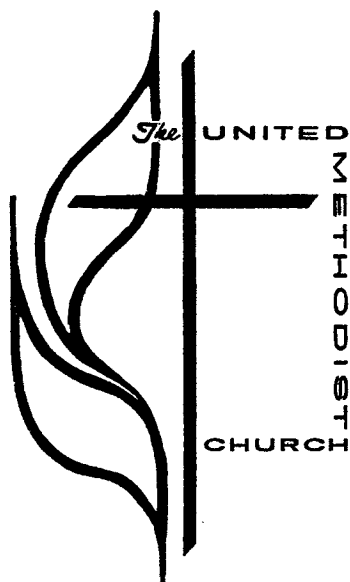

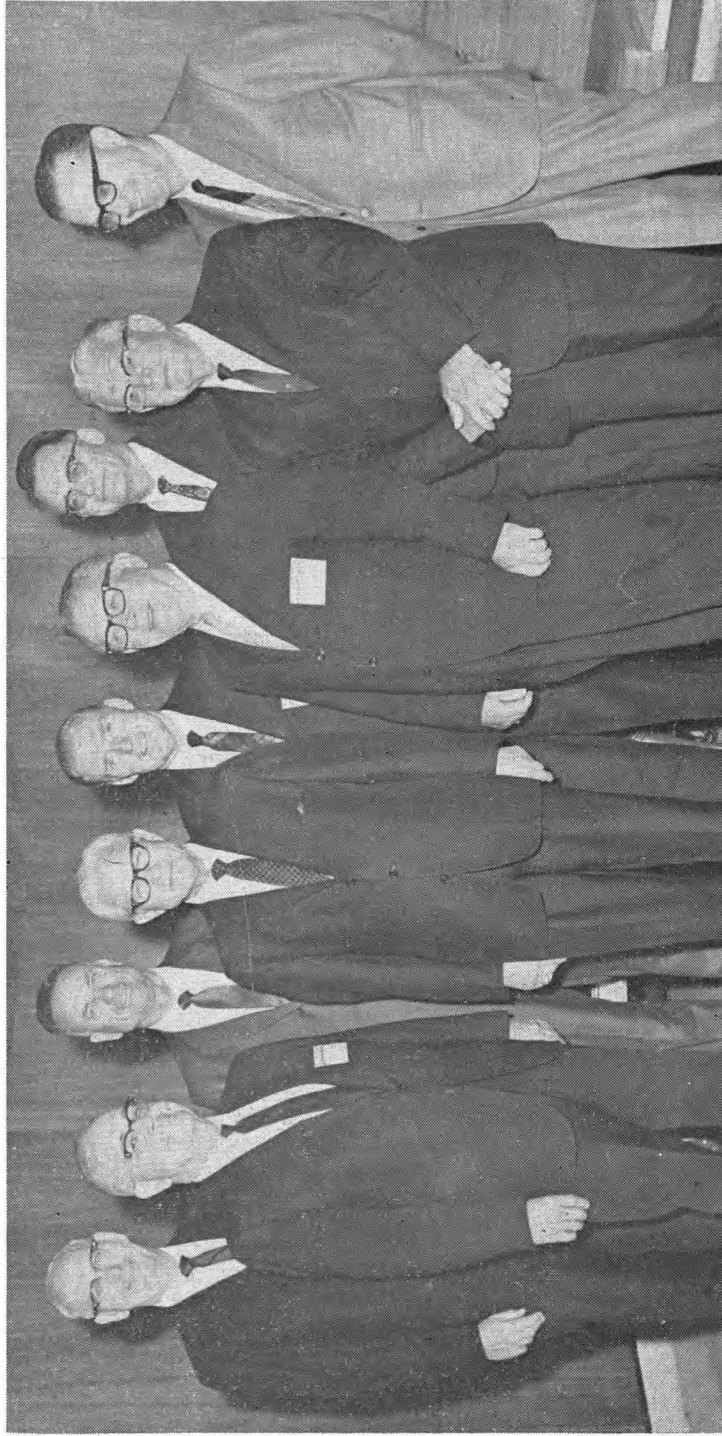

III—DAILY PROCEEDINGS

OPENING SESSION — SUNDAY EVENING, MAY 24, 1970

Merger Service — The Central Texas Annual Conference, The United Methodist Church, met in its One Hundred Fifth session (the sixty-first since the division from the old Northwest Texas Conference, and thirty-second since unification in 1939 and the third as The United Methodist Church) in the Polytechnic United Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas, at 7:30 P.M., Sunday, May 24, 1970, Bishop W. Kenneth Pope presiding.

Bishop Pope led in the Service of Celebration for the merging of the Central Texas Conference and that portion of the West Texas Conference of the former Central Jurisdiction that lies within the geographical bounds of the Central Texas Conference. The Sanctuary Choir of St. Andrew's United Methodist Church, Fort Worth, under the direction of K. W. McMillian, provided the special music for the Service. Bishop Pope preached the Sermon for the Merger Service and was assisted by Eric C. Purnell, in The Declaration of The Merger. Also participating in the merger ceremony were J. D. F. Williams, G. J. Goff, Maggart B. Howell, four children, four youth, four adults, four conference officers, and four ministers representing these age groups in both Conferences, all making the declaration that "we are united in God and in The United Methodist Church and in the new Central Texas Conference."

Standing Rules — J. W. Sprinkle, Chairman of the Cabinet, moved that Standing Rule No. 6 be set aside and suspended for the coming two years in order to allow some of the former members of the West Texas Conference to hold membership on more than one quadrennial board simultaneously. It was approved. (See Reports)

Nominations—The first business session of the newly merged Conference was then called to order by Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, and J. W. Sprinkle, Chairman of the Cabinet, presented nominations for membership on the boards and committee for the new Central Texas Conference. They were approved. (See Reports)

SECOND SESSION — MONDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 25, 1970

Opening Worship—The Conference met in the Sheraton-Fort Worth Hotel, Fort Worth, Texas, at 3:00 P.M., Monday, May 25, 1970, Bishop W. Kenneth Pope presiding. Bishop Pope called the Conference to order, announcing that this was the first session of the Conference of the new Central Texas Conference. Bishop Pope then led the Conference in worship. The hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung. Bishop Pope read from Philippians, Chapter 2, after which he led the Conference in prayer.

Roll—Bishop Pope called on J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, for directions on taking the roll.

Roll Call and Organization of the Conference—J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, made nominations for the secretarial and statistical staff: Daily Proceedings, Homer R. Kluck, Paul W. Wiseman and G. J. Goff; Roll, Nolan Fisher and Weldon Haynes; Reports, John Dowd; Organization, H. F. Meier, Jr., Disciplinary Question, R. A. Broaks; Statistician, Glenn C. Bowman; Associate Statistician, G. J. Goff. They were elected.

Special Privilege—Bishop Pope presented Dr. Roy Redmond of the Texas Methodist Foundation, who spoke to the Conference. Dr. Redmond nominated Roy Grogan, Bob McCreeless and C. M. Ulmer to be re-elected for another term of four years as Trustee for the Texas Methodist Foundation; William Riley and H.

Brown Loyd to fill unexpired terms of 3 years. He expressed appreciation for the service of others serving on the Foundation's Board of Trustees. The nominees were elected.

Board of the Ministry—Jack Riley, Chairman of the Board of the Ministry, presented a report concerning the use of Ministerial Education Fund monies in connection with scholarship grants. The Board recommended that certain requirements and procedures be followed in establishing the fact that a man is a "Ministerial Student." The report was adopted. (See Reports).

He presented a recommendation of the Board concerning the requirements necessary for the granting of a license to preach to those who have not attended a United Methodist College, and so we were not aware of Methodist History, Policy and Doctrine. The report was adopted. (See Reports).

Passage of Character—J. W. Sprinkle, Chairman of the Cabinet, reported that the Cabinet members had been polled and that the character of members

of the Conference had been passed. The report was accepted.

Entertainment — J. W. Gill, Chairman of the Committee on Conference Entertainment, presented the report and moved its adoption as printed in the Pending Reports with the exclusion of Item No. 5. It was approved. (See Report)

Special Privilege—Bishop Pope recognized the group in the Conference representing Youth Ministries Department. The Conference welcomed them.

Program Council—Moggort B. Howell, Chairman of The Program Council, presented L. L. Haynes, newly elected Vice-Chairman of the Program Council.

Moggort B. Howell presented Roy Grogon who made nominations for membership on the Program Council, indicating additions from the West Texas Conference to the list published in the Pending Reports. They were elected. (See Reports)

Moggort Howell presented the Program Council Budget, Report No. 10. He moved the adoption of the report. (See Reports)

Moggort Howell presented Report No. 3. The report was discussed and questions of classification were answered. The report was adopted. (See Reports)

Moggort Howell presented Sidney Roberts, Conference Program Director, who introduced members of the Program Council staff and presented a printed Job Description for staff members. Staff members spoke to the Conference. They are: Wilson Conofox, Director of Conference Program Agencies; Richard L. Sechrist, Associate Director; Mrs. Florence Campbell, Associate Director; and Robert L. Robertson, Area Director of Public Relations.

Sidney Roberts asked Bishop Pope to present a new Program Council staff member. Bishop Pope presented Eric C. Purnell as Associate Program Director with Cabinet status.

Moggort Howell presented Morgan Gorrett, Chairman of the Committee on Interpretation, who presented Report No. 1. The report was adopted. (See Reports)

Moggort Howell presented Tim Russell, Chairman of the Department of Youth Ministries, who presented the report. He introduced Terry Nelson who presented the youth members of the Conference Department of Youth Ministry.

Tim Russell, Roger Phillips and Jo Ann Summerhoys spoke to the report. David Vonce moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. (See Reports.)

Richard L. Sechrist, Coordinator of Youth Ministries, presented members of the Core Staff for Glen Lake and Rainbow Comps.

Wilson Conofox presented Mr. and Mrs. Corroll Gonn, Superintendent and Dietitian of Glen Lake Comp.

The Texas Methodist—Bishop Pope presented Mr. Spurgeon Dunnom, III, Editor of The Texas Methodist, who spoke to the Conference.

Visitors— Bishop Pope presented to the Conference the ministers who were visiting from other Conferences.

Announcements — Various announcements pertaining to meetings and luncheons were made.

Adjournment—Bishop Pope presented E. C. Purnell who gave the benediction and the Conference adjourned at 5:20 P.M.

THIRD SESSION — MONDAY EVENING, MAY 25, 1970

Worship Service—Bishop W. Kenneth Pope led in the Memorial Service and Service of Holy Communion in the Sanctuary of First Methodist Church, Fort Worth. Hymn No. 455, "Crown Him With Many Crowns" was sung. J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, read the Roll of Honor, the names of the bishops of the church, wives and widows of bishops, and members of the Central Texas Conference (including those of the former West Texas Conference) and their wives or widows who passed away during the last Conference year. As each name was read a flower was placed in the memorial cross by Mrs. Weldon Haynes.

Following the singing of the Memorial Hymn No. 536, "For All The Saints", the Scripture Lesson, Luke 23:39-49, was read by G. J. Goff, Pastor of Wesley United Methodist Church, Waco. Then followed the Affirmation of Faith, No. 738, the offering, and the singing of the Doxology.

Special music for the service was provided by the Chancel Choir of the First United Methodist Church, Fort Worth, under the direction of Mr. Robert Clarke.

Then followed a reception in the courtyard of the First United Methodist Church.

FOURTH SESSION — TUESDAY MORNING, MAY 26, 1970

World Service and Finance—H. B. Loyd, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, presented the reports of the Commission

Report No. 2 was adopted. (See Reports)

Report No. 3 was adopted. (See Reports)

Report No. 4 was adopted. (See Reports)

Report No. 5 was adopted. (See Reports)

Report No. 6 was adopted. (See Reports)

H. B. Loyd moved the adoption of the report as a whole. It was adopted. (See Reports)

He then presented a check to Bishop Pope for the Central Texas Conference share of the allocation from the United Methodist Publishing House in the amount of \$11,980.26.

Presentation—Bishop Pope presented Mr. Schmitz of the Joint Action for Community Service in Washington, D. C., who spoke to the Conference about the support of this work of helping people help themselves to become productive in society.

Special Privilege—Carl P. Mehoffy, Chairman of the Committee on Courtesy, asked John Ogden to escort Mrs. W. Kenneth Pope to the podium. He presented a token of the Conference's appreciation to her after expressing appreciation for her presence. Mrs. Pope spoke to the Conference, calling especial attention to the merger of the Central Texas Conference and the West Texas Conference and her joy in participating in it.

Roy Grogan presented S. Wayne Reynolds, Executive Director of Wesleyan Homes, who spoke to the Conference.

Roy Grogan presented James Campbell who gave the report of Homes for Retired Ministers. He presented Hubert Crain, Superintendent of Retired Ministers' Homes.

Roy Grogan presented Report No. 2. Floyd Johnson moved the discontinuance of the Conference Brotherhood as indicated in the report. It was discontinued. (See Report)

Roy Grogan moved that membership in the Brotherhood be fixed as of June 1, 1970 and that an annual membership fee of 10.00 be assessed each eligible member. The motion carried.

Gaither Day, Secretary of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, read a list of nominations to membership of various agency boards. They were elected.

Adjournment—Morgan Garrett pronounced the benediction, and the session adjourned at 4:55 P.M.

SIXTH SESSION—TUESDAY EVENING, MAY 26, 1970

The Anthem, "Let All The Earth Be Glad", was sung by the Chancel Choir of First United Methodist Church, Euless. Scripture Reading Na. 65¹ was read in unison by the congregation, followed by the singing of The Gloria Patri. The Offertory Anthem, "Surely The Lord Is in This Place," was sung by the choir. The congregation joined in singing the Daxalagy following the receiving of the offering.

Richard Millsap, Pastar of Central United Methodist Church, Fort Worth, told of a desire on the part of the late Hayden Edwards to have Warner Sallman of Chicago paint the partrait of Bishop Pope and Gaston Foote and to present the partrait to them as a surprise. Hayden Edwards died before the partraits were finished, but Mrs. Edwards requested that the work continue. Dr. Lamar Smith, Pastar of University Methodist Church, Wichita Falls, and formerly Associate Pastar of First United Methodist Church, Fort Worth, presented Dr. Foote's partrait. Richard Millsap presented to Bishop Pope his partrait.

Hymn No. 404, "Ga Tell It On The Mauntain", was sung, followed by the serman by Dr. Robert E. Hayes, Sr. The clasing Hymn No. 170, "O Master Let Me Walk With Thee", was sung. E. M. Caaper, Pastar at Mexia, pranonced the benediction.

SEVENTH SESSION—WEDNESDAY MORNING, MAY 27, 1970

Opening Worship—Bishop Pope called the Conference to order at 9:07 A.M. and led in the singing of the Hymn, "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know." He read the Scripture Lessan fram Paul's Letter to the Philippians, and based his devotional message on this reading. G. J. Gaff, Pastar of Wesley United Methodist Church, Waco, led the Conference in prayer.

Minutes—Urban A. Schulze, Chairman of the Committee on Minutes, reported that the minutes for the fourth, fifth and sixth sessions of the Conference have been examined and found to be in order. The report was accepted.

He announced that this was a constitutional matter and would be handled through the proper channels of General Conference and Annual Conference action.

He announced that Ira Gallaway will replace J. W. Sprinkle as Chairman of the Committee on Research and Planning.

He announced that Margan Garrett will replace J. W. Sprinkle as Chairman of the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs.

He announced that W. M. Greenwaldt will replace Wallace Chappell as head of Special Ministries.

J. W. Sprinkle, on behalf of the Board of The Ministry, nominated Jack Riley as Trustee of St. Paul School of Theology. He was elected.

G. W. French, Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education, nominated

Morgan Garrett to fill the unexpired term of Bruce Weaver as Trustee of Southwestern University, Georgetown. He was elected.

G. W. French, Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education, nominated Trustees for Texas Wesleyan College. They were elected. (See Report)

Bishop Pope announced that Carroll Thompson will replace Bruce Weaver as Chairman of the Area Counseling Committee.

Health and Welfare Ministries—Roy Grogan, Chairman of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, presented a new insurance program for the Conference.

C. A. Hayes, lay delegate from Cogdell Memorial United Methodist Church, Waco, offered an amendment that the life insurance feature in the package be lowered from \$6,000.00 to \$3,000.00. It was seconded. The amendment was defeated.

The proposal for the new insurance program was adopted. (See Reports)

Announcements—Bishop Pope announced that the check-out time for hotel guests had been extended to 3:00 P.M.

Evangelism—James Shuler, Chairman of the Board of Evangelism, presented the report with certain additions to the report as printed in the Pending Reports. (See Reports). He then presented various persons to the Conference.

He presented Quay Parmer, Conference Evangelist, and announced that the Board of Evangelism recommends Mr. Parmer for continuance as Conference Evangelist. He was approved.

James Shuler presented James Darnell, Conference Secretary of Evangelism, who spoke to the Conference and presented Bob Evans, Pastor of the First United Methodist Church, Cisco, who spoke to the Conference about "Saturation Evangelism".

James Shuler presented Charles Whittle, from the General Board of Evangelism. He spoke to the Conference.

James Shuler recognized Mrs. I. C. McAllister, a member of the General Board of Evangelism.

James Shuler presented Maggart B. Howell, a member of the General Board of Evangelism, who presented Dr. Joe Yeakel, General Secretary of the General Board of Evangelism, who spoke to the Conference.

James Shuler expressed appreciation to Dr. Yeakel and to the General Board of Evangelism and moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Special Privilege—Bishop Pope presented Byran Brawner, General Secretary-Treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance of the United Methodist Church, who spoke to the Conference.

He nominated his assistants. (See Reports)

He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Special Privilege — Bishop Pope recognized Dr. P. E. Riley, a long-time member of this Conference.

Announcements—Various announcements were made concerning meetings of groups and committees.

Adjournment—Alvin S. Gafford pronounced the benediction and the session adjourned at 12:07 P.M.

EIGHTH SESSION—WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, MAY 27, 1970

Call to Order—Bishop Pope called the Conference to order at 2:05 P.M.

Minutes — Urban A. Schulze, Chairman of the Committee on Minutes, reported that the minutes of the seventh session were read and found to be in order and requested the Conference to approve the minutes of the eighth and ninth sessions without the Committee's reading. It was approved.

Lay Workers—N. P. Stephenson, Chairman of the Committee on the Lay Worker, presented the report and moved its approval. It was approved. (See Reports)

Enlistment for Church Occupations—Charles McClure, Chairman of the Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations, presented the report.

He presented Elder Traster, who spoke on the Vocational Intern Program.

He presented Dennis Camp, who spoke to the report.

Charles McClure moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Pensions—W. H. Sindt, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Pensions, presented Eugene Robertson, Secretary of the Board of Pensions, who presented Report No. 1. He presented the portion, "Recommendations for Approval by Annual Conference" item by item as printed in the Pending Reports. Each item was voted on separately and each one approved. He then added Item No. 5 to this report regarding the service record of H. H. Barnett, Sr. It was approved. (See Reports)

J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, moved that for the year 1970 only Troy Clinesmith, Associate Director of The Methodist Home, a transfer from the Oklahoma Conference, be allowed annuity claim against the Central Texas Conference. It was approved. (See Reports)

The Committee recommended disability leave be granted at this session to J. Marris Bailey, Alton W. Ferrill, Howard W. Hallawell, W. W. Pittman, Lloyd Sanders, R. Frank Stane. It was done.

The Board recommended that the following members in Full Connection be granted the retired relationship: R. A. Brooks, Jr., Leroy Brown, Lester Davenport, Roy Johnson, D. L. McCree, and C. A. Sutton. It was done. (See the section entitled "Business of the Conference")

Conference Orientation — J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, spoke about the program of orientation for all those entering the Central Texas Conference to acquaint all new entrants with the procedures of and opportunities in the Central Texas Conference. The orientation meeting this year will be held June 8, 1970, at First United Methodist Church, Fort Worth.

Personal Privilege—Bishop Pope presented Clifton Bullack who spoke to the Conference concerning a personal decision with which he is struggling in regard to his daughter's public school attendance. Bishop Pope invited members of the Conference to stand as a vote of confidence for Clifton Bullack.

Education — Bishop Pope presented Dr. Durwood Fleming, President of Southwestern University, who spoke to the Conference about the processes and problems of the church's part in higher education.

Wallace Chappell, Chairman of the Board of Education, led in the presentation of the report of the Board of Education.

G. W. French, Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education, presented Report No. 2. He recognized all of the Campus Ministers.

G. W. French presented Charles Laing, State Director of the Texas Methodist Student Movement, who spoke to the Conference.

G. W. French called attention to the allocations to the Wesley Foundations.

G. W. French called special attention to that portion of Report No. 2 that pertains to the support of Hustan-Tillotson College and Race Relations Day, calling attention to the recommendation that we accept a goal of 25c per member in our local church budgets for Hustan-Tillotson College. He moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Dr. Durwood Fleming spoke in reply to the question, "Will Hustan-Tillotson and Wiley College participate in the \$1.50 per member program of the Texas Methodist College Association?". His reply was that this 25c per member plan is an interim plan for the next two years as we try to work out the problem.

G. W. French moved the adoption of the Report. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Jack Payne, Chairman of the Committee on Camping, presented Report No. 4, and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Wallace Chappell presented Report No. 3 and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Wallace Chappell presented Report No. 1. He presented a specific recommendation (No. 2, as printed in the Pending Reports) and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports).

He presented a resolution regarding the use of the savings account which is on deposit in the Savings and Loan Association in Weatherford, that the funds be retained on deposit or re-invested to bring a higher rate of return, until such time as the funds may be needed for a purpose near the original intent of its use. He moved the adoption of the resolution. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Wallace Chappell moved that the constitution of the Committee on Camps and Conferences be placed in the hands of the Program Council. It was adopted

The report as a whole was adopted. (See Reports)

Special Motion — J. D. F. Williams, Conference Secretary, suggested a change in the wording of the resolution concerning capital funds for Glen Lake. The changed sentence would read, "Control of this account be transferred from the Board of Education to the Trustees of Glen Lake Methodist Camp . . ." It was done.

Commission on Worship—Robert Haynes, Chairman of the Commission on Worship, presented the report and asked that it be filed. He also moved that the name of Claude Davison be added to the list of members of the Commission on Worship. He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Mt. Sequoyah Trustees — W. V. Bane, of the Board of Trustees of Mt. Sequoyah, presented the report. The report was adopted. (See Reports)

Credit Union—Morgan Garrett, president of the Board of the Central Texas Conference Credit Union, presented the report. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Rules—John Wesley Ford, Chairman of the Committee on Standing Rules, presented the report and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See Reports)

Urban Planning—Bishop Pope presented Gilbert Ferrell, Conference Director of Urban Planning, who spoke to the Conference on Inner City Ministry.

Abandoned Churches — William M. Greenwaldt, Cabinet representative, presented a resolution on abandoned churches in the Brownwood District and made a motion that District Superintendents be allowed to file their resolutions on abandoned churches with the Conference Secretary. It was done.

Richard Millsap made a motion that the chairman and secretary of the Conference Board of Trustees be authorized to sign deeds on behalf of the Board of Trustees. The motion carried.

Visitors—Bishop Pope called all visitors to the Conference to come to the front and be presented. Carl Mehaffy, Chairman of the Committee on Courtesy, introduced each of them to the Conference. The Conference welcomed them.

Special Privilege—Bishop Pope presented E. C. Purnell who spoke to the Conference, expressing appreciation to Bishop Pope and the Conference on behalf of the members of the former West Texas Conference for the reception and opportunities that have been extended to them. (See "Words of Special Privilege" in Reports.)

Nominations—James Campbell, Chairman of the Trustees for Retired Ministers Homes, made nominations for the Board of Trustees for the Retired Ministers Homes. They were elected. (See Reports)

Announcements — Sidney Roberts, Conference Program Director, gave instructions for housekeeping chores in preparing to leave the Conference room.

Other announcements were made.

Adjournment—The motion was made to adjourn. Bishop Pope pronounced the benediction. The Conference was adjourned at 4:45 P.M.

Bishop Pope presented our Conference Preacher, Dr. Robert E. Hayes, Sr., who preached the Ordination Sermon.



BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES**Report No. 7****Ministers Insurance****(Adopted May 27, 1970—Received for Record 6-19-70)**

We are aware of the constant trend of rising cost in hospital care. This fact, coupled with a large number of claims made upon Minister's Life and Casualty Union, making it necessary for the Insurance Company to ask the participating members for a substantial increase in premium rates, your Board of Health and Welfare Ministries makes the following recommendations:

- I. That the Hospitalization Policy be re-written with Minister's Life and Casualty Union to include the following increased benefits:
 - A. \$6,000 Life Insurance for ministers with annual earnings of \$5,000 or more.

\$4,000 Life Insurance for ministers with less than \$5,000 annual earnings.

\$2,000 Life Insurance for student ministers.
 - B. Accidental death dismemberment benefits to match Life Insurance amounts.
 - C. Increased hospital benefits for members and dependents, with the more important benefits being: (1) room rate—full semi-private, (2) the miscellaneous services to be 100% (with a \$25.00 deductible), (3) over-all out-patient benefit to 100%, (4) surgical maximum—\$400, (5) Maternity (basic)—\$175, and (6) other increased benefits.
 - D. Major Medical which includes (1) insured percentage at 80%, (2) cash deductible—\$100, (3) deductible period at 365 days, and (4) maximum benefits—\$10,000.

The Health Insurance benefits to terminate at age 65.

- II. The cost of total Insurance program to be approximately \$100,000 per year. We recommend one-half of individual ministers premium be paid by the ministers, and one-half by the Annual Conference, using the decimal in making apportionments to districts. January 1, 1971 to be effective date of new policy.

PROGRAM COUNCIL

Report No. 1

Quadrennial Emphasis Committee

A New Church for a New World

(Adapted May 25, 1970)

During the first two years of the present quadrennium the churches of the Central Texas Conference have been giving attention to "The Church and the Word," "The Church and its Work," and "The Church and the World." A central part of the emphasis of "The Church and the World" was carried out in 1969 through the study of the theme of Reconciliation and through presentation of the response to the Fund for Reconciliation.

All aspects of the Quadrennial Program will continue to receive attention through the remainder of the quadrennium.

Fund for Reconciliation

A suggested procedure and resource materials for use in presenting the cause of Reconciliation and the Fund for Reconciliation were prepared by the Committee and provided for each District and each local pastor and local church.

Workshops were conducted in several districts, aimed at helping local church committees make the best possible presentation to the congregations. In many congregations the Council on Ministries worked for several months in preparation for the presentation. The work was climaxed in October 1969. The results varied. Real attitude changes toward being "reconcilers for Christ" occurred in some places. In too many instances little or no change in attitude was observed.

Conference Center Committee

Report No. 5

Communications Committee

(Adopted May 26, 1970)

The major emphasis of our Committee for 1970 has been to strengthen the work of the District Secretaries of Communications; continued participation

in the United Methodist Communications Council of Texas; placement of **The Texas Methodist** in the homes of Key Officials of local churches; and implementation of the Communications Seminar at Perkins School of Theology, June 15-26, 1970.

Our plans for the next conference year consist of an extensive program for improving local church newsletters; promotion of the Conference page of **The Texas Methodist**; and increased emphasis on the promotion and placement of radio and television spot announcements and audio-visuals.

Eighty-three percent of the participants in the January statewide Consultations on Communications reported "new doors of understanding in communications" were opened for them. The Dallas consultation brought together communication industry representatives from radio, television, and newspapers for a face-to-face discussion of upgrading mass media communications in Methodism. The stated purpose was to "create a climate in which honest, open conversation can take place between key men of the communications and leaders of the church." Evaluations mailed out to each participant indicated a priority in communications training for the local church as the local church newsletter. Priorities for communications from the consultations continued with this list: church use of the mass media; developing a "systems approach" to Church communications; reporting news to radio, television and newspapers; radio-TV "spot" production and placement; Local Church Public Relations Committee; dialogue with the communications industry; **The Texas Methodist** local church editions; "Word and Music" and "The Place" radio programs and the Conference page of **The Texas Methodist**.

The Rev. William L. Hankla is retiring at this session of the Annual Conference as Conference Press Secretary after many years of efficient service. We want to express our appreciation for his devoted service to our Conference as it has been reflected in many inches of newsprint and many pictures through these years.

Report No. 7

Department of Youth Ministry

(Adopted May 25, 1970)

The Department of Youth Ministry has spent the past year in a search for identity and purpose. It has engaged itself in training events to prepare its various members to function in youth ministry. (An adequate definition of "youth ministry" is given on page 2 of **Youth Ministry Workbook**. It says, "Youth ministry, when it is alive and growing, is not a neatly packaged program. It is a dynamic process whereby increasing numbers of persons are enabled to respond to God's present activity in the needs and opportunities of their world.") It has attempted to draw its members together into a well knit and sensitive working group. And, it has attempted to serve the local church in its ministry with youth. It is in this third area that the Department has discovered that its function and structure have not been spelled out sufficiently and have remained quite cumbersome in practice. Therefore, at its February 14th meeting the Department outlined the following functions and structure:

Functions of the Department of Youth Ministry:

1. It is to gather data — to listen to the youth and the local churches and assimilate the needs expressed.
2. It is to motivate — to demonstrate the importance of youth ministry and encourage others to join in youth ministry.
3. It is to develop leadership — to train, equip and convey skills and confidence in youth ministry.
4. It is to **act** in youth ministry — to share youth ministry in the local church and throughout the Conference, to help the local church evaluate its youth ministry, to motivate the local church to minister and to train personnel in the local church for youth ministry.

To implement these functions the Department proposes the following **Structure of the Department of Youth Ministry:**

There are three levels to the structure of the Department of Youth Ministry:

1. Administrative — consisting of two areas of responsibility: a) the office of the Conference Coordinator and b) the Executive Committee (Chairman of the Department, the Conference Coordinator and the work area chairmen (youth). This level is responsible for coordination of the work of the Department and to **administer help** to the work areas as they plan and execute their work.
2. Planning/Action — consisting at present of two work areas each with a membership of 4 youth and 3 adults selected by the Dept. of Youth Ministry: a) "Youth Literature and Settings" which deals with training in all phases of our youth literature (e.g. Church School, Informal Group, **Youth Ministry Workbook** and administrative settings etc.) and "Social Concerns" which deals with Youth Service Fund, Legislative Affairs, drug problems, sex education etc. This

area is responsible for planning and executing all Department projects, training events, program etc. on the local church and district and Conference levels. The whole structure is geared to the concept of action, and it is here in the work areas that the major work of the Department will be carried out.

3. Evaluation — consisting of the entire Department of Youth Ministry including District Coordinators, special skills persons (e.g. high school counsellars, college professors, campus ministers etc.) and Conference Board representatives. This group will meet once a year to evaluate the past year's work and give directions for the coming year.

The hope is that the Department may become sensitive to the youth needs of the Conference and the needs of our churches in youth ministry through an established systematic process and that through this sensitivity and process the Department may become a servant body to our youth, our local churches, our districts and our Conference.

Report No. 8

Department of Children's Ministries

(Adopted May 26, 1970)

The Conference Department of Children's Ministries is concerned with ministering to needs and concerns of children within the eight districts of the Conference. It is concerned with who these children are, where they are and how the Christian Gospel can be related to their whole life. Through this ministry it is hoped they may become effective citizens of the Christian community and the world in which they live. It will be the task of the Department to communicate to the Conference Program Council this concern and to accept the challenges that it will receive in helping to implement the ministry to, for and with our girls and boys.

The Department of Children's Ministries has restructured the organization. The District Coordinator will have more help with study, planning, projecting and evaluating the ministry to and with children.

The Department is directly concerned with several major areas. One of these is the camping program for girls and boys. The local church day camping program offers an exciting setting for Christian living in the out-of-doors. The resident camp for fifth and sixth graders at Glen Lake is being promoted. The Department is grateful to Wm. B. Slack, Robert L. Robertson and Roy Eaton for their professional assistance in the production of the color sound filmstrip, **JEFF GOES TO GLEN LAKE.**

Another area of concern is the promotion of the adult leadership training opportunities for the on going church school and the occasional workers in the additional settings of the ministry. The districts have engaged in some very fine guidance for local church workers through Leadership Development Enterprises. Some of these have been workshops, seminars and laboratory-observation types of training.

There is a need for qualified instructors in all areas of Children's Ministry. All certified leaders of laboratory work are urged to attend the recertification adult laboratory enterprise at Mt. Sequoyah, June 26-July 3. It is the hope of the Department that many of our children's workers will take advantage of the laboratory courses of study provided for all age levels at this same time. The

Conference School of Missions at Georgetown will include the recommended courses for children in their Mission Study Program. We urge the districts to send someone to the School of Missions to be trained so that they may be of service with their respective districts.

Department of Adult Ministries

Because of the lack of precedent in structural procedure in prior years of Conference adult work, the Department of Adult Ministries in its annual meeting on March 7, 1970 voted to defer attempts at structuring for the time being. It is the feeling of the Department that the Program Council needs to give definitive direction to the working relationship between the Conference boards and agencies and the age-level and family departments. After several hours of discussing the purpose of our department in the present structure, we arrived at the following statement:

The function of the Conference Department of Adult Ministries shall be to study the needs of adults along with the goals of the Conference's ministry to adults and to coordinate the planning and implementation of a unified and comprehensive ministry with adults, using the conference structure, its resources and personnel.

In order to facilitate a unified approach to Conference programming and implementation, the Department feels it would be helpful for the board, agency, and department chairmen to meet in consultation as to how they might effectively work as a team. Until such a consultation can be affected, we suggest that the basis for membership on the adult department remain as it is with whatever additions are needed as regards matters of merger.

We recommend that a training session be held for District Coordinators of Adult Ministries in the fall of 1970 with District Superintendents and lay representation participating.

The past history of our Conference has stressed the importance of staff persons on the Board of Education to attend specifically to childrens and youth educational ministries. Under the new structure, we urge the Program Council to give equal consideration to the needs of adult ministries as relates to staff leadership.

We commend Wilson Canafax for his helpful guidance given to our department in addition to the many responsibilities that are his, and to Richard Sechrist who has also given of his time.

Ad Hoc Committee on Sex Education

(Adopted May 26, 1970)

The Role of Human Sexuality in Christian Living

The church has provided basic resources and educational guidelines by which a conference committee might plan and operate courses on human sexuality

in Christian living. A church setting is chosen because human sexuality is part of the mission of the church.

Prepared for use in training are standard guidelines for schedules, suggestions of possible activities, and units of learning. Preliminary experimentation has demonstrated the need to begin where youth and parents are. Differences from community to community, pressures created by individual development, age and sex combinations make it impossible to create a "Course" that will suit all situations. The approach recommended is to provide resources out of which a group of leaders, working with rather than on a group of teenagers and parents can plan a meaningful sequence of learning experiences. In other words, the quality of leadership is a crucial factor in the success of this experience.

Basic plans and materials have been tested in a series of experimental situations in various settings throughout the country. Guidelines have emerged from concrete experience. Local variations will be necessary but basic plans are recommended which are on sound educational principles.

To maintain the highest standards, while protecting the integrity of the church and the conference, these recommendations are given for the establishment of a conference committee for The Role of Human Sexuality in Christian Living.

- 1) That a committee for Human Sexuality in Christian Living be formed.
- 2) That this committee be related to and responsible to the Department of Family Life.
- 3) That a director be designated who is certified to teach the course.

These goals for leadership training are suggested—

- 1) To be an official part of the conference program.
- 2) To maintain the highest standards of integrity and quality in training and teaching.
- 3) To develop a group of certified teachers.
- 4) To train local church adult workers with youth to teach.
- 5) As a first step, to offer the Junior High youth, their parents, and the adult workers with youth of the Central Texas Conference and opportunity:
 - a. To grow in their understanding of human sexuality as an important part of the divine plan for human beings.
 - b. To expand their knowledge of the physical and emotional facts about sexuality and maturation as the foundation for the development of positive attitudes.
 - c. To discover and practice appropriate language and communication skills needed to talk meaningfully, both within the family circle and in other settings, about sexuality, reproduction, dating, love, and marriage.
 - d. To explore their attitudes toward themselves, especially toward the sexual dimensions of their lives.
 - e. To understand some of the cultural patterns and life styles of other ethnic groups and classes of people.
 - f. To understand the need for and the meaning of the teenager's seeking to establish his independence and his assuming responsibility for his own freedom.

g. To explore some of the attitudes which govern relationships with other persons (i.e. parents, peers).

h. To examine standards youth and adults choose as the guidelines for their lives, from among choices made available by our culture.

i. To choose for themselves guidelines for sexual and interpersonal behavior which reflect the best ethical thinking of the Christian community.

Further plans are in the making for other age groups. Regular evaluation is to be a part of the total program.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY**(Adopted May 27, 1970)**

We urge every Charge to have a Committee on Records and History and to write a local history of that particular church, obtain photographs of the buildings that may become valuable as time goes by, and perhaps institute an effort to obtain photographs of all pastors who have served that particular charge throughout its history.

AREA COUNSELING PROGRAM

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

The Area Counseling Program will complete four years of ministry to the pastors and their families of the North and Central Texas Conference on May 31, 1970. The Reverend De Forrest Wiksten, Program Director, continues to expand the services of his office and to work closely with the Boards of Ministry of the two conferences.

Area Counseling Ministry

The Area Counseling Ministry, which serves the North and Central Texas Conferences, has completed four years of operation. This pioneering experience is one of five similar endeavors in American Methodism. Nearly thirty other annual conferences are presently considering the establishment of pastoral care and counseling programs. There is considerable variety in the purpose and structure of their considerations.

From the outset, Dallas-Fort Worth has defined three major services to be rendered by this ministry:

1. A personal counseling service available to members of the two annual conferences and their resident families. This counseling is conducted according to professional standards as defined by the American Association of Pastoral Counselors, adhering to strict guidelines of confidentiality and maximum autonomy.

2. A program of continuing education in pastoral care and counseling for ministers dealing with the broad range of human experience in the parish.

3. Consultation with ministers who wish guidance in their own pastoral care and counseling ministry on an individual basis; and participation as is possible in existing programs of clinical pastoral education.

The volume of work accomplished in these three areas during the past four years is represented in the following statistical summary. The figures are tabulated through May 8, 1970.

286 persons have requested personal counseling service

2040 hours of individual counseling

250 hours of group counseling

195 educational events conducted, usually at a district or cluster group level

161 pastors requested consultation for their pastoral counseling

281 hours of consultation

379 speaking, preaching and meeting events relevant to total Church involvement of this office.

Personal and Professional Growth

The mission of this office in serving the Dallas-Fort Worth Area Methodist ministers is committed to the strengthening and realization of professional and personal potential. The mandate for "self understanding" in the interest of self-fulfillment and self-giving is deeply imbedded in the Christian tradition for abundant life. Jesus spoke often of the vital balance required between the realities of the heart and consequent behavior. Luther grasped the importance of the "inner" and "outer" man.

Modern personality arts and sciences struggle for progress in our capacity to realize our uniqueness, potentially connected with the universals of human experience. One method or system for assisting in this effort has been used by this office during the past year with encouraging results. The method is that devised by Dr. Roger Birkman, industrial psychologist and Methodist layman in Houston. Use of this system involves two hours of written work and four three-hour seminar sessions.

Computerized evaluations of personality are provided in booklet form and this material provides the content of the seminar time. Birkman postulates that traits of personality and temperament always have positive and negative potential in serving the needs of human fulfillment. This system provides data in better understanding the unique needs of each person and examines the complexity of interpersonal and occupational functioning.

Again, these Birkman Seminars will be available this conference year. There is a cost of forty dollars which covers the use of the materials and scoring facilities. The Pastoral Ministry to Marriage

Marriage and family life are increasingly influenced by the swirl of change in modern society. As the Church works in Her mission of the New Creation for all the world the central institution of marriage and family is coming in for painful and profound scrutiny. As with most established and tradition oriented structures in our society, marriage is feeling the heat of rapidly evolving and revolving history.

Methodism strongly affirms monogamous marriage as the most propitious structure in which human love may flourish to its potential. The pastoral responsibility for enabling this possibility is awesome.

As one contribution toward this end the Area Counseling Ministry is sponsoring a series of one day workshops in premarital counseling.

Methodism has just this year revised the Official Marriage Manual and Pastors Handbook. These are now available from Cokesbury. The two publications will be studied in these workshops along with instruction and assistance in the administration of the Taylor Johnson Temperment Analysis which is recommended. Additional study in marriage and family counseling will also be available.

. . . . That a means be established to give continuing financial support to the office of the chaplain of the Gatesville State School for Boys.

. . . . That increased financial and moral support be given Texas Alcohol Narcotic Education, Inc.

. . . . That every local congregation take a special offering on August 2, 1970 for "Texans Who Care," the interdenominational organization opposing passage of the constitutional amendment to legalize open saloons in Texas.

. . . . That local congregations cooperate with and make use of local councils on alcoholism, Alcoholics Anonymous, and similar rehabilitative groups.

. . . . That a group be designated to make a study of current welfare programs on behalf of the Annual Conference.

. . . . That every local Commission on Christian Social Concern study the material concerning the Society of Saint Stephen and seriously consider organizing such a body.

. . . . That persons within the Annual Conference be trained to counsel those facing military service and be available for such ministry, and that the Annual Conference develop a ministry to those approaching military service so that youth may know the rights and the responsibility of citizenship and Christian conscience.

. . . . That a task group be appointed to study the United Nations and what it means and does not mean today.

. . . . That a task group be appointed to study ways in which local

churches can become meaningfully involved in problems of environmental stewardship and population control.

... That the Merger Committee be continued and enlarged for the remainder of the quadrennium to keep watch on the effects of the merger of the West Texas and Central Texas Conference to make sure that all means are used to make the merger a valid and successful one.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERN

Report No. 2

(Adopted May 26, 1970)

In the name of Jesus the Christ the Church is now called to minister through a loving presence in the world, especially in a society seeking reality or escaping from it through the misuse of drugs. In response to that call to ministry the following resolution is offered.

Whereas there is in evidence an alarming increase in the misuse of drugs in our society among children, youth and adults without respect for any stratum of that society; and

Whereas the unprecedented incidence of drug misuse has prompted fragmented and reactive response more than positive, directional action, and

Whereas punitive measures have been called into question and therefore function less effectively as a means of combating drug misuse; and,

Whereas victims of drug misuse are now requesting emergency aid from medical, psychological, legal and other resources in our communities; and,

Whereas notable cases of death due to drug overdose have been experienced in our communities;

Therefore, be it resolved that the new Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church meeting in its first regular session respond to this crisis in society by providing a special task force for designing ministry to persons affected by the drug crisis in the following ways:

1. That Bishop W. Kenneth Pope appoint a **ad hoc** study committee of seven interested persons to study the problems of drug misuse and explore possibilities for the church's ministry in a drug-oriented society and report its findings to the program council for immediate action.
2. That the Conference urge local congregations to develop task groups for the purpose of seeking out resources for aiding persons who are victims of drug misuse.
3. That the Conference call upon the churches to encourage and financially support agencies in their local communities which provide drug information and referral services and refuge for youth who have had "bad trips" or who have decided to break the drug habit.
4. That members of our churches be encouraged to follow with interest and keep informed concerning drug misuse legislation, most especially

that legislation which provides for a more human possibility for first offenders by reducing such first offense from a felony to a misdemeanor.

CONFERENCE FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

The Central Texas Conference Federal Credit Union is less than three years old, yet its growth has been impressive. At the end of February 1970 the Union had 189 members and share deposits of \$71,038.04. It had processed 106 loans for \$68,717.13. During the month of March 1970 another \$11,000.00 in loans was processed.

At the close of the 1969 fiscal year a 3.3% dividend was paid on deposits while increasing the Reserve Fund to \$1,010.01. The present increase in loans, with the promise of even greater activity in the future, gives reason to hope for a significant increase in the dividend rate for 1970. Loans are now being made for the purchase of automobiles as well as the continued policy of making personal loans for all kinds of good reasons. Interest rates are highly competitive and the benefits of loan insurance at no additional cost add to the attractiveness of borrowing from the Credit Union as compared to borrowing from other sources.

Any officer or director of the Credit Union is eager to provide information concerning the Union and its services to any interested minister or church employee.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1.

Report of Chairman

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

We come to the end of two years of search by the Board of Education and its members, and we hope that we have discovered keys which will unlock the doors to more effective ministry in the months ahead.

Centering on our gradual awareness of the implications of the Program Council approach, we now see the work of the Board of Education as radically altered: It becomes a **work group** for educational ministry. Basic responsibility for **programming** is now in the hands of the Age Group and Family Departments, to whom the research findings and recommendations of the Board of Education are forwarded for action. This implies that the Board of Education should be a smaller group, of no more than 25 persons, preferably less, carefully selected for acquaintance with educational concerns, and planned skills. This group will need to meet more often, and for longer periods of time, if it is to carry out the needed research on needs, and to mature suggestions for programming. Five hours at a time, twice a year, will not accomplish what should be done.

The area in which we come with scanty achievement is leadership development, for we have been stymied by our own group for our role and responsibility in the new structure. Some good training enterprises have been conducted, but they were too few and too random. We searched in vain for an overall, long-range strategy, and do now await the "futures Seminar" in high anticipation that our guidelines to tomorrow for educational leadership development will come from this meeting. Leadership development is the "name of the game" for churchmanship in a changing age; and this includes a broadening battery of skills, frequently warmed heart, and clarity on the Gospel for professional and laity alike.

We leave four cautions with Conference leadership:

1. That we face up to the extensive time required for good planning, based on researched needs, and resulting in matured and effective programming. Such planning and the coordination related to it cannot be accomplished in a few hours every six months.
2. That we face up to the limitations in time and human capacity of our Conference Staff, and be realistic in what we expect them to accomplish.
3. That we face the high cost of leadership development, both in funds and in emphasis, and that we provide both.
4. That we face the danger inherent in a structure that stresses general program development and the overall planning process, that is, it fails to produce the smaller number of specialists demanded for catalyzing action and for continuing leadership development. We now inherit a body of such specialists from the somewhat compartmentalized structure of recent date. Twenty years may see these dissipated unless care is taken to see that it does not happen.

Specific Recommendations

1. The Board recommends that in the study of structure currently under way, external, objective consultants be sought.
2. The Board recommends that the Conference proceed according to Par. 1111.2 of **The Book of Discipline** in establishing the Annual Conference Committee on Camps and Conferences, which is amendable to the Program Council.

Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

Wesley Foundation is the Church serving distinctive task in the academic community. To serve the total university community, we must approach the campus as servant of the whole Gospel of Christ which wills to reconcile, redeem, renew, discipline, and unite all people. The Campus Ministry has responsibilities which no other institution can assume, speaking on behalf of every churchman the saving Word that has been spoken to us all.

We reaffirm our commitment to Christian Higher Education as represented by our United Methodist related colleges and universities.

We have attempted to continue and expand the support and concern of the Central Texas Conference for our Methodist institutions which seek to serve and witness in the challenging and rapidly expanding field of Higher Education. We commend the ministers and churches who have given the support of United Methodist Colleges and Wesley Foundation a position of top priority in their budgets and programs. We have seen a slow but steady increase in payments to the apportionment for Texas Methodist Colleges, reaching an all time record high in our conference during 1969. The \$126,807.00 given last year is our largest gift

ever, but we still failed by almost \$50,000.00 to pay our \$1.50 per member in full. We would express appreciation to Mr. Charles Musgrove for his encouragement and assistance to our committee and for the leadership which he offers in this strategic area.

President John King of Huston-Tillotson College and President T. W. Cole, Sr. of Wiley College met with the presidents of our Texas Methodist College Association schools and with the President of the Association in Houston on January 12, 1970. At this meeting the representatives of Huston-Tillotson and Wiley Colleges accepted membership in the Texas Methodist College Association effective June 1, 1970. **We recommend full approval of these two memberships by the Central Texas Conference** based on the following conditions and agreements ratified unanimously at the January 12 meeting:

1. Due to the increased emphasis on Race Relations Day the Texas Methodist College Association will cooperate fully in the most effective promotion of this program for the present. In the Texas conferences, Huston-Tillotson has looked to the Southwest Texas, Northwest Texas, Central Texas and North Texas Conference for support of this item. In the Texas Conference the Race Relations Day offering is for Wiley College. **It is recommended that the title of the Race Relations Day appeal be changed to Huston-Tillotson College Day in the Central Texas Conference and that it so appear in the Central Texas Conference Journal.**

2. The emphasis will be changed from an offering taken for Race Relations Day on a certain Sunday to the inclusion of an item in the budgets of the local churches in the Central Texas Conference for Huston-Tillotson Day. It is recommended that an apportionment of \$29,400.00, a total amount equivalent to 25c per member be established for the Central Texas Conference for the 1971 calendar year for Huston-Tillotson Day. (This apportionment is for operational funds only.)

3. **It is recommended that collections from the local churches of the Central Texas Conference received by the Conference office for Huston-Tillotson Day (or Race Relations Day) be forwarded to the Texas Methodist College Association offices.** These funds would be kept separately with records of churches giving and would be distributed to Huston-Tillotson without any expense charge. In this temporary period expenses of the Association will continue to be underwritten completely by the five schools which presently constitute the Association. (Under present arrangements, the Race Relations Day offering is sent to the Board of Education at Nashville which office returns one total check, less ten per cent for expenses, without lists of donors to the schools.)

In addition to these arrangements and procedures, the two schools to be added to the Association in June will have access to the consultant and advisory services of the Texas Methodist College Association offices and representatives in their appeals for capital and operational support and in their promotional and administrative activities leading toward better understanding and moral support from all constituencies of these institutions.

The Texas Methodist College Association program this spring will include contracts with district superintendents and pastors throughout the Central Texas Conference in an effort to familiarize these leaders with these developments in our program of higher education.

Though our support still lags far below the goal of 60c per member, this past year witnessed a stabilizing and growing support of our Wesley Foundations. Our receipts of \$57,034.00 was \$13,639.00 short of our apportionments, but represented a slight increase over the previous year. We salute the ministers and congregations who have expressed their concern for the ministry of the United Methodist Church on the campus by providing the funds for this work. We express

appreciation for Mr. Charles Laing for his counsel and assistance to our committee and for his work in coordinating the campus ministries across the state.

With full appreciation of the revolutionary changes sweeping across our campuses, we express confidence and support for the witness that is being offered in the name of Christ and His Church through our Campus Ministers.

We recommend that the apportionment on the churches remain the same as last year—60c per member for Wesley Foundation, and \$1.50 per member for United Methodist Colleges.

Based on actual receipts of 1969, we recommend the following allocations for 1971 for our Wesley Foundation units:

Report of The Committee on Camps

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

For thirty years Glen Lake Camp has been a vital part of this Conference's program. For twelve years Rainbow Camp has been also a part of its ministry. Today the camping program stands upon the threshold of a new period which will require more than a proud past history. An awareness of long-range objectives and a better system of providing support for its operation must be found if the future is to be as productive as the past.

During the year just ended a total of 2,321 have taken part in the conference camping program and this number does not include other groups and individuals which have spent one or more days there. A total of 279 have staffed the conference camping periods for the twenty-one different groups. In addition there have been thirty-two local groups who have used Glen Lake Camp.

Some long-needed improvements have been made at Glen Lake this year. The camp has been completely refurnished with bunks and foam-rubber mattresses and attic fans have been installed in all camper's cabins. This year for the first time, a summer "Core Staff" of collegiate youth will be a permanent staff. We have uplifted the publicity program of the Conference camp with the printing of a brochure commemorating Glen Lake's "Thirty Years at Work." Other renovation and maintenance have made the camp ready for service.

A personal appeal made to local church groups has brought in about \$2,000.00 for equipment at Glen Lake and Rainbow and this response has been important in the immediate operation of the camps. It is hoped that other groups will respond with financial gifts.

It is evident that rising food, material and labor costs are placing a severe strain upon our camp's financial structure. No longer does the fee charged a camper meet the costs involved. It stands to reason that either the operation of the camp will have to receive subsidy or its quality will suffer. Central Texas is the only conference in Texas owning a camp that has not already provided such help.

The Committee commends Mr. and Mrs. Carroll Gann and their staff for a fine year of service at Glen Lake and Rainbow Camps.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

The Commission on Enlistment functions as a task force to serve the Conference and the Churches of the Conference in the area of recruitment for Church Occupations. Though enlistment normally will take place in the context of the local Church, or in camps and conferences, we feel it is our role to help equip persons in such situations with knowledge, skills, and resources that will be helpful.

The key persons in local Church are the pastor and the local Church Secretary for Enlistment. We encourage each Church to have an intentional program whereby Church Occupations are interpreted to persons in the Church.

Another important person in the matter of vocational decisions is the school guidance counselor. We have found these persons to be most receptive to those representing the interests of the Church. Last fall Dr. Richard Hunt, a member of our Commission, led a seminar at the Texas Guidance Personnel Association's annual convention. As an outgrowth of these contacts, we will be undertaking this year a program to contact each school counselor within our Conference. In addition to making helpful resource material and information available to them we hope to establish contacts that will bear fruit in the future. In addition we are now exploring the possibility of setting up testing centers in nearby colleges which have facilities, where counselors and pastors could take persons for helpful testing to understand their vocational possibilities.

The Vocational Intern Program, now area-wide, continues to be a useful opportunity whereby youth considering a Church occupation can gain a "close look" by spending the Summer in a Church-related job situation. We encourage Churches to support the program both by making information about it available and by considering applying for a VIP worker.

We further seek to fulfill our role by being available to age-level departments and other groups within the Conference to interpret Church occupations wherever the opportunity exists.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Continuing Ministries

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

We recommend the continuance of evangelistic ministries presently underway:

1. Saturation Evangelism Teams to local churches upon request.
2. Participation in regional and national evangelism programs and spiritual life endeavors such as Lake Murray Spiritual Life Retreat in January for ministers/laymen and the National Council on Evangelism.
3. Training and equipping of the Conference Board of Evangelism in new approaches in Evangelism so as to continue to serve as resource agency to the local Churches, Districts, and Annual Conference.
4. Continue to seek out ways of uniting with other boards and conference agencies for new ways of evangelistic ministry to the "whole" man, his Church and Community.

Specific Recommendations for Conference Action

We recommend the equipping of the Conference Board of Evangelism to expand its ministries in the following areas:

1. Expansion of Saturation Evangelism Teams in both number of teams and personnel per unit. New personnel should include children's worker, lay participation, small group development leader, and leader trained in mission-social action ministries.
2. Join with other Conference program agencies in development of evangelist training for Probationary and Lay Pastor personnel of the Annual Conference.
3. Provide concerted evangelistic ministries to/with youth and college campus age groups.
4. Development for presentation in calendar year 1971 a conference-wide training opportunity for local churches similar in scope to "Evangelism Cafeteria Style" conducted in 1969.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES**Report No. 1****(Adopted May 26, 1970)**

The Christian Church has always been concerned for the sick, the needy, the outcast, and the underprivileged. The evidence of this concern is seen in our Church related hospitals, homes for aging, for children, and the exceptional ministries outside of agency structures. There are two areas for which our board is primarily responsible to the conference, district, and local Church. First, to strengthen these ministries, and second, to strengthen our commitment. To this end we recommend to the program council the following plan of action:

I. Sense the Need

- A. Continued concern and support to our Hospital and Homes.
- B. Encourage every local church to survey community needs and areas for outreach.

II. Fix the Goals

- A. Decide what must be done in the conference, district, and the local church and how we can undertake this ministry. How far can we go and how long it will take to complete the task.
- B. Set the goals up in relation to the known needs.
- C. Consult with other program, service and religious groups with-in the Church and community to avoid overlapping and duplicating.

III. Select Priority Objectives

- A. Encourage each local church to select specific ministries for immediate program development and implementation.

IV. Recommended Action

- A. District workshops to be set up using the Conference Board of Health and Welfare members to assist the District staff in becoming **enablers** to the local church within their district. These workshops should be set up as soon as possible in every district.
- B. Inform the Conference Board of all planned ministries within the District and where additional monies for budget are required over and above available local resource, the board will assist in any way possible.

V. Evaluation

- A. A meeting of the program council officers, the Executive Committee and District Representatives of the Board of Health and Welfare will meet in January to evaluate existing programs and projected ministries throughout the Conference.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES**Report No. 2****Conference Brotherhood****(Adopted May 27, 1970)**

The responsibility for the Conference Brotherhood was assigned to the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries by act of the 1969 Annual Conference. The Board has made a thorough study of the purpose and history of the Brotherhood which was organized in 1893 as a means of providing some death benefits for ministers and their wives. From the beginning it has been a voluntary endeavor based on voluntary participation. Through the years the death benefit paid to members of the Brotherhood has ranged from a high of \$1,000.00 to a present benefit of \$245.00, which was paid in the year 1968-1969.

There has been a steady decline in participation and present indications are that the lack of participation will ultimately cause the Brotherhood to fail.

There are presently 106 retired ministers and their wives actively participating in the Brotherhood Program, together with 55 widows. For the reasons above stated, we are recommending to the Program Council that the Brotherhood be discontinued in its present form as of June 1, 1970, and that the Annual Conference assume the responsibility for providing a fixed death benefit to the retired ministers, their wives, and widows participating in the Brotherhood Program as of that date. Further that the Brotherhood Program be continued by the Annual Conference which will pay at death, to the persons eligible, \$200.00. Further that each participant in the Brotherhood Program thereafter pay an annual membership fee of \$10.00 from which the above death benefit will be paid and any deficit resulting therefrom will be paid from the Annual Conference reserves.

In order for this procedure to be adopted, it will be necessary for the ministerial section of the Annual Conference to vote a change in the bylaws of the Conference Brotherhood to thereafter dissolve the same and for the Annual Conference to vote to thereafter assume the responsibility for payment of future death benefits as set forth above.

BOARD OF HEALTH & WELFARE MINISTRIES**Report No. 3****Harris Hospital****(Adopted May 27, 1970)****Patient Care Factors:**

During the Fiscal Year 1968-1969, 164,247 days of adult care were given; this was an increase of 1,481 days over the previous year. In addition, 24,802 days of newborn care were given — an increase of 2,885 over the previous year.

Although, nationwide, the number of obstetrical patients entering hospitals has declined sharply over the past five years, the opposite has been true of Harris Hospital. During 1968-1969, there were 5,521 deliveries, as compared to 4,747 in 1967-1968.

Each year finds us with increasing numbers of patients presenting themselves to our Emergency Room facilities for care — 15,759 (an increase of 2,874) outpatients (which includes outpatients to other departments such as Laboratory and X-ray) were treated in 1968-1969. True emergencies during the same time (included in that figure) were 11,442.

During the past calendar year, 382,807 Laboratory procedures were performed (increase of 1,619 over the previous year). The Department of Radiology reports 42,808 radiological examinations (an increase of 6,424 over the previous year).

The nursing shortage in Texas in general has not improved greatly since our last Report; however, Harris Hospital has been quite fortunate in recruiting foreign nurses from Ireland, England, and Scotland. Our personnel department, thus far, has recruited 38 of these foreign nurses.

Purchase of Equipment and Property:

During the year, the Board of Trustees of the Hospital authorized the purchase of equipment and property in the amount of \$655,727.

Expansion Program:

Phase II of our expansion program was completed in August, 1969, and 134 new beds were put into service; at the same time, the Seventh Floor of the Main Building was closed — thus, making a net increase of 77 beds. We are now operating 580 adult beds.

In December, 1969 we received bids from contractors for Phase III, our modernization program. The bids were more than 40% higher than our estimates; the Board of Trustees rejected all bids. Phase III has now become Phase IIIA and Phase IIIB. Phase IIIA will cover the modernization of Floors 8, 7, 6, and 5 and the construction of a new ICU. Bids have been requested on this project and the bid opening is scheduled for April 30, 1970. The splitting of the project into two phases will leave us still to accomplish Phase IIIB — modernization of Floors 4, 3, and 2.

The financing of this project will be accomplished by a Hill-Burton grant of \$1,000,000; a long term loan of approximately \$1,700,000; and Hospital reserve funds for the balance.

Medicare:

The number of patients covered by Medicare to our total patient load has been 19.36% as compared to 20.01% the previous year. The total Medicare patient days to the total adult patient day load has gone from 25.18% to 31.12%. Perhaps, the most important statistics has been the average length of stay of the patient prior to Medicare and the average length of stay of the patient 65 years or older since Medicare; July 1965 through June 1966 (before Medicare), the average length of stay of the patient 65 years or older was 9.88 days while for the period from July 1968 through June 1969, the average length of stay for the Medicare patient was 11.80 days.

On July 1, 1969 the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare made a unilateral decision to reduce payments to hospitals for patients by what is called the "2% factor." This factor was initially allowed hospitals for unidentifiable expenses at the onset of Medicare. The present payment for a Medicare patient is, in essence, a 10% discount from normal billings. This means that the patient paying his own bill is forced to pick up this slack.

Report of Commissioner-Chaplain, Harris Hospital

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

The Chaplaincy

The Chaplain's work at Harris Hospital continues to be a challenge to one's faith and to one's willingness to serve. Platitude and nice phrases often fall short against the back drop of extreme pain and incurable illness. It is our desire to so cooperate with God, that we literally become implements through whom his healing love may flow.

Our ministry at Harris Hospital is in many ways a crisis ministry — we share a deep meaningful experience with a family and then we may never see them again.

Chaplain John Schaub joined our staff in June 1969. He has been well accepted by the medical community and is doing us an outstanding piece of work. Although we see our primary responsibility as that of patient care, we also feel a responsibility to provide a clinical learning experience for our young ministers. Chaplain Schaub is the Acting Supervisor in charge of this learning experience.

The Program of Clinical Pastoral Education

Harris Hospital continues to provide a learning opportunity whereby theological students may grow in sensitivity to the need of persons and appreciation for adequate pastoral skills. Brite Divinity School, T.C.U., and Southwestern

Baptist Theological Seminary have provided a total of fourteen students this academic year for an orientation or "Monday" program of training. For their efforts, these students receive seminary credit.

Plans are being completed for our summer program. Up to six students will be received for Clinical Pastoral Education, Unit I, an intensified time of training, Monday through Friday, from June 1, 1970 to August 14, 1970. Plans are also under way to offer another C. P. E., Unit I, in the Fall.

Golden Cross Service

This report covers the period of April 1, 1969 through December 31, 1969.

At the close of December 31, 1969, the cost of 25 church referred patients amounted to \$20,895.22. The total amount received from the churches of our Conference for the same period of time amounted to \$4,463.90.

Methodist Mission Home of Texas

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

General: Your Home in San Antonio is now one of the outstanding agencies of its kind in the United States. In increasing measure it provides a well balanced, realistic, and effective ministry to unwed mothers and their families. These young women come from every social and economic background and a large majority of these in the Home come from church-related homes. They need our understanding, acceptance and love — in spite of their serious moral mistakes, they need a place where they can obtain confidential and expert help on their medical, psychological, and social problems; and they need the help of sensitive counselors to re-think life's meaning, find a more mature way to manage their lives, to accept God's forgiveness and to make realistic decisions about their babies. Your support of this program makes all this possible in larger measure each year.

Counseling: This phase of our work with the residents continues to be a basic factor in our healing and redemptive ministry. Our girls are being seen individually by experienced caseworkers and also are involved in group work sessions. Each resident is provided basic psychological testing under the direction of a Clinical Psychologist and when needed, the services of a Consulting Psychiatrist are used. All girls are given specific and detailed understanding of their prenatal problems under the direction of a Registered Nurse and are seen weekly in our Clinic at the Home.

The new Home on Whitby Road has been in use for slightly over two years and we are beginning to realize more fully the cost of operating this larger Home. We have been officially licensed by the State Department of Public Welfare to care for 120 residents — as of Sept. 1, 1969. When funds are available, we can easily move to our maximum capacity.

Adoption: The placement of beautiful little babies in fine Christian homes continues to be an important part of our ministry and the Home is a fully accredited adoption agency. Our policies on adoption are much more flexible than in former years and we are using homes of many different denominational backgrounds. However, a high preference is still given Methodist families and over 70% of our babies go into Methodist homes. We serve girls of all nationality backgrounds and place babies in Anglo, Latin-American and Negro homes. We are always glad to have couples write to us about adoption possibilities, and are in special need of Negro and Latin-American homes.

Building and Endowment Programs: The Home's Building and Endowment Programs are moving steadily ahead. At this time approximately \$50,000.00 remains to be underwritten on the original building campaign of \$1,250,000.00. Another \$40,000.00 in pledges remains outstanding at this time. The total indebtedness of which both the above figures are a part stands at \$200,000.00. The differential between the total indebtedness and the sum of the two above figures consists of interim financing, costs and interest, campaign expense, variations in building costs, etc. Every effort is being made to remove all outstanding indebtedness so that the Home may be debt free.

The Endowment Fund, only a year old, under the guidance of an able Committee, continues slowly but steadily to advance toward the provision of an undergirding reserve against future contingencies. Cash receipts increase slowly, with some individuals indicating gifts of future interest to the Home through Wills, Bequests, Insurance, Etc.

With continued diligence both the Building and Endowment efforts should move in the right direction, with the Home debt free within a reasonable length of time and an endowment that can provide some reserve which the Home has never enjoyed before.

Report No. 6

Methodist Home

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

Methodist Home in Waco has been serving boys and girls needing homes for 79 years and will be beginning its 80th year in November. In its early history, most of the children served were orphaned children. Now Methodist Home administers to boys and girls needing a home because for several years we have realized there is no longer a need to care for orphans and only a few children needing help who do not have complicated backgrounds. Their homes have been shattered by divorce, alcoholism, illness or severe marital misconduct. With these experiences and the trauma of leaving home and family, our children are very unsettled and suffer many emotional problems.

With the daily increase in our cost of living and to better meet the needs of these disturbed, emotional children, Methodist Home has taken on a multi-function program of services in providing the following basic services to meet the ever increasing needs of boys and girls and their parents. They are as follows:

Institutional Group Care Program

The Methodist Home campus covers 125 acres of beautiful land and on it we have 21 cottages for our children, each cottage group living as an independent family group. About 350 children live in this group care, receiving education in the public schools of Waco, vocational training, health services and spiritual development so they may take an active part in the normal life of the community.

Foster Home Care

All pre-school age children under our care live in a foster home, supervised by the staff of Methodist Home. In addition to pre-school age children, several older children who have found it difficult to adjust to group living on the campus are placed in foster homes in the areas close to our offices in Waco, Dallas, Houston and Amarillo. We now have about 100 boys and girls in foster homes.

Treatment of Mildly Disturbed Children

In recent months, the Home has been developing a treatment program for some of the children under its care. The Methodist Home accepts only those children for whom it has facilities and personnel to help solve their problems and meet their needs. Steps have been taken to provide some psychiatric help and case work services, both under professional guidance. The Methodist Home is not equipped to treat children with serious personality disorders nor can it minister to juvenile delinquents, or to the physically or mentally handicapped.

By the summer of 1971, the Methodist Home Guidance Center will be in

operation. This will be one of the finest facilities of its kind anywhere in America for the care of children with emotional problems. Hopefully, a Child Psychiatrist will be the director of the Center and a full staff of psychologists, social workers and other professional personnel will administer to the needs of our children and those of the community.

Adoption Service

Methodist Home is licensed to place children for adoption by the State Welfare Department but is not primarily an adoption agency. There are relatively few children made available to us each year whom we can place for adoption. Both the parents and the courts are reluctant to terminate parental rights on those children who are placed with us for care. It is always the goal of Methodist Home to try to restore children to their original homes if at all possible. However, for those children who can never return to their natural families and have been declared legally available for adoption, our goal for them is a permanent home and family of their own through adoption. Each year Methodist Home will place from four to eight children for adoption.

Family Counseling

In recent years Methodist Home has released 50 to 100 children each year, most of whom return to their parents or relatives. Methodist Home staff continues to work with the children and parents to help them make the proper adjustment of living together again. While there will no doubt always be some children returning to parents under conditions less than desirable, many hours go into the planning of discharge, as well as the setting up of safeguard where needed and possible. In like manner, much study and counseling go into the admission of a child into our care. Sometimes it is determined that our institution is not the answer to the child's needs. In that case, the staff tries to advise the child and his family as to the resources which might be available for his care.

As of April 1, 1970, we had enrolled the following number of children:

Campus 332, Foster Homes 93, Mather's Aid 4, College 22, Tentative Adoptions 0, Total 451.

As of April 1, 1970, the total offering from the Central Texas Conference amounted to \$85,406.53.

Report No. 7

Trustees for Retired Ministers Homes

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

The Board of Trustees of Homes for Retired Ministers wishes to express appreciation for the support of the churches of the Conference through the years and asks for their continued support.

During the past Conference year we have added 4 new homes, making a total now of 32 homes and 2 duplexes. One of the new homes at 4807 Melita was made possible by a generous gift of the Westcliff United Methodist Church in Fort Worth. The other new additions are located at 4621 Darla Drive in Fort Worth, 2205 Lee Street in Waco and one located in Ferris, Texas. The home in Ferris was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Carnes through their will.

The money from the offerings in the churches has been used to maintain, repair and improve these homes. Since there is a need of replacing some of these homes, we urge those who can to include the Retired Ministers Homes in their wills. This would help us continue through the years to adequately serve the retiring ministers of our conference.

We would like to report that our Superintendent for many years, Rev. Hubert Crain, plans to retire effective January, 1972, and we will be looking for someone to fill this position.

Specific Recommendations for Conference Action

1. We request that Sunday, July 12, 1970 be observed as Retired Ministers Homes Day.
2. We request that ministers be requested to ask members of their congregations to remember the Retired Ministers Homes in their wills.
3. We request that Conference members who plan to retire, and who will be depending upon Retired Ministers Homes for housing, should inform us of their needs as early as possible.

Wesleyan Homes

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

The Wesleyan Home in Georgetown, Texas continues to minister through services to Senior Citizens. One hundred seventeen residents benefit from the facilities provided here.

Our largest single income last year was from residents' fees which were increased from the previous year because of an increase in the number of residents and because the monthly rates were raised. Additional income came from Oil & Gas Royalties from the Highnote Estate, our local Chamber of Commerce pledge, gifts from individuals and Churches, wills and legacies and our Foster I Program.

We again received \$1,500.00 from the Lola Wright Foundation for the maintenance of our beautiful Memorial Garden.

JOINT DISTRIBUTING COMMITTEE

Involving the Merger of the Gulf Coast Annual Conference
with the
Central Texas, North Texas, and Texas Annual Conferences
and with a portion of the West Texas Annual Conference.

The Joint Distributing Committee, representing the several conferences concerned with the merger of the Gulf Coast Annual Conference with the Central Texas, North Texas and Texas Annual Conferences and with a portion of West Texas Annual Conferences and with a portion of the West Texas Annual Conference in accordance with the authority granted in Par. 1383 of the 1968 **Book of Discipline** of The United Methodist Church, presents herewith a report of agreements by which the pension responsibility is allocated to the several successor Annual Conferences and by which the pension assets are distributed to the several successor Annual Conferences, such report to be published in the annual journals of each conference involved in this merger in accordance with Par. 1383.3d of the 1968 **Book of Discipline**.

I. Allocation of Pension Responsibility

The pension responsibility of the Gulf Coast Conference, and the geographical portion of the West Texas Annual Conference which becomes a part of the Gulf Coast Annual Conference, an account of years of approved service rendered prior to June 1, 1970 by ministerial members and by lay pastors or approved supply pastors thereof, as approved by the Gulf Coast and West Texas Annual Conferences, is hereby accepted and approved for pension responsibility on the successor Annual Conferences, in accordance with the following principles:

1. Responsibility for all approved service to a pastoral charge shall be allocated to the successor conference within whose geographical boundaries the charge was located.
2. Responsibility for any approved service which cannot be directly related to a pastoral charge shall be allocated to the successor Annual Conferences in proportion to the number of years of approved service related directly to pastoral charges which will be allocated to such Annual Conferences.
3. Any responsibility for service rendered as a lay pastor or approved supply pastor entitled to pension credit, which has not been approved and/or is not a part of the total distribution, shall be the responsibility of the conference in which was located the charge where such service was rendered.
4. Consecutive years of service rendered as a lay pastor and/or approved supply pastor with pension credit in one of the merging conferences together with service as a lay pastor in a successor conference shall be counted as consecutive years in one conference for the purpose of qualifying a retired lay pastor for a pension under provisions of Par. 1379.3b of the 1968 **Book of Discipline**.

The pension responsibility of the former Central Texas, North Texas, and Texas Annual Conferences shall be the pension responsibility of the successor Central Texas, North Texas and Texas Annual Conferences respectively.

II. Distribution of Pension Assets

1. Service Annuity credits in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund and the Partial Reserve Pension Fund related to service in one of the merging Annual

Conferences shall be counted as distributable assets, and shall be distributed to the successor conferences as Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, or as Partial Reserve Pension Fund assets, as credits in such accounts of the ministers involved. Any annuity provided from these accounts at the time of the minister's retirement may be counted as part of the pension payable by the successor Annual Conference to such minister and/or to his widow.

2. The pension assets of the Gulf Coast and West Texas Annual Conferences shall be distributed to the successor conferences in proportion to the pension responsibility received by such conferences.

3. Pension assets for the former Central Texas, North Texas, and Texas Annual Conferences shall be pension assets of the successor Central Texas, North Texas, and Texas Annual Conferences respectively.

III. Assignment of Retired Ministers and other Beneficiaries

1. Retired Ministers

In the absence of specific notice from the resident Bishops of the successor Annual Conferences to the contrary, it is to be assumed that each retired member of the Gulf Coast and West Texas Annual Conferences is to be considered as a retired member of the successor conference in whose geographical boundaries was situated the Quarterly or Charge Conference in which such retired minister was last a member while in the effective relation, and that the retired members of the former Central Texas, North Texas and Texas Annual Conferences will be retired members of the so named respective successor Annual Conferences.

2. Widows and Dependent Children

In the absence of specific notice from the resident Bishops of the successor conferences to the contrary, the last Gulf Coast Quarterly or Charge Conference membership held by a deceased ministerial member of that conference shall determine the successor conference to which his widow and dependent children shall be related, and the General Board is hereby authorized to make such assignment on the basis of this determination, for purposes of setting up procedures for the payment of pensions to them, and such basis shall determine which successor conference is responsible for providing benefit program coverages for such persons

IV. Claims and Liens

Any amounts collected by the General Board of Pensions related to claims or liens filed by the Gulf Coast Annual Conference shall be allocated to the successor conferences in accordance with the pro-rata formula used to distribute the assets of the Gulf Coast Annual Conference to the successor conferences.

V. Authorizations

1. The General Board of Pensions is hereby authorized and directed to put into effect the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee and to distribute the pension assets and to allocate the pension responsibilities of the conferences involved in this merger, in accordance with the 1968 **Book of Discipline** and the principles agreed upon by this Joint Distributing Committee, according to the service records of the ministers, widows and dependent children as they have been compiled and as adjustments may be necessary upon the discovery of sufficient evidence that such adjustments should be made.

2. The chairman and the secretary of the Joint Distributing Committee together with a representative from the General Board of Pensions, are authorized to represent the Joint Distributing Committee in any recall of the committee by the General Secretary of the General Board of Pensions, and the Chairman of the Joint Distributing Committee is instructed to notify all members of the committee of the purpose, date, and the place of such meeting.

3. The General Board of Pensions is hereby requested to furnish to each successor Annual Conference a list of the names of charges and/or former charges in the Gulf Coast and West Texas Annual Conferences indicating the successor conference in the bounds of which the charges are or were located.

I. Allocation of Pension Responsibility

The pension responsibility of the West Texas Annual Conference, and the geographical portion of the Gulf Coast Annual Conference which becomes a part of the West Texas Annual Conference, an account of years of approved service rendered prior to June 1, 1970 by ministerial members and lay pastors or approved supply pastors thereof, as approved by the West Texas and Gulf Coast Annual Conferences, is hereby accepted and approved for pension responsibility on the successor Annual Conferences, in accordance with the following principles:

1. Responsibility for all approved service to a pastoral charge shall be allocated to the successor conference within whose geographical boundaries the charge was located.

2. Responsibility for any approved service which cannot be directly related to a pastoral charge shall be allocated to the successor Annual Conferences

in proportion to the number of years of approved service related directly to postoral charges which will be allocated to such Annual Conferences.

3. Any responsibility for service rendered as a lay pastor or approved supply pastor, entitled to pension credit, which has not been approved and/or is not a part of the total distribution, shall be the responsibility of the conference in which was located the charge where such service was rendered.

4. Consecutive years of service rendered as a lay pastor and/or approved supply pastor with pension credit in one of the merging conferences together with service as a lay pastor in a successor conference shall be counted as consecutive years in one conference for the purpose of qualifying a retired lay pastor for a pension under the provisions of Par. 1379.3b of the 1968 **Book of Discipline**.

The pension responsibility of the former Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas, and Texas Annual Conferences shall be the pension responsibility of the successor Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas and Texas Annual Conferences respectively.

II. Distribution of Pension Assets

1. Service Annuity credits in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund and the Portial Reserve Pension Fund related to service in one of the merging Annual Conferences shall be counted as distributable assets, and shall be distributed to the successor conferences as Ministers Reserve Pension Fund or a Portial Reserve Pension Fund assets, as credits in such accounts of the ministers involved. Any annuity provided from these accounts at the time of the minister's retirement may be counted as part of the pension payable by the successor Annual Conference to such minister and/or to his widow.

2. The pension assets of the West Texas and Gulf Coast Annual Conferences shall be distributed to the successor conferences in proportion to the pension responsibility received by such conferences.

3. Pension assets of the former Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas and Texas Annual Conferences in proportion to the pension responsibility received by such conferences.

3. Pension assets of the former Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas and Texas Annual Conferences shall be pension assets of the successor Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas and Texas Annual Conferences respectively.

III. Assignment of Retired Ministers and other Beneficiaries

BOARD OF THE LAITY**Report No. 1**

(Adopted May 26, 1970)

The Board was organized according to the Discipline with all nominated members elected by annual conference May 27, 1969.

Some of our Conference and District Leaders received special training in a training workshop at Mt. Sequayah, Fayetteville, Arkansas on June 20-22, 1969.

The Fifth National Convocation of United Methodist Men was at the University of Purdue July 11-13, 1969. Under the leadership of our Conference Director of United Methodist Men, Darman Dillan, our conference sponsored a bus to Purdue on which 28 men enjoyed real Christian fellowship. Forty-one men from Central Texas Conference attended this inspirational convocation.

The 21st Men's Rally was August 22-23, 1969 at Glen Lake. The theme for this rally was "God's Grace—My Response."

Our platform speakers, Dr. I. B. Loud, Dr. John W. Stewart, and Dr. Harry Denman really caused us to look at our response to God's Grace. Dr. J. W. Sprinkle, Dr. Maggart Hawell, Dr. Bruce Weaver, and Dr. William Greenwaldt challenged the men in attendance with stimulating messages at Evening Vespers and Morning Watch Services. The music and enthusiastic singing was under the direction and leadership of Bill Mann and Oris Baldwin.

November 1 and 2, 1969 at the Holiday Inn, Temple, Texas the staff of our General Board of Laity conducted a training workshop and clinic for our conference people and the other conferences of Texas. This clinic was well attended by our laymen and our District Superintendents.

February 26, 27, and 28—March 3 and 4, 1970, Dr. Hilbert J. Berger of the General Board of the Laity conducted a series of seminars for ministers and laymen in Waco, Fort Worth, and Stephenville on Christian Family Money Management. These sessions were most informative and helpful for families in planning their budget.

This Mid-Winter meeting for this Conference Board was held at Wesley United Methodist Church in Cleburne on January 25, 1970. At this point we seek to evaluate what we have accomplished and then move into intensified action seeking to help the laymen of our church participate in the action and reconciliation of our church and our world.

Looking at the current reports, we believe at least 95% of the churches of our conference observed Laymen's Day.

District rallies or banquets have been held or are planned for April and May.

Training sessions or workshops have been taught in District, Sub-Districts, and the Local Churches on: Administrative Board Members, Charge Lay-Leader, Lay Speaking, Bible Study, Prayer and Share, Pastor-Parish Relation Committee, Stewardship Education, Finance Committee, and Adequate Support of the Ministry.

All Districts are planning training sessions for delegates to the annual conference prior to the conference.

Presented and adopted by Conference Program Council April 3, 1970:

1. Plans for four Bi-District training sessions be developed in the areas of Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, Nominating Committee, Charge Lay Leader, Lay Speaking and Member of Council of Ministries. Leadership to be supplied by the section of Lay Life and Work.

Scheduling to be by and through Conference Program Directors in consultation with respective District Superintendents and or their District Program Directors.

Recommended timing to be about four hours on Saturday or Sunday afternoon during September, October, November or December, 1970.

2. Request a Task Force be appointed by Program Council to investigate the possibility of developing two or three Bi-District training sessions on Christian Stewardship during the period of September 19-26, 1970. Dr. Clifford Lott is available to our conference at this time.

To Bishop Pope, to the Cabinet, to our devoted ministers, to the sincere dedicated laymen, to all, who, because of their concern for our church and its witness to a changing world and because of their intense desire to help others be more effective Christian Witnesses we express our gratitude and deep appreciation.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM PASTORAL SUPPORT

Plan of Operation

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Conference, under the management of a Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support, hereinafter, for the sake of brevity, called the Commission, to be composed of nine persons to be nominated by the Bishop and his Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference, and who shall be chosen for their fitness for service on this Commission, and who may be members of other Annual Conference Boards and Commissions. The term of service shall be for three years, so arranged that three shall be elected each year.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Minimum Pastoral Support Program.

Vacancies in the membership of the Commission, caused by death or removal from the Annual Conference, shall be filled by the nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference. However, the Commission is authorized to fill vacancies between sessions of the Annual Conference when it is deemed advisable. Such appointment is to apply only until the ensuing session of the Annual Conference, when the vacancy is to be filled in the regular way.

The Commission shall organize at that session of the Central Texas Annual Conference held at the beginning of each quadrennium, by electing a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman, and a Recording Secretary. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Annual Conference shall be the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Commission. These officers shall constitute the Executive Committee of the Commission, and shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected. All subsequent elections of officers and executive committee during the quadrennium shall be held at the last regular meeting of the Commission held prior to the meeting of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Administrative Procedures

1. The following conditions shall be met by a pastoral charge to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for its pastor to receive salary supplements from the Fund:

(a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted an Every Member Canvass for the local church budget of each of its churches during the previous conference year.

(b) The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall have been accepted and paid in full for the previous conference year.

(c) The charge must pay a minimum of \$1800 for pastor's salary and must have at least 100 members.

2. The following conditions shall be met by a pastor to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for receiving salary supplements from this Fund:

(a) He shall be a pastor in effective relation, a probationary member, an approved full-time lay pastor, an approved student lay pastor, or a lay pastor who has not previously served a pastoral charge. He shall not be eligible for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund if his appointment is other than pastor of a charge within the Central Texas Conference, if he receives salary aid from the General or Conference Board of Missions, if he is classified as a part-time lay pastor, if he is a retired minister, or if he receives income from any other employment than the regular work of the pastoral ministry. Receiving a scholarship for college or seminary work shall not restrict his eligibility.

(b) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this Fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in his present appointment.

3. A prerequisite for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund shall be the filing with the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Commission a written application by the District Superintendent. This application shall indicate the classification of the pastor, the salary set by the charge, and shall contain the certifications by the District Superintendent whether or not the pastoral charge has met each of the requirements set forth above in Section 1.

4. In cases of appointments, or changes of appointments, between the sessions of the Annual Conference, all the above requirements are applicable and the District Superintendent shall file a new application for each charge concerned. Such salary supplements, if approved, shall be paid on a pro rata basis for the part of the year actually served.

5. The salary supplements shall be computed according to the following classifications:

(a) For married or unmarried conference member in the effective relation, or a probationary member and not enrolled as a student during the year, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$5,000.00 per year, but in no case shall the sum required be more than \$1,500.00.

(b) For a married or unmarried full-time approved lay pastor, who is an ordained elder, and who for the previous five consecutive years has served as a full-time approved supply pastor within the Central Texas Annual Conference, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$4,050.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00.

(c) For a married or unmarried full-time approved lay pastor, who does not meet all the qualifications of section (b) above, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,900.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00.

(d) For married ministers, who are either student pastors or probation, approved student lay pastors, or lay pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,600.00 but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00.

(e) For unmarried ministers, who are student pastors or probation approved student lay pastors, or lay pastors who have not previously served a pastoral charge, the salary supplement shall be the amount necessary to make the salary \$3,000.00 per year, but in no case shall the amount required be more than \$1,500.00, and

(f) In addition to the above schedule and above the limitation of aid, seminary students who are serving pastoral charges and receiving Minimum Pastoral salary supplements, may receive \$1.00 per mile, one way, one time, per year, for the distance from the seminary to the pastoral charge. This extra allowance shall be computed by the Commission, and paid in one payment to the seminary student pastor serving the charge at the end of the third quarter of the conference year.

6. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts apportioned to the churches in their respective districts, and for the rearrangement of pastoral charges, as necessary, to provide that the salary for the pastor to be paid by the charges be not less than \$1800.00 per year.

7. Payment on the apportionment to the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payment to those receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference Year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payment for the fourth quarter of the year, ending May 31st, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same percentage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, then final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.

8. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, all payments of those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund, and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals enroute, to all meetings of the Commission except such as are held while the Annual Conference is in session shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be paid in accordance with the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payment for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid is limited to those who receive the benefits of the Fund, and not more than ten (10) per cent of the gross receipts of any one year shall be made available for such emergency appropriation. All unexpired portions of such available emergency funds shall at the close of the year remain in the general fund, subject to the disbursement in accordance with the provisions of this Plan.

BOARD OF MINISTRY

Counseling Elder Program

(Adopted May 25, 1970)

The Counseling Elder program in the Central Conference was initiated through the combined effort of the Board of Ministry and the Cabinet. All eight Districts of the Conference now have a Counseling Elder Program in operation. Its purpose is to furnish a supportive relationship for Lay Postors and provide ordained clergy to administer the sacraments on charges where Lay Postors serve as ministers. It will be updated through the reassignment of personnel each June following the appointment of ministers at the Annual Conference session.

Recruitment

The major emphasis on recruitment in the Central Texas Conference continues to be the Bishop's Conference on the Ministry sponsored jointly with the North Texas Conference Board of Ministry. The Board of Ministry provides the Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations with information on young persons attending the Conference who indicate an interest in the ministry as a profession. Work is being done to set up a direct line of communication with these young persons that will help them to follow through on their expressed interest. Other means of supplementing the initial impact made upon these young persons by the Conference on the Ministry are under study.

Continuing Education

More and more emphasis must be placed upon the need for working ministers to avail themselves to the outstanding opportunities for continuing education. It is hoped that the Board of Ministry and the Conference Cabinet can actively promote this matter and give full assistance to men interested in continuing to educate themselves through (1) publicizing opportunities, (2) enlisting men to

participate, (3) providing information to lay leadership, and (4) providing pulpit supplies when men participating are required to be away over Sunday.

The Board of Ministry hopes to be able to make some Ministerial Education Fund monies available to help cover the cost of these experiences.

Specific Recommendations For Conference Action

There are two items of legislation which the Board of Ministry recommends to the Annual Conference for adoption.

The first item concerns the use of Ministerial Education Fund monies in connection with scholarship grants. Paragraph 308 (4) of the 1968 **Discipline** defines a "ministerial student." However there is a problem at this point. The problem lies in the fact that there must be some way for the Board to determine who really fits that definition. Therefore, we recommend the adoption of the following: "In order to qualify for scholarship assistance from the Ministerial Education Fund, a student must hold a valid License to Preach, or be certified as a "Ministerial Student" in writing by his District Superintendent. Such certification shall be made to the Chairman of the Board of Ministry."

The second item concerns the granting of a License to Preach. Some instances have arisen where a student in a non-Methodist Theological Seminary unites with the United Methodist Church in order to enter our ministry. According to the **Discipline** the completion of one-fourth of a BD degree is acceptable as training for a License to Preach in lieu of the Methodist Ministerial Course. This means it is possible to have men licensed to preach in the United Methodist Church who have no background and training in Methodist History, Polity and Doctrine.

In view of this, we recommend that the Conference adopt the following legislation: "Any man coming into the United Methodist Church from another denomination, who is enrolled in a Theological Seminary of another denomination, must complete the courses in Methodist History, Polity and Doctrine in order to qualify for a License to Preach. This shall be done under the guidance of his District Committee and the Registrar of the Conference Board of Ministry.

Report No. 4

Committee on Urban Ministry

(Adopted May 27, 1970)

Our conference is fortunate in having two skilled and committed leaders in the field of urban ministry, the Rev. Gilbert Ferrell in Fort Worth and the Rev. Bill Patten in Waco. The needs of the two areas are varied; consequently, the programs are tailored to the individual cities. The potentialities of our ministries are limited severely, however, by the lack of financial resources. Already, the Metropolitan Board of Missions of Fort Worth has extended itself to the limit of its present financial ability. Methodist people have responded with financial shares in both cities, but additional resources must be found if we would attempt to meet the opportunities for ministry that are open to us.

Features of our urban ministry in Fort Worth include interdenominational planning in two sections of the city, the Eastwood Community Center under the direction of the Rev. Cliff Bullock, the night ministry of the Rev. Steve Larson, and the ministry with Mexican Americans directed by the Rev. David Maldonado. In Waco an effective program has begun with the aged, specialized tutoring, and aiding community development in poverty areas.

The ministry of the Metropolitan Board of Missions in the care city projects, the work of the Bethlehem Community Center and the work of the Wesley Community Center have been approved for Advance Special giving. All churches of the conference are urged to weigh carefully their advance giving in light of the urban crisis, and if possible to begin support of this vital work.

We recommend the following to help our conference move toward its full mission:

1. Every church should seek to understand and fulfill its World Service and Conference Benevolence askings by using all available leaflets, films, and other educational information.

2. Every church should seek to understand our World and National Advance Specials until all our people became directly related to same specific missionary concern.

3. Beginning in June, 1970, we recommend that the Conference Missionary Secretary publish a quarterly newsletter for the purpose of keeping our pastors and laymen informed on what the Advance Specials are and how well we are progressing on these causes.

4. The following goals should be considered by the churches of the conference for Advance Specials:

BOARD OF PENSIONS**Report No. 1****Committee on Pension Education****(Adopted May 27, 1970)**

With the new conference year the Board is recommending that the annuity rate of our conference claimants be increased from \$64.00 to \$70.00 per service year.

The total Pension Responsibility for the Central Texas Conference according to the latest report from the General Board of Pensions is a total of 4,924.07 net years of service. This is a net decrease of 55.14 net years under last year. But we will be receiving as our responsibility from the West Texas Conference Group, merging with our Conference, 432 net years, giving us a total net responsibility of 5,356.07 net years.

During the 1969-70 Conference year the following names have been removed from our rolls of Conference claimants due to death: Rev. C. H. Sisserson, Rev. J. D. Smoot, Rev. T. H. Burton, Rev. LaRue Vanderpool, Mrs. A. E. Turney, Mrs. H. B. Clark, and Mrs. J. W. Tickner. Mrs. T. H. Burton, and Mrs. G. M. Seipp were added to our Conference claimants rolls.

Emergency aid has been granted during the conference year to Mrs. E. M. Daily in the amount of \$150.00, to Rev. J. T. Gardner in the amount of \$50.00, and to Mrs. J. J. Creed in the amount of \$50.00.

Aid pending retirement, in the amount of \$713.30, was granted to Rev. D. L. McCree. Disability payment in the amount of \$741.32 was granted to Rev. Alton Ferrell.

The new Entrant Plan of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of the Methodist Church continues to be in effect with no problems or complications arising.

Committee on Pension Credits for Full-time Lay Pastors

Answering Conference Business Question No. 23, "What lay pastors are granted pension credit on account of approved full-time service during the past year?" the following report is given.

No pension credit can be given for part-time service (service with other employment during the year), for service as a student lay pastor, for service by retired ministers, nor to those whose names are not included in the official appointments at the annual conference, nor to those who serve less than a full conference year, nor to those whose salary paid by the pastoral charge is less than the minimum salary established by the Annual Conference for full-time lay pastors. It is also a requirement established by the Annual Conference that a pre-requisite for consideration by the Conference Board of Pensions for pension credit for full-time lay pastors shall be the inclusion of the name of that individual in the printed report of the Board of the Ministry at the preceding annual conference session.

We recommend that pension credit be granted to the following full-time lay pastors for the conference year 1969-1970: Dan Johnson and Leroy Reaves.

Your conference board of pensions has granted annuity claim for the service of G. M. Seipp, who died January 9, 1970, while lay pastor at Blanket, for 3/4 of the conference year 1969-70. There were other full-time lay pastors, who were not granted pension claim because they had other employment, became student lay pastors, or their salaries were below the required minimum.

The printed report of the Board of Pensions (appearing on page 151 in the 1969 Journal) inadvertently omitted the name of Harmon Keelin, as the lay pastor who was granted pension claim for one-fourth year of service in 1968. This is reported that the omission may be corrected.

Committee on Proportional Payments

The Statistical Reports show that there were fifteen pastoral charges whose financial reports on amounts paid on pastor's salary and the Connectional Ministry Fund were out of proportion. But by the end of February, there were still eight churches which were out of proportion. Those out of proportion in these matters are:

Cisco District: Cisco, Wesley lacks \$218.00; Scranton \$210.00.

Fort Worth West District: Lake Worth Church, \$319.00.

Committee on Annuity Responsibility

Attention is called again to the action of the Annual Conference in 1963, which is still in effect, that the Central Texas Conference assumes no pension responsibility for service rendered outside the boundaries of this annual conference unless special authorization is recommended by the Conference Board of Pensions and granted by vote of the Conference. It is presumed that all chaplains in the armed services and in institutional services are participating in the pension programs available to them. No responsibility for such service is assumed by this annual conference unless authorized by vote of the conference.

The Board of Pensions reports that Reverend C. A. Sutton has requested that annuity claim be granted for 3½ years of service rendered while he was a minister in the Methodist Protestant Church prior to unification in 1939 and at the same time he was enrolled as a student at Westminster College, Tehuacana, Texas, such service being rendered within the present boundaries of the Central Texas Conference, and it being understood that at the time of unification any service recognized for annuity claim by the Methodist Protestant Church would be recognized by the successor conference in The Methodist Church.

The Board further reports that Mrs. T. L. Crenshaw, the widow of the Reverend T. L. Crenshaw, has requested annuity claim for six years of service, rendered in 1939-1944 within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference. Mr. Crenshaw withdrew from the conference under complaints, but such complaints do not invalidate the claim of Mrs. Crenshaw. To grant this claim will require a two-thirds vote of the annual conference. Mr. Crenshaw was later re-admitted into the Mississippi Annual Conference, but our conference did not pass upon any claim for service in this conference.

Recommendations for Approval by Annual Conference

1. The annuity rate for the conference year 1970-71 be set for \$70.00 per service year, increasing the rate from \$64.00, and that this new rate becomes effective June 1, 1970, and that this rate be the same for conference members and full-time lay pastors.
2. That pension credit for the late Rev. G. M. Seipp for three-fourths year in 1969-70 be approved by the conference.
3. That annuity claim for three and one-half years of service in 1925-1929 at Coolidge Methodist Church Protestant Church be granted to C. A. Sutton.

4. That annuity claim for six years of service (at the 70% rate for widows) for service rendered in the Central Texas Conference in 1939-1944 be granted to Mrs. Crenshaw, the widow of the late Reverend T. L. Crenshaw. (This will require a two-thirds vote by the annual conference.)

5. That a correction be authorized in the service record of the Reverend H. H. Burnett, Sr., which now shows that his year of service as a supply pastor at Cross Cut was as a student supply pastor for the year 1939-1940. He states that he did not attend school any of that conference year. Be it further authorized that he be granted annuity credit for that year of service.

6. The appointment of Troy C. Clinesmith, transferred into the Conference January 1, 1970, and appointed Assistant Director of Methodist Home, shall be with annuity claim for the year 1970.

RESOLUTION

(Adopted May 26, 1970)

In keeping with the merger of the Central Texas and West Texas Annual Conference into a new Central Texas Conference, it becomes necessary that there be made several adjustments in records now being printed in the Conference Journal. The following recommendations are presented for the consideration and decision of the Annual Conference:

1. That the number of this session of the newly organized Annual Conference shall be recorded as No. 1.

2. That the roll of Deceased Ministerial Members in the West Texas Conference and Central Texas Conference in the respective 1970 Journals shall include the names of those who died during the conference year 1969-1970, and these names shall be added to the list as it is printed in the 1969 Journal. Then beginning with the 1971 Journal of the new Central Texas Conference the list

shall include only the names of ministerial members who have been members of the newly organized Central Texas Conference, and who die after the adjournment of this session.

3. That the Annual Conference Register appearing in the Historical Section of the Journal shall begin its listing with this 1970 session and omit the printing of long lists of previous sessions of the Central Texas and West Texas Annual Conferences. A note shall be placed at the heading of this register which shall read: "The record of previous sessions of the Central Texas Conference is recorded in its 1969 Journal and the record of the previous sessions of the West Texas Conference is recorded in its 1970 Journal."

4. That the Chronological Roll shall be revised by listing in alphabetical order the names and records of all ministerial members (regardless of relation to the conference) of the former Central Texas and West Texas Annual Conferences who compose its membership at the merger session, and the records of "How and When Admitted" shall be answered by "M (merger) 1970." These names are to be followed in numerical sequence with the names of those transferring, readmitted, and admitted on probation during the 1970 session.

5. That in the Service Record of Ministerial Members, the column headed "How and When Received into Central Texas Conference" shall be recorded for all members of the former Central Texas and West Texas Annual Conferences, who were on roll at the opening session of the newly organized conference, shall be "M (merger 1970," and in the usual manner for all those transferring in, readmitted or received on probation during the 1970 session.

We recommend:

Under Nominations on page 189 of the **Journal** that the following be inserted after the word "nominations" in the third line to read "for mailing by the Conference Secretary to all lay and clerical members of the Annual Conference one week prior to the election of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers."

Paragraph 2 will read as follows:

"All Quadrennial Boards, Commissions and Standing Committees shall meet within thirty days of adjournment of the Annual Conference at a time and place designated by the Bishop and the Cabinet for the purpose of organization and briefing. Notice of this meeting for organization and briefing shall be mailed to each member of each Board, Commission and Committee by the Conference Secretary at least ten days prior to the meeting."

Paragraph 1 under 17 will read as follows:

"The reports of the pastors to Annual Conference (Tables I and II) and **the annual statement of receipts as issued by the Conference Treasurer** shall be presented at a district meeting to be held in January. The Conference Statistician shall set the time and place for the district meetings, and shall appoint a District Statistician for each district, who shall receive, **edit**, and compile the pastors' statistical reports into the district report. The District Statisticians shall forward the district statistical tables to the Conference Statistician within one week after the district meeting. No change in the statistical tables will be made after the district meeting.

"Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Board of Pensions, any church in the district that has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, or World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrowed must be made a part of the record.

"He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attention during the year, and had not been reported."

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE**Report No. 1****Special Offerings and Financial Procedures****(Adopted May 26, 1970)**

1. The Commission on World Service and Finance approves and recommends that the following offerings be taken in all local churches of the Central Texas Conference on or near the dates designated in the Discipline, or herein designated:

United Methodist Student Day, on the second Sunday in June.

Homes for Retired Ministers, on the second Sunday in July.

"Texas Who Care," on August 2, 1970, to be used in fight against open saloon in Texas.

Christian Education Sunday, on the fourth Sunday in September.

The Fund for Reconciliation, in October.

Methodist Mission Home of Texas, on the first Sunday in November.

Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday, in the month of November.

The Methodist Home, during the month of December.

Huston-Tillotson Day (formerly called Race Relations Sunday) on the second Sunday in February.

One Great Hour of Sharing, on the fourth Sunday in Lent.

Wesleyan Home Sunday, on Mother's Day, the second Sunday in May.

While no special day is designated for an offering for the Texas Alcohol-Narcotic Education, Inc., we approve this special cause for either an appropriation from the budget in the local church, or a special offering taken at such time as the local church determines.

Any appropriation in the budget of a local for Television-Radio Ministry should be transferred to World Service and Conference Benevolences, as this cause is now included in the World Service Fund.

2. The Conference Treasurer once a month shall distribute the receipts from local churches for World Service and Conference Benevolences among the six funds included in the annual budget for the Annual Conference in proportion to their apportionments. Any overpayment at the end of the conference fiscal year for World Service shall be remitted by the Conference Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Council on World Service and Finance. Any overpayments in the other five funds (General Administration, Temporary General Aid, Interdenominational Cooperation, Jurisdictional Administration, and Conference Benevolences) shall be transferred into the Operating Reserve, subject to the direction of the Commission on World Service and Finance. Any deficit in remittances from the churches for these five funds shall be covered by payments from the Operating Reserve.

3. All boards, commissions, and other agencies shall have prepared in writing their detailed budget requests for the ensuing fiscal year by February 10th. The program agencies shall present their requests to the Coordinating Committee of the Program Council by February 10th, and the non-program agencies shall present their requests to the Commission on World Service and Finance by the same date.

4. No board, or agency of the Central Texas Conference shall expend any money for any purpose which has not been included in the original budget, as amended and approved by the Commission on World Service and Finance, as printed in the current Journal, without specific approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

5. The fiscal year of all boards, commissions, and other agencies operating through the Central Treasury shall begin January 1 and close December 31. The treasurers of all boards and other agencies of the Annual Conference shall file

with the Conference Treasurer a financial statement of receipts and disbursements for the conference fiscal year just closed within 30 days after the close of the year.

6. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempted by the Commission on World Service and Finance), making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new conference year within the limits of the appropriation.

7. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to pay from the Operating Reserve the following items:

(1) Expense of printing the Journal, which may exceed the budget appropriation.

(2) Expense of the Conference Secretarial Staff.

(3) Expense of fidelity bonds for the Conference Treasurer, and others who handle conference funds, as determined by the Commission.

(4) Expense of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, and the treasurers of boards, commissions, and other agencies of the Conference, as may be ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance. Such audits are to be made by the Conference Auditors, the firm of Leatherwood and Ward.

(5) Other expenditures as may be authorized by the Commission on World Service and Finance; expenditures not exceeding \$500.00 may be authorized by the Executive Committee of the Commission.

8. The Conference Treasurer is authorized:

(1) To consolidate the various funds of the Annual Conference and of its agencies into one or more bank accounts.

(2) To write all checks for the agencies of the Conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency.

(3) To invest, at his discretion, such funds not needed for immediate disbursement, in the Texas Methodist Foundation, as may be approved by the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

(4) To invest the funds of the Conference in its general and subsidiary accounts in United States Treasury Bills or in Certificates of Deposit, and to borrow on, and dispose of, these investments at, or prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in accounts of the Conference at his discretion.

(5) To deposit funds for specifically designated purposes with Savings and Loan Associations with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE**Report No. 2****Financial Recommendations****(Adopted May 26, 1970)**

1. The Commission on World Service and Finance recommends that the apportionment for the support of the District Superintendents for 1971 be an amount equal to 7½% of the salaries paid the pastors and associate pastors, including lay pastors. The District Superintendents shall be paid on the basis of \$12,500 per year for salary and \$2,000 per year for travel and other expenses, payable monthly.

The districts, at the discretion of the district stewards, may apportion to the churches expenses for a district office, up to \$5,000 per year. Such office expense, listed in proper categories in a budget request, must be approved by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, and annual renewal requests must be accompanied by an independent audit of the District Office Fund.

The District Superintendents' salaries shall include an annual housing allowance to the amount actually expended for utilities not to exceed \$1,000.

Authorized funds for the work of the districts to be apportioned to the churches shall be:

- (1) District Parsonage Fund
- (2) District Training Fund (for leadership training activities only)
- (3) District Office Fund
- (4) District Missions

Remittances for District Missions shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer by local church treasurers. Remittances for other district funds should be sent direct to the district treasurers by local church treasurers.

2. Half of the salary and office fund for the Area Program Director shall be paid by the Central Texas Conference. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to make these payments monthly to the Area Program Director.

3. The salaries and allowances authorized by the annual conference for the Director of Conference Program Agencies, and the Associate Directors of Conference Program Agencies shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly. Where parsonages are furnished by the conference, the salary shall include an housing allowance to the amount expended for utilities not to exceed \$1,000 each year.

4. During the seventh month period, from June 1 to December 31, 1970, the funds needed for the support of the new Associate Director of Conference Program Agencies are estimated at \$8,175.00. It is recommended that this be financed by transferring the unexpended appropriation in the fund for the Director of Evangelism and Missions (\$5,933.98) into the District Superintendents Fund, and his salary and allowances for the seven months only be paid from the District Superintendents Fund. This extra expenditure from this fund will be more than offset by payment from the former West Texas Churches into the District Superintendents Fund. Beginning January 1, 1971, there shall be transferred annually \$5,000 from the surplus in the District Superintendents Fund to the budget item for the Associate Director of Conference Program Agencies, and

the balance necessary to provide for his salary and allowances shall come from Conference Benevolences.

5. The apportionment for the Connectional Ministry Fund for the fiscal year 1971 shall be an amount equal to 30½% of the salaries paid to pastors and associate pastors, including lay pastors. The Conference Treasurer shall distribute funds received for Connectional Ministry for 1971 according to a scale based on the following percentages: District Superintendents Fund 7½%, Episcopal Fund 2%, and Conference Claimants Fund 21%.

6. The Central Texas Conference has been operating on a fiscal year beginning January 1, while the churches of the West Texas Conference have been operating on a fiscal year which ran from June through May. In order that the transition into the financial procedures of the new conference may be made easier, it is recommended that all churches will use during the last seven months of 1970 the Connectional Ministry plan in use in the Central Texas Conference. But the churches in the former West Texas Conference will be assigned apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences (which fund also includes in one apportionment the General Administration Fund, the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, the Temporary General Aid Fund, Jurisdictional and Conference Administration Fund) on the same scale as previously in use in the West Texas Conference for the next seven months. These apportionments will be furnished the district superintendents when it has been decided where district lines will be announced by the bishop. Churches in the former Central Texas Conference will continue on the same apportionments now assigned for 1970.

7. Apportionments to the districts for World Services and other apportioned funds will be assigned to the district soon after the adjournment of annual conference and these shall be distributed to the churches by the District Superintendents and District Stewards not later than August 1, 1970.

8. In order the confusion which results from similarity of names, it is recommended that the fund now called Conference Specials be changed to "Conference Projects" It is further recommended that the apportionments for Conference Projects to the churches shall be printed in an additional column in the Statistical tables of the Journal.

ROY E. BRIGGS

Roy Earl Briggs, son of Jim B. Briggs and Minerva Dianne Briggs, was born May 19, 1891 near Georgetown, Texas. He was graduated from the High School in Santa Anna, Texas and entered the photography business in which he was engaged for several years. He met and married Miss Myrtle May McHorse of Santa Anna. Their wedding date was December 19, 1912. To this union were born five children: Marvin W. Briggs; Belle May Briggs; Earline Rose Briggs and Roy E. Briggs, Jr., all of whom survive him along with their mother.

Roy Briggs was granted the license to preach in May 1921 and was admitted on trial into the Central Texas Conference that same year. He was received into full connection on November 18, 1923 and was ordained Deacon on November 18, 1923 and Elder on November 22, 1925. Both ordinations were by Bishop James E. Dickey.

Roy E. Briggs served with dignity, honor and success the following appointments in the Central Texas Conference: Kerens Circuit 1921; China Springs 1922; China Springs and Lakeview 1923-24; Bethel 1925-26; Thurber and Mingus 1927; Fort Worth, Diamond Hill 1928-31; Whitney Station 1932-33; Newcastle 1934-36; Rice 1937-39; Coolidge 1940-44; Moody 1945; Clifton 1946-49; Bartlett 1950-52; Glen Rose 1952-54; Fort Worth, St. Johns 1955; Grandview 1956-57; from which he retired at the session of The Central Texas Conference in 1957.

He lived with his faithful companion in the Retired Ministers Home in Corsicana until his call came to "Come Up Higher" on April 15, 1970.

Memorial services were conducted in the sanctuary of the First United Methodist Church in Corsicana where Brother Roy worshiped and served his Lord with great consistency, by his pastor Dr. Lively Brown and two dear friends Drs. Sidneys Robert and Floyd E. Johnson.

As a minister Roy E. Briggs was a good shepherd of his flock wherever he served. His message was warm and human, forceful, pleasing and persuasive. Somehow he had the capacity to cause those in the congregaton to feel that he was speaking a personal message to each of them. No truer representative of the Christian cause ever served in our midst. May God somhow raise up many like Roy Briggs to preach His Word and to live His Gospel.

TRAVIS HENSON BURTON

Travis Henson Burton was born in Robinsonville, Texas (McLennan County) on May 5, 1883, the son of J. F. Burton and Alice Cubly Burton. He attended High School at Battle, going on to further his education at Central Texas College, and later doing College work at Candler School of Theology, Decatur, Georgia.

On July 18, 1902, he was married to Sarah L. Massengale, and to this union five children were born, who with his wife, Mrs. Sarah Burton, survive: Mrs. J. I. Read, Miss Evelyn Burton, Mrs. Claude Hallmark, Mrs. Brent Williamson, and Travis Burton.

He was licensed to preach on July 21, 1911 by the Waco District Conference, and approved as a supply in 1912 by the Central Texas Conference. He was admitted on trial November 19, 1913 by the Central Texas Conference at Temple, Texas, and received into full connection in November, 1915 at Georgetown, Texas.

He was ordained deacon in November, 1915 and elder in November, 1917, both at the hands of Bishop James H. McCoy.

CHARLES H. SISSERSON

Charles Hutcheson Sisserson, son of William and Jane Wilson Sisserson, was born February 10, 1896, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. His father was a minister in the Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Sisserson was educated at the Westfield High School in Westfield, New Jersey, the University of Michigan and Union Theological Seminary. Southwestern University conferred the Honorary Doctor of Divinity degree upon him in 1949.

On December 3, 1921, he was married to Mary Lane. Together they entered the ministry of the Methodist Church in 1925, and together they gave themselves in devoted service at Chatfield, Waxahachie Circuit, Maypearl, St. Mark's in Cleburne, Bartlett, Missouri Avenue in Fort Worth, Itasca, Mart, First Church in Weatherford, the Cleburne District, Meadowbrook in Fort Worth, and First Church in Hurst. Following Mrs. Sisserson's death in 1966, Dr. Sisserson continued to serve as associate pastor at First Church in Hurst and later at Westcliff in Fort Worth.

Licensed to preach by the Weatherford District, October 10, 1925, he was admitted into the Central Texas Conference on trial in November of that year. He was admitted into full connection and ordained by Bishop John M. Moore in 1927. Bishop Moore also ordained him an Elder in 1929. Dr. Sisserson retired in 1961.

A pioneer in the camping program of the Central Texas Conference, Dr. Sisserson served many years as a trustee of Glen Lake Camp. He was a trustee of Weatherford College and Southwestern University. He was a delegate to the South Central Jurisdictional Conference in 1948, 1952, and 1956. Boards on which he served included the Jurisdictional Board of Lay Activities, Conference Board of Missions and Conference Board of Education. For twelve years he was secretary of the latter.

His was the heart of a pastor. He had a great concern for people. He will be remembered as an able preacher of the Word and a wise administrator, but most of all as a pastor. The ministers and wives who served with the Sissersons in the Cleburne District will remember him as a pastor of pastors.

He died at the Glenview Hospital in Fort Worth on July 19, 1969. To his children, Charles Hutcheson Sisserson, Jr., of Dallas, Mrs. Woodrow W. Mills of Alpine, Kenneth Lane Sisserson and Mrs. Robert H. Sumner; his nine grandchildren; and all who have known him, he left the example of a disciplined Christian life lived triumphantly all the way.

The memorial service was held July 21, 1969, at the Meadowbrook United Methodist Church in Fort Worth. Ministers leading the worship were H. Brown Loyd, Floyd E. Johnson, Ben H. Feemster, and Sidney Roberts. Interment was in Rose Hill Cemetery.

A hymn in the new Methodist Hymnal written by Frederick J. Gillman says,

"God send us men whose aim 'twill be
 Not to defend some ancient creed,
 But to live out the laws of Christ
 In every thought and word and deed."

God gave us such a man in "Rube" Sisserson and for his life we give thanks and praise to God.

JOHN D. SMOOT

John D. Smoot was the son of John R. Smoot and Sarah Anderson Smoot. He was born October 13, 1875 in Hill County, Texas.

He received Christian baptism at the age of six and joined the Methodist Church in which he served throughout his life.

John married Miss Meta Movourneen Graham on October 20, 1901. Four children were born to John and Meta, three sons and a daughter.

LARUE VANDERPOOL

LaRue Vanderpool came into the world to bless it on September 15, 1903 in Frenchburg, Kentucky, the son of James M. and Grace Angel Vanderpool. He was one of five preacher sons. As a part of his Kentucky heritage, he possessed that native wit, so characteristic of the mountaineers, and used that rare gift to bring joy to the hearts of many people.

He attended Winchester High School, Wesleyan Prep School, and Wesleyan College in Kentucky where he received his A.B. degree in 1926. LaRue was an avid reader, a good student, and continued his post graduate work at Emory University and the University of Oklahoma where he completed his academic work for the M.A. degree.

LaRue was licensed to preach in June, 1922 in Lexington, Kentucky. On August 29th of that same year, he was admitted on trial in the Kentucky Conference. He was ordained a deacon by Bishop U. V. W. Darlington in 1925 and received into full connection. In September of 1927, he was ordained an elder by Bishop James E. Dickey. LaRue was a great preacher and a good pastor, serving Whitesburg, Ruddles Mills, Moorefield, and Whitebead in his home Conference of Kentucky. Upon his transfer to the Oklahoma Conference, he served the Dustin, Boynton, and Blanchard charges.

On July 27, 1931, LaRue married Jose Bell. The following year, they were transferred to the Central Texas Conference, serving with great loyalty and success the following charges: Italy, Coolidge, Glen Rose, Hubbard, Bartlett, and the last ten years of his ministry were devoted to two churches in Fort Worth, Trinity and Wichita Avenue.

Due to failing eyesight, he was forced to retire from the pastoral ministry during the Annual Conference of 1957. Through these years, Josie, his faithful and devoted wife, had maintained her relationship with the Fort Worth Public Schools, largely due to the helpful counsel of a distinguished and dedicated ophthalmologist and the late Dr. J. N. R. Score. During their pastorate at Wichita Avenue, they bought the home at 2901 Burchill Road, North in the area served by Polytechnic Methodist Church. After LaRue's retirement from Conference appointments, he and Josie continued to work as a team in sharing the good news of Christ's coming, by teaching two of the finest adult classes in Poly Church.

Personally, LaRue Vanderpool meant much to me in the early years of my ministry. He was a wise counselor, a good friend, and a faithful evangelist in my time of great need. As a pastor at Poly, I found him always faithful to the cause and programs of the Methodist Church to the very end.

After several years of limited health and vision, which had continued to fail, he went to sleep on January 29, 1970 to awaken in his Father's house.

LaRue is survived by his wife, Josie Bell Vanderpool, and his brother, Dr. Homer Vanderpool.

Memorial services were held in the Polytechnic United Methodist Church, January 31st, at 3 p.m. with the following ministers sharing in the services: Dr. H. Brown Loyd, Dr. Maggart B. Howell, Dr. Floyd E. Johnson, Dr. Harry Vanderpool, and Dr. J. D. F. Williams. Burial was in Annetta Cemetery in Parker County on Saturday afternoon, January 31, 1970.

GEORGE MAXWELL SEIPP

George Maxwell Seipp was born January 24, 1903 in Towson, Maryland, the son of George W. and Mary C. Seipp. He attended Towson High School and received his B.S. Degree in Heath College in 1925. He attended four terms of the summer school for Supply Pastors at Perkins School of Theology. He was licensed to preach in 1954 by the Brownwood District Conference, and was first approved as a supply pastor in 1955. He was ordained deacon in 1957 and elder in 1958, with both ordinations at the hands of Bishop William C. Martin in the Central Texas Conference.

On May 15, 1930, he was married to Irene Ardene Selzer and together they established a Christian home that was to be a haven of blessing and a place of peace across the years. There being no children, they opened their hearts to the young of other families. It is interesting to note that the first church related position Brother Seipp held was that of Youth Director on the staff of First Methodist Church, Brownwood.

During the fifteen years of his service to the Church, Brother Seipp served as pastor of the Valera Circuit four years, Johnson Memorial, Brownwood four years, Trinity, Coleman for five years and at the time of his death, he was in his fourth year at Blanket-May. The length of his tenure in each of his pastoral appointments is an indication of the thoroughness and the acceptability of his work among his people. No claim of the Church went unheeded where he served. The records underscore that he completed every assignment in the financial affairs of his churches. He was a faithful pastor and kept a detailed record of the number of pastoral calls he had made and the dates when he had visited each family. It is not surprising that his people expressed their devotion to him as their spiritual leader and their personal friend.

Physical health was a constant concern of Brother Seipp and thus it was necessary for him to serve his entire ministry in the Brownwood District. During the last year of his life he was aware that his strength was ebbing and therefore had made his plans to seek retirement at the 1970 session of the Conference. On January 9, 1970 he was relieved of his suffering. The service of memorial was held on January 12, 1970 with William M. Greenwaldt and Plez Todd officiating. He is survived by his companion, Mrs. G. M. Seipp. His body was committed to its resting place in the Restland Memorial Park in Dallas.

She was a Baptist until her marriage, then she joined the Methodist Church and remained a Methodist until her death.

Mattie attended public schools through the tenth grade when she became a wage earner and helped her parents with household expenses. She continued her education through reading, studying, correspondence, and the live learning experience of raising a large family. Mattie was a life member of the Women's Society of Christian Service. She was a Sunday School teacher from the time she was a teen-age girl until she was in

her late seventies. She led many Bible study groups and special work sessions for many years wrote a column for the Texas Advocate entitled "From the Crow's Nest." She was a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

X—MISCELLANEOUS**STANDING RULES****I. Organization****1. Annual Conference Program Council**

There shall be an Annual Conference Program Council (in conformity to the action of the 1968 Uniting Conference) the membership of which shall be:

- 1) The presiding bishop
- 2) The district superintendents
- 3) Chairmen of Conference Boards, Commissions and Quadrennial Committees, except the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 4) The conference secretary
- 5) The conference president and vice president of youth
- 6) The district lay leaders
- 7) Chairmen of age-level and family ministries
- 8) One minister from each district
- 9) The conference lay leader
- 10) The conference president of the Women's Society of Christian Service and one additional representative
- 11) Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences—not otherwise members
- 12) The conference statistician
- 13) Members without vote:
 - Salaried and volunteer conference staff
 - The conference treasurer
 - The chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance

The cabinet to serve as the Nominating Committee

Members of the Executive Committee shall be (total not to exceed 30)

- 1) The officers of the Annual Conference Program Council
- 2) The presiding bishop
- 3) The district superintendents
- 4) The conference program director
- 5) Chairman of
 - Board of Missions
 - Board of Evangelism
 - Board of Education
 - Board of Christian Social Concerns
 - Commission on World Service and Finance
- 6) The conference lay leader

- 7) The conference president of the Women's Society of Christian Service
- 8) Laymen elected at large
Number necessary to bring total membership up to 30.
Insofar as possible, representatives of conference agencies not otherwise represented.
- 9) The Conference Director of Christian Education and Social Concerns and the Conference Director of Evangelism and Missions shall be ex-officio members without vote.

5. Area Executive Secretary

There shall be an Area Executive Secretary, to be selected and appointed in the same manner as the Discipline outlines for the appointments of a District Superintendent, that is, by the Bishop. The term of office shall be limited to eight years.

The Area Executive Secretary will be responsible to the Bishop and to the Executive Committee of the Administrative Council. His duties in the Central Texas Conference shall be to initiate, to coordinate, and to implement the program of the conference in cooperation with the boards and agencies of the Conference. He shall be the Chairman of the Executive Secretaries in the Annual Conference and have general oversight over the Annual Conference program.

After consultation with the Bishop of the area, the portion of the Area Executive Secretary's budget for the Central Texas Conference shall be provided by the Commission on World Service and Finance, it being understood that the total amount from this Conference shall not exceed \$13,000 for the Conference year 1965-66.

A liaison committee composed of the Bishop, the Chairman of the Administrative Council, and a member of the Cabinet, chosen by the Bishop, shall serve along with a like committee from the North Texas Conference as a coordinating policy committee of the area to work with the Area Executive Secretary.

II. Boards, Commissions and Committees

6. Nominations

The District Superintendents at the beginning of the quadrennium shall nominate the members of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Teller, and shall provide mimeographed copies of such nominations for mailing by the Conference Secretary to all lay and clerical members of the Annual Conference one week prior to the election of the Boards, Commissions, Standing Committees and Tellers," provided that no person may be nominated no more than one Board, Commission, or Committee which must meet regularly during the session of the Annual conference, except where the Discipline provides for membership because of an office held. This rule is not applicable to the District and Associate District Lay Leaders, nor Committee on Investigation. The District Superintendents shall also nominate at the end of any normal term members of any Board, Commission, or Committee.

"All Quadrennial Boards, Commissions and Standing Committees shall meet within thirty days of adjournment of the Annual Conference at a time and place designated by the Bishop and the Cabinet for the purpose of organization and briefing. Notice of this meeting for organization and briefing shall be mailed to each member of each Board, Commission and Committee by the Conference Secretary at least ten days prior to the meeting."

All executive secretaries of the boards and agencies of the Annual Conference, beginning in 1965, shall be limited to a term of eight years.

The above rule shall not apply to the office of Conference Secretary-Treasurer.

7. Eligibility

The period of eligibility of membership on the Boards, Committees, and Commissions of the Annual Conference shall not exceed two consecutive quadrenniums, a total of eight years, except as set out below. When a person is elected to fill an unexpired term, he shall be given an expiration date for the end of the quadrennium that is not less than six years nor more than nine years in the future.

A member who has served two full quadrenniums on any Board, Commission, or Committee shall not be eligible for membership on the same Board, Commission, or Committee until a full quadrennium has passed. If a member has served less than two full quadrenniums, he shall be eligible again for membership after one full Conference Year has passed.

In appointing new Quadrennial Boards, Commissions, and Committees, the Cabinet shall have the power to appoint new members for only four years, in order to equalize the number who are eligible to serve four years with those eligible to serve eight years.

Nevertheless, the above shall not apply to membership on the Board of Lay Activities as it relates to the nomination of a Conference lay leader. A Conference Lay Leader is eligible for a term of no more than eight consecutive years.

Employees and Trustees of institutions, or employees of Conference Boards and Commissions, shall not be eligible for membership on the Board, Commission, or Committee through which financial support is derived. This shall not apply to membership on the Commission on World Service and Finance, except in cases in which a Board receives direct appropriation of funds from Conference Benevolences budget or other funds allocated by the Commission.

The appointment of any member of the Conference to the District Superintendentcy shall automatically vacate his membership on any of the quadrennial Boards, Commissions, or Examining Committees to take effect at the time of his appointment, except where the Discipline makes them members of an Annual Conference Board, Commission, or Committee. The Bishop is asked to notify such group in time to fill the vacancy before the conference adjourns.

8. Vacancies

Vacancies on all Boards, Commissions, and Committees occurring during the quadrennium shall be filled by nominations of the Board, Commission, or Committee concerned, and elected by the Conference.

Retirement from the active itineracy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board or Commission and on all Institutional Boards, effective on the date such relationship is taken.

Boards, Commissions and Institutions related to the Annual Conference shall not take any action that in effect shall nullify this rule.

Any member of a Quadrennial Board absent without excuse from two consecutive meetings of the Board shall thereby forfeit membership on said Board.

III. Financial

9. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1st to December 31st, and salaries of clerical members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.

10. Remittances

Remittances from a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Commission on World Service and Finance. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which remittance is made. The Conference Treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the District Superintendent for each remittance. The Pastor shall enclose the annual statement of receipts as issued by the Conference Treasurer, corrected if necessary, with the church's Annual Conference report as verification of items reported in Table II.

11. Requests for Appropriations

At the beginning of the paragraph in the report of any board, commission, committee or agency, which presents a proposed budget or asking as an appropriation from Conference Benevolences, or any other conference fund, there shall be printed the following statement: "The board (commission, committee, or agency) has presented to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for their consideration and recommendation to the Annual Conference, the following askings:"

12. Apportionments

The apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be based on the total money raised (item 69 in Report to Annual Conference) less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness ((item 30 in Report to Annual Conference), less the amount paid for building and improvements (item 31 in the Report to Annual Conference.) and less the amount paid for General and Conference Advance Specials (item 53 and 62 in Report to Annual Conference.) It shall be the duty of the Commission on World Service and Finance to compute the appropriations annually, using the statistics of the last published journal (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. The district apportionments shall be distributed to the local churches by the district superintendent and the district stewards.

13. Annual Audit

The Auditing Committee appointed by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall audit all books of Treasurers of Boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Discipline, and report the results to the Commission on World Service and Finance, which Commission will send a statement of these audits to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.

Annually, each Board or special interest, shall make request to the Commission on World Service and Finance, for any Special Day offering, except where set by the Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed Conference Calendar unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit including current annual income and expense together with its report, to the appropriate Board.

14. Special Days and Campaigns

Any request from a Board or institution or special interest of the Methodist Church asking for a special campaign for funds or a Special Day Offering shall first be presented to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study and recommendation. If such recommendation is made to the Annual Conference it must show that the detailed use of funds is reasonable; and that proper safeguards have been set up for the use of funds.

Any recommendation from a Board, Commission, or Committee, including the Commission on World Service and Finance, asking for an increase that will effect the Budget of the local church, if approved, shall become effective at the beginning of the next fiscal year, January 1st.

IV. Administrative**15. Conference Secretary-Treasurer**

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Commission on World Service and Finance after consulting with the Bishop and his Cabinet.

The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be under the supervision of the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. He shall also serve as the Treasurer for the Board of Pensions and the Commission on Minimum Pastoral Support.

The term of office of the Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily be a quadrennium and a newly elected Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily assume his official duties at the session following the General Conference.

16. District Conference

The District Conference, where held, shall be composed of the ex-officio members as provided in the latest Discipline, and one delegate for every 100 members or two-thirds fraction thereof, provided that every Church shall have at least one delegate. District Conference records, where kept, are not to be reported to the Annual Conference session.

17. Reports

The reports of the pastors to Annual Conference (Tables I and II) and the annual statement of receipts as issued by the Conference Treasurer shall be presented at a district meeting to be held in January. The Conference Statistician shall set the time and place for the district meetings, and shall appoint a District Statistician for each district, who shall receive, edit and compile the churches' statistical reports into the district report. The District Statistician shall forward the district statistical tables to the Conference Statistician within one week after the district meeting. No change in the statistical tables will be made after the district meeting.

Each District Superintendent shall report to the Cabinet and to the Board of Pensions, any church in the district that has borrowed money to pay either the pastor's salary, percentage items, or World Service askings for the year closing. The amount borrowed must be made a part of the record.

He shall also indicate any such situations that occur the year previous that came to his attention during the year, and had not been reported.

18. Conference Procedure

Lay members and alternate lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected at the Charge Conference and the term shall begin at the opening of

the next regular session of the Annual Conference and continue until the opening of the next regular session of the Annual Conference.

All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference, which pertain to the work of one of the Conference Boards, Commissions, or Committees shall be referred to the proper Board, Commission, or Committee for review, before action shall be taken by the Annual Conference.

All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports, not included in the Pending Report book, coming to the Conference, must be typewritten in triplicate, and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the Secretary before they are presented to the Conference. It is strongly recommended that any reports, requiring approval of the Annual Conference, not in the Pending Report Book, be mimeographed for members of the conference that they may follow the report as it is being read.

All bonds required by the law of The Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference, shall be filed with the Secretary of the Conference.

19. Conference Expense

The Committee on Conference Entertainment, appointed quadrennially, shall be charged with the details of expenses of holding the Annual Conference, and entertainment of retired ministers.

Each charge in the Annual Conference is expected to defray the expense of its minister and lay delegate while in attendance upon the Conference.

Per diem allowance will be granted pastors receiving a total salary of, or less than, the amount recommended year by year by the Committee on Conference Entertainment and approved by the Annual Conference.

20. Car Expense

For the quadrennium 1968-1972, all Boards, Commissions, and Committees of the Conference shall allow six cents per mile car expense, or eight cents when two or more members ride in the same car, for necessary travel within the Conference or adjacent territory. Five cents per mile shall be allowed for out of the state travel. Members of Conference Agencies are urged to use car pools wherever possible.

21. Memoirs

There shall be a permanent Committee on Memoirs composed of the Secretary of the Conference and the Secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of deceased ministers, and the wives or widows of ministers. The minister in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing with the committee immediately after the funeral.

22. Amendments

Any of the above rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference.
