Daily Proceedings

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION-NOVEMBER 7, 1934

Wednesday morning at 9 a. m., November 7, 1934, the West Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was called to order for its Sixtieth Annual Session by Bishop Charles L. Mead, as the presiding bishop. The skies were clear, weather fine, with Marlin and Davis Chapel as host to this meeting, the conference had its opening devotional period, Dr. J. W. Warren in charge of the devotions.

Devotions: Aftre Devotion, Dr. J. W. Warren, district superintendent of the Waco District, in a formal way introduced and presented Bishop C. L.

Mead, who in turn gave the morning message.

Charles to ac

Following the message by Bishop Mead, the sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by Bishop Mead, assisted by the district superintendents and a number of the elders of the conference, to more than 200 persons. The offering during this service or prior to the communion amounted to \$5.68.

Organization.—At this point the bishop asked W. W. Baker, the secretary of the last conference, to call the roll. One hundred and four persons answered to their names.

The roll of the deceased members was called. The following men had died during the year: J. Early Brown, Enoch Cogswell, and E. E. Cooper. Upon the call of Bishop Mead, the conference stood in perfect silence as the names of the deceased brothers were called, and the bishop led in a fervent prayer.

Upon the nomination of C. S. Williams, Rev. W. W. Baker was elected secretary. Upon the nomination of the secretary, the following men were confirmed as assistants: C. W. Franklin, J. L. Wattley.

C. E. Whitiker and J. H. Childs were nominated for treasurer. Upon the vote and count of the conference C. E. Whitiker was elected treasurer. He nominated as assistants the following men: J. H. R. Dudley, A. D. Jacques, G. A. Deslandes, F. J. Hutchinson, Z. W. Holmes, J. J. Hardemon. These were elected.

On motion of T. H. Wyatt, H. A. Jones was elected statistician. He nominated the following men as his assistants: R. W. Allen, B. A. Byars, R. A. Appling, J. A. Wills, J. N. Hooey, F. D. Young. These were elected by the conference.

On motion of J. W. Warren, Marcus A. Freeman was elected reporter to the papers, secular and church.

On motion of K. W. McMillan, Fred D. Young was elected to collect accounts for the Book Concern.

K. W. McMillan at this time read the list of Boards and Standing Committees. Upon motion these were referred for readjustment to the Cabinet. The list was read the second time and confirmed (See list).

On motion of T. H. Wyatt the printed program was adopted. Compliments were passed by the Conference on the program and the church entertaining the conference, with Rev. J. H. Childs as pastor.

The extension of the conference (Limit) was voted to include the fourth window of the auditorium.

Introductions.—The mayor of Marlin, Honorable Cecil R. Glass, was introduced by Bishop Mead and he brought words of greeting for the city of

Marlin. This welcome was brief yet warm and full of good will for the visitors in the city as well as members of the conference.

Mr. George W. Buchanan was introduced and presented by Bishop Mead and he brought fine words of greeting, representing the Chamber of Commerce.

Bishop Mead gave the response to the welcome program in a very able and acceptable manner. Full of wit and counsel, and even a religious tone characterized this response.

The High School Glee Club was asked to sing in this welcome program. They did this with much credit and interest in the work of the church and school.

Mrs. E. A. Fullbright of the First Baptist Church was presented by Rev. J. H. Childs, and brought greetings from the Negro Baptists of Marlin. Secretary Baker was asked to send a response to the church on behalf of the conference.

At this point the conference was favored with the song, "The National Negro Anthem," by the High School Glee Club. This was enjoyed by all, and even the conference joined in singing this masterpiece in literature.

A telegram was received from Dr. E. M. Jones expressing his regret of not being able to attend the conference and telling of his automobile accident.

On motion of C. E. Whitiker the conference received an offering of \$20.50 and this was ordered sent to Dr. Jones to help in his lawsuit on account of this accident and death resultant.

Dr. E. J. Hammond and Dr. A. P. Shaw were introduced and gave brief words touching the work of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension and the Christian Advocate, Southwestern Edition, respectively.

Announcements were given, the Doxology sung, the conference stood adjourned till 2:30 p. m.

FIRST DAY-AFTERNOON

The conference reassembled at 2:30 p. m. with Bishop Mead in the chair. Rev. J. A. Wills had charge of the devotions. Much fervor in spirit and in singing a number of the fine hymns was participated in by the conference during this devotional hour.

Question Twenty-seven was called, and the following men were passed in character and reported the work of the respective districts: T. H. Wyatt, Austin District; K. W. McMillan, Dallas District; C. S. Williams, San Antonio District; S. D. Mosely, Victoria District; J. W. Warren, Waco District.

The effective elders of each district were called and were passed in character and they reported the work of their charges.

On motion of J. W. Warren the following items were reported by the pastors of the charges: World Service, Samuel Huston College, Episcopal Fund, Conference Claimants, Gulfside, Southwestern Christian Advocate, conversions and additions.

On motion of S. D. Mosely, J. A. Thomas was passed in character and given the supernumerary relation, and asked to locate at the next conference or one year hence.

The bishop inquired if the district superintendents had asked the churches to collect the benevolences and pro-rate the Stewards Claims. Remarks fol-

lowed and it was discovered that the Benevolent claim had been looked after but the Stewards funds had not been pro-rated.

At this point Dr. J. Walt Moore took the chair and presided during the Anniversary of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. Dr. Moore led in a brief song service and gave interesting remarks and presented Dr. E. J. Hammond of Atlanta, Georgia, who gave a very helpful and uplifting address touching the work of the Board.

Dr. A. W. Carr, district superintendent Houston District, Texas Conference, was introduced and made remarks.

Announcements were given, the conference adjourned to meet Thursday morning at 9 a. m.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION

The Sixtieth Session of the West Texas Annual Conference was called to order in its second day's work at 9 a. m., November 8th, with Bishop Charles L. Mead in the chair.

Rev. L. E. Muse of Mt. Zion Church, Waco, had charge of the devotions. He read the Scripture and gave inspiration in the song service as he gave some beautiful experiences of the hymn writers.

Following the devotions Bishop Mead introduced and presented for remarks the following visitors: Dr. C. F. Bohmfolk, Superintendent San Antonio District, Gulf Conference; Dr. R. L. Weldon, Brenham District, Gulf Conference; Dr. A. A. Leifeste, Lake Charles District, Gulfside Conference; Dr. A. W. Carr, Houston District, Texas Conference.

Dr. Carr, representing Bishop Jones, spoke of the work at Gulfside and asked the conference to appoint a commission of two to cooperate with similar commissions from each of the six conferences in the Area in building a program for the Gulfside Enterprise. This was ordered by the conference. On motion of the Cabinet, K. W. McMillan and C. E. Whitiker were nominated and elected as members of said commission.

Bishop Mead announced that we be now in United Session. The roll of the laymen was called for, and upon vote of the conference, the secretary was asked to build the roll and have printed in the journal.

2.—Is this conference incorporated? Yes.

3.—Who are the bonded officers of the conference? None. (Committee is appointed to look after the matter of bonding.)

4.—What are the reports for the statistician and treasurer? (See reports.)

5.—What are the items and aggregates of the General Conference Benevolences apportioned to this conference and approved by this body for the ensuing year? (See Report of Secretary of Cabinet.)

On motion of C. E. Whitiker the cabinet was named as a committee to report on the matter of publication of the conference journal. After much discussion and illumination of the indebtedness for conference minutes this matter was referred to the cabinet for action and recommendation.

At this point the following visitors were introduced and gave brief remarks touching their work in their respective fields: Rev. G. E. D. Belcher, Boynton Church, Houston, Texas Conference; Dr. Stanley E. Grannum, Samuel Huston College; Dr. S. L. Brown, St. Paul Church, Dallas. This being the anniversary of the Board of Education, the regular annual offering was taken to the amount of \$351.50 from the districts of the conference. The Dallas district reported the largest amount of \$130.00.

Rev. I. C. Oliphant of the A. M. E. Church, Prof. Jesse Washington of the Baptist Church, Dr. L. J. Jackson of the First Baptist Church were introduced

and each gave a brief address and words of greeting.

Announcements were given, Doxology sung, the conference adjourned until 2:30 p. m.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION

The Sixtieth session of the West Texas Annual Conference reassembled at 9 a. m. with Bishop Charles L. Mead in the chair.

The devotions were conducted by Rev. J. B. Phoenix of Pelham Circuit. Hymn singing, Scripture reading and prayer emphasized the extent of the devotional period.

The call for the previous two day's record was made by Bishop Mead. The secretary read the journal and with minor corrections the journal was approved.

On motion of C. E. Whitaker the General Conference Benevolences were ordered published in the journal by districts.

T. B. Echols was called at this time for the Gulfside effort. He interestingly told of the work being carried forward at Gulfside and expressed greetings from Bishop and Mrs. Jones and proceeded with the roll call of districts and charges and the following amounts were paid on Gulfside: Austin District, \$18.00; Dallas District, \$42.00; San Antonio District, \$23.00; Victoria District, \$12.00; Waco District, \$13.00, making a total of \$108.00 for the conference session.

Mrs. W. B. Williams of New Jersey, representing the work of the W. F. M. Society, spoke interestingly of the work in the foreign field and encouraged the women to become more active in the work of so great a cause as Foreign Missions.

The following visitors and men were introduced and they spoke representing the work committed to their hands with the Boards: Dr. M. J. Holmes of the Board of Education; Dr. Willis J. King of Gammon Theological Seminary; Dr. T. B. Echols, Director of Religious Education of the New Orleans Area; Dr. E. O. Lindstrum of Brenham.

Dr. W. J. King gave the report from the Sesquicentenial held in Baltimore upon the invitation of Bishop Mead.

Miss Constance Arnold was introduced and spoke of the work at Eliza Dee Home, Austin, and urged the work of the W. H. M. Society be still supported by the women of the conference.

Announcements were given, Doxology was sung, benediction by Dr. Willis J. King.
