DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Day—Wednesday, October 24, 1928. Opening Session

The West Texas Annual Conference convened for its Fifty-fourth Annual Session in the St. Paul Methodist Episcopal Church, Dallas, Texas, with Bishop Robert E. Jones, presiding.

The conference session opened with a devotional service led by the Rev. K. W. McMillan. The Rev. G. A. Deslands, District Superintendent of the San Antonio District offered the opening prayer.

Devotional Message.—The Bishop read the first chapter of Colossians from which he delivered the devotional address.

Communion Service.—The Holy Communion of the Lord's Supper was observed. The Bishop, the pastor host and the members of the cabinet officiating.

Roll Call.—The Secretary of the last Annual Conference called the roll; and one hundred members and nine probationers responded to their names.

Mortuary List.—The Conference stood as the names of S. W. Harvey, N. H. Townsend, H. H. Qualls and J. H. Swann were called. The Bishop offered prayer.

Organization.—On nomination of J. W. Warren, J. H. R. Dudley was elected Secretary of Conference and named as his assistants, L. L. Haynes, W. W. Baker, J. W. Stones, Jr., and K. W. McMillan: these were confirmed by the Conference.

C. E. Whitiker, Conference Statistician, named as his assistants; T. M. Bruton, R. W. Allen, J. B. Phoenix, D. B. Baker, J. F. Muse, J. N. Hooey, B. A. Byars, H. A. Jones, F. D. Young; they were confirmed by the Conference.

J. W. Weakly Conference Treasurer, named his assistants as follows: J. D. Rice, W. B. Lott, D. F. Vance, S. N. Harvey, F. J. Hutchinson, J W. Warren, and S D. Mosley; they were confirmed by the Conference.

Bar of Conference.—On motion of G. A. Deslands, the bar of the Conference was fixed to include all seats in the auditorium, inside the balcony.

Printed Program:—On motion of G. A. Deslands, the Conference Program as printed would be made official, with exceptions: instead of nine o'clock for the opening, the hour for opening the morning session to be eight-thirty, and adjourn at the will of the Conference. Prevailed.

Reporters.—On motion of K. W. McMillan, J. B. Phoenix was elected Reporter to the Southwestern Christian Advocate. T. B. Echols was elected Reporter to the Dallas Express and Daily papers.

Committee on Courtesies.—Dr. R. N. Brooks, Prof. T. B. Echols and Rev. R. S. Mosby were named as Committee on Courtesies, and on motion of G. A. Deslands they were appointed by the Conference.

Order of the Day.—On motion, the hour for the morning's devotional message would be the hour before adjournment of the morning session of the Conference.

Form for Pastors Report.—On motion of J. W. Warren, the items to be reported by each pastor would be, World Service Quota. Amount raised.

Revivals, conversions and accessions.

Samuel Huston College Quota, and amount raised.

Southwestern subcsriptions.

Condolence.—On motion of G. A. Deslandes, the secretary was instructed to send a telegram to Mrs. Dr. Huff expressing the sympathies of the conference on the death of Dr. Huff.

Standing Committees.—On motion, the Standing Committees appointed by the Cabinet were approved, and ordered posted by the Secretary. (See Standing Committees.)

Introductions.—The following persons were introduced to the Conference: Dr. W. F. Brittson of Dallas, representing Dr. O. B. Morris, pastor First Methodist Church, Dallas, Texas; Dr. F. H. Butler of Chicago, Ill., representing the Board of Epworth League and Young Peoples Work; Dr. I. Garland Penn, of Cincinnati, Ohio, representing the Board of Education; Dr. E. M. Conover, Philadelphia, representing the Bureau of Church Architecture; Dr. A. R. Howard, of Washington, D. C., representing the Board of Temperance Prohibition and Public Morals; Dr. E. M. Jones of New Orleans, La., representing the Board of Pensions and Reliefs.

Samuel Huston College Glee Club.—The S. H. C. Glee Club was presented to the Conference and sang two selections, "Swing Low Sweet Chariot," and "God's Going To Trouble The Waters."

Memorial Service.—The Rev. K. W. McMillan presided during the memorial services. The St. Paul Choir and Conference joined in singing, hymn No. 627.

After prayer and special music, the roll of the honored dead was called, and very fitting eulogies were delivered to the deceased: To Rev. J. H. Swann, by the Rev. J. W. Weakly; to Rev. S. W. Harvey, by the Rev. A. M. Mason; to Rev. H. H. Qualls by the Rev. J. H. Childs; to Rev. N. H. Townsend, by the Rev. M. W. Stephens.

After which the Rev. R. M. Davis pastor of St. Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church, Fort Worth, Texas, delivered the Conference Memorial Sermon, using for his text, the fifth verse of the second chapter of

Philippians. Text, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus." The message was indeed a great one. Following the sermon, the Conference stood together and sang, "In the Christians home in Glory."

The Bishop resumed the chair and Question Fifteen was called.

Second Day-Thursday, October 25, 1928.

The Conference was called to order at 8:30 o'clock, Thursday morning, with Bishop R. E. Jones, presiding. After the singing of a hymn, Rev. S. N. Harvey led the Conference in prayer.

Journal.—The Journal of the previous day's proceedings was read and approved.

Delinquent Reports.—The Conference Treasurer read the list of delinquent reports and they were turned in.

Question 11. (a)—Manny C. Ellison, J. H. Strait, F. D. Young passed in character, they were graduated from the Conference Course of study and on motion, they were elected to Elders Orders.

On the recommendation of the Registrar and approval of their District Superintendents T. M. Bruton, P. H. Moore, T. J. D. Sims and Esaw Smith passed in Character and continued in the Studies of the Fourth Year.

Extension of Time.—On the motion of R. N. Brooks, an extension of time of one year was granted to Esau Smith and T. J. D. Simms to finish the Conference Course of study.

Question 6 (a)—In the studies of the First Year, N. W. Stephens, J. A. Thomas, Zebre King, H. C. Willis and Joel Jordan were passed in character and upon motion of the Registrar, K. W. McMillan, were continued on trial in the studies of the first year.

ADDRESSES ON SAMUEL HUSTON COLLEGE.—Dr. T. R. Davis, President of Samuel Huston College and I. Garand Penn of the Board of Education, address the Conference on S. H. C.

Bishop R. E. Jones made remarks, making particular reference to the financial interest of Samuel Huston College.

FINANCIAL DRIVE FOR S. H. C.—The amount of \$505.10 was raised in an enthusiastic drive for Samuel Huston College, which was launched by Bishop Jones. "Praise God from whom all blessings flow" was then sung by the Conference.

The method of carrying on the work has not come up to our expectation. We have been expecting an intensive educational program on the part of the representative, since this is known and is established in many of our minds that the results have not been as gratifying as they might have,

We therefore recommend, that a more intensive educational program with systematic visitaitons be made by the representative and that as per contract or agreement, said representative will make periodic reports of work done as stipulated in contract with the Bishop of the Area.

We recommend that the representative confine himself to the Area with office or living quarters in New Orleans, the head of the Area.

Since over a period of four years the increase has not been what we have hoped for, and since there has been a gradual decrease in the collection for immediate distribution to the Claimants,

We recommend tolerance on the part of our Conference for a period covering 12 months looking for increased interest in collections and funds.

We call upon our pastors and members for their unstinted support in this matter, and that we raise or pay the 5 per cent of salaries collected by the pastors and Dist. Supts. for this fund.



HISTORICAL

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, A. D. 1865, by Bishop Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this conference were held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texaas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Texas Conference held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized with Bishop Thomas Bowman, president. The ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. The president of that Conference was Bishop Bowman. Those present in the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their course and rest from their labors. This Conference to date has seven districts, one hundred seven pastoral appointments and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz.: Samuel Huston College, located at Austin, Texas.
