



DAILY PROCEEDINGS

THURSDAY-FIRST DAY

Fort Worth, Texas, October 14, 1943.

At 2:30 p.m. the Fifth Annual Session of the West Texas Conference of the Methodist Church (Central Jurisdiction) was called to order by Bishop Robert E. Jones of New Orleans, Louisiana, in St. Andrew's Church, with K. W. McMillan as the host Pastor.

The Choir.—The music of the Conference Session was led by St. Andrew's Church Choir. Hymn No. 140, "There Is a Foundation Filled With Blood," was announced by Bishop Jones and the Conference joined in singing.

The Communion.—Bishop Jones read the ritualistic prayer preceding the administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. He was assisted in the Communion by the District Superintendents, Dr. Love, Dr. Howard, Dr. Crolley and the Pastor of the Church, K. W. McMillan.

Memorial Service.—The Memorial Service was held for our deceased Ministers and wives of ministers who had died during the year.

Question No. 2 was called, and the names of the following men were reported as having died during the year: J. G. Browne, E. T. Allen, M. L. Wyatt, and C. E. Whitiker.

Upon the request of the Committee on Memoirs, Bishop Jones delivered the memorial address and led in prayer for the families and friends of the deceased.

The Choir led in singing the hymn, "Lead Kindly Light," thus closing the Memorial Service.

The Bar of the Conference.—Upon motion of J. W. Warren, the Bar of the Conference was fixed at the outside of the second window.

Question 22—Who have been received by transfer? At this time the Bishop announced the transfer of Karl E. Downs.

Introductions.—Dr. Karl Downs was introduced following the announcement of being transferred to the Conference.

Characters Passed.—The character of the following were passed: A. D. Holden, J. H. Carruthers, I. B. Loud, W. W. Baker, J. H. Childs, and they reported the work of their several districts (see Reports).

Introductions.—Dr. N. J. Crolley was introduced, made remarks and presented a check for \$75.00 from the Chartered Fund. On

motion this was ordered turned over to the Conference Treasurer.

Dr. A. R. Howard was introduced and made brief remarks of

his work with the Board of Temperance.

The following men were also introduced: Dr. James R. Starks and Dr. G. G. Troupe.

Announcements.—Announcements were given, and the Conference adjourned its afternoon session.

Benediction.—The Benediction was pronounced by Dr. A. R. Howard.

Ovation Program.—At 7:45 p.m. the choirs of the various Methodist Churches of the city, with their Pastors, assembled to do honor to Bishop Jones in the Ovation Program.

Dr. F. D. Young was the presiding officer in charge.

Welcome Address.—Dr. J. H. Smith brought the words of welcome on behalf of the Methodists of the city, with response by I. B. Loud.

Bishop Smith's Address.—Bishop A. Frank Smith of Houston, Texas, brought the Ovation Address on this occasion. He was elaborate in his words of commendation to the work of Bishop Jones as a Bishop in the Church and a citizen of his Country.

Editor Brooks of the Christian Advocate made the presentation speech in giving a check to our Bishop Jones from the Conference.

Bishop Jones gave the closing address and made kindly remarks for the token given by the Ministers and Laymen of the Conference.

District Superintendents, Committees, Officers, Elections

REPORT OF THE AUSTIN DISTRICT

It is with heartfelt gratitude and becoming reverence that we submit this our first annual report for the Austin District.

Immediately after the death of Dr. C. E. Whittiker, this, your humble servant, was appointed as District Superintendent of the above-mentioned District by Bishop R. E. Jones. Upon coming to the District we found all Pastors in harmony and each doing his best in his particular Charge.

Deaths: The following have died: Rev. C. E. Whittiker, Rev. M. L. Wyatt, and Mrs. George Pleasent. We extend our heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved.

Special Work Done

St. Mark, Lockhart, Rev. D. B. Baker, has completed the Church. Built a dining room and renovated the parsonage. All clear of debt. Dale—Rev. E. L. Spencer has built a small parsonage at this point.

St. Peters—Rev. B. F. Stewart has completed the Church and notes are paid in advance.

Simpson—Rev. T. M. Bruton and his good people have succeeded in paying the mortgage debt and all other indebtedness to the amount of \$2,000.

Liberty Hill—Rev. E. T. Fuller has succeeded in rebuilding the Church at this point.

Temple—Rev. M. A. Freeman has remodeled and furnished the

parsonage, painted and papered the church, and paid to the Board of Home Missions and the Church Extension the debt in full, to the amount of \$825, thus leaving Temple clear of debt.

Tilmon—Rev. R. W. Weaver has built a neat parsonage and painted the church. This has been done without debt.

Giddings—Rev. Mrs. McCoy Lark rebuilt our church at Giddings and by the assistance of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension to the amount of \$150 made possible the completion of this work without debt.

San Marcos—Rev. J. F. Muse and his good people are remodeling our church at a cost of more than \$700. This work is being done with cash.

Brownwood—Rev. J. N. Hooey. The parsonage at this point has been completely remodeled and is fully worth \$2,000. Only a small debt of \$200 remains to be paid.

Luling Ct.—Rev. B. A. Byars. The Union Hill Church, which is part of the Luling Circuit, has been repaired. This work was done on cash basis.

San Saba—Rev. C. L. King has done extensive repair work on the church at this point.

La Grange—Rev. E. N. King has repaired and painted the parsonage at La Grange.

Wesley Chapel, Austin—Rev. Fred D. Young and his people have completely renovated the parsonage and repaired the plumbing fixtures in the church, at a cost of \$1,600. This amount has been paid in full.

The mortgage held against this church by the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension to the amount of \$5,400 has been paid this year, thus leaving Wesley clear of debt.

Spiritual Life

Most of the churches are spiritually alive. We have had a number of revivals.

District Meetings

We have held the following District meetings: An Easter roll call meeting, a District Conference, Convention and Young People's Institute. Wesley and Simpson have had fine Vacation Bible Schools. Dr. T. B. Echols is to be given much credit for the religious educational work done in the local churches throughout the District.

Finance

The District has shown marked improvement in Finance in General and Conference Benevolence.

There has been an increase in Ministerial support in all Charges. It has been indeed a joy to work with these men and their congregations.

REPORT OF THE DALLAS DISTRICT

Bishop Jones, Brethren and Laymen of the West Texas Conference:

I count it a privilege to stand before you and submit my second annual report for the Dallas District. Realizing that the Lord has been good to us in that we are able to meet and give an account for our stewardship in the midst of a world torn by conflict, bloodshed and sorrow.

Our work across the State of Texas has shown signs of increase in spiritual, numerical and financial trends. The Ministers and laymen have put themselves into the work with all their strength. Most of our churches have taken advantage of flourishing times and had their greatest years of success financially. One of our churches has suffered great losses in membership owing to the call to the armed forces and the shift in population as a result of defense work, while other churches have grown.

Physical improvements in Denison under Rev. T. H. Foy, our church and parsonage have been remodeled and painted at a cost of more than \$1,100 cash, also great improvements in their benevolences.

Rev. Lee in Lubbock, where we were outdoors and with a small membership, has erected the best Negro church in Lubbock. On a pay-as-you-go plan, with Rev. Lee as contractor, a membership of twenty-two people has paid more than \$1,400 this year on the building, along with other claims.

Our church at Pelham, under Rev. Greene, has remodeled the parsonage and paid for it in full.

Rev. A. Porter, at the Mexia Circuit, has remodeled one of our churches and it is in fine shape.

Rev. W. T. Handy, at St. Paul, Dallas, has been able to break all records across the years of St. Paul. The church has a new roof, the basement renovated, drainage system installed to stop seeping in the basement. Raised more than \$12,600 this year and paid all benevolences.

Rev. Owens, at El Paso, has raised all claims, put a new roof on our church.

Rev. J. A. Wills, at Trinity, has been able to pay the church out of debt.

Rev. J. J. Hardemon, at Warren Chapel, has been able, with a loan from the Board of \$2,000, to get the church out of local creditors' hands.

Rev. Reed, at East St. Paul, has had a great year. Purchased a lovely church site, paid for it, and has more than \$500 in building fund.

Rev. Johnnie Richardson, at Jones Chapel, has completed the remodeling and painting of the church. Paid more benevolences than has been raised in the history of the church.

Rev. Johnson, at Ennis, has had a fine year, money on hand for improvements.

Rev. Jordan is in the best shape, from all angles, than ever before.

Rev. D. H. Hansboro has beautified the church at Ferris and has raised all claims 100% for every cause.

Sherman is experiencing a new day under Rev. L. R. Proctor. Rev. Smith at Milford-Italy, and Rev. F. L. Blair at Waxahachie have given fine accounts of themselves.

St. Andrew's Church, under the leadership of Dr. McMillan, has a record-breaking year in additions and finances, and probably has the finest church in the Conference. Raised more than \$2,500 for benevolences.

Thompson has made a decided increase in finances over last year.

Rev. R. A. Appling supplied our work at Cogswell, completed some improvements, paid all claims.

Rev. Pearson at Cowan had a fine year.

Rev. Carter, with a few members, has raised every claim, even though he has gone at his own expense sometimes. He has been faithful.

Rev. Brown, at Wichita Falls, has purchased new seats for the church, and repaired the parsonage.

Rev. Fortson, at Odessa, has put new life into the work, raised all claims.

We have held two group meetings and a great District Conference and Young Folk activities under the direction of Dr. Echols. Most churches are well organized.

REPORT OF THE SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT

Bishop and Brethren:

We humbly present to you the annual report of the San Antonio District. Our District touches the Texas-Mexican border at three places: Del Rio, McAllen, and Mission. Places of worship extend from Gonzales on the east to Uvalde on the west, from Kerrville on the north to Harlingen in the south.

We have thirty-six preaching places, thirty-one church buildings, twenty-one appointments, and nineteen parsonages. We gratefully recognize this as the pioneer work of others who labored here long before us, both ministers and laymen. What we find is our inheritance; what we leave is our bequest to society.

We all have worked this year but, for every trial, we have had the presence of Another with us, whose Silent Companionship has been the strength of our days.

Death visited the parsonages of the District on three occasions this year, causing the translation of Rev. James Garland Browne, Mrs. Mammie Smith White, and Mrs. Sarah Cavitt. These families and congregations met their sorrow as stalwart Christians.

We have been able to hold four Quarterly Conferences at each Charge during the year; a District group meeting, a Race Relation Roll Call, an after-Easter Council, and a combined meeting of the District Institute, District Woman's meeting, District laymen's meeting and a District Conference.

Increases have been made in ministerial support, benevolences and local work.

The Christian Education program of the District has taken cognizance of the mental trend of the people we serve and sought to meet through Daily Vacation Bible School, Christian Education Conferences, and the District Institute.

Revivals as they were once known have been few in the District this year. But we worked daily for the winning of souls in various Charges and in a District preaching mission. The results have been encouraging as will be shown in the Reports of the Pastors. Every man in the District has been a student to improve his preaching for times such as these.

The work of every Charge will stand out in raising money (large sums) to rebuild, or by remodeling the church or parsonage, or by the increase in church attendance. Every Charge on the District will show a decided increase in benevolence giving.

We are grateful to the fine laymen of the District for their loyal support of the program of the church and their co-operation with their Pastors. Their leader is Brother Elisha Thompson.

The women of the District are the jewels that cannot be replaced. Without their interests and support our work would not have had the success that it enjoys. Their leader is Mrs. R. L. North.

Honorable Mention

At Beeville, Brother F. M. Hudspeth has covered the church, painted and papered the parsonage. At Corpus Christi, Brother R. L. Palmer has purchased a new site for the church, on a paved street, in the heart of the residential district, at a cost of \$5,400, and has paid \$3,000 on this new property. Rev. J. L. Wattley has raised \$300 for the remodeling of Henson Chapel. Charlemagne Payne has raised more money for the erection of a new church in Kingsville than all his predecessors. He has more than \$900 for this purpose.

B. J. Easter, who has the secret of keeping his church filled, has done a remarkable piece of work on the Nixon Circuit. He has remodeled the church that was severely damaged by storm at Gillette, and enlarged the church at Nixon. This work was done

by the preacher with his own hands and paid for by the congregation. They are free of debt. A total cost of \$600 was spent by this preacher and his loyal congregation for remodeling.

Rev. R. S. Mosby, who has an excellent financial system—he never has a rally at St. Paul—has remodeled an old house owned by the church and next door to the church, at a cost of \$1,500. This will be used as a Service Men's Center. This will be a novel idea, and it gives the church opportunity to reach the many Service Men in and around San Antonio.

Rev. Saul White, by raising \$1,400 in ninety days and a loan of \$700 from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, cleared Jones Chapel of debt with a creditor that has held the note since 1924. This church will be entirely free of debt next year.

At Sanford Chapel, the late Rev. J. G. Browne began the year in high. Two months after Conference, he passed. February 1, Rev. G. A. Deslandes accepted this appointment. Since that time things have continued to happen in West San Antonio. Grounds beautified, walks built, church repainted, floors scraped and varnished, venetian blinds hung, and Sanford Chapel is made one of our most beautiful and attractive places of worship.

We all take off our hats to Rev. L. E. Muse and Jacobs Chapel. Last November the 20-year-old debt at Jacobs Chapel was \$4,000. Last May this congregation refused a loan from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension of \$2,000. Last July a noteburning and dedication service was held. This Pastor and congregation paid the debt in full and nothing else in the budget suffered. He has raised more than \$9,000 this year.

Our District has raised more than \$6,000 for the claims of Annual and General Conference Benevolence. We have given to our ministers and their families of the Conference who suffered, \$500. We have added to the rolls of the churches, comforted those who were stricken and held out the "hope of His promise" to those who were in despair. I want to thank those who have been very helpful and co-operative in the work of Kingdom building on the San Antonio District. They are: Rev. and Mrs. F. M. Hudspeth, Rev. and Mrs. L. H. REPORT OF THE VICTORIA DISTRICT

Bishop R. E. Jones, Ministers, Members of the Annual Conference, and Friends:

Six years ago it was my opportunity to assume the work of District Superintendent of the Victoria District. Now we come to the close of this administration.

Under the prayerful guidance of the Holy Spirit the work has gone forward. And the glory of the achievements belongs to Him who has furnished the increase. God has been a lamp unto our feet and a light unto our pathways.

There has been growth in the District as well as losses. The war work program has been responsible for many people going to other parts for work. This has not meant loss in every case, but it does hinder the local work. If a good steward moves out to work you must find another one.

Fine crops and high wages are ours to enjoy this year and we are all feeling fine.

The Victoria District has seventeen Ministers on it. There are thirty-seven organized churches on it.

There are 2,500 members and many adherents. She borders on the coast. The highway now running along the coast makes its boarder a field for potential growth.

Churches should be planted there—from Bay City to her boundary of the San Antonio District, as more and more people are going there to live.

We have suffered by sickness among our Ministers this year, but no deaths. Rev. M. W. Stephens has been sick most of the year, and now asks for the retired relations. Rev. J. B. Eggleston is very ill. Rev. R. G. Grant is on the sick list also. We have Rev. J. H. Strait with us on the District. His health has been surprisingly sturdy this year. He hopes to see a day of service again. Yet he has not been on the field this year.

The Victoria District is made much poorer by the loss of the services of these stalwart Sons of the Gospel from their respective pulpits weekly.

Rev. O. K. Brewster has assumed responsibility for the work at Goliad and goes to Placedo on the Port Lavaca Circuit.

Rev. A. G. Russel and Rev. Franklin have both given a lot of time to help fill the gap caused by these men being out.

Mrs. B M.. Pleasents has assisted Rev. J. B. Eggleston with the work at Yoakum and Shiner, and has been very effective in the same.

Our prayers and sympathy have been much with the men and their families in these trying days of illness.

The men and the churches have contributed to them in a fine way. The churches on the District and those off the District are

showing a fine Christian spirit toward their brethren while they are ill.

We have held four Quarterly Conferences in every charge.

The District meets annually in a meeting with the Women's Society of Christian Service. Mrs. A. H. Jackson is the efficient president of the District. She has led on in a fine way. We held the following annual meetings.

We have held a Retreat just after Conference, a Retreat just after Methodist Student Day, or Race Relations Day, a District Conference, a District Institute, and a Retreat just before coming to Conference. Held it this year on the first day of October at Weimar. Here Prof. R. A. Atkinson, Rev. D. C. Carrol and the members and the good friends of Weimar entertained the meeting in a most commendable fashion.

Reports were made and matters pertaining to making a good report at this Conference were gone into.

During the six years I have been on the District, seventeen churches have enjoyed a building or major repair job, and seven parsonages.

These are not little minor jobs such as putting in a window or swinging a door. Debts have been paid or reduced. There are no aggravated debts on the District. Rev. Jack Caesar lifted the last such situation this year. He paid off the church note and now has shingles on the ground to repair the church. This is at Garwood.

Rev. Tom Stevens and Rev. Belt Prince are leading in successful efforts in evangelism. Have put in more days and gathered more souls in porportion to the communities served than any one on the District.

Ganada Church, Rev. W. M. Franklin, Pastor, has paid above \$2.00 per member on the Benevolences this year, making them the leaders on the District, and maybe on any of the other Districts. Of course this is a small church. But their record is outstanding. They have hereby demonstrated the wisdom in tithing, as I believe they have more people that tithe than any other congregation their size on the District.

They should be emulated by others.

Pastors salaries are enjoying a wartime lift. Hope it will continue. I have enjoyed a 20% increase, with honorariums in many churches.

We have tried to do something to make it more comfortable to the men in the Charges, by my words and my examples. They have been given a consideration when floods and hurricanes wrecked our homes and blew our crops away. And in this type of work our Bishop, our Field Representatives and the General Boards have been very considerate of our every request. Dr. F. W. Mueller, Dr. Edgar Love, and Dr. E. J. Hammonds have done us no little amount of favors since our coming to the District, for both churches and Ministers and their families.

The District is contributing for General and Conference Benevolences more than \$2,000. Paying an average of just about one dollar per member.

REPORT OF THE WACO DISTRICT

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

I am submitting my annual report of the work of the Waco District as follows:

Church Buildings and Parsonages: There are twenty-eight church buildings, seventeen parsonages. Total buildings on the District, forty-five. Total value of churches and parsonages, \$84,890. Lots, 29, value of lots, \$8,150. Total value of all property, \$93,040. Insurance in effect, \$23,189. Members in full connection, 2,493. Children in classes for training, 416. Grand total of members of all classes, 2,909.

Church Schools: Enrolled in all departments, 963; Youth Fellowship groups, 50; Woman's Society of Christian Service, 18. Total enrollment, 432.

Active Work Done: Daco District has gone forward in a large way to improve church and parsonage buildings. Paid the old debts against property. Three years ago there were nine nagging debts. Today there are only three, none of which are pressing.

Benevolences: General and Conference Benevolences have gradually grown to almost double that of three years ago.

Travel and Cultivation: Quarterly Conference group meetings, District Conference Youth Assemblies and Vacation Bible School have required much study and travel.

To Pastors and Laymen: I am expressing grateful thanks to all Pastors and laymen who have so faithfully co-operated in the achievements above mentioned.

I wish you would please allow me to present to you, and to the West Texas Conference, one of the finest groups of Pastors in the Jurisdiction.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Religious Education

We hail with much enthuiasm the announcement that Dr. T. B. Echols will be assigned to the State of Texas as his field of labor. He will have the supervision of one instead of four States, as of ten years ago, and be able to do more effective and concentrated work in our Conference.

May we express our appreciation here to him for the pioneering work he has undertaken and the achievements that have been accomplished under his leadership.

Young People's Summer Institute

Every District in the State conducts a summer institute for its young people. We recommend that special effort be made to greatly increase the attendance. These District projects put in the reach of the young people in every local church a special training and guidance for leadership in the local youth organization. The summer institute is to the church today what the old camp meeting was to the church a generation ago and should have our wholehearted support.

Vacation Church Schools

We are grateful to our Board of Education and Area Division of Christian Education and Samuel Huston College for the leadership they have given us in the Vacation Church School Movement, and request that, as far as possible, this assistance be continued; that District planning conferences will be conducted to train leaders for Vacation Church School work in the local churches. Our goal for 1944 is: "A vacation church school in every local church."

Church School Advance

We are in the midst of a nation-wide movement to increase the attendance to our Church Schools and Church Services, and to make more effective the teaching ministry of the church. The aim is: "to reach every person in America with Christian teaching." The success or failure of this program will depend upon the extent to which each local church reaches persons of its membership and community.

We urge each local church to give this undertaking its wholehearted support.

Training Projects

In each Conference within the State there will be conducted: midwinter District and sub-District institutes; annual conference seminars and coaching conferences; District and local church leadership training schools; District missionary institutes, and other projects that will be especially designed to train leaders for District and local church work.

See that your church leaders attend as many of these projects as possible. Let's take our Christian Education program seriously and make the year 1943-44 a banner year for our Conference and State.

Finance

- 1. We recommend that we will receive enthusiastically the budget approved by the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance and will put forth special effort to raise it in full.
- 2. That this budget shall be raised through special assessment to the local Charge and funds from the observance of "Fourth Sunday" and "Rally Day."
- 3. That quotas be distributed to the Districts of the Conference and divided among the Charges according to their strength. These funds to be sent to the Conference Treasurer.
- 4. We recommend that each charge will observe the "Fourth Sunday" in each month with a fitting program on missions as provided by the Discipline and the Board of Education; and that the offerings from the Church School and Youth Organization on this day be applied on our program of Christian Education in the local church. Wide use should be made of the "Widening Horizon" sent out by the office of the Executive Secretary.
- 5. The General Board of Education each year prepares special promotional materials for the observance of Rally Day and Religious Education Week, that should be displayed and used by each church, also Rally Day worship services, envelopes and other materials. In past years the churches of the Central Jurisdiction have given very little attention to these observances. We are, therefore, especially anxious that during the year each Charge shall observe Religious Education Week and Rally Day. Our

church schools, youth organizations and churches need the spiritual impact that accompanies these celebrations.

Report of Commission on World Service and Finance

To the Pastors and Lay Members of West Texas Conference— Brethren:

The Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance having given careful study to the resolutions below, will submit them to our Annual Conference next October for your consideration.

These resolutions have the unanimous support of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. We believe their adoption will materially improve some phases of our Conference work.

Resolution No. 1-

Whereas, The General Conference Commission on World Service and Finance closes its fiscal year as of May 31, each year, and whereas, the General Conference Commission on World Service through its executive officers has requested the several Conferences of the Methodist Church to close as of May 31, each year, in order that reports may be harmonized and compared accurately.

Be it resolved, That the West Texas Conference adopt May 31 of each year as the closing date of its fiscal year.

Resolution No. 2-

Referred to the Conference Board of World Service and Finance at the instance of the Annual Conference Board of Conference Claimants.

Whereas, The sum now available each year for distribution among Conference Claimants is inadequate for present needs, and Whereas, The present rate of increase in the Permanent Fund is insufficient to meet expected future needs.

Be it resolved, 1. That each Pastor's wife of the Conference be asked to raise and report five dollars (\$5.00) to the Annual Conference for immediate distribution to Conference Claimants.

2. That each Pastor be asked to give an amount equal to one per cent of his cash salary annually, this amount to be distributed as follows:

50% to the Regular Fund for immediate distribution;

25% to be applied to the Permanent Fund;

25% to be distributed among Supply Pastors.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

Bishop Jones, District Superintendents, Ministers and Laymen of the West Texas Conference—Brethren:

For the third time I am attempting to report my activities as the Conference Lay Leader of the West Texas Conference.

In December a District-wide Institute, under the leadership of Mrs. H. B. Evans, was held at Waco, Texas. A capable faculty, consisting of the following named persons, gave instruction in the subject following their respective names:

Rev. Z. W. Holmes, Evangelism; Rev. I. H. Pierce, Stewardship; Miss Edna Carmichael, Adequate Church Finance; Miss L. F. Johnson, Recreation; Mrs. L. H. Isaacs, The Methodist Church; Mrs. H. B. Evans, Stewards in the Methodist Church.

Rev. J. H. Childs, District Superintendent of the Waco District, by his presence, lent dignity to the meeting.

Besides the delegates from the Waco District, there were representatives from the San Antonio, Victoria and Austin Districts.

Laymen's Day and Laymen's Week

At the request of the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference Treasurer provided District Lay Leaders with the postage necessary to distribute to the several Charges on their Districts the material prepared by the General Board of Lay Activities for Laymen's Week. Reports from the five Districts indicate that approximately 52% of the churches in our Conference observed either Laymen's Day or Laymen's Week.

Education

The Annual Conference of 1942 launched a \$5,000 Emergency Drive for Samuel Huston College. The Ministers and Laymen of the Waco District elected the Conference Lay Leader General Chairman of the drive for the Waco District. The quota for the Waco District was \$500.

Men's organizations and Brotherhoods were urged to take the leadership in the project. In several instances they agreed to do so. At St. James, Waco, the Brotherhood accepted the responsibility and reported 120% of the amount allocated to the church.

The entire District raised its quota 100% plus.

Church Papers

Charge Lay Leaders have been called upon to assist their pastors in bringing this cause before the congregation. The increased number of subscriptions shows, no doubt, how well they have worked.

National Meetings

The Conference Lay Leader attended the annual meeting of the General Board and National Council of Conference Lay Leaders held in Chicago last July.

A complete report of the proceedings of this meeting was compiled and mimeographed copies mailed to all of the Pastors and Charge Lay Leaders of the West Texas Conference.

Conference Meetings

The Conference Lay Leader has attended one meeting of the Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance; one meeting of the Annual Conference Program Committee; and three District Conferences—Dallas, Waco, and Victoria Districts.

By participating in discussions or delivering addresses at these meetings, attempts were made to increase the interest of Pastors and Laymen in the work of Lay Activities.

Recommendations

- 1. That the West Texas Conference observe Laymen's Day and Laymen's Week at the time designated by the General Board of Lay Activities. The Charge quota for Lay Activities to be reported to the Conference Treasurer immediately after Laymen's Day.
- 2. That District Superintendents, District Lay Leaders, Pastors and Charge Lay Leaders continue unceasingly in their efforts to arouse interest in Men's Work to the end that an effective body of Methodist men may be organized in each Charge.
- 3. That each Pastor and Charge Lay Leader attempt to place the Christian Advocate Central Edition in every Methodist home in the Conference and secure for the Official Board at least five subscriptions to the Methodist Laymen.

HISTORICAL

CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, A. D. 1865, by Bishop Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference were held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Texas Conference held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, president. The Ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. The president of that Conference was Bishop Bowman. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Capper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper and Charles Scruggs. All have finised their course and rest from their labors. This Conference to date has five districts, 107 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz., Samuel Huston College, located at Austin, Texas.
