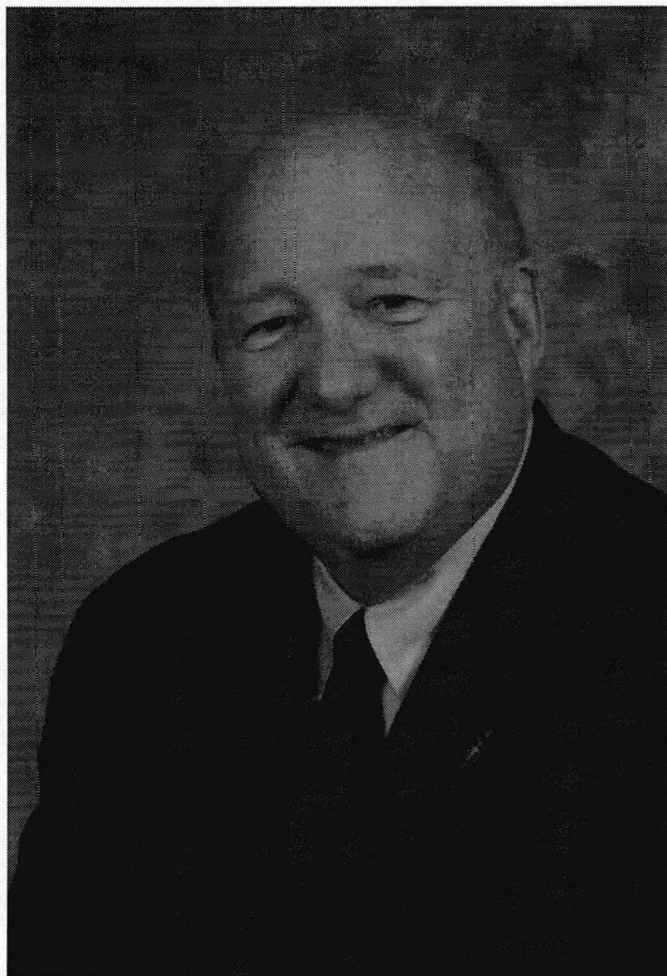

Opening Worship Service

The opening worship service of the called session of the Central Texas Conference was held at First United Methodist Church of Mansfield, Texas. Dr. Scott Ferrell led the singing of hymns. Special music was presented by the Praise Ensemble from First United Methodist Church, Mansfield.

Bishop Mike Lowry's scripture focus was Exodus 13:17 and following verses. He then offered a prayer. The Bishop compared the time in which we live as a time of change to that of the Israelites facing a time of change during the exodus from Egypt. He also referenced the struggles of the early church as shared by Paul in the Book of Thessalonians.

Dr. Bob Holloway reported that the Extended Cabinet had exceeded their "A Pound A Weigh" weight loss goal and had raised \$140,000 to date for "Imagine No Malaria."

The Offertory prayer was given by Dr. Luther Henry. An offering was taken for the continued work to defeat malaria.

At 10:38 a.m. the Called Session of the Central Texas Conference was brought to order by Bishop Mike Lowry.

Organization of the Conference

Rev. Harvey Ozmer set the bar for the conference and announced the visitor's section. He stated that The Exodus Project: A Transformational Roadmap for a Church in Transition, as presented by the Alignment Task Force, was the item of business for the called session.

He then introduced Sally Fleming, Head Teller. Registration was taken for laity and then clergy.

Rev. Steve Nance, Rev. Judy Richmond and Lisa McCutcheon were introduced as the secretaries. Bishop Mike Lowry clarified the voting process and referenced ¶316.6 of The Book of Discipline which outlines eligibility for Local Pastors to vote. He then explained the procedure for considering the proposal.

Alignment Task Force Proposal

Rev. Mike Ramsdell presented the proposal of the Task Force. He stated the committee saw it as the plan for this conference to carry out the command to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. He stated the committee took this task seriously as given to them by the Central Texas Conference.

Rev. Ramsdell stated that the Task Force would request a vote asking that the proposal be a straight

up yes or no vote with no amendments. Once that vote was taken, the Task Force would then present the proposal for a vote.

The Exodus Project: A Transformational Roadmap for a Church in Transition

Rev. Mike Ramsdell reviewed the proposal. He highlighted that the proposal emphasizes the conference existing for the local church.

Following a period of questions and answers, the Enabling Motions were presented.

Enabling Motion Number 1

The Alignment Task Force was commissioned with aligning all the resources of the conference so that the mission of the church, making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, has the best chance to be carried out.

The alignment of resources means integrating decisions about structure, people, districts, buildings, budgets, etc. in order to put more flexibility back in the system.

The Task Force strongly believes The Exodus Project: A Transformational Roadmap for a Church in Transition found on pages 1-59 of the Preliminary Journal needs to be implemented in its entirety. All the elements of this plan are needed to accomplish the desired outcomes we as a conference seek.

Therefore, we move that the vote be a straight up or down vote without amendments.

Gary invited all to the Church Growth and Development report found on page 85 of the preliminary journal. He recognized and expressed appreciation for chair, Mike Alexander and the entire committee.

He announced the Centennial Churches - 18 CTC churches reached this level – each of these churches were recognized and received a certificate of completion and a Common English Bible Outreach Kit.

Some of the new church start pastors shared some of their experiences of their new church starts:

1. LifePoint in Haslet, pastor Thomas Childs, talked about the struggles of starting a church without the land or a building. He also expressed his appreciation for 1st Fort Worth and the tremendous help they had been.
2. Our Manna who worship in the Richland Hills Church.
3. New Day in Mansfield, pastor Sheila Fiorella shared stories of some of the unchurched people who have been attracted to this congregation and how they had grown spiritually; how they had come together as a Christian family and how they help each other in life.
4. Rockbridge in Cedar Park, pastor Wade Killough shared a video of his church and talked about the growth of the congregation and the spirit by which they serve their community.
5. Wesley – a Ghanaian community of faith – started at the Aldersgate facility in Arlington. The Aldersgate congregation was recognized.
6. St. James was recognized for helping to establish an African American congregation in Killeen.
7. Steve Ramsdell and the congregation of 1st Waco is partnering for new church, Life Church, a Hispanic speaking community in Speegleville led by Gabe Dominguez; and also Robinson, led by pastor Patrick Chaney and his wife Lindsey.

Rev. Lindley concluded the report by affirming these pastors and new churches. He also challenged the CTC churches to support church growth by the Share program. He highlighted the green card on the table which explains the new center for Evangelism and Church Growth. Another informational card on the table explains congregational development – another important component of the new center.

2. World Service is separated from Conference Benevolence which will facilitate the reporting of statistical information at year-end.
3. Center for Leadership program areas: Cabinet, Board of Laity, Information Technology, Communications, Board of Ordained Ministry, Episcopacy, Higher Education, and Campus Ministry.
 Campus Ministry (\$181,302 increase)
 Budget support divorced from per member formula.
 Individual District apportionments for Campus Ministry (\$172,246) have been added to budget support.
4. Center for Evangelism and Church Growth program areas: Student Leadership, Transformational Ministry, Small Membership/Rural Ministries, Evangelism, Ethnic Local Church Concerns, and Church Growth & Development.
5. Center for Mission Support program areas: Texas Methodist Colleges, Ecology Justice & Mercy, Spiritual Formation & Small Groups, Parish & Community, Mission Experience, Methodist Center Operations, Discipleship, Glen Lake Camp program support and debt service, and Clergy Benefits.
 Clergy Benefits (\$1,434,879 decrease)

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION**Report No. 1**

1. The Council on Finance and Administration expresses its thanks to the churches of our Central Texas Conference for their fine support of the mission partnership of the United Methodist Church through the benevolence program. Our overall percentage receipts in 2010 totaled 91.14%. Our churches contributed \$10,760,980. Two hundred sixty eight of our Conference churches paid 100% of the apportionment share in full. The Conference was unable to pay its General Church Apportionments in full for only the second time in the last twelve years. We contributed 91.13% of General Church Apportionments.
2. Compensation for the District Superintendents and Executive Center Directors is determined by the following:
 - a. Salary: the increase in District Superintendent and Executive Center Director salaries will be the same percentage increase as is reflected in the salaries of those Elders in full membership of the Conference who serve as Senior Pastors of churches within the Central Texas Conference. This formula percentage increase for 2012 is 1.04%. The salaries of the District Superintendents and Executive Center Directors will be \$115,511.
 - b. Beginning in 2012, where there is a Housing Allowance at the District Superintendent and Executive Center Director level, the formula will be 20% of salary rounded to the nearest thousand. The percentage will be reviewed every four years. The Housing Allowance for 2012 will be \$23,000.
3. This amount is to provide for the District Superintendents' and Executive Directors' expense for conference meetings and additional ministerial expenses in an accountable reimbursement plan, the district superintendent's portion of the conference health benefits plan premium, for an amount requested by each district superintendent or director to be excluded from salary and added to the district (or conference) contribution toward housing allowance, and each district superintendent and executive director's salary. The line item amount for each of these is to be determined in consultation with and approved by the Council on Finance and Administration. It is required that the accountable reimbursement plan for the district superintendent and executive director's expense for conference meetings and additional ministerial expenses be established in accordance with Sec. 62 of the Internal Revenue Code (IRC). Also, any Housing Expense Set-aside, as desired by each district superintendent or executive director shall be established in accordance with Sec. 107 of the IRC in like manner. Further, the cost of the Clergy Retirement Security Program, billed directly to the conference, will be an apportionment to the districts. An additional amount for voucher, reimbursed expenses related to each executive director's office is also a part of the respective council's or commission's budget.
4. The district committees on finance are authorized to prepare budgets for presentation to the district stewards. An amount up to 10% of the support and compensation for the district superintendent may be included in the district budget to defray the utility costs of the district parsonage. In addition, an

amount up to 10% of the support and compensation may be included in the district budget for the purpose of voucher reimbursement of travel and business-related expenses. District budgets shall not include a discretionary fund, but may include a District Operations Expense item. The district budget shall be submitted to the Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration for approval each year. The district stewards are authorized to apportion a Connectional Contingency Fund to be used for paying in full at the district level apportioned items, which may fall short within the respective district. The Connectional Contingency Fund will be administered at the district level in the same manner as the District Work Fund. It is understood that if a portion of the Connectional Contingency Fund is not used in any given year, it will remain in the fund and future apportionment funds will be reduced. Any adjustments for unusual local church situations will be made in the apportionment of the Connectional Contingency Fund only. All other apportionments will be distributed to every local church on the basis of the decimal.

5. We recommend a \$100,000 apportionment for Texas Methodist College Association. The Council also recommends that funding for Campus Ministries will be a set dollar amount rather than based on conference membership.
6. At the end of each fiscal year unexpended unrestricted operation funds, less the amount needed to cover deficits in conference budget accounts, shall be transferred into the operating reserve and an accounting of all operating reserve funds shall be made at each Annual Conference.
7. Each year the use of the unspent Contingency Fund shall be reviewed by the Council on Finance and Administration and the Bishop to decide if any amount should be used for Conference, Jurisdictional and General Church apportionments before going into the Operating Reserve.

2. The three Conference Ministry Centers shall have prepared in writing and submitted to the Council on Finance and Administration their budgets for the ensuing year by the date set by the Council on Finance and Administration. Requests will not be considered if received after the due date unless an extension has been requested and approved.
3. An amount equal to 50% of the General/Jurisdictional Conference per diem or reimbursement for actual expenses above the per diem, whichever is less, shall be paid to each elected lay and clerical delegate and to the first lay and clerical alternate delegates representing this conference at General/Jurisdictional Conference.
4. The Executive Director for Mission Support is authorized to:
 - a) Consolidate the various funds of the Annual Conference and of the agencies into one or more bank accounts.
 - b) Write all checks for the agencies of the conference upon requisition by authorized officers of the agency and in keeping with approved conference budget. The Treasurer is also authorized to transmit to the authorized treasurers all other funds that are raised by the local churches in response to General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conference askings that have been approved by the appropriate body.
 - c) The conference treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer from the accounts of all boards, commissions, and other agencies of the conference into the operating reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempted by CFA) making allowances for all outstanding checks. This procedure is recommended with the understanding that the Executive Director for Mission Support will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.
 - d) Invest the funds of the conference in government securities and federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and/or with the Texas Methodist Foundation, and/or Central Texas Methodist Foundation and to borrow on and dispose of investments at, or prior to, maturity, and to deposit the proceeds from these investments in accounts of the conference under the guidance of the Council on Finance and Administration.
 - e) Deposit funds for specifically designated purposes in federally insured depositories up to and not exceeding insurability, and/or with the Texas Methodist Foundation and/or Central Texas Methodist Foundation under the joint control of the Central Treasury (Conference Council on Finance and Administration) and the agency concerned, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.

Report No. 3
Reserve Funds

In order to establish a better system of accountability, the Council on Finance and Administration, following action of the 1991 Annual Conference, implemented the following management procedures for reserve funds beginning 1/1/92:

- a) The operating reserve is no longer treated as a contingency fund but as a cash flow fund.
- b) A separate contingency fund has been set up to cover unbudgeted expenses with accounting of these expenditures to be made to the Annual Conference.
- c) A contingency fund of \$50,000 has been established from the operating reserve.
- d) The contingency fund will be replenished at the beginning of each year by the interest earnings on both the contingency fund and the operating reserve. Any interest earnings over and above that necessary to replenish the contingency fund to a balance of \$50,000 will go into the operating reserve.
- e) The goal is a permanent operating reserve fund of 10% of the current budget to be used strictly for cash flow.
- f) The operating reserve will be replenished by funds unused by the conference at the end of the year.
- g) The authority for the administration of these funds rests with the Council on Finance and Administration pursuant to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church and the Guiding Principles and Best Practices of the Central Texas Conference.

Contingency Fund Policy

1. Expenditures will be made from the Contingency Fund under one of two circumstances:
 - a) Unforeseen circumstances, unpredicted, unplanned for, emergency situations that could not have been foreseen by reasonable people and reasonable committees.
 - b) Failure of expected income to support a budgeted expenditure.
2. The conference treasurer may authorize up to \$250; the CFA executive committee may authorize up to \$5,000 either in meeting or by phone; those over \$5,000 must be authorized by the full board either in meeting or by phone.
3. No disbursement will be made without the authorization signature of either the conference treasurer or the chair of CFA.

Report No. 4
Mileage Reimbursement

The accountable mileage reimbursement for conference staff shall be the IRS rate. All others shall be reimbursed at 25 cents per mile for one to six persons in a car, and 35 cents per mile when seven or more members ride in the same car for necessary travel on conference business. Due to the fluctuation of gasoline

prices, the CFA is authorized to change the mileage rate between sessions of the Annual Conference if deemed necessary. This reimbursement rate will be effective at the close of this Annual Conference.

**Report No. 5
Accountability**

The Council on Finance and Administration, through its Director, shall monitor monies received through the apportioned funds and keep those Boards and Agencies receiving funds from the conference advised of possible shortfalls to enable them to adjust their expenses where at all possible in order for expenditures not to exceed actual income for the year. CFA will seek to work with Boards and Agencies to allow the maximum funding of ministries and programs without creating a deficit situation in the Conference Budget.

Report No. 6

At Annual Conference, CFA will present a budget which is comprised of the major ministry components of the Conference. When the Conference approves the budget, it will be voting on the figures of those components and the composite total. If occasion arises to meet unforeseen and unusual expenses, or to provide for emerging ministries that could not be known at the time of budget preparation, a request may be made to CFA for approval to shift monies from one major ministry component to another major ministry component of the budget. In faithfulness to the Financial Best Practices this procedure will not be used simply because a ministry area anticipates some funds will not be spent.

Report No. 7

In these days when churches are more vulnerable to being sued than they were in the past, and for a far wider list of causes, it is imperative that each local church be incorporated. Failing to be incorporated puts each of the members of the church in jeopardy. In addition to being incorporated each church must review its property and liability insurance coverage with consideration for areas of liability not only between church staff and members or guests, and not only between the church as an entity and whomever might happen upon the premises, but also for the area of liability of employer versus employee.

Report No. 8

By action of the 1999 Annual Conference, each newly chartered church shall be apportioned 25% of what would be its apportionment, under Annual Conference Financial Procedures point C., for its first year after records are available, 50% its second year, 75% its third year and 100% its fourth year and thereafter.

**Report No. 9
Fair Share Asking**

We recommend the following as Fair Share goals for 2012:

Justice for Our Neighbors \$38,000 – (5th year of five years)
United Community Centers \$50,000 – (4th year of five years)

(REMINDER: *The Annual Conference no longer has a surety bond to cover laity who handle church finances. A letter was sent to all churches notifying them of this change. Once again we urge every church to review their current general liability insurance to ascertain whether this issue is addressed.*)

MISSION MINISTRIES

Report of the Executive Director of Mission Ministries

Energizing and equipping local churches to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world continues to be our life's work. If we believe in the gospel, then we need to believe that lives can be changed and that we can reach more and more people for Jesus Christ. The more people we reach, the more good we can do, and the more people we have for the kingdom of sharing God's love. We believe the new Exodus Project: A Transformational Roadmap for a Church in Transition will give us greater flexibility to accomplish the mission.

As Executive Director of Mission Ministries and Assistant to the Bishop the bulk of my work in 2010-2011 has surrounded resourcing various task groups and working with a variety of clergy leadership issues. I worked extensively with the Conference Alignment Task Force, led by Rev. Mike Ramsdell. The Alignment Task Force presented a report at the June 2010 Annual Conference which established a Called Session of Annual Conference November 13, 2010 to receive and vote upon the work of the Task Force. The Exodus Project: A Transformational Roadmap for a Church in Transition was presented, discussed and overwhelmingly approved.

Since November 13, 2010 an enormous amount of work has been done by so many people to bring the Exodus Project to fruition. New job descriptions, new employee handbooks, reallocation of conference office space, interviews for new staff, setting up Centers, new Guiding Principles, new Procedures Manual, Cluster Groups, new districts, new role of District Superintendents, creating a new budget, and training for a new way of being are some of the things needed for full implementation of the plan.

A separate Task Force was named by Bishop Lowry to bring to the 2011 Annual Conference the Guidelines for full implementation. The chair of the task force is Dr. Mike Young. The task assigned the team was to reconcile the former "Standing Rules" of the Annual Conference with the new programs and structures of the Exodus Project. Realizing that the Exodus Project was a roadmap for a church in transition, the phrase "Standing Rules" does not describe an Exodus journey. The Church described in the Exodus Project is on the move, facing change, and adapting quickly to changing realities.

Examples of other areas of work this year; Nothing but Nets, Imagine No Malaria, Encounter with Christ in Latin America and the Caribbean, Partners in Ministry,

Leadership Summit, examples of generous giving, Centennial Celebration, THR Task Group, and CTMF Task Group.

Since 2006 The Central Texas Conference has focused on the life-saving power of a \$10 net through Nothing but Nets. This year received \$4,958. Through Imagine No Malaria, The United Methodist Church is working in partnership with our brothers and sisters in Africa to eliminate death and suffering from malaria continues. Central Texas Conference has agreed to set a goal of raising 1 million dollars towards eradicating malaria between 2010 and 2015. Together we have received over \$110,000 through the CTC Cabinet challenge and gifts in June 2010 and in June 2011 we will celebrate and identify next steps. There are so many more lives we can save.

We worked with Bishop Lowry and Arborlawn UMC to host the Encounter with Christ in Latin America and the Caribbean. This Encounter with Christ in Latin America and the Caribbean is a Permanent Fund of the GBGM to support mission partnership with Methodist churches throughout the Latin American/ Caribbean region. It is a principal means through which United Methodism engages in shared mission with some nineteen colleague national churches connected to the Council of Evangelical Methodist Church in Latin America and the Caribbean and the Methodist Church of the Caribbean and the Americas. This presentation was done by Bishop Joel Martinez and Dr. Wilson Boots.

Partners in Ministry can be an invaluable tool for leaders of congregations seeking to enhance the ministry effectiveness of their church. It is a resource that provides direct, practical guidance on how the ministry of laity and clergy can complement and strengthen each other. The basic building block is the ministry team, in which one's status as clergy or laity does not matter, but rather one's sense of God's call and gifts for ministry. In August 2010 we trained our first class of clergy and laity leaders for Partners in Ministry. This ministry will be jointly handled by the Board of Laity and Center for Leadership.

The Central Texas Conference has a lengthy history of being a generous people. A sampling of that generosity was evidenced this past year by gifts to the Haiti Emergency Fund of over \$289,000; Ghana Water Projects over \$5,000; Chile Emergency \$4,600; Maua Hospital Fund \$13,000; Child Rescue in Sierra Leone \$32,124. These are just a few of the more than 111 Advance Special categories that received over \$834,000 of Advance Special giving.

April 6, 2011 the Leadership Summit was held at three locations. The Summit's purpose was to call together for prayer, discernment and holy conversation a cross section of leaders throughout the denomination. It was a venue for leaders to hear first-hand how the Council of Bishops is helping the church clarify and affirm God's leading through the vision, values and culture of the United Methodist Church. Central Texas Conference had three groups; one in Temple Texas, one in Fort Worth and one with the Board of Ordained Ministry. One

hundred twenty five persons took part in these groups plus individuals were able to view independently and also pull up the material from media archives.

June 1, 2011 I will change roles to serve as Assistant to Bishop and Executive Director of the Center for Leadership. I have enjoyed, grown personally and spiritually from my time as Director of Mission Ministries. I am excited about the new direction our conference is going and look forward to living into the Exodus Journey.

Report of the Mission Ministries Associate Director

Throughout the year 2010, the conference staff continued to be dedicated to offering training and resources to the churches and leaders of the Central Texas Conference. In the process, I saw some very exciting things happening in those congregations.

In addition, I worked with congregations across the conference on implementing and upgrading their Safe Sanctuaries policies and procedures. If your church has not yet written its policy or begun its procedures for Safe Sanctuary, please take care to do that now. The Safe Sanctuary online course is a good way to obtain training for volunteers and leaders.

We began an adult ministry/adult discipleship group for persons with responsibilities for growing adult disciples and providing a pathway to discipleship for persons in their congregations. These leaders have met to share ideas, challenges, and resources about building discipleship systems within their churches.

We are in the process of re-energizing the Central Texas Conference Christian Educators Fellowship to provide support for persons who have leadership responsibilities for spiritual growth and building disciples. It is important to have a network of persons who can share information, support, and resources for this ministry. My thanks to those persons who have expressed an interest in gathering occasionally for community and learning together.

It has been such a privilege to work with the Central Texas Conference Nurture Council over the past few years. This has been an amazing group of dedicated, faithful leaders who have provided this conference with countless hours of their time and energy to offer events, workshops, and resources to local churches and leaders all over this conference. Report of the Mission Ministries Associate Director

It has been a great pleasure to be in ministry with the Central Texas Conference youth ministers and Student Leadership Team this past year.

Some highlights of the past year:

Our Student Leadership Team is stronger than ever and recognized two of our seniors as candidates for ministry. We have five students that are currently on the team that have identified a call to full-time ministry. This year, we hope to send another strong delegation to Exploration 2011. Please read the Student Leadership Team report for details on all the exciting things we accomplished this year.

Our conference hosted JYMO this year at Texas Wesleyan University. It is a gathering of youth from throughout the Jurisdiction to come together to develop their faith, leadership skills, and take care of some disciplinary business. We had the largest delegation there, and showed our hospitality by providing a welcome ice cream sundae party on opening night and put together a monstrous slip-n-slide down the hill during a spot of free time. Our conference also provided workshop leaders, using the skills of many of our talented clergy and youth ministers.

Our conference sent four representatives to the Global Youth Convocation in Berlin, Germany in July 2010. Rev. David McMinn, Amy Miller, Matt Polk, and Stefanie Schutz acted as South Central Jurisdiction alternate delegates and took part in the legislative decisions that were made during the convocation. They were able to experience the true connection of the UMC by meeting people from all over the world and experiencing worship in many different traditions.

Report of the Mission Ministries Associate Director

Sometimes plans change and we have to adapt. Such is the case with the retirement I had planned to take at the end of 2010. At the request of Dr. Georgia Adamson, I stayed on staff through the end of May, refocusing most of my attention on communications with the digital world taking the lead in connecting with our constituencies. We reworked the website (www.ctcumc.org), which will undergo another revamp as part of the new alignment; continued circulation of the popular weekly *E-Link* to conference and local church leaders; and the every-other-week *Central Link* newspaper for sharing news and features throughout the conference. The newspaper, still popular with our "I-want-to-hold-a-newspaper-in-my-hands" audience, will most likely be scaled down to a quarterly magazine format at a substantial cost savings to the conference. Permitting me to focus on communications allowed me to do more feature articles to lift up the remarkable ministries of our local churches and the conference. Substantial interest in evangelism has been rekindled during the last 12 months beginning with hundreds of covenants made at last year's Annual Conference, and continuing with evangelism training programs for local churches. The new alignment will bring many improvements in structure, some I wish I had

had the chance to work under, but I end my conference staff time feeling blessed to have worked with some of the most incredible, dedicated servants of Christ. Yes, it's always the wonderful servants that stand out in our minds.

Report of Central Texas Conference Youth in Mission (CTCYM) Director

In 2010, almost 2,400 youth and adult missionaries from the Central Texas Conference spread out across Oklahoma and south central Texas to serve those in need in Christ's name. As part of the Central Texas Conference Youth in Mission's (CTCYM) annual trips, Conference youth and adults helped redefine what many people expect from young people by giving a week of their time to help more than 300 families.

In early June, 1,400 senior-high youth and adults helped Oklahomans whose lives have been affected by disability, poverty and age. The same week, almost 400 youth and adults went on CTCYM's combination trip in southern Oklahoma. The combination trip includes groups of both junior and senior high youth. Working closely with the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference (OIMC) and other local agencies in 22 different Oklahoma cities, CTCYM groups identified people who needed repairs or construction at their homes, but who could not afford it or were physically unable to complete it. The projects included patching roofs, repairing floors, painting walls, fixing porches, replacing windows, building wheelchair ramps and much more.

In July, almost 600 junior high youth and adults left for CTCYM's week-long junior high mission trip in eight small south central Texas cities. The projects they undertake rival the size and scope of those done by the senior high including building ramps and porches, installing sheet rock, and other construction and repairs.

As plans for 2011 come close to completion, the CTCYM Advisory Committee has worked to make this year's trips great events for both those who participate and those who receive our help. This summer, our senior high and combination trips will be serving in the Texas and Louisiana coastal region. Our junior high groups will be serving within the Central Texas Conference.

Every summer CTCYM brings together youth and adults from around the Conference to serve in the name of Christ. For a week they live, eat, work and worship together in living centers hosted by churches in different parts of the country. CTCYM is funded by the fees paid by participants to attend and by donations from other mission-minded individuals.

NURTURE COUNCIL

The CTC Nurture Council has had a very productive year in 2010. In the short time that I have been Chairperson I can really see how we are making God's disciples and leaders for our Church. I was very impressed with Bishop Mike Lowry's address at the Annual Conference in June 2010.

The council has worked toward nurturing the whole conference in a variety of ways and each of our ministry groups has been working to implement the four areas of focus of The United Methodist Church.

- Allen Grant (Marriage & Family) reported on the Parenting Skills class to be held Oct. 16, 2010 at FUMC Burleson. The topics/session will include; Boundaries with Kids, Real World Parents, and the STEP program. There was a keynote speaker with breakout sessions. Allen discussed how this program relates to three of the four focus areas of the UMC.
- Joy Roberson, (Conference Staff) reported on the Academy for Christian Education. Joy has developed a crash course weekend. The topics covered include; discerning your call, Bible study and working with staff and volunteers. The course was offered October 1-2, 2010 at FUMC Weatherford and March 25-26, 2011 at Central UMC in Waco. It was limited to twenty (20) participants per weekend and the cost was \$30.00 per participant. The goal is to offer this course three times per year.
- While we have many activities going on, a major area was the continuation of Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations.
- Karen Granderson (Conference Staff) reported on the Created by God Training in Kay Lancaster's (Children) absence. Created by God is a human sexuality curriculum for fifth (5th) and sixth (6th) grade children. The event was held at FUMC in Arlington. Lee Meekins from the Alabama/West Florida conference led the training. This event is specifically to train the trainers who can in turn train teachers for the local church.
- Richard Thompson reported on the Social Principles task force. The task force is working on selecting "hot button" issues out of each area of the Social Principles, to be taught and discussed in the local churches. Options included developing curriculum that could be used in small groups, developing an on-line training course for teachers to present and facilitate discussion of these issues and offering a \$50 grant to local church to assist in buying curriculum on the Social Principles. It was suggested that people in the local church are looking to the leadership of the CTCUMC to give their position and/or opinion regarding these issues. A brainstorming session was held on September 16, 2010 at the Conference Office. Allen suggested the curriculum should include a session on "What is social justice?"

- Marianne Brown (Youth and Student Leadership Team). The youth and SLT are very busy. The UNIFY event was held on September 25, 2010 at three separate locations. Several of the youth have become Certified Lay Speakers and are teaching the course to other SLT members. They are also planning a "Great Day of Service" for April 16, 2011. The SLT is planning a conference wide initiative to attend YOUTH 2011 which will be held at Purdue University this summer.
- Cindy Young (Singles) reported that the Singles Task Area continues the work of strengthening the local church's ministry with singles through the three areas of social, spiritual and outreach. The Task Area has developed a Facebook page and is working on a website. They are in the planning stages of a mission trip for 2011 due to the tremendous success of the 2010 mission trip. In addition they are working on developing a "hub" to increase participation of those in the outlying districts.
- Linda Hutchings (UMW Spiritual Growth) reported on the UMW 2010 Spiritual Growth Retreat "Faith, Food and You" that was held May 14-16 at Lakeview Camp and Conference Center. The retreat leader was Dr. Elvin Adams, MD and the spiritual director was Judy Holloway. The 2011 Spiritual Growth Retreat is currently set for March 4 - 5. The UMW Assembly was April 30 - May 5 in St. Louis, MO. The CSCM in Aug. was a great success and the UMW Autumn Gathering was on October 2, 2010 which had more than 8 hours in Burning of the Candle for missions.
- Kay Hawkins (Glen Lake Camp & Retreat Center) reported on the various changes to the summer camp offerings. A "Family Camp" component was being added and was offered at different times throughout the summer. Family Camps will be Thursday to Saturday during the time a week long camp is in session. Each Family Camp can accommodate up to twenty (20) families. All week long camps will begin on Sundays at 4:00 p.m. and end on Fridays at 4:00 p.m. Kay has applied for grant monies to increase the scholarship amounts that can be awarded. The staff is currently evaluating the Bible Retreats for 2011. The camp is presently operating with the smallest full-time staff in twelve (12) years and is looking at a deficit of \$100,000 for 2010. The staff is very dedicated and was working very hard to carry out the mission and ministry of Glen Lake Camp & Retreat Center.
- Richard Thompson (CTC Walk to Emmaus) reported that the ministry still remains vital and financially solvent though there has been a decrease in the number of pilgrims. Thirteen (13) walks were scheduled for 2010 and fourteen (14) walks are scheduled for 2011. There was a conference- wide gathering on October 2, 2010 with the theme "Hearts on Fire." Bishop Mike Lowry opened the event, Julieanne Alan shared her story and Rev. Danny Brown offered a closing message.

- Karen Granderson announced that the safe-sanctuary can be completed online. There is no cost for the course, but the participant must have the book which can be purchased from Cokesbury Book Store. The course takes four to six hours to complete.
- Due to the uncertain future of the Nurture Council and its function, preparation of the 2011-2012 budget was tabled. The Nurture Council has been mandated not to spend more than 5/12 of the 2011 budgeted monies.

Our ministry task forces and leadership groups are working to equip and energize our local churches to rethink not only who they are as God's disciples but also the ways they can interact with their communities and the world for the sake of God's kingdom on earth. Thank you for letting me be part of this Nurture Council.

CONFERENCE STUDENT LEADERSHIP TEAM

The Conference Student Leadership Team has aligned its ministry with the Four Focuses of the General Church for the past two years. This year our team selected the focus of Developing Principled Christian Leaders. To strengthen the leadership aspect of youth ministry in the conference, we centered several activities on different ways to lead and different qualities needed to be a good leader.

Last year several members of the SLT were certified as Lay Speakers by the conference. They influenced the entire SLT to go through Basic Lay Speaker Training all together in two sessions this past year. Youth Lay Speakers helped to teach the class to the other members of the SLT. Over 15 completed the basic Lay Speaking Course this past year. Many of us will be taking the advanced course and getting our Lay Speaking Certification.

Our SLT participated in JYMO – Jurisdictional Youth Ministry Organization this past July. It was held at Texas Wesleyan University and we hosted over 200 students from around the Jurisdiction. Former SLT Allye Combs-Morgan chaired the event as JYT President and our SLT helped in multiple ways to provide radical hospitality for our friends. Our delegation was the largest in attendance and we spent time in workshops and worship learning how to be leaders in our conference and local church.

The Conference SLT decided at the beginning of the year that strengthening each District SLT would benefit the conference more than having one large conference-wide event. UNIFY, a time of fellowship and worship service, became the fall event in hopes of achieving this. The event was held at three different locations across the conference on the same day. The conference SLT prepared a skeleton model for the event and then district SLTs partnered together to create it. Mid-Cities, Fort Worth and Waxahachie districts collaborated at one site. Brownwood and Weatherford districts partnered together, and Temple and Waco districts were paired. This event helped each district SLT to put on an event with the support of one or more other teams and without having to start planning from

scratch. UNIFY was a smashing success in the response we had from local churches, in the experience our district SLTs gained, and in sharing the message that we are all the Body of Christ and serve a special purpose.

This October, the CTC celebrated its 100th anniversary and several members of the SLT helped to put on the event. The SLT ran the children's area including clowns, coloring, games, arts and crafts. Some SLT members participated in the afternoon activities by performing vignettes and doing reading in the program. The SLT also prepared a table to display its history.

Our Midwinter retreats this year were both based around the theme "Radiate." Radiate Weekend 1 was different from any Midwinter our SLT has done before. We centered the weekend on using individual talents to praise God and how to become worship leaders in our local churches. Youth broke out into several different creative arts groups and learned something to incorporate into the closing worship to which families and church members were invited. This groups included theater troupes, a dance ensemble, a band, a photography class, a technology crew, students who delivered Scripture and a Message, and the Energizers who created a radically hospitable environment in which to worship. The youth worked all weekend and learned about how different aspects of worship come together to convey the same message. Each youth came home with a skill they can utilize to lead in their local church.

Radiate Weekend 2 was a more traditional Midwinter centered on being a leader in everyday life and how different gifts are used differently. Youth and adults took a spiritual gifts assessment and had a time to learn about each gift and why God gave them the ones He did. The weekend allowed for a lot of self-exploration and showed youth different opportunities they have everyday to be a leader.

In finding our own strengths and talents, we have been able to empower other youth of the conference to not only find their gifts, but also to use those in their local churches and everyday lives to glorify God. Our focus of leadership turned into a focus of finding yourself and your purpose and why that qualifies and equips you personally to do God's work.

WALK TO EMMAUS

The Walk to Emmaus, like so many things associated with religion, is competing with the secular world for people's time and emotions. Business and family obligations occupy more and more of the available hours each day. Economic distress and world unrest seem to make the world a place where human existence is tenuous and frightening. Will there be enough money to pay the bills this month? Will we be able to make all the extracurricular activities and still have time to get work done? If we get the work and activities done, when will we have time to clean house and take care of the yard? When retirement comes will there be enough income and savings for the family to live comfortably? What about all those terrorists, civil wars, and protests for political change in other parts of the world? What effect will that have on our way of life and economic situation? What else can we pile on ourselves to worry about? Oh yeah, by the way, will we have time to go to church and to participate in a three-day religious weekend event?

Ironically, the Walk to Emmaus and similar events can bring some sense to the world and can increase our ability to cope with everyday life. Jesus taught that when we center on ourselves we tend to get so caught up and inward focused that everything becomes unmanageable. We worry about things we cannot control and then we worry about our inability to control those things. Life becomes a downward spiral. A Walk to Emmaus weekend begins to teach that focusing on God relieves many of our worries. When we take off our watches and quit concentrating on what we have to do next (Don't anticipate) we can experience the current moment and event in a way that is not otherwise possible. When we focus on seeing, hearing, and experiencing God in the daily and momentary activities, we still get fed, we still have time for breaks, we still have time for sleep and rest, and things back home somehow seem to get taken care of without our constant worrying and efforts to control them. As we become more aware of the grace God offers us, problems that previously seemed insurmountable can be left at the cross so that we can get on with life, moving forward and upward.

The first day of the Walk to Emmaus weekend focuses on God and the grace he offers. The second day focuses on Jesus Christ and our life as a response to grace. The third day focuses on the Holy Spirit and the call to be part of the Christian community in action in the world. The weekend and its activities seek to teach us the following.

God loves us unconditionally and longs for our return. Human beings are shaped by a unique capacity to make decisions about their priorities. God's love searches us out, seeks to redeem us, and wants to give us a life in grace. God's love is shared by Christians called to be the church – priests to one another, a channel of grace between God and people. By God's grace we are accepted and set right with God in Jesus Christ. New life comes with our "Yes." The new life is rooted in a relationship with God, sustained by grace through spiritual disciplines; giving one's heart to God. This new life involves growth through study of Scripture, tradition, and our world; giving one's mind to God. This new life in Christ is made real by means of Sacraments and other sacred moments in which we celebrate Christ overcoming death in our lives. This new life is expressed by sharing Christ as a friend with friends; giving one's hands and feet to God. This new life is not free from obstacles of sin, but we are enabled by grace and discipline to overcome obstacles and to grow through them. This new life is discipleship; life lived in grace, following in Jesus' footsteps, growing in his likeness, heart, head, and hands given to God. Disciples transform their environments by being a Christian presence with others and in the community. Disciples continue to grow in the grace of Christ through obedience to the Holy Spirit in disciplines of prayer and service. Disciples are called together to be the Body of Christ, teaming up their gifts for ministry, together being Jesus alive in the world. Disciples of Jesus cannot make it alone, but can persevere with strength from the Spirit through mutual support and accountability in group reunions. When the three days are over a Fourth Day begins. This is the purpose of Emmaus; a lifetime of discipleship, new life to our churches, homes, and workplaces conveying grace where we live.

In 2010 the Central Texas Conference Walk to Emmaus conducted thirteen three-day weekend events where 388 Pilgrims experienced the grace of God. For those 388 Pilgrims, 475 people gave up their weekends to serve on teams so that the Pilgrims could experience the grace of God. The Pilgrims came from 168 different churches representing 10 different denominations and 31 non-denominational congregations.

The way you think about your situation determines how you feel about it, and how you feel about it largely determines what you will do. The Walk to Emmaus empowers people to think about life in terms of relationship with God and one another. This enables them to trust in God and to have faith in God's plan for their lives. Thinking this way reduces all those issues mentioned at the beginning to secondary levels and empowers people to focus on God. The Central Texas Conference Walk to Emmaus in 2010 sent 388 people back to their homes, their

home churches, and their work environments focused on God.

OLDER ADULT MINISTRIES

During the past year, individual districts have been engaged in connectional activities. These activities have included purely social activities such as Valentine lunches (complete with high school jazz bands or local crooners) and worship services. The Mid-Cities District older adults have gathered at White's Chapel UMC for an Advent worship service and lunch for the past five years.

It is our hope to get more churches within districts or within cluster groups to encourage their older adults to do more social, worship, and mission activities with other older adult groups. With the increased size of our districts, we may

need to emphasize cooperation within the cluster groups-when the churches within the groups are relatively near each other.

The challenge we are facing in older adult ministry today is the aging of our older adult population. Those older adults who have been active in church activities over the last fifteen to twenty years are not able to keep up the pace that they have been maintaining. We need to find ways to engage our younger older adults (the 50's and early 60's groups) in more mission and social activities. With people generally working longer before retirement, working older adults have less time to participate in older group activities. This is especially true when so many older adult opportunities are offered during the workweek.

In addition to the activities mentioned above, we need to be aware of the changing nature of the environment our older adults. We as a Conference and as individual churches, need to be aware of the issues regarding housing, transportation, and medical care that challenge our older adults. It is our hope that through the districts and the cluster groups, we will be aware of how these issues are affecting the lives of our members and our communities in general.

Many decisions are being made today in Congress and in the legislature regarding our older adults and families. Many of these decisions may result in our churches being asked to fill gaps that do not exist now. New realities will give us new opportunities for ministry to older adults.

GLOBAL AIDS FUND TASK FORCE

The Global Aids Fund was established by the United Methodist Church to address the HIV/AIDS pandemic around the world. Unlike other “killer diseases of poverty” that are largely confined to other parts of the world, AIDS is a significant cause of death in the United States, including our Conference. The number of persons here who live with this devastating disease is shocking to many local United Methodists. When you add the persons who are “affected” to those who are “infected” the number becomes so large that it cries out for ministry.

Unfortunately, the stigma attached to HIV/AIDS makes it a taboo subject in many churches. The myths that still exist about this disease cripple attempts to deal with it constructively. Many infected persons and their families not only live with the devastating physical, emotional, and financial burdens of the disease, they also live in fear that others will learn of their condition and reject them. Sadly, such rejection and ostracism seems to be a standard response, even from some churches.

The Global Aids Fund Task Force for the Central Texas Conference is committed to raising the awareness of this condition in our Conference and providing guidance and leadership in the effort to eradicate this terrible killer disease. Education is the key to prevention of this disease. High risk populations, especially young people, are woefully uninformed about HIV/AIDS and, as a result, continue to have increasing numbers of infections.

During the past year the Task Force has successfully sponsored HIV/AIDS workshops in Fort Worth and Waco and participated in the international AIDS Conference in Dallas. We are now designing an educational program specifically for youth. You will continue to hear more from us in the coming months and we hope you will respond positively when your church has the opportunity to participate. The Task Force can serve as a critical resource for your church and community, but we are ultimately dependent upon local churches to open their doors, hearts and minds to this ministry. RESTORATIVE JUSTICE

Restorative Justice Practices and principles are applied through various forms of mission and outreach ministry within the Central Texas Conference. We support the formerly incarcerated and nurture their faith through preaching, teaching and mentorship programs. In addition, many members of our Conference faithfully participate in Kairos Ministries where they visit the prisoner and share the love of Christ with our brothers and sisters – as one imprisoned with them.

The Crime Victims Council reaches out to victims by providing an annual Community Interfaith Worship Service of Help, Hope and Healing for victims of crime, their families, friends and the community. In addition, Crime Victims Council continues to provide pastoral counseling, training for churches, hospitals and communities on victim support and work collaboratively with the Second Chances program by providing mentoring and training to former inmates.

Overall, the Central Texas Conference continues to lead the charge in its fight and advocacy for justice and mercy ministries, and our "one-stop methodology" (through the Tarrant County Restorative Justice Center) is considered, and recognized, as a model which encourages collaboration, interfaith partnerships and biblical disciplines that, when applied, promote safer neighborhoods and opportunities for reconciliation of heart and community.

DISABILITY CONCERNS

The Disability Concerns Committee (DCC) can assist the local church, Wesley Foundation Center and other related United Methodist Church entities with the following disability concerns: **health impairment, physically disabled, deaf/hard of hearing, blind/visually impaired, mentally/emotionally impaired, developmentally delayed and attitudinally impaired.** DCC, whose membership is from each of the Conference's Districts, has the responsibility to motivate the local churches to be in ministry to and with persons and their families who are effected and affected by disabling conditions.

Additionally, at 2010's CTC UMC Annual Conference, DCC presented three Accessibility Project Grant Awards and one DEAL Grant. The Accessibility Project Grant provides seed money to eliminate barriers that make access to the life of the church difficult. FUMC, Meridian, Morningside UMC, Fort Worth and Baylor University's Wesley Foundation received a 2010 Grant. The 2010 DEAL Grant provides one grant for college financial assistance to a student who has a handicapping condition and a second grant to a student who has a declared major in assisting individuals with handicapping conditions. Renee Frazee, Wortham UMC, was the 2010 DEAL recipient for graduate study for a master's degree in interpreter pedagogy.

DCC members can make a site visit to any local church to assist its members in designing a long term plan for access. Contact information is on the CTC UMC website under Disability Concerns.

DISASTER RESPONSE

The Disaster Response for our conference had a very busy 2010. After the earthquake in Haiti the conference responded with over 23,000 Health Kits to Haiti and donations totaling over \$160,000. In the fall of 2010 three members from our conference joined a team from the South Texas Conference to go to Haiti to help with deconstruction and construction in Haiti. All teams going to Haiti must have a person trained in UMVIM and they must have been to Haiti in order to lead a team. All three team members are now making plans for going to Haiti and leading teams from our conference. Two teams from our conference will be going in October of this year.

Also, in cooperation with UMVIM, we sent a full team to UMCOR's Sager Brown Depot in Baldwin, LA to prepare the health kits for shipping to Haiti.

In the fall of 2010 Hurricane Hermione hit the Texas coast and did extensive damage to 600 homes due to flooding in Williamson County of our conference. The churches in the Temple District have been working on repairs and rebuilds. The Bishop requested emergency aid from UMCOR to help with this rebuild, and the conference has contributed disaster response money donated for this cause also.

Several of our churches have made requests for training for being on Emergency Response Teams, as well as how to prepare their own churches and communities to be prepared for disasters.

In preparation for the (CTC) Central Texas Conference realignment /restructure changes to occur after June, 2011, many committees are faced with funding changes/decreases. The Cooperative School of Christian Mission (CSCM) is among them. Over the last few years, CTC funding for CSCM has dropped from \$10,000 to just over \$3,000 (2011 estimate) per year, so program cutbacks, price increases and creative avenues are planned. The School has been a 'cooperative' effort between the former CTC Board of Global Ministries (1970s) and the current Mission Council/Outreach committee, with the CTC United Methodist Women, since the mid-1970s, with funding aid dating back to 1980, per old Journals. Sadly, the 2011 Cooperative School of Christian Mission marks the end of the covenant between the United Methodist Women and the Outreach Council. The implementation of the Central Texas Conference Exodus Plan begins June 2011. UMW President Cynthia Rives will lead the UMW in making plans for future Schools of Christian Mission. Regardless, there will still be a School of Christian Mission in the CTC.

At the 2011 Cooperative School of Christian Mission, the Rev. Dr. Michael Young will teach one of the Spiritual Growth day and evening classes at Fort Worth First UMC, Weekday school from August 1-4, 2011 and at Glen Lake Camp from August 5-7: "Coming Out on the Side of Grace: Justice, Forgiveness and Reconciliation". Other classes include studies on "Haiti" and "Mission in the Age of Global Christianity." Children and Youth classes are offered at both school locations.

2012 SCM Studies will include Spiritual Growth: "Living Sacramentally and Walking Justly"; Geographic: "Haiti", and Social issue: "Poverty". Men, women, children and Clergy are encouraged to attend and participate. We hope to see you there!

HEALTH AND WELLNESS TASK FORCE REPORT

Mona Bailey, CTC Chair, Health and Wellness Task Force

The Church defines health as “what is necessary for the individual to be in mission” – engaging our whole selves in relationship with God to carry out a life of purpose and service. John Wesley wrote that we must “preserve thy body in health, in strength and vigour, a fit instrument for the soul...” The General Board of Pension and Health Benefits has challenged us as United Methodists to dig deeper to understand not only what health means to us individually, but also the broader implications of health for the future of the Church. With that goal in mind, the Health and Wellness Task Force sponsored the following projects/workshops during this past year:

SELF-CARE FOR CLERGY.....Two workshops were held in 2010, with 49 clergy (and some spouses) attending. The workshops were in Glen Lake and Belton. These Self-Care classes are designed to provide a break from day-to-day responsibilities and allow clergy to reflect, revive and renew the spirit and potential that effective ministry requires. The trainers are Rev. Bobby Cullen, Rev. Beverly Gilliam, Mona Dunkin, a Lay Health Promoter, and Jackie Elliott, a Faith Community Nurse.

LAY HEALTH PROMOTER CLASSES.....Dr. Mark DeHaven of UNT Health Sciences Center continues as the leader of the Lay Health Promoter classes, and as of 2010, we have established a focus group of 9 churches in the Conference, 2 or 3 LHP’s from each, to be the established group for the Conference over the next 3 years. Our congregational Health Assessment surveys have been taken and a study book put together for each of the churches, based on their results, giving suggestions as to how to move forward within the church families to focus on Body, Mind, and Spirit.

FAITHFULLY FIT FOREVER.....Two Faithfully Fit Forever classes were held in 2010 – one in Ft. Worth at Christ UMC and one at Keller UMC – with total attendance being 34 individuals. FFF is a non-profit, cooperative community health program created by MeritCare Hospital Parish Nursing and Cardiac Rehab staff, which attempts to eliminate the barriers that keep people from participating in exercise and health enhancing behaviors. It is faith-based, geared toward men and women over 55 or who have not exercised regularly; and consists of 40 minutes of exercise, 10 minutes of devotional, and 10 minutes of religious education. We currently have at least 6 churches who are offering FFF courses in the Conference.

On behalf of the board of directors and the staff of the Foundation, we count it a sacred privilege to serve the persons and churches of our great conference. The generosity of God's people inspires us to make every effort to enable them to achieve their goals for Christ's Church.

Certificates of Participation deposits from individuals and churches continue to be the heart of our church loan program. Each of our investors share in the harvest of growing churches that rely on us for prudent loans for capital improvements. In 2010, our CP investors earned interest of \$454,975 as they participated in our church loan program.

By partnering with Heartspring Methodist Foundation (Texas Conference), Texas Methodist Foundation (Austin) and the United Methodist Development Fund (New York), we have made our investors' dollars reach even farther in loans to our conference churches. A great example of our partnering is a \$6 million loan commitment to Arborlawn United Methodist Church that is shared with Heartspring Methodist Foundation, the United Methodist Development Fund and the Central Texas Methodist Foundation. We are grateful for the connectional reach of the United Methodist Church.

Respectable results for 2010 from all of our investment categories were credited to our churches, trusts, annuities and endowment accounts: Growth Stock Fund, 9.86%; Fixed Income Fund, 6.69%; and the Diversified Fund, 7.57%. Every effort is made for the majority of our investments to responsibly reflect the social values of the United Methodist Church. Again, investment partnering with other foundations allows us to diversify investments with competent advisers.

From individual charitable gift accounts administered by the foundation, we distributed \$373,193 to advance the ministries of our conference. While churches receive the majority of the distributions from charitable accounts, agencies and institutions are often included.

For our annuitants and trust beneficiaries, \$879,944 was distributed to them from their gift arrangements that provide income for their lifetimes or a fixed period of time. Of course, after the lifetime of these income beneficiaries, the final beneficiaries are the churches and agencies they have designated.

The Foundation recorded annual net income for 2010 operations at \$159,794, which is from investments, income from loans, and because of outstanding work by our staff. An independent audit of the foundation's financial activities is conducted each year and copies of the annual report of audit are available on request.

Larry Van Zile transitioned from staff to consultant for the Central Texas Methodist Foundation, and his focus on annual stewardship programs and capital campaigns with churches continues to make a difference. Annual stewardship growth in the churches where Larry worked in 2010 ranged from 15% to 25% as congregations were gently challenged to give as they have been blessed.

The foundation's leadership is engaged in prayerful dialog with attention to the changes taking place through the Exodus Project of our conference. It is our goal to adapt to the fresh vision and to consider every opportunity to participate in advancing our conference in every way we can.

CENTRAL TEXAS METHODIST FOUNDATION STUDY TASK FORCE

SCOPE AND DESCRIPTION OF THE TASK FORCE'S WORK

In response to a Conference resolution, Bishop Mike Lowry appointed a Task Force to study the relationship between the Central Texas Conference and the Central Texas Methodist Foundation to address the following concerns:

To investigate the relationship in regards to the original intentions of the Articles of Incorporation. The key phrase in the Articles of Incorporation describing the relationship in Article IV.C.: "It [The Central Texas Methodist Foundation] is an affiliated organization of the Central Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church." While there is no clear definition of what "an affiliated organization of" means, the founders attempt was to express close relationship and at the same time protect both the CTC and the CTMF from being financially liable for each other. The members of the Board of Directors, according to the most recent bylaws, are nominated by the Central Texas Conference and approved by the Board of Directors.

We also consulted with our Conference Chancellor and were advised that clarification of the meaning would involve not only our articles of incorporation, bylaws and other items from meetings and Conference journals, but also the methods by which the relationship has operated since 1991 (the founding date of the CTMF). We have also looked at other conferences in their relationships with foundations and find the same concern of expressing relationship yet protecting each other financially. The chairperson of the Task Force has met with our Executive Director, Pat-Sprayberry Hall, who graciously shared the history and developments of the Foundation and the development of the Articles of Incorporation and the evolution of the Bylaws over these past 20 years.

The CTMF has expressed its desire to continue in close relationship with the Central Texas Conference, that they believe their ministry to be part of our ministry. The Task Force, due to the membership makeup of the Board of Directors and the explicit endorsement of the CTMF and the TMF (Texas Methodist Foundation) as our primary organizations for investment), contends that the relationship, while maintaining financial boundaries are in a relationship of trust and common ministry.

To explore the responsibilities of the Annual Conference and the responsibilities of the CTMF in maintaining that important relationship with transparency and authenticity according to the past and present bylaws of the Foundation. At the center of this concern is how financial condition is reported to the Annual Conference, to local churches who are in relationship with the CTMF, and to investors. Transparency demands around investments in this day and time are much higher than at the time of the founding of CTMF. Conversations by Task Force members and churches and agencies of the Central Texas Conference have showed a desire for more prompt and open reporting of their invested and loaned monies.

The most recent bylaws of the CTMF in para. 7.05 read as follows, "As a courtesy without requirement of vote by the Annual Conference, the Board of Directors shall cause an information annual report in writing to be made to the Central Texas Annual Conference showing the activities, plans, and financial condition of the Foundation." Of concern to the Task Force is that while narrative is given stating that the CTMF is healthy, no reports provide sufficient detail to show where the CTMF's gains and losses are, how loans are being given or repaid or where the CTMF stands in general. United Methodist Conference Foundations are not required to report to their constituencies, but the general rule is that they do so as a courtesy, thereby demonstrating transparency and encouraging confidence and further investment. In order to determine the health of the relationship between the CTC and the CTMF, the Task Force has verbally and in writing requested the financial statements of the CTMF for 2009 and 2010. At the submission of this report, we have not received those statements.

That a report be brought back to next year's session of the Central Texas Annual Conference so we might, as a conference, stay engaged and connected with all aspects of this important ministry. Engagement and connection need to be strengthened. Over time and at times, the CTMF has felt isolated from the CTC and the CTC has felt the CTMF has functioned with insufficient communication and partnership in its direction. One place to begin better engagement is in the nominations process. The language of the bylaws calls for a greater partnership in personnel on the Board of Directors than just asking the CTMF to present its slate of names and be rubber stamped by the Conference Nominations Committee. A second place is to expand the reporting of the activities and condition of the CTMF at Annual Conference and to Conference officials.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Based on the Central Texas Conference Methodist Foundation's Articles of Incorporation and in keeping with common practice among like institutions throughout the country, the Taskforce respectfully submits the following recommendations to the Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church and the Central Texas Conference Methodist Foundation. In making such recommendations, the Taskforce has considered our affiliated relationship, established through the Articles of Incorporation, in addition to the implied endorsement that exists for investors, both individual and institutional, and congregations funding ministries through Foundation loans.

That a Memo of Understanding be created between the Central Texas Conference and the Central Texas Methodist Foundation, detailing the nature of their affiliated relationship.

That the partnership of the Nominations Committee of the Central Texas Conference and the Board of Directors be more actively engaged with the Nominations Committee offering its names along with those recommended.

Term limits should be enforced so that new leadership is developed.

That the following methods of reporting to the Central Texas Conference be endorsed by the Central Texas Conference and adopted by the Board of Directors of the Central Texas Methodist Foundation.

That the approved Audit be sent annually by the Executive Director or Chair of the Board of Directors to the Chairperson of CF&A and the Conference Treasurer.

That the following items be included in writing as a part of the Central Texas Methodist Foundation's annual financial report to the Central Texas Conference, and be made available in a timely fashion to any person upon request:

- A detailed financial statement of assets and liabilities.
- Asset allocations and upper and lower ranges by class.
- A list of the current fund managers and the name of the company monitoring investments. If funds are pooled, the unit price and value of each unit at the time of the report.
- Management fees and expense ratios.
- Current and historical returns on investments, including returns after distributions and fees.
- Asset distribution analysis.
- Report of the past due relationship, and how much of a reserve allocation exists to support loans in default.
- Provide an operating statement reflecting the income and expenses of the foundation on an annual basis.
- That the Study Committee remain in place for one more year so that it can report to 2012 Annual Conference on efforts to comply with the above recommendations.

The health care debate has prompted active discussion about how the cost of health care affects those with limited resources. Texas, in particular, has been discussing ways to continue to provide services to the poor and disabled while maintaining sufficient margin to achieve our mission and meet the needs of a growing metro area. The delicate balance of providing care to the sick and poor while maintaining a sustainable health care system remains at the heart of the health care reform debate.

As a large enterprise and major employer in North Texas, Texas Health Resources must pay attention to financial metrics. But the core measure of how we are living our mission, vision and values comes down to how many people we have compassionately helped or healed. Our guiding philosophy will always be that of caring for the whole patient—body, mind and spirit.

As part of our mission to improve the health of the people in the communities we serve, we continue to focus on delivering outstanding care and balancing opportunities for wellness and prevention. Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals continue to expand services to provide prevention opportunities while exploring new ways to better coordinate care.

In 2010, Texas Health expanded access to care across North Texas through several new initiatives.

Texas Health Harris Methodist Outpatient Center Burleson. Texas Health Harris Methodist Outpatient Center Burleson opened a stand-alone, 10-bed emergency department to care for the emergent medical needs of the Burleson, Joshua and Crowley communities. The new emergency department is equipped to handle acute medical emergencies and is located on the campus of Texas Health Burleson. The emergency department is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week and is staffed by the same physician group that delivers emergency care at Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospitals in Fort Worth, Southwest Fort Worth and Cleburne.

Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Alliance. Texas Health Resources has named Winjie Tang Miao, current president of Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Azle, as president of the new Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Alliance. Texas Health Alliance, located at the intersection of Interstate 35W and

Golden Triangle Boulevard, will be Texas Health's newest full-service hospital. The project, which includes a 24-hour emergency room, outpatient services, advanced imaging and surgical services, physician offices and acute-care inpatient beds, is scheduled to be completed in 2012.

Expansion of Texas Health Physicians Group. Texas Health Resources acquired MedicalEdge Healthcare Group, one of the largest independent physician practice groups in North Texas. The combination of the two organizations positions Texas Health closer to where patients live and work and enhances the ability to serve patients throughout the continuum of their changing medical needs and requirements. The acquisition added more than more than 280 physicians and 140 physician extenders to Texas Health Physicians Group. MedicalEdge brings several ancillary services to Texas Health, including sleep lab services, infusion services, diagnostic imaging and chiropractic services.

Texas Health also continues our community outreach with programs promoting prevention, wellness and community service.

Faith Community Nursing. Texas Health Harris Methodist Hospital Fort Worth pioneered the concept of faith community nursing within the Texas Health hospitals. This program integrates the practices of faith and nursing to improve the health of the communities we serve. Texas Health hospital chaplains and program nurse coordinators enter into a covenant relationship with a faith community's leader and a nurse within the congregation. Our hospitals have covenants with more than 60 faith communities to provide education on health services, wellness and disease prevention.

Disease Management and Education. From no-cost screening mammograms to diabetes education classes, each of our Texas Health Harris Methodist hospitals reach out to their communities through free or low-cost screenings to help catch health problems early. Additionally, classes to help manage diseases such as diabetes, heart health and other chronic diseases are available.

Community Service. Texas Health Resources employees are actively engaged in the community and provided more than 4,613 hours of community service in 2010. Texas Health provides our employees Community Time Off. This is paid time that gives employees an opportunity to serve the community through volunteer services without having to take time away from their vacation hours. Employees have volunteered at shelters, schools, food pantries, and more. In some areas, entire departments have spent the day serving the community together, which improves teamwork.

Texas Health Gives. The 2010 fall giving campaign broadened our horizons. While employees were still able to designate their favorite United Way Agencies, they were also offered a choice of selected non-profit agencies. These agencies included the American Cancer Society, American Heart Association, March of Dimes and Susan G. Komen for the Cure and were ranked by employees through

an annual survey of non-profits that align with Texas Health's key service lines and geographic area. More than \$1.08 million was donated by 3,882 employees to this year's campaign beneficiaries.

Texas Health Resources continues our commitment to integrating faith in our day-to-day work. As a faith-based health system, Texas Health provides our communities opportunities for spiritual guidance during difficult times.

Faith Community Leadership Summit. In its fifth year, the Faith Community Leadership Summit continues to offer faith leaders an opportunity to network and learn more about the role faith communities have in improving the health of people they serve. The theme of the most recent summit was "The Importance of Storytelling." More than 350 faith leaders, the largest number of attendees in five years, learned more about self care, sharing messages, and wellness.

Chaplains. Every Texas Health hospital has a chaplain available to serve patients in both joyous and difficult times. Chaplains do more than offer prayer. They offer companionship, counseling and silence in the midst of chaos to patients, family and staff.

Faith and Spirituality Integration Council. The Faith and Spirituality Integration Council comprises hospital presidents, system executives, physicians and nurse leaders representing all parts of Texas Health. Its charge is to strengthen Texas Health's faith-based vision and culture by helping leaders integrate faith and spirituality in all aspects of the organization.

The Council helps develop resources and implement programs to equip every person in Texas Health to understand and appreciate the role of faith and spirituality in health.

This is just a summary of how the people of Texas Health are serving their neighbors throughout North Texas. We believe strongly in helping our communities. This includes providing charity care and community benefits. In 2009 Texas Health Resources hospitals provided approximately \$275,000 a day in charity care. Including the cost of unreimbursed government-sponsored indigent care, the total increases to more than \$441,000 per day. With the unreimbursed cost of treating Medicare patients, the figure rises to more than \$1.5 million per day.

Texas Health hospitals are committed to our mission of improving the health of people in the communities we serve. We look forward to additional opportunities to help us fulfill that mission.

We ask for your prayers as we strive to live the humanity in health care, following the eternal example of the Great Physician.

Methodist Children's Home continues to press on toward our mission of offering hope to children, youth and families through a nurturing, Christian community. I am honored to have been selected as the tenth President of MCH in June 2010. When I accepted this position, I knew MCH has always had the potential to do great things for children and families. I assured our Board of Directors and United Methodist congregations throughout Texas and New Mexico that we would diligently work to find the highest and best use of the resources entrusted to us. In this process, MCH will continue to discover new and more effective ways to partner with local churches to reach hurting children, youth and their families. In order to do so, MCH must continually challenge ourselves and rely on the generosity of our friends in the Central Texas Annual Conference.

Our first step in this process was to participate in several accreditation reviews. I decided this would be an effective way to thoroughly examine our operations and services, and identify our strengths and new opportunities. I am confident Methodist Children's Home is meeting the highest best-practice standards as determined by the Council on Accreditation (COA) and Coalition for Residential Education (CORE). I am pleased with the hard work of our staff and volunteers who took on these duties in addition to their daily responsibilities serving our children.

At the same time, I worked with the MCH Board of Directors to commission a new strategic plan. The strategic priorities and goals of this five-year plan will enable our ministry to increase its impact on children and families across Texas and New Mexico. One of our goals is to develop new opportunities for MCH to work with churches to help meet needs in their communities and congregations. We received valuable input during our strategic planning process from our Commissioners, a group of clergy and laypersons who serve as advocates for Methodist Children's Home in their local churches.

As we focused on our recent growth and where we believe God is leading our ministry, I was made aware of troubling information about potential theft at MCH. I immediately contacted members of our Board of Directors, and we initiated an internal investigation and independent audit. I trust our actions will set a good example of integrity for our children, one of the more important qualities we help youth develop in their lives. I also hope our actions always honor the trust of benefactors like those we have in the Central Texas Annual Conference. I assure our many friends that my colleagues and I are working hard to make sure that if theft is confirmed, it will never happen again (particularly in this manner), no matter how complex the deception may turn out to be. I am convinced Methodist Children's Home will become a stronger organization as we learn from this unfortunate situation.

While many people want to focus on the investigation, the real story at Methodist Children's Home centers around the lives that are being changed. Supporters, like those we have in the Central Texas Annual Conference, help MCH do great things. Guided by our core values of Christian Principles, Relationships, Responsibility, Growth, Service and Hope, MCH provided services for nearly 1,600 children during the year. In addition to our work through residential campuses in Waco and Waxahachie, we also increased the services offered through our Waco Outreach Office that serves the Central Texas Annual Conference.

The future will provide the Home with as many, if not more, opportunities to positively impact the lives of children, youth and families. Today, the mission of Methodist Mission Home is to offer hope to individuals facing spiritually, emotionally and physically challenging circumstances, so they may lead enriched, rewarding and satisfying lives. Through professional guidance and compassionate support, teens and young women facing unplanned pregnancy and families considering adoption make mutually beneficial decisions. Through transitional education including life skills and vocational training, young adults with disabilities and those who are deaf develop confidence and competence to reach their personal level of independent living. MMH fulfills this mission through the following programs:

Adoption Services has placed 5,763 children into loving homes through domestic, older child, and international adoptions. We provide counseling for birth parents and adoptive families throughout the adoption process. Our maternity services include campus housing for pregnant teens and young women considering adoption. Post-adoption counseling is available for birth parents, adoptive families, and adoptive children. MMH provides adoption education to teach teens and the professionals who work with at-risk youth about the alternatives to parenting – adoption

The Southwest Center for Higher Independence (SCHI) For many teens, graduation from high school means moving on to college. For students with multiple disabilities, college is not always the next step. For these young adults, ages 18 and older, SCHI is the next step. Established in 1974, SCHI was founded as a transitional education center for people who were deaf and hard of hearing. Today, our services have expanded to accommodate more diverse disabilities, including high functioning MR, autism, Asbergers, cerebral palsy, and learning disorders. SCHI has assisted hundreds of young adults with disabilities in learning the vocational and life skills to achieve their personal best.

The Genesis Cooperative is a self-supporting collaboration of five nonprofit agencies on the MMH campus serving youth and young adults with disabilities, pregnant teens and young women, women recovering from substance abuse and their children, and adults who are deaf/blind.

The Central Texas Conference created Wesleyan Homes 56 years ago and Wesleyan Homes first opened its doors in 1962. The Wesleyan at Scenic opened in 1978 and was expanded in 1986 and 2000 and now has 220 beds. 2008 marked a milestone when the original Wesleyan Retirement Home was sold and a new 124 apartment independent living retirement facility opened on a 40 acre campus called the Wesleyan at Estrella. In April of 2011, a new 60 apartment assisted living facility opened on the Estrella Campus.

The Central Texas Conference elects Wesleyan's Board and our charitable support for resident care comes from the churches of the Central Texas Conference as well as from individual donors. We give thanks to God for the faithfulness of the Church as it supports Wesleyan Homes through the Mother's Day Offering and through volunteers serving the Wesleyan residents in a myriad of ways.

The Ministry of Wesleyan Homes

In all our facilities and in all the ways we serve, Wesleyan Homes through its chaplains, its community volunteers and its partnership with local churches is a Christian ministry, extending the mercy, healing and love of Christ to those we serve. We work with elders, their families and church and community volunteers to build Christian community. Our new independent living campus off Williams Drive in Georgetown opened in January, 2008. All 124 apartments were soon occupied. As we begin 2011 we still have a waiting list of over 200 persons, as The Wesleyan at Estrella sets the pace for senior adult communities in Central Texas.

A 60 apartment assisted Living facility on the new Wesleyan at Estrella's 40 acre campus adds to the continuum of care. It offers personal assistance to those who can still live with supportive services in a residential setting. 20 of its apartments are on a specially designed memory support wing.

Wesleyan Hospice

In 2008, Wesleyan Hospice expanded to begin serving home-based hospice clients as well as residents in our skilled nursing facility in Georgetown, The Wesleyan at Scenic. This aspect of our ministry, dealing specifically with those nearing death, adds greatly to our ministry's commitment to provide compassionate care.

MENTAL HEALTH CONCERNS

The Mental Health Concerns Committee provides training in mental health education for laity and clergy at the local, district, and conference levels. During 2010 the following training and resources were provided:

Depression: Understanding Help and Hope--Rev. Tony Campbell, Depression Connection Team; presentations in nine local churches (Smithfield, FUMC Waxahachie, Aledo, Davis Memorial, Saginaw, Springtown, Aldersgate, Godley, Campus Drive)

Suicide Survivors: The Healing Journey After Loss—an eight-week program facilitated by a trained professional and a survivor, followed by additional monthly support meetings; open to the CTC

Train-the-Trainer Self Care Covenant Workshops—Rev. Beverly Gillam, Rev. Bobby Cullen, Mona Dunkin

Mental health information and referral consultation for 75 individuals, provided by Rev. Tony Campbell, Depression Connection Team

The Mental Health Concerns Committee continues to be available for consultation and for funding for district and local church education regarding mental health issues. Training is provided without charge to the local church for Stephen Ministry volunteers or any interested local church group.

HUNGER TASK FORCE

The Hunger Task Force continued to support the establishment and expansion of food ministries within churches of the Central Texas Conference through the hunger grant program. Donations to the previous year's Thanksgiving Offering fund grants for the following year. We were thrilled with the generosity of congregations upon receiving over \$17,000 in 2010 from churches within the Central Texas to fight hunger. Ninety percent of the offering remained within the conference to fund church hunger ministries distributed through grants with the remaining ten percent going to the Haitian Creole Pig Project.. The Haitian Creole Pig Project supplies poor farmers with a pair of piglets, male and female, as a source of increased revenue and food. The Task Force also developed a two-week curriculum for Sunday school and small group study called *Hunger: The Enemy at the Table: A Bible Study on Hunger*. The study is designed to be offered two weeks preceding the Thanksgiving Offering but is appropriate for year-round. The curriculum focus is information on hunger in Texas, America and the global community and explores our response to it as Christians choosing each day to walk in the way of Christ. Teacher instructions are provided as are a number of handouts to be distributed

during class and option devotionals during the week. While the course requires no advance preparation for class, the devotional materials will deepen the experience of the study. The study was placed on the conference website and remains available for download.

REFUGEE AND IMMIGRATION MINISTRIES

The Refugee & Immigration Ministries Task Force serves as liaison between the conference and local churches in an effort to maintain Christ's ministry of hope and of justice as educators and advocates for the sojourner in our midst. There are several opportunities for sharing God's love in the Refugee Immigration Ministries.

One is the support and advocacy for refugees as they come to our area to begin a new life that is free from the dangers and the oppression experienced in their previous homes. This support takes many forms, including gifts of time, resources, presence and prayers. There are different levels of commitment needed by local congregations, ranging from partial preliminary support by providing gently used household items to full co-sponsorship with Refugee Services of Texas for a minimum of six months as the family adjusts to life in our conference.

Another focus is Justice for Our Neighbors (JFON) which is a program that provides high-quality immigration legal services to low-income immigrants. JFON also fosters greater cross-cultural community building and raises awareness about U.S. immigration policies through education for mission and advocacy. The conference local JFON office is located at Polytechnic United Methodist Church in Fort Worth. Volunteers are always eagerly welcomed to help answer phones, do general office tasks, complete paperwork, and simply be the smiling face and welcoming arms of Christ. Volunteers need not be bilingual.

A third opportunity to welcome the stranger (Matthew 25) is through the WIN Welcoming Immigrants Network. WIN is a faith-based network of caring people who reach out in love to immigrants in the United States. WIN began as a United Methodist movement, and still claims those roots by use of the United Methodist "Welcoming the Migrant to the United States" resolution as a guiding document.

Today, as an interfaith organization, WIN openly embraces persons of many denominations and faiths, and claims the "Interfaith Platform on Humane Immigration Reform" as another guiding document. Anywhere the welcoming spirit lives, WIN belongs. Members of WIN are advocates for the immigrants among us, taking action both socially and politically to bring Christ's love to life for the vulnerable and powerless.

URBAN MINISTRIES

- Central Texas Senior Ministry - Nurtures and affirms older persons empowering them to strive for continued growth and personal development through programs that encourage intergenerational relationships, connections with peer groups, and associations with the community support network.
- Crowley House of Hope - Provides families and individuals within the Crowley Independent School District with emergency assistance in the form of food, clothing and financial aid for utilities, shelter, healthcare and medication.

- H.O.P.E Tutoring - Provides free tutoring to 3rd-8th grade students in the Arlington Independent School District helping countless students be successful in school and later in careers by providing them with educational resources they might not otherwise have received and fostering in them a desire to learn.
- Arlington Urban Ministries - Offers medical transportation, food, shelter and emergency assistance to families and individuals in need within the city of Arlington.
- Crime Victims Council - Assists individuals and families affected by poverty and crime by providing services and networking with other agencies at no cost to the clients.
- Bridges of the Spirit Institute - Provides training opportunities to prepare individuals in the Central Texas Conference to develop dynamic, spirit-led bridge building ministries with the Latino community.
- Black Church Convocation - Focused on rejuvenating African American UM Churches and their leaders so that they can effectively reach out to and serve their communities.

The total student population is 25% US ethnic minority, 9% international, and 52% women. Forty-six denominations are represented, with 52% of MDiv students being United Methodist. The median age of our entering class of MDiv students is 26, with 57% of total enrollment under thirty.

To ensure that our students are prepared for leadership in an increasingly global context, Candler continues its emphasis on internationalizing the curriculum. This fall, Rev. Dr. Beauty Maenzanise, dean of the theology faculty at Africa University in Zimbabwe, joined us as the 2010-11 McDonald Chair in the Study of Jesus and Culture, and the Rev. Dr. Margot Kaessmann, former head of the 14 million-

member Protestant church in Germany, joined us for a semester as visiting Theologian-in-Residence. This year, Candler has academic exchange partnerships with theology schools across five continents and nine countries, including many related to The United Methodist Church. In addition to our ongoing summer internship program with the Methodist Church in the Bahamas, Candler once again partnered with International Relief and Development, Inc., to send eight student interns as far as Cambodia and as near as Gulfport, Miss., to address a broad range of issues, including democracy and governance, HIV/AIDS, child poverty and mortality, and community development. Travel seminars in 2010-2011 include the Middle East Travel Seminar in May-June and World Methodist Evangelism Institute evangelism seminars to the Philippines, India, and Colombia.

A hallmark of the Candler MDiv experience, the two-year Contextual Education program shapes our students' pastoral identities by interweaving service at ministry sites and churches with academic analysis in the classroom and spiritual reflection in pastor-led small groups. In any given week, Candler deploys more than 250 ConEd students throughout the region to minister to people in congregations, hospitals, and social service agencies. This year, we will expand Candler Advantage, a program designed to pay rising third-year MDiv students for summer internships in congregations so they can concentrate fully on honing their pastoral skills beyond the first two years of ConEd.

Candler's Lifelong Learning events strengthen the church by providing opportunities for clergy and lay leaders to learn more about the practice of ministry. Fall Conference 2010 focused on conflict transformation; the spring event featured poet, author, and funeral director Tom Lynch along with Candler's own Tom Long, addressing "The Good Funeral." The 2011 Fall Conference highlights "The Art of Preaching in the 21st Century," with a chance to learn from some of the most respected names in preaching.

In addition to our Lifelong Learning events, Candler oversees the educational process of more than 900 people each year through the Course of Study regional school and our five extension schools in the Southeast.

Despite today's challenging economic climate, Candler remains committed to making theological education financially possible for our students. Although our operating budget essentially remained flat this year, we increased our total financial aid investment to over \$5 million. Eighty-three percent of eligible students received Candler-based financial aid, with the average award covering 76 percent of tuition. In March, we hosted our third annual Leadership Candler event, an all-expenses-paid discernment experience that draws together top prospective MDiv students to explore the richness of life and study at Candler as they are considered for 30 top scholarships. In addition, Candler won a grant from the Carpenter Foundation to offer financial management training to our students. The grant also sponsored the public lecture series, "Simple Enough?" to explore

the relationship between financial and spiritual well-being. Featured speakers were popular United Methodist pastors and authors Adam Hamilton and Paul Escamilla.

Our esteemed faculty continues to distinguish itself at the highest levels. Dr. Luke Johnson won the prestigious Grawemeyer award in religion, Dr. Carol Newsom received a Luce grant from the Association of Theological Schools, and Dr. Jacob Wright received a medal of honor from the Collège de France in Paris. In addition to their achievements in scholarship and teaching, faculty members continually demonstrate their dedication to the church through preaching and teaching engagements and service in parishes both local and across the country and world.

We celebrate the outstanding achievements of two of our United Methodist faculty as they retire this year: Dr. Russ Richey and Dr. Brooks Holifield. Both are highly regarded for their extraordinary work in their areas of expertise—the history of Methodism and American Christianity, respectively—and for their service to our denomination, both at the local and national levels.

Candler draws considerable vitality and inspiration from its relationship with The United Methodist Church. Our ability to fulfill our mission of *educating faithful and creative leaders for the church's ministries in the world* depends upon your support, gifts, and prayers. 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MISSION

Huston-Tillotson University helps the Central Texas Annual Conference achieve its mission and vision through our own mission to provide the University's diverse student body with an exemplary education that is grounded in the liberal arts and sciences, balanced with professional development, and directed to public service and leadership.

The University prepares students with the integrity and civility to thrive in a diverse society, fosters spiritual development, preserves and promotes interest in the accomplishments and experiences of the University's historic constituents and evolving populations, and creates and sustains supportive relationships that advance the Huston-Tillotson University community. We achieve our mission through the diversity of our student body, the global perspective of our educational programs, and the defined opportunities for spiritual growth and civic engagement.

UNIVERSITY PROFILE**Enrollment**

Huston-Tillotson University reached a twenty-eight year enrollment high with 901 students enrolling in the fall of 2010. Segmentation of our student population by gender reveals an important factor regarding male enrollment. Our overall student population was balanced in terms of gender and consisted of 446 males (50%) and 455 females (50%); this is significant because many universities report decreases in male student enrollment, while our student population remains relatively balanced. The number of first-time, first year freshmen students mirrors the gender breakdown of the larger student population. The first-year, first-time freshmen population consisted of 135 males (50%) and 135 females (50%).

The racial/ethnic composition of our student population is as follows: Hispanic – 19%; White, non-Hispanic – 6%; Multiracial – <1%; Nonresident Alien – 3%; Unreported – 1%; and Black, non-Hispanic – 72%.

Faculty

In the fall of 2010, the University employed 47 full-time faculty members. The race/ethnic composition of the faculty is as follows: Hispanic – 11%; White, non-Hispanic – 43%; American Indian– 2%; Asian/Pacific Islander – 4%; Black, non-Hispanic – 40%. Thirty-three members of our faculty (70%) have the terminal degree in their teaching field.

PRESIDENTIAL AND INSTITUTIONAL ADVANCEMENT ACTIVITIES

The number of incoming freshmen male students continues to climb. Yet, the six-year graduation rate of for females continues to exceed that of their male counterparts. In response, the HT President's Male Initiative on Learning and Excellence (President's MILE), founded during the fall 2008 semester, provides a means of ensuring student success in college as well as persistence to graduation. The President's MILE seeks to create a unique set of deliberate learning experiences that motivate academic and personal success, emphasizing learning experiences that focus on addressing greater awareness of students' academic talents, strengths, and aspirations. During the fall 2010 semester, the President's MILE program was renamed the President's Male Achievement and Persistence (MAP) program to more succinctly capture the aims of the programs.

HT's President and CEO Larry L. Earvin, Ph.D. was honored with the Core Values Award for Perseverance presented by Atlantic Trust during the spring 2011 semester. The award recognizes Austin citizens who embody the nine core values taught by First Tee. First Tee of greater Austin is a non-profit mentoring program committed to enriching the lives of young people through the game of golf. HT's Pre-Alumni Council won the UNCF 2011 National Pre-Alumni Barbara Marshall Council of the Year award during the 65th National Alumni Council/53rd National Pre-Alumni Council Leadership Conference in Birmingham, Alabama

during the spring 2011 semester. The National Alumni Council is a sponsored organization of the United Negro College Fund (UNCF). HT's Pre-Alumni Council, with more than 40 student members, fosters school pride and loyalty while managing fund-raising campaigns that promote life-long giving in support of their alma mater.

The Office of Institutional Advancement continues to be active with grant development activity in order to meet campus needs. One of the University's major initiatives, the 8th Annual President's MASKED Scholarship Gala, is scheduled for March 5, 2011.

Additionally, HT celebrated its 135th Year Anniversary during October 2010. A four-day celebration with a focus on health and wellness dominated the HT landscape during the 135th anniversary of Austin's oldest institution of higher education. Activist and author Susan L. Taylor served as the inspirational guest speaker during the Charter Day Convocation on October 22, 2010. In addition to the annual Charter Day Convocation, the celebration included a health and wellness symposium, a site location ceremony for the new HT health and wellness center, Center for Religious Life donor remembrance, programs at First United Methodist Church and Wesley United Methodist Church, and historical exhibits at the Downs-Jones Library and the George Washington Carver Museum and Cultural Center.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

College of Arts and Sciences (CAS)

Student Development

The College of Arts and Sciences continues to strengthen the academic preparation of its students through the creation of new outlets for scholarly, creative endeavors. HT's new literary journal, *900 Chicon*, launched last year, publishes high quality literary works of HT students that includes poems, fiction, creative non-fiction, images, and video. The journal is guided by Mike Hart, Assistant Professor of English in the **Department of Humanities and Fine Arts**.

The CAS also continues the academic and leadership preparation of its students through the continued support of established student organizations, which include the Pi Gamma Mu Honor Society, Sociology Association, Psychology Club, and HIV Peer Educators. The organizations continue to receive advisement and support from faculty members in the **Department of Social and Behavioral Sciences**.

In response to a need to enhance students' mathematical skills development, The ACADEMY, which was established to provide intensive and active instruction to students in foundational math courses, continues to achieve its mission. ACADEMY is an acronym for Achievement in College Algebra During thE Matriculation Year, and the goal of The ACADEMY is to equip students with the

conceptual understanding and computational proficiency for success in the foundational mathematics courses, specifically MATH0330- Introduction to Algebra and MATH1314- College Algebra. The ACADEMY is housed in the **Department of Natural Sciences and Mathematics**.

During the spring 2010 semester, the Alternative Teacher Certification Program (ATCP) recognized twenty-seven new teachers at the second annual Certification Celebration held April 22, 2010. The new teachers earned certification in fifteen different fields including elementary education, special education, high school and middle school English, social studies, science, and math, music, physical education, and bilingual education. The ATCP program prepares individuals who have already earned at least a bachelor's degree to become teachers through a rigorous course of study accredited by the State Board of Educator Certification. The ATCP program is housed within the **Department of Educator Preparation**.

Student Research Initiatives

Departments in the College of Arts and Sciences are continuing to focus on activities that aid student learning through inquiry, discovery, and publishing. As an outcome, students presented their research, via poster and platform presentations, during the Fifth Annual Research Day Symposium, which was held on April 22, 2010. The event was sponsored by the College of Arts and Sciences and the School of Business and Technology. Plans for the 3rd edition of the HT Research Journal, which will contain works presented by students at during the Research Day Symposium, are already underway. Additionally, plans are currently on track for the Sixth Annual Research Day Symposium.

Students at HT and U.T. at Austin are continuing the joint Tree of Life project which is research designed to identify species' relationships using DNA technology. Additionally, HT students are continually encouraged to pursue Foreign Service careers in the US Department of State, US AID, Peace Corps and through other agencies.

Community Involvement

The Austin Pre-Freshmen Engineering Program (AusPREP) experienced tremendous success during this past summer when 101 local middle and high school students enrolled in the summer program. The students received instruction in math and science, participated in hands-on scientific exercises in rocketry and robotics, and made field trips to the Johnson Space Center and various scientific sites. The program also included career awareness lectures focusing on career opportunities in science and engineering.

Using grant funds from the United States Department of Education for Math and Science Initiatives, HT continues its Saturday STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) Academy. This program currently enrolls Austin area high school students in forensic science and math instruction as well as provides opportunities to engage in discussions about science degree programs at HT and opportunities for joint degrees in engineering.

Faculty Development

HT faculty members continue to be actively involved in faculty development programs. In June 2010, eight faculty members attended the New York University Faculty Development summer workshops, which provided attendees the opportunity to participate in intensive week-long seminars with colleagues from institutions across the county. HT faculty members participated in seminars focused on a wide range of topics, including geopolitics, service learning, civic education, and the philosophy of forgiveness, just to name a few.

Three faculty members participated in the winter 2010 NYU faculty development seminar. Faculty members also continue to make significant strides in grant writing.

Selected Faculty Research

HT History professor, Dr. Elaine Hutson, received a Henry C. McBay Research Fellowship in the amount of \$12,000 to support her original research, "Is there an African Diaspora in the Middle East?" This highly competitive fellowship program, managed by the UNCF, was awarded to Dr. Hutson during the summer of 2010. HT History professor, Dr. Janice Sumler-Edmond, continued the book signing and promotion of her newly released fascinating and intriguing biography entitled "The Secret Trust of Aspasia Cruvellier-Mirault: The Life and Trials of a Free Woman of Color in Antebellum Georgia."

School of Business and Technology (SBT)**Student Development**

The School of Business and Technology (SBT) continues to encourage its students to pursue graduate and professional studies in order to experience the myriad benefits of increased educational attainment. Last year, six SBT graduates completed requirements for their Master's degrees. These students join several other SBT graduates who have successfully completed graduate study since 2005.

Students also have the opportunity to participate in the Study Abroad Program. The SBT offers a short-term summer study abroad program in the Dominican Republic. During the summer of 2010, fifteen students participated in the program, earned up to six credit hours, and participated in a host of academic and extra-curricular activities.

Fulbright Scholar

HT was awarded a Fulbright Scholar for the academic year 2010-2011. Dr. K'Aol, from Kenya, will assist the Department of Business Administration with writing grant proposals and teaching two courses during the spring 2011 semester. Dr. K'Aol earned his Ph.D. in Entrepreneurship. In addition to his teaching duties, Dr. K'Aol will serve as a representative of HT at international events and activities in the local community.

Engaging Students

HT Computer Science professor, Dr. Hershall J. Shelley, facilitated the Extensible Undergraduate Research in Communications Applications (EURECA) program for interested students to gain exposure to mechanical, electrical, and computer engineering.

Student Services***Religious Life and Campus Ministry***

The Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry continues to actively assist the Student Affairs Unit to meet its mission by continuing to provide an ecumenical ministry that acknowledges the spiritual needs of all students at the University. University Chapel Hour, held each Thursday, continues to include speakers who are clergy members from diverse backgrounds. HT students also participate in a number of spiritual development programming, which includes spiritual retreats, weekly Sister Connection (Women's Bible Study) and weekly Brothers of Fellowship (Men's Bible Study) meetings.

The Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry continues to enjoy their new facility, which is across the street from the main campus entry. The new and improved location provides increased space for student development and additional meeting space for weekly programmatic initiatives. The welcome reception for the fall 2010 cohort of incoming W.E.B. DuBois Scholars was held in the new center and Reverend Donald Brewington, University Chaplain, served as host for the event.

Additionally, the Office of Religious Life and Campus Ministry hosted the 4th Annual Bishop Ernest T. Dixon Lecture on January 27th, 2011, which also launched HT's Black History Month celebrations. The speaker for the 4th Bishop Ernest T. Dixon Lecturer was Rev. Dr. Rodney T. Smothers from Oxon Hill, Maryland. Rev. Dr. Smothers is currently Pastor of the St. Paul United Methodist Church in Oxon Hill, Maryland and a Path 1 Mentor Coach for New Church Development for the General Board of Discipleship of The United Methodist Church. He has served as Adjunct Professor at The Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta, Georgia and as Adjunct Lecturer at Howard University School of Divinity in Washington, D.C.

AVID at HT

HT joins the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and Texas Association of Developing Colleges as a pilot institution for the AVID Post-Secondary Initiative. Introduced in 1986 for secondary education California, AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination) is a pedagogy designed to improve the quality of teaching and learning for "middle" students through the use of active learning strategies and a focus on writing, instruction, collaboration in the classroom, student organization skills, and academic rigor (WICOR). Identified by the institution, "middle" students are generally those who have the basic academic ability to succeed, but who are in need of additional support to

overcome low expectations educational barriers. AVID's WICOR strategies are designed to teach critical thinking, writing and public speaking skills, logic, debate, and organization in an academically rigorous environment. The AVID first-year seminar, open to all incoming freshmen, will launch during the upcoming fall 2011 semester.

Counseling and Consultation Center (CCC)

The Counseling and Consultation Center continues to help the Student Affairs Unit meet its mission by helping students with their personal concerns so that they can meet the daily challenges of student life. Staffed by an experienced psychotherapist, the center is open daily for students in need of assistance. Students are encouraged to make an appointment, but walk-ins are welcome when there is availability. Greater awareness of the benefits of counseling has been promoted through focused programming. Moreover, HT's ability to respond to distressed students has improved via the Behavioral Intervention Plan and Team, led by the Director of the Counseling and Consultation Center.

The Office of Disability Services, housed within the CCC, continues to provide needed supportive services for HT students with disabilities. The center is staffed by an experienced, full-time Disabilities Services Coordinator.

Career and Graduate Development Center (C&GDC)

The Career and Graduate Development Center continues to develop and update services and resources available to HT students, alumni and employers. The C&GDC Fall 2010 Career Expo was held in September of 2010. To assist students with the HT mission of preparing students for success, upwards of 40 employers attended for the fourth year in a row and presented to students information related to who they are, what they do, and why HT students should consider present and future part-time, internship, and full-time employment with these organizations in the future.

The C&GDC Fall 2010 Graduate and Professional School Fair, held October 2010, allowed students to explore information, scholarships, and fellowships related to attending graduate and professional schools upon matriculation from HT. Over twenty-two colleges, universities and professional schools attended.

The C&GDC collaborated with the Office of Disability Services to host a Disability Awareness Fair attended by 17 agencies and organizations with the primary goal of allowing students to learn more about the difficulties facing students living with and attending school with disabilities.

Student Health Services

The HT Health Connection e-health community empowerment program continues to collaborate with other community based organizations to empower our campus and underserved populations in our community with health information from the National Library of Medicine. The program objective is to provide participants with

the basic background knowledge and information about racial disparities in health and health care. Participants are trained to conduct informational sessions that enhance consumer awareness. Consumers are informed about the following through online health access: HIV/AIDS, Heart Disease, Cancer, Mental Health and Diabetes. Informed consumers will benefit by having a better quality of life.

Athletics

Huston-Tillotson University Athletics continues to meet its mission by providing opportunities for competition in intercollegiate athletics while ensuring an atmosphere that emphasizes academic and athletic excellence. We continually strive to ensure that all of our student-athletes are “Champions of Character” and model the values of Respect, Responsibility, Integrity, Sportsmanship, and Servant Leadership. The Athletic Department is committed to the principle that participation in athletics is integral to the total educational process, as well as to the personal growth of each student-athlete. HT is a member of the NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) and the Red River Athletic Conference (RRAC).

The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is composed of 12 intercollegiate sports (men’s and women’s indoor and outdoor track, men’s cross-country, women’s volleyball, softball, baseball, men’s and women’s basketball, and men’s and women’s soccer) Intercollegiate Athletics currently serves 253 student-athletes, approximately 28% of the student body. HT student athletes continue to excel both inside and outside of the classroom. During the fall 2010 semester, the cumulative GPA of student athletes was 2.43.

Saint Paul School of Theology is a seminary of the United Methodist Church that educates leaders to make disciples for Jesus Christ, renew the Church, and transform the world. We are one institution with two campuses, a free-standing seminary campus in Kansas City and a university partnership seminary on the campus of Oklahoma City University.

During the 2010-2011 academic year, 214 students from 26 annual conferences, 24 denominations and 7 countries were enrolled in degree programs at Saint Paul School of Theology in Kansas City. Fifty-four students were enrolled in the Master of Divinity program at Saint Paul at Oklahoma City University. The Course of Study School at Saint Paul served 311 students from 22 annual conferences. Classes took place in Kansas City, Missouri, and for the first time two courses were offered in Springfield, Missouri. Course of Study classes will begin on the

Saint Paul at Oklahoma City University campus in the fall of 2011.

Saint Paul School of Theology at Oklahoma City University will celebrate its first commencement convocation in 2011. The first graduating class of Master of Divinity students will be hooded in a special ceremony in August on the Oklahoma City University campus. Each graduate will have completed 90 hours of study.

Sixteen South Korean students graduated in May from the Korean Doctor of Ministry Track in Wesleyan Spirituality and Congregational Renewal. The international program included teaching by Methodist professors from the United States and South Korea. Class sessions took place in the U.S., England, and South Korea. A second Korean DMin track began in January 2011.

A Doctor of Ministry cohort track focusing on Revitalizing Congregations is slated to begin January 2012. It will focus on biblical preaching, vibrant and meaningful worship, visionary leadership, diverse communities, social justice, and contextual ministry. The DMin track relates directly to the United Methodist Council of Bishops initiatives (the "Four Foci") for the Church.

The Saint Paul youTheology program expanded to include youth from the Lydia Patterson Institute in El Paso, Texas. It will start a new pod in Nebraska in 2011. YouTheology is funded primarily by Lilly Endowment, Inc. for youth to continue to explore their faith and calling through worship, service, study, travel, and a mentoring relationship.

It was the third year for Laity School of Theology. Each Laity School Saturday Session was taught by seminary faculty and presented in an accessible manner. Lay attendees came from diverse ecumenical and educational backgrounds. Topics included worship, Bible, ethics, church history, and theology. Laity School was offered in Missouri and Oklahoma.

The seminary restructured its continuing education lectures to become Community Reads. Students, faculty, staff and outside guests were encouraged to read topical books such as *No Rising Tide* by Joerg Rieger and *Pedagogy of the Bible: An Analysis and a Proposal* by Dr. Dale Martin. Community Reads cultivated early discussion and provoked deeper questioning during author lectures.

Saint Paul at OCU held its second LEAD seminar on the Oklahoma City University campus. The seminar covered topics to improve and strengthen ministerial leadership. The seminars are a collaborative educational project of the Oklahoma Area of the United Methodist Church, Oklahoma City University, and Saint Paul.

A. Major Accomplishments

Perkins School of Theology exists because we are missionally driven “as a community devoted to theological study and to teaching in the service of the church of Jesus Christ ... to prepare women and men for faithful leadership in Christian ministry” (from the *SMU: Perkins School of Theology 2009-2011 Catalog*, p. 9).

A vital recognition of our mission-driven commitment occurred in 2010, when the Association of Theological Schools (ATS) renewed our accreditation for another 10 years.

In a meeting with one of our senior administrative directors during the ATS site visit, the discussion turned to the challenges facing us in the second decade of the twenty-first century. Some of those challenges are well-known: we are a denominationally affiliated school in a post-denominational era; we are a university-based school in an anti-intellectual era; and we are dependent on earnings from endowments and gifts from individuals whose capacity to generate revenue has been significantly impacted by the great recession. During the discussion, one of the ATS visitors made this observation: “You probably do not realize how many theological school administrators across North America would gladly trade places with you now.”

One of the things that we learned through the review process, from the first steps in drafting the self-study to the final actions of bidding the visiting team goodbye, was the unbreakable connection between our mission as a school and the professional or academic activities we conduct as a school. Everything derives from that mission: our curriculum, our hiring decisions about faculty and staff, our admission procedures for recruiting and matriculating students, our standards of conduct, our placement goals for those who complete programs of study toward Perkins degrees, our public advertising, our non-degree programming, our budgeting process, and our self-assessments. In that regard, we are tremendously blessed.

B. Opportunities, Plans and Challenges

1. **Faculty.** The productivity of the Perkins faculty is impressive both in qualitative and quantitative published work. The leadership that members of our faculty provide in academic guilds continues to grow. When we evaluate faculty members' achievements each semester, we view teaching as equal in importance to research. And at the end of their degree programs, when students submit their responses to the graduation survey, they consistently identify the faculty as the first or second most important facet of their experience at Perkins.

We keep these things clearly in mind as we embark upon searches for new colleagues. Searches in worship and in theology began in 2010 to replace our

retiring colleagues, Marjorie Procter-Smith (LeVan Professor of Preaching and Worship) and Charles Wood (Lehman Professor of Christian Doctrine). It will be challenging to meet all of our own expectations for excellence in scholarship and teaching in these two positions.

We have been both committed to a policy of enhancing diversity on the faculty and careful in our processes for making new appointments to the faculty. Here are some data points:

At the rank of associate professor, we have achieved gender equity, for we have exactly the same number of women as men ranked as tenured associate professors;

Among our tenured professors, approximately one-third are identified as ethnic minority or non-white – which means that, in ethnicity, the faculty is leading the diversification of the school even more rapidly than the student body.

2. Facilities. The massive attention that we have given to improving our facilities during the past several years was actually necessitated by our own mission. By attending to these extensive improvements in the buildings where we work, we have strengthened our means for engaging in theological study and teaching to prepare women and men for faithful leadership in Christian ministry. These improvements also include making Perkins' facilities fully accessible and LEED certified. (LEED certification is the recognized standard for measuring building sustainability in terms of environmental responsibility.)

During the planning process for the construction of Prothro Hall and the renovation of both Kirby and Seelman Halls, we made a commitment to the University that by the end of fiscal year 2010 (May 31, 2010) we would have sufficient cash and pledges to cover the total. I was very pleased to report to the President and the Provost of the University that we reached that goal. However, while we have celebrated the completion of construction and fund raising, the critical task of collecting the dollars pledged still remains for the coming years.

3. Formative Scholarship. At the University commencement in the spring of 2010, approximately one-third of all the doctoral degrees awarded at SMU went to men and women from the Graduate Program in Religious Studies. The GPRS, a cooperative program of Perkins School of Theology and SMU's Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences, has long been the highest rated Ph.D. program on the SMU campus. The GPRS also marked its fortieth anniversary since the first Ph.D. was awarded through the GPRS in 1970.

One of our strategic plan goals is to secure the future of the program by finding permanent endowments to support adequate student stipends. We have succeeded in getting multi-year gifts from individuals who are committed to the program and some additional annual support from the Provost as well as from the Associate Vice President for Research and Dean of Graduate Studies. These

contributions, together with some funds from a Luce Foundation grant to the Latino Center and from the Ministerial Education Fund of The United Methodist Church, have made our stipends reasonably competitive for first-rate doctoral students. But the only way to ensure the excellence of the program is to have permanently endowed support.

Two other events of note in the GPRS this year involve structural relationships and student admissions.

Perkins now occupies a seat at the table as a charter member of the Hispanic Theological Initiative Consortium. Among the other institutions represented are Emory, Fuller, Princeton Theological Seminary, and about seven more.

The GPRS welcomed Julian Gonzalez, its first doctoral candidate funded through the Luce grant to the Center for the Study of Latino/a Christianity and Religions.

All Perkins students continue to benefit from the exceptional faculty and staff of Bridwell Library and its substantial resources.

4. Finances. Beginning in 2010 and continuing through 2012, each unit of SMU has had to develop a budget plan that takes necessary reductions. For us at Perkins, the first of those three years we managed to take a cut of about 2.2% without noticeably affecting any of our operations. No staff position had to be eliminated. No employees were terminated. No research or travel funds were reduced.

But next year, we expect to have to take another cut of similar size. And again, preparing for the year after that, we expect to have to add a similar cut. By the time we finish absorbing the impact of the great recession, we will have had to make reductions totaling about 6.7%.

5. Enrollment. Data compiled recently by the Association of Theological Schools show the total enrollment in all ATS schools for the M. Div. degree, which is designed for persons who feel called to the professional ministry of the church, has declined by about five percent. Nevertheless, in the fall of 2010, we recruited an entering master's class that is 27% larger than the one in 2009. Additionally, counting the students who are enrolled in our Singapore D.Min. cohort, we have 15 new D.Min. students this year. For the sake of our mission, we will need the commitment of our friends and partners to the ongoing task of continuing to recruit outstanding cohorts of students.

C. Conclusion

The state of our school is strong. But so are the challenges facing us. I recently spent one evening a week leading a home Bible study with a group of folks, more than half of whom I did not know until the Bible study began. We read the book of Esther together. One memorable evening we dealt with the verse

where Mordecai tries to persuade Esther that her silence will not provide her with safety. Then he pleads with her through a rhetorical question and comment: "Who knows? Perhaps you have been put in this position for just such a time as this."

Perhaps the state of our school is strong for just such a time as this.

As SMU celebrates the centennial of its founding in 1911 by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and its opening in 1915, the University continues to rise in national prominence. The past year has been marked by exciting developments. Highlights follow:

SMU's total fall 2010 enrollment was 10,938, including 6,192 undergraduates, 3,372 graduate students and 1,374 professional (theology and law) students. The ethnic minority enrollment makes up 22.6 percent of the student body. SMU's fall 2010 enrollment included a record number of 1,052 international students from 94 countries.

SMU Unbridled: The Second Century Campaign, launched in 2008, is the largest fund-raising effort in the University's history, with a goal of \$750 million. Gifts to date have exceeded \$464 million, providing funds for 211 new scholarships; 17 new endowed academic positions; 12 new institutes, centers and other academic initiatives; support for two schools and one academic department; and 13 new or renovated facilities.

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has raised SMU's classification to a research university with "high research activity," reflecting the University's dramatic increase in research. SMU is ranked 56th among the 260 best national universities by *U.S. News & World Report*.

SMU's Dallas campus has grown to 90 buildings and 230 acres. In 2010 SMU dedicated the new Caruth Hall in the Bobby B. Lyle School of Engineering and the Annette Caldwell Simmons Hall, home of the Annette Caldwell Simmons School of Education and Human Development. Construction has begun on the George W. Bush Presidential Center, consisting of a library, museum and independent institute. The Center is expected to open in early 2013.

William M. Tsutsui is new dean of Dedman College of Humanities and Sciences. Formerly associate dean for international studies at the University of Kansas, he is a specialist in modern Japanese business and economic history.

The new Hunter and Stephanie Hunt Institute for Engineering and Humanity in Bobby B. Lyle School of Engineering pairs technological innovation with business collaboration to improve conditions for the global poor.

The Embrey Human Rights Program is one of the fastest growing programs at SMU, with 179 students in the pipeline to graduate with a human rights minor. An important component of the program is travel to worldwide sites of major human rights abuses.

News of Perkins School of Theology

SMU's Graduate Program in Religious Studies is ranked in the top 10 of doctoral programs in theology and religion in North America.

Enrollment of students seeking Master's degrees in Perkins School of Theology is up in 2010-11, with the entering class 27 percent larger than the previous year.

Perkins celebrated the 50th anniversary of its Master of Sacred Music program in 2010 with alumni gathering on campus from across the United States and beyond.

A new Doctor of Ministry program has been launched in cooperation with Trinity Theological Seminary in Singapore. Perkins faculty will teach in Singapore, and students from that region will study at Perkins.

Perkins students traveled to India and South Africa for the first time as part of the Global Theological Education Program's cultural immersion course. Students also visited theological schools and churches in Greece, Turkey, France and Mexico.

The Church's General Board of Higher Education awarded a grant to Perkins to expand its theological training for Latin American pastors in the Methodist tradition.

Bishop Minerva G. Carcaño received the 2011 Distinguished Alumna Award from the Perkins Alumni/ae Council. The first Hispanic woman to be elected to the United Methodist episcopacy, she currently serves as bishop of the Phoenix Episcopal Area.

News of SMU Wesley Foundation

Under the leadership of Andy Roberts, the SMU Wesley Foundation is one of the most active ministries on campus. "The Well," a weekly worship service in Perkins Chapel, features music, teaching, prayer and Holy Communion. Small group Bible studies, the heart of SMU Wesley, foster fellowship and spiritual growth.

SMU treasures its Methodist heritage and maintains a particularly close relationship with Highland Park United Methodist Church and its senior minister, the Rev. Mark Craig. I enjoy serving as guest preacher at that church each fall. We ask for your continued prayers and support as SMU moves forward in the coming year.

The past year was an important one for Southwestern University as we concluded the period covered by our Strategic Plan for 2000-2010 and began implementing our Strategic Plan for 2010-2020.

Enrollment – Fall 2010

Southwestern enrolled 1,374 students in Fall 2010, its highest enrollment ever. This growth in enrollment is part of our strategic plan to increase enrollment to 1,500 students by 2015.

Faculty Appointments

We welcomed four new tenure-track faculty members for the 2010-11 academic year: Melissa Burns, Assistant Professor of History; Lysane Fauvel, Assistant Professor of Philosophy; Omar Rivera, Assistant Professor of Philosophy; and Brenda Sendejo, Assistant Professor of Anthropology.

Three faculty members were appointed to endowed chairs in Fall 2010: Sherry Adrian, Associate Professor of Education, was appointed to the Herbert and Kate Dishman Professorship in Special Education; Phil Hopkins, Associate Professor of Philosophy and Chair of the Religion and Philosophy Department, was named the first holder of the Lurlyn and Durwood Fleming Professorship in Religion and Philosophy; and Mary Grace Neville, Associate Professor of Business, was appointed to the John Shearn Chair in Business, replacing retiring faculty member Don Parks. Author John Pipkin has been named Writer in Residence at Southwestern University for the next three years.

Paideia®

Our signature Paideia program is now in its 7th year, with 251 students and 27 professors participating this academic year. In September 2010 we successfully concluded the Priddy Challenge for Paideia, which enabled us to permanently fund the Paideia program with a \$9 million endowment. Last fall we also launched a new program called “Paideia Conversations,” which expands the Paideia Program to first-year students.

Paideia students continue to be engaged with the community, and several cohorts have taken on the issue of homelessness in Georgetown. For example, students in Professor Don Gregory’s Paideia cohort are organizing a “One Swipe” event for February 2011, in which students can donate unused meals from their

meal plans to homeless students in the Georgetown Independent School District. Our food service provider, Sodhexo, is cooperating with them on the project.

The connections one of our Paideia students learned to make landed her a book contract. *Howling: The Trickster in Ginsberg* by senior American Studies major Katie Mead will be published in early 2012 by McFarland publishers.

NITLE at Southwestern

In April 2010, we formally dedicated the new headquarters for the National Institute for Technology in Liberal Education (NITLE), which is now based at Southwestern. NITLE offers many exciting programs of benefit to faculty, staff and students at liberal arts colleges. In January, for example, we partnered with NITLE and Trinity University to offer a webinar on "Funding Fellowships for the Humanities."

Sustainability

Southwestern continues to set an example in the area of sustainability. In October 2010, Southwestern officially received Silver-level LEED certification for our new Prothro Center for Lifelong Learning. All three scoreboards on Southwestern's varsity playing fields have been replaced with scoreboards that use energy-conserving LED lights, and a group of faculty, staff and students is involved with an ongoing project to replace the lights in one of Southwestern's small theaters with LED fixtures. In fall 2010 Theatre Professor John Ore began offering a class to teach students about this and other energy conservation strategies for the theater.

In 2010, Southwestern was one of only four colleges and universities in Texas to receive a B+ rating or better from the Sustainable Endowments Institute. This rating was external affirmation of the hard work that the Southwestern community has been doing over the past five years to build environmental awareness into both our academic program and our operations.

Diversity

Southwestern also continues to be a leader in educating minority students. A 2010 report published by The Education Trust said Southwestern has one of the best track records in the country when it comes to graduating Hispanic students in comparison to white students. With a Hispanic graduation rate of 71.6 percent compared to a white graduation rate of 73.5 percent, Southwestern was one of 34 private colleges in the country listed as having the lowest "gap" between the percent of Hispanic students who graduate and the percent of white students who graduate.

In the summer of 2010, Southwestern started a new program designed to help first-generation Hispanic students make the best choice when it comes to selecting which college to attend. Sixteen Austin-area students attended the five-week inaugural program, which was funded by a \$263,318 grant Southwestern received from the U.S. Department of Education. In 2010, Southwestern received an additional \$443,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Education

that will enable us to offer this program for an additional year and offer two additional summer programs for high school students and teachers in the coming years – a three-year summer program in math and science for traditionally underserved high school students and a three-year summer program of computer science workshops for middle and high school teachers.

Community Engagement

In 2009-2010, Southwestern students contributed more than 20,000 hours of service to our community. A few noteworthy examples:

In fall 2010, students involved with our community garden began delivering fresh produce to Georgetown's Meals on Wheels program.

In December 2010, all 69 students taking General Chemistry visited a Georgetown elementary school to guide students in real-life chemistry experiments.

Southwestern students are currently raising funds to construct a second Habitat for Humanity house in Georgetown.

The summer of 2010 marked the final year of our domestic violence summer internship program that was funded by the Verizon Foundation. Several students have gone to work for Austin-area nonprofits that they interned for through this program.

Faculty Achievements

Southwestern University faculty members continue to excel as teachers and scholars. For example:

Ten Southwestern faculty members published books in 2010.

Biology Professor Romi Burks received a \$18,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to write a proposal for a program that would enable undergraduates to conduct research in other countries. Burks took two Southwestern students to Uruguay in November 2010 to help write the grant proposal.

Chemistry Professor Lynn Guziec received the second "Inspiring Hope" award presented by the Breast Cancer Resource Centers of Texas in 2010 for her work in developing novel anti-cancer agents.

In November 2010, seven Southwestern faculty members received awards from the Sam Taylor Fellowship Fund, which provides monetary awards for the continuing education and development of full-time faculty members of United Methodist colleges and universities in Texas.

Student Achievements

Southwestern students also earned a variety of honors in 2010. For example:

Sophomore Jenna Gaska won 3rd place at the international level for best single service project in 2009-2010 from Circle K International. Gaska started a project called "Bead the Change," which has raised more than \$5,700 to benefit women and orphans in Uganda.

Junior Gillian Ring received a scholarship from the U.S. Department of State to study Chinese in China in summer 2010.

Postbaccalaureate student Maureen Johnson received an Ambassadorial Scholarship from The Rotary Foundation that will enable her to spend a year in Lima, Peru, beginning in June 2011.

First-year student Connor Smith was one of 25 students who received a scholarship to attend the World Affairs Council of America's 2010 National Conference held in Washington, D.C., Nov. 4-5, 2010. Senior Dylan Hickey was one of three students selected statewide to receive a scholarship from the Texas Association of School Personnel Administrators (TASPA) for the 2010-2011 school year. The scholarship honors the best teacher candidates in the state.

Two 2010 psychology graduates placed in national award competitions sponsored by Psi Chi, the national psychology honor society. In all, 10 students from Southwestern have received awards in the Psi Chi national paper competitions in the past 12 years.

2010 graduate Sarah Gould-Stotts was named to one of *USA Today's* 2010 All-USA College Academic Teams. These annual awards honor students who not only excel academically but also extend their intellectual abilities beyond the classroom to benefit society.

Three students who graduated from Southwestern in May 2010 were awarded Fulbright English Teaching Assistantships in Europe.

Four Southwestern students were selected to participate in summer research programs sponsored by the National Science Foundation in summer 2010.

Athletics

Our athletic teams continue to bring recognition to Southwestern. Our women's golf team finished fifth at the NCAA championships in 2010 and our men's golf team ended its season as co-SCAC Conference champions. In just its second season, the women's softball team won its conference title and made it to the NCAA regional tournament. Head Coach Angela Froboese earned her second consecutive Coach of the Year Award and the team was ranked 23rd in the nation by the National Fastpitch Coaches Association. Our women's volleyball team made it to the NCAA tournament for the sixth consecutive season in 2010. 101 student athletes from Southwestern made the 2010 SCAC Spring Academic

Honor Roll and both the men's and women's swimming teams were named to the College Swimming Coaches Association of America DIII All-Academic Teams.

Thinking Ahead Campaign

Southwestern's *Thinking Ahead* comprehensive fundraising campaign was originally scheduled to end in 2010, but in October 2010 the Board of Trustees voted to extend the campaign to help fund new needs identified by the Strategic Plan for 2010-2020. Key among these needs is a new science building, which is estimated to cost \$25 million. The campaign has been extended another five years with a new goal of \$150 million. Nearly \$110 million has been raised to date.

Campus Construction Projects

The major construction project currently under way is the renovation of Southwestern's historic Roy and Lillie Cullen Building. The renovation will include replacement of all 467 of the building's windows with double-paned, insulated windows to make it more energy efficient. It also will include an upgrade to the building's mechanical and electrical systems.

Speakers and Symposia

Southwestern continues to attract prominent speakers for its major lecture series.

The 2010 Writer's Voice speaker was filmmaker Mira Nair. The 2011 Writer's Voice speaker will be Dave Eggers, who has enjoyed widespread praise as a writer of both fiction and nonfiction. Eggers will be on campus November 1.

Our 2010 Shilling Lecture was delivered by Dr. Bill Foege, an epidemiologist who has been credited with eliminating smallpox around the world. The 2011 Shilling Lecture will be delivered by Blake Mycoskie, the founder of TOM'S Shoes. Southwestern's 33rd Brown Symposium will held Feb. 23-25, 2011. The symposium was organized by Music Professor Michael Cooper and is titled "Think – Converse – Act: The Salon and Its Histories." The symposium will feature three lectures on the history of salons, along with three public salons on topics that are important in today's world, including one titled "Arts – Sciences – Religions: Conflict or Convergence?"

In October 2010, Southwestern hosted the Edgar F. Beckham Engaged Diversity Symposium. This symposium featured presentations by current and former faculty members from Dillard University, Huston-Tillotson University, Morehouse College, Rhodes College, and Southwestern who conducted joint research thanks to funding from a three-year, \$150,000 grant we received from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.

The Strategic Plan for 2010-2020

In March 2010, our Board of Trustees approved our new strategic plan for 2010-2020. At the center of this plan is advancing the University's academic mission,

and we took a major step forward on this in the fall by implementing a new curriculum. This four-course per semester model is the most significant change in our curriculum in more than three decades and we believe it will contribute greatly to improving student learning and will accelerate our progress along our trajectory towards being one of the finest liberal arts colleges in the nation.

The plan also has three “supporting strategies”:

Enhancing the campus experience and residence life;

Building far-reaching visibility and recognition; and

Ensuring the financial vitality and overall sustainability of the institution.

This is the first time our strategic plan has formally included visibility and reach, and in the summer of 2010 we retained a highly respected national communication firm, Lipman Hearne, to do research on whether our name is a hindrance when it comes to visibility. In fall 2010, Lipman Hearne conducted a survey of all our major constituencies and got a very high participation rate. The survey found that current students, faculty, staff and alumni have a considerable amount of affection for the University’s current name. However, the research also showed that Southwestern University is not well known among prospective students – particularly those who live outside Texas – and that most people do not associate the name “Southwestern University” with a private, church-related liberal arts institution.

Therefore, the Board has decided that increasing Southwestern’s visibility among prospective students as well as trying to correct misperceptions about our existing name should be our priorities as we implement the visibility portion of our Strategic Plan for 2020. Our plan now is to launch a major visibility campaign, pending the availability of funding.

On a personal note, I would like to end this report by noting that this year marks my 10th year as president of Southwestern. It continues to be a privilege for both Jane and me to work with you and to see Southwestern reach higher for the benefit of our students and the well-being of humanity.

Conference Trustees:

10. Twenty (20) Trustees consisting of ~~two (2)~~ one (1) ordained ministers and ~~two (2)~~ three (3) lay persons from each of the Central Texas Conference, North Texas Conference, Southwest Texas Conference and Texas Conference, and one (1) minister and one (1) lay person or no (0) clergy and two (2) lay persons if approved by the conference from each of the Northwest Texas Conference and the Rio Grande Conference, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Conference Trustees."

As Amended at the Fall Meeting of the Board, Oct. 29, 2010:


Conference Trustees:

10. Twenty (20) Trustees consisting of ~~two (2) ordained ministers and two (2) lay~~ four persons from each of the Central Texas Conference, North Texas Conference, Southwest Texas Conference and Texas Conference, at least (1) but no more than two (2) of which shall be ordained ministers, and one (1) minister and one (1) lay person or no clergy and two (2) lay persons if approved by the conference from each of the Northwest Texas Conference and the Rio Grande Conference, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "Conference Trustees."

**SEXUAL ETHICS POLICY FOR PROFESSING MEMBERS
OF THE CENTRAL TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE
OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH**

Regarding harassment of clergy appointed to the local church
Presented, June 2011
By CTC Cabinet

Statement of Policy

A Professing Member of the Central Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church shall not engage in harassment, including but not limited to sexual and/or gender harassment of clergy (§§ 605.8 and 2702.3 in the 2008 *Book of Discipline*).

Theological Foundation

All persons are created by God. God intends all persons to have worth and dignity in their relationships. We are one connected body, and when one part of the body is injured physically, emotionally or spiritually, the entire body is rendered less than God intended. Misconduct of a sexual nature of any kind violates a person's wholeness and is an unjust use of status and power and a sinful behavior against God and one another. The Scripture witnesses to a God who brings about justice, mercy and grace. The Church is called to express God's love in concrete actions of compassion and healing for all people.

Definitions

1. Sexual Harassment: Sexual harassment is a form of sexual misconduct and is defined in the *Social Principles* as "any unwanted sexual advance or demand, verbal or physical that is reasonably perceived by the recipient as demeaning, intimidating or coercive. Sexual harassment must be understood as an exploitation of a power relationship rather than as an exclusively sexual issue" (2008 *Book of Discipline*, ¶ 161). Sexual harassment of clergy includes, but is not limited to the creation of a hostile or abusive environment which undermines the ministry of the clergy person serving within the appointment. (2008 *Book of Discipline*, ¶ 2702.3). Behaviors considered sexual harassment can include "unwanted sexual jokes, repeated advances, touching, displays or comments that insult, degrade, or sexually exploit women, men, elders, children or youth" (2008 *Book of Resolutions*, page 135). Sexual harassing behaviors may be in person or by phone, e-mail, texting, and social networking sites.

2. Power: Clergy are generally considered to be in positions of power due to their professional role as spiritual leaders within a church. There are, however, situations in which professing members of a church have the power to create a hostile or abusive environment which undermines the ministry of the clergy person serving within the appointment to the local church. Some of those situations are related to gender, race, age, wealth, education, and status within the community.

3. **Sexual Abuse:** Sexual abuse means unwanted physical conduct of a sexual nature, sexual contact or sexualized behavior and may include, by example, touching, fondling, other physical contact and sexual relations.

4. **Sexual Misconduct:** The 2008 *Book of Discipline* identifies sexual misconduct as a chargeable offense for clergy (§2702.1) and for lay (§ 2702.3).

Making a Complaint

Clergy and other persons who have knowledge of a possible violation of this policy by a Professing Member may report the same to the chairperson of Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee and District Superintendent. Upon receipt of any complaint, the Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee with the guidance of the Conference Consultant and District Superintendent will investigate, consider any response, and take action to seek a just resolution.

PROCEDURES FOR REPORTING, INVESTIGATING, AND RESOLVING VIOLATIONS OF THIS POLICY

The clergy person who feels harassed by a lay person is encouraged to use the following procedures. If the offending behavior and complaint is sexual abuse or sexual misconduct then the immediate procedure is a formal complaint as outlined in the Book of Discipline § 2703.4. Identifying sexual or gender harassment depends on a determination of what a reasonable person would perceive as unacceptable. It is important to resolve complaints confidentially and, if possible, informally.

Initial Resolution Process

Clergy are responsible for establishing and maintaining clear boundaries of professional conduct.

Therefore, a clergy person should respond immediately and clearly to the harasser that such behavior is unwelcome and uncomfortable

If the behavior continues:

Avoid being alone with the harasser.

Keep accurate records of the harassing behavior.

Contact the Chair of the Staff Parish Relations Committee (if the Chair of SPRC is the harasser then contact the District Superintendent directly).

Notify the District Superintendent to begin the informal process for complaint resolution.

The District Superintendent will contact the Central Texas Conference Consultant who will meet with the chair of SPRC (or person designated) to explain the informal process and introduce two advisors.

Informal Resolution Process

After meeting with the Conference Consultant the chair of SPRC (or a person designated) and the two advisors the intervention team will form and will meet separately with the clergy person and with the accused. The purpose of the meeting is to:

Determine if the complaint is valid or a miscommunication and a misunderstanding.

Ask the accused to make an appropriate written statement to the clergy person. The written response may include explanation of the behavior resulting in a misperception of intent, an apology, and a promise not to repeat the behavior.

If the clergy person finds the response satisfactory then the complaint will be considered as resolved and the District Superintendent will be notified of the result.

If the response of the accused is not satisfactory or the accused refuses to respond, then the complaint will move to the formal process and the District Superintendent and Staff Parish Relations Committee will be notified that a formal process of complaint has been initiated. At any point during the informal process the clergy person, the accused or the SPRC committee may request in writing to the District Superintendent a formal resolution process.

Formal Resolution Process

If the District Superintendent determines that the process outlined above has been followed and the complaint is not resolved, then the District Superintendent will appoint a committee on investigation according to ¶ 2703.4 in the 2008 *Book of Discipline*.

2. The final decision of the committee will be communicated in writing to the clergy person, the accused and the Staff Parish Committee.

I'm pleased to report that Texas Wesleyan University has entered the year with a new sense of pride and accomplishment, as well as a new sense of energy that reflects that of our new president, Frederick G. Slabach. Mr. Slabach joined the University as its 20th President at the first of January. Mr. Slabach was previously Executive Secretary and Chief Executive Officer of the Harry S. Truman Scholarship Foundation and was also a former Dean of the Texas Wesleyan School of Law.

Wesleyan Welcomes All with an Outstanding Liberal Arts Education...and More

Texas Wesleyan places an emphasis on welcoming motivated, first-generation students—students who are the first in their family to go to college. President Slabach is a first-generation student and completely understands how important it is for students to get personalized attention. Wesleyan's class sizes are intentionally small, with an average 14-to-1 student-to-faculty ratio, so there's no chance of becoming a "number" and getting lost as they might at a large university.

Our caring faculty and focus on individualized attention continue to provide opportunities for our students that they would not be exposed to in a large university. For example, Texas Wesleyan University has a DNA gene sequencer.

That is unusual for a small liberal arts college. But at the large universities, the use of a DNA gene sequencer is limited to faculty and graduate students. At Texas Wesleyan, *undergraduates* are allowed to use this high-tech research instrument. That is an experience an undergraduate student simply cannot get at most large universities.

Wesleyan is No Longer North Texas' "Best Kept Secret"

Such focus on our students is helping Texas Wesleyan become a more

prominent institution, both locally and nationally. Indeed, for 2011, U.S. News and World Report ranked Texas Wesleyan University in the #1 tier of all regional universities in the West. This is the same tier as Trinity University in San Antonio, Santa Clara University in Silicon Valley, California, and Gonzaga University in Washington State.

The 2010-2011 year marks our sixth consecutive year of enrollment growth. Spring 2011 enrollment was 2,955 students with 44% of the student body enrolled in the University's outstanding graduate programs, including Nurse Anesthesia, Law, Education, Business Administration, and Counseling.

In addition, our School of Business Administration now offers one of only three Forensic/Fraud Accounting programs in the nation, and a unique Project Management program focused on government contracting that is likely to be the only of its kind in the nation. The School of Business Administration is committed to preparing students to compete in a dynamic and challenging global business environment. Graduates possess a strong ethical foundation and an authentic commitment to serving the communities in which they live and work. Given the ethical lapses the nation has witnessed over the past several years, Wesleyan's emphasis on "ethics across the curriculum" is extremely important.

Providing a Signature Student Experience

Last year, Texas Wesleyan embarked on a journey to create a signature experience for our students. We know that our students value our small classes and the personal attention they receive from their professors, but we wanted to build on our other strengths as well. Research identified our unique value proposition to be a commitment to enabling student performance by removing barriers to success. "Barriers to success" refers to issues students face as well as issues at the institutional level. For example, today's students often face the challenge of being ill-prepared for college-level work. Others may face financial hardship. Some may be the first in their family to attend college. And many face the challenge of balancing an education with the demands of supporting a family and tending to one or more jobs.

Fortunately, Wesleyan excels at helping students overcome a myriad of challenges. The Freshmen Experience, for example, was introduced to help new students learn how to manage their time, to learn good study habits, and to make the most of their education. Our Academic Success Center also excels at tutoring students who need help in specific areas of study.

Through faculty and staff involvement, the University renovated the lobbies of our residence halls, installed 40 new campus lights and began security bike patrols, refurbished the student center, centrally located our graduate and undergraduate admissions offices, provided free washers and dryers in residence halls, created two new parking lots, and completed campus-wide wireless networking (Wi-Fi). These are just some of the initiatives in addition to the completion of a \$3-million state-of-the-art Fitness Center.

Over 65 members are now working on projects designed to better engage transfer students, making the most of campus space, improving campus communications, and delivering on the career promise.

A Record Year in Athletics

The Texas Wesleyan Athletic Department has continued to excel in the 2010-11 school year. For the first time in school history, both the men and women's basketball teams made NAIA National Tournament appearances. With eight of their thirteen sports still in action this spring, the Rams have already seen their athletes awarded with three All-American selections, five NAIA Scholar Athlete selections, and twenty All-Red River Athletic Conference selections.

In men's basketball, the Rams matched the highest win total in the 74-year history of the program with an overall record of 30-4. The team was ranked in the top-10 nationally all season and was ranked fifth in the final poll of the year. Texas Wesleyan has been rated in the top-25 in 43 consecutive NAIA Coaches Polls, marking the third longest active streak. At 21-1 in Red River Athletic Conference play, the Rams won their fourth consecutive RRAC Regular Season Championship. The team featured five All-Conference players including RRAC Player of the Year Brian Wanamaker. Wanamaker also became just the third player in program history to receive 1st-team All-American recognition, while Jonathan Blake was an Honorable Mention All-American selection.

In women's basketball, the Lady Rams made the program's second NAIA National Tournament appearance this season. With an overall record of 28-6, they were one win shy of the school's single season record which was set in 1978-79 (29-5). The Lady Rams finished as the RRAC regular season and tournament runner-up. They featured four All-Conference players, while Brittany White was named Honorable Mention All-American, becoming just the fourth All-American selection in program history.

The Rams have enjoyed plenty of other success as well. In their first season both the men and women's cross country teams finished as the RRAC runner-up. The men's golf team is currently ranked 11th in the NAIA Coaches Poll and 7th in the Golf World/Nike Coaches Poll.

The table tennis team was presented their 2010 team National Championship rings by Fort Worth Mayor Pro Tem Danny Scarth during the Texas Wesleyan Open Tournament in March of this year. The team now has its sights set on winning their eighth consecutive team National Championship. Mark Hazinski, who will represent Team USA at both the Pan American Games and Table Tennis World Championships this year, led the Rams into the NCTTA/ACUA National Tournament, April, 14-17.

Strong Values on Campus and In the Community

Wesleyan is proud to be a United Methodist university with the strong tradition of providing students with the ethical and moral foundation they need to be leaders in their communities. In that tradition, the University brought Arun Gandhi, peace activist, proponent of non-violence, and grandson of Mohandis Gandhi, to participate in University College Day (UCD). UCD serves as a forum where multiple disciplines are interconnected, and allows both faculty and students to share intellectual ideas in a written and live presentation format. Mr. Gandhi joined students and fielded student questions after receiving the Key to the City from Fort Worth City Councilmember Kathleen Hicks. He made a public presentation in the evening to a standing-room-only audience at our own Martin Hall.

The University also hosted the only Texas appearance of a national traveling exhibit, "Abraham Lincoln: A Man of His Time, A Man for All Times." The exhibit was presented by The National Endowment for the Humanities and The Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History and ran April 13 through May 8, 2011.

This year we will focus our attention upon energizing and equipping the local churches of our conference so that they will be better able to fulfill their mission. It is our prayer and hope that this session of our Annual Conference will give each of us a renewed focus and enthusiasm for the mission and ministry of our churches. Together, we will accomplish great things in the name of our Lord Jesus the Christ.

We offer special thanks to Bishop Mike Lowry, Georgia Adamson, Harvey Ozmer and all of their staff members for their dedication and hard work in preparing for this session of Annual Conference. Likewise, we are grateful to all boards, agencies, committees, commissions and task forces who have worked with great commitment to offer effective and life giving ministry in our churches, communities and around the world. And we offer special thanks to each local church for the significance of your ministries each day of the year. You are the heart and soul of our ministries.

The Agenda Committee recommends that the 2011 Per Diem Allowance granted each day in actual attendance at the conference for retired clergy, retired diaconal ministers, retired deaconesses, ministers' surviving spouses, pastors receiving total salary of or less than the minimum compensation of the conference, students appointed to attend school and ministers on disability leave be \$17.50 for those who reside in McLennan County and \$35 for those who reside outside McLennan County. Secondly, the Agenda Committee recommends that the budget line item for the expenses of annual conference 2012 be set at \$53,000.

The Agenda Committee continues to carefully monitor your evaluations of our Annual Conference sessions. We have an evaluation document for your use again this year. Please, please, locate it now and make notes as we move through our conference this year so that you will be prepared to offer us your very best observations. We do appreciate your help. We continue to make changes based upon your suggestions and observations.

Because we have met in Tarrant County for three consecutive years due to the construction plans in Waco, we will once again meet in Waco in 2012. We will then resume our schedule of alternating between Ft. Worth and Waco. The schedule of locations for future meetings of the Annual Conference is as follows: Tarrant County: 2013, 2015, 2017, 2019, and 2021; and, Waco: 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, and 2020. Annual Conference 2012 will take place June 3 – 6 in Waco.

I express my gratitude to those who have given so much time and effort in serving on the Agenda Committee this year. Your leadership is greatly appreciated.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Report No. 1

The past year was a landmark year for the Central Texas Conference. The Conference turned 100. Rather than becoming senile and feeble, it has grown increasingly strong through the years. It is significant that in its centennial year it has again restructured itself better to serve the present age.

The present Conference was not created *ex nihilo*, but is the result of a continuous growth and development. It is the role of the Commission on Archives and History to make sure that this progress is preserved. We cannot carefully plan where we are going without an awareness of whence we have come.

Our Hebrew forbears required that God's mighty act of delivering them from bondage in Egypt be solemnly celebrated every year. An annual ritual meal, the Seder, was commanded to be observed. Even today, thousands of years after the Exodus, each Jewish home annually observes the Passover ritual in which a designated child inquires "Why is this night different from all other nights?" and the elders explain its significance.

Jesus and his disciples observed this Passover meal, and Christians still carry out the ceremonial meal as Jesus commanded: "Do this in remembrance of me." Rather than being a distant memory, God's continuing work among his people makes the past and the present both a part of the Divine scheme of things. It is the responsibility of the Commission on Archives and History to guarantee that our heritage is a part of our present and of our future.

A Centennial Celebration was held at the Will Rogers Center in Fort Worth in October. Some 1,200 persons were in attendance. Youth and adults, laity and clergy were involved in the celebration. There were displays from 127 local congregations from all the districts exhibiting their past and present life. Music was performed which spanned the hundred year spectrum. Former presiding bishops John Russell, Joe Wilson and Ben Chamness and Twila Bryan, the widow of Bishop McFerrin Stowe, stirred the crowd with their reminiscences. Bishop Monk Bryan, who is a native of Central Texas, and who was born in the Blooming Grove parsonage when the Conference was only six years old, was symbolic of the still-youthful nature of Central Texas. Presiding Bishop Mike Lowry's sermon connected the past, the present and the future of the Conference in such a dynamic way that the entire assemblage was made proud of its history and eager to venture in the frontier of the future.

A book of the history of the Central Texas Conference and its ancestor, the Northwest Texas Conference, has been published. It is the first comprehensive summary of the 143 years of its life to be written. It is the result of years of work by 25 dedicated lay and clergy volunteers. Entitled "Central Texas Conference 144 Year at the Center of Texas Methodism", it is the product of exhaustive research. It not only recounts our past, but lays the foundation for our future.

The *Discipline* requires that when a local church ends its active life its cornerstone and all other markings that distinguish it as a United Methodist Church be removed and preserved. Central Texas is the only annual conference in all Methodism that has a Cornerstone Garden. Texas Wesleyan University has provided a peaceful place on its campus where such cornerstones are displayed. The evidence of the devotion and service of generations of lay members and pastors is thus displayed in a place for gratitude, meditation and appreciation.

Our Conference Archives are the most comprehensive of any in our jurisdiction. Our Archivist is in continual service providing information for local churches and districts needing documentation of legal matters, researching the records in order to answer local churches' requests for historical information concerning their past and in responding to queries from individuals researching family records. Districts send their records to the archives where they are catalogued and stored to provide future reference.

Since the *Discipline* requires that the archives receive and preserve the records of closed local churches, an enormous amount of time, effort and space is required in fulfilling this responsibility. Local churches and individuals are encouraged to use their Conference archives.

There are at least 217 local churches in the Conference which have been active for over 100 years. While many of these have applied for and received their designations as United Methodist Historical Sites with the accompanying markers, there are those which have not. First United Methodist of Euless is

being awarded the designation this year, and the Commission would like to enable all eligible churches to receive it. If your church has been in existence for 100 years, you are invited to apply. Please contact Carol Roszell, your Conference Archivist, for assistance in applying for this recognition.

ARCHIVIST REPORT

Report No. 2

512 linear feet of records were delivered for the archives depository during this past year, much of which were local church, district and conference records. A great many additional contributions were made to the archives by supportive individuals and the personal papers of pastors. Scholar's, clergy, layperson's, author's, conference personnel, historian's, student's, and genealogist's depository usage has remained steady, many of them having been referred to the archives by other institutions and persons. Approximately 172 research requests have been received during the past year. The centennial celebration was a success and the written history of the conference has proceeded to the publisher.

Archival/records management, local church historian training, and archives/records management consultation continue to be provided to local churches and at district training sessions. I attended the GCAH Annual Meeting at Budapest, Hungary in August of 2010. I still serve as a member of the executive board of the Texas United Methodist Historical Society which met in Brenham and Chappell Hill, Texas in March of 2011. I continue as a member of the Executive Board of the Historical Society of the United Methodist Church. I continue to encourage each of our local churches to write their history as best they are able, a copy of which will be housed in the depository. Additional space was afforded to the archives depository on the campus at no charge to help alleviate storage for items that have yet to be processed. As a reminder, the majority of the records housed at the archives are primary, non-published records, which reinforces the need for our churches to locate and protect their records. All closing churches and those that are merging into or with another church must send their records to the archives for protection and availability as mandated by the Standing Rules.

Thank you for allowing me to serve God and the Central Texas Conference in this ministry of memory.

Her grandfather was a New Start Pastor who with his wife and children chose to go into the "wilderness" to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to make disciples. She writes: "So Grand Father Mauldin's legacy to me is why I support Church Growth and Development."

The ministry of H. L. Mauldin continues to inspire us today. There are many areas in our Conference where we need to plant new congregations. We should be starting at least three new faith communities each year. With your support along with people like Mrs. Lemons, we can meet the great challenge before us.

Church Growth and Development is thankful to all the churches that gave us the opportunity to present the SHARE program to their congregation. We are equally grateful to those pastors and church leaders who presented the SHARE program in their churches and encouraged their members to become Partners in Ministry. Because of your faithfulness, we received \$201,000 in 2010, an increase of \$48,000. We did not meet our goal of adding 2010 new shares but we are moving in the right direction.

As we move into a new day and a new structure for ministry, the SHARE program will continue. The SHARE program serves as the primary funding source for planting new congregations. Therefore, we call upon every church, every pastor, every church leader to do the following:
 Model the importance of this ministry by purchasing or increasing your SHARES.
 Present the SHARE program to your congregation. February is SHARE promotion month. Give your people the chance to become a Partner in Ministry by

purchasing SHARES.

Encourage Sunday School classes, youth groups, women's groups and men's organizations to become SHAREHOLDERS.

In your worship pray for our new churches and for those who have not received Christ into their lives.

REMEMBER CHURCH GROWTH IN YOUR WILL

The Central Texas Methodist Foundation was instrumental in helping a long time United Methodist member support new church starts by including Church Growth and Development in their estate planning. Nancy Elizabeth West passed away November 10, 2007 at 97 years of age. Known as Elizabeth, she was a member of First United Methodist Church of Fort Worth, and was active in the United Methodist Women and her Sunday School class.

In 1895, her family inherited their farm; when Elizabeth was 9 years old, the family moved to the farm from Waco. Ms. West later moved to Fort Worth and worked as a medical technologist for 37 years. She was earnest in her work, in her church and in her circles of friends. She was always considerate of others and known for her generosity as well as for her prudent saving and investing. In her Will, Ms. West remembered many friends and family members and made charitable bequests to a number of causes including FUMC of Fort Worth and of Jonesboro, which was her parent's home church, United Methodist Women, and Glen Lake Camp.

In addition to outright monetary gifts made through her Will, Ms. West gave her family's 1900-acre farm to the Central Texas Methodist Foundation for the Nancy Elizabeth West Endowment Fund. As the Trustee of Ms. West's endowment fund, the Central Texas Methodist Foundation will sell the farm and permanently invest the proceeds to produce income. The principal will always be kept invested and only the interest earnings will be distributed.

The majority of the endowment income will be distributed to establish new churches. So, a 112 year old family farm that grew many crops of wheat and corn will be converted to grow new lives in Christ for many, many generations. When arranging for the provisions of her Will, Ms West was careful to express her appreciation for the generous inheritance she had received from her parents. "I have enjoyed the fruits of their labor as well as mine," she said. "And, I want to honor them and give thanks to God for all of my blessings by leaving my estate to reflect the Christian values of my parents and me," she added.

As more persons include Church Growth and Development in their overall financial planning and will preparation, the funding for new church starts will increase. For those who have already remembered us in their stewardship and estate planning for the future we say, **Thank You!**

COMMITTEE ON COUNSELING

Report No. 1

The counseling committee continues its effort to offer counseling program support and resources to the clergy and diaconal ministers and families of the conference. The committee members will continue to expand and update the list of approved counselors in order to provide expertise and greater accessibility to meet the counseling needs of our members and their families. We commend all our counselors for the valuable service they provide to our conference members. In addition to the confidential counseling available, many of the counselors listed are also available for seminars and workshops.

Report No. 2

1. This service is available to ordained conference members, diaconal, and retired ministers, and persons serving in full-time conference appointments, plus their spouses and dependent family members. In addition, ordained members and families of the Rio Grande Conference serving within the geographical boundaries of the Episcopal area are eligible.
2. Complete confidentiality and respect for privacy will be maintained. As a client, only your counselor will know your name, and no information about you will go to any other person without your written consent. It is understood by the committee, and should be by the client, that where the professional counselor is bound by the mandatory reporting requirements by the state in areas of sexual misconduct, sexual abuse, and harm to others or self, the counselor's duty to report shall not be negated. In such cases, the client shall be so informed, and such mandatory reporting shall be made to the appropriate authorities and agencies. Trust will be vested in the integrity of the counselors, both to keep confidences with clients and to keep faith with the program by submitting accurate bills of service for payment. Such bills will list hours of service, a client code, but no name. (Only the counselor will be able to connect the client code with a name, and thus preserve the confidentiality of the client.)
3. The counseling Service will be limited to six visits to a counselor in any one year.

- a. The first two visits the counselor's contractual fee will be paid in full by the program.
- b. Thereafter, participants will be asked to pay a portion of the cost of the counselor's contractual fee scaled to income, as follows:

Family Income*	Program will pay	Client will pay
1. Under \$20,000	90%	10%
2. \$20,000-28,596*	75%	25%
(*Includes Full-time clergy receiving equitable compensation)		
3. Over \$28,596	50%	50%

*Family Income includes combined income of spouses, excluding housing or parsonage allowance.

4. Thereafter, if counseling is still needed after six visits in a calendar year, an application may be made to the Health Benefits program for possible payment. At that time, the symptoms must clearly indicate the need for therapy, and any such payments will then be made in accord with the Health Benefits Program, and not the contractual fees of the Conference Counseling Program.
5. During the first six visits to the counselor, payments from the Conference Counseling Program and the Health Benefits Program simultaneously will not be allowed.
6. Payments for the program will be made only to those counselors who have been approved as participants in the program. There will be no exceptions. The current list of approved counselors in the Central Texas Conference Counseling Program is as follows:

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The Board of Ordained Ministry adopted five goals in the fall of 2008 for its work during this quadrennium. These goals guide our work of qualifying and mentoring persons who are seeking ordination as clergy in the Central Texas Conference. These goals are:

1. Create a standard of best practices for the District Committees on Ordained Ministry.
2. Develop a qualification and interview process to be used by the Central Texas Conference Board of Ordained Ministry with candidates seeking to be commissioned, with those who are continuing as provisional members and with those who are seeking ordination and full connection.
3. Evaluate the current Residency process as to the effectiveness for the probationary members of the Central Texas Conference. During this process, recommended changes to the process should be designed with the primary goal of helping a probationary member form a pastoral identity for his/her ministry.
4. Create an environment and process for the enlistment of young adults to serve in ordained ministry into the Central Texas Conference.
5. Develop a program of continuing education for members of the Board of Ordained Ministry to ensure each member's effectiveness in representing the Central Texas Conference.

The work of the Board of Ordained Ministry continues to focus on the five goals that guide our work during this quadrennium. Ongoing improvement, continually striving for excellence and effectiveness, and a passionate commitment to develop ordained clergy to be leaders in the churches and ministries of the Central Texas Conference motivate the members of the Board as they seek to serve the Kingdom of God.

The primary responsibility of the Board focuses on qualifying and credentialing men and women for faithful ministry. This is a shared responsibility with the District Committees on Ministry and the churches of the Central Texas Conference.

The initial work of the District Committee on Ministry is important. The Board continues to seek ways to strengthen the relationships between the Board and the District Committees on Ministry. With the realignment of the districts, the Board will be re-training all District Committee on Ministry chairpersons, registrars, District Superintendents, and District Administrators. Creating and sustaining best practices for the District Committees on Ministry is an ongoing work which will be pursued diligently this fall with the formation of the new districts.

In the Central Texas Conference 9.92 percent of our elders are 35 and younger; the Central Texas Conference ranks third among United Methodist conferences in the number of young clergy who are members of an annual conference. While other conferences have organized efforts to attract and invite young persons for ordained ministry, the Central Texas Conference is fortunate to have the number of younger clergy because of other factors: effective student ministries in local churches, the excellence of the Central Texas Conference Youth Mission and student ministries, and the presence of two fine seminaries in our area. The Board believes that we can increase the number of younger persons seeking ordination by developing a comprehensive enlistment plan; therefore, the Board of Ordained Ministry will create a team of persons who will enlist younger persons for ministry in the Central Texas Conference Student Ministries.

The process for ordination in The United Methodist Church can seem complex and rigid to those who are exploring a call to ordained ministry. The Board of Ordained Ministry continues to work on ways to make the process clearer given the mandates of the Book of Discipline. Persons who are exploring a call to ordained ministry are encouraged to be in conversation with their District Superintendents and the chairpersons of their District Committee on Ordained Ministry.

Our conference's Residency Program has implemented many changes in the past three years. We continue to work on enhancing this process so that provisional members of the annual conference discover ways to live into and create a pastoral identity.

The Board is implementing a process where the files and work of the Board and the candidates will be done electronically. While this is initially time consuming, there will be greater efficiency and clarity for the candidates.

Finally, the Board of Ordained Ministry is comprised of clergy and laity who have additional responsibilities in their local churches, other ministry settings, or in other endeavors and callings. The gifts of their time and service during this year of change and renewal have been exemplary.

COMMITTEE ON THE EPISCOPACY

Bishop Lowry began the 2010 conference year with a formal self-assessment that confirmed his gift for leadership through change. Because changes had been requested by conference leaders when Bishop Lowry was elected, this year's self-assessment culminated in his collaboration with clergy and laity to set goals that would focus his leadership.

With an outside consultant's study of conference strengths and needs, the bishop

presented a call-to-action report in each district, and continued conversations at the district level throughout the year. In response, the Cabinet and the Conference Task Force on Realignment recommended organizational changes to strengthen the local church and provide new places for worship, spiritual growth, and service.

The year will be remembered for its challenging economy, increased funds required for pensions, and rise in apportionments. With financial struggles, it has been a year that required extraordinary clarity of vision and thorough communication with the local church. Our bishop has provided opportunities for dialog and guidance through a weekly blog that provided reflections of his spiritual journey and personal vision for the Church. In addition, his articles in the *Central Link* have given guidance and support through the many changes that call for increased commitment and discipleship.

The focus for Bishop Lowry's leadership remains missional, empowering the local church to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION AND CLERGY BENEFITS

Report No. 1

The commission has met as needed and has carried out its responsibilities of overseeing the Minimum Compensation program for the Annual Conference. Because of the changes in appointments from time to time which often changes the number of persons and the amount needed for supplements, it is extremely difficult to project the financial needs as far in advance as required.

The commission seeks to be responsible to the churches of the Annual Conference in not requesting more than is needed in Apportionments and at the same time provide adequately for the program. The commission is also very much aware of the financial constraints that produce the need for equitable compensation in some appointments. The commission is therefore willing to not only provide financial assistance, but also provide educational assistance to help all equitable compensation entities with the tools and help to rise above the minimum compensation levels for their clergy.

We are recommending that Equitable Compensation levels for all categories of supplements be increased by 1.04% for the 2012 Conference financial year. Additionally, we recommend that the 2012 budget for Equitable Compensation be \$55,000.00 in Salary Compensation, \$60,000 in the Moving Expense Fund and that the Committee's budget be \$800.00 for Committee expenses.

The Equitable Compensation Commission of the Central Texas Conference will offer to participate with those churches receiving equitable compensation in obtaining workers' compensation insurance for lay and clergy employees through the Conference-wide insurance program, up to \$250.00 per policy.

Report No. 2

Equitable Compensation Fund

There shall be a program of equitable compensation support in the Central Texas Conference under the management of the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits. This program shall be patterned after ¶625 of the 2008 Discipline. Based on these guidelines, the following paragraphs shall compose the operating procedure for the Equitable Compensation Program.

1. A prerequisite for consideration of salary supplements from the Equitable Compensation Fund shall be the filing with the Commission of a written application (Form EQ1/2012) by the District Superintendent each January 1 or anytime an appointment change occurs in an Equitable Compensation appointment. The District Superintendent shall certify classification of the clergy and the salary (using Pastoral Compensation and Support Worksheet figures) set by the charge.
2. Salary grants shall be made for a calendar year with payments made monthly. In cases of appointment changes at or between the Annual Conference session, the District Superintendent shall file a written request with the Commission. Approved supplements shall then be paid on a pro-rata basis for the part of the year actually served.
3. Beginning January 2009, a church/charge is eligible to receive equitable compensation benefits for a maximum of three (3) years; a one year extension may be granted by the Cabinet if the charge exhibits progress and potential.
4. The following conditions must be met by the pastoral charge before it can become eligible for consideration to receive supplements from the Equitable Compensation Fund:
 - a) The pastoral charge shall have conducted a stewardship campaign for the local budget of each of its churches during the previous calendar year. This shall be an every member campaign. The Commission will assist in such a campaign upon written request from the charge pastor or district superintendent.
 - b) All apportioned items shall have been paid in full by the local church for the previous calendar year.
 - c) The charge must have at least 100 members.In unusual situations the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits may waive any or all of these conditions.

5. The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits will pay any amount up to 1/4 of the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference for each applicant according to his/her ministerial classification. If any exception under paragraph 3 or 4 is sought, the request must be endorsed by a 2/3 vote of the Cabinet before it can be considered by the Commission.
6. Persons of the following ministerial relationships are eligible for consideration for salary supplements at the level indicated for 2012. Rates for adjustment will be considered annually by the commission, but no less than the same percentage increase as that computed for the District Superintendents. The increase for 2012 will be 1.04%. The amounts reflected include the pastor's support and compensation amounts according to the cabinet worksheet, exclusive of parsonage considerations or a housing allowance. In calculating equitable compensation payments, no more than 25% may be deducted from total compensation as a housing allowance (even if the housing allowance actually constitutes more than 25% of the total compensation). Exception to this rule may be made for missional considerations.

1 - 1 - 2012

- a. Elder in Full Connection -- \$37,834
- b. Provisional member (1992 Disc.) or Provisional Elder (2000 Disc.)
 - 1) Non-student -- \$33,008
 - 2) Student -- \$30,504
- c. Associate Member -- \$33,008
- d. Full-time Local Pastor -- \$30,504

7. Pastors who are appointed to less than full-time service as addressed in the 2008 *Discipline*, (§ 338.2) shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund. The amount of salary supplement for which the pastor is eligible will be determined by the Cabinet's interpretation of time actually spent in serving the charge. For example, if the pastor is deemed as serving 1/4 of full time, his/her minimum salary eligibility would be 1/4 of the minimum of his/her conference relationship classification. The categories of 1/4, 1/2, and 3/4 will be followed in determining less than full-time eligibility for salary supplements from the Equitable Salary Fund.
8. Ministers who are not eligible for salary supplements are:
 - a) Those whose appointment is other than pastor of a charge.
 - b) Those classified as part-time local pastor.
 - c) Retired ministers.
 - d) No pastor shall be eligible to receive salary supplements from this fund who has been offered appointments with higher salary, but who persistently prefers for personal reasons to remain in a present appointment.
 - e) Associate Pastors

9. The Commission is studying ways in which Equitable Salary funds may be used to supplement unusual situations beyond the Conference minimum scale to provide assistance for pastors who remain in churches for missional purposes at the request of the Cabinet. We continue in dialogue with the Cabinet about such a policy.

**Report No. 3
Moving Expenses**

I. Eligibility

- A. Those elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, associate members, or full time local pastors, who are appointed to a local church in the Central Texas Annual Conference, and other elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, associate members, or full time local pastors for whom the Central Texas Annual Conference is the salary paying unit (such as District Superintendents, Conference Council Directors, Wesley Foundation Directors, etc.) shall be eligible to receive funds.
- B. Retiring elders in full connection, associate members, and full-time local pastors shall be eligible to receive funds for one move into housing not already owned or supported by a local church after retirement, to a maximum amount of \$2000. In circumstances in which a pastor, in one of the three relationships listed above, planning to retire moves prior to the retirement date, reimbursement for a move made within one year prior to the retirement date shall be made upon retirement, contingent upon the presentation of proper documentation.
- C. If an elder in full connection, probationary member, commissioned minister preparing for ordination as elder in full connection, associate member, or full-time local pastor from another Conference is to be appointed to a local church in the Central Texas Annual Conference, the Central Texas Annual Conference will pay the cost of the move from the border of the Central Texas Conference, up to the maximum amount allowed.
- D. Those elders in full connection, probationary members, commissioned ministers preparing for ordination as elders in full connection, and associate members, or full-time local pastors who go on Leave of Absence, or who surrender their credentials, either voluntarily or involuntarily, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Annual Conference moving funds, except in the case of those going on disability leave or the family of an elder in full connection, a probationary member, a commissioned minister preparing for ordination as elder in full connection, an associate member, or a full-time local pastor who dies while under appointment shall be eligible to receive funds for the initial move into housing not already owned or supported by a local church, up to the maximum amount allowed.

- E. Those persons who change or move houses, but who do not change appointments, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Conference moving funds.
- F. Those persons who change appointments, but who do not change houses, will not be eligible to receive any Central Texas Conference moving funds, with the exception of \$250.00 for moving office materials.
- G. If either or both clergy of a clergy couple living in one house change appointments, and move to one house, they will be eligible to receive funds for only the cost of the one move, up to the maximum amount allowable. If two houses are involved, at either the beginning point or ending point, they will be eligible to receive funds for both moves, each up to the maximum amount allowable.
- H. In no case shall the Conference pay more than the eligible expenses noted in II. Moving Allowance.

II. Moving Allowance

Our Conference Moving Policy has two options: these options are (a) Self-Move and (b) Commercial Move. The total expense of a Self-Move will not exceed \$1000 to the Conference, and the total expense of a Commercial Move will not exceed \$1500 to the Conference.

1. Self-Move – The Self Move plan consists of the total receipts plus a maximum \$300 bonus with the grand total compensation not to exceed \$1000. Proper documentation of receipts for the cost of van rental, gasoline, and \$2.00 per mile must be submitted to the Conference Secretary Treasurer before receiving reimbursement.

or

2. Commercial Move – Upon receiving a copy of the invoice from the commercial move by the Conference Secretary Treasurer, the Conference will pay a maximum of \$1,500 of actual moving expense. The Commercial Move includes the cost of the movers and cost for boxes, tape and packaging material not to exceed the total of \$1,500. The receiving charge will be responsible for up to \$500.00 above the conference coverage. Any expense above that will be the responsibility of the pastor.

III. Method of Payment

- 1. Proper Moving Expense Vouchers shall be provided by the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer at the Annual “Start-Up Seminar”.
- 2. The completed vouchers and required documentation shall be submitted to the office of the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer within sixty (60) days of the effective date of the appointment for repayment.
- 3. Should the local church incur any responsibility for moving expenses, copies of the same documentation must be provided prior to payment.

Exceptions

- A. Exceptions to any of the above may be approved or denied by the Central Texas Conference Secretary/Treasurer in consultation with the previous and receiving District Superintendents.
- B. Appeals of any decision by the Conference Secretary/Treasurer may be directed to the Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits. The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits shall have final authority to interpret the moving policy and make decisions.

Report No. 4***Housing/Parsonage Standard***

The church today demands the clergy to be not only a preacher, as was the early circuit rider, but a resident pastor and responsible citizen in the community. In order to meet these felt needs, and to call men and women to a dedicated ministry, the church must provide living conditions that will establish an adequate base from which to operate. It is the privilege and responsibility of the members of each congregation to provide the physical setting which will give the parsonage family the maximum comfort and convenience that the energies of the pastor may be more concentrated on his/her task and willing service in the Church of God. Because the parsonage, like the church building, reflects upon the congregation and the pastor, it should be in such condition that all concerned can be justifiably proud of it. Likewise, pastors should exercise the same diligence in caring for the parsonage as they would if it were their own property; mindful that they are stewards for those who will live in the parsonage after them.

The following Parsonage Standards were put in place and approved at the 1973 Central Texas Annual Conference and have appeared in our Journals since that time. Therefore, parsonages built or purchased prior to December 31, 1973 may not meet all of the recommendations in Sections I and II, but are subject to requirements in Sections III – V. Parsonages built or purchased after January 1, 1974 are subject to all recommendations and requirements listed in Sections I – V.

Parsonage Standards for Central Texas Conference can be found in Section XII Policies and Procedures (page 335):

Report No. 5**Vacation Policy**

United Methodist ministers are in a unique position in their role as pastors of a local church. Their membership and relationship is primarily to the Annual Conference as they serve under the appointment of the Bishop. At the same time their salary-paying unit is the local church. They are called to accountability for

effective ministry both by the Bishop through the appointive system and by the local church through the Pastor-Parish Relations (PPR) Committee. In vacation policy and similar matters it should be remembered by all that a pastor is not the employee of the local church. On the other hand, the Discipline (2008) ¶258.2 gives to the PPR Committee a consultative role in such matters.

NOTE: Years of service refer to years under appointment in an Annual Conference, not to years of service in the local church to which a pastor is appointed.

NOTE: In addition to the above guidelines, the PPR Committee should be sensitive to a pastor's need for time off from the pastor's duties, and should encourage the pastor to take regular days off each week.

NOTE: Our Book of Discipline states that, "a clergy member's continuing education and spiritual growth program should include such leaves at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of every quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the minister's vacations and shall be planned in consultation with their charges and other agencies to which they are appointed as well as the bishop, district superintendent, and annual conference continuing education committee." ¶351.2 BOD

Since then, there have been as many as 38 retirement homes at one time. Hundreds of retired ministers and their spouses have been residents in the homes. Over the years, salary and retirement benefits for our clergy have improved and the majority of retiring clergy are able to provide housing on their own. As this trend continues the need for homes decreases.

It is the policy of the HRM Board of Trustees to sell homes as they become vacant and hold the funds in reserve to purchase a home as the need arises. If you know of a retired clergy or surviving spouse that might be in need, please have them contact me.

This year, Homes for Retired Ministers sold 2 homes and we are now down to 3 homes in our ministry as of April 6, 2011. All 3 homes have residents. Thank you for your faithful support of this wonderful ministry of our Conference. Houses and their residents are as follows:

**Morris DeLaney Walker
1909-1972**

The Morris Walker award was established to recognize Morris DeLaney Walker’s distinguished and exemplary service to The United Methodist Church as a conference lay leader. He was outstanding in how he filled his duties, but he also set a high standard of service that reflected throughout the conference. Morris once said his parents had taught him to “tithe my abilities and time as well as my income for the benefit of the church. I have found the opportunity of being some small service to the church most gratifying.”

Walker’s jovial and delightful personality assisted in his role of encourager to the members with whom he worked. He met life with twinkling eyes and a mischievous grin. Even today, those who knew him still tell of their adventures with him.

Walker served as president of the District Board of Missions and president of the Protestant Men’s Council of Tarrant County. He was one of the initial 24 directors of the Metropolitan Board of Missions and one of its three incorporators. He was a member of Meadowbrook [United] Methodist Church from the time of his youth, later serving as lay leader, district lay leader for the church’s Fort Worth East District, and Conference lay leader.

During the early 1960s, while carrying a full work load and serving in so many positions in the Central Texas Conference and beyond, he rarely missed Monday night visitation meetings in his church. His beyond-the-local-church activities did not keep him from being an exemplary witness in his local church.

In 1963 Walker represented the Methodist Church in Denmark through a United Nations cultural and spiritual exchange for a six-week period. He was Methodist representative to the United Nations Conference where he met Bishop Tutu.

He excelled in his professional and community life. He worked for Mrs. Baird’s Bakery for 42 years, holding the highest position of a non-Baird family employee. He spent as much time in church work as in his job and the Bakery supported it. He was a faithful disciple of Christ whose work was an example for all who knew him.

Some of our groups are having local/district retreats, such as New World in Arlington where Bishop Lowry was one of the speakers and a gathering at White's Chapel featuring Coach Brad McKoy as the featured speaker. Local events seem to attract more participants.

We have several men who have heard the call to step up to leadership roles in our conference, Joseph Silvas from St. Paul in Hurst has completed the requirements to become a Men's Ministry Specialist and was recently commissioned in Nashville. This gives us two Men's Ministry Specialists for our conference and 26 nationally.

We also now have two new Scouting Ministry Specialist, John Burks from First Colleyville and John Hammond from First Hurst. In addition, John Burks has agreed to become Our Conference Scouting Coordinator, a position that has not been filled for a number of years.

We continue to struggle in getting Men's groups to Charter or re-charter their group, this is one of the primary sources of funds for the Men's General Commission. We only have 39 churches chartered out of the 300 plus churches in our conference.

Going forward we continue to focus on:

- Development of Principled Christian Leaders;
- Create new places for Men to continue to grow and mature in faith, word, and deed;
- Ministry with the poor;
- Global health

Our hope and prayer is that you will get involved with us at your local church.

It is my privilege to submit this report to you and to bring greetings and a word of appreciation for the support, prayers, and commitment to the ministry of Lydia Patterson Institute.

Life on the border becomes more difficult by the moment. The life of Lydia Patterson has become more than a place where students receive a strong education and leaders are formed. Today, Lydia Patterson is also a safe haven for students crossing the border looking for safety from the violence and unrest that plagues the city of Juarez, Mexico.

Although we have been able to maintain our enrollment in the past two years, we have seen a decline from the past years. The reason is obvious. Parents have lost their jobs; consequently, we have had to provide more scholarships than ever before. Parents who might have had a small business or a taco stand or a modest way of making a living have had to close down due to the threats of the mob that they either pay them or pay with their lives. People, women and children, are being murdered daily. Over 4,000 lives were lost last year as the result of the violence and many more went unreported. Students at Lydia Patterson have been directly affected. Many have lost parents or other members of their families. We have buried several former students and comforted many victims of kidnappings.

In 1913, Lydia Patterson opened its doors for the first time to minister to the young children of families crossing the border and fleeing from a revolution in Mexico. Families were looking for a safe place for their children and escaping the unrest in our neighboring country. Mrs. Lydia Patterson recognized the need for ministry to these displaced children and began her work in this impoverished neighborhood in El Paso. Almost 100 years later, Lydia Patterson is, again, serving as a refuge to young children escaping the threat of violence and bloodshed that they are exposed to daily. Many of our students make a two hour trip from their homes to Lydia Patterson daily by riding two or more buses from their homes to downtown Juarez. They then cross the international bridge on foot and walk the eight blocks to Lydia Patterson. One student, when asked about her sentiments as she made this daily trip, stated that she was in fear. She prayed and said that when she set foot on the American side, she could breathe easily again. Another student, as he was being interviewed by a local TV channel for a special on the work of Lydia Patterson, talked about his fears as well. He talked about the emptiness during the holidays as they mourned the loss of family members who had lost their lives to the violence. He also stated that he prayed a lot and then smiled and said that he still had hopes.

In the midst of all, Lydia Patterson is more committed than ever to bringing hope to its students. It continues to equip the students with that which can remove them from such a hostile environment...a good education. The spiritual life on our campus strengthens their hope for a future free of threats and injustice. Through our Student Lay Ministry Program, we continue to form leaders for the church. Students are serving in internships in local United Methodist Churches throughout the country. Students are graduating from seminary and others are making their way to a life in ministry. In spite of all the challenges, in the last two years, 100% of our graduating seniors have gone on to college. Lydia Patterson Institute, its administrators, faculty and staff, strongly believe that the fate of its students lies in the heart of our ministry.

I invite you to visit our new web page and learn about how you are already a part of this ministry by virtue of your relationship to your church, conference, and the jurisdiction. I encourage you to visit our campus in El Paso and personally experience the life of ministry with direct interaction with our students. We welcome work teams, mission groups, agency meetings, and personal visits. In as much as Juarez, Mexico, is a very dangerous city today, by national standards, El Paso is the safest city of its size to live in. We hope to see you here soon, and please keep our students in your daily prayers.

Deposit Account

This account is our basic "draft" account at GBOP where we deposit apportionment monies for the Pre-82 Pension Program and the Comprehensive Protection Program. The General Board then drafts from this account to pay our obligations as they become due. The balance represents accumulated earnings from across the years, and is unencumbered except for what is needed for cash flow purposes. This account is invested in the Short-term Investment Fund. The board authorized a transfer of \$600,000 to fund a cash-flow reserve for the HealthFlex account January 2004, \$300,000 of which has been repaid.

On deposit in this account are the funds received from the 2010 C.P.P. apportioned component of Conference Claimants. The GBOPHB is allowing every Conference a three (3) year C.P.P. premium payment holiday. This is due to the drastic economic downturn of 2008 and early 2009. As shared at the 2010 Conference session, we do have a 2011 one-time payment to make to undergird MPP annuities. By action of GBOPHB, we are allowed to use these deposited funds for that purpose. Also shared at the 2010 Conference session, other C.P.P. funds received allows a reserve to be constituted.

Conference Superannuate Fund

This fund originated as a result of the merger of the Methodist Episcopal and Methodist Episcopal South Conferences. The principal amount of this fund (\$63,986) must remain intact; however, the past and future earnings may be used based upon the conference's wishes. A portion of this is owed to the Deposit account to repay funding the self-funded death benefit.

PRE-82 PENSION FUNDING PLAN

The 2000 General Conference mandated that every conference have in place a funding plan to insure that monies will be in place no later than the year 2021 to cover any unfunded liability for those pastors with pre-82 years of service. Below you will find the proposed funding plan for the Central Texas Conference. The funding plan as of January 1, 2011 is summarized below:

(These numbers were projected from the 2011 actuarial valuation as of January 1, 2009 using 7% interest at 3% PSR increases. While the CAC in past years has increased approximately 4%, we do not expect that trend to continue. We anticipate increases closer to 2%-3%. We intend to keep the PSR at .9% of the CAC.)

Note: These numbers do reflect the massive financial challenges that occurred during 2008 as the stock market collapsed. It appeared as though we would reach our goal of 120% funding by 2016; but, market losses took its toll. Our Pre-82 funded status fell from 106% to 81%. Your Conference Board of Pensions is in consultation with the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits as we assess the current and future financial needs to insure the stability of the Pre-82 Plan. We know there will be rising costs due to various factors: 1) increases in Past Service Rates, 2) greater numbers of Retirees, 3) variables in interest rates, 4) recouping monies lost in the market downturn.

Therefore, we request that the Conference Claimant Apportionment be set at \$850,000. This is a \$50,000 increase from 2011. We must be prepared for further increases in coming years until the plan is secure and we can limit the volatility of the market effects.

- Past service Rate (PSR) of \$627 and
- 3% average increase in the Past Service Rate

In the opinion of The General Board of Pension and Health Benefits of The United Methodist Church, the attached funding plan meets the funding requirements of Paragraph 1506.8 of *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church 2008*. This opinion applies only to the attached funding plan.

PENSIONS:

1. In accordance with Conference action, which requires that the Past Service Rate (PSR) be at least 9/10 of 1% of the Conference Average Compensation (CAC for 2012 this is \$69,278), for those clergy with pre-1982 service years who qualify for annuity, the Conference Board of Pensions recommends that the PSR for 2012 be \$640. This meets the minimum requirement.
2. Based on our Funding Plan, we request the following amounts be apportioned to our churches in 2012:
 - a) Conference Claimants requirement (Pre-82 funding) \$850,000
 - b) CPP – to be Direct Billed
 - c) Total 2012 Request \$850,000
 - d) In the case of Family Leave or Leave of Absence appointed after January 1, 2004, the board recommends that the conference make CPP contributions of 3% of the Denominational Average for Full Members, Associate Members, and Probationary Members for the period of one year.

Report No. 4

Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP)

On January 1, 2007, the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) became effective as the new Pension program for all eligible United Methodist Clergy.

CRSP offers a two component benefit design:

- a) Defined Benefit – promises a specific dollar amount at retirement regardless of market conditions or investment performance. The amount is based on a formula that specifies a monthly retirement benefit to eligible clergy for the remainder of their lives.
- b) Core Defined Contribution – promises a defined amount that is deposited into an active clergyperson's account with monthly deposits. This benefit distributed at retirement is the accumulated amount plus earnings (losses) in the individual's account.

The 2012 financial obligation C.R.S.P. requires of the Central Texas Conference is:

- a) Core Defined Contribution – 3% of each eligible clergyperson's plan compensation.
- b) Core Defined Benefit - \$1,909,460

2012 Funding Plan:

The cost of participation in C.R.S.P. will continue to be direct billed to the local church for the two core components (Defined Benefit and Defined Contribution).

- a) Defined Contribution – 3% of participant plan compensation
- b) Defined Benefit – Full-time Clergy - \$7,300
 $\frac{3}{4}$ time Clergy - \$5,475

½ time Clergy - \$3,650

¼ time Clergy - \$1,825

Report No. 5

This report is a reminder that five (5) months of the Active Health Insurance Program will be apportioned in 2012 and seven (7) months beginning June 1, 2012 be direct billed to the local church/conference sponsored agency. The direct billed amount will include the total premium of which the church/agency pays ½ and the participant pays ½. If the local church/agency so chooses, it may pay the clergy share as a benefit.

The Active Health Insurance Program be removed as an apportionment as of January 1, 2013 and will be direct billed to the local church/conference sponsored agency. The direct billed amount will include the total premium of which the church/agency pays ½ and the participant pays ½. If the local church/agency so chooses, it may pay the clergy share as a benefit.

Report No. 6

The board recommends that it continue to actively pursue the issue of pension arrearage utilizing a very fair but stringent examination of each situation to determine what steps need to be taken to assure the integrity of the affected minister's future pension benefits.

The board recommends the following procedure for dealing with current and future pension contributions:

Letters will be sent to the following lay leaders of the churches involved: Administrative Board/Council Chair, Pastor/Staff Relations Committee Chair, Finance Committee Chair, and Treasurer. The pastor and the district superintendent will also receive the letter. The letter will emphasize the importance of this issue and urge them to bring their contributions current by sending their check to Central Texas Conference, 464 Bailey Avenue, Fort Worth, TX 76107.

Each church which does not meet its obligation will report this fact to its Charge Conference and give an explanation. The district superintendent will keep a record of this action. As of December 31, 2010, we have eight (8) churches in arrears for a total amount of \$58,987.

CONFERENCE GROUP HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM

We are now in our eighth year of providing medical and pharmacy benefits through HealthFlex and we continue to be very satisfied with the program. There was no change in our EPO and PPO plan structures from 2010 to 2011. It is important to note that, while there will be no change in our health plan in 2012, we do anticipate plan changes in 2013 due to future changes in plans offered by HealthFlex.

Our health insurance plan will continue to be a mandatory program administered according to the HealthFlex rules for mandatory conference programs. Those for whom the program is mandatory are Elders, Provisional Elders, Associate Members, and Full-time Local Pastors appointed to local churches in the Conference, as well as those for whom the Conference is the Plan sponsor for the Pension program such as District Superintendents, Conference staff appointees, and Campus Ministers. In addition Elders appointed at least one-half time and Student Local Pastors will be included. Deacons serving at least one-half time are eligible for coverage at the Salary-Paying Unit (local church) level under a Sub-Adoption Agreement, but are not mandated. Not included in the plan (and thus not allowed insurance through the Conference) will be Elders serving less than one-half time, Ministers of Other Denominations, those appointed to extension ministries other than those named above, and Part-time Local Pastors. The Conference Board of Pensions reserves the right each year to choose the optional categories of appointments to be selected to best serve the needs of the Conference. Where a clergyperson in a mandatory category chooses to waive the program, the church served by that clergyperson will be assessed a minimum contribution equal to the single clergy PPO rate for the year, which is the default plan for the Conference, to be paid monthly. This is to insure

the stability of the program so it will be in place for other clergy who will serve that church. We further recommend that churches begin to think of health insurance coverage as a benefit provided to a pastor rather than as a part of that pastor's salary, and we encourage them to make it a separate item in their budget apart from salary considerations.

Lay employees, normally scheduled to work 30 hours or more per week, may be eligible for coverage at the Salary-Paying Unit (local church) level under a Sub-Adoption Agreement if Risk Pool requirements are met. The Risk Pool Rules apply to lay employees on an employer-by-employer basis. Surviving spouses and dependents of covered lay employees deceased on or after January 1, 2009 are eligible for coverage as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death and will be responsible for the entire premium. A new spouse acquired by a surviving spouse is not eligible for benefits through the Conference.

Claims experience was better than expected in 2010 so we will not experience an increase in premiums in 2012. The following are the preliminary premium rates for 2012 from HealthFlex.

We remind churches and pastors of the urgency to pay health insurance premiums monthly in a timely fashion. To fail to do so, as in any insurance

program, may result in cancellation of insurance benefits. If at any time the premium due becomes more than 90 days delinquent, the coverage for that/those participant(s) may be cancelled retroactively to the first of the month where the delinquency began and will not be available for reinstatement until the next plan year.

In 2011, the HealthFlex Incentive Program continues to provide financial incentives to HealthFlex participants for participating in the Virgin HealthMiles (VHM) walking program. VHM is a physical activity program brought to HealthFlex participants by HealthFlex and the Center for Health. This program allows participants to earn rewards for making a commitment to improve your health by walking or getting active in other ways. Again this year, HealthFlex is using a combination of reward incentives and disincentives to promote good health and encourage participants to be more responsible for their health-related behaviors.

VHM offers an opportunity to help participants become or stay focused on their health. Participants enroll and receive a free “GoZone” pedometer, which tracks the steps taken every day. Steps are uploaded from the pedometer to a personalized “LifeZone” HealthMiles Web site, which displays physical activity levels. Over time, participants can track their progress—and their rewards. Each time steps are uploaded, “HealthMiles” are received. HealthMiles are also earned for filling out a brief health snapshot, taking health measurements, participating in challenges and more. When fitness levels and measurements improve, participants earn HealthMiles for improvements. HealthMiles works like a frequent-traveler program. As different levels are reached, “HealthCash,” is earned which can be redeemed as gift cards for national retailers, or as a check written to the participant or their favorite charity. Up to \$300 can be earned in a 12-month period.

HealthMiles are converted to HealthCash based on the participation levels indicated below. (The reward for Level One is the free pedometer if you are new to the program.)

Participant HQ Incentive—Avoiding a Higher Deductible

HealthFlex continues to encourage more participants and spouses to complete

the HQ online health risk assessment. *Active plan participants and spouses who complete the HQ **between August 1, 2011 and September 30, 2011** will avoid having an extra \$250 individual or \$500 family cost added to their 2012 medical deductible.* Please note the following guidelines:

- The HQ deadline to avoid the higher 2012 deductible applies only to participants and their spouses enrolled in HealthFlex *active* medical plans. Medicare companion plan participants are not subject to the higher deductible.
- For married participants:
 - Both the participant and the covered spouse must take the HQ to avoid the higher deductible.
 - If only the participant or only the covered spouse takes the HQ, the household's 2012 coverage will be subject to an additional \$250 on their individual deductible or an additional \$500 on their family deductible.
 - For couples with one active participant and one Medicare companion plan participant, only the active-plan participant must complete the HQ between August 1, 2011 and September 30, 2011 in order to avoid the higher deductible.
 - Participants with family coverage who do not have a spouse covered by HealthFlex are only subject to the additional \$250 added to the individual or family deductible if they do not take the HQ between August 1, 2011 and September 30, 2011.
- Active plan participants and spouses who take the HQ before August 1, 2011 or after September 30, 2011 will be subject to the higher deductible.
- Participants and covered spouses must each log in to the HealthFlex/WebMD Web site using their own unique user IDs and passwords.

Quest Diagnostics Blueprint for Wellness® - a comprehensive and confidential "biometric" screening that is part of your HealthFlex wellness benefits—and a perfect complement to your annual doctor's visit. Blueprint for Wellness provides useful information about your heart, liver, kidney function, diabetes risk and blood sugar control, calcium and iron—plus PSA screening for men. The screening must be done **between April 1, 2011 and July 31, 2011** and you must be enrolled in Virgin HealthMiles to qualify for the incentive.

**Report No. 9
RETIREE HEALTH BENEFITS and
Service Requirements for Funding Retiree Health Benefits**

Beginning January 1, 2008, the Central Texas Conference (Conference) subsidized Retiree Health Insurance carrier is a Medicare Companion Plan, which is inclusive of prescription benefits, through HealthFlex sponsored by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits of the United Methodist Church and administered by BlueCross BlueShield of Illinois.

NOTE: Effective January 1, 2012, HealthFlex will no longer offer our current retiree health plan, Medicare Companion Plan 3. Therefore, the health plan for our retirees in 2012 will be Medicare Companion Plan 2. The major difference between the plans is there will be a \$500.00 deductible and then the plan will pay 80% of covered charges with an out of pocket maximum of \$1,500.00. The prescription plan will not change.

The Conference Board of Pensions is currently investigating the possibility of a future move to Extend Health, a vendor contracted by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits, who provides individual enrollment and plan assistance in the open market.

The Conference shares the funding of the Retiree Health Benefit Program for eligible retired participants with the retired clergy and spouses. The Conference Retiree Health Benefit Program assumes participation in Medicare Parts A and B and is designed to extend certain benefits beyond what Medicare pays. The Conference will subsidize the premium for the clergy retiree and his/her eligible spouse if the following service requirements have been met (these rules are in

effect for any clergyperson who retires after Annual Conference June, 2002): **Service Requirements for Funding Retiree Health Benefits:** At the time of retirement, the clergyperson must have been working in at least a ¾ time appointment as a Full Member of the Central Texas Conference or as a Full Time Local Pastor eligible for retirement per the Discipline and the rules of the Annual Conference. At the time of retirement, the clergyperson must be a member of the Central Texas Conference, serving in a local church or one of its “Conference Responsible” agencies, and they must have at least five (5) years of ministerial service in the Central Texas Conference and ten (10) years of service in the United Methodist Church. A waiver of the five (5) year requirement for service in the Central Texas Conference may be considered by the Central Texas Conference Board of Pensions upon recommendation of the Cabinet.

For those eligible clergypersons and their eligible spouses enrolled in the HealthFlex Medicare Companion Plan offered by the Conference who retire January 1, 2008 or after, the Conference will pay from 15 – 50% of the premium for those retiring at age 65 (or full retirement age) based on their years of ministerial service in the United Methodist Church.

For those eligible clergypersons and eligible spouses enrolled in the HealthFlex Medicare Companion Plan offered by the Conference who retired before January 1, 2008, the Conference will continue to subsidize the premium at 50%. Surviving spouses of deceased retired clergy are eligible for the subsidy as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death. A new spouse acquired by

a retiree or surviving spouse after retirement is not eligible for retiree benefits through the Conference.

If, at the time of retirement, the clergyperson is less than 65 years of age and has been covered for five consecutive years under HealthFlex, then the Conference will partially fund participation in the Conference's plan for active clergy only if the same service requirements are met as those who are 65 years of age. If the service requirements listed above have not been met, then the clergyperson and his or her spouse are responsible for providing for his or her own healthcare from that point forward.

If at the time of retirement, a retiree has Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage (e.g. through a spouse's employer), he/she may decline retiree coverage and retain the ability to enroll for coverage at a future date. If the retiree loses his or her coverage, it is the retiree's responsibility to notify the Conference and enroll in the retiree coverage within 30 calendar days of loss of other coverage. If this 30-day requirement is not met, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage/subsidy through the Conference at a future date. If an eligible retiree without Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage declines coverage at the time of retirement, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage/subsidy through the Conference at a future date.

Beginning January 1, 2009, the Central Texas Conference has elected the exception that allows a multiple employer plan to exempt certain individuals from the Medicare secondary payer rules for the working aged. This election helps reduce costs incurred by the Conference and the overall HealthFlex program. This exception applies to clergy, lay employees and spouses who are 65 years of age or older, entitled to Medicare due to their age, and have coverage under the HealthFlex program through an employer (local church or Conference sponsored entity) who employs fewer than 20 employees. For those individuals affected by the exception, Medicare will be the primary payer of their claims beginning the first day of the month they attain age 65, even if still an active employee, and the employee will no longer be eligible for coverage under the active plans. Eligible clergy and clergy spouses will be moved from the active plan over to the Conference subsidized retiree Medicare Companion Plan at that time. *The premium will be subsidized at 50% for the first five months of 2012 and then billed in full for the remainder of the year just as with any other active clergy.* Upon retirement, if eligible for retirement health benefits, a subsidy will apply based upon years of service as indicated in the scale above. Eligible lay employees, 65 years of age or older, will be moved from the active plan to the Medicare Companion Plan and will be responsible for the entire premium.

Beginning with a retirement date of January 1, 2009 or later, a lay employee whose active service has ended and has completed a minimum of five years of

continuous and uninterrupted coverage in HealthFlex immediately preceding the date of retirement, may continue under the Medicare Companion Plan, along with any eligible family members covered at the time of retirement, and will be responsible for the entire premium. Surviving spouses of retired, deceased lay employees are eligible for coverage as long as they are a covered participant at the time of death. A new spouse acquired by a retiree or surviving spouse after retirement is not eligible for benefits through the Conference.

If at the time of retirement, a retired layperson has Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage (e.g. through a spouse's employer), he/she may decline retiree coverage and retain the ability to enroll for coverage at a future date. If the retiree loses his or her coverage, it is the retiree's responsibility to notify the Conference and enroll in the retiree coverage within 30 calendar days of loss of other coverage. If this 30-day requirement is not met, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage through the Conference at a future date. If an eligible retiree without Other Employer-sponsored Group Health Coverage declines coverage at the time of retirement, the retiree will forfeit the ability to enroll for retiree coverage through the Conference at a future date.

We continue to have a concern for clergy who may have opted out of the Social Security system. It is imperative that those persons be Medicare eligible when they turn 65, or they likely will not be able to obtain any medical insurance. Some who have opted out may have this eligibility through a spouse, or through enough previous employment. However it should also be noted that eligibility for Social Security disability payments differs from the requirements for retirement and Medicare benefits. If a new pastor is considering this course, they should investigate these matters very carefully.

In 2011, the HealthFlex Incentive Program continues to provide financial incentives to HealthFlex participants for participating in the Virgin HealthMiles (VHM) walking program. VHM is a physical activity program brought to HealthFlex participants by HealthFlex and the Center for Health. This program allows participants to earn rewards for making a commitment to improve your health by walking or getting active in other ways. Participants and spouses enrolled in HealthFlex active and Medicare companion plans are eligible to earn HealthCash through the VHM program.

VHM offers an opportunity to help participants become or stay focused on their health. Participants enroll and receive a free "GoZone" pedometer, which tracks the steps taken every day. Steps are uploaded from the pedometer to a personalized "LifeZone" HealthMiles Web site, which displays physical activity levels. Over time, participants can track their progress—and their rewards. Each time steps are uploaded, "HealthMiles" are received. HealthMiles are also earned for filling out a brief health snapshot, taking health measurements, participating in

challenges and more. When fitness levels and measurements improve, participants earn HealthMiles for improvements. HealthMiles works like a frequent-traveler program. As different levels are reached, "HealthCash," is earned which can be redeemed as gift cards for national retailers, or as a check written to the participant or their favorite charity. Up to \$300 can be earned in a 12-month period.

Report No.10**RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL-HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR
RETIRED OR MINISTERS ON INCAPACITY LEAVE OF THIS CONFERENCE**

The Central Texas Conference (the "Conference") adopts the following resolutions relating to rental-housing allowances for active, retired or disabled clergypersons of the Conference:

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church (the "Church"), of which this Conference is a part, has in the past functioned and continues to function through ministers of the gospel (within the meaning of Internal Revenue Code section 107) who were or are duly ordained, commissioned, or licensed ministers of the Church ("Clergypersons");

WHEREAS, the practice of the Church and of this Conference was and is to provide active Clergypersons with a parsonage or a rental-housing allowance as part of their gross compensation;

WHEREAS, pensions or other amounts paid to retired and disabled Clergypersons are considered to be deferred compensation and are paid to active, retired and disabled Clergypersons in consideration of previous active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized the Conference (or its predecessors) as the appropriate organization to designate a rental-housing allowance for Clergypersons who are or were members of this Conference and are eligible to receive such deferred compensation;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT an amount equal to 100% of the pension or disability payments received from plans authorized under *The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church* (the "*Discipline*"), which includes all such payments from the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits ("GBOPHB"), during the year 2012 by each active, retired or disabled Clergyperson who is or was a member of the Conference, or its predecessors, be and hereby is designated as a rental-housing allowance for each such Clergyperson; and

THAT the pension or disability payments to which this rental-housing allowance applies will be any pension or disability payments from plans, annuities, or funds authorized under the *Discipline*, including such payments from the GBOPHB and from a commercial annuity company that provides an annuity arising from benefits accrued under a GBOPHB plan, annuity, or fund authorized under the *Discipline*, that result from any service a Clergyperson rendered to this Conference or that an active, retired or disabled Clergyperson of this Conference rendered to any local church, annual conference of the Church, general agency of the Church, other institution of the Church, former denomination that is now a part of the Church, or any other employer that employed the Clergyperson to perform services related to the ministry of the Church, or its predecessors, and that elected to make

contributions to, or accrue a benefit under, such a plan, annuity, or fund for such active, retired or disabled Clergy person's pension or disability as part of his or her gross compensation.

NOTE: The rental-housing allowance that may be excluded from a Clergy person's gross income in any year for federal income tax purposes is limited under Internal Revenue Code section 107(2) and regulations there under to the least of: (1) the amount of the rental-housing allowance designated by the Clergy person's employer or other appropriate body of the Church (such as this Conference in the foregoing resolutions) for such year; (2) the amount actually expended by the Clergy person to rent or provide a home in such year; or (3) the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances (such as a garage), plus the cost of utilities in such year.

Report No. 11 Section 125 Cafeteria Plan

For the purpose of paying for health care without having to pay taxes on the money which one spends, the Central Texas Conference established a Cafeteria plan under Section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code for all lay and clergy employees working 1040 hours per year (20 hours per week), who work in our churches, as Conference staff, in the CTC Foundation, at Glen Lake Camp and Retreat Center, or who are appointed to Conference-responsible extension ministries within the bounds of the Conference.

The Cafeteria Plan has an automatic feature and four optional features. The automatic feature, for which one does not need to fill out an enrollment form, is the exclusion from one's wages, on a pre-tax basis, one's medical insurance coverage premium. One needs only to indicate the yearly premium amount on one's Pastoral Support and Compensation Form and tell one's treasurer to exclude each month's premium and send it to the proper address. The four optional features require filling out an enrollment form and paying the proper administrative and posting charges which apply. These are also paid with pre-tax dollars. The optional features one may select to exclude from wages include:

1. Un-reimbursed Medical (URM) Flexible Spending Account up to \$5,000 (on a use-it-or-lose-it basis) through Aflac's FlexOne.
2. Dependent Day Care (DDC) Flexible Spending Account up to \$5,000 (for care of dependents under 13 years of age or dependents mentally or physically incapable of self-care, also on a use-it-or-lose-it basis) through Aflac's FlexOne.
3. Supplemental Medical Policies from Aflac.
4. Supplemental Dental Policies from Aflac.

Enrollment occurs within 30 days of employment and then is offered yearly to all eligible employees. It is important to note that re-enrollment in the Flexible Spending Accounts do not automatically occur or "roll over" into the following year. Each participant must re-enroll in the fall of the previous year for the next year's participation. The Supplemental Medical and Dental policies will remain in place in subsequent years unless a cancellation form is submitted to the Conference Office during the open enrollment period requesting the same. New materials for enrollment are available on the Conference website in October of each year for re-enrollment for the following year.

As with the health insurance plan, the premiums for the optional features should be paid monthly in a timely fashion. To fail to do so may result in the cancellation of the policy/policies. If at any time the premium due becomes more than 90 days delinquent, the coverage for that/those participant(s) may be cancelled retroactively to the first of the month where the delinquency began and will not be available for reinstatement until the next plan year.

TEXAS METHODIST FOUNDATION

Texas Methodist Foundation further explored ways to effectively serve United Methodist individuals, churches, and institutions in Texas during 2010, which included extending \$300,000 in special grant funding to the six annual conferences in Texas and New Mexico. Recognizing that additional funding would go far in serving communities still being impacted by economic strains, we provided these funds for special initiatives as identified by the presiding bishops in each conference and outreach ministries for critical needs – food, shelter, emergency assistance, and ministries of care and support – to those who have endured the devastating loss of a home or job.

Additionally, we are pleased to report that the Foundation ended 2010 with \$373 million in assets under management, showing an \$8 million growth over 2009. As a financial institution we remain strong and capable as we sow seeds for ministry by providing investments, loans, stewardship services, grants, and gift planning guidance to United Methodists across the state. Looking deeper into what those services really provide, we view the mission and ministry we set in motion through our work as the heart of our service to God.

As well as providing financial and consulting services, we continue to advocate strong pastoral and congregational leadership to build vital communities of faith. As more and more pastors gather around the common table provided by peer learning groups, our TMF Institute for Clergy and Congregational Excellence remains committed to supporting and developing courageous clergy leaders. Finding crucial spiritual renewal and key leadership tools required to serve the local church alongside the members of their congregations, who can also benefit from the Institute's Holy Conversations Communities of Learning, together they more fully answer their unique call to extend the hope of Christ in service to the world.

The Texas Methodist Foundation, located in Austin, serves United Methodist individuals, churches and agencies within the five geographic annual conferences in Texas and the Rio Grande Conference of Texas and New Mexico. We appreciate the opportunity to report some of the ways we enabled United Methodists last year.

How can we help you bring God's dreams for ministry to life?

We are pleased to report the assistance we provided in 2010:**Within the Central Texas Annual Conference:**

- Loans from the Foundation to churches in the Central Texas Annual Conference totaled \$59.8 million.
- Churches and related agencies within the Central Texas Annual Conference had \$21.4 million invested with the Foundation's Methodist Loan Fund.

Throughout the state:

- As of December 31, 2010, total assets under management by the Foundation were approximately \$373 million.
- Methodist Loan Fund investments grew overall, including new Individual Fund accounts of \$3.6 million. Methodist Loan Fund investments support the Foundation's loan program which currently funds 446 loans to United Methodist churches and agencies. Our loan balance ended 2010 at \$295.3 million.
- The TMF Institute for Clergy and Congregational Excellence ministry supported 87 pastors from the Texas annual conferences participating in 10 Clergy Development Groups. The Institute also welcomed 43 District Superintendents from around the state and across the South Central Jurisdiction, and the 11 active Bishops serving in the South Central Jurisdiction who were involved in group processes. Senior pastors and laity from five congregations also participated in two Holy Conversations Communities of Learning, focusing on spiritually-based strategic planning. And more than 60 judicatory leaders, pastors and laity also attended special gatherings of entrepreneurial leaders hosted by the Institute.
- During 2010, the Foundation funded grants in excess of \$620,000 including several from donor-advised funds. These grants benefited a variety of programs managed by local churches, community outreach centers, and conference ministries. The Foundation's Grants Ministry continues to give priority to programs that address the root causes of poverty as it affects children.
- The Foundation distributed approximately \$820,000 from permanent endowments, predominantly to United Methodist causes in Texas.
- Our Stewardship staff consulted on 20 capital campaigns and Miracle Sundays, resulting in pledges totaling more than \$13.6 million to support the missions of United Methodist congregations across the state. They made more than 398 consultation visits to churches offering counsel and guidance in areas of specific need related to funding ministry. Stewardship staff also conducted 12 annual and year-round stewardship workshops in local churches and 21 district and conference level workshops.
- Charitable Services staff guided leaders of more than 100 churches in initiating or revitalizing Permanent Endowment Fund programs. Staff also organized and facilitated peer group gatherings of congregational leaders from a number of churches. These groups exchange ideas and learn best practices for growing endowments to provide resources for future ministry. A number of planned giving workshops designed to promote bequests and legacy giving were conducted in congregations across the state. Staff also worked with individuals in establishing donor-advised funds which enable donors to receive an immediate tax deduction for irrevocable gifts and

provide additional means of accomplishing their charitable objectives over an extended time.

A listing of Texas Methodist Foundation Board of Directors from the Central Texas Conference area will be presented during the Annual Conference meeting June 5 - 8, 2011 in Waco.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees takes seriously its responsibility to verify that the Conference Insurance coverage is current. To that end, a review of all the Conference insurance policies has been completed, and we are satisfied that the Conference insurance coverages are adequate. The Conference continues to offer our churches the opportunity to participate in a group policy for Workers Compensation, Employee Liability, and Directors and Officers Insurance. This coverage is available through Roach, Howard, Smith, and Barton in Fort Worth at 1-800-295-6607. Churches often find that lower rates can be obtained through this Group Plan; therefore, we encourage our churches to consider this insurance option.

We also have Group Option for churches taking mission trips out of the country. If your church is planning such a mission trip outside the United States, we invite you to contact Roach, Howard, Smith and Barton at 1-800-295-6607 in Fort Worth for information about this Group Insurance Plan.

Conference policy requires that each church in the charge carry Workers' Compensation Insurance on pastors and other employees. If a pastor (or other worker) receives a work-related injury, health insurance will not pay on what should be a worker's compensation claim. In addition, regular liability insurance will not pay or protect a church against such a gap in coverage. Please, if you do not have workers' compensation coverage, check with our Conference agent, Roach, Howard, Smith and Barton (1-800-295-6607) in Fort Worth, or any agent of your choosing.

We encourage churches to survey the insurance coverage that they now have and compare it with new policies and new carriers. We remind churches that a required part of Charge Conference reporting is a report from the Trustees, which lists insurance coverage and deed recordings.

A new three (3) year contract for our Conference Electric Aggregate Plan has been negotiated and signed with Hudson Energy. All conference entities involved in this program have been notified of the change and lower rate. Approximately 250 entities are enrolled.

The Conference Center Facility Study performed by the firm of Hahnfeld, Hoffer and Stanford was completed and brought to the 2010 Annual Conference with a tentative recommendation pending the action of the Called Session of the Annual Conference. The Board of Trustees is now in a proactive movement toward a final Conference Center Facility recommendation.

In meeting Conference Board of Trustee Disciplinary paragraph 2512.7 "Establishment of Annual Conference Policy with Regard to Government Landmark Efforts to Designate Church Owned Property as Landmarks", your Conference Board of Trustees has developed the following policy:

**Central Texas Conference Board of Trustees
Executive Summary**

Pursuant to the necessity of the Conference to have a policy with regard to voluntary or governmental efforts to designate church owned property as landmarks this brief explanation of the types of historic designations is being provided.

Historic Markers/Designations in The United Methodist Church

- The United Methodist **Historic Site Marker** is a subject/educational designation marker that has **no limitations** on use of the church structure or changes to it. Even if the church were to move, the marker goes with.
- A **UM Heritage Landmark** is a structure or location specifically related to significant events, developments, or personalities in the **overall** history of the UMC or its antecedents and must have distinctive historic interest and value for the denomination as a whole. However, **the General Commission on Archives and History has no direct control over the administration, interpretation, and preservation of Heritage Landmarks** but it does have guidelines to maintaining the integrity of the landmark which if breached could simply result in the Heritage Landmark status being revoked.

Historic Markers/Designations from the Texas Historical Commission or local governmental agencies or organizations

- **THC Subject Markers** are educational in nature and reveal aspects of local history important to a community or region such as church congregations, schools, events and individuals. Subject markers are placed at sites that have historical associations with the topic but **no legal restriction is placed on the use of the property or site**. THC requests they be notified if the marker is relocated.

- **Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks** are awarded to **structures** deemed worthy of preservation for their historical and architectural significance. It is a **legal designation** and comes with a measure of protection. The designated structure must give 60 days written notice before any alterations are made to the structure as well as other limitations.
- **Public Organizational/Association Designation Landmark Status** may well serve community historical, cultural, or architectural purposes but depending on their own criteria and restrictions may substantially restrain the use, transformation and transferability of any church owned property that has been so designated. These limitations will be dictated by the governing body regardless of whether entered into voluntarily or involuntarily.

**CENTRAL TEXAS CONFERENCE
Landmark Designation Policy**

This policy is established pursuant to the 2008 *Book of Discipline* of The United Methodist Church as follows –

“Establishment of Annual Conference Policy with Regard to Governmental Efforts to Designate Church-Owned Property as Landmarks – The board, after consultation with the conference commission on archives and history, or alternate structure, shall develop a policy for an annual conference response, on behalf of any local church, church-related agency, or district or annual conference board of trustees located within the bounds of the annual conference, to any governmental effort to designate a property held in trust for the benefit of The United Methodist Church (§ 2501) by any such board of trustees as a cultural, historical or architectural landmark.”
(§2512.7 of the 2008 *Book of Discipline*)

WHEREAS, the Conference Board of Trustees is the designated agency to intervene and take all necessary legal steps to safeguard and protect the interests and rights of the Annual Conference anywhere and in all matters relating to property and rights of property of any of its local churches and church-related agencies. (2008 *Book of Discipline* §§2501, 2512.4)

WHEREAS, landmark designation of property by a public or governmental body, or other non-profit organization may well serve important cultural, historical, architectural or other community purposes, but it may also substantially restrain the use, transformation and transferability of any church-owned property so designated. Whether voluntary or involuntary on the part of the church property owner, landmark status thus results in a transfer or sale of property under *The Book of Discipline*.

WHEREAS, the Conference Commission on Archives and History has been duly consulted, and whereas, in addition, this policy cannot conflict with the recognition of United Methodist Sites and Landmarks as provided in ¶1712 of *The Book of Discipline*.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT, at the earliest opportunity following notification or receipt of information that voluntary or involuntary landmark status efforts may affect its property, a local church or church-related agency in the Central Texas Conference shall notify the Conference Treasurer or Conference Chancellor, who in turn shall notify the resident Bishop and the District Superintendent in whose district the property is located.

If the local church or church-related agency desires to cooperate voluntarily with landmark status for its property, the church or agency shall obtain an approval vote of the Conference Board of Trustees who shall confer with the Bishop prior to or during its deliberations. The local church or agency shall then comply with the provisions on sale or transfer of property (as applicable) of *The Book of Discipline*, including the convening of any required meeting or charge conference.

In the event of efforts to landmark involuntarily property owned by a local church or church-related agency, the Conference Board of Trustees may in their discretion assist local churches and church-related agencies in responding to such efforts, and may intervene and take such measures as appropriate to protect the interests of The United Methodist Church in the property in question.

General Overview of Landmark Designation:

Generally speaking, landmark designation seeks to preserve some historic, cultural, architectural or other similar aspect of a building or defined geological area. Government bodies and non-profit organizations at the federal, state and local levels are involved in these efforts.

Landmark status can be voluntary or involuntary on the part of the property owner. A typical example of voluntary landmark status is when a government body and a property owner agree to preserve some architectural façade or historic feature of a building. The owner agrees to a perpetual easement restricting future use and development rights on the building and property in exchange for the governmental body's payment of money and extension of tax credits to the owner.

Involuntary landmark status typically occurs at the state and local level when a government body designates a defined geographical area as a historic or cultural district. The restrictions on the property vary from district to district, and compliance with the restrictions can be voluntary or mandatory. In all cases, the

decision on whether to permit a use or expansion request is beyond the control of the property owner. There may be tax incentives for a property's location within a district.

Property owners may feel that landmark designation is an honor, or that a historic district or neighborhood is a positive part of urban life. However, as a practical matter, there may be many negatives to landmark status. Chief among these are the scope and nature of the restraints on use, transformation and transferability of the property.

The Legal Department of the General Council on Finance and Administration generally advises against obtaining voluntary landmark status of property owned by local churches or church-related agencies.

"In summary, church organizations need to be extremely careful before making any decision that its property would be enhanced in any way by landmark status. Landmark status may be desirable in certain limited circumstances. However, landmark status can drastically limit the availability and allocation of resources and severely restrict a church's freedom to make its own decisions about important issues, including how it practices its faith." (GCFA Legal Manual, V-March 18, March 2005.)

From the standpoint of property owned in trust for The United Methodist Church, landmark status may very well prevent a local church from transforming the donations given in the past into new structures or establishments for United Methodist use or enjoyment in the future. Further, the tax benefits available to private property owners are generally worthless to a church since a church does not usually pay income or real estate taxes.

Certainly, each landmark status effort needs to be assessed on its own merits, and there may be instances where landmark status is in the best interests of both the public and the church organization. However, generally speaking, landmark designation should be discouraged.

Resolved: That the Congregations and Boards and Agencies of the Central Texas Annual Conference, during the 2011-2012 conference year, develop plans of action to confront these global threats to God's good creation and share these plans with Congregations across the Annual Conference.

**Resolution for the Discontinuance Of Pleasant Hill UMC
Brownwood District**

Whereas the congregation of Pleasant Hill UMC located in Erath County, Brownwood District, has declared its intention to close after faithful servant ministry for 110 years and

Whereas the Brownwood District has surveyed the needs of ministry in the mission field and believe it can be served by existing nearby congregations and

Whereas it would appear to serve no missional purpose to retain this property and

Whereas the discontinuation of the church and the abandonment of its property has been recommended by the District Superintendent and approved by the Bishop, a majority of the District Superintendents and the District Board of Church Location and Building and

Whereas all steps required by the Discipline have been taken;

Therefore be it resolved that the Pleasant Hill UMC be discontinued as of January 2, 2011 and all of its property declared abandoned and transferred to the Central Texas Conference of the UMC for sale distribution or other disposition as the Conference Board of Trustees may deem in the best interest of the mission of the Conference (see the Central Texas Conference Standing Rule 8, ¶ 1, page 317 of the *2009 Journal of the Central Texas Conference*) and

Be it further resolved that the Central Texas Conference Board of Trustees be authorized at its discretion, to distribute items of property, which may best be used by other churches to such churches or to the Commission on Church Growth & Development and to sell all other property with the net proceeds first applied to the retirement of any pension deficits of that church and the remainder given to the Commission on Church Growth & Development for congregational development and

Be it further resolved that the remaining members of the Pleasant Hill UMC at the time of this action be transferred to FUMC Hico, Texas and that all official records of the discontinued church be forwarded to the Central Texas Conference archives.

**Resolution for the Discontinuance of Resurrection United Methodist
Church
Weatherford District**

WHEREAS the St. Paul United Methodist Church located in Johnson County was renamed Resurrection United Methodist in 2008; and

WHEREAS the membership of Resurrection Methodist Church has been transferred to other congregations and there are no existing trustees; and

WHEREAS the district superintendent and the Director of Church Growth and Development have recommended discontinuance of Resurrection United Methodist Church; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Central Texas Conference Board of Trustees be authorized, in its discretion, to distribute the items of the property which may be best used by other churches to such churches or to the Commission on Church Growth and Development and to sell all other property with the net proceeds given to the Church Growth and Development.

June 3, 1914 - July 14, 2010

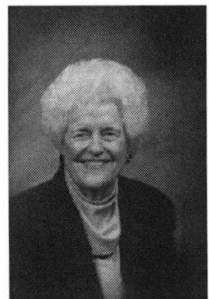

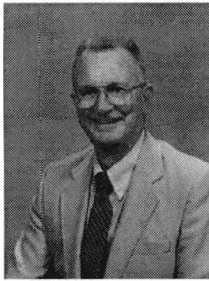
Margaret Harper Schoberle

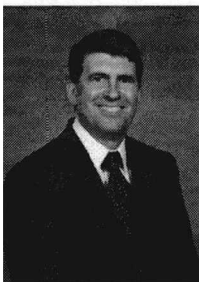

HOBBIES: Reading, old movies, square dancing, video film making and writing memoirs.

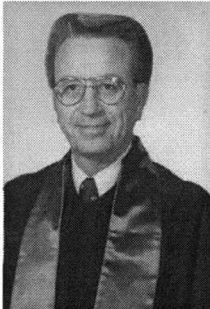

GUIDING PRINCIPLES & BEST PRACTICES

Introduction to Guiding Principles & Best Practices

The task assigned our team was to reconcile the former “Standing Rules” of the Annual Conference with the new programs and structures of the Exodus Project, adopted by the Annual Conference in November of 2010.

Our group felt it important for our work to express the “Guiding Principles” adopted by the Annual Conference in the Exodus Project as the first section of this report. These principles are foundational to the understanding of our mission and ministry.

Realizing that the Exodus Project was a roadmap for a church in transition, the phrase “Standing Rules” does not describe an Exodus journey. The Church described in the Exodus Project is on the move, facing change, and adapting quickly to changing realities. It is for that reason that the second section of our work is named “Best Practices.”

Finally, as we looked at our previous Standing Rules, it became clear that the number of actual “rules” was very small. The vast majority of the content related to policies and procedures that were part of the work of the various structural organizations.

In order to make our organization more nimble and adaptive, we offer the proposal that those items be included in a Conference Policy and Procedure Manual that is also part of this report. Unlike the “Best Practices and Guiding Principles,” these policies and procedures can be handled at the appropriate organizational level and do not require a 2/3 vote of the annual conference to amend or suspend.

We also approached this task with the hope that both documents will be more organic and less institutional. They are living and breathing organism that adapt and change as necessary to do the work of God in the world.

Guiding Principles of the Central Texas Annual Conference

- We embrace and celebrate the mission of the United Methodist Church of “making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.”
- We believe that the churches of our conference are “mission stations,” outposts for the work of God in the world.
- We believe that mission at all levels of the church should be well defined, laser focused, with measurable outcomes.
- We believe that the Conference and its local congregations are called to be good stewards of the resources God provides for our work.
- We believe that we are called to be faithful to the five core values of Evangelism, The Wesleyan Tradition, Spiritual Growth, Mission, and Inclusiveness.
- We embrace the four focus areas of the United Methodist Church of: 1) Developing principled Christian leaders for the church and the world, 2) Creating new places for new people by starting new congregations and renewing existing ones, 3) Engaging in ministry with the poor, and 4) Stamping out killer disease by improving health globally.
- We believe that each local church can become a “Fruitful Congregation” by practicing Radical Hospitality, Passionate Worship, Intentional Faith Development, Risk-Taking Mission, and Extravagant Generosity.
- We believe in the inevitability of change, that it’s God’s gift, and it is our task to manage change in efficient and creative ways.

Annual Conference Best Practices

(Section One)

- The Central Texas Conference shall be organized according to the current Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church. In accordance with the Discipline, it shall meet annually at a time appointed by the Bishop at the location chosen by the Annual Conference. Adjourned or special sessions shall be called in a manner set forth by the Discipline.
- The business of the Annual Conference shall be conducted by the current edition of Roberts Rules of Order.
- A Preliminary Report of matters for consideration by a session of the Annual Conference shall be made available to the members of the Annual Conference at least one month prior to the session of the Annual Conference.

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- Lay members and alternate lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected at their local church charge conference for a one-year term following their election, subject to the provisions of the Book of Discipline.
 - There shall be an equal number of lay and clergy members on the Annual Conference. The procedure for the equalization of lay and clergy members in the next Annual Conference will be presented as part of the report of Center for Mission Support.
 - The procedures for handling matters to be presented to Annual Conference that were not in the Preliminary Report can be found in the Policy and Procedure Manual of the Annual Conference.
 - Any of the Best Practices of the Annual Conference may be amended or suspended by a two-thirds vote of those present and voting at a session of the Annual Conference provided that any such motion to amend the Best Practices must be laid on the table at least one day before the Conference can vote to amend.
 - Vacancies in membership on Annual Conference bodies that occur between sessions of the Annual Conference shall be filled by the appropriate bodies following the procedures outlined in the Policy and Procedures Manual of the Annual Conference.
 - General Church and Annual Conference apportionments shall be apportioned to each local church on a conference wide basis. The details of the formula shall be part of the report of The Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration. (§613.3)
 - There shall be a Manual of Conference Policies and Procedures that outlines policies and procedures related to Financial Matters, Clergy Benefits, Change of Appointment and other issues related to the functions of the Church.
 - There will be a team to read, record, and approve the proceedings of the Annual Conference after the final session. The team will be nominated by the Center for Mission Support and approved by the Core Leadership Team.
 - The Districts of the Annual Conference will organize in such a way to reflect the offices/tasks required by the Book of Discipline and the Annual Conference. Beyond the basic Disciplinary and Conference requirements, Districts may organize in the best way to accomplish the mission of the Annual Conference and support the mission of their local churches.

Financial Best Practices**(Section 2)**

- The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1 to December 31, and the salaries of clergy members (appointed as pastors, District Superintendents, Executive Center Directors) and lay employees shall be paid accordingly.
- The Council on Finance and Administration shall present the proposed budget for the purpose of clarification and correction only at the first business session of the Annual Conference each year. Changes in the proposed budget shall be reported by the committee, board and/or Center making the request at the time they report to the Annual Conference. Approval or disapproval of the financial request shall be voted as an amendment to the proposed budget at the final presentation of the budget by CFA at the last session of the Annual Conference.
- Any proposal to create a new apportionment or to change the purpose for an existing apportionment shall be presented during a regular or called session of the Annual Conference, and shall not be voted on until the next session of the Annual Conference.
- Any proposed change of the decimal formula shall first be studied by the Council on Finance and Administration. CFA shall then report its recommendation to the Annual Conference (2008 Book of Discipline ¶615).
- The auditing firm approved by the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall audit all books of treasurers of boards whose auditing is not provided in the Book of Discipline, and report the results to the CFA. A statement of these accounts will be sent to the Conference Secretary for inclusion in the minutes.
- The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend the mileage reimbursement for necessary travel to Conference meetings for members of all Conference entities.
- The Conference Treasurer, after the close of the fiscal year, shall transfer into the Operating Reserve all unexpended balances of the annual appropriations for the year just closed (excepting only items specifically exempted by the Council on Finance and Administration). The Conference Treasurer will honor the requisitions for all necessary expenses of the new fiscal year within the limits of the appropriations.

Annual Conference Organization (Section Three)

- The Annual Conference is to be organized to accomplish the stated mission of the United Methodist Church. “The mission of the church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.”
- There shall be a **Core Leadership Team** who will oversee the administration and mission of the Annual Conference. It will develop measurable outcomes for the Central Texas Conference in keeping with the direction laid out by the Annual Conference and which are faithful to the Book of Discipline. The team will identify emerging mission needs and deploy resources to meet them. The Team will create a culture of accountability for the Center Teams and their Executive Directors. The Team will be convened by the Bishop or in the absence of the Bishop by the Assistant to the Bishop.
 1. The membership of the Core Leadership Team will include;
 - a. The Bishop (voice but not vote)
 - b. The Conference Lay Leader
 - c. One lay member elected by each of the five geographical districts
 - d. One lay member Chosen from the New Church District
 - e. Three at-large members appointed by the Bishop
 - f. Dean of the Cabinet
 - g. The Assistant to the Bishop
 - h. The Executive Director of the Center for Leadership
 - i. The Executive Director of the Center for Evangelism & Church Growth
 - j. The Executive Director of the Center for Mission Support
 2. Specific Responsibilities of Core Leadership Team and its Temporary Project Groups
 - a. Annual Conference Strategic Planning
 - b. Management and updating the Guiding Principles of the Conference
 - c. Planning of the sessions of Annual Conference
 - d. Other Project Groups that are needed to facilitate the mission of the Conference.
- There will be the **Connectional Table** of the Annual Conference. Its purpose is to provide for the diversity of voices and interests of the Conference to be heard in conversation about the mission and ministry of the Church. The group is collaborative and inclusive. The Connectional Table is to enable the flow of information and communication among the various interests and ministries within the Conference. The Table is where the representative areas required by the Book of Discipline will reside.
 1. The membership of the Connectional Table shall include:
 - a. Executive Directors of The Three Centers
 - b. President of Conference United Methodist Women

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- c. President of Conference United Methodist Men
 - d. Inclusiveness Team (Includes attention to:)
 - 1) The Status and Role of Women
 - 2) Native American Ministries
 - 3) Disability Concerns
 - 4) Religion and Race
 - e. President of Conference Student Leadership Team
 - f. Team Leader of Conference Young Adult Ministries
 - g. Team Leader of Unity and Interreligious Concerns
 - h. Team Leader of Commission on Archives and History
 - i. Members of General and Jurisdictional bodies who reside in the Annual Conference
2. The Connectional Table will be convened by any of the Executive Center Directors.
- There will be a **Center for Leadership**. The Executive Director of the Center for Leadership will also serve as the Assistant to the Bishop. The Center will be responsible for the following functions:
 1. Higher Education
 2. Campus Ministry
 3. Intentional Interim Ministry
 4. Extension Ministries
 5. Identification, recruitment, and equipping of young, diverse, lay and clergy leaders.
 6. Resourcing for Healthy Churches.
 7. Communication and information technology for the Annual Conference.
 8. Professional and Ethical Behavior for Clergy and Lay Leaders
 9. Annual Conference Nominations and Leadership

The Center will be the organizational home of the following:

1. The Board of Ordained Ministry
 2. The Committee on Administrative Review
 3. The Committee on Investigation
 4. The Board of Laity
 5. The Order of Elders
 6. The Order of Deacons
 7. The Order of Local Pastors
 8. Committee on the Episcopacy
 9. Committee on Counseling (program)
- There will be a **Center for Evangelism and Church Growth**. The Center will be responsible for the following functions:
 1. Small membership and rural church transformation.
 2. Ethnic local church concerns
 3. Evangelism and witness
 4. Establishment of new faith communities

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5. Transformation of Existing Congregations.
 6. Parish and Community Development
- There will be a **Center for Mission Support**. The Center will address the following issues.

XII. Policies and Procedures

Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church Policies & Procedures of the Annual Conference

2011-2012

Procedure for Equalization of Lay Clergy Members of the Annual Conference

1. It shall be the responsibility of the Center for Mission Support annually to revise the number of additional lay members required to equalize lay and clergy membership of the Annual Conference.
2. The Center for Mission Support shall notify each District Superintendent as to the churches that will elect additional members preceding the next Annual Conference, by September 1.
3. To equalize the number of lay and clergy, the following will be members by virtue of offices held;
 - a. Each District Lay Leader
 - b. Each District United Methodist Women President
 - c. Each District United Methodist Men President
 - d. Each District Student Leadership President
 - e. One additional youth designated by the District Student Leadership Team
 - f. Lay chairs of Conference boards, councils, commissions, or committees.
 - g. Lay Members of any general and/or jurisdictional agencies who reside in the Central Texas Conference and are not otherwise members of the Annual Conference.

Procedure for Submitting Matters to Be Presented to the Annual Conference Session

1. All resolutions and petitions for consideration of Annual Conference shall be presented to the Center for Mission Support sixty days prior to the beginning of the Annual Conference session. It is the responsibility of the Center for Mission Support to send these resolutions and petitions to the appropriate Center Team. The Center Team will report a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions prior to the Annual Conference.

2. All matters to be presented to the Annual Conference in session which pertain to the work of one of the Center Teams, and which were not received and considered before the Preliminary Report was made available, shall be referred by the Center for Mission Support to the appropriate Center Team for consideration. The Center Team will report a recommendation of concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions prior to the Annual Conference.
3. All other papers, resolutions or reports presented to Annual Conference which may not pertain directly to the work of one of its standing bodies must also be referred to the designated Conference Secretary and then to a study committee nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference. Those shall be reported back to the Conference with recommendation for concurrence or non-concurrence and/or any revisions prior to the close of the Conference session, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.
4. All papers, resolutions, obituaries and reports coming to the Conference, not included in the preliminary report, must be typewritten and copies of said report must be in the hands of the designated Conference Secretary before they are presented to the Conference. Any reports requiring approval of the Annual Conference, not in the preliminary report, shall be reproduced for members of the Conference by the proponent so that all may follow the report as it is being presented.
5. The Center for Mission Support shall designate a team to receive and publish suitable memoirs of deceased clergy and widows or widowers of clergy. The clergy in charge of the funeral of such persons shall be responsible for preparing the memoir and filing it with the Center for Mission Support immediately after the funeral.

Procedure for Nominations to Annual Conference

There shall be an Annual Conference Nominations and Leadership Team. It shall be the purpose of the Team to seek out and enlist the services of the best-qualified persons available within the Annual Conference to fill various positions for which it is to make nominations.

The membership shall be the Bishop, who shall be the chair, voice but no vote,

1. the District Superintendents,
2. Lay Leader, the Conference
3. Presidents of Conference United Methodist Women, Conference United Methodist Men, Conference Student Leadership Team
4. District Lay Leaders,
5. One other youth representative recommended annually by the Conference Student Leadership Team,
6. Representatives recommended annually by the Commission on Inclusiveness,
7. Three clergy at-large elected annually upon nomination.
8. The Executive Directors of the Centers for Mission Support, Leadership, and Evangelism and Church Growth shall be members without vote.

The Conference Committee on Nominations and Leadership procedure for officers of boards, councils or agencies of the Conference as required by the Discipline and/or Standing rules shall be:

1. The respective boards and agencies shall nominate their own officers and present the names to the Nomination Team prior to February 10 of the year in which they shall be elected
2. The Nominations Team may return the nominations to the boards and agencies with possible recommendations for further review and resubmission;
3. The Committee on Nominations shall have ultimate authority to submit nominations to the Annual Conference in order to achieve appropriate age, ethnic, gender, District and expertise representation.
4. When the nominations are complete, the Committee on Nominations shall present the names of the officers of the respective boards and agencies and Center Teams to the Annual Conference for election.

The Annual Conference Nominations and Leadership Team shall make nominations to the Annual Conference as may be necessary for the following positions required by the current Book of Discipline.

No person shall serve as an elected member of more than one of the Annual Conference standing bodies at one time, unless necessary for age, ethnic, gender, District or expertise representation.

The nomination procedure for Conference Teams, Boards, Committees and Commissions shall be as follows:

- 1) Prior to February 1st of each year, the Center for Leadership shall make available to each District Superintendent a listing of all positions for which District nominations are solicited for consideration by Conference Nominations Team to appear on the slate that will be presented at the ensuing Annual Conference session;
- 2) Prior to February 10th, the District Superintendents of the respective Districts shall distribute to the local church Lay Leaders and to the pastors of the respective Districts the listing of all positions for which District nominations are being solicited from the local churches for positions to be elected at the ensuing Annual Conference session;
- 3) Prior to March 15th, the District Committee on Nominations will meet for the purpose of preparing District nominations for all positions in question, taking into consideration the names submitted by local churches. The District Committee, however, shall make nominations of only persons it feels are adequately equipped for the task and may elect not to make nominations in those cases where it feels minimum qualifications for the positions in question are not present. All persons being considered for a position in the Annual Conference shall be contacted by the District Committee on Nominations before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibilities of the position and whether or not they are willing to serve, if nominated and elected
- 4) Prior to May 10th, the Conference Nominations Team shall meet to prepare a list of nominees for all positions that must be filled by the next Annual Conference.
- 5) All persons being considered for a position in the Annual Conference shall be contacted by the Conference Nominations Team before nomination to Annual Conference regarding the responsibility of the position and whether or not they are willing to serve, if elected.

Prior to April 1, all agencies and institutions related to the Annual Conference shall submit to the Center for Leadership their nominations of persons to be elected by the Central Texas Conference to serve on their boards of Directors or trustees.

It is recommended that insofar as possible, the membership on leadership teams, councils, boards, and agencies of the Annual Conference shall be representative of the Conference's Districts except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.

All Annual Conference Standing Bodies shall have the right to add up to four additional persons to their membership in addition to other Conference guidelines, in order to ensure age, gender, ethnic, and District and expertise representation.

The chair of Commission on Communications and the Commission on Archives and History will be elected at the Annual Conference preceding the next General Conference unless prohibited by the Discipline. If not already serving on the body, they will serve as ex-officio members of their respective standing body for one year prior to their taking office in the new quadrennium. All other members of the [standing bodies] will be elected and begin membership at the first Annual Conference following General Conference

All nominations shall be for a quadrennium that corresponds with General Conference except if this is in violation of the Discipline or with special Annual Conference approval.

Annual Conference Financial Procedures

A. Remittance Procedure

Apportionment payments, askings, special day offerings, advance specials, and any missional gifts from a pastoral charge to the Conference Treasurer should be submitted either online or by check with accompanying current year remittance form supplied by the Council on Finance and Administration. The Conference Treasurer will in turn post online, in a timely fashion, remittances received. The Conference Treasurer will also report monthly to the Bishop and Cabinet the status of funds remitted.

B. Conference Budget Preparation Procedure

After careful consideration of all financial responsibilities of the Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration, and the Executive Center Directors shall recommend all funding levels for the major categories in the total Conference program. If for any reason the Conference benevolence budget needs to be changed, CFA shall adjust the allocation and refer it back to the three Conference Centers for adjustments of the itemized appropriations in the Conference benevolence budget. Should any Conference Center agency feel its cause has been neglected or excluded, it shall have the opportunity to represent its cause before the Council on Finance and Administration (Book of Discipline ¶614).

C. Conference Budget based on Local Church Decimal

All Conference items allocated to the local churches of the Conference shall be

based on the decimal arrived at by the following formula: Determine Conference total expenditure by adding the total of the following Table II statistical items:

- 51A Pension & Benefit Funds (CRSP)
- 53 Pastor's Base Compensation
- 54 Associate Pastor's Base Compensation
- 55 Utilities and Housing paid to/for Pastor and to/for Associate(s)
- 57 Travel and Other Allowances paid to/for Pastor and Associate (s)
- 58 Deacon(s) Compensation
- 59 Diaconal Compensation
- 60 Other Staff Compensation
- 61 Current Program Expense
- 62 Other Current Operating Expense

Add the above ten (10) expenditures for each local church to get the "local church total expenditure." Divide each "local church expenditure" by the "Conference total expenditure" to arrive at the local church decimal. (Each decimal is rounded to five decimal places.) Multiply the local church decimal by Conference Apportionment allocation to get the Local Church Apportionment. (Each apportionment is rounded to the nearest dollar, with each church being apportioned at least one dollar for each apportionment.)

D. Council on Finance and Administration Duty

It shall be the duty of the Council on Finance and Administration to compute the decimal annually using the latest statistics (corrected, if necessary), and furnish the table of apportionments to the Districts for distribution.

E. Items for Distribution

All items to be distributed under the formula are included in the Conference budget: all General Church Apportionments, all Jurisdictional Church Apportionments, and Annual Conference Administration and Ministries. Others can only be added by action of the Annual Conference.

F. Special Day Offering

Any Special Day Offering, except where set by the Book of Discipline, must first be annually presented and approved by the Council on Finance and Administration. No such day shall be recommended to the Annual Conference for any agency, cause, or institution, nor shall such a day be listed or printed on the Conference calendar, unless such agency, cause, or institution has presented a full financial statement and audit, including current annual income and expense, together with its report to the appropriate Conference Ministry Center.

Procedures for Discontinued or Abandoned Church Property

Any property abandoned in the past or that shall be abandoned in the future and the property disposed of as directed by the Book of Discipline in accordance with 2008 ¶ 2548, the proceeds derived there from, if any, shall be first applied to the retirement of pension deficits, and the satisfaction of any claims against ministerial pension annuities which may have arisen out of failure of that church to make proportionate payment for support. The remaining proceeds are to be transferred to the Center for Church Growth and Development.

In the event of a church closure or abandonment, the official and historical records of the closed or abandoned church will be transferred directly to the Archives Depository of the Central Texas Conference by the District Superintendent of the District in which the closed or abandoned church is located.

In the event of two or more churches merging, the official and historical records of the churches being merged shall be transferred to the Archives Depository of the Central Texas Conference by the District Superintendent of the District in which the churches are located. The records shall be transferred to the Archives Depository no later than three months following the merger.

Procedures for Local Churches

Each congregation shall annually give attention to the vacation policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the policy found in this Manual.

Each congregation shall annually give attention to the housing policy, using as the guideline for its discussion the policy found in this Manual.

Parsonage utilities should be in the name of the church, i.e., the deposit paid by the church. If the parsonage utilities are not paid by the church, the departing pastor must have arranged in advance of his/her departure to have the meters read on moving day, or on the day of departing the parsonage. The departing pastor is responsible for the bills up to that time.

In the event of death of a clergy or diaconal minister residing in a church owned residence, the family of the deceased clergy or diaconal minister will be allowed ninety days to find other housing and vacate the church owned residence, or such other time as deemed appropriate by the Cabinet and by the local church pastor/staff-parish relations committee.

Salaries of clergy moving at Annual Conference shall be paid through May 31 by the former charge and from June 1 by the receiving charge.

No pastor is allowed to claim reimbursement for more than 5/12 of the Pastor's accountable reimbursement Plan between January and May without recommendation of the PPR/SPR Committee and approval by the Administrative Board.

Policy Regarding Parsonage Standards for Local Churches

The following Parsonage Standards were put in place, approved at the 1973 Central Texas Annual Conference, and have appeared in our Journals since that time. Therefore, parsonages built or purchased prior to December 31, 1973 may not meet all of the recommendations in Sections I and II, but are subject to requirements in Sections III – V. Parsonages built or purchased after January 1, 1974 are subject to all recommendations and requirements listed below in Sections I –V.

Section I Location

The location of a new parsonage is a matter of extreme importance. It should provide for the safety, convenience and privacy of the parsonage family. For this reason, we recommend that a new parsonage not be located adjacent to the church facilities.

Section II Size of Building and Living Areas

The new or remodeled parsonage should be large enough to accommodate the pastor's family. It should provide adequate space for the entertainment of guests. It should be remembered in selecting a parsonage that the present parsonage family is not the only one who will live in that parsonage and that the house should be adaptable for a variety of family sizes and situations. Also, care should be given that facilities should be fully accessible for those with handicapping conditions meeting standards of the 2008 Discipline ¶2543.

Recommendations:

1. 1800 square feet minimum living space.
2. At least 3 bedrooms, preferable 4.
3. At least 2 bath, preferable 2 ½ with adequate linen closet.
4. Living and dining areas adequate for entertaining.
5. A family room
6. Adequate closet and storage space. Closet space in each bedroom and other storage space well distributed throughout the house.
7. Laundry area (see III.C.8)
8. Adequate garage or carport space (preferable 2-car attached garage)
9. Adequate outside living area with fenced yard.

Section III
Required Equipment

A. Health & Safety

1. Adequate supply of hot and cold water in bathrooms, kitchen and laundry.
2. Proper sewage disposal according to the stands of local and/or State Department of Health.
3. Fire extinguisher in kitchen with yearly inspection.
4. Automatic central heating and air conditioning.
5. Any bathroom heating should be protected and if not electric should be vented.
6. Provide smoke detectors for kitchen, living, laundry, and bedroom areas.
7. Provide carbon monoxide detectors, unless parsonage is completely electric.
8. Recommend that a Lead Paint Disclosure be provided for parsonages built before 1978.

B. Kitchen with Well-Planned Work Area

1. Cooking area complete with range or built-in cooking units, counter space, hood and exhaust fan.
2. Sink area complete with modern double bowl sink with disposal and drain space.
3. Large automatic refrigerator with freezer unit.
4. Required code electrical outlets for every room.
5. A well-equipped kitchen with adequate storage for dishes and utensils.
6. Built-in dishwasher.
7. Laundry room with washer/dryer.

C. Furnishings

1. House adequately furnished with main items in living room, family room, and kitchen. Discarded or worn out furnishings should not be used to furnish the parsonage. A Gift/Donation Policy by the Trustees of the church should be in place to prevent such an occurrence.)
2. Window coverings, drapes, curtains, and blinds.
3. Television antenna or cable service to parsonage.
4. Lawn tools, mower (self-propelled or riding as appropriate for size of yard) hoses, ladder, garbage receptacles.
5. All bedroom furnishings shall be the responsibility of the parsonage family.
6. The formal dining room furnishings shall be the responsibility of the resident parsonage clergy.
7. The Commission on Equitable Compensation and Clergy Benefits recommends that effective January 1, 2011, all living and family room furnishings become the responsibility of the resident parsonage family.

Section IV Maintenance

1. Decoration—both the interior and exterior of the parsonage should be kept in such a state of decoration as to preserve not only its physical condition but its aesthetic value as well. Decorating and/or any remodeling should be done in consultation with the parsonage family.
2. Repair and replacement— An annual budget item will enable the Trustees and Parsonage Committee to have a consistent, rather than haphazard program of maintenance and improvement that will be less costly in the long run. There should be an annual budget item for repair and replacement of furniture and equipment.

Section V Miscellaneous

1. Parsonage Book—it is recommended that the parsonage committee prepare and keep up-to-date a record in which are placed all guarantees, repair parts lists, and the instructions for use of equipment belonging in the parsonage. The record should also indicate when and from whom purchased and whom to call for service. Also this book may well contain a list of whom to call for various reasons, where to find various items, when and by whom various improvements were made, and other information helpful to an incoming minister.
2. Insurance—the trustees should be certain that the church-owned house and contents are insured for at least 80% of replacement cost against fire, wind, and other hazards. Public liability insurance should be carried on parsonage property. Tenant Homeowners insurance is available for all ministers who desire to cover personal possessions and liability. **IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PASTOR TO INSURE PERSONAL PROPERTY BELONGING TO THE PASTOR AND FAMILY.**
3. Utility Deposits—should be made in the name of the church.
4. Gifts to Parsonage—when a gift of furniture or furnishings is presented, it should be designated specifically if it is to remain in the parsonage or is to be the personal gift for the pastor/family. In the event it is to remain in the parsonage, the parsonage committee must approve it.
5. Pastor's Office/Study—The Office/Study should be located in the Church Building and adequately furnished and equipped. Some pastors may choose to also maintain an office in the parsonage and be responsible for its furnishings in addition to the official church Office/Study.

Adequate parsonage facilities, based on the above standards insure that a pastoral appointment can be made based on the needs of the charge, rather than the ability of the parsonage to receive the family assigned. An annual review of the church-owned parsonage, to ensure proper maintenance, will be conducted by the chair of the board of trustees or the chair of the parsonage committee, if one exists, the chair of the committee on pastor-parish relations, and the pastor (§2532.4, 2008 Discipline).

Vacation Policy & Procedures

United Methodist ministers are in a unique position in their role as pastors of a local church. Their membership and relationship is primarily to the Annual Conference as they serve under the appointment of the Bishop. At the same time, their salary-paying unit is the local church.

Pastors are called to accountability for effective ministry both by the Bishop through the appointive system and by the local church through the Pastor-Parish Relations (PPR) Committee. In vacation policy and similar matters, it should be remembered that a pastor is not the employee of the local church. On the other hand, the Discipline (2008) ¶258.2 gives to the PPR Committee a consultative role in such matters.

The review included verification of the bank statements and reconciliation reports for both the operating and designated accounts; reports generated from the QuickBooks accounting software, original receipts, federal tax forms and reports (941's w-2's and w-4's) and verbal explanations provided by staff member Laura Abbott. The 2010 district finances are in good order. No discrepancies were found that would cause us to question their accuracy nor integrity.

A change in administrative assistants occurred early in the year, transition was smooth. The challenges of implementing strong checks and balances with a small staff continues to be a priority. Building staff are utilized in a check signing capacity. Outside consultants reconcile bank statements and provide monthly financial reports. A complete set of backup documentation files are maintained. Cash deposits are minimal; when an event does occur, volunteers are secured to count, verify and initial deposits made. Quick Books is used to track all transactions. Minor changes were made to clarify reporting, and align expenditures with deposits. Payroll is handled internally for the administrative assistants; the District Superintendent is paid with Conference staff. Professional expenses are reimbursed, clear and timely reporting is provided. Federal reports are filed on behalf of the district by an outside source, tax deposits are made monthly. In June, the district will merge and re-organize with other churches in the area in conjunction with the Conference plan. Distribution of assets will be at the discretion of a 3-person committee appointed by the Bishop. It is recommended that final reports be created at the time of transition.

In June, the district will merge and re-organize with other churches in the area in conjunction with the Conference plan. Distribution of assets will be at the discretion of a 3-person committee appointed by the Bishop. It is recommended that final reports be created at the time of transition.

Bishop Lowry,

I have been asked by Rankin Koch of the Temple District to perform a limited scope review of the financial records of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church for calendar year 2010.

During 2010, the Temple District Office received \$147,765.17 from all sources and expended \$131,069.75. The ending cash balance was \$86,683.66. This breaks down to budgeted district apportionment receipts of \$112,990.00 and non-budgeted receipts of \$34,775.17, and budgeted district expenditures of \$87,993.02 and non-budgeted expenditures of \$43,076.73.

I have examined the cash accounts of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church, as of December 31, 2010. This was a limited scope review and should not be considered to have been performed in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. It did, however, include such tests of cash receipts and disbursements as I considered necessary. Further, I limited my review to the eight months during which Amy Robbins served in the District Office, from May through December 2010.

My scope does not provide you with a complete report of internal controls. It allows me, however, to provide you with a degree of comfort with the current accounting system and with the system of internal controls and procedures. In that regard, **I believe that the cash accounts of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church are maintained in an acceptable manner and accurately reflect the transactions therein.**

During the spring of 2010, the FBI arrested former District Administrative Assistant Alicia Turner on several counts of fraud and theft, mostly as a result of her previous employment in the Austin area. Current District Administrative Assistant Amy Robbins, with additional input and review by me, investigated all transactions handled by Ms. Turner.

This investigation showed that Ms. Turner initiated three fraudulent payments to herself totaling \$1,251.24. In addition one set of Office Pro 2007 software, of the two sets purchased with District funds by Ms. Turner, is missing from the District Office. It is valued at approximately \$500.00. Further, no cash was deposited from sale of tickets at the District Laity Banquet and is believed to have been stolen by Ms. Turner. This amount is unknown, but believed to be approximately \$2,300.00.

Financial Statements

Ms. Turner has been prosecuted and on November 23, 2010, she entered guilty pleas to several counts of fraud and theft. She was sentenced to three years, four months incarceration, followed by five years probation and was ordered to pay restitution. Further, she was ordered to make restitution to the Temple District Office in the amount of \$1,251.24.

All backup documentation for checks to be written by Amy Robbins are reviewed and approved by Rankin Koch. The checks, along with backup documentation are reviewed and approved by the two lay check signers. This provides an additional review outside the District office and should provide additional mitigating controls not provided in a two-person office.

Currently, Amy Robbins pays a limited number of bills by means of Electronic Funds Transfer (EFT), and would like to pay additional such bills in the future. This saves both time and money in that you do not incur the costs of preparing and mailing checks for these bills. However, I believe that additional controls should be implemented to take the place of the additional review and approval of the two lay check signers.

I recommend that the bills that are to be paid by EFT be reviewed and initialed by the District Superintendent prior to being paid. At the end of the month, the reconciled bank statement should be reviewed, approved and signed off by at least one of the lay check signers. This provides an additional outside review of these expenditures in place of that now done when signing checks.

Controls over cash collected for Laity Banquet ticket sales could be improved by stating that ticket sales at the banquet must be made by check. We realize this is not entirely practical, so believe that any cash sales should be limited to two persons, working together. Both these persons should count cash collected, with a third count made by Amy Robbins before depositing the cash. The counts should be compared and any discrepancies investigated.

While no system of controls in a two-person office is perfect, I believe this will be an effective, yet practical system.

I have been asked by Rankin Koch of the Temple District to perform a limited scope review of the financial records of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church for the period ending May 31, 2011. This audit was performed in conjunction with the changeover in Districts within the Central Texas Conference.

During the first five months of 2011, the Temple District Office received \$67,776.47 from all sources and expended \$65,765.82. The ending cash balance was \$88,933.91. This breaks down to budgeted district apportionment receipts of \$47,374.20 and non-budgeted receipts of \$20,402.27, and budgeted district expenditures of \$34,465.74, and non-budgeted expenditures of \$31,300.08.

My scope does not provide you with a complete report of internal controls. It allows me, however, to provide you with a degree of comfort with the current accounting system and with the system of internal controls and procedures. In that regard, I believe that the cash accounts of the Temple District Office of the United Methodist Church are maintained in an acceptable manner and accurately reflect the transactions therein. In addition, both control recommendations made as a result of my year-end 2010 audit have been implemented.



Organization
 Glenn Lake United Methodist Camp, Inc. (the Organization), was incorporated in the State of Texas, as a nonprofit corporation. The Organization is a division of the Central Texas conference of the United Methodist Church (the Conference). The Organization is dedicated to promoting the Gospel by establishing, developing and promoting all aspects of Conference ministry, as it relates to Christian camping and outdoor activities. The Organization is supported primarily through user fees but receives substantial support from the Conference and public donations.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Statement Presentation
 The Organization recognizes revenues and contributions when earned and expenses when incurred, in accordance with the accrual basis of accounting. The financial statements are presented in accordance with FASB Accounting Standards Codification 958 (formerly SFAS 117). As such, the net assets of the Organization and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

- **Unrestricted net assets** - Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed stipulations and that may be expendable for any purpose in performing the objectives of the Organization.
- **Temporarily restricted net assets** - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met either by actions of the Organization and/or the passage of time. As the restrictions are satisfied, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets. As of December 31, 2010, the Organization had no temporarily restricted net assets which were not fully released in the year ending December 31, 2010.
- **Permanently restricted net assets** - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations that require that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Investment income generated from these funds is available for general support of the Organization's programs and operations unless otherwise stipulated by the donor. As of December 31, 2010, the Organization had no permanently restricted net assets.

Basis of Accounting
 The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Investments
 The Organization has adopted FASB Accounting Standards Codification 320 (formerly SFAS No. 124). Under FASB ASC 320, investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the

Investments (Continued)

Restrictions are met in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized.

Taxes

The Organization is exempt from federal taxes under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) and is not considered a private foundation. There is no unrelated business income for the year ended December 31, 2010.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of ninety days or less to be cash equivalents. Cash and cash equivalents is \$1,720 as of December 31, 2010.

Donated Materials and Services

Contributions of donated non-cash assets are recorded at their fair values in the period received. Contributions of donated services that create or enhance non-financial assets or that require specialized skills or provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation, are recorded at their fair values in the period received.

The Organization receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers who assist in the day-to-day activities. No amounts have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition under FASB Accounting Standards Codification 958 (formerly SFAS 116) have not been satisfied.

Functional Expenses

Functional expenses have been allocated among Management and Administration, Program, Fund Service, Facility Support, Recreation, and Marketing and Hospitality based on an analysis of personnel time and space utilized for the related activities.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Fundraising

Fundraising expenses are included within Program Expense and amount to \$9,674 for the year. There are no material joint costs associated with fundraising.

Inventory

Inventory consists of food items for the dining room and camp-related items such as clothing and books for resale in the camp store. All items are valued at cost on the first-in, first-out method.

Note 2 - Concentration of Credit Risk

Financial instruments which potentially subject the Organization to concentrations of credit risk consist principally of cash investments on deposit with the Texas Methodist Foundation. None of these investments are considered marketable securities or are used for trading purposes. The Organization's management estimates that the fair value of these investments do not differ from the carrying value in the accompanying statement of financial position.

The Organization maintains cash and cash equivalents with a highly credit rated financial institution in which the Organization's deposits are insured by the FDIC to \$250,000. Deposits at the financial institution did not exceed FDIC coverage during the year ending December 31, 2010.

Accounts payable includes a bank account overdraft of \$7,611 on December 31, 2010.

Note 3 - Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are carried at cost and donated assets are recorded at fair value at the date of contribution. All expenditures for property, furniture and equipment for \$2,500 or more are capitalized. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets for 5, 7, 10, 15 or 40 years.

Fixed assets acquired by Glen Lake United Methodist Camp, Inc. are considered to be owned by the organization.

Note 4 - Investments

Investments of the Organization consist of idle cash on deposit with the Texas Methodist Foundation. These deposits are uninsured but are guaranteed by the Foundation. The balance at December 31, 2010 is \$37,305. Interest income from these investments is \$625 in 2010. There are no realized or unrealized gains or losses from these investments.

Note 5 - Long-Term Debt

The Organization's long-term debt is as follows:

- A. Mortgage note originally dated October 13, 1993 in the amount of \$850,000, payable to the Texas Methodist Foundation, secured by land and buildings. Additional construction draws of \$345,561 and \$75,000 were added to this note in 1998 and 1999. Monthly payments are \$6,980, which includes interest at 7%. These payments are reimbursed by the Conference and are reflected on the Organization's books as debt allocation income. There is no penalty for early or additional payments. The balance at December 31, 2010 is \$365,842.
- B. Mortgage note dated June 12, 2007 in the amount of \$3,100,000, payable to the Texas Methodist Foundation, secured by a first lien on land and building known as Still Water and a second lien on land and buildings in Note 5(A) above. Interest accruing on the note is variable, and monthly payments of interest only are due the 7th day of each month up to and including April 7, 2011 when monthly payments of that amount necessary to amortize a loan in the amount of the principal balance outstanding on April 7, 2011 is calculated. The loan matures on June 7, 2030. The principal balance of the note at December 31, 2010 is \$3,010,193.
- C. Note dated October 18, 2007 in the amount of \$21,607, payable to GMAC, accruing interest at the rate of 6.99% with payments in the amount of \$17.31 due monthly until maturity on October 18, 2011. This note is secured by a vehicle. The balance at December 31, 2010 is \$4,918.
- D. Note dated February 19, 2007 in the amount of \$23,176, payable to GMAC, accruing interest at the rate of 7% with payments in the amount of \$391.31 due monthly until maturity on February 19, 2012. This note is secured by a vehicle. The balance at December 31, 2010 is \$3,870.
- E. Note dated November 15, 2010 in the amount of \$5,000, payable to the Executive Director. This note is unsecured.

Principal reduction of long-term debt for note 4(B) above is estimated, beginning at January, 2011, with interest accruing at 3% per annum and principal and interest payments of \$19,846 per month.

Note 6 - Retirement Plan

The Organization offers its qualified employees the opportunity to participate in a defined contribution retirement plan under IRS code section 402(b), administered by the General Board of Health and Pension Benefits of the United Methodist Church. To qualify, the employee must be 21 years of age and have completed one year of continuous employment with the Organization. Under the plan guidelines, the employee must contribute 3.5% of his/her salary in order for the Organization to contribute 7% of the employee's salary. The Organization only acts as a withholding and contributing employer agent for these funds and has no liability for future pension benefits. For the year ended December 31, 2010, the Organization's contribution to the plan is \$4,354.

It is estimated that the Organization's exposure in this case is equal to or less than \$500,000, an amount within its primary insurance policy limits of \$1 million. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Activities

The Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church (the "Conference") is a state-level agency of the United Methodist Church. The primary financial responsibility of the Conference is to serve as a conduit for monies contributed by individual church members through their local churches for the programs of the United Methodist Church at district, conference, jurisdictional, and national levels.

Basis of Accounting

The Conference's accounts are maintained on the cash basis of accounting, and the statement of cash and cash equivalents and statement of cash receipts and disbursements recognizes only cash received and disbursed. Therefore, receivables and payables, long-lived assets, accrued income and expenses, and depreciation and amortization, which would normally be recognized under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and which may be material in amount, are not recognized in the accompanying financial statements. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to present financial position and revenues and expenses in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The effects of their departure from generally accepted accounting principles have not been determined.

The accompanying financial statements do not include the accounts of Glen Lake United Methodist Camp, Inc. (the "Camp"), a division of the Conference. The effects of this departure from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have not been determined. During 2010, the Conference remitted \$36,485 and \$110,200 to the Camp for debt retirement and camp operations assistance, respectively.

Cash Equivalents

The Conference considers all highly-liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. Cash equivalents consist of funds on deposit with Texas Methodist Foundation ("TMF") and Central Texas Methodist Foundation ("CTMF"). These balances are not insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Conference maintains cash balances at a bank which periodically exceed federally insured limits. At December 31, 2010, the Conference has approximately \$258,000 of uninsured cash based on annual bank balances. Also, at December 31, 2010, the Conference has uninsured cash of approximately \$1,530,000 and \$394,000 on deposit at TMF and CTMF, respectively, based on actual cash balances. The Conference has not historically experienced any losses in such accounts, and management does not believe there is significant credit risk associated with these balances.

NOTE 1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income Taxes

The Conference is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is not considered a private foundation within the meaning of Section 509(e) of the Code.

Subsequent Events

Management evaluated subsequent events through September 1, 2011, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2. RETIREMENT PLANS

The Conference maintains a defined contribution benefit plan for substantially all ministers. As approved by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits, the Conference is obligated to make contributions to the Plan equal to 12% of the denominational average compensation as calculated by the Conference Pension Officer. The contribution to the Plan is billed directly to the churches by the Conference and remitted to the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.

The Conference offers its employees the opportunity to participate in a defined contribution retirement plan under IRS code section 409(b), administered by the General Board of Health and Pension Benefits of the United Methodist Church. To participate in the Plan, employees must work a minimum of 1,040 hours each year. Under the Plan guidelines, the Conference contributes 9% of each participant's compensation annually, regardless of whether the participant contributes to the Plan.

For the year ended December 31, 2010, the Conference's total contribution to both plans is \$205,197.

NOTE 3. CORRECTION OF ERROR

During 2010, management recorded two accounts at CTMF totaling \$3,000 that were inadvertently omitted from the financial statements at December 31, 2009. Additionally, two funds were inadvertently overstated by \$150,889 in the December 31, 2009 financial statements. Accordingly, the beginning balances in the accompanying statement of cash receipts and disbursements have been restated to correct these balances.

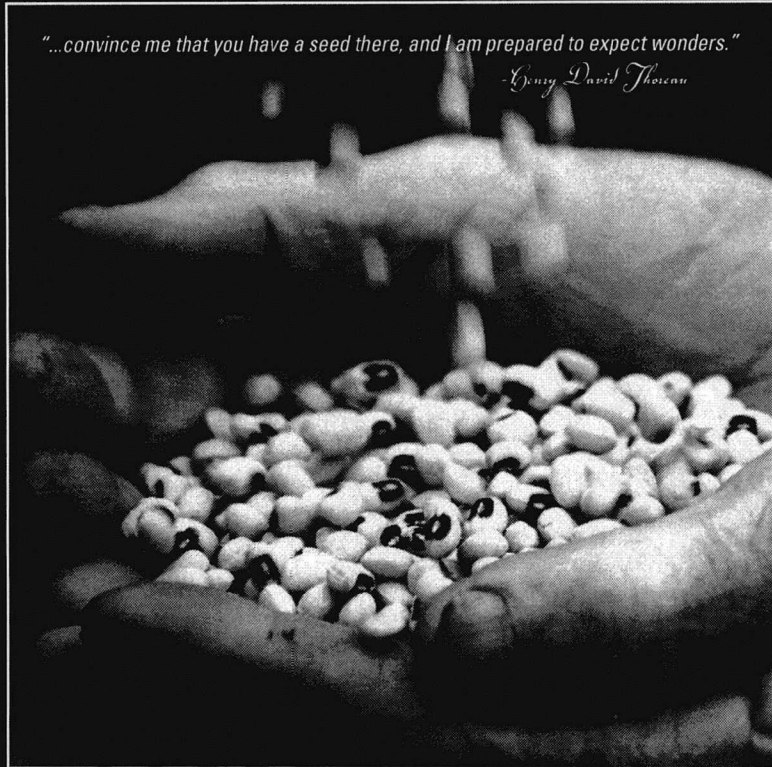
