# WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE DAILY PROCEEDINGS 

## IV.

## FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION Wednesday, October 12, 1949

OPENING-The 75th Annual Session of the West Texas Conference of the Methodist Church convened in St. Paul Methodist Church, Dallas, Texas, at 9 o'clock, Bishop R. N. Brooks presiding.

DEVOTION-Devotion was conducted by Host Pastor, I. B. Loud and Fred D. Young, Superintendent of the San Antonio District.

MUSIC-Music was furnished by St. Paul Senior Choir.
OPENING HYMN-For an opening Hymn the choir sang No. 402.
PRAYER-D. B. Baker offered prayer. The Choir then sang No. 1.
THE RITUAL-I. B. Loud led the conference in ritualistic reading, after which the choir sang Hymns No. 411 and 164.

SCRIPTURE-Fred D. Young read the following Scriptures: Old Testament, Isa. 53 and New Testament, Romans 1 and St. John 1:1-16. ANTHEM-The choir rendered an anthem.
COMMUNION MEDITATION-The Communion Meditation was given by Bishop R. N. Brooks. Text: St. John 1:43-46. The Theme: "Seeing the Best."

Hymns 111 and 330 were sung.

OFFERTORY-An offering was taken for the Gulfside Association. The amount, \$244.29.

Hymn 357 was sung.
SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER-Bishop Brooks assisted by the District Superintendents and the Host Pastor, administered the Holy Communion to 400 communicants.

Hymn 210 was sung by the choir as the service closed.

# DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S COMPOSITE REPORT WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE 

CENTRAL JURISDICTION

Methodist Church
Seventy-Fifth Session
Bishop Brooks, my collegues in the ministry, lay members of this session of the West Texas Conference, and friends all. With deepest appreciation to the pastors and laymen for their loyal and unselfish support, with the keenest sense of the need of God's grace and continued fellowship, and humbly invoking His blessing, I come in sincere humility of spirit to make this annual report.

A vast expanse of field, farm, city, and forest lying west of an imaginary line beginning on the Gulf of Mexico on the east boundary of Matagorda County, and running north to Calvert; thence along the Southern Pacific Railroad to the northern boundary of Texas, and then spreading westward, ever westward till it literally spills over it's borders out where the quaint and cosmopolitan city of El Paso nestles complacently in the stony lap of Mt. Franklin-this is the West Texas Conference of the New Orleans Area of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church. Beyond question, this is the conference of unchallenged superlatives.

The work of building the kingdom of God under the banner of Methodism in the conference has been carried on by approximately eighteen thousand laymen, more than one-hundred and fifty ministers, and six district superintendents. And all the while we have had the able leadership, wise counsel, and godly judgment of our beloved Bishop, R. N. Brooks, to keep us moving aright and toward our cherished goals. The leadership of this Christian statesman we have been pleased to accept and follow.

## ADVANCE AMIDST DILEMMA

In the foreward of "Man's Disorder and God's Design" we read these words: "The peoples of the world rise from the ruins of war, hungry and hopeless, confused and disillusioned; but deeper than the hatred alive in many hearts is the desire for love and fellowship, for peace and understanding." The tuned eyes of our nations scientist saw recorded on a seismograph a few days ago what they believed to be an atomic explosion. In a few days the newspapers blazed with the news of Russia's possession of the atomic bomb. And now attention is being turned increasingly towards rearmament, the acceleration of guided-misile and radar-screen programs. The Methodist church stands in the midst of the turmoil and dilemma and, through its advance program, is determined to hurl a positive thrust at secularism, indifference, war-mongering, and all forces opposed or deterrent to God's kingdom. In the midst of chaos and crisis the Methodist church is resolved to meet the Christ who can meet the crisis.

## SAMUEL HUSTON COLLEGE

Now in its forty-ninth year, Samuel Houston College continues to be the nerve-center and glorious pride of the West Texas Conference. Through the years the conference has been steadfast and unswerving in its support of the college, not from a sense of obligation, but because the conference recognizes the fact that it is a privilege and distinction to have the opportunity to support and nurture such fine work as has been, and is being carried on at the college from its infancy.

Today we are a long way from the time when washwomen and tired men brought chairs and tables and dishes to the school and left them as their humble contribution to the dream which the founders had. And yet, caroling down across the valley of the years, that same loyalty and devotion has been a part of West Texas Methodism. The dream and vision has broadened immeasurably, but the humbleness of sacrifice remains.

The returns from the investment which the conference makes in the school are good. As a conference we write into our budget each year the sum of $\$ 13,000$ for the college, and whenever unforseen developments arise requiring additional funds the conference stands ready to do its duty. Each year the school gives to the church trained and churchminded men and women who are prepared to come into the local church and carry the obligations of the layity. It is well that we take cognizance of this fact and realize that as we contribute to the college the college is also contributing to us, in many instances, four-fold. Many of our pulpits today are being filled by men who received their inspiration and initial training at Samuel Huston College.

Dr. Robert F. Harrington who came to the college as successor to the late Karl E. Downs, is steering the ship of the conference dream masterfully. The college-community and conference welcomed him with appropriate ceremonies and undergirded him with their support. In spite of the difficulty attendant to coming into a new situation where a program has already been set up, Dr. Harrington addressed himself to the task with calmness and confidence and has carried on in a very fine way. The college enters its 50th year, and in the grace and glory of God, tends towards an even brighter future.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

In the field of religious education the West Texas Conference regrets the loss of a full time worker. It is unfortunate, that although we, as a conference, pioneered in this work we find ourselves without a director. Nevertheless the work has been carried on to a commendable degree. Each district conducting a Young Peoples Institute, and Vacation Bible schools were held all over the conference in every district. A Youth Assembly was held at the college during August and we represented at the Morristown Training School.

Religious education in the local churches is carrying on and finding its expression through the Church Sunday-school, Methodist Youth Fellowship, and such other training groups as best fits the local situation. We continue with hope and anticipation.

## THE RURAL CHURCH IN TRANSIT

Edwin E. Sundt wrote in 1930 these words as the introductory statements in his first chapter of the Book "The Country Church and Our Generation"-"To appreciate the enormous changes which have come upon rural life during the past generation, it is necessary to note very carefully changes in transportation and communication, the educational trend among rural people, to consider the revolutionary changes in farm machinery, to study recent migrations and to note the rapid progress of cooperative enterprises."
"These items have a profound bearing upon rural life and are intimately related to the problems of the country church."

With these statements as a background we inquire into the rural church's impact on this New Day in the country and attempt to discover the problems which have become acute as well as those new ones which have developed.

New roads and high speed travel have brought the rural church to a parting of the ways. The educational methods and programs for adults have opened new areas of life and lifted horizons. New contacts with the farm agent and the Bureaus sponsored by National and State Federations and Agricultural Colleges have given to crop adaptation possibilities and brought in more returns on the farm investment.

What can the church do in the light of these new found freedoms and conditions?

We recommend a leadership for the Rural church of the highest possible character and training. The day has passed for the feeble, the
inferior and unfit in the leadership of rural people. The new age demands the best for the county.

We further recommend a commission be raised to study the larger plan, and salaries for the rural ministers in line with the localities and the economical problems in given communities.

We recommend the cooperation with rural organizations in their programs, the recognizing and organizing of Four H Clubs and kindred organizations among our children.

We recommend the use in our rural churches the finest WORSHIP SERVICES WHICH CAN BE EVOLVED, the best in fellowship meetings, the special Visual Aids furnished by groups listed with the County agent or the Agricultural college, the building of adequate facilities for service to the Area and EMPHATIC PREACHING of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

## CHURCH CONSTRUCTION

Under the caption, "Going the Second mile in Home Missions and Church Extention," in the little booklet, "THE METHODIST of the NEW ORLEANS AREA" we read these words, "In order to meet the needs of 91,000 Methodist in the New Orleans Area through progressive Church programs, new buildings must be constructed for our congregations, and the old ones must be continually repaired. Fully conscious of this great need the West Texas Conference has shouldered joyfully and enthusiastically its share of the task. After many costly and fruitless experiments we have overcome our bent for constructing poorly planned, temporary and inadequate structures. We are building now for permanence; for today and for the tomorrows. Within the Conference the following church buildings have need completed or are under construction: Austin District-Kells Branch, Rev. I. C. Greer, Pastor. Win-chester-Rev. H. Franks, Pastor. The final note on St. Peters has been paid. Dallas District: Ennis, Trinity, Wichita Falls and Lake Como are either renovating or constructing new buildings the cost of which will approximate $\$ 50,000$. San Antonio District: Jacobs Chapel a beautiful Gothic structure is nearing completion due to the heroic work of Rev. Muse and his loyal followers. A long and pressing need was met at Kingsville when First Methodist Church there gave to our Scotts Chapel congregation a very nice building. It has been moved and completely renovated at a cost of $\$ 5,500$. Rev. M. C. Stone is pastor. Completion of our church at Floresville has lagged because of the continued illness of our pastor, Rev. G. V. Cavett. Victoria District: Our church at Cuero under the fine leadership of Bro. B. F. Lee is almost completed. The church and parsonage at Yoakum has undergone complete renovation. Bro. Greene has done remodeling at Hallettsville and Bro. Jack Caesar at Garwood. Weimer, Columbus, Goliad and Victoria will all come in for building or remodeling within the next year.

Waco District: Two new buildings are under construction-Brack's Chapel in Waco and Whites Mission near Marlin. The final debt on our Davis Chapel, Marlin, was paid off by Rev. Baker and his loyal workers.

Western District: The veteran Geo. A. Deslandes is a living testimony to the fact that the warm Gulf-stream of youth can extend a long way out into the ocean of age. He took the retired relation some years ago but because of his bouyancy, his vigor and his ability to get things done the Conference has never ceased to use him. Accordingly when there was a very difficult job to be done at Abeline, Texas the Bishop called upon this seasoned leader to do it and today it is done. Abeline has a beautiful brick edifice which is a delight to all who look upon it.

The Parish houses also come in for consideration. St. Paul, Dallas has purchased a new parsonage at the cost of $\$ 12,000$. The new and ultra modern St. Paul Parish house in San Antonio, so well planned and begun by the former pastor, Bro. Mosby has been completed under the pastorate of Bro. McMillan. It is indeed a dream house completely furnished, air conditioned etc. It could well serve as a pattern for parsonages which are yet to be built.

## NEW PROJECTS

Possibilities are bright for early remodeling or constructing at the following points: Wichita Falls, Del Rio, St. Marks, San Antonio, Downs

Memorial, Corpus Christi, Midland,, Jones Chapel and Mt. Zion-Waco, Simpson Memorial-Austin. And in Corpus Christi a most marvelous thing has happened. Bro. Bruton has succeeded in having elected to his Board of Trustees two very prominent business men both of whom are members of our First Methodist church there. In a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of our church there, they said to the District Superintendent, "We could not feel at ease to worship in a $\$ 300,000$ edifice which we are constructing for ourselves when we remembered that our Colored Brethren are still out of doors. So we propose to back a building program for St. Paul church also." You would be pleased I am sure to know that these men have already secured $\$ 10,000$ in support of their plans. It is the Psychological hour for action. Shall we act, or shall we delay?

## BENEVOLENCES

Reports of the pastors will show that all over the conference great work has been done in the raising of benevolences, advance specials, etc. We must not forget to thank the good laymen of the charges for their part in making possible these reports.

## MINISTERIAL SUPPORT

In our Methodist economy there are four items of Ministerial support, namely; Pastor's salary, Support of District Superintendents, support of the Episcopacy and Conference Claimants. The three last mentioned are established upon the amount paid the pastors. Our goal is for a well trained, consecrated, full-time Ministry. Such a ministry must be adequately supported. This objective must be pursued, this matter must be laid upon the hearts of the layety. The salaries of our trained Ministry must eventually be made commensurate with the salaries of men in other professions. There must be a fixed and definite schedule for minimum support for pastors in accordance with paragraph (806) of the discipline of 1948. This we sincerely urge.

## EVANGELISM

Much has been said, and much has been done to relieve the physical suffering and hunger in our world. But there is a deeper need and a greater hunger being manifested today. All about us men are trying to satisfy the cravings of God-hungry souls with things material. They are still obsessed with the ideology accosted the mind of the rich man in the Scriptures which caused him to believe that he could fatten a starved soul on corn. It has been our delight, our great privilege and passion to offer to men the Bread-of-God which cometh down from above.

Thus in all of our charges in all the districts through continuous and persistent programs of preaching, teaching, visitation and personal contacts we have sought to evangelize. Results as will be shown by the reports of pastors have been very gratifying. Accessions and conversions have approximated 800 within the confines of the conference.

In this very thrilling and adventurous enterprise St. Paul Church, San Antonio seems to lead the ranks. To this charge alone was added 205 souls.

## NEW AND UNDEVELOPED AREAS

Our conference has need of study of population shifts and economic readjustments. Our rural membership in increasing numbers each year is moving into the cities. We must save these people to the church. They must be followed, found, fellowshiped, and churched. New churches must be established in our great centers. We need to move from some present locations and see plainly as we go into other and new areas. The Advance opens our eyes and points the way. All over the conference we are studying our present positions both physically and psychologically. THE NORTHWEST: All that great area which comprises the Western District where men grow tall and wild and free, where distances are almost incomprehensible, and even the winds grow weary with travel, is pregnant with possibilities. With almost untaped natural resources, studding the broad expanse of these prairies may be seen the derricks of ten thousand oil wells pouring forth millions of dollars in black gold.

Here too, is the great wheat belt, where rippling grain rolls to the horizon like a wind-touched sea.

There is also something quite ineffable about the growing and prosperous cities of the plains. Abilene, Sweetwater, Big Spring, Midland, Odessa, Lubbock, Plainview, Littlefield, Muleshoe, Amarillo, to mention only a few-their beauty is unspeakable. Only when one has had a complete panarama of this great section can one understand the challenge which it offers. In the language of the poet it is heard to say:
"Give me men to match my mountains, Give me men to match my plains, Men with empires in their purpose, And new ages in their brains.
Into this wonderful land have gone a District Superintendent and nine stalwart ministers. Prospectors they are: thoroughly cognizant of the fact that there is a wealth of human gold in those hills, and they are staking a claim for the King. But nine men are not enough to meet the challenge of the west. Other workmen must be rushed to that scene if we would save the day.

Have you seen Texas? No, I am afraid you have not if you haven't seen the southern tip of the state-the fabulous Rio Grande Valley, the Winter Garden spot of the state, where a good God condescends to live next door to man and where the rustle of His garments can be heard in response to the touch of every evening zephyr. Here beautiful palmstudded cities stand shoulder to shoulder like soldiers in mass formation and march victoriously into the future.

But, and this robs the color from the picture, in all this magnificent area stretching south from Corpus Christi to Brownsville we have only two organized churches, namely-Scott's Chapel, Kingsville, and St. Paul, Harlingen. Robstown, Alice, Raymondville, Brownsville, Edenburg, McAllen, Mission, and many others await our coming. The harvest is truly great but the laborers are few. Fields cannot be plowed without workmen the edifice cannot be built without artisans. This emergency poses another and our final thought.

## RECRUITING FOR THE CHRISTIAN MINISTRY

The church survives because it belongs to the eternal in human life and society. We accept this and in the acceptance we state our faith in its destiny. The gospel is the life of the church, and to proclaim that truth is still the world's biggest business and a man's supreme challenge.

We submit this to the young men and women of our conference with firm conviction that we are offering them opportunity of cooperating with God in the building of a Kingdom Society. The Romance of relationship with Him who is all and in all. The thrilling joyous hope of a fight against powers and principalities, and the joy of a risk that the life I give into His hands to use will become a part of the glory in His victory.

The ministry needs you! Dare you neglect? Dare you refuse? Dare you say I cannot go when the world calls everywhere for a guiding word and better proclamation, and a sure way?

We still believe that the Master is come and calleth for you. Look on the fields. See here, see there. Don't turn away, follow through. "How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things."
"Hark the voice of Jesus calling, Who will go and work today?
Fields are white and harvest waiting.
Who will bear the sheaves away?"
"Loud and long the Master calleth,
Rich reward he offers thee:
Who will answer gladly saying
Here am I, send me, send me.
Let none hear you idly saying,
There is nothing I can do.
While the souls of men are dying
And the Master calls for you.Take the task He gives you gladly.Let His work your pleasure be:Answer quickly when he calleth.Here am I, send me, send me.

## REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD PEACE

The general purpose of the World Peace Commission as stated by the General Conference of the Methodist Church is:
"It shall be the purpose of the Commission on World Peace to advance the interests of the Kingdom of our Lord through international justice and the spirit of good will throughout the world; to endeavor to create the will to peace, the conditions for peace, and the organization for peace; and to organize effective action in the church for the advancement of peace."

The time is now for the West Texas Conference to institute a program which will embrace those areas of interpretation, education and action relative to World Peace.

In the words of Dr. C. F. Boss, Jr. "We need to discover what peace really is: Is it the absence of war? Is it an emotion; an attitude? Is it a principle of organization? A process? What are the causes of war? Can men abolish them? Is peace something men can build? Does peace start in the minds of men or of children or both?

What does the church teach about war and peace? Are we familiar with the position of the Methodist Church, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America and the World Council of Churches?

Are we familiar with the United Nations Charter? Are we aware of the significent work being done by the United Nations at Lake Success?

What is the real cause for the conflict between the United States and Soviet Russia? What are the basic differences between Communism and Democracy? Can they be reconciled? What are the basic differences between Communism and Christianity?

How can we join the people of the world in their effort to bring peace to the world?

What can we do that will enable us to practice democracy and develop world friendship in the several cities, towns and rural communities throughout the West Texas Conference?

The development of an atomic bomb by Russia and the renewed defense efforts being promoted by our country make it imperative that we consider seriously all of the just mentioned questions and then some.

In order that the members of the West Texas Conference might take an active part in the establishment of a lasting peace, your Commission on World Peace make the following recommendations, in accordance with the directive issued to the Annual Conferences of Methodism by the Commission on World Peace of the Methodist Church:

Truly, this is our Evangelistic responsibility and primary objective; and every local church is being called into action to meet the challenge and serve the present age in bringing our people to Christ, through the pulpit, public, visitation, and all effective methods of Evangelism; then, teach them and assimulate them into the activities of the Church.

We recommend that Committees on Membership and Evangelism be carefully selected, organized, and made an active force in each local Church. Supply them with SHEPHERDS Magazine and other literature to help make Evangelism a vital part of the Program of Advance, to win and develop Christian families to observe family worship, Grace at meals, Bible study, and practical Christian living.

We recommend that each Annual Conference and District hold Institutes on Evangelism to develop a more efficient group of ministerial and lay Evangelistic leaders, or directors.

We further recommend that our local church Boards of Lay Activities, Education, and Woman's Society of Christian Service cooperate in the promotion of Evangelism, and making Christ real by winning people and developing them into Christian personalities, and to make good every opportunity in securing recruits for the ministry and other full time Christian workers.

## REPORT OF COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS QUOTING FROM THE STATEMENT OF THE EX-SECRETARY OF INTERBOARD COMMITTEE ON VOCATION

## "The enlistment of young people to the cause of Christ; the friendly

 counsel and consecrated guidance of youth who desire to serve through the church will be the ongoing responsibility of every Annual Conference, every Methodist preacher and every layman of our great church. Quoting further from the book Christian Vocations by Dr. Frank S. Hickman he says, "The church and all it stands for must be lifted to a position of exalted esteem in the eyes of youth, or presently its ranks of vocational workers will become thin and broken. When an Army's banners are habitually dragged in the dust, you cannot expect the youth of the land to rally to them."These quotations embody the condition and challenge, and present for us the direction and point of Our Quest for "Workers together with God." We are conscious of the task, its bigness and importance. We therefore recommend to this session of the Annual Conference some pertinent first steps to take in this "recruitment, counselling, encouraging, screening and guiding youth in making, and those who have made life-service commitments."

First, we urge the District Supts., Pastors, Superintendents of Church Schools, Boards of Education, W. S. C. S. officers, Young Adults and Youth Leaders to secure directive information from the office of the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations, Harold W. Ewing, Secretary, 121 Seventeenth Ave. So. Nashville 4, Tenn.

Secondly, we request our Conference Board of Education and the Ex. Secretary to organize in every District, Sub-District and Local Church a committee on Christian Vocation with functioning secretary, so that the whole church may receive the impact of the need and opportunity.

Third, that in every church a period be set aside for presentation of the fields of action and the emphasis on the church's place and opportunity in the making of a good world in which to live.

Fourthly, that the preachers be implored to reemphasize the place of a positive conversion, definite meditation, place of Prayer, Acceptance of the belief that we have some "talent" God needs us to develop and use, and the belief in the conviction that one is entering a religious vocation in response to the divine will.

## WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION-1949

Christian Education in the West Texas Conference has received a major emphasis for a number of years. The promotion of the Kingdom of God through the teaching ministry has been one of the successful methods used by our' conference for more than two decades. We are ever conscious of the fact that if children, youth and adults are to sustain a vital relationship with God and the church that numerous opportunities must be provided for acquaintance, communion and fellowship with God. It is, therefore, in this spirit and with these goals in mind that our conference board of education embraces its task both in our local churches and in our educational institution. The principles of Jesus Christ must be inculcated and exemplified in the lives of our consistuency.

The Board of Education began the year without an Executive Secretary. After the lapse of a few weeks, however, we secured the services of Mrs. Charlyn Saunders as a Special Christian Education Worker. She began her work with much enthusiasm and was making quite an impression upon us when after three months she was called to the chair of Dean of Women for our Samuel Huston College.

## OUR CONFERENCE STAFF

With the going of Mrs. Saunders to the college our conference staff met and took over the conference program, planning and promoting their
respective projects. Each member of the staff has done a fine job in her field.

## CHILDREN'S WORK

Mrs. Helen Holden Miller was selected as Conference Director of Children's Work. To this task she gave her' devotion and untiring efforts. Under her leadership a conference seminar of Children's Work was held at Samuel Huston College with representatives from four districts present. A staff member from the Children's Division of our General Board of Education at Nashville was present and conducted the courses in Vacation Church School Methods and Children's Work. The following persons were commissioned to promote Vacation Church School Work throughout the conference: Mrs. Jewel Manning, San Antonio District; Mrs. Eunice Hudspeth, Dallas District; Mrs. Marguerite Washington, Victoria District; Miss FeyDelle James, Western District; and Mrs. Melen Miller, Austin District and general supervisor.

Nineteen Vacation Church Schools were held with an enrollment of 1203 children and young people.

The General Board of Education through a remnant fund of the Crusade for Christ provided money for the Seminar of Children's Work and a stipend of (\$25) twenty five dollars per week for each district worker during the summer months. We are very grateful to our general board for their gracious help during the Crusade, and now that it is over our conference, along with the others of the Central Jurisdiction, must prepare to finance its own Vacation Church School program and Children's Work. Too much praise cannot be given Mrs. Miller for the leadership she gave in these projects.

## YOUTH WORK

Some years ago a group of people set out to climb a mountain. It was not long before they encountered such a violent storm that they were tmpted to give up the venture. The guide, however, encouraged them to continue the upward climb. They did so, and before long reached a point near the mountain top where the sun was shining. Below they saw dark clouds and the turbulent ihunderstorm; but on the heights where they were the sky was clear, the atmosphere peaceful.

This is a true description of our youth work. The mountain climbers are represented by our Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship. Their guide is their Conference Director, Mrs. Marguerite Washington. Early in the year they planned a conference-wide youth assembly, but without an Executive Secretary and the losing of the Special Worker it seemed that all hope was gone. But their director urged them to go forward with their plans, the results was a most successful Youth Assembly at Samuel Huston College August 12, 13 and 14. To this assembly the Waco district sent eighteen young people paying their expenses to the tune of $\$ 100$. Who will doubt but that this $\$ 100$ was the best investment the district could have made. The Conference Youth Assembly will be an annual affair at Samuel Huston College and the Board solicits the wholehearted cooperation of each district.

## CENTRAL JURISDICTIONAL LEADERSHIP SCHOOL

The West Texas Conference was well represented at the Central Jurisdictional Leadership School that was held at Morristown, Tennessee, where Bishop R. N. Brooks was one of the guest speakers. Our representatives were: Rev. Ernest Dixon, Proxy Executive Secretary; Helen Mil-
ler, Marguerite Washington, Leona Tabor, Dorothy Hardaway, and Itasca Stafford, who also served as a member of the faculty and did a grand job. We hope the District Superintendents will keep the week of July 6-14 free next summer so that their staff workers of the district may attend this school, espcially since the New Orleans Area will be the host to the school at Gulfside, Waveland, Miss.

## DECREASE IN MEMBERSHIP

The Board of Education calls upon the ministers and laymen of the conference to unite in an effort to increase our chur'ch school enrollment and attendance. It certainly was not comforting news to read of the decrease in church membership in the Ccntral Jurisdiction while the rest of the Church advanced 17 per cent. We are convinced that the church that does not maintain an active and growing Church School will soon discover that it has a waning and dying membership.

We see clearly enough our Christian tasks and responsibilities. We wish to fulfill them. We mean to undertake them. Too often we stop there. We think and we talk about what we ought to do-but to take the consequences and do it seems to be too hard a task. Perhaps we stop short of action because in facing our task we look at ourselves and realize how weak and unimportant we are. Thus we admit not having taken into consideration Him who said: "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth, and without me ye can do nothing." In the weeks and months ahead we shall face new responsibilities, new opportunities. May we realize that He who gives us our tasks also is willing to provide us with power and courage equal to our tasks and will guide us in doing them.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

## WE RECOMMEND:

1. That each local church within the conference will set for its goal a twenty-five percent increase in its Church School enrollment and attendance, and that the district superintendents and district staffs will keep these goals before the charges. This will represent our share in the Church School Advance.
2. That we give the West Texas Conference M. Y. F. Assembly our wholehearted sunport. hTe chief purpose of the assembly is to train the conference district and local Church officers of the Methodist Youth Fellowship in the methods and program of their youth organization, and provide an opportunity for them to function as a confernce organization of youth.
3. That each district will be urged to send their district children, youth and adult director to the Central Jurisdictional Leadership School (along with our conference staff) which meets this year at Gulfside, Waveland, Mississippi, July 6-14, 1950. And that funds for their room and board be provided from the Christian Education funds on the same basis as conference workers. The understanding is that each district will be responsible for the transportation of their district workers to and from Waveland.
4. That we ask that a volunteer Executive Secretary be appointed until we can again have the services of a full time secretary.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE TO THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE

In the wisdom and language of the bishops in their quadrenial addresses to the general conference in Boston, on the subject temperance, "The Methodist Church has been and is an implacable foe of the liquor traffic. And in the language and tenacity of the song we sing sometimes "I shall not be moved". That this foe of the liquor traffic, the Methodist Church, shall not be moved. But shall ever stand as a Bulwark on the front line in the battle against this great enemy the liquor traffic, whose duty it is to destroy the mental, physical, social and even the spiritual welfare of our people.

In order to bring the Kingdom of God on earth as it is in Heaven, we must not leave one stone unturned in uprooting this evil from among our people. We know that this is not an easy job, never was and never will be. But it is one of those jobs that must be done.

The liquor business is like a poison ivy vine that has entwined itself around and through the branches of a tree in such a manner that makes it seemingly impossible to destr'oy the vine without injuring the tree. But to continue to strike at the roots you will eventually destroy the vine.

In this day of advance not only in Methodism, but in the advancement of civilization, and in this march to a better world. No it is not pleasing to march beside drunkards, they hinder our progress.

THEREFORE your committee offer the following recommendations:

1. Since the theaters are the places where most of our young people frequent, and that the great amount of drinking that is seen on the screen is liable to influence the drinking habit among them, that we register our protest against drinking shown on the screen.
2. That each pastor give his full support to the cause of temperance on world's temperance Sunday, and that a committee be appointed to conduct programs denouncing the evil of strong drinks.
3. And that each pastor will on Commit Sunday commit himself to total abstenance, and see to it that every member have the opportunity to sign a commitment card.
4. That the West Texas Annual Conference register its support in favor of the Senate Bill 1847 prohibiting the interstate advertising of whiskey over the radio and television. And a copy of these recommendations be sent Senator Edward C. Johnson.

## RESOLUTIONS WEST TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

BE IT RESOLVED: That the West Texas Annual Conference hereby accepts as its aim and goal the ultimate conversion of its pension program to that of the Ministers Reserve Pension Plans of The Methodist Church, as described in pp. 1642 to 1657, Discipline of 1948; and,
I. 'That the West Texas Annual Conference hereby adopts as the immediate objective and the first step toward the attainment of that goal the Three-Fold Pension Plan, outlined by The Board of Pensions, as follows:
a. That the sum of $\$ 52,790$ be allocated to an "Initial Reserve," to be used, principal and interest, over a period of approximately 20 years, to provide annually the conference contribution of an amount equivalent to $9 \%$ of the "Average Salary" of the conference (as defined in the pension code) on behalf of each and every qualified "New Entrant."
b. That the sum of $\$ 43,086$ be allocated to an "Initial Reserve," to be used, principal and interest over a period of approximately 36 years, to provide annually the conference contribution of an amount equivalent to $2 \%$ of the "Average Salary" of the Conference as defined in the pension code) on behalf of each and every qualified "previous Entrant, and each and every qualified full-time Accepted Supply Pastor.
c. That the sum of $\$ 25,504$ be allocated to a "Distribution Reserve Account" to be used, principal and interest, over a period of approximately 15 years, to add to the annuity provided from funds currently available for distribution to Conference Claimants, an amount equivalent to $\$ 2.00$ per year of approved service of each minister, and $\$ 1.40$ per year of approved service of each widow, given to the West Texas Annual Conference.
II. That the cost of the Three-Fold Pension Plan, in the amount of $\$ 121,380$, be provided as follows:
a. That the full amount of the Permanent Fund of the West Texas Annual Conference on deposit with The Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church, Incorporated in Illinois, as the date of the conference session of 1953, be applied toward the cost of the Three-Fold Pension Plan.
b. That a campaign to secure the remainder of the amount necessary to complete the goal of $\$ 121,380$ (which will be approximately $\$ 90,000$ to $\$ 95,000$ ) is hereby authorized for the three conference years 1950-1951, 1951-52 and 1952-53.
c. That the resident bishop be, and he is hereby, authorized and requested to appoint a committee of fifteen members, composed of ministers and laymen, to be known as the Reserve Pension Fund Campaign Committee, which shall be responsible for launching, conducting and managing the aforesaid campaign; that the resident bishop be an advisory member of the committee.
d. That the Campaign Committee be authorized and instructed to prepare, in consultation with the bishop, a specific program of campaign procedure, the details of which shall be presented to the 1950 session of the Conference for approval and adoption.
III. That all funds which may now or hereafter be received from bequeaths, wills, estates and other gifts for the Pension Funds of the West Texas Conference shall be allocated to the Three-Fold Reserve Pension Program of the Conference, as the Conference may from time to time determine.

We cherish the works and observe the traditions of the pioneers of the great West Texas Conference, they have been cherished to the extent that each generation of ministers and laymen have tried to carry the flag a little further. We of this great Conference hear as if it were the voices of those that have gone on before echoing down the corridor of time.

Amendment No. 3 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church Concerning Lay Delegates to the General Conference
At its third quadrennial session, held in Boston, Massachusetts, April 28-May 8, 1948, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds $(2 / 3)$, the vote being six hundred and sixty-five (665) for to ten (10) against, on Friday morning, May 7, 1948, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their consideration and action, the following proposed Amendment to the Constitution of The Methodist Church.

Amend Paragraph 25, Article V of the 1944 Discipline of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:
"The lay delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional or Central Conference shall be elected by the lay members of the Annual Conference, provided that such delegates be at least twentyfive, (25) years of age and shall have been members of the constituent Churches forming this union, or of The Methodist Church, for at least four years next preceding their election, and are members thereof within the Annual Conference electing them at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences." by striking out the word and numeral "TWENTY-FIVE (25)" and substituting therefor the word and numeral "TWENTY-ONE (21)," so that the Paragraph when amended will read as follows:
"The lay delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional or Central Conference shall be elected by the lay members of the

Annual Conference, provided that such delegates be at least TWENTYONE (21) years of age and shall have been members of the constituent Churches forming this union, or of The Methodist Church, for at least four years next preceding their election, and are members thereof within the Annual Conference electing them at the time of holding the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences."

Amend Paragraph 13, Article III of the 1944 Discipline of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:
"The General Conference shall fix the basis of representation in the Jurisdictional Conferences, provided that the Jurisdictional Conferences shall be composed of an equal number of ministerial and lay delegates, the ministerial to be elected by the ministerial members of the Annuai Conferences and the lay delegates by the lay members." by inserting the words "AND THE PROVISIONAL ANNUAL CONFERENCES" to immediately follow the words "Annual Conferences" in line six (6) of the said Paragraph, so that the Paragraph when amended will read as follows:
"The General Conference shall fix the basis of representation in the Jurisdictional Conferences, provided that the Jurisdictional Conferences shall be composed of an equal number of ministerial and lay delegates, the ministerial to be elected by the ministerial members of the Annual Conferences AND THE PROVISIONAL ANNUAL CONFERENCES and the lay delegates by the lay members."

The Bishops of the Central Conferences shall have membership in the Council of Bishops with vote limited to matters relating to their respective Central Conferences." by deleting the words "LIMITED TO MATIERS RELATING TO THEIR RESPECTIVE CENTRAL CONFERENCES" found at the close of said sub-paragraph 2, so that the Paragraph when amended will read as follows:
"2. The Bishops of the Central "Conferences shall have membership in the Council of Bishops with vote."

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

Dallas, Texas, October 1949


#### Abstract

Bishop Brooks and members of the West Texas Conference now assembled we your Committee on memoirs beg leave to make the following report: During this Conference year the following persons heard the call to "Drop Anchor," then to "Abandon Ship."


Rev. H. L. McKinney, one of the well thought of retired Ministers passed this life July 24, 1949. He had served in the smaller charges in a large way. Joining the Conference in 1926 he gave 14 years of worthy service. He took the retired relation in 1940 and lived with his wife in San Antonio until the end came.

Rev. Frank L. Blair was born in Marshall, Texas and was educated Wiley College. He felt the call to preach at the age of 21 . He joined the West Texas Conference in 1927 and gave 22 years to the pastorate all of which were spent in charges in the Dallas District.

At the time of his passing Rev. Blair lived with his wife the former Miss Nancy G. Ferrell and their three children and was serving the pastorate at Pelham, Texas.

Mrs. Annie Rosetta Muse departed this life during the closing days of June. She knew the road of sacrifice and service as a Christian. She was a devoted mother to her two daughters and a loyal and loving wife to her husband. The Sisterhood of the ministry will miss her.

[^0]Mrs. Jackson a leading layman of Wharton, Texas of the Victoria District also passed during this Conference year.


John Wright Frazier a prominent layman was born in Stockdale, North Carolina, April 29, 1864. He received his early College training at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina. In 1886 he came to Texas as principal of the Public School in Victoria, Texas, serving in that capacity for thirteen years. In 1900 he was called to Austin to assist in the building of Samuel Huston College. While working at Samuel Huston College he continued his training at Wiley College whereby he received the A.B. Degree. Up on the passing of President Lovinggood, Professor Frazier served as president of the college from December 1917 to the end of the session.

Under the administration of President Karl E. Downs, a new building was named Frazier Hall in honor of Professor Frazier. At the time of his passing, July 2, 1949, he was professor and trustee emeritus of the college.

## CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, A. D., 1865, by Bishop Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference were held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Texas Conference held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, tlat the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, president. The Ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were ca led to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Toxas, January 22, 1874. The president of that Conference was B shop Bowman. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey. Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackettı, Daniel Harper and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their course and rest from their labors. This Conference to date has six districts, 111 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denominations, viz., Samuel Huston College, located at Austin, Texas.
