



Wednesday Morning — July 2, 1952 First Day

Opening: The 78th Annual Session of The West Texas Conference, Central Jurisdiction, The Methodist Church, convened in St. Andrews Methodist Church, 522 Missouri Avenue, Fort Worth, Texas at 9:00 A.M. Bishop R. N. Brooks, Resident Bishop of The New Orleans Area, presiding.

Devotions: Devotions were conducted by the host pastor, Rev. J. H. Carruthers, with music being furnished by the excellent choir of St. Andrews Church.

Communion Meditation: The communion meditation was delivered by Dr. R. F. Harrington of Samuel Huston College.

Offering: An offering for Gulfside was received with the amount being \$560.00.

The Ritual: Bishop R. N. Brooks led the Conference in the ritual for the

Administration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

Communion: Bishop Brooks, assisted by the District Superintendents administered The Holy Communion to approximately 800 communicants.

ORGANIZATION

Roll Call: Bishop R. N. Brooks directed the secretary of the last Annual Conference, Rev. Prenza L. S. Woods, to call the roll of the Conference membership. Answering the roll call were effective elders, probationers, retired ministers, and approved supply pastors. Following the calling of this roll, the roll of the lay membership of the Conference was called.

Election:

Statistician — Rev. Curtis Owens

Rev. E. C. Tatum moved that a rising vote of thanks and appreciation be given to Rev. K. W. McMillan, retiring treasurer. It was done.

Bishop Brooks pointed out that only the bony structure of Conference organization would be provided for pending the publication of the 1952 Discipline.

Rev. E. T. Dixon was elected reporter to the local newspapers, etc.

Rev. F. D. Young moved that the Annual Conference fix a date at least 15 days before the next Conference Session as the date for the receiving of all reports. Rev. I. B. Loud amended the motion:—that the setting of the dates to comprise the Conference fiscal year be considered by the Bishop and the Cabinet. The motion passed.

Rev. S. A. Keesee moved that the treasurer prepare an authorized, uniform report blank for reporting all items to the Conference treasurer. The motion passed.

MEMORIAL SERVICES

Memorial Services were conducted at 12:15 P.M. with Rev. W. W. Baker in charge. The message was brought by Rev. Curtis Owens. (See report of Memorial Committee).

Following the announcements the first session was adjourned with a benediction given by Rev. Curtis Owens.

First Day Afternoon Session

The afternoon session was to be devoted to a consideration of "Evangelism—Our Primary Responsibility" . . . however no afternoon session was held.

Thursday Morning July 3, 1952 (Second Day)

Devotions were conducted by Rev. T. M. Bruton. Hymns 268, 178, and 346 were sung. The scripture was read from John 1:1-12. Prayer was offered by Rev. T. M. Bruton.

Business: Bishop Brooks continued the business of the Annual Conference:

It was pointed out that the legal limits of the Conference would comprise the first seven rows of seats in the center of the Church.

Agenda: Rev. T. B. Echols moved that Saturday evening, preceding the Christian Advocate program, be devoted to the young people. The Conference concurred to designate Saturday of the Annual Conference as Christian Education Day.

The Conference voted that the printed program become the official program of the Annual Conference.

Committees and Commissions and Reports:

Bishop Brooks called for the report of the District Superintendents. After an introduction by Rev. F. D. Young, Rev. S. A. Keesee read the report of the District Superintendents. (See report). Rev. E. A. Smith motioned the acceptance of the report—seconded by Rev. M. T. Reed; the motion passed.

The District Superintendents were congratulated by Bishop Brooks and Ministers for having presented such a splendid report and special mention was made of the very excellent manner in which the report was presented by Rev. S. A. Keesee.

Passing of Characters:

The character of the District Superintendents, Rev. R. S. Mosby, Rev. F. D. Young, Rev. R. L. Palmer, Rev. S. A. Keesee, Rev. J. A. Wills, Rev. Z. W. Holmes, was passed by the Conference.

The characters of the ministers of the Austin, Dallas, San Antonio, Waco, Victoria, and Western Districts were passed by the Annual Conference.

Bishop Brooks explained to the Conference that Dr. Prince Taylor, editor of the Central Christian Advocate could not be present and presented a check for \$1280.89 to the Conference Treasurer from the Publishing House. It was motioned by Rev. F. D. Young and seconded by Rev. J. L. Wattley that the check be received. Motion passed.

Presentation of Dr. Davage:

Upon presentation and introduction by Bishop Brooks, Dr. M. S. Davage, President of Huston-Tillotson College addressed the Conference, explaining in detail the situation requiring the merger of Samuel Huston and Tillotson Colleges. At the conclusion of the address Rev. I. B. Loud moved that the West Texas Conference, in session, indorse whole-heartedly the merger of the two colleges and continue its love and support for same. The motion was seconded by Rev. E. C. Tatum and passed.

Executive Secretary's Report:

Mr. Chieza of Southern Rhodesia was presented by Bishop Brooks. He expressed to the Conference his appreciation for Bishop and Mrs. Brooks. He also thanked the conference for all that had been done for his people in Africa, and all that they might do in the future.

Rev. J. H. Carruthers presented Mrs. R. N. Brooks to the Conference. She was received with a rising ovation and, in turn, addressed the Conference briefly.

Following the announcements the Conference was adjourned with a benediction by Dr. R. F. Harrington.

Bishop Brooks read the following names of persons to make up the Editing Committee for the Journal. This committee is to be known as the Conference Publishing Board. Rev. F. D. Young, Rev. T. B. Echols, Rev. I. B. Loud, Rev. C. D. Owens, Mrs. H. R. Blair, and Rev. Prenza L. S. Woods. It was motioned by Rev. T. M. Bruton, and seconded by Rev. J. W. As ministers of the gospel, let us climb them like men."

SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT

The work of the San Antonio District for the Conference year 1952 - 53, has in many respects been very gratifying. There are about four churches within the District confines which are definitely under par, and which require some type of Spiritual or Psychological therapy.

We have given much attention to these churches, both in Quarterly Conferences and special visitations, and counselings with the officials, in the hope of being able to properly diagnose each case and find the

needed remedy. We hope the results will justify the efforts.

With the above mentioned exceptions, the District, at present, is in

a very healthy state.

The District Superintendent, the Pastors, and laymen have had great fellowship and accord across the year.

THE GROWING URBAN TENDENCY

Quietly and almost imperceptibly the San Antonio District, is becoming a distinctive Urban District. Whether or not it is a healthy sign, certainly could precipitate much debate, but the fact remains that the Negro has deserted the farms. This is especially true in the area between San Antonio and the Mexican border. Those few Negroes who remain on the farms are becoming increasingly Urban-minded.

RESULTS

Four of our rural and small town churches, namely, Divine, Miguil, Redds Chapel and Southerland Springs have all closed their doors in

the last three years. The cause, the people are gone.

We can ill afford to neglect our remaining rural churches, but in order to meet the increasing and ever excellerating competition, we must seek to greatly strengthen our churches in the great centers by providing for them the best possible leadership and an adequate Urban-program, so geared and so executed as to reach the largest possible number of people.

At the same time ways and means must be found to establish missions

in the outpost areas.

BUILDING

Our building program was much retarded this year by the tieup of Advance Special Funds, which for some reason, up to this time we have not received. Our most noteworthy building accomplishment being the bringing to completion our new Jacob's Chapel edifice so well begun by

the former pastor, Bro. L. E. Muse. The church completed, the parsonage completely renovated and furnished, the grounds landscaped and shrubbry planted, present an unusually pleasing sight.

Our future building program includes completion of the churches at Floresville and Pleasanton, renovation at Harpers and Nixon, building St. Mark's Mission in San Antonio and a completely new edifice at Uvalde.

THE MUSTS

There is a desperate need for a new church in Corpus Christi. Corpus Christi is the most strategically located of all the cities of the great Southwest, the gateway to one of the richest sections of the State. At present the city is experiencing an astounding growth. The church must keep abreast.

East St. Paul is also a must. This pastor and congregation are rallying with great vigor to building a church, commensurate with the dignity, the growth and the need of this section of the city. Let us back them.

The District has had 196 accessions.

VICTORIA DISTRICT

The Victoria District is grateful to the Heavenly Father for His wonderful guidance through this Conference year. It has been a year of all work and no play. Most of the pastors have had a good year in their charges.

SOME OF THE OUTSTANDING WORK DONE BY THE PASTORS OF THE DISTRICT

The Rev. Lawrence D. Washington, was appointed to supply our St. Paul's Church after the passing of Brother Harvey. He has had a very successful year, even though he did not get on the grounds until some time in November. Coming into this new field, Brother Washington has done a splendid job in making improvement on our Parsonage. The Parsonage has been completely renovated inside. New bath room fixtures installed, hot water heater and kitchen sink, all put in to make this a modern home, all rooms papered and painted. He is ready to start repairing the church.

The Rev. A. D. Minor, has done a fine job in liquidating the indebtedness on our church in Edna. He has been able to pay all of the local debts, and has made a substantial payment to the Board of Missions and Church Extension on the church loan. More than \$2,000 has been paid on old indebtedness. Many other improvements have been made.

The Rev. T. J. Simms, has done a fine job in the improvement of our church in Goliad. Pastor's study, choir room and gallery added at a cost of about \$1,500. The members are happy over this work, and new interest has been created.

The Rev. J. W. Goode, has made wonderful strides this conference year. He bought a lot and put a neat little church edifice on it for our membership in Port Lavaca. This gives us a church home in Port Lavaca, which was very much needed.

Our church at Flatonia has been renovated throughout, and the church in Schulenburg seated with regular church pews, under the leadership of the Rev. D. C. Carroll.

This has been a splendid year for brother Carroll, and the good people of the Schulenburg-Flatonia Circuit.

The Rev. John H. Marshall, has had a grand year in our Websters Chapel Church of Victoria. This pastor has done a fine job. The old church has been brick-veneered, and an educational building with social hall and kitchen has been added. With a little more funds this will be one among the best churches in the conference.

At our last conference, the Waelder Church became a part of the Weimar Parish. There came into our fellowship a minister from the A.M.E. church. The Rev. H. G. Simmons, who was appointed pastor of our Bethel Church at Waelder, has done a fine job. A roof which had been burned off the church for nearly four years was put on in nearly four months by Brother Simmons.

The membership of the District has increased this conference year, we have had an increase in the Church School membership of the District. We thank God for His guidance in the affairs of the Victoria District, for in the midst of our struggles we have felt His guiding hand.

CHURCHES REMODELED AND IMPROVED IN THE WACO DISTRICT

St. James Church, Bremond, Texas, has been remodeled at a cost of \$1200 donation from Advance Funds, \$500. Raised Locally \$700.

The Parsonage at Maysfield has been remodeled. Donation from the Advance Funds \$600. To be raised locally \$800.

The above mentioned newly erected church buildings are not entirely finished. But the congregations are now worshipping in them. Each one of them can be entirely finished for small sums of money. The Pastors and people of these newly constructed remodeled and improved churches and parsonage, merit the praise and respect of Methodists throughout the world.

Truly these servants of God have done a great service for Christianity and our beloved Methodism.

CHURCHES THAT SHOULD BE ERECTED IN THE NEAR FUTURE IN THE WACO DISTRICT

Jones Chapel, Waco, must have a new modern church building at once. The congregation and Church School here, under the leadership of Rev. George L. Johnson has grown too large for this small one room structure. This membership under the leadership of Brother Johnson has raised more than \$3000 on a new Jones Chapel.

Cedar Chapel in the rurals of Limestone County Texas, must have a new modern church building at once. Here we have about 60 members mostly tenant farmers worshipping and carrying on a church school in an old dilapidated school house.

Through the wise providence of God and the untiring efforts of our faithful pastors and people the Waco District is able to report its share of the Benevolences, Advance Specials and other Special Claims apportioned to it.

The Waco District faces the future with faith in God. And with faith in world Methodism, and pledges to do its part to help bring the kingdom of God on the earth.

The Benevolent Claims have been presented, accepted and paid. The salaries of nearly every pastor on the Western District have been increased.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

World Service is the life line of The Methodist Church. Since Methodist Union in 1939 the church has earnestly sought to find a way to prepare an equitable schedule to apportionments of the total World Service Budget to the several Annual Conferences.

After careful study by the General Commission on World Service and Finance and upon their recommendation, the General Conference adopted a plan of distribution of World Service Apportionments to Annual Conferences on a decimal based on the following factors:

- (a) One-third on the basis of active membership.
- (b) One-third on the basis of total non-building giving (i.e., total for all purposes less amounts paid for debts, buildings and improvements), and
- (c) One-third on the basis of World Service giving on apportionment. The figures computing the decimal shall be those of the first three years of the quadrennium. The figures for (a) and (b) shall be taken from the General Minutes and for (c) from the reports of the General Commission on World Service and Finance.

This report was recommended by the General Commission after four years of intensive study of one dozen other methods. While it is true that the Central, South Central and South Eastern Jurisdictions receive the largest increases in this plan, we still believe it to be the fairest method.

This plan and the increase in the total World Service budget from \$7,903,379 to \$9,660,000 increased an apportionment of the Central Jurisdiction from \$169,223 to 255,293. Because it was obvious that for many conferences this plan meant an increase of above 100% and some other conferences would have a decrease or hold the same apportionment; the General Conference adopted an adjustment schedule for these apportionments whereby no annual conference shall have an apportionment with less than a ten percent increase above the apportionment for 1948-52; and no Annual Conference shall have an apportionment with more than thirty-five percent increase. This adjustment brings the Central Jurisdiction's apportionment down to \$222,081.

In the New Orleans Area we have made an excellent record in World Service giving. This has been achieved because after careful study under the direction of our Resident Bishop by the several Annual Conference Commissions on World Service and Finance we have cooperated in making a more equitable distribution of the total apportionment for World Service for which the Area is responsible.

With our intimate knowledge of all the factors involved we are convinced that the contributing ability of the several annual conferences in the Area on a percentage basis is:

By vote of the New Orleans Area Council at the beginning of the last quadrennium it was agreed that the several Annual Conferences would share the total World Service apportionments on the above percentage basis.

The adjustment for Annual Conference apportionments for the Conferences in the New Orleans Area during the quadrennium of 1948-1952 was as follows:

On the basis of the decimal for distribution of the apportionment by the General Conference prior to the adjustment of maximum of 35% increase the total World Service for the New Orleans Area would increase from \$41,956 to \$67,734. However the adjustment brings the total apportionment for the Annual Conferences of the New Orleans Area down to \$55,397.

A study of the above chart clearly indicates that the fairest and most equitable distribution of World Service apportionments for the several Annual Conferences of the New Orleans Area is the adjusted apportionment on the percentage basis adjusted and approved by the New Orleans Area Council.

Report No. II THE ADVANCE FOR CHRIST AND HIS CHURCH

The General Conference of 1952 approved the Conference initiated Advance Specials. We recommend that for WEST TEXAS Annual Conference that the goal for Advance for 1952-53 shall be 10,775. That the first \$3,500 of this amount shall be used as follows: \$3,000 for District Subsidy and \$500 for assistance for Pastors attending the 10 week school. That \$550 for Gulside, and \$225 contributed to assist in the entertainment of Ministers' Wives attending — The Ministers' Wives Retreat—1953. From the balance \$6,500, that each District in the Annual Conference shall have one project to participate in this amount. That the project and amount of its participation in the fund shall be fixed by the Advance Committee of the Annual Conference of which the Bishop shall

be chairman. That the goal of \$10,775 shall be apportioned to the several Districts according to their percentage share of Annual Conference responsibilities. That this fund shall be reported by the charges of the Annual Conference Treasurer in the following manner: one-half of goal for charges on Thanksgiving Day and one-half on Christmas Sunday.

We express our sincere hope that each charge realize that we recognize that the sum of \$10,775 for Advance Projects within our Annual Conference is inadequate. Therefore, each charge will accept their goal as a base below which they will not fall, rather than a ceiling above which they will not go. Anyone who has a mental picture of many of the churches and parsonages in our conference will agree that we must continuously give more and more to Advance if we are to have our ministers adequately housed and respectable preaching places in West Texas Conference vicinity.

WEEK OF DEDICATION

We recommend that the Conference set a goal for the Week of Dedication to be raised in the Spring of 1953 at \$1100 for the Conference. That this amount be apportioned to the Districts on the percentage basis; and thence to the charges of the several Districts on the Approved Percentage share of the charge.

EPISCOPAL FUND

In compliance with the General Conference we recommend that the Episcopal Fund shall be two percent of the Pastors Cash Salary. Not including house rent $(1\frac{3}{4}\%)$ for first year of quadrennium).

CONFERENCE CLAIMANT FUND

We recommend that the Conference Claimant Fund shall be 15% of the Pastor's Cash Salary. 5% for Reserve and 10% for immediate distribution.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S FUND

We recommend that the District Stewards of the several districts shall set the salary, house rent, travel and office expense for the Superintendents. Provided that in no case shall the amount set for salary of the District Superintendent be less than 16 percent of the pastor's apportioned salary for that District.

PASTOR'S SALARY

We recommend for each full time pastor in the Annual Conference whose salary is less than \$3,600, that there shall be a minimum increase in salary of 25% to match the rising cost of living.

MINIMUM SUPPORT FUND

We recommend that each charge shall be apportioned 2% of Pastor's Cash Salary for Minimum Support.

SUSTENTATION FUND

We recommend that each charge report an amount to the Conference Treasurer equal to 1% of Pastor's Cash Salary for the Sustentation of Pastors.

We further recommend that each Minister who is a member of the Annual Conference or Supply Pastor under appointment shall pay 2 per cent of his Annual Salary to the Conference Treasurer for the Reserve Pension Fund.

We recommend that in compliance with the vote of the Central Jurisdictional Conference in Philadelphia June 19, 1952 that we raise in the West Texas Conference, under the leadership furnished to us from the College, the amount of \$1.00 per member for Huston-Tillotson College.

We recommend that Church School Rally Day shall be September 28. We recommend that Christian Education Week's observance shall be September 28 - October 5.

That Report Days for all claims be Race Relations Sunday and Easter Sunday 1953.

We call attention to each charge of the Fourth Sunday Remittance from the Church School of the Charge. This is applied to the World Service and Conference Benevolence quota of the charge for Annual Conference Benevolence and 50% for World Service.

We recommend our World Service and Annual Conference Benevolence Budget be \$25,000. We recommend that the ratio between General Conference Benevolence and Annual Conference Benevolence shall be for General Conference 48.8%; for Annual Conference 51.2%.

We recommend that the plan of the General Conference shall be used in making apportionments to the Districts. According to the 1951 Annual Conference Journal the following would be the percentage share of the Districts:

We recommend that the apportionments be made to the several charges of the Annual Conference on the same basis which it is made to the Districts. In this way the stronger charges will share their rightful part of the benevolence responsibility.

LAY REPORT

Bishop Brooks and Members of the West Texas Annual Conference:
As your Conference Lay Leader, I submit to you my Annual Report.
The Laymen of the Conference have been cooperative with the District Superintendents and Pastors in helping them in all phases of the work assigned to them.

It was loyal Laymen who helped Pastors in the spiritual as well as the financial growth of the Conference. In all reports they have cooperated

in a very fine way.

Since our last meeting we have attended the Quadrennial General Conference at San Francisco, California, April 23 through May 6, 1952. It was there that we did our bit in helping to change the laws of the Church.

We also attended the Central Jruisdictional Conference at Philadelphia to elect two (2) new General Superintendents of the Methodist Church, namely, Bishop Edgar A. Love and Bishop Matthew W. Clair.

We have done our best to promote the Lay Work of the West Texas

Conference, although without funds.

RECOMMENDATIONS

As the General Board of Lay Activity will promote Christian Stewardship the Quadrennium of 1952 - '56 in all of its phases, we recommend that the Laymen in cooperation with the District Superintendents and Pastors of the West Texas Conference set up strong organizations to promote stewardship, especially Stewardship of Possession and Giving. We shall stress tithing and more proportionate giving.

EVANGELISM

Evangelism also will still be the program for the Merhodist Chutch during 1952 - '56. We recommend that the Laymen join hands and hearts with the Pastors and District Superintendents in promoting Evangelism, and help bring the Unchurched to Christ and His Church.

METHODIST MEN

We shall still call upon the Laymen of each Charge ot organize the men of the Charge in that organization known as the "Methodist Men". We are asking all Presidents of Methodist Men to bring their organizations up to date, namely, if your charter has expired, see to it that your Charter be renewed by sending to the General Board of Activities your Annual dues.

TEMPERANCE AND PROHIBITION

We recommend that in cooperation with the Pastor, Church School Superintendents, and the Church Board of Education set up a strong Committee on Temperenca and designate one Sunday in each month as "Temperance" Sunday.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS

Mr. Chairman, brothers and sisters of the West Texas Annual Conference:
Again, I stand before you to submit the Annual report of the Annual
Conference Board of Missions.

We have not held any Conference level meetings on account of the limited funds appropriated for the work of the board. Actually our activities are limited to just the handling of the correspondence. It is regrettable that we must face ourselves as a conference and admit that we are doing nothing of a missionary nature. As I move about from place to place, I hear the Macedonian call; it seems that in too many places our Church life is deteriorating. Brothers, we must see visions—where there are no visions people perish.

It is necessary for us to watch the shift of population in our various communities and cities. It is sad to say that in most of our new born communities we are Johnny-come-late if we ever get there. I wonder if

we might not be extreme pessimists, let us make a few comparisons. The other fellow can out-distance us; if he is AME or CME he pays as much connectional money as we pay. If he is Baptist, he outs more into an anniversary as you pay for claims without any board to help and yet he gets into the new community; builds and grows.

I think we should re-interpret our conception of missions. We seem to be interested only in receiving, somehow in our conference we must set up for each year some advance specials. If we are to keep abreast with

the trends of Church needs in our communities.

In most of our larger cities we have new communities growing up; hundreds of people moving in, so the Methodist Church must move in with them. This need is not just something that the Board of Church Extension should meet, but it is a challenge that we must meet as a Conference. Here in Fort Worth we need new Methodist Churches; as Chairman of the Conference Board I as amking our District Superintendents to study these growing needs and present them to the Annual Conference and as Pastors and Lay-men put ourselves to the task of meeting these needs.

REPORT OF MINIMUM MINISTERIAL SUPPORT

West Texas Annual Conference

Paragraphs 261, 264, 651, (7), 806-808:

We recommend that there shall be a minimum salary schedule in the West Texas Conference for full-time pastors—(full-time meaning those pastors who are devoting all their time to the ministry and are living on their charges) as follows:

Single Men — \$1000.00 anunally. Married Men — \$1200.00 annually.

Each Child Under 16 Years of Age — there will be an addition of \$100.00

annually.

It is estimated that a minimum of \$8000.00 is necessary to begin this fund. We propose to provide for same through two sources: (1) The Ministers of the Annual Conference, and (2) the Charges of the Annual Conference.

We recommend that during the Conference year, 1952-53, there shall be an amount equal to 2% of the estimated pastor's salary paid to the Conference Treasurer by each Pastoral Charge.

ANNUAL REPORT

of

CHAIRMAN OF COMMISSION ON WORLD PEACE

of the

METHODIST CHURCH

Greetings to the West Texas Conference:

To me comes again the honor of submitting to you the aannul report of the Chairman of the Commission on World Peace. It is by no means or measure an insignificant or trivial consideration to be honored as your Chairman on this Commission. Rather, it is a distinguished position and I give assurance for confidence shown me as I submit this record of stewardship out of the experience of my office and offer some degree of recommendations.

As we come to this hour of accounting let me remind you that this world of ours is in a chaos and the condition is deplorable. In this report

I will relate some of the work done by the commission.

1. Literature has been distributed to all Churches in the West Texas Conference.

2. Film strips on United Nations.

3. Addresses in local Churches and high schools.

4. Observance of United Nations Day and World Service Sunday.

5. Bombarded Congress with letters as relates to Universal Military Training (which we opposed, and the bill was defeated). Action was taken on the local level.

The Chairman was one of the guest speakers at McMurray College, Abilene, Texas, with Dr. Carl Soule and others. The program was sponsored by State Federation of Methodist Women, was inter-racial and the results were gratifying.

Universal Military Training (defeated)

The Methodist Church, through the General Conference, has taken a clear stand against any system of peace time universal military training.

(Discipline No. 2025 page 599.) We reaffirm this stand.

We believe the American home would suffer if UMT were adopted. As Christians we believe that wholesome moral life is better attained in normal civilian surroundings than in military training camps no matter how much the National Security Training Commissiona msy attemp to control or regulate them.

Education for citizenship in a democracy would suffer if a permanent plan of compulsory military training were adopted. Young men who are trained to obey military officers implicitly are not educated to make individual moral decisions orn to exercise personal initiative. We do not want all our young men put into the hands of military leaders, nor our country placed under permanent military dominations.

The Board of World Peace

We know the Korean situation is grave. War clouds are hanging heavy. We cry PEACE! PEACE! There is no peace. The world of ours

today is confronted by a crisis. Today's crisis is the most acute in history. The Church cannot ignore nor evade this problem. Upon its solution rests our future. If that future is to fulfill the cherished prophesies of the Christian Church. There must be peace, permanent and eternal.

Since Christianity and war are utterly opposed, the Church as the body of Christ, the carrier of the Gospel, the institution that bears Christ's name, must not become the agent of any government for its furtherance. The task of the Church is healing, reconciliation, the removal of prejudice and hate, the cementing of bonds of brotherhood, the exalting of God as the Father and Ruler of all mankind and Christ as the Savior of all.

The primary conditions of peace lie in the attitude of men. Since the Church in a unique way holds in its keeping the moral and spiritual forces for a peaceful world, the Church has a unique and God-given responsibility.

The Church can be an agency of great power for the establishment of a world community, as has been demonstrated by the missionary and ecumenical movements. That the bonds of brotherhood among Christians have held so firm during the recent years of war and international tension is occasion for humble thanks-giving to God. From the beginnings already made, a wider world community must be fashioned through cooperation with persons of all religious faiths.

Relief of Suffering

Among the primary tasks of the Church is the duty to relieve human misery. When millions of our brothers for whom Christ are hungry, cold and homeless children die of starvation, no Christian can turn a deaf ear to the voice of Him who says "in as much as ye have done it unto me". The command of Christ and political realism unite in making this ministry an essential condition of peace, for war walks on the heels of hunger. Relief can be given through various channels. Since no private giving can be adequate in the amount, there must be large scale government appropriations on a non-pertisan basis, given for the welfare of recipients. The gifts of the Methodist Church through both the Church World Service and the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief, should be greatly increased.

Universal Disarmament

We rejoice that the sixth session of the General Assembly meeting in Paris during the winter of 1951-52 established by unanimous vote a disarmament Commission to nations overburdened by the economid and moral strains of the present armament race; this action brings new hope of the possibility of reduction, control and eventual elimination of the implements of war. We pray for the sucessc of this commission and pledge it the support of our church.

Military Training

The General Conference and seven church-wide organizations of the Methodist Church, led by the Council of Bishops, have declared there oppositions to any system of peace-time universal training. We reaffirm this stand. We appeal to the United States to give bold leadership looking toward the universal abolition of peace-time conscription by or through the United States.

United Nations Day

October 24th has been designated by resolution of the U. N. Assembly as United Nations Day. We recommend that more consideration be given by local churches to this Board in observance of this day. aA often as possible hold special programs with speakers, panels, forums, etc. The religious forces of our land should assume dynamic leadership on this nation-wide observance of UN Day. We should remember that at least three basic principles on which UN is founded are also cardinal tenets of our religious faith: the dignity and worth of the human person, the unity of mankind, the moral freedom of the individual. Both religion and the United Nations believe that since man makes and wages war, man can also build those conditions in the world which make enduring peace possible.

"God of the nations and Father of all Peoples; who art our refuge and strength in all time of trouble; who dost give us the power to direct, under Thy Guidance, our destiny in these perilous days:

Deliver us all from self-righteousness and pride. Grant that principle and not power be the basis of decisions among the family of nations; that compassion and concern for the welfare of all Thy Children be at the center of all United Nations deliberations. Inspire all peoples, we beseech Thee, to do justly love much, and walk humbly with Thee. Amen."

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AT SAMUEL HUSTON COLLEGE

(Report for the year 1951-1952)

Religion and Education should be considered equally important, we think and certainly in a Church-related institution. It has been our endeavor during the past year to give emphasis to this fact at Samuel Huston College.

Religious Life on the campus has been emphasized in several ways:

Regularly, each Sunday morning, there has been Sunday School, in which was used the literature of the Methodist Cuhrch. While attendance was voluntary, always there were interested students and faculty persons present. During the past year the Superintendent of the Sunday School was a student, a Senior, the daughter of one of our West Texas Conference ministers.

Sunday evening Vesper services were stressed as the time when the Samuel Huston College Family came together for an hour of religious worship. Featured during this hour have been ministers of the city; members of the faculty; carefully selected outstanding people of the city; visitors who were in the city or on the campus; and occasionally, some of the student organizations were in charge.

Power Hour on Wednesday evenings gave to those more religiously-minded students an opportunity to "store up" power for the remainder of the week.

The Methodist Student Movement gave Methodist young people who attended the meetings, an opportunity to keep abreast with the thoughts and trends of Methodist students the world over. Delegates from this group were sent to various student conferences, and upon returning, made their reports at chapel assemblies.

The Oxford Club, composed of young men interested in religious service as a career, came before the student body upon occasion. It will be of interest to you to note that the President of the Oxford Club is expected to be the first Negro to enter this fall the Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University, as a full-fledged graduate student.

The Student Christian Association was organized during the past year.

Religious Emphasis Week this year was the best ever, according to the consensus of opinion of many who have witnessed then during the years. Much of the success might be attributed to the Conference Executive Secretary, who maintains his office on the campus, and who was the speaker for the Religious Emphasis Week.

As we come to the end of Samuel Huston College as such, it is our sincere hope that in the new Huston-Tillotson College, the Methodist "trends" will be continued in many ways, particularly in the area of Religious Life; and further, that there will be a greater concentration of effort on the part of Methodists who will be connected with the new institution ,to the end that we may hold fast to that which has been gained in this phase of our work.

Report of BOARD OF EDUCATION

FOREWORD

In the pages that follow, our Executive Secretary, The Reverend Ernest T. Dixon sets forth the achievements of the past year and proposes a program of ADVANCE that will lead our conference to new heights of attainment.

It is our hope that he will have the wholehearted support of every minister and layman of the West Texas Conference.

Bishop Brooks, Members of the 1952 West Texas Annual Conference and Friends:

The Conference Board of Education submits to you its annual report as follows:

In his Annual Message to Congress in December 1862 Abraham Lincoln made the following statement:

"The dogmas of the quiet past are inadequate to the stormy present: the occasion is piled high with difficulty, and we must think anew and act anew."

Persons interested in the Church's program of Christian Education realize the truth of Lincoln's words of our day. Increasingly, we must continue to dispel the old opinions and convictions that the Christian Education program is a "Tommy-tinker, namby-pamby," peripherial element in the toal program of the Church. Preaching is important, but not sufficient to meet the toal religious and moral needs of people. Seventy million unchurched people in America and the present sickness of our society indicate this fact. Obedience to the Master's command, "Go teach," is a major responsibility and concern of every true Christian individual and group.

"The essential character of religious education as the foundation of the Church's life runs like a thread through the Scriptures from the days when Moses gave specific direction to his people for teaching their children to the Great Commission which Jesus gave to his followers. Likewise, Christian Teaching is imbedded in the foundation of our Methodist structure both in the example and in the explicit instruction which Wesley and Asbury gave to their preachers."

There is a definite concern for and interest in a vital program of Christian Education in the West Texas Conference. The seeds sown approximately 30 years ago under a tent in Long Mott, Texas are still producing good fruits.

This report is an effort to record the concern and interest and fruits realized during the 1952-52 Conference year and to suggest specific directions and goals for the 1952-53 Conference year.

Getting Started . . .

The present executive secretary was appointed on May 6, 1951. However, because of certain responsibilities in connection with his work at Tuskegee Institute, Alabama, he did not assume his duties until June 1st.

Sustained work within the Conference began on September 12th when the District Superintendents met with the Executive Secretary to discuss and prepare plans for the West Texas Conference Christian Education program. At this meeting the District Superintendents suggested that the executive secretary should conduct a series of meetings at strategic ceners on each district. The purposes of these meetings were:

- 1. To introduce the new executive secretary.
- 2. To discuss the "Organization and Program of the Methodist Church School.
- 3. To locate present and potential leadership.
- 4. To discover needs and interests.

The sub-district centers decided upon were the following:

Austin District: Austin, Luling, La Grange, Lampasas, Temple.

Dallas District: Dallas, Denison, Fort Worth, Mexia-Pelham, Wichita Falls.

San Antonio District: Corpus Christi, Seguin, San Antonio, Uvalde. Victoria District: El Campo, Hallettsville, Victoria.

Waco District:† Marlin, Waco.

Western District:† Amarillo, Abilene, Colorado City, Brownwood, El Paso, Lubbock, San Angelo, Midland.

Churches in each district were grouped about those centers nearest them.

On September 15th the Board of Education met and approved the district superintendents suggestions as well as certain other recommendations made by the executive secretary which included the purchasing of a 16 MM projector and screen.

The series of sub-district meetings were held during the months of October and November. The general theme was: "Improving and Enriching Our Church School Program." Beczuse of conflicting dates and activi-

The executive secretary made personal contacts in local Churches to promote the Vacation Church School Program in the Austin and Dallas Districts. He conferred with the summer student worker on the Western District Cceil Williams, concerning the VSC Program and supplied him with some helpful materials.

Youth Work

During the months of July and August 1951 the executive secretary met with the six district youth groups at the Institutes and shared in the leadership and guidance of their activities. Each youth group elected their District Officers and made plans for the year. The total youth enrollment of the District Institutes was approximately 450.

In connection with the Texas and West Texas United Evangelistic Mission, October 27 - November 4, Methodist Youth Rallies were held in Austin, San Antonio, Waco, Victoria, Dallas and Amarillo (Nov. 24).

Reclamation of West Texas Methodist youth was the major emphasis at these rallies. A total of approximately 500 youth came together for dis-

cussion and inspiration.

The following are excerpts from a letter dated September 30, 1951, written by the President of the Southwest Texas Methodist Youth Fellowship, David Douglass:

. . . The young people of the conference feel strongly about the segregation and discrimination among the various races in our Nation. We believe if we can show an example of our people working together in common fellowship—it will add immensely toward helping to overcome this gross separation . . . just being guest is a far cry from real unity. This year at one of our camps we would like to have representatives from your West Texas Conference.

For the first time in the history of Texas Methodism:

- 1. Youth of the Southwest Texas, Rio Grande and West Texas Conferences sat down together and made plans for a joint activity, an Older Youth Work Camp, June 2 7, 1952 at Mt. Wesley Assembly, Kerrville.
 - 2. Youth of the West Texas Conference attended a meeting at the Mount Wesley Assembly, Kerrville, not as guests, but as full fledged delegates.

Approximately 35 Older Youth attended the Work Camp. The three representatives from the West Texas Conference were: Gwendolyn Crawford; San Angelo; Lillian Williams and Ernestine Ransom, Dallas.

Two youths from the San Antonio District represented the West Texas Conference at the National Convocation of Methodist Youth at Purdue University, August 1951. They were: Mary Catherine Bryant, San Antonio: St. Paul, and Ella F. Bell, Corpus Christi: St. Paul. During the past year they have served as recource leaders in various youth meetings in local churches and at Samuel Huston College.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AT SAMUEL HUSTON COLLEGE

(Report of the year 1951-1952)

In connection with Dr. Caldwell's statement the following facts are presented:

- 1. The conference Board of Education and our local churches at San Marcos, Kerrville, Littig and Austin (Wesley) cooperated with the Methodist Student Movement in sending ten delegates to the Texas MSM meeting at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, Texas, November 23 25, 1952. The delegates were: Gilbert Caldwell, Charles Erdy, La Juanah Longston, Emma Lois Smith, Hawthorne, Maud Collins, Donnie Collins, Bonnie Houston, Mildred Hawthorne, Maud Collins, Donnie Collins, Bonnie Houston, Marshall Hodge and Curtis McDonald.
- 2. At the closing service during Religious Emphasis Week one hundred and three (103) students and faculty members lighted candles at the altar and deposited signed cards which read in part:

 "I here and now reaffirm my faith in God's spiritual forces and also reaffirm my loyalty to Jesus Christ as my Saviour and Friend."

Adult Work

Ten young adults from our Conference attended the New Orleans Area Leadership School for Adult Workers at Gulfside, August 13 - 15, 1951. Dr. Robert S. Clemmons, General Board of Education, Adult Department, directed the school.

Fifteen other young adults joined the above ten at Gulfside to attend the New Orleans Area Young Adult Assembly August 15 - 19, 1951.

To supplement the work done by Dr. Clemmons at Gulfside, the Reverend Edwin F. Tewksbury of the General Board of Education spent January 30 thru February 2, 1952 conducting a series of evening Young Adult meetings. The theme of the meetings were: "Aoung Adults Wake Up! Brace Up! Look Up!

The twenty-five young adults who attended left the meeting determined to make it an annual affair.

Other Activities

The Board of Education cooperated with the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service in the 1952 School of Missions. Seventynine women attended the school.

A Family Life Seminar was conducted on the San Antonio District January 15 - 18, 1952. The theme was: "Venturing with God in Family Life." Some of the resource leaders were: Dr. C. Austin Whittier, physician, San Antonio; Judge Raymond Gerhardt, Bexas County; Reverend Kenneth Copeland, Southwest Texas Conference and Mr. Robert Fields, City Health Department, San Antonio. Approximately 150 persons attended this seminar which was held in San Antonio.

During National Family Week, May 4 - 11, 1952, the executive secretary conducted a series of discussions on Courtship, Marriage and Family Life at the Tilmon, Luling, Brownwood and Beeville Churches, To guide and supplement the discussions three motion pictures were shown: "Choosing For Happiness," "This Charming Couple," "Who's Boss." Approximately 275 persons participated in the weeks activities.

A Final Word

During the past year mistakes were made, disappointments, failures and setbacks were experienced and vital areas of work were neglected. However, these are common elements in all our lives. We do not lament over them, but rather glory in the fact that the days ahead are filled with unlimited oportunities and possibilities. Together we will face the distant horizon and set our hearts, minds and hands on capturing what lines beyond.

Sincerest words of gratitude and appreciation are extended Bishop Robert N. Brooks, the officers and members of the Conference Board of Education, the Conference Directors of Children, Youth and Adult Work, the former executive secretary, the District Superintendents and their Christian Education staffs, the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church, President, faculty, staff and atudent body of Samuel

Huston College and the good ministers and laymen of the West Texas Conference. Their cooperation and support made possible the accomplishments contained in this report.

- 2. Conference and District Directors of Children's Work represented at National Council of Churches Children's Workers Regional School. Austin, Texas, November 10, 1952.
- 3. District Vacation Church School Training Conferences, (To train prospective VCS workers and develop VCS District teams that will serve selected churches and areas.)
- 4. Conference wide Observance of Childhood Sunday.

Youth Work

- 1. District and sub-district youth workers conferences (To study and interpret information contained in Youth Planbook.)
- 2. Conference Wide Observance of Youth Week, January 25 February 1, 1953. (This is a United Christian Youth Movement project. Youth evengelistic services may be conducted by individual or groups of local Churches. On Sunday, February 1, District wide youth rallies may be held).
- 3. Conference Wide Christian Vocations Conference. (To be planned in cooperation with the Huston-Tillotson Methodist Student Movement).
- 4. Annual Youth Conference or Retreat, (To provide an opportunity for the youth and Conference and District youth workers (1) to evaluate the past years' work, (2) to elect Conference MYF Officers, (3) to coordinate their District activities and programs, (4) to fellowship and worship together.)
- 5. Conference wide observance of: Student Recognition Day, Methodist Student Day, (1950-1951 twelve (12) young people of the West Texas Conference received a total of \$1771.00 ln loans and scholarships from the Methodist Student Loan Fund.

During the Samuel Huston College Commencement Week Activities this year, 1952, National Methodist Scholarships were awarded to Faye Crawford, Evelyn Spears and Marshall Hodge. These awards cover tuition and fees up to \$400 for each student.)

6. Conference Wide promotion of Methodist Youth Fund. (This fund helps to maintain a program of Missionary education and youth work

around the world.)

7. Send delegates to National Methodist Youth Planning Conference, August 16 - 20, 1952, Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana.

8. Full support and participation in those youth activities jointly sponsored by the Rio Grande, Southwest Texas and West Texas Conference.

Adult Work

- 1. District and Sub-District Adult Conferences (To discuss the total adult program and promote the formation of YAF in local churches.)
- 2. Leadership Training Institutes (at least, one accredited school in each district of the West Texas Conference.)
- 3. Cooperate with Texas, Rio Grande and Southwest Texas Conferences in sponsoring a "Texas Methodist Adult Conference."
- 4. Send requested delegates to:
 - a. New Orleans Area Young Adult Leadership School, August 18-20, 1952 at Gulfside. (Executive Secretary, Conference Director of Adult Work, each District Director of Adult Work and the Conference Young Adult president.)
 - b. New Orleans Area Young Adult Assembly, August 21-24, 1952 (at least 25 young adults from the West Texas Conference.)
- 5. Older Adults Retreat (Honored delegates will be retired ministers and their wives and widows of retired ministers.)

General Work

- Conference wide observance of Church School Rally Day, September 28, 1952 (This would be an appropriate way to close the observance of Christian Education Week.)
- 2. Observance of World Service Sunday the fourth Sunday in each month by every local church. (Thr fourth Sunday offering should be emphasized and promoted on this Day.)
- 3. Conference wide observance of National Family Week. (Each district may conduct a Family Life Conference.)
- 4. Emphasize Rural Church improvement and adevelopment in each District by doing the following:
 - a. Select and set up a demonstration rural parish in each district and concentrate on (1) Church beautification (2) Organization of the Church School, and (3) Promotion of Stewardship Program (The Lord's Acre Plan).
 - b. Observe Rural Life Sunday.
 - c. Sponsor a Conference Town and Country Ministers Workshop. (approximately one-third of the preaching places in the West Texas Conference are located in rural areas. Let's give them some special attention.)

5. Make a complete study of all the churches in the Conference considering such matters as membership, growth, leadership resources, program, finances, physical plant and equipment, etc.

6. The appointment of a special committee to explore the possibilities and opportunities for the development of an effective program for

the Methodist students attending Huston-Tillotson College.

7. District and Sub-district meetings of Church School Superintendents and Chairmen of Boards of Education. (To discuss organization and administration of the Methodist Church School.)

SAMUEL HUSTON COLLEGE — QUADRENNIAL REPORT 1948 — 1952

To the Presiding Bishop, Members and Friends of the West Texas Conference in Annual Session —

Greetings:

This year marks approximately my fourth anniversary of service to this Conference as President of Samuel Huston College. At this historic juncture in the life of the College, it seems wise to apprise our faithful constituency of some of the accomplishments during the last four years. This is especially in keeping since it is generally understood that the College will assume a different form for the coming year. It will merge with another institution, and will move forth into a new educational era.

Let me remind you that the year 1948 was not only my first year at the College, but was the year which witnessed the sudden and unexpected death of the late President Karl Everett Downs. A great expansion program was under way at the time of his passing. Three new units had been completed. I doff my hat to the fine accomplishments which featured the administration of this dynamic and able young leader who was obsessed by a grand and majestic vision.

These capital improvements were expensive, and left the financial burden to be borne by the coming administration. It must also be pointed out, however, that these improvements in plant expansion increased the valuation of your property holdings at Samuel Huston College by many thousands of dollars. As compared with a plant valuation of \$140,425 as of 1942, there is a plant valuation now of \$437,227 during this current year.

Against a background of plant deficit, newspaper accounts of eminent merger with another institution, and the feeling that many contacts were lost through the sudden passing of the former administrator, the work at Samuel Huston College was assumed.

During the last four years there have been some achievements of note which should be reported now, for the record. This document bids well to be the last major output from what is now Samuel Huston College.

I. THE ACADEMIC

The academic atmosphere and activity may very well be the essence of all that a College does. The academic atmosphere represents a combination of teacher industriousness on the one hand, and student application on the other. These have combined to give us certain achievements which we now list.

a. Recognition, Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools:

For some seventeen years or more, the College received a secondary rating from the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, which is a regional approval agency for the South. Several reasons have usually been advanced for not securing the topmost rating, i.e., the library, teacher preparation, salaries, etc.

We made a tremendous effort during the last school year, and were rewarded with approval from the Southern Association of

Colleges and Secondary Schools. Approval means "A" rating. The telegram informing us of the College's standing, is reprinted, below:

b. Association of Texas Colleges:

The Colleges of Texas have for some time maintained an Association that is based primarily on academic excellence. This year, Samuel Huston College was granted membership in this Association on the basis of its academic excellence. Although the membership status is that of an Associate, it is a step forward to know that your institution now joins hands with all of the other institutions of Texas in academic achievement.

c. Selective Service College Qualification Tests:

Samuel Huston College was designated by Selective Service as a center where tests would be made to determine the standing of young men who were eligible for duty in the armed services. It has been interesting to not the interracial complexion of the group taking these examinations. This, I contend, is a tribute to our College.

d. Graduate Record Examinations:

Another interesting achievement which has obtained for several years now, is the fact that one of the Graduate Record Examinations in the Sciences, is held at Samuel Huston College. A specialized group, operating from Princeton University, has established certain standard tests whereby students in various sections are tested with a view toward determining their ability to do graduate work. Samuel Huston College was selected as one of these centers.

e. Students:

During these four years, a goodly percentage of our total students enrollment has been on the honor roll. This number has fluctuated from semester to semester. However, there has been pervading our student body an urge to achieve. This urge has been pointed up very clearly as our students have moved away from the College campus for additional study, etc. These items ought to be noted:

1. The first Negro to graduate from the University of Texas was a Samuel Huston College alumnus—Oscar L. Thompson—who received his Master of Arts degree in Zoology January 31, 1952. TIME magazine noted this event in its February 18, 1952 issue by giving Mr. Thompson six lines under the caption "Report Cards."

2. Advanced Medical Student at Galveston

Herman Barnett should be the first Negro to finish the University of Texas Medical School. He will be in his last year, in September. At the graduation exercises last June he received a special \$350.00 award. The Galveston newspaper reported that an extra amount of applause greeted Mr. Barnett as he went to the rostrum to receive this prize.

3. Advanced Law student in the University

Virgil Lott, son of a distinguished Austin family, whose father is an outstanding business man and who is also a trustee of Samuel Huston College, is a third year Law student in the School of Law at the University. According to schedule, Virgil Lott will be the first Negro to finish the University of Texas Law School this coming year.

4. First graduate of Texas Southern University Law School

Attorney Henry Doyle, an alumnus of Samuel Huston College, was the first Negro to graduate from the Texas Southern University Law School, in Houston. He is now enjoying a lucrative practice in the city of Houston.

5. Advanced student in Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University

Marion E. McMillan is possibly the first student in the Perkins School of Theology to receive credit that could be used as the University itself. (Others had studied and received credit, with the understanding that it be transferred to other schools.) It is thought that if Rev. McMillan continues his studies, he stands a good chance of being the first Negro to graduate from Southern Methodist University.

6. Fullbright Scholar

Mrs. Marion Downs has recently returned from a year's study in Italy, and additional travels on the continent, as a result of a Full-bright Scholarship award.

These six cases represent outstanding ones among the many scores of fine Samuel Huston College people who forge ahead in this generation. One has every reason to feel proud of these unique achievements.

d. The Faculty

The story of our faculty may be told very briefly, with several sets of figures:

This represents at the faculty level what was necessary in order to bring the College to full approval in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. A divest of this picture would apparently lead one to feel that the College has imbued its students with the necessary academic fibre to achieve. With your help and financial support, we have been able to pay our faculty enough to inspire them to work for self-improvement. Altogether, we have endeavored to remain true to the intellectual and moral tenets of the founding Fathers.

II. SPECIAL PROJECTS

There are four special projects that should be pointed out in this report. These indicate the type of activity that has characterized the last four years at the College:

a. The fiftieth Anniversary

The Fiftieth Anniversary was undertaken to liquidate the outstanding indebtedness of the College. It was thought that on a master sheet of from 1900-1950 (50 years), if we could place \$1,000 against each year, we would be in a good position to liquidate our outstanding indebtedness and move forward to bigger thinger.

The program phase of the Fiftieth Anniversary went along beautifully. The financial phase lagged miserably. \$10,910.93 was realized from this effort. Only one year was entirely covered by contibutions. This year, 1924, was the only one completely covered. Bishop and

Mrs. Robert N. Brooks made this contribution. That means that they gave almost one-tenth of the entire amount raised.

b. Race Relations Union Service

First year — Governor Allen Shivers of Texas

Second year— Judge Hickman, Chief Justice of the State Supreme Court

Third year — Dr. Kenneth Pope, Pastor of First Methodist Church, Houston, Methodism's largest congregation.

c. Give-A-Book Campaign

The campaign was designed to increase the volumes in our library as we pointed to accreditation. Books have come to us from all over the Western part of this country. Many Friends were discovered and created during the Give-A-Book Campaign. One of the most noteworthy incidents in connection with this effort was the work done by a Mr. H. A. Dunn, Superintendent of the Main Building at the University of Texas. Mr. Dunn secured hundreds of books for our library from University Professors and students alike. Having shipped books all over the world as a hobby, Mr. Dunn's work for Samuel Huston College was publicly mentioned in TIME magazine, with his picture, lauding the work that he had done for Samuel Huston College.

d. West Texas Conference Emergency Fund

At the instance of Bishop Robert N. Brooks, the goodness of the West Texas Annual Conference, and under the leadership of Dr.

G. Haven Caldwell, the West Texas Annual Conference moved to help the College during this trying year. We were faced with a reduced income from a smaller student enrollment. We were faced with higher expenditures in the salary of teachers, improving the physical appearance of our library, additional books, additional equipment and supplies for the library, Science laboratories, etc. A total amount of \$4,391.50 was raised from this effort. The College greatly appreciates this fine consideration on the part of the West Texas Annual Conference.

III. HEALTH SERVICES:

For several years some improvement in the health service of the College was felt to be necessary. Funds weren't available, however, to increase our services.

During the last two years, we were fortunate in establishing a Clinic on the campus, manned by a Registered Nurse. Much of the equipment was donated by Mrs. James Loving, in memory of her daughter, Dr. Marybelle Loving. To indicate something of the quality of the nursing care you sons and daughters have had, the first Nurse left us reluctantly, and became the first of her race to be employed on the staff of a Nursing School in a hospital in New England. (Incidentally, she is a graduate of Samuel Huston College.) Our complete Health Service is constituted as follows: A Physician, a Dentist, a Registered Nurse and a Clinic with fairly adequate facilities. The Clinic and Nursing personnel were added during the last two years.

IV. MAINTENANCE AND EXPANSION:

One of the problems during these latter years has been the matter of maintaining an old plant. Despite a lack of funds, there were some things that had to be done:

Our young people would want this Negro youth to be present at our Assembly next year and give a brief report of his work at the college. We are very happy about this Scholarship being voted and hope it will supply a need to your School Fund. We hope that this will be a permanent Scholarship from year to year.

"I would be glad to hear from you about the changes in your college set-up, and the progress being made.

"Would it be possible for Dr. Davage to be with us at the Youth Assembly next year and be a resource persons on the theme of Brother-hood and Race? I believe it will not be too long until we can have Fraternal Delegates on the campus of McMurry College during our Assembly.

"We appreciate the fine work and leadership that you are giving the College and we shall be remembering you in our prayers as you go forward in your combined program in your school.

It may be difficult, but perhaps it is going to be necessary for us to try to convince our constituencies that we are not in retreat when we reduce the number of our institutions, provided we strengthen and make more effective those which remain."

So spoke Dr. Matthew Simpson Davage in making his report as Acting Secretary, Department of Higher Education for Negroes, in the Board of Education Year Book for 1592.

Dr. Davage left Samuel Huston College in 1920, and now comes back to Huston-Tillotson College as the first President, in 1952. My prayers are that greater educational achievements lie in the offing, and I fervently request that you stand by your investment in the new Huston-Tillotson College.

Dear Sir:

I submit herewith a comparative financial report of operations and plant resources for the past four years. The figures for 1951-1952 are incomplete, as our fiscal year does not close until Jun 30, 1952. In addition to this report, a statement of losses and gains for the past twenty years, a statement of Plant and Equipment Funds for the past ten years and a statement of the Realization of Budgeted Income for the past year are included

During the past year Samuel Huston College operated a summer session (1951) and two regular semesters of instruction.

The equated enrollment was as follows:

Summer 1951	256
1st Semester 1951–1952	497
2nd Semester 1952–1952	469

Income for the summer of 1952 is not included in this report, as beginning this year the summer school operations will be reported separately.

For the year 1952-1952, income from students amounted to \$89,343.21. Collections from students for the past year have been good with \$.3% remaining uncollected on student accounts. This represents an improvement over last year when accounts remaining uncollected were 4.3%. Collections from old accounts haven't been any too good. An analysis, however, of these old accounts reveals that many of these accounts are owed by students who dropped out or withdrew unofficially and in many such instances these students have no earned credit in the Registrar's Office. It appears unlikely that we will ever collect these amounts.

Without the advantages of full accreditation during the past years and being in direct competition now with two state schools whose investments have run into millions, it has been difficult—to say the least—to maintain an adequate enrollment. To do this, greater concessions in the form of scholarships or work-aid opportunities have been offered which has cut deeply into cash income from students. In addition to this, we have in some cases been expected by a supporting constituency to carry students who even though receiving scholarship or work aid, are not able to pay their expenses.

With no mortgaged indebtedness on college properties, we can conservatively report that the value of the Board of Education's holdings at Samuel Huston College has been increased by more than \$250,000.00 in the past ten years. Since such capital additions have for the most part been made from current operating funds, we have been forced to forego payment of current operating obligations. Necessary capital improvements made this past year consist of a boiler for the Administration Building, library equipment, paving of East Twelfth and re-wiring of Lovinggood Dormitory for Men. Some decrease in indebtedness is shown in 1949-1950 and in 1950-1951, but the increased financial demands of the

past year incident to attaining full accreditation will again increase the

current indebtedness of the College.

As we approach the end of another year at Samuel Huston College, I personally would like to express my gratitude to the founding fathers, those pioneer West Texas Conference Churchmen who, with wisdom and courage launched Samuel Huston College. I take pride in the fact that my first job after college was at Samuel Huston College and that I am rounding out 17 years in Methodist Colleges, fifteen of these years being at Samuel Huston. I wish also to express my appreciation to Bishop Brooks; Doctor Davage; Trustees; Members of the West Texas Conference; The President, Faculty, Staff and Students; and the host of friends that have made it possible for us to end these many years by making a worthwhile contribution to a greater Huston-Tillotson College.

CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, A.D. 1865, by Bishop Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference were held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight anunual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eight session of the Conference held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, President.

The Ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper, and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their labors.

This Conference to date has six districts, 111 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz., Samuel Huston College, located at Austin, Texas.


