CALLED SESSION Of The Central Texas Annual Conference January 7, 1978

Opening Worship — The Called Session of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church, met at First United Methodist Church, Fort Worth, Texas at 10:00 a.m. Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe, presided.

Organization of Conference — J. W. Sprinkle, Conference Secretary made recommendations and nominations for the secretarial staff: Rolls - Walter Black and Mike McKee; Daily Proceedings - Paul Wiseman and Charles Rice; Committee on Minutes - Kay Cottingham, Henry Radde, Jan Rhinefort and Luther Henry.

Harris Hospital - Resolution concerning Harris Hospital refinancing Present debts, financing, modernization and improvements and changes in By-Laws and Charters - Judson A. Cramer, Chairman of the Board of Harris Hospital introduced the report.

He presented Ron Smith, Executive Director of the Hospital, who presented the plans for renovation and remodeling of the hospital. He presented a slide tour of the hospital and its facilities

Sproesser Wynn, Attorney for the Board, presented a review of the laws concerning taxexempt financing.

Barry Bailey, member of the Board of Harris Hospital - Methodist presented the Resolution and changes in the By-Laws and Charter and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (see reports).

Missional Priorities Update: Ethnic Minority Local Church - Marjorie Burns, Chairperson of Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force, introduced the report and led in its presentation. She presented the following persons who spoke to the report: Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe, Nelda Barrett, Diaconal Trainee, Gary Whitbeck and James Porter. James Porter introduced a recommendation regarding the ethnic minority missional priority in this Central Texas Conference (see report).

Evangelism Missional Priority - H. F. Meier, Jr. and Bob Evans lifted up this priority and

announced up coming training workshops in Evangelism.

World Hunger Missional Priority - James Shuler spoke to this Missional Priority. He presented Don Kelley who presented a recommendation to the Conference regarding our participation in W.H.E.A.T. (World Hunger Education Action Together). He moved that the Central Texas Annual Conference affirm, cooperate with and participate in the organization of W.H.E.A.T. It was adopted.

1977 Finances - J. W. Sprinkle, Conference Treasurer, reported that the Central Texas Conference paid every apportioned item in full for 1977.

Conference Hospitalization Program - J. W. Sprinkle reported on the status of the Conference insurance program.

Credit Union - J. W. Sprinkle reported on the activity and status of the Credit Union.

1978 Annual Conference - Bishop Stowe announced the date and place of our 1978 Annual Conference Session will be June 4-7 in Fort Worth.

Resolution Concerning Harris Hospital Refinancing Present Debts And Financing Modernization And Improvements

1. Whereas, historically in America most critical hospital services have been provided by church sponsored non-profit, charitable hospitals; and

2. Whereas, the Methodist Church (now the United Methodist Church) has always been in

the forefront in sponsoring such services for ministering to the sick without regard to race or creed; and

- 3. Whereas, the Congress of the United States has for decades assisted the non-profit, charitable, church-sponsored hospitals by recognizing them as exempt charitable operations, exempt from payment of income tax and to which gifts and bequests are deductible for income and estate tax purposes, respectively; and
- 4. Whereas, the added importance of the availability of hospital services provided by such non-profit hospitals was further recognized by Congress some 25 years ago when Hill Burton Federal monies were provided for enlargement and improvement of such hospitals; and
- 5. Whereas, with the advent of Medicare and Medicaid the Federal Government has relied more and more on such hospitals to provide the hospital services directly and indirectly guaranteed to Senior Citizens and to the indigent by the Federal Government; and
- 6. Whereas, some six years ago the Treasury Department of the U.S. Government took the position that the furnishing of hospital services to the public by non-profit hospitals at cost constituted charitable operations, even if no "free" services were provided, and the U.S. Supreme Court later agreed; and
- 7. Whereas, for the last few years the Congress of the United States has been seriously considering various suggested forms of National Health Insurance, and most responsible organizations (including the American Hospital Association and the American Medical Association) now concede that within the near future we will have some form of National Health Insurance, and the Federal Government (and the public) will be even more dependent on church-related non-profit hospitals for hospital services for the public; and
- 8. Whereas, the present administration in Washington has indicated a request for what it calls a hospital "cost containment" law, or possibly H.E.W. regulations effectuating the same results, which is to place a ceiling on hospital charges, and if this is done hospitals with conventional loans (bearing higher interest rates) will probably be at a disadvantage as compared to hospitals with tax-free loans (bearing tax-free and hence lower interest rates); and
- 9. Whereas, Public Hospitals, like Hospital "Districts," have always enjoyed both the advantages of (1) taxing power, and (2) tax-free financing; and
- 10. Whereas, recognizing that non-profit hospitals, even though not government owned and operated, have been and are and increasingly will be performing a necessary public function and meeting a public need, the U.S. Treasury Department ruled (some three years ago) that if States would pass entity to actually issue the notes or bonds, that such non-profit hospitals could refinance their outstanding debts and could finance their future enlargements, improvements and/or modernization through tax exempt revenue notes or bonds, the same as has been permitted for public (government owned and operated) hospitals; and
- 11. Whereas, the Texas Legislature (like those of most other states) promptly passed the Hospital Project Financing Act permitting non-profit hospitals (even though church sponsored) to refinance their present debts and to finance their enlargement, improvements and/or modernization with tax exempt revenue notes or bonds to be approved by the Attorney General like other public notes or bonds, and to be issued by "Hospital Authorities" that the law in Texas had already provided could be created by any Texas county or by any Texas city (or group of Texas cities), the exact mechanism being to put technical title to the hospital property in the Authority at the time it issues the notes or bonds, for the Authority to contract with the hospital non-profit corporation to continue to operate the hospital and retire the notes or bonds as they mature out of hospital revenues, and for the title to then revert to the non-profit hospital corporation when the notes or bonds are paid; and
- 12. Whereas, most of the non-profit hospitals in most other states have been or are presently financing and refinancing their debts for past and future enlargements and improvements by like tax-free financing (the interest being free of income tax to the holder

such as are interest payments on municipal bonds and on public hospital bonds), which, in effect, constitutes a further federal (IRS) assistance to these hospitals; and

- 13. Whereas, Harris Hospital (which is the property of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church in Fort Worth) has outstanding long term debts (both conventional and government guaranteed) totaling about eight million dollars (presently secured by deeds of trust and mortgage liens on its main hospital properties), and needs about thirteen million dollars of new and additional financing in order to modernize and comply with all present accrediting requirements and to provide the best possible hospital services to the people served by it; and
- 14. Whereas, at the request of Harris Hospital and other non-profit private (mostly church sponsored) hospitals in Tarrant County, the Commissioner's Court (the governing body) of Tarrant County has created the Tarrant County Hospital Authority for the primary purpose of enabling Harris Hospital and other non-profit tax exempt hospitals in Tarrant County to refinance their present long term debts and to finance their future enlargements and improvements with tax-free revenue bonds or notes as permitted by present U. S. Treasury Department rulings and under the Texas Hospital Project Financing Act; and
- 15. Whereas, such tax-free note or tax-free bond financing results in an interest rate some 2 to 3% below the interest rate that would be required by conventional financing, which, over a period of 20 years could mean a savings of some 5 to 6 million dollars in interest on the funds needed by Harris Hospital—savings to the hospital and hence savings to the patients; and
- 16. Whereas, the Board of Trustees (the Governing Board) of Harris Hospital has determined that such tax-free method of financing and refinancing is the preferable and the most desirable means of meeting the needs of the sick and maimed of the area served by such hospital; and
- 17. Whereas, bond counsel has advised that such bonds or notes; if issued in accordance with the Texas Hospital Financing Act will in fact and law be tax-free bonds or notes and the tax-free interest rate will be applicable, and that responsible brokerage firms have agreed to underwrite such issue if made by the Tarrant County Hospital Authority in behalf of Harris Hospital, and the Tarrant County Hospital Authority has agreed to issue such bonds or notes if so requested for the financing and improvement of Harris Hospital, and indications are that due to the fine record made by Harris Hospital in its operations over the years, such revenue bonds to be repaid by and under operation of Harris Hospital will receive a high rating (and hence a low interest rate) by the rating agencies; and
- 18. Whereas, the method (the legal steps) of such tax-free financing varies in form (but not in substance) from conventional financing (a conveyance of title with reverter when the debt is paid, as distinguished from a conventional deed of trust—a conveyance much like a mortgage to be cancelled or released when the debt is paid); and
- 19. Whereas, while only 21 million dollars is needed for the new financing and refinancing, but on a public issue like is contemplated an additional 3 million dollars of bonds is actually issued and sold, the proceeds of which excess is not spent, but held in escrow or reserve and invested as an additional security factor for early interest and early maturity safety purposes (actually the earned income on this invested reserve is expected to exceed the interest incurred on it), but the 21 million present limit by this Conference on Harris' long term debt will be technically exceeded by this additional excess which, though not to be spent, will be technically outstanding as long term debt; and
- 20. Whereas, Harris Hospital has guaranteed certain specific financing of the Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospital which is a non-profit affiliate of Harris Hospital, controlled by the Harris Hospital Governing Board and hence by this Annual Conference, which guarantee involves a million dollars of secondary liability only; and
- 21. Whereas, the Hospital's Board of Trustees has requested the Bishop to call a special meeting of the Conference to decide whether Harris Hospital will be permitted to follow this tax-free (interest) method to finance and refinance as above outlined since (1) the conveyance with reverter is technically different from a mortgage or deed of trust, and (2) the actual amount of bonds to be issued will technically exceed the present twenty-one

million limit heretofore set by the Conference, and the secondary liability mentioned in the preceding paragraph relating to the guarantee of specific H-E-B borrowings could also be regarded as long term debt involving up to another million; and

- 22. Whereas, the Conference has considered the matters above related and finds:
- (a) that although the legal instruments constitute a different form than heretofore employed, the substance is the same—if the hospital pays off the bonds, its property will belong to it free and clear when they are paid under either the tax-free or the conventional method; but if the hospital defaults, it could lose its property under either method:
- (b) that while there will be about twenty-four million dollars in bonds outstanding, yet the hospital will only receive twenty-one million with which to finance and refinance, and will really only have to repay a net of twenty-one million plus interest from its revenues, the three million reserve being held in escrow or reserve for safety as above related, and available to invest costing no net interest in the meantime;
- (c) that the relationship between Harris Hospital and the Central Texas Annual Conference, after conveyance of title to such hospital authority, will remain unchanged as to election of trustees, management, operations or otherwise; and
- (d) that the proposed lease contract between the Hospital Authority and the hospital should be approved, and that the Bishop should appoint a committee to negotiate such further minor changes or modifications of the lease contract, if any, as may be required:
- 23. IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED that the method of financing and refinancing at tax-free interest rates above outlined and as recommended by the Harris Hospital governing board, involving a technical transfer of title to the Authority while the bonds are outstanding, be and the same is hereby approved, and that the long term debt limit be increased to an amount not to exceed twenty-five million dollars so as to accommodate the reserve or escrow requirements and the contingent liability above outlined; and
- 24. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the proposed lease contract between the Hospital Authority and the Hospital be and the same is hereby approved and the Bishop is requested to appoint a committee to be available to approve any further minor changes or modifications should they be indicated; and

25. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

- (a) That the recognition by the Federal and State governments that church-related charitable hospitals are performing a necessary public function is to be appliated;
- (b) that the prompt action by the Texas Legislature in permitting non-profit hospitals in Texas to reduce their cost of funds borrowed for hospital projects is appreciated;
- (c) That the cooperative action of the Tarrant County Commissioner's Court in creating a County Hospital Authority to assist the private non-profit hospitals of the County to finance and refinance their necessary expansion and improvements with tax-free borrowings and the appointment of knowledgeable leading citizens to comprise its Board is appreciated;
- (d) That the cooperative action of the Tarrant County Hospital Authority in having expressed its willingness and intent to follow the required procedure and issue such bonds for the purpose of refinancing Harris Hospital's present long-term debts and providing funds for the enlargement and improvement of its hospital facilities is appreciated;
- (e) That the stewardship, leadership, and judgment shown by the Harris Hospital Board of Trustees over the years in developing and guiding the largest hospital in Tarrant County to its present state, and in planning an even brighter future for it is appreciated.

Recommendations To The Called Session Of The Annual Conference January 7, 1978

- We recommend that the Annual Conference combine the General Advance Special for Ethnic Minority Local Church and the Conference Advance Special for Ethnic Minority Local Church for the purposes of promotion, with monies to be divided equally between the two.
- 2. We further recommend that the Conference adopt a combined Advance Special for the Ethnic Minority Local Church in the amount of \$62,000 annually with the Conference portion of the monies received being allocated for salary supplement, for church development and extension, and for scholarships.
- 3. We recommend that the Committee on Education and The Advance of the Board of Global Ministries administer the funds. To secure funds, districts, local churches and/or Conference organizations should make application to the Committee on Education and The Advance.

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

The Administration of Lydia Patterson has shown itself to be prudent, able and committed to Christ and The Mission of United Methodism. Any implication that our conference and its local churches have done more than enough in the financial support of Missions is erroneous, for last year for/every dollar we spent in benevolent causes we spent \$5.88 on our own churches and ministers. When we have reached near the bottom of all conferences of the Jurisdiction in financial support of Lydia Patterson we ought to be looking for what we can do rather than speaking of what we cannot do.

A. PROCEDURES FOR ENTRANCE INTO PROBATIONARY MEMBERSHIP IN THE CENTRAL TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Candidate must complete Candidate for Ministry Studies and have been a candidate for one year prior to being eligible for probationary membership, unless in Seminary prior to January 1, 1977, or had completed the studies for license to preach by the same date.

The Candidate must have met the education requirements under paragraph 415 and 416 of the 1976 Book of Discipline before the application can be considered. A complete transcript of college and/or Course of Study work must accompany the application.

The Candidate must submit the response to question 7 (page 177 and following to paragraph 415, pages 177-178) of the 1976 Book of Discipline. Write the question before giving response. This will be typewritten and double spaced.

The Candidate must be recommended in writing on the basis of a three-fourths majority vote of their District Committee on Ordained Ministry. The Candidate should consult with the District Superintendent to insure that a letter of recommendation has been sent to the Registrar of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry by February 15.

The Candidate must present a satisfactory certificate of good health on the prescribed form obtained from the Registrar and filled out by the candidate and their physician. Everyone must have a chest X-ray and electrocardiogram. Females must also have a Pap Smear. Medical forms may be obtained from the Registrar. The Candidates will bear the cost of their physical examination.

The Candidate must send the Registrar a copy of a letter written to their Seminary in which they grant release for the Seminary to give any data the Board request concerning

Candidates must have completed psychological testing by December 15, under the supervision of Chaplain John W. Schaub. Details of fulfilling this requirement will be furnished upon request from Chaplain Schaub or The Registrar of the Board of the Ordained

The candidate must submit a completed, typed, application for Probationary Membership, using their full name and answering all questions on the application. Forms sent on request from the Registrar.

The Candidate must submit a sermon on a text prescribed by the Board of the Ordained Ministry on $8\frac{1}{2}$ x 11 paper, typewritten and double spaced. Type the text at the beginning of the sermon. The text changes each year and is furnished by the Registrar with the application.

The Candidate must submit their response to a problematic situation in ministry, typewritten and double spaced. A description of the situation is sent with the application. Attach the description to the response when returning to the Registrar.

The Candidate must have three (3) glossy print, wallet size, black/white photographs to be submitted with their application and a concise autobiographical statement concerning age, health, family, Christian experience, call to the ministry, educational record, formative Christian experiences, and plans for service in the Church written on the back of the application.

The Candidate must be present at the Board Spring Interview Retreat. Those persons who have met all of the required deadlines for the submission of their written work, health form and psychological testing will be notified by the Registrar of the time and place for the retreat. Excused absences can only be granted by the Chairman of the Board of the Ordained Ministry. Seminary students attending school out of the State of Texas should make special arrangements with the Chairman to set up their interview and their psychological testing before January 15.

The following must be on file with the Registrar by midnight, January 15:

- -Transcripts
- -Responses to Discipline questions
- -Health Form
- —Copy of letter to Seminary granting them release to give any data requested by the Board.

- -Verification that the candidate has met psychological testing procedures by December

Candidates' failure to meet the December and January 15 deadlines, will result in the application being delayed at least one year.

B. PROCEDURES FOR ENTRANCE INTO FULL CONNECTION MEMBERSHIP IN THE CENTRAL TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Candidate must meet the general requirements for admission as listed in the 1977 Book of Discipline, paragraph 421.

The Candidate must file an application for Full Connection with the Registrar of the Board of the Ordained Ministry. Accompanying the application must be a transcript of all Seminary and/or Course of Study work; two (2) glossy black and white, wallet size photographs, and a brief biographical statement typed on the back of the application.

The Candidate must answer questions listed under paragraph 421, (A-K) pages 183-184, of the 1976 Book of Discipline. The response is to be typed and double spaced, listing the question before giving the response.

The Candidate must submit a recent cassette tape of a sermon preached in a local church worship service. The candidate should advise the listener of the date the sermon was preached and its title.

The Candidate must also submit a written sermon on a text prescribed by the Board of the Ordained Ministry. This sermon will be typed, double spaced, on $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ paper. The text of the sermon should be typed at the beginning of the sermon. The sermon text changes each year. The text will be furnished when the Candidate makes request for application.

The Candidate must submit a response to the problematic situation in ministry. It must be typewritten, double spaced. A description of the situation will be sent with the application form.

The Candidate must submit a personal theological statement of at least 7-10 pages, typewritten, double-spaced, that reflects the Candidate's thorough study of pages 40-107 of the 1976 Book of Discipline.

The Candidate must submit a statement signed by a Bi-Polar instructor stating where and when he/she finished the Bi-Polar personal growth seminar.

All requirements listed above must be in the office of the Registrar of the Board of the Ordained Ministry by midnight, January 15, of the year the Candidate expects to be nominated for Full Connection to the Annual Conference.

The Candidate must be present at the Spring Interview Retreat. Excused absences can only be granted by the Chairman of the Board of the Ordained Ministry.

INTERNSHIP —

Upon approved action by the Annual Conference meeting in Waco, June 1976, those received into Probationary Membership in 1977 will be required to serve an internship before they can be admitted into Full Connection in the Annual Conference. Details of this requirement will be furnished to the Candidate upon request from the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, or Registrar of the Board of the Ordained Ministry. Also see the 1976 Conference Journal, pages 100-101.

The following must be on file with the Registrar by midnight, January 15; for those seeking Full Connection:

C. PROCEDURE FOR THOSE PERSONS REQUESTING CONTINUATION ON PROBA-TION

It shall be the responsibility of the Candidate to write the Registrar of the Board of the Ordained Ministry requesting the form for Continuation on Probation. Requests should not be mailed before January 15.

The Candidate must file a request for Continuation on Probation by February 1 of the year requested for continuation.

All Candidates in this classification will be present at the interview retreat in early March. Only the Chairman of the Board of the Ordained Ministry has the authority to excuse a Candidate from the retreat. In the case of out-of-state Candidates, they must make special arrangements with the Chairman for their interviews. It is suggested that these persons be in contact with the Chairman no later than January 1 to make the arrangements.

It shall be the responsibility of the Candidate to maintain a meaningful level of contact with his/her District Superintendent and the Board of the Ordained Ministry. Should special areas of personal or ministerial concern arise that would affect the Candidate's relationship to the Board of the Ordained Ministry, it is hoped that contact will be made with the Board in order that every possible means of help for the Candidate can be drawn upon.

Candidates for continuation will be notified of the time and place of the Spring Interview Retreat after the Candidate has returned the request form for that year.

D. PROCEDURE FOR THOSE PERSONS REQUESTING READMISSION TO PROBATIONARY MEMBERSHIP

Persons requesting readmission to Probationary Membership must meet the general requirements for readmission as listed in the 1976 Book of Discipline, paragraph 441.

Additionally, these persons must have on file a letter of recommendation from their District Committee on the Ordained Ministry, and be present at the Spring Interview Retreat with those requesting Continuation on Probation. The Board of the Ordained Ministry would also appreciate a letter from the District Superintendent giving their personal and professional appraisal of the Candidate under consideration.

Those seeking readmission to Probationary Membership should check with the Registrar of the Board of the Ordained Ministry to make sure they have met all the requirements prior to their interview.

E. GRANT-IN-AID MONEY

All persons eligible for Grant-In-Aid money shall fill out a request form obtained from either the Treasurer of the Board of the Ordained Ministry or the Registrar.

Grant-In-Aid money from the Central Texas Annual Conference will only be given those who are currently probationary members of the Conference or have applied for probationary membership. The Registrar of the Board of the Ordained Ministry must have a written request for Probationary Membership in the Central Texas Annual Conference on file before anyone is eligible for Grant-In-Aid money from the Ministerial Education Fund.

REPORT FROM COMMITTEE ON SEMINARY GUIDELINES (Reprint from 1976 Report)

We recommend that the Board of Ordained Ministry of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church follow guidelines set forth in the Discipline by recognizing and approving those seminaries accredited by the University Senate. (para. 1614, The Book of Discipline, 1976).

We further recommend that all persons planning to seek admission into the Central Texas Conference be counselled to give primary consideration to United Methodist Seminaries for their theological education. In the event a non-United Methodist seminary is being considered, it is necessary that the candidate consult the District Committee on the Ordained Ministry and the Conference Board of the Ordained Ministry for approval.

Report No. 5

(Approved June 5, 1978)

The Probationer Year:

The task is to implement the decision of the 1976 Annual Conference calling for a 12-month internship for all candidates for ministry within the Conference, beginning with those entering theological studies in 1976.

The goal of the program is to facilitate the total maturation and integration of the personal, spiritual and professional agenda of each probationer, with the expectation that such persons will be able to provide more competent leadership to the several congregations.

It is estimated that in June, 1979, the first year of implementation, 6 to 8 persons will be in the program. Probationers who have completed a 2-semester Perkins internship or equivalent internship, are exempt from most of the program. However, there will be aspects in which their participation will be required. Persons in the conference internship program will serve the internship in the church to which they are appointed. In Cooperation with the Cabinet and the Bishop, the Board will enlist the participation of a necessary number of pastors with a high degree of competency in the office of pastor and who have personal and spiritual strength and resources to permit a good supervisory relationship. The pastor-supervisor's appointment should be geographically near by the probationer's appointment for maximum supervision with the least travel time.

Expectations of Pastor-Supervisor

The pastor-supervisor will provide supervision of all aspects of the probationer's tasks and relationships. In addition, it is expected that the supervisor will provide a supervisory session of 1-1½ hours every other week, dealing with a reflection document written by the probationer about an act of ministry in which he/she has been engaged. This can take the shape of a verbatim, process note, critical incident, or other if so agreed upon. The purpose of this paper is not to deal with abstract issues but to deal with the actual practice of ministry, bringing to bear insight into the dynamics involved as well as dealing with Biblical and theological issues. Great care is to be given to the inner feeling of the probationer. Of the 26 maximum supervisory sessions, a total of 20 must be completed for the probationer year.

To assist the pastor-supervisor in this supervisory process, the board committee will provide:

- 1. All supervisors who have not served as field instructors of the Perkins Intern Program an intensive 2-3 day introduction to supervision, possibly at Perkins.
- 2. All supervisors a one-day bi-monthly peer group of all probationer supervisors. This peer group, with a consultant, will discuss supervision in general and the supervision of the probationer. In this manner, supervisors will be aided in gaining further skills in supervision.

Expectations of the Probationer Congregation

A person serving his/her probationer year internship is in a critical period of personal and professional formation. To assist the formation process, the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee or a specially constituted committee of the congregation (6-8 in number) should devote themselves regularly to the probationer. Aspects of this relationship might be:

- 1. Assisting the probationer in the entry to the congregation.
- 2. Working with the pastor and probationer in negotiating the probationer's Covenant of Expectations, including a well-defined job description.
- 3. Members of the committee must make special efforts to familiarize themselves with the probationer as a person and in his/her functioning as a pastor.
- 4. The committee should meet at least monthly with the pastor-supervisor and probationer for feedback and consultative dialogue.
- 5. The committee must participate in the diagnostic evaluations in October. Both essay and prepared instruments will be used. This evaluation will include also the session's findings in conversation with consultant, pastor and probationer.
- 6. On the basis of the diagnostic findings, the committee will assist pastor-supervisor and probationer in renegotiating the Covenant of Expectations and the job description.
- 7. The Committee, with the pastor-supervisor and consultant, will conduct an oral examination of the probationer in March. The District Superintendent and Board of Ministry representative will be present for this process.
- 8. On the basis of the above, the chairman of the committee will write a report to the Board of Ministry on the probationer's year. This report will be one source of information which the Board or its respective committee will use in formulating its recommendation to the Annual Conference relative to election to full membership and elders' orders.

Expectations of the District Superintendent

The District Superintendent is encouraged to relate in every possible way to the probationer member. Since the probationer will be under episcopal appointment, the District Superintendent will have supervisory responsibility to the probationer as to every other pastor in the District. The probationer shall be expected to be in attendance at all District meetings. It is recommended that the probationer not be called upon for major leadership responsibility in the District. The District Superintendent is asked to explain the role and authority of the Pastor-Supervisor to the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.

What Is Expected of the Probationer?

- The probationer will serve his probationary year wherever the Bishop may appoint him/her. The probationer will be consulted but he/she may not have veto rights over the Cabinet decision. The executive committee of the Board or an appropriate probationer committee will be available for consultation with the Cabinet in making probationer appointments.
- 2. The probationer is expected to enter into his/her probationary year in good faith and apply him/herself fully. Such application will include:
 - a. the negotiation of the Covenant of Expectations and the job description.
 - b. the disciplined writing of clinical documents.
 - c. full participation in the supervisory sessions.

- d. regular participation in the peer group meetings with the consultant and such Conference leadership as may be determined.
- e. full entry into the relationship with the lay committee.
- f. full participation in the diagnostic feedback process.
- g. full participation in the oral examination at year's end.

Every effort will be made to facilitate the spouse of the probationer to learn how to function in a positive and creative manner as the spouse of a professional person in ministry. If possible, a spouse peer group may be created. Such a group may have various professional leadership at its disposal.

What Is Expected of the Consultant?

A consultant in human relations is to be provided for the probationer peer group and supervisors.

- 1. The consultant will meet with the probationers for a monthly 6-8 hour inclusive Interpersonal Relations Workshop. Such workshops are to focus also on feelings.
- 2. It is recommended that the consultant will meet for one day bi-monthly with the pastor-supervisors for supervision and skill training.
- 3. The consultant will participate in the October diagnostic process and the March oral examination.
- 4. The consultant will prepare a written recommendation to the Board as to the probationer's election to membership and elder's orders.

What Is Expected of The Board?

The Board will create a Probationer Committee of nine persons to provide overall management of the system. It is recommended that one of the Perkins Intern staff members or other qualified person, be retained as consultant to the committee.

The committee will consult with the Cabinet to reach agreement on pastor-supervisors.

The chairman or designated member of the committee, with the respective District Superintendents, will negotiate the participation of congregations and pastors.

The committee will contract with:

- a. Perkins or other qualified personnel, for new supervisor training.
- b. the consultant for probationer and supervisor peer processes as earlier defined.

The committee will be responsible for from three to five one-day seminars, perhaps in conjunction with probationer peer groups, at which times the probationers will receive thorough training and indoctrination on all aspects of the Conference's life and work. All probationers, including those who have completed their internship, while in seminary, and who are serving their final year before admittance into full conference membership, will participate in the seminars. Among the concerns may be:

- a. Seminar with the Bishop and Cabinet
- b. A seminar with the Conference Council staff on Conference program
- Seminars as needed on all of the institutional ministries of the Conference. Field trips may be desirable.
- d. C.C.F.A. orientation on all apportionments.
- e. Seminar with Board of Ministry, dealing with development of a continuing education program, sharpening of skills, as well as membership and orders.

A member of the committee should visit in each placement in early September to check out progress.

The committee should have a copy of the probationer's Covenant and job description (for each probationer).

A member of the committee should participate in both the diagnostic and oral examination procedures.

What the Perkins Staff Might Contribute

It is recommended that a Perkins Intern staff member or other qualified person, be retained by the Board as consultant to the committee. Such a consultant might:

- help the committee in conceptualizations and adaptations, as well as critical quality control factors
- b. be a trainer for the Counseling Elder in the managerial control responsibility
- c. participate in the diagnostic process
- d. be a consultant to the committee in consideration of individual decisions on probationers.

The material for the development of the probationer Covenant of Expectations and job description and the basic diagnostic instruments will be obtained from Perkins.

Report No. 6

(Approved June 5, 1978)

Committee on Enlistment and Recruitment

The work of this committee has been utilized in one primary event this past year. The event was the Bishop's Conference on Christian Ministries held at Glen Lake on March 11. With joint sponsorship with the Board of Diaconal Ministries, much emphasis was given to approximately one hundred young persons regarding the possibility of ministry for their lives. Both ordained and diaconal possibilities were lifted up and discussions were held for ten different areas of ministry. Dr. James Hares and Ms. Marjorie Power presented a biblical span of ministry dealing with the patriarchs in general and men and women in particular. Several colleges and seminaries presented their programs and Nelda Barrett presented an audio visual view of several diaconal ministers at work within the Conference. Bishop Stowe led the group in worship with an emphasis upon God's call in our lives.

One additional work of this committee has been the preparation and distribution of visual steps and requirements into both ordained and diaconal ministry.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

Report #1

(Approved June 5, 1978)

The church is mission and ministry. This ministry is derived from the life of Jesus Christ. The Church and all its members have a part in this commitment to and responsibility for ministry in the life of the congregation and in the wider reaches of the world. Consecration to the Office of Diaconal Minister is the church's recognition of God's call, the individual's response to that call, and the authorization of such persons for designated service and ministry.

The Office of Diaconal Minister in the United Methodist Church has its origin in the biblical and historical Christian heritage, in the theological understandings of ministry, and in the outreach of the church beyond the local congregation. It is an integral part of the total ministry of the church with a recognized relationship to the Annual Conference and receives the appropriate benefits such a relationship makes possible.

The root meaning of the word "diaconal" is service — from the Greek word "diakonia." The diaconal minister is a serving minister — one who performs ministries of service — usually beyond the altar of the church. "Deacons" were the first order of "minister" to emerge in the early church and continued as a separate and distinctive office. The United Methodist Church has — in the tradition of the early church — returned to the original meaning of diaconal ministry and now offers a vehicle through which persons engaged today in a genuine ministry can be recognized.

This concept of ministry lends strength to an already vital mission. Through the joining of the diaconal and ordained ministries in a truly team effort the love of God as revealed in Jesus Christ will become an even greater reality in our communities. As the Apostle Paul reminds us, we do not all have the same gifts but all are needed. Just as ordained clergy cannot function in a vacuum, neither can the diaconal minister — and neither can be successful without the lay persons who make up the United Methodist Church.

The Board of Diaconal Ministery has responsibility for the persons who are consecrated into the Office of Diaconal Minister and those persons who are in process — persons that the church has recognized as having accepted God's call and has authorized to specialized diaconal ministries of love, justice, and service. It provides for those persons a support system, both personal and professional. The Board is also charged with the responsibility of assessing the needs of Conference for diaconal ministers as well as those needs of the church as a whole; to interpret and promote understanding of Diaconal Ministry and of the Office of the Diaconal Minister; to enlist and recruit persons for diaconal ministries; and to provide guidance and support for persons in preparation for Diaconal Ministry.

In 1977 the Registrar and the Board Interview Committee up-dated all records of those transferring into the Diaconal relationship from the status of Lay Worker, those in preparation, and those persons needing to renew certification. At this time the Conference Journal lists seventeen (17) persons as Diaconal Ministers. There are 10 other professionally certified, but not consecrated persons in the Conference and eight prospects in training for the diaconal relationship.

The Board has developed a policy for continuing education and a process for review of application for the funds that have been allocated for that purpose.

It is also important that the Board of Diaconal Ministry and the Board of Ordained Ministry maintain a working relationship at the Annual Conference level in order to provide the necessary support for all the professional ministries of the Conference. Particular areas of mutual responsibility for the two Boards should include interpretation, evaluation, support of the professional ministries of the church, relationships with the local church pastor on staff-parish relations or employing agencies, Conference relationships, continuing education, and employment support including salary, pension, insurance, and other benefits. The two Boards have met together to discuss areas of cooperative effort and mutual concern. They jointly sponsored the Conference on Ministry held at Glen Lake in March of 1978.

Diaconal Board Members as well as Diaconal Ministers themselves, have had opportunities to interpret the Diaconal Ministry to groups in local churches and on college campuses. The Board is now working on a brochure that will assist with interpretation.

The Committee on Support Systems is also vital not only so that persons working in the Conference are aware of benefits offered, but that the Conference continues to upgrade benefits in line with its obligations to professionals by working closely with pastor-parish committees or employing agencies concerning employment benefits, as well as entry and exit procedures.

The Board of Diaconal Ministry is pleased with the progress that we feel has been made. We would like to also thank the Central Texas Annual Conference for its support. As professionals in ministry we pledge you our support in return.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Report No. 1

(Approved June 5, 1978)

As of January, 1978, membership in United Methodist Women of Central Texas Conference stood at 10,538 with a total of 228 local units. Funds sent to the Women's Division last year totaled \$146,711.

A conference newsletter sent to all local officers and included in the coordinated mailing is a new venture. The response to the first edition has been so positive that two additional issues are planned for 1978.

In March, members of the Executive Committee accompanied staff of the Women's Division on a six day itineration of the conference. The purpose was to talk with local women, some of whom never get to district and conference meetings. It was an opportunity to clarify our commitment to mission, to interpret the meaning of ministries to women and children, and to discuss points of controversy.

Because of our concern for the quality of mission education, we have searched for ways in which the School of Christian Mission can best meet the needs of this conference. That search has brought us to the decision to hold the School of 1978 in the locale where most of our constituency lives. It will be held on the campus of Texas Wesleyan College and Polytechnic United Methodist Church. The weekday session is July 12-14. The weekend session is July 15-16.

For the first time, child care is being provided the children of parents who attend. We are indebted to the staff of Polytechnic Methodist Church for making personnel and facilities available to us. Children from two months of age to those who have completed the fifth grade will be accepted. The program will provide supervision and lunch for all ages as well as study and field trips for older children.

Information on the school has been sent to every local officer and pastor. Further information will be available at the display at the site of Annual Conference and through the pages of the Texas United Methodist Reporter.

The three topics of study this year are:

Covenant Living in Times of Change — "... to understand ourselves as a covenant people in relation to the world but not of the world, set apart, yet servant."

Revelation — "To examine Revelation in the cultural and religious context from which it came and to relate its content to contemporary culture and religion."

Contemporary China — "To explore the significance of the China event in light of the Christian gospel and its concern for human welfare."

To conserve energy, encourage fellowship, and meet the needs of those who do not wish to drive in Fort Worth, we suggest to persons and churches with vans or buses that they make known to neighboring churches the availability of such vehicles so that no one is deprived of the experience of School of Christian Mission for lack of transportation.

Attendance at our Annual Meeting of 1977 set a record for recent years. But we anticipate an even larger crowd next October 7, 1978, when we meet at Central United Methodist Church in Fort Worth. Our speaker will be the Associate General Secretary of the Women's Division, Ms. Theressa Hoover.

About 30 women of Central Texas will attend the Assembly of United Methodist Women in Louisville, KY, April 27-30. It is a quadrennial event bringing women from around the world together for worship.

The Commission on Status and Role of Women continues to foster an awareness of issues, problems, and concerns related to the status and role of women with special reference to full participation of women in the total life of the church on all levels.

There has been publicity on audio-visuals available in the conference council office. Appropriate programs, seminars, workshops, and books which carry out the purpose of the commissions have been emphasized.

The seminar dealing with "Reality, Within Life Situations" which was cancelled due to bad weather has been rescheduled for September 9 at Glen Lake.

Support for outstanding work done by women in the conference has been noted.

At this time reports have been received that 30 churches have had women preaching in a major worship service. Some of these speakers were clergy women, lay speakers, and other capable dedicated women.

The goals for the 1978-1979 year are:

- 1. To do a survey to provide information on jobs and salaries of lay personnel in churches in the Central Texas Conference in order to develop guidelines for local church use.
- 2. To develop and initiate additional opportunities for women in the church, with organization based on needs and interest. Models and suggested programs could be provided, as well as resource persons to serve as consultants.
- 3. Continue to encourage invitations to women to fill the pulpit in a major worship service at least once in each church in 1979.

MISSIONAL PRIORITY TASK FORCE ON EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

(Approved June 5, 1978)

The "why" and "how to" of evangelism have received broad emphasis recently in publications and seminars. Leadership development events, mass rallies and specific training are scheduled frequently at all levels of the United Methodist Church. Some congregations are making significant progress toward understanding the tasks and possibilities which are theirs. Much of what has been accomplished has not yet become visibly evident nor statistically measurable, but this is sure to follow if our faithful efforts continue and increase.

Believing that most of us perform more carefully and more consistently when striving toward accepted objectives, the following challenges are proposed for the Central Texas Conference, all to be achieved by June 1, 1979.

- 1)Increase the total membership in local churches by 12,000; "4,000 by December 31, 1979; an additional 4,000 by December 31, 1980; and an additional 4,000 by December 31, 1981."
- 2) Receive 3,000 members into our churches by profession of faith.
- 3) Establish 400 new Sunday School classes in our congregations.
- 4) Attain 20% increase in Sunday School attendance.
- 5) Publish monthly progress reports in The Texas Methodist, listed by local churches and districts.

Each congregation is also urged to develop its own policies of discipling and timing, using whatever methods seem most suitable for meeting these challenges. Apparently no church is doing all within its power and potential to evangelize its community or city. This is our challenge for all of us to be much more intentional in our response to Jesus' great commission, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you . . ." (Matt. 28:19.20).

ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH PRIORITY TASK FORCE

Addendum No. 1

Although exciting and new things have been taking place in the Ethnic Minority Local Churches in our Conference, there is still much to be done.

As Central Texas United Methodists, we need to awaken to the physical and spiritual needs of a growing ethnic minority in our area. In Dallas-Fort Worth alone, there are some 20,000 Native Americans. Of that number, 3,000 live in the Fort Worth area and 50 families move in annually.

Also, with the increasing Chicano population in the Central Texas Conference, we need to develop awareness and sensitivity to their special concerns. We as a conference need to develop a trusting, working relationship with our sister conference — The Rio Grande Conference, always remembering that relationships take work and time to build. Relationships cannot begin with a paternalistic attitude that one conference is superior to another.

There is still a need for funds for building renovations. Even though some churches in urban areas have been renovated, there are churches in non-urban areas which need funds for renovations.

Ethnic minority churches in this conference have expressed the need for additional staff. One way of meeting this need is to train more diaconal people and identify persons who might be interested in other types of ministry.

As the United Methodist Church makes continued progress in the elimination of ethnic discrimination and racism within its organizational structures and institutions, the matter of "open itinerancy" seems to be one of the persistent unresolved issues. The question is, do we really believe in open pulpits? When we look around do we see an open system at work, or do we see men and women locked into or out of the appointive process? The issue must be faced. We must move in the direction of United Methodism's commitment to ethnic inclusiveness.

And finally, there is the need for a continued financial commitment of support of the Ethnic Minority Local Church. By supporting the Ethnic Minority Local Church through the Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority and Advance, the Church can advance to the forefront of creative action and join together as the inclusive Body of Christ that we are meant to be.

THE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

Report No. 1

The Commission on Religion and Race in the Conference continues to foster an awareness of issues, problems, and concerns related to ethnic minority constituency of the Central

Texas Annual Conference. New guidelines set forth in the Discipline (paragraph 254 & 436) call for each local church to have a chairperson of Religion and Race and each District to have a secretary of Religion and Race, therefore the Commission of Religion and Race structured a questionnaire which was sent to every District Superintendent to ascertain if this was being done.

The Commission has met several times during this past Conference year to acquaint the membership with their representatives of the purposes and functions of the Commissions of Religion and Race as outlined in the discipline.

This event which was planned for early fall of 1977 which staff persons from the General Commission on Religion and Race were to be invited to the Central Texas area to provide consultation for all local Church Religion and Race Chairpersons and District Secretaries, as well as other concerned members of the Conference, was cancelled due to calendar conflicts; however, it is recommended to do this early fall of 1978.

The Commission on Religion and Race strongly recommends an annual Harry Hoosier extravaganza during the month of August or September.

The purpose of such a meeting would be in accordance with paragraph 2002 of the Discipline. The Commission on Religion and Race of the Central Texas Annual Conference was represented by two (2) members who represented the Commission on Religion and Race and the Central Texas Annual Conference at the annual meeting of Black Methodist Church renewal in Jackson, Mississippi. The Annual Conference of Religion and Race is attempting to train the membership of the Commission whereby they may be better able to serve the Methodist Church.

The goals for the new year are:

- (1) Harry Hoosier extravaganza in the summer of 1979.
- (2) An ethnic minority preaching in each church during a major worship service in 1978-1979.
- (3) The development of multi-racial fellowship in all churches.
- (4) To continue to provide a channel of assisting the ethnic and racial groups as they seek to develop programs of empowerment and ministry to their community.

Wonders, retired from Department of Religion, TWC.

The Board of Church and Society has outlined for its 1979 program goals the following:

- 1. Continue the planning of and possible implementation of an event for the conference on Pre- and Post-Retirement.
- 2. Initiate necessary research and study of what role the conference could and/or should

play in the continuing problem of illegal aliens in Texas.

- 3. Promote the use of the prepared seminar kit on Divorce and Religion in the conference and nationally.
- 4. Seek for support statements of local districts for the agriculture (farm) crisis in America.
- 5. Reactivate the task force on TV violence for development of recommendations relative to the information researched.

The above goals of the board are as presented by the committees of the board: Committee on Emerging Social Issues, Committee on General Welfare, and Committee on Human Relations.

Goals of Committee on Ecumenical Affairs

- 1. To continue support of the Texas Conference of Churches and Texas IMPACT.
- 2. To contact ecumenical counterparts in our area.
- 3. To explore the possibility of non-metropolitan ecumenical parish.
- 4. To continue to monitor the St. Barnabas ecumenical project in Arlington.
- 5. To work toward getting \$10,000 of Central Texas Conference assets to be set aside for Central Texas Conference participation with other churches in an ecumenical drive to oppose the legalization of pari-mutuel wagering in the state of Texas at such time the next campaign is imminent.

Goals of Committee on Parish Development

HARRIS AND HURST-EULESS-BEDFORD HOSPITALS

Annual Reports

(Received June 6, 1978)

Harris Hospital-Methodist has, with the beginning of the Phase V construction program, adopted the theme: "A Great Medical Center For A Great City." While this is already a reality, the current and future plans of the Hospital will add tremendous dimensions to this great institution of healing.

THE CENTER . . .

Operating under the auspices of The Central Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, Harris Hospital-Methodist is governed by a 31 member Board of Trustees. The institution is a voluntary, charitable, not-for-profit corporation under the laws of the State of Texas; any excess of revenues over expenses must be reinvested in the Hospital and cannot be applied to an individual's gain.

In 1961, a significant event occurred at Harris Hospital-Methodist. The Hospital and neighboring Fort Worth Children's Hospital joined hands for sharing of services; and on March 26, 1963, they formed The Fort Worth Medical Center. Fort Worth Children's Hospital, a private, not-for-profit general hospital for children and young adults with over 100 beds, and Harris Hospital-Methodist exchange services as a means of eliminating duplication of buildings and equipment and as a means of providing better care for patients. A great medical center for one of the great cities of the State is now becoming a reality.

THE MAGNITUDE . . .

Harris Hospital-Methodist, Fort Worth Medical Center, is the largest health care facility in Tarrant County with 628 beds, 2100 employees and 502 physicians on the staff. We are the fifth largest employer in Tarrant County and our payroll returns some \$19,745,000 per year to our local economy.

THE SERVICES...

Harris Hospital-Methodist has become a highly specialized medical facility in family medicine, general surgery, neurosurgery, ophthalmology, otolaryngology, thoracic and cardiovascular surgery, orthopedic surgery, plastic and traumatic surgery, dental and oral surgery, internal medicine, pediatrics, dermatology, cardiology, radiology, neurology, obstetrics and gynecology, urology, anesthesiology, emergency medicine, and pulmonary medicine. These facilities are extended to all hospitals needing these services, and we are receiving referrals from thirteen which makes a total of some 2300 beds.

THE OUTREACH . . .

We have also launched a "satellite" program which is increasingly becoming a trend among the large hospitals of the nation. This plan aids and strengthens the small hospitals in outlying areas. The larger institution offers administrative guidance and expertise as well as specialized services, all of which greatly enhances their health care ministry in their respective communities. Harris Hospital-Methodist is now associated with two smaller hospitals — H.E.B. Hospital (Hurst-Euless-Bedford) and E.M.A.S.H. Hospital (Eagle Mountain Area Suburban Hospital) of Azle. We are the only hospital in the Conference engaged in this new "medical frontier," and through it we hope to increase our medical services to an ever-increasing area of Central Texas.

The three hospitals combined have a payroll of \$23,200,000, a budget of \$47,600,000, a total of 2,500 employees and 767 beds.

THE FUTURE IS NOW . . .

Through the generosity of philanthropic sources the ever-increasing capital equipment needs of the Medical Center can be met each year, while the retirement of the revenue bonds can be achieved through the normal operating revenue. The capital needs of all hospitals have sky-rocketed. For example, in 1970, an estimated \$30,000 in assets per hospital bed was the national average. In 1975 this had increased to \$60,000 per bed. Thus, the hospital must continue to be dependent on the generosity of Foundations, Corporations and individuals for the full implementation of the care and services it extends to the community. It takes in excess of \$1,000,000 per year to replace equipment and acquire the new technological advances that keep Harris Hospital-Methodist equal to the growing health demands of Tarrant County and the surrounding communities. Every individual can play an important part in the great future of The Fort Worth Medical Center through their Special (tax exempt) Gifts.

GIFTS TO HARRIS HOSPITAL-METHODIST...

Current gifts are applied to the equipment and physical expansion needs and the educational programs and are not used for operating expanses unless specifically so designated. Such gifts enable the hospital to purchase needed equipment and provide educational opportunities which are not in the yearly operating budget of Harris Hospital-Methodist. This type of financial support makes possible the continuing medical progress at Harris Hospital-Methodist. In the forty-eight years since it has been founded, such support has enabled the hospital to expand in keeping with the demands of patient care. Harris Hospital-Methodist strives to provide the finest in hospital and health care through its well trained, compassionate and experienced personnel, its continuing effort to keep pace through a planned expansion of its physical facilities, and providing to the patients, physicians and employees the most modern and up-to-date equipment available.

PHASE V MODERNIZATION AND RENOVATION PROJECT OF HARRIS HOSPITAL-METHODIST:

Harris Hospital-Methodist received a certificate of need from the Texas Health Facilities Commission for renovation and modernization of floors 1, 2, 3, and 4 on the north wings of the Hospital. In addition, the basement of the Jones Building in the Radiology Department will also be modernized. In January, 1978, the Tarrant County Hospital Authority sold revenue bonds for \$23,230,000 for the purpose of financing this renovation and modernization project at Harris Hospital-Methodist. The Harris Hospital-Methodist bonds received an A+rating. This financing had previously been approved by The Central Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church at a special meeting called in January, 1978. The Hospital currently has an application in process for a total body computed tomographic scanner for the Radiology Department. Rangaire Building Corporation of Fort Worth, Texas, has entered into a construction management contract with Harris Hospital-Methodist and will be responsible for managing, supervising, and carrying out the construction of the Phase V project. Construction began in February of 1978, and will require some 25 months for completion.

HARRIS HOSPITAL-METHODIST DEVELOPMENTS:

During the fiscal year, several steps were taken to more efficiently deliver care and extend services to the patient population. The cost identification program which was instituted three years ago was used to develop the budget for the fiscal year and to closely monitor daily operating expenses in each department. Through a rigorous cost consciousness program instituted in this fiscal year, Harris Hospital-Methodist was able to increase its excess of revenue over expenses from \$97,253 in fiscal year 1976 to \$2,154,963 in fiscal year 1977. Harris Hospital-Methodist also renewed its efforts in nurse recruitment in order to increase the employment of professional nurses registered in Texas. This program includes a nurse internship program for recent graduates as well as recruitment activities on local nursing school campuses. Another program initiated during the past fiscal year at Harris Hospital-Methodist has been the rehabilitation team designed to evaluate and provide services to persons requiring particular rehabilitative programs during their period of recuperation.

HURST-EULESS-BEDFORD HOSPITAL DEVELOPMENTS:

Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospital repeated its performance of last year as a fiscally stable institution with a reputation for quality care. The Hospital also embarked on a Phase III construction and modernization program. This program will result in an addition of 20 beds at the Hospital and will improve the auxiliary and administrative services at the Hospital. In January of 1978, the Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospital Authority sold revenue bonds for \$5,285,000 for the purpose of financing the current construction program. The Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospital bonds received an A rating. Rangaire Building Corporation is also the

construction manager at Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospital and has agreed to complete the project on a cost plus basis with a guaranteed maximum price. It is expected that the project will be completed by January, 1979.

MEDICARE

The number of patient days covered by Medicare and Medicaid compared to total patient days for the period October 1, 1976, to September 30, 1977, was 37.9 percent at Harris Hospital-Methodist and 17.7 percent at Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospital. Approximately 32.7% of all Harris Hospital-Methodist revenues and 17.2% of Hurst-Euless-Bedford Hospital revenues were from Medicare and Medicaid sources. Education For The Clergy

The Department of Pastoral Care has continued to provide educational opportunities for seminarians and the area clergy. On Mondays of each academic semester, students spend the day in seminars and visiting patients. They are given group and individual supervision

in the meaning and methods of ministry to people in crisis. Academic credit is received upon successful completion of a semester's work.

Education For Patients

A new and exciting form of ministry has begun. Video-taped programs created and sponsored by the Department of Pastoral Care, are broadcast daily, Monday - Friday, by means of the hospital's closed-circuit system (Channel 2). Twenty programs have been produced, divided equally between devotional and educational themes. The purpose of these programs is to increase the chaplains' availability to patients who are in need of spiritual ministry. The response of patients has been encouraging. This project is our first step in the direction of television as a form of ministry. It is also an innovative attempt to provide relevant patient education in the areas of emotional and spiritual adjustment to hospitalization and crisis.

METHODIST HOME — WACO

Report No. 1

(Received June 6, 1978)

A total of three hundred and ninety two (392) children and youth from Central Texas Conference comprised a part of the total 873 young people served by the Methodist Home last year.

Methodist Home, one of the nation's leading child care centers, provides a wide range of services to homeless, neglected, abused, and troubled children and their families. Emphasis is placed upon the development of the whole individual, and children are given the opportunity to grow educationally, spiritually, and physically within a caring Christian community. Methodist Home is owned and operated by the seven annual conferences of the United Methodist Churches in Texas and New Mexico.

Methodist Home - Report I - Services For Children And Youth

(The following seven sections are excerpts from the Administrator's Annual Report to the Methodist Home Board of Directors which provides a current update of our program)

1. RESIDENTIAL CARE

"In the spring of 1969 the Division System was developed for Methodist Home. Even with some apparent weaknesses, it is without question, a superior system for the care of children in a large residential care program. The campus is divided into four divisions, each division composed of 4-6 homeunits with a total of 50-70 children in each. Division staff form a team and are close to the child, so that problems are solved promptly and many times can be spotted before they become problems. The key factor in the whole system is that the worker is close to the child."

Budgeted Capacity: 200 Average Occupancy: 189 Average Cost per Day: \$23.00

2. THE FOSTER HOME PROGRAM

"Since 1966, the Foster Home Program has grown in numbers and significance. Any child or youth who needs the closeness of a foster home and it would appear his adjustment would be better in a foster home then he is placed there. Not all children can

do well in a foster home — our experiences tells us that. A poor foster home is just as devastating to a child or youth as is any other poor placement. The prevailing opinion held by many child care people in our state and nation that a foster home is better for a child than any group placement is a severe detriment to good child care in our country. After a child has been in six or seven foster homes and has not been able to adjust properly in any of them, then his problems have been compounded so severely by the many failures that it is most difficult for those in residential care to properly meet his needs. Our outpost offices in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio, Amarillo, and Albuquerque have enabled us to greatly expand our foster home capabilities.

Budgeted Capacity: 125 Average Occupancy: 119 Average Cost per Day: \$8.00

3. ADOPTION

"For many years Methodist Home has had an adoption program, but from the standpoint of numbers it has not been and is not now a large program. Through the years only five or six children have been placed for adoption each year, however in the last two years we have placed about fifteen children for adoption each year."

4. CHILDREN'S GUIDANCE CENTER

"The next far-reaching step in program development came in 1971 with the opening of the Guidance Center. The five basic services of mental health offered by the Guidance Center have served effectively in meeting the needs of treatment for emotionally disturbed children and youth. Usually it is operating at near capacity. It is fully accredited as a psychiatric hospital for children and youth by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals."

5. BOYS RANCH

"Another relatively new program in the umbrella of services of Methodist Home is the Methodist Home Boys Ranch, in the process of development since 1971. Some boys and young men have certain problems and adjustments that life in group care on a campus or in foster homes cannot be met. These boys, some adjudicated by juvenile courts, some on the border of juvenile delinquency, can best be served in a rural setting working with livestock and machinery. Our Boys Ranch Program, in actual operation five years, has proven the truth of this statement. There is a constant demand for the services of the ranch and the success factor, measured in terms of good adjustment to living upon discharge is probably the highest of any of our programs."

Budgeted Capacity: 36 Average Occupancy: 29
Average per Day Cost: \$23.00

6. HOWARD EMERGENCY SHELTER

"The Howard Emergency Shelter Program was begun on July 15, 1977. Its main purpose is to care for children and youth who have immediate and emergency need for short term placement until plans can be made for their more nearly permanent care. Fourteen days is the maximum time for placement. The Howard Emergency Shelter has been in operation long enough to demonstrate to us the effectiveness of this service. It was clearly shown that there was a pressing need for the service and our program is proving that the need can be met in this way."

Budgeted Capacity: 12 Average Occupancy: 6 Average per Day Cost: \$29.00

7. FONDREN RECEPTION/EVALUATION CENTER

"The new Fondren Reception/Evaluation Center enables us to bring children to the Home on short notice, do most of the study while the child is in the Center and determine on the basis of his needs whether he should be admitted to one of the areas of service of Methodist Home or if he should be referred to some other agency. This gives us a whole new dimension in our total program of services."

Average per Day Cost: \$22.00

Methodist Home — Report II — Eligibility And Services Donated

1. ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR SERVICE

The Methodist Home serves children and youth regardless of race, creed, or financial circumstances of the family. Although families of children served are asked to contribute to their support, in fact, their total support constitutes less than 1% of revenues.

2. SERVICES DONATED

There were 140,882 days of child care provided last year through residential care, ranch living, foster care, psychiatric hospitalization and therapy. Approximately 900 children and youth received food, shelter, counseling, education, and spiritual enrichment in a Christian environment at Methodist Home.

3. SERVICES DONATED TO METHODIST HOME

Local hospital room-care is provided when a Methodist Home child needs hospitalization. Partial medical services are also available.

Methodist Home - Report III - Problems Faced And Problem Solving

1. PROBLEMS FACED

- Anti-institutional bias that has too many children inappropriately placed in local communities with other agencies. Thus, by the time the applicant arrives at Methodist Home the person is a severely damaged client requiring expensive trained personnel for treatment.
- Homeparent recruitment and retention
- Development of Group Homes in different areas of Texas and New Mexico.
- Admission Procedures
- Emergency care needs
- Anticipated loss of annual \$342,000 National Institute of Mental Health Grant

2. PROBLEM SOLVING

- Methodist Home is committed to work with the districts in the conference at the preventive level with churches and families utilizing Methodist Home staff.
- Methodist Home will continue to provide quality residential care in cottage style living on campus with efficient and effective supportive services and appeals for affirmative support of this quality of care to be communicated within our respective communities.
- Inservice training program established with additional Associate Degree Program for Child Care workers at McLennan Community College
- New Admissions process with establishment of Fondren Reception Center
- Howard Emergency Shelter established
- Involve key leadership of Annual Conferences to help realize Group Homes
- Continue to communicate cost needs toward increased financial support from local churches.

AGING RESOURCE MODELS FOUNDATION

Report No. 1

By-Laws

(Approved June 6, 1978)

SECTION ONE. Name. The name of this corporation shall be THE AGING RESOURCE MODELS FOUNDATION OF THE CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH, commonly known as the ARM Foundation.

SECTION TWO. Purpose. The Foundation is formed for charitable, religious and educational purposes benefiting or serving the interests and needs of older persons within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference and in accordance with the directives of the annual conference.

SECTION THREE. Authority. The Foundation shall have authority to raise funds for its work and to collect, receive, hold and administer such funds and other property which may be given, transferred, conveyed or entrusted to it; to accept gifts designated for any of the interests of the church and administer the same; to accumulate income and to make the same a part of its permanent fund, or to make gifts and grants from such accumulated income, or from other proper funds not a part of its permanent fund; and to invest, reinvest, buy, sell, lease, transfer, and convey any and all funds and property which it may hold, and to execute the duties of trustee thereof, all as may be proper or incidental to its purpose, and subject always to the directives of the Central Texas Conference.

SECTION FOUR. Membership. This foundation is an agency of the Central Texas Conference and is amenable to it through its Board of Global Ministries.

SECTION FIVE. Directors. The management of the affairs of the corporation is vested in its elected directors, to be six in number, who shall be divided in three classes, and who shall serve for a term of three years, except for the initial term of Classes One and Two, or until their successors are elected. At least three of the elected directors shall be persons over age sixty.

The directors shall be elected by the Central Texas Conference upon nomination of the Committee on Nominations of the Annual Conference after recommendation of the Board of Global Ministries, except that in case of a vacancy occurring before the normal expiration of any term the same may be filled for the unexpired portion of such term by the remaining directors.

In addition to the elected directors, its Cabinet representative, the Board of Global Ministries and the chairperson of its Committee on Parish Development and its cabinet representative shall be directors ex-officio with right to vote.

No more than four of the directors may be clergy.

Absence of a director without excuse from three regular meetings in succession shall terminate that person's membership on the Board.

SECTION SIX. Powers of directors. The directors are authorized to carry on the work of the Foundation and to transact its business by and through its duly constituted officers, committees, and agents. They are further authorized to use the facilities and services of any other agency of the church, as for example the National Division of the Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church, and to enter into working agreements and contracts with such agencies concerning the handling and administration of the funds of the Foundation, subject, however, to ratification by the Central Texas Conference after report and recommendation by its Board of Global Ministries.

SECTION SEVEN. Regular meetings. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held at the annual conference or within thirty days following its adjournment. The Board of Directors may provide by resolution the time and place for the holding of other regular meetings of the Board.

SECTION EIGHT. Special meetings. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the president. A special meeting shall be called by the president upon the request in writing of any four of the Directors.

SECTION NINE. Notice. Notice of each meeting of the Board of Directors shall be given in writing at least ten days prior to the time fixed. Any director may waive notice of any meeting, and the attendance of a director in a meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except where the director attends for express purpose of objecting to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened. In the case of a special meeting, the notice shall state the purpose for which the meeting is called.

SECTION TEN. Quorum. A majority of the Board of Directors present and voting constitute a quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of the Board.

SECTION ELEVEN. Manner of acting. The act of a majority of the directors present at a meeting in which a quorum is present, shall be the act of the Board of Directors.

SECTION TWELVE. Report. The Board of Directors shall submit an annual report in writing showing the activities, plans, and financial condition of the Foundation to the Board of Global Ministries at least thirty days preceding the Annual Conference, and shall make such other reports as may be called for by the Board of Global Ministries or by the Central Texas Conference.

SECTION THIRTEEN. Officers. The Officers of the Foundation shall be a president, vice-president and secretary. The Board of Directors may elect or appoint such other officers and agents as it may deem desirable with such authority and duties as it may prescribe.

The officers shall be elected by the Board of Directors from its own membership at its annual meeting. If the election of officers is not held at such meeting, it may be held as soon thereafter as may be convenient. Each officer shall hold office until the meeting of the Board of Directors at or following annual conference, or until a successor shall have been duly elected.

Any officer may be removed by the Board of Directors when in the judgment of said Board the best interest of the Foundation would be served thereby.

A vacancy in an office may be filled by the Board of Directors for the unexpired portion of the term.

The president shall be the principal executive officer of the Foundation and shall supervise and control all of its business and affairs. And shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors. One person shall not serve as president for more than four years in succession.

In the absence of the president or in case of the presidents inability or refusal to act, the vice-president shall have all the powers and all the responsibilities of the president.

The secretary shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors in a book provided for that purpose, the secretary shall see that all notices are duly given, and shall be custodian of the corporate records.

The Central Texas Conference treasurer shall have charge and custody of and be responsible for all funds and securities of the Foundation. All funds shall be kept in the designated depository of the Central Texas Conference, and shall be deposited and withdrawn in the manner and form prescribed by the treasurer of the Conference.

SECTION FOURTEEN. Granting powers. The Board of Directors shall be the Grant Committee of the Foundation. It shall receive applications for grants upon such form as may be approved by it and shall make grants upon such terms as it may determine.

SECTION FIFTEEN. Fiscal matters. The fiscal year of the corporation shall coincide with the fiscal year of the Annual Conference.

At the close of each fiscal year there shall be an audit of the Foundation's accounts by the auditor of the Central Texas Conference, and copies of the report of the audit shall be distributed by the secretary as in the case of other funds of the Central Texas Conference.

SECTION SIXTEEN. Amendment. The by-laws may be altered, changed, or amended by the Board of Directors and submitted for approval to the Board of Global Ministries of the Central Texas Conference, subject to ratification by the Annual Conference.

Aging Resource Models Foundation Report No. 2

The Annual Conference authorized the formation of the Aging Resource Models (ARM) Foundation in June 1976 and granted it \$10,000 for grants to local congregations. In March 1977, the Governor's Committee on Yging granted an additional \$42,000 to the ARM Foundation. By combining these two resources, ten programs serving thirteen congregations have been approved and are ministering to the elderly:

METHODIST MISSION HOME OF TEXAS

Report No. 1

(Received June 6, 1978)

THOUGH WE ARE 83 YEARS OF AGE AS AN AGENCY... we celebrate this month the Tenth Anniversary of moving onto our twenty acre Campus in 1968. The Fourth Annual Commencement Service on March 11 for our Southwest Center for the Hearing Impaired will incorporate recognition of this Tenth Anniversary, and of the Annual Conferences, which made it possible!

A SATELLITE MATERNITY HOME IN NACOGDOCHES . . . is now in operation because of the interest of the churches and advocate groups in that area. We are able to serve four residents at one time, as well as counsel out-patients. A similar service is being contemplated by the Methodist Mission Home in cooperation with interested persons in the Midland-Odessa area.

NEW DIRECTOR MR. DOUGLAS SLASOR OF INDIANA . . . who is deaf and oral, and a new Assistant to the Director, were hired for the Southwest Center for the Hearing Impaired in the past two months. The Center continues to refine its program and services.

NEW CAMPUS CLINIC IN OPERATION . . . In late 1977 our Campus Clinic was opened, with one section for obstetrical examination by the regular weekly visit of the physician, some infirmary rooms, as well as an examination room for the hearing impaired clients used by their physician who comes twice a week. We would be happy to receive a gift of this \$80,000 facility by any church or individual who would like to give it!

THE OLD CLINIC... (some 9,000 square feet) is being remodeled to better house some 30 hearing impaired male clients, as well as provide a social center for all the hearing impaired residents. This should be finished by May 1.

ADOPTIVE FEE TIED DIRECTLY TO CHURCH GIVING AND TO OTHER GIFTS . . . In November, 1977 the Board of Directors developed a minimum adoptive fee, which is in reverse proportion to the amount of gifts received through the Annual Conferences and individuals each year. As the churches increase their subsidy to the maternity-resident-baby-adoptive couple continuum of service, then the portion of the overall cost that the adoptive parents are asked to give will be reduced!

IN 1977 WE SERVED . . . 542 persons in need in a direct way; 146 Maternity Clients, 115 infants, 210 Adoptive Parents, and 71 Hearing Impaired Residents. Our total operational budget for 1978 is at one and one fourth million dollars, of which the churches will give about 12%. Our church giving for operating was at an all-time high this past year in the amount of \$155,000. Our total endowment is \$310.825.

Report No. 2

(Approved June 6, 1978)

Changes In Article II Of The By-Laws, Trustees Or Directors

Section 1.

This Corporation shall be under the control and direction of a Board of Directors, who shall have and exercise all the powers and prerogatives granted to directors of private corporations under the laws of the State of Texas, subject only to the general supervision of the patronizing Annual Conferences of The United Methodist Church.

Section 2.

The number of Directors (hereinafter referred to as Trustees) shall be as follows: The Bishops of the United Methodist Church who preside over the patronizing Annual Conferences; the District Superintendents who reside in San Antonio; two ministers and two lay persons from each of the patronizing Annual Conferences on nomination of the Conference Board of Health and Welfare, provided that one of the ministers shall preferably be a District Superintendent, and that one of the laypersons shall preferably be the Conference Lay Leader or President of the Conference United Methodist Women; and ten other persons at large to be nominated by the Board of Trustees of this Corporation, and confirmed by action of the majority of the patronizing Annual Conferences. Such Trustees may be elected for terms of not to exceed four (4) years, provided that no person may serve more than eight (8) years consecutively, except the Bishops of the United Methodist Church, who shall be members so long as they are presiding over a patronizing Annual Conference. A person may be re-elected to the Board after an absence of one full year. The Board of Trustees may make provision for recognition of the faithful service of those members of the Board of Trustees, who have reached the age of seventy (70) who have become physically incapacitated, by electing them Honorary Members of the Board because of meritorious service to the Methodist Mission Home. Honorary members are in addition to the membership quotas outlined in Article II, Section 2. Honorary members shall be entitled to all privileges of a member except the right to vote.

Section 3.

The Board of Trustees shall meet semi-annually in April or May and in October or November of each year, all of such meetings to be held at the office of the said Corporation in San Antonio, Texas, in each instance upon written or printed notice to be sent out by the President at least three weeks in advance of such meeting; provided that for good cause,

any such meeting may be postponed at the discretion of the President, except that the spring meeting shall be held at least two weeks before any of the annual sessions of the patronizing Annual Conferences. Special meetings of the Board of Trustees may be held when necessary by call of the President or the Chairperson by written or printed notice mailed at least three weeks before the date on which the meeting is to be held, in which notice the purpose of the meeting shall be stated.

Section 4.

The Board of Trustees shall, at their Fall Meeting, elect a Chairperson (herein sometimes referred to as Chairperson) and a Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Trustees, a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary, and a Treasurer, each of whom shall hold their respective offices for one year and until others are elected and qualify in their stead.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND MINISTRY

Report No. 1

A. COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Goals for 1979

- 1. To give continued support to our Black United Methodist Colleges. We plan to provide each local church with specific material on the Black College Fund with special emphasis on Wiley and Huston-Tillotson. We will seek to have The Texas Methodist run a special issue on the United Methodist Colleges of Texas.
- 2. To encourage all church of the Conference to make the brochure "College Bound" available to all their High School Juniors and Seniors; and to find other ways to do a better job of interpreting United Methodist Colleges and Universities to the church.
- 3. To continue to act as a liaison between the local church and institutions of Higher Education:
 - a. By publishing special opportunities and enrichment programs made available by the institutions.
 - By encouraging the use of Texas Methodist Campuses for Conference and local church meetings.
 - c. By encouraging colleges to provide for Conference use specific information of people and facilities available for use by local churches.
- 4. To continue to keep churches informed of the necessity of the apportionments for United Methodist institutions of Higher Education.
- 5. To encourage gifts to the United Methodist Scholarship and loan Funds.
- 6. To enhance that Student Recognition Day by:
 - a. Requesting that the two church-related senior colleges of the Conference (Texas Wesleyan and Southwestern) supply materials for distribution;
 - b. Suggesting that, at the pastor's discretion, students and/or alumni be invited to speak to UMYF groups, Church School Classes, and worship services; and
 - c. By urging the colleges to assume responsibility for providing names of speakers.
- 7. To continue ways to relate to those chaplains within the bounds of our conference, and those who are members of our Conference but serve elsewhere. We will develop a program of personal contact through which local churches and/or Sunday School classes may maintain regular contact through personal letters, newsletters, and conference news.

B. COMMITTEE ON CLERGY BENEFITS

Goals for 1979

- To administer the Annual Conference's programs and plans for Equitable Salaries, Clergy Group Insurance, and Clergy Moving Expense Fund.
- 2. To enroll all ministers coming into the Annual Conference on probationary membership, and all those receiving Equitable Salary payments who are eligible, in the Conference Insurance Program.
- 3. To investigate the possibility of a separate life insurance program by group members on a voluntary basis.
- 4. To continue an ongoing study of benefits and coverage of the Annual Conference Hospitalization Insurance Program.
- 5. To study the usage of the Annual Conference Moving Expense Fund to evaluate its adequacy, and possible need for revision.
- 6. To study the purpose of the Equitable Salary Fund, and to update and rewrite the guidelines for administration of the Fund as needed.

CONFERENCE HOSPITALIZATION, LIFE, ACCIDENT AND DISABILITY GROUP INSURANCE

The Conference insurance program is currently served through the Browning Agency of Arlington, Texas. Coverage for lay employees of local churches of the conference is available from this company at rates commensurate to the Clergy Group.

1. We recommend that the conference continue its insurance with the Browning Agency. The agency representative is Mr. Randy Draper, P. O. Box 6266, Arlington, Texas 76011. The conference insurance representative is the Conference Secretary-Treasurer. The Group Plan is available to all ministers who are ordained or licensed serving full time, and student pastors. Our current hospitalization coverage includes:

- c. Disability Insurance: \$200 per month for 36 months (Through our Conference Pensions Program we also have disability income provided at the level of onethird of the average salary for up to 15 years.)
- d. Premiums for current coverage is \$238.25 per quarter for a family and \$102.31 per quarter for an individual.
- e. We recommend that the Annual Conference continue to pay 60% of the premium for all ministers whose salary is below the average of the Annual Conference, and continue paying 50% of the premium for all ministers whose salary is equal to or above the average salary for the Annual Conference.
- f. We urge each local church to carefully consider coverage of all employees, including their minister(s), under Workman's Compensation if this coverage is not already in effect.
- 2. Post-Retirement Insurance for those who qualify for Medicare the following insurance coverage is available at a cost of \$37.90 per quarter, through a Medicare Counterpart Policy. These benefits are provided for accidents or sickness covered by Medicare:
 - All the Medicare deductible for each Benefit Period.
 - All hospital charges in excess of Medicare's daily allowances during any period of hospital confinement covered by Medicare.
 - All Skilled Nursing Facility charges in excess of Medicare's daily allowances for confinement in extended care facility from the 21st through the 100th day.
 - Up to \$35 for each pint of blood for as many as 3 pints during hospital confinement covered by Medicare.
 - Up to \$20 per shift, as many as 2 shifts per day, and up to 90 days for private duty Registered Nurses (R.N.) during confinement covered by Medicare.
 - Benefits equal to 25% of the amount paid by Medicare for physician's charges during Medicare covered hospital confinement (the 20% Medicare doesn't pay.)
 - All of the ambulance expenses not covered by Medicare up to \$50 per calendar year.
 - All of a member's premiums will be refunded if member's death results from accidental bodily injury.
 - Guaranteed renewable for life subject to company's right to change premium rates. Company reserves only the right to change policy premium rates on a

- class basis. Company will not refuse premium payments or require restrictive endorsements as a condition of renewal.
- Policy does not cover loss caused by or resulting from alcoholism, narcotic addiction, nervous or mental disorders, dental treatment, rest cure, or any period of hospital or skilled nursing facility confinement that daily allowances are not paid under Medicare or loss covered by any Workmen's Compensation or Employers' Liability laws.
- 3. Dependent Insurance Coverage: Dependent Insurance Coverage is available through the Conference program, to the spouse of a retired or deceased Conference member, through age 65.

Dependent Coverage has all of the benefits of our Conference Insurance Program except death and disability benefits. The premium is \$145.69 per quarter with the Conference paying 50%.

EQUITABLE SALARY SUPPORT

2. We further recommend that this not be a mandatory or automatic minimum, but a minimum standard toward which the local church and the Conference work together as indicated below:

Where the local church's pastor's salary is below the Conference minimum the Conference will pay 110% of the supplement paid for 1978 (provided the 110% does not raise the salary above the new minimum). Beyond that the Conference will add one dollar of supplement for each one dollar the local church increases the local pastor's salary up to the minimum salary set by the Conference.

- 3. Paragraph (F) of the "Administrative" procedures which pertains to the mileage remuneration for seminary students, shall remain as stated in the 1976 Conference Journal.
- 4. We request that \$10,000 be included in the Conference budget for the salary supplement fund.

C. COMMITTEE ON CAMPUS MINISTRY

Goals for 1979

- 1. To have the apportionment for Wesley Foundation, which is presently based on 75¢ per member, raised to 85¢ per member and figured from the total conference membership, and apportioned to the districts on the decimal.
- 2. To interpret to the Annual Conference the changing role of the Texas Commission on Campus Ministry (TCCM), and the transferral to the Annual Conference of responsibilities formerly overseen by the State Director of TCCM.
- 3. To cooperate with TCCM in providing support systems for Campus Ministers, including the opportunity to share program ideas and skills.
- 4. To offer exposure and explanation of Campus Ministry to the local churches of the Conference. To aid in the achievement of this goal the Task Force on Goals for

Growth in Campus Ministry has been established. The Task Force has a threefold design purpose:

- a. Interpretive What is Campus Ministry?
- b. Increase student awareness of United Methodist Campus Ministry on the Campuses where they attend, or plan to attend.
- c. Raise funds for the support of Campus Ministry.

To accomplish the threefold purpose \$750.00 is requested in the 1979 budget of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

- 5. To encourage Campus Ministers to attend continuing education events, and perhaps, sponsor a continuing education event.
- 6. To investigate in cooperation and conjunction with District Council on Ministries and/or local churches, the need for the establishment of ministries to students attending community colleges.
- 7. To express appreciation to local churches for their financial undergirding of Campus Ministry within the Annual Conference.

UNITED METHODIST COMMUNICATIONS COUNCIL

Report No. 1

Constitution & By-Laws

(Approved June 6, 1978)

I. NAME:

A. The name of this organization shall be The United Methodist Communications Council.

II. PURPOSE:

- A. The purpose of The United Methodist Communications Council shall be to coordinate communications activities of the United Methodist Church in Texas and New Mexico.
 - One objective of The United Methodist Communications Council shall be to oversee, through its Newspaper Division, the editing and publication of THE TEXAS METHODIST/UNITED METHODIST REPORTER, a weekly newspaper.
 - 2. A second objective of The United Methodist Communications Council shall be, through its Media Division, the directing of United Methodist NEWService and fostering the use of communication media by annual conferences and local churches.
 - 3. A third objective of The United Methodist Communications Council shall be to oversee, through its Agency Services Division, the production of print, sound and film resources for agencies of the Church.

III. MEMBERSHIP:

- A. Membership of The Communications Council shall be drawn equally from the United Methodist annual conferences in the states of Texas and New Mexico, divided thusly:
 - The bishops who are assigned for episcopal leadership for Annual Conferences in Texas and New Mexico shall be members of The Communications Council.
 - 2. There shall be six (6) representatives from each annual conference which shall include the Chairperson of the Conference Communications Committee

- and Editor of the conference page in The TEXAS METHODIST, the Conference Council Director, and a district superintendent.
- At least two representatives from each annual conference shall be lay persons. Practicing professionals in the field of communication should be considered.
- It is recommended that at least two of these six be practicing professionals in the field of communications. It is further recommended that the Conference Council Director be included.
- B. Representatives to The Communications Council shall be elected by each annual conference at the beginning of each quadrennium on nomination of the Conference Nominating Committee and shall serve for the quadrennium. Communications Council representatives who become affiliated with an annual conference other than the one from which they were originally elected shall be replaced at the next regular session of the annual conference.
- C. The annual Conference shall qualify and designate their elected representatives for service on The Communications Council equally in the Division of Newspaper, Media and Agency Services.
- D. Division members from any annual conference outside Texas and New Mexico:
 - 1. Shall be auxiliary members of the Communications Council with voice but not vote.
 - 2. Who, by virtue of election as Division chairperson, are members of the Communications Council Executive Committee, shall become ex-officio members of the Communications Council, with voice and vote.

IV. CONSTITUTION: OWNERSHIP

- A. This Constitution shall become operative and in effect when approved by twothirds of the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the states of Texas and New Mexico.
- A. The United Methodist Communications Council and each of its Divisions are wholly owned by the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church located in the state of Texas and New Mexico and are answerable to them.
- B. The United Methodist Communications Council and its Divisions may not be sold, transferred or terminated except by vote of two-thirds of the annual conferences, except that each Division shall have authority to buy and sell property as needed to maintain its ongoing function.
- C. Should because of lapse of time or otherwise: The United Methodist Communications Council cease to exist, all of its real and acquired assets shall be proportionally divided to the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the states of Texas and New Mexico.
 - Any Division of The Communications Council cease to exist, all of its real and acquired assets shall be divided among the remaining Divisions by The Communications Council.
 - The entire Communications Council cease to exist, all of its real and acquired assets shall be proportionately divided among the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the states of Texas and New Mexico.

V. OFFICERS:

- A. Officers of The Communications Council shall consist of the following: Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, and the Chairpersons of the three Divisions elected from the membership of the respective divisions.
 - 1. The duties of the Chairperson shall be:
 - a). To preside over all meetings.
 - b). To call the Annual Meeting and any other meetings of The

Communications Council or its Executive Committee as may be needed during the year.

- 2. The duties of the Vice-Chairperson shall be to perform the duties of the Chairperson during his absence.
- The duties of the Secretary shall be to accurately record the proceedings of The Communications Council and its Executive Committee. Minutes of each of these meetings shall be distributed to all members after each meeting.
- 4. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to dispense funds held by The Communications Council, as budgeted by the Council. The records of the Treasurer shall be given a certified audit at the end of each calendar year.
- Prior to annual adoption of the budget, the Executive Committee of The Council shall seek the advice and counsel of The Council on Finance and Administration of the several conferences involved.
- B. Officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of The Communications Council and no one may serve in the same office more than four (4) years nor as an officer of The Council more than eight (8) years.
- C. The Executive Committee shall appoint annually a Nominating Committee to submit a slate of officers to The Communications Council provided that additional nominations may be made from the floor, at the time of the election.

VI. COMMITTEES:

- A. There shall be the following standing committees and such other committees as the Council may determine:
 - 1. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:
 - a). This Committee shall be composed of the Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, and the Chairpersons of the Divisions. There shall also be one representative selected by the conference representatives from each annual conference not otherwise represented by these officers and Division Chairpersons.
 - b). The Executive Committee shall be empowered to conduct any business of The Communications Council between meetings of The Communications Council.
 - c). Minutes of the Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be sent to each member of The Communications Council promptly after each meeting of the Committee.
 - d). Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be subject to review by The Communications Council at its meeting.
 - e). Meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Chairperson of The Communications Council as needed or on the request of any member of the Executive Committee. Notice of such meeting and agenda shall be sent to all members of The Communications Council who may attend as ex-officio members.
 - f). Special committees may be appointed by the Executive Committee and such other committees as the Council may determine.
 - g). To review requests from the divisions and recommend a budget to the Council.

VII. DIVISIONS:

A. NEWSPAPER DIVISION:

 This Division shall be composed of a Chairperson elected by The Communications Council, a Vice-Chairperson and a Secretary elected by the Division and other members as designated by their respective annual conferences. Each annual conference utilizing the services of THE UNITED METHODIST REPORTER shall be entitled to designate one voting representative to the Newspaper Division.

- 2. This Division shall be empowered to conduct any the business of THE TEXAS METHODIST/UNITED METHODIST REPORTER and related activities. between meetings of The Council.
- 3. Minutes of the meetings of this Division shall be sent to each member of The Communications Council promptly after each meeting of the Division.
- 4. Decisions of this Division shall be subject to review by The Communications Council at its meeting, reported to and reviewed by The Communications Council at its meeting in order to coordinate this Division's functions with those of the other Divisions of The Council.
- 5. Meetings of the Newspaper Division will be held annually at the time of The Communications Council and additionally once each year or may be called by the Chairperson of the Newspaper Division as needed or on the request of any member of this Division. A meeting of the Newspaper Division shall be held annually at the time of The United Methodist Communications Council meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairperson of the Newspaper Division as needed on the request of any member of this Division.
- 6. The following committees may be created by the Newspaper Division to implement programs in the following areas:
 - a). Committee for Finances
 - b). Committee for Personnel
 - c). Additional committees as needed.

B. MEDIA DIVISION:

- This Division shall be composed of a Chairperson elected by The Communications Council, a Vice-Chairperson and Secretary elected by the Division and other members as designated by their respective annual conferences.
- 2. This Division shall be empowered to conduct any the business of the United Methodist NEWService and any the business in the field of media services between meetings of The Communications Council.
- 3. Minutes of the meetings of this Division shall be sent to each member of The Communications Council promptly after each meeting of the Division.
- 4. Decisions of this Division shall be subject to review by The Communications Council at its meetings. reported to and reviewed by The Communications Council at its meeting in order to coordinate this Division's functions with those of the other Divisions of The Council.
- 5. Meetings of the Media Division shall be held annually at the time of The Communications Council and additionally once each year or may be called by the Chairperson of the Media Division as needed or on request of any member of the Division. A meeting of the Media Division shall be held annually at the time of The United Methodist Communications Council meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairperson of the Media Division as needed on the request of any member of this Division.
- 6. The following committees may be created by the Media Division to implement programs in the following areas:
 - a). Committee for Finances
 - b). Committee for Personnel
 - c). Additional committees as needed.

C. AGENCY SERVICES DIVISION:

- This Division shall be composed of a Chairperson elected by The Communications Council, a Vice-Chairperson and Secretary elected by the Division and other members as designated by their respective annual conferences.
- 2. This Division shall be empowered to conduct any the business in the field of Agency Services and related activities. between meetings of The

Communications Council.

- 3. Minutes of the meetings of this Division shall be sent to each member of The Communications Council promptly after each meeting of the Division.
- 4. Decisions of this Division shall be subject to review by The Communications Council at its meetings, reported to and reviewed by The Communications Council at its meeting in order to coordinate this Division's functions with those of the other Divisions of the Council.
- 5. Meetings of the Agency Services Division shall be held annually at the time of The Communications Council and additionally once each year or may be called by the Chairperson of the Agency Services Division as needed or on request of any member of the Division. A meeting of the Agency Services Division shall be held annually at the time of The United Methodist Communications Council meeting. Additional meetings may be called by the Chairperson of the Agency Services Division as needed or on request of any member of the Division.
- 6. The following committees may be created by the Agency Services Division to implement programs in the following areas:
 - a). Committee for Finances
 - b). Committee for Personnel
 - c). Additional committees as needed.

VIII. FINANCE:

- A. Financial support for the services and expenses of The Communications Council through its several Divisions will be received from related annual conferences, agencies and institutions.
- B. Each of the several Divisions will adopt its annual budget, submit it to The Communications Council for information and review, and carry continuing responsibility for managing its fiscal affairs.
- C. Annual conference representatives shall convey to their annual conferences the amounts of financial support requested for services provided.

IX. STAFF:

- A. The Communications Council may employ staff persons of the Divisions on recommendation of the Personnel Committee of that Division, shall elect chief executives of the Division upon recommendation of the Divisions.
- B. Each Division may employ a chief executive as elected by The Communications Council and authorize the employment of additional staff as needed.
- C. The Executive Committee may nominate an Executive Director to be elected by The Communications Council.

X. MEETINGS:

- A. Regular meeting of The Communications Council shall be held each year. Notice of the time and place of the annual meeting shall be sent to all members, thirty (30) days prior to the meeting.
- B. Special meetings of The Communications Council may be called by the Chairperson or the Executive Committee. Notice of such meetings shall be sent to all members at least one week prior to such meetings.
- C. A quorum of at least one-half of the voting members of The Communications Council shall be required to conduct the business of The Communications Council.

XI. AMENDMENTS:

A. Amendments to this Constitution, and the creation or amendments of By-Laws, may be adopted at any regular meeting of The Communications Council, provided notice of such Amendments is sent to each member of The

Communications Council at least one month prior to the meeting at which such Amendments are to be voted upon.

B. The vote required to adopt such changes shall be two-thirds of those present and voting, provided that there is a quorum present.

C. Amendments to the Constitution shall also be ratified by two-thirds of the Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church in the states of Texas and New Mexico.

COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATION & INTERPRETATION

Report No. 2

(Approved June 6, 1978)

Three areas of concern that must be lifted up are:

Conference Resource Library

The Conference Resource Library is located at the Conference offices. Lee Vance, Resource Librarian, continues to give excellent leadership. A summary of resources available are:

116-16 mm Sound Films

736-35 mm Filmstrips

315- Audio Cassettes

50-Record Albums

40- Media Kits

over 500- Books

There is also a Master Copy File containing all Curriculum materials for 3-5 years and a check-out file of all current materials.

During the past year 152 churches have used the Resource Center at least one time. Over 1,000 individual items have been issued.

We encourage an even wider use of these resources. Let Lee Vance know your needs and help you plan. She can and will give invaluable assistance if she is asked to help.

Connection

The new United Methodist radio program Connection continues to be well received wherever it is heard. It is recognized as one of the most innovative and creative religious radio programs being produced today.

Ten percent (10%) of all placements of Connection nation-wide have been in the Texas-New Mexico area where our approach has been somewhat different from anywhere else.

Each of these placements was handled by a layperson or a local who made the contact and the necessary arrangements with the local radio station. This has proven to be the most effective method of placement. Many members of this Conference can do this same thing in their own community. Placement kits and detailed instructions are available from the Committee.

Local Church Communications Coordinators

The 1976 General Conference created the new position of Local Church Coordinator of Communications. The 1976 Discipline describes the duties of this Coordinator in Par. 261.5. This can be a key position and one of the most important in the local church.

We recommend the following:

- 1. That every local church name a Local Church Coordinator of Communications no later than January 1, 1978
- 2. That every District provide a training event for these Local Church Coordinators to train them in the "how-to" of their jobs.

COMMITTEE ON RESEARCH AND PLANNING

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

During 1976-1977, each local church was required by the Annual Conference action to do a self-study of the congregation and the community in which it functions. This study included the gathering of demographic data on which to base plans for the future.

In looking at the Annual Conference, and especially the work of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, the Committee on Research and Planning feels that a similar kind of data gathering and assimilation is as necessary for an annual conference to plan effectively as for a local church. In order to have maximum effectiveness from our various personnel and our financial resources, it is necessary for us to gather, assimilate, evaluate and interpret existing data as it affects our conference. This hunch was reinforced in conversation with Lyle Schaller, who is on the staff of Yokefellow Institute, Richmond, Indiana, and a leading church planner; and Paul Geisel, Administrator of North Texas Council of Government; as well as other authorities in the fields of church and urban planning.

Therefore, we propose the following research project to be started as soon as possible, and no later than January, 1979.

We would gain access to available data, assimilate it, and define it in relation to such areas as (1) church growth and development, (2) church location and relocation, (3) parishing and shared ministries, (4) specialized ministry needs, (5) leadership training needs, (6) development of new ministries.

We would propose the following as a way of doing the job:

- 1) Although 1970 census data is outdated, more recent and adequate data exists at least in regard to basic growth/decline/population shift, i.e.,
 - a. data available from COG's, utility companies, construction records, city and county planners, etc.
 - b. breakdowns by race, sex, age, income, etc., available in part.
- Process would be to assemble data which exists, and, on basis of questions we want answered, reduce it to
 - a historical commentary
 - b. graphs and charts
 - c. interpretive statements
- 3) This would require a consultant to "lay out the job," advise and assist in interpretation, and one knowledgeable person not necessary to be trained in research to do the data gathering and assimilation. This person would work under the general oversight of the Research and Planning Committee; under the day-to-day supervision of the Conference office.
- 4) Time required would be:
 - a. 2 months for gathering data
 - b. 2 to 4 months for assimilation and writing
- 5) For the process to have value, it would have to be integrated or juxtaposed with:
 - a. local church data as per recent study
 - b. assessment of facilities and program capacities
 - c. missional design statement for the Annual Conference as a whole.
- 6) The latter (missional design) would require a long range planning Task Force, appointed by the Bishop, from the Conference, to assess, project and propose and the counsel of an "expert" such as Schaller or Bob Harman, which will add another \$1,500 to total costs.

CONFERENCE YOUTH COUNCIL

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

In the absence of last year's president, Mr. Gary Hernandez, I am pleased to present the Conference Council on Youth Ministries report for the past year.

Last year the Conference Council on Youth Ministries Supported and organized four annual events including Jr. High Mid-winters, Sr. High Mid-winters, Annual Youth Conference and the Annual Youth Rally. Participation in these events by our conference youth was very encouraging. Jr. High Mid-winters were held the second and fourth weekends of Feb. Two Sr. High Mid-winters were also scheduled for the first and third weekends of the same month. Due to bad weather the second Sr. High Mid-winter was cancelled but we are happy to announce that all registration fees were returned. Annual Youth Conference was held the last week of April on the 28 and 29. Youth elections for the Conference Council on Youth Ministries were held during Annual Youth Conference until the adoption of the new by-laws during the year of 1977. In reviewing the need and purpose of this Annual Youth Conference the presently elected CCYM voted to move Annual Youth Conference to the Saturday before the opening of Annual Conference. This event shall run through the Annual Youth Rally. Attendance at Annual Youth Conference will not be a requirement for participation in the Annual Youth Rally. In doing this we hope to enlarge the participation of youth in Conference wide events.

In addition to these events on October 21 and 22 of this year a leadership training event will be held. We hope to use this format in the future to relate to the needs of the local youth groups.

The Youth Service Fund is a major concern of the CCYM. Lydia Patterson and Glen Lake were our out of conference and in conference projects and will return as our projects again this year. Lydia Patterson received \$212.26 and Glen Lake received \$212.27.

Besides this money \$1,681.11 was sent to the Navajo Methodist Mission School in New Mexico. This money was raised several years ago by our youth for a van for the Oklahoma Indian Conference. By the time the money was raised the van for the Oklahoma Indian Conference was no longer needed or wanted. We felt that the Navajo Methodist Mission School could put the money to good use in increasing their library and visual aids departments.

This past year our conference was represented by three youth and one adult representative at Jurisdictional Youth Caucus. The youth were Gary Hernandez, Adolph Lopez, and myself. The adult representative was Hubert Owensby. During this Caucus Douglas Chee Vaughn was elected to a term to serve on the National Youth Ministries Organization (NYMO). We also had several members in attendance at Jurisdictional Youth Ministries Enterprise.

Last December the Ft. Worth East District sponsored a Conference-wide Christmas party. It is hoped that this will become an annual event. We are grateful to the Ft. Worth East district youth and their coordinator Hubert Owensby for the work put in on this event.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF ACCOM

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

I. Matters referred

- A. (1) The Executive Committee recommends that a task force composed of the trustees of the Central Texas Foundation be directed by the Annual Conference to study the expansion of the Corpus of the Central Texas Foundation
- B. (2) to include all permanent funding in a single corpus. This task force should also give consideration to moving all foundation funds including local church foundation funds to the Texas Methodist Foundation.
- C. (3) The Executive Committee recommends that the fund raising request from the Board of Global Ministries for a limited capital funds effort by ARM to raise \$160,000 be approved.
- D. (4) The Executive Committee recommends a seminar on church management led by the Association of Church Business Managers be approved.
- E. (5) The Executive Committee recommends that the CTC Nominating Committee appoint an Inter-Conference Task Force as requested by the Rio Grande Conference.
- F. (6) The Executive Committee recommends that the following persons be appointed to the Conference Van Task Force:

Dale Hunt -- Chairperson

Helen Marshall

Dr. R. G. Alexander

- G. (7) The Executive Committee recommends that the Annual Conference have a period after the Bishop's address (preferably) during the 1978 session for discussion and possible answering of a questionnaire concerning "Where Are We, Where Do We Want To Go" in the Annual Conference. This should be properly prepared and executed and the results brought back to ACCOM to be considered so that programs could be adopted in response to the concerns reflected from the members of Annual Conference.
- H. (8) The Executive Committee recommends that our Conference have a Managerial Grid and that the JCOM be asked to participate.
- (9) The Executive Committee recommends the approval of the By-Laws of the Constitution of the Texas Conference of Churches.
- J. (10) The Executive Committee recommends the approval of the By-Laws of the Constitution of the United Methodist Communications Council of Texas.
- K. (11) The Executive Committee recommends the approval of the By-Laws of the Constitution of the Texas Planning Commission.
- L. (12) The Executive Committee recommends the approval of the By-Laws of the Constitution of the ARM Foundation contingent upon the removal of the sexist language.
- M. (13) The Executive Committee recommends that CTC cooperate in the study relative to uniformity of format on Conference Journals from TMPC.
- N. (14) The Executive Committee recommends that the request from TMPC for the meeting date of the TMPC on 2-23-79 in Dallas be approved.
- O. (15) The Executive Committee recommends that the Recommendations from the Convocation on the Black Church be received and referred to Religion and Race for implementation and recommendations.

II. Boards and Committees

E. (a) The Executive Committee recommends that we attempt to clarify that the Conference Task Force pass its recommendations to ACCOM and that ACCOM then assigns the responsibilities to the appropriate Board or Agency.

- (b) The Board of Global Ministries will be responsible for administering the Advance including the Missional Priorities. The Committee on Communication will be responsible for promoting.
- V. Procedure for Approval of Program and Budget
 - (1) The Executive Committee recommends that CFA study the mileage allowance for Boards and Agencies. The Executive Committee specifically recommends 10¢/mile for one person driving and 15¢/mile for a car pool.

Resolution

(Approved June 6, 1978)

The ACCOM Executive Committee affirms the worth & dignity of the Native American. We acknowledge their struggle for human dignity & recognize the official statements on their behalf passed by the 1976 General Conference. However, in response to their request for support in the opposition of bills now pending in both houses of our national legislative branch, we find the issues are too complex for us to make recommendations due to the brevity of time between the receipt of their request and this Annual Conference session. Therefore, we move the matter be referred to a duly designated segment of our Conference's Board of Church & Society for study and recommendations for action through channels that board deems appropriate, with the understanding that action be taken immediately.

ST. PAUL SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

(Received June 6, 1978)

In June 1977 the seminary received full accreditation on the Doctor of Ministry program which began in 1972. Following the strongly affirmative 1976 Association of Theological Schools Evaluation, the full accreditation of the Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) program is another recognition of Saint Paul progress in training future leaders of the church.

In last year's summary our search for full time black presence on the faculty was reported. As a result of affirmative action, we are happy to announce that Dr. Julius E. Del Pino will be joining the faculty as of July 1, 1978, as Assistant Professor of Church Administration and Field Education.

The seminary's enrollment for Fall 1977 was 184, compared with 171 last year, a 6% increase. There are 156 full time Master of Divinity students as compared with 143 last year. The first year class is considerably larger than last year, and the total number of applications for new admissions represented the highest number in this decade.

Beginning this year the Trustees will be meeting twice per year instead of annually, a step which represents one of several moves in the direction of greater participation and involvement. Additional At-Large Trustees are making possible a stronger and growing network of long-range support.

The October 1977 Board of Trustees approved a proposal that the 20th Anniversary observances of Saint Paul emphasize a three-year financial campaign for \$2 million. The campaign is to extend from the time of the Trustees meeting through December of 1980. The Trustees approved a plan by which approximately $\frac{2}{3}$ of the funds raised would be for current operating expenses and $\frac{1}{3}$ for future endowment needs.

During the past year the Reverend Mr. Jerrie Jones, a 1977 graduate of Saint Paul, joined our development staff on a half-time basis as he continued to serve The United Methodist Church in LaMonte, Missouri. In June 1978 he will become seminary's development staff.

I would like to express special appreciation for the outstanding Ministerial Education

Fund support during the past year. The responsiveness of the church is extremely heartening to those of us with direct responsibility for theological education. I cannot overestimate the significance of this sustaining support for Saint Paul School of Theology. The strong MEF response will be of major importance to our work in financing our existing ministry, and in considering further improvements in our service to the church. THANKS for a task superbly done!

In spite of inflation and small endowment we were able to operate in the black for the second consecutive year. However, our income over expenses can be deceptive unless it is noted that an unusual amount of income came from wills. The 1977-78 budget represents a 12% increase over the 1976-77 budget which in turn was a 12% increase over the 1975-76 budget. These increases represent a much needed step toward faculty and staff salary improvements, combined with overall inflationary costs.

In looking forward to our 20th anniversary in the fall of 1978, there is much for which to be grateful. Indispensable to our work is the strong and effective partnership of the local church in sending us students and providing dollars for dreams to be realized. The Saint Paul Lay Consultation Council continues to be a specific expression of this partnership. As we continue our best efforts for the great ministry of training men and women for leadership in the church, we do so in the belief that all our works are begun, continued, and ended in God's everlasting and unbounded love.

THE COMMISSION FOR LAY CONCERNS

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

This Commission, like so many other organizations, has been plagued by bad weather in the early part of the year in attempting to get its work done.

A 1977 decision to support the L.E.A.D. program under the Board of Discipleship's Committee on Evangelism has been carried out just ending prior to Annual Conference. You have heard and will hear more about the report of that activity from the Board of Discipleship on the reactivation of the apathetic and bored church member.

District Lay Rallies have been held in all the districts with excellent attendance and inspiration to the laity of those districts. New Lay Speaking materials have been received and are in the hands of the District Lay Leaders or Lay Speaking Directors. Work has begun in almost all districts on the new Lay Speaking program.

Future programs will involve the development of a resource manual for the local church lay leader. This manual will be designed and put together with the cooperation of the General Board of Discipleship in Nashville. This will be a manual including the sources of information on both the general church and Annual Conference church agencies and boards that will enable the Lay Leader to become the resource person in the local church for the purpose of keeping the line of communication open between all levels of church activity. This manual is in the process of design at this point and after a short period of time, will be placed in the hands of a committee to be finalized for content and training sessions for local church lay leaders early in 1978. Hopefully, this will be a useful tool that can enhance communication and thereby the ministry within the church.

This Commission along with other like organizations throughout the Southwest Jurisdiction is aware of the need to continually update and refine the job descriptions and roles of both the lay organization and the conference and district lay leaders. With that in mind, we will be involved in planning and implementing a Jurisdictional level retreat event

dealing with the redefining and clarification of the role and function of the lay leader, both on district and conference level. Additionally, we are in the process of tentatively planning a retreat type event for the District Lay Leaders and District Superintendents of this conference in an effort to clarify within our structure as an Annual Conference a specific nature of the roles of the District Commissions, the District Lay Leaders, as well as having the purpose of forming a closer relationship and awareness of the role of District Lay Leader and District Superintendent.

The Commission and its members continue in a supportive way to function throughout the conference attempting to live out the role of the laity in ministry in the church.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

The Board of Pensions realizes it has a sacred responsibility to guide the program of retirement benefits for the ministerial members of the Conference to afford maximum financial undergirding in the retirement years. Recommendations it makes consider this responsibility and also the inherent responsibility of being fiscally responsible for wise and prudent decisions that will guarantee the economic security of its decisions.

The Board of Pensions recommends that the annuity rate for the new year be \$95 per service year. Furthermore, the Board has affirmed its goal that the increase during coming years be not less than \$2 per year until the annuity rate of \$100 per service year is reached. When financial condition of the account warrants it the Board's intention is that the annuity rate set be as high as possible. Realizing that under present conditions to raise annuity \$1 per service year requires approximately \$100,000 in increased deposits. This is the actuarial estimate for funding all ministers for their service years for a \$1 increase in benefits.

The Board is pleased to note that pledges to the Limited Capital Funds Campaign for pensions has reached \$1,430,000. At the end of the second year of this five year campaign money actually paid upon pledges was slightly more than \$600,000. We believe this is a demonstration of the concern of many of the people in our Conference that ministers be afforded a decent annuity. The faithful support of many lay persons of the Conference as well as ministers has enabled this \$1,500,000 goal to be within easy distance.

Throughout our great church, and indeed many other denominations, there has been a marked move toward providing a housing allowance to ministers in lieu of a furnished parsonage. This trend will likely continue, although it is met with deep concern by some and rejoicing by others. An impartial questionnaire mailed to each minister of the Conference provided valuable indication of the sentiment in this regard. It is the considered judgement of this Board that this Conference should request an appropriate study group or existing body to make a study of this matter, that congregations might have facts pro and con available should they desire them. The Board of Pensions, of course, takes no position on this matter but does request that the Conference provide an impartial study.

The following ministerial members of the Annual Conference have requested the retired relationship and the Board of Pensions recommends that the Conference grant that relationship. They are: J. Morris Bailey, Floyd A. Boulware, Lloyd Ferrell, Len Layne, E. C. Hewitt.

The Board has received no requests for sustentation for the coming year.

HOMES FOR RETIRED MINISTERS

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

Since 1906 the Central Texas Conference has been providing homes for ministers who needed help at retirement. The need is as acute now as it has ever been and will in all probability become more so. We have 30 homes, all of them occupied.

Each home has been acquired by the conference with the understanding that it would be kep in liveable repair. In addition, insurance premiums and taxes must be paid. To provide funds for these expenses a special offering has been received each year in July. We want to thank the members of the churches in the conference for the offering this past year which amounted to \$12,438.00. We need your continued support.

Heretofore, most of the annual offering had to be used for insurance premiums, (\$2104.00 this year), and taxes, (\$7784.00 this year), leaving very little for upkeep and repairs. We spent \$9,010.65 this year on upkeep and repairs. For the last three years, the residents of the homes have been taking care of minor repairs and have been contributing monthly to our program. Their gifts this past year amounted to \$8,342.00. You can see that their support has been a great help to our program.

AREA HEADQUARTERS STUDY COMMITTEE

WORLD HUNGER MISSIONAL PRIORITY TASK FORCE

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

- 1. In 1977, 250 Churches gave \$34,290.43 to World Hunger Advance Specials. This was our response to a goal of \$33,600.00. We would remind our Churches that this Priority is an "Advance Priority Special" and is not to be confused with other branches of the general Church which may have special food projects (such as UMCOR, CROP, etc.). Churches are requested to give special attention to instructions for mailing offerings as provided by our Conference Treasurer.
- 2. We recommend our Annual Conference's participation and non-financial support of WHEAT, the ecumenical channel for political and national information and influence.
- 3. The World Hunger Priority is a "two-way" street in that hunger is often near at hand. Churches which have food programs and nutritional ministries could be eligible for partial funding from this Advance Special. Information and applications are available from this Task Force.
- 4. In that Advance giving is "second mile" giving, and not part of our program, administrative, or general budget assessments; we are prepared to assist our Churches, Districts, and Annual Conference with information, ideas, and possible projects for reaching our Conference-wide goal of \$33,600.00. To aid in reaching this goal and give total opportunity to every member of our Annual Conference, we will provide each congregation with the outline, plan, and necessary materials for a Thanksgiving Offering for World Hunger based upon the idea of "Buy A Sack Of Groceries For A Hungry Family." Our goal is to complete this effort on November 19 Thanksgiving Sunday.

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

(Approved June 6, 1978)

The close of another conference year brings us to the midpoint in the Quadrennium and we attempt to reflect upon and assess our life together as a cabinet and as a conference.

We experience positive feelings about the present state of our conference and are happy to report that there is an unusually strong sense of unity in our midst. Generally, morale of ministers and laypeople is high. There is a growing sense of inclusiveness in our fellowship and an openness to the need for outreach ministries in the world. Committed lay people are giving strong leadership at every level.

The everpresent danger is that we will become self satisfied and stagnant in our outlook and efforts and turn a deaf ear to more stimulating and provocative ideas and endeavors. During the year ahead we will be marching under the banner, "The Future Will Not Wait." We must be more future oriented and allow our thought processes to move beyond mere institutional maintenance and look toward an aggressive and stimulating approach. We must be willing to move out and take more risks in our ideas and efforts. Special attention must be given to a clear understanding of the mission and purpose of the Annual Conference. Boards and agencies must plan and work with the fulfillment of the mission and purpose as the one major objective.

As a cabinet we feel that we are growing and improving in our life and work together. A unique sense of camaraderie and teamwork has developed. We are moving toward a better understanding of our task and its conference-wide responsibilities — especially in the

appointive process. The retreat with the North Texas Conference Cabinet in which Dr. Lyle Schaller gave leadership helped as we struggled for a better understanding of our task. Much time and effort was spent in the preparation of the statement on the appointive process. There have been many indications that it has been helpful.

Some of the high points in the districts' work during the past conference year are:

Brownwood: Church Growth Seminar, reorganization of District Commission on Lay Concerns, Lenten Rally on hunger, stewardship training, Lay Leader training, PPR Committee Consultation.

Fort Worth East: Lay Academy for training officers and teachers, district celebration, giving guidance and material in budget campaigns.

Fort Worth West: Missions Rally, preaching seminar, sub-district workshops for PPR Committees, Festival '78 with orientation sessions for local church officials, Christmas in July for benefit of United Community Centers, strong youth program.

Temple: Pastors' retreat, Epiphany Celebration with training for local church officers, Lay Concerns Banquet, VCS training.

Waco: Epiphany Celebration, leadership training, creation of personal relationships among ministers, churches and district superintendent, beginning of district and subdistrict youth organization.

Waxahachie: local church leaders training, workshop for leaders with Lyle Schaller, continuing education events at meetings of pastors and spouses, training seminars for PPR Committees on how appointments are made.

Weatherford: development of a team spirit, two church growth seminars, three adult curriculum workshops, giving to general advance doubled, strong district commission on lay life and work, two youth curriculum workshops, led all districts in Texas and New Mexico in Methodist Home Offering.

Each of the districts has sought to respond to the Missional Priorities — Ethnic Minority Local Church, World Hunger and Evangelism. Various methods of informing the people have been employed.

The Ethnic Minority Local Church Advance has received gifts from 96 churches and the World Hunger Advance has received gifts from 250 churches. Reprioritizing in the conference and several of the districts has made funds available for the Ethnic Minority Local Church cause. We urge all our people to acquaint themselves with the crisis in the ethnic minority churches and to direct more support of every kind to this cause.

Real progress has been made in the area of evangelism. During 1977 increases were experienced in many churches:

130 churches had increases in membership

128 churches had increases in worship attendance

106 churches had increases in Sunday School attendance

We believe that we have turned a corner and that we are on our way. We regret that church school membership and participation continues to decline. Special emphasis on evangelism and the church school are mandates for us. A number of districts have had church growth seminars and evangelism rallies. Emphasis has been given in Charge Conferences and pastors' meetings. We must not let up in our efforts to enlist the unchurched, to activate the inactive and to have all our people involved in learning growing experiences.

CENTRAL TEXAS FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

Report No. 1

(Approved June 6, 1978)

The Central Texas Conference Federal Credit Union has had an excellent year, thanks to your participation in it. Its assets have risen \$120,990 to a total of \$629,609. If we continue at the rate we are now on, it will be only a couple of years until we pass the \$1,000,000 mark. Loans this last 12 month period have totaled \$606,269, amounting to an increase of \$107,690

over the same period a year ago. Share deposits now total \$565,728, an increase of \$154,689 in the past year. We are over the one-half million dollar mark for the first time in our existence in share deposits. Membership increased by 137 this past year, now totaling 632. Loans this past month (May) totaled \$65,571, a new record loan total for a one-month period.

Your credit union is still one of the best places to save money. Dividends of 6% are paid regularly which also included automatic share deposit insurance. We urge every minister who is not a member to seriously consider enrolling the entire family as members. Underage children who become members will be able to remain members all their life. This can be a real advantage, as they may not have access to a credit union in their own profession.

The credit union is also an excellent place to borrow money, as long as we have the money to lend. It has a most competitive rate with any other financial institution and carries automatic death benefits on money borrowed at no extra charge. The true annual percentage rate is 9% if the loan is covered by share deposits, or 12% if it is not covered by share deposits.

We do wish that all of our members would be active members. We have a poor record of participation, as seen in that over 3/4 of our members hold less than 1/4 of our shares, and about 40% of our members have share balances of less than \$25.00. Our Credit Union will be only as great as its members want it to be.

We express our appreciation to Dr. J. W. Sprinkle, our treasurer, for the fine way he oversees the work of the Credit Union.

Report Of The Study Committee For The Area Counseling Program

A. Introduction

The 1977 Annual Conferences of the North Texas Conference and Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church recognized with special appreciation the eleven years of service provided by De Forrest Wiksten as Director of the Area Pastoral Counseling Service and accepted his resignation from that position at the time of his receiving a pastoral appointment in the North Texas Conference. The report of the Area Counseling Committee, received and approved by the two conferences (p. 199 North Texas Journal; p. 154 Central Texas Journal) concludes with the following recommendations:

- (1) That a study of the total support system for ordained ministers in the two conferences, including services now performed by the Area Counseling Office, be conducted during the next several months.
- (2) That an interim Area Counselor be named to continue basic functions of the Office and assist in conducting the study. It is understood that this interim Area Counselor shall be required to give less than full time to the Office, and that as needed, remaining funds already approved for the Area Counseling Committee's work be available to complete the study.
- (3) That the present Area Counseling Committee membership be enlarged for the purpose of this study, to include one representative from each Cabinet (named by the respective Cabinets); one representative from each Board of Ordained Ministry (named by the respective Boards); at least one ethnic minority member and one woman from each Conference (to be named by the respective Conference Nominating Committees). Others may be utilized as resource persons or consultants as determined by the Study Committee. Our intent is to continue to provide effective counseling guidance for ordained ministers and their families within the two conferences. We believe that this is an ideal time to carefully evaluate our procedures and, if necessary, to update services which are offered.

In response to the above instructions, the Committee has carried out the following:

- 1. Appointed Robert E. Elliott as Interim Director, on a part-time basis.
- 2. Has assembled as an expanded committee, with additional members from each conference, has undertaken a study of support needs in the two conferences, and presents the following report and recommendations:

B. Need

1. The Study Committee sees a clear need for continuing pastoral counseling services for clergy and families. Ministers and their families are subject to the troubles and hurts of other mortals, and in some ways are subject to unique stresses. It is essential that the conferences continue to provide for their members access to confidential and competent pastoral counseling, and perhaps other forms of counseling or therapy as well.

2. However, there is also a broad range of support needs for clergy and families, occurring at several transition points in the minister's life and career, from entry to departure, in which counseling may not be the most effective form of pastoral support. The counselor's value is that he stands outside the system; but there are many other appropriate forms of help, counsel, and guidance that can be more effectively implemented by one who stands inside the system. The Committee sees the need for such a person to serve as a system's facilitator, coordinating and expediting the present network of support services in the conference, in matters of recruitment, admissions, evaluation, insurance and pension programs, retirement, continuing education, and other concerns of professional ministry. Conference boards and agencies responsible for oversight of these matters have been given increasingly extensive and detailed tasks, calling for more time and energy than is reasonable to expect of volunteer personnel. The people charged with responsibility for those support services need the help of a system's coordinator and facilitator. Such a facilitator could minister more directly to many of the morals and pastoral identity concerns of clergy, before they develop into personality crises needing specialized counseling or therapy.

C. Director of Professional Ministries

- 1. We propose that the function of the present Area Counseling office be contracted to pastoral and professional counselors in each annual conference under the Direction of the present Study Committee for Area Counseling.
- 2. We further recommend that the present office of Administrative Assistant to the Bishop be expanded to form a new Area position to be known as the Director of Professional Ministries; and that Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe, in consultation with the new Area Committee on Professional Ministries, select and appoint by, or before, the 1979 Annual Conference, the Director of Professional Ministries at a salary at the average level of the District Superintendents of the two conferences.
- 3. We recommend that the source of funding for contracting Counseling Services and for the office of Director of Ministries shall not exceed the amount budgeted for the 1979 Central Texas Annual Conference positions of the Area Counseling Service and the office of the Administrative Assistant to the Bishop. (Passed by North Texas Conference, May 29, 1978)

D. Relationships

- 1. The Director of Professional Ministries (abbreviation DPM) will be responsible to:
 - The Bishop, and
 - A newly formed Area Committee on Professional Ministries, to be formed of the chairpersons of the following Boards or Councils:

CENTRAL TEXAS

NORTH TEXAS

Board of Ministry Board of Pensions Council on Prof. Ministries **Board of Ordained Ministries**

Board of Prof. Support

Board of Higher Education & Ministry

plus two at-large clergy members from each conference, to be nominated by

the respective Committees on Nominations.

- 2. The DPM will serve as a member of the two cabinets, except the making of appointments.
- 3. The DPM will serve as Executive Officer of all conference agencies responsible for ordained ministry.
 - 4. The DPM will be the administrator of the Area Counseling Program(s).

E. Functions

- 1. The DPM is to be a systems facilitator, working to enable present professional support structures better to meet the needs of persons they are designed to serve.
- 2. The office will bear to conference pastoral support systems something of the relationship the office of Program Council bears to other conference program agencies, as resource and facilitator.

- 3. As Executive Officer of Boards and Counsels having to do with concerns of Professional Ministry, the DPM will not displace chairpersons or other officers, nor usurp their authority, but will assist them to implement and coordinate their work in such areas as:
 - a. Recruitment
 - b. Candidacy
 - c. Admissions
 - d. Continuing Education
 - Evaluation of professional performance, including the maintainance of professional record files.
 - f. Health and other insurance programs
 - g. Retirement
- 4. The DPM will administer the Area Counseling Program in such a way as to maintain both quality and confidentiality of service. (See Paragraph I).
- 5. The DPM will perform some of the duties currently assigned to the Administrative Assistant to the Bishop.

F. Qualifications

A candidate for this position, if not a United Methodist minister him/herself, will need to know intimately both the United Methodist system and experience of United Methodist clergy. She/He will need to be "People-Oriented," although his/her work will be more with groups and structures than with individuals in one-to-one relationships. She/he will need to have consultant and management skills, and preferably counseling skills, although counseling may be a small part of the work. She/he will need to have the kind of standing and integrity that invites trust and confidence from persons at all levels of the system.

G. Tenure

The DPM will be appointed without limitation of tenure.

H. Budget

The DPM will be salaried at the average level of District Superintendents in the two conferences. A proposed budget:

I. Area Pastoral Counseling Program

The Director of Professional Ministries will have special responsibility for oversight of the Area Counseling Program, and will be in a position to help implement some options in the flexible design of that program.

- 1. Needs
 - a. Geography: An obvious need is for wider geographical distribution of counseling resources, especially in relation to western and southern parts of Central Texas Conference.
 - b. Other Types: Further thought should be given to the possible need for other

- specialized kinds of counseling, such as psychiatric therapy, vocational counseling, etc.
- c. Choice: No one counselor, no matter how skilled, will be best for all clients; having a choice of counselors available can therefore be an advantage to conference members.

2. Contract Services

Therefore the Study Committee believes attention should be given to the plan of providing counseling through fee-for-service contracts with qualified persons, of whom there are a number in both conferences.

3. Cost

Such fee-for-service contracts, if carefully made, can maintain both quality and quantity of counseling services and be maintained at less cost than salary for a full-time person. A current estimate: \$25,000.

4. Recommendations

- a. That the present Interim Director of the Area Counseling Program and the present Area Counseling Committee continue their duties until such time as this report be adopted and implemented by the appointment of a Director of Professional Ministries.
- b. That the new Director of Professional Ministries, when appointed, and the new Area Committee on Professional Ministries, when formed, shall in consultation with other competent persons or groups prepare plans for contractual provision of pastoral (and perhaps other) counseling services for clergy and families of the two conferences.
- c. Among the issues to be considered in such plans:
 - (1) Types of counseling and counselors
 - (2) Qualifications for counselors
 - (3) Distribution and location of Offices
 - (4) Budget and cost for services
 - (5) Possible use of client fees and health insurance coverage to further reduce conference cost.
 - (6) Accountability, confidentiality, and referral procedures.

In a fee-for-service plan special care will be needed in the delicate balance of accountability and confidentiality in the counselor's work. The counselor must protect the anonymity and confidentiality of his/her work with clients, while at the same time making some responsible accounting of work for which she/he is being paid. Such a balance can be maintained if the Director of Professional Ministries and the counselors are selected wisely and establish good professional working relationships.

RESOLUTION ON LICENSED CHILD CARE IN TEXAS

(Approved June 6, 1978)

During the last Legislative Session in Texas, a strong challenge was raised against statutes that establish minimum standards for child care placing, under licensing by the State Department of Human Resources.

Several church-related agencies sought exclusion from the standards under the guise of alleged interference with the practice of religious education or worship. Though fully licensed, Methodist Mission Home, San Antonio, and Methodist Home, Waco, fully subscribe to the guidelines under which licensing maintains adequate standards of service to children, and witness that they have not experienced the difficulties reported by others.

Many might prefer fewer reviews and less scrutiny by State Officers, and we sometimes disagree over procedures and even principles. Nevertheless, we prefer this to a complete lack of standards. Licensed childrens' services provide competent, ethical, high-standard service to children.

Our principles stem from our basic goals: To insure that every child be given quality care and protection regardless whether such care is provided by a non-profit private agency with religious motivations and sponsorship, a state owned institution, or by a profit making business organization operated with corporate interests and goals in mind. Only when licensing and regulation is vested at a level remote from local interest and influence, can reasonable assurances of protection for children be expected.

Therefore, be it resolved that the Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas, Rio Grande, and the Texas Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church owning and operating the Methodist Home and the Methodist Mission Home affirm the defense and protection of rights and privileges of children needing care by other than their parents, and uphold the principle of licensing agencies, for purposes of caring and placing children, to protect minimum standards of care for every child in the care of other people.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Report No. 1

(Approved June 7, 1978)

- 1. The members of the Council on Finance and Administration wish to thank the Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors and local church memberships for the excellent response that has enabled us to meet all our obligations 100% in 1977. This year we are presenting for your approval a budget that represents approximately 8% increase. We are grateful to all boards and agencies that have attempted to maintain a reasonable increase in light of an inflationary period.
- 2. The Salary allowances for the District Superintendency shall be an amount equal to 110% of the average of the salary and allowances paid to pastors of the top twenty (20) churches of the Conference. It shall be computed on the basis of salaries approved by Charge Conference which appear on the Episcopal work sheets as of April 1 prior to the meeting of the Annual Conference. The figures will be compiled by the Administrative Assistant to the Bishop and transmitted to the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Conference Secretary-Treasurer within five days.

The salary includes a housing allowance actually expended not to exceed \$1,500.00. The \$1,115.00 requested by the Board of Pensions for all members under appointment with annuity is added to the above figure.

The Council recommends to the Annual Conference that district committees on finance be authorized to draw up district budgets for presentation to the District Stewards for office operations and to travel allowances, provided the budgets will be submitted to the Council on Finance and Administration for approval if the total increase of the district fund exceeds 10% of the previous year's budget.

We recommend that District Stewards be authorized to apportion a Connectional Contingency Fund used in paying in full apportionment items which may fall short within the respective district. The apportionments will not include the traditional cushions. The Connectional Contingency Fund will be administered at the district level in the same means as the District Work Fund. It is understood that if a portion of the Connectional Contingency Fund is not used in any given year, it will remain in the fund and future apportionments will be reduced. Any adjustments for unusual local church situations will be made in the apportionment of the Connectional Contingency Fund only. All other apportionments will be distributed to every local church on the basis of the decimal.

We recommend the unified form agreed upon by the Cabinet for reporting district budgets.

3. We appreciate the progress of the Capital Fund Campaign sponsored by the Board of Pensions. The next three years will be extremely important and every effort should be made to keep the pledges up to date in order that the Reserve Pension Program will soon be fully funded and be releasing funds for other causes.

In 1979 the Conference Claimants Fund is to be set at \$640,000.00. This covers all costs and expenses for the support of all obligations to the Retired Ministers, their wives and dependent children.

In 1979 the Connectional Ministers Fund will be \$238,037.00. Of that amount, the Episcopal Fund is \$45,202, and the District Superintendents Fund will be \$192,835.00.

4. The Council recommends the request from the Board of Higher Education and Ministry that the Texas Methodist College Association apportionment remain at \$1.50

per member and that the Wesley Foundation Fund be increased from $75 \, \epsilon$ to $85 \, \epsilon$ per member. These funds to be apportioned to districts and local churches on the decimal authorized by the conference.

5. We concur in the request of the South-Central Jurisdictional Conference and its Council of Bishops and set the amount of \$14,788.00 for Lydia Patterson Institute and \$30,000.00 for Southern Methodist University in our budget to be distributed annually as authorized in the standing rules of the conference. Thus, the Council on Finance and Administration requests the following for 1979:

- 6. We concur with ACCOM to raise Conference travel from 8 and 10 cents to 10 and 15 cents per mile. We request Conference Standing Rules be changed in accordance.
- 7. We encourage the support of the Advance Specials Program in every local church. Especially, we ask consideration for the goal of \$62,200.00 annually for Ethnic Minority Local Church and \$33,600.00 for the World Hunger Program.
- We recommend the appointment of Dr. J. W. Sprinkle as Secretary-Treasurer of the Central Texas Conference.

Report No. 2

(Approved June 7, 1978)

 The Conference Council on Finance and Administration approves and recommends that the following offerings be taken in all local churches of the Central Texas Conference on or near the dates designated:

UNITED METHODIST STUDENT DAY, 2nd Sunday in June HOMES FOR RETIRED MINISTERS, 2nd Sunday in July CHRISTIAN EDUCATION SUNDAY, 4th Sunday in September WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY, 1st Sunday in October METHODIST MISSION HOME OF TEXAS, 1st Sunday in November THE METHODIST HOME, WACO, The Month of December HUMAN RELATIONS DAY, last Sunday in January GLEN LAKE — RAINBOW, the Month of March ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING, 4th Sunday in Lent GOLDEN CROSS Sunday, 1st Sunday in May WESLEYAN HOME MOTHER'S DAY OFFERING, 2nd Sunday in May EVANGELISM SUNDAY

 While no special day is designated for an offering for the Texas Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc., we approve this special cause for either an appropriation from the budget in the local church, or a special offering taken at such time as the local church determines.

- We concur with ACCOM on their proposal to schedule program and budget. i.e. ACCOM Report
- 4. In keeping with the requirements of the Discipline, the apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolences will be combined into one fund, namely, World Service and Conference Benevolences. This fund, along with Connectional Ministry, Conference Claimant's Fund, Conference Projects, Minister's Insurance, Texas Methodist College Association, Wesley Foundation, Ministerial Education Fund, Black Methodist College Fund, Missional Priority Fund, Joint Communication Council for Evangelism, Lydia Patterson, Southern Methodist University, will be apportioned to the Districts on the decimal figure, established annually, as authorized in the Standing Rules of the Conference.
- 5. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to distribute each month the receipts from local churches for World Service and Conference Benevolences among the funds included in the annual budget of the conference in proportion to their apportionments. Any deficit in remittances from the churches will be covered by payments from the Operating Reserve, upon approval by CFA.
- 6. All boards, commissions and other agencies shall have prepared in writing their detailed budget requests for the ensuing fiscal year by a date mutually agreed upon and announced by CFA and ACCOM. The program agencies shall present their requests to the Committee on Coordination and Budget by said date. The non-program agencies shall present their requests to the CFA by the same date.
- 7. No board or agency of the Central Texas Conference shall expend any money for any purpose which has not been included in the original budget, as amended and approved by CFA and the Conference and printed in the current Journal. Exceptions to this rule can only be made by CFA or its executive committee.
- 8. The fiscal year of all boards, commissions and other agencies operating through the Central Treasury shall begin January 1 and close on December 31.
- The Conference Treasurer is authorized to pay from the Operating Reserve the following items.
 - a. Expenses of printing the Journal, which may exceed budget appropriation.
 - b. Expenses of the Conference Secretarial Staff.
 - c. Expense of Fidelity Bonds for the Conference Treasurer and others who handle Conference Funds, as determined by CFA.
 - d. Expenses of auditing the books of the Conference Treasurer, the treasurers of boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference as may be ordered by CFA. Such audits are to be made by the Conference auditors, the firm of Clay-Wilson, C.P.A.
 - e. The moving expenses of ministers of the Conference as described in the 1973 minutes of the Conference Journal, Page 27. When the next Annual Budget is prepared the CFA is authorized to place the total amount in the budget to repay the Operating Reserve for past year spending.
 - f. Other expenditures as may be authorized by CFA. Such expenditures not to exceed \$500 may be authorized by the Executive Committee of the Council.
- 10. The Conference Treasurer is authorized:
 - a. To consolidate the various funds of the Annual Conference and of the agencies into one or more bank accounts.
 - b. To write all checks for the agencies of the Conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency and in keeping with the approved Conference

- Budget. He is also authorized to transmit to the authorized treasurers all other funds that are raised by the local churches in response to General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference askings that have been approved by the appropriate body.
- c. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempt by CFA) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.
- d. To invest the funds of the Conference in Government Securities and Federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and to borrow on and dispose of investments at or, prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in accounts of the Conference at his discretion and under the guidance of CFA.
- e. To deposit funds for specifically designated purposes in federally insured depositories under the joint control of the Central Treasury and the agency concerned, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.

Charles Maley Buttrill

Charles Maley Buttrill was born April 13, 1884 in Fredonia, Alabama. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. D. B. Buttrill. He moved with his family to a farm near Mansfield, Texas in 1892 and attended the Mansfield Public Schools. He attended the Polytechnic College, Ft. Worth, Southwestern University, Georgetown, and Southern Methodist University, Dallas.

He married Annie Margaret Broun, June 24, 1914 at Greenwood, Texas in Wise County. He received his license to preach in 1910 at First Methodist Church in Fort Worth, Texas. In 1912 Brother Buttrill was assigned to Arcadia, Oklahoma. He served in



Oklahoma until 1920 when he was appointed to Mt. Calm in the Central Texas Conference. From then until his retirement in 1948 some of the churches he served included Penelope, Diamond Hill, Ft. Worth, Itasca, Dawson, Ferris, Couts Memorial, Weatherford, Rising Star, Ferris Heights, Waxahachie, Italy, St. Paul, Cleburne, Oglesby. Following retirement he lived in Grandview, The Wesleyan Home, Georgetown, McGregor, The Regis Retirement Home in Waco.

He died on Monday, August 15, 1977. Those surviving him include three daughters, Mrs. Hulen (Leta) Bills of Waco, Mrs. Sidney (Jennie) Files of Houston, and Mrs. Charles (Margaret) Cole of McGregor, six grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

The Reverend Dr. George Albert Fallon

At the June 1974 Central Texas Annual Conference, United Methodist Church, Dr. George Fallon was appointed by Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe to organize a new congregation in North Arlington. On June 19, 1974 the first worship service was held in the nearby Ramada Inn; 79 attended, and when Dr. Fallon issued the call to unite and help build a new church, 52 responded. Palm Sunday 1977 the congregation moved into their completed Sanctuary.

Dr. Fallon was born in England. He took his undergraduate work at Allegheny College, Meadville, Pennsylvania and at the School of Missions, Drew



Theological Seminary. His graduate work was taken at Drew Theological Seminary and the School of Theology, Boston University, where he received his Bachelor and Master of Sacred Theology degrees. Allegheny and Baldwin-Wallace College in Ohio conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

After serving the Mt. Lebanon United Methodist Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Dr. Fallon went to Wesley United Methodist Church in Worcester, Massachusetts, where in his ten years of service it became the largest Methodist church in New England.

In 1953 Dr. Fallon went to the Lakewood Church in Cleveland, Ohio. Under his eleven-year pastorate the Lakewood Church achieved an outstanding place in the nation because of the emphasis on Lay participation. During his ministry the Lakewood Church never received fewer than 100 members a year on Profession of Faith; 3,627 new members were received, making Lakewood then the largest Methodist Church in Ohio.

Dr. Fallon became the senior minister of Trinity Methodist Church in 1964, in Lafayette, Indiana, home of Purdue University. Here he ministered to students, university educators and lay people from all walks of life. Trinity, a downtown church, became a service center in the brief two years he was there. A Pastoral Counseling Center was established in the church with six clinically trained ministers as qualified counselors. A Planned Parenthood Clinic was started in the church, with a woman doctor as Director. Active in the Ecumenical movement, Dr. Fallon held the first Ecumenical services in Lafayette at Trinity Church. For the first time in its 97 year history, the church took on the support of two full-time missionaries.

Dr. Fallon was Assistant General Secretary for the General Board of Evangelism, Nashville, Tennessee (now the Board of Discipleship). With responsibility for the Field Services section, he developed the New Life Missions by adding the new phase of making personal and corporate commitments about specific involvement in the church and community. Under his direction were the Koinonia ministries which included Prayer Groups; Lay Witnessing was brought to the Board; Leisure Time ministries were established; Urban and Inner City work broadened; a bi-lingual department was added to serve the Spanish-speaking peoples; new programs were started for designated leaders of evangelism within the local church, district and conference levels. He preached continuously in various churches across the country and in England.

For sixteen years Dr. Fallon served as a member of the Executive Committee of the General Board of Evangelism of the Methodist Church. He was elected the first President of the National Council of Evangelism and served as president for six years. During his ministry he served on many national church boards. He was a delegate to several General and Jurisdictional Conferences of the Methodist Church. He was a delegate to the organizational meeting of the World Council of Churches in Amsterdam in 1948. He preached at many annual conferences including the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Dr. Fallon was married to Ruth B. Fallon, world traveller and lecturer. They had two sons; George J. Fallon lives in Maine, and Dr. Gary J. Bloomfield lives in Washington; and one little granddaughter, Kyla Bloomfield.

Charles Hermon Cole

A uniquely effective ministry began November 2, 1925. As Dr. Charles Hermon Cole often said, "That was when I took my one wife, my one son, my one dog, and my one suitcase, and putting this sum total of all my possessions in my one car, moved to become pastor of the McCurton and Kinta Methodist Churches in Oklahoma."

Licensed to preach in 1925, Dr. Cole was ordained a Deacon in 1927 in Muskogee, Oklahoma and was ordained an Elder at the Boston Avenue Methodist Church in Tulsa, Oklahoma in 1929.

During his six years as a pastor in Oklahoma he served at Allen, Fairland, Stilwell, and Afton. The Coles then moved to the Texas-New Mexico Conference where they served at Marathon, Fort Davis, and Wink.

In 1935 Dr. Cole transferred to the Central Texas Conference where he served with distinction for thirty four years. Some of the most important and strategic churches in the Conference are included in the list of those he served: Comanche, Winters, Fort Worth Highland Park (later named Carter Park), Graham First, Waco St. John's, Mineral Wells First, Waco First, and Weatherford First.

The quality of his ministerial leadership is emphasized by the fact that he served two full terms as District Superintendent, first in the Cleburne District and later in the Gatesville District. He was well known for his interest in and his outstanding ability to work with young people in their early ministry. Many pastors are indebted to him for his encouragement and for his wise, patient, and loving counsel.

Dr. Cole's academic record includes education in the Zephyr public schools, Daniel Baker College, School of Mines (Miami, Oklahoma), and an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Texas Weslevan College.

The son of Robert and Julia Cole, Charles Hermon was born August 31, 1904 near Lancaster in Dallas County. The youngest of nine children, he moved with his family to a farm near Zephyr in Brown County when he was but a child. There he grew to manhood and married Miss Ozella Harshaw on November 2, 1924. Ozella was ever a faithful wife and mother and co-worker in every venture. In her own right she has been an outstanding leader in youth work and women's work.

Actively involved in the work of connectional Methodism, Dr. Cole was elected as a Conference delegate to Jurisdictional Conference, was Chairman of the Board of Trustees of Retired Ministers Homes, and on the Boards of Trustees of the Wesley Foundation, the Methodist Home in Waco, and the Methodist Mission Home in San Antonio.

Following his retirement in February of 1969, the Coles moved to McGregor where he continued to serve the Lord. He taught Sunday School in the Methodist Church there, and was always a supporter of the church's ministers and ministry.

Dr. Cole died January 15, 1978, fittingly a Sunday. He was interred at Waco Memorial Park on January 18 following a funeral service conducted by two of the many ministers who looked upon him as a spiritual father, J. Frank Turner, Jr., and Michael Patison. The choir for the service was composed of other ministers whose lives had been influenced by him.


He is survived by his wife Ozella and his son Charles Hermon, Jr., both of McGregor; by two sisters, Mrs. Ernest Marable of Brownwood and Mrs. W. M. Hooper of Ennis; a brother, George Cole of Brownwood; two granddaughters, Mrs. Kenneth E. Griffin of Dayton, Ohio and Mrs. Derrell R. Helm of Azle, Texas; two great-grandsons, David Griffin and Brian Helm; and by a number of nieces, nephews, and friends.

MICHAEL PATISON

P. E. Cantrell

P. E. Cantrell was born September 12, 1885 near Brownwood, Texas. His marriage to Ellie Milligan on September 6, 1906 was the first wedding in the Line Street Methodist Church in Hillsboro. Several years later while working in the Piggly Wiggly grocery store in Hillsboro, P. E. Cantrell made a decision to enter the ministry of the Methodist Church. He attended and received degrees from Georgetown and Southern Methodist University.

In 1917 he was admitted to the Central Texas Conference on trail. He was ordained Deacon in 1919 and ordained Elder in 1921. During the twenty years he




served in the Central Texas Conference, he served the following churches: Eliasville, Corsicana circuit, South Bend, Sardis, Caddo, Joshua, Tolar, Haslet, Comanche, Palo Pinto, Aledo and Caddo. He retired in 1939 for health reasons and lived in Mineral Wells, Texas until his death on January 16, 1978 after a lengthy illness. The memorial service was held at the Baum Funeral Home Chapel with Rev. Barry Holmes, pastor of Central United Methodist Church officiating.

Wallace Nail Dunson, Sr.

Wallace Nail Dunson, Sr. was born March 9, 1901 in Crawford, Texas where he spent his early years. In 1924 he was licensed to preach on recommendation of the Hewitt Methodist Church, took his first appointment (Olney Circuit) and was admitted on trial into the Central Texas Conference. He attended Meridian Junior College and Southern Methodist University, Dallas. Except for 18 months spent as pastor at Bronte, Southwest Texas Conference, Brother Dunson was appointed to pastor these churches within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference: Santo, Thurber, Cisco, Coleman, Ranger,





He was assistant conference secretary for 4 years and secretary of the Conference Board of Missions from 1938 to 1956. Under the direction of the General Board of Missions, he toured and inspected Methodist work in Europe, including stops in Poland and Czechoslovakia. That trip in 1948 also allowed him to attend the organizational meeting of the World Council of Churches in Amsterdam. He served faithfully on other conference boards and agencies during his 41 active years, always lovingly investing his talents that the Church might remain strong.

William Warren Baker

Reverend William Warren Baker, son of the late Warren and Caroline Jackson Baker, was born September 22, 1889 in the Cedar Community of Limestone County, Texas. He attended the community school.

XI. General Section Conference Standing Rules

As Amended June 7, 1978

I. ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Conference Procedure:

- 1. The Central Texas Conference shall be organized according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 36 and Para. 67: Amendment VII) and shall meet annually at the time appointed by the bishop (Para. 661.2) and the place chosen by the conference (Para. 661.3).
- 1.1 Adjourned or special sessions shall be called in the manner set forth in the Book of Discipline (Para 661.4).
- 1.2 The business of the Annual Conference shall be conducted according to Roberts Rules of Order.
- 1.3 Lay members and alternate members of the Annual Conference shall be elected at the charge conference for a one year term to begin on January 1, following their election, subject, however, to paragraph 700.3 of the Discipline.
- 1.3.1 To equalize the number of Lay and Clerical members of the Annual Conference the following will be members by virtue of the office held: each District Lay Leader, each District United Methodist Women's President and Conference Program Board Chairperson who is a lay person, the Diaconal Ministers of the Conference not otherwise members, and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, General Council on Ministries and General Church Board and Agency representatives not otherwise members of Annual Conference; and one additional Lay member from the Charges of the Conference whose membership is above the number, set annually by the Conference Secretary required to equalize the ratio between clergy and Lay Members. This figure will be revised annually. The Conference Secretary will notify the District Superintendent as to the churches that will elect additional members by January preceding the next Annual Conference.
- 1.3.2 Each charge of the Annual Conference is responsible for defraying the expenses of its lay and clerical members while in attendance at the conference.
- 1.4 All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference which pertain to the work of one of the conference boards, commissions, committees, and councils shall be referred to the proper boards, commissions, committees, or councils before action can be taken by the Annual Conference, and shall be reported back to the conference for action prior to the close of the conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.
- 1.5 All papers, resolutions, obituaries, and reports coming to the conference, not included in the Pending Report book, must be typewritten in triplicate and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the secretary before they are presented to the conference. Any reports requiring approval of the Annual Conference, not in the Pending Report book, shall be reproduced for members of the conference so that they may follow the report as it is being presented.
- 1.6 Per diem allowance for each day in actual attendance at Annual Conference will be granted retired ministers, retired deaconesses, and pastors, any of whom are receiving a total salary of, or less than the minimum salary of the conference. It shall also be granted to the aforementioned ministers' spouses and students appointed to attend school.
- 1.7 There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the secretary of the conference and the secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of the deceased ministers and wives or widows of ministers. The ministers in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing it with the committee immediately after the funeral.
- 1.8 Any of the standing rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference, provided that any motion to amend the Conference Standing Rules must lay on table at least one day before the conference can vote to amend.
- 1.9 Vacancies on all Conference Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall be filled by nominations by and selected by the appropriate body. Those persons elected to fill vacancies shall serve the remainder of the tenure of the original member. "However, when the chairperson of the committee has been transferred to another district and, in the opinion of the appropriate body, unusual circumstances require the continued services of such chairpersons, the body shall have the right to retain that person in its membership for the remainder of that person's tenure. Such persons shall not be counted as district representatives."

- 1.9.1 Any member of the Conference Boards, Councils, Commissions, and Committees who is absent without excuse from any two consecutive meetings of the Board, Council, Commission, or Committee shall thereby forfeit membership on the agency and their vacancy shall be filled in accordance with 1.9 above.
- 1.9.2 Retirement from the active itineracy shall vacate a minister's membership on any Conference Board, Council, Commission, Committee, and Institutional Boards, effective on the date such relationship is taken.
- 1.10 Members of General Boards, Councils, Commissions or Committees within the Annual Conference shall be exofficio members of corresponding Conference Agencies.

II. CONFERENCE ORGANIZATION

Annual Conference Council on Ministries:

- There shall be an Annual Conference Council on Ministries as recommended in the Book of Discipline (Para, 831).
- 1.1 The purpose of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall be: (a) to receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district agencies, the annual conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinated program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program; and (c) to provide implementation for an administration of the coordinated program as adopted by the conference.
- 1.2 The Conference Council on Ministries shall be composed of the presiding bishop; a chairperson; vice-chairperson; secretary; and treasurer; the district superintendents; the president of the United Methodist Women and one additional representative from the United Methodist Women; the conference lay leader, the conference director-president of the United Methodist Men; two youth representatives, two young adults, and two representatives of United Methodist Men; the Chairperson of the Board of Discipleship, Board of Church and Society, and Board of Global Ministries, the Board of Higher Education and Ministry, the Commission on Religion and Race; and the Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church, the Chairpersons of the Committees of the ACCOM, three district representatives from each district, one clergy, one lay woman and one lay man; members of the General Council on Ministry; Jurisdictional Council on Ministry, and General Church board and Agency representatives not otherwise members of the Council, and additional members at large as needed to assure minority representatives and equal lay and clerical membership.
- 1.2.1 The conference council staff, the conference secretary-treasurer, conference statistician, the assistant to the bishop, and a representative from the Council on Finance and Administration shall be members of the Council without vote. District representatives and at large members shall be elected annually and shall serve no more than four consecutive years.
- 1.3 The officers of the Council shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and a treasurer, nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Council for a two-year term. If the chairperson is a lay person, the vice-chairperson shall be a minister, and vice versa. No officer is eligible for re-election to the same office.
- 1.4 There shall be an executive committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, consisting of the officers, the bishop, a district superintendent chosen by the cabinet, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women, and the Conference Council director who shall serve without vote. The Chairpersons of program boards and committees on co-ordination and budget, communication and interpretation, and research and planning shall also be members of the Executive Committee in consideration of all agenda matters except matters of personnel. The Council shall nominate and elect such additional members from the Council as may be required so that the executive committee is composed of one-half lay persons and one-half clergy. The officers of the Conference Council on Ministries shall fill the same office on the executive committee.
- 1.5 The executive committee of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall: (a) receive reports and recommendations from the conference boards and agencies to the Conference Council on Ministries; (b) serve as the personnel and budget committee for the Conference Council on Ministries and its staff; and (c) propose the agenda for the meetings of the Council.

Conference Council on Ministries (ACCOM) Committees:

2. There shall be the following Council (ACCOM) committees: a Committee on Research and Planning; a Committee on Coordination and Budget; a Committee on Nominations; a Committee

- on Communications and Interpretation. The Council (ACCOM) shall appoint such other committees, task forces, and consultants as it deems necessary in the performance of its duties, provided that the appointed members shall serve no more than four consecutive years.
- 2.1 The (ACCOM) Committee on Research and Planning shall (1) engage in planning and research on behalf of the council in the continuing ministry of The United Methodist Church within the conference; (2) serve as an advisory group in planning and research for the Annual Conference and its agencies; (3) serve as the clearinghouse for all planning and research projects under the sponsorship of the Annual Conference and its agencies; (4) relate to and cooperate with the planning and research projects of the General Council on Ministries.
- 2.1.1 The members of the committee shall be, the chairperson of the four Boards, the Conference Lay Leader or his representative from the United Methodist Laity (same person through the year), the president of the United Methodist Women or her representative from the United Methodist Women (same person through the year), a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet, the chairperson of the Commission on Religion and Race or chairperson's representative (same person through the year), chairperson of the Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church. Members without vote: chairperson or chairperson's representative from the Conference Council on Finance and Administration (same person through the year), the Conference Council Director.
- 2.1.2 The officers, a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary, and such additional persons as needed shall be nominated and elected by the Conference Council on Ministries.
- 2.2 The (ACCOM) Committee on Coordination and Budget shall (a) receive program recommendations from the local churches, the District and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; (b) evaluate these recommendations and propose a coordinated conference program to the Conference Council on Ministries. It shall also study and coordinate the budget askings of the conference agencies as they relate to the conference program and make recommendations regarding the same to the Conference Council on Ministries.
- 2.2.1 Members shall be chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and eight members nominated and elected by the ACCOM. The membership shall be one-half clergy and one-half laity. The Conference Council Director shall be a member without vote.
- 2.3 The (ACCOM) Committee on Communications and Interpretation shall (a) recommend policies that will enable the Conference, the District, and the local churches, and their agencies, to make use of all communications help; (b) make available to the Conference specialized communications resources, especially in the fields of broadcasting and audio-visuals; (c) to promote principles of good communication within the conference to provide two-way channels of communication between Annual Conference agencies, district Councils on Ministries and local churches, and to lead the Conference in making creative use of communications and opportunities offered by modern media, including Conference and general church periodicals and resources; (d) to provide communications training opportunities for leaders in the Annual Conferences and local churches; (e) to interpret the programs of the General Church and the Annual Conference to the local churches and to promote all general and conference benevolent causes in cooperation with United Methodist Communications.
- 2.3.1 Members shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson and a secretary; the District Communication Co-ordinators, and eight additional members at large. The Conference Council Director shall be a member without vote.
- 2.4 The (ACCOM) Committee on Nominations shall make nominations as the Council on Ministries may determine necessary for fulfilling its program requirements. The ACCOM shall elect three clergy and three lay persons by ballot without nominations. The Committee shall elect officers from within its membership.

Conference Agencies:

Program Boards

- There shall be four Conference Program Boards within the Annual Conference Council on Ministries: The Board of Discipleship; the Board of Church and Society; the Board of Global Ministries; and the Board of Higher Education and Ministry.
- Each Board shall be composed of the officers, one lay man, one lay woman, one clergy representative from each district, elected by the District Conference, a district superintendent chosen by the cabinet, and no more than five members at large who shall be nominated and elected by the board as it may determine necessary to assure minority representation. The district representatives and at large members shall be elected for four years and shall serve no more than four consecutive years.
- 2.1 The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class of the initial membership

serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter one-half of the members shall be elected every two years for a full four year term. Members shall not serve more than four consecutive years and shall not be eligible to serve on any other program board for a one year period.

- 2.2 The Conference Council Director shall be a member of each board without vote.
- 2.3 Each board shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary who shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a two-year period. If the chairperson is a lay person, the vice-chairperson shall be a minister, and vice versa. Officers of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election to the same office and shall not be counted as district representatives.
- 3. The following Boards shall have additional members:
- 3.1 The Board of Discipleship: the conference lay leader and two additional representatives from the United Methodist Commission for Lay Concerns; and the Mission Coordinator of Christian Personhood of the United Methodist Women.
- 3.2 The Board of Church and Society: the Mission Coordinator of Christian Social Involvement of the United Methodist Women.
- 3.3 The Board of Global Ministries: the president of the United Methodist Women; the Mission Coordinator of Global Concern of the United Methodist Women; and one additional representative from the United Methodist Women.
- 3.4 The Board of Higher Education and Ministry: the chairperson, the registrar, and one other representative from the Board of the Ordained Ministry; the chairperson and one other member of the Board of Pensions; and the Mission Coordinator of Supportive Community of the United Methodist Women.
- 4. The Conference Boards will provide consultative service and resources to the local churches, the District Council on Ministries, the Annual Conference, and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. Each Board will be responsible for the essential function of the area of concern assigned to it and will be related to the objectives and scope of work set forth for its general board in the Book of Discipline.

Board of Pensions

- 5. The Board of Pensions shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 1260). A cabinet representative shall be selected by the cabinet as an additional member. The Board shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Higher Education and Ministry and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.
- 5.1 The first elected body shall be divided into two classes. One class serving for the remainder of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible to serve for the remainder of the quadrennium and for an additional quadrennium. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for an eight year term.

Board of Ordained Ministry

- 6. The Board of the Ministry shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 665.4-665.17). The board shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Higher Education and Ministry and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.
- Members shall be nominated by the bishop and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years and are eligible for re-election for one additional four-year term. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each. The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes with one class serving for the remainder of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible for re-election for an additional four year tenure. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four year term of office and shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium.

Council on Finance and Administration

- 7. There shall be a Conference Council on Finance and Administration which shall be composed of five ministers and six lay persons, nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Council shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the members of the council. The Council shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (Para. 866) and such other responsibilities as may be delegated to it by the Annual Conference.
- 7.1 Members shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years and are eligible for re-election for one additional

four-year term. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each. The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class serving for the remainder of the quadrennium and the other class shall be eligible for re-election for the additional four year tenure. Thereafter, each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term of office and shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium.

United Methodist Women

The United Methodist Women shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Global Ministries and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

Commission for Lay Concerns

The United Methodist Commission for Lay Concerns shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Discipleship and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.

Commission on Archives and History

- There shall be a Commission on Archives and History, consisting of one lay person and one clergy elected by the District Caucus, for a four year term. Four at-large members shall be added by nomination of the chairperson of the Commission and elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall have a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and secretary who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. The Commission shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (Para. 1277) and other responsibilities as delegated to it by the Annual Conference. No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms.
- 10.1 The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes, with one class of the initial membership serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter, one-half of the members shall be elected annually for a full four-year term.

Commission on Religion and Race

- There shall be a Commission on Religion and Race following the general guidelines and structure of the General Commission on Religion and Race as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para. 1278 and 1279 as applicable).
- 11.1 The membership shall consist of the bishop, a district superintendent selected by the cabinet, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women and twenty-six additional members. It is recommended that the twenty-six additional members be: four minority clergy; four minority lay men; four minority lay women; three youth under 18 (two minority and one white); three minority young adults, four white clergy; and four white lay persons. The additional members shall not be eligible to serve more than two consecutive years.
- 11.1.1 The initial elected body shall be divided into two classes with one class of the initial membership serving for two years and the other half receiving the full four years. Thereafter, every two years one half the members shall be elected for a full four year term.
- The Commission shall have the responsibilities and duties as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para. 1280.3).

Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church

- The Commission on Status and Role of Women in the church shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline.
- The membership of the Commission shall consist of the following: three clergy, at least one of whom shall be a woman; three lay men; and three lay women; two representatives from Conference United Methodist Women; and six members at large, two of whom shall be under 18, and all selected for their interest, expertise, and with concern for ethnic and age balance in representation.

Board of Trustees

- There shall be a Conference Board of Trustees with duties and responsibilities as outlined in the Book of Discipline (Para. 1410.12).
- 13.1 The membership shall consist of twelve persons who must be at least 30 years of age. Six shall be

ministers in the effective relation in the conference and six shall be lay persons in good standing within local churches within the bounds of Central Texas Conference.

13.2 The Board shall be incorporated, unless the conference is incorporated in its own name; should the Board be incorporated, the above twelve persons shall be directors of the corporation. These persons shall be elected by the conference for a term of three years, except as to the first Board, one-third of whom shall be elected for a term of one year, one-third for a term of two years, and one-third for a term of three years, and shall serve until their successors have been elected and qualified; provided, however, that existing incorporated trustees of the Annual Conference may continue unaffected by this subsection unless and until such charter is a mended.

Board of Diaconal Ministry

 There shall be a Board of Diaconal Ministry which shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (Para. 732).

Committee on Rules

- 15. There shall be a Conference Committee on Rules to develop and interpret the rules for governing Annual Conference action and to propose new rules as needed for Annual Conference guides.
- 15.1 The membership shall be three lay men, three lay women, and three clergy, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected quadrennially by the Annual Conference with a limit of one four year term.
- 15.2 There shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the membership of the Rules Committee. The first person named to this committee each quadrennium shall convene the committee for the purpose of organization.

Committee on Investigation

- 16. There shall be a Committee on Investigation to make inquiry into accusations against ministerial members of the Annual Conference and, where necessary, to make recommendations to the bishop for further action as per Para. 1540, the Book of Discipline.
- 16.1 The membership shall be five itinerant elders as permanent members and five itinerant elders as reserve members who shall be nominated by the bishop and elected annually by the Annual Conference.

Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions

17. There shall be a Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions to extend courtesy to all visitors to the Annual Conference sessions and to prepare appropriate resolutions to be read and adopted at the conference sessions. The committee shall be composed of two clergy and two lay persons nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected annually by the Annual Conference.

The Committee on Minutes

18. There shall be a Committee on Minutes to read and approve the Daily Proceedings of the Annual Conference. The members shall be two clergy and two lay persons who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference.

Committee on Agenda

- 19. There shall be a Committee on Agenda to prepare the agenda of the Annual Conference and submit it to the conference for adoption.
- 19.1 The membership shall be composed of the bishop, the assistant to the bishop, the district superintendents, the conference lay leader, the president of the United Methodist Women, the Conference Secretary, the chairpersons of the conference boards, the chairperson of the conference Council on Ministries, two youth representatives from the Conference Youth Ministries, and the Conference Council director who shall be without vote.
- 19.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect its own officers.
- 19.3 The Committee shall present to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, prior to the conference session, a detailed estimate of the expenses of the conference, including per diem allowance.

Annual Conference Committee on Nominations

20. There shall be an Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. It shall be the purpose of the

- committee to seek out and enlist the services of the best qualified persons available within the annual conference to fill various positions for which it is to make nominations.
- 20.1 The membership shall be the bishop, who shall be the chairperson, the district superintendents, the conference lay leader, the conference presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and the Conference Council on Youth Ministries; the District Lay Leaders; the District presidents of United Methodist Women, one other youth representative of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, two minority representatives recommended by the Commission on Religion and Race, one of whom shall be a woman, and three clergy at large.
- 20.1.1 The nominating procedure shall be as follows:
 - a. Prior to February 1st of each year, the Conference Office shall make available to each district superintendent a listing of all offices for which nominations will be made at the ensuing Annual Conference session:
 - b. Prior to February 10th, the district superintendents of the respective districts shall distribute to the pastors of the respective districts the listing of all offices for which nominations will be made at the ensuing Annual Conference session for the purpose of soliciting suggestions from the local church nominating committees relative to the Annual Conference offices in question;
 - c. Prior to March 15, the district representatives to the Conference Nominating Committee shall meet for the purpose of preparing district nominations for all offices in question, taking into consideration the names submitted by local church nominating committees. The representatives, however, shall make nominations of only persons they feel are adequately equipped for the task and may elect to not make nominations in these cases where they feel minimum qualifications for the offices in question are not present.
 - d. Prior to April 15, the district nominating group shall submit to the Conference Council Office the list of their nominations for the purpose of compilation and circulation to the members of the Conference Nominating Committee at least ten days prior to its initial meeting.
 - e. Prior to May 10, the Conference Nominating Committee shall meet for the purpose of preparing a list of nominees for all officers which must be filled by the next Annual Conference session.
 - f. All persons being considered for an office in the Annual Conference shall be contacted before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibilities of the office and whether or not they are willing to serve, if nominated and elected.
- 20.1.2 The Annual Conference Council on Ministries Director and the Conference Secretary shall be members without vote.
- 20.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect a vice-chairperson and a secretary from within the membership of the committee.
- 20.3 The Committee shall make such nominations to the Annual Conference as may be necessary for the following positions: the chairperson, the vice-chairperson, secretary and the treasurer of the Conference Council on Ministries; the chairperson, the vice-chairperson, the secretary, and additional members of the Conference Board of Discipleship; the Conference Board of Church and Society; the Conference Board of Global Ministries; and the Conference Board of Higher Education and Ministry; the Conference Commission on Archives and History, the Conference Commission on Religion and Race, Commission on Status and Role of Women in the Church, the Conference Board of Trustees, the Conference Committee on Minutes, the Conference Board of Pensions, and the Conference Committee on Courtesies and Resolutions. It shall nominate such other persons as may be required or requested by the annual, jurisdictional or general conferences and related ecumenical bodies.
- 20.4 Insofar as possible, the membership on councils, boards, and agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third lay women, and one-third laymen in keeping with the policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.

III. CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION

Administrative Personnel:

Administrative Assistant to the Bishop

1. An ordained minister shall not serve more than six out of nine years in this position.

Administrative Personnel of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries

 The tenure of office for a Clerical member of the Conference on the ACCOM staff shall be limited to eight years.

Conference Secretary-Treasurer

- The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be nominated by the Council on Finance and Administration, after consulting with the bishop and his cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference.
- 3.1 The Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be under the supervision of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. He shall serve as the treasurer for the Board of Pensions, for the Commission on Equitable Salaries, and shall be co-ordinator for the Conference pension program.
- 3.2 The term of office of the Secretary-Treasurer shall be for a quadrennium and shall be limited to eight years. A newly elected Secretary-Treasurer shall ordinarily assume his official duties at the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference.
- 3.3 All bonds required by the law of The United Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference shall be filed with the secretary of the conference. The bond for the Conference Secretary-Treasurer shall be approved by the bishop and his cabinet and filed in the bishop's office.
- 3.4 The Conference Secretary shall nominate to the Annual Conference such staff as needed to conduct the daily proceedings of the Annual Conference.

IV. FINANCIAL

- The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1st to December 31st, and salaries
 of clerical members, appointed as pastors or district superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.
- 2. Remittances from a pastoral charge to the conference treasurer shall be accompanied by the remittance forms supplied by the Council on Finance and Administration. These forms shall be in triplicate and indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause for which the remittance is made. The conference treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the district superintendent for each remittance. The pastor shall enclose the annual statement of receipts as issued by the conference treasurer, corrected if necessary, with the church's Annual Conference Report as verification of items reported in Table II.
- 3. After careful consideration of all financial responsibilities of the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration, with three liaison representatives selected by the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, meeting with the Council on Finance and Administration in all budget discussions, shall recommend an allocation for the major categories in the total conference financial program; ministerial support, conference claimants fund, administration, World Service, conference benevolences, and capital funding. The Annual Conference Council on Ministries, being charged by the Discipline to study and coordinate the budget request of the several conference agencies as they relate to the conference program, shall formulate and present an itemized conference benevolence budget providing for the support of these agencies to the Council on Finance and Administration. If, for any reason, the Council on Finance and Administration decides that the total of the requests for the conference benevolence budget needs to be changed, it shall adjust the allocation and refer it back to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries for adjustments of the itemized appropriations in the conference benevolence budget.
- 3.1 If any program agency feels its cause has been neglected, jeopardized, or excluded, it shall have the opportunity to represent its cause before the Council on Finance and Administration as provided in Para. 868 of The Book of Discipline.
- 4. All budget items allocated to the districts of the conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula. Take total money raised, less the amount paid on principal and interest on indebtedness, less the amount paid for building and improvements and less the amount paid for General and Conference Advance Specials.
- 5. It shall be the duty of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to compute the decimal annually, using the latest statistics (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the districts. The district superintendent and the district stewards shall distribute the askings to the local church on the same basis.
- 6. Items to be distributed under the formula are the Connectional Ministry Fund, Conference Claimants Fund, World Service and Conference Benevolences Fund, Conference Projects Fund, Ministerial Education Fund, Black Methodist College Fund, and the Ministers Insurance Program Fund. Others may be added by the action of the Annual Conference.
- 7. The auditing firm appointed by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall audit all books of treasurers of boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Book of Discipline, and report the results to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, which Council will send a statement of these audits to the conference secretary for inclusion in the minutes.
- 8. Annually, each board, or special interest, shall make request to the Council on Finance and

Administration through the Annual Conference Council on Ministries for any special day offering, except where set by the Book of Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause, or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed conference calendar, unless such agency, cause, or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit, including current annual income and expense, together with its report to the appropriate board.

- 9. For the quadrennium 1976-1980, all boards, commissions, committees and councils of the conference shall allow ten cents per mile, or fifteen cents per mile when two or more members ride in the same car, for necessary travel to conference meetings.
- 10. The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempt by C.F.A.) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference Treasurer will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

V. DISTRICTS

District Conference

- There shall be a District Conference in each district to the Annual Conference which shall meet at least two weeks prior to the Annual Conference after notice is given to all local churches by the district superintendent, who shall be the chairperson, and on call by the district superintendent during the Annual Conference session.
- 1.1 The purpose of the District Conference shall be: (a) to elect district representatives to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries; (b) to elect district representatives to the conference agencies; (c) to elect members of the District Council on Ministries; (d) to elect two persons under age twenty-five to serve as members of the Annual Conference; and (e) such other business as it shall determine.
- 1.2 The membership of the District Conference shall be the lay and clerical delegates from that district to the Annual Conference and the lay pastors serving within the district, the district lay leader, and the district president of the United Methodist Women, and all members of the Annual Conference residing within the district.
- 1.3 The District Conference records, where kept, are not to be reported to the Annual Conference.

District Committee on Nominations

- There shall be a District Committee on Nominations in each district of the Annual Conference for the purpose of nominating to the District Caucus the best qualified persons within the district for the various positions as required by the Annual Conference.
- 2.1 The membership shall be the district superintendent, who shall be the chairperson, and such other persons as determined by the District Council on Ministries.

District Council on Ministries

- There shall be a District Council on Ministries in each district of the Annual Conference. It shall be liaison to the local church and the Annual Conference in all matters of program.
- 3.1 The District Council on Ministries shall be composed of the district superintendent, the president of the District United Methodist Women, the district lay leader, a youth not over eighteen years of age, the members of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries residing in the district, one lay woman, one lay man, and one clerical representative to each conference board, and such other persons as the District Council may determine. Interim vacancies may be filled by the District Council on Ministries in lieu of the District Conference.
- 3.2 The officers shall be a chairperson and such other officers as the council shall determine who shall be elected by the Council upon nomination of the District Committee on Nomination.

VI. LOCAL CHURCHES

 Each congregation shall annually give attention to its vacation policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the statement contained in the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee Manual as issued by the General Church.

VII. DISCONTINUED OR ABANDONED CHURCHES

When a local church has been discontinued or abandoned and the property disposed of as directed by the Book of Discipline in accordance with Paragraph 2441, the proceeds derived therefrom, if any, shall be first applied to the retirement of pension deficits, and the satisfaction of any claims against ministerial pension annuities which may have arisen out of failure of that church to make proportionate payment for ministerial support. The Trustees of the Conference shall recommend to the next session of the Annual Conference the disposition of any remaining proceeds.

EQUITABLE SALARY SUPPORT

Plan of Operation

There shall be a program of minimum pastoral support in the Central Texas Conference, under the management of The Board of Higher Education and Ministry and the Committee on Equitable Salary.

Duties and Responsibilities

The duties and responsibilities of the Commission shall be to have charge of and promote all of the interests of the Equitable Salary Support Program.

Administrative Procedure

- 1. The following conditions shall be met by a pastoral charge to become eligible for consideration by the Commission for a pastor to receive salary supplements from the Fund:
 - (a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted an Every Member Canvass for the local church budget of each of its churches during the previous conference year.
 - (b) The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall have been accepted and paid in full for the previous conference year.
 - (c) The charge must pay a minimum of \$1,800 for pastor's salary and must have at least 100 members.
- 2. Persons of the following ministerial relationships (listed below) are eligible for consideration for salary supplements at the level indicated:

(a) Elder, Full Connection	9000
(b) Associate Member	7600
(c) Full Time Local Pastor	7000
(d) Probationary Member	
1. Non-Student Living on Charge	7600
2. Non-Student Living Away From Charge	5500
3. Student Living on Charge	6500
4. Student Living away from Charge	5500
(e) Student Local Pastors	
1. Living on Charge	
2. Living Away from Charge	5500

- 3. This shall not be a mandatory or automatic minimum, but a minimum standard toward which the local church and the Conference work together as indicated below:
 - Where the local church's pastor's salary is below the Conference minimum the Conference will pay 110% of the supplement paid for 1978 (provided the 110% does not raise the salary above the new minimum). Beyond that the Conference will add one dollar of supplement for each one dollar the local church increases the local pastor's salary up to the minimum salary set by the Conference.
- 4. In addition to the above schedule and above limitation of aid, seminary students who are serving pastoral charges and receiving Equitable Salary Supplements, may receive \$1.00 per mile, one way, one time per year, for the distance from the seminary to the pastoral charge. This extra allowance shall be computed by the Commission, and paid in one payment to the seminary student pastor serving the charge at the end of the third quarter of the Conference year.
- 5. Those ministers who are not eligible for salary supplement are:
 - $(a) \ \ Those whose appointment is other than pastor of a charge within the Central Texas Conference.$
 - (b) Those who receive salary aid from the General Conference Board of Missions.
 - (c) Those classified as part-time local pastors.
 - (d) Retired ministers who receive income from any other employment other than the regular work of the pastoral ministry.
 - (e) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this Fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in

his present appointment.

- (f) The District Superintendent shall combine the salary, travel expense, and utility expense allowed as total salary when making a supplement request.
- 6. A prerequisite for consideration for salary supplements from this Fund shall be filing with the Commission a written application by the District Superintendent. This application shall indicate the classification of the pastor, the salary set by the charge, the amount of increase in pastor's salary to be matched by Salary Support, and shall contain the certifications by the District Superintendent whether or not the pastoral charge has met each of the requirements set forth above in Section 1, 2 and 3.
- 7. In cases of appointments, or changes of appointments, between the sessions of the Annual Conference, all above requirements are applicable and the District Superintendent shall file a new application for each charge concerned. Such salary supplements, if approved, shall be paid on a pro rata basis for the part of the year actually served.
- 8. The District Superintendents shall be responsible for making the program effective in their respective districts, as in all other causes of the Church, and for the collection of the amounts apportioned to the churches in their respective districts and for the rearrangement of pastoral charges, as necessary, to provide that the salary for the pastor to be paid by the charges be not less than \$1,800.00 per year.
- 9. Payments on the apportionment of the Churches shall be made at least quarterly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference. The Commission shall make payments to those receiving the benefits of the Fund at the end of the first three quarters of the Conference year, namely, September 1, December 1, March 1, and payments for the fourth quarter of the year ending May 31st, shall be made on May 15th. All of these quarterly payments shall be made on the same percentage basis as that of which the funds shall come to the hands of the Conference Treasurer, without discrimination in any case, and if receipts of funds by the Conference Treasurer prior to the session of the Annual Conference are not sufficient to meet all commitments, the final settlement for the year shall be made after all remittances have been made to the Conference Treasurer.
- 10. A complete financial statement shall be made at each session of the Annual Conference, showing all receipts from the Conference Treasurer during the year, all payments of those receiving the benefits of the Fund, and for all other purposes. This exhibit of receipts and disbursements shall be published each year in the Conference Journal.

Expenses for work of the Commission, such as stationery, stamps, office supplies, necessary clerical work, etc., shall be allowed from the Fund, and the traveling expenses of the members of the Commission, together with the cost of meals enroute, to all meetings of the Commission except such as are held while the Annual Conference is in session shall be allowed. Traveling expenses shall be paid in accordance with the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

Three-fourths of the amount normally payable to those receiving the benefits of the Fund shall be allowed until the meeting of the Commission prior to the session of the Annual Conference, at which time if a sufficient amount of money has been realized from the apportionment, payments for the fourth quarter shall be made not later than May 15th of each year.

Emergency aid shall be limited to thost whose total income does not exceed the minimum salary for their classification, and the amount granted shall not exceed ten (10) per cent of their classification.

Committee On Sustentation

Report No. 1

OPERATIONAL PROCEDURE FOR SUSTENTATION Plan of Operation

- There shall be a program of sustentation in the Central Texas Conference under the direction and management of the Executive Committee of the Board of Pensions.
 - This committee will have charge of and promote all the interests of the Sustentation program and shall be the determining factor in the final approval of any candidate for participation in this program.
- 2. We recommend that the amount of sustentation granted to an applicant shall be the amount of the current minimum salary.
- $3. \ \ We \, recommend \, further \, that \, the \, following \, shall \, be \, eligible \, for \, participation:$
 - 1. All ministers of the Central Texas Conference who have been admitted on trial, or have been

- received into full connection, provided they have not reached the age of voluntary retirement, which is sixty-five (65) years of age.
- 2. An approved supply pastor who shall have rendered not less than ten (10) years of full-time approved service as pastor of a charge in the Central Texas Conference.
- 3. Any Minister, meeting the above requirements, who is relieved of his pastoral duties and granted a leave of absence from his charge by the Bishop and Cabinet any Conference year for physical or pyschological reasons shall be eligible for sustentation for the portion of the year that remains until the next meeting of the Annual Conference.
- 4. We recommend the following procedure:
 - 1. The applicant shall make his desire known, in writing, to the Committee on Sustentation.
 - 2. The applicant must submit to a complete examination of the Clinic of The Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, Texas and the Certificate of Disability must be completed by the examining physician. Emphasis shall be placed upon question number eight (8) of the Certificate of Disability which asks: "Do you unreservedly feel that one year leave of absence would be conducive to restoration of health so that the claimant might continue in an effective ministry?"
 - 3. In extreme emergencies, the Committee will consider the diagnosis and recommendations of a duly qualified physician, but not the claimant's personal physician.
 - 4. When the applicant is approved by the Committee, the name of the applicant shall be submitted to the Committee on Conference Relations with a request that a leave of absence be granted for a period of one year. With the approval of the Committee on Conference Relations and the favorable action of the Annual Conference, the applicant shall be eligible for the benefits of this program.
 - 5. We unreservedly recommend that no person be eligible for sustentation funds for a period exceeding twelve (12) months running consecutively.
 - 6. All payments shall be made to the claimant monthly.
- 5. We recommend the following financial plan:
 - 1. The Committee shall be given authority to draw upon the Operating Reserve Fund of the Central Texas Conference such amounts as are necessary during any given Conference Year to meet the needs of the applicants in accordance with the above suggested practice.
 - 2. After the amount expended during a Conference Year has been determined, the Committee on Sustentation will make a request to the Council on Finance and Administration for the inclusion of that amount in the Conference Budget for the ensuing year. This procedure will be most practical for there is no way to actually determine the full amount which will be needed in any Conference Year, and if the plan is followed, there will be no possibility of having surplus or deficiencies in the money available for the Sustentation Committee.

SUPERANNUATE HOUSING ALLOWANCE

WHEREAS, The United States Government has recognized in its income tax regulations monies designated as "Allowance for the rental of a parsonage or home" for a minister to be exempt from taxation, and WHEREAS The United States Government has also recognized in its income tax regulations monies paid by a minister for utilities of such "parsonage or home" for a minister to be exempt from taxation; therefore, be it Resolved, By the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church in annual session June 3-6, 1973 that Twelve Hundred Dollars (\$1,200.00) of the total annuity paid to each retired minister shall constitute a rental allowance paid as a part of the retired minister's compensation for past service, except that such allowance not exceed one-third ($1\frac{1}{3}$) of the total annuity received as pensions funds from the United Methodist agencies, and be it further Resolved, that an additional allowance of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) shall constitute a utility allowance for the minister's said "parsonage or home." (This is in accord with paragraph 860; code section 107, regulation paragraph 1:107-1 of the Internal Revenue Code, 1954 as amended.)

CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE ORGANIZATON OF COMMISSION FOR LAY CONCERNS

There shall be a Central Texas Conference Commission for Lay Concerns. It shall cooperate with and facilitate the activities of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries.

PURPOSE: The conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall establish and maintain communication with the district laity organizations and the district Council on Ministries for the purpose of helping make them aware of resources available from General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference as well as programs of other districts in the Central Texas Conference. The Commission for

Lay Concerns shall also be in close cooperation with the Annual Conference Council on Ministries and Board of Discipleship to aid in developing and implementing programs to and for the laity.

OFFICERS: The conference lay leader shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference upon nomination by the Commission for Lay Concerns. The nomination shall be by written ballot. The two associate conference lay leaders, one of whom shall be vice chairperson of the Commission for Lay Concerns, four sub-conference lay leaders, conference director of lay speaking, conference director of United Methodist Men, the recording secretary, the treasurer and such other officers as the conference Commission for Lay Concerns may authorize shall be elected annually upon nomination by the nominating committee.

MEMBERSHIP: The conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall be composed of the conference lay leader, who shall be chairperson, two associate conference lay leaders, four sub-conference lay leaders, the conference directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, the district lay leaders, the presiding (or his representative) bishop, the district superintendents, the conference president of United Methodist Women, two (2) conference youth representatives selected by the United Methodist Youth, the recording secretary, the treasurer and such other officers as the conference Commission for Lay Concerns shall authorize. Members shall include the assistant to the bishop and the Conference Council director.

TENURE AND VACANCIES: Election of Commission for Lay Concerns members shall be for one (1) year. No person shall serve more than eight (8) consecutive years in the same elected office. Vacancies shall be filled by the Commission for Lay Concerns as they occur.

STANDING COMMITTEES: There shall be an executive committee of the conference Commission for Lay Concerns consisting of the conference lay leader, who shall be chairperson, two (2) associate conference lay leaders, the conference president of United Methodist Women or her representative, conference directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, a cabinet representative, the elected officers and such others as the Commission for Lay Concerns may authorize. There shall be a nominating committee appointed by the conference lay leader consisting of not less than four (4) nor more than eight (8) members of the Commission for Lay Concerns plus the cabinet representative.

MEETINGS: The Commission for Lay Concerns and/or its executive committee shall meet annually or as often as necessary to carry on its work and shall be called into session by the conference lay leader or presiding bishop.

FINANCES: The Commission for Lay Concerns shall cooperate with the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in obtaining funds for its needs in fulfilling its duties. The executive committee shall act as the budget committee.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER: (Paragraph 1051 Discipline) — The conference lay leader is the designated leader of the conference laity, with responsibility for becoming increasingly aware of the work of the laity in achieving the mission of the Church. The conference lay leader shall guide the deliberations of the Commission for Lay Concerns in developing long-range and annual objectives, direct the implementation of these objectives and represent the Commission for Lay Concerns in other conference agencies as determined by the Discipline. The conference lay leader shall guide the work of the Commission for Lay Concerns so that it will be coordinated with the comprehensive program of the conference. The conference lay leader shall present a written report annually to the Commission for Lay Concerns and the Annual Conference. The conference lay leader shall be seated in the Annual Conference as a voting member.

ASSOCIATE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER AND SUB-CONFERENCE LAY LEADERS: There shall be two (2) associate conference lay leaders whose work shall be related to the conference lay leader and who shall each be responsible for the esablishment and maintenance of communication with one or more sub-conference lay leaders as assigned for the purpose of making them aware of resources and programs in all levels of the church and receiving from them programs that are in progress in their district. There shall be four (4) sub-conference lay leaders who shall each be responsible for the establishment and maintenance of communications with one (1) or more district lay leaders and district Councils on Ministries as assigned for the purpose of making them aware of resources and programs in all areas of lay concerns available at all levels of the church and receiving from them programs in progress in their local church as well as district wide programs.

CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF LAY SPEAKING: The conference director of lay speaking shall work to become informed in the area of oral communications for the purpose of aiding district directors in establishing programs aimed at increasing the effectiveness of the witness of laity. These programs shall involve both speaking to groups and in one-to-one relationships. The director shall be guided by standards set in the Discipline (1972) paragraphs 1067-1070.

CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF UNITED METHODIST MEN: The conference director of United Methodist Men shall be involved in an ongoing program of research to find ministries to/and for men in the church and community. He shall be knowledgeable of the options and resources available to the local

church and make these known to the district directors in order that they might make them known to the local churches. At the same time, he shall seek information from the district directors of options and ministries available in their districts.

THE DISTRICT ORGANIZATION OF COMMISSION FOR LAY CONCERNS

There shall be in every district an organization of the laity known as the District Commission for Lay Concerns

OBJECTIVE AND PURPOSE: The purpose of the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be to establish and maintain communication between the Annual Conference and district Councils on Ministries and the local church. Additionally, it shall make the laity of the local church aware of their role in the total program of the church, and help them assume a proper role in carrying out this program.

MEMBERSHIP: The district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be composed of the district lay leader who shall be chairperson, the sub-district lay leaders, the district directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, local church lay leaders, the district superintendent, the district president of United Methodist Women, two (2) youth representatives and such others as authorized by the district Commission for Lay Concerns.

OFFICERS: The district lay leader shall be elected annually by the Annual Conference upon nomination by the district Commission for Lay Concerns. A secretary and a treasurer, sub-district lay leaders (there shall be one (1) sub-district lay leader for each five (5) or six (6) churches in the district), district director of lay speaking, district director of United Methodist Men and other directors as authorized by the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be elected annually by the district Commission for Lay Concerns.

TENURE AND VACANCIES: All elections of Commission for Lay Concerns members shall be for the term of one (1) year. Any vacancy occurring in the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall be filled by that Commission for Lay Concerns.

STANDING COMMITTEES: There shall be an executive committee of the district Commission for Lay Concerns consisting of the district lay leader, who shall be chairperson, a sub-district lay leader representative (elected annually by the district Commission for Lay Concerns), district directors of lay speaking and United Methodist Men, the district president of United Methodist Women, the district superintendent and the elected officers and such others as the district Commission for Lay Concerns shall authorize. There may be a nominations committee consisting of the district lay leader who shall be chairperson, the district superintendent and as many as five (5) but not less than one (1) other Commission for Lay Concerns members.

MEETINGS: The Commission for Lay Concerns and/or its executive committee shall meet annually or as often as necessary to carry out its duties. Meetings shall be called by the district lay leader or district superintendent.

FINANCES: The district Commission for Lay Concerns through its executive committee shall cooperate with the conference Commission for Lay Concerns to obtain funds needed to carry out its duties.

THE DISTRICT LAY LEADERS AND SUB-DISTRICT LAY LEADERS: The work of the district lay leader is to be responsible for becoming increasingly aware of the role of the laity in carrying out the mission of the church. The district lay leader shall work in close cooperation with the district superintendent in seeking to carry out that mission. The work of the sub-district lay leader shall be to become increasingly aware of the role of the laity in carrying out the mission of the church and interpreting this awareness to the laity of the sub-district that they may be about this mission. The sub-district lay leader shall visit each of the churches in the sub-district a minimum of four (4) times per year (one (1) visit to be a charge conference).

DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF LAY SPEAKING: The district director of lay speaking shall work to become informed in the area of oral communications and use this knowledge in instituting programs within the district for the purpose of increasing the effectiveness of the witness of the laity. This shall involve the training for speaking to groups and in one-to-one relationships.

DISTRICT DIRECTOR OF UNITED METHODIST MEN: The district director of United Methodist Men shall be the source of information for the churches of the district in the work of the United Methodist Men. He shall make himself aware of the opportunities for ministry of/and to men in the local church and community. It shall be his responsibility to make these options known to the local churches in order that they may take advantage of these opportunities for ministry.

This document may be changed by a simple majority of those present and voting at the regular annual meeting of the conference Commission for Lay Concerns provided that ten (10) days notice of the proposed change be given in writing to its membership in advance of said meeting.

We have examined the summary of cash receipts and disbursements of Dr. J. W. Sprinkle, Secretary-Treasurer, Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church, for the year ended December 31, 1977. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1, the Central Texas Conference's policy is to prepare this summary on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue is recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, since such accounting principles require the accrual of income and expense.

The Supplementary Information included in this report is presented for information only, since the status of these items are of interest to the readers of this report in conjunction with the various funds to which they are related. However, the scope of our examination was limited to a review of cash receipts and disbursements of the various funds, and we performed no auditing procedures with regard to the Supplementary Information except to confirm the balances shown.

In our opinion, the accompanying summary of cash receipts and disbursements referred to above present fairly the recorded cash receipts and disbursements of the Conference Treasurer for the year then ended, on the basis described in Note 1, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.
