- 4.0 There shall be a Commission on Archives and History, consisting of one lay and one clergy elected by each District Conference Six at-large members shall be added by nomination of the retiring chair of the commission and elected by the Annual Conference. The commission shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641) and other responsibilities as delegated to it by the Annual Conference No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms. The commission shall have a chair, a vice-chair, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected as outlined in Section II, ¶¶16.2a and 16.7 for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium.
- 4.1 The conference Committee on Nominations may nominate a conference archivist-historian to be elected by the Annual Conference, as permitted in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641.3). The annual conference archivist-historian shall serve with non-expiring term of office and shall be a voting member of the conference Commission on Archives and History.

The membership shall consist of the bishop and the director of Mission Ministries, without vote; the three officers (chair must be a woman ¶644.3 2008 Discipline, vice-chair and secretary) nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference; Conference Lay Leader, president of the UMM, UMW and Conference Student Leadership Team; 3 minority clergy (2 female and one male); 4 minority lay (2 female and 2 male); one young adult; 5 at-large (3 female and 2 male) to ensure racial-ethnic balance all nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations; and an Associate Director of Mission Ministries and General and-or Jurisdictional members that relate to GR&R and GCOSROW

12.2 Members shall be elected for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium, and may succeed themselves one time for a total of 8 consecutive years. All members should be selected for their interest, expertise, and with concern for ethnic and age balance in representation. The Commission will select a representative to serve on the Nurture Mission Council and a representative

recommended annually, to serve on the Conference Committee on Nominations.

The Executive Committee consisting of the officers, the Director of Mission Ministries, the District Superintendent who serves the district in which the camp is located, and the Executive Director of Glen Lake, shall have and exercise, between meetings of the Board of Directors, the authority of the Board of Directors in the management of Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center.

All Board members will be asked to serve a three (3) year term starting immediately after the annual meeting of said Conference of the United Methodist Church. Two terms of service can be served consecutively, and then a year must be taken off before serving on the Board. If a Director is selected to fill a vacancy after the first year of an unexpired term, the Partial Term served by such director shall not be considered when determining the limit on terms set forth above.

FIRST SESSION - SUNDAY EVENING, June 7, 2009

Opening Worship Service

At 7:00 P.M. the music for Gathering at the Pre-Service Concert was provided by The White's Chapel Orchestra, Chancel Choir, Praise Band and selected soloists under the direction of White's Chapel Music and Creative Arts Ministry Team. The "Celebration of Christian Worship" began at 7:30 P.M. Rev. Dr. Walter L. Kimbrough, Pastor Emeritus of Cascade United Methodist Church in Atlanta, GA., was guest preacher. He used as his text Acts 2:36-47 and his sermon was "Remembering Our History." Music for the service was provided by White's Chapel Music and Creative Arts Ministry under the direction of Shaunna LaCroix, who also served as Song Leader, Micah Blalock and Tim Georgeff, Organist. Special music was brought by the Women's Ensemble from Trinity United Methodist Church in Arlington with Rev. G.W. "Dub" Shepherd directing. Dr. Walter L. Kimbrough gave the sermon "Something to Shout About" based on I Corinthians 15:50-58.

FOURTH SESSION – MONDAY MORNING, June 8, 2009

Organization of Conference

Bishop Lowry called the Central Texas Annual Conference to order at 11:10 A.M. and invited Dr. John McKellar, Sr. Pastor of White's Chapel United Methodist Church, to welcome the assembly and introduce the Mayor of Southlake, the Honorable John Terrell. Mayor Terrell presented Bishop Lowry with a key to the city and a proclamation that June 7-13, 2009 is Central Texas Annual Conference Week.

Rev. Harvey Ozmer made announcements and Rev. Rankin Koch called for the Adoption of the Agenda.

Adoption of the Agenda – Rankin Koch

Rev. Rankin Koch set the bar as the main floor of the sanctuary until Wednesday afternoon, June 10, 2009. The agenda on pages 6-9 of the Preliminary Reports was presented and the Approval of the Agenda with necessary changes was moved. Motion carried. The Consent Calendar located on page 9 of the Preliminary Report Booklet was presented. The motion was made to approve the Consent Calendar. The motion passed.

Rev. Koch then presented the Committee on the Agenda report found on page 74 of the Preliminary Report. The Agenda Committee recommended that the 2009 Per Diem Allowance granted each day be \$35.00 for those who reside in Tarrant County and \$70.00 for those who reside outside Tarrant County. The Agenda Committee recommended that \$41,100.00 be the budget line item for the expenses of the 2010 Annual Conference. All delegates were encouraged to complete an evaluation form at the end of the Conference. The Agenda Committee recommended that the 2010 Annual Conference be held in Fort Worth at Will Rogers Memorial Center. This change in site is necessary due to delays in the renovation of the Waco Convention Center. The Agenda Committee recommended returning to Waco in 2011.

The report was approved.

Rev. Harvey Ozmer continued with the organization of the Conference. Rev. Sally Fleming was introduced as Head Teller, Rev. Ken Bergeron and Rev. Judy Richmond as secretarial staff in charge of taking the minutes supported by Lisa McCutcheon, Catherine Simpson serving as Page and Rev. John Dirk as the Conference Statistician. The location of the Floor Managers was given, as were instructions for presenting motions, greetings, resolutions, and announcements.

The Bishop led the Conference in prayer to honor the passing of Mrs. Dale Smith and for her 20 years of service to the Conference as Parliamentarian. He then introduced Mr. Ed Komandosky, serving as Parliamentarian for this year's Annual Conference.

Episcopal Address

Bishop Mike Lowry gave the Episcopal Address to the Central Texas Conference beginning at 11:25 A.M. Bishop Lowry began by thanking the Conference for the hospitality shown in welcoming him and Jolynn. He expressed appreciation to the Episcopal Committee, the Cabinet and the churches of the Central Texas Conference.

Bishop Lowry shared what he had learned in making his Shepherd Visits:

- We are strong in missional engagement.
- We don't know how to do evangelism and need to learn how to do it.
- Upkeep and preservation of church buildings have taken priority over missional growth.
- Young adults are often a missing generation.
- We know we have to change but we are slow to do it.
- 116 out of 320 churches are one generation away from either becoming a less than full-time appointment or closing.

The Bishop quoted Friedman in his book, The World is Flat and he asked our churches, "Do we have more dreams than memories or more memories than dreams." He reminded the Conference that there is a closing window of opportunity to transition into the church of tomorrow.

Bishop Lowry then shared his vision for the Conference. "Our vision is growing faithful and fruitful local churches all across the Conference that will transform the world. The goal is not to just build an institution, nor to even build the United Methodist Church, but rather it is to advance the Kingdom of God."

After video announcements were made, the Bishop dismissed the Conference for lunch at 12:15.

FIFTH SESSION – MONDAY AFTERNOON, June 8, 2009

The Monday afternoon session began with singing led by White's Chapel Praise Group. Bishop Lowry called the session to order at 2:10 P.M. Rev. Clifton Howard opened with prayer.

Resolution to Live Out the Mission of the Church – Steve McIver

Mr. Steve McIver presented the resolution from the Executive Ministry Team and moved to allow for discussion and voting prior to the Board of Pensions report on Tuesday, June 9, 2009. After approval from the Conference, it was placed on the table per the 24 hour rule.

Spouses Introduction – Karen Schmidt

On behalf of the clergy spouses, Karen Schmidt, presented our First Lady of the Conference, Jolynn Lowry, with pink roses representing joy and admiration. Jolynn graciously thanked the Conference for the warm welcome she and the Bishop have received since coming to the Conference.

Council on Finance and Administration and Narrative Budget – John McKellar and Harvey Ozmer

Dr. John McKellar explained the process that the Council on Finance and Administration used in arriving at the presented budget, which will be considered for approval on Wednesday June 10, 2009.

Rev. Harvey Ozmer presented a ministry based budget, referred to as the Narrative Budget, titled "The Pathway to Energize and Equip Churches for the Transformation of the World." Aided by a video, the Narrative Budget assists in the translation of line items in the printed budget to lives being changed for Christ.

Committee on Nominations – Doyle Allen

Dr. Doyle Allen presented the 2009 slate of nominations to the Annual Conference. The report was presented and would be voted on Wednesday afternoon.

Church Growth and Development – Mike Alexander

Rev. Tom Connolly presented the Hispanic Ministry report found on page 79 of the Preliminary Report. He reported on the immersion event that will take place at El Buen Samaritano this summer. He announced that Mr. Sam Rodriguez, who was working in the Central Texas Conference, accepted a position with the General Board of Discipleship. He then presented a video put together by the Conference Hispanic Ministries Committee.

Rev. Jamie Peterson reported on the scholarship that was given to her to attend the N.C.L.I.

Rev. Mike Alexander referred to the report on pages 77-80 of the Preliminary Report and made a motion to adopt the report as a whole. The motion passed.

A slide show presentation celebrating all of the new church starts in the Central Texas Conference since 1980 was shown. Following the slide presentation, Dr. Allen Goss received a gift thanking him for all of his work on the 2008 General Conference held in Fort Worth, TX.

Living the United Methodist Way – Eve Hamilton

Ms. Eve Hamilton, assisted by Rev. Karen Granderson, Mrs. Carolyn Stephens, Mrs. Joy Roberson and Mrs. Jennifer Bellamy, presented a program on Energizing and Equipping Churches. The four-step program includes:

- 2) We live by two kinds of holiness.

 - *Social
- 3) We follow three simple rules.
 - *Do no harm.

The Central Texas Conference enjoyed a time of fellowship as members attended the Texas Rangers vs. Toronto Blue Jays Baseball Game at the Rangers' Ballpark in Arlington, Texas. Bishop Mike Lowry threw out the first pitch.

SIXTH SESSION – TUESDAY MORNING, June 9, 2009

Bible Study – Bishop Mike Lowry

The morning session began at 8:30 A.M. with singing. Prayer was led by Mr. Steve McIver.

Bishop Mike Lowry based his Bible Study on Acts 17:16-34. He spoke on the subject of witnessing.

When the Bible Study concluded the Bishop called the session to order at 9:15 A.M.

Rev. Harvey Ozmer made announcements.

Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center – Diane Griffin

Ms. Diane Griffin, Chair of the Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center Board of Directors, reported that development was one of the main areas of growth for the camp. She shared her personal memories of Glen Lake and recognized those in attendance who have enjoyed Glen Lake Camp in many different capacities.

Rev. Steve Nance, Director of Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center, shared some of the exciting things happening at Glen Lake Camp and Still Water Lodge. He asked for prayers as the camp seeks financial support for much needed improvements in order to fulfill the mission statement of developing young persons and adults as Christians.

Ms. Griffin asked that the reports on pages 27 and 74 of the Preliminary Report be approved as a whole. The reports were approved.

Cabinet Report – Rankin Koch

The entire Cabinet presented their report in a creative musical rendition of hymns and songs. The narration was read by the Rev. The Bishop asked to meet during the lunch break with any Board Member from the Central Texas Methodist Foundation present at Annual Conference to resolve this issue.

Conference History and Archives Task Force – Michael Patison

A motion was presented by Rev. Michael Patison, Chair of the Committee, to authorize a celebration in 2010 to mark the 100th anniversary of the Central Texas Conference. Rev. Henry Radde will be designated as Chairman of the Celebration Committee.

A motion was made to accept. The motion passed.

Rev. Radde challenged each member to donate to this cause in an amount equaling \$1 for each year they have been a member of this Conference.

Rev. Patison and Ms. Carol Roszell, Conference Archivist, updated those present at Annual Conference on the status of a book outlining the history of the Central Texas Conference. The book is expected to be completed in 2010 and pre-order forms were available at the History and Archives display table.

Commission on Inclusiveness – Marnese Elder

Mrs. Marnese Elder told how she was asked to revitalize this Commission. She shared the agency's main purpose and vision for the future.

A motion was made to accept this report. The motion was accepted.

Committee on Episcopacy/Annual Conferences' Realignment – Bliss Dodd

Ms. Bliss Dodd explained the responsibility that the College of Bishops has in reassigning boundaries of the Annual Conferences in the South Central Jurisdiction and in combining two Annual Conferences to save money throughout the Jurisdictions in the United States to fund ministry in Africa. Ms. Dodd presented items to be considered before realigning the Conference boundaries through a slide show entitled "Prioritized Considerations for Shaping New Episcopal Boundaries."

Ms. Dodd made a motion to approve the report on page 82 of the Preliminary Report and it was adopted.

Rev. Eric McKinney made a motion that the Episcopal Address be published as a supplement of the United Methodist Reporter and distributed to the Council of Bishops. The motion was seconded.

The motion carried.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE RESOLUTION

WHEREAS the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church is committed to living out the mission of the general church which is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world and

WHEREAS the Central Texas Conference has adopted the four areas of focus of the United Methodist Church which are:

1. Developing principled Christian leaders for the church and the world
2. Creating places for new people and renewing existing congregations
3. Engaging in ministry with the poor
4. Combating our killer diseases by improving health globally, and

WHEREAS we believe local churches provide the most significant arena through which disciple-making and transformation occurs and

WHEREAS the annual conference and the districts of the annual conference desire to energize and equip local churches in each of these focus areas as faithfully and fruitfully as possible for the advancement of the Kingdom of God.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Bishop Mike Lowry of the Central Texas Conference be authorized to appoint a task force to examine the conference alignment of resources, structure and organization of the Annual Conference and districts to ensure faithfulness and fruitfulness in ministry that we might make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the designated task force will welcome input from all local churches of the Central Texas Conference and will bring recommendations for adaption and/or transformation of the Annual Conference and districts to ensure the conference's ability to achieve the stated mission through but not limited to the areas of focus for the advancement of the Kingdom of God either by next Annual Conference or a Special Called Session of Annual Conference.

EIGHTH SESSION – TUESDAY EVENING, June 9, 2009

Service of Ordination

At 7:00 P.M., music for gathering was led by the Aledo United Methodist Church Praise Band, Aledo, Texas, under the direction of Chris and Mary McClellan.

At 7:30 P.M., the Service of Ordination began with music led by the Campus Drive United Methodist Church Mass Choir, Ft. Worth, Texas, under the direction of Carol Miles. The Rev. Dr. Walter L. Kimbrough preached for the Ordination worship service. His text for the evening was Acts 3:1-10 entitled "The Privilege of Ministry." In his sermon, Dr. Kimbrough exuberantly and eloquently made three points: 1) Commitment to be a Partner with the Master, 2) Commitment to Exercise Leadership and 3) Commitment to Being a Possibility Thinker. Other liturgists for the service included Rev. Rachel Heyduck, Rev. Rankin Koch, Mr. Steve McIver, Dr. Mike McKee, Rev. Sharon Robertson, and Rev. Billy Strayhorn. NINTH SESSION – WEDNESDAY MORNING, June 10, 2009

Bible Study – Bishop Mike Lowry

The Conference began with a Bible Study led by Bishop Lowry on the text Acts 21:27-22:21 at 8:35 A.M. He reminded us of our vows of membership – to support the church with our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness.

The Bishop began the business session at 9:15 A.M.

United Methodist Publishing House – Eric McKinney

Dr. Eric McKinney thanked the Central Texas Conference for supporting the United Methodist Publishing House which has provided resources for the churches for years. He asked for continued backing of Cokesbury, as they are suffering in this economic downturn. He informed the Conference that due to Cokesbury's loss in revenue this past year, no check was available to assist in support of the United Methodist Church pensions program. The report was submitted and received.

Dr. Tim Bruster made a motion to take a special offering for the Central Conference Pensions Initiative to help in offsetting the loss of the United Methodist Publishing House annual donation. The motion was seconded and passed. The offering will be taken prior to the lunch break.

Resolutions Continued – John Clifford

The Resolution Regarding Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Raids and Detentions on page 118 of the Preliminary Report.

A motion was made by Rev. Reed Justice, to postpone the Resolution indefinitely. It was seconded and he spoke to it. The motion failed.

A motion was made to amend the resolution by omitting lines 18, 19, 20 and it was seconded. The motion to amend failed.

The resolution passed.

This resolution reads as follows –

RAIDS AND DETENTIONS**

WHEREAS, Jesus called his disciples and followers to “strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness,” and we, as disciples, are called to embody a new order of love and justice; and,

WHEREAS, the Old Testament is clear as to our role in relationship to the stranger/alien/foreigner in our midst – to care for them as we would want to be cared for; and,

WHEREAS, the Greek word in the New Testament for hospitality is *philoxenia*, which literally means “love of stranger/foreigner;” and,

WHEREAS, raids on undocumented immigrants in the United States and indefinite detention represent government inadequacy in addressing complex national and international economic and political realities, which close legal avenues and force immigrants into the shadows, where they are often subject to exploitation and virtual servitude; and,

WHEREAS, an unjust detention center is located within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference – the T. Don Hutto Correctional Facility, in Taylor, Texas – holds immigrant men, women (some pregnant), children and infants, with no criminal past. In some extreme cases, children have been separated from their mothers for months at a time; and,

WHEREAS, in a new 2008 General Conference Resolution, the United Methodist Church affirms that “regardless of legal status or nationality, we are all connected through Christ to one another...The solidarity we share in Christ eliminates the boundaries and barriers which exclude and isolate. Therefore, the sojourners we are called to love our brothers and sisters, our mothers and fathers, our sons and daughter; indeed, they are us.” (Resolution: *Welcoming the Migrant to the United States*).

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, 1.) pledges to create a task force to address immigration concerns within our jurisdiction and develop plans for emergency responses to ICE raids, which might include providing material aid, legal services, childcare, language interpreting, and spiritual support, and taking part in vigils and public witness pointing toward justice and humane treatment of immigrants (Such a task force may include conference representatives from areas dealing with Global Ministries, Church & Society, Religion and Race, racial/ethnic caucuses, as well as such groups as United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and Justice For Our Neighbors). 2.) Investigate ways to respond to the existence of ICE detention centers within the Conference boundaries and consider how to provide ministries, legal support, and other services that will serve the objectives of Christian hospitality and civil/human rights.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution will be sent within thirty days of the conclusion of this Conference to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and members of the Texas legislature (both House and Senate), that we are in favor of legislation that will fund services at ICE Detention Centers.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED that the Central Texas Annual Conference will, 1.) Engage in study of new General Conference Resolutions on migration and immigration and other resources that explore the biblical and theological bases for the church’s positions and responses on these issues; and 2.) Participate in connectional education and training on immigration and collaborate as occasion provides with the United Methodist Task Force on Immigration (an interagency and inter-organizational body mandated by the 2008 General Conference).

FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED that the Central Texas Annual Conference urge all its congregations and their members to pray for the people whose lives are affected by ICE raids and detention, and will, as appropriate, provide denominational and ecumenical ministries to assist families affected by raids and detention.

The Conference Church and Society Committee Recommend Concurrence

Announcements were made by Rev. Harvey Ozmer.

Bishop Lowry dismissed the Conference for a 15 minute break.

Bishop Lowry reconvened the Conference at 10:08 A.M.

Rev. Don Scott opened with prayer.

Constitutional Amendments – Harvey Ozmer and General Conference Delegates

Rev. Harvey Ozmer provided instructions on the voting process for the Constitutional Amendments. Ballots were distributed and reviewed. Mr. Tom Harkrider provided a brief history of the General Conference addressing the issues involved, the rationale behind the amendments, and the reasoning behind the grouping order. Groups A and B were composed of all the amendments pertaining to the Worldwide nature of the Church:

A – five (5) core component amendments.

B – eighteen (18) word change amendments.

Mr. Harkrider shared a video presentation about the amendments and led an open dialogue on the Worldwide nature of the Church. Bishop Lowry then called for a vote on each of these twenty three (23) amendments. Each amendment was voted on individually.

A third section of Constitutional Amendments was then before the Conference. Group C of amendments contained nine (9) stand alone amendments. Dr. Tim Bruster was introduced and presented the first three (3) of the amendments. Discussion and voting was completed on these individually.

Since the Health and Welfare Luncheon was ready to be served and still with six (6) Constitutional Amendments remaining to be considered, all ballots were collected. It was announced that new ballots would be distributed for voting on the remaining amendments after lunch.

Announcements were made by Rev. Harvey Ozmer.

Rev. Tim Boeglin provided directions to the Health and Welfare luncheon area.

The Bishop adjourned the session for a lunch break to reconvene at 1:15 P.M.

TENTH SESSION – WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, June 10, 2009

Bishop Lowry called the session to order at 1:15 P.M. Dr. Georgia Adamson opened with prayer.

Health and Welfare Ministries' Reports

Rev. Tim Boeglin, Chair of Health and Welfare Ministries, referenced the report found on page 41 of the Preliminary Report. He shared events and workshop information and thanked attendees for participating in the Health and Welfare Luncheon.

Mr. Chris Spence, President of the Wesleyan Homes, shared the mission of this agency and future plans to provide additional locations. Their report can be found beginning on page 47 of the Preliminary Report.

Mr. Tim Johnson and Ms. Pam McGrew spoke on home health care and hospice needs that are being met through Sears Methodist Retirement Center of Waco.

Mr. Trey Oakley presented the report found on page 44 of the Preliminary Report for the Methodist Children's Home. He stressed that the staff remains passionate about impacting the lives of children.

Ms. Jennifer Sample, Executive Director of the Methodist Mission Home, presented a video outlining ministries of the Home and thanked the Conference for the generosity shown.

Ms. Mona Bailey was introduced to the Conference by Rev. Boeglin and thanked for the continuing Health and Wellness work she does for the Conference.

Mrs. Laura Friend, Parent Advocate, shared the story of the death of her 12 year old daughter because the place she was at had no Atrial Defibrillator. Her mission is to have the AED machines in every school and have personnel trained to use it.

Rev. Boeglin presented the total report. The report was accepted.

"I move that the Central Texas Methodist Foundation, 'an affiliated organization of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church,' provide each member of the annual conference a written report in accordance with section 7.05 of the organization's bylaws that states, 'The board of directors shall cause an annual report in writing to be made to the Central Texas Annual Conference showing the activities, plans, and financial condition of the Foundation' no later than Aug. 1, 2009." The motion was seconded and passed.

Committee on Nominations – Doyle Allen

Dr. Doyle Allen moved that the slate of nominations brought before the Conference on the first day be approved. The nominations were approved.

Bishop Lowry adjourned the Conference for a 15 minute break.

The session reconvened at 3:05 P.M. with song. Dr. John McKellar opened with prayer.

Constitutional Amendments Continued

Dr. Tim Bruster presented Amendments 8, 9, 15 and 17. After discussion was called for, votes were taken on each. Rev. Brenda Weir shared Amendment 19 with the vote being taken following questions. Dr. Bruster then spoke to Amendment 22 with the vote following.

All ballots were then collected.

Bishop Lowry thanked all of those in the Conference who worked so diligently in putting Annual Conference together. The Bishop also praised the staff and volunteers of White's Chapel United Methodist Church. The Bishop had the Conference sing the Doxology to the gathered volunteers of White's Chapel for being such gracious hosts.

Rev. Harvey Ozmer made announcements and gave an update on Conference offerings.

Word was received of tornadoes in the northwestern part of the Conference area. Bishop Lowry led the Conference in prayer for all concerned.

Bishop Lowry called for a 5 minute break in preparation of the Service of Covenant.


A Service of Covenant and Confirmation of Appointments



COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Budgeted 2009: \$2,750 _____ Requested 2010: \$2,050

Report No. 1

1. The Council on Finance and Administration expresses its thanks to the churches of our Central Texas Conference for their wonderful support of the mission partnership of the United Methodist Church through the benevolence program. Our overall percentage receipts in 2008 totaled 95.89%. Our churches contributed \$10,701,490. Two hundred eighty three of our Conference churches paid 100% of the apportionment share in full. We are also pleased to report that our Conference is one of seventeen Annual Conferences that paid its general church apportionments in full.
2. The Extended Cabinet has submitted a request to the Council on Finance and Administration that the salary for the seven District Superintendents and the three Directors remain the same for 2010 as it is for 2009. The amount is \$110,992.00. C.F.A. concurs with this recommendation in these uncertain economic times.

The formula for determining the salaries for District Superintendents and Directors which was adopted by the Annual Conference in 2002 is as follows: the increase in District Superintendent and other Cabinet level positions support will be the same percentage increase as is reflected in the salaries of those Elders in full membership of the Conference who serve as Senior Pastors of churches within the Central Texas Conference.

3. This amount is to provide for the district superintendents' and Directors' expense for conference meetings and additional ministerial expenses in an accountable reimbursement plan, the district superintendent's portion of the conference health benefits plan premium, for an amount requested by each district superintendent or Director to be excluded from salary and added to the district (or conference) contribution toward housing allowance, and each district superintendent and director's salary. The line item amount for each of these is to be determined in consultation with and approved by the Council on Finance and Administration. It is required that the accountable reimbursement plan for the district superintendent and director's expense for conference meetings and additional ministerial expenses be established in accordance with Sec. 62 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Also, any Housing Expense Set-aside, as desired by each district superintendent or Director shall be established in accordance with Sec. 107 of the IRC in like manner. Further, the cost of the Clergy Retirement Security Program, billed directly to the conference, will be an apportionment to the districts. An additional amount for voucher, reimbursed expenses related to each director's office is also a part of the respective council's or commission's budget.
4. The district committees on finance are authorized to prepare budgets for presentation to the district stewards. An amount up to 10% of the support and compensation for the district superintendent may be included in the district budget to defray the utility costs of the district parsonage. In addition, an amount up to 10% of the support and compensation may be included in the district budget for the purpose of voucher reimbursement of travel and business-related expenses. District budgets shall not include a discretionary fund, but may include a District Operations Expense item. The district budget shall be submitted to the Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration for approval each year. The district stewards are authorized to apportion a Connectional Contingency Fund to be used for paying in full at the district level apportioned items, which may fall short within the respective district. The Connectional Contingency Fund will be administered at the district level in the same manner as the District Work Fund. It is understood that if a portion of the Connectional Contingency Fund is not used in any given year, it will remain in the fund and future apportionment funds will be reduced. Any adjustments for unusual local church situations will be made in the apportionment of the Connectional Contingency Fund only. All other apportionments will be distributed to every local church on the basis of the decimal.
5. It is the recommendation of the Council that we eliminate the \$1.50 per-member funding formula used to determine the amount for the Texas Methodist College Association apportionment. We have been unable to fund at that level since 2004. Therefore, we recommend a \$100,000 apportionment for Texas Methodist College Association. This is a reduction of \$76,702. The

Council also recommends that the amount for the Wesley Foundation Fund be equal to \$1.91 per member based on the total conference membership, and apportioned to the churches on the decimal formula. This is a reduction from \$2.14 per member. Both actions are recommended due to budget constraints.

6. At the end of each fiscal year unexpended unrestricted operation funds, less the amount needed to cover deficits in conference budget accounts, shall be transferred into the operating reserve and an accounting of all operating reserve funds shall be made at each Annual Conference.
7. Each year the use of the unspent Contingency Fund shall be reviewed by the Council on Finance and Administration and the Bishop to decide if any amount should be used for Conference, Jurisdictional and General Church apportionments before going into the Operating Reserve.

Report No. 2

2. All boards, commissions and agencies shall have prepared in writing and submitted to the Council on Finance and Administration their budgets for the ensuing year by the date set by the Council on Finance and Administration. The program agencies shall present their budgetary request to the Committee on Evaluation and Budget on a date set by the Chair of the Mission Leadership Team prior to the annual budgetary meeting of the MLT. Requests will not be considered if received after the due date unless an extension has been requested and approved.
3. An amount equal to 50% of the General/Jurisdictional Conference per diem or reimbursement for actual expenses above the per diem, whichever is less, shall be paid to each elected lay and clerical delegate and to the first lay and clerical alternate delegates representing this conference at General/Jurisdictional Conference.
4. The director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration is authorized to:
 - a) Consolidate the various funds of the Annual Conference and of the agencies into one or more bank accounts.
 - b) Write all checks for the agencies of the conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency and in keeping with approved conference budget. The Treasurer is also authorized to transmit to the authorized treasurers all other funds that are raised by the local churches in response to General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference askings that have been approved by the appropriate body.
 - c) The conference treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions, and other agencies of the conference into the operating reserve all unex-

pended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempted by CFA) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

- d) Invest the funds of the conference in government securities and federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and/or with the Texas Methodist Foundation, and/or Central Texas Methodist Foundation and to borrow on and dispose of investments at, or prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in accounts of the conference under the guidance of the Council on Finance and Administration.
- e) Deposit funds for specifically designated purposes in federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and/or with the Texas Methodist Foundation and/or Central Texas Methodist Foundation under the joint control of the Central Treasury (Conference Council on Finance and Administration) and the agency concerned, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.

**Report No. 3
Reserve Funds**

In order to establish a better system of accountability, the Council on Finance and Administration, following action of the 1991 Annual Conference, implemented the following management procedures for reserve funds beginning 1/1/92: (See 1993 Journal, page 145)

- a) The operating reserve is no longer treated as a contingency fund but as a cash flow fund.
- b) A separate contingency fund has been set up to cover unbudgeted expenses with accounting of these expenditures to be made to the Annual Conference.
- c) A contingency fund of \$50,000.
- d) The goal is a permanent operating reserve fund of 10% of the current budget to be used strictly for cash flow.
- e) The operating reserve will be replenished by funds unused by the conference at the end of the year.
- f) The authority for the administration of these funds rests with the Council on Finance and Administration pursuant to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church and the Standing Rules of the Central Texas Conference.

Contingency Fund Policy

1. Expenditures will be made from the Contingency Fund under one of two circumstances:
 - a) Unforeseen circumstances, unpredicted, unplanned for, emergency situations that could not have been foreseen by reasonable people and reasonable committees.
 - b) Failure of expected income to support a budgeted expenditure
2. The conference treasurer may authorize up to \$250; the CFA executive committee may authorize up to \$5,000 either in meeting or by phone; those over \$5,000 must be authorized by the full board either in meeting or by phone.
3. No disbursement will be made without the authorization signature of either the conference treasurer or the chair of CFA.

Report No. 4

Mileage Reimbursement

The accountable mileage reimbursement for conference staff shall be the IRS rate. All others shall be reimbursed at 25 cents per mile for one to six persons in a car, and 35 cents per mile when seven or more members ride in the same car for necessary travel on conference business. Due to the fluctuation of gasoline prices, the CFA is authorized to change the mileage rate between sessions of the Annual Conference if deemed necessary. This reimbursement rate will be effective at the close of this Annual Conference.

**Report No. 5
Procedure for Monitoring Expenses**

The Council on Finance and Administration, through its Director, shall monitor monies received through the apportioned funds, and keep those Boards and Agencies receiving funds from the conference advised of possible shortfalls to enable them to adjust their expenses where at all possible in order for expenditures not to exceed actual income for the year. CFA will seek to work with Boards and Agencies to allow the maximum funding of ministries and programs without creating a deficit situation in the Conference Budget.

Report No. 6

At Annual Conference CFA will present a budget in which the bold type represents the totals of projected expenditures for each standing body of the Conference.

(NOTE: The supporting line items that comprise the total will be shown in lightface-italicized type. When the Conference approves the budget, it will be voting on the bold face figures only, with the supporting figures given for informational purposes.)

If occasion arises to meet unforeseen and unusual expenses, or to provide for emerging ministries that could not be known at the time of budget requests, a board or agency may seek CFA approval to shift monies from one line item to another in the light face italicized portion of their budget. In faithfulness to Standing Rule V.10 this procedure will not be used simply because a board anticipates some funds will not be spent.

Report No. 7

In these days when churches are more vulnerable to being sued than they were in the past, and for a far wider list of causes, it is imperative that each local church be incorporated. Failing to be incorporated puts each of the members of the church in jeopardy. In addition to being incorporated each church must review its property and liability insurance coverage with consideration for areas of liability not only between church staff and members or guests, and not only between the church as an entity and whomever might happen upon the premises, but also for the area of liability of employer versus employee.

Report No. 8

By action of the 1999 Annual Conference, each new church start shall be apportioned 25% of what would be its apportionment, under Standing Rule, V, 4.0, for its first year after records are available, 50% its second year, 75% its third year and 100% its fourth year and thereafter.

Report No. 10

The Council has appointed a long-range study committee to consider the future financial structure, needs, and income procedures of the Conference.

(REMINDER: The Annual Conference no longer has a surety bond to cover laity who handle church finances. A letter was sent to all churches notifying them of this change. Once again we urge every church to review their current general liability insurance to ascertain whether this issue is addressed.)

MISSION MINISTRIES Directors' Reports
Report of the Executive Director of Mission Ministries

This past conference year we continued to focus our work on "Making Disciples of Jesus Christ." The theme we adopted in the 2004 quadrennium, "*Follow Me: Nurturing Our Faith; Reach out to Others and Witnessing to our Faith*," has proven to be quite successful in challenging individuals and congregations of this conference to remain focused on the mission of the Church.

We have launched these themes with the intent that our lives will be impacted and enriched so that we may live victorious Christian lives.

Christian Education Sunday will be on Sunday, September 6, 2009. On or around that Sunday, all churches in the Central Texas Conference are asked to take a special offering to support all the Christian education ministries of the conference. This money is used to provide opportunities for training to local church educators, such as attending FOCUS '09. We will have several persons attending FOCUS and receiving scholarships from the offerings sent to the conference from Christian Education Sunday. Once again, I appreciate the opportunity to serve God with such wonderful and supportive colleagues on the conference staff. Being able to work with our local churches and leaders in small, medium and large-size churches is such a joy and a privilege. Report of Humanitarian Director

As we enter a new quadrennium, I am excited about the strides that the Central Texas Conference has made during the last four years and joyfully anticipate the exciting ministries in which we will play a role during the coming four years. The programs that I support through my position as Director of Humanitarian Services will, along with the conference, support the United Methodist Church's vision set forth in the new Four Areas of Focus—developing leaders, creating places for new people, eliminating poverty, and improving health globally. We will continually evaluate how these ministries align with the goals of the general church.

One of the highlights for me during the past year is the leadership developed in the UVMIM (UM Volunteers in Mission) program and the significant efforts of our congregations in sending out mission teams. To our knowledge, members of CTC churches provided over \$2.3 million in volunteer labor—and we know that this only scratches the surface of the impact our congregations made in ongoing activities in their communities and beyond. I am also proud of the increase in churches recognized as Five Star congregations and their new commitments to support United Methodist missionaries serving all over the world.

Another highlight is the new training opportunities that the Disaster Response Task Force continues to develop with the support of UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief), particularly in the areas of local church preparedness, resource assessment, and developing early response teams. Through Refugee & Immigration Ministries, our conference support of Justice For Our Neighbors (JFON) continues to grow each year and our task force will be actively exploring how we might further expand JFON's ministry throughout our conference area. We also have new churches that are choosing to sponsor refugee families resettled to our area through Refugee Services of Texas. One of the most exciting opportunities in 2009 is the grant-making that our Task Force on Hunger will initiate for churches beginning or expanding their hunger ministries in response to growing needs in our local area.

The goal of these and many other conference outreach programs is to empower our congregations to live out the gospel through ministries about which they are passionate. It is a privilege to work to provide resources and training for these efforts, to recognize the vital community outreach ministries of our churches, and to help develop volunteer leadership that makes such ministries possible. Report of the Archivist/Resource Director

The Conference Multi-Media Resource Center's ongoing goal is to support all of the varieties of ministry throughout the conference. The Resource Center assists all of the local churches and related agencies of the conference. The Resource Center is a lending library with resources to aid the various ministries of our local churches and agencies.

The Resource Center contains a variety of resources for pastors, Sunday School teachers, committee members, small groups, men's/women's groups, youth groups, and children's ministries as well as resources for personal spiritual growth. The Resource Center provides books, videos, study aids, music, bible studies, and audiovisual equipment to enhance your spiritual journey, ministry, and educational programs. The Resource Center provides materials that address many topics for all age groups, from children to senior adults. The collection is searchable online and online reservations are possible. In addition to specific requested resources, the Resource Center also offers consultation on topics and related resources that are available in the collection. Consultation continues to be available to guide churches in creating, managing, and operating their in-house church library.

The Resource Center experienced a 7% increase in usage in the past year. The collection continues to be updated with current materials and studies and some old favorites have been updated to DVD format. 272 new materials were added to the collection in 2008, along with weeding out dated material for a total of 3,900 items. A great deal of database maintenance has been done to correct incomplete or missing data that has prevented accurate online search and location of resources.

Recommendations for new or seasonally relevant materials are noted in the E-link. You may preview the print and video resources available for loan. In addition, the Center provides samples of current Christian education curriculum to aid patrons with their purchase decisions. Most items loan at no charge, others rent for a reasonable fee. Future plans include making the Resource Center web page more interactive and informative. Plans include adding a "recommendations" feature, reviews, and helpful links. Promotion of the Resource Center will continue to be a focus for the coming year.

We continue to build and improve our library of Christian media to serve our members with up-to-date, high quality resources and services.

Report of Central Texas Conference Youth in Mission (CTCYM) Director

In 2008, more than 2,500 youth and adults of the Central Texas Conference made a powerful impact on the lives of more than 300 individual families during three CTCYM mission trips.

In early June, the senior-high trip saw 1,600 youth and adults spread out across Southwest Missouri and Northwest Arkansas to learn about, experience and demonstrate *The Amazing Grace of Jesus Christ*. The same week, more than 200 youth and adults went on CTCYM's combination trip in East Texas. This trip includes groups of junior and senior high youth. Working through local agencies in 22 different cities, CTCYM groups identified people who need repairs or construction at their homes, but who could not afford it or were physically unable to complete it. The projects included patching roofs, repairing floors, painting walls, fixing porches, replacing windows, building wheelchair ramps and much more.

In July, almost 800 junior high youth and adults left for CTCYM's week-long junior high mission in 10 different cities in Southeast Texas. Dodging the brunt of Hurricane Dolly, many of the groups did weather wind and rain to complete their work that week.

In addition to the customary planning needs, the committee has identified three areas of focus for 2009:

- **Leadership:** work toward matching the skill set of those in leadership with the skills needed for the positions and providing the training leadership needs to provide a positive experience at each Living Center.
- **Communication:** ensuring all communication is clear, timely and effective.
- **Expansion:** identifying the steps CTCYM needs to take to continue to grow.

Toward this end the CTCYM Advisory Committee has begun to put together a 5-year Strategic Plan to insure that our ability to continue to serve continues to grow.

Every summer CTCYM brings together youth and adults from around the Conference to serve in the name of Christ. For a week they live, eat, work and worship together in living centers hosted by churches in different parts of the country. CTCYM is funded by the fees paid by participants to attend and by donations from others mission-minded individuals.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE MISSION LEADERSHIP TEAM

Budgeted 2009: \$18,350 _____ Requested 2010: \$13,350

Our first Mission Leadership Team meeting for the new quadrennium was in August 2008. The Nurture, Outreach, and Witness combined councils met at Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center to begin communication and strategic planning for ministry. Thinking creatively for change expands our horizons and moves us into the vision that God has for us.

In September, we were introduced to Bishop Lowry. During our weekend at Still Water Retreat Center, our new bishop began to reveal his vision to the Mission Leadership Team, the Executive Leadership Team, and Extended Cabinet. We began the journey to evaluate effectiveness, to persevere for new opportunities with Christ centered, focused evangelism and mission. The Mission Leadership Team adopted the revised budgets for the approval by the Annual Conference. The fact is, we are facing some tough economic times. But during these times of uncertainty, we have a greater opportunity to witness and share our faith. Each committee has evaluated and tightened their budgets. The careful study and placement of requested funding by the MLT Council guarantees that ministry will remain effective and efficient.

On March 7th, during the MLT meeting, we introduced the conference goals. Each council will maintain the *Four Areas of Focus* as the outline for effective ministry.

The MLT adopted RESTORATIVE JUSTICE MINISTRIES as the Annual Conference offering for 2009. Four entities comprise this ministry: Crime Victims Council, Tarrant County Restorative Justice Center/Home of Greater Joy; Methodist Justice Ministry; and Parents and Children Together.

We recommended the reappointment of Karen Granderson and Steve Nance. Their dedication and leadership continues to be a source of strength and knowledge for our conference. The power of the N.O.W. structure enables our conference staff, volunteers and congregations to lay the ground work for ministry supporting the *Four Areas of Focus*. We are called to strengthen our local and global ministries. Our mission is to make "disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world". Our Wesleyan heritage, our biblical principles, gives witness of our dedication. It is as easy as 1-2-3-4!

NURTURE MISSION COUNCIL

Budgeted 2009: \$116,222 _____ Requested 2010: \$89,590

The Nurture Council is energized and focused. Although there are a few ministry areas that we are seeking leadership for, others are very strong and extremely effective. We are very pleased with the activity coming from the newest members of our group, Allen and Darlene Grant, coordinators for Marriage and Family Ministry. Providing for stronger and more spiritual marriages is the priority of this ministry area. Plans are underway for a conference training event that possibly will include sessions for Pastors on pre-marital counseling; marriage repair/enrichment curriculum; parents on parenting skills; plenary session with a national leader of the church.

In the area of Children's Ministry we are working on improving the connection between workers and directors throughout the conference. We are also looking at ways and means to offer ministry and the love of Christ to children outside the walls of the church in order for unchurched

families to experience the love of Christ. A *Created By God* retreat on Human Sexuality for fifth and sixth graders with parenting sessions held concurrently on Human Sexuality, Internet Safety, and Protecting Children from Predators will be planned. Possible leadership training events for the next year may include the *Created By God* Human Sexuality curriculum, *Way of the Child* Spiritual Development, and *Godly Play* will be scheduled. Also an opportunity for dialogue among directors of weekday programs and church staff will be planned in order to help these programs co-exist within the same building.

Senior Adult Ministry, in collaboration with the senior adult leadership teams of Wesleyan Homes and FUMC Belton, accomplished the creation of a comprehensive database of the various ministry settings in every congregation in the Central Texas Conference. This database will provide much needed information about best practices among our congregations and help us identify where and what kinds of ministry resourcing is needed to support growing edges of congregations' ministries with Senior Adults in the years ahead.

Once again this year, our Spiritual Formation Committee has participated in the 5-Day Academy for Spiritual Formation through the leading efforts of the North Texas Conference. Not only did participants from the CTC attend the 5-Day Academy, but the CTC contributed to the general fund, while also offering scholarships to CTC attendees. Efforts were made to institute A Day of Spiritual Formation working with local churches to lead groups through spiritual formation group exercises.

UMC Singles – *Singles with Spirit* had a great year. The Tarrant Area Council continued to present quarterly events including our first singles retreat at Still Water Lodge, which was a Conference wide event; our annual "day at the lake" and a fall Leadership Summit facilitated by Terry Hershey. Other Conference wide events include our second year to provide a chartered bus to the Jurisdictional Singles Retreat at Mount Sequoyah. We made our first Singles Mission Trip traveling to Dulac, Louisiana to repair homes damaged by Hurricane Katrina. The long list of local events continues to grow with activities ranging from Bible study, to Habitat for Humanity, to game nights and far too many to mention. We were very excited to kick-off the Centraplex Area Singles with a Valentines event at Woodway FUMC, serving the Temple and Waco Districts. 2009 Singles Retreat for our Conference was again held at Still Water Lodge and featured Kent Kilbourne as the keynote speaker. The first weekend in June 2009 we will present *Listening to Divorce*, led by Charles Gaby also at Still Water Lodge. This is certainly a dynamic time for Singles Ministry in the Central Texas Conference.

As we continue to work and build strong ministries in the coming year, we will be focusing on Stewardship, Leadership Development, and Worship as key areas that are vital to our ministry. The Nurture Council is committed to providing quality resources and training in all our areas of responsibility. One way we plan to achieve this is through widespread implementation of the *Five Practices of a Fruitful Congregation: Radical Hospitality. Passionate Worship. Intentional Faith Development. Risk-Taking Mission and Service. Extravagant Generosity.*

WALK TO EMMAUS

The Walk to Emmaus weekend event begins with prayer and is surrounded by and supported by prayer and the sharing of Communion throughout preparation and the weekend itself. Sponsors prayerfully consider who they will sponsor as Pilgrims on a Walk to Emmaus long weekend. The Walk is not for everyone. It is one of many spiritual renewal experiences. No one "needs" to go on a Walk to Emmaus – however many people are likely to benefit. The Walk to Emmaus is not intended to fix marriages, end depression, or restore families, although it sometimes does. It is a tool used to share grace; one of many means to draw people to a closer relationship with Jesus. Part of the daily devotional guide provided to sponsors is continued prayer for the Pilgrim and for the Walk team as they prepare for the weekend.

Worship services including Prayer and Communion begin the process as the Board of Directors considers when and where Walks will be conducted and the selection of leadership for each Walk. Prayer also guides the Team Selection Committee and the Walk Lay Director and Spiritual Director in selection of specific team members. The Team consists of both clergy and laity. There are five clergy to provide spiritual guidance and support and about 35-40 lay people. The team meets four times over the two months before the Walk. They preview all fifteen of the talks to be given, work on team building, celebrate Communion, pray, and worship together at each meeting, including prayer for each Pilgrim.

There are two continuous prayer events surrounding the weekend. A 24-hour Prayer Vigil begins on Thursday afternoon just before the Walk starts and continues through Sunday evening as the Walk concludes. People throughout the Greater Emmaus Community sign up for 30 minute time periods around the clock during the weekend when they agree to pray in their homes, churches, or wherever they are for the Walk, the Pilgrims, and the team members. There is also a Prayer Chapel at the Walk site that is staffed 24-hours a day by team members providing continuous prayer for the Pilgrims and the Walk. In addition to these two prayer efforts, the dates and locations of Walks are shared throughout the world-wide Emmaus Community and people all over the world spend time in prayer for each Walk.

As the Walk begins the Pilgrims share an introduction time where they begin the process of becoming acquainted with one another and learn about the weekend. While they are doing this, the sponsors participate in a Sponsor's Worship Service where Communion is shared, each Pilgrim is prayed for by name, and the Emmaus cross the Pilgrim will ultimately receive at the end of the Walk is labeled with that Pilgrim's name and is prayed over. On Saturday evening of the Walk weekend the Emmaus Community gathers at the Walk location for a Candlelight Worship Service where they share communion and again pray for each Pilgrim by name. At the end of this service the Pilgrims are brought into the candle-lit area and informed that these people have been worshipping and praying for them, and then the community leaves. Communion is celebrated each day during the Walk and there are several times each day where prayer is a part of the activity, sometimes group prayer, sometimes silent individual prayer, and sometimes individual prayer by and about the members of the small groups formed for discussion.

Through prayer and Communion each Walk to Emmaus event invites Jesus to be part of the process. The intent is for the team to provide an experience where the Holy Spirit can touch each Pilgrim at the time and in the way that each one needs. No one will judge any Pilgrim upon his or her level of participation or reactions to the weekend. There is no prescribed response to anything on Emmaus. Some people are strongly moved by the spirit, others will feel nothing tangible. A Pilgrim is no less if his or her response is quieter than the next person's, or if any part of the whole walk does not move him or her at all. For some, the Walk is a life-changing experience.

Participating in Emmaus does not make a person different or better than any other Christian. It just makes them a person who has been on a Walk to Emmaus weekend. The only thing that can change a person is Jesus. The crosses and lanyards, intended to be worn only at Emmaus functions, do not set the wearer apart from the rest of the church, nor are they supposed to have any power. They are a memento of the experience and can be used as an aid to prayer. Like many other crosses and

icons they are reminders of who we belong to. In 2008 there were 429 Pilgrims who attended a Walk to Emmaus weekend in the Central Texas Conference. These Pilgrims came from twenty different Protestant denominations and from the Catholic Church. Emmaus does not aim to take people out of church, but to help them think about what Jesus has done for them and energize them to go back to their own church and serve God. Personal Christian growth and active service in a person's home church are emphasized.

Providing for stronger and more spiritual marriages is one of the goals that all churches need to become involved in. But where do we start? This year I would like to suggest that we create a Conference Training Event to strengthen marriages and families.

The Texas State Legislature has approved a project presented by the Lutheran Services in Austin that encourages pre-marriage counseling. When a couple applies for a marriage license the cost is now \$60. Lutheran Services has developed TWOgether. If a couple completes 8 hours of pre-marriage education including relationship building and conflict management, there is no cost for that marriage license. To receive the certificate of completion, the couple must receive the 8 hour educational pre-marriage instruction from a certified instructor.

An educational event might look like this:

- Sessions for Pastors on how to conduct pre-marriage counseling with instructions on how to become a certified instructor.
- Sessions on marriage repair/enrichment curriculum that could be taught by lay or clergy
- Sessions for parents (age-group related) on parenting skills.
- A Plenary session with an outstanding national leader in the church.
- Curriculum and other resources available for persons to purchase during the event.

The Disability Concerns Committee can help your church with the following disability concerns: health impairment, physically disabled, deaf/hard of hearing, blind/visually impaired, mentally/emotionally impaired, developmentally delayed and attitudinally impaired.

Is everyone welcome at your church? You can answer this question with a “yes” if you can affirm the following:

1. A person who uses a wheel chair can get into the restroom with no problem.
2. Our parking lot has handicap signage.
3. Our trustees conduct an annual accessibility audit.
4. Members with limited mobility participate regularly in Sunday worship leadership.
5. We provide large print bulletins, bibles and hymnals for every worship event.
6. Anyone who is deaf or hard of hearing, coming to our church, will be able to participate and understand everything in worship, Sunday school, etc., and can become an active church member.
7. We do not have anyone in our church that is attitudinally impaired.
8. We have ministries for those with hidden disabilities.
9. Our ushers are trained to assist in welcoming all persons.
10. Our trustees have an established task force on accessibilities.
11. We have included an awareness that mental health disabilities (serious depression, anxiety, etc.,) may occur in all families.
12. Our church has implemented a plan to become accessible to all.
13. We do include persons with various disabilities and/or their advocates in the planning for disability ministries.
14. We volunteer our time to be Camp Buddies at Glen Lake Camp's inclusive camping program for children, youth and adults.
15. We offer respite care for our members who are caregivers at home.

DISASTER RESPONSE

The conference Disaster Response Task Force sponsored a number of activities to serve those affected by disaster in 2008. In partnership with the UMVIM program, a conference team served at UMCOR's Sager Brown Depot in Baldwin, LA, and we have scheduled teams for September 2009 and May 2010. A long-term recovery team trekked up to Iowa to serve in response to severe spring flooding and an Early Response Team cleared debris and deconstructed homes in Orange and Port Arthur, TX, after Hurricane Ike devastated southeast Texas in the fall.

In response to both Hurricanes Gustav and Ike, CTC congregations collected supplies for flood buckets and delivered over 850 assembled buckets and bulk supplies to Sager Brown and directly to San Leon, TX, in Galveston County. Our churches served as shelters through the Red Cross and other organizations and our members volunteered at shelters throughout the conference, especially along the coastal evacuation routes. We also deployed spiritual care team members, Stephen ministers, clergy, and other caring volunteers to emergency shelters.

Task force members also participated in training events that we hope will enable our churches to be more prepared for a disaster. Representatives attended an UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief) training academy in November 2008 to learn about planning for pandemics and to be trained in a new UMCOR training that will assist churches with writing disaster plans for their congregations, helping their members to be prepared, and assessing the resources of their facilities and congregations in order to be in ministry to their community in time of disaster. This new training, "Connecting Neighbors", was launched in January 2009 at the Waxahachie and Weatherford district lay training events, and task force members will be available to train individual congregations or clusters of churches as requested. In February 2009, five new trainers began the process to be authorized by UMCOR to teach Early Response Team courses for our congregations, thus we will resume our commitment to train more churches in the creation of Early Response Teams.

We also updated our "Toolkit for Disaster Preparedness & Response", which has a multitude of resources for local church leaders and can be found on the Disaster Response page of the conference website.

HEALTH AND WELFARE

In 2008 a GoodNews workshop was held at Stillwater Lodge. GoodNews is a faith based wellness program. Lay Health promoters are trained, and they in turn promote healthful living in local congregations. The training was specifically targeted for the Temple, Waco and Brownwood Districts. Approximately 750 people attended the Health and Welfare luncheon at Annual Conference. Five United Methodist agencies (Texas Health Resources Harris Methodist; Wesleyan Homes; Methodist Home - Waco; Methodist Mission Home and Sears Methodist Retirement Systems) provided the meal and excellent presentations.

Faith Community Nursing continues to be supported in the local churches by the Golden Cross collection. The Health and Welfare Committee was also busy in planning the Annual Conference Spring Leadership Summit held at Central UMC Waco in March of 2009. "Taking Care...of the Body of

Christ[™] was presented to address numerous health issues in the local churches. Much appreciation and thanks is given to Mona Bailey who served as the chair for the past four years. Our hope is to build upon the good foundation she had laid.

"I've learned how to walk again." This phrase was spoken to me last week by Frank, an Associate who has been employed with Aldersgate for the last three years. Frank and I went on to discuss how the last three years had changed him. When Frank first came to Aldersgate, he was a very angry, depressed closed up individual. Last week, Frank gave his last devotional as an Aldersgate Associate. Today, he is employed with Ricardo's Tortilla Factory and Heartland Mall. Frank is just one of several Associates that we have witnessed growing in Christ and learning "to walk again" at Aldersgate.

Stories like this are so amazing to hear. It states the main reason that Aldersgate is here. It reminds us that no matter how difficult the times are, how many challenges are put in front of us, there is a reason that Aldersgate will continue to thrive. And that reason is God.

With the difficult times that we are facing, we have begun to make changes to help support Aldersgate better. Until this year, Aldersgate paid every employee minimum wage. With minimum wage increasing, it became more difficult for us to continue to pay our Associates. In December, we applied for a special minimum wage rate certificate. This certificate allows us to pay piece rate to our Associates. Because of this rate, it allows us to be more competitive on our bids for other contracts.

It has been difficult time for contributions and we want to thank those that have been able to continue to make donations during this time. Contributions are very important to us. These contributions help support our Associates that do not have the money to pay for meals or housing.

God is so good. This past year we have been so very blessed. We have added contracts to our litter removal department and have picked up contracts with DanHil Containers. The contract with DanHil Containers has allowed us to add five more positions. As everyone has, we have had our share of challenges and in each of these challenges we have come together as a group and prayed. With God's help we have overcome every one of these challenges.

Aldersgate is heading into its 22nd year of serving God's special people. Throughout the years, it has seen many changes and growth. Currently, we employ 75 Associates and 21 staff. We have fifteen Associates living on campus. Last summer, we had several groups volunteer their time at Aldersgate. One of the projects completed by these groups was the renovation of our kitchen. By lowering the ceiling and replacing one of the overhead doors, it has been made more energy efficient.

In October, we held our first fundraiser on the Aldersgate campus. "Under the Stars at Aldersgate" consisted of a concert, dinner, live and silent auction held under a clear tent under the stars. The event was a huge success. We are looking forward to this year's event. December was our second year to hold "A Road to Bethlehem," a drive through nativity put on by the staff and Associates at Aldersgate. This event is a great way to share the story of the birth of Jesus with people from the community.

This year we will begin construction on our prayer garden. The prayer garden will be overlooking the property and be accessible to anyone. This will be a place for us to hold special events such as our concerts, etc. We have groups that will begin clearing the area starting this month.

Our Promise Singers are continuing to sing around the conference and bless people with their music ministry. Last year, the Promise Singers performed over 45 times. This group is truly a blessing. If you or your church has not had the opportunity to listen to this group, please contact us to schedule them.

Those of you that have had the opportunity to visit Aldersgate know what a special place it is. We invite you to visit us anytime, as a group or by yourself. We start each day with a devotion and prayer time. As soon as you step foot on the campus, you can see how richly God has blessed us. The smiles and testimonials from the men and women that work here tell the story. God is present here.

The people of Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals are proud of our faith-based heritage of compassionate care, begun by people devoted to the healing ministries of the United Methodist Church. Our philosophy of caring for the whole individual – body, mind and spirit – is based on values rooted in God's Spirit and reflected in the human spirit.

The faith-based heritage and values of Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals remains at the center of everything we do. A new brand identity for Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals was rolled out across the system at the end of 2008 and in early 2009. This change is the result of a need to establish a single identity across the Texas Health Resources system. The hospitals continue to have "Methodist" as a prominent part of their names. The new logo includes a subtle faith symbol embedded in the design.

Each hospital displays the Cross and Flame symbol of the United Methodist Church inside. Texas Health is also planning several other methods of recognizing and expanding our faith-based foundations.

**Theme 1
Prayer Books**

On times of pain, bad health or the unknown, many people use prayer to help deal with crisis. According to the National Institute on Health, 45 percent of people surveyed had used prayer for health reasons and 25 percent had others pray for them. Texas Health caregivers are familiar with cultural nuances and provide culturally competent care with respect for diversity of spiritual understanding. As part of its faith-based mission, the hospitals of Texas Health Resources offer a prayer book with prayers from different faiths for patients and their families.

The prayer books are distributed to provide comfort and are a useful reminder of the central role spirituality plays in everything we do. They are available throughout the hospitals in waiting rooms, chapels and other locations. Additionally, patients may request or receive the books from their hospital chaplains. The books also are available on www.texashealth.org for those who want to print out their own personal copy.

**Theme 2
Faith Community Nursing**

Texas Health is expanding programs system-wide that facilitate the collaboration of hospital chaplains, clergy and congregations of all faiths to enhance the care of our patients. For example, the Faith-Community Nursing Program, begun in Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals, is being expanded across the system to support outreach through community religious organizations.

Caring for individuals - mind, body and spirit - is what Texas Health hospitals have successfully done through its faith community nursing program since its inception in 2002 at Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Fort Worth. Serving 39 faith communities with 82 nurse volunteers, the program has touched more than 28,000 families in the community.

On July 8, 2008, the program expanded its reach beyond the Christian community to embrace the Dar el Eman Islamic Center, located in south Arlington. Dar el Eman Islamic Center designated three active members of the mosque to serve as faith community nurses. These nurses will care for more than 2,000 members and will focus primarily on a congregational health needs assessment, as well as CPR training for adults and hand hygiene classes for children. A health fair also is planned.

**Theme 3
Chapels and Chaplains**

A chapel is available for patients, families and guests to pray and meditate. Each Texas Health hospital participates in the Mindfulness Chimes program and rings chimes at 11a.m. and 7p.m. every day to remind people to take a moment for spiritual reflection. Additionally, chaplains are available for prayers at the request of a patient or family member.

**Theme 4
Clinical Pastoral Education**

For more than 30 years, Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) has provided practical, hands-on theological education for ministers or seminarians. CPE combines ministry with a curriculum designed to help CPE students learn about themselves as ministers as well as how to meet the spiritual needs of those in their care.

While at Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals, students in CPE Programs are members of their hospital's Department of Pastoral Care and function as chaplains in their institutions. The Departments of Pastoral Care are well integrated into the patient care functions of these hospitals, and students in the education program have many opportunities to engage in ministry to patients

experiencing health-related crises. They give bedside ministry to patients and their loved ones, participate in an on-call rotation for weekday night and weekend crisis ministry and work on interdisciplinary care teams.

Participants in this program have an opportunity to reflect on their experiences and assess them from a psychological and theological perspective.

Theme 5

Faith Community Leadership Summit

Approximately 400 people attended the 2009 Faith Community Leadership Summit, echoing the popularity of the program since it began in 2007. The summit brings together faith leaders from Tarrant and surrounding counties to dialogue and network, share best practices, provide needed resources, and equip leadership for the challenges of the 21st century.

The 2009 topics included: leadership opportunities and challenges; self-care/renewal for caregivers; mental health and families of faith; creating caring congregations, including challenges facing our communities; caring for persons with addictions; and ministering to those who are experiencing loneliness.

The program is open to leaders in all faith communities—mark your calendars for the next summit on February 6, 2010.

Theme 4

Community Benefit and Charity Care

In 2007 Texas Health Resources hospitals provided approximately \$237,000 per day in charity care and expect to report similar size figures for 2008. Counting the cost of unreimbursed government-sponsored indigent care, the figure goes up to approximately \$322,600 per day. Add the unreimbursed cost of treating Medicare patients, and the figure rises to \$1.2 million per day.

We continue to work to improve the health of the communities we serve through programs in and out of our hospitals.

MMH Ministry

Today, the mission of Methodist Mission Home is to offer hope to individuals facing spiritually, emotionally and physically challenging circumstances, so they may lead enriched, rewarding and satisfying lives. Through professional guidance and compassionate support, teens and young women facing unplanned pregnancy and families considering adoption make mutually beneficial decisions. Through transitional education including life skills and vocational training, young adults with disabilities and those who are deaf develop confidence and competence to reach their personal level of independent living. MMH fulfills this mission through the following programs:

- **Family Services** has placed 5,716 children into loving homes through domestic, older child, and international adoptions. We provide counseling for birth parents and adoptive families throughout the adoption process. Our maternity services include campus housing for pregnant teens and young women considering adoption. Post-adoption counseling is available for birth parents, adoptive families, and adoptive children. "Is Parenting Harder Than You Thought?" provides education to teach teens and the professionals who work with at-risk youth about the alternatives to parenting – adoption and voluntary foster care.
- **The Southwest Center for Higher Independence (SCHI)** For many teens, graduation from high school means moving on to college. For students with multiple disabilities, college is not always the next step. For these young adults, ages 18 and older, SCHI is the next step. Established in 1974, SCHI was founded as a transitional education center for people who were deaf and hard of hearing. Today, our services have expanded to accommodate more diverse disabilities, including high functioning MR, autism, Asbergers, cerebral palsy, and learning disorders. SCHI has assisted hundreds of young adults with disabilities in learning the vocational and life skills to achieve their personal best.
- **The Genesis Cooperative** is a self-supporting collaboration of five nonprofit agencies on the MMH campus serving youth and young adults with disabilities, pregnant teens and young women, women recovering from substance abuse and their children, and adults who are deaf/blind.

The Central Texas Conference created Wesleyan Homes 54 years ago and the Wesleyan Retirement Home opened its doors in 1962. The Wesleyan Nursing Home opened in 1978 and was expanded in 1986 and 2000 and now has 220 beds. 2008 marked a milestone when a new 124 apartment independent living retirement facility opened on a 30 acre campus called the Wesleyan at Estrella. The original Wesleyan Retirement Home has been sold.

The Central Texas Conference elects Wesleyan's Board and our charitable support for resident care comes from the churches of the Central Texas Conference as well as from individual donors. We give thanks to God for the faithfulness of the Church as it supports Wesleyan Homes through the Mother's Day Offering and through volunteers serving the Wesleyan residents in a myriad of ways.

Benevolence

In 2008, Wesleyan Homes was home to 538 older adults and gave \$1,657,818 in charitable care. Wesleyan received \$21,879 from the Mother's Day Offering and other giving through the churches in the Conference.

New Georgetown Campus Update: The Wesleyan at Estrella, Phase I: Independent Living

Our new independent living campus off Williams Drive in Georgetown opened in January, 2008. All 124 apartments were soon occupied. Now a waiting list of 220 grows every day, as The Wesleyan at Estrella sets the pace for senior adult communities in Central Texas.

Phase II: Assisted Living

Phase II of the new Wesleyan at Estrella's 40 acre campus is ready to begin construction. All we need is a thawing of the financial markets to permit us to obtain permanent financing for the 60 bed assisted living facility, 50 or so independent living cottages and a wellness/fitness center.

Hospice

In 2008, Wesleyan Hospice expanded to begin serving home-based hospice clients as well as residents in our skilled nursing facility in Georgetown, The Wesleyan at Scenic. This newest aspect of our ministry, dealing specifically with those nearing death, adds greatly to our ministry's commitment to provide compassionate care.

Elsewhere in the Conference

Wesleyan is also looking for locations in the northern part of the conference where a market need can be demonstrated and where local United Methodists are willing to work and pray and give so that a new ministry can be developed and nurtured. The new campus in Georgetown required the price of 30 acres of land as well as charitable giving in the amount of \$1.5 million. A similar project would require a similar commitment by a local community. We hope your community can some day know the difference a church related not for profit ministry for its elders can make. TASK FORCE ON HUNGER

In 2008, the CTC Task Force on Hunger co-sponsored a potato drop during General Conference in Fort Worth to promote the ministry of the Society of St. Andrew and to benefit local food banks and food pantries. REFUGEE AND IMMIGRATION MINISTRIES

Mindful of the plight of the refugee and immigrant in our community, we reach out to address issues that in fact affect all of us. Our conference RIMCOR (Refugee and Immigration Coordinator) attended a national seminar in New York in October 2008. We have five (5) district coordinators and conducted a conference meeting in November. A main goal is to expand our mission through speaking

engagements in church and other gatherings. In 2009, the task force will actively explore the expansion of the ministry of Justice For Our Neighbors (JFON) in extended areas of our conference. We will also continue to promote the opportunity for our congregations to support JFON through the conference Fair Share Askings.

Through our direct and connectional relationship with RST (Refugee Services of Texas) and JFON legal clinic, we have promoted:

1. Gathering of resources and people to procure living necessities, financial assistance for rent and utilities, and transportation for medical and school needs of the refugee, and;
2. Supporting the immigrant by promoting awareness of JFON, establishing citizenship classes in CTC churches, and exploring the use of literacy and like programs, as well as visitations and prayer vigils for those in detention in our conference area.

VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION (UMVIM)

The conference UMVIM program stayed busy in 2008 with team leader training and several conference-wide mission trips. A construction/VBS team served in Reynosa, Mexico, as part of our conference covenant relationship with the Eastern Mexico Conference; a medical/teaching team served at Ganta United Methodist Hospital and Mission Station in Liberia; and in partnership with the disaster response program, a team served at UMCOR's Sager Brown Depot in Baldwin, LA. A conference-wide construction team also served in Lake Charles, LA, in February 2009, to support our partnership with the Southwest Louisiana Disaster Recovery Ministry still leading recovery efforts from Hurricane Rita and now leading more efforts to recover from Hurricane Ike. Other trips planned for 2009 are a young adult mission trip to Aldersgate Enrichment Center in March and our annual UMVIM/Disaster Response trip to Sager Brown in September.

To our knowledge, CTC churches sent out three medical teams and 404 construction teams in 2008, comprised of 3,355 team members. These statistics include the CTCYM summer trips, so we know that our youth are making a wonderful impact on many communities. The teams served in 10 countries outside of the United States and seven states within the U.S. The teams contributed more than \$875,000 in project supplies and other expenses and worked over 17,000 volunteer work days. According to the standard value of volunteer time, that amounts to over \$2.3 million in labor!

Our UMVIM Task Force will continue to promote opportunities for local congregations to participate in a variety of mission activities, and along with the conference will support the new Four Areas of Focus of the general UMC. We will particularly explore ways that we can partner with communities in need, especially in the area of Community-Based Health Care in developing countries, which is a primary focus of the church's Global Health Initiative and encompasses much more than sending medical mission teams.

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HIGHER EDUCATION

The Higher Education Task Force begins the new quadrennium focusing in our denomination's commitment to partnering with United Methodist colleges, universities and seminaries to "develop new principled Christian leaders for the church and the world." One way we will accomplish this is with preview experiences for high school students and their parents. In the fall, high school juniors and seniors and their parents will be invited to meet with representatives from the United Methodist-related schools in Texas and nearby states to determine what each school has to offer in studies, financial assistance and spiritual support. Next spring, high school sophomores and their parents will have a similar opportunity that starts them thinking and preparing for the benefits of pursuing higher education — and staying connected in the faith by attending a United Methodist-related school. Taking a significant role at these events will be the seven campus ministers and two university chaplains whose active presence demonstrates the faithful journey from local church to college campus to young professional seeking a new or renewed church home.

The good news for 2009 is an increase in the number of scholarships the Task Force is offering to United Methodist students. The **Merit Scholarship** is available through the contributions local churches make to the Student Day Offering. The amount varies according to the previous year's offering receipts. The **Stephens Scholarships** — \$1,000 for a student in finance/accounting and \$1,000 for a student in journalism/public relations — are made possible by contributions made by Alvis P. & Carolyn E. Stephens. The newest scholarship — the **Dr. G. Alfred & Opal Brown Ministerial Scholarship** — provides \$5,000 for a student planning for ministry as an elder in the Central Texas Conference. It is the hope of the Task Force that other individuals and organizations will realize the benefits of supporting our students to prepare them to be blessings to the church and the world.

EMORY

/ CANDLER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

With a new building, new faculty and staff, new curriculum, newly expanded financial aid initiatives—and even new art!—Candler School of Theology is moving with enthusiasm and grace through changes that enhance its ability to fulfill its mission: *to educate faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries in the world.* To this end, Candler is constantly working to deepen its already vital

relationship with The United Methodist Church.

As one of the 13 official seminaries of The United Methodist Church, Candler is grounded in the Christian faith and shaped by the Wesleyan tradition of evangelical piety, ecumenical openness, and social concern. As one of nine graduate level, professional schools of United Methodist-related Emory University, Candler provides a context for learning and formation that engages the most complex and difficult issues of our day. As a school located in the major metropolitan area of Atlanta, Georgia, Candler offers students the opportunity for practice in a highly diverse community, a global crossroads where church growth is expected, cultivated, and actually happening! There is no better place for preparation that resonates with and addresses our major denominational priorities: developing leaders, starting and growing churches, ministry with the poor, and improving global health.

On September 25, 2008, and with abundant joy, we dedicated Phase I of the new Candler School of Theology Building. A LEEDS silver certificate building, the "CST" includes offices and classrooms that provide the opportunity for technologically sophisticated work and community in an environmentally sound setting. Phase II, to be built in due time, will house the Pitts Theology Library, the Wesley Teaching Chapel, and additional offices and classrooms.

This year we welcomed the arrival of six new faculty and senior staff, five of whom are United Methodists. Forty two percent of the faculty and senior staff is United Methodist, and all but five are ordained. Two new staff positions were created, the Director of Lifelong Learning, filled by Dr. Bob Winstead, a member of the North Georgia Annual Conference, and the Associate Dean of Methodist Studies, filled by Dr. Anne Burkholder, a member of the Florida Annual Conference. Both of these new positions serve the larger church as they connect clergy with new opportunities for learning; connect conferences and students who are ultimately seeking ordination; engage with denominational organizations at a variety of levels; oversee denominational certifications and the Course of Study; advise students; and teach courses. In addition, Bishop Ruediger Minor is with us for two years as the inaugural holder of the Hankey Chair in World Evangelism and Bishop Walter Klaiber is with us as Bishop-in-Residence during the spring semester.

Candler is in the second year of its new curriculum, designed to assist students in aligning their course selection with their call to ministry and integrating the classroom with their contextual education settings. This emphasis is accomplished through the selection of a concentration, the opportunity for special certifications, and joint programs and initiatives with three other Emory graduate schools: Goizueta Business School, Emory Law School, and Rollins School of Public Health.

We are delighted to report that in spite of the difficult economic realities that have had a serious impact on us all, Candler School of Theology and Emory University are faring well, due to sound fiscal stewardship and excellent donor support. The Emory Capital Campaign has achieved \$881 million of its \$1.7 billion goal. Candler's goal of \$60 million will enable us to achieve strategic priorities regarding facilities, student support, lifelong learning, endowed professorships, programs and curriculum development, and international initiatives.

Candler has always been deeply committed to assisting students with generous financial aid, but in light of the current economic climate, we have deepened our commitment to significant student support in two very important ways. This academic year, 80 percent of eligible students received scholarships or grants, with an average award covering 79% percent of tuition. Through these awards, more than \$2.5 million was provided to 196 United Methodist students. In addition, we created "Leadership Candler," an all-expenses-paid discernment experience that draws together distinguished prospective MDiv students from across the country and the world to explore the richness of life and study at Candler.

As a part of its contribution to the new building, Emory University provided Candler with a major grant for

the purchase of new artwork. As a result, Candler is now home to the world's largest collection of original works by John August Swanson. Comprising both serigraphs and paintings, the collection focuses on biblical narratives and reflects the storytelling traditions of Swanson's Mexican-Swedish heritage as well as the influence of mosaics and stained glass from the Byzantine and medieval eras.

Candler's student body truly reflects the denominational emphasis on the importance of attracting younger and more diverse people. Our enrollment stands at 493, with 401 seeking the Master of Divinity, 50 the Master of Theological Studies, 18 the Master of Theology, 13 the Doctor of Theology, and 11 enrolled as Special, Non-Degree students. Eighty-three percent are enrolled full-time. The total student population is 24% US ethnic minority, 12% international, and 51% women. More than 50 denominations are represented, with 52% of MDiv students being United Methodist from 40 Annual Conferences, including Bulgaria, East Angola, Mozambique, and Korea. Other Methodist denominations include African Methodist Episcopal, African Methodist Episcopal Zion, Christian Methodist Episcopal, Church of the Nazarene, Free Methodist, Wesleyan Methodist, and the Methodist Church of Korea. The average age of our students is 32, with 56% under thirty. The median age of our MDiv students is 27.

Candler is deeply committed to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the development of persons for Christian ministry, especially in the United Methodist Church. We are grateful for your support of Candler through the Methodist Education Fund, visits, prayers, nurture of our students, and direct donor support. Come and see us! 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HUSTON-TILLOTSON UNIVERSITY MISSION

Huston-Tillotson University helps the Central Texas Conference Report achieve its mission and vision through our own mission to provide the University's diverse student body with an exemplary education that is grounded in the liberal arts and sciences, balanced with professional development, and directed to public service and leadership.

The University prepares students with the integrity and civility to thrive in a diverse society, fosters spiritual development, preserves and promotes interest in the accomplishments and experiences of the University's historic constituents and evolving populations, and creates and sustains supportive relationships that advance the Huston-Tillotson University community. We achieve our mission through the diversity of our student body, the global perspective of our educational programs, and the defined opportunities for spiritual growth and civic engagement.

UNIVERSITY PROFILE

Enrollment

Huston-Tillotson University reached a twenty-seven year enrollment high with 785 students enrolling in the fall of 2008. Segmentation of our student population by gender reveals an important factor regarding male enrollment. Our overall student population consisted of 393 males (50%) and 392 females



(50%); this is significant because many universities report decreases in male student enrollment, while our student population experienced an increase in male student enrollment. We are also very proud of the fact that the number of first-time, first year freshmen male students exceeded the number of their female counterparts for the second consecutive year during the fall 2008 semester. The first-year, first-time freshmen population consisted of 98 males (55%) and 81 females (45%).

The racial/ethnic composition of our student population is as follows: Hispanic – 11%; White, non-Hispanic – 8%; Asian/Pacific Islander – <1%; Nonresident Alien – 3%; Unreported – 1%; and Black, non-Hispanic – 77%.

Faculty

In the fall of 2008, the University employed 38 full-time faculty members. The race/ethnic composition of the faculty is as follows: Hispanic – 3%; White, non-Hispanic – 29%; Asian/Pacific Islander – 6%; Black, non-Hispanic – 52%; International or other – 13%. Twenty-seven members of our faculty (71%) have the terminal degree in their teaching field.

PRESIDENTIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL ADVANCEMENT ACTIVITIES

For the past two consecutive fall semesters, the number of incoming freshmen males has exceeded the number of incoming freshmen females. Yet, the six-year graduation rate for females exceeds that of their male counterparts. In response, the HT President's Male Initiative on Learning and Excellence (President's MILE) was founded during the fall 2008 semester as a means of insuring student success in college as well as persistence to graduation. The President's MILE is a deliberate set of experiences grounded in best practices in student retention, student success, and student engagement. Membership is open to any students enrolled at HT, and students must complete an application and write an essay to join. The main goals of the program to (1) inspire academic confidence, (2) motivate a cadre of men to promote student learning and development collaboratively, and (3) develop principled leaders characterized by human understanding, citizenship, and social change.

The Office of Institutional Advancement has been active with grant development activity in order to meet campus needs. During the 2008-2009 academic year, the University received a second one-million dollar gift from alum Mr. Anthony Viaer. Mr. Viaer continued his philanthropy efforts by awarding renewable four-year scholarships to three students commencing with the fall 2008 academic year. Furthermore, HT was awarded a UNCF Capacity Building Grant for \$600,000 over a three-year period. This grant is currently in its 3rd year.

Additionally, a new HT Alumni and Friends website was launched in December 2008. The response has been tremendous, and the site is receiving a large number of hits per day from around the world. As a result of the website, online contributions are increasing.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

College of Arts and Sciences (CAS)

Student Development

The College of Arts and Sciences continues to strengthen the academic preparation of its students through the continued support of recently formed student clubs, which include the HT Film Society, the History Club, and a campus chapter of the Austin Poetry Society. The clubs continue to receive advisement and support from faculty members in the **Department of Humanities and Fine Arts**.

HT students are also provided the opportunity internships with the United States Immigration and Customs Enforcement. The internship program offers first-hand experience and introduces upper level Criminal Justice majors (within the **Department of Social and Behavioral Sciences**) to the benefits

and challenges of a federal law enforcement career. The internship program is an example of a number of initiatives with law enforcement agencies designed to ensure job readiness for HT graduates.

During the spring 2008 semester, a chapter of the National Science Teachers Association was started at HT. HT is the 2nd HBCU in the nation and the only HBCU in Texas to have such a chapter. The chapter is housed within the **Department of Teacher Education and Kinesiology**.

Student Research Initiatives

Departments in the College of Arts and Sciences are continuing to focus on activities that aid student learning through inquiry and discovery. As an outcome, students presented their research, via poster and platform presentations, during the Third Annual Research Day Symposium, which was held on April 22, 2008. The event was sponsored by the College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Business and Technology.

Additionally, HT students are continually encouraged to pursue Foreign Service careers in the US Department of State, US AID, Peace Corps and through other agencies.

Community Involvement

HT, in partnership with Kealing Middle School in Austin, Texas, continues to develop and recruit student mentors for the "My Brothers' & Sisters' Keeper," a mentoring program geared toward young minority students. The program provides mentoring, academic enrichment, and wellness support to participating middle school students in East Austin. Forty middle school boys and girls participate in the 3-year program, sponsored by a grant to HT from the Office of Minority Health.

Huston-Tillotson University also received a \$238,000 grant from the United States Department of Education for Math and Science Initiatives. A resulting component of the initiatives includes the HT Saturday STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Academy, which commenced during the spring 2009 semester. The program currently enrolls Austin area high school students in forensic science and math instruction as well as provides opportunities to engage in engineering activities in robotics and rocketry. The instructional classes meet for three hour sessions on two weekends per month from January 17th through May 16th, 2009. Students will also have opportunities to hear from guest speakers in the science fields and participate in science-related field trips.

Faculty Development

The 2008-2009 academic year marked the second year for HT's Minority Science and Engineering Improvement Program (MSEIP), which is funded by the U.S. Department of Education. Faculty in Math and Science completed a two day MATLAB training course designed to prepare them to develop computer applications that are incorporated into the syllabi of first year biology courses. The MSEIP project allows HT to keep abreast of newer approaches to biological curricular developments; the project will continue for one more year.

HT faculty members continue to be actively involved in faculty development programs.

HT faculty members are provided the opportunity to attend the New York University Faculty Development summer and winter workshops. Faculty members also continue to make significant strides in grant writing.

Selected Faculty Research

[The Secret Trust of Aspasia Cruvellier Mirault: the Life and Trials of a Free Woman of Color in Antebellum Georgia](#) is the title of HT History professor, Dr. Janice Sumler-Edmond, latest book. The intriguing biography is a story that informs the reader's understanding of the antebellum South as this widowed matriarch navigates social, economic, and political complexities to create a legacy for her family. The book is published by the University of Arkansas Press.

HT Philosophy professor, Dr. James Kraft, recently co-edited Religious Tolerance through Humility: Thinking with Philip Quinn, along with David Basinger of Roberts Wesleyan College. The book outlines the serious consideration of religious diversity that tends to reveal the weakness of support many have for their religious commitments and that the humility produced tends to result in religious tolerance. The book is published by Ashgate Publishing.

School of Business and Technology (SBT)

Student Development

Since its inception in 2005, the School of Business and Technology has encouraged its students to pursue graduate and professional studies in order to experience myriad benefits of increased educational attainment. In the summer of 2008, three SBT graduates received their Masters of Accountancy degrees from Alabama A&M University. Eight SBT graduates are currently pursuing graduate degrees at universities stateside and abroad.

Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence

For the third year in a row, HT was again awarded a Fulbright Language Teacher Assistant (FLTA) for academic year 2008-2009. Ms. Yuan Boqi, the FLTA from China, will help to jumpstart HT's Chinese language program. In addition to her teaching duties, Ms. Yuan will serve as a representative of HT at Asian events and activities in the local community.

Engaging Students in Computer Science

Under the direction of Dr. Hershall Shelley, Chair of the Department of Computer Science, a group of computer science majors have embarked on a project of refurbishing old university computers. These computers have been deemed obsolete by faculty and staff and are no longer being used. The students clean the computers then reimage them with a current operating system making them capable of word processing and internet access. The refurbished computers are then sold to students for \$25. Monies collected are then donated to the Computer Science Club to support various club activities.

Recruitment Initiative

The SBT is committed to increasing its enrollment of high achieving students. Last year, it accomplished this task by helping to enroll at least 50 new students at HT with 3.0 GPA or higher. A significant number of these new students were accepted into the W.E.B. DuBois Honors Program with a 3.5 GPA or higher. The success of this recruitment initiative is attributable to direct and targeted work, including making personal contacts, visiting schools, and meeting students and parents to discuss their needs.

Student Services

Religious Life and Campus Ministry

The Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry has been actively assisting the Division of Student Affairs meet its mission by continuing to provide an ecumenical ministry that acknowledges the spiritual needs of all students at the university. University Chapel Hour, held each Thursday, continues to include speakers who are clergy members from diverse backgrounds. HT students also participate in a number of spiritual development programming geared towards students, which include spiritual retreats, weekly Sister Connection (Women's Bible Study) and weekly Brothers of Fellowship (Men's Bible Study) meetings.

Furthermore, in an effort to encourage compassionate student leadership, the APPEALS program commenced at HT during the fall 2008 semester. The APPEALS program is a leadership development module based on transformational and servant leadership. The program seeks through a weekend intensive training to help students understand that in order to impact others (peers) and/or their environment that they perhaps will need to make some personal changes and that like wise they

need to have the kind of 'transforming' visions/goals that will inspire others to join in allowing them to be successful. Then they are required to go into a middle or high school in east Austin and teach these same principles to some of those students who may be 'at risk'. Nine students were involved in the APPEALS program during the first semester, eight during the second semester, and 15 new students were trained during December 2008.

Additionally, the Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry hosted the 2nd Bishop Ernest T. Dixon Lecture on January 28th, 2009, which also launched HT's Black History Month celebrations. The speaker for the 2nd Bishop Ernest T. Dixon Lecture was Rev. Marilyn E. Thornton, pastor at Emery United Methodist Church in Murfreesboro, TN and lead editor of African American Resources at the United Methodist Publishing House in Nashville. In her editorial capacity, Rev. Thornton provides the leadership for developing biblically sound resources that use African American heritage as a springboard, including Vacation Bible School program, adult Bible studies, and children's literature. The purpose of the lecture was to invite HT and the local community to think critically in regards to the Bible and theology.

Campus Life

During the 2008-2009 academic year, the Office of Campus Life has focused on deepening students' understanding of the relationship between curricular and co-curricular experiences by connecting student programming to relevant areas within the syllabi of various academic courses. Such programs included the annual Leadership Training Seminar, which focused on ethical leadership practices for all students; various social activities; and programs highlighting the historic campaign and election of President Barack Obama. Campus Life also held four programs in honor of Hispanic Heritage Month, which included a spoken-word program with internationally renowned poet Gabriella Garcia-Medina on campus. Additionally, close to 70 students, faculty, and staff came together for the Salsa Magic program, which brought professional dancers to campus to teach participants the art of Latin dance.

Counseling and Consultation Center (CCC)

The Counseling and Consultation Center (formerly Campus Support Programs) continues to help the Division of Student Affairs meet its mission by helping students with their personal concerns so that they can meet the daily challenges of student life. Staffed by an experienced psychotherapist, the center is open daily for students in need of assistance. Students are encouraged to make an appointment, but walk-ins are welcome when there is availability.

Additionally, through partnership with the Department of Psychology, the CCC has engaged in the Peer Stress Reduction Counseling and Education Project, which commenced in early Spring 2008 with a 4-hour training to instruct peer educators on the facilitation of stress management support groups. Students were provided training on empirically supported stress management techniques which can be effectively administered to the larger student population. Peer Stress Reduction Counseling and Education Support Groups were held on April 3 and 10th 2008. In May 2008, a Stress Busters Health Fair where Stress Management techniques were taught reflected the culmination of a semester long effort to address stressors that negatively impact student's academic and emotional wellbeing.

Career and Graduate Development Center

The Career and Graduate Development Center continues to develop and update the following services and resources available to HT students, alumni and employers.

- In March of 2008, the C&GDC facilitated a meeting with the HT academic Deans, over 10 Deans from the Council of Historically Black Graduate Schools and HT junior and senior students.
- In March and April of 2008 the C&GDC held four Senior Boot Camps for the second year in a row to better prepare graduating students for the world of work.
- Throughout the spring semester, the C&GDC provided students, alumni and international students' access to multiple online career fairs increasing opportunities for employment. The addition of the

International Student Career eFair allowed the C&GDC to better serve a population that is very hard to help based on federal, state and other rules and regulations that inhibit and discourage the hiring of International students.

- The C&GDC provided multiple opportunities for students to receive free graduate and professional school preparation assessments during the spring of 2008. This included a scholarship provided to one HT student for a free LSAT prep course and scholarship opportunities for fee waivers for assessment testing.
- The April 2008 Career Fair was the largest career fair held at HT with over 60 employers. This included a separate Teacher Job Fair with 13 attending school districts.
- Summer and fall 2008 saw the near completion of the newly renovated Career and Graduate Development Center. This Center includes an on-campus recruiting office with three professional computer based work stations to provide a professional environment for on-campus interviews to both the student and the employer. The Career Library and Laboratory include three computerized student work stations, one of which was designed specifically for students with disabilities wheelchair access. This Center was envisioned in the 2000-2010 Strategic Plan and now is a reality. All furnishings and computers were paid for through income received from multiple career events held by the C&GDC.
- A new computerized password protected Library software called the Vault Library System has been leased for students to use not only from this library but also on the World Wide Web.
- The C&GDC Fall 2008 Career Expo and Spring 2009 Internship Fair was held to assist students with the HT mission of preparing students for a global economy. Over 40 employers attended. Although the economy was already on a downturn at this time, the employer turnout held steady from the number that attended in the fall 2007.
- The C&GDC Fall 2008 Graduate and Professional School Fair was held in October 2008 to allow students to explore information, scholarships, and fellowships related to attending graduate and professional schools upon matriculation from HT. Recruiters from 37 graduate and professional schools which was an increase from the 25 that attended in fall 2007.

PASS Program

The Division of Student Affairs continues to develop the Pathways to Academic Socialization and Success (PASS) program. The goals of the Huston-Tillotson (HT) Pathways to Academic Socialization and Success (PASS) program are to ensure the design and implementation of an effective intervention system to develop first generation college students' academic and social skills in order to increase the rate of persistence and graduation. The PASS program consists of two major activities: a one-week summer pre-collegiate orientation program and a living-learning community during the fall and spring semesters. The PASS Program was recently awarded a \$10,000 grant by Citi Foundation, and additional proposals are in progress for additional funding.

Student Health Services

The HT Health Connection e-health community empowerment program continues to collaborate with other community based organizations to empower our campus and underserved populations in our community with health information from the National Library of Medicine. The program objective is to provide participants with the basic background knowledge and information about racial disparities in health. Participants are trained to conduct informational sessions that enhance consumer awareness. Consumers are informed about the following through online health access: HIV/AIDS, Heart Disease, Cancer, Mental Health and Diabetes. Informed consumers will benefit by having a better quality of life.

Athletics

Huston-Tillotson University Athletics continues to meet its mission by providing opportunities for competition in intercollegiate athletics while ensuring an atmosphere that emphasizes academic and athletic excellence. We continually strive to ensure that all of our student-athletes are "Champions of Character" and model the values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity, Sportsmanship, and Servant

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Leadership. The Athletic Department is committed to the principle that participation in athletics is integral to the total educational process, as well as to the personal growth of each student-athlete. HT is a member of the NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) and the Red River Athletic Conference (RRAC).

The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is composed of 13 intercollegiate sports (men's and women's indoor and outdoor track, women's cross country, women's volleyball, baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer, and men's and women's golf – the last three sports were launched within the last two years.) Intercollegiate Athletics currently serves 216 student-athletes, approximately 28% of the student body. HT student athletes continue to excel both inside and outside of the classroom. During the 2007-2008 season, Men's soccer, led by Coach Lassiter, had the RRAC Offensive and Defensive Players of the Year. In the fall of 2008 semester, the cumulative GPA of student athletes was 2.85.

Saint Paul School of Theology is a seminary of the United Methodist Church that educates leaders to make disciples for Jesus Christ, renew the Church, and transform the world. We are one institution with two campuses, as our campus at Oklahoma City University welcomed its first class in fall 2008.

This academic year, 267 students from 17 states and 5 continents were enrolled in degree programs at Saint Paul School of Theology. Twenty-two Master of Divinity students enrolled at the Saint Paul campus at Oklahoma City University. The Course of Study School at Saint Paul served 277 students from 23 annual conferences.

The seminary gathered in September to celebrate its 50th Opening Convocation in Kansas City. One week later Bishop Robert Hayes, President Tom McDaniel, and President Myron McCoy signed a unity document during the inaugural Opening Convocation ceremony for the Oklahoma City University campus of Saint Paul School of Theology at Oklahoma City University. Dr. Elaine Robinson was installed in April as Academic Dean for the SPST at OCU campus.

It was the fifth year for the Saint Paul youTheology program. Twenty high school youth from the Midwest were selected to form a group that explored their faith through worship, service, study, travel, and a mentoring relationship. The program culminated with a Pan Methodist Pilgrimage in historic East Coast locations fundamental to the roots of Methodism.

The Saint Paul Institute began a weekend program to enrich the learnings of laity in the area. Each Laity School of Theology Saturday Session was taught by Saint Paul faculty and presented in an accessible manner for persons with a variety of educational backgrounds. Topics included worship, Bible, ethics, church history, and theology. In fall 2009, the Laity School will begin to offer sessions in Oklahoma City.

Saint Paul announced two new Doctor of Ministry degree tracks in Children and Poverty (2010) and Global Health and Wholeness (2011). Both tracks relate directly to the United Methodist Council of Bishops initiatives (the "Four Foci") for the Church.

Dr. Israel Kumudzandu, Assistant Professor of New Testament Studies and Dr. Patricia Beattie Jung, Professor of Christian Ethics and the Oubri A. Poppele Professor of Health and Welfare Ministries, were new faculty hires, along with Dr. Elaine Robinson at our Oklahoma City University campus. She

is the Academic Dean and Associate Professor of United Methodist Studies and Theology.

The seminary received \$248,771 grant from the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry of the United Methodist Church for technology and focused recruitment activities targeting Native Americans, individuals of various ethnic groups and young adults.

The Kansas City campus will celebrate its 50th Anniversary September 28-29, 2009. The festivities will be a time to celebrate the seminary's tradition and history, reunite graduates and friends of the seminary, look toward the seminary's future, and share the seminary's story with the larger Kansas City Community.

Like all educational institutions Saint Paul finds itself navigating through the economic recession, making the necessary adjustments but continuing to plan for a strong future.

The mission of Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University is to prepare women and men for faithful leadership in Christian ministry. As an official school of theology within The United Methodist Church, it is part of our goal to continue to prepare leaders for ministry in the church by focusing on four key areas – formation, faculty, finances, and facilities.

One essential step in forming faithful leadership for the church of Jesus Christ is to partner with the annual conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction and beyond to identify those called to ministry, both the ordained and the lay ministry. One outstanding expression of this partnership is Exploration 2009, meeting in Dallas in November of this year. Sponsored by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Exploration is a three-day event for committed youth and young adults (high school seniors through age 24) to hear, discern, and respond to God's call to ministry and to explore their gifts for ordained ministry as deacon or elder in The United Methodist Church. Perkins is pleased to be involved in planning as well as assisting to host that fall gathering. Our own Tracy Anne Allred, director of Student Services, is chair of the Exploration 2009 Design Team, and Herbert Coleman, director of Recruitment is a member of that team as well. The work of forming our youth and young adults in faith and vocation is a high calling all its own, and Perkins is honored to share that task with the clergy and laity of the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Formation for faithful leadership not only requires attention to identifying those called to the ministries of deacons and elders, along with other pastoral ministries, but to preparing the next generation of Biblical scholars, theologians, ethicists, church historians, and practical theologians, such as teachers of preaching and pastoral care. Perkins has taken steps to increase financial and faculty support for its Graduate Program in Religious Studies, and has partnered with other schools of theology to support the Hispanic Theological Initiative to fund Latino and Latina students, both at the Ph.D. and master's level.

Regarding the Perkins faculty, graduates tell us that the quality and diversity of our 35-plus member faculty is one of the most valuable assets which students encounter here at Perkins. Every time we conduct a search for a new faculty member, our goal is to enhance the quality of teaching and research for the good of the church and its mission. This year we welcomed assistant professor of Old Testament Dr. Susanne Scholz to the Perkins faculty. We appointed Dr. Richard D. Nelson, W.J.A. Power Professor of Biblical Hebrew and Old Testament Interpretation, to the office of Associate Dean for Academic Affairs. We are fortunate to have Dr. David Maldonado, Jr. among us for his second tenure at Perkins; he serves as the director of the newly established Center for the Study of Latino/a Christianity and Religions at Perkins.

In January, Dr. Joerg Rieger was appointed by the Provost of Southern Methodist University to the newly endowed Wendland-Cook Professorship in Constructive Theology. We were also pleased to welcome Rev. Susan Buchanan as director of Recruitment and Student Services for the Houston-Galveston Extension Program. And we have named as associate director of Public Affairs and adjunct professor of Preaching, Dr. Paul Escamilla, who brings both pastoral and administrative experience to his work at Perkins. We said farewell to Dr. Edwin E. Sylvest, Jr., who retired as Professor *Emeritus* of Church History after 38 years at Perkins. On a personal note, last year SMU President R. Gerald Turner appointed me to the position of Director of Church Relations for the Office of the President. Additionally, I was elected by the General Conference in May 2008 to a position on the Judicial Council, a responsibility I feel deeply privileged to hold.

Rev. Todd Rasberry, Director of Development, continues working to raise funds necessary for the scholarship support of our students and the endowment of our programs. Only 50 percent of our needed revenue is generated by tuition. The other half is derived from our endowment earnings and support from congregations across the connection through the United Methodist Ministerial Education Fund.

On September 11 of this year, Perkins will dedicate three buildings for its work, including the new LEED Certified Elizabeth Perkins Prothro Hall and the renovated Kirby and Selecman Halls. (LEED certification is the recognized standard for measuring building sustainability in terms of environmental responsibility.) We are pleased that one of the inaugural public events in our new Prothro Hall will be the Hispanic Summer Program. Scheduled for mid-June, the program will bring together an international group of students and scholars for theological study and discourse across their disciplines within a Hispanic context. Dr. James T. Laney, the former President of Emory University and former U.S. Ambassador to South Korea, once said that "every new building is a declaration." At Perkins, these new and renewed buildings are our declaration that God is leading us into the new millennium with boldness and vision for leading the wider church toward its mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY
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As SMU approaches the centennial of its founding in 1911 by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and its opening in 1915, the University continues to rise in national prominence. Some highlights of the past year follow:

- SMU's total fall 2008 enrollment was 10,965, including 6,240 undergraduates, 3,521 graduate students and 1,204 professional (theology and law) students. Minority students make up 20.6 percent of the student body. Applications for the first-year class have more than doubled in just eight years, and the average SAT score of the first-year class has risen 97 points in the past 10 years. International student enrollment is at an all-time high, with 958 students from 97 countries.
- In September 2008 SMU launched "SMU Unbridled: The Second Century Campaign," the largest fund-raising effort in SMU history, with a goal of \$750 million. Additional goals are 25 percent alumni participation each year and 50 percent alumni participation during the campaign years. Gifts during the two-year quiet phase provided \$317 million for uses including a newly endowed school (the Annette Caldwell Simmons School of Education and Human Development); an endowed academic department (the Roy M. Huffington Department of Earth Sciences); five new academic institutes, centers and initiatives (such as the Embrey Human Rights Education Pilot

Program); nine endowed faculty positions; 175 endowed scholarships; and seven new or renovated facilities.

- At its quadrennial meeting in July, the South Central Jurisdiction elected a slate of academic, business, civic and church leaders to the SMU Board of Trustees. New church leaders elected to four-year terms are Bishop Earl Bledsoe, Dallas Area; and the Rev. Sheron Patterson, Highland Hills United Methodist Church, Dallas. Those re-elected to an additional term include the Rev. Kirbyjon Caldwell, Windsor Village United Methodist Church, Houston; the Rev. W. Mark Craig, Highland Park United Methodist Church, Dallas; Bishop Scott J. Jones, Kansas Area; and Bishop Ann B. Sherer, Nebraska Area.
- A national search is currently in progress for a successor to SMU Chaplain Will Finnin, who retired in December. The search committee, headed by SMU Vice President for Student Affairs Lori White, hopes to name a chaplain this spring.
- SMU broke ground in May for a new Caruth Hall for the School of Engineering; in October the school was named in honor of Dallas leader Bobby B. Lyle.
- A new low-cost Center for Family Counseling opened in October at SMU-in-Legacy, the University's campus in Plano, and in central Dallas.
- SMU-in-Taos broke ground in July for facilities and improvements that will allow fall semester classes to be added to the summer programs offered since 1973.
- In February 2008 the George W. Bush Foundation announced that SMU had been chosen as the site of the George W. Bush Presidential Center, which will be a rich source of research materials for scholars and others.

News of Perkins School of Theology:

- Construction of the new Elizabeth Perkins Prothro Hall and renovation of Kirby Hall and Selecman Hall are scheduled for completion in June 2009.
- Barbara Cook Wendland and Erroll Wendland established the Wendland-Cook Professorship in Constructive Theology at Perkins.
- Perkins Dean William B. Lawrence was elected to the nine-member Judicial Council of The United Methodist Church during the quadrennial meeting of the General Conference.
- David Maldonado Jr. received the 2009 Perkins Distinguished Alumnus/a Award. He is current director of Perkins' Center for Latino/a Christianity and Religions.
- As part of Perkins' Global Theological Education Program, students took cross-cultural immersion courses taught by Perkins faculty and others on-site in South Africa, the Palestinian Territories, Israel and Mexico. The two-week courses include interaction with local pastors, laypeople and theology students.

News of the Wesley Foundation:

- Under the leadership of the Rev. Andy Roberts, the SMU Wesley Foundation continues its active campus ministry. New programs include "The Well," a weekly worship service in Perkins Chapel featuring music, teaching, prayer and Holy Communion; and weekly sessions of fellowship, Bible study and prayer for first-year students. SMU Wesley sent a student team to New Orleans in May 2008 to assist with continued disaster relief.

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- SMU treasures its Methodist heritage and maintains a particularly close relationship with Highland Park United Methodist Church and its senior minister, the Rev. Mark Craig. I enjoy serving as guest preacher at that church each fall. We ask your continued prayers and support as SMU moves forward in the coming year.

SOUTHWESTERN UNIVERSITY
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Founded by Methodist leaders as Texas's first institution of higher learning, Southwestern University continues to align its activities with the vision and mission of the Conferences of The United Methodist Church.

As just one example of this, we have seen a growing interest in social justice on campus the past year. This has been led by a new student organization that is trying to promote social justice by means of theatre. To date, this group has developed plays to address racism, disabilities, and the environment.

Our academic curriculum encourages students to think about social justice issues as well. After studying social justice issues in some of his education classes at Southwestern, senior education major Ted Wilson applied and was accepted to be one of 15 students nationwide who served as summer missionary interns with the United Methodist Church's General Board of Global Ministries in 2008. Wilson was assigned to work at the headquarters of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) in Baldwin, La., where he helped with national and global relief efforts. After graduation, Wilson plans to continue working with the United Methodist Church and contributing to social justice issues, specifically those dealing with children and the homeless.

Enrollment – Fall 2008

Wilson is one of 1,270 students enrolled at Southwestern in Fall 2008 – down slightly from 1,294 in Fall 2007. The good news is that the highest percentage ever of our incoming class was minority students – nearly 26 percent. We also enrolled twice as many out-of-state students as we did the previous year.

In October 2008 we launched a new Web site that we hope will be more appealing to prospective students. In 2008, we also signed an agreement with Lon Morris College that will make it easier for some of their students to transfer to Southwestern.

Fall 2008 marked the 10th anniversary of our First-Year Seminar program. To provide transfer students with the same experience, we offered a new Advanced Entry Seminar for our transfer students last fall. All indications are that the program was very well received.

In Fall 2008 all students enrolled at Southwestern began following a new Honor Code pledge that was developed by a committee composed of faculty, students, and staff. The new pledge states: "I have acted with honesty and integrity in producing this work and am unaware of anyone who has not."

New Faculty

We welcomed five new tenure-track faculty members for the 2008-09 academic year: David Asbury, Assistant Professor of Music; Barbara Anthony, Assistant Professor of Computer Science; Carina Evans, Instructor of English; Shannon Mariotti, Assistant Professor of Political Science; and Maria de los Angeles Rodriguez Cadena, Assistant Professor of Spanish. Dirk Early, a professor of economics, also assumed the new position of associate dean of the Brown College of Arts and Sciences for a three-year term.

Paideia®

We have a record number of students participating in our Paideia program this academic year – approximately 240. These students continue to do amazing projects that help them make connections between what they are learning in the classroom and the world around them. For example, in summer 2008, several Paideia students went to Honduras to help set up computers they had refurbished during the school year.

Student Life

In fall 2008, we initiated a new program for sophomores called “Sophomore Spotlight.” This program, which includes a combination of educational and social experiences, was developed by a task force that included representatives from Student Life, Residence Life, the Center for Academic Success, Athletics, and Career Services. As one of its contributions to the program, Career Services developed a new “Pirate Apprentice” program, in which they matched sophomores with alumni who are now working in fields in which they are interested. Forty sophomores took advantage of the program and spent a day with alumni over Winter Break in January. The program coincides with the fact that 2008-09 is the first year we are requiring all our sophomores to live on campus. This new program is designed to make that experience a positive one and help improve retention of sophomores.

In 2008, Southwestern also announced that it would become the first college or university in Texas to offer men’s lacrosse as a varsity sport. A new coach, Joe Ernst, was hired in December 2008 to begin recruiting players for the 2009-2010 season.

Construction Projects

The campus has been buzzing with construction since May 2008. That month, we broke ground on our new Wilhelmina Cullen Admission Center, which will be our first LEED-certified building on campus. This building will be dedicated during Parents Weekend in February 2009.

Last summer we also began construction on the Charles and Elizabeth Prothro Center for Lifelong Learning, which will consolidate many student services into a single building, as well as provide a home for the Paideia® program. This building is expected to be completed around the end of 2009.

Over the summer we also renovated two of our oldest residence halls on campus – Herman Brown Residence Hall and Moody-Shearn Residence Hall. The renovation of Hermann Brown Residence Hall was funded by a \$980,000 gift from The Brown Foundation of Houston.

In August 2008, our new Dorothy Manning Lord Residential Center was named a runner-up in *University Business* magazine’s search for “Dorms of Distinction.”

Community Engagement

Southwestern has now been named to the President’s Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll every year since the program was started in 2006.

In 2007-08, Southwestern students contributed 15,602 community service hours to nearly 80 agencies.

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In summer 2008, 10 Southwestern students worked with several different agencies in the Central Texas area that serve women who are victims of domestic violence. This program was made possible by a \$66,000 grant from Verizon.

Even during the busy holiday season, our students make time to help others. For example, this past December:

- Members of the Sigma Phi Lambda Christian sorority "adopted" 215 children for the Salvation Army's Angel Tree project. Students were recruited to shop for each of the children when they went home for Thanksgiving.
- Members of Circle K International – a new student organization on campus this year – collected toys, food, and clothing to deliver to families in the state of Matehuala, Mexico, over Christmas break.
- Members of the Southwestern swim teams helped Handcrafts Unlimited, a store on the downtown Georgetown square that sells arts and crafts made by senior citizens to help supplement their income, with their annual "Kids Shopping Days" event where children are invited to come shop at the store without their parents to buy gifts for teachers, family members, and others.
- Rather than giving gifts to each other, members of the Southwestern tennis teams brought money and gifts for local charities to their team party. Their donations went to The Caring Place in Georgetown and to the Bike for Kids program sponsored by MIX 94.7 radio station in Austin.
- Members of the women's basketball team served lunch to senior citizens at the Round Rock Senior Citizens Center.

Southwestern students and faculty members also serve the community through various research projects. We currently have two faculty members and three students working on a study about the effectiveness of smoking cessation programs for the Williamson County and Cities Healthcare District (WCCHD).

Faculty Achievements

Southwestern University faculty members continue to excel as teachers and scholars. In the summer of 2008, Southwestern Kinesiology Professor Scott MacLean spent a week working with the U.S. Olympic swim team at their training camp at Stanford University just before they left for Beijing. Along with colleagues from the United States Olympic Training Center and Arizona State University, MacLean helped the Olympic swimmers improve their starting performance.

In Fall 2008, Suzanne Buchele, an associate professor of computer science, returned to Southwestern after two years of teaching students in the West African country of Ghana. Buchele received a Fulbright award to teach at Ashesi University College, a private liberal arts college in Ghana's capital city of Accra.

In November 2008, seven Southwestern faculty members received awards from the Sam Taylor Fellowship Fund, sponsored by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, which provides monetary awards for the continuing education and development of full-time faculty members of United Methodist colleges and universities across the nation. Most of Southwestern's award recipients plan to use their funds to complete book projects.

Biology Professor Romi Burks was selected as a BEN Scholar for 2008-2010. The BEN Scholar program is sponsored by the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) and is designed to help biological science educators across the country better engage their students through use of digital resources.

Chemistry Professor Lynn Guziec received a grant from the National Institutes of Health to fund research on a new technique that could rapidly predict the anti-cancer activity of new compounds. One of our art faculty members, Mary Visser, had several pieces selected for an art exhibition that is traveling around China in 2008-09 in conjunction with the Olympics.

Student Achievements

Southwestern students have won several recent honors as well. Two students who graduated from Southwestern in May 2008 were awarded Fulbright English Teaching Assistantships in Germany.

Our women's golf team placed third at the NCAA Division III National Championship in May 2008, topping its fourth place finish the previous year. The team also achieved the third highest GPA of any women's golf team in the country, including Divisions I and II.

In October 2008, a team of students from Southwestern won its division and placed second overall in the 2008 Business Ethics Match hosted by the Texas Independent College Fund (TICF). The competition provides students the opportunity to show their reasoning skills through debating current issues in business ethics.

Also in October 2008, a team of students from Southwestern has claimed the title of Top Undergraduate Institution in the region in the IBM-sponsored Association for Computing Machinery International Collegiate Programming Contest for the second year in a row. The contest is the world's most prestigious computer programming competition and requires students to use their programming skills to solve as many problems as possible within a five-hour period.

2008 Distinguished Alumnus

Southwestern's 2008 Distinguished Alumna/Alumnus Award was presented to Dr. William Engvall, a respected family medicine practitioner and anesthesiologist from Georgetown. Dr. Engvall earned his medical degree from The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston, and then proceeded to hold appointments with the United States Public Health Service, the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas, Baylor University Medical Center in Dallas, Scott & White Hospital in Temple, and Texas A&M University College of Medicine.

Thinking Ahead Campaign

As of December 31, 2008, Southwestern's "Thinking Ahead" comprehensive campaign had reached \$89,403,506 to support students, faculty, diversity enrichment, and the living-learning environment on campus. In October 2008, the University's Board of Trustees voted to extend the campaign through Dec. 31, 2010, due to uncertain economic conditions.

Endowment and the Economy

In summer 2008, the Board of Trustees voted to move most of the University's endowment under new management with the Commonfund. At the time of the switch, the endowment stood at nearly \$285 million, but that is expected to drop in 2008-2009 due to declines in the stock market. In 2007-2008, the University had a balanced budget for the 31st consecutive year. Steps have been taken to reduce expenses for 2008-2009 due to anticipated declines in revenue.

Major Speakers

Southwestern continues to attract prominent speakers for its major lecture series. The 2008 Writer's Voice speaker was Azar Nafisi, who spoke very eloquently about the value of liberal arts education in today's world. The 2009 speaker will be Tobias Wolff, who will be on campus November 10, 2009. The Writer's Voice series is sponsored by Southwestern's A. Frank Smith, Jr. Library Center.

Our 2008 Shilling Lecture was delivered by former U.S. Senator Bill Bradley on April 21, 2008. Our 2009 Shilling Lecture was delivered on February 10 by Wangaari Maathai, the first African woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize for her work with the Green Belt Movement in Africa. Additionally, The American College and University Presidents Climate Commitment, which formally commits campuses to eliminate greenhouse gas emissions over time and educate students about climate neutrality, was signed during Dr. Maathai's visit to campus.

Symposia and Conferences

2009 will mark the 31st year for Southwestern's Brown Symposium. The Symposium was held Feb. 5-6 and is titled "Science and Religion: Conflict or Convergence?" Speakers included Dr. Andrew Newberg from the University of Pennsylvania, Professor Simon Conway Morris from the University of Cambridge, Professors Christopher Bader and Paul Froese from Baylor University, Professor Mary Evelyn Tucker from Yale University, and Professor David Sloan Wilson from SUNY Binghamton. Biology Professor Ben Pierce, who organized this symposium, hoped it would show people from both fields how they can benefit from each other's work.

CLOSING THOUGHTS

This year, Southwestern will begin developing a new strategic plan to replace The Strategic Plan for 2010, which has guided the University for the past nine years. Because of the volatile nature of our current economy, this new strategic plan will only cover a five-year period.

Despite the challenges of the current economic environment, I want to assure you that the academic environment at Southwestern will not suffer. Students who attend here will continue to receive the best liberal arts education in the Southwest. We appreciate all the support and guidance that you have given us in this endeavor.

“An overview of Lon Morris College – A Real College Experience”

Founded in 1854, Lon Morris College is the oldest existing two-year college in Texas. We have been serving young people in East Texas and across the world for over 155 years. We are the only two-year United Methodist College west of the Mississippi and have 136 years of affiliation with the United Methodist Church. We also hold the distinction of having held membership in the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools longer than any other two-year college in the state. As a two-year college owned by the Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, Lon Morris College strives to remain relatively small, offering a quality liberal arts education through personal attention, small classes (10 to 1 student teacher ration), a dedicated faculty, modern technology services, a diverse student body, and a variety of student services. While the traditional community college focuses on offering a quality education which is conveniently located and economical, Lon Morris College seeks to educate the whole person in an individualized and residential environment allowing the student to experience more of a “real” college feel and look therefore, better preparing the student for a transition to a four-year residential institution. Over 88% of our students live on campus. 15% of our student body is international representing countries such as Jamaica, Great Britain, Canada, Mexico, Congo, Russia, Korea, etc. 96% of our graduates continue their education at four-year institutions. We offer a “real” college experience in a two-year setting, perfect for students from rural areas that need time and a place to gain confidence before entering a four-year institution or the student from a major metropolitan area that is seeking individualized and personal attention. At Lon Morris College, students are not just a number, they are not just a name, they are not just a warm body, but instead, they are real people that deserve real attention. Lon Morris College is not a “destination” school; instead we are a “process” school. Our process helps young adults reach their ultimate destination school and life calling.

Vision:

Lon Morris College is on a journey to insure that all students, Methodist and Non-Methodist, in the state of Texas, across the nation, and around the world know the value of a small, personalized, residential, faith based education. We are comfortable with a student that doesn't choose the educational experience we offer, but we are not comfortable when a student doesn't even know the option exists. *Lon Morris College will become recognizably known for our faith based, international, and residential “real” college experience.*

Mission:

The Mission of Lon Morris College is to offer a quality liberal arts education within a Christian community that allows the whole person to develop and mature.

Key Drivers:

Operate like a business: The College focuses on six strategic business initiatives including a) administrative affairs, b) business affairs, c) academic affairs, d) development, e) student affairs, and f) athletics. Less than 2% of the operating budget now comes from church support. The school provides more that \$2.4 million in scholarships from its operating budget.

Compete like a real college: Historically we have viewed other community colleges as our competition. The college is focused on positioning itself more as a freshman and sophomore "real college" experience, and will explore opportunities to continually expand curriculum and programs. We have implemented new initiatives that focus on both recruitment and retention of students. LMC is designed to help students from both rural areas and suburban areas that are seeking admission into four-year institutions but need a place to prove and improve themselves to get ready for the four-year residential experience. We focus on students that need, desire, and deserve one on one attention. Lon Morris College has launched a radical advertising and marketing campaign to help "tell the story". The campaign includes television, direct mail, giving clubs, press releases and a 12 minute DVD.

Systematic fundraising: Private liberal arts schools must be systematic in their development activity. "Good old boy" fundraising cannot sustain the economic needs of the school. Therefore, the school is building a business approach to constantly seek out potential donors, foundations, and grant opportunities with unrelenting focus and drive. We have implemented new processes designed to increase the financial viability and credibility of Lon Morris College. In 2004 the college raised around \$500,000 in annual support. The new systematic approach generated an estimated \$2.4 million in support during the 2007-2008 fiscal year.

Core Beliefs:

Lon Morris College is in the process of "re-directing" itself to operate with more efficiency and intensity and is building upon the school's historical foundation. One of the biggest challenges facing the college is overall indebtedness. In the last 2 years the college has reduced its overall debt from over 10 million dollars to 6.3 million dollars plus any outstanding balance on a 1 million dollar revolving operating line of credit that is guaranteed by Texas Annual Conference. It is the goal of Lon Morris College to continue reducing institutional debt and to eventually operate the college with a formula of overall indebtedness being equal to, or less than, 15% of the annual operating budget. This reduction of debt has and will be accomplished through liquidation of assets, increased revenue, and development activity. The rich history of the school and the loyal alumni supporters coupled with the leadership model will allow Lon Morris College to provide an increasing number of student opportunities to showcase their academic potential. Though LMC will remain small by design, the power of the impact of a "real college" residential experience will be life changing for many students that might not otherwise have a chance to succeed in college. The college is focused on increasing our student population over the next 5 years to 600 students.

On behalf of the entire Lon Morris College team, (students, faculty, staff, alumni, and the Board of Trustees), let me express our deepest appreciation to the Central Texas Conference for your continued prayer and belief in the vision for Lon Morris College. We are proud to have been empowered to earn the institutional credibility that is crucial for the sustainability of our institution. Lon Morris College is committed to creating the national reputation, financial stability, residential, international, faith based, real college experience that our students deserve!

COMMISSION ON COMMUNICATIONS

Budgeted 2009: \$95,200 Requested 2010: \$81,200

Communications is one of the most critical areas of growth for our Conference and our denomination. In an ever-changing horizon of communication methods, the church must learn to use the methods, both current and future, as tools to *share the Gospel* and *make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world*. Just as missionaries are unable to share the Gospel if they don't speak the language of the mission field, we can't reach new generations if we don't share that message in a format and language that are common and understandable to those generations.

But our task is twofold. While exploring and utilizing new communications methods and tools, we must also maintain our own internal communication efforts (such as *E-Link*, the *Central Link* and the Conference and District Web sites) in order to keep members, clergy, churches and districts fully informed on issues concerning the denomination, Annual Conference and districts; as well as areas of spiritual development and growth. The first aspect of communication is both exploratory and mission oriented and is external in nature. The second is inward and deals with maintenance and dissemination of necessary information to operate and facilitate the work of the Annual Conference and local Churches.

We are achieving the second currently through the *E-Link* which provides weekly news briefs and resources to church, district and conference leaders, but it is also available without charge to anyone who wants to know what's going on conference wide. To be added to the e-list, contact susan@ctcumc.org. We also continue to publish the every-other-week newspaper (*Central Link*) that conveniently combines conference, denomination and spiritual-building resources to our readers.

We are in the process of overhauling the Conference Website to make it more user friendly and appealing. While exploring ways to share the Gospel, we are also exploring alternative forms of communication and meeting within the Conference that would help alleviate travel costs and time. As we have before, we will be partnering with the North Texas Annual Conference for the Igniting Ministries campaign.

COMMITTEE ON THE AGENDA

Today the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church gathers for the one hundred and forty-third time and the fortieth time as the New Central Texas Conference since the merger with a group of churches of the previous West Texas Conference. This year we come to renew our mission to make disciples of Jesus the Christ for the transformation of the world. This year we will focus our attention upon energizing and equipping the local churches of our conference so that they will be better able to fulfill their mission. It is our prayer and hope that this session of our Annual Conference will give each of us a renewed focus and enthusiasm for the mission and ministry of our churches. Together, we will accomplish great things in the name of our Lord Jesus the Christ.

We offer special thanks to Bishop Mike Lowry, Doyle Allen, Harvey Ozmer and all of their staff members for their dedication and hard work in preparing for this session of Annual Conference. Likewise, we are grateful to all boards, agencies, committees, commissions and task forces who have worked with great commitment to offer effective and life giving ministry in our churches, communities and around the world. And we offer special thanks to each local church for the significance of your ministries each day of the year. You are the heart and soul of our ministries.

The Agenda Committee recommends that the 2009 Per Diem Allowance granted each day in actual attendance at the conference for retired clergy, retired diaconal ministers, retired deaconesses, ministers' surviving spouses, pastors receiving total salary of or less than the minimum compensation of the conference, students appointed to attend school and ministers on disability leave be \$35 for those who reside in Tarrant County and \$70 for those who reside outside Tarrant County. (See Per Diem Form in back of the Preliminary Reports.)

Secondly, the Agenda Committee recommends that the budget line item for the expenses of annual conference 2010 be set at \$47,600.

The Agenda Committee continues to carefully monitor your evaluations of our Annual Conference sessions. We have an evaluation document for your use again this year. Please, please, locate it now and make notes as we move through our conference this year so that you will be prepared to offer us your very best observations. We do appreciate your help. We continue to make changes based upon your suggestions and observations.

The Agenda Committee was notified by the Waco Convention Center that their remodeling was delayed and that they will not be ready for us in 2010. With this information, the Agenda Committee voted to return to Fort Worth to the Will Rogers Coliseum in 2010. The Committee also agreed to meet in Waco for 2 consecutive years. So, the new schedule of locations for future meetings of Annual Conference is as follows: Tarrant County: 2010, 2013, 2015, 2017, 2019, and 2021; and, Waco: 2011, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, and 2020.

I express my gratitude to those who have given so much time and effort in serving on the Agenda Committee this year. Your leadership is greatly appreciated.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Budgeted 2009: \$12,000 Requested 2010: \$10,200

Report No. 1

The Central Texas Conference traces its roots to the establishment of the Northwest Texas Conference in 1866. Northwest Texas Conference held its inaugural session in Waxahachie under the guidance of newly-elected Bishop Enoch Mather Marvin. It stretched to the northwest borders of the state.

In 1910, when the Conference had gotten so large that it was unwieldy, it was divided into the present Central and Northwest Texas Conferences. Because of its location, the Northwest Texas Conference retained the original name, but because the Central Texas area had primacy it was given the archives.

Next year will mark the 100th anniversary of the creation of the Central Texas Conference and it is appropriate that this centennial be commemorated.

A committee is working to produce a book that will give the history of this remarkable Conference. It is planned for completion in time for a celebration next year. The cost is being underwritten by the Conference, but it is anticipated that sale of the book will cover the cost with money from the sale returned to the Conference.

Local churches are encouraged to maintain their own histories. Each local congregation should elect a Local Church Historian with the responsibility to collect, assimilate and display the church's heritage.

Those churches which publish their histories are to put copies in the Conference Archives, and they are encouraged to submit a copy to this Commission so it can be entered as a contender for the Kate Warnick Award. This award is given by the Texas United Methodist Historical Society for the winners in three categories: large church, medium-size church and small church. Last year's state

winner in the medium-size category was our own First UMC of Springtown.

The Discipline states that when a United Methodist Church closes all UM symbols, artifacts and cornerstones are to be removed and given to the Conference. A "Cornerstone Garden" has been provided on the campus of Texas Wesleyan University through its generosity. As churches close in the future, their cornerstones will be added to those from the past already displayed there.

A local church can obtain United Methodist Historical Marker if it is at least 100 years old, and it may get a Texas State Historical Marker if it is at least 50 years old. Information on the process can be obtained from Conference Archivist Carol Roszell at (817) 877-5222.

This Commission and its members are available to assist local churches and districts in training and implementing their historical work.

Report No. 2
ARCHIVIST REPORT

26 linear feet of records were delivered to the archives depository during this past year, a great deal of which were district and conference records. A great many additional contributions were made to the archives by supportive individuals. Scholar's, clergy, layperson's, author's, conference personnel, historian's, student's, and genealogist's depository usage has remained steady, many of them having been referred to the archives by other institutions and persons. Approximately 172 research requests have been received during the past year. I am part of a committee that is writing the history of the Central Texas Conference with the publication goal as the centennial of the current conference which is 2010. Archival/records management, local church historian training, and archives/records management consultation continue to be provided to local churches and at district training sessions. I attended the first ever GCAH Archivist Training event at the GCAH headquarters, Drew University in 2008. I have been elected to the General Commission on Archives and History and attended our first quadrennial meeting in Dayton, Ohio in September, 2008. I still serve as a member of the executive board of the Texas United Methodist Historical Society. I continue as a member of the Executive Board of the Historical Society of the United Methodist Church. Looking forward, I plan to begin building a web presence online for the archives depository. The photographic collection of the archives has been inventoried and noted in a database. The archives is participating in a digitization program with the University of North Texas to place digital images of a portion of our holdings online within their Portal to Texas History Project. I will continue the campaign encouraging each of our local churches to write their history as best they are able, a copy of which will be housed in the depository. Special emphasis will be placed on gathering information on the former West Texas Conference Central Jurisdiction churches. A second Archival Depository is being negotiated with Texas Wesleyan University to allow us to expand our holdings. As a reminder, the majority of the records housed at the archives are primary, non-published records, which reinforces the need for our churches to locate and protect their records. All closing churches and those that are merging into or with another church must send their records to the archives for protection and availability as mandated by the Standing Rules.

Models for Ministry**

Models for starting new churches continue to change. Models promoted by the Commission:

- 1) Parachute Drop – Sending a new church start pastor to an identified mission field with no sponsoring churches, no members, and no support other than CG& D.
- 2) Restart – Sending a new church start pastor to an older church with attendance of less than

10-15 but where the area is growing and a new model of church is needed to reach the identified mission field.

- 3) Shared Facilities – Sending a new church start pastor to start a new church in an existing, strong, healthy church to reach a new demographic.
- 4) Expansion Campus/Satellite – Helping a strong, healthy, existing church establish a second campus or satellite that has the possibility of becoming a stand alone church.
- 5) Churches Starting Churches or Mother/Daughter – A strong, healthy, existing church offers to sponsor a new church start with staff, members and money.
- 6) Adoption – A strong, healthy existing church offers to adopt a smaller, nearby existing church and establishes new ministries, a new vision to reach a new demographic and establish a new church.
- 7) Elijah – A small struggling church agrees to give their buildings and assets to a new church start in the area.

The Commission will continue to search for new effective models for starting new churches in the right places, at the right time with the right pastors.

In the near future the Commission structure will be expanding, to include work in the area of transformation and revitalization of existing churches.

COMMITTEE ON COUNSELING

Budgeted 2009: \$20,000 _____ Requested 2010: \$18,000

Report No. 1

The committee on counseling is continually working to provide effective counseling services and resources for clergy members and families of the Central Texas Conference. We continue to work to expand the

list of approved counselors for a greater level of care and accessibility to meet the counseling needs of our members and their families throughout the annual conference. We are grateful for the invaluable services provided by the approved counselors. In addition to the confidential counseling available, they are also available for seminars and workshops.

Report No. 2

1. This service is available to ordained conference members, deacons, diaconal, and retired ministers, and persons serving in full-time conference appointments, plus their spouses and dependent family members. In addition, ordained members and families of the Rio Grande Conference serving within the geographical boundaries of the Episcopal area are eligible.
2. Complete confidentiality and respect for privacy will be maintained. As a client, only your counselor will know your name, and no information about you will go to any other person without your written consent. It is understood by the committee, and should be by the client, that where the professional counselor is bound by the mandatory reporting requirements by the state in areas of sexual misconduct, sexual abuse, and harm to others or self, the counselor's duty to report shall not be negated. In such cases, the client shall be so informed, and such mandatory reporting shall be made to the appropriate authorities and agencies. Trust will be vested in the integrity of the counselors, both to keep confidences with clients and to keep faith with the program by submitting accurate bills of service for payment. Such bills will list hours of service, a client code, but no name. (Only the counselor will be able to connect the client code with a name, and thus preserve the confidentiality of the client.)
3. The counseling Service will be limited to six visits to a counselor in any one year. The first two visits the counselor's contractual fee will be paid in full by the program. Thereafter, participants will be asked to pay a portion of the cost of the counselor's contractual fee scaled to income, as follows:

Family Income*	Program will pay	Client will pay
1. Under \$20,000	90%	10%
2. \$20,000-28,596*	75%	25%
(*Includes Full-time clergy receiving equitable compensation)		
3. Over \$28,596	50%	50%

*Family Income includes combined income of spouses, excluding housing or parsonage allowance.

4. Thereafter, if counseling is still needed after six visits in a calendar year, an application may be made to the Health Benefits program for possible payment. At that time, the symptoms must clearly indicate the need for therapy, and any such payments will then be made in accord with the Health Benefits Program, and not the contractual fees of the Conference Counseling Program.
5. During the first six visits to the counselor, payments from the Conference Counseling Program and the Health Benefits Program simultaneously will not be allowed.
6. Payments for the program will be made only to those counselors who have been approved as participants in the program. There will be no exceptions.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

Budgeted 2009: \$109,250 _____ Requested 2010: \$106,017

As the Board of Ordained Ministry began its work in the first year of the new quadrennium, the goals were adopted to guide the work of qualifying and mentoring persons who are seeking ordination as clergy in the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church. These goals are:

1. Create a standard of best practices for the District Committees on Ordained Ministry.
2. Develop a qualification and interview process to be used by the Central Texas Conference Board of Ordained Ministry with candidates seeking to be commissioned, with those who are continuing as probationary members and with those who are seeking ordination and full connection.
3. Evaluate the current Residency process as to the effectiveness for the probationary members of the Central Texas Conference. During this process, recommended changes to the process should be designed with the primary goal of helping a probationary member form a pastoral identity for his/her ministry.
4. Create an environment and process for the enlistment of young adults to serve in ordained ministry into Central Texas Conference.
5. Develop a program of continuing education for members of the Board of Ordained Ministry to ensure each member's effectiveness in representing the Central Texas Conference.

Members of the Board have given much time, thought, and expertise to formulating processes designed to foster candidates' growth as Christian leaders for the 21st century.

Of course, there is the continual concern regarding the qualification and ordination process of the United Methodist Church. While the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Central Texas Conference cannot arbitrarily change the process, the Board can develop and implement a standard of best practices that encourages and guides persons as they seek to become ordained elders or deacons. The task of qualifying persons for ordained ministry is a shared responsibility among the local churches who initially recommend persons for candidacy, District Committees on Ordained Ministry, the Board of Ordained Ministry, and the candidates themselves. The Board's guiding principle is to provide not only the process but the training necessary for each party to fulfill their responsibilities in this sacred calling.

In late 2007, the Board began discussing the creation of an online sexual misconduct prevention course with Dr. Richard Hunt. Working with Rev. Ed George, Dr. Hunt and his staff created the Prevention of Clergy Sexual Misconduct ("PCSM") course, and Beta testing by Board members and staff began last summer. The course became available to clergy members in December 2008. Currently, PCSM is for the training of clergy only. The Board's financial investment includes the right to use it at no additional cost until June 2010 at which time a subscription fee will be established. All clergy are encouraged to take advantage of this to renew their certification in this area, whether or not they have attended Sexual Misconduct Prevention Training within the last four years.

Finally, the Board of Ordained Ministry is comprised of clergy and laity who have additional responsibilities in their local churches and other ministry settings or in other endeavors and callings. The gifts of their time and service during this year of change and renewal have been exemplary.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION AND CLERGY BENEFITS

Budgeted 2009: \$1,000 Requested 2010: \$800

Report No. 1

The commission has met as needed and has carried out its responsibilities of overseeing the Minimum Compensation program for the Annual Conference. Because of the changes in appointments from time to time which often changes the number of persons and the amount needed for supplements, it is extremely difficult to project the financial needs as far in advance as required. The commission seeks to be responsible to the churches of the Annual Conference in not requesting more than is needed in Apportionments and at the same time provide adequately for the program. The commission is also very much aware of the financial constraints that produce the need for equitable compensation in some appointments. The commission is therefore willing to not only provide financial assistance, but also provide educational assistance to help all equitable compensation entities with the tools and help to rise above the minimum compensation levels for their clergy.

We are recommending that Equitable Compensation levels for all categories of supplements be increased by 1% for the 2010 Conference financial year. Additionally, we recommend that the 2010 budget for Equitable Compensation be \$57,000.00 in Salary Compensation and that the Committee's budget be \$800.00 for Committee expenses.

The Equitable Compensation Commission of the Central Texas Conference will offer to participate with those churches receiving equitable compensation in obtaining workers' compensation insurance for lay and clergy employees through the Conference-wide insurance program, up to \$250.00 per policy.

Report No. 2

Equitable Compensation Fund

There shall be a program of equitable compensation support in the Central Texas Conference under the management of the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits. This program shall be patterned after ¶625 of the 2008 Discipline. Based on these guidelines, the following paragraphs shall compose the operating procedure for the Equitable Compensation Program.

1. A prerequisite for consideration of salary supplements from the Equitable Compensation Fund shall be the filing with the Commission of a written application (Form EQ1/1999) by the District Superintendent each January 1 or anytime an appointment change occurs in an Equitable Compensation appointment. The District Superintendent shall certify classification of the clergy and the salary (using Pastoral Compensation and Support Worksheet figures) set by the charge.
2. Salary grants shall be made for a calendar year with payments made monthly. In cases of appointment changes at or between the Annual Conference session, the District Superintendent shall file a written request with the Commission. Approved supplements shall then be paid on a pro-rata basis for the part of the year actually served.
3. **Beginning January 2009, a church/charge is eligible to receive equitable compensation benefits for a maximum of three (3) years; a one year extension may be granted by the Cabinet if the charge exhibits progress and potential.**
4. The following conditions must be met by the pastoral charge before it can become eligible for consideration to receive supplements from the Equitable Compensation Fund:
 - a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted a stewardship campaign for the local budget of each of its churches during the previous calendar year. This shall be an every member campaign. The Commission will assist in such a campaign upon written request from the charge pastor or district superintendent.
 - b) All apportioned items shall have been paid in full by the local church for the previous calendar year.
 - c) The charge must have at least 100 members.

In unusual situations the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits may waive any or all of these conditions.

5. The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits will pay any amount up to 1/4 of the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference for each applicant according to his/her ministerial classification. If any exception under paragraph 3 or 4 is sought, the request must be endorsed by a 2/3 vote of the Cabinet before it can be considered by the Commission.
6. Persons of the following ministerial relationships are eligible for consideration for salary supplements at the level indicated for 2010. Rates for adjustment will be considered annually by the commission, but no less than the same percentage increase as that computed for the District Superintendents. The increase for 2010 will be 1%. The amounts reflected include the pastor's support and compensation amounts according to the cabinet worksheet, exclusive of parsonage considerations or a housing allowance. In calculating equitable compensation payments, no more than 25% may be deducted from total compensation as a housing allowance (even if the housing allowance actually constitutes more than 25% of the total compensation). Exception to this rule may be made for missional considerations.

7. Pastors who are appointed to less than full-time service as addressed in the 2008 *Discipline*, (§ 338.2) shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund. The amount of salary supplement for which the pastor is eligible will be determined by the Cabinet's interpretation of time actually spent in serving the charge. For example, if the pastor is deemed as serving 1/4 of full time, his/her minimum salary eligibility would be 1/4 of the minimum of his/her conference relationship classification. The categories of 1/4, 1/2, and 3/4 will be followed in determining less than full-time eligibility for salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund.
8. Ministers who are not eligible for salary supplements are:
 - d) Those whose appointment is other than pastor of a charge.
 - e) Those classified as part-time local pastor.
 - f) Retired ministers.
 - g) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in a present appointment.
 - h) Associate Pastors
9. The Commission is studying ways in which Equitable Salary funds may be used to supplement unusual situations beyond the Conference minimum scale to provide assistance for pastors who remain in churches for missional purposes at the request of the Cabinet. We continue in dialogue with the Cabinet about such a policy.

**Report No. 3
Moving Expenses**

- I. **Eligibility**
 - A. Those elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, associate members, or full time local pastors, who are appointed to a local church in the Central Texas Annual Conference, and other elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, associate members, or full time local pastors for whom the Central Texas Annual Conference is the salary paying unit (such as District Superintendents, Conference Council Directors, Wesley Foundation Directors, etc.) shall be eligible to receive funds.
 - B. Retiring elders in full connection, associate members, and full-time local pastors shall be eligible to receive funds for one move into housing not already owned or supported by a local church after retirement, to a maximum amount of \$2000. In circumstances in which a pastor, in one of the three relationships listed above, planning to retire moves prior to the retirement date, reimbursement for a move made within one year prior to the retirement date shall be made upon retirement, contingent upon the presentation of proper documentation.
 - C. If an elder in full connection, probationary member, commissioned minister preparing for ordination as elder in full connection, associate member, or full-time local pastor from another Conference is to be appointed to a local church in the Central Texas Annual Conference, the Central Texas Annual Conference will pay the cost of the move from the border of the Central Texas Conference, up to the maximum amount allowed.

- D. Those elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, and associate members, or full-time local pastors who go on Leave of Absence, or who surrender their credentials, either voluntarily or involuntarily, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Annual Conference moving funds, except in the case of those going on disability leave or the family of an elder in full connection, a probationary member, a commissioned minister preparing for ordination as elder in full connection, an associate member, or a full-time local pastor who dies while under appointment shall be eligible to receive funds for the initial move into housing not already owned or supported by a local church, up to the maximum amount allowed.
- E. Those persons who change or move houses, but who do not change appointments, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Conference moving funds.
- F. Those persons who change appointments, but who do not change houses, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Conference moving funds, with the exception of \$250.00 for moving office materials.
- G. If either or both clergy of a clergy couple living in one house change appointments, and move to one house, they will be eligible to receive funds for only the cost of the one move, up to the maximum amount allowable. If two houses are involved, at either the beginning point or ending point, they will be eligible to receive funds for both moves, each up to the maximum amount allowable.
- H. In no case shall the Conference pay more than the eligible expenses noted in II. Moving Allowance.

II. Moving Allowance

Our Conference Moving Policy has two options: these options are (a) Self-Move and (b) Commercial Move. The total expense of a Self-Move will not exceed \$1000 to the Conference, and the total expense of a Commercial Move will not exceed \$1500 to the Conference.

1. Self Move – The Self Move plan consists of the total receipts plus a maximum \$300 bonus with the grand total compensation not to exceed \$1000. Proper documentation of receipts for the cost of van rental, gasoline, and \$2.00 per mile must be submitted to the Conference Secretary Treasurer before receiving reimbursement.

or

2. Commercial Move – Upon receiving a copy of the invoice from the commercial move by the Conference Secretary Treasurer, the Conference will pay a maximum of \$1500 of actual moving expense. The receiving charge will be responsible for up to \$500.00 above the conference coverage. Any expense above that will be the responsibility of the pastor.

III. Method of Payment

- 1. Proper Moving Expense Vouchers shall be provided by the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer at the Annual "Start-Up Seminar".
- 2. The completed vouchers and required documentation shall be submitted to the office of the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer within sixty (60) days of the effective date of the appointment for repayment.
- 3. Should the local church incur any responsibility for moving expenses, copies of the same documentation must be provided prior to payment.

Exceptions

- A. Exceptions to any of the above may be approved or denied by the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer in consultation with the previous and receiving District Superintendents.
- B. Appeals of any decision by the Conference Secretary/Treasurer may be directed to the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits. The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits shall have final authority to interpret the moving policy and make decisions.

Report No. 4

The commission, upon referral from the Cabinet, has undertaken a review of the Conference parsonage Furnishings Policy. Additional adjustments will be presented at forthcoming Annual Conference sessions. (See III D.6)

Housing/Parsonage Standard

The church today demands the clergy to be not only a preacher, as was the early circuit rider, but a resident pastor and responsible citizen in the community. In order to meet these felt needs, and to call men and women to a dedicated ministry, the church must provide living conditions that will establish an adequate base from which to operate. It is the privilege and responsibility of the members of each congregation to provide the physical setting which will give the parsonage family the maximum comfort and convenience that the energies of the pastor may be more concentrated on his/her task and willing service in the Church of God. Because the parsonage, like the church building, reflects upon the congregation and the pastor, it should be in such condition that all concerned can be justifiably proud of it. Likewise, pastors should exercise the same diligence in caring for the parsonage as they would if it were their own property; mindful that they are stewards for those who will live in the parsonage after them.

The following Parsonage Standards were put in place and approved at the 1973 Central Texas Annual Conference and have appeared in our Journals since that time. Therefore, parsonages built or purchased prior to December 31, 1973 may not meet all of the recommendations in Sections I and II, but are subject to requirements in Sections III – V. Parsonages built or purchased after January 1, 1974 are subject to all recommendations and requirements listed below in Sections I – V.

Parsonage Standards for Central Texas Conference are as follows:

- I. Location—The location of a new parsonage is a matter of extreme importance. It should provide for the safety, convenience and privacy of the parsonage family. For this reason, we recommend that a new parsonage not be located adjacent to the church facilities.
- II. Size of building and living areas—The new or remodeled parsonage should be large enough to accommodate the pastor's family. It should provide adequate space for the entertainment of guests. It should be remembered in selecting a parsonage that the present parsonage family is not the only one who will live in that parsonage and that the house should be adaptable for a variety of family sizes and situations. Also care should be given that facilities should be fully accessible for those with handicapping conditions meeting standards of the 2008 Discipline ¶2543.

Recommendations:

- An 1800 square feet minimum living space.
- At least 3 bedrooms, preferable 4.
- At least 2 bath, preferable 2 ½ with adequate linen closet.
- Living and dining areas adequate for entertaining.
- A family room
- Adequate closet and storage space. Closet space in each bedroom and other storage space well distributed throughout the house.
- Laundry area (see III.C.8)
- Adequate garage or carport space (preferable 2-car garage)
- Adequate outside living area with fenced yard.

III. Required Equipment

A. Health

- 1. Adequate supply of hot and cold water in bathrooms, kitchen and laundry.
- 2. Proper sewage disposal according to the stands of local and/or State Department of Health.

B. Safety

- 1. Fire extinguisher in kitchen with yearly inspection.
- 2. Automatic central heating and air conditioning

3. Any bathroom heating should be protected and if not electric should be vented.
4. Provide smoke detectors for kitchen, living, laundry, and bedroom areas.
5. Provide carbon monoxide detectors, unless parsonage is completely electric.

C. Kitchen with well-planned work area.

1. Cooking area complete with range or built-in cooking units, counter space, hood and exhaust fan.
2. Sink area complete with modern double bowl sink with disposal and drain space.
3. Large automatic refrigerator with freezer unit.
4. Required code electrical outlets for every room.
5. A well-equipped kitchen with adequate storage for dishes and utensils.
6. Built-in dishwasher.
7. Laundry room with washer/dryer.

D. Furnishings

1. House adequately furnished with main items in living room, family room, and kitchen. (Discarded or worn out furnishings should not be used to furnish the parsonage. A Gift/Donation Policy by the Trustees of each church should be in place to prevent such an occurrence.)
2. Window coverings, drapes, curtains, and blinds.
3. Television antenna or cable service to parsonage.
4. Lawn tools, mower (self-propelled or riding as appropriate for size of yard) hoses, ladder, garbage receptacles.
5. All bedroom furnishings shall be the responsibility of the parsonage family.
6. Effective January 1, 2009, the formal dining room furnishings became the responsibility of the resident parsonage clergy.
7. **The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits recommends that effective January 1, 2011, all living and family room furnishings become the responsibility of the resident parsonage family.**

IV. Maintenance

- a. Decoration—both the interior and exterior of the parsonage should be kept in such a state of decoration as to preserve not only its physical condition but its aesthetic value as well. Decorating and/or any remodeling should be done in consultation with the parsonage family.
- b. Repair and replacement—
 1. An annual budget item will enable the Trustees and Parsonage Committee to have a consistent, rather than haphazard program of maintenance and improvement that will be less costly in the long run.
 2. An annual budget item for repair and replacement of furniture and equipment.

V. Miscellaneous

- a. Parsonage Book—It is recommended that the parsonage committee prepare and keep up-to-date a record in which are placed all guarantees, repair parts lists, and the instructions for use of equipment belonging in the parsonage. The record should also indicate when and from whom purchased and whom to call for service. Also this book may well contain a list of whom to call for various reasons, where to find various items, when and by whom various improvements were made, and other information helpful to an incoming minister.
- b. Insurance—The trustees should be certain that the church-owned house and contents are insured for at least 80% of replacement cost against fire, wind, and other hazards. Public liability insurance should be carried on parsonage property. Tenant Homeowners insurance is available for all ministers who desire to cover personal possessions and liability. **IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PASTOR TO INSURE PERSONAL PROPERTY BELONGING TO THE PASTOR AND FAMILY.**

- c. Utility Deposits—Should be made in the name of the church.
- d. Gifts to Parsonage—When a gift of furniture or furnishings is presented, it should be designated specifically if it is to remain in the parsonage or is to be the personal gift for the pastor/family. In the event it is to remain in the parsonage, the parsonage committee must approve it.
- e. Pastor's Office/Study—The Office/Study should be located in the Church Building and adequately furnished and equipped. Some pastors may choose to also maintain an office in the parsonage and be responsible for its furnishings in addition to the official church Office/Study.

Adequate parsonage facilities, based on the above standards insure that a pastoral appointment can be made on the basis of the needs of the charge, rather than the ability of the parsonage to receive the family assigned.

An annual review of the church-owned parsonage, to ensure proper maintenance, will be conducted by the chair of the board of trustees or the chair of the parsonage committee, if one exists, the chair of the committee on pastor-parish relations, and the pastor (§2532.4, 2008 Discipline).

**Report No. 5
Vacation Policy**

United Methodist ministers are in a unique position in their role as pastors of a local church. Their membership and relationship is primarily to the Annual Conference as they serve under the appointment of the Bishop. At the same time their salary-paying unit is the local church. They are called to accountability for effective ministry both by the Bishop through the appointive system and by the local church through the Pastor-Parish Relations (PPR) Committee. In vacation policy and similar matters it should be remembered by all that a pastor is not the employee of the local church. On the other hand, the Discipline (2008) ¶258.2 gives to the PPR Committee a consultative role in such matters.

BOARD OF LAITY

Budgeted 2009: \$7,100 _____ Requested 2010: \$6,035

The Board of Laity provides coordination and support services for United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, Student Leadership Teams, Lay Speaking Ministries and Lay Leaders. The mission is to enhance our effectiveness as partners in ministry to make disciples of Christ. In continued promotion of this mission, the following activities were held: the Laity Memorial Service, the "Partners in Ministry" luncheon, training for new lay members of annual conference, training for lay leaders throughout the conference, Laity Sunday celebrations in local churches and lay speaking training. The following goals are set for 2009:

1. Continue to carry out purposes as listed in the 2008 Book of Discipline.
2. Communicate through words and actions the Four Areas of Focus.
3. Utilize the Talent Bank Forms to identify people with the gifts, graces and passion for ministry beyond the local church.

At the November 15, 2008 meeting the board voted to add young adults to the Board of Laity. The following positions make up the membership of the Board of Laity: Conference Lay Leader, Associate Conference Lay Leader, Conference Student Leadership Team President, Conference Director of Lay Speaking Ministries, Conference UMW President, Conference UMM President, District Lay Leaders, District Student Leadership Team Presidents, District UMW Presidents, District UMM Presidents, one Young Adult Representative from each district, Presiding Bishop, Cabinet Representative and the Director of Mission Ministries-Assistant to the Bishop.

One of the roles of the Central Texas Conference Board of Laity is to review the evaluations of Annual Conference and report the results to the Agenda Committee. The multiple choice part of the evaluations is read by computer and in 2008 there were 511 evaluations turned in, or about one half of the number of people attending Annual Conference. LAY SPEAKING MINISTRIES

Lay Speakers have stepped up to serve as supply pastors and certified lay ministers in smaller churches. They have been encouragers in many churches and continued to raise the confidence of pastors to call on Lay Speakers to fill the pulpit and perform many mission services locally and across district lines throughout the conference.

We have improved numbers and been instrumental in the growth of Sunday Schools in our churches. Lay Speakers Lead Bible Studies is a popular course for Sunday School teachers. It has been well received across CTC Districts and at the 7th Annual Event at Glen Lake Camp where Virginia Mayfield challenged Lay Speakers to a higher level of leading small groups.

The United Methodist Church is a connectional church; Lay Speaking Ministries foster that connection, build upon it, and find ways to improve it. Lay Speaker training is taken to the local church upon request of the congregation. In 2008-2009 at least 45 Lay Speaking courses were offered in CTC local churches. Faculty and participants cross District lines to assure that the laity are encouraged to lead, communicate and serve our Lord. The E-Link, CTC web pages and District web pages have become integral tools to keeping Lay Speakers informed of learning opportunities. Additional accessibility to www.layspeakingministries.org is another tool for the Lay Speakers. More than 115 CTC Lay Speakers attended the 5th Annual Lay Speaking Event in February, 2009 where 14 Lay Speaking courses were offered. We recognized 16 new Local Lay Speakers.

We will continue to strongly encourage laity to be engaged in ministry with the clergy. Rev. Sharon Reid and Joe Paxton taught the classes of preparation for Certified Lay Ministry this year at Glen Lake.

In an effort to be a more effective extension of our clergy pool, we offered a course called A Ministry of Caring lead by Vera Moffitt from the Temple District. She had a full class of Lay Speakers who learned many skills relating to assisting clergy in caring ministries to the home bound, nursing home, and hospitalized parishioners. More these Lay Speakers serve as worship leaders, liturgists, music leaders, Pastor's Assistants and in any way called upon by their pastor.

The New Basic Course is being implemented across the Conference and it will encourage laity to realize their full potential in many areas of lay service in addition to being pulpit supply. The Basic class refocuses to help maintain the Wesleyan tradition of holding together personal faith and social justice.

Lay Speakers hold leadership roles in the Board of Church and Society, prison ministry and ministry to the homeless and underprivileged. Across CTC community food banks, meals on wheels, senior citizen centers, after school programs, nursing and rehab ministries and many other community outreach programs are led by Local and Certified Lay Speakers.

It is my pleasure and honor to submit this report to the Bishop and members of the conference with a profound sense of gratitude for your support of our ministry. Foremost, I wish to extend my sincere appreciation for the gracious welcome of our students to jurisdictional conference. It was the intent of the "mariachi" band to express its gratitude, on behalf of all the students, with their lively music. I believe it is fair to say that they brought love and joy to the floor of the conference.

Our ministry continues to be vibrant and energetic, in spite of the serious challenges that we face with an economy crisis and the violence on the border. The optimism and faithful enthusiasm of the students is a daily reminder of the reason for the existence of "La Lydia". We are currently serving 459 students whose hopes and dreams have been placed in our hands. Our work is crucial, as we look into the future and recognize the increasing need for educated leaders with strong principles and Christian values. On the other hand is the need to break the cycle of poverty so common among our students.

The result of our efforts is seen in the number of students attending college. In the past 10 years, we have sent approximately 630 students to college. United Methodist colleges and universities have provided opportunities to at least 240 of these students. We presently have 48 students attending UM colleges and universities throughout the country. As a part of our Student Lay Ministry Program, many are serving as interns in local churches in preparation for a lifetime of service.

The present school year has been a challenge in many ways. The increasing violence across the border has turned Lydia Patterson into a safe haven for many students. In my daily encounter with parents, I can

see the anguish in their teary eyes as they seek financial assistance to keep their children in school. Many have lost their jobs and are in constant threat for the safety of their families. We have experienced an increased need for scholarships to meet their needs. We are grateful to the number of people and local churches who have come forward to assist us with this pressing need.

In the midst of all, we thrive to provide the best education possible. We have added new classes. Seniors are being trained for the SAT and the results are visible in their improved scores. College courses are being taught and computer labs have been added to enhance their performance. The outcome is evident in students like Rebecca, a freshman attending Nebraska Wesleyan University, who made the Dean's list in her first semester.

The economy cannot be a deterrent for our ministry. We will soon enter into the feasibility study for a capital campaign to restore our campus and change more lives. Lydia Patterson has endured many depressions and recessions in its 95 years of ministry, and it has survived. I feel certain that, just like our United Methodist friends pulled us through some very tough times in the past, they will see us through once more. On my daily drive to work, I could always see the lives of our neighbors across the border. This was a constant reminder of the ministry of "La Lydia". The view has recently been blocked by a fence built along the border to restrain undocumented immigrants. I can no longer see the tiny sheds where people live, so now it is a reminder that Lydia Patterson builds bridges and not fences.

Thank you for being a part of a ministry that is touching lives every day. Your love and commitment is our source of strength. Together with you and with your continued support and prayers, Lydia Patterson Institute will always answer God's call to service.

Dozens of recent events, planned and hosted by Mount Sequoyah occurred during the past 12 months. These conference, training, and retreat sessions provide young and seasoned clergy the tools, models, and experiences to effectively lead their congregations. In 2009, Mount Sequoyah provided a second successful jurisdictional faith-based environmental conference to "Care for our Creation"; coordinated a partnership with national and regional Methodist agencies to initiate jurisdiction-wide training for addiction issues within local congregations and communities for congregational, district, and conference teams; and hosted the charter conference for the Small Church Leadership Institute for laity and clergy. Dozens more laity and clergy workshops, seminars, and meetings were hosted for effective leadership and discipleship training addressing specific ministry needs for congregations, districts, and conferences. A new initiative is to offer hospitality to returning soldiers, and their family members, in partnership with Veterans Health Care System of the Ozarks, the local VA medical center in Fayetteville.

Mount Sequoyah hosted disaster training through UMCOR just days after being a recipient of early response chainsaw and debris ministry teams from six states. In the 87 years of ministry and service to generations of Methodist clergy and laity, Mount Sequoyah has never experienced such physical devastation as happened during the January 27-28, 2009 Ice Storm. Described as an "arctic tornado" at the end of four days, the physical beauty of Mount Sequoyah lay in a pile of tree rubble which will cause clean up and building repair efforts to continue through the first and second quarters of this year. The rubble is temporary; however, the purpose is not interrupted for this unique and significant ministry of sacred service to Methodist clergy and laity from 6,400 congregations across 15 conferences in the South Central Jurisdiction.

In a critical year for balancing budgets, end of year revenue income for Mount Sequoyah facility use was the highest ever at \$750k, following a challenging year with significant loss in contracted revenue, due to group cancellations. Total revenue, as compared with previous years, has also increased from private contributions. Apportionment assistance given by the Central Texas Conference is vital to the continued transition for this connectional ministry.

Mount Sequoyah continues to be a leading and active partner for laity and clergy throughout the South Central Jurisdiction. Mount Sequoyah provides initiatives to develop effective leadership for our church; provides training for starting new faith communities and for renewing existing congregations; provides best practices for establishing "ministries in hard places" with the poor, the homeless, those in prison; and, it provides leadership for developing ministry strategies for addressing global health issues. Mount Sequoyah joins our collective UMC mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of our world.

TASK FORCE ON CONGREGATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

Congregational effectiveness is a shared responsibility of the congregations, local pastors and the Cabinet. This model was developed by the Congregational Effectiveness Task Force composed of representatives of clergy, laity and the cabinet. This document, amended to include youth and young adult input as directed by Annual Conference 2008, is to be used by local churches, administrative councils, boards and clergy as a tool for enhancing congregational effectiveness.

An effective congregation shall:

- Make disciples of Jesus Christ through emphasis on profession of faith, baptism and confirmation classes.
- Transform lives through mission and ministries.
- Nurture growth and effectiveness by affirming, teaching and practicing United Methodist doctrine based on John Wesley's quadrilateral of scripture, reason, tradition, and experience.
- Live the following seven-point agenda:
 1. Provide intentional hospitality.
 2. Take risks in ministries, missions and service.
 3. Engage in passionate worship.
 4. Practice extravagant generosity.
 5. Provide the structure for the development of faith-forming relationships.
 6. Stimulate prayer activity and Bible study.
 7. Participate in the United Methodist connection.

(I) INTENT OF THIS MODEL OF CONGREGATIONAL EFFECTIVENESS

The intent of this model is to document and illustrate the basic profile of effectiveness expected of the congregations within The Central Texas Annual Conference. The principles and elements of this model are grounded in scripture, our polity, history, tradition and in The Book of Discipline. The expectations of this model reflect what the charged task force members recognize as valid for a United Methodist congregation. This model is not intended to reflect:

- What is easy to do and maintain.
- What we or some might want to do.
- What some might find convenient to do.

(II) FOCUS ON LAY LEADERSHIP FRAMEWORK FOR EFFECTIVENESS

Excellence in leadership is essential for effectiveness in any organization...a fact that is especially true for a congregation. Leadership envisions leads, mediates, guides, collaborates, facilitates, motivates, mitigates and serves. Consultation with every church in the Central Texas Conference will be based on this model of effectiveness. While all congregations vary in size, scope, challenges and opportunities, they share in common the mission and ministry of the United Methodist Church to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Therefore, leadership should implement the model in ways appropriate to their situation.

While recognizing the importance of the appointive process, this model addresses only congregational effectiveness. It is understood that the senior pastor is the primary administrative and spiritual leader of the local congregation.

(III) EXPECTED ELEMENTS OF EFFECTIVE CONGREGATIONS

It is vital that each congregation develop/renew a sense of identity and purpose. Clarity of the church's vision is demonstrated through practicing the elements explained in more detail below.

1. Provide intentional hospitality:

- Strive to develop a membership profile that reflects the demographic and ethnic profiles of the geographical area/footprint of local ministry.
- Provide education classes for prospective and new members on United Methodist doctrine, polity, history and tradition, and the role of scripture in the Christian life.
- Maintain excellent facilities for babies, children and youth.
- Provide safe, positive, and nurturing environments for babies, children, youth, and vulnerable adults consistent with "Safe Sanctuaries" policies.
- Deploy and maintain visitor recognition and contact – intentionally hospitable, clearly visible, obvious and energetic.
 - Develop a plan to attract, draw, invite, and welcome youth and young adults into the regular life of the congregation.

2. Take risks in ministries, missions and service:

- Maintain a physical plant adequate for the needs of the congregation and its demands for effectiveness. (Plant should be not only functional, adequate, and well-maintained, it should be open and available to the community.)
- Start and/or sponsor chartered and viable units of:
 - United Methodist Women
 - United Methodist Men
 - Student Ministries
- Support and participate in outreach ministry that includes local, regional and global efforts.

-Be in collaborative ministry with others and other groups:

Other: Congregations
Denominations
Faith groups
Agencies
Individuals
Groups
Entities, public and private
Intentionally reach out to young people

3. Engage in passionate worship:

-Offer worship opportunities authentic to the Wesleyan tradition and conducted in a creative and spirit filled environment.

-Monitor and review the worship life of the church in a number of ways to determine effectiveness.

4. Practice extravagant generosity:

-Conduct annual pledge, finance or stewardship programs that are appropriate to congregation membership and effective in results.

-Maintain a high relationship between pledging units and total giving units – striving for 75% – and emphasize tithing (at least moving towards the tithe) and ever-increasing generosity.

-Grow annually the levels of total giving and Stewardship of time and resources.

-Develop a high ratio of individuals involved in mission and ministry to average worship attendance (at least 75%-80%).

-Share information about ways in which ministries are made possible through extravagant generosity.

- Designate a percentage of the annual budget toward student ministries and raise that percentage each year according to growth in the program.

5. Provide the structure for the development of faith-forming relationships:

-Maintain a high ratio (at least 75%-80%) of class and small group membership to average worship attendance. NOTE:

-An individual can be counted only one time regardless of the number of classes she/he attends.

-Small group membership is vital to faith formation and continuous spiritual growth and service.

-Develop and maintain in collaborative partnership an active and viable Student Ministries

-Develop a plan to integrate this Student Ministry into the regular life of the congregation

-Provide groups and classes for all age groups represented within the geography of the local outreach of the church.



- Practice obvious ministry to congregation members, friends and associates:
 - Homebound visitation and communion,
 - Hospital ministry, and
 - All the nurturing ministries expected of a congregation.

6. Stimulate prayer activity and Bible study:

- Offer the structured Bible and theology study packages of the United Methodist Church on a regular basis.
- Use United Methodist study and educational materials as the baseline for study of the Bible, theological reflection, study of United Methodist doctrine, polity, tradition and history.
- Offer adequate and appropriate training and supervision for lay and staff teaching/education cadre.
- Provide a broad and rich variety of spiritual formation venues and offerings: prayer, meditation, study, reflection, fasting, etc.

7. Participate in the United Methodist connection:

- Pay out at least 100% of annual missional giving (apportionments).
- Have all financial accounts reviewed in a manner consistent with the Book of Discipline.
- Adopt and follow all the appropriate financial controls suggested by conference officials.
- Elect/appoint lay leadership that is competent, caring and inclusive in age, sex, ethnicity, etc., and that will be obvious in its involvement, involvement and "revolvement."
- Identify and participate in lay leadership training offered at local church, district, and conference levels.
- Have a governing body, board or council that meets at least quarterly and meets all the organizational requirements of The Book of Discipline.
- Maintain all official records required by The Book of Discipline, the conference and district in current, usable and orderly fashion.
- Display 'United Methodist Church' prominently in congregation signs, web sites, printed material, business cards, stationery, etc.
- Be appropriately represented within the connection by urging members to serve beyond the local church on ~~agency boards, task force groups, committees, study/reflecting groups, etc.~~ the Board of Laity, Student Leadership Team, UMM, UMW, and all other boards, task forces, and committees that are available to be active on.

(IV) AN EFFECTIVE CONGREGATION'S SUPPORT FOR PASTOR AND STAFF

- Recognize and support the Senior Pastor as the chief operating officer and the primary spiritual leader of the congregation.

- Recognize all appointed staff as spiritual leaders of the congregation and leaders within the connection and the community.
- Maintain obvious support of continuing education for pastor and staff:
 - Adequate funds and designated time
 - Proper topics of education to meet needs and opportunities

- Provide appropriate benefits and above minimum wage pay for all staff.

- Document the congregation's position concerning non-appointive employees and employment:
 - Established personnel policies and job descriptions
 - Established benefits, working conditions and expectations
 - Established performance evaluation instruments and processes
 - Handle conflict and grievances through clearly stated protocols and procedures.

(V) MEASURABLE OUTCOMES

Although many aspects of the practice of ministry are intangible, effective congregations will demonstrate certain measurable outcomes as a result of their ministry. These outcomes then can be evaluated by the District Superintendent, Church Councils, and S/PPRC according to expectations appropriate to the congregation's local ministry context. The following evaluation document can be used further for the core of communications: district trainings, self-evaluation, charge conferences, S/PPRC training, and pastoral conversations. This does not imply, however, that such outcomes are the responsibility of the church alone.

The Congregational Effectiveness document is intended to be completed yearly in January and reviewed before the annual charge conference in the fall for measurable results and additional planning.

In completing the following self-evaluation document, specific, quantifiable answers will prove beneficial to the church's leadership team. Even in a narrative answer, supplying details of how the church is/or will be effective at "making disciples in order to transform the world" will prove very helpful to members of the congregation as well as to others in the connection.

The Congregational Effectiveness Task Force realizes the importance of clergy effectiveness as the other side of a healthy partnership in accomplishing the mission of the church. The CTC has created a Clergy Effectiveness document which is to be used in each congregation with the clergy and S/PPRC. The Clergy Effectiveness document is to be completed in June and July and submitted to the District Superintendent by August 15.

This report does not include a process for dealing with congregations that are continually in crisis or find it impossible to live in peace with their pastor. A structure or process of intervention needs to be devised to council and work with such churches. (This suggestion is from a clergyman who was not a member of the drafting task force and is offered only for your future consideration.)

What do you plan to do/develop in this area next year? How many candidates for ministry have come from your congregation? What can we as a congregation do to better understand the United Methodist connection? How many of our congregational members serve on district or conference groups? Do our congregational leaders attend the District Training Event?

#8 How does the congregation through S/PPRC support the Pastor in:

Participation in a support or accountability group?
Participation in Continuing Education? What amount is budgeted for Continuing Education? (The CTC Board of Ordained Ministry Policy regarding Continuing Education funds states, "In all cases, the local church is expected to provide \$200 or 1% of the pastor's salary, whichever is greater.")

Days off? (The Vacation Policy is published annually as part of the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits in the Conference Journal.)

How can the congregation better support the pastoral family?

What can the congregation do to better understand the pastor's challenges and frustrations?

**Report No. 2
PRE-82 PENSION FUNDING PLAN**

The 2000 General Conference mandated that every conference have in place a funding plan to insure that monies will be in place no later than the year 2021 to cover any unfunded liability for those pastors with pre-82 years of service. Below you will find the proposed funding plan for the Central Texas Conference. The funding plan as of January 1, 2009 is summarized below:

(These numbers were projected from the 2009 actuarial valuation as of January 1, 2007 using 7% interest at 3% P.S.R increases. While the CAC in past years has increased approximately 4%, we do not expect that trend to continue. We anticipate increases closer to 3%. We intend to keep the P.S.R. at .9 of 1% of the CAC)

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Note: These numbers do not reflect the extreme economic challenges that occurred later in 2008. It had appeared that we would reach our goal of 120% funding for this Plan by 2016; but, market losses have taken a toll on our funding reserve (as it has for all Conferences). Your Conference Board of Pensions is in consultation with the General Board of Pensions as we assess the current and future financial

needs to insure the stability of the Pre-82 Plan. We do know that there will be rising costs due to various factors: 1) increases in Past Service Rates, 2) greater numbers of Retirees, 3) variables in interest rates, 4) re-couping monies lost in the market downturn.

Therefore, we request the continuation of the \$700,000 Conference Claimant Apportionment for 2010; and, we must be prepared for an increased apportionment amount in the coming years.

Report No. 3

PENSIONS:

1. In accordance with Conference action, which requires that the Past Service Rate (PSR) be at least 9/10 of 1% of the Conference Average Compensation (CAC for 2010 this is \$66,133), for those clergy with pre-1982 service years who qualify for annuity, the Conference Board of Pensions recommends that the PSR for 2010 be \$614. This meets the minimum requirement.
2. Based on our Funding Plan, and the CPP requirements, we request the following amounts be apportioned to our churches in 2010:

a) Conference Claimants requirement (Pre-82 funding)	\$700,000
b) CPP	<u>\$560,000</u>
c) Total 2010 Request	\$1,260,000

 - d) In the case of Family Leave or Leave of Absence appointed after January 1, 2004, the board recommends that the conference make CPP contributions of 3% of the Denominational Average for Full Members, Associate Members, and Probationary Members for the period of one year.

Report No. 4

Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP)

On January 1, 2007, the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) became effective as the new Pension program for all eligible United Methodist Clergy.

CRSP offers a two component benefit design:

- a. Defined Benefit – promises a specific dollar amount at retirement regardless of market conditions or investment performance. The amount is based on a formula that specifies a monthly retirement benefit to eligible clergy for the remainder of their lives.
- b. Core Defined Contribution – promises a defined amount that is deposited into an active clergyperson’s account with monthly deposits. This benefit distributed at retirement is the accumulated amount plus earnings (losses) in the individual’s account.

The 2010 financial obligation C.R.S.P. requires of the Central Texas Conference is:

- a. Core Defined Benefit - \$1,874,626
- b. Core Defined Contribution – 3% of each eligible clergyperson’s plan compensation.

2010 Funding Plan:

The cost of participation in C.R.S.P. will continue to be direct billed to the local church for the two core components (Defined Benefit and Defined Contribution).

- a. Defined Benefit – 15% increase in the amount billed in 2009.
- b. Defined Contribution – 3% of participant plan compensation

Report No. 5

The board recommends that it continue to actively pursue the issue of pension arrearage utilizing a very fair but stringent examination of each situation to determine what steps need to be taken to assure the integrity of the affected minister’s future pension benefits.

The board recommends the following procedure for dealing with current and future pension contributions: Letters will be sent to the following lay leaders of the churches involved: Administrative Board/Council Chair, Pastor/Staff Relations Committee Chair, Finance Committee Chair, and Treasurer. The pastor and the

district superintendent will also receive the letter. The letter will emphasize the importance of this issue and urge them to bring their contributions current by sending their check to Central Texas Conference, PO Box 99387, Fort Worth, TX 76199-0387

Each church which does not meet its obligation will report this fact to its Charge Conference and give an explanation. The district superintendent will keep a record of this action.

**Report No. 7
CONFERENCE GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM**

We are now in our sixth year of providing medical and pharmacy benefits through HealthFlex and we continue to be very satisfied with the program. There were no changes in our EPO and PPO plan structures from 2008 to 2009.

Our health insurance plan will continue to be a mandatory program administered according to the HealthFlex rules for mandatory conference programs. Those for whom the program is mandatory are Elders, Probationary Elders, Associate Members, and Full-time Local Pastors appointed to local churches in the Conference, as well as those for whom the Conference is the Plan sponsor for the Pension program such as District Superintendents, Conference staff appointees, and Campus Ministers. In addition Elders appointed at least one-half time will be included. Deacons serving at least one-half time are eligible for coverage at the Salary-Paying Unit (local church) level under a Sub-Adoption Agreement, but are not mandated. Not included in the plan (and thus not allowed insurance through the Conference) will be Elders serving less than one-half time, Ministers of Other Denominations, those appointed to extension ministries other than those named above, and Part-time Local Pastors. The Conference Board of Pensions reserves the right each year to choose the optional categories of appointments to be selected to best serve the needs of the Conference. Where a clergyperson in a mandatory category chooses to waive the program, the church served by that clergyperson will be assessed a minimum contribution equal to the single clergy PPO rate for the year, which is the default plan for the Conference, to be paid monthly. This is to insure the stability of the program so it will be in place for other clergy who will serve that church. We further recommend that churches begin to think of health insurance coverage as a benefit provided to a pastor rather than as a part of that pastor's salary, and we encourage them to make it a separate item in their budget apart from salary considerations.

Lay employees, normally scheduled to work 30 hours or more per week, may be eligible for coverage at the Salary-Paying Unit (local church) level under a Sub-Adoption Agreement if Risk Pool requirements are met. The Risk Pool Rules apply to lay employees on an employer-by-employer basis. Surviving spouses and dependents of covered lay employees deceased on or after January 1, 2009 are eligible for coverage as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death and will be responsible for the entire premium. A new spouse acquired by a surviving spouse is not eligible for benefits through the Conference.

Claims experience again showed a significant increase in 2008 and our projected 2010 premiums reflect that increase. The following are the preliminary premium rates for 2010 from HealthFlex.

Effective January 1, 2010, the prescription drug plans previously associated with our health plans will no longer be offered by HealthFlex. They will change to RX Plan FX 2 for all plans including PPO, EPO and the Medicare Companion Plan. The most significant changes will be the addition of a retail deductible for the EPO plan and the mail order copay for a 90 day supply will go from 2 times the copayment to approximately 2 ½ times the copayment for brand name prescriptions. The following is the coverage overview of FX 2.

We remind churches and pastors of the urgency to pay health insurance premiums monthly in a timely fashion. To fail to do so, as in any insurance program, may result in cancellation of insurance benefits. If at any time the premium due becomes more than 90 days delinquent, the coverage for that/those participant(s) may be cancelled retroactively to the first of the month where the delinquency began and will not be available for reinstatement until the next plan year.

In 2006, The General Board of Pension and Health Benefits (GBOP) began a multi-year HealthFlex Plan Sponsor Incentive Program which is designed to provide the conferences in HealthFlex with the opportunity to earn a rebate on their total active plan premium (Medicare Companion plan participants are not eligible). In year 3 which began January 1, 2008, the incentive again involved completion of the HealthQuotient (HQ) health risk assessment as well as an additional activity, a wellness exam. In addition, the goal was again three tiered. We are very pleased to announce that the Central Texas Conference reached the tier 3 goal for the HQ and the tier 1 goal for the wellness exam in 2008 and we were awarded a 4% rebate from GBOP (2% for the HQ and 2% for the wellness exam). We will again pass the percentage of premium savings received by the Conference on to those enrollees/enrolled spouses who successfully completed the required activity/activities in 2008 when we receive our rebate in 2009.

In 2009, the HealthFlex Incentive Program has changed from previous years. The Incentive Program now provides monetary incentives to HealthFlex plan sponsors and participants for making healthy choices. Participants have the opportunity to receive up to \$425 in rewards over a 12-month period for participating in HealthFlex wellness activities. The Central Texas Conference, as the plan sponsor, will receive a percentage of participants' 2009 earnings as a plan sponsor incentive. HealthFlex's newest wellness offering, which began January 1, 2009, is the Virgin HealthMiles (VHM) walking program. VHM is a physical activity program brought to HealthFlex participants by HealthFlex and the Center for Health. This program allows participants to earn rewards for making a commitment to improve your health by walking or getting active in other ways.

VHM offers an opportunity to help participants become or stay focused on their health. Participants enroll and receive a free "GoZone" pedometer, which tracks the steps taken every day. Steps are uploaded from the pedometer to a personalized "LifeZone" HealthMiles Web site, which displays physical activity levels. Over time, participants can track their progress—and their rewards. Each time steps are uploaded, "HealthMiles" are received. HealthMiles are also earned for filling out a brief health snapshot, taking health measurements, participating in challenges and more. When fitness levels and measurements improve, participants earn HealthMiles for improvements. HealthMiles works like a frequent-traveler program. As different levels are reached, "HealthCash," is earned which can be redeemed as gift cards for national retailers, or as a check written to the participant or their favorite charity. Up to \$300 can be earned in a 12-month period.

In 2008, the General Board issued \$100 Visa prepaid cards to active plan participants who completed an HQ between January 1 and June 30, 2008. **This year, the HQ Blitz Incentive will be offered only to registrants of the Virgin HealthMiles program.** HealthFlex participants who take the HQ between January 1 and June 30, 2009, and meet all eligibility requirements will receive \$100 in HealthCash credited to their VHM accounts. The requirements for eligibility are:

- Only participants and their spouses who are enrolled in active medical plans are eligible. Medicare companion plan participants are not eligible regardless of their employment status.
- Participants must be registered in the VHM program.
- For married participants:
 - Both the participant and the spouse must take the HQ to be eligible for the Blitz Incentive.
 - If both the participant and spouse take the HQ, they will each be eligible for \$100 HealthCash—for a total incentive of \$200 per couple.
 - If only the participant or spouse takes the HQ, neither will be eligible for the incentive.
 - For couples with one active participant and one Medicare companion plan participant, only the active participant is eligible for the \$100 Blitz Incentive.
- Participants who take HQ after June 30, 2009, will not be eligible for this incentive.
- Participants and spouses must log in to the HealthFlex/WebMD Web site using their own unique user IDs and passwords. If a participant's spouse completes the HQ while logged in under the participant's ID, neither the participant nor the spouse will be eligible for the Blitz Incentive. Spouses taking the HQ under the participant's ID also will not be credited with 2,500 HealthMiles.

HealthMiles are converted to HealthCash based on the participation levels indicated below. (The reward for Level One is the free pedometer.)

- \$100 for completing the HQ Health Risk Assessment during the "HQ Blitz" period, January 1 through June 30, 2009. (This incentive is in addition to the 2,500 miles earned for HQ completion.)
- \$25 for completing a comprehensive ProCheck blood screening between January 1 and December 31, 2009 (if available in your area.)

Beginning January 1, 2008, the Central Texas Conference (Conference) subsidized Retiree Health Insurance carrier is a Medicare Companion Plan, which is inclusive of prescription benefits, through HealthFlex sponsored by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits of the United Methodist Church and administered by BlueCross BlueShield of Illinois.

The Conference shares the funding of the Retiree Health Benefit Program for eligible retired participants with the retired clergy and spouses. The Conference Retiree Health Benefit Program assumes participation in Medicare Parts A and B and is designed to extend certain benefits beyond what Medicare pays. The Conference will subsidize the premium for the clergy retiree and his/her eligible spouse if the following service requirements have been met (these rules are in effect for any clergyperson, who retires after Annual Conference in June, 2002): **Service Requirements for Funding Retiree Health Benefits:** At the time of retirement, the clergyperson must have been working in at least a $\frac{3}{4}$ time appointment as a Full Member of the Central Texas Conference or as a Full Time Local Pastor eligible for retirement per the Discipline and the rules of the Annual Conference. At the time of retirement, the clergyperson must be a member of the Central Texas Conference, serving in a local church or one of its "Conference Responsible" agencies, and they must have at least five (5) years of ministerial service in the Central Texas Conference and ten (10) years of service in the United Methodist Church. A waiver of the five (5) year requirement for service in the Central Texas Conference may be considered by the Central Texas Conference Board of Pensions upon recommendation of the Cabinet.

For those eligible clergypersons and their eligible spouses enrolled in the HealthFlex Medicare Companion Plan offered by the Conference who retire January 1, 2008 or after, the Conference will pay from 15 – 50% of the premium for those retiring at age 65 (or full retirement age) based on their years of ministerial service in the United Methodist Church.

For those eligible clergypersons and their eligible spouses enrolled in the HealthFlex Medicare Companion Plan offered by the Conference who retired before January 1, 2008, the Conference will continue to subsidize the premium at 50%.

Surviving spouses of deceased retired clergy are eligible for the subsidy as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death. A new spouse acquired by a retiree or surviving spouse after retirement is not eligible for retiree benefits through the Conference.

If, at the time of retirement, the clergyperson is less than 65 years of age and has been covered for five consecutive years under HealthFlex, then the Conference will partially fund participation in the Conference's plan for active clergy only if the same service requirements are met as those who are 65 years of age. If the service requirements listed above have not been met, then the clergyperson and his or her spouse are responsible for providing for his or her own healthcare from that point forward.

If at the time of retirement, a retiree has Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage (e.g. through a spouse's employer), he/she may decline retiree coverage and retain the ability to enroll for coverage at a future date. If the retiree loses his or her coverage, it is the retiree's responsibility to notify the Conference and enroll in the retiree coverage within 30 calendar days of loss of other coverage. If this 30-day requirement is not met, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage/subsidy through the Conference at a future date. If an eligible retiree without Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage declines coverage at the time of retirement, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage/subsidy through the Conference at a future date.

Beginning January 1, 2009, the Central Texas Conference has elected the exception that allows a multiple employer plan to exempt certain individuals from the Medicare secondary payer rules for the working aged. This election helps reduce costs incurred by the Conference and the overall HealthFlex program. This exception applies to clergy, lay employees and spouses who are 65 years of age or older, entitled to Medicare due to their age, and have coverage under the HealthFlex program through an employer (local church or Conference sponsored entity) who employs fewer than 20 employees. For those individuals affected by the exception, Medicare will be the primary payer of their claims beginning the first day of the month they attain age 65, even if still an active employee, and the employee will no longer be eligible for coverage under the active plans. Eligible clergy and clergy spouses will be moved from the active plan over to the Conference subsidized retiree Medicare Companion Plan at that time and the premium will be subsidized at 50% as with any other active clergy. Upon retirement, if eligible for retirement health benefits, the subsidy will continue based upon years of service as indicated in the scale above. Eligible lay employees, 65 years of age or older, will be moved from the active plan to the Medicare Companion Plan and will be responsible for the entire premium.

Beginning with a retirement date of January 1, 2009 or later, a lay employee whose active service has ended and has completed a minimum of five years of continuous and uninterrupted coverage in HealthFlex immediately preceding the date of retirement, may continue under the Medicare Companion Plan, along with any eligible family members covered at the time of retirement, and will be responsible for the entire premium. Surviving spouses of retired, deceased lay employees are eligible for coverage as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death. A new spouse acquired by a retiree or surviving spouse after retirement is not eligible for benefits through the Conference.

If at the time of retirement, a retired layperson has Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage (e.g. through a spouse's employer), he/she may decline retiree coverage and retain the ability to enroll for coverage at a future date. If the retiree loses his or her coverage, it is the retiree's responsibility to notify the Conference and enroll in the retiree coverage within 30 calendar days of loss of other coverage. If this 30-day requirement is not met, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage through the Conference at a future date. If an eligible retiree without Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage declines coverage at the time of retirement, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage through the Conference at a future date.

We continue to have a concern for clergy who may have opted out of the Social Security system. It is imperative that those persons be Medicare eligible when they turn 65, or they likely will not be able to obtain any medical insurance. Some who have opted out may have this eligibility through a spouse, or through enough previous employment. However it should also be noted that eligibility for Social Security disability payments differs from the requirements for retirement and Medicare benefits. If a new pastor is considering this course, they should investigate these matters very carefully.

Effective January 1, 2010, the prescription drug plans previously associated with our health plans will no longer be offered by HealthFlex. They will change to RX Plan FX 2 for all plans including the Medicare Companion Plan. The change will be in the mail order copay for a 90 day supply which will go from 2 times the copayment to approximately 2 ½ times the copayment for brand name prescriptions. The following is the coverage overview of FX 2.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL-HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR
RETIRED OR MINISTERS ON INCAPACITY LEAVE OF THIS CONFERENCE

The Central Texas Conference (the "Conference") adopts the following resolutions relating to rental-housing allowances for active, retired or disabled clergypersons of the Conference:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the "Church"), of which this Conference is a part, has in the past functioned and continues to function through ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the Church ("Clergypersons");

WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and of this Conference was and is to provide active Clergypersons with a parsonage or a rental-housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to retired and disabled Clergypersons are considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to active, retired and disabled Clergypersons in consideration of previous active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental-housing allowance for Clergypersons who are or were members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT an amount equal to 100% of the pension or disability payments received from plans authorized under *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church* (the "*Discipline*"), which includes all such payments from the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits ("GBOPHB"), during the year 2010 by each active, retired or disabled Clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental-housing allowance for each such Clergyperson; and

THAT the pension or disability payments to which this rental-housing allowance applies will be any pension or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds authorized under the *Discipline*, including such payments from the GBOPHB and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a GBOPHB plan, annuity, or fund authorized under the *Discipline*, that result from any service a Clergyperson rendered to this Conference or that an active, retired or disabled Clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the Church, or any other employer that employed the Clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the Church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such active, retired or disabled Clergyperson's pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental-housing allowance that may be excluded from a Clergyperson's gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations there under to the least of: (1) the amount of the rental-housing allowance designated by the Clergyperson's employer or other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing resolutions) for such year; (2) the amount actually expended by the Clergyperson to rent or provide a home in such year; or (3) the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

**Report No. 10
Section 125 Cafeteria Plan**

For the purpose of paying for health care without having to pay taxes on the money which one spends, the Central Texas Conference established a Cafeteria plan under Section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code for all lay and clergy employees working 1040 hours per year (20 hours per week), who work in our churches, as Conference staff, in the CTC Foundation, at Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center, or who are appointed to Conference-responsible extension ministries within the bounds of the Conference.

The Cafeteria Plan has an automatic feature and four optional features. The automatic feature, for which one does not need to fill out an enrollment form, is the exclusion from one's wages, on a pre-tax basis, one's medical insurance coverage premium. One needs only to indicate the yearly premium amount on one's Pastoral Support and Compensation Form and tell one's treasurer to exclude each month's premium and send it to the proper address. The four optional features require filling out an enrollment form and paying the proper administrative and posting charges which apply.

These are also paid with pre-tax dollars. The optional features one may select to exclude from wages include:

1. Un-reimbursed Medical (URM) Flexible Spending Account up to \$5,000 (on a use-it-or-lose-it basis) through Aflac's FlexOne.
2. Dependent Day Care (DDC) Flexible Spending Account up to \$5,000 (for care of dependents under 13 years of age or dependents mentally or physically incapable of self-care, also on a use-it-or-lose-it basis) through Aflac's FlexOne.
3. Supplemental Medical Insurance from Aflac.
4. Dental Policy from Aflac.

Enrollment occurs within 30 days of employment and then is offered yearly to all eligible employees. It is important to note that re-enrollment in the Flexible Spending Accounts do not automatically occur or "roll over" into the following year. Each participant must re-enroll in the fall of the previous year for the next year's participation. The Supplemental Medical and Dental policies will remain in place in subsequent years unless a cancellation form is submitted to the Conference Office during the open enrollment period requesting the same. New materials for enrollment are available on the Conference website in October of each year for re-enrollment for the following year.

As with the health insurance plan, the premiums for the optional features should be paid monthly in a timely fashion. To fail to do so may result in the cancellation of the policy/policies. If at any time the premium due becomes more than 90 days delinquent, the coverage for that/those participant(s) may be cancelled retroactively to the first of the month where the delinquency began and will not be available for reinstatement until the next plan year.

COMMITTEE ON RULES, POLICIES AND GUIDELINES

Budgeted 2009: \$300 Requested 2010: \$250

The Committee on Rules is charged with reviewing and recommending changes to the Conference Standing Rules. The Standing Rules have been reviewed.

The following changes have been submitted to the committee and recommended to the Annual Conference. Strike through indicates deletion. Bold print indicates new language. For the full text, see the Conference Journal.

II. Conference Organization

- 19.2 The committee shall receive personnel recommendations from Mission Ministries, the Council on Finance and Administration, ~~The~~ **the** Commission on Church Growth and ~~development~~ **Development**, the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Commission on Archives and History, and the Board of Pensions. The work of the committee will in no way interfere with the prerogative of Disciplinary mandates concerning the nominations of the Director of the Mission Ministries or the Conference ~~treasurer~~ **Treasurer** nor with existing Conference Standing Rules.
- 19.4 The committee shall ~~conduct~~ **have oversight of** an annual review ~~and evaluation~~ **and evaluation of process** for all Annual Conference staff members in whatever manner it deems necessary to assure the integrity of the staff as a whole and as individuals.
- 19.6 The committee shall ~~formulate~~ **maintain** a personnel policy handbook ~~which will address~~ **for the purpose of addressing** issues such as vacation time, leave of absence, sick leave, pregnancy leave (for male and female) and other matters germane to the employment of personnel.
- 19.7 The committee shall ~~formulate and keep~~ **be responsible for maintaining** current job descriptions for all members of the Conference staff. **These will be kept in a secure place in the Conference office.** (Refer to 2008 Discipline ¶ 608 for ACCOM (Mission Ministries) Director; ¶ 619 for Conference Treasurer; ¶ 603.7 for Conference Secretary; Standing Rules Page 288 of 1992 Journal - CG&D and Page 290 III 1.0 through 1.2)
- 19.8 The committee shall **have responsibility to** conduct grievance hearings for **issues** which in-house management has been unable to resolve and **to** conduct exit interviews for staff members who are leaving for any reason.
- 19.9 **The committee shall be responsible for creating and maintaining uniform hiring and exiting procedures to be used by Conference Directors.**

III. Annual Conference Mission Ministries

- 4.0 The Conference Nurture Mission Council will have 9 District representatives selected from a District pool by the MLT and may have four at large if it is determined necessary by the MLT to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation, and additional members may be the Coordinator for Spiritual Growth of the Conference United Methodist Women, the President of the Student Leadership Team, the Resource Center Director and the chair of the Board of Directors of Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center. There will be a representative selected from the Commission on Inclusiveness, **and a representative selected from the Emmaus Board of Directors.** The Director of Glen Lake Camp shall be a member of the council without vote.

V. Financial

- 2.0 ~~Remittances~~ **Apportionment payments, askings, special day offerings, advance specials, and other missional gifts remitted** from a pastoral charge to the Conference treasurer shall be accompanied by the **current year** remittance

forms supplied by the Council on Finance and Administration. These forms shall ~~be in triplicate and~~ indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause ~~for which the remittance is made and the total must match the amount remitted. The Conference treasurer shall return one receipted form to the pastor and one to the District Superintendent for each remittance.~~ **The Conference Treasurer shall post on-line in a timely fashion remittances received. Monthly the Conference treasurer shall report to the District Superintendents and the Bishop the status of funds remitted.** The pastor shall enclose the annual statement of receipts as issued by the Conference treasurer, corrected if necessary, with the church's Annual Conference Report as verification of items reported in Table II.

3.4 Any proposed change of the decimal formula shall first be studied by the Council on Finance and Administration. CFA shall then report to the Annual Conference its recommendation. (In accordance with the 2008 Book of Discipline ¶ 615.)

4.0 All budget items allocated to the Districts and local churches of the Conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula: Determine the base amount for each District or church by taking the total of the following items: (58) pension & benefit funds (~~MPP CRSP~~) paid directly to the General Board of Pensions, (64) Pastor's base compensation, (65) Associate(s) base compensation, (66a) Utilities and housing paid to/for pastor, (66b) Utilities and housing paid to/for associate(s), (67a) Travel paid to/for pastor, (67b) Travel paid to/for associate(s), (68a) Other allowances paid to/for pastor, (68b) Other allowances paid to/for associate(s), (69) Diaconal minister(s) compensation, (70) Other staff compensation, (71) Current expenses for program, (72) Other current operating expenses. Add the above thirteen (13) expenditures for each District to get the "District total expenditure". Divide each "District total expenditure" by the "Conference total expenditure" to get the District decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the District decimal by each Conference Apportionment to get the District Apportionment. Add the above thirteen (13) expenditures for each local church to get their "local total expenditure". Divide each "local total expenditure" by the "District total expenditure" to arrive at the local church decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the local church decimal by each District Apportionment allocation to get the Local Church Apportionment. (Each apportionment is rounded off to the nearest dollar), **with each church being apportioned at least one dollar for each apportionment.**

VI. Districts

2.1 The purpose of the District Conference shall be: (a) to review without debate or vote the Preliminary Report and other items of business coming before the Annual Conference; (b) to elect District representatives to the Conference agencies (c) to elect members of the District Mission Leadership Team; (d) to elect two young adults ~~under age twenty-five~~, **approximately eighteen to thirty years of age**, to serve as members of the Annual Conference; and (e) such other District business as may be determined permissible under the Book of Discipline.

TEXAS METHODIST FOUNDATION

The Texas Methodist Foundation's commitment "to empower the Church in the achievement of her God-appointed missions" continues to be reaffirmed, especially during this year of economic uncertainty. The Foundation was founded in 1938 during another challenging economic time for United Methodist churches and institutions in Texas. Our founders were a group of forward-thinking United Methodist clergy and laity who gathered to strengthen the long-term financial stability and effectiveness of their Church. We consider it our calling and our privilege to continue to carry out their vision through our services.

We ended 2008 with \$316.5 million in assets under management. Our Investment Services area saw an increase in funds among the strong pool of church and institutional accounts they serve. A number of our existing investors moved additional funds to the Foundation from bank accounts in 2008. These transfers were often precipitated by the confidence investors have in the transparency and integrity of

our financial operations and our commitment to serving the needs of United Methodists rather than shareholders. Many of these investors found a safe haven in the Methodist Loan Fund where they know their investments will earn competitive rates while building and strengthening other United Methodist agencies with loans for new construction, capital improvements and expanded facilities to better serve their communities through ministry.

The Texas Methodist Foundation, located in Austin, serves United Methodist individuals, churches and agencies within the five annual conferences in Texas and the Rio Grande Conference of Texas and New Mexico. We appreciate the opportunity to report some of the ways we assisted United Methodists last year.

How can we help you to help others?

We are pleased to report the assistance we provided in 2008:

Within the Central Texas Annual Conference:

- Loans from the Foundation to churches in the Central Texas Annual Conference totaled \$56.3 million.
- Churches and related agencies within the Central Texas Annual Conference had \$17.3 million invested with the Foundation's Methodist Loan Fund.

Throughout the state:

- As of December 31, 2008, total assets under management by the Foundation were approximately \$316.5 million.
- Methodist Loan Fund investments grew overall, including new Individual Fund accounts of \$3.1 million. Methodist Loan Fund investments support the Foundation's loan program which currently funds 429 loans to United Methodist churches and agencies. Our loan balance ended 2008 at \$267.7 million.
- The TMF Institute for Clergy and Congregational Excellence ministry (formerly the Clergy Leadership Initiative) supported 87 pastors from the Texas annual conferences participating in 10 Clergy Development Groups. The Institute also welcomed 25 District Superintendents from around the state and across the South Central Jurisdiction, and the 11 active Bishops serving in the South Central Jurisdiction who were involved in group processes. The Institute conducted three special educational events, attended by 33 pastors from the Texas annual conferences, focusing on ways to create congregational cultures of generosity.
- During 2008, the Foundation funded grants in excess of \$1.4 million including several from donor-advised funds. These grants benefited a variety of programs managed by local churches, community outreach centers, and conference ministries. The Foundation's Grants Ministry gives priority to programs that address the root causes of poverty as it affects children.
- The Foundation distributed \$495,000 from permanent endowments, predominantly to United Methodist causes in Texas.
- Our Stewardship staff consulted on 19 capital campaigns, resulting in pledges totaling more than \$11.4 million. They made more than 252 consultation visits to churches offering counsel and guidance in areas of specific need related to funding ministry. Stewardship staff also conducted 14 annual stewardship workshops in local churches and several district and conference level workshops.
- Our Development staff worked with more than 75 churches to help them initiate or revive Permanent Endowment Fund programs. Additionally, they worked with individual donors on planned gifts totaling more than \$1.1 million to benefit United Methodist churches and agencies.

The Conference Board of Trustees continues as the custodian for a nonperforming promissory note received from the sale of the Fort Worth Trinity property.

The annual review of the Conference insurance policies has been completed. We continue to monitor the property and liability insurance needs of the conference.

The Conference continues to offer to churches the opportunity to participate in a group policy for Worker's Comp, Employee Liability, and Directors, Officers and Trustees Insurance. This coverage is available through Roach, Howard, Smith and Barton in Fort Worth. Churches often find that lower rates are available through this group plan; therefore, we encourage our churches to consider this insurance option.

Conference policy requires that each church in the charge carry Workers' Compensation Insurance on pastors and other employees. If a pastor (or other worker) receives a work-related injury, health insurance will not pay on what should be a worker's compensation claim. In addition, regular liability insurance will not pay or protect a church against such a gap in coverage. Please, if you do not have workers' compensation coverage, check with our Conference agent, Roach, Howard, Smith and Barton (817-332-1313) in Fort Worth, or any agent of your choosing.

We encourage churches to survey the insurance coverage that they now have and compare it with new policies and new carriers. We remind churches that a required part of Charge Conference reporting is a report from the Trustees, which lists insurance coverage and deed recordings.

The current conference electric service contract with Reliant Energy will end on August 1, 2010. The company has decided it will not renew plans after the expiration date. Alternate carriers will be considered prior to that time.

The architectural firm of Hahnfeld, Hoffer, Stanford has been hired to access the Conference Office building needs and space planning.

The Board of Trustees expresses a special thanks to Dr. Allen Goss for his faithful service as the property officer of the Conference. He has served God and the Central Texas Conference well.

COMMISSION ON INCLUSIVENESS

Budgeted 2009: \$3,300 _____ Requested 2010: \$2,805

The United Methodist Church is a part of the church universal, which is one Body in Christ. The United Methodist Church acknowledges that all persons are of sacred worth and that we are in ministry to all. All persons shall be eligible to attend its worship services, participate in its programs, receive the sacraments, and upon baptism be admitted as baptized members. All persons, upon taking vows declaring the Christian faith and relationship in Jesus Christ, shall be eligible to become professing members in any local church in the connection. In the United Methodist Church no conference or other organizational unit of the Church shall be structured so as to exclude any member or any constituent body of the Church because of race, color, national origin, status of economic condition.

It is the basis of this definition that the Conference Commission on Inclusiveness continues to develop processes and programs that will improve our ability to commit to excellence in our interactions and fellowship in the name of our Lord and Savior.

The Commission will adopt a strategic plan for inclusiveness to be implanted in 2010. This year we are developing the plan and establishing findings and roles that will expand our ability to practice inclusiveness. The plan concepts will include data collection and training to include:



Monitoring and Review of Cross Racial, Cross Cultural, and/or Appointment of a Clergy Woman.

The Commission will collect data and evaluate whether local churches:

- Pastor and/or staff-parish committee participated in a dialogue and/or training on inclusiveness in ministry, including appointments across racial or gender lines.
- Clergy and/or lay leadership participated in an experience in a cultural/racial context different from their own.
- Pastoral staff and/or lay leadership participated in a district gathering where ideas were shared among a diverse racial, gender, economic level group of individuals.
- Participated in a pulpit exchange between churches of different cultural, racial, or gender backgrounds.
- Are currently interested in a cross-racial and/or cross-cultural appointment

Monitoring and Review of New Church and Congregational Development to attain whether local churches:

- Create ways to work with other congregations of a difference racial or cultural background for the purpose of sharing ministries and resources.

Monitoring and Review of all Ministries to attain whether they are inclusive in Nature. The Commission will collect data to attain whether local churches have the resources to:

- Provide opportunities to develop awareness and understanding of all people and cultures within their local community, such as dialogue, study or ministry.
- Provide opportunities for children and youth to interact and relate to persons of different racial or cultural backgrounds.
- Provide opportunities for congregation to experience and gain an appreciation for different forms and styles of worship, especially those that come out of a different racial/ethnic experience.

Monitoring and Review to Affirm, Develop, and Enable Ministries that Embody Justice. The Commission will collect data to attain whether local churches:

- Financially support a specific justice ministry, such as hunger, prison or jail ministry, outreach to poor or those on margins of society.
- Conduct worship services that provide opportunities to acknowledge and celebrate clergy and lay participation in ministries of justice.
- Provide opportunities for persons to share how a particular justice ministry has benefited or impacted his/her life.
- Clergy and/or lay leadership participate in dialogue or training sessions dealing with diversity.

November 13, 1931 – July 9, 2008



Joe Douglas Worley was born in Whitney, Texas on November 13, 1931. He was born into the family of Lewis A. and Pearl F. Farmer Worley. From humble beginnings, he rose serving God to the end of his days. On July 9, 2008 he was called to his eternal home.

He graduated from Meridian High School in 1951. Later that year he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force and saw duty in the Korean War. He was discharged as a Staff Sergeant in 1956 and enrolled in Texas Wesleyan College, receiving a degree in 1959. In that same year, he enrolled in Perkins School of Theology. He received a Master of Divinity in 1962.

Joe was ordained first Deacon and then Elder serving in the United Methodist Church. In 1966 he enlisted in the U.S. Army and served as Chaplain. His call took him to Thailand, Vietnam, and Germany. He also served at bases across the United States. His family remembers the compassion he had for those who serve in our Armed Forces as he walked with many through tough times and rewarding times. He retired from the Army in 1983 as a Lieutenant Colonel. Joe returned to the Central Texas Conference and served as a pastor. His charges included Silver Creek UMC, Kingswood UMC, and Cahill UMC. He retired from active pastoral service in 1993.

Upon retirement, Joe was an active member, first at Kingswood UMC and later at First UMC, Burleson. He continued to serve, taking Communion to the homebound. Those at First UMC Burleson recall that in latter years there was always a church float in the Burleson Annual 4th of July Parade. Few knew who sponsored that float. And few knew how there was always free refreshment for all of the children who came and participated in the parade. In retirement, Joe also continued his call as Chaplain in the Burleson Lions Club as he was active there as well to the end of his days.

Joe married the former Thelda Sue Chumley in 1954. To their union were born three children, Raymond Douglas, Janis Annette, and Ronald Glynn. Joe was preceded in death by his wife of 47 years; his parents; one brother; and two sisters.

A service of worship celebrating the life and ministry of Joe D. Worley was held on July 12, 2008 at First UMC, Burleson, conducted by his pastor Rev. Mike Love, Dr. Leonard Radde, and Dr. David Mosser. On July 14, Joe D. Worley was buried with honors at the Dallas / Fort Worth National Cemetery.

Joe is survived by his sons, Raymond D. Worley and family of Waynesville, Mo., and Ronald G. Worley of Burleson; daughter Janis A. Argo and family of Burleson; brothers, Edwin and James Worley, both of Cleburne; five grandchildren; and three great grandchildren.

XI. Standing Rules

I. ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Conference Procedure

- 1.0 The Central Texas Conference shall be organized according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶¶ 33, 34) and shall meet annually at the time appointed by the Bishop (2008 ¶ 603.2) and the place chosen by the Conference (2008 ¶603.3).
- 1.1 Adjourned or special sessions shall be called in the manner set forth in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶603.5). The business of the Annual Conference shall be conducted according to the current edition of Roberts Rules of Order. There shall be a Preliminary Report that shall include all matters for consideration by a session of Annual Conference received in accordance with the Conference Calendar. The Preliminary Report shall be mailed to the members of the Annual Conference at least one month prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
- 1.3 Lay members and alternate lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected at the Charge Conference for a one-year term to begin on January 1, following their election, subject however, to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶602.4).
- 1.3.1 To equalize the number of lay and clergy members of the Annual Conference, the following will be members by virtue of the offices held: each District Lay Leader, each District United Methodist Women's President, each District United Methodist Men's President, each District Student Leadership Team President or designee and one additional youth officer appointed by the District Student Leadership Team, any chair of any Annual Conference board, council, commission or committee, the Directors of the Stewardship, Finance and Administration and Commission on Church Growth and Development (CG&D), and the Director and associate Directors of the Annual Conference Mission Ministries who is a lay not otherwise a member, the Conference archivist/historian who is not otherwise a member, and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, General Council on Ministries and General Church board and agency representatives not otherwise members of the Annual Conference; and one additional lay member from the charges of the Conference whose membership is above the number, set annually by the Conference secretary required to equalize the ratio between clergy and lay members. This figure will be revised annually. The Conference secretary will notify each District Superintendent by September 1 as to the churches that will elect additional members preceding the next Annual Conference. Each charge of the Annual Conference is responsible for defraying expenses of its lay and clergy members while in attendance at the Conference. All resolutions and petitions for consideration of Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Conference Secretary by 30 days prior to the deadline set for inclusion in the Preliminary Report prior to regular session of Annual Conference. These resolutions and petitions shall then be sent by the Conference Secretary to the appropriate standing body. The appropriate standing body shall then report a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions to the Annual Conference.
- 1.4.1 All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference in session which pertain to the work of one of its standing bodies, and which were not received and duly processed so as to be printed in the Preliminary Report, shall be referred to the Conference Secretary and then to a Legislative Committee of the corresponding standing body consisting of its members present at the Conference, chaired by its chair or designee, and shall be reported back to the Conference with recommendation for concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions prior to the close of the Conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.
- 1.4.2 All other papers, resolutions or reports presented to Annual Conference which may not pertain directly to the work of one of its standing bodies must also be referred to the Conference Secretary and then to a study committee nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference and shall be reported back to the Conference with recommendation for concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions prior to the close of the Conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.
- 1.5 All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports coming to the Conference, not included in the preliminary report, must be typewritten in triplicate and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the secretary before they are presented to the Conference. Any reports requiring approval of the

Annual Conference, not in the preliminary report, shall be reproduced for members of the Conference by the proponent so that all may follow the report as it is being presented.

- 1.6 Per diem allowance for each day in actual attendance at Annual Conference will be granted, according to their status when they arrive at Annual Conference, to retired clergy, retired diaconal ministers, retired deaconesses, ministers' surviving spouses, pastors receiving a total compensation of, or less than the minimum compensation of the Conference, students appointed to attend school, and ministers on disability leave.
- 1.7 There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the secretary of the Conference and the secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of the deceased clergy, widows or widowers of clergy. The clergy in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing it with the committee immediately after the funeral.
- 1.8 Any of the standing rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference, provided that any motion to amend the Conference standing rules must lie on the table at least one day before the Conference can vote to amend.
- 1.9 Vacancies on all Conference boards, councils, commissions, teams, and committees shall be filled by nominations and selected by the appropriate body. Those persons elected to fill vacancies shall serve the remainder of the tenure of the original member. A person who has been elected to fill an unexpired term of four years or less may be nominated to serve an additional four year term, provided the total tenure does not extend beyond eight consecutive years. However, when the chair of the committee is a district representative who has been transferred to another district and, in the opinion of the appropriate body, unusual circumstances require the continued services of such chair, the body shall have the right to retain that person in its membership for the remainder of that person's tenure. Such persons shall not be counted as district representatives.
- 1.9.1 Any member of the Conference boards, councils, commissions, teams, and committees who is absent without excuse from any two consecutive meetings of the board, council, commission, team, or committee shall thereby forfeit membership on the agency and their vacancy shall be filled in accordance with 1.9 above.
- 1.9.2 Vacancies, that require Annual Conference Committee on Nominations action to fill, which occur between the sessions of Annual Conference, may be selected by the related body, must be approved by the Conference Executive Ministry Team, and ratified by the Conference Committee on Nominations. All persons being nominated shall be contacted by the selecting body prior to nomination to determine their willingness to serve.
- 1.10 Members of General and Jurisdictional boards, councils, commissions, or committees within the Annual Conference shall be ex officio members of corresponding Conference agencies. Boards, councils, commissions, committees, teams, and other groups formed by Annual Conference must organize within 21 days of the closing session of Annual Conference, and report their officers to the Office of Stewardship, Finance and Administration by July 1 of that year. Mailing lists maintained by Conference and District offices shall be used only for purposes of mailings relating to Conference business.

II. CONFERENCE ORGANIZATION

Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team

- 1.0 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team will be a coordinating body that will provide "clear checks and balances regarding program functions and financial/administration functions within the Annual Conference" (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶ 610.1). It shall assist the Annual Conference in "structuring its ministries and administrative procedures in order to accomplish its purpose. In so doing it shall provide for the connectional relationship of the local church, district, and Conference with the general agencies.
- 1.1 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team shall provide for planning and research in the continuing ministry of The United Methodist Church within the Conference; serve as the clearing house for all planning and research projects under the sponsorship of the Annual Conference and its agencies; relate to and cooperate with the planning research projects of the General Council on Ministries.
- 1.2 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team will monitor to ensure inclusiveness – racial,

gender, age, and people with disabilities – in the Annual Conference” (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶610). It will meet at least twice annually – once in the Fall and once in the Spring. It may meet additionally as needed.

- 1.3 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team will be comprised of the three officers of the Administrative Leadership Team, the three officers of the Mission Leadership Team, three at-large members selected for balance and expertise – all of whom will be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference quadrennially, or as needed annually for vacancies. The residing Bishop shall chair the Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team. A vice-chair and secretary shall be elected from the team at the first meeting of the new quadrennium. Additional voting members of the team will include two District Superintendents (selected by the Cabinet), the Conference Lay Leader, the Chair of the Commission on Inclusiveness and the three Conference Executive Directors. This Executive Ministry Team will give overall supervision to the Annual Conference boards, councils, commissions, teams, and committees, utilizing the Administrative Leadership Team and the Mission Leadership Team for further coordination and supervision.
- 1.4 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team reports directly to the Annual Conference. It may do that directly or through one or more of the representative bodies in the organizational structure.

Conference Administrative Leadership Team

- 1.0 The Conference Administrative Leadership Team shall function as a resource and support for the Annual Conference boards, councils, commissions and committees.
- 1.1 The Administrative Leadership Team shall meet one time each year in the spring (determined by the leadership team itself).
- 1.2 The membership shall be composed of the chairs/presidents of each of the boards, commissions and committees excluding the Committee on Investigation, Administrative Review Committee, Joint Committee on Incapacity, Minutes, the Agenda Committee, and the Commission on Communications. The chair, vice chair and secretary will be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. The Bishop, one Cabinet representative and three Conference Directors shall serve as ex officio members.

Committee on the Agenda

- 3.0 There shall be a Committee on the Agenda to prepare the agenda for the Annual Conference and submit it to the Conference for adoption.
- 3.1 The membership shall be composed of the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the Conference Lay Leader, the president of the Conference United Methodist Women, the President of the Conference United Methodist Men, Conference Parliamentarian, the Conference Director of Communications, the President and one other youth representative from the Conference Student Leadership Team, the chairs of the Conference boards, the chair of the Conference Mission Leadership Team, host pastor, local arrangements chair, and worship chair. The Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Conference Director of Church Growth & Development and the Conference Director/secretary of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall serve without vote.
- 3.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect its own officers quadrennially.
- 3.3 The executive Committee shall include the chair, vice-chair, secretary, Bishop, Lay Leader, host District Superintendent, host pastor, local arrangements chair, worship chair, and the Directors of Mission Ministries and SFA without vote.
- 3.4 The Committee shall present to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, prior to the Conference session, a detailed estimate of the expenses of the Conference, including per diem allowance.

Commission on Archives and History

- 4.0 There shall be a Commission on Archives and History, consisting of one lay and one clergy elected by each District Conference. Six at-large members shall be added by nomination of the retiring chair of the commission and elected by the Annual Conference. No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms. The commission shall have a chair, a vice-chair, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected as outlined in Section II, ¶¶ 16.2a and 16.7 for a

four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium. The commission shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641) and other responsibilities as delegated to it by the Annual Conference.

- 4.1 The Conference Committee on Nominations may nominate a Conference archivist/historian to be elected by the Annual Conference, as permitted in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641). The Annual Conference archivist/historian shall serve with non-expiring term of office and shall be a voting member of the Conference Commission on Archives and History.
- 4.2 The Commission on Archives and History will retain the cornerstones of all Central Texas abandoned churches and the United Methodist Historical Marker Plaque (if the church received one) of all Central Texas abandoned churches.

Commission on Church Growth and Development

- 5.0 There shall be a Commission on Church Growth and Development to carry out the functions set forth on pages 147-150 of the 1980 Journal of the Central Texas Conference as amended.
- 5.1 The membership of the commission shall consist of elected members: one clergy from each District and one lay from each District nominated by the District Committee on Nominations and elected by the District Conference for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium and eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years; two persons of ethnic background, two women if not already represented, two at large lay and two at large clergy nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium and eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years; ex officio members: the Bishop; the District Superintendents; the chair of the Central Texas Conference Foundation, without vote; the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration; the Director of the Conference Mission Ministries; the Conference Lay Leader; the President of the Conference United Methodist Men; the President of the Conference United Methodist Women; the chair of the Conference Outreach Council; the chair of the Conference Board of Trustees; the executive Director of the commission, without vote; the Missionary for Hispanic Ministries, without vote; and the Director of the Texas Methodist Foundation, without vote. Additional lay members: if needed, shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference to ensure inclusion of persons with expertise in the areas of finance, architecture, real estate, building construction, law, and ethnic minority congregational development.
- 5.2 The commission shall elect from its members the following officers: chair, vice-chair, and secretary.
- 5.3 There shall be at least two standing committees: the Committee on Church Extension; the Committee on Finance, with other committees named by the chair as needed.

Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns

- 6.0 There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns which shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶642).
- 6.1 Each quadrennium, members shall be elected for a four-year term. Members are eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years. The officers (3) chair, vice chair and secretary and any additional members will be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations.

Committee on Counseling

- 7.0 There shall be a Committee on Counseling elected by the Annual Conference for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium.
- 7.1 The committee shall be composed of five members. Two shall be nominated by the Board of Ordained Ministry and three shall be nominated by the Bishop.
- 7.2 The purpose of the Committee on Counseling will be to monitor the counseling program on a regular basis and make an annual evaluation of the performance of the counselors, and secure counselors as needed.
- 7.3 The chair of the committee, who shall be nominated and elected by the committee, will be charged with the responsibility of carrying out the administrative responsibilities of the committee.

Committee on the Episcopacy

- 8.0 There shall be a Conference Committee on the Episcopacy that shall be elected, organized and

function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶637).

Episcopal Residence Committee

9.0 There shall be a Conference Episcopal Residence Committee that shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶638).

Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits

- 10.0 There shall be a Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits which shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶625).
- 10.1 The commission shall be composed of 14 members, seven lay and seven clergy persons, all of whom shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. In addition, one District Superintendent named by the Cabinet shall be a member.
- 10.2 The body shall be divided into two classes. Members shall be elected for a four-year term and may succeed themselves one time
- 10.3 Officers shall be nominated and elected by the members of the commission for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium.
- 10.4 The commission shall provide for a regular review of the standards for clergy vacation, days off, housing, moving expenses, continuing education and such additional benefits as appropriate or as the Annual Conference may direct.
- 10.5 The commission shall devise and implement a process for the standards to be presented to the local church at least annually through the charge Conference and as many other opportunities as appropriate but not limited to District Staff Parish Relations training events, SPR consultations and the Start-Up Seminar.

Council on Finance and Administration

- 11.0 There shall be a Conference Council on Finance and Administration which shall be composed of seven clergy and eight lay, with at least one lay from each District. The following shall be ex officio members of the council: the Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration, without vote; any members of the General or Jurisdictional Council on Finance and Administration who reside within the bounds of the Conference, with vote, unless voting membership is in conflict with another provision of the Book of Discipline, in which case membership shall be without vote; in either case, they shall not be eligible to serve on any agency receiving funds; the presiding Bishop, without vote; a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet, without vote; the Conference Director or another representative of the Conference Mission Ministries, without vote; the Director of Church Growth and Development, without vote; and the Conference Lay Leader, without vote. The council shall have a president, a vice-president and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the members of the council. The council shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶¶611-619) and such other responsibilities as may be delegated to it by the Annual Conference.
- 11.1 Members shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years to coincide with the quadrennium and are eligible for re-election for one additional four-year term. The Committee on Nominations is encouraged to assure that, insofar as possible, the membership will have a balance of men/women and racial/ethnic makeup. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each., Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term of office and shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium

Commission on Inclusiveness

- 12.0 There shall be a Commission on Inclusiveness following the general guidelines of the 2004 General Conference mandates.
- 12.1 The Commission on Inclusiveness will replace and will address all areas and requirements of the Commission on Religion and Race, Native American Ministries and the Commission on the Status and Role of Women as stated in 2008 *Discipline* ¶¶643, 644 and 654. The membership shall consist of the Bishop and the Director of Mission Ministries, without vote; the three officers (chair must be a women ¶644.3 2008 Discipline, vice-chair and secretary) nominated by the Conference Committee

on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference; Conference Lay Leader, President of the UMM, UMW and Conference Student Leadership Team; 3 minority clergy (2 female and one male); 4 minority lay (2 female and 2 male); 5 at-large (3 female and 2 male) to ensure racial/ethnic balance; and one young adult all nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. All General and/or Jurisdictional members that relate to GR&R and GCOSROW and one Mission Ministries Associate Director.

- 12.2 Members shall be elected for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium, and may succeed themselves one time for a total of 8 consecutive years. All members should be selected for their interest, expertise, and with concern for ethnic and age balance in representation. The Commission will select a representative to serve on the Nurture Mission Council and a representative recommended annually, to serve on the Conference Committee on Nominations. The chair of the Commission will be a member of the Mission Leadership Team.

Committee on Investigation

- 13.0 There shall be a Committee on Investigation for Ordained Clergy in accordance with the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶2703.2).
- 13.1 There shall be a Committee on Investigation for Diaconal Ministers in accordance with the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶2703.3).

Board of Laity

- 14.0 The Board of Laity shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶631.3) and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Discipleship and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.
- 14.1 The Conference Lay Leader, serving as chair of the Conference Board of Laity, shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a period not to exceed four years and to coincide with the quadrennium
- 14.2 An associate Conference Lay Leader serving in roles coordinated by the Conference Lay Leader and the Bishop, shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations for a period of four years to coincide with the quadrennium.

Committee on Minutes

- 15.0 There shall be a Committee on Minutes to read, **record** and approve the proceedings of the Annual Conference after the final session. The members shall be two clergy and two lay who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected annually by the Annual Conference. A chair to be appointed by the Bishop will serve the full quadrennium.

Annual Conference Committee on Nominations

- 16.0 There shall be an Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. It shall be the purpose of the committee to seek out and enlist the services of the best qualified persons available within the Annual Conference to fill various positions for which it is to make nominations.
- 16.1 The membership shall be the Bishop, who shall be the chair, the District Superintendents, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference Presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and the Conference Student Leadership Team, the District Lay Leaders, one other youth representative recommended annually by the Conference Student Leadership Team, a representative recommended annually by the Commission on Inclusiveness, and three clergy at-large elected annually upon nomination by the Conference Committee on Nominations; chair of the Administrative Leadership Team; and chair of the Mission Leadership Team.
- 16.1.1 The Annual Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Director of Church Growth and Development, and the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be members of the Conference Committee on Nominations without vote. The Director of Mission Ministries shall serve as vice-chair and secretary.
- 16.2 The Conference Committee on Nominations procedure for officers of boards, councils or agencies of the Conference as required by the Discipline and/or Standing rules shall be:
- a. The respective boards and agencies shall nominate their own officers and present the names to the Committee on Nominations prior to February 10 of the year in which they shall be elected; except for the chair as outlined in Section II, 16.7.



- b. The Committee on Nominations shall review the nominations for diversity and inclusiveness;
 - c. The Committee on Nominations may return the nominations to the boards and agencies with possible recommendations for further review and resubmission;
 - d. The Committee on Nominations shall have ultimate authority to submit nominations to the Annual Conference in order to achieve appropriate age, ethnic, gender, District and expertise representation.
 - e. When the nominations are complete, the Committee on Nominations shall present the names of the officers of the respective boards and agencies to the Annual Conference for election.
- 16.3 The Committee on Nominations shall make nominations to the Annual Conference as may be necessary for the following positions: Conference Lay Leader, associate Conference Lay Leader, the Chairs, Vice Chairs and Secretaries for the Conference Administrative Leadership Team, Nurture Mission Council, Outreach Mission Council, Witness Mission Council, Conference Mission Leadership Team, the Commission on Inclusiveness, the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Conference Student Leadership Coordinator; membership on Council on Finance and Administration, Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits, Pensions, Trustees, Minutes, and Rules; additional membership as required for Commission on Communication and Interpretation, Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Commission on Church Growth and Development, Commission on Inclusiveness, Nominations and Personnel. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate such other persons as may be required by the Annual, Jurisdictional or General Conference and related ecumenical bodies. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate a representative from a major urban agency to serve on the Outreach Mission Council. No person shall serve as an elected member of more than one of the Annual Conference Standing bodies at one time, unless necessary for age, ethnic, gender, District or expertise representation.
- 16.4 The nomination procedure shall be as follows:
- a. Prior to February 1st of each year, the Conference office shall make available to each District Superintendent a listing of all positions for which District nominations are solicited for consideration by the Conference Committee on Nominations to appear on the slate that will be presented at the ensuing Annual Conference session;
 - b. Prior to February 10th, the District Superintendents of the respective Districts shall distribute to the local church Lay Leaders and to the pastors of the respective Districts the listing of all positions for which District nominations are being solicited from the local churches for positions to be elected at the ensuing Annual Conference session. Talent Bank Forms will be provided for completion on candidates whose names are submitted. Emphasis shall be on developing a pool of qualified nominees noting their areas of interest rather than being nominated for a specific position;
 - c. Prior to February 10th, the Conference Commission on Inclusiveness shall develop a list of Ethnic candidates that shall include names, addresses, telephone numbers, local church membership and biographical information including talents, interests, and church leadership experience. This list shall be provided to the District Nominating Committees prior to their annual spring meeting;
 - d. Prior to February 10th, the Executive Committee of each Annual Conference Standing body may develop a list of candidates with special interest and capability who may serve as members of that Standing Body. The list shall include names, addresses, telephone numbers, local church membership and biographical information including talents, interests, and church leadership experience indicated on Talent Bank forms. These forms shall be provided to the District Committee on Nominations prior to the annual spring meeting;
 - e. Prior to February 10th, Annual Conference Staff serving as liaison to Annual Conference Standing Bodies may develop a list of candidates with special interest and capability who may serve as members of that Standing Body. The list shall include names, addresses, telephone numbers, local church membership and biographical information including talents, interest, and church leadership experience indicated on Talent Bank forms. These forms shall be provided to the District Committee on Nominations prior to the annual spring meeting;
 - f. Prior to March 15th, the District Committee on Nominations will meet for the purpose of preparing District nominations for all positions in question, taking into consideration the names submitted by local churches. The District Committee, however, shall make nominations of only persons it feels are adequately equipped for the task and may elect to not make nominations in those cases where it feels minimum qualifications for the positions in question are not present. All persons being considered for a position in the Annual Conference shall be contacted by the District Committee on

Nominations before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibilities of the position and whether or not they are willing to serve, if nominated and elected. Emphasis shall be on developing a pool of qualified nominees noting their areas of interest rather than being nominated for a specific position. The District Committee is encouraged to act as a recruiting agency to seek out qualified nominees who may not put their own names forward;

- g. Prior to April 1, the District Committee on Nominations shall submit to the Conference Mission Ministries office the list of its nominations with completed Talent Bank forms. All District nominations shall be compiled and circulated to the members of the Conference Committee on Nominations at least ten days prior to its initial session;
 - h. Prior to May 10th, the Conference Committee on Nominations shall meet for the purpose of preparing a list of nominees for all positions which must be filled by the next Annual Conference. The Conference Committee will seek to match names from the pool submitted to the available positions in order to put the best qualified persons in those positions, taking into account the need for ethnic, gender, age, and geographical balance. No person is eligible for re-election to the same office and shall not be counted as District representatives.
 - i. All persons being considered for a position in the Annual Conference shall be contacted in writing by the Conference Committee on Nominations before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibility of the position and whether or not they are willing to serve, if elected.
- 16.4.1 Prior to April 1, all agencies and institutions related to the Annual Conference shall submit to the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations their nominations of persons to be elected by the Central Texas Conference to serve on their boards of Directors or trustees.
- 16.5 It is recommended that insofar as possible, the membership on leadership teams, councils, boards, and agencies of the Annual Conference shall be representative of the Conference's Districts-except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- 16.6 All Annual Conference Standing Bodies shall have the right to add up to four additional persons to their membership in addition to other Conference guidelines, in order to ensure age, gender, ethnic, District and expertise representation.
- 16.7 The chair of Commission on Communications and the Commission on Archives and History will be elected at the Annual Conference preceding the next General Conference unless prohibited by the *Discipline*. If not already serving on the body, they will serve as ex-officio members of their respective standing body for one year prior to their taking office in the new quadrennium. All other members of the [standing bodies] will be elected and begin membership at the first Annual Conference following the General Conference
- 16.8 All nominations shall be for a quadrennium that corresponds with General Conference except if this is in violation of the *Discipline* or with special Annual Conference approval.

Board of Ordained Ministry

- 17.0 The Board of Ordained Ministry shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶635).
- 17.1 Members shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years to coincide with the quadrennium and are eligible for re-election for two additional four-year terms. The members shall be divided into three classes of four years each. Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term of office and shall be eligible for two additional quadrenniums.

Board of Pensions

- 18.0 The Board of Pensions shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline. (2008 ¶639) A Cabinet representative shall be selected by the Cabinet as an additional member.
- 18.1 The elected body shall be divided into two classes. Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term, and shall be eligible for election for one additional four-year term.

Personnel Committee

- 19.0 There shall be a Central Texas Conference Personnel Committee whose membership will be composed of the following: Bishop, the Annual Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Director of Church Growth and Development, the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration, without vote and twelve additional persons, equal lay and clergy, nominated by the

Conference Committee on Nominations. Members shall be elected for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium and eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years. Membership shall be divided into two rotating classes. Officers shall be nominated and elected by the members of the Personnel Committee for a four year period to coincide with the quadrennium. The chair position shall alternate quadrennially between lay and clergy. The Committee on Nominations will take care to ensure gender, race and age representation.

- 19.1 The committee shall organize itself in a manner which it deems necessary to fulfill its mandate as the Personnel Committee of the Conference Mission Ministries, the Council on Finance and Administration, the Commission on Church Growth and Development, the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Commission on Archives and History, the Director of Glen Lake Camp & Retreat Center and the Board of Pensions avoiding conflict with the Book of Discipline.
- 19.2 The committee shall receive personnel recommendations from Mission Ministries, the Council on Finance and Administration, the Commission on Church Growth and Development, the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Commission on Archives and History, and the Board of Pensions. The work of the committee will in no way interfere with the prerogative of Disciplinary mandates concerning the nominations of the Director of the Mission Ministries or the Conference Treasurer nor with existing Conference Standing Rules.
- 19.3 The committee shall recommend to the Annual Conference the structure and personnel in the Conference which is necessary to fulfill the stated mission of the Annual Conference. (Refer to Standing Rule: IV., 1.2).
- 19.4 The committee shall have oversight of an annual review and evaluation process for all Annual Conference staff members in whatever manner it deems necessary to assure the integrity of the staff as a whole and as individuals.
- 19.5 The committee shall recommend to the appropriate entities proposals for salary, travel expense, health & life insurance, pension, housing (where applicable), and other practical matters affecting the work, health, and families of the Conference staff.
- 19.6 The committee shall maintain a personnel policy handbook for the purpose of addressing issues such as vacation time, leave of absence, sick leave, pregnancy leave (for male and female) and other matters germane to the employment of personnel.
- 19.7 The committee shall be responsible for maintaining current job descriptions for all members of the Conference staff. These will be kept in a secure place in the Conference office. (Refer to 2008 Discipline ¶ 608 for ACCOM (Mission Ministries) Director; ¶ 619 for Conference Treasurer; ¶ 603.7 for Conference Secretary; Standing Rules Page 288 of 1991 Journal - CG&D and Page 290 III 1.0 through 1.2)
- 19.8 The committee shall have responsibility to conduct grievance hearings for issues which in-house management has been unable to resolve and to conduct exit interviews for staff members who are leaving for any reason.
- 19.9 The committee shall be responsible for creating and maintaining uniform hiring and exiting procedures to be used by Conference Directors.

Committee on Rules, Policies and Guidelines

- 20.0 There shall be a Conference Committee on Rules, Policies and Guidelines to develop, define, and interpret the standing rules, policies and guidelines of the Annual Conference. The committee shall be responsible for producing and keeping current a manual of the standing rules, policies and guidelines of the Annual Conference.
- 20.1 It is recommended that the membership consist of three laymen, three laywomen, and three clergy, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. The elected body shall be divided into two classes. Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term, but may be reelected for one subsequent four-year term. Additional members, without vote, shall be a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet and the secretary of the Conference.
- 20.2 There shall be a chair, a vice-chair, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the membership of the Rules Committee. The cabinet representative shall convene the committee for the purpose of electing its officers.

Board of Trustees

- 21.0 There shall be a Conference Board of Trustees with duties and responsibilities as outlined in the

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Book of Discipline (2008 ¶2512).

- 21.1 The membership shall consist of twelve persons of legal age. Four shall be clergy in the effective relation in the Conference and eight shall be lay in good standing within local churches within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference and a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet as an observer.

United Methodist Men

- 22.0 The United Methodist Men shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Nurture Council and shall report directly to the Annual Conference (2008 ¶648).

United Methodist Women

- 23.0 The United Methodist Women shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Outreach Council and shall report directly to the Annual Conference (2008 ¶647).

Student Leadership Team

- 24.0 The Conference Student Leadership Team shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶649) and the by-laws of the Conference Student Leadership Team as printed in the 2004 Conference Journal (CCYM report).

Safe Sanctuary Policy Interpreters

- 25.0 The Safe Sanctuary Policy Interpreters for Central Texas Conference will be comprised of three persons initially appointed by the Bishop and Extended Cabinet serving from 2007-2012. Thereafter, they shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference quadrennially. A chairperson shall be elected from the three at the first meeting of the new quadrennium. Persons may succeed themselves one time for a total of 8 consecutive years. When vacancies occur, the Executive Ministry Leadership Team will appoint a person to fill the term between conference years. The interpreter's work is clarification, interpretation, education, as well as hearing concerns and making recommendations for future alternations to our CTC Safe Sanctuary policy. Their rulings are the definitive answer concerning conference events.

III. ANNUAL CONFERENCE MISSION MINISTRIES

Conference Mission Leadership Team

There shall be a Conference Mission Leadership Team (formerly called ACCOM) as recommended and detailed by the 2008 *Book of Discipline* ¶608.

- 1.1 The purpose of the Mission Leadership Team hereafter referred to as MLT is to focus and guide the mission and ministry of the United Methodist Church within the Central Texas Conference by: 1. envisioning the ministries necessary to live out the mission of the church in and through the Annual Conference; 2. creating and nurturing relationships and connections among the local, District, Annual Conference, and general church ministries; 3. providing encouragement, coordination and support for the ministries of nurture, outreach and witness in Districts and congregations for the transformation of the world; 4. ensuring the alignment of the total resources of the Annual Conference to its mission; 5. developing and strengthening ethnic ministries, including ethnic local church concerns; providing for advocacy and monitoring functions to ensure that the church is consistent with its stated values.
- 1.2 The Conference MLT shall be composed of the presiding Bishop, without vote; the officers of the MLT nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations; one District Superintendent, selected by the Cabinet; Conference Lay Leader, without vote; President of the UMM; President of the UMW; Directors of Mission Ministries, SFA and Church Growth & Development without vote; associate Directors of Mission Ministries, without a vote; the President of the Conference Student Leadership Team; the Conference Student Leadership Coordinator, the chairs of the Councils on Nurture, Outreach and Witness (3); the chair of the Commission on Inclusiveness; the chair of the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns; the chair of each District Leadership

Team or District representative; members of the General Council on Ministries and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries; General Church board and agency representatives not otherwise members of Conference Mission Leadership Team; and four members at-large, who shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference, as needed to provide sensitivity to inclusion of appropriate age, gender, ethnic, and expertise representation and to ensure equal lay and clergy membership. At-large members shall serve for all or part of one quadrennium and may succeed themselves one time.

- 1.3 The officers of the MLT shall be a chair, a vice-chair and a secretary nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. If the chair is a lay, the vice-chair shall be clergy and vice versa.
- 1.4 The Annual Conference MLT shall (a) receive reports and recommendations from the Conference councils and agencies of the Conference MLT; (b) serve as the budget committee for the Conference Mission Ministries; and (3) propose the agenda for the meetings of the MLT.
- 1.5 The MLT shall: (a) review program and funding criteria and goals for every Conference Mission Ministry program council and agency; (b) recommend programs to the Annual Conference; (c) forward all requests to CF&A for funding and; (d) have responsibility for setting and implementing goals.

Program Councils:

- 2.0 There shall be three Conference program councils within the Annual Conference Mission Ministries: the Nurture Mission Council which carries out the mandates of the Board of Discipleship and the Commission on Ethnic Local Church Concerns, Outreach Mission Council which carries out the mandates of the Board Church and Society and the Board of Global Ministries and Witness Mission Council which carries out the mandates of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the Committee on Evangelism.
- 3.0 These councils shall be composed of the officers and District representatives and other such persons as may be mandated by the *Discipline*. It is recommended that there be one layman, one lay woman, one clergy, and one youth representative from District representation; and four-six members at-large on each council to be nominated by the Conference Mission Leadership Team as it may be determined necessary by the Conference Mission Leadership Team to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation. The District representatives and at-large members shall be eligible for re-election for an additional four-year term on all programs of the council.
- 3.1 The Conference Director of Mission Ministries and associate Directors shall be members of an assigned Mission Council without vote.
- 3.2 Each council shall have a chair, a vice-chair and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the Conference Committee on Nominations for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium. If the chair is a lay, the vice-chair shall be clergy and vice versa. The chair position of the councils shall alternate quadrennially between lay and clergy.
- 3.3 The Conference Mission Councils will provide consultative service and resources to the local churches, the District mission councils, the Annual Conference, and the Annual Conference Mission Leadership Team. Each council will be responsible for the essential function of the area of concern assigned to it by the Annual Conference and will be related to the objectives and scope of that work.
- 3.4 Each Council will have an executive body composed of the officers and at least two additional members elected by the Council from its District representatives.
- 3.5 Each Council will meet quarterly or as needed.
- 3.6 Each Council will develop Task Forces as needed to address specific needs and functions.
- 4.0 The Conference Nurture Mission Council will have 9 District representatives selected from a District pool by the MLT and may have four at large if it is determined necessary by the MLT to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation, and additional members may be the Coordinator for Spiritual Growth of the Conference United Methodist Women, the President of the Student Leadership Team, the Resource Center Director and the chair of the Board of Directors of Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center. There will be a representative selected from the Commission on Inclusiveness, and a representative selected from the Emmaus Board of Directors. The Director of Glen Lake Camp shall be a member of the council without vote.
- 4.0.a. The Nurture Mission Council will be responsible at the Conference level for the objectives and scope of work set forth for all the functions of the General Board of Discipleship (2008 Book of Discipline,

¶630). The council shall relate to all Conference agencies for the implementation of the Conference's comprehensive plan for Ethnic Local Church Concerns (1990 journal, pages 201-205).

- 4.1 The Conference Outreach Mission Council will have 10 District representatives selected from a District pool by the MLT and may have six at large if it is determined necessary by the MLT to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation, and additional members may be the Mission Coordinator of Social Action of the Conference United Methodist Women, the Mission Coordinator of Christian Education and Interpretation of the Conference United Methodist Women, the Director of Humanitarian Services, the Coordinator of CTCYM, the Conference secretary of Global Ministries, and a representative from a major urban agency recommended by the Conference Committee on Nominations.
 - 4.1.a. The Outreach Mission Council will be responsible at the Conference level for the objectives and scope of work set forth for all the functions of the General Board of Global Ministries (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶633) including Small Membership Church (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶645), Disability Concerns (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶653), Mission Personnel (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶1313.6) and the General Board of Church and Society (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶629).
- 4.2 The Conference Witness Mission Council will have 9 District representatives selected from a District pool by the MLT and may have four at large if it is determined necessary by the MLT to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation, and additional members may be the Mission Coordinator of Membership, Nurture and Outreach of the Conference United Methodist Women, Conference Director of Lay Speaking, Conference Chair of Communications, and one Central Texas Conference campus minister chosen by peers.
 - 4.2.a. The Witness Mission Council will be responsible at the Conference level for the objectives and scope of work set forth for all the functions of the General Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶634).

Commission on Communications

- 5.0 The Commission on Communications shall (a) recommend policies that will enable the Conference, the District, and the local churches, and their agencies to make use of all communications help; (b) make available to the Conference specialized communications resources, especially in the fields of broadcasting and audiovisuals; (c) promote principles of good communication within the Conference to provide two-way channels of communications between each Annual Conference agency, District Mission Leadership Team and local church, and to lead the Conference in making creative use of communications and opportunities offered by modern media, including Conference and General Church periodicals and resources; (d) provide communications training opportunities for leaders in the Annual Conference and local churches; (e) interpret the programs of the General Church and the Annual Conference to the local churches and promote all general and Conference benevolent causes in cooperation with United Methodist Communications.
- 5.1 Members shall be a chair, a vice-chair and a secretary, Student Leadership Team representative, and eight additional members at-large nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. The Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Conference Director of Communications, the Conference Director of Finance and Administration, the Director of Church Growth and Development, the Director of Information Technology, and a Cabinet representative shall be members without vote. Officers shall be nominated and elected as outlined in Section II, ¶16.2a and 16.7 for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium.

Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center Board of Directors

- 6.0 The members shall include fifteen (15) clergy and laity in three rotating classes. Utilizing ¶610.5 from The 2008 Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church as guidelines, each class shall be nominated by the Board of Directors; presented to the Conference Nominations Committee and voted upon by the Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church within whose bounds said premises are located. Additional ex-officio members with voice, but no vote would include: Executive Director of Glen Lake Camp & Retreat Center, Director of Mission Ministries, Associate Director of Mission Ministries, and the Chair of Nurture Council

- 6.1 Each year, at the first meeting after Annual Conference; the Board of Directors, by a majority vote of Directors entitled to vote, shall elect officers consisting of a chair, vice-chair, and secretary. The Executive Committee consisting of the officers, the Director of Mission Ministries and the Executive Director of Glen Lake, shall have and exercise, between meetings of the Board of Directors, the authority of the Board of Directors in the management of Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center.
- 6.2 All Board members will be asked to serve a three (3) year term starting immediately after the annual meeting of said Conference of the United Methodist Church. Two terms of service can be served consecutively, and then a year must be taken off before serving on the Board. If a Director is selected to fill a vacancy after the first year of an unexpired term, the Partial Term served by such Director shall not be considered when determining the limit on terms set forth above.

IV. CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION

Administrative Personnel of the Annual Conference

- 1.0 There shall be three Conference executive staff positions: Director of the Conference Mission Ministries; Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration; and Director of the Commission on Church Growth and Development.
- 1.1 A clergy may not be appointed to serve as an executive staff member of the Annual Conference for more than eight years in any consecutive 12 years. No clergy shall serve as an executive staff member more than 12 years.
- 1.2 Any proposal to increase or change the structure of the Conference executive staff of the Annual Conference shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference. No appointment predicated on the creation of such new or changed staff position shall be made, tentatively or finally, until the same is approved by the Annual Conference.

Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration

- 2.0 The Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be nominated by the Council on Finance and Administration, after consulting with the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference.
- 2.1 The Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be under the supervision of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. The Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall serve as the stewardship advocate for the Annual Conference, Conference secretary, Conference treasurer, Conference pension officer and treasurer for the Board of Pensions, treasurer of the Commission on Equitable Compensation and manager of the Conference Center building.
- 2.2 The tenure of office for a clergy member of the Conference serving as the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be for a quadrennium. A newly elected Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall ordinarily assume official duties at the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference.
- 2.3 All bonds required by the law of The United Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference shall be filed with the secretary of the Conference. The bond for the Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be approved by the Bishop and the Cabinet and filed in the Bishop's office.
- 2.4 The Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall nominate to the Annual Conference such staff as needed to conduct the daily proceedings of the Annual Conference.
- 2.5 The job description of the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration may be modified upon recommendation of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration and approval of the Annual Conference in regular or called session.

V. FINANCIAL

- 1.0 The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1st to December 31st, and salaries of clergy members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.
- 2.0 Apportionment payments, askings, special day offerings, advance specials, and other missional gifts

remitted from a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer shall be accompanied by the current year remittance forms supplied by the Council on Finance and Administration. These forms shall indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause and the total must match the amount remitted. The Conference Treasurer shall post on-line in a timely fashion remittances received. Monthly the Conference Treasurer shall report to the District Superintendents and the Bishop the status of funds remitted. The pastor shall enclose the annual statement of receipts as issued by the Conference treasurer, corrected if necessary, with the church's Annual Conference Report as verification of items reported in Table II.

- 3.0 After careful consideration of all financial responsibilities of the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration, with three liaison representatives selected by the Annual Conference Mission Ministries, meeting with the Council on Finance and Administration in all budget discussions, shall recommend all allocations for the major categories in the total Conference financial program: clergy and diaconal support, Conference claimants fund, administration, World Service, Conference benevolences, and capital funding. The Annual Conference Mission Ministries, being charged by the Discipline to study and coordinate the budget request of the several Conference agencies as they relate to the Conference program, shall formulate and present an itemized Conference benevolence budget providing for the support of these agencies to the Council on Finance and Administration. If, for any reason, the Council on Finance and Administration decides that the total of the requests for the Conference benevolence budget needs to be changed, it shall adjust the allocation and refer it back to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries for adjustments of the itemized appropriations in the Conference benevolence budget.
- 3.1 If any Conference agency feels its cause has been neglected, jeopardized, or excluded, it shall have the opportunity to represent its cause before the Council on Finance and Administration as provided in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶613).
- 3.2 The Council on Finance and Administration shall present the proposed budget, for the purpose of clarification and correction only, at the first business session of the Annual Conference each year. Changes in the proposed budget shall be reported by the committee, board, and/or council making the request at the time they report to the Annual Conference. Approval or disapproval of the financial request shall be voted as an amendment to the proposed budget at the final presentation of the budget by CFA at the last session of the Annual Conference.
- 3.3 Any proposal to create a new apportionment, or to change the purpose for an existing apportionment shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference.
- 3.4 Any proposed change of the decimal formula shall first be studied by the Council on Finance and Administration. CFA shall then report to the Annual Conference its recommendation. (In accordance with the 2008 Book of Discipline ¶615.)
- 4.0 All budget items allocated to the Districts and local churches of the Conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula: Determine the base amount for each District or church by taking the total of the following items: (58) pension & benefit funds (CRSP) paid directly to the General Board of Pensions, (64) Pastor's base compensation, (65) Associate(s) base compensation, (66a) Utilities and housing paid to/for pastor, (66b) Utilities and housing paid to/for associate(s), (67a) Travel paid to/for pastor, (67b) Travel paid to/for associate(s), (68a) Other allowances paid to/for pastor, (68b) Other allowances paid to/for associate(s), (69) Diaconal minister(s) compensation, (70) Other staff compensation, (71) Current expenses for program, (72) Other current operating expenses. Add the above thirteen (13) expenditures for each District to get the "District total expenditure". Divide each "District total expenditure" by the "Conference total expenditure" to get the District decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the District decimal by each Conference Apportionment to get the District Apportionment. Add the above thirteen (13) expenditures for each local church to get their "local total expenditure". Divide each "local total expenditure" by the "District total expenditure" to arrive at the local church decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the local church decimal by each District Apportionment allocation to get the Local Church Apportionment. (Each apportionment is rounded off to the nearest dollar, with each church being apportioned at least one dollar for each apportionment.)
- 5.0 It shall be the duty of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to compute the decimal annually, using the latest statistics (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to

by the District Committee on Nominations and elected by the District Conference, vice chair and secretary elected by the Council. The members of each Council will be assigned by the District Mission Leadership Team from a pool consisting of one member from each local church in the District; however churches with less than 10 members may choose to be represented by one person per charge. Membership on each Council will be selected from this pool. Four persons may be added to each council to ensure inclusiveness or expertise.

District Conference

- 2.0 There shall be a District Conference in each District of the Annual Conference which shall meet at least one full week prior to the beginning of the Annual Conference after notice is given to all local churches by the District Superintendent, who shall be the chair. The District Superintendent may call a District Conference during the Annual Conference session (2008 ¶657).
- 2.1 The purpose of the District Conference shall be: (a) to review without debate or vote the Preliminary Report and other items of business coming before the Annual Conference; (b) to elect District representatives to the Conference agencies (c) to elect members of the District Mission Leadership Team; (d) to elect two young adults, approximately eighteen to thirty years of age, to serve as members of the Annual Conference; and (e) such other District business as may be determined permissible under the Book of Discipline.
- 2.2 The membership of the District Conference shall be the lay and clergy members from that District to the Annual Conference and the local pastors serving within the District, the District Lay Leader, the District President of the United Methodist Women, the District President of the United Methodist Men, the President of the District Student Leadership Team one additional youth appointed by the District Student Leadership Team, and all other members of the Annual Conference residing within the District.

District Committee on Nominations

- 3.0 There shall be a District Committee on Nominations in each District of the Annual Conference for the purpose of nominating to the District Conference the best qualified persons within the District for the various positions as required by the Annual Conference.
- 3.1 The membership shall be the District Superintendent, who shall be the chair, the District Lay Leader, the District President of United Methodist Women, the District President of United Methodist Men, the President of the District Student Leadership Team, and such other persons as determined by the District Mission Leadership Team.

VII. LOCAL CHURCHES

- 1.0 Each congregation shall annually give attention to the vacation policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the statement as printed in the 1993 *Journal*, pages 257-258.
- 1.1 Each congregation shall annually give attention to the housing policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the statement printed in the 1993 *Journal*, pages 254-257.
- 1.2 Parsonage utilities should be in the name of the church, i.e., the deposit paid by the church. If the parsonage utilities are not paid by the church, the departing pastor must have arranged in advance of his/her departure to have the meters read on moving day, or on the day of departing the parsonage. The departing pastor is responsible for the bills up to that time.
- 1.3 In the event of death of a clergy or diaconal minister residing in a church owned residence, the family of the deceased clergy or diaconal minister will be allowed ninety days to find other housing and vacate the church owned residence, or such other time as deemed appropriate by the Cabinet and by the local church pastor-parish relations committee.
- 2.0 Salaries of clergy moving at Annual Conference shall be paid through May 31 by the former charge and from June 1 by the receiving charge.
- 2.1 No pastor is allowed to claim reimbursement for more than 5/12 of the Pastor's accountable reimbursement Plan between January and May without recommendation of the PPR/SPR Committee and approval by the Administrative Board.

VIII. DISCONTINUED OR ABANDONED CHURCH PROPERTY

- 1.0 Any property abandoned in the past or that shall be abandoned in the future and the property disposed of as directed by the Book of Discipline in accordance with 2008 ¶ 2548, the proceeds derived there from, if any, shall be first applied to the retirement of pension deficits, and the satisfaction of any claims against ministerial pension annuities which may have arisen out of failure of that church to make proportionate payment for support. The remaining proceeds are to be transferred to the Commission on Church Growth and Development.
- 1.1 In the event of a church closure or abandonment, the official and historical records of the closed or abandoned church will be transferred directly to the Archives Depository of the Central Texas Conference by the District Superintendent of the District in which the closed or abandoned church is located.
- 1.2 In the event of two or more churches merging, the official and historical records of the churches being merged shall be transferred to the Archives Depository of the Central Texas Conference by the District Superintendent of the District in which the churches are located. The records shall be transferred to the Archives Depository no later than three months following the merger.

XII. Pastoral Records

Years of service equals membership in the Central Texas Conference only. Years of service are through June 1, 2009. Any errors or omissions should be reported to the Conference Secretary.



We have reviewed the 2008 financial records of the Fort Worth District of the United Methodist Church of the Central Texas Conference during the period of April 5 – April 23, 2009. The review included verification of the bank statements and reconciliation reports for both the operating and designated accounts; reports generated from the QuickBooks accounting software, original receipts, federal tax forms and reports (941's w-2's and w-4's) and verbal explanations provided by staff member Lynn Carter. The 2008 district finances are in good order. No discrepancies were found that would cause us to question their accuracy nor integrity.

The year began with a conversion from Quicken accounting software to Quick Books. After the initial learning was accomplished, the transition resulted in ease in recording and reporting. Reports can be generated internally. Disbursements continue to be well documented. Backup includes receipts, emails, and notations. It was noted that when district funds are used to partially pay a statement balance (as in the case of Visa credit cards), notes indicating the source of the balance of the payment would reduce later questions. Currently the District Administrative Assistant has the major responsibility for counting money, making deposits, writing checks and signing them. As the District continues to explore safe money handling procedures, a consideration might be to provide backup support by having an outside party reconcile bank statements. It is recommended that the District adopt a policy annually relating to professional reimbursement expectations.

As indicated by our signatures, we find that the records and data are in proper order for the calendar year 2008.

We have reviewed the 2008 financial records of the Mid-Cities District of the United Methodist Church of the Central Texas Conference during the period of February 14 – March 5, 2009. The review included verification of the bank statements and reconciliation reports for both the operating and designated accounts; reports generated from the QuickBooks accounting software, original receipts, federal tax forms and reports (941's w-2's and w-4's) and verbal explanations provided by staff member Nancy Schulser. The 2008 district finances are in good order. No discrepancies were found that would cause us to question their accuracy nor integrity.

Transition to Quick Books accounting software brought new recording opportunities to the District books. Accounts were set up to correspond with reporting needs. A smooth transition was made from Quicken, allowing for more flexibility and quicker retrieval of transaction detail. Year end changes were suggested to streamline the accounts. Journal entries were made to bring account balances current and remove discrepancies from years past. Clear distinction is made reflecting which entries use district funds and which use restricted funds. Backup documentation supporting entries was found and was filed appropriately. The District needs to continue to explore procedures that will protect individuals handling district funds.

I have been asked by Rankin Koch of the Temple District to perform a limited scope review of the financial records of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church for calendar year 2008. During this year, the Temple District Office also provided the accounting for the new Rockbridge UMC, located in Round Rock. Funds for that church were also included in my review.

During 2008, the Temple District Office received \$270,700.38 from all sources and expended \$330,882.14. The ending cash balance was \$62,976.59. This breaks down to budgeted district apportionment receipts of \$110,765.00 and non-budgeted receipts of \$159,935.38, and budgeted district expenditures of \$112,936.59 and non-budgeted expenditures of \$217,945.55.

I have examined the cash accounts of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church, as of December 31, 2008. This was a limited scope review and should not be considered to have been performed in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. It did, however, include such tests of cash receipts and disbursements as I considered necessary.

My scope does not provide you with a complete report of internal controls. It allows me, however, to provide you with a degree of comfort with the current accounting system and with the system of internal controls and procedures. In that regard, I believe that the cash accounts of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church are maintained in an acceptable manner and accurately reflect the transactions therein.





The review included verification of the bank statements and reconciliation reports for both the operating and designated accounts; original receipts, and verbal explanations provided by staff member Dana Coble. The 2008 district finances are in good order. No discrepancies were found that would cause us to question their accuracy nor integrity.

Quicken was used in 2008 to track the finances of the district. The year ended with a change in administrative assistants and a conversion to Quick Books. Strong procedures observed include strong documentation and notation of expenditures made. As is generally a concern in a small office, it was noted that the administrative assistant is responsible for making deposits, disbursements and recording of transactions. This is a vulnerable position for the employee and the District, and does not provide protection nor verification to reduce human errors. It is recommended that the District committee brainstorm ways to provide some checks and balances. Financial reports were not found in the District files for 2008. Ideas of effective reporting were explored. It is recommended that the District adopt a policy annually relating to professional reimbursement expectations.

Organization
 Clara Lake United Methodist Camp, Inc. (the Organization), was incorporated in the State of Texas, a nonprofit corporation. The Organization is a division of the Central Texas conference of the United Methodist Church (the Conference). The Organization is dedicated to promoting the Gospel through evangelism, discipleship, and promoting the spiritual growth of its members. The Organization's primary purpose is to provide a safe and secure environment for children and youth, and to provide a place of worship and spiritual growth for all who desire it. The Organization is supported primarily through member fees but receives substantial support from the Conference and public donations.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Statement Presentation
 Under SFAS No. 117, the Organization is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets (unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets) based upon the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

In accordance with SFAS No. 116, contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Investments

The Organization has adopted SFAS No. 124, "Accounting for Certain Investments Held by Not-for-Profit Organizations." Under SFAS No. 124, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statements of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

Taxes

The Organization is exempt from Federal taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and is classified as a private foundation. There is no unrelated business income for the year ended December 31, 2008.

Contributions

All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support that increased those net asset classes. When a temporary restriction expires, temporarily restricted net

assets are reclassified to investments; net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from investments.

Gifts and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of ninety days or less to be cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents in \$51,526 at December 31, 2008 is as follows:

Cash (temporarily restricted) \$51,383
Cash (unrestricted designated) \$143

Donated Materials and Services

Contributions of donated non-cash assets are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets or that require specialized skills, as provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received.

The Organization receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist in the day-to-day activities. No amounts have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition under SFAS No. 110 have not been satisfied.

Employment System

Functional expenses have been allocated among Administration, Program, Food Service, Job-employment, and Facility Support based on an analysis of personnel time and space utilized for the related activities.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Administrative

Administrative expenses are included within the direct program expense and amount to \$14,312 for the year. There are no material, joint costs associated with fundraising.

Inventory

Inventory consists of food items for the dining room and camp-related items such as clothing and food for resale in the camp store. All items are valued at cost on the first-in, first-out method.

NOTE 2 - Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments which potentially subject the Organization to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash investments on deposit with the Texas Methodist Foundation. None of these investments are considered marketable securities or are used for trading purposes. The Organization's management estimates that the fair value of these investments do not differ from the carrying value in the accompanying statement of financial position.

The Organization maintains cash and cash equivalents with a highly credit rated financial institution, in which the Organization's deposits are insured by the FDIC to \$250,000. Deposits at the financial institution did not exceed FDIC coverage during the year ending December 31, 2008.

NOTE 3 - Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are carried at cost and donated assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. All expenditures for property, furniture and equipment for \$2,500 or more are capitalized. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets for 5, 7, 10, 11 or 40 years.

Fixed assets acquired by Glen Lake United Methodist Camp, Inc. are considered to be owned by the organization.

The following shows the value of the fixed assets on hand at December 31, 2008:

Note 6 - RESTRICTED ASSETS

The Organization offers its qualified employees the opportunity to participate in a defined contribution retirement plan under IRS code section 401(b), administered by the General Board of Health and Pension Benefits of the United Methodist Church. To qualify, the employee must be 21 years of age and have completed one year of continuous employment with the Organization. Under the plan guidelines, the employee must contribute 3.5% of his/her salary in order for the Organization to contribute 7% of the employee's salary. The Organization only acts as a withholding and contributing employer agent for these funds and has no liability for future pension benefits. For the year ended December 31, 2008, the Organization's contribution to the plan is \$10,226.

Interest income from these investments is \$32,341 in 2008. There are no restricted or unrestricted gains or losses from these investments.

Note 8 - Long-Term Debt

The Organization's long-term debt is as follows:

- A. Mortgage note originally dated October 13, 1992 in the amount of \$150,000, payable to the Texas Methodist Foundation, secured by land and buildings. Additional construction draws of \$393,561 and \$75,000 were added to this note in 1998 and 1999. Monthly payments are \$6,980, which includes interest at 7%. These payments are reimbursed by the Conference and are reflected on the Organization's books as debt allocation income. There is no principal or additional payments. The balance at December 31, 2008 is \$402,590.
- B. Mortgage note dated June 12, 2007 in the amount of \$1,100,000, payable to the Texas Methodist Foundation, secured by a first lien on land and building known as Still Water and a second lien on land and buildings in Note 5(A) above. Interest accruing on the note is variable, and monthly payments of \$10,000 are due the 7th day of each month to and including June 30, 2010. Monthly payments of \$10,000 are to be made to the lender through the end of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010. The principal balance of the note at December 31, 2008 is \$2,987,566. There is remaining on the note an amount of \$132,434 which may be drawn for improvements to the Still Water building.
- C. Note dated October 18, 2007 in the amount of \$11,607, payable to GMAC, accruing interest at the rate of 6.99% with payments in the amount of \$117.71 (the monthly installment) on October 18, 2011. This note is secured by a vehicle. The balance at December 31, 2008 is \$12,984.
- D. Note dated February 19, 2007 in the amount of \$223,176, payable to GMAC, accruing interest at the rate of 7%, with payments in the amount of \$91.31 due monthly until maturity on February 19, 2012. This note is secured by a vehicle. The balance at December 31, 2008 is \$14,179.

Construction-in-progress in the amount of \$245,966 at December 31, 2008 is for costs incurred in the construction of improvements to the Still Water building which was purchased on June 14, 2007. Seventeen units of the forty-unit facility were placed in service on September 19, 2007. Construction of the improvements to the facility will consist of three phases containing for two to three years. Phase One of the project is expected to be completed in 2009.

1. It was noted that the wireless Internet use is connected to without a password.
Recommendation: It is recommended that the wireless Internet access be secured

exist in the accounting system.
2. Unreconciled, undesignated net assets decreased from the prior year by \$80,590 or
75%.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

The Central Texas Methodist Foundation (the "Foundation"), a Texas non-profit corporation, was organized to make loans to local churches and agencies of the Central Texas Conference ("CTC") for the acquisition and improvement of real property. The Foundation is organized under the laws of the State of Texas and is subject to the laws of the State of Texas. The Foundation is a charitable organization under the laws of the State of Texas and is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Foundation receives unrestricted gifts from donors to help cover the cost of providing services and to enable the Foundation to fulfill their program objectives. Unrestricted gifts, grants, and bequests are reported as income in the operating fund. Additionally, the Foundation may be designated as a charitable beneficiary of wills, trusts, annuities and other unrestricted gifts which will be reflected as revenue and support in the statement of activity in the year realized.

No part of the assets of the Foundation can be used by or subjected to the claims of any creditor or claimant of the Foundation or the assets of any other agencies, except in connection with and to the extent of the CTC's deposits or local church's deposits or other funds held by the Foundation on its behalf.

Basis of Presentation

The Foundation's financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains, and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets of the Foundation and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Unrestricted Operating Net Assets - Represents the portion of expendable funds that is available for support of Foundation operation. This includes outstanding loans to local churches and conference agencies. The interest earnings and principal receipts are available for support of foundation operations.

Temporarily Restricted Net Assets:

Managed Investment Funds

Managed Funds - Represent funds invested for a temporary or indefinite period for the benefit of the depositors. The Foundation makes all investment decisions related to these deposits and pays interest at rates established on a monthly basis.

Charitable Gift Annuities

Annually funds represent a gift of money or other property given to the Foundation on the condition that the Foundation bind itself to make periodic stipulated payments, that terminate at a specified time, to the donor or other designated individuals.

Certificates of Participation

In January of 1997, the Foundation initiated a \$1,000,000 offering of sale of Certificates of Participation to members and friends of United Methodist Churches and Agencies within the State of Texas. Effective July 1, 1998 the foundation modified this offering to unlimited principal. The Certificates of Participation are issued as general debt obligations of the Central Texas Methodist Foundation in minimum amounts of \$1,000, and the 2008 and 2007 rates of annual interest paid to investors ranged from 3.00% to 3.60%.

Proceeds from the sale of Certificates of Participation are used to make loans to United Methodist Churches, Agencies or institutions within the Central Texas Conference. The loans are secured by the certificates and are insured under Paragraph (4) Section 3(a) of the Securities Act of 1933, as amended, and Section 6-J of the Texas Securities Act.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Foundation considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash and cash equivalents. At December 31, 2008, the Foundation had no such investments included in cash and cash equivalents.

Permanently Restricted Net Assets:

Endowment and Life Estate Funds

Endowment and other life estate funds represent funds which are either currently restricted or for which the donor has stipulated restrictions requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested. Certain restricted funds are held in trust by the Foundation to determine the ultimate use of life estate property upon the death of the donor. The property is valued at \$1,000 until the Foundation obtains ultimate use of the corpus upon the death of the donor. At December 31, 2008 there were four Life Estate Funds included in temporarily restricted funds in net assets.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principals requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from these estimates.

Notes receivable

Notes receivable arise from the extension of credit to qualifying local churches and other institutions and agencies of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church and as such, are subject to the risk of loss from uncollectible accounts due to local economic conditions. The Foundation uses the direct write-off of Notes receivable based on prior experience, review of individual accounts, historical losses, existing economic conditions and management's evaluation of other pertinent factors. Accounts are considered delinquent when the customer does not make payments according to agreed upon terms.

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost. The Foundation has a policy whereby property additions below a minimum amount are expensed as incurred. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method. The annual depreciation rates for buildings and furniture and equipment are based on 30, 7 and 5 year useful lives.

NOTE 2 - INVESTMENTS

In 2008 the Foundation utilized one investment manager with \$3,455,212 under management. At December 31, 2007 there were no investment managers. The Foundation paid approximately \$8,076 and \$0 in investment fees for the year ended December 31, 2008 and 2007, respectively, which are reflected as expense in the accompanying financial statements. Life estate property interests in real estate conveyed to the Foundation with the donor reserving a life estate in the property. Each property is valued at \$1.00 until the Foundation obtains ultimate use of the Corpus upon the death of the donor. During 2008 and 2007, included in the capital gains are \$(2,334,462) and \$(114,350) of unrealized gains/ (losses) and \$(53,034) and \$54,140 of realized gains/(losses), respectively.

Interfund Revenue And Expenses

The Foundation generally receives a fund management fee of .50% to 1.00% of invested assets from each managed account. The management fee is recorded as an expense in each fund and as revenue in the operating fund.

Federal Income Taxes

The foundation is exempt from federal income taxes, under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Financial Statement Presentation

In 1995, the Central Texas Methodist Foundation adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations." Under SFAS No. 117, the Central Texas Methodist Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets and permanently restricted net assets. In addition, the Central Texas Methodist Foundation is required to present a statement of cash flows. As permitted by SFAS No. 117, the Foundation has discontinued its use of fund accounting and is, accordingly, reclassifying its financial statements to present classes of net assets in accordance with SFAS. The contributions received are recorded in the three classes of net assets depending on the existence and nature of any donor restrictions. Under SFAS No. 116, contributions with donor restrictions are required to be reported as temporarily restricted support and are then reclassified to unrestricted net assets upon expiration of the time restriction.

Compensated absences

Compensated absences have not been accrued because the amount cannot be reasonably estimated.

Concentration of credit risk

The Organization maintains a bank account at two banks. Accounts at an institution are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$100,000. Cash in the bank account at each bank exceeded federally insured limits.

We have audited the accompanying statement of cash and cash equivalents of Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church (the "Conference") as of December 31, 2008, and the related statement of cash receipts and disbursements for the year then ended. In our opinion, except for the effect of excluding the accounts of the Camp in the financial statements, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the cash and cash equivalents of Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church as of December 31, 2008, and its cash receipts and disbursements for the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income Taxes
The Conference is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is not considered a private foundation within the meaning of Section 598(a) of the Code.

NOTE 2. RETIREMENT PLANS

The Conference maintains a defined contribution benefit plan for substantially all ministers. As approved by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits, the Conference is obligated to make contributions to the Plan equal to 12% of the denominational average compensation as calculated by the Conference Pension Officer. The contribution to the Plan is billed directly to the churches by the Conference and remitted to the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.

The Conference offers its employees the opportunity to participate in a defined contribution retirement plan under IRS code section 402(b), administered by the General Board of Health and Pension Benefits of the United Methodist Church. To participate in the Plan, employees must work a minimum of 1,600 hours each year. Under the Plan guidelines, the Conference contributes 8% of each participant's compensation annually, regardless of whether the participant contributes to the Plan.

For the year ended December 31, 2008, the Conference's total contribution to both plans is \$184,551.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities
Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church (the "Conference") is a state-level agency of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church. The primary financial responsibility of the Conference is to serve as a conduit for monies contributed by individual church members throughout the state for the programs of the United Methodist Church at district, conference, jurisdictional and national levels.

Basis of Accounting
The Conference's accounts are maintained on the cash basis of accounting, and the statement of cash and cash equivalents and statement of cash receipts and disbursements recognizes only cash received and disbursed. Therefore, receivables and payables, long-lived assets, accrued income and expenses, and depreciation and amortization, which would normally be recognized under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and which may be material in amount, are not recognized in the accompanying financial statements. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial positions and revenues and expenses in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The effects of this departure from generally accepted accounting principles have not been determined.

The accompanying financial statements do not include the accounts of Glen Lake United Methodist Camp, Inc. (the "Camp"), a division of the Conference. The effects of this departure from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have not been determined. During 2008, the Conference remitted \$83,689 and \$120,200 to the Camp for debt retirement and camp operations assistance, respectively.

Cash Equivalents
The Conference considers all highly-liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are reported on the balance sheet with Texas Methodist Foundation ("TMF") and Central Texas Methodist Foundation ("CTMF"). These balances are not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Concentration of Credit Risk
The Conference maintains cash balances at a bank which periodically exceeds federally insured limits. At December 31, 2008, the Conference has approximately \$1,709,000 of uninsured cash based on actual bank balances. Also, at December 31, 2008, the Conference has uninsured cash of approximately \$1,288,000 and \$1,17,000 on deposit at TMF and CTMF, respectively, based on actual cash balances. The Conference has not historically experienced any losses in such accounts, and management does not believe there is significant credit risk associated with these balances.

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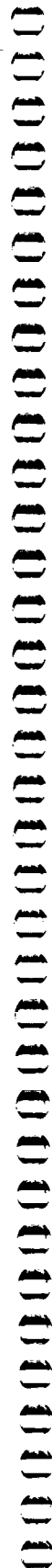

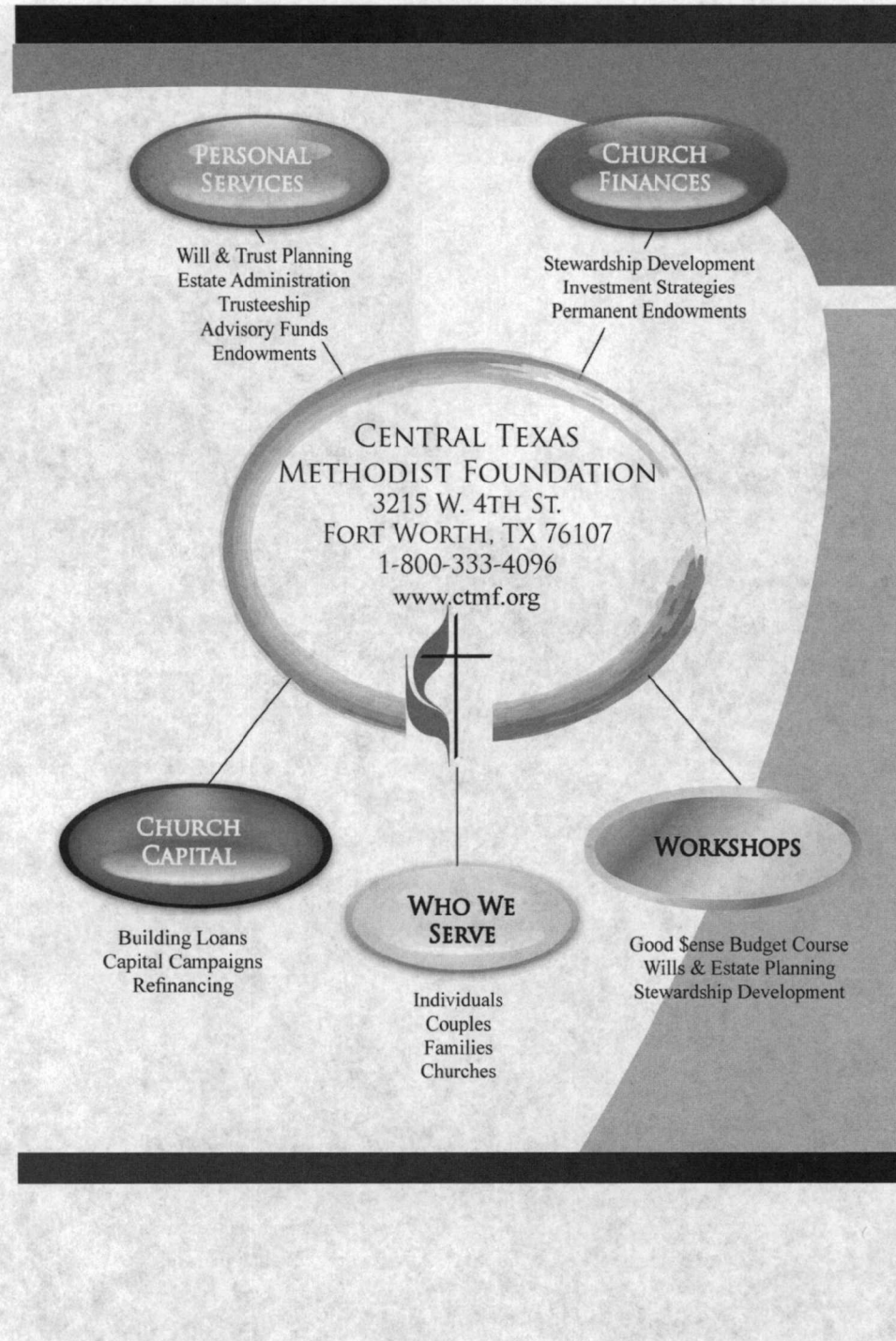


