





1.3 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team will be comprised of the three officers of the Administrative Leadership Team, the three officers of the Mission Leadership Team, three at-large members selected for balance and expertise – all of whom will be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference quadrennially, or as needed annually for vacancies The residing Bishop shall chair the Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team. A vice-chair and secretary shall be elected from the team at the first meeting of the new quadrennium. Additional voting members of the team will include two District Superintendents (selected by the Cabinet), the Conference Lay Leader, the chair of the Commission on Inclusiveness and the three conference Executive Directors. This Executive Ministry Team will give overall supervision to the annual conference boards, councils, commissions, teams, and committees, utilizing the Administrative Leadership Team and the Mission Leadership Team for further coordination and supervision.

- 3.1 The membership shall be composed of the bishop, the district superintendents, the conference lay leader, the president of the conference United Methodist Women, the president of the conference United Methodist Men, Conference Parliamentarian, the Conference Director of Communications, the president and one other youth representative from the conference Student Leadership Team, the chairs of the conference boards, the chair of the conference Mission Leadership Team, host pastor, local arrangements chair, and worship chair. The conference director of Mission Ministries, the conference director of Church Growth & Development and the conference director-secretary of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall serve without vote.
- 3.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect its own officers quadrennially.
- 3.3 The executive Committee shall include the chair, vice-chair, secretary, Bishop, Lay Leader, host district superintendent, host pastor, local arrangements chair, worship chair, and the director of Mission Ministries and SFA without vote.

- 4.0 There shall be a Commission on Archives and History, consisting of one lay and one clergy elected by each District Conference Six at-large members shall be added by nomination of the retiring chair of the commission and elected by the Annual Conference. The commission shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641) and other responsibilities as delegated to it by the Annual Conference No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms. The commission shall have a chair, a vice-chair, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected as outlined in Section II, ¶16.2a and 16.7 for a four-year period to coincide with the guadrennium.
- 4.1 The conference Committee on Nominations may nominate a conference archivist-historian to be elected by the Annual Conference, as permitted in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641.3). The annual conference archivist-historian shall serve with non-expiring term of office and shall be a voting member of the conference Commission on Archives and History.

# RESOLUTION FOR THE DISCONTINUANCE OF CENTRAL UMC (WAXAHACHIE DISTRICT)

Whereas the congregation of Central UMC Corsicana Texas located in Navarro County, Waxahachie District, has declared its intention to close after faithful servant ministry for 122 years, and

Whereas the Waxahachie District has surveyed the needs of ministry in the mission field and believe it can be served by existing nearby congregations, and

Whereas it would appear to serve no missional purpose to retain this property, and

Whereas the discontinuation of the church and the abandonment of its property has been recommended by the District Superintendent and approved by the Bishop, a majority of the district superintendents and the District Board of Church Location and Building, and

Whereas all steps required by the Discipline have been taken;

**Therefore be it resolved** that the Central UMC be discontinued as of June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2010 and all of its property declared abandoned and transferred to the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church for sale distribution or other disposition as the Conference Board of Trustees many deem in the best interest of the mission of the Conference, and

Be it further resolved that the Central Texas Conference Board of Trustees be authorized, at its discretion, to distribute items of property which may best be used by other churches to such churches or to the Commission on Church Growth & Development and to sell all other property with the net proceeds first applied to the retirement of any pension deficits of that church and the remainder given to the Commission on Church Growth & Development for congregational development, and

**Be it further resolved** that the remaining members of the Central UMC at the time of this action be transferred to St. Luke's UMC Corsicana, Texas and that all official records of the discontinued church be forwarded to the Central Texas Conference archives.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 1. That the Central Texas Annual Conference communicate to Texas Health Resources our deep appreciation for the quality of ministries of pastoral care, clinical pastoral education, community faith-based initiatives including the parish-nurse program, and benevolent care for indigent and uninsured persons in the communities served by the Harris Methodist related hospitals. We recognize that in a challenging economy it is the practice of some hospital systems to look at its faith-based commitments as the first place to reduce expenditures. Texas Health Resources' commitment to excellence in faith-based ministries is acknowledged and appreciated. Furthermore, we express sincere gratitude to Texas Health Resources for their generous contributions to the life of the Annual Conference by their contribution in printing annual conference materials.
- 2. That the Central Texas Conference create an "Oversight Committee" to provide and ensure trustee orientation for the protection of institutional church-relatedness and on-going evaluation of trustee performance in all Conference-related institutions. We further recommend that this Oversight Committee consist of 13 members including the Resident Bishop of the Central Texas Annual Conference or his/her designate, with the remaining 12 members being elected by the Annual Conference with 4 members being nominated by the Conference Board of Trustees, 4 members nominated by the Bishop and Cabinet, and 4 members being nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations.
- 3. That the Central Texas Annual Conference establish a vetting process conducted by the "Oversight Committee" (established by above resolution #2), by which every person whose name is nominated for election as Trustee of any conference-related institution will be considered with respect to their commitment to institutional church relatedness and local church participation prior to a vote by the Annual Conference.
- 4. That the Central Texas Conference strongly request and encourage the Harris Methodist Health System Trustees to adopt a voting procedure that requires an option for the Trustees to vote either yes or no, or abstain, on all votes taken.
- That the Central Texas Conference obtain legal consultation regarding statutory boundaries
  of Texas Health Resources By-Laws; Central Texas Annual Conference rights and
  responsibilities in electing trustees to the Harris Methodist Health System Board (a
  Founding Member of Texas Health Resources); and to determine if the lack of an

- opportunity for the Harris Methodist Health System Board to vote on the issue of "branding" was a violation of the THR by-laws.
- That the Central Texas Annual Conference asks its congregations to support the health related initiatives of the Harris Methodist related hospitals to serve the spiritual and healthcare needs of all people.

The recommendations were adopted and referred back to the Episcopal Office and Mission Leadership Team for implementation.

I suggest that a report be brought back to next year's session of the Central Texas Annual Conference so we might, as a conference, stay engaged and connected with all aspects of this important ministry."

Dr. Dale Schultz seconded the motion. The motion passed.

### <u>Justice for Our Neighbors – Mary Beth Garcia</u>

Mary Beth Garcia provided an update on the work being done by Justice for Our Neighbors, a clinic seeking to help low-income immigrants who otherwise could not afford assistance. A video was shown telling the story of a family from Rwanda.

### <u>Committee on Nominations – Georgia Adamson</u>

Dr. Georgia Adamson presented the nominations sheet laid on the table Monday for consideration. The nominations were approved as presented.

### Committee on Resolutions - John Clifford

Rev. John Clifford called attention to the resolutions found on pages 115 and 116 of the Preliminary Report and the resolution laid on the table Monday for consideration.

### RESOLUTION WELCOMING THE MIGRANT

### Resolution passed.

This resolution reads as follows -

WHEREAS: Compassion for the immigrant and welcome for the stranger are among our core faith values; and our scripture tells us that "The strangers who sojourn with you shall be to you as the natives among you, and you shall love them as yourself for you were strangers in the land of Egypt." (Leviticus 19:33-34) and Jesus reminds us to welcome the stranger. "For as much as you do it for the least of my brothers and sisters you do it for me." (Matthew 25:40); and

WHEREAS: the General Conference of the United Methodist Church, hosted by our Central Texas Annual Conference in Fort Worth, April, 2008, adopted by a substantial majority resolution 3281, "Welcoming the Migrant to the United States," and this resolution "affirms the worth, dignity, and inherent value and rights of all persons regardless of their nationality or legal status." and urges United Methodist Churches throughout the country "to build bridges with migrants in their local communities, to learn from them, celebrate their presence in the United States and recognize and appreciate the contributions in all areas of life that migrants bring." (Book of Resolutions, 2008, p. 418). and

WHEREAS: the Council of Bishops, including our own Bishop Mike Lowry, declared, in May, 2009, their support of comprehensive immigration reform in their Statement on the U. S. Immigration Situation:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, in accord with our General Conference and Bishops, that we will put these faith values into practice as an Annual Conference, as individuals, and in our communities of faith by our teaching, our language and our actions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we call on the 111th Congress of the United States to enact comprehensive, humane and equitable immigration reform based on the following principles from our Bishops Statement:

- 1. Provide a pathway to citizenship for immigrants.
- 2. Reunify immigrant families that have been separated by immigration itself or due to work places raids and ensuing indefinite detentions and deportations.
- 3. Increase the number of visas for short-term workers to come into the United States to work in a safe, legal, and orderly way.
- 4. Extend legal protection to all workers who come to stay for a certain period of time as well as for those who stay permanently, including the right to bargain for higher wages, to protest against poor working conditions, and to preserve their human rights as workers, be they documented or undocumented.
- 5. Eliminate privately operated detention centers, which are not regulated by the federal or state governments and end all indiscriminate raids.

WHEREAS the Discipline of the United Methodist Church affirms the biblical witness to God's activity in creation and

WHEREAS we join in the Apostle's Creed that states that God is the creator and

**WHEREAS** we believe that God sent His Son to redeem us from sin and Jesus Christ stated that he was present at creation and gave us no teachings that would support evolution and

WHEREAS the theory of evolution is not a science but a religion that must be accepted on faith because the laws of physics and chemistry deny evolution and there are no examples of species evolving and

WHEREAS scientists should be searching for the truth in their research and presenting all of the scientific facts from qualified researchers

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church support the active practice of Creation Science that has thousands of highly qualified scientists who are not permitted to publish their findings in science journals and support the teaching of Creation Science in our schools and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church request the 2012 General Conference of the United Methodist Church to reverse the action of the 2008 General Conference Petitions 80050, 80990 and 80893 that accepted faith-based evolution as the only way to teach science and opposed Creationism and take action to encourage the teaching of Creation Science as an equally acceptable theory to the teaching of evolution in our churches and

schools.

### RATIONALE:

I have studied the Creation/Evolution argument for 60 years and am convinced that Evolution is a nonscientific teaching based on faith because the laws of physics and chemistry prove that evolution of larger molecules from the random interaction of hydrogen atoms is statistically impossible. Because it violates the basic laws of science evolution must be accepted on the basis of faith and becomes a false religion. If evolution is impossible the only other possibility is that of creation. Because we believe in the Bible and state in our creed that God is the creator then we should support the teaching and research of creation scientists and ask that such teachings be given as much credit as the false doctrine of evolution.

Modern scientific findings such as the DNA findings that all persons are descended from one woman supports the beliefs of Jews, Christians and Muslims in Eve as the mother of mankind. Eve did not evolve from some primeval soup, but was created. Our present population is in line with the number of descendants of four couples surviving a flood that destroyed all others.

THE ARGUMENT THAT YOUNG PEOPLE ARE LEAVING THE METHODIST CHURCH BECAUSE IT DIDN'T SUPPORT EVOLUTION IS NOT TRUE IN MY FAMILY. I HAVE THREE GRANDCHILDREN WHO WERE RAISED IN THE METHODIST CHURCH WHO LEFT TO WORSHIP IN BIBLE BELIEVING CHURCHES, AND DO NOT BELIEVE IN EVOLUTION. The vote by the Annual Conference to approve the above 2011 budget will also authorize the Council on Finance and Administration to adjust categories III and IV to comply with any organizational or structural changes resulting from the adoption of the report of the Alignment Study Committee.

#### NOTES TO THE 2011 BUDGET

- (1) Mission Ministries budget line includes administrative items (MM staff ARP expenses) and programming expenses for Nurture, Outreach, Witness, and Communications. Glen Lake Camp and Campus Ministries have been moved to other budget areas.
- (2) Glen Lake Camp budget line includes subsidies for camp operations and the required payments for the Camp Infrastructure Loan.
- (3) Campus Ministry budget line includes committee expenses plus the Wesley Foundation apportionment set at \$1.91/member.
- (4) Other Conference Ministries budget line includes Igniting Ministry, Archives & History, Christian Unity & Interreligious Concerns, Commission on Inclusiveness, Texas Methodist College Association, and the Counseling Program.
- (5) Area Administration consists of the Episcopal budget lines: Episcopal Residence, Episcopal Office, and Episcopacy Committee.
- (6) Board of Ordained Ministry budget line includes committee and programming funding.
- (7) Conference Administration budget line includes CFA staff ARP expenses, and all elements of the Conference Center involving building and office operations.
- (8) Extended Cabinet budget line item includes compensation and pensions for both appointive cabinet and directors, Cabinet administrative expenses, and a new line item called Wings of the Spirit that will fund creative and innovative ministries
- (9) Board of Pensions and Health Benefits budget line item has been broadened to include not just committee expenses, but also the apportionments for Conference Claimants, Clergy and Health Insurance, and Retiree Health Insurance. (CPP direct billed beginning 2011.)
- (10) Equitable Compensation & Clergy Benefits budget line item groups the expenses for Minimum Salary Support, Moving, and the committee.
- (11) Other Administration Components budget line groups the expenses related to the Statistician and General/Jurisdictional Delegales with the committee/board expenses for CFA, Trustees, Rules, Personnel, and Leadership Teams.
- (12) CFA, MM, CGD, & BOM staff compensation (salary, taxes, insurance & pension).

#### **COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION**

#### Report No. 1

- 1. The Council on Finance and Administration expresses it's thanks to the churches of our Central Texas Conference for their wonderful support of the mission partnership of the United Methodist Church through the benevolence program. Our overall percentage receipts in 2009 totaled 94.07%. Our churches contributed \$10,946,878. Two hundred seventy two of our Conference churches paid 100% of the apportionment share in full. We are also pleased to report that our Conference is one of fourteen Annual Conferences that paid its general church apportionments in full.
- 2. The formula for determining the salaries for District Superintendents and Directors which was adopted by the Annual Conference in 2002 is as follows: the increase in District Superintendent and other Cabinet level positions support will be the same percentage increase as is reflected in the salaries of those Elders in full membership of the Conference who serve as Senior Pastors of churches within the Central Texas Conference.
  - This formula for 2011 is 3%. Applying this formula, the compensation and support for the District Superintendents and the Directors of Stewardship, Finance and Administration; Church Growth and Development; and Mission Ministries for 2011 will be \$114,322.
- 3. This amount is to provide for the district superintendents' and Directors' expense for conference meetings and additional ministerial expenses in an accountable reimbursement plan, the district superintendent's portion of the conference health benefits plan premium, for an amount requested by each district superintendent or Director to be excluded from salary and added to the district (or conference) contribution toward housing allowance, and each district superintendent and director's salary. The line item amount for each of these is to be determined in consultation with and approved by the Council on Finance and Administration. It is required that the accountable reimbursement plan for the district superintendent and director's expense for conference meetings and additional ministerial expenses be established in accordance with Sec. 62 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Also, any Housing Expense Set-aside, as desired by each district superintendent or Director shall be established in accordance with Sec. 107 of the IRC in like manner. Further, the cost of the Clergy Retirement Security Program, billed directly to the conference, will be an apportionment to the districts. An additional amount for voucher, reimbursed expenses related to each director's office is also a part of the respective council's or commission's hudaet.
- The district committees on finance are authorized to prepare budgets for presentation to the district stewards. An amount up to 10% of the support and compensation for the district superintendent may be included in the district budget to defray the utility costs of the district parsonage. In addition, an amount up to 10% of the support and compensation may be included in the district budget for the purpose of voucher reimbursement of travel and business-related expenses. District budgets shall not include a discretionary fund, but may include a District Operations Expense item. The district budget shall be submitted to the Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration for approval each year. The district stewards are authorized to apportion a Connectional Contingency Fund to be used for paying in full at the district level apportioned items, which may fall short within the respective district. The Connectional Contingency Fund will be administered at the district level in the same manner as the District Work Fund. It is understood that if a portion of the Connectional Contingency Fund is not used in any given year, it will remain in the fund and future apportionment funds will be reduced. Any adjustments for unusual local church situations will be made in the apportionment of the Connectional Contingency Fund only. All other apportionments will be distributed to every local church on the basis of the decimal.
- 5. We recommend a \$100,000 apportionment for Texas Methodist College Association. The Council also recommends that the amount for the Wesley Foundation Fund be equal to \$1.91 per member based on the total conference membership, and apportioned to the churches on the decimal formula.
- 6. At the end of each fiscal year unexpended unrestricted operation funds, less the amount needed to cover deficits in conference budget accounts, shall be transferred into the

operating reserve and an accounting of all operating reserve funds shall be made at each Annual Conference.

7. Each year the use of the unspent Contingency Fund shall be reviewed by the Council on Finance and Administration and the Bishop to decide if any amount should be used for Conference, Jurisdictional and General Church apportionments before going into the Operating Reserve.

#### Report No. 2

 The Conference Council on Finance and Administration approves and recommends the following offerings be taken in all local churches of the Central Texas Conference on or near the 2011 dates designated:

- 2. All boards, commissions and agencies shall have prepared in writing and submitted to the Council on Finance and Administration their budgets for the ensuing year by the date set by the Council on Finance and Administration. The program agencies shall present their budgetary request to the Committee on Evaluation and Budget on a date set by the Chair of the Mission Leadership Team prior to the annual budgetary meeting of the MLT. Requests will not be considered if received after the due date unless an extension has been requested and approved.
- 3. An amount equal to 50% of the General/Jurisdictional Conference per diem or reimbursement for actual expenses above the per diem, whichever is less, shall be paid to each elected lay and clerical delegate and to the first lay and clerical alternate delegates representing this conference at General/Jurisdictional Conference.
- 4. The director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration is authorized to:
  - Consolidate the various funds of the Annual Conference and of the agencies into one or more bank accounts.
  - b) Write all checks for the agencies of the conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency and in keeping with approved conference budget. The Treasurer is also authorized to transmit to the authorized treasurers all other funds that are raised by the local churches in response to General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference askings that have been approved by the appropriate body.
  - c) The conference treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions, and other agencies of the conference into the operating reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempted by CFA) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

- d) Invest the funds of the conference in government securities and federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and/or with the Texas Methodist Foundation, and/or Central Texas Methodist Foundation and to borrow on and dispose of investments at, or prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in accounts of the conference under the guidance of the Council on Finance and Administration.
- e) Deposit funds for specifically designated purposes in federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and/or with the Texas Methodist Foundation and/or Central Texas Methodist Foundation under the joint control of the Central Treasury (Conference Council on Finance and Administration) and the agency concerned, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.

#### Report No. 3 Reserve Funds

In order to establish a better system of accountability, the Council on Finance and Administration, following action of the 1991 Annual Conference, implemented the following management procedures for reserve funds beginning 1/1/92:

- a) The operating reserve is no longer treated as a contingency fund but as a cash flow fund
- b) A separate contingency fund has been set up to cover unbudgeted expenses with accounting of these expenditures to be made to the Annual Conference.
- c) A contingency fund of \$50,000 has been established from the operating reserve.
- d) The contingency fund will be replenished at the beginning of each year by the interest earnings on both the contingency fund and the operating reserve. Any interest earnings over and above that necessary to replenish the contingency fund to a balance of \$50,000 will go into the operating reserve.
- e) The goal is a permanent operating reserve fund of 10% of the current budget to be used strictly for cash flow.
- f) The operating reserve will be replenished by funds unused by the conference at the end of the year.
- g) The authority for the administration of these funds rests with the Council on Finance and Administration pursuant to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church and the Standing Rules of the Central Texas Conference.

#### **Contingency Fund Policy**

- 1. Expenditures will be made from the Contingency Fund under one of two circumstances:
  - a) Unforeseen circumstances, unpredicted, unplanned for, emergency situations that could not have been foreseen by reasonable people and reasonable committees.
  - b) Failure of expected income to support a budgeted expenditure
- 2. The conference treasurer may authorize up to \$250; the CFA executive committee may authorize up to \$5,000 either in meeting or by phone; those over \$5,000 must be authorized by the full board either in meeting or by phone.
- No disbursement will be made without the authorization signature of either the conference treasurer or the chair of CFA.

#### Report No. 4 Mileage Reimbursement

The accountable mileage reimbursement for conference staff shall be the IRS rate. All others shall be reimbursed at 25 cents per mile for one to six persons in a car, and 35 cents per mile when seven or more members ride in the same car for necessary travel on conference business. Due to the fluctuation of gasoline prices, the CFA is authorized to change the mileage rate between sessions of the Annual Conference if deemed necessary. This reimbursement rate will be effective at the close of this Annual Conference.

## Report No. 5 Accountability

The Council on Finance and Administration, through its Director, shall monitor monies received through the apportioned funds, and keep those Boards and Agencies receiving funds from the conference advised of possible shortfalls to enable them to adjust their expenses where at all possible in order for expenditures not to exceed actual income for the year. CFA will seek to work with Boards and Agencies to allow the maximum funding of ministries and programs without creating a deficit situation in the Conference Budget.

#### Report No. 6

At Annual Conference, CFA will present a budget which is comprised of the major ministry components of the Conference. When the Conference approves the budget, it will be voting on the figures of those components and the composite total. If occasion arises to meet unforeseen and unusual expenses, or to provide for emerging ministries that could not be known at the time of budget preparation, a request may be made to CFA for approval to shift monies from one major ministry component to another major ministry component of the budget. In faithfulness to Standing Rule V.10 this procedure will not be used simply because a ministry area anticipates some funds will not be spent.

#### Report No. 7

In these days when churches are more vulnerable to being sued than they were in the past, and for a far wider list of causes, it is imperative that each local church be incorporated. Failing to be incorporated puts each of the members of the church in jeopardy. In addition to being incorporated each church must review its property and liability insurance coverage with consideration for areas of liability not only between church staff and members or guests, and not only between the church as an entity and whomever might happen upon the premises, but also for the area of liability of employer versus employee.

#### Report No. 8

By action of the 1999 Annual Conference, each newly chartered church shall be apportioned 25% of what would be its apportionment, under Standing Rule, V, 4.0, for its first year after records are available, 50% its second year, 75% its third year and 100% its fourth year and thereafter.

## Report No. 9 Fair Share Asking

We recommend the following as Fair Share goals for 2011:

Justice for Our Neighbors \$38,000 – (4<sup>th</sup> year of five years)
United Community Centers \$50,000 – (3<sup>rd</sup> year of five years)
Global Aids Funds \$81,896 – (2<sup>nd</sup> year of two years)

(REMINDER: The Annual Conference no longer has a surety bond to cover laity who handle church finances. A letter was sent to all churches notifying them of this change. Once again we urge every church to review their current general liability insurance to ascertain whether this issue is addressed.)

#### **Report of the Mission Ministries Associate Director**

We have had several opportunities for learning, leading, and growing in discipleship this year. Our 2009 Academy of Christian Education included 16 local church Christian educators (leading all age levels) and more than a dozen clergy and lay leaders in the areas of Bible, theology and Christian education. We will have our next ACE event in the fall of 2011. In the meantime, we plan several one-day training sessions around the conference using some of the leaders and modules that have been so successful in our week-long approach.

Ten children's leaders attended the GBOD's FOCUS '09 event in Indianapolis in July. From that these leaders have continued to share their experiences and learning among themselves and with others in the conference.

Sixteen persons attended our conference's first training for coaches who will work with local churches and leaders for the purposes of identity, focus, purpose and mission. We will be organizing further opportunities for more depth as well as for bringing new persons to be trained.

We provided training for clergy who offer premarital counseling to gain information and resources for meeting the state's guidelines and assisting couples to begin and maintain strong and healthy marriages.

The Fall Summit, led by Bishop Robert Schnase, was the largest our conference has ever conducted. Many of our local churches continue to study Bishop Schnase's book on *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations*. The conference staff is still working with local churches to provide resources, training, and support for these local church efforts.

Christian Education Sunday will be Sunday, September 13, 2010. All of our churches are invited to ask for a special offering to support the Christian education ministries of the conference. This money is used to provide opportunities such as those mentioned above for training local church leaders for all age level/life-stage ministries for leadership and discipleship in their local churches and communities. We are very grateful for all who participate in this offering and in the opportunities provided as a result of your generosity.

It is a great privilege and honor to serve God with you in the Central Texas Conference. Working with our conference staff and leadership to energize and equip local churches and leaders for discipleship continues to be fun and challenging and inspiring for me. #### Report of the Mission Ministries Associate Director

This past year has been filled with new opportunities and meeting many new people. To fit it all into a half page report is very limiting, but here are some highlights. I will mention the Student Leadership Team events, but please refer to that report for more information.

After a fantastic annual conference last year, youth headed out for the summer on mission trips, camps, and retreats with their youth groups. Two of our youth headed to Southwestern University for the first annual Texas Youth Academy. This two-week delve into theology, faith development and worship was replicated from the Duke University Youth Academy which is a highly-regarded and very popular program on the East Coast. Ethan Gregory and Jessica Connell

thoroughly enjoyed this Academy and came back energized and equipped to lead in their local church. Since then, Ethan has become a certified Lay Speaker and has had several preaching opportunities. Our conference will again be co-sponsoring the Texas Youth Academy and hope that many more youth emerge strengthened and inspired.

Inspired by the ReThink Church campaign, several youth workers and I wrote a curriculum piece for youth based on the question, "Church Is..." In September, I and three other youth workers headed to Nashville for a Youth Worker Movement workshop on Writing. We met with Cokesbury and Abingdon staff, Upper Room staff, and the editor from The Journal of Student Ministries. This was a very educational time and we returned with a desire to utilize more of our local youth workers as writers and curriculum developers to share within our conference. We have begun "idea-sharing" or document sharing again for our local church youth workers.

Our Student Leadership Team decided in the Spring to adopt the Four Focus Areas of the General Church as their own focus areas for the next four years. This year, our theme was "Engaging in Ministry with the Poor." The SLT chose to do two experiential events and two educational events. Our first event was a Poverty Simulation Weekend in Waco in October. This was a transformational experience for the small group that went. We had our belongings taken away from us, had to live on a fixed amount of money for the weekend, and had to scrounge for food on the streets. This changed our views of many poverty-related issues, such as homelessness, lack of health-care, and lack of transportation. Our students have felt called to work within their communities to make a difference for those in poverty. Our second event was World Vision's 30 Hour Famine in November. We spent the 30 hours at Glen Lake involved in education, service, worship, and drinking a lot of water and juice. We raised several thousand dollars for World Vision and challenged the youth to give of themselves to help others.

At the end of October, Karen Granderson, Jeff Jones, Mary Gean Cope and I provided a Safe Sanctuaries/Sexual Misconduct Prevention Training for local church youth workers and children's workers. This had not been offered for a few years, so it was time to provide more training. A new Safe Sanctuaries edition had also just been published, so we could highlight the changes, especially the new sections on social media. This was especially helpful for those in attendance who had not updated their local church Safe Sanctuaries policy recently.

### Report of Humanitarian Services Director

It has been exciting in 2009 to watch our conference and its humanitarian services ministry areas find new and creative ways to support the United Methodist Church's vision for the Four Areas of Focus—developing leaders, creating places for new people, eliminating poverty, and improving health globally.

We have continued to develop volunteer leadership in a number of areas and to deepen the strength of ministries that have grown over the years. The Disaster Response Task Force resumed the training of Early Response Teams according to new guidelines set by UMCOR to ensure that teams are equipped to serve vulnerable communities in times of disaster. The task force also launched new training to help local congregations be prepared for disaster in their own communities.

Support of missionaries by our churches also grew, and at the 2009 Annual Conference, we were honored for those important commitments and relationships.

The Refugee & Immigration Ministries Task Force was delighted to add to the ministries it supports the Welcoming Immigrants Network (WIN), a new faith-based network of caring people who reach out in love to immigrants. WIN is spearheaded by one of our own conference clergy, and the task force works closely with WIN leadership to advocate for immigrants, along with continued work with Justice for Our Neighbors and Refugee Services of Texas.

The Outreach Council welcomed to the leadership team two new conference coordinators in the Humanitarian Services areas: Rev. Lana Bradley, CTC Coordinator for the Task Force on Hunger, and Rev. Johnny Miller, CTC UM Volunteers in Mission (UMVIM) Coordinator. The Task Force on Hunger provided grants to a number of churches beginning new or expanded hunger ministries, and our congregations raised approximately \$17,000 for the 2009 Thanksliving Offering. The conference UMVIM program continued to train more team leaders from our local congregations, and applauds the efforts of churches that reached out to their neighbors, both locally and globally. To our knowledge, mission teams contributed a value of over \$2.2 million in volunteer labor hours—and this is only what was reported to us here at the conference office, so we know that countless more hours of ministry were graciously given behind the scenes. This vital service to our communities includes the work of youth on the CTCYM projects, a ministry about which our conference can be very proud!

Another highlight from 2009 was the first annual Great Day of Service, a one-day mission event coordinated by the conference office, the Student Leadership Team, CTCYM, and the Metropolitan Board of Missions. Over 250 youth and adults served ministries supported by the Metro Board and the event was so successful that leadership immediately began planning for the second Great Day of Service in April 2010, which will be expanded to three locations across the conference area.

We are truly grateful to all CTC congregations for their community outreach ministries and wish blessings upon all of the people reaching out to the least, the last, and the lost.

#### Report of the Archivist/Resource Director

The Conference Multi-Media Resource Center's goal is to support all of the varieties of ministry throughout the local churches and conference groups and agencies with resources and information so that they may be equipped to make Disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. The Resource Center assists all of the local churches and related agencies of the conference. The Resource Center is a lending library with resources to aid and support the various ministries and goals of our local churches and agencies.

The Resource Center contains a variety of resources for pastors, Sunday school teachers, committee members, small groups, men's/women's groups, youth groups, and children's ministries as well as resources for personal spiritual growth. The Resource Center provides books, DVD's, study aids, music, bible studies, and audiovisual equipment to enhance your spiritual journey, ministry, and educational programs. The Resource Center provides materials that address many topics for all age groups, from children to senior adults. The collection is searchable online and material may be reserved online as well as via email, in person or by phone. In addition to requested resources, the Resource Center also offers consultation for specific needs. Consultation is always available to guide churches in planning their small group studies, confirmation and new member classes and creating, managing, and operating their own in-house church library.

There is also a section devoted to the material provided by Tony Campbell and the Depression Connection Team.

The Resource Center experienced an 8% increase in usage in the past year. The collection continues to be updated with current materials and studies and some old favorites have been updated to DVD format. 193 new materials were added to the collection in 2009, along with weeding out dated material for a total of 4,061 items.

Recommendations for new or seasonally relevant materials are noted in the E-link. You may preview the print and video resources available for loan at no charge. In addition, the Center provides samples of current Christian education curriculum to aid patrons with their purchase decisions. Most items loan at no charge, others rent for a reasonable fee. Future plans include making the Resource Center web page more interactive and informative. Plans include adding a "recommendations" feature, reviews, and helpful links. Promotion of the Resource Center will continue to be a focus for the coming year. We continue to build and improve our library of Christian media to serve our members with up-to-date, high quality resources and services. Suggestions for additional resources are always welcome. ## Report of Central Texas Conference Youth in Mission (CTCYM) Director

In 2009, more than 2,500 youth and adults from Central Conference churches served as the hands and feet of Christ in three CTCYM mission trips. Participants of the senior high and junior high/senior high combination trip spent a week in June of 2009 helping those in need in the poverty-stricken Mississippi Delta region and other areas in Louisiana and Texas. The Mississippi Delta region is one of the poorest areas of the United States. Many of the residents say they feel forgotten as they see jobs leave the region at the same time relief dollars have been redirected to other areas hit hard by natural disasters. Working through local agencies and churches, CTCYM participants were able to provide a small bit of much-needed relief to many in the area. The projects included patching roofs, repairing floors, painting walls, fixing porches, replacing windows, building wheelchair ramps and much more. Junior high trip participants worked in their own back yards helping those in need right in the Central Texas Conference. Thirty-four churches served as host living centers and more than 120 individuals accepted the volunteer leadership positions that make CTCYM possible.

As plans for 2010 come close to completion, the CTCYM Advisory Committee has worked to make this year's trips great events for both those who participate and those who receive our help. This summer, CTCYM expects to bring 2,800 youth and adults together on our three trips, increasing our ability to help more people than ever before.

CTCYM has worked closely with the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference to be able to serve in their communities. Twenty-three Oklahoma churches will be hosting our senior high and combination trip groups. Our junior high groups will be serving in ten different small communities in the Southwest Texas conference.

Every summer CTCYM brings together youth and adults from around the Conference to serve in the name of Christ. For a week they live, eat, work and worship together in living centers hosted by churches in different parts of the country. CTCYM is funded by the fees paid by participants to attend and by donations from others mission-minded individuals.

Ministry Focus: The Igniting Ministry initiative was approved and expanded by the 2008 General Conference to provide a presence of The United Methodist Church in communities across the U.S. with an emphasis on attracting non-churched persons – especially those 18 to 34 years of age.

The RETHINK CHURCH/IGNITING MINISTRY efforts across the Central Texas Conference have been seriously curtailed since 2008 (\$50,000 down to \$10,000 and down again to \$8,500) when funds were withheld

At a time when we are trying to raise the profile of United Methodism, it is counterproductive to restrict advertising our invitational messages. This is especially obvious when our neighboring North Texas Conference places TV, radio, billboard, and major newspaper advertising around the times of Advent, Lent and back-to-school that attract potential visitors to their churches. This is a program that previously was shared by North and Central Texas with many of our congregations reaping the benefits. Our local churches are asking: "Why don't we advertise our churches at Christmas time and Easter?"

Central Texas Conference advertising for 2009/2010 have/will be limited to lower cost (and certainly lower profile and reach) advertising with such outlets as an online community site (Pegasus) and a free-distribution tabloid (Fort Worth Weekly). If funds should become available, it would be helpful to restore a significant portion of this funding so that we might more widely cover our conference area and at least participate in radio and more online advertising.

# **CONFERENCE STUDENT LEADERSHIP TEAM**

The Student Leadership Team has had an exciting year engaging in Ministry with the Poor. The Student Leadership Team decided to take Engaging in Ministry with the Poor, one of the Four Focus Areas from the General Church, and make it our theme for the year. All the events we offered were built around poverty and taught youth from around the conference how to fight poverty in their local churches and communities. The SLT chose to do two events that were experiential in the Fall and two events that were educational in the Spring.

In October, the Student Leadership Team joined with Mission Waco to hold a Poverty Simulation Weekend. A small group of youth from around the conference came to Waco and truly experienced poverty. Participants slept outside, worked with local underprivileged children, participated in a hunger banquet and attended Church Under the Bridge in Waco.

In November the Student Leadership Team partnered with Glen Lake Camp to host a 30 Hour Famine. Youth came to Glen Lake and fasted for 30 hours. Youth were asked to start the famine after lunch on their own before they came to Glen Lake and continued until 6:00 p.m. on Saturday. During the Famine youth participated in small groups and learned about hunger at a global level. Youth also participated in several mission projects in and around Glen Rose. The famine was broken with Holy Communion. Fasting for 30 Hours was a great way to truly experience Communion.

During February the Student Leadership Team hosted its annual Mid Winters. Mid Winter 1 was centered around ministry with the poor globally and Mid Winter 2 was centered on ministry with the poor locally. The scriptural theme was Matthew 25: 34-36. At each of the retreats, youth participated in small groups where they learned how to love their neighbors at a local and global level. SLT brought in many non-profit organizations dealing with different aspects of poverty and invited to students to be inspired by their work. Youth also participated in great games, fellowship, and passionate worship.

The Student Leadership Team is continually working to energize and equip local churches for youth ministry. We see our mission to provide opportunities for youth and youth workers to come together to learn about relevant topics, that they can take back to their local churches and be equipped for new ministry. ## **WALK TO EMMAUS**

The Walk to Emmaus is a spiritual renewal program intended to strengthen the local church. The experience is intended to energize people to return to their home church where they will be active and in turn will energize the church. The Walk to Emmaus is designed to empower people to become disciples and equip them to become leaders in the local church. The program's approach seriously considers the model of Christ's servanthood and encourages Christ's disciples to act in ways appropriate to being "a servant of all."

The Walk to Emmaus experience begins with a 72-hour short course in Christianity, comprised of fifteen talks by lay and clergy on the themes of God's grace, disciplines of Christian discipleship, and what it means to be the church. The course is wrapped in prayer and meditation, special times of worship and daily celebration of Holy Communion. The "Emmaus community," made up of those who have attended an Emmaus weekend, support the 72-hour experience with a prayer vigil, by preparing and serving meals, and other acts of love and self-giving. The Emmaus Walk typically begins Thursday evening and concludes Sunday evening. Men and women attend separate weekends. In 2009 the Central Texas Conference Walk to Emmaus program conducted thirteen three-day-weekend events at locations throughout the Conference. We had 443 Pilgrims from 165 local churches representing thirteen denominations and 17 different non-denominational congregations.

During and after the three days, Emmaus leaders encourage participants to meet regularly in small groups. The members of the small groups challenge and support one another in faithful living. Participants seek to Christianize their environments of family, job, and community through the ministry of their congregations. The three-day Emmaus experience and follow-up groups strengthen and renew Christian people as disciples of Jesus Christ and as active members of the body of Christ in mission to the world.

The Walk to Emmaus gets its name from the story in Luke 24:13-35, which provides the central image for the three-day experience and follow-up. Luke tells the story of that first Easter afternoon when the risen Christ appeared to the two disciples who were walking together along the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus. Like Christians and churches who are blinded by preoccupation with their own immediate difficulties, these two disciples' sadness and hopelessness seemed to prevent them from seeing God's redemptive purpose in things that had happened. And yet, the risen Christ "came near and went with them," opening the disciples' eyes to his presence and lighting the fire of God's love in their hearts. As they walked to Emmaus, Jesus explained to them the meaning of all the scriptures concerning himself. When they arrived in Emmaus, Jesus "took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them," and their eyes were opened. They recognized him as Jesus, the risen Lord, and they remembered how their hearts had burned within them as they talked with him on the road. Within the hour, the two disciples left Emmaus and returned immediately to their friends in Jerusalem. As they told stories about their encounters with the risen Lord, Jesus visited them again with a fresh awareness of his living presence.

However, the story of Jesus' resurrection does not conclude with the disciples' personal spiritual experiences. Jesus ascended to the Father, and the disciples became the body of the risen Christ through the empowerment of the Holy Spirit. The disciples were sent forth by the Spirit to bear witness to the good news of God in Jesus Christ. They learned to walk in the spirit of Jesus, to proclaim the gospel to a disbelieving world, and to persevere in grace through spiritual companionship with one another. The Walk to Emmaus offers today's disciples a parallel opportunity to rediscover Christ's presence in their lives, to gain fresh understanding of God's transforming grace, and to form friendships that foster faith and support spiritual maturity. While Emmaus provides a pathway to the mountaintop of God's love, it also supports pilgrims' return to the world in the power of the Spirit to share the love they have received with a hurtful and hurting world. Emmaus does not aim to take people out of church, but to help them think about what Jesus has done for them and energize them to go back to their own church and serve God. Personal Christian growth and active service in a person's home church are emphasized.

# Older Adult Ministries

This year's resourcing for Senior Adult ministries took the form on individual workshops, teaching events, and preaching in 49 congregations across the annual conference. Of particular

interest to many of these fellowships, especially those congregations heavily weighted with Senior Adult faithful, has been Bishop Ruben Job's <u>Living Fully, Dying Well</u>study. In a DVD "Disciple-like" format, this study powerfully and deeply reintroduces the life themes too often neglected in our teaching and nurture ministries these days, aging and dying as potentially fruitful aspects of the Disciple's life. The eight session study is available through the conference resource center and Cokesbury.

Other teaching/workshop themes presented often are: Evangelism Among Senior Adults, a First Century Christian Insight for Today (two or three sessions), Unique Turns in the Faith Journey of Senior Adults (three sessions), and Is Loneliness a Christian Option? (one session).

The Senior Adult Ministry Team hopes to build an active and interactive Senior Adult ministry this year. Based on the success of past district level programming, we will encourage older adult programs within each district to gather for mission opportunities, for worship, and for social gatherings. We hope to visit with District Superintendents and older adult leaders in the congregations throughout the Conference.

We hope to organize an Older Adult Retreat to offer educational and spiritual programming. Ideally this retreat will be in the late summer or fall. Location will be determined by the availability of adequate facilities.

## Socially

One of the 3 ways we have strengthened the local churches is with our social activities in 2009. We continued our 3<sup>rd</sup> Friday Dinner in 2009. Our dinners included 30-35 folks each month from 12-15 churches in our area. These dinners started a few years ago during the holiday season and were so successful we decided to do them on a monthly basis. The holiday season is a tough time for singles so we are meeting their needs of belonging and companionship with others. This opens the door for our regulars and new ones just joining us to meet each other. Dinners are an easy way to get to know folks in an uplifting environment. Our singles share these friendships formed and go back their home churches and spread the word on what a great group we have. These events can strengthen the singles communities at the smaller churches.

We had 2 events at Lyle Lodge (FUMC FW lodge at Eagle Mountain Lake) this year. The summer event was a BBQ dinner, swimming, volleyball, live music and indoor games. This is one of our biggest events for the year and we had 65 folks from various churches in our area as well as some from Dallas. At the fall event we grilled hot dogs and played games at Lyle Lodge. These events form friendships and strengthen bonds with our old friends. We really encourage folks to bring friends and encourage those that may have dropped out for a while to come out to our events. Everyone can share experiences from their home churches either good or bad and can take the learning experience back to their home church to help it grow.

We also attended outdoor concerts, baseball games, organized a walking group, community events and events shared by singles from our local churches.

## Spiritually

This has been a great year for us spiritually. We launched a bible study last spring with Rev. Chuck Graff leading. We had 5 sessions with 30-35 in attendance each week. It was so successful we have planned another one for this year starting in April that will be 4 weeks long. The bible study group was very diverse in age ranging from mid 30's to 60+. We had 10-12 churches represented. Many of the singles in attendance are new to the UMC TA Singles group. They are singles looking for a bible study group. This showed a strong need for a bible study in the singles community. Most churches do not have large singles groups so this was a great way to combine the

groups. Singles want and need spirituality in their lives. These singles will go back to their home church and encourage others to come to the event this spring.

Last spring we had our 3<sup>rd</sup> annual retreat at Glen Lake/Still Water Lodge. We had over 40 in attendance this last year. Our speaker was Rev. Kent Kilbourne and Tom McDermott provided music. Each year we do this the group grows in attendance. We had singles form Tarrant County, Dallas and as far down as Waco. Our next retreat has been set for April 9-10 at Still Water.

We took a van full of singles to Mt Sequoyah for the Jurisdictional Singles Retreat in November 2009. This is an annual singles retreat with 8 states represented. The retreat was very uplifting and spiritually based. We had 4 churches represented in our group. This is a wonderful training experience for folks working on building a singles ministry at their church or wanting to maintain one and keep it growing. They have wonderful speakers to lead the sessions. Everyone came home refreshed and energized.

3 of our churches have on going divorce recovery groups. Many of our singles are coming from a resent divorce and looking for a healthy atmosphere. What better place to come to than your church for a divorce recovery group. Folks in these groups find a group of friends to bond with and feel secure in the surroundings of a church atmosphere.

#### **Outreach and Mission**

One of the mission projects that have been ongoing since the beginning of this group has be donating food to the food bank. At each event at Lyle Lodge we encourage folks to bring 2 can for the Food Bank. This has been very successful and needed at the Food Bank. Many of our churches have food banks and receive food from the Food Bank.

At Christmas this year we had singles participate in the Holiday Friends project at Harvest House in Burleson. They worked with the children creating cards for the parents. This was our 3rd year doing this project.

We took our 1<sup>st</sup> Mission trip in January of 2009 to Dulac, Louisiana to do hurricane repair work. We took 12 singles and Rev. Chuck Graff on the trip. We worked on 3 homes that needed indoor and outdoor repair work done. As a side trip we stopped at Sager Brown and toured the UMCOR Depot. This opened a lot of eyes on the distribution of items for disaster relief. It was a great team and every one learned and gained empathy for our neighbors in southern Louisiana. It was such a successful trip we took a team of 12 again this last February.

UMC Singles TA has had a blessed year! We plan to ensure the singles in the conference have opportunities to grow and share with each other.

## AIDS TASK FORCE

One of the UMC's Four Focus Areas is the elimination of the killer diseases of poverty. Of these diseases, the one that has the greatest presence in the United States is HIV/AIDS. In Tarrant County, for example, AIDS is the leading cause of death in some demographic categories. In spite of these startling statistics, many people remain uninformed and unaware of the dangers of this epidemic. For this reason the UMC has allotted 25% of the funds raised in an Annual Conference to be used locally, with the other 75% being used globally. In the Central Texas Conference, the Global Aids Fund Task Force is administering these funds for the purpose of building on-going HIV/AIDS ministries in local churches.

The strategy of the Task Force is to partner with local churches in sponsoring HIV/AIDS education and prevention workshops as the first step in establishing this ministry. The workshop agenda is aimed at educating the participants about HIV and AIDS and providing the training necessary to build this ministry in their churches. At the least, the opportunity to speak openly and honestly will help to remove the stigma that now prevents many from learning the truth about this disease. Few congregations are not affected by HIV/AIDS, either by having members who are infected or, more likely, having members who are affected by the infection of some relative or friend. Our youth are especially vulnerable to this disease without appropriate education and guidance. The goal of the Task Force is to provide the opportunity for every church in our Conference to have access to one of our "Critical Questions, Critical Answers" workshops.

We, the members of the Central Texas Conference, represent and offer the love of Christ through Restorative Justice Ministries (RJM) and practices by addressing the spiritual and practical needs of those we serve. Indeed, it is only by the grace of God, through the love of Christ and as a result of our connectional system that we (the Central Texas Conference Restorative Justice Ministries) are leading the charge in providing ministry and service to those who are marginalized and who live on the fringes of society. Through our Restorative Justice ministries we:

- provide free legal protection and representation for abused women and children
- assist homeless men and women who are being cheated and exploited by unscrupulous day labor operators.
- preserve and strengthen families who are in crisis due to incarceration
- provide residential programs designed to help women leaving prison/jail to re-enter successfully into the general population.
- provide emergency food and clothing, (within 24-48 hours of release) to the formerly incarcerated and their families
- aid crime victims and their respective family members in their healing
- provide scholarships to the formerly incarcerated who seek to obtain higher levels of education
- present Christmas gifts and toys to the children of the incarcerated
- present the gospel to those behind bars through volunteerism and Chaplaincy
- advocate RJM practices through educational and community events and forums

Yes, we are busy as we fulfill the Great Commission and, by precept and example, we in "Restorative Justice Ministries" whole-heartedly and unashamedly confess that we are, indeed, "Our Brother's Keeper". ## **DISASTER RESPONSE**

The Disaster Response Task Force saw a number of changes in our training program for 2009 as we updated our training with UMCOR. Five newly certified trainers have been busy training conference members in becoming Early Response trained in times of disaster. Our Disaster Task Force members have also been making presentations at district trainings, clergy meetings, and churches on Connecting Neighbors. Connecting Neighbors is a new program on how to prepare a church for both a disaster in their town and with their own church.

We have also been working on a disaster plan on what will happen if a disaster hits our own conference office.

In September 2009, in partnership with the UMVIM program, a full team went to UMCOR's Sager Brown Depot in Baldwin, LA to help assemble health kits, cleaning buckets, layette kits and school kits. Another trip took place in May 2010.

The beginning of 2010 brought the terrible tragedy of the earthquake in Haiti. The people of the Central Texas Conference responded with great enthusiasm as the Body of Christ. Over 23,000 health kits were collected and over \$160,000 was given to UMCOR through our churches. **Proposed Ministries:**

On behalf of the board of directors and the staff of the Foundation, we count it a sacred privilege to serve the persons and churches of our great Conference. Fifty-three years ago the founders of the Central Texas Methodist Foundation put in place a ministry that has evolved from a \$25,000 asset base to a \$25,000,000 asset base while distributing hundreds of thousand of dollars over the years to benefit churches and agencies of our conference. The Foundation continues to grow in services to benefit individuals and churches; and, we continue to grow in assets in our trust.

In 2009, two legacy gifts entrusted to our care came from Ms. Elizabeth West and Mr. Edwin T. Curry, both members of First United Methodist Church of Fort Worth. Both Ms. West and Mr. Curry established endowment funds with the Foundation through their wills. Their endowments are permanent sources of support for the causes of Christ they wanted to support, and it is our privilege to administer their gifts as they directed.

We're inspired with the continuing alliance we share with the Heart Spring Methodist Foundation that serves the Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church. Our common missions to serve in our conference areas give us opportunity to share our strengths and skills to benefit those we serve. Investment choices, fundraising programs, loan offerings, and staff development is better in both conferences because we value the Methodist connection together. We were pleased to offer the Clergy Tax Seminar in our conference which was led by Amy Hume, CPA, from the Texas Conference. More sharing is in our plans.

Some statistical references are great indicators of the 2009 year:

Certificates of Participation deposits are up 15%

Loans and loan commitments are up 24%

Year end total asset value is up 25%

The Foundation recorded annual net income for 2009 operations at \$466,804, thanks to improved investment performance, added income from assets, and outstanding work by our staff.

Larry Van Zile is to be particularly thanked for his efforts in growing our Certificates of Participation and for his leadership with annual stewardship programs in a number of churches. Within the national debate on health care reform, there has been much discussion on reducing costs, advancing technology, coordinating care and encouraging preventive care. These are essential for true reform, and Texas Health Resources is pursuing strategies to achieve these goals.

But what North Texans consistently tell us they want is to make health care human again—to restore <u>humaneness</u> and <u>compassion</u> to health care. In 2010 Texas Health Resources is focused on nurturing this innate human desire—people caring for and helping heal other people.

This means strongly emphasizing our faith-based heritage and the core values that form the foundation for everything we do—respect, integrity, compassion and excellence. Texas Health employees promise to take care of patients, each other and themselves, in body, mind and spirit. Our great Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals were founded in the spirit of "May all who enter here each day find healing and hope." This remains our pledge to those whom we are privileged to serve.

As Texas Health plans for the future, we are committed to maintaining the best of our foundation and historical tradition. It is the commitment of our hospitals to rehumanize health care. We believe in delivering care with respect for the individual, for the practice of medicine and for the healing power of faith.

## Rehumanizing Health Care through Respect

Respect for people is at the core of our mission: To improve the health of people in the communities we serve. This starts with treating our employees with dignity and respect, providing strong benefit programs and a supportive, encouraging and educational workplace. It is reflected in the respect with which our employees treat patients and visitors. We welcome and respect the diversity of religious faiths in our communities and among our staff members. We support the ways in which people nurture their spirits. Patients and families are encouraged to invite their ministers to our hospitals in order to maintain continuity with the patient's faith community. We are there to support them.

Respect for medicine means encouraging our caregivers to practice their art and science in an environment where high technology and best medical practices are manifest in healing hands and caring hearts. At Texas Health we are committed to advancing quality and patient safety for North Texans. Throughout the Texas Health system, our dedicated employees are continuously enhancing the quality of our care through training, education, research, effective leadership and responsible stewardship of resources.

And Respect for the healing power of faith is central to all our activities. In all we do we ask, "What good is medicine without faith?" Our faith-based heritage is exemplified in our hospitals by chapels and chaplains, meditation gardens, prayer books that offer prayers in varied faith traditions, and our clinical pastoral education program. Each year we sponsor the Faith Community Leadership Summit for all area ministers, faith leaders and lay leaders. This year's conference, attended by 300 faith leaders, focused on end-of-life care, support and ministry.

New initiatives are aimed at emphasizing compassion and the engagement of the faith community in healing. These include:

Compassion Index: Who better can help us judge our compassion than recent patients?
 From patient survey data, we have developed a customized report that focuses on responses dealing with topics such as caregiver compassion and concern for meeting

- patient needs. The report provides a "compassion report card" from the patient's perspective.
- Values-Based Leadership workshop: Part of a series of workshops for leaders that we
  are launching this year, this program emphasizes that emotional and spiritual intelligence
  are critical to values-based leadership. The workshop will help leaders consistently and
  consciously apply Texas Health's values to their decisions and communications.
- Faith and Spirituality Integration Council: This internal group provides resources and supports system leaders to reinforce faith-based values and promote values-based leadership. Members include several hospital presidents, other system-level leaders and Texas Health's senior chaplains.
- KLTY collaboration: This year we are sponsoring a series of 3-minute messages on KLTY, the No. 1 ranked Christian radio station in the U.S. "Healing Texans" with Bonnie Curry highlights patient and employee stories that show the spiritual side of healing.

Rehumanizing health care also means reaching beyond the walls of our hospitals. Our Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals continue to use innovative and effective ways to improve health in their communities. A few examples show the breadth and depth of our hospitals' support for their service areas:

- Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Azle: The hospital collaborates with a local service organization on the "Good NEWS for a Better LIFE" program. This initiative promotes healthy lifestyles and injury prevention among senior citizens. It focuses on improving health status through education, fitness classes and stronger social support. Additionally, it strives to increase access to local health care facilities and helps coordinate care for participants. The program is one of six nationwide recently recognized by the Premier health care alliance for improving the health of individuals in the community.
- Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Cleburne: In support of early detection of breast
  cancer, no-cost screening mammograms at Texas Health Cleburne may be scheduled by
  Johnson County women who do not have health insurance and match a low-income
  financial profile. Combined with an educational focus, this program has provided more than
  2,500 no-cost mammograms and diagnostic support for Johnson County women.

- Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Fort Worth: Texas Health Fort Worth pioneered the concept of faith community nursing within the Texas Health hospitals. This program integrates the practices of faith and nursing to improve the health of the communities we serve. Texas Health hospital chaplains and program nurse coordinators enter into a covenant relationship with a faith community's leader and a nurse within the congregation. Our hospitals have covenants with more than 60 faith communities to provide education on health services, wellness and disease prevention.
- Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Hurst-Euless-Bedford: Texas Health HEB has
  partnered with John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth to deliver diabetes education
  classes to the local Tongan population. Currently meeting in one church, Texas Health HEB
  plans to expand the program to other churches with large Tongan populations. The hospital
  also plans to build on its relationship with Tongans in the churches after the initial diabetes
  education campaign.
- Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Stephenville: The hospital has conducted a
  variety of community benefit programs for Erath County residents. These include hand
  hygiene in the public schools, nutrition services (with Schreiber Foods), car seat safety,
  diabetic education outreach and faith-based nursing. Future plans for Texas Health
  Stephenville include a diabetic program for the area's Hispanic population.
- Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Southwest Fort Worth: The hospital has focused on issues around treatment of sickle cell disease since 2007. It worked closely with various health care organizations, including John Peter Smith Hospital (JPS), Cook Children's Medical Center, the Sickle Cell Disease Association and the Texas Department of Health Services to address the care given to adult patients on a citywide level. In February 2010 the groups' efforts resulted in the opening of a sickle cell clinic at JPS.

Texas Health Resources: At the system level, Texas Health raised \$93,000 for the March of Dimes through the 2009 March for Babies. More than 1,000 walkers from across the system participated in the event, enabling Texas Health to almost double our original goal of \$50,000. Texas Health CEO Doug Hawthorne served as chair of the campaign in the Dallas Fort Worth Metroplex.

## Our Measure of Success: Helping and Healing

This is just a flavor of how the people of Texas Health are serving their neighbors throughout North Texas. We believe strongly in helping our communities. This includes providing **charity care and community benefits**. In 2008 Texas Health Resources hospitals provided approximately \$238,000 a day in charity care. Including the cost of unreimbursed government-sponsored indigent care, the total increases to more than \$405,000 per day. With the unreimbursed cost of treating Medicare patients, the figure rises to more than \$1.3 million per day.

As a large enterprise and major employer in North Texas, we must pay attention to financial metrics. But the core measure of how we are living our mission, vision and values comes down to how many people we have compassionately helped or healed. Our guiding philosophy will always be caring for the whole patient—body, mind and spirit.

We ask for your prayers as we strive to live the humanity in health care, following the eternal example of the Great Physician.

Although I have experienced benefits from this procedure, it became evident that the effects of Parkinson's would prevent me from continuing to fulfill my responsibilities as President. After much prayer and discussion with my family and medical professionals, I decided to announce my plans to retire as President of Methodist Children's Home during our Board of Directors meeting in February. At the time this report was submitted to the Central Texas Annual Conference, I was working with the Home's Board of Directors to determine my retirement date.

I certainly feel sadness that the effects of Parkinson's led me to this decision. I wish I had many more years to serve in this ministry. However, my sadness is outweighed by my great joy at the thought of the increased opportunities I will soon have to spend time with my loved ones and the realization of the great honor it has been to lead this special ministry since 2003.

As I reflect on what the Home has accomplished during my time as President, I am reminded that God is amazing. Opportunities to implement innovative programs to better serve children and expand our services to care for more young people throughout Texas and New Mexico testify that God has His hand on this special ministry. I give God glory for the work that went in to surpassing our initial mandate to double the number of children served daily from 500 to 1,000 and for His continued guidance as we press on toward our goal of becoming the most redemptive childcare program in the nation.

As President, I surrounded myself with talented and dedicated people whose main objective was to provide the best for at-risk children. My life is better because of these people and the many special relationships I have developed with our children, staff, Board and benefactors – some of whom are now close friends.

Supporters, like those we have in the Central Texas Annual Conference, help the Home do great things. Guided by our core values of Christian Principles, Relationships, Responsibility, Growth, Service and Hope, the Home has recently accomplished the following for the glory of God:

- Provided services for nearly 1,600 children during the year.
- Opened four homes on our Waxahachie campus and now serve 40 children in this area.
- Completed construction of a Recreation and Activities Center at our Boys Ranch.
- Expanded the Grandparents as Parents Program in Waco.

The future will provide the Home with as many, if not more, opportunities to positively impact the lives of children, youth and families. The Home's staff remains passionate about our work with young people and will be ready to help change lives and, in the process, empower our children to one day be productive members of society and this faith community.

We are grateful for the leadership and support of the Central Texas Annual Conference. Our achievements in the past, and those yet to come, are directly related to the men and women who give their time, talents and resources to bless our children. We are grateful to Rev. Henry Radde for completing nine years of service on the Home's Board of Directors. ## **MMH Ministry**

Today, the mission of Methodist Mission Home is to offer hope to individuals facing spiritually, emotionally and physically challenging circumstances, so they may lead enriched, rewarding and satisfying lives. Through professional guidance and compassionate support, teens and young women facing unplanned pregnancy and families considering adoption make mutually beneficial decisions. Through transitional education including life skills and vocational training, young adults with disabilities and those who are deaf develop confidence and competence to reach their personal level of independent living. MMH fulfills this mission through the following programs:

- Adoption Services has placed 5,735 children into loving homes through domestic, older child, and international adoptions. We provide counseling for birth parents and adoptive families throughout the adoption process. Our maternity services include campus housing for pregnant teens and young women considering adoption. Post-adoption counseling is available for birth parents, adoptive families, and adoptive children. MMH provides adoption education to teach teens and the professionals who work with at-risk youth about the alternatives to parenting adoption
- The Southwest Center for Higher Independence (SCHI) For many teens, graduation from high school means moving on to college. For students with multiple disabilities, college is not always the next step. For these young adults, ages 18 and older, SCHI is the next step. Established in 1974, SCHI was founded as a transitional education center for people who were deaf and hard of hearing. Today, our services have expanded to accommodate more diverse disabilities, including high functioning MR, autism, Asbergers, cerebral palsy, and learning disorders. SCHI has assisted hundreds of young adults with disabilities in learning the vocational and life skills to achieve their personal best.
- The Genesis Cooperative is a self-supporting collaboration of five nonprofit agencies on
  the MMH campus serving youth and young adults with disabilities, pregnant teens and
  young women, women recovering from substance abuse and their children, and adults who
  are deaf/blind.

In 2008, Wesleyan Hospice expanded to begin serving home-based hospice clients as well as residents in our skilled nursing facility in Georgetown, The Wesleyan at Scenic. This newest aspect of our ministry, dealing specifically with those nearing death, adds greatly to our ministry's commitment to provide compassionate care.

# Elsewhere in the Conference

Wesleyan is also looking for locations in the northern part of the conference where a market need can be demonstrated and where local United Methodists are willing to work and pray and give so that a new ministry can be developed and nurtured. The new campus in Georgetown required the price of 30 acres of land as well as charitable giving in the amount of \$1.5 million. #### TASK FORCE ON HUNGER

Growing hunger needs in Texas moved the task force to designate the 2008 Thanksliving offering to remain within conference to fund grants submitted by conference churches seeking to initiate and/or build capacity for ministries that combat hunger within their communities. During 2009, a grant application was developed and made available to conference churches for first-time requests up to \$1,000 and additional requests up to \$250. Applications were reviewed by the task force and upon approval; funds were distributed directly to the submitting church. Over \$15,000 had been distributed in support on ministries that feed the hungry by year-end with remaining funds of approximately \$1,000 carried over to 2010 as a designated line item to continue funding grant applications throughout the year.

Distribution of Thanksliving offering funds will change beginning in 2009 moving away from designating one recipient to receive 100% of the offering to the new practice of a 90%-10% split between a Global Ministries Advance and hunger ministries within the Central Texas Conference alternating yearly. In 2009, the task force designated Global Ministries Advance #982029 Hunger and Development to receive 90% of the offering with 10% remaining within the conference to fund grant applications for local church ministries to feed the hungry. Subsequently, the 2010 Thanksliving offering will have 90% of the offering remain within the conference to fund hunger ministries and 10% designed to a Global Ministries Advance. The task force believed this an effective way to support ministries that alleviated world hunger while continuing to encourage local churches in their efforts to combat hunger within their communities.

Hunger in Texas has reached crisis proportions. In November of this year, the Department of Agriculture announced that Texas had been elevated to the rank of the second hungriest state in the nation surpassed only by Mississippi. In response to the growing hunger needs of Texas, the task force has established the following goals for 2010 designed to combat hunger within the communities of the Central Texas Conference.

- Develop an online resource that provides descriptions of ongoing hunger ministries in churches
  of the Central Texas Conference with contact information for churches interesting in beginning or
  expanding a hunger ministry in their community. The purpose for this sharing of ideas is to the
  expansion of hunger ministries within the conference to feed the hungry.
- Produce and distribute a CD highlighting hunger ministries of grant recipients funded by the 2008 Thanksliving offering. The CD will be designed as a worship aid in support of the 2010 Thanksliving offering with 90% of the total designated to remain in the conference to continue funding grants for hunger ministries.
- Develop a two-week curriculum for use by Sunday school classes and small groups on hunger issues within Texas and our biblical imperative to feed the hungry and confront the ongoing causes of hunger both at home and around the globe.

## EMORY-CANDLER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Guided by our mission to educate faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries in the world, Candler School of Theology continues to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ by developing leaders called by God to serve in Christian ministry. Our distinctive commitment to both inspiring minds and empowering ministry enables us to develop uniquely well-rounded leaders who are challenged academically, encouraged spiritually, and immersed in Christian service from the first day they arrive on campus.

As one of the 13 official seminaries of The United Methodist Church, Candler is grounded in the Christian faith and shaped by the Wesleyan tradition of evangelical piety, ecumenical openness, and social concem. As one of nine graduate professional schools of Emory University, Candler provides a rich context for learning and formation supported by the extensive resources of a top-tier research university. As a school located in the major metropolitan area of Atlanta, Georgia, Candler offers students a learning laboratory that reflects the highly diverse communities of our 21st century world. There is no better place for preparation that addresses our major denominational priorities: developing leaders, starting and growing churches, ministry with the poor, and improving global health.

To ensure that our students are prepared for leadership in an increasingly global context, Candler has placed a new emphasis on internationalizing the curriculum. In 2009, we established the Office of International Initiatives, led by Dr. David Jenkins, and received several grants related to international engagement. Through one of these, Candler partnered with International Relief and Development, Inc. to send seven student interns to Mozambique, Indonesia, and the Republic of Georgia in the summer of 2009. Other grants are assisting Candler in initiating a national conversation on best practices for internationalizing theological education. In spring semester of 2010, Dr. Wesley de Souza, Arthur J. Moore associate professor in the practice of evangelism, team-taught a distance education class in real time with a professor and students at a seminary in Sao Paolo, Brazil, the first collaboration of its kind at Candler. The March 2010 visit of Roman Catholic Cardinal Walter Kasper, president of the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity, ushered in a yearlong special emphasis on internationalization at Candler.

A hallmark of the Candler MDiv experience, the Contextual Education program continues to shape our students' pastoral identities by interweaving service at ministry sites and churches with academic reflection in the classroom. In any given week, Candler deploys more than 250 ConEd students throughout the region to minister to people in congregations, hospitals, and social service agencies. Last year, Candler's ConEd students provided 1/3 of the service hours responsible for Emory University winning the U.S. government's Presidential Award for General Community Service, the

highest federal award a college or university can receive for its commitment to community engagement.

Candler's Teaching Parish Program, directed by Dr. Alice Rogers, continues to expand into more conferences in the Southeastern Jurisdiction, providing United Methodist students with the opportunity to serve churches throughout their seminary education, earn academic credit for pastoral experience, and complete their MDiv degree in three years. Through the Course of Study regional school at Candler and our five extension schools in the Southeast, we oversaw the educational process of 918 people this past year.

Candler has faced the recent economic challenges with bold initiatives to advance our mission. Although our operating budget essentially will remain flat next year, we are increasing our investment in financial aid each year. Candler's total financial aid commitment in 2009-10 was \$4.7 million. Eighty-six percent of eligible students received Candler-based financial aid, with the average award covering 76 percent of tuition. More than \$2.6 million was provided to 191 United Methodist students. We also established Candler Advantage, a program designed to pay rising third-year MDiv students for summer internships in congregations so they can concentrate fully on honing their pastoral skills. In March, we hosted our second annual Leadership Candler event, an all-expenses-paid discernment experience that draws together top prospective MDiv students to explore the richness of life and study at Candler. Last year, 75 percent of the participants in Leadership Candler joined us as students in the fall. Finally, Candler has raised more than half of our \$60 million capital campaign goal.

During 2009-10, Candler celebrates the 25th anniversary of the Sherman Scholarship Fund. Established by Frank and Helen Sherman of Jacksonville, Florida, the Sherman program has provided financial assistance to 868 students preparing for pastoral ministry in United Methodist churches.

Candler's student body continues to attract younger and more diverse people. Our enrollment stands at 499, with 391 seeking the Master of Divinity, 62 the Master of Theological Studies, 25 the Master of Theology, 14 the Doctor of Theology, and 7 enrolled as Special, Non-Degree students. The total student population is 23% US ethnic minority, 11% international, and 50% women. More than 50 denominations are represented, with 52% of MDiv students being United Methodist. The median age of our entering class of MDiv students is 26, with 57% of total enrollment under thirty.

Our faculty members continually demonstrate their dedication to the church through preaching and teaching engagements, scholarship, and service in local parishes as leaders in their congregations. This year we welcome two new faculty: Dr. Greg Ellison, assistant professor of pastoral care and counseling, who joined us in fall 2009, and a fellow United Methodist, the Rev. Dr. Arun Jones, who joins us in fall 2010 as the Hankey Chair in World Evangelism. Candler also has produced *A Thrill of Hope*, a church resource DVD for Advent that offers a fresh take on the Christmas story, uniting art, scripture, and commentary by members of Candler's faculty. Candler draws considerable strength and inspiration from its vital relationship with The United Methodist Church. Our ability to fulfill our mission of educating faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries in the world depends upon your support, gifts, and prayers. 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#### **HUSTON-TILLOTSON UNIVERSITY MISSION**

Huston-Tillotson University helps the Central Texas Conference achieve its mission and vision through our own mission to provide the University's diverse student body with an exemplary education that is grounded in the liberal arts and sciences, balanced with professional development, and directed to public service and leadership.

The University prepares students with the integrity and civility to thrive in a diverse society, fosters spiritual development, preserves and promotes interest in the accomplishments and experiences of the University's historic constituents and evolving populations, and creates and sustains supportive relationships that advance the Huston-Tillotson University community. We achieve our mission through the diversity of our student body, the global perspective of our educational programs, and the defined opportunities for spiritual growth and civic engagement.

#### **UNIVERSITY PROFILE**

#### **Enrollment**

Huston-Tillotson University reached a twenty-eight year enrollment high with 882 students enrolling in the fall of 2009. Segmentation of our student population by gender reveals an important factor regarding male enrollment. Our overall student population consisted of 418 males (48%) and 464 females (52%); this is significant because many universities report decreases in male student enrollment, while our student population is relatively balanced. The number of first-time, first year freshmen students mirror the gender breakdown of the larger student population. The first-year, first-time freshmen population consisted of 118 males (47%) and 132 females (53%).

The racial/ethnic composition of our student population is as follows: Hispanic – 13%; White, non-Hispanic – 6%; American Indian – <1%; Asian/Pacific Islander – <1%; Nonresident Alien – 3%; Unreported – 1%; and Black, non-Hispanic – 76%.

#### **Faculty**

In the fall of 2009, the University employed 40 full-time faculty members. The race/ethnic composition of the faculty is as follows: Hispanic – 10%; White, non-Hispanic – 40%; American Indian– 2%; Asian/Pacific Islander – 2%; Black, non-Hispanic – 45%. Thirty members of our faculty (75%) have the terminal degree in their teaching field.

## PRESIDENTIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL ADVANCEMENT ACTIVITIES

The number of incoming freshmen male students continues to climb. Yet, the six-year graduation rate of for females continues to exceed that of their male counterparts. In response, the HT President's Male Initiative on Learning and Excellence (President's MILE), founded during the fall 2008 semester, provides a means of ensuring student success in college as well as persistence to graduation. The President's MILE seeks to create a unique set of deliberate learning experiences that motivate academic and personal success, emphasizing learning experiences that focus on addressing greater awareness of students' academic talents, strengths, and aspirations. During the fall 2009 semester, 60 students participated in the MILE program. The MILE students participated in several activities designed to motivate academic and personal success, which included the National Forum for Black Public Administrators, the PeopleFund, and the Men and Women of Color Leadership Conference. Additionally, in only its second year, 15% of MILE students earned a 3.5 or higher fall 2009 semester GPA, and 7% earned a perfect 4.0 GPA.

The Office of Institutional Advancement has been active with grant development activity in order to meet campus needs. One of the University's major initiatives, the 7<sup>th</sup> Annual President's MASKED Scholarship Gala, is scheduled for March 6, 2010.

Additionally, the University launched its new Mobile Giving Fundraising Campaign during the fall 2009 semester. In keeping with the technologically advanced skills of our recent graduates who are comfortable with different forms of technology, potential donors can send a text message from their cell phones in order to make an easy contribution to the University. Additionally, the HT Alumni and Friends website, launched in fall 2008, continues to receive tremendous response, and the site receives a large number of hits per day from around the world. As a result of the website, online contributions are increasing.

#### **ACADEMIC PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

#### College of Arts and Sciences (CAS)

#### Student Development

The College of Arts and Sciences continues to strengthen the academic preparation of its students through the continued support of established student clubs, which include the HT Film Society, the History Club, and a campus chapter of the Austin Poetry Society. The clubs continue to receive advisement and support from faculty members in the **Department of Humanities and Fine Arts**. Additionally, 2 Music majors, within the Department of Humanities and Fine Arts, represented HT as members of the 105 Voices of History Mass Choir that recently performed at the Kennedy Center in our nation's capital.

In response to a need to enhance students' mathematical skill development, The ACADEMY was established to provide intensive and active instruction to students in foundational math courses. ACADEMY is an acronym for Achievement in College Algebra During the Matriculation Year, and the goal of The ACADEMY is to equip students with the conceptual understanding and computational proficiency for success in the foundational mathematics courses, specifically MTH133 Introduction to Algebra and MTH143 College Algebra. The ACADEMY is housed in the **Department of Natural Sciences and Mathematics**.

During the spring 2009 semester, the Alternative Teacher Certification Program (ATCP) reported 39 new students completed the coursework required to sit for the teacher certification examination. The new teachers continue to excel in their teaching fields, and 2 interns were named Austin ISD "Teacher of Promise," which is an honor awarded to first year teachers for outstanding teaching during their first year. The ATCP is housed within the **Department of Teacher Education and Kinesiology**.

#### Student Research Initiatives

Departments in the College of Arts and Sciences are continuing to focus on activities that aid student learning through inquiry, discovery, and publishing. The second edition of the HT Research Journal, which contains works presented by students at during the prior two Huston-Tillotson Research Days. The HT Research Journal continues the historical legacy of empirical investigation that was begun with the Inaugural Huston-Tillotson Research Day 2006 and its companion HT Research Journal. Enhancing the quality of the human condition is a thematic thread that connects published student research which complements the legacy of HT. Plans are currently underway for spring 2010 Research Day activities.

Students at HT and U.T. at Austin are continuing the joint Tree of Life project which is research designed to identify species' relationships using DNA technology. Additionally, HT students are continually encouraged to pursue Foreign Service careers in the US Department of State, US AID, Peace Corps and through other agencies.

## Community Involvement

The AusPREP summer math and science program experienced resurgence during this past summer when 82 local middle and high school students enrolled in the summer program. The students received instruction in math and science, participated in hands-on scientific exercises in rocketry and robotics, and made field trips to the Johnson Space Center and various scientific sites. The program also included motivational talks focusing on career opportunities in science and engineering.

Using grant funds from the United States Department of Education for Math and Science Initiatives, HT developed a Saturday STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Academy. This program currently enrolls Austin area high school students in forensic science and math instruction as well as provides opportunities to engage discussions about science degree programs at HT and opportunities for joint degrees in engineering.

#### **Faculty Development**

The 2009-2010 academic year marked the third and final year for HT's Minority Science and Engineering Improvement Program (MSEIP), which is funded by the U.S. Department of Education. The MSEIP provides training for HT Math and Science faculty in the use MATLAB software to develop integrated computational modules for student use in biology courses. Several biology laboratory manuals were revised to reflect the inclusion of these modules.

HT faculty members continue to be actively involved in faculty development programs.

HT faculty members recently attended the New York University Faculty Development summer and winter workshops. Additionally, 3 faculty members were awarded the United Methodist General Board of Higher Education and Ministry Sam Taylor Fellowship for 2009-2010. Faculty members also continue to make significant strides in grant writing.

#### Selected Faculty Research

HT Philosophy professor, Dr. James Kraft, received a Melon Foundation grant in the amount of \$6,000 for original research on "The Impact of Critical Thinking Training on Epistemic Humility and Religious Tolerance." Dr. Kraft also presented his latest research on the epistemology of religious disagreement to the Philosophy department at Bogazici University in Istanbul, Turkey.

HT Sociology professor, Dr. Rosalee Martin, presented a paper entitled "Including Field Placements in the Sociology Curriculum" at the fall meeting of the Association of Applied and Clinical Sociology. HT Political Science professor, Dr. Paul Anaejionu, also presented at the same professional meeting his recent work entitled, "The Problem of Problem Definition in Social Research."

#### School of Business and Technology (SBT)

## Student Development

The School of Business and Technology (SBT) continues to encourage its students to pursue graduate and professional studies in order to experience the myriad benefits of increased educational attainment. Two recent SBT graduates were accepted into two of the most prestigious Masters of Accountancy programs in the country- U.T. at Austin and Bentley College in Boston, Massachusetts. Both students were awarded scholarships to attend. Three SBT students were awarded the prestigious Hatton W. Sumner's Foundation Scholarships, which is a merit-based scholarship that renews annually each semester until graduation based on the contingency that recipients maintain a 3.0 cumulative GPA.

#### **Fulbright Scholars at HT**

For the 4<sup>th</sup> year in a row, HT was again awarded a Fulbright Language Teacher Assistant (FLTA) for academic year 2009-2010. Dr. Yipan Zhu, the FLTA from China, earned the Ph.D. in Linguistics and will teach Chinese I and II. In addition to her teaching duties, Dr. Zhu will serve as a representative of HT at Asian events and activities in the local community

HT was also awarded a Fulbright Scholar-in-Residence (SIR) for the 2009-2010 academic year. Dr. Aloysius Njong, from Cameroon, earned the Ph.D. in Economics and will assist the SBT by teaching two courses each semester. Dr. Njong will represent HT at international events and activities in the local community.

#### **Targeting New Student Market-ROTC**

HT's SBT Dean, Dr. Steven Edmond, who also serves as the HT ROTC Coordinator, met with ROTC representatives at U.T. at Austin in order to generate greater involvement in the HT/UT ROTC Cross-

Enrollment Agreement and to increase the number of student participants. As a result, during the fall 2009 semester, at least ten incoming ROTC students enrolled at the HT, which is the largest number of ROTC students since the program's inception.

#### **Student Services**

## Religious Life and Campus Ministry

The Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry continues to actively assist the Division of Student Affairs meet its mission by continuing to provide an ecumenical ministry that acknowledges the spiritual needs of all students at the University. University Chapel Hour, held each Thursday, continues to include speakers who are clergy members from diverse backgrounds. HT students also participate in a number of spiritual development programming, which includes spiritual retreats, weekly Sister Connection (Women's Bible Study) and weekly Brothers of Fellowship (Men's Bible Study) meetings.

The Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry recently relocated to their new facility, which is across the street from the main campus entry. The new and improved location provides increased space for student development and additional meeting space for weekly programmatic initiatives. The welcome reception for the fall 2009 cohort of incoming W.E.B. DuBois Scholars was held in the new center and Reverend Donald Brewington, University Chaplain, served as host for the event.

Additionally, the Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry hosted the 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Bishop Ernest T. Dixon Lecture on January 28<sup>th</sup>, 2010, which also launched HT's Black History Month celebrations. The speaker for the 3<sup>rd</sup> Bishop Ernest T. Dixon Lecture was Rev. Dr. Valerie J. Bridgeman. Rev. Dr. Bridgeman is an interdisciplinary scholar who works in the fields of bible, practical theology (preaching and worship), hermeneutics, cultural criticism, and the arts. She received her Ph.D. in biblical studies from Baylor University. She currently serves as associate professor of Hebrew Bible, Homiletics and Worship, and Scholar in Theology and the Arts at Lancaster Theological Seminary in Pennsylvania. She began her career as a professor at HT in the 1990s.

#### Campus Life

During the 2009-2010 academic year, the Office of Campus Life continues to focus on deepening students' understanding of the relationship between curricular and co-curricular experiences by connecting student programming to relevant areas within the syllabi of various academic courses. Such programs include the annual Leadership Training Seminar, which focuses on ethical leadership practices for all students and various social programming. In an effort to respond to the HT's increasingly diverse student population, the HT's Latino Student Association (LSA) was founded during the fall 2009 semester. The LSA is a culturally based organization formed to promote the awareness and appreciation of Latino culture on campus and all students are welcome to join. In honor of Hispanic Heritage Month, the LSA hosted a discussion with nationally renowned diversity speaker, Mr. Michael Benitez, who spoke on "Repoliticizing Multiculturalism: Cultivating Conditions for Sustained Intercultural Relations and Authentic Dialogue."

#### Counseling and Consultation Center (CCC)

The Counseling and Consultation Center continues to help the Division of Student Affairs meet its mission by helping students with their personal concerns so that they can meet the daily challenges of student life. Staffed by an experienced psychotherapist, the center is open daily for students in need of assistance. Students are encouraged to make an appointment, but walk-ins are welcome when there is availability. The Office of Disability Services, housed within the CCC, continues to provide needed supportive services for HT students with disabilities. The center is staffed by an experienced, full-time Disabilities Services Coordinator.

## Career and Graduate Development Center (C&GDC)

The Career and Graduate Development Center continues to develop and update services and resources available to HT students, alumni and employers. Last April, the C&GDC hosted almost 40

organizations at the annual Spring Career Fair despite a very difficult economic downturn. This number was one-third less than the previous spring, which was an indicator of things to come.

The C&GDC facilitated four Senior Boot Camp presentations to better assist students with preparing for a tough economic employment market. Also, the 2009 Senior Class was presented a book entitled "Graduating with God" through the contributions of funds from the C&GDC, the Center for Religious Life, and the Office of Alumni Affairs. In addition, the senior class with the support of the Senior Class Advisor and graduation fees purchased a large Ram's Head to be placed in the Student Union in recognition of the HT Ram mascot.

The C&GDC Fall 2009 Career Expo and spring 2010 Internship Fair was held in September of 2009. To assist students with the HT mission of preparing students for a global economy, almost 40 employers attended for the third year in a row and presented to students' information related to who they are, what they do, and why HT students should consider present and future part-time, internship, and full-time employment with these organizations in the future.

The C&GDC Fall 2009 Graduate and Professional School Fair was held October 7, 2009 to allow students to explore information, scholarships, and fellowships related to attending graduate and professional schools upon matriculation from HT. Over twenty-five colleges, universities and professional schools attended, which is a slight decrease from the number that attended in the fall of 2008.

Also, in October in partnership with the UT School of Law, several HT students attended their annual law camp resulting in one student receiving a free LSAT prep class award.

In November of 2009, the C&GDC partnered with the School of Business and Technology and the HT International Students Organization in hosting an HT Culture Fest Week. The events included an international food taste testing event, a Chinese Ribbon Dance, a Spanish Flamenco Dance, a Nigerian Dance Group, information tables for multiple international cultures, capped off by an International Culture Fest Employer/Student Luncheon where employers that hired students to work abroad and/or hired international students presented in roundtable fashion their interest in providing employment opportunities to the HT student and alumni community.

#### Student Health Services

The HT Health Connection e-health community empowerment program continues to collaborate with other community based organizations to empower our campus and underserved populations in our community with health information from the National Library of Medicine. The program objective is to provide participants with the basic background knowledge and information about racial disparities in health. Participants are trained to conduct informational sessions that enhance consumer awareness. Consumers are informed about the following through online health access: HIV/AIDS, Heart Disease, Cancer, Mental Health and Diabetes. Informed consumers will benefit by having a better quality of life.

#### **Athletics**

Huston-Tillotson University Athletics continues to meet its mission by providing opportunities for competition in intercollegiate athletics while ensuring an atmosphere that emphasizes academic and athletic excellence. We continually strive to ensure that all of our student-athletes are "Champions of Character" and model the values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity, Sportsmanship, and Servant Leadership. The Athletic Department is committed to the principle that participation in athletics is integral to the total educational process, as well as to the personal growth of each student-athlete. HT is a member of the NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) and the Red River Athletic Conference (RRAC).

The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is composed of 12 intercollegiate sports (men's and women's indoor and outdoor track, women's cross-country, women's volleyball, softball, baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's soccer—women's softball was launched during the fall 2009 semester) Intercollegiate Athletics currently serves 249 student-athletes, approximately

28% of the student body. HT student athletes continue to excel both inside and outside of the classroom. During the fall 2009 semester, the cumulative GPA of student athletes was 2.82.

Saint Paul School of Theology is a seminary of the United Methodist Church that educates leaders to make disciples for Jesus Christ, renew the Church, and transform the world. We are one institution with two campuses, a free-standing seminary campus in Kansas City and a university partnership seminary on the campus of Oklahoma City University.

This academic year, 284 students from 41 states and 5 continents were enrolled in degree programs at Saint Paul School of Theology in Kansas City. Forty-one students were enrolled in the Master of Divinity program at Saint Paul at Oklahoma City University. The Course of Study School at Saint Paul served 290 students from 18 annual conferences.

Over 400 students and alums, current and emeritus faculty, and friends of the seminary gathered in September to celebrate the seminary's 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary in Kansas City. The festivities were a time to celebrate the seminary's tradition and history, reunite in friendship, look toward the seminary's future, and share the seminary's story with the larger Kansas City Community.

The Order of St. Luke constructed a meditative labyrinth on the Kansas City Campus naming it in honor of Dr. Susan Sonnenday Vogel '82 DMin. Susan Sonnenday Vogel is the first woman Doctor of Ministry graduate of Saint Paul and served in a number of roles including Associate Dean for Spiritual & Professional Formation during her 33 year tenure.

Two Doctor of Ministry tracks were established. The Doctor of Ministry track in Children and Poverty will begin June 2010 and a track in Global Health and Wholeness is slated for January 2011. Both tracks relate directly to the United Methodist Council of Bishops initiatives (the "Four Foci") for the Church.

It was the second year for Laity School of Theology. Each Laity School Saturday Session was taught by Saint Paul faculty and presented in an accessible manner for persons with a variety of educational backgrounds. Participants could attend one session or all six. Topics included worship, Bible, ethics, church history, and theology. Laity School was offered in Kansas City, Missouri and various churches in Nebraska, Kansas, and Oklahoma.

It was the sixth year for the Saint Paul youTheology program. Lilly Endowment, Inc. renewed a grant for the program developed for Midwest youth to continue to explore their faith through worship, service, study, travel, and a mentoring relationship. The youTheology program culminates with a nine day Pan Methodist Pilgrimage to the East Coast where youTheologians see historic locations fundamental to the roots of Methodism.

Dr. L. Shannon Jung was installed into the Franklin and Louise Cole Chair for Town and Country Ministries in the fall. The chair was a celebration for the seminary and rural ministry. There was special recognition for the team of laity and clergy that worked for several years to establish the fully funded Town and Country Chair.

The process of building and renovation has been an overwhelming experience of grace, brought to expression through an immeasurable generosity on the part of those who shared in both the vision and its accomplishment. Beginning in 1911 with the creation by Methodist leaders in the South of two new institutions of higher learning—SMU and Emory—those who have been committed to this school and its mission to serve the church have continued steadfastly to ensure the fulfillment of that purpose. This latest endeavor has been no different.

So many have invested so much in this enormous undertaking that it is impossible to name them all. I would certainly express my deep gratitude to the Central Texas Annual Conference, and the South Central Jurisdiction as a whole, from which have come strong, steady, supportive participation at so many levels—from finances to prayers, from inviting young adults to consider ordained ministry to partnering with us in training and preparation of those students for faithful leadership in Christian ministry.

The Perkins and Prothro families have brought a vision forward across the better part of a century, a vision for the role they could play in shaping society by helping education transform the world. Their legacy exists in physical facilities and philanthropic financial support throughout Southern Methodist University, and certainly at Perkins, but extends much further still. People with great resources and generous hearts give wonderful gifts. But people with vision see beyond what their resources can do, beyond what their generosity can accomplish, beyond what their noblest actions can achieve, to the larger purposes beneath and beyond all of these efforts. The Perkins and Prothro families have possessed such vision, and shared it amply with Perkins. In so doing, they have opened new horizons for the church by establishing a legacy of the sort that leads not backward, but forward, into a new future of theological education.

Highland Park United Methodist Church, led by their senior minister Mark Craig, has contributed more to the success of this venture than anyone could ever imagine receiving from a neighbor. The Texas Methodist Foundation and its president, Tom Locke, have been munificent in their support. Paul and Joanne White of Louisiana were among the earliest donors to this project, and for their generosity we are deeply grateful. Myriad other congregations, institutions, families, and individuals have partnered in this effort, making gifts of all sizes to further the mission of Perkins through these renovation and expansion projects. A series of plaques in the new Prothro Hall names more than 800 entities as having contributed funds—and the list continues to grow.

Members of the faculty and staff at Perkins provided invaluable wisdom, discernment, and guidance throughout this process. In the midst of great disruption, certain persons gave exceptional leadership to keep us on an even keel. Among them were Tracy Anne Allred, director of Student Services; Janelle Hampton, building manager and registrar; Todd Rasberry, director of Development; Roberta Cox, director of Public Affairs; and Jim McMillin, the associate director of Bridwell Library, and chair of our Construction Committee.

With building construction and renovation completed, we are now poised to pursue with even greater focus certain strategic goals that are central to our work in the future. These goals are part of the University's larger objectives related to a \$750 million capital campaign launched in September 2008 in anticipation of the centennial of the school's founding in 1911. SMU Unbridled: The Second Century Campaign includes further enhancing the academic quality and reputation of the school through faculty endowments and other means; fostering an open, collaborative, diverse community, beginning with the further development of the Center for the Study of Latino/a Christianity and Religions; strengthening scholarly research and creative achievement; enhancing student development and quality of life; and broadening global perspectives through continuing development of the center for Global Theological Education.

On a personal note, I continue to serve on our denomination's Judicial Council, and regard this role as both a high honor and profound responsibility. I also continue to serve as liaison between the Church and the University.

The building endeavors of the last several years and strategic goals of the present and future all serve to fulfill a singular missional purpose from which we cannot and will not waver: to prepare women and men for faithful leadership in Christian ministry. For your partnership in that mission through this historic season at Perkins, and in the many ways your partnership promises to support these future goals as we work together toward their fulfillment, we are grateful.

As SMU approaches the centennial of its founding in 1911 by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and its opening in 1915, the University continues to rise in national prominence. The past year has been marked by exciting developments. Highlights follow:

- SMU's total fall 2009 enrollment was 10,891, including 6,228 undergraduates, 3,544 graduate students and 1,119 professional (theology and law) students. The ethnic minority enrollment makes up 21 percent of the student body. The average SAT score of the first-year class has risen nearly 100 points in the past 10 years.
- SMU Unbridled: The Second Century Campaign was launched in September 2008. Gifts during the campaign's two-year quiet phase and first public year have exceeded \$416 million toward a goal of \$750 million. The campaign seeks endowment for student quality, faculty and academic excellence, and the campus experience. To date, the campaign has provided funds for 193 new endowed scholarships; 16 new endowed academic positions; 11 new endowed institutes, centers and other academic programs; support for two schools and one academic department; and 12 new or renovated facilities.
- The new Caruth Hall for the Lyle School of Engineering will open this spring. The school recently announced its new Hunter and Stephanie Hunt Institute for Engineering and Humanity, to address conditions of the global poor. A building to house the Annette Caldwell Simmons School of Education and Human Development is under construction and scheduled to open in August. New year-round housing at SMU-in-Taos allowed the addition of fall semester classes in 2009 at the New Mexico campus, which has offered summer courses since 1973.
- Among several outstanding appointments, the Rev. Stephen Rankin, Ph.D. was named SMU's
  new chaplain and minister to the University. He came to SMU from Southwestern College in
  Kansas, where he was campus minister and professor of Religious Studies. Rankin is a clergy
  member of the Kansas West Annual Conference.

- David Meltzer, professor and chair of Anthropology in SMU's Dedman College, was elected a member of the prestigious National Academy of Sciences. Several students have won Fulbright, Truman and other national fellowships.
- Alan C. Lowe was named director of the George W. Bush Presidential Library, to be located at SMU. He previously was executive director of the Howard H. Baker Jr. Center for Public Policy at the University of Tennessee-Knoxville. James K. Glassman, undersecretary of state for Public Diplomacy and Public Affairs in 2008, was named executive director of the George W. Bush Institute, to be part of the Bush Presidential Center, which is expected to open in 2013.
- The Bush Presidential Library is already making an impact at SMU. Political science and
  journalism professors have invited former President Bush to speak to their classes, groups of
  scholarship students have visited the temporary archives, and former First Lady Laura Bush has
  hosted an exchange between Iraqi women and SMU faculty.

## News of Perkins School of Theology

- Perkins School of Theology began a significant new chapter in September 2009 when it
  dedicated the new Elizabeth Perkins Prothro Hall and renovated Kirby Hall and Selecman Hall.
  The Perkins and Prothro families and their foundations provided the lead gift for the new
  building, continuing the tradition of Joe J. and Lois Perkins, for whom the school was named in
  1945.
- C. Michael Hawn, professor of Church Music and director of the Master of Sacred Music Program at Perkins School of Theology, was honored as The United Methodist Church's 2008-09 University Scholar/Teacher of the Year.
- Pastors from Latin America traveled to Perkins last summer for theological and ministerial training through *Theology Beyond Borders*. Perkins is one of three United Methodist schools of theology offering the Course of Study School in Spanish. Pastors from Columbia, Argentina and Costa Rica received training supported by a new grant from The United Methodist Church's General Board of Higher Education and Ministry.
- Joerg Rieger was appointed to the newly endowed Wendland-Cook Professorship in Constructive Theology. A clergy member of the North Texas Annual Conference, Rieger has taught at Perkins for 15 years. The professorship was established by Barbara and Erroll Wendland and the Joe and Louise Cook Foundation. The Wendlands are from Temple, Texas, and Mrs. Wendland is a member of the Perkins Executive Board.

## News of SMU Wesley Foundation

Under the leadership of the Rev. Andy Roberts, a clergy member of the North Georgia Annual
Conference, the SMU Wesley Foundation is one of the most active ministries on campus. "The
Well," a weekly worship service in Perkins Chapel, features music, teaching, prayer and Holy
Communion. Small group Bible studies, the heart of the SMU Wesley Foundation, foster
fellowship and spiritual growth.

SMU treasures its Methodist heritage and maintains a particularly close relationship with Highland Park United Methodist Church and its senior minister, the Rev. Mark Craig. I enjoy serving as guest preacher at that church each fall. We ask your continued prayers and support as SMU moves forward in the coming year.

The past year was one of many celebrations for Southwestern, as we marked, among other things, the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of our first Homecoming in 1909. Those who attended sang "Blest Be the Tie

that Binds" during the chapel service, just as participants did 100 years ago. Southwestern University continues to align its activities with the vision and mission of the Texas Annual Conference as it has since it was founded by Methodist leaders as Texas's first institution of higher learning.

As another example of this, Southwestern hosted the National Student Peace Alliance Annual Conference in February 2010. This conference drew more than 300 students from across the country who are interested in promoting policies that will reduce violence and build sustainable peace both domestically and internationally.

#### Enrollment - Fall 2009

Southwestern enrolled 1,301 students in Fall 2009, which was one of its highest enrollments ever. The first-year students were selected from our largest applicant pool ever — nearly 30 percent over the previous year. This was a tremendous accomplishment considering the difficult economic. The number of students who returned for the Spring 2010 semester was also up thanks to a concerted effort to retain students. Our student body this year includes two students from Rwanda who came to Southwestern through a program designed to help rebuild their country, which suffered extensively during the 1990s as a result of genocide and civil war.

This year we are celebrating the 10th anniversary of our Dixon Scholars Program, which is generated in partnership with the Texas Methodist Foundation. This program has made it possible for almost 150 deserving African-American, Hispanic, and Native American students to attend Southwestern. Their average graduation rate has been higher than 87 percent.

#### **Faculty Appointments**

We welcomed five new tenure-track faculty members for the 2009-10 academic year: Reginald Byron, Assistant Professor of Sociology; Patrick Hajovsky, Assistant Professor of Art History; Molly Jenson, Assistant Professor of Religion; Kenneth Mello, Assistant Professor of Religion; and Dustin Tahmahkera, Assistant Professor of Communication Studies. We also welcomed Mary Gonzalez as our new assistant dean for Student Multicultural Affairs and welcomed back our chaplain, Dr. Beverly Jones, who took a two-year leave of absence to serve as District Superintendent of the New Mexico Conference. Traci Giuliano, Professor of Psychology, accepted an offer to become one of our Brown Chair holders and Helene Meyers, Professor of English, accepted an offer to hold the McManis University Chair.

#### Paideia<sub>®</sub>

Our signature Paideia Program continues to grow, with 269 students and 27 professors participating this academic year. In March, we will celebrate the opening of the Charles and Elizabeth Prothro Center for Lifelong Learning, which will provide a new home for the Paideia Program, as well as space for many essential student services.

## **NITLE Comes to Southwestern**

In May 2009, we announced an exciting new initiative for Southwestern. We are now the home for the National Institute for Technology in Liberal Education (NITLE). NITLE was established in 2001 with funding from The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation to provide small liberal arts colleges with technological solutions that might otherwise be unavailable to them. What is even more exciting is that one of our own Southwestern graduates, Dr. Joey King, is the new executive director of NITLE. Having NITLE headquartered on our campus should offer many benefits for faculty and students, as well as bring us increased national visibility. The \$4.3 million that came from the Mellon Foundation with the NITLE transfer was our largest gift in 2009.

#### Sustainability

Southwestern continues to set an example in the area of sustainability. In February 2009, we signed the College and University Presidents Climate Commitment. In January 2010, the University signed an agreement to purchase all of its electricity from wind power for the next 18 years. This makes Southwestern one of less than 20 universities in the country to rely totally on "green" power, and the first in Texas to get all its electricity from wind power. Other sustainability initiatives the past year include eliminating the use of trays in the cafeteria, installing a new compost bin for food waste from the cafeteria, as well as remote composting bins throughout campus, and hosting a third environmental summit for high school students.

In 2009, Southwestern officially received Gold LEED certification for our new Wilhelmina Cullen Admission Center. Many of the "green" features in this building have also been incorporated into the new Prothro Center, which will open in March.

#### Community Engagement

In 2008-2009, Southwestern students contributed 28,514 hours of service to our community. The summer of 2009 marked the second year that our students were able to work with several different agencies in Central Texas that serve women and children who are victims of domestic violence, thanks to a grant from the Verizon Foundation.

After the January 2010 earthquake in Haiti, 13 different student organizations teamed up to raise money for Partners in Health, which has been providing medical care in Haiti for more than 20 years. One of our graduates who is now a surgeon in Temple went to Haiti to work at a hospital operated by Project Help-Haiti.

#### **Faculty Achievements**

Southwestern University faculty members continue to excel as teachers and scholars. For example:

- Biology Professors Maria Cuevas and Maria Todd have received a \$99,000 grant from the
  National Science Foundation for their research on membrane proteins known as claudins.
  These two professors, along with Biology Professor Rebecca Shiller, received the first
  "Inspiring Hope" award presented by the Breast Cancer Resource Centers of Texas in 2009
  for their genetic research that could lead to new therapies for breast cancer as well as their
  work with the next generation of doctors and researchers.
- Economics Professor Dirk Early has received a \$20,000 grant from the U.S. Department of
  Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to conduct a study that will help determine
  whether minorities face additional barriers when trying to rent affordable housing in
  neighborhoods that are perceived as more desirable.
- Chemistry Professor Lynn Guziec has received \$231,950 from the National Institutes of Health over the next two years to work with a colleague at The University of Texas at Austin on a project that could enable physicians to detect diseases earlier and more easily than current methods.
- Sociology Professor and University Scholar Ed Kain was named the 2010 recipient of the Southern Sociological Society's Distinguished Contributions to Teaching Award.
- In the spring of 2009, Kinesiology Professor Scott MacLean spent a week working with the U.S. Olympic bobsled team at their training camp in Park City, Utah, to help them fine tune their equipment in preparation for the 2010 Winter Olympics.
- Business Professor Mary Grace Neville was selected to receive the Journal of Management Education's 2009 Fritz Roethlisberger Award for the best article published in the Journal in 2008.

 In November 2009, five Southwestern faculty members received awards from the Sam Taylor Fellowship Fund of the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, which provides monetary awards for the continuing education and development of full-time faculty members of United Methodist colleges and universities in Texas.

#### Student Achievements

Southwestern students also won a variety of honors in 2009. For example:

- A team of Southwestern students was named one of nine "Outstanding Winners" from among 1,675 teams that participated in the 2009 Mathematical Contest in Modeling sponsored by the Consortium for Mathematics and Its Applications (COMAP). As a result of their performance in this competition, the Southwestern students also were selected to receive the SIAM Award which is given by the Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics.
- In November 2009, a team of students from Southwestern won its division and placed second overall in the annual Business Ethics Match hosted by the Texas Independent College Foundation (TICF). The competition provides students the opportunity to show their reasoning skills by debating current issues in business ethics.
- After only two years on campus, Southwestern's Mock Trial Team did well enough to qualify for a National Intercollegiate Mock Trial Tournament that was held in Memphis in March 2009.
- Studio Art major Duncan Alexander won the 2009 Austin Critics Table Award for video design for his work on "The Color of Dissonance," which premiered at Southwestern in April 2009.
- Kayla Comeaux, a math major at Southwestern, was one of 100 students nationwide selected to be a 2009-2010 NASA MUST scholar.
- Four students who graduated from Southwestern in May 2009 were awarded Fulbright English Teaching Assistantships in Europe.

In 2009, Southwestern students revived the tradition of the Brooks Prize Debate, which was originally started at Southwestern in 1878. Twenty-two students are participating in the 2010 competition.

## Athletics

Our women's golf team continues to bring national recognition to Southwestern as well. Last year, in addition to placing fourth in the nation in NCAA Division III, they earned the second highest GPA of any women's golf team in the country, including Divisions I and II. Southwestern was the only Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference team and only team in the state of Texas to be recognized by the National Golf Coaches Association All-Scholar Award.

This spring, Southwestern will field a new varsity men's lacrosse team – the first such team in the state of Texas.

## **Awards Presented**

Southwestern's 2009 Distinguished Alumna/Alumnus Award was presented to Dr. Douglas M. Benold, a longtime Georgetown family practice physician and member of the Southwestern University Board of Trustees.

Also in 2009, Southwestern awarded one of its highest honors, the Southwestern University Medal, to Erriest Clark, the first African-American to graduate from Southwestern. The medal was presented

November 6 during a gala event celebrating 40 years of African-American alumni achievements at Southwestern.

#### Thinking Ahead Campaign

In January 2010, Southwestern passed the \$100 million mark in its *Thinking Ahead* comprehensive fundraising campaign. This marked the first time in its history that Southwestern has had a fundraising campaign that raised more than \$100 million. The campaign continues to seek additional resources to support our students and faculty.

Major grants received in 2009 included a \$461,340 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to purchase laboratory equipment for the Texas Life-Sciences Collaboration Center, which is a partnership between Southwestern, the City of Georgetown and the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce

Southwestern also received a \$100,000 grant from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation to continue a program it started four years ago to promote student exchanges between two predominantly white universities and three historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs). Other universities involved with the project are Dillard University in New Orleans, Huston-Tillotson University in Austin, Morehouse College in Atlanta, and Rhodes College in Memphis. Southwestern sent its first exchange student to Dillard University for the fall 2009 semester.

#### Speakers and Symposia

Southwestern continues to attract prominent speakers for its major lecture series. The 2009 Writer's Voice speaker was Tobias Wolff, who gave a lecture titled "Saved by Stories: This Writer's Life." The 2010 Writer's Voice speaker will be filmmaker Mira Nair, who will be on campus November 9. Our 2009 Shilling Lecture was delivered by Dr. Wangaari Maathai, the first African woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize. The 2010 Shilling Lecture will be delivered in March by Dr. Bill Foege, an epidemiologist who has been credited with eliminating smallpox around the world.

Southwestern's 32<sup>nd</sup> Brown Symposium was held Feb. 11-12, 2010. The symposium was organized by Art History Professor Thomas Howe and was titled "IMPERIVM: The Art of Empire in Rome and America." Speakers included Karl Galinsky from The University of Texas at Austin, art critic Edward Lucie-Smith, Edward Luttwak from the Center for Strategic and International Studies at Georgetown University, Margaret Malamud from the University of New Mexico, and Alexander Stille of Columbia University, who also writes for the New Yorker Magazine and the *New York Times*.

## **Looking Ahead**

Throughout 2009, Southwestern worked on developing a new strategic plan for the institution. Our Board of Trustees is expected to approve the final version of this plan in March 2010. The Trustees set up a special committee to ensure that our relationship with the United Methodist Church is affirmed in this new plan.

Despite the challenges of the current economic environment, we are confident that Southwestern has a bright future ahead. We appreciate all the support and guidance that you have given us in our work.

Things are bright at Texas Wesleyan University. After the fall of 2008 boasted the highest enrollment ever in Texas Wesleyan's 120-year history, fall 2009 surpassed all expectations: Over 3,300 students were enrolled last fall at Texas Wesleyan University! This is but one indication that the strategic planning and initiatives implemented by Wesleyan President, Dr. Hal Jeffcoat, are clearly becoming stronger throughout the life of this institution.

An area that went through restructuring is the arts and sciences. Last fall, we had two new deans join Texas Wesleyan. As a result of a new approach, Dr. Steve Daniell was hired as the new dean of the School of Arts & Letters, and Dr. Trevor Morris came on board as the dean of the new School of Natural and Social Sciences. Both of these individuals' background and vision will greatly enhance future growth in these two schools.

Another change was in the appointment of Joe Brown as Dean of Freshman Success and Dr. Katherine Prater as Dean of Wesleyan University College. In both of these positions, each bring their own gifts to help achieve a common objective: Texas Wesleyan will assist first-year students adjust to the rigors of college life and at the same time, acquire the essential skills needed for academic success and excellence.

There are several projects around campus worth noting. The Claudia Stepp Scene Shop, which broke ground last March, opened last fall. Construction began in January of this year of the Jack and Jo Willa Morton Fitness Center. This new fitness center will become a new centerpiece on the campus. It will also enrich and contribute to the overall wellness of students, faculty and staff. Last fall also saw the ribbon-cutting ceremony of the new Wesleyan Bookstore. This event celebrated with leaders from the community, city, and state. Our new bookstore also has important significance: It is the first development in the broader vision for rejuvenating the Rosedale corridor adjacent to the main campus. Finally, last fall welcomed a new mascot in the form of "Willie," the Wesleyan Ram. This new statue of our mascot sits prominently just outside the Student Center and it is one of several signs that our campus is full of life and excitement.

This year also marks the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Texas Wesleyan's School of Law. As Fort Worth's only law school, Wesleyan's School of Law shines in two areas. Last fall it was reported that our law school has a pass rate for the bar exam at 93%. In addition, Wesleyan School of Law is one of only 31 ABA-accredited law schools that require students to complete 30 hours of *pro bono* legal service during their education here. To date, 1,256 students have logged more than 64,000 hours to the benefit of persons throughout the area.

But beyond all the statistical data, there is something else about Texas Wesleyan that is noteworthy. In the past two years, two students have benefited from what some might call Texas Wesleyan's "extravagant generosity." Jeremy Burnett was a former homeless young adult who struggled with addictions and other personal problems. Through a series of events, it was discovered that Jeremy was also a math whiz. After qualifying financial aid, Jeremy enrolled at Texas Wesleyan and he is now working toward a degree in math and Spanish. Jeremy's presence, boisterous laughter, and

bright smile have become a fixture around campus. Another student, David Rai, found his way to Texas Wesleyan by way of tragedy. After an unexpected death to his father, David's future was unsure. His family had immigrated to this country from Nepal and he was afraid of what might happen next. With the assistance from a local United Methodist Church and the university, David was able to enroll at Texas Wesleyan. In a recent article in Wesleyan's newspaper, *The Rambler*, David said, "This college has given me a second chance in life." In the midst of all the progress, academic success, growth, and strategic planning for the future, these two students are evidence that Texas Wesleyan University cares about its students. These are just two reasons why things are alive and well at Texas Wesleyan University, and they are reasons why I am grateful and honored to be a part of this campus community. Thanks to all who contribute to this institution of higher education that is truly an example of a Wesleyan tradition and spirit that unites "knowledge and vital piety."

This year we come to renew our mission to make disciples of Jesus the Christ for the transformation of the world. This year we will focus our attention upon energizing and equipping the local churches of our conference so that they will be better able to fulfill their mission. It is our prayer and hope that this session of our Annual Conference will give each of us a renewed focus and enthusiasm for the mission and ministry of our churches. Together, we will accomplish great things in the name of our Lord Jesus the Christ.

We offer special thanks to Bishop Mike Lowry, Georgia Adamson, Harvey Ozmer and all of their staff members for their dedication and hard work in preparing for this session of Annual Conference. Likewise, we are grateful to all boards, agencies, committees, commissions and task forces who have worked with great commitment to offer effective and life giving ministry in our churches, communities and around the world. The Agenda Committee recommends that the 2010 Per Diem Allowance granted each day in actual attendance at the conference for retired clergy, retired diaconal ministers, retired deaconesses, ministers' surviving spouses, pastors receiving total salary of or less than the minimum compensation of the conference, students appointed to attend school and ministers on disability leave be \$17.50 for those who reside in Tarrant County and \$35 for those who reside outside Tarrant County. (See Per Diem Form in back of the Preliminary Reports.)

Secondly, the Agenda Committee recommends that the budget line item for the expenses of annual conference 2011 be set at \$50,500.

The Agenda Committee continues to carefully monitor your evaluations of our Annual Conference sessions. We have an evaluation document for your use again this year. Please, please, locate it now and make notes as we move through our conference this year so that you will be prepared to offer us your very best observations. We do appreciate your help. We continue to make changes based upon your suggestions and observations.

Because we have met in Tarrant County for the past 3 years, the Committee also agreed to meet in Waco for 2 consecutive years. So, we will be meeting in Waco next year and in 2012. The schedule of locations for future meetings of the Annual Conference is as follows: Tarrant County: 2013, 2015, 2017, 2019, and 2021; and, Waco: 2011, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, and 2020.

I express my gratitude to those who have given so much time and effort in serving on the Agenda Committee this year. Your leadership is greatly appreciated.

## COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

#### Report No. 1

The history of the Central Texas Conference goes back to 1866. It was created from the Texas Conference by the General Conference of that year and given the name it would bear for the next forty three years: Northwest Texas Conference.

It was so successful that in only 43 years, in 1910, it was divided. That portion west of the western borders of the Young, Stephens and Eastland Counties down to the northwest corner of Brown County and then west along the county lines to the Colorado River was given the original name of Northwest Texas. The portion east of that line was renamed Central Texas.

This year marks the one hundred forty third year of its life as a Conference and its100<sup>th</sup> year as the Central Texas Conference.

#### A Written History

For the first time a book of the history of the Conference is being produced. Only brief summaries have been written previously. A committee of laypersons and clergy is compiling the information which will be published later in the year.

## Centennial Celebration

The day-long celebration of our one hundredth year as an annual conference is to be held October 23, 2010 at the Amon G. Carter Exhibits Hall in Fort Worth. Local churches are invited to have a display of their own history at the event.

#### Local Church Histories

This is the most appropriate of times for every local church that has never written its history to do so. Those churches which already have done so are encouraged to update their history if that is needed. Every local church, large or small, is valuable and its history should be preserved.

Copies of local church histories are housed in the Conference Archives. New and updated copies should be sent to archivist Carol Roszell,

#### Local Church Historical Markers

Any local congregation that is one hundred or more years old is eligible to apply for a Methodist Historical Marker. The church is awarded a brass plaque to be attached to the structure signifying the important part it has played in the life of Methodism. ## Report No. 2 ARCHIVIST REPORT

24 linear feet of records were delivered to the archives depository during this past year, much of which were district and conference records. A great many additional contributions were made to the archives by supportive individuals. Scholar's, clergy, layperson's, author's, conference personnel, historian's, student's, and genealogist's depository usage has remained steady, many of them having been referred to the archives by other institutions and persons. Approximately 168 research requests have been received during the past year. I am part of a committee that is writing the history of the Central Texas Conference with the publication goal as the centennial of the current conference which is 2010 and our celebratory event scheduled for October 23, 2010. All local churches are encouraged to present a display of their history at this event. Archival/records management, local church historian training, and archives/records management consultation continue to be provided to local churches and at district training sessions. I attended the GCAH Annual Meeting at the GCAH headquarters, Drew University in 2009. I will attend the next Annual Meeting in Budapest, Hungary in August 2010. I still serve as a member of the executive board of the Texas United Methodist Historical Society which will meet in Lubbock, TX this year and I will be presenting "Beyond the Great Divide: The New Central Texas Conference". I continue as a member of the Executive Board of the Historical Society of the United Methodist Church. Looking forward, I plan to begin building a web presence online for the archives depository. A project is beginning to index all photos that are included in the NWTX and CTC journals. The archive continues to participate in a digitization program with the University of North Texas to place digital images of a portion of our holdings online within their Portal to Texas History Project. I will continue the campaign encouraging each of our local churches to write their history as best they are able, a copy of which will be housed in the depository. Space continues to be a concern at the archives and weeding has begun in an effort to streamline the holdings. As a reminder, the majority of the records housed at the archives are primary, non-published records, which reinforces the need for our churches to locate and protect their records. All closing churches and those that are merging into or with another church must send their records to the archives for protection and availability as mandated by the Standing Rules.

## Report No. 2 Changing Our Strategy for New Church Starts

In the past, the model for starting new churches has been the Parachute Drop. A Parachute Drop means that a pastor is "dropped" into an identified mission field with no sponsoring churches, no members, and no support other than CG&D. Statistics show that this model is less likely to succeed. Today, CG&D is focusing on new, more effective models:

- Churches Starting Churches or Mother/Daughter A strong, healthy, existing church offers to sponsor a new church start with staff, members and money.
- Second Campus/Satellite: CG&D works with a strong, healthy, existing church to establish a second campus that may or may not become a stand alone congregation.
- Expansion Campus/Satellite Helping a strong, healthy, existing church establish a second campus or satellite that has the possibility of becoming a stand alone church.
- 4) Adoption A strong, healthy existing church offers to adopt a smaller, nearby existing church and establishes new ministries, a new vision to reach a new demographic and establish a new church.
- Elijah A small struggling church agrees to give their buildings and assets to a new church start in the area.

The Commission will continue to search for new effective models for starting new churches in the right places, at the right time with the right pastors.

In the near future the Commission structure will be expanding, to include work in the area of transformation and revitalization of existing churches.

## Report No. 3 Report of the Missionary for Hispanic Ministry

God has definitely been leading the work of our Conference Hispanic Ministries Committee as we plan, strategize, and focus on our four work/team areas: Spiritual Formation, Structural and Organizational Advocacy, Church Growth and Development, and Leadership/Equipping and Recruiting.

- To add at least 7 mission congregations in our conference as described in paragraph 259.1 of the 2008 Book of Discipline by 2012.
- To add at least 5 viable faith communities as per the National Plan of Hispanic/ Latino Ministries by 2012.
- Continue intentional growth of church membership among second and third generation Hispanics in our local churches.
- Continue the expansion of outreach programs that minister to the immigrant community such as English as a Second Language and citizenship classes.
- Foster ministry relationships between the congregations of the Central Texas Conference and the Rio Grande Conference.

#### Report No. 4 2010 New Shares in 2010

Thanks to our Partners in Ministry contributions to the SHARES program we are able to continue the vitally important ministry of starting new churches. The SHARES program is our main source of financial income and is essential to our future growth. Unfortunately, over the past few years the number of SHARES has decreased. In 2009, we received \$154,000. (In 2008 we received \$238,000) Our goal for 2010 is add 2010 NEW Shares. Without new and present SHAREHOLDERS, starting new churches in the right places, at the right time, with the right pastors will not be possible.

The conference goal of 10,807 SHAREHOLDERS is based on the Conference membership of 162,116, or one SHAREHOLDER for every fifteen members of each local church. Curently, we have 2500 shares. Every church is asked to present the SHARE program. We are discovering that when the Director or another representative from CG&D presents the program in a local church the number of new shares radically increases. Also, most people in our churches today are unaware of the SHARE program and the ministry of CG&D. We need the support of every pastor and every congregation to meet the financial challenge of starting new churches in the Central Texas Conference.

#### COMMITTEE ON COUNSELING

#### Report No. 1

The counseling committee continues its effort to offer counseling program support and resources to the clergy and families of the conference. We also encourage participants to take advantage of the additional resources available for counseling services as defined in our conference health and benefits plan. The committee members will continue to expand and update the list of approved counselors in order to provide expertise and greater accessibility to meet the counseling needs of our members and their families. We commend all our counselors for the valuable service provided to our conference members. In addition to offering confidential counseling services, many of the counselors listed are also available for seminars and workshops.

## Report No. 2

- This service is available to ordained conference members, diaconal, and retired ministers, and persons serving in full-time conference appointments, plus their spouses and dependent family members. In addition, ordained members and families of the Rio Grande Conference serving within the geographical boundaries of the Episcopal area are eligible.
- 2. Complete confidentiality and respect for privacy will be maintained. As a client, only your counselor will know your name, and no information about you will go to any other person without your written consent. It is understood by the committee, and should be by the client, that where the professional counselor is bound by the mandatory reporting requirements by the state in areas of sexual misconduct, sexual abuse, and harm to others or self, the counselor's duty to report shall not be negated. In such cases, the client shall be so informed, and such mandatory reporting shall be made to the appropriate authorities and agencies. Trust will be vested in the integrity of the counselors, both to keep confidences with clients and to keep faith with the program by submitting accurate bills of service for payment. Such bills will list hours of service, a client code, but no name. (Only the counselor will be able to connect the client code with a name, and thus preserve the confidentiality of the client.)
- 3. The counseling Service will be limited to six visits to a counselor in any one year.
  - The first two visits the counselor's contractual fee will be paid in full by the program.
  - b. Thereafter, participants will be asked to pay a portion of the cost of the counselor's contractual fee scaled to income, as follows:

- 4. Thereafter, if counseling is still needed after six visits in a calendar year, an application may be made to the Health Benefits program for possible payment. At that time, the symptoms must clearly indicate the need for therapy, and any such payments will then be made in accord with the Health Benefits Program, and not the contractual fees of the Conference Counseling Program.
- During the first six visits to the counselor, payments from the Conference Counseling Program and the Health Benefits Program simultaneously will not be allowed.
- Payments for the program will be made only to those counselors who have been approved as participants in the program. There will be no exceptions.

#### **BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY**

The Board of Ordained Ministry adopted five goals in the fall of 2008 for its work during this quadrennium. These goals guide our work of qualifying and mentoring persons who are seeking ordination as clergy in the Central Texas Conference. These goals are:

- 1. Create a standard of best practices for the District Committees on Ordained Ministry.
- Develop a qualification and interview process to be used by the Central Texas Conference Board of Ordained Ministry with candidates seeking to be commissioned, with those who are continuing as probationary members and with those who are seeking ordination and full connection.
- Evaluate the current Residency process as to the effectiveness for the probationary
  members of the Central Texas Conference. During this process, recommended changes to
  the process should be designed with the primary goal of helping a probationary member
  form a pastoral identity for his/her ministry.
- 4. Create an environment and process for the enlistment of young adults to serve in ordained ministry into the Central Texas Conference.
- Develop a program of continuing education for members of the Board of Ordained Ministry to ensure each member's effectiveness in representing the Central Texas Conference.

Working on these goals during the past year the Board has:

 Trained members of the District Committees on Ordained Ministry and mentors for candidates in ministry. Training of District Committees on Ordained Ministry will be offered annually to refresh the training of veteran members and to ensure that persons who become members after a change of appointment will be able to perform their responsibilities knowledgeably. Mentor training will be offered throughout each year by the Board, as necessary, to guarantee a sufficient number of trained candidacy mentors.

- Continue training members of the Board to create an effective process that is faithful to The United Methodist Church's understanding of ordained ministry.
- Initiated changes in the Central Texas Conference Residency Program that included a
  program with two years of minimum participation rather than three years and a peer support
  group for each of the two years.
- The Board has developed a policy requiring candidates to pay \$100 of the \$215 cost of
  interpretation of their psychological assessments. This is intended to engender investment
  in the candidacy process by candidates and their sponsoring churches, as well as to
  exercise more fiscal control over our apportioned funds. Candidates are encouraged to
  seek assistance from their recommending
- charge conferences if they are unable to fund this expense themselves. This policy will
  also apply to any clergy required to renew their psychological assessments for any reason.
- To facilitate accessibility, the Board has posted Spring Interview paperwork, as well as a
  multitude of other frequently used forms to its Website. It is anticipated that all forms and
  policies will be made available on the Website in both manual and electronic formats by the
  end of 2010. The Board is studying various options for secure electronic communications
  to lessen skyrocketing postal expense.
- Encouraged the participation of 48 students and young adults at Exploration in Dallas.
- The Prevention of Clergy Sexual Misconduct (PCSM) course has been tested and is on-line for clergy to satisfy the requirement to complete a sexual misconduct prevention training every four years.

The process for ordination in The United Methodist Church can seem complex and rigid to those who are exploring a call to ordained ministry. The Board of Ordained Ministry continues to work on ways to make the process clearer given the mandates of the Book of Discipline. Persons who are exploring a call to ordained ministry are encouraged to be in conversation with their District Superintendents and the chairpersons of their District Committees on Ordained Ministry.

The Board of Ordained Ministry's intent is that the process has the rigor needed to create opportunities for candidates' growth in their Christian faith and their practices of Christian ministry. This work is the work of not only the Board, but the District Committee on Ordained Ministry, who qualifies persons as candidates, the persons who mentor exploring, declared, and certified candidates, and the local churches which initially recommend persons for candidacy. The Board encourages local churches and clergy of the Central Texas Conference to look for persons of promise who could serve as effective clergy.

Finally, the Board of Ordained Ministry is comprised of clergy and laity who have additional responsibilities in their local churches, other ministry settings, or in other endeavors and callings. The gifts of their time and service during this year of change and renewal have been exemplary.

- Deepen spiritual development, enhancing spiritual formation and connectedness with clergy through special groups and teaching opportunities
- Build to last with new funding for critical CTC functions, structural flexibility, and alignment of resources
- Inspire big dreams such as 300 vital, vibrant churches by 2020, new fiscal streams for conference action, and a realignment of conferences resources and personnel

The Committee on Episcopacy is committed to the support of Bishop Lowry in these goals through consultation and annual evaluations.

# COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION AND CLERGY BENEFITS

#### Report No. 1

The commission has met as needed and has carried out its responsibilities of overseeing the Minimum Compensation program for the Annual Conference. Because of the changes in appointments from time to time which often changes the number of persons and the amount needed for supplements, it is extremely difficult to project the financial needs as far in advance as required. The commission seeks to be responsible to the churches of the Annual Conference in not requesting more than is needed in Apportionments and at the same time provide adequately for the program. The commission is also very much aware of the financial constraints that produce the need for equitable compensation in some appointments. The commission is therefore willing to not only provide financial assistance, but also provide educational assistance to help all equitable compensation entities with the tools and help to rise above the minimum compensation levels for their clergy.

We are recommending that Equitable Compensation levels for all categories of supplements be increased by 3% for the 2011 Conference financial year. Additionally, we recommend that the 2011 budget for Equitable Compensation be \$57,000.00 in Salary Compensation and that the Committee's budget be \$800.00 for Committee expenses.

The Equitable Compensation Commission of the Central Texas Conference will offer to participate with those churches receiving equitable compensation in obtaining workers' compensation insurance for lay and clergy employees through the Conference-wide insurance program, up to \$250.00 per policy.

#### Report No. 2

#### Equitable Compensation Fund

There shall be a program of equitable compensation support in the Central Texas Conference under the management of the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits. This program shall be patterned after ¶625 of the 2008 Discipline. Based on these guidelines, the following paragraphs shall compose the operating procedure for the Equitable Compensation Program.

- A prerequisite for consideration of salary supplements from the Equitable Compensation
  Fund shall be the filing with the Commission of a written application (Form EQ1/1999) by
  the District Superintendent each January 1 or anytime an appointment change occurs in an
  Equitable Compensation appointment. The District Superintendent shall certify
  classification of the clergy and the salary (using Pastoral Compensation and Support
  Worksheet figures) set by the charge.
- Salary grants shall be made for a calendar year with payments made monthly. In cases of appointment changes at or between the Annual Conference session, the District Superintendent shall file a written request with the Commission. Approved supplements shall then be paid on a pro-rata basis for the part of the year actually served.

- 3. Beginning January 2009, a church/charge is eligible to receive equitable compensation benefits for a maximum of three (3) years; a one year extension may be granted by the Cabinet if the charge exhibits progress and potential.
- 4. The following conditions must be met by the pastoral charge before it can become eligible for consideration to receive supplements from the Equitable Compensation Fund:
  - a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted a stewardship campaign for the local budget of each of its churches during the previous calendar year. This shall be an every member campaign. The Commission will assist in such a campaign upon written request from the charge pastor or district superintendent.
  - b) All apportioned items shall have been paid in full by the local church for the previous calendar year.
  - c) The charge must have at least 100 members.

In unusual situations the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits may waive any or all of these conditions.

- 5. The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits will pay any amount up to 1/4 of the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference for each applicant according to his/her ministerial classification. If any exception under paragraph 3 or 4 is sought, the request must be endorsed by a 2/3 vote of the Cabinet before it can be considered by the Commission.
- 6. Persons of the following ministerial relationships are eligible for consideration for salary supplements at the level indicated for 2011. Rates for adjustment will be considered annually by the commission, but no less than the same percentage increase as that computed for the District Superintendents. The increase for 2011 will be 3%. The amounts reflected include the pastor's support and compensation amounts according to the cabinet worksheet, exclusive of parsonage considerations or a housing allowance. In calculating equitable compensation payments, no more than 25% may be deducted from total compensation as a housing allowance (even if the housing allowance actually constitutes more than 25% of the total compensation). Exception to this rule may be made for missional considerations.

#### 1-1-2011

- a. Elder in Full Connection -- \$37,445
- b. Probationary member (1992 Disc.) or Probationary Elder (2000 Disc.)
  - 1) Non-student -- \$32,668
  - 2) Student -- \$30,190
- c. Associate Member -- \$32,668
- d. Full-time Local Pastor -- \$30,190
- 7. Pastors who are appointed to less than full-time service as addressed in the 2008 Discipline, (¶ 338.2) shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund. The amount of salary supplement for which the pastor is eligible will be determined by the Cabinet's interpretation of time actually spent in serving the charge. For example, if the pastor is deemed as serving 1/4 of full time, his/her minimum salary eligibility would be 1/4 of the minimum of his/her conference relationship classification. The categories of 1/4, 1/2, and 3/4 will be followed in determining less than full-time eligibility for salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund.
- 8. Ministers who are not eligible for salary supplements are:
  - d) Those whose appointment is other than pastor of a charge.
  - e) Those classified as part-time local pastor.
  - f) Retired ministers.
  - g) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in a present appointment.
  - h) Associate Pastors
- The Commission is studying ways in which Equitable Salary funds may be used to supplement unusual situations beyond the Conference minimum scale to provide

assistance for pastors who remain in churches for missional purposes at the request of the Cabinet. We continue in dialogue with the Cabinet about such a policy.

## Report No. 3 Moving Expenses

#### I. Eligibility

- A. Those elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, associate members, or full time local pastors, who are appointed to a local church in the Central Texas Annual Conference, and other elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, associate members, or full time local pastors for whom the Central Texas Annual Conference is the salary paying unit (such as District Superintendents, Conference Council Directors, Wesley Foundation Directors, etc.) shall be eligible to receive funds.
- B. Retiring elders in full connection, associate members, and full-time local pastors shall be eligible to receive funds for one move into housing not already owned or supported by a local church after retirement, to a maximum amount of \$2000. In circumstances in which a pastor, in one of the three relationships listed above, planning to retire moves prior to the retirement date, reimbursement for a move made within one year prior to the retirement date shall be made upon retirement, contingent upon the presentation of proper documentation.
- C. If an elder in full connection, probationary member, commissioned minister preparing for ordination as elder in full connection, associate member, or full-time local pastor from another Conference is to be appointed to a local church in the Central Texas Annual Conference, the Central Texas Annual Conference will pay the cost of the move from the border of the Central Texas Conference, up to the maximum amount allowed.
- D. Those elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, and associate members, or full-time local pastors who go on Leave of Absence, or who surrender their credentials, either voluntarily or involuntarily, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Annual Conference moving funds, except in the case of those going on disability leave or the family of an elder in full connection, a probationary member, a commissioned minister preparing for ordination as elder in full connection, an associate member, or a full-time local pastor who dies while under appointment shall be eligible to receive funds for the initial move into housing not already owned or supported by a local church, up to the maximum amount allowed.
- E. Those persons who change or move houses, but who <u>do not change appointments</u>, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Conference moving funds.
- F. Those persons who change appointments, but who do not change houses, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Conference moving funds, with the exception of \$250.00 for moving office materials.
- G. If either or both clergy of a clergy couple <u>living in one house</u> change appointments, and move to one house, they will be eligible to receive funds for only the cost of the one move, up to the maximum amount allowable. If two houses are involved, at either the beginning point or ending point, they will be eligible to receive funds for both moves, each up to the maximum amount allowable.
- H. In no case shall the Conference pay more than the eligible expenses noted in II. Moving Allowance.

#### II. Moving Allowance

Our Conference Moving Policy has two options: these options are (a) Self-Move and (b) Commercial Move. The total expense of a Self-Move will not exceed \$1000 to the Conference, and the total expense of a Commercial Move will not exceed \$1500 to the Conference.

1. Self-Move – The Self Move plan consists of the total receipts plus a maximum \$300 bonus with the grand total compensation not to exceed \$1000. Proper documentation of

receipts for the cost of <u>van rental</u>, <u>gasoline</u>, and <u>\$2.00 per mile</u> must be submitted to the Conference Secretary Treasurer before receiving reimbursement.

or

2. Commercial Move – Upon receiving a copy of the invoice from the commercial move by the Conference Secretary Treasurer, the Conference will pay a maximum of \$1500 of <u>actual moving expense</u>. The receiving charge will be responsible for up to \$500.00 above the conference coverage. Any expense above that will be the responsibility of the pastor.

#### III. Method of Payment

- 1. Proper Moving Expense Vouchers shall be provided by the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer at the Annual "Start-Up Seminar".
- The completed vouchers and required documentation shall be submitted to the
  office of the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer within <u>sixty (60) days</u>
  of the effective date of the appointment for repayment.
- 3. Should the local church incur any responsibility for moving expenses, copies of the same documentation must be provided prior to payment.

#### Exceptions

- A. Exceptions to any of the above may be approved or denied by the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer in consultation with the previous and receiving District Superintendents.
- B. Appeals of any decision by the Conference Secretary/Treasurer may be directed to the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits. The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits shall have final authority to interpret the moving policy and make decisions.

# Report No. 4 Housing/Parsonage Standard

The church today demands the clergy to be not only a preacher, as was the early circuit rider, but a resident pastor and responsible citizen in the community. In order to meet these felt needs, and to call men and women to a dedicated ministry, the church must provide living conditions that will establish an adequate base from which to operate. It is the privilege and responsibility of the members of each congregation to provide the physical setting which will give the parsonage family the maximum comfort and convenience that the energies of the pastor may be more concentrated on his/her task and willing service in the Church of God. Because the parsonage, like the church building, reflects upon the congregation and the pastor, it should be in such condition that all concerned can be justifiably proud of it. Likewise, pastors should exercise the same diligence in caring for the parsonage as they would if it were their own property; mindful that they are stewards for those who will live in the parsonage after them.

The following Parsonage Standards were put in place and approved at the 1973 Central Texas Annual Conference and have appeared in our Journals since that time. Therefore, parsonages built or purchased prior to December 31, 1973 may not meet all of the recommendations in Sections I and II, but are subject to requirements in Sections III – V. Parsonages built or purchased after January 1, 1974 are subject to all recommendations and requirements listed below in Sections I – V.

# Parsonage Standards for Central Texas Conference are as follows:

- I. Location—The location of a new parsonage is a matter of extreme importance. It should provide for the safety, convenience and privacy of the parsonage family. For this reason, we recommend that a new parsonage not be located adjacent to the church facilities.
- II. Size of building and living areas—The new or remodeled parsonage should be large enough to accommodate the pastor's family. It should provide adequate space for the entertainment of guests. It should be remembered in selecting a parsonage that the present parsonage family is not the only one who will live in that parsonage and that the house should be adaptable for a variety of family sizes and situations. Also care should be given that facilities should be fully

accessible for those with handicapping conditions meeting standards of the 2008 Discipline ¶2543.

#### Recommendations:

An 1800 square feet minimum living space.

At least 3 bedrooms, preferable 4.

At least 2 bath, preferable 2 1/2 with adequate linen closet.

Living and dining areas adequate for entertaining.

A family room

Adequate closet and storage space. Closet space in each bedroom and other storage space well distributed throughout the house.

Laundry area (see III.C.8)

Adequate garage or carport space (preferable 2-car attached garage)

Adequate outside living area with fenced yard.

#### III. Required Equipment

#### A. Health

- 1. Adequate supply of hot and cold water in bathrooms, kitchen and laundry.
- 2. Proper sewage disposal according to the stands of local and/or State Department of Health.

#### B. Safety

- 1. Fire extinguisher in kitchen with yearly inspection.
- 2. Automatic central heating and air conditioning
  - 3. Any bathroom heating should be protected and if not electric should be vented
  - 4. Provide smoke detectors for kitchen, living, laundry, and bedroom areas.
  - Provide carbon monoxide detectors, unless parsonage is completely electric.
  - 6. Recommend that a Lead Paint Disclosure be provided for parsonages built

#### before 1978.

- C. Kitchen with well-planned work area.
  - 1. Cooking area complete with range or built-in cooking units, counter space, hood and exhaust fan.
  - Sink area complete with modern double bowl sink with disposal and drain space.
  - 3. Large automatic refrigerator with freezer unit.
  - 4. Required code electrical outlets for every room.
  - 5. A well-equipped kitchen with adequate storage for dishes and utensils.
  - 6. Built-in dishwasher.
  - 7. Laundry room with washer/dryer.

# D. Furnishings

- House adequately furnished with main items in living room, family room, and kitchen. (Discarded or worn out furnishings should not be used to furnish the parsonage. A Gift/Donation Policy by the Trustees of each church should be in place to prevent such an occurrence.)
- 2. Window coverings, drapes, curtains, and blinds.
- Television antenna or cable service to parsonage.
- Lawn tools, mower (self-propelled or riding as appropriate for size of yard) hoses, ladder, garbage receptacles.
- 5. All bedroom furnishings shall be the responsibility of the parsonage family.
- The formal dining room furnishings shall be the responsibility of the resident parsonage clergy.
- The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits recommends that effective January 1, 2011, all living and family room

# furnishings become the responsibility of the resident parsonage family.

#### IV. Maintenance

- a. Decoration—both the interior and exterior of the parsonage should be kept in such a state of decoration as to preserve not only its physical condition but its aesthetic value as well. Decorating and/or any remodeling should be done in consultation with the parsonage family.
- b. Repair and replacement-
  - 1. An annual budget item will enable the **Tr**ustees and Parsonage Committee to have a consistent, rather than haphazard program of maintenance and improvement that will be less costly in the long run.
  - 2. An annual budget item for repair and replacement of fumiture and equipment.

#### V. Miscellaneous

- a. Parsonage Book—It is recommended that the parsonage committee prepare and keep up-to-date a record in which are placed all guarantees, repair parts lists, and the instructions for use of equipment belonging in the parsonage. The record should also indicate when and from whom purchased and whom to call for service. Also this book may well contain a list of whom to call for various reasons, where to find various items, when and by whom various improvements were made, and other information helpful to an incoming minister.
- b. Insurance—The trustees should be certain that the church-owned house and contents are insured for at least 80% of replacement cost against fire, wind, and other hazards. Public liability insurance should be carried on parsonage property. Tenant Homeowners insurance is available for all ministers who desire to cover personal possessions and liability. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PASTOR TO INSURE PERSONAL PROPERTY BELONGING TO THE PASTOR AND FAMILY.
- c. Utility Deposits—Should be made in the name of the church.
- d. Gifts to Parsonage—When a gift of furniture or furnishings is presented, it should be designated specifically if it is to remain in the parsonage or is to be the personal gift for the pastor/family. In the event it is to remain in the parsonage, the parsonage committee must approve it.

e. Pastor's Office/Study—The Office/Study should be located in the Church Building and adequately furnished and equipped. Some pastors may choose to also maintain an office in the parsonage and be responsible for its furnishings in addition to the official church Office/Study.

Adequate parsonage facilities, based on the above standards insure that a pastoral appointment can be made on the basis of the needs of the charge, rather than the ability of the parsonage to receive the family assigned.

An annual review of the church-owned parsonage, to ensure proper maintenance, will be conducted by the chair of the board of trustees or the chair of the parsonage committee, if one exists, the chair of the committee on pastor-parish relations, and the pastor (¶2532.4, 2008 Discipline).

### Report No. 5 Vacation Policy

United Methodist ministers are in a unique position in their role as pastors of a local church. Their membership and relationship is primarily to the Annual Conference as they serve under the appointment of the Bishop. At the same time their salary-paying unit is the local church. They are called to accountability for effective ministry both by the Bishop through the appointive system and by the local church through the Pastor-Parish Relations (PPR) Committee. In vacation policy and similar matters it should be remembered by all that a pastor is not the employee of the local church. On the other hand, the Discipline (2008) ¶258.2 gives to the PPR Committee a consultative role in such matters.

NOTE: Years of service refer to years under appointment in an Annual Conference, not to years of service in the local church to which a pastor is appointed.

NOTE: In addition to the above guidelines, the PPR Committee should be sensitive to a pastor's need for time off from the pastor's duties, and should encourage the pastor to take regular days off each week.

Since then, there have been as many as 38 retirement homes at one time. Hundreds of retired ministers and their spouses have been residents in the homes. Over the years, salary and retirement benefits for our clergy have improved and the majority of retiring clergy are able to provide housing on their own. As this trend continues the need for homes decreases.

It is the policy of the HRM Board of Trustees to sell homes as they become vacant and hold the funds in reserve to purchase a home as the need arises. If you know of a retired clergy or surviving spouse that might be in need, please have them contact me.

There are 5 homes in our ministry as of January 28, 2010. All 5 homes have residents. Thank you for your faithful support of this wonderful ministry of our Conference. Houses and their residents are as follows:

#### Morris DeLaney Walker 1909-1972

The Morris Walker award was established to recognize Morris DeLaney Walker's distinguished and exemplary service to The United Methodist Church as a conference lay leader. He was outstanding in how he filled his duties, but he also set a high standard of service that reflected throughout the conference. Morris once said his parents had taught him to "tithe my abilities and time as well as my income for the benefit of the church. I have found the opportunity of being some small service to the church most gratifying."

Walker's jovial and delightful personality assisted in his role of encourager to the members with whom he worked. He met life with twinkling eyes and a mischievous grin. Even today, those who knew him still tell of their adventures with him.

Walker served as president of the District Board of Missions and president of the Protestant Men's Council of Tarrant County. He was one of the initial 24 directors of the Metropolitan Board of Missions and one of its three incorporators. He was a member of Meadowbrook [United] Methodist Church from the time of his youth, later serving as lay leader, district lay leader for the church's Fort Worth East District, and Conference lay leader.

During the early 1960s, while carrying a full work load and serving in so many positions in the Central Texas Conference and beyond, he rarely missed Monday night visitation meetings in his church. His beyond-the-local-church activities did not keep him from being an exemplary witness in his local church.

In 1963 Walker represented the Methodist Church in Denmark through a United Nations cultural and spiritual exchange for a six-week period. He was Methodist representative to the United Nations Conference where he met Bishop Tutu.

He excelled in his professional and community life. He worked for Mrs. Baird's Bakery for 42 years, holding the highest position of a non-Baird family employee. He spent as much time in church work as in his job and the Bakery supported it. He was a faithful disciple of Christ whose work was an example for all who knew him.

It is my pleasure to bring this report to the Bishop and members of your annual conference. I extend to you my deepest appreciation for your support and prayers throughout the years. Lydia Patterson Institute is an institution that touches lives daily and all students whose lives have been changed carry every United Methodist from this conference in a very special place in their hearts. Please receive a warm greeting and word of gratitude from them as well as our faculty and staff.

Like everyone else, this past year has been a real challenge to us. Lydia Patterson is affected by the economic conditions on both sides of the border. On the one hand, the U. S. economy has created a loss of giving potential for our supporters. On the other hand, large numbers of parents have lost their jobs due to the crumbling Mexican economy. Many of our parents were employed in the American manufacturing plants that have had to, either relocate, or close their doors. This current school year, we saw a small drop in our enrollment. Parents are having a very hard time sending their kids to school. We gave out 20% more scholarships to our current students as well as helped as many as possible enroll for the first time. We are very grateful to all our friends and churches of the UMC who are in touch with the challenges that we face and have stepped up to help with one or more scholarships. Without your help, we could not possibly do our work and live to tell all the success stories that come out of this generous gift.

As if poverty and a bad economy were not enough, our students live a much more fearful threat every day; the violence on the streets. You hear it on the news daily. Juarez, Mexico, is the deadliest city in the world at the moment. Ten to 15 deaths occur daily, and our students must live through it. They still have to walk on those deadly streets on their way to school. One student said that once she walked over the bridge and into the U. S., she felt that she could breathe again. CNN, on a news report to the nation named Lydia Patterson Institute a haven to the students who needed refuge from a world of violence. This same report also mentioned the interesting fact that Lydia Patterson was established as a refuge to displaced immigrants fleeing from a Mexican revolution. Almost 100 years, later LPI brings hope and a safe place for students running from the streets of violence. You can still excess this report if you go to CNN.com.

In the midst of all, Lydia Patterson is a bright and shiny beacon in the life of the church. Sixty-seven students graduated last year, and 65 are in college today. Once more, the UMC has stepped up to continue our ministry. Twenty-four colleges and universities are providing scholarships for our students so that they can continue their education and escape the threats previously mentioned. Southwestern University called the life of one of our students, "A Cinderella Story". When you take students from a life of very little or no resources and send them to college where they excel, these are story book stories. Saul Bueno is a student at Southwestern University who will graduate in the spring with double majors and a plan to earn a master's degree. Fernando Rivera, on the other hand, is a student at Oklahoma City University planning to go to seminary and to prepare for the ordained ministry. Twenty-three students are serving churches throughout the country while they attend college.

The student lay ministry program is growing. We have 37 in this program being trained to lead churches, youth groups, develop Hispanic ministries, etc. Eight of these students will travel to Germany, in July, to represent the South Central Jurisdiction in the Global Young Peoples Convocation. They are working tremendously hard to raise the funds to make this possible.

I have no doubt that God blesses those who do His work. Lydia Patterson is blessed with the love, support and prayers of all our friends of this conference and the jurisdiction. I invite you to come home to El Paso and experience the greatness of our ministry. I extend a special invitation to you to come on a mission trip or a work team and be blessed as well. Thank you, again, for being there for us.

# Report No. 2 PRE-82 PENSION FUNDING PLAN

The 2000 General Conference mandated that every conference have in place a funding plan to insure that monies will be in place no later than the year 2021 to cover any unfunded liability for those pastors with pre-82 years of service. Below you will find the proposed funding plan for the Central Texas Conference. The funding plan as of January 1, 2010 is summarized below:

(These numbers were projected from the 2010 actuarial valuation as of January 1, 2008 using 7% interest at 3% PSR increases. While the CAC in past years has increased approximately 4%, we do not expect that trend to continue. We anticipate increases closer to 2%-3%. We intend to keep the PSR. at .9% of the CAC.)

Note: These numbers do not reflect massive financial challenges that occurred during 2008 as the stock market collapsed. It appeared as though we would reach our goal of 120% funding by 2016; but, market losses took it's toll. Our Pre-82 funded status fell from 106% to 78%. Your Conference Board of Pensions is in consultation with the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits as we assess the current and future financial needs to insure the stability of the Pre-82 Plan. We know there will be rising costs due to various factors: 1) increases in Past Service Rates, 2) greater numbers of Retirees, 3) variables in interest rates, 4) re-couping monies lost in the market downturn.

Therefore, we request that the Conference Claimant Apportionment be set at \$800,000. This is a \$100,000 increase from 2010. We must be prepared for further increases in coming years until the plan is secure and we can limit the volatility of the market effects.

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# Report No. 3 PENSIONS:

- In accordance with Conference action, which requires that the Past Service Rate (PSR) be at least 9/10 of 1% of the Conference Average Compensation (CAC for 2011 this is \$67,950), for those clergy with pre-1982 service years who qualify for annuity, the Conference Board of Pensions recommends that the PSR for 2011 be \$627. This meets the minimum requirement.

# Report No. 4

# Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP)

On January 1, 2007, the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) became effective as the new Pension program for all eligible United Methodist Clergy.

CRSP offers a two component benefit design:

- a) Defined Benefit promises a specific dollar amount at retirement regardless of market conditions or investment performance. The amount is based on a formula that specifies a monthly retirement benefit to eligible clergy for the remainder of their lives.
- Core Defined Contribution promises a defined amount that is deposited into an active clergyperson's account with monthly deposits. This benefit distributed at retirement is the accumulated amount plus earnings (losses) in the individual's account

The 2011 financial obligation C.R.S.P. requires of the Central Texas Conference is:

- Core Defined Contribution 3% of each eligible clergyperson's plan compensation.
- b) Core Defined Benefit \$2,034,461

#### 2011 Funding Plan:

The cost of participation in C.R.S.P. will continue to be direct billed to the local church for the two core components (Defined Benefit and Defined Contribution).

- a) Defined Contribution 3% of participant plan compensation
- b) Defined Benefit Full-time Clergy \$7,300

3/4 time Clergy - \$5,475

1/2 time Clergy - \$3,650

1/4 time Clergy - \$1,825

# Report No. 5

The Conference Board of Pensions and Health Benefits has determined that our current funding planfor clergy benefits through apportionments is fiscally unsustainable. Therefore, the Board isrecommending the following changes;

- That the Comprehensive Protection Plan (C.P.P.) be direct billed to the local church/conference sponsored agency beginning January 1, 2011.
- 2. That five (5) months of the Active Health Insurance Program be apportioned in 2012 and seven (7) months beginning June 1, 2012 be direct billed to the local church/conference sponsored agency. The direct billed amount will include the total premium of which the church/agency pays ½ and the participant pays ½. If the local church/agency so chooses it may pay the clergy share as a benefit.
- 3. That the Active Health Insurance Program be removed as an apportionment as of January 1, 2013 and be direct billed to the local church/conference sponsored agency. The direct billed amount will include the total premium of which the church/agency pays ½ and the participant pays ½. If the local church/agency so chooses it may pay the clergy share as a benefit.

# Report No. 6

The board recommends that it continue to actively pursue the issue of pension arrearage utilizing a very fair but stringent examination of each situation to determine what steps need to be taken to assure the integrity of the affected minister's future pension benefits.

The board recommends the following procedure for dealing with current and future pension contributions:

Letters will be sent to the following lay leaders of the churches involved: Administrative Board/Council Chair, Pastor/Staff Relations Committee Chair, Finance Committee Chair, and Treasurer. The pastor and the district superintendent will also receive the letter. The letter will

emphasize the importance of this issue and urge them to bring their contributions current by sending their check to Central Texas Conference, PO Box 99387, Fort Worth, TX 76199-0387 Each church which does not meet its obligation will report this fact to its Charge Conference and give an explanation. The district superintendent will keep a record of this action. As of December 31, 2009, we have six (6) churches in arrears for a total amount of \$45,601.

The Conference Board of Pension recommends that every person update their Designation of Beneficiary form at least every five years, or upon a change of appointment for active clergypersons, or upon any life changing event (marriage, death of a spouse, divorce, etc.)

# Report No. 8 CONFERENCE GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM

We are now in our seventh year of providing medical and pharmacy benefits through HealthFlex and we continue to be very satisfied with the program. The only change in our EPO and PPO plan structures from 2009 to 2010 was the pharmacy benefit structure. Effective January 1, 2010, the prescription drug plans previously associated with our health plans changed to RX Plan FX 2 for all plans. The most significant change is the addition of a retail deductible for the EPO plan and the mail order copayment for a 90 day supply went from 2 times the retail copayment to approximately 2 ½ times the copayment for brand name prescriptions. The following is the coverage overview of FX 2.

Our health insurance plan will continue to be a mandatory program administered according to the HealthFlex rules for mandatory conference programs. Those for whom the program is mandatory are Elders, Provisional Elders, Associate Members, and Full-time Local Pastors appointed to local churches in the Conference, as well as those for whom the Conference is the Plan sponsor for the Pension program such as District Superintendents, Conference staff appointees, and Campus Ministers. In addition Elders appointed at least one-half time and Student Local Pastors will be included. Deacons serving at least one-half time are eligible for coverage at the Salary-Paying Unit (local church) level under a Sub-Adoption Agreement, but are not mandated. Not included in the plan (and thus not allowed insurance through the Conference) will be Elders serving less than one-half time. Ministers of Other Denominations, those appointed to extension ministries other than those named above, and Part-time Local Pastors. The Conference Board of Pensions reserves the right each year to choose the optional categories of appointments to be selected to best serve the needs of the Conference. Where a clergyperson in a mandatory category chooses to waive the program, the church served by that clergyperson will be assessed a minimum contribution equal to the single clergy PPO rate for the year, which is the default plan for the Conference, to be paid monthly. This is to insure the stability of the program so it will be in place for other clergy who will serve that church. We further recommend that churches begin to think of health insurance coverage as a benefit provided to a pastor rather than as a part of that pastor's salary, and we encourage them to make it a separate item in their budget apart from salary considerations.

Lay employees, normally scheduled to work 30 hours or more per week, may be eligible for coverage at the Salary-Paying Unit (local church) level under a Sub-Adoption Agreement if Risk Pool requirements are met. The Risk Pool Rules apply to lay employees on an employer-by-employer basis. Surviving spouses and dependents of covered lay employees deceased on or after January 1, 2009 are eligible for coverage as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death and will be responsible for the entire premium. A new spouse acquired by a surviving spouse is not eligible for benefits through the Conference.

Claims experience again showed a significant increase in 2009 and our projected 2011 premiums reflect that increase. The following are the preliminary premium rates for 2011 from HealthFlex.

We remind churches and pastors of the urgency to pay health insurance premiums monthly in a timely fashion. To fail to do so, as in any insurance program, may result in cancellation of insurance benefits. If at any time the premium due becomes more than 90 days delinquent, the coverage for that/those participant(s) may be cancelled retroactively to the first of the month where the delinquency began and will not be available for reinstatement until the next plan year.

In 2010, the HealthFlex Incentive Program continues to provide financial incentives to HealthFlex participants for participating in the Virgin HealthMiles (VHM) walking program. VHM is a physical activity program brought to HealthFlex participants by HealthFlex and the Center for Health. This program allows participants to earn rewards for making a commitment to improve your health by walking or getting active in other ways. New this year, HealthFlex is using a combination of reward incentives and disincentives to promote good health and encourage participants to be more responsible for their health-related behaviors.

VHM offers an opportunity to help participants become or stay focused on their health. Participants enroll and receive a free "GoZone" pedometer, which tracks the steps taken every day. Steps are uploaded from the pedometer to a personalized "LifeZone" HealthMiles Web site, which displays physical activity levels. Over time, participants can track their progress—and their rewards. Each time steps are uploaded, "HealthMiles" are received. HealthMiles are also earned for filling out a brief health snapshot, taking health measurements, participating in challenges and more. When fitness levels and measurements improve, participants earn HealthMiles for improvements. HealthMiles works like a frequent-traveler program. As different levels are reached, "HealthCash," is earned which can be redeemed as gift cards for national retailers, or as a check written to the participant or their favorite charity. Up to \$300 can be earned in a 12-month period.

HealthMiles are converted to HealthCash based on the participation levels indicated below. (The reward for Level One is the free pedometer if you are new to the program.)

#### New for 2010:

• Participants and covered spouses in active plans must complete the HealthQuotient™ (HQ) by

August 31, 2010 or an extra \$250 will be added to their 2011 individual medical plan deductible (or \$500 for family deductible).

 HealthCash will not be awarded for taking the HQ in 2010. However, 500 HealthMiles will be awarded one time for this activity in 2010.

## Participant HQ Incentive—Avoiding a Higher Deductible

HealthFlex is taking a new approach to encourage more participants and spouses to complete the HQ online health risk assessment. Active plan participants and spouses who complete the HQ between January 1, 2010 and August 31, 2010 will avoid having an extra \$250 individual or \$500 family cost added to their 2011 medical deductible. Please note the following guidelines:

- The HQ deadline to avoid the higher 2011 deductible applies only to participants and their spouses enrolled in HealthFlex *active* medical plans. Medicare companion plan participants are not subject to the higher deductible.
- · For married participants:
- Both the participant and the covered spouse must take the HQ to avoid the higher deductible.
- If only the participant or only the covered spouse takes the HQ, the household's 2011 coverage will be subject to an additional \$250 on their individual deductible or an additional \$500 on their family deductible.
- For couples with one active participant and one Medicare companion plan participant, only the active-plan participant must complete the HQ by August 31, 2010 in order to avoid the higher deductible.
- Participants with family coverage who do not have a spouse covered by HealthFlex are only subject to the additional \$250 added to the individual or family deductible if they do not take the HQ by August 31, 2010.
- Active plan participants and spouses who do not take the HQ until after August 31, 2010 will be subject to the higher deductible.
- Participants and covered spouses must each log in to the HealthFlex/WebMD Web site using their own unique user IDs and passwords.

# Report No. 9 RETIREE HEALTH BENEFITS and Service Requirements for Funding Retiree Health Benefits

Beginning January 1, 2008, the Central Texas Conference (Conference) subsidized Retiree Health Insurance carrier is a Medicare Companion Plan, which is inclusive of prescription benefits, through HealthFlex sponsored by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits of the United Methodist Church and administered by BlueCross BlueShield of Illinois.

The Conference shares the funding of the Retiree Health Benefit Program for eligible retired participants with the retired clergy and spouses. The Conference Retiree Health Benefit Program assumes participation in Medicare Parts A and B and is designed to extend certain benefits beyond what Medicare pays. The Conference will subsidize the premium for the clergy retiree and his/her eligible spouse if the following service requirements have been met (these rules are in effect for any clergyperson who retires after Annual Conference June, 2002): Service Requirements for Funding Retiree Health Benefits: At the time of retirement, the clergyperson must have been working in at

least a ¾ time appointment as a Full Member of the Central Texas Conference or as a Full Time Local Pastor eligible for retirement per the Discipline and the rules of the Annual Conference. At the time of retirement, the clergyperson must be a member of the Central Texas Conference, serving in a local church or one of its "Conference Responsible" agencies, and they must have at least five (5) years of ministerial service in the Central Texas Conference and ten (10) years of service in the United Methodist Church. A waiver of the five (5) year requirement for service in the Central Texas Conference may be considered by the Central Texas Conference Board of Pensions upon recommendation of the Cabinet.

For those eligible clergypersons and their eligible spouses enrolled in the HealthFlex Medicare Companion Plan offered by the Conference who retire January 1, 2008 or after, the Conference will pay from 15 – 50% of the premium for those retiring at age 65 (or full retirement age) based on their years of ministerial service in the United Methodist Church.

For those eligible clergypersons and their eligible spouses enrolled in the HealthFlex Medicare Companion Plan offered by the Conference who retired before January 1, 2008, the Conference will continue to subsidize the premium at 50%.

Surviving spouses of deceased retired clergy are eligible for the subsidy as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death. A new spouse acquired by a retiree or surviving spouse after retirement is not eligible for retiree benefits through the Conference.

If, at the time of retirement, the clergyperson is less than 65 years of age and has been covered for five consecutive years under HealthFlex, then the Conference will partially fund participation in the Conference's plan for active clergy only if the same service requirements are met as those who are 65 years of age. If the service requirements listed above have not been met, then the clergyperson and his or her spouse are responsible for providing for his or her own healthcare from that point forward.

If at the time of retirement, a retiree has Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage (e.g. through a spouse's employer), he/she may decline retiree coverage and retain the ability to enroll for coverage at a future date. If the retiree loses his or her coverage, it is the retiree's responsibility to

notify the Conference and enroll in the retiree coverage within 30 calendar days of loss of other coverage. If this 30-day requirement is not met, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage/subsidy through the Conference at a future date. If an eligible retiree without Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage declines coverage at the time of retirement, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage/subsidy through the Conference at a future date.

Beginning January 1, 2009, the Central Texas Conference has elected the exception that allows a multiple employer plan to exempt certain individuals from the Medicare secondary payer rules for the This election helps reduce costs incurred by the Conference and the overall working aged. HealthFlex program. This exception applies to clergy, lay employees and spouses who are 65 years of age or older, entitled to Medicare due to their age, and have coverage under the HealthFlex program through an employer (local church or Conference sponsored entity) who employs fewer than 20 employees. For those individuals affected by the exception, Medicare will be the primary payer of their claims beginning the first day of the month they attain age 65, even if still an active employee, and the employee will no longer be eligible for coverage under the active plans. Eligible clergy and clergy spouses will be moved from the active plan over to the Conference subsidized retiree Medicare Companion Plan at that time and the premium will be subsidized at 50% as with any other active clergy. Upon retirement, if eligible for retirement health benefits, the subsidy will continue based upon years of service as indicated in the scale above. Eligible lay employees, 65 years of age or older, will be moved from the active plan to the Medicare Companion Plan and will be responsible for the entire premium.

Beginning with a retirement date of January 1, 2009 or later, a lay employee whose active service has ended and has completed a minimum of five years of continuous and uninterrupted coverage in HealthFlex immediately preceding the date of retirement, may continue under the Medicare Companion Plan, along with any eligible family members covered at the time of retirement, and will be responsible for the entire premium. Surviving spouses of retired, deceased lay employees are eligible for coverage as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death. A new spouse acquired by a retiree or surviving spouse after retirement is not eligible for benefits through the Conference.

If at the time of retirement, a retired layperson has Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage (e.g. through a spouse's employer), he/she may decline retiree coverage and retain the ability to enroll for coverage at a future date. If the retiree loses his or her coverage, it is the retiree's responsibility to notify the Conference and enroll in the retiree coverage within 30 calendar days of loss of other coverage. If this 30-day requirement is not met, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage through the Conference at a future date. If an eligible retiree without Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage declines coverage at the time of retirement, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage through the Conference at a future date.

We continue to have a concern for clergy who may have opted out of the Social Security system. It is imperative that those persons be Medicare eligible when they turn 65, or they likely will not be able to obtain any medical insurance. Some who have opted out may have this eligibility through a spouse, or through enough previous employment. However it should also be noted that eligibility for Social Security disability payments differs from the requirements for retirement and Medicare benefits. If a new pastor is considering this course, they should investigate these matters very carefully.

Effective January 1, 2010, the prescription drug plans previously associated with our health plans changed to RX Plan FX 2 for all plans. The most significant change is the mail order copayment for a 90 day supply went from 2 times the retail copayment to approximately 2 ½ times the copayment for brand name prescriptions. The following is the coverage overview of FX 2.

In 2010, the HealthFlex Incentive Program continues to provide financial incentives to HealthFlex participants for participating in the Virgin HealthMiles (VHM) walking program. VHM is a physical activity program brought to HealthFlex participants by HealthFlex and the Center for Health. This program allows participants to earn rewards for making a commitment to improve your health by walking or getting active in other ways. Participants and spouses enrolled in HealthFlex active and Medicare companion plans are eligible to earn HealthCash through the VHM program.

VHM offers an opportunity to help participants become or stay focused on their health. Participants enroll and receive a free "GoZone" pedometer, which tracks the steps taken every day. Steps are uploaded from the pedometer to a personalized "LifeZone" HealthMiles Web site, which displays physical activity levels. Over time, participants can track their progress—and their rewards. Each time steps are uploaded, "HealthMiles" are received. HealthMiles are also earned for filling out a brief health snapshot, taking health measurements, participating in challenges and more. When fitness levels and measurements improve, participants earn HealthMiles for improvements. HealthMiles works like a frequent-traveler program. As different levels are reached, "HealthCash," is earned which can be redeemed as gift cards for national retailers, or as a check written to the participant or their favorite charity. Up to \$300 can be earned in a 12-month period.

HealthMiles are converted to HealthCash based on the participation levels indicated below. (The reward for Level One is the free pedometer if you are new to the program.)

# RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL-HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR MINISTERS ON INCAPACITY LEAVE OF THIS CONFERENCE

The Central Texas Conference (the "Conference") adopts the following resolutions relating to rental-housing allowances for active, retired or disabled clergypersons of the Conference:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the "Church"), of which this Conference is a part, has in the past functioned and continues to function through ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the Church ("Clergypersons");

WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and of this Conference was and is to provide active Clergypersons with a parsonage or a rental-housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to retired and disabled Clergypersons are considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to active, retired and disabled Clergypersons in consideration of previous active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental-housing allowance for Clergypersons who are or were members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation;

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

**THAT** an amount equal to 100% of the pension or disability payments received from plans authorized under *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church* (the "*Discipline*"), which includes all such payments from the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits ("GBOPHB"), during the year 2011 by each active, retired or disabled Clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental-housing allowance for each such Clergyperson; and

THAT the pension or disability payments to which this rental-housing allowance applies will be any pension or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds authorized under the *Discipline*, including such payments from the GBOPHB and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a GBOPHB plan, annuity, or fund authorized under the *Discipline*, that result from any service a Clergyperson rendered to this Conference or that an active, retired or disabled Clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the Church, or any other employer that employed the Clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the Church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such active, retired or disabled Clergyperson's pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental-housing allowance that may be excluded from a Clergyperson's gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations there under to the <u>least</u> of: (1) the amount of the rental-housing allowance designated by the Clergyperson's employer or other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing resolutions) for such year; (2) the amount actually expended by the Clergyperson to rent or provide a home in such year; or (3) the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

# Report No. 11 Section 125 Cafeteria Plan

For the purpose of paying for health care without having to pay taxes on the money which one spends, the Central Texas Conference established a Cafeteria plan under Section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code for all lay and clergy employees working 1040 hours per year (20 hours per week), who work in our churches, as Conference staff, in the CTC Foundation, at Glen Lake Camp and

Retreat Center, or who are appointed to Conference-responsible extension ministries within the bounds of the Conference.

The Cafeteria Plan has an automatic feature and four optional features. The automatic feature, for which one does not need to fill out an enrollment form, is the exclusion from one's wages, on a pretax basis, one's medical insurance coverage premium. One needs only to indicate the yearly premium amount on one's Pastoral Support and Compensation Form and tell one's treasurer to exclude each month's premium and send it to the proper address. The four optional features require filling out an enrollment form and paying the proper administrative and posting charges which apply. These are also paid with pre-tax dollars. The optional features one may select to exclude from wages include:

- Un-reimbursed Medical (URM) Flexible Spending Account up to \$5,000 (on a use-it-or-loseit basis) through Aflac's FlexOne.
- Dependent Day Care (DDC) Flexible Spending Account up to \$5,000 (for care of dependents under 13 years of age or dependents mentally or physically incapable of selfcare, also on a use-it-or-lose-it basis) through Aflac's FlexOne.
- 3. Supplemental Medical Policies from Aflac.
- 4. Supplemental Dental Policies from Aflac.

Enrollment occurs within 30 days of employment and then is offered yearly to all eligible employees. It is important to note that re-enrollment in the Flexible Spending Accounts do not automatically occur or "roll over" into the following year. Each participant must re-enroll in the fall of the previous year for the next year's participation. The Supplemental Medical and Dental policies will remain in place in subsequent years unless a cancellation form is submitted to the Conference Office during the open enrollment period requesting the same. New materials for enrollment are available on the Conference website in October of each year for re-enrollment for the following year.

As with the health insurance plan, the premiums for the optional features should be paid monthly in a timely fashion. To fail to do so may result in the cancellation of the policy/policies. If at any time the premium due becomes more than 90 days delinquent, the coverage for that/those participant(s) may be cancelled retroactively to the first of the month where the delinquency began and will not be available for reinstatement until the next plan year.

# COMMITTEE ON RULES, POLICIES AND GUIDELINES

The Committee on Rules is charged with reviewing and recommending changes to the Conference Standing Rules. The Standing Rules have been reviewed.

The following changes have been submitted to the committee and recommended to the Annual Conference. Strike through indicates deletion. Bold print indicates new language. For the full text, see the Conference Journal.

#### V. FINANCIAL

- 3.0 After careful consideration of all financial responsibilities of the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration, with three liaison representatives selected by the Annual Conference Mission Ministries, meeting with the Council on Finance and Administration in all budget discussions, shall recommend all allocations for the major categories in the total Conference financial program: dergy and diaconal support, Conference claimants fund, administration, World Service, Conference benevolences, and capital funding. The Annual Conference Mission Ministries, being charged by the Discipline to study and coordinate the budget request of the several Conference agencies as they relate to the Conference program, shall formulate and present an itemized Conference benevolence budget providing for the support of these agencies to the Council on Finance and Administration. If, for any reason, the Council on Finance and Administration decides that the total of the requests for the Conference benevolence budget needs to be changed, it shall adjust the allocation and refer it back to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries Mission Ministries for adjustments of the itemized appropriations in the Conference benevolence budget.
- All budget items allocated to the Districts and local churches of the Conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula: Determine the base amount for each District or church by taking the total of the following items: (58) pension & benefit funds (CRSP) paid directly to the General Board of Pensions, (64) Pastor's base compensation, (65) Associate(s) base compensation, (66a) Utilities and housing paid to/for pastor, (66b) Utilities and housing paid to/for associate(s), (67a) Travel paid to/for pastor, (67b) Travel paid to/for associate(s), (68a) Other allowances paid to/for pastor, (68b) Other allowances paid to/for associate(s), (69) Diaconal minister(s) compensation, (70) Other staff compensation, (71) Current expenses for program, (72) Other current operating expenses. Add the above thirteen (13) expenditures for each District to get the "District total expenditure". Divide each "District total expenditure" by the "Conference total expenditure" to get the District decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the District decimal by each Conference Apportionment to get the District Apportionment. Add the above thirteen (13) expenditures for each local church to get their "local total expenditure". Divide each "local total expenditure" by the "District total expenditure" to arrive at the local church decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the local church decimal by each District Apportionment allocation to get the Local Church Apportionment. (Each apportionment is rounded off to the nearest dollar, with each church being apportioned at least one dollar for each apportionment.)

All Budget items allocated to the Districts and local churches of the Conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula: Determine the base amount for

each District or church by taking the total of the following items: (51A) Pension & Benefit Funds (CRSP), (53) Pastor's Base Compensation, (54) Associate(s) Base Compensation, (55) Utilities and Housing paid to/for Pastor and to/for Associate(s), (57) Travel paid to/for Pastor and to/for Associate(s) and Other Allowances paid to/for Pastor and to/for Associate(s), (58) Deacon(s) Compensation, (59) Diaconal Compensation, (60) Other Staff Compensation, (61) Current Program Expense, (62) Other Current Operating Expenses. Add the above ten (10) expenditures for each District to get the "District total expenditure". Divide each "District total expenditure" by the Conference total expenditure to get the District decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply each district decimal by each Conference Apportionment to get their "local total expenditure". Divide each "local total expenditures for each local church to get their "local total expenditure". Divide each "local total expenditure" by the "District total expenditure" to arrive at the local church decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the local church decimal by each District Apportionment allocation to get the Local Church Apportionment. (Each Apportionment is rounded off to the nearest dollar, with each church being apportioned at least one dollar for each apportionment.)

6.0 Items to be distributed under the formula are the Episcopal Fund, District Superintendent Salaries & Pension, Conference Claimants and C.P.P., Clergy Health Insurance, Equitable Compensation, Other Clergy Benefits, Property and Administration, World Service/Conference Benevolences, Interdenominational Cooperation, Ministerial Education, Black Colleges, Africa University, Mission Initiatives, Mount Sequoyah, Lydia Patterson Institute, SMU Campus Ministry, Texas Methodist College Association, Wesley Foundations, and Glen Lake Camp Improvements. Others may be added by the action of the Annual Conference.

#### TEXAS METHODIST FOUNDATION

The Texas Methodist Foundation experienced significant growth during 2009, increasing our assets and further clarifying our vision for the most effective way to serve United Methodist individuals, churches, and institutions in Texas. We give thanks for our success, but not without awareness. We understand many of the ministry partners we serve continue to face challenges resulting from economic pressures and that during times of uncertainty, it is more important than ever for the Church to focus on mission and ministry. That makes our financial stability even more important: the more financially sound we are, the better able we are to achieve our mission "to empower the Church in the achievement of her God-appointed missions."

We ended 2009 with \$365.4 million in assets under management. This increase of more than \$45 million over 2008 reflects substantial growth, but our promise to help the United Methodist community accomplish God's dreams for ministry goes well beyond the balance sheet. We continually renew our commitment to promote the long-term health and vitality of the Church in Texas and use that as a standard for decision-making, whether considering a loan, investment, capital campaign, gift, or grant request. Above all, we see the mission and ministry we enable through our services as the core purpose of our work and service to God.

In addition to financial resources, churches must have strong leadership in order to thrive. Our TMF Institute for Clergy and Congregational Excellence continues to support and develop clergy leaders through peer learning groups. Pastors take newly-acquired skills and habits, and their experience of spiritual renewal and deep community, back to their congregations to develop disciples who practice a Christian way of life together for the sake of the world.

The Texas Methodist Foundation, located in Austin, serves United Methodist individuals, churches and agencies within the five geographic annual conferences in Texas and the Rio Grande Conference of Texas and New Mexico. We appreciate the opportunity to report some of the ways we assisted United Methodists last year.

How can we help you bring God's dreams for ministry to life?

We are pleased to report the assistance we provided in 2009:

#### Within the Central Texas Annual Conference:

- Loans from the Foundation to churches in the Central Texas Annual Conference totaled \$60.2 million.
- Churches and related agencies within the Central Texas Annual Conference had \$16.9 million invested with the Foundation's Methodist Loan Fund.

#### Throughout the state:

- As of December 31, 2009, total assets under management by the Foundation were approximately \$365.4 million.
- Methodist Loan Fund investments grew overall, including new Individual Fund accounts of \$7.3 million. Methodist Loan Fund investments support the Foundation's loan program which currently funds 449 loans to United Methodist churches and agencies. Our loan balance ended 2009 at \$306.4 million.
- The TMF Institute for Clergy and Congregational Excellence ministry (formerly the Clergy Leadership Initiative) supported 95 pastors from the Texas annual conferences participating in 10 Clergy Development Groups. The Institute also welcomed 32 District Superintendents from around the state and across the South Central Jurisdiction, and the 11 active Bishops serving in the South Central Jurisdiction who were involved in group processes. Senior pastors and laity from five congregations also participated in a 34-member Holy Conversations Community of Learning, focusing on spiritually-based strategic planning.
- During 2009, the Foundation funded grants in excess of \$770,000 including several from donoradvised funds. These grants benefited a variety of programs managed by local churches, community outreach centers, and conference ministries. The Foundation's Grants Ministry gives priority to programs that address the root causes of poverty as it affects children.
- The Foundation distributed \$923,549 from permanent endowments, predominantly to United Methodist causes in Texas.
- Our Stewardship staff consulted on 10 capital campaigns, resulting in pledges totaling more than \$2.7 million. They made more than 338 consultation visits to churches offering counsel and guidance in areas of specific need related to funding ministry. Stewardship staff also conducted 17 annual and year-round stewardship workshops in local churches and 38 district and conference level workshops.

Our Development staff worked with more than 103 churches to help them initiate or revive Permanent Endowment Fund programs in 2009, and facilitated meetings of both endowment leaders and potential donors. Two new seminars were introduced by the Development staff: Finding Your Treasures and Building a Philanthropic Cathedral for Your Soul. These seminars focused on the roots of individual generosity and how one gives out of gratitude for God's gifts. Development staff also played a professional role in the 2009 Stewardship Gathering of the National Association of United Methodist Foundations and the 2009 Stewardship Summit of the Southwest Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church.

#### **BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

The Board of Trustees takes seriously its responsibility to verify that the Conference Insurance coverage is current. To that end, a review of all the Conference insurance policies has been completed and we are satisfied that the Conference insurance coverages are adequate. The Conference continues to offer our churches the opportunity to participate in a group policy for Workers Compensation, Employee Liability, and Directors and Officers Insurance. This coverage is available through Roach, Howard, Smith, and Barton in Fort Worth at 1-800-295-6607. Churches often find that lower rates can be obtained through this Group Plan; therefore, we encourage our churches to consider this insurance option.

We have also begun a new Group Option for churches taking mission trips out of the country. If your church is planning such a mission trip outside the United States, we invite you to contact Roach, Howard, Smith, and Barton at 1-800-295-6607 in Fort Worth for information about this Group Insurance Plan

Conference policy requires that each church in the charge carry Workers' Compensation Insurance on pastors and other employees. If a pastor (or other worker) receives a work-related injury, health insurance will not pay on what should be a worker's compensation claim. In addition, regular liability insurance will not pay or protect a church against such a gap in coverage. Please, if you do not have workers' compensation coverage, check with our Conference agent, Roach, Howard, Smith and Barton (1-800-295-6607) in Fort Worth, or any agent of your choosing.

We encourage churches to survey the insurance coverage that they now have and compare it with new policies and new carriers. We remind churches that a required part of Charge Conference reporting is a report from the Trustees, which lists insurance coverage and deed recordings.

The current conference electric service contract with Reliant Energy will end in June 2010. A new three (3) year contract for our Conference Aggregate Plan has been negotiated and signed with Hudson Energy. All conference entities involved in this program have been notified of the change and lower rate.

The Conference Center Facility Study performed by the firm of Hahnfeld, Hoffer, and Stanford has been completed. The special Task Group appointed by the Conference Trustees received the report and brought it forward to the full Board of Trustees. Further action on the report will be taken in coordination with the recommendations of the Conference Alignment Committee.

Homer R. Kluck June 16, 1928 - June 10, 2009



Homer was born June 16, 1928, in Perry, Texas to Charlie William and Marie Alfrieda Wolff Kluck. His early life was centered around the family farm, the Methodist Homer R. Kluck Church located steps away from his home, and the German community of Perry. He attended Alexander School, Riesel High School, graduated from Marlin High School, and was a graduate of Texas Wesleyan with a degree in music education. He held a M.Th. degree from Perkins School of Theology, SMU. In 1989

he received an honorary doctor of divinity degree from Texas Wesleyan.

For 40 years he served as a minister in the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church. Twelve of those years he spent as a campus minister and the director of the Wesley Foundation at TCU. The students loved him and his quiet yet powerful witness influenced many.

While at TCU he also served as a pastor for Southside Ministries where he led Sunday afternoon services in a run down store front for a diverse congregation. He developed beautiful liturgies for these services, blending traditional and contemporary, classical and folk, Bach to Bob Dylan. The Eucharist was served each week with all singing "The Welcome Table", recalling Jesus' metaphor of the Kingdom of God as a great feast.

Six years of his ministry he served as the district superintendent of the Temple District. He served as the chairman of the board of Ordained Ministry of the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church. He was a clergy delegate to the 1984 and the 1988 General Conferences of the United Methodist Church. Churches he pastored included Dido-Newark, Eddy, Granger, West, Killeen, Moody, and First Georgetown. In Fort Worth he served Bethel, Wedgwood, Western Hills, and Arlington Heights. Other positions of service included president of the Tarrant Area Community of Churches, trustee of the Wesleyan Home in Georgetown, and the Board of Trustees of Southwestern University. Homer's ministry extended beyond the church. He served as president of the Tarrant County Mental Health Association and as a member of the Texas Mental Health Association.

Homer was an accomplished musician and shared his talents as pianist and vocalist in his ministry and with family and friends. Long time friend, Dr. Gil Ferrell noted, "If Longfellow was correct in saying that music is the universal language of humankind, then Homer Kluck was a world-class linguist."

Backpacking was a love and as a trained hiker he led both youth and adult backpacking trips high into the Colorado mountains and led day hikes for family and friends.

At his funeral, Paul's admonition to the Colossian Christians was read: "clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, patience, and above all, clothe yourselves with love which binds everything together in perfect harmony." It was noted that Homer did not merely "clothe" himself in those virtues, as one might "put on" a cloak. Rather, for Homer, those virtues "went all the way through". Through his life, his ministry, his love, his laughter, and his music, this modest, eloquent, compassionate man exuded the love of Christ in this world.

Homer is survived by his wife, Genny, daughter, Margie Kluck, and grand daughter, Hannah Covington.

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## Rue Joyce Harris Yant May 14, 1927-October 26, 2009

She had also found her place, space, and pace as the preacher's wife. She was loving, outgoing, and supportive of his ministry. After 13 years at Iredell and Cranfills Gap, Dale was moved to Evant. Tragically, Dale died there in 1983, but God's love was in action. The Iredell Church was without a pastor at the time, so they asked if she would bring a devotional for their worship service for just a few Sundays. Joyce brought an atmosphere on peace and thought to the services. She was a believer in getting people involved in their church. It was then that she was encouraged to get her license to preach and became a local pastor. The few Sundays became several years. The charge that she had served as the preacher's wife, was now the charge she served as their preacher. Although only serving a single charge for her entire career, she was there for many years. With health issues, she retired from the active ministry, but went on to unofficially mentor several new pastors to the area. In the last two years of her life, she lived with her son Martin and his family and was surrounded by love, laughter, and life. 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# XI. Standing Rules

## I. ANNUAL CONFERENCE

#### Conference Procedure

- 1.0 The Central Texas Conference shall be organized according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶¶ 33, 34) and shall meet annually at the time appointed by the Bishop (2008 ¶ 603.2) and the place chosen by the Conference (2008 ¶603.3).
- 1.1 Adjourned or special sessions shall be called in the manner set forth in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶603.5). The business of the Annual Conference shall be conducted according to the current edition of Roberts Rules of Order. There shall be a Preliminary Report that shall include all matters for consideration by a session of Annual Conference received in accordance with the Conference Calendar. The Preliminary Report shall be mailed to the members of the Annual Conference at least one month prior to the session of the Annual Conference.
- 1.3 Lay members and alternate lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected at the Charge Conference for a one-year term to begin on January 1, following their election, subject however, to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶602.4).
- 1.3.1 To equalize the number of lay and clergy members of the Annual Conference, the following will be members by virtue of the offices held: each District Lay Leader, each District United Methodist Women's President, each District United Methodist Men's President, each District Student Leadership Team President or designee and one additional youth officer appointed by the District Student Leadership Team, any chair of any Annual Conference board, council, commission or committee, the Directors of the Stewardship, Finance and Administration and Commission on Church Growth and Development (CG&D), and the Director and associate Directors of the Annual Conference Mission Ministries who is a lay not otherwise a member, the Conference archivist/historian who is not otherwise a member, and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, General Council on Ministries and General Church board and agency representatives not otherwise members of the Annual Conference; and one additional lay member from the charges of the Conference whose membership is above the number, set annually by the Conference secretary required to equalize the ratio between clergy and lay members. This figure will be revised annually. The Conference secretary will notify each District Superintendent by September 1 as to the churches that will elect additional members preceding the next Annual Conference. Each charge of the Annual Conference is responsible for defraying expenses of its lay and clergy members while in attendance at the Conference. All resolutions and petitions for consideration of Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Conference Secretary by 30 days prior to the deadline set for inclusion in the Preliminary Report prior to regular session of Annual Conference. These resolutions and petitions shall then be sent by the Conference Secretary to the appropriate standing body. The appropriate standing body shall then report a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions to the Annual Conference.

- 1.4.1 All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference in session which pertain to the work of one of its standing bodies, and which were not received and duly processed so as to be printed in the Preliminary Report, shall be referred to the Conference Secretary and then to a Legislative Committee of the corresponding standing body consisting of its members present at the Conference, chaired by its chair or designee, and shall be reported back to the Conference with recommendation for concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions prior to the close of the Conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.
- 1.4.2 All other papers, resolutions or reports presented to Annual Conference which may not pertain directly to the work of one of its standing bodies must also be referred to the Conference Secretary and then to a study committee nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference and shall be reported back to the Conference with recommendation for concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions prior to the close of the Conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.
- 1.5 All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports coming to the Conference, not included in the preliminary report, must be typewritten in triplicate and two copies of said report must be in the hands of the secretary before they are presented to the Conference. Any reports requiring approval of the Annual Conference, not in the preliminary report, shall be reproduced for members of the

- Conference by the proponent so that all may follow the report as it is being presented.
- 1.6 Per diem allowance for each day in actual attendance at Annual Conference will be granted, according to their status when they arrive at Annual Conference, to retired clergy, retired diaconal ministers, retired deaconesses, ministers' surviving spouses, pastors receiving a total compensation of, or less than the minimum compensation of the Conference, students appointed to attend school, and ministers on disability leave.
- 1.7 There shall be a Committee on Memoirs composed of the secretary of the Conference and the secretary of the Board of Pensions to insure suitable memoirs of the deceased clergy, widows or widowers of clergy. The clergy in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing it with the committee immediately after the funeral.
- 1.8 Any of the standing rules may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting at a session of Annual Conference, provided that any motion to amend the Conference standing rules must lie on the table at least one day before the Conference can vote to amend.
- 1.9 Vacancies on all Conference boards, councils, commissions, teams, and committees shall be filled by nominations and selected by the appropriate body. Those persons elected to fill vacancies shall serve the remainder of the tenure of the original member. A person who has been elected to fill an unexpired term of four years or less may be nominated to serve an additional four year term, provided the total tenure does not extend beyond eight consecutive years. However, when the chair of the committee is a district representative who has been transferred to another district and, in the opinion of the appropriate body, unusual circumstances require the continued services of such chair, the body shall have the right to retain that person in its membership for the remainder of that person's tenure. Such persons shall not be counted as district representatives.
- 1.9.1 Any member of the Conference boards, councils, commissions, teams, and committees who is absent without excuse from any two consecutive meetings of the board, council, commission, team, or committee shall thereby forfeit membership on the agency and their vacancy shall be filled in accordance with 1.9 above.
- 1.9.2 Vacancies, that require Annual Conference Committee on Nominations action to fill, which occur between the sessions of Annual Conference, may be selected by the related body, must be approved by the Conference Executive Ministry Team, and ratified by the Conference Committee on Nominations. All persons being nominated shall be contacted by the selecting body prior to nomination to determine their willingness to serve.
- 1.10 Members of General and Jurisdictional boards, councils, commissions, or committees within the Annual Conference shall be ex officio members of corresponding Conference agencies. Boards, councils, commissions, committees, tearns, and other groups formed by Annual Conference must organize within 21 days of the closing session of Annual Conference, and report their officers to the Office of Stewardship, Finance and Administration by July 1 of that year. Mailing lists maintained by Conference and District offices shall be used only for purposes of mailings relating to Conference business.

## II. CONFERENCE ORGANIZATION

#### **Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team**

- 1.0 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team will be a coordinating body that will provide "clear checks and balances regarding program functions and financial/administration functions within the Annual Conference" (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶ 610.1). It shall assist the Annual Conference in "structuring its ministries and administrative procedures in order to accomplish its purpose. In so doing it shall provide for the connectional relationship of the local church, district, and Conference with the general agencies.
- 1.1 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team shall provide for planning and research in the continuing ministry of The United Methodist Church within the Conference; serve as the clearing house for all planning and research projects under the sponsorship of the Annual Conference and its agencies; relate to and cooperate with the planning research projects of the General Council on Ministries.
- 1.2 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team will monitor to ensure inclusiveness racial, gender, age, and people with disabilities in the Annual Conference" (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶610). It will meet at least twice annually once in the Fall and once in the Spring. It may meet

additionally as needed.

- 1.3 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team will be comprised of the three officers of the Administrative Leadership Team, the three officers of the Mission Leadership Team, three at-large members selected for balance and expertise all of whom will be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference quadrennially, or as needed annually for vacancies. The residing Bishop shall chair the Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team. A vice-chair and secretary shall be elected from the team at the first meeting of the new quadrennium. Additional voting members of the team will include two District Superintendents (selected by the Cabinet), the Conference Lay Leader, the Chair of the Commission on Inclusiveness and the three Conference Executive Directors. This Executive Ministry Team will give overall supervision to the Annual Conference boards, councils, commissions, teams, and committees, utilizing the Administrative Leadership Team and the Mission Leadership Team for further coordination and supervision.
- 1.4 The Annual Conference Executive Ministry Team reports directly to the Annual Conference. It may do that directly or through one or more of the representative bodies in the organizational structure.

## Conference Administrative Leadership Team

- 2.0 The Conference Administrative Leadership Team shall function as a resource and support for the Annual Conference boards, councils, commissions and committees.
- 2.1 The Administrative Leadership Team shall meet one time each year in the spring (determined by the leadership team itself).
- 2.2 The membership shall be composed of the chairs/presidents of each of the boards, commissions and committees excluding the Committee on Investigation, Administrative Review Committee, Joint Committee on Incapacity, Minutes, the Agenda Committee, and the Commission on Communications. The chair, vice chair and secretary will be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. The Bishop, one Cabinet representative and three Conference Directors shall serve as ex officio members.

#### Committee on the Agenda

- 3.0 There shall be a Committee on the Agenda to prepare the agenda for the Annual Conference and submit it to the Conference for adoption.
- 3.1 The membership shall be composed of the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the Conference Lay Leader, the president of the Conference United Methodist Women, the President of the Conference United Methodist Men, Conference Parliamentarian, the Conference Director of Communications, the President and one other youth representative from the Conference Student Leadership Team, the chairs of the Conference boards, the chair of the Conference Mission Leadership Team, host pastor, local arrangements chair, and worship chair. The Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Conference Director of Church Growth & Development and the Conference Director/secretary of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall serve without vote.
- 3.2 The Committee shall nominate and elect its own officers quadrennially.
- 3.3 The executive Committee shall include the chair, vice-chair, secretary, Bishop, Lay Leader, host District Superintendent, host pastor, local arrangements chair, worship chair, and the Directors of Mission Ministries and SFA without vote.
- 3.4 The Committee shall present to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, prior to the Conference session, a detailed estimate of the expenses of the Conference, including per diem allowance.

#### Commission on Archives and History

4.0 There shall be a Commission on Archives and History, consisting of one lay and one clergy elected by each District Conference. Six at-large members shall be added by nomination of the retiring chair of the commission and elected by the Annual Conference. No member shall be eligible to serve for more than two consecutive terms. The commission shall have a chair, a vice-chair, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected as outlined in Section II, ¶ 16.2a and 16.7 for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium. The commission shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641) and other responsibilities as delegated to it by the Annual Conference.

- The Conference Committee on Nominations may nominate a Conference archivist/historian to be elected by the Annual Conference, as permitted in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶641). The Annual Conference archivist/historian shall serve with non-expiring term of office and shall be a voting member of the Conference Commission on Archives and History.
- 4.2 The Commission on Archives and History will retain the comerstones of all Central Texas abandoned churches and the United Methodist Historical Marker Plague (if the church received one) of all Central Texas abandoned churches.

## Commission on Church Growth and Development

- 5.0 There shall be a Commission on Church Growth and Development to carry out the functions set forth on pages 147-150 of the 1980 Journal of the Central Texas Conference as amended.
- The membership of the commission shall consist of elected members: one clergy from each District and one lay from each District nominated by the District Committee on Nominations and elected by the District Conference for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium and eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years; two persons of ethnic background, two women if not already represented, two at large lay and two at large clergy nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium and eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years; ex officio members: the Bishop; the District Superintendents; the chair of the Central Texas Conference Foundation, without vote; the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration; the Director of the Conference Mission Ministries; the Conference Lay Leader; the President of the Conference United Methodist Men; the President of the Conference United Methodist Women; the chair of the Conference Outreach Council; the chair of the Conference Board of Trustees; the executive Director of the commission, without vote; the Missionary for Hispanic Ministries, without vote; and the Director of the Texas Methodist Foundation, without vote. Additional lay members: if needed, shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference to ensure inclusion of persons with expertise in the areas of finance, architecture, real estate, building construction, law, and ethnic minority congregational development.
- 5.2 The commission shall elect from its members the following officers: chair, vice-chair, and secretary.
- 5.3 There shall be at least two standing committees: the Committee on Church Extension; the Committee on Finance, with other committees named by the chair as needed.

## Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns

- There shall be a Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns which shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶642).
- 6.1 Each quadrennium, members shall be elected for a four-year term. Members are eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years. The officers (3) chair, vice chair and secretary and any additional members will be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations.

## Committee on Counseling

- There shall be a Committee on Counseling elected by the Annual Conference for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium.
- The committee shall be composed of five members. Two shall be nominated by the Board of Ordained Ministry and three shall be nominated by the Bishop.
- 7.2 The purpose of the Committee on Counseling will be to monitor the counseling program on a regular basis and make an annual evaluation of the performance of the counselors, and secure counselors
- The chair of the committee, who shall be nominated and elected by the committee, will be charged with the responsibility of carrying out the administrative responsibilities of the committee.

## Committee on the Episcopacy

8.0 There shall be a Conference Committee on the Episcopacy that shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶637).

#### **Episcopal Residence Committee**

9.0 There shall be a Conference Episcopal Residence Committee that shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶638).

## Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits

- 10.0 There shall be a Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits which shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶625).
- 10.1 The commission shall be composed of 14 members, seven lay and seven clergy persons, all of whom shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. In addition, one District Superintendent named by the Cabinet shall be a member.
- 10.2 The body shall be divided into two classes. Members shall be elected for a four-year term and may succeed themselves one time
- 10.3 Officers shall be nominated and elected by the members of the commission for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium.
- 10.4 The commission shall provide for a regular review of the standards for clergy vacation, days off, housing, moving expenses, continuing education and such additional benefits as appropriate or as the Annual Conference may direct.
- 10.5 The commission shall devise and implement a process for the standards to be presented to the local church at least annually through the charge Conference and as many other opportunities as appropriate but not limited to District Staff Parish Relations training events, SPR consultations and the Start-Up Seminar.

## Council on Finance and Administration

- 11.0 There shall be a Conference Council on Finance and Administration which shall be composed of seven clergy and eight lay, with at least one lay from each District. The following shall be ex officio members of the council: the Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration, without vote; any members of the General or Jurisdictional Council on Finance and Administration who reside within the bounds of the Conference, with vote, unless voting membership is in conflict with another provision of the Book of Discipline, in which case membership shall be without vote; in either case, they shall not be eligible to serve on any agency receiving funds; the presiding Bishop, without vote; a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet, without vote; the Conference Director or another representative of the Conference Mission Ministries, without vote; the Director of Church Growth and Development, without vote; and the Conference Lay Leader, without vote. The council shall have a president, a vice-president and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the members of the council. The council shall have the responsibilities and duties assigned to it by the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶¶611-619) and such other responsibilities as may be delegated to it by the Annual Conference.
- 11.1 Members shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years to coincide with the quadrennium and are eligible for re-election for one additional four-year term. The Committee on Nominations is encouraged to assure that, insofar as possible, the membership will have a balance of men/women and racial/ethnic makeup. The members shall be divided into two classes of four years each., Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term of office and shall be eligible for one additional quadrennium

## Commission on Inclusiveness

- 12.0 There shall be a Commission on Inclusiveness following the general guidelines of the 2004 General Conference mandates.
- 12.1 The Commission on Inclusiveness will replace and will address all areas and requirements of the Commission on Religion and Race, Native American Ministries and the Commission on the Status and Role of Women as stated in 2008 Discipline ¶¶643, 644 and 654. The membership shall consist of the Bishop and the Director of Mission Ministries, without vote; the three officers (chair must be a women ¶644.3 2008 Discipline, vice-chair and secretary) nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference; Conference Lay Leader, President of the UMM, UMW and Conference Student Leadership Team; 3 minority clergy (2 female and one male); 4 minority lay (2 female and 2 male); 5 at-large (3 female and 2 male) to

- ensure racial/ethnic balance; and one young adult all nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. All General and/or Jurisdictional members that relate to GR&R and GCOSROW and one Mission Ministries Associate Director.
- 12.2 Members shall be elected for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium, and may succeed themselves one time for a total of 8 consecutive years. All members should be selected for their interest, expertise, and with concern for ethnic and age balance in representation. The Commission will select a representative to serve on the Nurture Mission Council and a representative recommended annually, to serve on the Conference Committee on Nominations. The chair of the Commission will be a member of the Mission Leadership Team.

## Committee on Investigation

- 13.0 There shall be a Committee on Investigation for Ordained Clergy in accordance with the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶2703.2).
- 13.1 There shall be a Committee on Investigation for Diaconal Ministers in accordance with the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶2703.3).

#### **Board of Laity**

- 14.0 The Board of Laity shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶631.3) and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Board of Discipleship and shall report directly to the Annual Conference.
- 14.1 The Conference Lay Leader, serving as chair of the Conference Board of Laity, shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference for a period not to exceed four years and to coincide with the guadrennium
- 14.2 An associate Conference Lay Leader serving in roles coordinated by the Conference Lay Leader and the Bishop, shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations for a period of four years to coincide with the quadrennium.

#### Committee on Minutes

15.0 There shall be a Committee on Minutes to read, record and approve the proceedings of the Annual Conference after the final session. The members shall be two clergy and two lay who shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected annually by the Annual Conference. A chair to be appointed by the Bishop will serve the full quadrennium.

## **Annual Conference Committee on Nominations**

- 16.0 There shall be an Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. It shall be the purpose of the committee to seek out and enlist the services of the best qualified persons available within the Annual Conference to fill various positions for which it is to make nominations.
- 16.1 The membership shall be the Bishop, who shall be the chair, the District Superintendents, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference Presidents of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and the Conference Student Leadership Team, the District Lay Leaders, one other youth representative recommended annually by the Conference Student Leadership Team, a representatives recommended annually by the Commission on Inclusiveness, and three clergy atlarge elected annually upon nomination by the Conference Committee on Nominations; chair of the Administrative Leadership Team; and chair of the Mission Leadership Team.
- 16.1.1 The Annual Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Director of Church Growth and Development, and the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be members of the Conference Committee on Nominations without vote. The Director of Mission Ministries shall serve as vice-chair and secretary.
  - 16.2 The Conference Committee on Nominations procedure for officers of boards, councils or agencies of the Conference as required by the Discipline and/or Standing rules shall be:
  - The respective boards and agencies shall nominate their own officers and present the names to the Committee on Nominations prior to February 10 of the year in which they shall be elected; except for the chair as outlined in Section II. 16.7.
  - The Committee on Nominations shall review the nominations for diversity and inclusiveness;
  - The Committee on Nominations may return the nominations to the boards and agencies with possible recommendations for further review and resubmission;

- d. The Committee on Nominations shall have ultimate authority to submit nominations to the Annual Conference in order to achieve appropriate age, ethnic, gender, District and expertise representation.
- e. When the nominations are complete, the Committee on Nominations shall present the names of the officers of the respective boards and agencies to the Annual Conference for election.
- 16.3 The Committee on Nominations shall make nominations to the Annual Conference as may be necessary for the following positions: Conference Lay Leader, associate Conference Lay Leader, the Chairs, Vice Chairs and Secretaries for the Conference Administrative Leadership Team, Nurture Mission Council, Outreach Mission Council, Witness Mission Council, Conference Mission Leadership Team, the Commission on Inclusiveness, the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Conference Student Leadership Coordinator; membership on Council on Finance and Administration, Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits, Pensions, Trustees, Minutes, and Rules; additional membership as required for Commission on Communication and Interpretation, Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Commission on Church Growth and Development, Commission on Inclusiveness, Nominations and Personnel. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate such other persons as may be required by the Annual, Jurisdictional or General Conference and related ecumenical bodies. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate a representative from a major urban agency to serve on the Outreach Mission Council. No person shall serve as an elected member of more than one of the Annual Conference Standing bodies at one time, unless necessary for age, ethnic, gender, District or expertise representation.
- 16.4 The nomination procedure shall be as follows:
- a. Prior to February 1<sup>st</sup> of each year, the Conference office shall make available to each District Superintendent a listing of all positions for which District nominations are solicited for consideration by the Conference Committee on Nominations to appear on the slate that will be presented at the ensuing Annual Conference session;
- b. Prior to February 10<sup>th</sup>, the District Superintendents of the respective Districts shall distribute to the local church Lay Leaders and to the pastors of the respective Districts the listing of all positions for which District nominations are being solicited from the local churches for positions to be elected at the ensuing Annual Conference session. Talent Bank Forms will be provided for completion on candidates whose names are submitted. Emphasis shall be on developing a pool of qualified nominees noting their areas of interest rather than being nominated for a specific position;
- c. Prior to February 10<sup>th</sup>, the Conference Commission on Inclusiveness shall develop a list of Ethnic candidates that shall include names, addresses, telephone numbers, local church membership and biographical information including talents, interests, and church leadership experience. This list shall be provided to the District Nominating Committees prior to their annual spring meeting;
- d. Prior to February 10<sup>th</sup>, the Executive Committee of each Annual Conference Standing body may develop a list of candidates with special interest and capability who may serve as members of that Standing Body. The list shall include names, addresses, telephone numbers, local church membership and biographical information including talents, interests, and church leadership experience indicated on Talent Bank forms. These forms shall be provided to the District Committee on Nominations prior to the annual spring meeting;
- e. Prior to February 10<sup>th</sup>, Annual Conference Staff serving as liaison to Annual Conference Standing Bodies may develop a list of candidates with special interest and capability who may serve as members of that Standing Body. The list shall include names, addresses, telephone numbers, local church membership and biographical information including talents, interest, and church leadership experience indicated on Talent Bank forms. These forms shall be provided to the District Committee on Nominations prior to the annual spring meeting;
- f. Prior to March 15<sup>th</sup>, the District Committee on Nominations will meet for the purpose of preparing District nominations for all positions in question, taking into consideration the names submitted by local churches. The District Committee, however, shall make nominations of only persons it feels are adequately equipped for the task and may elect to not make nominations in those cases where it feels minimum qualifications for the positions in question are not present. All persons being considered for a position in the Annual Conference shall be contacted by the District Committee on Nominations before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibilities of the position and whether or not they are willing to serve, if nominated and elected. Emphasis shall be on

- developing a pool of qualified nominees noting their areas of interest rather than being nominated for a specific position. The District Committee is encouraged to act as a recruiting agency to seek out qualified nominees who may not put their own names forward:
- Prior to April 1, the District Committee on Nominations shall submit to the Conference Mission Ministries office the list of its nominations with completed Talent Bank forms. All District nominations shall be compiled and circulated to the members of the Conference Committee on Nominations at least ten days prior to its initial session;
- Prior to May 10<sup>th</sup>, the Conference Committee on Nominations shall meet for the purpose of preparing a list of nominees for all positions which must be filled by the next Annual Conference. The Conference Committee will seek to match names from the pool submitted to the available positions in order to put the best qualified persons in those positions, taking into account the need for ethnic, gender, age, and geographical balance. No person is eligible for re-election to the same office and shall not be counted as District representatives.
- All persons being considered for a position in the Annual Conference shall be contacted in writing by the Conference Committee on Nominations before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibility of the position and whether or not they are willing to serve, if elected.
- 16.4.1 Prior to April 1, all agencies and institutions related to the Annual Conference shall submit to the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations their nominations of persons to be elected by the Central Texas Conference to serve on their boards of Directors or trustees.
  - 16.5 It is recommended that insofar as possible, the membership on leadership teams, councils, boards, and agencies of the Annual Conference shall be representative of the Conference's Districts-except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.
  - 16.6 All Annual Conference Standing Bodies shall have the right to add up to four additional persons to their membership in addition to other Conference guidelines, in order to ensure age, gender, ethnic, District and expertise representation.
  - 16.7 The chair of Commission on Communications and the Commission on Archives and History will be elected at the Annual Conference preceding the next General Conference unless prohibited by the Discipline. If not already serving on the body, they will serve as ex-officio members of their respective standing body for one year prior to their taking office in the new quadrennium. All other members of the [standing bodies] will be elected and begin membership at the first Annual Conference following the General Conference
  - 16.8 All nominations shall be for a quadrennium that corresponds with General Conference except if this is in violation of the Discipline or with special Annual Conference approval.

#### **Board of Ordained Ministry**

- 17.0 The Board of Ordained Ministry shall be elected, organized, and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶635).
- 17.1 Members shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference for a term of four years to coincide with the quadrennium and are eligible for re-election for two additional four-year terms. The members shall be divided into three classes of four years each. Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term of office and shall be eligible for two additional quadrenniums.

## **Board of Pensions**

- 18.0 The Board of Pensions shall be elected, organized and function according to the Book of Discipline. (2008 ¶639) A Cabinet representative shall be selected by the Cabinet as an additional member.
- 18.1 The elected body shall be divided into two classes. Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term, and shall be eligible for election for one additional four-year term.

#### **Personnel Committee**

19.0 There shall be a Central Texas Conference Personnel Committee whose membership will be composed of the following: Bishop, the Annual Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Director of Church Growth and Development, the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration, without vote and twelve additional persons, equal lay and clergy, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. Members shall be elected for a four-year term to coincide with the quadrennium and eligible to serve two (2) four-year terms for a total of eight years.

Membership shall be divided into two rotating classes. Officers shall be nominated and elected by the members of the Personnel Committee for a four year period to coincide with the quadrennium. The chair position shall alternate quadrennially between lay and clergy. The Committee on Nominations will take care to ensure gender, race and age representation.

- 19.1 The committee shall organize itself in a manner which it deems necessary to fulfill its mandate as the Personnel Committee of the Conference Mission Ministries, the Council on Finance and Administration, the Commission on Church Growth and Development, the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Commission on Archives and History, the Director of Glen Lake Camp & Retreat Center and the Board of Pensions avoiding conflict with the Book of Discipline.
- 19.2 The committee shall receive personnel recommendations from Mission Ministries, the Council on Finance and Administration, the Commission on Church Growth and Development, the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Commission on Archives and History, and the Board of Pensions. The work of the committee will in no way interfere with the prerogative of Disciplinary mandates concerning the nominations of the Director of the Mission Ministries or the Conference Treasurer nor with existing Conference Standing Rules.
- 19.3 The committee shall recommend to the Annual Conference the structure and personnel in the Conference which is necessary to fulfill the stated mission of the Annual Conference. (Refer to Standing Rule: IV., 1.2).
- 19.4 The committee shall have oversight of an annual review and evaluation process for all Annual Conference staff members in whatever manner it deems necessary to assure the integrity of the staff as a whole and as individuals.
- 19.5 The committee shall recommend to the appropriate entities proposals for salary, travel expense, health & life insurance, pension, housing (where applicable), and other practical matters affecting the work, health, and families of the Conference staff.
- 19.6 The committee shall maintain a personnel policy handbook for the purpose of addressing issues such as vacation time, leave of absence, sick leave, pregnancy leave (for male and female) and other matters germane to the employment of personnel.
- 19.7 The committee shall be responsible for maintaining current job descriptions for all members of the Conference staff. These will be kept in a secure place in the Conference office. (Refer to 2008 Discipline ¶ 608 for ACCOM (Mission Ministries) Director; ¶ 619 for Conference Treasurer; ¶ 603.7 for Conference Secretary; Standing Rules Page 288 of 1992 Journal CG&D and Page 290 III 1.0 through 1.2)
- 19.8 The committee shall have responsibility to conduct grievance hearings for issues which in-house management has been unable to resolve and to conduct exit interviews for staff members who are leaving for any reason.
- 19.9 The committee shall be responsible for creating and maintaining uniform hiring and exiting procedures to be used by Conference Directors.

## Committee on Rules, Policies and Guidelines

- 20.0 There shall be a Conference Committee on Rules, Policies and Guidelines to develop, define, and interpret the standing rules, policies and guidelines of the Annual Conference. The committee shall be responsible for producing and keeping current a manual of the standing rules, policies and guidelines of the Annual Conference.
- 20.1 It is recommended that the membership consist of three laymen, three laywomen, and three clergy, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. The elected body shall be divided into two classes. Each quadrennium, new members shall be elected for a four-year term, but may be reelected for one subsequent four-year term. Additional members, without vote, shall be a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet and the secretary of the Conference.
- 20.2 There shall be a chair, a vice-chair, and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the membership of the Rules Committee. The cabinet representative shall convene the committee for the purpose of electing its officers.

## **Board of Trustees**

- 21.0 There shall be a Conference Board of Trustees with duties and responsibilities as outlined in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶2512).
- 21.1 The membership shall consist of twelve persons of legal age. Four shall be clergy in the effective

relation in the Conference and eight shall be lay in good standing within local churches within the bounds of the Central Texas Conference and a District Superintendent chosen by the Cabinet as an observer.

## **United Methodist Men**

22.0 The United Methodist Men shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Nurture Council and shall report directly to the Annual Conference (2008 ¶648).

## **United Methodist Women**

23.0 The United Methodist Women shall be organized, function, and elect officers according to the Book of Discipline and by-laws adopted by the organization. It shall be related to but not amenable to the Outreach Council and shall report directly to the Annual Conference (2008 ¶647).

## Student Leadership Team

24.0 The Conference Student Leadership Team shall be organized and function according to the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶649) and the by-laws of the Conference Student Leadership Team as printed in the 2004 Conference Journal (CCYM report).

#### Safe Sanctuary Policy Interpreters

25.0The Safe Sanctuary Policy Interpreters for Central Texas Conference will be comprised of three persons initially appointed by the Bishop and Extended Cabinet serving from 2007-2012. Thereafter, they shall be nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference quadrennially. A chairperson shall be elected from the three at the first meeting of the new quadrennium. Persons may succeed themselves one time for a total of 8 consecutive years. When vacancies occur, the Executive Ministry Leadership Team will appoint a person to fill the term between conference years. The interpreter's work is clarification, interpretation, education, as well as hearing concerns and making recommendations for future alternations to our CTC Safe Sanctuary policy. Their rulings are the definitive answer concerning conference events.

#### III. ANNUAL CONFERENCE MISSION MINISTRIES

#### Conference Mission Leadership Team

There shall be a Conference Mission Leadership Team (formerly called ACCOM) as recommended and detailed by the 2008 Book of Discipline ¶608.

- 1.1 The purpose of the Mission Leadership Team hereafter referred to as MLT is to focus and guide the mission and ministry of the United Methodist Church within the Central Texas Conference by: 1. envisioning the ministries necessary to live out the mission of the church in and through the Annual Conference; 2. creating and nurturing relationships and connections among the local, District, Annual Conference, and general church ministries; 3. providing encouragement, coordination and support for the ministries of nurture, outreach and witness in Districts and congregations for the transformation of the world; 4. ensuring the alignment of the total resources of the Annual Conference to its mission; 5. developing and strengthening ethnic ministries, including ethnic local church concerns; providing for advocacy and monitoring functions to ensure that the church is consistent with its stated values.
- 1.2 The Conference MLT shall be composed of the presiding Bishop, without vote; the officers of the MLT nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations; one District Superintendent, selected by the Cabinet; Conference Lay Leader, without vote; President of the UMM; President of the UMW; Directors of Mission Ministries, SFA and Church Growth & Development without vote; associate Directors of Mission Ministries, without a vote; the President of the Conference Student Leadership Team; the Conference Student Leadership Coordinator, the chairs of the Councils on Nurture, Outreach and Witness (3); the chair of the Commission on Inclusiveness; the chair of the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concems; the chair of each District Leadership Team or District representative; members of the General Council on Ministries and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries; General Church board and agency representatives not otherwise members

of Conference Mission Leadership Team; and four members at-large, who shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference, as needed to provide sensitivity to inclusion of appropriate age, gender, ethnic, and expertise representation and to ensure equal lay and clergy membership. At-large members shall serve for all or part of one quadrennium and may succeed themselves one time.

- 1.3 The officers of the MLT shall be a chair, a vice-chair and a secretary nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. If the chair is a lay, the vice-chair shall be dergy and vice versa.
- 1.4 The Annual Conference MLT shall (a) receive reports and recommendations from the Conference councils and agencies of the Conference MLT; (b) serve as the budget committee for the Conference Mission Ministries; and (3) propose the agenda for the meetings of the MLT.
- 1.5 The MLT shall: (a) review program and funding criteria and goals for every Conference Mission Ministry program council and agency; (b) recommend programs to the Annual Conference; (c) forward all requests to CF&A for funding and; (d) have responsibility for setting and implementing goals.

#### **Program Councils:**

- 2.0 There shall be three Conference program councils within the Annual Conference Mission Ministries: the Nurture Mission Council which carries out the mandates of the Board of Discipleship and the Commission on Ethnic Local Church Concerns, Outreach Mission Council which carries out the mandates of the Board Church and Society and the Board of Global Ministries and Witness Mission Council which carries out the mandates of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the Committee on Evangelism.
- 3.0 These councils shall be composed of the officers and District representatives and other such persons as may be mandated by the *Discipline*. It is recommended that there be one layman, one lay woman, one clergy, and one youth representative from District representation; and four-six members at-large on each council to be nominated by the Conference Mission Leadership Team as it may be determined necessary by the Conference Mission Leadership Team to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation. The District representatives and at-large members shall be eligible for re-election for an additional four-year term on all programs of the council.
- 3.1 The Conference Director of Mission Ministries and associate Directors shall be members of an assigned Mission Council without vote.
- 3.2 Each council shall have a chair, a vice-chair and a secretary who shall be nominated and elected by the Conference Committee on Nominations for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium. If the chair is a lay, the vice-chair shall be clergy and vice versa. The chair position of the councils shall alternate quadrennially between lay and clergy.
- 3.3 The Conference Mission Councils will provide consultative service and resources to the local churches, the District mission councils, the Annual Conference, and the Annual Conference Mission Leadership Team. Each council will be responsible for the essential function of the area of concern assigned to it by the Annual Conference and will be related to the objectives and scope of that work.
- 3.4 Each Council will have an executive body composed of the officers and at least two additional members elected by the Council from its District representatives.
- 3.5 Each Council will meet quarterly or as needed.
- 3.6 Each Council will develop Task Forces as needed to address specific needs and functions.
- 4.0 The Conference Nurture Mission Council will have 9 District representatives selected from a District pool by the MLT and may have four at large if it is determined necessary by the MLT to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation, and additional members may be the Coordinator for Spiritual Growth of the Conference United Methodist Women, the President of the Student Leadership Team, the Resource Center Director and the chair of the Board of Directors of Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center. There will be a representative selected from the Commission on Inclusiveness, and a representative selected from the Emmaus Board of Directors. The Director of Glen Lake Camp shall be a member of the council without vote.
- 4.0.a. The Nurture Mission Council will be responsible at the Conference level for the objectives and scope of work set forth for all the functions of the General Board of Discipleship (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶630). The council shall relate to all Conference agencies for the implementation of the

- Conference's comprehensive plan for Ethnic Local Church Concerns (1990 journal, pages 201-205).

  The Conference Outreach Mission Council will have 10 District representatives selected from a District pool by the MLT and may have six at large if it is determined necessary by the MLT to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation, and additional members may be the Mission Coordinator of Social Action of the Conference United Methodist Women, the Mission Coordinator of Christian Education and Interpretation of the Conference United Methodist Women, the Director of Humanitarian Services, the Director of CTCYM and a representative from the CTCYM Advisory Board, the Conference secretary of Global Ministries, and a representative from a major urban agency recommended by the Conference Committee on Nominations.
- 4.1.a. The Outreach Mission Council will be responsible at the Conference level for the objectives and scope of work set forth for all the functions of the General Board of Global Ministries (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶633) including Small Membership Church (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶645), Disability Concerns (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶653), Mission Personnel (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶1313.6) and the General Board of Church and Society (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶629).
- 4.2 The Conference Witness Mission Council will have 9 District representatives selected from a District pool by the MLT and may have four at large if it is determined necessary by the MLT to achieve age, gender, ethnic and expertise representation, and additional members may be the Mission Coordinator of Membership, Nurture and Outreach of the Conference United Methodist Women, Conference Director of Lay Speaking, Conference Chair of Communications, and one Central Texas Conference campus minister chosen by peers.
- 4.2.a. The Witness Mission Council will be responsible at the Conference level for the objectives and scope of work set forth for all the functions of the General Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (2008 Book of Discipline, ¶634).

#### **Commission on Communications**

- 5.0 The Commission on Communications shall (a) recommend policies that will enable the Conference, the District, and the local churches, and their agencies to make use of all communications help; (b) make available to the Conference specialized communications resources, especially in the fields of broadcasting and audiovisuals; (c) promote principles of good communication within the Conference to provide two-way channels of communications between each Annual Conference agency, District Mission Leadership Team and local church, and to lead the Conference in making creative use of communications and opportunities offered by modern media, including Conference and General Church periodicals and resources; (d) provide communications training opportunities for leaders in the Annual Conference and local churches; (e) interpret the programs of the General Church and the Annual Conference to the local churches and promote all general and Conference benevolent causes in cooperation with United Methodist Communications.
- 5.1 Members shall be a chair, a vice-chair and a secretary, Student Leadership Team representative, and eight additional members at-large nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations. The Conference Director of Mission Ministries, the Conference Director of Communications, the Conference Director of Finance and Administration, the Director of Church Growth and Development, the Director of Information Technology, and a Cabinet representative shall be members without vote. Officers shall be nominated and elected as outlined in Section II, ¶16.2a and 16.7 for a four-year period to coincide with the quadrennium.

## Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center Board of Directors

- 6.0 The members shall include fifteen (15) clergy and laity in three rotating classes. Utilizing ¶610.5 from The 2008 Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church as guidelines, each class shall be nominated by the Board of Directors; presented to the Conference Nominations Committee and voted upon by the Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church within whose bounds said premises are located. Additional ex-officio members with voice, but no vote would include: Executive Director of Glen Lake Camp & Retreat Center, Director of Mission Ministries, the District Superintendent within whose bounds the camp is located, Associate Director of Mission Ministries, and the Chair of Nurture Council
- 6.1 Each year, at the first meeting after Annual Conference; the Board of Directors, by a majority vote

- of Directors entitled to vote, shall elect officers consisting of a chair, vice-chair, and secretary. The Executive Committee consisting of the officers, the Director of Mission Ministries, the District Superintendent within whose bounds the camp is located, and the Executive Director of Glen Lake, shall have and exercise, between meetings of the Board of Directors, the authority of the Board of Directors in the management of Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center.
- 6.2 All Board members will be asked to serve a three (3) year term starting immediately after the annual meeting of said Conference of the United Methodist Church. Two terms of service can be served consecutively, and then a year must be taken off before serving on the Board. If a Director is selected to fill a vacancy after the first year of an unexpired term, the Partial Term served by such Director shall not be considered when determining the limit on terms set forth above.

## IV. CONFERENCE ADMINISTRATION

## **Administrative Personnel of the Annual Conference**

- 1.0 There shall be three Conference executive staff positions: Director of the Conference Mission Ministries; Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration; and Director of the Commission on Church Growth and Development.
- 1.1 A clergy may not be appointed to serve as an executive staff member of the Annual Conference for more than eight years in any consecutive 12 years. No clergy shall serve as an executive staff member more than 12 years.
- 1.2 Any proposal to increase or change the structure of the Conference executive staff of the Annual Conference shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference. No appointment predicated on the creation of such new or changed staff position shall be made, tentatively or finally, until the same is approved by the Annual Conference.

## Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration

- 2.0 The Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be nominated by the Council on Finance and Administration, after consulting with the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Annual Conference.
- 2.1 The Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be under the supervision of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. The Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall serve as the stewardship advocate for the Annual Conference, Conference secretary, Conference treasurer, Conference pension officer and treasurer for the Board of Pensions, treasurer of the Commission on Equitable Compensation and manager of the Conference Center building.
- 2.2 The tenure of office for a clergy member of the Conference serving as the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be for a quadrennium. A newly elected Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall ordinarily assume official duties at the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference.
- 2.3 All bonds required by the law of The United Methodist Church or the Central Texas Conference shall be filed with the secretary of the Conference. The bond for the Conference Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall be approved by the Bishop and the Cabinet and filed in the Bishop's office.
- 2.4 The Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration shall nominate to the Annual Conference such staff as needed to conduct the daily proceedings of the Annual Conference.
- 2.5 The job description of the Director of Stewardship, Finance and Administration may be modified upon recommendation of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration and approval of the Annual Conference in regular or called session.

#### V. FINANCIAL

- 1.0 The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1st to December 31st, and salaries of clergy members, appointed as pastors or District Superintendents, shall be paid accordingly.
- 2.0 Apportionment payments, askings, special day offerings, advance specials, and other missional gifts remitted from a pastoral charge to the Conference treasurer shall be accompanied by the

current year remittance forms supplied by the Council on Finance and Administration. These forms shall indicate clearly the amounts to be credited to each cause and the total must match the amount remitted. The Conference Treasurer shall post on-line in a timely fashion remittances received. Monthly the Conference Treasurer shall report to the District Superintendents and the Bishop the status of funds remitted. The pastor shall enclose the annual statement of receipts as issued by the Conference Treasurer, corrected if necessary, with the church's Annual Conference Report as verification of items reported in Table II.

- 3.0 After careful consideration of all financial responsibilities of the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration, with three liaison representatives selected by the Annual Conference Mission Ministries, meeting with the Council on Finance and Administration in all budget discussions, shall recommend all allocations for the major categories in the total Conference financial program; clergy and diaconal support, Conference claimants fund, administration, World Service, Conference benevolences, and capital funding. The Annual Conference Mission Ministries, being charged by the Discipline to study and coordinate the budget request of the several Conference agencies as they relate to the Conference program, shall formulate and present an itemized Conference benevolence budget providing for the support of these agencies to the Council on Finance and Administration. If, for any reason, the Council on Finance and Administration decides that the total of the requests for the Conference benevolence budget needs to be changed, it shall adjust the allocation and refer it back to the Annual Conference Mission Ministries for adjustments of the itemized appropriations in the Conference benevolence budget.
- 3.1 If any Conference agency feels its cause has been neglected, jeopardized, or excluded, it shall have the opportunity to represent its cause before the Council on Finance and Administration as provided in the Book of Discipline (2008 ¶613).
- 3.2 The Council on Finance and Administration shall present the proposed budget, for the purpose of clarification and correction only, at the first business session of the Annual Conference each year. Changes in the proposed budget shall be reported by the committee, board, and/or council making the request at the time they report to the Annual Conference. Approval or disapproval of the financial request shall be voted as an amendment to the proposed budget at the final presentation of the budget by CFA at the last session of the Annual Conference.
- 3.3 Any proposal to create a new apportionment, or to change the purpose for an existing apportionment shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference.
- 3.4 Any proposed change of the decimal formula shall first be studied by the Council on Finance and Administration. CFA shall then report to the Annual Conference its recommendation. (In accordance with the 2008 Book of Discipline ¶615.)
- 4.0 All Budget items allocated to the Districts and local churches of the Conference shall be based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula: Determine the base arriount for each District or church by taking the total of the following items: (51A) Pension & Benefit Funds (CRSP), (53) Pastor's Base Compensation, (54) Associate(s) Base Compensation, (55) Utilities and Housing paid to/for Pastor and to/for Associate(s), (57) Travel paid to/for Pastor and to/for Associate(s) and Other Allowances paid to/for Pastor and to/for Associate(s), (58) Deacon(s) Compensation, (59) Diaconal Compensation, (60) Other Staff Compensation, (61) Current Program Expense, (62) Other Current Operating Expenses. Add the above ten (10) expenditures for each District to get the "District total expenditure". Divide each "District total expenditure" by the Conference total expenditure to get the District decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply each district decimal by each Conference Apportionment to get the District Apportionment. Add the above ten (10) expenditures for each local church to get their "local total expenditure". Divide each "local total expenditure" by the "District total expenditure" to arrive at the local church decimal. (Each decimal is rounded off to four places.) Multiply the local church decimal by each District Apportionment allocation to get the Local Church Apportionment. (Each Apportionment is rounded off to the nearest dollar, with each church being apportioned at least one dollar for each apportionment.)
- 5.0 It shall be the duty of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration to compute the decimal annually, using the latest statistics (corrected, if necessary) and furnish the table of apportionments to the Districts. The District Superintendent and the District stewards shall distribute the askings to the local church on the same basis.
- 6.0 Items to be distributed under the formula are the Episcopal Fund, District Superintendent Salaries &

Pension, Conference Claimants, Clergy Health Insurance, Equitable Compensation, Other Clergy Benefits, Property and Administration, World Service/Conference Benevolences, Interdenominational Cooperation, Ministerial Education, Black Colleges, Africa University, Mission Initiatives, Mount Sequoyah, Lydia Patterson Institute, SMU Campus Ministry, Texas Methodist College Association, Wesley Foundations, and Glen Lake Camp Improvements. Others may be added by the action of the Annual Conference.

- 7.0 The auditing firm appointed by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall audit all books of treasurers of boards whose auditing is not provided for in the Book of Discipline, and report the results to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, which council will send a statement of these audits to the Conference secretary for inclusion in the minutes.
- 8.0 Annually each board, commission, agency, or special interest, shall make requests to the Council on Finance and Administration through the Annual Conference Mission Ministries for any special day offering, except where set by the Book of Discipline. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause, or institution, nor shall such a day be listed on the printed Conference calendar, unless such agency, cause or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit, including current annual income and expense, together with its report to the appropriate board.
- 9.0 The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend the mileage reimbursement for necessary travel to Conference meetings for all members of boards, commissions, committees and council of the Conference and, upon recommendation of the Personnel Committee, also recommend mileage for Annual Conference staff.
- 10. The Conference treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions and other agencies of the Conference into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempt by CFA) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Conference treasurer will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

#### VI. DISTRICTS

#### **District Mission Leadership Team**

- 1.0 There shall be a District Mission Leadership Team in each District of the Annual Conference. It shall be a liaison to the local church and the Annual Conference in all matters of programming.
- 1.1 The purpose of the District Mission Leadership Team is to focus and guide the mission and ministry of the United Methodist Church within their District by: 1. envisioning the ministries necessary to live out the mission of the church; 2. creating and nurturing relationships and connections throughout the District ministries; 3. mirroring the structure of the Annual Conference Mission Ministries Nurture, Outreach and Witness Councils therefore providing encouragement, coordination and support for these ministries; 4. ensuring the alignment of the total resources of the District to its mission; 5. developing and strengthening ethnic ministries, including ethnic local church concems; providing for advocacy and monitoring functions to ensure that the church is consistent with its stated values.
- 1.2 The District Mission Leadership Team shall be composed of the District Superintendent, officers (chair, vice chair and secretary) and the District chairs of Nurture, Outreach and Witness Councils nominated by the District Committee on Nominations and elected by the District Conference, the District President of the United Methodist Women, the District President of the United Methodist Men, the President of the District Student Leadership Team, the District Lay Leader, one Conference staff, District Youth Coordinator, and GCOM, JCOM and General Church Representatives residing in the District, the members of the Annual Conference Mission Team, Nurture Mission Council, Outreach Mission Council, and Witness Mission Council residing in the District; and such other persons as the District Mission Leadership Team may determine. Interim vacancies may be filled by the District Mission Leadership Team in lieu of the District Conference.
- 1.3 The District Nurture, Outreach and Witness Councils shall be composed of officers: chair, nominated by the District Committee on Nominations and elected by the District Conference, vice chair and secretary elected by the Council. The members of each Council will be assigned by the District Mission Leadership Team from a pool consisting of one member from each local church in the District; however churches with less than 10 members may choose to be represented by one person

per charge. Membership on each Council will be selected from this pool. Four persons may be added to each council to ensure inclusiveness or expertise.

#### **District Conference**

- 2.0 There shall be a District Conference in each District of the Annual Conference which shall meet at least one full week prior to the beginning of the Annual Conference after notice is given to all local churches by the District Superintendent, who shall be the chair. The District Superintendent may call a District Conference during the Annual Conference session (2008 ¶657).
- 2.1 The purpose of the District Conference shall be: (a) to review without debate or vote the Preliminary Report and other items of business coming before the Annual Conference; (b) to elect District representatives to the Conference agencies (c) to elect members of the District Mission Leadership Team; (d) to elect two young adults, approximately eighteen to thirty years of age to serve as members of the Annual Conference; and (e) such other District business as may be determined permissible under the Book of Discipline.
- 2.2 The membership of the District Conference shall be the lay and clergy members from that District to the Annual Conference and the local pastors serving within the District, the District Lay Leader, the District President of the United Methodist Women, the District President of the United Methodist Men, the President of the District Student Leadership Team one additional youth appointed by the District Student Leadership Team, and all other members of the Annual Conference residing within the District.

#### **District Committee on Nominations**

- 3.0 There shall be a District Committee on Nominations in each District of the Annual Conference for the purpose of nominating to the District Conference the best qualified persons within the District for the various positions as required by the Annual Conference.
- 3.1 The membership shall be the District Superintendent, who shall be the chair, the District Lay Leader, the District President of United Methodist Women, the District President of United Methodist Men, the President of the District Student Leadership Team, and such other persons as determined by the District Mission Leadership Team.

#### VII. LOCAL CHURCHES

- 1.0 Each congregation shall annually give attention to the vacation policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the statement as printed in the 1993 Journal, pages 257-258.
- Each congregation shall annually give attention to the housing policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the statement printed in the 1993 Journal, pages 254-257.
- 1.2 Parsonage utilities should be in the name of the church, i.e., the deposit paid by the church. If the parsonage utilities are not paid by the church, the departing pastor must have arranged in advance of his/her departure to have the meters read on moving day, or on the day of departing the parsonage. The departing pastor is responsible for the bills up to that time.
- 1.3 In the event of death of a clergy or diaconal minister residing in a church owned residence, the family of the deceased clergy or diaconal minister will be allowed ninety days to find other housing and vacate the church owned residence, or such other time as deemed appropriate by the Cabinet and by the local church pastor-parish relations committee.
- 2.0 Salaries of clergy moving at Annual Conference shall be paid through May 31 by the former charge and from June 1 by the receiving charge.
- 2.1 No pastor is allowed to claim reimbursement for more than 5/12 of the Pastor's accountable reimbursement Plan between January and May without recommendation of the PPR/SPR Committee and approval by the Administrative Board.

## VIII. DISCONTINUED OR ABANDONED CHURCH PROPERTY

1.0 Any property abandoned in the past or that shall be abandoned in the future and the property disposed of as directed by the Book of Discipline in accordance with 2008 ¶ 2548, the proceeds derived there from, if any, shall be first applied to the retirement of pension deficits, and the satisfaction of any claims against ministerial pension annuities which may have arisen out of failure of

that church to make proportionate payment for support. The remaining proceeds are to be transferred to the Commission on Church Growth and Development.

- 1.1 In the event of a church closure or abandonment, the official and historical records of the closed or abandoned church will be transferred directly to the Archives Depository of the Central Texas Conference by the District Superintendent of the District in which the closed or abandoned church is located.
- 1.2 In the event of two or more churches merging, the official and historical records of the churches being merged shall be transferred to the Archives Depository of the Central Texas Conference by the District Superintendent of the District in which the churches are located. The records shall be transferred to the Archives Depository no later than three months following the merger.

The 2009 district finances are in good order. No discrepancies were found that would cause us to question their accuracy nor integrity.

Several changes in personnel were experienced by the District in 2009. Familiarity with the QuickBooks accounting software was demonstrated, the books accurately reflect the trail of transactions that occurred. The District Administrative Assistant retains a broad spectrum of roles; a new practice of bank reconciliations provided by an outside source is designed to reduce the associated vulnerability. I have been asked by Rankin Koch of the Temple District to perform a limited scope review of the financial records of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church for calendar year 2009.

During 2009, the Temple District Office received \$138,049.89 from all sources and expended \$132,366.71. The ending cash balance was \$68,659.77. This breaks down to budgeted district apportionment receipts of \$113,354.00 and non-budgeted receipts of \$24,695.89, and budgeted district expenditures of \$89,245.15 and non-budgeted expenditures of \$43,121.56.

I have examined the cash accounts of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church, as of December 31, 2009. This was a limited scope review and should not be considered to have been performed in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. It did, however, include such tests of cash receipts and disbursements as I considered necessary.

My scope does not provide you with a complete report of internal controls. It allows me, however, to provide you with a degree of comfort with the current accounting system and with the system of internal controls and procedures. In that regard, I believe that the cash accounts of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church are maintained in an acceptable manner and accurately reflect the transactions therein. In addition, I heartily support the conversion of the District Office accounting system to a completely computerized system.



- More than \$140,000 in grant funds to ministries in the Central Texas Conference;
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
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
