. This extra allowance shall be camputed by the Cammission, and paid in ane payment to the seminary student pastar serving the charge at the end of the third quarter of the conference year.

6. Funds for the work of the Commission shall be secured in accordance with the pravisians of Paragraph 826, Discipline 1964, and the apportionment of each pastoral charge shall be the sum equal to one per cent of the salaries apportioned for the pastar and all associate pastars appainted to the charge. This amount shall be included in the Cannectianal Ministry appartianment.

The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts appartioned to the churches in their respective districts, and far the rearrangement of pastaral charges, as necessary, to provide that the salary for the pastor to be paid by the charges be not less than \$1800.00 per year.

8. Payment on the apportionment to the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Cammissian shall make payment to thase receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31st, shall be made an May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same percentage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.

A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts fram the Canference Treasurer during the year, all payments af those recaiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for work of the Cammissian, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund, and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals enroute, ta all meetings af the Commission except such as are held while the Annual Conference is in session shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be paid in accordance with the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Cammission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of maney has been realized from the apportionment, payment far the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid is limited to those who receive the benefits of the Fund, and not more than ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available far such emergency appropriation. All unexpired portians af such available emergency funds shall at the close of the year remain in the general fund, subject to the disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this Plan.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

Report No. 1

Jurisdictional Ministerial Education Fund

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

Ministry Sunday offerings for the training of our ministers continue to give needed encouragement and assistance to aur ministers in training. We believe that the churches' fine response hos played a significant part in the increase in number of young men committing their lives to the ministry. Your Board seeks to administer its share of these funds in a fair and equitable way making them available on the basis of need to deserving young men and women.

Recruitment for the Ministry

We have cause to rejoice in the fine response made by our young men to the call of Bishop W. Kenneth Pope to the Conference on the Ministry.

This was the best attended conference we have had. There were 88 young men present from the Central Texas Conference and a real serious concern was shown to the challenge of the ministry.

The Board of Ministerial Training is becoming more aware of the fine job our local pastors are doing to help our young men understand the call of God for ministers. The Ministerial Education Fund has given great assistance.

. Under the direction of the Boord of Ministerial Training, a questionnaire was sent to each postor deoling with ministeriol recruitment in his local church.

Although all the pastors have not been heard from we did get enough to give us a trend which was very revealing and also encouraging in many ways.

From the pastors responding we found that 90% had preached one or more times on the call to the ministry during the year and about 80% observed Ministry Sunday.

This survey revealed 20% of our pastors reporting had developed a close relationship with the vocations guidonce counselors in the high schools.

More than half of those reporting were keeping an up to dote relationship with the youth in their church who were committed to full-time church service. Many of these are in college while some are still in high school.

There seems to be o greater owareness in our Conference of the importance of challenging our youth to consider our church reloted vocations. This was reflected in the attendance of some 88 of our top young people attending the Bishop's Conference on the Ministry this spring.

I am confident we are making progress in this most important area of need in the life of our church and society.

Guidance Program

The Guidance Progrom has now completed its second yeor. The battery of phychological tests was administered on April 20 at Harris Hospital and on April 27 at Austin Avenue Methodist Church. Information from these inventories is used in follow-up conferences arranged for each individual with Dee Wiksten, Area Counselor. The emphasis of the Guidance Program is upon helping the individual to clarify his vocational calling and to respond to it more adequately. The test and inventory results serve as a guide in subsequent counseling with the individual and are in no way considered a screening device. The battery is similar to those now in use in our area seminaries and has been revised on the basis of last year's experience.

The results of the battery of tests and inventories for specific individuals are strictly canfidential, and will be released to authorized persons only with the written consent of the individual candidate involved.

The Guidance Program is planned primarily for those who are in the early stages of their consideration of the ministry. It is hoped that every local preacher, approved supply, and other individuals who are in any way considering the ministry as a vocation will participate in the Guidance Program. Pastors and District Superintendents are urged to encourage such persons to participate in the test battery and counseling. High school and college students and persons in other vocations may also participate.

Additional information about the Guidance Program and appointments for specific testing and counseling may be secured from Richard Hunt, Dept. of Psychology, SMU, Dallas, 75222, and from Dee Wiksten, c/o Methodist Hospital, Dallas.

Proposed Recommendation

The decisions involved in the procedure for an individual to secure a license to preach are extremely impartant for both the individuals involved and for the church (Par. 306, 1964 Discipline). Because of this importance, the Board of Ministerial Training of our Central Texas Conference and the Area Pastoral Counselor have cooperated in developing a Guidance Program for individuals in the early stages of decision and preparation for the ministry. This Guidance Program, now in its second year of operation, has been of great help to those who have participated fully in the program.

The District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications (Par. 306.4, 1964 Discipline) may require psychological and aptitude tests . . . and such other information . . for determining (an individual's) gifts, graces and potential usefulness" as a licensed local preacher. In view of the serious need for additional effective ministers and the crucial opportunity which the license to preach process offers both the individuals and the church, the Board of Ministerial Training of the Central Texas Conference makes the following recommendation:

1. That each District Committee on Ministerial Qualifications may require all opplicants for license to preach to take the psychological test batetry provided by the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and participate in follow-up interviews with the Area Counselor before the license to preach is issued by the District Committee.

2. That the Conference Board of Ministerial Training take the following steps to make the psychological test battery and follow-up counseling available to license to preach candidates:

a. Make the psychological test battery available to individuals at any time through the Psychological Testing Department of area colleges.

b. Secure a qualified psychological consultant to supervise the administration of such tests and coordinate test results with follow-up interviews.

c. Provide for the cost of this program from the conference Board of Ministerial Training budget.

3. As facilities and cast of the program permits, the Canference Baard of Ministerial Training will caaperate with the District Cammittee an Ministerial Qualifications, the District and lacal church Cammittee on Christian Vacations, and the canference Cammission an Christian Vocations (Par. 145.9, 696.1, 675-677, 1968 Discipline) to make the psychological test battery and fallow-up interviews available to individuals cansidering the ministry and ather church related vocations, regardless of whether they intend to apply for a license to preach.

Continuing Education

Guided Reading Program participants in our canference have praven this means of continuing education a success. At least five graups have been organized for the purpose of reading and discussian as autlined in guides provided thraugh the Office of Continuing Education at Perkins School of Theology. Some graups have included clergy af variaus denominational affiliations. Other graups have been camposed of clergy and laymen. In each case guided reading has pravided the accasion and cantent for seriaus dialague and new learning.

Perkins Outreach Seminars have cantinued ta attract attention and participatian acrass the conference. Hiram Jahnson, chairman, arranged five such seminars at variaus centers in the conference during the year. Perkins provided faculty for the one-day seminars.

Another style of continuing education pravided by Perkins is an in-residence reading program. At least ane af the members of aur conference taok advantage of that program this year.

Each of the aforementioned programs is outlined in a brachure sent last fall to pastors from the Office af Continuing Educatian at Perkins School of Theology. Further opportunities are listed in "Study Oppartunities far Ministers," a publication of the Department of Ministry of the National Council af Churches, a capy of which was sent to each pastar this spring.

Urban Ministries

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

The Annual Conference, on June 6, 1967, created the office of the Director of Urban Planning and provided for the beginning of new urban ministries in Fort Worth and Waco (pages 141-143, 1967 Journal). Study and action began immediately. We report on progress and, from the experience of the year, proffer certain recommendations concerning Annual Conference strategy.

Progress Report: Fort Worth

The Metropalitan Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, began approximately three years ago as a merger of the Boards of Missions and Church Extension of the Fort Worth East and Fort Worth West Districts for the purpose of church extension, was re-constituted in November, 1967, as an agency of **total metropolitan** planning and action. All Methodist congregations and community centers in the metropolitan area are represented. A thirty-two member Board of Directors, meeting monthly, functions for the Metropolitan Board. The conference Director of Urban Planning serves as its Executive Director.

Financial support for the work begun and projected is expected from the more than 2400 \$30-annually Metro Shares secured in pledges this year, together with budgeted district mission amounts from the local churches, with some assistance from the Annual Conference and the National Division of the General Board of Missions.

Out of the studies of this year, four major areas of the city have been defined in which the Metropolitan Board will invest funds and personnel and exercise supervision. These areas are: Northside, Old Southside, the Southeast quadrant, and Bethandrew (the near-Southeast area in which Bethlehem Center and St. Andrews Church are located). We were invited to submit the projections for these four areas for possible approval as MUST II Advance Specials, and this has been done. Details of these projections are far too voluminous to include here; they include the development of larger urban parishes and team ministries, direct ministries to need (such as tutoring, street work with youth, day care for children, various rehabilitation work, etc.), community organization, institutional chaplaincy, specialized ministries to sub-cultures.

Vital to the work currently being done and anticipated are our two community centers, Wesley (on the Northside) and Bethlehem (two locations on the near-Southeast side). They have a combined experience of seventy-five years in inner city work; both have able staffs and a full range of programming.

While projections were being shaped for the four areas, new ministries were begun. In the Southeast quadrant, the vacant buildings which once housed the Eastwood Church were re-opened as "Eastwood Center, Methodist Urban Ministry." There is a tutoring program there, serving 150 children and involving over 100 tutors from seven congregations, Texas Wesleyan College, and Texas Christian University. Parents' studies have been offered, and some group work with girls begun. On March 1, the Reverend Clifton Bullock was appointed pastor-director of Eastwood Center. On the Northside, the joint appointment, by the Central Texas and Rio Grande Conferences, of the Reverend David Maldonado to the Calvary Church provides a base for an increasingly important bi-lingual and interethnic ministry. In Bethandrew, a pilot tutoring program was conducted this spring and a special ministry to boys begun. There will be extensive summer programming in all four areas. Eight other areas where acute needs exist have been defined. Congregations in or near these areas will be offered the survey and planning resources of the Metropolitan Board in developing a relevant response. Significant beginnings have been made in four of these areas by seven different congregations.

Utilizing studies by municipal planners, the Metropolitan Board has pinpointed six priority areas beyond the periphery of present residential development. Two new sites in these priority areas will be purchased during the 1968-69 conference year. Two strategic sites are presently held by the Board.

We have entered serious exploration with other denominations, looking toward joint planning in both the changing areas and the expanding edge of the city. We anticipate that a major portion of the work projected will eventually be geared to, and in some instances merged with, the work of other denominations.

Proposed Report: Waco

The Inner City Ministry of Waco has, in a year's time, developed a program which is remarkable in scope and quality. It is headed by a three-man clergy team: the Reverend Billy Mack Patteson, Innovator; the Reverend Rodalfo Barrera, pastor of the Latin American Church; and the Reverend Luther Henry, pastor of Brack's Chapel. The hub of its wark is Friendship House, a storefront on the city square, opened last August. Information cards have been kept on more than 1,000 individuals who have made inquiries there, more than half of whom have received some kind of direct aid, job assistance, or a proper referral. Approximately 300 volunteers help in the multi-faceted program: work at the storefront, tutoring, transportation, group work with youth, etc. The Latin American Church and Brack's Chapel, as well as St. John's, Herring Avenue, and Mt. Zion Churches, provide facilities for programming. Especially satisfying has been the penetration, through personal encounter, of the barriers of class, race, and denomination.

Projections include the continued development of program at Friendship House, Brack's Chapel, and the Latin American Church, the expansion of the inner city ministry to Central North Waco (with the possibility of a second storefront in this area), additional tutoring locatians, a ministry to older adults, and an enlargement of the playground program begun in three locations this year.

In almost every phase, there has been a gratifying ecumenical interaction and cooperation, so much so that all major propections now include ecumenical dimensions.

Supervised by a twenty-five member Baard of Directors, this work is supported by the National Division, the Annual Conference, the District Board of Missions, and by the Waco Methodists who have pledged 500 \$20-per-year shares.

Recommendations Concerning Annual Conference Policy

1. Buildings and Property. We must turn from our preoccupation with buildings. A three to five year moratorium on all construction, seriously proposed in some quarters, may be extreme and unwise for us. But surely in the nowunavoidable view of the crisis in our cities and our radically changing urban circumstances we can envision a more relevant use of funds than ta continue to house ourselves mare and more elegantly. Furthermore, we can na longer consider the work of missions to be solely the establishment of surburban congregations and the erection of buildings, to which job our funds have been almast exclusively committed. Therefore, we recommend (a) that we restudy our allocation of mission funds with the intent of maintaining the church in mission to all areas of metropolis, (b) that any proposed building project be subject to intensive scrutiny by the District Board of Church Location and Building, and approved only when clearly justified as necessary to the church's mission, and (c) that encouragement and support be given to ventures in ecumenically shared buildings and the development of missionary congregations using leased quarters.

Since property is necessary in most instances, we recommend the systematic purchase of sites well out ahead of the population spread, but without preconception regarding their use. We further recommend that we cease disposing of abandoned church properties which lie within a thirty mile radius om metropolitan areas. In a decade or two, many of these could become strategic suburban sites.

2. Aid to Churches in Changing Areas. For the foreseeable future, we will continue to grapple with the problems of the racially changing neighborhood. In this circumstance the church's ministry of reconciliation is vital. Yet, in the past, we have left congregations in such changing areas to struggle (and die, when they could no longer be self-supporting) or aided their flight. We recommend that we now use our connectional strength and corporate ingenuity to enable them to stay, to be the missionary presence. This aid could be in the form of release from connectional financial obligation, the grant of additional funds, the development of the broadly-supported larger parish or team ministry, or assistance in developing bi-racial staffs. But let us no longer consider retreat.

Other type changes (e.g., the vastly increased population density and mobility when a neighborhood changes from one-family dwellings to high-rise apartments) being critical periods of adjustment to local congregations during which they need the sustenance of the connectional strength of the Annual Conference. We recommend that resources be made available, as a valid mission commitment, to strengthen and re-focus such congregations.

3. Joint Strategy and Action. The pooling of our accumulated denominational wisdom and resources is imperative if we are even to approximate an adequate response to the Word of God in metropolis. We are past the time for fraternal gesture. Therefore we recommend that the Annual Conference record its firm commitment to invest funds and personnel in ecumenically-planned projects, in all areas of metropolis, understanding that in a given circumstance this involves the willingness to lose denominational identity in the new structures of mission which emerge.

The National Division of our General Board of Missions is now a full participant in the Joint Strategy and Action Committee, the vehicle of six major denominations for urban mission, and is urging a comparable commitment in the local area.

4. **Support of Existing Community Centers.** The bulk of Methodist ministry to deprived peoples in Fort Worth has been done by Bethlehem Community Center and Wesley Community Center. They are keystones in the presently projected urban ministries. Formerly supported by the Woman's Division, they are now agencies of the general church. They face vastly expanded opportunities with inelastic budgets. They merit and need the support of the Annual Conference and local churches. We urge their inclusion in the budgets of Annual Conference and local congregations as quickly as possible and in the largest amount possible. Further, in accord with policies of the National Division of the General Board of Missions, we recommend that they be given permission to make appeals directly to local congregations and that they be approved as recipients of Advance Special giving.

Interdenominationally-governed cammunity centers with similar programs, such as the Laura Edwards Center in Waco, also deserve a more broadlybased and generous support.

5. **Planning and Research.** The urban situation is fluid, complex, and volatile. Along with business and industry, the church is recognizing the necessity for a "constant posture of research" if we are to stay alive and fulfill our calling. The continuance of the conference office of Director of Urban Planning would, therefore, seem to be indicated and is recommended.

Committee on Pension Education

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

The annuity rate paid by your Conference Board of Pensions was \$55.00 in 1965-66. With the new conference year we will be paying \$60.00 per service year to our Conference Claimants.

We began the 1967-68 conference year making pension payments to a total of 361 individuals. There were 82 retired ministers, 78 widows, 7 dependent children, and 5 special claimants, a total of 172 claimants directly related to our conference. In addition we were responsible for 82 retired ministers, 98 widows, 6 dependent children, and 3 special claimants on our Outside Responsibility List. The total pension responsibility of the Central Texas Conference according to the latest report of the General Board of Pensions is a total of 4,850.54 net years of service. This is an increase of 110.54 net years over last year. We paid to the Clearing House of the General Board of Pensions a total of \$29,578.00 for pensions.

During the 1967-68 conference year the following names have been removed from our rolls of conference claimants due to death: L. M. Lawhon, R. R. Willingham, Mrs. J. E. Buttrill, Mrs. J. L. Ray, J. B. Cole, Mrs. R. M. Studer, and A. Norman Evans. There has been added to our rolls of conference claimants, Mrs. Hayden Edwards and Mrs. L. M. Lawhon.

Emergency aid has been granted during this conference year to Mrs. E. M. Daily in the amount of \$50.00, to Mrs. J. J. Creed in the amount of \$400.00, to Mrs. W. J. Cloud in the amount of \$50.00, and to the Rev. Allen A Peacock in the amount of \$680.00. This is a total of \$1,180.00 granted as emergency aid.

The New Entrant Plan of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of The Methodist Church will become effective in 1968-69. The Conference Board of Pensions will pay an amount equal to 9% of the average salary of the Annual Conference on behalf of each of the new entrants of our conference, beginning this year. The new entrants will each receive a bill from the General Board of Pensions for an amount equal to 3% of the average salary of the annual conference. If he so chooses, the new entrant may pay an amount equal to 3% of his ministerial support if this is the lesser figure. New entrants are those received on trial and those received by transfer into the Central Texas Conference under forty years of age.

Committee on Annuity Claims for Approved Supply Service

Answering the Disciplinary Business Question No. 22, "What full-time approved supply pastors ore credited with annuity claim on account of full-time service during the year?" the following report is given.

No annuity claim can be credited to part-time supply service (pastoral services with any other employment during the year), to student supply pastors, to retired ministers serving as supply pastors, nor to those serving pastoral appointments for less than one full year. It is also a requirement of the Central Texas Conference that a prerequisite for consideration by the Conference Board of Pensions for annuity credit for full-time approved supply service be the Inclusion of the name of that individual in the classification of Full-Time Approved Supply Pastors in the report of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications at the preceding conference session.

We recommend that annuity claim be credited to the following full-time approved supply pastors for the annual conference year ending in 1968:

Rollo Herrington, C. Dale Hunt, Dan Johnson, Marion F. Johnson, Harmon W. Keelin, George M. Seipp and John McDaniels.

Committee on Annuity Responsibility

Attention is called to the action of our Annual Conference in 1963, which is still in effect, that the Central Texas Conference assumes no pension responsibility for service rendered outside the bounds of the Annual Conference unless special authorization is recommended by the Board of Pension and granted by vote of the Annual Conference. It is presumed that all Chaplains in the armed services and in the institutional services are participating in the pension programs available to them. No responsibility for such service is assumed by our Annual Conference unless authorized by vote of our Annual Conference.

Your Conference Board of Pensions presents the following recommendations: (1) That the Policy of the Conference be that for the men who have pensions figured including MRPF service years that their pension payments be raised until they equal what would be paid if they were figured on the current annuity rate.

(2) That in accordance with recommendation of Board of Pensions and acceptance of the Annual Conference of 1967-68 the annuity rate be \$60. per service year and the Conference Claimants apportionment in the Connectional Ministry Fund be an amount equal to 21% of Pastor's Salary.

(3) That the Annual Conference authorize the General Board of Pensions be made the paying agency for the pensions of the conference.

Report No. 3

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

At the 1957 session of the Central Texas Annual Conference, the following resolution was adopted by the annual conference:

"We recommend to The Annual Central Texas Conference in Waco, June 1957 that Mrs. Laura Shipp be placed on the roll of cloimants of the Conference, and be paid the Widows prorata share of the total annuity for such.

"That she share only in that partial of funds poid in by the Churches of the Central Texas Conference — Namely $16\frac{1}{2}$ % of the salaries of Postars and Churches of the Conference, and that payments become retroactive to October 14, 1956, date of the death of Rev. Shipp.

"The resolution was passed unanimously by the Board"

Since that time your Board of Pensions has been poying pensions to Mrs. Laura Shipp and to Mrs. Mabel Shipp, to Mrs. Laura Shipp ot the special rate indicated previously and to Mrs. Mobel Shipp ot the regular rate.

It has come to the ottention of your Conference Board of Pensions that since the above resolution was adopted by our annual conference that a similar case in the Central Kansos Conference was referred to the Jurisdictional Council for a decloratory decision. This decision (No. 201, October 12, 1963) declared that "A divorced wife of a former Methodist minister is not eligible for a pension which might be granted to a wife for her years of approved service." In the light of this decision the General Board of Pensions declined to approve any pension for any divorced wife of a former Methodist minister.

Your Conference Boord of Pensions, in consideration that the General Boord of Pensions has been approved as the paying agent for pensions for this annual conference, believes that it must recommend to the annual conference that Mrs. Louro Shipp be removed from the roll of conference claimonts.

Your Conference Boord of Pensions is concerned deeply with the needs of Mrs. Louro Shipp but is convinced that the use of pension funds for this purpose is illegal. Therefore, ofter consultation with and approval of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, we recommend that the Conference Treosurer be authorized and instructed to pay her monthly payments of compensation out of Operating Reserve.

We, the Committee on Proportional Payments, are pleased to announce that out of three hundred fifty eight churches in the Central Texas Conference that only three of them showed a proportional deficit in the item of Connectional Ministry and all three of these have now paid the full amount since the statistical books were closed.

Once again we seek to remind the churches and the pastors of the seriousness of failing to provide far all the ministers who depend on this fund far their financial support. We are campelled to say again and again that when a church fails in this area the amount of deficit is deducted from that pastar's retirement, therefore penalizing him when he is likely to need it most. The church or the pastor can easily remove any deficit which appears in our records simply by paying the amount due to the Conference Treasurer for the Board of Pensions.

COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND METHODIST INFORMATION

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

The work of our Commission has been enhanced by the establishment of the office of the Area Director of Public Relations. A great deal of the work of our Commission has been facilitated by a central source of news service to news-papers, radio and television stations in the Central Texas Conference. The personal contacts with news men by the Area Director of Public Relations has been invaluable in our work this year.

Highlights of aur work this year present a well rounded program af news services. A training session for District Directors of Methodist Informatian was held early in the summer. A seminar for conference officials was held to imprave public relations programs for the various boards and agencies. We have sent news releases to District Directors with general mail aut news releases to many outlets. News conferences have been held at stragetic times along with many feature stories on special appointments and events. A great impetus to our program has been cooperation with the major newswire services.

Through the Texas Office of Methodist Information, our area Directar of Public Relations has prepared a Methodist Information Kit listing the names, addresses and phone numbers of the Methodist afficers, executives and chairmen of the conference boards and agencies. The kit has been distributed to the news media and has proven to be an invaluable asset as a source of information.

Our commission has sought to improve the reporting of Conferences and pastoral appointments by providing news room facilities staffed by the District Directors of Methadist Information at the Annual Conference last year, General Conference and presently through aur news room located in Room 333.

We also want to emphasize the importance of the work of **The Texas Methodist** and urge that a time be set for stressing the value of local editions and a mare extensive subscription to **The Texas Methodist**. A new "**Key member**" plan, an All Official Plan, and an every family plan are particularly emphasized. We feel that **The Texas Methodist** is a vital source of informatian far the church and shauld be found in every Methodist home.

A request to the Central Texas Conference for funds to share in the operation of the Methodist Communications Council of Texas is to come from the Texas Methodist Planning Commissian. This statewide body has recammended that each annual conference in Texas share proportionately in a coordinated program of cammunications: We recammend that the Central Texas Conference become a responsible participant in the Methodist Communications Council of Texas by making available the necessary funds and personnel to adequately facilitate the work of this council subject to the approval of the rest of the annual conferences af Texas.

The Commission has presented to the Canference Commissian on World service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference the following askings for the operation af aur Commission for the Conference year 1969-70 the sum of \$240.00 accarding to the budget submitted to the Commission on Warld Service and Finance.

Methodist Communications Council of Texas

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

The Methodist Communications Council of Texas was constituted upon the recommendation of the Texas Methodist Planning Commission by the Annual Conferences of Texas to study the whale area of communications as it relates to Methodism in Texas, and the following is a progress repart and some recommendations resulting from the study.

Our Goal

To establish an adequate structure for communicating the image and message of the church an a statewide level.

Objectives in two Areas

- 1. Television, Radio, and Film
 - 1. To disseminate information about availability and usage.
 - 2. To develop a philosophy and train leadership in the use of audiavisual resources.
 - 3. To study the feasibility of a statewide audio-visual resources library and to coordinate present annual conference library resources.

- 4. The placement of oudio-visuol materials on television and radio in the morket areo.
- 5. To coordinote the production of resources.
- 6. To moke the church's voice heard in secular production.
- II. Informational services (Texas Methodist, Public Relations, and Methodist Information Printing)
 - 1. Develop a philosophy ond train leadership in journolism.
 - 2. Coordinate the Texas Methodist publishing interests through the Executive Committee of the Texas Methodist, subject to approval of the Jaint Board of Publications.
 - 3. Coordinote stote-wide Methodist news services.
 - 4. Media relations.
 - 5. Consultation service for printed media.

Organization

We recommend the formation of a Communications Council composed of and doing the work of TRAFCO and a committee in informational services (Texas Methodist, Methodist Information and Public Relations).

There shall be two functional committees:

I. The electronic medio services committee

The responsibilities and authorities of the electronic media services committee ore the some os the objectives listed above for the area of television, radio, and film.

II. The informational services committee

The responsibilities ond outhorities of the informational services committee are the same as the objectives listed above for the area of informational services.

We further recommend the employment of a port-time Director of the Methodist Communications Council of Texos to be elected by the total Council upon nomination of the Executive Committee. We recommend a total budget, not to exceed \$8,000 from the Annual Conferences, this amount to be pro-roted among the Annual Conferences of Texas on the basis of membership.

RESOLUTION

(Adopted June 4, 1968)

A petition to the 1968 General Conference of The Methodist Church requesting on Enabling Act to effectuate a change in the boundaries of the South Central Jurisdiction and the Western Jurisdiction. Said change would transfer to the South Central Jurisdiction a strip of territory in the Novojo Indian Reservation which lies olong the eastern edge of the Western Jurisdiction and adjoins the South Central Jurisdiction and the New Mexico Annual Conference.

To the Members of the General Conference:

Greetings:

Information about this request and petition:

The New Mexico Annuol Conference of the South Central Jurisdiction presently has two churches on the Novajo Indion Reservation, ot Shiprock, New Mexico, ond Bisti, New Mexico. These churches ore in the Albuquerque District of the New Mexico Conference.

Due primorily to the Christion ond Methodist influence of the Navojo Methadist Mission School ot Farmington, New Mexico, both Indians and white people on the reservation ore requesting that other Methodist Churches and teaching work be established on the reservation. A petition for the establishment of a church at Window Rack, Arizono, is in the hands of the superintendent of the Albuquerque, New Mexico District. Other towns and villages on the Arizona side of the reservation and near New Mexico have invited the Albuquerque District Superintendent to extend teaching services, and to provide worship with the intention of establishing churches. The first step in this work will be through a "Mobile Ministry" now being organized by the Albuquerque District. In order to provide this ministry and have it officially administered by the Albuquerque District Superintendent, a change in jurisdictional boundaries must be made.

The Southern California Arizona Annual Canference has no work in this Navajo reservation territory and has no intention of starting work there, primarily because af the long distance between this strip adjacent to New Mexico and their nearest churches. The Arizona District Superintendent in whose district the territory under consideration is located concurs with the Albuquerque District Superintendent in making this request for change of boundaries.

Therefore:

I, Charles R. Thigpen, District Superintendent of the Albuquerque District in the New Mexico Annual Conference, with the concurrence of the Albuquerque District Board of Church Location and Donald Locher, District Superintendent of the Phoenix District of the Southern California-Arizona Conference, hereby petition the 1968 General Canference af The Methadist Church to enoct an Enabling Act as follows:

When all disciplinary provisions pertaining to this procedure have been followed and completed, the Western Jurisdiction is hereby authorized to change its boundaries by ceding to the South Central Jurisdiction a piece of territory fifty (50) miles wide bounded an the east by the Arizona-New Mexico state border, an the north by the Arizona-Utah state border, on the west by a north-south line fifty (50) miles west of the Arizona-New Mexico state border and parallel to it, and on the south by the south border of the Navajo Indian Reservation. When this change in the boundaries of the two jurisdictions involved is completed, the territory ceded by the Western Jurisdiction to the South Central Jurisdiction shall be taken from the Southern California-Arizona Conference and added to the New Mexico Annual Conference.

COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION

Report No. 3

Plan of Operation

1. There shall be a program on sustentiation in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of a Committee of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.

This committee will have charge of and promote all the interests of the Committee on Sustentation and shall be the determining factor in the final approval of any candidate for participation in this program. Vacancies caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference in the membership of the committee shall be filled by nomination of the Bishop and his Cabinet and election by the Conference. However, the Committee is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointments are to apply only until the session of the Annual Conference following, and then the vacancy will be filled by the regular manner. The committee shall meet and organize by electing a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee and shall serve for the Quadrennium.

2. We recommend that the amount of sustentation granted to an applicant shall be the amount of the current minimum salary.

3. We recommend further that the following shall be eligible for participation:

(1) All ministers of the Central Texas Conference who have been admitted on trial, or have been received into full connection, provided they have not reached the age of voluntary retirement, which is sixty-five (65) years of age. (2) An approved supply pastor who shall have rendered not less than ten (10) years of full-time approved service os postor of a charge in the Central Texas Conference.

(3) Any minister, meeting the adove requirements, who is relieved of his pastorol duties and is granted a leave of absence from his charge by the Bishop and Cobinet during ony Conference year for physical or psychological reasons shall be eligible for sustentation for that portion of the year that remains until the next meeting of Annual Conference.

4. We recommend the following procedure:

(1) The opplicant shall make his desire known, in writing, to the Committee an Sustentation.

(2) The opplicant must submit to a complete physical examination of the Clinic of The Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texos; and, should the examining physician's diagnosis reveal difficulty in the area of the emotional, or the psychological, then the applicant shall submit to an examination by a duly qualified psychiatrist, or psychologist. In any case, the examiner shall give special attention to the following question in making his recommendation to the Committee on Sustentation: "Do you unreservedly feel that one year leave of obsence would be conducive to restoration of health so that the claimant might continue in an effective ministry?"

(3) In extreme emergencies, the Committee on Sustentation will consider the diagnosis and recommendation of a duly qualified physician, but not the claimant's personal physician.

(4) When the application is opproved by the Committee on Sustentation, the nome of the applicant shall be submitted to the Committee on Conference Relations with a request that a leave of absence be granted for o period of one year. With this opprovol of the Committee on Conference Relations, and the fovorable action of the Annual Conference, the opplicont sholl be eligible for the benefits of this program.

(5) We unreservedly recommend that no person be eligible for sustentation funds for a period exceeding twelve (12) months running consecutively.

(6) All payments shall be made to the claimant monthly.

5. We recommend the following financial plan:

(1) The Committee on Sustentation shall be given authority to draw upon the Operating Reserve of the Central Texas Conference such amounts os are necessary during any given Conference Year to meet the needs of the applicants in accordance with the obove suggested practice.

(2) After the omount expended during a Conference Year has been determined, the Committee on Sustentation will make a request to the Commission on World Service and Finance for the inclusion of that amount in the Conference Budget for the ensuing year. This procedure will be most practical for there is no way to actually determine the full amount which will be needed in any Conference Year, and if this plan is followed, there will be no possibility of having surplus or deficit in the money available for the Sustentation Committee.

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

Due to the changes in structure which will shift TRAFCO responsibilities to the Conference Council, we have made no budget request to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

The Church hos on its honds the problem ond the opportunity of whot to do with a mirocle. The modern medio of communication presents possibly the greatest opportunity for Christian advancement that the world has known since the first century. The potentials are so great that we are tempted either to stand in owe and do almost nothing or to take another ovenue of retreat and look on television, radio and films as something in the modern realm of entertainment and of no significant concern of the Church. But if we do this the thousands of commercially vested interests and the fringe groups of religion will take over these terrific ways of communicating. Indeed they almost have done this already. This is a day and on area wherein we must be doers of the Word and not hearers only. And there are great signs of progress if we will see them and each of us seriously set about to do the best we can with these apportunities that we now have to go into the world, where the world is and as the world is, with the redeeming message of our Lord.

Let us do oll that we can to encourage our people in our local churches to see the potential in these new and current methods of communication, to better understand them and to better make them useful to our Christian calling. And let us continue to porticularly support such programs as "Word and Music" and "Night Coll."

Report No. 1

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

The culturol, social, economic, etc. changes taking place in our world today, bringing about such tremendous changes in so many areas of life and society, have not by-passed the Church in Town and Country. It too has and is feeling the effects of the revolutionary results of the aforesaid.

Generally specking, there ore three mojor oreos that need our ottention, such os clusters of semi-rurol population usually near lakes and resort areas where retired and semi-retired ore moving in at a very ropid rate. Mony such areas in our Conference are not served by our church. Some small churches need to remain intact. We have many examples of churches with small numbers of people and small ottendance having been helped by the Lorger Porish and/or Extended Ministry. Some amazingly increased in attendance and show signs of growth. Other churches need to re-locate, consolidate, etc., but it must be done slowly, with dignity and purpose so as to keep in service the few remaining members.

An area that needs study and planning is an ecumenical movement in small communities where a "community church" could serve much more effectively than two or three denominational churches.

Report No. 2

(Adopted June 3, 1968)

The Town and Country Commission recommends:

1. The continued effort to define the boundaries of each parish in the Conference in order that no person in the entire geographical area will be without the spiritual aid of pastor and church.

2. Continued education and development of the ministry and laity of our Conference in the increasing need of churches to cooperate in arrangements such as Extended Ministry and Larger Parish.

3. That the Cabinet continue to move in the direction of favorable policy toward full-time trained ministers who must serve a parish appointment with more than one church.

4. That each pastoral charge have enough members to make it financially able to obtain and hold capable pastoral leadership.

5. The promotion of workshops in Districts where needs are greatest in meeting the goals of this Commission and the Conference Program.

6. That "Charge Line Standards," as shown in the 1965 Journal, page 200, continue to be followed in setting up cooperative parishes.

7. Continued exploration of the possibilities of special ministries in Town and Country such as the ministry to resort and vacation areas.

8. Cooperation with the Board of Lay Activities in promotion of stewardship with special emphasis and helps for small churches served by student and part-time pastors.

9. Continuation of emphasis on the Lord's Acre-Hour Plan as a means to provide funds for building programs and special mission projects.

10. Continued emphasis upon Property Improvement and Church Beautification Programs.

11. Continued use af District Secretaries of Town and Country Work for assistance in carrying out the Commission's Program and goals.

12 We recommend the continued use of Dr. Stanley Williams in directing our work.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

(Received June 4, 196B)

As we write for the last time, "Woman's Society of Christian Service," there goes through our minds and hearts the great faith and work of the women of this conference and their work and witness for these past twenty-eight years. As the dawn of a new church and a woman's organization comes into view, we rejoice and give thanks for the past and know that it will strengthen us in the future as women set themselves at Kingdom-Building tasks. The new Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild will continue through its new Purpose to help women to grow in the experience of God through Jesus Christ, study anew the needs of our world, present a challenging program of education in missions and secure funds for the task of the Board of Missions for the United Methodist Church.

From the National Consultation on the Church in Community Life which was held last September in Columbus, Ohio, a statement is still ringing in our ears. "Where people's paths cross, there is a cross to pick up." This describes the work of our women as they give of themselves in inner-city and in non-

metropolitan areas of need. By the presentation of special mission study programs, the monthly programs, reading and studying the Methodist Woman and the World Outlook, involving themselves with the needs of people and sharing of their human and material resources, they become committed and concerned companions of Christ in this service. They know at times we are members of congregations who build Cathedrals where tents are needed. We resist our Exodus.

Women realize that all of our planning must be "ecumenical." They must also be "future-orientated" to meet the demands of the day. In Church Women United we give of our means and time to work at needs which must be met by our whole community. This requires wise planning and proper use of our resources. Generosity is one of the marks of aur Methodist women in this area of work. In the local churches many of the society and guild members have assisted in the study of Ecumenism, based on Dr. Outler's book, "That the World May Believe." The three other topics for study have been used church-wide as well as in aur groups. The theme, "Christ and the Faiths of Men," "Japan," and "Man and Community" have all pointed to the uniqueness of our women. They mean to be in mission as well as missionary and to continue to support the church in "sending" or "sharing Christ," we like to say, around the world.

There have been many Retreats, Time A Part and days spent in special cultivation and study to deepen and enrich the spiritual life of our women. The majority of our women participated in The Call to Prayer and Self-Denial. Many were in attendance and gave a generous offering for the special needs suggested by the missionary needs of our board.

A conference wide workshop on Africa was held in January and the districts are now deep into the plans for follow-up meetings in their area. The School of Christian Mission in Southwestern University last summer found many pastors in attendance. Plans for this summer of 1968 finds our committee working with the boards of our conference looking toword an interboard school. The District Directors as well as the district officers of the Woman's Society are working together in this endeavor. On the district level, fall workshops on missions were held and much help was given the hundreds who took advantage of the training. Youth were included and plons are made for more to attend this year with more attention given to their needs as they participate in the school. They made a tremendous contribution to the whole school. The women continue to follow and support with prayers and loving concern their students and service people.

The 12,896 women of our conference society have pledged \$132,000.00 for the 1967-68 year. Our giving is showing a nice increase of nearly 8% over this time last year and it is hoped we can exceed this pledge. We have assumed our fair share of the support of John Ed and Carolyn Francis of \$6,000.00. They have now arrived in Japan and are happily working and trying to master the language problem. We are indeed grateful for this opportunity to share Christ through them in the lovely land of cherry blossoms.

The fact is that of all the books ever published, 75% of them have been published in the last decade. Many of them were bought by our women. The amount of materials bought at all meetings still is one of the encouraging signs of the desire of our women to be knowledgeable in all their witness and service. What we don't know may kill us, so says one of the leaders in the communications seminar. The Media Is the Massage, or message, we like to say. What ever way or wave is available we will need to use in the proclamation af Good News. Unique goals have been set by the women and in many ways and by all methods they intend to penetrate the world with Light.

"The Church for Others" was the theme of the Board of Missions meeting in Denver. The gigantic plans for Oceania and in the Arab world will call forth our best human and material resources. The over 600,000 Fellow-Christians in the Arob world and the hundreds of Polynesions in the Pacific oreo will be o port of the thrust of the missionory work for the new quadrennium. Every twelve doys there is o coll to the Methodist Committee of Overseos Relief to contribute money and people to world disaster or crisis. Our women in the church look therefore on the locol church os a bootcomp, not o fortress, where we will be inspired and trained, go out to work and then return often to the boot-camp for further study ond training. Thus into the new Church we morch forward knowing that:

> "You touch one string And the whole heovens ring— And His Name is Love."

Report No. 1

Special Offerings and Financial Procedures

(Adopted June 5, 1968)

1. The Commission on World Service ond Finonce opproves ond recommends that the following offerings be token in oll locol churches of the Central Texos Conference on or neor the dotes designoted in the Discipline, or herein designoted:

World Service Sunday, on the fourth Sunday of each month.

Methodist Student Day, on the second Sunday in June.

Homes for Retired Ministers, on the second Sundoy in July.

Christian Education Sunday (formerly Church School Rally Doy), on the fourth Sunday in September.

Methodist Mission Home of Texas Sunday, on the third Sunday in October.

Fellowship of Suffering and Service Sunday, on the first Sunday in October.

Ministerial Education Sunday, on the third Sunday in October.

Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday, during the month of November.

The Methodist Home, during the month of December.

Race Relations Sunday, on the second Sunday in February.

One Great Hour of Sharing, on the fourth Sunday in Lent.

Wesleyan Homes, on the second Sundoy in Moy (Mother's Day).

While no special day is designated for the Texos Alcohol-Norcotic Education program, we approve this special cause for either an appropriation from the budget of the local church, or a special offering taken at such time as the local church determines.

2. The Conference Treasurer once o month sholl distribute the receipts from local churches for World Service ond Conference Benevolences omong the six funds included in the annual budget for the Annual Conference in proportion to their opportionments. Any overpoyment of the end of the conference year for World Service shall be remitted by the Conference Treosurer to the

Treasurer of the Cauncil on World Service and Finance. Any averpayments in the other five funds (General Administration, Temporary General Aid, Interdenominational Caoperation Fund, Jurisdictional Administration and Conference Benevalences), shall be transferred into the Operating Reserve, subject to the direction of the Commission on Warld Service and Finance.

3. All boards, commissions and other agencies, seven (7) manths in advance, shall make their requests for appropriations from the Conference Benevolences budget, presenting in writing their proposed budget, in detail. This request shall be presented to the Cammissian an World Service and Finance not later than 30 days before the meeting of the Annual Conference Council.

4. Na board, cammission, or agency of the Central Texas Canference shall expend any maney far any purpose that has not been included in the ariginal budget as approved by the Cammissian an Warld Service and Finance, as printed in the Canference Journal, without the specific approval of the Executive Cammittee of the Cammissian an Warld Service and Finance.

5. The fiscal year of all boards, commissions, and other agencies operating through the Central Treasury of the Conference shall begin January 1 and close December 31. The treasurers of all boards, commissions, and other agencies of the Annual Conference shall file with the Conference Treasurer o financial statement of receipts and disbursements for the Conference year just closed within seven days after the close of the year.

6. The Conference Treasurer, after the clase of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies, into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just clased (excepting anly items specifically exempted by the Cammissian an Warld Service and Finance), making allowance for all autstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer, if natified in advance, will hanar the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new conference year within the limits of the appropriation.

7. The Canference Treasurer is authorized to pay from the Operating Reserve the fallowing items:

(1) Expense of printing the Jaurnal, which may exceed the budget apprapriation.

(2) Expense of the Conference Secretarial Staff.

(3) Expense of fidelity bands for the Conference Treasurer, and athers who handle Conference Funds, as determined by the Commission.

(4) Expense of ouditing the boaks of the Canference Treasurer, and the treasurers of boards, cammissions, and other agencies of the Canference, as may be ordered by the Cammission on Warld Service and Finance. Such audits ore to be made by the Canference Auditors, the firm of Leatherwood and Ward.

(5) Other expenditures as may be decided by the Cammissian an World Service and Finance.

8. The Conference Treasurer is authorized:

(1) To cansolidate the various funds of the annual conference and of its agencies into one or more bank accounts.

(2) To write all checks for the agencies of the Conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency.

(3) To invest, at his discretion, such funds not needed for immediate disbursement, in the Texas Methodist Foundation, as may be approved by the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

(4) To purchase, as investments, from the funds of the Conference in its general and subsidiary accounts United States Treasury Bills or Certificates of Deposits, and to borrow on, or dispose of, these investments at, or prior to maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in the accounts of the Conference at his discretion.

(5) To deposit funds for specifically designated purposes with Savings and Loan Associations with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Financial Recommendations

1. The Commission recommends that paragraph No. 1 of Report No. 4 in the 1967 Journal be replaced by the following:

The Commission recommends that the apportionment for the support of the District Superintendents shall be an amount equal to 8% of the salaries of the pastors and associate pastors, including supply postors. The District Superintendents shall be paid on the basis of \$12,000.00 per year salary and \$2,000.00 per year travel expense, payable monthly. The districts may, at the discretion of the district stewards, assess to the churches expenses for a district office, up to a total of \$5,000.00 per year. In 1968 \$581.00 of the 8% received in the District Superintendents' Fund shall be paid to the district treasurers on a monthly basis to become a part of the allowable total for the budget of the District Office. Any receipts from the 8% assessment not used for salary, expense af travel or in the \$581.00 toward District Office expense shall be retained in the District Superintendents' Fund.

District Office Expense for 1968, listed in proper categories in a budget request, must be approved by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and annual renewal requests must be accompanied by an independent

audit of the District Office Fund. District Office ossessments shall be poid by local church treasurers directly to the district treosurer chosen by the district stewards.

The District Superintendents' salory shall include an annual housing allowance to the amount actually expended for utilities up to \$750.00.

Authorized funds for the work of the district to be apportioned to the churches shall be:

- 1. District Parsonage Fund
- 2. District Office Fund
- 3. District Training Fund (For Leadership Training Activities only)
- 4. District Missions

Remittances for District Missions shall be sent to the Conference Treosurer by local treasurers. Remittances for other district funds shall be sent to the district treasurer by the local treasurers.

2. The Commission recommends that the opportionment for the support of the District Superintendents for 1969 be an omount equal to $7\frac{1}{2}$ % of the solories paid the pastors ond ossociote pastors, including supply pastors. The District Superintendents sholl be poid on the basis of \$12,000 per year salary and \$2,000.00 per year travel and expense poyable monthly.

The districts may, at the discretion of the district stewards, ossess to the churches expenses for o District Office, up to \$5,000.00 per year. Such office expense, listed in proper categories in a budget request, must be approved by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and onnuol renewol requests must be occompanied by on independent audit of the District Office Fund.

The District Superintendents' solary sholl include an onnual housing allowonce to the omount octually expended for utilities up to \$750.00.

Authorized funds for the work of the district to be apportioned to the churches shall be:

- 1. District Parsonage Fund
- 2. District Office Fund
- 3. District Training Fund (For Leadership Training Activities only)
- 4. District Missions

Remittances for District Missions sholl be sent to the Conference Treosurer by locol church treasurers. Remittances for the other district funds shall be sent to the district treasurer by the local church treosurer.

3. The Commission, in consultation with the supervisory committees, hos approved the following Budgets for 1969.

The salary ond office fund for the Area Executive Secretary shall be paid by the Canference Treasurer in manthly payments to the Area Executive Secretary. The salaries for the twa Canference Directars shall be paid by the Canference Treasurer in manthly payments to the Directors. Other portions of their budgets shall be paid by the Canference Treasurer upan requisition by the Directors as the funds are needed, except that the travel allawance ond housing allawance of the Director of Evangelism and Missions shall be paid manthly without requisition.

4. The appartianment far Cannectianal Ministry far the Fiscol year 1968 (last seven months) shall be an amount equal to 31% of the salaries of the pastars, associate pastars, including supply pastars. The Canference Treasurer shall distribute funds received far Cannectianal Ministry in 1968 occarding to a scale based on the following percentages: District Superintendents 8%, Episcopal Fund 2%, Canference Claimants Fund 21%.

The appartianment far Cannectional Ministry for the conference year 1969 shall be an amount equal to $30\frac{1}{2}\%$ of the salaries of the pastars, associate pastars, including supply pastars. The Canference Treasurer shall distribute funds received far Cannectianal Ministry far 1969 accarding to a scale based on the fallowing percentages: District Superintendents $7\frac{1}{2}\%$, Episcopal Fund 2%, Canference Claimants Fund 21%.

5. The Cammissian cancurs in the recammendation of the Bishop and the Cabinet that the Jurisdictional Ministerial Education goal be that adapted by the Jurisdictional Canference—1% of the regular budget af each church (excluding building and capital improvement items).

6. The Annual Conference in its 1967 Sessian approved a Conference Special of \$65,000.00 far the year 1968. The Cammissian recammends the fallowing allocation of the Canference Special for 1968.

HAYDEN MICAJAH EDWARDS

Hayden Micajah Edwards was born May 16, 1905 in Ireland, Hamilton County, Texas. He was the son of Daniel Lee Edwards and Annette Lainge Edwards.

He was reared in Ireland, Texas, where he attended and finished high school in 1922-24. The following two years, 1925-27, he attended Tarleton State College in Stephenville, Texas. He later attended Southern Methodist University in Dallas in 1928-29. He completed his college and university studies in 1942-43, with a B.S. Degree from Texas Wesleyan College in Fort Worth. This latter institution conferred upon him the Honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree on August 28, 1953. It was about this same time that T.W.C. named him as "The outstanding male graduate for the past 15 years."

He was married to Jessie Ruth Trammell, August 21, 1925. To their union were born two children: Marilyn Edwards, now Mrs. Harold E. Vandiver, Wichita Falls, Texas, and Hayden M. Edwards, Jr., Arlington, Texas.

Dr. Edwards' entire ministerial career was spent in the Central Texas Conference. He was licensed to preach May 15, 1925 by the Gatesville District Conference. He was first approved as supply pastor November 17, 1926. On November 6, 1929 he was admitted on trial and on November 9, 1932 he was admitted into full connection. He was ordained Deacon November 12, 1931 by Bishop Sam R. Hay, and Elder on November 8, 1933 by Bishop Hay.

Dr. Edwards served as a supply on the Huckabay Circuit for two years, beginning in 1926, and on the Covington Circuit in 1928. As to Conference service, in 1929 he was at Covington; 1931 Malone; 1935 Clifton; 1940 Fort Worth, Broadway; 1946 Fort Worth, St. Marks; 1947 Fort Worth, Polytechnic; 1955 District Superintendent, Fort Worth East District; 1961 Arlington, First; and 1964 to date of his death he was District Superintendent of the Fort Worth West District.

He died at his home in the district parsonage, 6308 Greenway, Fort Worth, on January 1, 1968 after a heart attack. The funeral services were conducted at the First Methodist Church, Fort Worth, by Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, Bishop Wm. C. Martin, and The Reverend Dr. Lamar Smith. Interment was in Greenwood Memorial Park in Fort Worth.

Dr. Edwards is survived by his wife; one son, Hayden Edwards, Jr., of Arlington; a daughter, Mrs. Harold Vandiver of Wichita Falls; three brothers, Arthur Edwards of Fort Worth, Johnnie Edwards of Bridgeport; and Raymond Edwards of Marble Falls; two sisters, Mrs. Paul Hampton of Azle and Mrs. Edward Brookshire of Graford; his stepmother, Mrs. Kate Edwards of Hamilton; five grandsons, and one great-granddaughter.

Many honors came to Dr. Edwards during his ministerial life. May 22, 1961 was designated as "Hayden Edwards Day" in ort Worth, and a testimonial

dinner was given for him by his friends. On December 16, 1967 he was named a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor by the Dallas Consistory of Scottish Rites bodies. He was a 32nd Degree Mason, a Past Chaplain for the Grand Lodge of Texas AF&AM, and Past Chaplain of the Fort Worth Moslah Temple Shrine. He helped organize Goodwill Industries and was active in the Red Cross work in Fort Worth. In 1943 he was president of the Downtown Lions Club. He served on the Boards of Trustees of Texas Wesleyan College, Harris Hospital, Texas Mission Home and Training School at San Antonio, and was Traffic Club Chaplain and Community Chest ministerial representative in Fort Worth. He went overseas at least seven times to preach at military outposts of the Air Force.

Few preachers have had a more colorful and constructive career than did Dr. Edwards. He was known by everyone as a person with a big heart. Through the years he had come to be known throughout the City of Fort Worth as a person who cared about people of all types and conditions. He was devoted to the church and its ministry and throughout his life he witnessed to his faith in Jesus Christ as the Saviour of all men. All of us who knew him would say with hearts full of gratitude and warm with appreciation, "he was a good minister of Jesus Christ."

A. NORMAN EVANS

Abner Norman Evans, son of Rufus Bell Evans and Beulah Jane Evans, was born November 8, 1887 in Corsicana, Texas.

He attended the University Training School of Blooming Grove, Texas in 1903 before going to Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas where he received his A. B. degree in 1907. He did graduate study at the University of Denver in 1919. He was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Divinity by Henderson Brown College (now Hendrix College) in Conway, Arkansas in 1925.

He married Lucile Hall September 30, 1907. They had three children: Mrs. Beulah Alice Taylor, Anita Lucile Evans (deceased(and a son, Dr. Alton Norman Evans. They celebrated their sixtieth Wedding Anniversary in Waco, Texas a short time before her death November 11, 1967.

Dr Evans began his vocational life as a journalist and served the editorial staff of newspapers in Fort Worth and Temple, Texas before entering the ministry. He never lost his interest in writing, and his editorials on the front page of the Austin Avenue News, weekly paper of Austin Avenue Methodist Church where he served as pastor for ten years, are treasured by those enriched by his ministry.

Dr. Evans was licensed to preach in Dublin, Texas, June 29, 1909. He was admitted on trial to the New Mexico Conference in 1909, was ordained deacon in 1911 and elder in 1913 by Bishop James Atkins. He served three appointments in New Mexico: Magdalena, Highland Park, El Paso and Tucumcari. He then served St. Paul Methodist Church in Denver, Colorado, and Excelsior Springs, Missouri. He was Chaplain of the Colorado State Senate while in Denver.

In 1918 he began a long and distinguished career of preaching in churches with college and university constituents. After a year at Fayette, Missouri, he became president of Howard Payne College. He re-entered the pastorate in 1920 and served First Methodist Church, Fort Smith, Arkansas, Munger Place and Grace Churches in Dallas, Texas, and Travis Street Church in Sherman, Texas.

From 1932 to 1934 he was pastor of the McFarlin Memorial Methodist Church in Norman, Oklahoma near the campus of Oklahoma University. He transferred from the West Oklahoma Conference to the Central Texas Conference in 1943.

From 1943 to 1953 he led the Austin Avenue Methodist Church in Waco, Texas through a decade of growth with a fruitful ministry to Baylor University students and the leadership of the city of Waco.

He retired in 1953 and moved to Corpus Christi, Texas where he assisted as associate minister and financial adviser in the building of two great churches, First Methodist and St. Lukes.

Dr. and Mrs. Evans then moved back to Waco to enjoy their second retirement years among a host of friends. Mrs. Evans was not strong, and Dr. Evans remained close to her side until her death, November 11, 1967. It was no surprise to friends and loved ones that he soon followed on March 10, 1968. They had done everything together so long!

They are buried side by side in Waco Memorial Park at Waco, Texas. Dr. Howard Hollowell, Dr. Robert Evans and Dr. J. B. Holt conducted the services.

Dr. A. Norman Evans was a quiet-spoken but eloquent preacher, an able administrator, a genial and lovable pastor, a devoted husband and father, a friend on whom one could always depend.






He retired in 1957 by the Central Texas Conference and then made his home at 1123 Usher Street in Benbrook, Texas.



Norman Evans on September 30, 1907; and until the day of her death on November 11, 1967, she supported her husband in faithfulness and in unwavering devotion through his long and distinguished career as journalist, college president and Methodist pastor and preacher.

She was born May 12, 1890, to Ezra I. and Alice Hall. Her father was a distinguished educator, and the intellectual and religious atmosphere of her homelife in childhood and in youth provided her with a cultural and spiritual foundation upon which she based her beautiful life for all its many years.

In the early years of their marriage, Dr. Evans was associated with **The Austin (Texas) Tribune**, following which he went to Temple, Texas, where he helped

went to Temple, Texas, where he helped in organizing, and for a time in publishing, **The Temple Tribune**. Later he was circulation manager for the **Fort Worth Record**. He was licensed to preach in the Methodist Church by the Dublin, Texas, District Conference in 1909. Forty-four years later he retired, at Waco, Texas, at the end of a signally brilliant ten-year ministry in the Austin Avenue Methodist Church, of that city.

Mrs. Evans loved beautiful things, and was a gracious lady in the truest sense of the word. Her husband has often said that in all their sixty years together he had never known her to do a mean or unworthy thing. She loved music, and was a music teacher in Magdalena and in Tucumcari, both in New Mexico, during the early years of their parsonage life. Salaries were low in those days, and Dr. Evans recalls that the financial returns from Mrs. Evans' teaching were sometimes as much as the churches paid him as their pastor.

But she taught because she loved music, having prepared herself in music education earlier in her life. She held a degree in music from Howard-Payne College, in Fayette, Missouri, where she later returned with her husband who became president of that school in 1919.

Mrs. Evans assumed her place quietly among the people, preferring always that her husband should receive the honors of the ministry, finding greater joy in his successes, while she herself supported him from the background. He says today, however, "She was more popular than I was; and they used to say of us that I got the jobs, but she held them."

Mrs. Evans was willing always to open her home to others, and a number of people today actually owe their successes in life to the gracious hospitality and Christian influence of the Evans home. She was quiet almost to the point of shyness, but never so reserved as to impress others that she did not care. Her courage seemed to be without limit, and to her God was as real as her closest earthly friend. She took this faith and courage into all environments, whether the pioneer life of a small New Mexico town or the halls of state when her husband served for a time as Chaplain of the Colorado State Senate, while a pastor in the city of Denver.

STANDING RULES

I. Organization

1. Annual Conference Council

There shall be an Annual Conference Council (in conformity to the action of the 1968 Uniting Conference) the membership of which shall be:

- 1) The presiding bishop
- 2) The district superintendents
- 3) Chairmen of Conference Boards, Commissions and Quadrennial Committees, except the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 4) The conference secretary
- 5) The conference president and vice president of youth
- 6) The district lay leaders
- 7) Chairmen of age-level and family ministries
- 8) One minister from each district
- 9) The conference lay leader
- 10) The conference president of the Women's Society of Christian Service and one additional representative
- 11) Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences—not otherwise members
- 12) The conference statistician
- 13) Members without vote:

Salaried and volunteer conference staff The conference treasurer The chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance

The cabinet to serve as the Naminating Committee

Members of the Executive Committee shall be (total not to exceed 30)

- 1) The officers of the Annual Conference Council
- 2) The presiding bishop
- 3) The district superintendents
- 4) The conference program director
- 5) Chairman of
 - Board of Missions
 - Board of Evangelism
 - Board of Education
 - Board of Christian Social Concerns
 - Commission on World Service and Finance
- 6) The conference lay leader

- 7) The conference president of the Women's Society of Christian Service
- 8) Loymen elected of lorge

Number necessory to bring total membership up to 30. Insofar as possible, representatives of conference agencies not otherwise represented.

9) The Conference Director of Christian Education and Social Concerns and the Conference Director of Evangelism and Missians shall be exofficia members without vote.

Note: Pending publication of the 1968 Discipline of the United Methodist Church, certain terminology and porograph references continue to relate to the 1964 Discipline of The Methodist Church.

5. Area Executive Secretary

There sholl be on Areo Executive Secretory, to be selected ond appointed in the some monner os the Discipline outlines for the oppointments of a District Superintendent, that is, by the Bishop. The soid Area Executive Secretary sholl be oppointed ot the 1965 session of the Annual Conference. The term of office shall be limited to eight years.

The Areo Executive Secretory will be responsible to the Bishop ond to the Executive Committee of the Administrative Council. His duties in the Central Texos Conference sholl be to initiate, to coordinate, and to implement the program of the conference in cooperation with the boards and agencies of the Conference. He shall be the Chairmon of the Executive Secretories in the Annual Conference and have general oversight over the Annual Conference program.

After consultation with the Bishop of the area, the portion of the Area Executive Secretary's budget for the Central Texos Conference shall be provided by the Commission on World Service and Finance, it being understood that the total amount from this Conference shall not exceed \$13,000 for the Conference year 1965-66.

A lioison committee composed of the Bishop, the Choirmon of the Administrotive Council, and a member of the Cabinet, chosen by the Bishop, shall serve along with a like committee from the North Texos Conference as a coordinating policy committee of the area to work with the Area Executive Secretory.

II. Boards, Commissions and Committees

6. Nominations

The District Superintendents of the beginning of the quadrennium shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for distribution, provided that no person moy be nominoted on more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Annual Conference, except where the Discipline provides for membership because of an office held. This rule is not opplicable to the District and Associate District Lay Leoders, the Committee on Conference Relations, nor Committee on Investigation. The District Superintendents shall also nominote at the end of ony normal term members af ony Board, Commission, or Committee.

All executive secretories of the boords ond ogencies of the Annual Conference, beginning in 1965, shall be limited to a term of eight years.

The obove rule sholl not opply to the office of Conference Secretory-Treosurer.

7. Eligibility

1968

The period of eligibility of membership on the Boards, Committees, and Commissions of the Annual Canference shall not exceed two consecutive quadrenniums, a total of eight years, except as set out below. When a person is elected to fill an unexpired term, he shall be given an expiration date for the end of the quadrennium that is not less than six years nor more than nine years in the future.

A member who has served twa full quadrenniums on any Board, Commissian, or Committee shall not be eligible for membership on the same Board, Commission, or Committee until a full quadrennium has passed. If a member has served less than twa full quadrenniums, he shall be eligible again for membership after one full Conference Year has passed.

In appainting new Quadrennial Boards, Commissions, and Cammittees, the Cabinet shall have the power to appaint new members far anly faur years, in order to equalize the number who are eligible to serve faur years with those eligible to serve eight years.

Nevertheless, the above shall not apply ta membership on the Board of Lay Activities as it relates to the namination of a Conference lay leader. A Conference Lay Leader is eligible for a term of no more than eight consecutive years.

Employees and Trustees of institutions, or employees of Conference Baards and Commissions, shall not be eligible for membership on the Board, Commission, or Committee through which financial support is derived. This shall not apply to membership on the Commission on Warld Service and Finance, except in cases in which a Board receives direct apprapriation of funds from Conference Benevolences budget or other funds allocated by the Commission.

The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendency shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Cammittees to take effect at the time of his appointment, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission, ar Committee. The Bishop is asked to natify such group in time to fill the vacancy before the Conference adjourns.

8. Vacancies

Vacancies on all Boards, Commissions, and Committees occuring during the quadrennium shall be filled by naminations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference. 11.0

Retirement from the active itineracy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board or Commission and on all Institutional Boards, effective on the date such relationship is taken. et by the Da

Baards, Commissions and Institutions related to the Annual Conference shall ake any action that in effect shall pullify this rule not take any action that in effect shall nullify this rule. a full financial state

Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two consecutive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

December 31st, and salaries of clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly. on in the the use of furnics.

10. Remittances

Remittances from a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Commission on World Service and Finance. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which remittance is made. The Conference Treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the District Superintendent for each remittance. The Pastor shall enclose these voucher receipts with his Annual Conference report as verification of items reported in Table 11.

11. Requests for Appropriations

At the beginning of the paragraph in the report of any board, commission, committee or agency, which presents a proposed budget or asking as an appropriation from Conference Benevolences, or any other conference fund, there shall be printed the following statement: "The board (commission, committee, or agency) has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference, the following askings:"

12. Apportionments

The apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be based on the total money raised (item 99 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness (item 51 in Report to Annual Conference), less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 52 in the Report to Annual Conference.) and less the amount paid for General and Conference Advance Specials (items 74 and 88 in Report to Annual Conference.) It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to compute the appropriations annually, using the statistics of the last published journal (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. The district apportionments shall be distributed to the local churches by the district superintendent and the district stewards.

13. Annual Audit

The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not pravided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

Annually, each Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed Conference Calendar unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit including current annual income and expense together with its report, to the appropriate Board.

14. Special Days and Campaigns

Any request from a Board or institution or special interest of the Methodist Church asking for a special campaign for funds or a Special Day Offering shall first be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and recommendation. If such recommendation is mode to the Annual Conference it must show that the object or enterprise is wholly owned by The Methodist Church; that the detailed use of funds is reasonable; and that proper safeguards have been set up for the use of funds.

Any recommendation from a Board, Commission, or Committee, including the Commission on World Service and Finance, asking for an increase that will effect the Budget of the local church, if approved, shall become effective at the beginning of the next fiscal year, January 1st.

IV. Administrative

15. Conference Secretary-Treasurer

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Commission on World Service and Finance after consulting with the Bishop and his Cabinet, the Board of Pensions, and the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be under the supervision of the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. He shall also serve as the Treasurer for the Board of Pensions and the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

The term of office of the Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily be a quadrennium and a newly elected Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily assume his official duties at the session following the General Conference.

16. District Conference

The District Conference, where held, shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate. District Conference records, where kept, are not to be reported to the Annual Conference session.

17. Reports

1968

The reports of the pastors to Annual Conference (Tables I and II) and final payments to the Conference Treasurer for all connectional items shall be presented at a district meeting to be held within two weeks of the opening date of the Annual Conference. The Conference Statistician shall set the time and place for the district meetings, and shall appoint a District Statistician for each district, who shall receive, audit, and compile the pastors' statistical reports into the district report, and shall receive and forward the same day final remittances from the local churches to the Conference Treasurer. The District Statisticians shall forward the district statistical tables to the Conference Statistician within one week after the district meeting. No change in the statistical tables will be made after the district meeting.

Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Committee on Proportional Payments any church in the district that has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, or World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrowed must be made a part of the record.

He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attention during the year, and had not been reported.

18. Conference Procedure

Lay members and reserve lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected at the Fourth Quarterly Conference and the term shall begin at the end of ensuing regular session of the Annual Conference and continue until the next regular session of the Annual Conference.

All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, except statistical reports, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary before they are presented to the Conference.

All bonds required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

19. Conference Expense

The Conference Committee on Entertainment, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of retired ministers.

Each charge in the Annual Conference is expected to defray the expense of its minister and lay delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

Per diem allowance will be granted pastors receiving a total salary of, or less than, the amount recommended year by year by the Committee on Conference Entertainment and approved by the Annual Conference.

20. Car Expense

For the quadrennium 1964-1968, all Boards, Commissions, and Committees, of the Conference shall allow six cents per mile car expense, or eight cents when two or more members ride in the same car, for necessary travel within the Conference or adjacent territory. Five cents per mile shall be allowed for out of the state travel. Members of Conference Agencies are urged to use car pools wherever possible.

21. Memoirs

There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

22. Amendments

Any of the above rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference.
