## IV <br> Daily Proceedings

Conference Minutes<br>First Day - Wednesday<br>April 22, 1959

The 85th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference was convened in Warren Methodist Church, Dallas, Texas, Wednesday morning, April 22, 1959, at 9:00 o'clock, with Bishop Willis J. King, Resident Bishop of the New Orleans Area, presiding. The devotions were conducted by Reverend J. Garfield Owens, host-pastor. Music for the service was furnished by the senior choir of the host church. The Scripture lesson, (1 Corinthians 11:23-29) was read by Reverend C. D. Owens, and prayer was offered by Reverend Robert S. Mosby.

## Holy Communion

Bishop King introduced to the conference Bishop Alexander P. Shaw of Los Angeles, California, who delivered the Communion sermon, using for his subject, "Pleasing God." Following the sermon, bishops King and Shaw, assisted by the district superintendents, administered the Lord's Supper to 503 communicants. The Communion offering was $\$ 144.60$. At the close of the services, Bishop King recessed the conference for a period of fifteen minutes.

## Roll Call

Bishop King called the reassembled conference to order at 11:15. Reverend A. Cecil Williams led the conference in the singing of hymn No. 4, "O Worship The King." Bishop King directed the secretary to call the roll of the ministerial members of the conference, the approved supply pastors, and the retired ministers. This was done. Bishop King suggested that the lay delegates to the conference stand by districts in recognition of their presence. This was done.

## Organization and General Business

Bishop King called Disciplinary question No. 1: Who are elected for the quadrennium? Secretary: T. R. Watkins, P. O. Box 284, Seguin, Texas. Statis-
tician: C. D. Owens. At this point, Rev. Owens asked Bishop King's permission to make a statement. The request was granted, and Rev. Owens, after thanking the conference for having given him the high privilege of serving as statistician for the past three years, stated that his duties as superintendent of the Waco District would not allow him to continue as Conference statistician, and tendered his resignation. By vote of the conference, his resignation was accepted. Bishop King commended the fine work done by Rev. Owens, and instructed the conference to elect a statistician to succeed Rev. Owens. The name of Rev. Eric C. Purnell was placed in nomination. A motion by Rev. W. W. Baker, seconded by Dr. J. J. Seabrook, that the nominations be closed on Rev. Purnell, prevailed. Rev. Purnell was elected Conference Statistician. Rev. Purnell appointed the following assistant statisticians: Rev. G. J. Goff, Rev. J. B. Richardson, and Mrs. O. L. Jackson.

## Legal Limits

On motion by Rev. G. F. Alexander and seconded by Rev. George L. Johnson, the Bar of the conference was fixed to include the first six rows of seats across the auditorium of the church.

## Committee on Conference Journal

By vote of the conference, Rev. J. L. Wattley, Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr., and C. H. Johnson were elected as the committee on the conference Journal.

## Motions

On separate motions, Rev. W. J. Washington was elected Reporter to the Press, Rev. J. G. Owens, Conference Postmaster, and the printed program was voted the Official Guide for the session of the conference.

Disciplinary Question No. 2: Is the Annual Conference incorporated? (Para. 625) Yes.

Disciplinary Question No. 3: Bonding and auditing: (a) What officers handling funds of the conference have been bonded, and in what amounts? Rev. I. B. Loud, Treasurer, $\$ 10,000.00$. (b) Have the books of said officers or persons been audited? (Para. 640, 729) Yes.

## Introductions

Bishop King introduced to the conference the following visitors: The Reverends J. S. Scott, F. Titus, James Feast, L. B. Felder, F. D. Mays, L. D. Washington, C. D. Wells, and H. D. Pace, all from the Texas Conference; Rev. Prince Jackson and Rev. Ballard of the A. M. E. Church; Rev. Foy and Dr. J. H. Touchstone of the General Board of Lay Activities.

Brief remarks were made by Rev. Jackson, Rev. Foy, and Rev. Scott. During the course of his talk, Rev. Scott gave a brief report of the work done relative to the proposed Children's Home of the Texas and West Texas Conferences.

## Point of Privilege: Presentation

Rev. I. B. Loud, on a point of privilege requested that Mrs. Willis J. King, wife of the Bishop, be presented to the conference, and that Mrs. J. G. MOTION: A motion by Rev. A. D. Minor, seconded by Rev. M. T. Reed, that the election of delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences begin Thursday morning at 10:45 o'clock, prevailed.

## Memorial Service

With Rev. J. B. Richardson, Chairman of the Memorial Committee presiding, the Memorial Service began with the singing of hymn No. 520, "Abide With Me." Comforting words from the Scriptures were read by Rev S. W. Curtis, who also offered prayer. Following the singing of hymn No. 231, "Pass Me Not O Gentle Saviour," the conference stood with bowed heads as the names of the Ministers and Minister's wives who died during
the year were read. They were, Ministers: Rev. C. C. Brown, Rev. T. H. Foy, and Rev. Samuel T. Johnson. Minister's wives: Mrs. C. D. Wyatt, Mrs. J. N. Hooey, Mrs. C. C. Brown, Mrs. R. Appling.

Rev. J. L. Wattley delivered the Memorial sermon. He used as his subject: "There Goes The Ship" (Watching The Ships Go By).

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First Day - Wednesday, April 22nd.
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    2:30 o'clock
    The afternoon session began at 2:30 o'clock, Bishop Willis J. King, presiding. The devotions were conducted by Rev. John Elliott. Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr. read the Scripture and offered prayer. Rev. Elliott gave the devotional message.

## Conference Business

PASSING OF CHARACTER: District Superintendents. By vote of the conference, the character of the district superintendents was passed without question. Bishop King called for the report of the District Superintendents. Rev. Prenza L. Woods read the report and moved its adoption. The conference voted its adoption.

By vote of the conference, the character of the members of the conference was passed (by Districts) unquestioned.

PrESENTATION: Bishop King presented Dr. J. J. Seabrook, President of Huston-Tillotson College. Dr. Seabrook gave a brief account of the progress and growth of the college, and read the recommendations contained in the "President's Report". (see Report) Rev. R. S. Mosby suggested to the conference that action on the recommendations be deferred until Thursday in order that the Board of Education might have time to study them. The conference agreed to the suggestion.

Bishop King pointed out the need for a Committee on Memorials to the General Conference. A motion by Rev. T. M. Bruton, seconded by Dr. J. J. Seabrook, that Bishop King appoint such a committee, prevailed.

REPORT: Committee on the Journal. Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr. gave the report and moved its adoption. The report was adopted.

DISCIPLINARY QUESTIONS: Bishop called Disciplinary Questions 19 through 44. (See Part II, Business of the Annual Conference, Pertaining to Ministerial Relations).

## Class Received

With appropriate ceremony, Bishop King received a class of nine (9) ministers into Full Connection in the West Texas Conference. They were: Booker T. Adams, J.S.C. Grattan, Zan W. Holmes, Jr., J. D. Mooring, J. S. Loud, C. J. Polk, John Preciphs, E. A. Rogers, and Robie Wade.

## Introductions

Bishop King introduced Rev. Robert F. Harrington, Pastor of Mt. Zion Methodist Church, and Editor of the Areascope, New Orleans, La., Rev. T. R. Albert, Pastor, Wesley Methodist Church, Baton Rouge, La., Rev. and Mrs. Ansil Lynn, (Retired) of the Oklahoma Conference.

Rev. Harrington, representing Rev. L. Scott Allen, Editor of the Central Advocate, spoke in interest of the Advocate. Rev. Lynn greeted the conference, and gave a brief account of his missionary work in the Belgian Congo. Rev. Albert made brief remarks.

PRESENTATIONS: Bishop King presented Rev. A. Cecil Williams, College Pastor, Huston-Tillotson College, and Dr. T. B. Echols, Associate, General Board of Pensions. President Seabrook highly commended the work of Rev. Williams at the college, and Dr. Echols spoke in interest of the Reserve Pension Plan of the Methodist Church.

RECESS: Bishop King recessed the conference for a period of fifteen minutes.

The conference reassembled at 10:30 A.M. Following the singing of a hymn, the business of the conference was resumed.

## Voting

In preparation for voting to elect delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences, Bishop King instructed the ministerial members to occupy the first three rows of seats across the auditorium, and the lay members, the next three rows. The Secretary called the roll of the conference, Ministerial and lay. Ninety-five (95) ministerial members and fiftynine lay members answered present, and were declared eligible to vote.

TELLERS, LAY: George Woods, Tully Stanley, Elmer Porter, Mrs. Clara Williams, Mrs. H. N. Hammonds, and Mrs. O. L. Jackson.

The first ballot was taken for two (2) ministerial and two (2) lay delegates to the General Conference.

PRESENTATION: Bishop King presented Dr. J. Otis Young, Associate Publisher, the Methodist Publishing House, Chicago, Illinois. Dr. Young spoke in very inspiring terms of the efficient, profitable operation of the Publishing House. He presented the conference a check for $\$ 1,924.16$ from the Publishing House. Bishop King expressed thanks on behalf of the conference.

## Noon-day Services

The noon-day services began with Rev. Cecil Williams leading in the singing of hymn No. 279, "God of Grace, and God of Glory". Bishop King presented Dr. T. L. Miller, District Superintendent, North East Conference. Dr. Miller brought greetings from the North East Conference, and from Bishop William C. Martin, and offered prayer. Bishop King introduced the guest speaker for the conference session, Dr. Oscar T. Olson, Pastor, Ep-worth-Euclid Methodist Church, Cleveland, Ohio. Dr. Olson read from the 19th Chapter, of the gospel of St. Luke. He selected as a subject: "Occupy 'Till I Come". Dr. Olson thrilled the conference as he challenged and appealed to the conference to: "Occupy all of life until our Lord comes to
collect that which was given each of us, plus the interest produced by our efforts". He closed his message with a fervent prayer to this end.

TELLERS REPORT: First Ministerial ballot, General Conference: 95 votes were cast, 92 votes were effective, 47 were necessary to elect. Rev. I. B. Loud with 57 votes was elected. First ballot, Lay: Entire ballot defective. No. Election.

Bishop King announced that voting would be resumed at $2: 30$ P.M. Following the announcement the benediction was pronounced by Dr. T. L. Miller.

## Afternoon Session Thursday, April 23, 1959

The afternoon session began at 2:30 P.M. with a brief devotional service presided over by Rev. G. J. Goff, assisted by Rev. J. B. Richardson.

## Conference Business

## Bishop Willis J. King, Presiding

VOTING RESUMED: The second ballott was taken for one (1) ministerial and two (2) lay delegates to the General Conference.

DISCIPLINARY QUESTIONS: Rev. G. F. Alexander requested Bishop King to reconsider Disciplinary Questions 43 and 44. Under question 43, Rev. W. S. Byars, a supply pastor was granted the Retired Relations. Under question 44, Dennis Woodling was appointed to attend school.

REPORT: Conference Board of Education. Rev. William J. Washington presented the report and moved its adoption. The report was adopted. (see Report) Following the adoption of the report, Rev. R. S. Mosby tendered his resignation as chairman of the Conference Board of Education. He thanked the conference for the privilege of serving as chairman for three years. He advised the conference of the Board's selection of Dr. W. Astor Kirk to succeed him. The conference accepted his resignation and approved the selection of Dr. Kirk.

TELLER'S REPORT: Second ballot for one (1) ministerial delegate to General Conference: 93 votes were cast, 92 votes were effective, 47 votes were necessary to elect. There was no election. Second ballot for two (2) lay delegates to the General Conference: 59 votes were cast, 57 votes were effective, 29 votes were necessary to elect. Dr. John T. King with 38 votes and Mrs. O. B. Coe with 29 votes were elected.

The third ballot was taken for one (1) ministerial delegate to the General Conference; the first ballot taken for two (2) lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Bishop King presented Rev. Ernest T. Dixon, Associate Secretary General Board of Education. Rev. Dixon gave a report on his work.

Disciplinary Questions 25 and 31 reconsidered: Under question 25a, A. M. Mason was voted admission on trial, and under 31(c) C. J. was elected an elder.
Tellers' Report, third ballot for one (1) ministerial delegate to General Conference: 93 votes were cast, 92 votes were effective, 47 votes were necessary to elect. There was no election.

The fourth ballot was taken for one (1) ministerial delegate to the General Conference.

COMMITTEE ANNOUNCED: Bishop King announced the following Committee on Memorials to the General Conference: Dr. J. J. Seabrook, Dr. John T. King, Rev. R. S. Mosby, Rev. Ernest T. Dixon, and Mrs. O. B. Coe.

Bishop King presented Dr. J. H. Touchstone of the General Board of Lay Activities, who addressed the conference.

REPORT: The report of the fourth ballot for one (1) ministerial delegate to the General Conference was as follows: 94 votes were cast, 93 were effective, 47 votes were necessary to elect. R. S. Mosby with 55 votes was elected. The report of the first ballot for two (2) lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was: 59 votes cast, 51 votes were effective, 26 votes were necessary to elect. C. H. Johnson with 40 votes, and W. Astor Kirk with 34 votes, were elected.

MOTION: A motion by Dr. T. B. Echols that the telegram bearing greetings from Rev. Charles Warren, Pastor, St. Mark Methodist Church,

New York City, be read, and that the secretary acknowledge the same, was seconded and passed.

The first ballot for two (2) Ministerial delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference, and two (2) lay reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference were taken.

Upon request of Bishop King, Bishop A. P. Shaw made remarks.
Rev. Prenza L. Woods' request that Rev. J. S. C. Grattan be permitted to give a report on the new church in San Antonio (Downs Memorial) was granted. Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Jr. gave a brief report on the Hamilton Park Church in Dallas.

TELLERS' REPORT: First ballot for two (2) ministerial delegates to Jurisdictional Conference: 91 votes were cast, 90 votes were effective, 46 votes were necessary to elect. Rev. Ernest T. Dixon with 56 votes was elected. The second ballot was taken for one (1) ministerial delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference.

ANNOUNCEMENT was made that the Ministers Wives and Daughters Association Program originally scheduled for Saturday morning, would be held Friday afternoon.

TELLERS' REPORT: Second ballot for one (1) ministerial delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference: 90 votes were cast. 89 were effective, 45 were necessary to elect. There was no election. REPORT of the first ballot for two (2) reserve lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference: 61 votes were cast, 45 were effective, 23 were necessary to elect. Mrs. O. D. Garland with 40 votes and Odie E. Davis with 30 votes were elected.

Following necessary announcements, the conference was recessed until Friday morning at 9:00 o'clock.

## Third Day, Friday, April 24, 1959 Morning Session

The Friday morning session began at 9:00 o'clock, Rev. I. C. Loud conducting the devotions. Hymn No. 346, "O Thou in Whose Presence My Soul Takes Delight", was sung. Rev. Loud offered prayer.

## Conference Business <br> Bishop Willis J. King, Presiding

At the request of Bishop King, Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr. gave the report of the Committee on the Journal, and moved adoption. The report was adopted.

Disciplinary Question \#15: What Methodist institutions are approved by the conference for annuity responsibility? Huston-Tillotson College, Gammon Theological Seminary, and Langston University. A motion by Dr. J. J. Seabrook that Langston University be discontinued as an institution with annuity responsibility from the West Texas Conference, was seconded by Dr. T. B. Echols, and passed. A motion by Rev. William J. Washington, and seconded by Dr. Echols, that Prairie View College and Texas Southern University be approved for annuity responsibility, carried.

Disciplinary Question \#16: What date is determined for Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday? A motion by R. S. Mosby that Thanksgiving Sunday be observed as Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday was seconded and passed.

Disciplinary Question \#17: Conference lay leader: (a) Name? Odie E. Davis.

Disciplinary Question \#18: What local churches have been: (a) Organized? Downs' Memorial, San Antonio. (b) Merged? None. (c) Discontinued? At this point, Rev. R. S. Mosby made a report on Fredrick Temple Methodist Church, Austin, in which he stated that the membership of Fredrick Temple had become so depleted that it could no longer operate as an organized church. He moved that the church be abandoned, the property be sold, and that the proceeds from the sale of the property be used to liquidate the debt of the district parsonage, and the remaining funds be used to pay off other indebtedness, and to remodel the district parsonage. After the motion had been seconded, Rev. Ernest T. Dixon offered an
amendment, to the effect that: After the Fredrick Temple property has been abandoned and sold, the outstanding debts are to be liquidated; then the District Board of Church Location of the Austin - Victoria District, in consultation with the West Texas Annual Conference Board of Trustees will decide whether or not the remaining funds are to be used to remodel the district parsonage, or to establish a new church in the greater Austin, Texas area. The amended motion carried.

REPORT: The report of the third Ministerial ballot for one (1) delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference was made: 82 votes were cast, 82 were effective, 42 votes were necessary to elect. Rev. J. H. Carruthers with 43 votes, was elected. The first Ministerial ballot for two (2) reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

REPORT: Dr. John T. King made explanatory remarks concerning the report of Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, and presented W. Astor Kirk, who read the report. (See Report). A recommendation not in the report that: The West Texas Conference and the Texas Conference jointly sponsor Wesley Foundations at Prairie View College and Texas Southern University, was approved by the conference.

REPORT: The report of the first Ministerial ballot for two (2) reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was made: 78 votes were cast, 61 were effective, 32 were necessary to elect. Dr. J. J. Seabrook with 35 votes was elected.

The second Ministerial ballot for one (1) delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

## Resolution To Abandon Property Western District

The following resolution to abandon property on the Western District was read by Rev. R. L. Palmer: Whereas, the former Brooks Chapel Methodist Church located at Colorado City, Texas, has not been in use for many years; And, Whereas, the building (an old Army Barrack) is beyond use for any purpose; And, Whereas, there is no membership or congregation at Colorado City to justify our trying to keep the property; And, Whereas, there are several other denominational groups fairly well established in Colorado City; And Whereas, the District Board of Church Location of the Western District, meeting in a District Conference, February 18-20, 1959, in El Paso, Texas, approved the abandonment and sale of the said property; Be It Resolved: that the West Texas Annual Conference in session at Dallas, Texas, on this 24th day of April, 1959, do hereby declrae the said Brooks Chapel Methodist Church abandoned, and direct that the property be sold, and the proceeds therefrom be used on the Western District toward the purchase of a District parsonage. Signed: William Ellison, District Superintendent. R. L. Palmer, Chairman, District Board of Church Location. A motion by C. H. Johnson that the resolution be approved, was seconded by Rev. J. B. Phoenix, and passed

MOTION: A motion by E. T. Dixon that: The Conference cabinet review the Annual Conference Board of Trustees and make whatever corrections or nominations necessary, and present same to the present session of the Annual Conference for information and approval, prevailed.

PRESENTATION: Mr. Robert Bryan of the Texas Methodist Student Movement was presented, and spoke to the interest of the movement.

REPORT: The report of the second Ministerial ballot for one (1) reserve delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference was made. 86 votes were cast, 84 were effective, 43 were needed to elect. J. G. Owens with 61 votes was elected.

PRESENTATION: Bishop King presented Dr. Abington of the A. M. E. Church. Dr. Abington made brief remarks.

RECESS: Bishop King recessed the conference for a period of fifteen minutes.

MORNING SESSION RESUMED: Bishop King called the reassembled conference to order at 11:00 A.M. Rev. A. Cecil Williams led in the singing of Hymn No. 162, "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing". Bishop King pre-
sented Mrs. M. M. Loud, President of the West Texas Conference Ministers Wives and Daughters Association. Mrs. Loud in turn, presented the members of the association, and made the financial report of the association by Districts as follows:

Dr. J. J. Seabrook made a statement in which he strongly urged that loans made by the Methodist Student Loan Fund to individuals, be repaid.

NOON - DAY SERVICE: Bishop King presented Dr. Oscar T. Olson, who, following brief devotions, delivered the noon day sermon.

Visitors from the Louisiana Conference in the persons of Rev. R. S. Taylor and Rev. Morris, were presented.

Following the presentation, Dr. Olson gave the benediction.

The Saturday morning session began at 9:00 o'clock. Morning devotions were conducted by Rev. J. S. Loud.

Bishop Willis J. King, Presiding
REPORT: The report of the committee on the Journal was made by Rev. Zan W. Holmes. The report was adopted.

REPORT: The report of the Conference Board of Evangelism was read by Rev. O. B. Coe, who moved its adoption. The motion was seconded, and the report adopted. (See Report).

REPORT: The Conference Board of Temperance: The report was read by Rev. M. T. Reed. The conference adopted the report.

REPORT: The Conference Board of Pensions: The report was made by Rev. Marcus A. Freeman, and was adopted. Following the adoption of the report, Rev. Freeman read a resolution, Re: The Reserve Pension Plan of the Methodist Church, and The West Texas Annual Conference. On motion by Rev. Freeman, the resolution was approved. (For report and resolution see Report).

Disciplinary Question \#40 reopened: Who are the supernumerary ministers, and for what number of years consecutively has each held this relation? The name of Rev. M. E. McMillan was submitted. The conference voted him the supernumerary relations, beginning the 1959-1960 conference year.

1956-1960, be bound and sent to Committee on the Auditing of Minutes of the Central Jurisdiction was seconded and passed.

REPORT, Conference Statistician: Rev. Eric C. Purnell, Conference Statistician, read the statistical report and moved its adoption. An amendment to the motion by Rev. I. B. Loud that the Conference adopt the report with the understanding that the statistician be given time to recheck the report and make necessary correction, prevailed. (See Report).

REPORT, Conference Treasurer: The report was read by the treasurer, Rev. I. B. Loud. On motion by Rev. Loud, the report was adopted. (See Report).

REPORT, Commission on World Service and Finance: The report was read by Rev. S. A. Keesee, chairman of the commission. On motion by Rev. Keesee, seconded by Dr. John T. King, the conference adopted the report. (See Report).

## REPORT 1 <br> DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S COMPOSITE REPORT

West Texas Annual Conference<br>April 22-26, 1959<br>Dallas, Texas

Bishop King, members, and friends of the West Texas Annual Conference: The five District Superintendents serving the West Texas Annual Conference are grateful for this opportunity to report to you concerning their labors. An article on "The Superintendency" describes the tasks of the District Superintendent as being threefold. He is the connector in our connectional Methodist Church. He joins the world parish with the local church. He is the receptor of the needs of the people of the world parish, relaying these needs to the people of the local church. Here, if it ever comes to pass, is a response to needs. Thus, he becomes the effector for the Kingdom. We, your District Superintendents, have endeavored to discharge these responsibilities; and always we have had the wise counsel, faithful guidance, and brotherly spirit of our Episcopal leader, Bishop Willis J. King . . . a Christian statesman of great mental, moral, and spiritual stature. Accept, Bishop King, our deep appreciation for you and for your leadership.

## The Church

The church stands for so many things; she is interested in such a variety of things; she expresses the life that is in her in so many spheres of activity that it is an easy matter for her friends, much less her enemies, to lose sight of her primary meaning and main task. Some people suppose that the church's main task is the pursuit of knowledge-others see its value as a stabilizing force in the social order. Within the churches today are also those who think and act as if the main function of the church is to make people comfortable and happy. With much talk about facilities and equipment to provide for the recreation and entertainment of the young and the solace and enjoyment of the old, they betray their own judgement of the church's task in the community.

When the Risen Christ met His disciples on that hill in Galilee, they worshipped Him. He gave them a commission. He didn't tell them to educate people. Actually He knew that what they had to say to the world would be a stumbling block. He didn't tell them to stabilize society. As a matter of fact, He knew that they would turn that ancient world upside down. He didn't tell them to make people comfortable and happy, for He knew that His followers would suffer bitter persecution. No, it was a simple command; "Go and make disciples of all nations," and to it He added a simple promise, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." That order and that promise are ours today. Through and in the church we give to that
order and to that promise meaning and purpose. The meaning and purpose? Christ on the Cross obtained for us a pardon; Christ in the heavens holds high the promise of eternal life; Christ in our souls sanctifies us now. He lives with us. Upon this rock He has builded ... and the gates of Hell shall not prevail.

## Evangelism

Surely evangelism is telling the story and persuading men and women. Telling the story of God's redeeming love, telling the story of new men in Christ Jesus, telling the story of the new society that comes when new men in Christ Jesus take Him at His word, and take Him seriously. This has been a major emphasis in our Conference this year. Revivals and preaching missions have been held in several churches, and the Bishop's Evangelistic Crusade saw many persons accepting Christ or renewing vows of dedication to Him. Although the results of our evangelistic efforts are encouraging, we must never lose the passion for winning souls. This is our major business . . . this is our calling. We recognize the fact that much more must be done in this area if we are to grow commensurate with our opportunities for growth.

## Huston - Tillotson College

The college has had a very successful year, much of which is due to the cooperation and support of the Bishop, ministers, and laymen of the West Texas Conference. A college shares responsibility for the kind of world in which it operates. Every college is expected to deal realistically with daily responsibilities in scholarship, Christian guidance, and academic administration. The college must respond, too, to the board and fundamental opportunities on today's frontiers of knowledge and service. Huston - Tillotson has an enrollment of 422 energetic young people - 397 native Texans. The faculty consists of eleven doctorates, twelve with advance work on the doctorate degree, and the remaining regular faculty members hold the Masters Degree, and three part-time instructors have work above the Bachelors Degree. They are graduates of many of the best colleges and universities of America and abroad.

The college achieved unqualified accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools last December 12th. This is the highest recognition a college or university can receive by its regional accrediting agency. Huston-Tillotson now ranks on an equal basis with such colleges and universities as Southwestern, Texas Wesleyan, McMurry, Southern Methodist, Baylor, Texas Christian, and The University of Texas. On February 13th. the college was approved by The American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. It also holds membership in The Association of American Colleges, The National Commission on Accrediting. University Senate of The Methodist Church, The Congregational Christian College Council, and The Texas Education Agency. The college closed with a balanced budget for the first time since the merger, due largely to the 100 per cent increased support of the West Texas Conference. Bids will be let for a beautiful air-conditioned library this month. The next addition to follow is a Student Union Building. We are happy for the leadership of Dr. J. J. Seabrook and pledge to him our continued support.

## Austin - Victoria District: R. S. Mosby, Superintendent

The immediate and general church needs have been presented to the Austin - Victoria District with clarity and interest. Higher Education goals have been cited and stressed, and the program of Advance with its messages of urgency has been repeatedly emphasized. A new church building begun and planned by the former District Superintendent has been completed at Smithville. Rev. Robbie Wade and his people are certainly to be congratulated. New challenges are faced on the coast, and we are planning to meet them with adequate buildings and programs. Building and extension programs are underway. The laymen of the Austin-Victoria District are faithful; the pastors are gracious and dedicated.

## Dallas District: T. M. Bruton, Superintendent

There has been an increased interest in building and improvement on the Dallas District. Many of the pastors have led their congregations in
constructing new places of worship. Jones Chapel, Mexia, is now a credit to the entire West Texas Conference; Union Memorial, Mexia, is under construction. Because of the lack of funds, these good people have been forced to stop the building program in order to raise more money. When it is possible to complete this building it will be both modern and adequate. Brother J. S. Loud is giving able leadership at this place. Our church at Denison, following the capable leadership of the late Rev. Samuel Johnson, has been completely rebuilt and is now one of the beauties of Denison.

A beautiful parsonage has been constructed at Sherman where Brother Espie is pastor. Cogswell church is now housed substantially with less than $\$ 1000$ debt. This work has gone forward although the pastor, Dr. K. W. McMillan, has been ill throughout the year. Hamilton Park church, following the leadership of Brother I. B. Loud and Brother Zan W. Holmes, Jr., has completed a magnificently beautiful building, and the congregation is growing rapidly. At this writing the congregation numbered 242 . With the exception of Hamilton Park, none of the other congregations have large debts. The debt at St. Andrews, Fort Worth, has been paid. Congratulations to Brother Haynes and this fine congregation. The pastors of the Dallas District have cooperated in a fine way towards meeting the benevolent obligations. For the most part, the churches have done well.

## San Antonio District: Prenza L. S. Woods, Superintendent

The nineteen pastors serving the churches making up the San Antonio District have been loyal and devoted to the work of the church and to Kingdom building. In the field of church extension we have made some progress. The building in Pleasanton has been completed, and the East St. Paul Church has been re-built. Brother Minor and the congregation of East St. Paul did an excellent job. We are now concentrating on the Downs Memorial Church, a new organization in San Antonio. A donation of $\$ 800$ from the Board of Missions has been granted towards the purchase of a site along with $\$ 400$ from the Annual Conference Advance Program. An imposing site just three blocks from a two-hundred fifty family home unit development has been secured. Much credit is due Rev. J. S. C. Grattan for the very fine leadership given. A building has been purchased, and we are now in the process of making arrangements to move the building to the site. A new building is underway at Gonzales where Brother A. C. Holden pastors; Barnett's Chapel in Kerrville will begin its building project in the near future, and plans for an extensive renovation on the St. Paul Church, Harlingen, are almost completed. We are grateful for the cooperation of First Methodist Church, Harlingen, for assistance in this project.

We are extremely proud of our record with the Board of Missions as it relates to debts on the District. There are only two at this time, and both of them are current with all payments being made on time during the past year. Wesley Chapel, Seguin, and Jacobs Chapel, San Antonio, are the churches turning in such a fine performance in this regard. St. Paul, Corpus Christi, continues to take care of its obligations in a fine way. The fourth quarterly conference session at St. Paul, San Antonio, saw the authorization of a building program of more than $\$ 150,000.00$. This program will include extensive work on the sanctuary, and the erection of an educational unit and chapel. Plans are drawn, and it is expected that this work will get underway in the next few months.

The World Service and Conference Benevolence program, the Advance Specials program, and the Higher Education program have all been given careful attention. Reports on all causes are quite commendable. It has been a good year for the San Antonio District, and we lift our hearts in thanksgiving to God for His continued good benedictions.

## Waco District: C. D. Owens, Superintendent

Pastors have been zealous in their leadership on the Waco District, and the laymen have been anxious to follow. Evangelism has been stressed throughout the District and many of the churches had had either Revivals or Preaching Missions. The financial causes have been explained and emphasized, and, for the most part, the response has been very good. The treasurer's report will reveal this.

The District is also making great strides in building and improvement. St. James, Mart, has had a much needed face lifting along with the parsonage . . .
thanks to the leadership of Brother C. J. Polk. The West Point Church, Valley Mills, has done the impossible . . . for they have given us a lovely chapel costing approximately $\$ 10,000.00$ completely free of debt. Jones Chapel Church, Waco, is in the process of re-locating; St. James, Temple, expects to begin building within the next 90 days. The Maysfield membership has done a remodeling job on the church; The Port Sullivan Church which was destroyed by a storm is now under construction, and the Rose Bud Church is now ready to begin its building. These churches are served by Brothers S. W. Curtiss, L. E. Muse, G. L. Johnson, and I. C. Greer.

Because of the interest on the part of the District Trustees, Pastors, and members of the District, the Waco District becomes the fourth of the five Districts with a residence for the Superintendent. The Waco District parsonage, purchased at a price of $\$ 9,500$, is a beautiful, spacious, and well furnished home located in the River Oaks Addition . . . a rapidly growing section in Waco.

## Western District: W. M. Ellison, Jr., Superintendent

The Western District numbers 17 churches served by 13 dedicated and consecrated pastors. No finer laymen are found anywhere than those who make up the great Western District. The work began with a planning conference in Abilene, May 7th., 1958. From this conference four group meetings and a tour of the Bishop were scheduled and successfully carried out.

This has been a good year for re-modeling, repairing and re-painting parsonages and churches. At Brownwood, Brother M. C. Stone, Pastor, our church has been completely re-decorated inside and out at a cost of $\$ 1,200$. A set of chimes have been installed and one can listen daily to the great hymns of the church. Brother J. L. Mayfield at Lampasas-San Saba has led out people in setting up a much needed building fund with which to enlarge and repaint the church at Lampasas. Brother A. D. Porter is giving fine leadership at Llano-Mason. In addition to repairing, the parsonage has been piped and butane gas is used. Historic Myrtle Avenue, El Paso, has begun a building fund with the hope of re-locating soon. This is one of our most urgent needs. Lubbock is one of the fastest growing cities in West Texas. Brother M. T. Reed is doing an excellent job. The parsonage debt at Midland has been retired and the parsonage has been re-painted. Additions have been made to the parsonage at San Angelo, and the church has been re-decorated inside and out. Brother J. H. Hudson is keeping the interest of the Methodist Church alive at Roscoe, and Brothers Houston, Wills, and Carter are doing commendable work at Abilene, Amarillo, and Odessa respectively.

The membership throughout the District has done a remarkable job in their contirbutions to World Service and Benevolent askings. Most of the charges have paid World Service in full. The reports will show a definite increase in the over-all program for Advance Specials. One of the most outstanding and never-to-be-forgotten events of the year was the tour of the Western District in late September made by Bishop King. The tour covered Lampasas, Brownwood, Abilene, San Angelo, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, and El Paso. The Bishop was enthusiastically received not only by the pastors and members, press and radio, but by other denominational and racial groups wherever he spoke. This was one of the best programs of its kind in human relations.

The future of the District looks encouraging. There is a big job to be done :. . a great challenge to be accepted. With the leadership our laymen are giving, it is our firm belief and hope that the program of the church will be greatly strengthened.

## Christian Education

Christian Education in the West Texas Conference is in capable hands those of Brother W. J. Washington. He gives tirelessly of himself and finds whole-hearted support throughout the Conference. Brother Washington's report will reveal the many accomplishments in this area of our Conference's life. We are justly proud of this native son.

The W.S.C.S. of the Conference continues in the forefront . . . thanks to Mrs. O. B. Coe, Conference President, and all of the other women who support her in getting across the W.S.C.S. emphasis. Every District feels the healthly impact of the W.S.C.S. in terms of program planning and development.

## Conclusion

If time permitted we would call the name of every pastor in the West Texas Conference and could possibly point out areas of outstanding service on his part. The same is true in lay activity. This being impossible, we beseech you to accept our deepest appreciations and gratitudes for tasks well done. We are mindful of your support and loyalty, your devotion and dedication; and if we have been able to accomplish anything the entire credit is yours. We extend it humbly and thankfully.

This is our church. Charles Rann Kennedy put it this way. "The pillars of it go up like brawny trunks of heroes; the sweet human flesh of men and women is moulded about its bulwarks, strong, impregnable; the faces of little children laugh out from every cornerstone; the terrible spans and arches of it are the joined hands of comrades; and up in the heights and spaces there are inscribed the numberless meanings of all the dreams of the world. It is yet building . . . building and built upon. Sometime, in the silence of the night time, one may hear the tiny hammerings of the comrades at work up in the dome . . . the comrades that have climbed ahead."

We hear the hammerings, and on the security of one man's name . . . the name of Jesus, we move forward knowing that "The Kingdom is coming . . . we will tell the story; God's banner exalted shall be. The earth shall be full of His knowledge and glory . . . as waters that cover the sea."

## REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE 1959-1960

Bishop King and members of the West Texas Annual Conference. We, oyur commission on World Service and Finance have made a careful study of all benevolent and service causes claiming the attention of our Conference and have used every precaution that no cause, board, or commission be neglected. We are also mindful of the present economic status of our people and their willingness to share their material possessions that the Kingdom of God may be realized in our day. We feel that our budget is reasonable and therefore submit the following report for your action and determination.

## The Christian Higher Education Emphasis

The 1956 General Conference provided for an Emphasis on Christian Higher Education.

This movement is a church wide effort to expand and strengthen the Educational program of the Methodist Church. To strengthen the bounds that bind our Institutions to the church, to lead our schools and colleges to a growing commitment to christian standards and ideals and to lead our church in an effort to undergird the Institutions with adequate moral and financial support.

The Higher Education Emphasis is planned to meet the challenge of the contemporary world struggle for men's minds with an Education designed to make all thoughts and life captive to Jesus Christ, and to lead Methodists to a deeper appreciation of the necessity of Christian Higher Education.

For every Annual Conference to assume its share of the moral and financial support for Methodist Educational Institutions. The General Conference suggested $\$ 1.00$ per member each year as a current minimum for Colleges, and $30 \phi$ per member each year for Wesley Foundations.

Therefore, the members of the West Texas Conference are requested to contribute a minimum of $\$ 1.00$ per year for Huston - Tillotson College, and $30 \phi$ per member for Wesley Foundations.

Many of our members can and will give more to this all important cause, we are including in our Total Conference Budget a minimum amount of $\$ 21,450$ for Christian Higher Education. Each Charge in the Conference is apportioned a minimum goal. Let us keep this Christian Higher Education Emphasis before our people at all times, giving them an opportunity to make regular contributions to this cause. Let us also request the Organizations of the Churches to make contributions to this cause.

Special Emphasis should be placed upon the Christian Higher Education Emphasis on Race Relations Day.

Money collected in the churches for the Christian Higher Education Emphasis should be sent immediately to the Conference Treasurer by Cashier Check, Money Order, or Certified Check, clearly disignated for Christian Higher Education.

The Conference Treasurer shall immediately remit all funds received for Christian Higher Education to the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education.

Please Note: There is an amount of $\$ 500.00$ included in the $\$ 21,450$ apportionment for Travel and Promotional expense of the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education. This $\$ 500.00$ represents the maximum amount to be used by the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education for Travel and Promotion this Conference year.

## Special Days

We recommend the observance of the following days. Paragraphs 250, 296.

1. The Week of Dedication:

Emphasizing Ash Wednesday and culminating on the First Sunday in Lent which shall be designated as: The Day of Dedication.
2. The Fellowship of Suffering:

World Wide Communion Sunday, the First Sunday in October.
3. World Service Sunday:

The Fourth Sunday in each month.
4. Church School Rally Day:

Date to be designated by the West Texas Annual Conference.
5. Methodist Student Day:

The Second Sunday in June.
6. Race Relation Day:

The Second Sunday in February.
7. Children's Day:

The First Sunday in May.
8. National Family Week:

The First to the Second Sunday in May.
9. Commitment Day:

The First Sunday in December.
10. Student Recognition Day:

The Sunday after Christmas.
11. Laymen's Day:

Date set as provided for in Par. 1493.
12. World Order Sunday:

The Sunday preceding November 11th.
13. Universal Bible Sunday:

The Second Sunday in December.
14. Hospital and Homes' Week:

Beginning with Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday, Par. 1559, Sec. 1.
15. Retired Ministers' Day:

Par. 1610, Sec. 6.
16. Rural Life Sunday:

## Special Information

The Commission on World Service and Finance shall make the apportionments for World Service, Conference Benevolence and All other Conference Askings directly to the Charges of the Conference. Par. 796.

The Charges of the Conference shall pay World Service, Conference Benevolence and all other Conference Askings by Certified check, Cashier Check or Money Orders. All such Checks and Money Orders shall be made to the Annual Conference Treasurer. Money collected on the World Service
and Conference Benevolence Budgets be remitted to the Conference Treasurer monthly by local Charge Treasurers.

The above rules concerning Annual Conference Finances do not apply to the District Superintendent Fund. The District Superintendents will give direction concerning this item.

## Advance Funds

The West Texas Conference Advance Specials are to be administered by the Conference Board of Missions. The total Advance Goal for the West Texas Conference for this Conference Year is $\$ 19,000.00$.

## Recommendations

We recommend that the following percentages be used in making apportionments to the several Districts of the Annual Conference:

Austin - Victoria District ....................... 25.5\%
Dallas District ............................................. $25.6 \%$
San Antonio District ............................. $25.6 \%$
Waco District ........................................... $17.0 \%$
Western District ..................................... $6.3 \%$

## Ministerial Support

The Episcopal Fund
We recommend that the Episcopal Fund shall be 2\% of the Pastor's Cash Salary.

## The Conference Claimant Fund

(A) We recommend that the Conference Claimant Fund shall be $15 \%$ of the Pastor's Cash Salary.
(B) $12 \%$ of this amount shall be for immediate distribution. $3 \%$ of this amount shall be for the Reserve Pension Fund.

## The Minimum Support Fund

We recommend that the Minimum Support Fund shall be $2 \%$ of the Pastor's Cash Salary.

## The Sustentation Fund

We recommend that the Sustentation Fund shall be 1\% of the Pastor's Cash Salary.

## The District Superintendent Fund

Par. 802, 821, 822 - 1956 Discipline
We recommend that the District Board of Stewards of the Several Districts of the Conference shall set the District Superintendent Fund at $16 \%$ of the Pastor's and Associate Pastor's Salaries. This amount shall include the District Superintendent's Salary, Travel and Office Expenses. This amount shall also include the District Superintendent's House Rent on those Districts that do not have District Parsonages.

The Western District is the Missionary. Extension District of the Conference and is entitled to Conference Board of Mission Subsidy Funds, Maintenance Funds and Advance Funds. An amount of $\$ 1,500.00$ is included in the Conference Budget for the Conference Board of Missions to subsidize the District Superintendent Fund on the Western District.

We are recommending that an amount of not less than $\$ 900.00$ of the amount received by the Conference Board of Missions from the General Board of Missions for maintenance in the West Texas Conference be allocated to the Western District to be applied to the District Superintendent Fund for that District.

We further recommend that at least $\mathbf{\$ 9 0 0 . 0 0}$ out of the Conference Advance Funds be appropriated to the Western District to supplement the Traveling Expense of the District Superintendent of the Western District.

No other amount shall be levied against any of the Churches or any of the Districts of the Conference for the District Superintendent Fund.

Increases in Pastor's Salaries will not affect the District Superintendent Fund during this Quadrennium, 1956-60.

The term "District Superintendent Fund" as used in the above paragraphs is not to be confused with the purchasing and Maintenance of Maintenance of District Parsonages", see paragraph 716 of the Methodist Discipline.

We recommend that Substantial increases be made in Pastor's Salaries in those Charges throughout the Conference where the present salaries for Pastors are inadequate.

## THE RESERVE PENSION PLAN OF THE METHODIST CHURCH AND THE <br> WEST TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE

BE IT RESOLVED:

1. That the Three-fold Ministers Reserve Pension Fund Program of the West Texas Annual Conference be in effect as follows:
A. That the ministers who are admitted into full connection at the 1959 session of the West Texas Conference together with the ministers who are received on trial and continued on trial at the said 1959 session, be enrolled as "New Entrant" members of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, in accoradnce with the rules and regulations of the Fund, as contained in Par. 1642-1655 of the Discipline.
B. That the ministerial members of the West Texas Annual Conference, in the effective relation, who were admitted in full connection prior to the 1959 session thereof, and who are not otherwise eligible for membership in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, and the full-time approved supply pastors, be enrolled as members of the Partial Reserve Pension Fund, in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Fund, as continued in Par. 1656 and 1657 of the Discipline.
C. That, beginning with the conference year 1959-60, each and every qualified member of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund and each and every qualified member of the Partial Reserve Pension Fund shall contribute annually to the Fund an amount equivalent to $3 \%$ of the average salary of the conference, provided, however, that if his support, as defined in Par. 1643 S 2 of the Discipline, be less than the average salary of the Conference, a member may elect to contribute annually to the Fund an amount equivalent to $3 \%$ of his support.
D. That the service annuity payable to a retired member of the Partial Reserve Pension Fund, or to the widow of a deceased member thereof, based upon contributions made to the account of such member by the West Texas Annual Conference, be regarded as part of the pension provided by the Conference for such conference claimant under the provisions of the pension code.
2. That, beginning with the conference year 1960-61, The Board of Pensions of The Methodist Church, Incorporated in Illinois be, and it is hereby, authorized and directed to pay annually from the Distribution Reserve account of the West Texas Annual Conference on deposit with the said Board of Pensions, to the current distribution funds of the said conference, as the Board of Conference Claimants may request, an amount equal to the total number of annuity responsibility years of the West Texas Annual Conference multiplied by $\$ 2.00$ per year of such service.

## BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

That the Board of Conference Claimants of the West Texas Annual Conference be constituted the Committee on Reserve Pensions of the Conference, in accordance with the provisions of Par. 1645, Sec. 9 of the Discipline.

## REPORT OF THE <br> WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSIONS <br> April 22-26, 1959

Bishop King, my fellow ministers and beloved laymen of The West Texas Annual Conference - Greetings:

It is with a sense of gratitude that we come to the end of another Conference year, and with eager anticipation, we look forward to the
beginning of another year with all of its challenges and ventures for Kingdom building.

Again, I present to you a brief summary of the Missionary phase of our Conference as it relates to the General Church. First, I would like to mention trends in the fields of Missions. More and more the General Church is inclined to help the local church do its job in cooperation with an Annual Conference. The General Church expects us to share in the promotion of all of our missionary causes, both maintenance and extension. The Annual Conference Advance is our Conference extension. Money from this source provides funds with which we are able to do our work of expansion with aid from the General Board. It is, therefore, imperative that every charge on every District strive to meet its obligations relative to World Service and Conference Advance. This must be done if there is to be money available for the tremendous needs in our Conference. From these two sources we supplement salaries . . . we build churches.

One of the reasons we are not able to adequately meet our needs is because a large percentage of our local churches never meet their World Service and Advance quotas. Because of this, the money is simply not available. If no financial interest is evidenced on the part of the local church and the Annual Conference the Board of Missions and Church Extension is not inclined to extend aid. One of the questions on the application form is . . . "What amount will the local church assume?" Another question is "What amount will the Annual Conference contribute?" These are the trends.

In the field of extension we have made some progress. The East St. Paul Church, San Antonio, has been completed. $\$ 1,000.00$ from the Annual Conference Advance went to this church, and a donation grant of $\$ 3,000.00$ has been approved by the Board of Missions. A donation grant of $\$ 800.00$ from the Board of Missions and $\$ 400.00$ from Conference Advance has made possible the purchase of a site for the newly organized Downs Memorial Church in San Antonio. Cooperation on the part of local churches in San Antonio made possible the purchase of a building for this congregation, and we are now in the process of getting the building moved to the site. $\$ 350.00$ from Conference Advance enabled us to clear the long-standing debt in Kingsville on the San Antonio Distrist, and the church at Pleasanton has been completed with the aid of a $\$ 500.00$ donation from the Board of Missions.

On the Waco District we have a new church at Rosebud and at Port Sullivan. A District parsonage has been purchased with help from our Conference Advance. On the Dallas District Hamilton Park Church is one of our most modern plants in the entire Conference. Out of our Conference Advance the debt at Waxahachie has been brought under control, and it is now being handled by the local congregation. Out of this years Advance we will cancel the long standing debt at Ennis with an outstanding donation from the Board. We now have a church in Lake Como, Fort Worth. On the Austin-Victoria District our Webster Chapel Church has been cleared of all indebtedness as a result of the sacrificial giving of the people and the fine leadership of Brother Holmes. The church at Smithville has been completed.

Much praise is due the congregation at Haven Chapel in Denison who, following the goals set by the late Rev. Samuel Johnson, now have a beautiful house of worship.

A number of ministers have received salary subsidies from the Conference Advance. The house rent for the minister of the Downs Memorial mission has been taken care of out of Advance. Detailed reports of this will be included in the Treasurer's report.

The West Texas Conference has received from the Divisions of National Missions $\$ 10,050.00$ for salaries. This amount has gone to ministers whose salaries were sub-standard or to help in the establishment of a new work. My Brethren, do you find here any incentive to be loyal to the connectional causes of this great Church?

You will find included in this report a listing of our church debts with the General Board. Let us strive to meet these obligations. You will also find listed the grants made this year to the various churches in our Conference.

REPORT 5
REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION
TO: Bishop Willis J. King and Members of the 85th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference, The Methodist Church.
The Commission on Christian Higher Education is pleased to submit the following annual report.

The Commission held one general meeting during the year. At this meeting the chairman, Dr. John T. King, who is a member of the General Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, reviewed the progress of the higher education emphasis throughout the general church.

The launching of the first Russian Sputnik signaled the beginning of a great effort to achieve the conquest of outer space. The immediate impact of this historic event on American education has been an intensification of interest in the natural sciences. We can discern in this emphasis on science and technology further evidence of the dominance of materialism in our world.

The salvation of the human race in this "Age of Outer Space" lies ultimately in the conquest of the "inner man." The goals which mankind
may seek to realize through the application of scientific knowledge must be those inspired by a genuine commitment to spiritual and moral values. This means that Christian higher education will become increasingly important in the years ahead.

## Completed Projects

In accordance with the request of the General Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, your Annual Conference Commission cooperated with Huston-Tillotson College in holding a service of rededication April 28, 1958. Bishop King presided at the rededication service and Dr. Edmund Heinsohn, pastor of the University Methodist Church of Austin and chairman of the College's board of trustees, delivered the address.

Brother King then reminded the group that since he is a member of the General Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, his colleagues on that body would certainly expect us to comply with the General Commission's request that district convocations be held within the several districts of each annual conference. Consequently, the following schedule was observed in the West Texas Annual Conference:

Western District - December 3, 1958, at Doolittle Methodist Church, Llano.
Dallas District - February 19, 1959, at Thompson Chapel Methodist Church, Fort Worth.
San Antonio District - February 25, 1959, at Jacob Chapel Methodist Church, San Antonio.
Austin-Victoria District - February 26, 1959, at William Taylor Methodist Church, Luling.
Waco District - April 2, 1959, at Bracks Chapel Church, Waco.
On behalf of the Annual Conference Commission and in the interest of the overall Christian higher education emphasis, a number of speaking engagements were filled during the year. Various amounts of printed material were mailed to each pastor for his use in emphasizing Christian higher education in the local church. The brochure published by the Commission has been distributed to the members of this Annual Conference. During the year, there was also a constant exchange of correspondence between our Commission and the General Conference Commission.

## Unfinished Projects

The matter of a lecturership on the Christian faith, which was proposed at the last session of the Annual Conference, has been explored further. The annual lectures for 1959 have been scheduled for May 15 and 17 at Huston-Tillotson College. The Commission is continuing to explore the possibility of permanently endowing this project.

Members of the Commission are working with committees of the Boards of Education of the West Texas and Texas Conferences to achieve the goal of establishing Wesley Foundation work at Prairie View and Texas Southern universities. The Commission wholeheartedly endorses the proposal of the Commission on World Service and Finance with regard to supporting such foundation work at these two institutions.

The Commission is still hopeful of securing the cooperation of other conference agencies in sponsoring a conference on the ministry. In connection with this project, plans have been made to emphasize the importance of the ministry during the Annual Youth Program at this session of the Annual Conference.

## New Projects

The Commission has adopted the following projects for the ensuing conference year:

1. To sponsor an essay contest among high school seniors in the churches of the Conference. The essays will be written on selected topics relating to Christian higher education.
2. To organize a Committee on Wills and Legacies to explore the possibilities of support for Huston-Tillotson College from these sources.
3. To organize a Committee on Endowment and Capital Funds which will cooperate with similar committees of the board of trustees of Huston - Tillotson College.
4. To sponsor a convocation on Christian higher education at Huston-Tillotson College. It is planned that this convocation will be held during Religious Emphasis Week.
5. To organize a Committee on Good Literature to furnish pastors with lists of the latest publications dealing with Christian higher education.
6. To explore the possibilities of cooperating with Huston-Tillotson College and representatives of other Conference boards in the establishment of an advisory board which would recommend ways and means to strengthen the religious life of the college community.

## Recommendations

1. The Commission recommends that each local church utilize every opportunity to emphasize the importance of Christian higher education and to promote the best interest of Huston- Tillotson College.
2. It is recommended that the Conference authorize the establishment of a committee of chairman of the several conference agencies to coordinate meeting places, dates, etc., thus effecting economies.
3. The Commission endorses very strongly the proposed budget of the Commission on World Service and Finance as it relates to the higher education emphasis, and recommends its approval by the Conference.
4. The experience of the Commission suggests that the promotion of the emphasis on Christian higher education may be enhanced through the collection of historical information about the Conference and the College. Therefore, it recommends that the Conference's Historical Commission explore the possibility of establishing a Conference Archives in the new library at Huston Tillotson College when it is completed.
The Commission is deeply appreciative of the encouragement and guidance which Bishop King generously gave during the past year. It also expresses its thanks to all the ministers of the Conference and to the district superintendents for their support and cooperation. Their assistance in promoting the District Convocations and in promoting all other aspects of the "Quadrennial Emphasis" is gratefully acknowledged. The Commission must express also its gratitude to Dr. J. J. Seabrook and all persons at Huston - Tillotson College for making the facilities of the College available for its use. Lastly, the members of local churches are to be congratulated for their kind acceptance of and generous response to the "cause" of Christian higher education.

## MEMORIAL TO 1960 GENERAL CONFERENCE - THE METHODIST CHURCH

Reference to Paragraph 2018, 1956 Discipline of The Methodist Church.
WHEREAS, the General Conference of 1956 recognized the need for a more intensive effort on the part of The Methodist Church to expand and strengthen its institutions of higher education;

WHEREAS, the said General Conference authorized the establishment of a Quadrennial Commission on Christian Higher Education to direct and supervise the Quadrennial Higher Education Emphasis, and

WHEREAS, although definite progress has been made in achieving the goals outlined by the General Commission, there is an apparent need for a continuing effort to strengthen Methodist institutions of higher education, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the 1960 General Conference authorize the continuance of a Quadrennial Commission on Christian Higher Education for the 1960-64 Quadrennium, provided that it shall consist of not more than 80 members, inclusive of representatives from the Council of Bishops, Lay and Ministerial representatives from the six jurisdictions, and staff members of the General Board of Education.

WHEREAS, the contribution of Methodists to the training of Negroes for leadership will rebound to the total welfare of the church and of the American community, and

WHEREAS, despite the intensive efforts made during the two years of special emphasis in higher education to increase aid for Methodist colleges attended predominantly by Negroes, the total amounts projected as goals by the Board of Education and the General Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education have not been reached, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education take steps toward securing a Race Relations offering of $\$ 2,000,000$ annually during the 1960-64 quadrennium.

## REPORT <br> WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Bishop King, members and friends of the West Texas Conference, Greetings.
This report renders an account of the activities of the conference board of education. Three meetings have been held this year. The first was a special call session on June 27, 1958, at Austin for the purpose of welcoming the executive secretary back to the conference and to his work. At this meeting the plans for the work of this year were explicitly laid (see minutes). The next meeting was a mid-year meeting held at Huston-Tillotson College on January 15, 1959. A review of the work already done wth additional plans for the future represented the nature of the work of that meeting (see minutes). The final meeting ofthe board for this past conference year was held Tuesday afternoon here in Dallas.

Christian education is the process through which individuals are exposed to and involved in experiences that lead them into Christian maturity. This means then that every indivudual, child, youth and adult, must become dynamically involved in this process. We, the conference board of education, have tried earnestly to offer experiences for the leaders and workers in our local churches that will enable them to perform more adequately and effectively in their respective responsibilities.

The board of education is realistically involved, representing the conference, in areas of discovering additional avenues for these enriching experiences of which we have referred. Too, it becomes the responsibility of the board to venture forward in the area of interjurisdictional relationships. The folowing report of the executive secretary to the Board will set forth the board's work and the new frontiers of our labors.

We discovered the necessity of adding more members to the board; in the mid-year meeting, L. L. Haynes, Sr., J. G. Owens, T. M. Shadowens, and A. Cecil Williams were added as members-pending the approval by
the annual conference (par. 1443, sec. 4).
We are indeed grateful to all who have worked in many ways to support and strengthen the work of our board. Persons and groups are too many to singularly note here. We do, however, wish to express our gratitude and appreciation to the volunteer staff workers in the conference and districts, district superintendents and pastors, and the host of lay workers in the local churches of our conference. We especially want to here recognize and pay tribute to the unexcelled support and cooperation rendered us in the work by the Division of the Local Church, The General Board of Education.

## Annual Report of the Executive Secretary To the Board of Education and the West Texas Conference

This medium is used to express my personal gratitude and appreciation to the members of the Board of Education and to the members of the West Texas Conference for its kind expression in rendering to me the time and assistance which enabled me to do another year of study. I am happy to report that the Master of Sacred Theology Degree in the field of Christian Education was awarded me from Boston University School of Theology on June 8, 1958. On June 15, 1958, I reassumed the responsibilities of the executive secretary.

The status of Christian education in the West Texas Conference is one of increasing satisfaction. According to the reports of the 1957-58 conference year (This data was accertained from the current conference Journal. The figures throughout this report are based upon figures taken from this source) there were 8,910 members enrolled in the church schools of our conference. This figure represents a $37.4 \%$ increase over that of the previous year $(6,010)$. Looking at the statistics of our church school reports, we find that there are sizable increases all across the board. There are only one or two areas in which we are not able to see marked increases. We must be led to believe that there is a new awakening to the paramount necessity for providing in each local church the type of educational experience that evokes the type of response on the part of our congregations and the members of our respective communities which enables them to continually realize the full and abundant life found in Christ Jesus. We are able to rejoice in these apparent gains only because we do not look at the numbers as being cold and inanimate; rather, these figures represent people - individuals who have the capacity for becoming like "Him."

Since returning on June 15, 1958, more than sixty separate trips have been made that represents about 27,328 miles traveled via car. Each district has been visited at least six times and many of these have been meetings where several local churches have been represented.

## Children's Work

The strongest element of Christian education in our local churches is centered in the work of the children's division. Of the 8,910 total members of ourc hurch schools, 3,051 are enrolled in the children's division. Our labors are directed in this wise because we feel that it is very imperative that a good and strong foundation be laid in these formative years so that the continued process of nurture in the fellowship of the church can be carried on with this elemental background. Also the fact has been well established that at least six of every ten persons joining the church through profession of faith come by way of the church school. If we are to increase our efforts in evangelism it will be wise for us to even concentrate more of our efforts at bringing individuals into a wholesome and meaningful relationship with God as Father, and Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord while they are yet young and developing concepts and attitudes.

## Youth Work

A great deal has taken place this year in the area of youth work. The Reverend A. Cecil Williams, conference director of youth work, and the five district directors of youth work, Eric C. Purnell, Garrett J. Goff, Irvin C. Loud, Mrs. L. V. Collins, and Mrs. Jimmie M. Moore, have joined forces with the host of sub-district and local counselors of youth to provide an array of experiences for the youth of the West Texas Conference that have meant much in their Christian development.

## Youth Institutes

Four of our five districts held Methodist Youth Fellowship Institutes between the dates of July 7, and August 8. Approximately 250 youth and their adult counselors had the memorable experience of fellowship and studying together in their respective districts. The youth institute offers an experience in living and in training for the youth and their counselors of the local church. We are encouraged with the growth and development of many local MYF groups that receive their primary inspiration and help from the summer institutes.

## New Orleans Area Youth Convocation

This year the youth of the New Orleans Area gathered with their adult counselors at Dillard University, New Orleans, Louisiana for the first Area Youth Convocation to be held in many years. The West Texas Conference had nineteen youth and five adult counselors in attendance to the convocation representing four of our five districts. The Convocation served as the conference training enterprise for youth and adult counselors for this year. The decision has been made to sponsor the conference youth assembly in the alternate years of the area convocation. The Area convocation will be held in August, 1960, within the West Texas Conference at Huston-Tillotson College. The youth of the West Texas Conference will be host to this meeting.

## Sub-District Youth Meetings

Much of the time of the executive secretary has been spent in developing active sub-district meetings with our MYF groups. We have felt that the greater good will come from meetings with youth in the subdistricts because more youth can become involved in the fellowshipping experience. There are a number of sub-district groups that are well organized. Sub-district meetings have been held in the San Antonio district, the Austin-Victoria district, the Western district, and the Dallas district. We earnestly hope that these meetings will become frequent occurences in each of the districts to the extent that every local MYF will become involved in such meetings.

## Student Work

More and more of our youth from our local churches are making Huston-Tillotson College their choice for their higher education. This renders an encouraging note because we feel that they are receiving the very best training available.

The Methodist Student Movement, the official religious-life organization for Methodist students on the college campus, has been a real source of inspiration to the entire college community at Huston-Tillotson this year. The Reverend A. Cecil Williams, College pastor, has served as the counselor for this group. They have done such note-worthy things as having special retreats and entertaining, for the very first time in the history of the organization in the state, the State Annual Methodist Student Movement Conference. A total of better than 175 youth from college campuses in the state gathered on campus for the Thanksgiving holidays for this meeting.

Several exploratory meetings have been held with the State Director for the Texas Methodist Student Movement, the Reverend Bob Breihan, for the purpose of investigating the possibilities of establishing some rather positive work with Methodist students on the campuses of Texas Southern University in Houston and at Prairie View A\&M College. We of the West Texas Conference share a definite responsibility with the Texas Con-
ference in setting up Wesley Foundations at these two institutions for ministering to our youth who are in attendance there. Following an exploratory trip with representatives from the two conferences and the State Director to these two schools and being in conference with the presidents of each, an extensive and comprehensive report was given to the Board in its January meeting with proposed suggestions and recommendations. The Board established a committee to further the study and make a report in its next meeting. The recommendations growing out of this committee's report are (1) that, in cooperation with the Texas Conference, a temporary committee composed of representatives of each conference be established for each institution to further study the needs and make recommendations for the immediate beginning of a thorough Wesley Foundation Program; and (2) that the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to include in the budget for this year an allowance for the .30 per member - and that a sum of $\$ 1,000.00$ be assured for the assistance of this work at both institutions. Copies of the State Director's report to the two conference Boards of Education are available for those who may be specifically interested. The West Texas Conference is represented on the Texas Methodist Student Movement Board of Trustees in the persons of Mrs. Clara Watkins Johnson, Dr. W. Astor Kirk, and Reverend William J. Washington.

## Young Adult Work

The young adult fellowship in the West Texas Conference is on the upward move. Only a few years ago there were only one or two churches in the conference that had effectively organized young adult groups. Today there are churches in each district that have well organized groups that are about the earnest business of creating "a redemptive" fellowship that meets their needs and maintains their interest in the larger work of the Church

The activities of the young adults is primarily limited to the local church; though there are a number of activities that involve their time and interest beyond the local church.

## Adult Work

No activities beyond that of the work done in the local churches can be accredited to the work of the executive secretary for this conference year. The only statement that seems here appropriate is that the areas of adult work and older adult work are pregnant with potentials and opportunities for good work yet to be discovered and done.

## General Church School Work

Of the 155 preaching places in the West Texas Conference there is a church school operative in 145 . The appalling feature about these statistics is, however, there was a gain of 8 new preaching places in the conference in this past year when we gained only two new church schools.

The attitude must immediately become prevalent among us that the sure and lasting foundation of a growing and thriving congregation will center itself in a thorough and dynamic program of Chrsitian teaching. One of the very first steps in organizing a new congregation should and must be in the establishing of a church school. Most of the conferences in Methodism will show in their records more church schools than preaching places.

The above paragraph will seem somewhat in contradiction to the opening statements of this paper. We are doing wonderfully well in many areas, however, there are many others where we have yet a distance to travel before we will be adequately doing all that we can in this big business of leading others into this full and abundant life of relationships with God in Christ and his fellow man.

Four district Church School Administrator's seminars were held this year in San Antonio, Edna, Waco, and Fort Worth, respectively on November 10 through 13. This series of meetings featured the Reverend Ernest T. Dixon, Jr., Department of General Church School Work, General Board of Education. A total of more than 175 church school administrators, including commission of education chairman, superintendents, teachers, and
many other officers and members of local churches attended these four sessions. This, I feel, represented the signel feature for this year in the area of General Church School Work. There are many activities and a great deal of efforts rendered to assist those who have the big job of carrying on the work in the church schools from Sunday to Sunday. We are ever aware of the good work that these many workers are continuing to do. There are contnued increases in attendance and in school memberships which unmistakably attest that there are tireless efforts being exerted on the parts of many.

## Leadership Education

Leadership education denotes a larger segment of all that we are about in this big business of Christian Education. Through our institutes, seminars, worker's conferences, and the many other things that are done through this office involves primarily some part of leadership education. We realize that there are some special tools that every leader must possess in the act of attempting to lead. A person must have a basic love and respect for persons - believing that all have the capacity for becoming a true child of God when confronted with Him through Christ in his experiences. Along with our endeavors to sharpen the insights of our workers in the local church as to new educational approaches and techniques, we are very concerned that each worker face the realization immediately that the teachings reflected in his life are far more appealing and meaningful. Christ must be seen through the individual that is doing the teaching. Also, the quality of the experience that is provided becomes of greatest essence because it is only through the experience of relationships that the basic message of the gospel is made real.

## Audio Visual Supplies and Equipment

Audio visuals are a bare necessity in a teaching program. The West Texas Conference has attempted to establish something of a library for the churches of the conference. We are proud of the equipment that we now have:

116 mm . Bell \& Howell film projector
1300 watt Viewlex filmstrip projector
1 DuKane Record Master (3 speeds with discussional control)
1 70x70 Dalite screen
All of this equipment is in good repair and is in constant use throughout the conference.

We are not presently able to say that we have any 16 mm . film in the office. This represents a need that we hope to begin to satisfy in the immediate future. We do have a limited supply of filmstrips that are finding a rather limited circulation. They are:

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT HUSTON-TILLOTSON COLLEGE

To Bishop King, Ministers and Laymen of the West Texas Annual Conference: Greetings:

In behalf of the faculty and students we wish to thank the Bishop, ministers and laymen of the West Texas Annual Conference for your continued support to Huston-Tillotson College which has made it possible for the college to receive unqualified accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. We were recently approved by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. We are also members of (1) The Association of American Colleges, (2) The Texas Education Agency, (3) The University Senate of The Methodist Church, (4) The National Commission on Accrediting, and (5) The Congregational Christian College Council.

Your support has also made it possible for the college to continue its effectiveness as a quality institution in preparing young men and young women for a leadership role in a complex society.

The college assumes as its responsibility the promotion of liberal education within the framework of Christian principles.

The President had the pleasure of telling the story of Huston-Tillotson College to The First Methodist, Port Lavaca; First Methodist Church, Alice; The First Methodist Church, Ingleside; the district conferences and several churches in the Austin community. He attended group meetings and district conferences on every district of the West Texas Conference.

We also mailed out 22,000 pieces of literature on Race Relations to our supporting conferences.

## Religion

Huston-Tillotson College is decidedly a Christian College. Founded in prayer and built up by faith, it bears the marks of Divine favor throughout its history.

Its students must have a sound religious, moral and social outlook which will guide their purposes and activities. They must understand their places in and responsibilities to a democratic society and a changing world.

They must be willing and, indeed, feel obligated to work to bring about desirable social changes. They must have adequate perspective and sound judgements so that they may realize that it is not enough to decry social injustice, but that it is also necessary to do something constructive about it.

We were honored to have as our speakers during our Religious Emphasis Week observance Reverend T. M. Bruton, superintendent of the Dallas District; Reverend J. H. Carruthers, pastor, Saint Paul Methodist Church, San Antonio; and Reverend L. L. Haynes, pastor, Saint Andrew's Methodist Church, Fort Worth.

We were also graced with the presence of Dr. Goodrich E. White, Chancellor of Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia; and Bishop H. Thomas Primm of the 10th Episcopal District of the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Representatives from Gammon Theological Seminary, Howard School of Religion and the Board of Missions were on our campus recruiting students in the interest of the ministry.

## Faculty

We have a dedicated faculty, one-third of which have doctorate degrees, and the remaining regular members of the faculty do not have less than a Master's degree. They are graduates of the best colleges and universities of the world. We have renowned authors and research specialists among them.

Doctors King, Jones, Warren and Reverend Williams made speeches at various churches in behalf of the college and Race Relations. Some of the churches included the First Methodist Church, Kerrville; First Methodist Church, Goldwaite; First Methodist Church, Kress; Wesley Methodist Church, Austin; St. Peters Methodist Church, Austin; Simpson Methodist Church, Austin; Means Memorial Methodist Church, Andrews; and Majors Chapel Methodist Church, Waco.

## Students

We have enrolled 422 fine young men and women, six of whom are from the Panama Canal Zone. Many of our students are from within the boundary of the West Texas Conference an dfrom other sections of the State of Texas. We also have students enrolled from other states of the union.

Our enrollment this year shows an increase of 9.1 per cent over last year's enrollment.

## Financial Aid to Students

Through scholarships and work aid Huston - Tillotson College is giving its students over $\$ 25,000.00$. We received four (4) National Methodist Scholarships and we were allowed $\$ 500.00$ from the Methodist Student Loan Fund of the Board of Education. We are participating in the National Student Loan Fund (Federal Government).

Several individuals have made contributions to our Scholarship Fund, and several members of the West Texas Conference have said that they are remembering us in their wills. This is an area that has not been explored.

## Services Rendered by the College Choir

Our choir rendered service at several Methodist churches in the interest of Race Relations: Castell, Mason, Alice, Goldwaite, St. John in Austin, Llano, Georgetown, and St. Paul, Corpus Christi.

Our choir also had the pleasure of serving at several district conferences and sharing in the worship services at the following churches: Warren Methodist Church, Dallas; St. Andrews Methodist Church, Fort Worth; Simpson Methodist Church, Austin; St. Peters Methodist Church, Austin; Wesley Methodist Church, Austin; St. James Methodist Church, Waco; William Taylor Methodist Church, Luling; and Bracks Chapel, Waco

## Meetings Atrended by Students

We had student representation at the Methodist Student Retreat, Rock Ledge, the Conference on Race Relations, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, and the 13th Annual Recreation Workshop of the South

Central Jurisdiction of The Methodist Church, Glen Lake Methodist Camp, Glen Rose, Texas.

Dr. W. Astor Kirk and Reverend A. Cecil Williams of our faculty were used as resource leaders at these conferences.

## Our Program

A general education program was developed which was endorsed by the faculty and approved by the trustees, and it became an integral part of the revised curriculum of the college. Our divisions were reduced from 7 to 4 and the departments from 24 to 10 . Only those courses were introduced which would be workable for a small liberal arts college in the age in which we live.

## 1. Division of Education

The Division of Education is organized to offer professional and content preparation in four areas: Physical and Health Education. Elementary Education, Secondary Education, and Home and Family Relations.

The general obiectives of the Division are (a) to develop physical fitness. social efficiency, competence for directing health and physical activities, (b) to develop competent young people to man our business enterprises, and (c) to provide the necessary professional background for teachers in the elementary and secondary schools.

## 2. Division of Humanities

The Division of Humanities comprises the department of Communication and Languages - courses in English. Spanish. French, Speech and Drama; the department of Fine Arts - courses in Music and Art; and the department of Philosophy and Religion - courses in Philosophy and Religion.

The objectives of the Humanities Division are:

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM - 1958-1959
Bishop King, Members and Friends of the 85th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference. It is with a deep sense of gratitude and sincere humility that I come to make our annual report for the Conference Board of Evangelism.

Much has been said, and much has been done to relieve the physical suffering and hunger in our world. But there is a deeper need and a greater hunger being manifested today. All about us men are trying to satisfy the cravings of God - hungry souls with things material. They are still obsessed with the ideology accosted the mind of the rich man in the scriptures, which caused him to believe that he could satisfy a hungry soul with bread. It has been our delight, our great privilege to offer to men the bread of God, which comes down from above.

Our district boards under the leadership of the district secretaries have worked cooperatively with the several District Superintendents in promoting the work of evangelism throughout the conference: Seminars, convocations and preaching missions have been carried out in each of the five districts. The Bishops Crusade has been conducted by many of the Charges with favorable results. We have given full support to the Area Committee in carrying out recommendations set forth in its annual report at Gulfside last August. We have had some success, however, we are not completely satisfied and are looking forward to making 1959-1960 "a year of Evangelism."

The place of the Christian is not out of the world but among people. There is a notion is some quarters that the chief end of religion is to make people good, to keep them from being bad so when they die they will go to heaven. These are all highly desirable, but Christian conversion is always purposeful. To ancient Israel God said: "In the day that I shall have cleansed you from all your iniquities, I will cause you to dwell in cities." Our devotion to Christ will most certainly take us to the sanctuary and the communion table, but from there we must go into the busy streets where wheels turn and men faint and tire. We are to give our witness in the den and tumult of trade, in the marts of commerce.

Jesus made the place of service clear when He prayed for His disciples in this fashion: "I pray not that Thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that Thou shouldest keep them from evil." Then He added, "as Thou hast sent Me into the world, even so have I sent them into the world." Therefore in the light of this prayer, and commission we make the following recommendations for the ensuing year, to lead our local churches into the greatest year of evangelistic triumph.

1. That we make the year of 1959 through March, 1960 a year of Evangelism.
2. That revivals be held periodically in each local church.
$\therefore$ Spiritual Life Retreats:
(a) Retreats for Ministers in each district
(b) Retreats for Officials, Boards and Members
(c) Retreats for young people
3. A year-round program of visitation Evangelism.
(a) An intensive program of discovering prospects
(b) Simultaneous district-wide religious census
(c) An exchange of pulpits among pastors at intervals
4. That membership training classes for boys and girls, youth and adults be sponsored with the pastor as instructors, in each local church.
5. That the Annual Conference provide expense of Conference Secretary of Evangelism to the Annual National Meeting of the General Board of Evangelism; and that each district do the same for its secretary.
6. That the Commission on Membership and Evangelism in each local church work cooperatively with the commissions on Education, Missions and Stewardship and Finance in promoting the total program of the local church.

## REPORT OF THE <br> WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF WORLD PEACE April, 1959

Bishop King, Ministers, Laymen, and Friends:
I should like to begin my report by saying, There Is No Alternative To Peace. Throughout modern history, mankind has pursued a concept of peace through disarmament that might ultimately put an end to the recurring tragedy of warfare among nations. Unfortunately, a long procession of efforts toward universal peace has, almost wholly, failed. From these failures, however, the nations of the world now know that if a worthwhile peace is to be gained, it must be not merely the absence of a condition of war, it must be a positive, safeguarded peace - one with justice and durability. The unprecedented horror of a war in the future lends an urgency to this task that is inescapable. As never before, and especially in the nuclear age, there is no alternative to peace.

The peace we seek is an enduring peace, with security, justice, and freedom for the peoples of the world.

Since the end of World War II, the quest for peace has been vigorously pursued by peoples and governments in a dedicated crusade to ensure that mankind will never suffer the scourge of a nuclear war. Our own United States believes that a workable system of armaments control, backed by adequate, effective inspection measures, offers one of the most promising means of assisting in achieving such a peace to lessen the increasing nuclear threat over the world, to reduce the high level of non-nuclear arms and the related burden of armaments, and to meet apprehensions about surprise attacks.

Adequate inspection and control is the foundation for disarmament. Past efforts to control world armaments have shown that disarmament cannot deepnd upon mutual trust alone, that unilateral weakness is an invitation to aggression, and that a weak disarmament is worse than no agreement at all. The lessons of history teach us that disarmament agreements without adequate reciprocal inspection increase the dangers of war and do not brighten the prospect of peace - effective mutual inspection is the foundation for real disarmament.

Five ways you can work for peace: (1) Keep informed. (2) Take part with better understanding of the world's problems; encourage and use every available means for constructive discussions with your neighbors, associates and community groups. (3) Share: select and support a private overseas assistance project as a personal direct sharing of American resources in helping others to help themselves. (4) Make friends: show warmth and hospitality to foreign students, trainees and exchange technicians visiting this country. Only you can offer the friendliness so necessary if others are to receive genuine impressions of life in our United States. (5) Pray for peace. Finally, pray for peace to help in searching out the ways in which it can be realized and for continuing faith that peace can be achieved.

## Conference Activities

All members of the Board, when called upon, readily responded by filling speaking engagements in churches, schools, clubs, and colleges. Filmstrips are available also. Special days were observed throughout the conference, namely: World Order Sunday, United Nations Week, Human Rights Day and Trick or Treat.

Peace teams were organized on Huston - Tillotson College campus, after conferring with President Seabrook and Rev. A. Cecil Williams, the College Minister. The pattern was taken from Hendrix College. The purpose of the teams was: Go to local Methodist Youth Fellowship groups in the vicinity of the college and promote interest in the M.Y.F. Program and, on invitation of local church groups, hold morning or afternoon services. Only students interested in PEACE are members of the team.

The Chairman was extended an invitation to join Dr. Boss and others to The Soviet Union Eastern European Seminar. The folder with proposed itinerary and program appeared to be very good but because of funds accounted for my not accepting the same.

A book on the issues before the Thirteenth General Assembly and other materials were sent to all district superintendents and members of the committee, letters and telegranms were sent to our senators and representatives asking them to support certain bills which we received from the General Board.

Two members from the West Texas Conference were present during the South Central Jurisdictional and Regional Conference on Christian Social Relations. The purpose of the conference was three-fold: (1) To present in a dynamic and up-to-date way the total picture of social concern to annual conference and district leaders who work in Christian social relations; (2) The enrichment of individuals through inspiration and information in workshop periods and general sessions for the entire groups; (3) To train leaders through workshops, job analysis and discussion sessions. Your Chairman served on World Peace Panel: Conference Board Programs, speaking on the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Methodist Youth Fellowship in the conference. Other members of the panel were Rev. Charles Cheffey, Rev. Henry Jinske, and Dr. Alvin Murray.

Special activity was the sponsoring of a conference-wide prayer vigil during United Nations Week which was quite a success.

We wish to thank all of the ministers and laymen for support given this Board.

## BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Bishop King and Members of the West Texas Conference:
It is with pleasure and gratitude that I submit the annual report of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. We left the last session of the Annual Conference with a strong desire to do a more effective job of promoting the program of Lay activities in our conference. To this end,
we set our goals very high. Although all obpectives were not reached, I am happy to report that some were. Notable among the achievements for the year were: The organization of fifteen (15) new Methodist Men's Clubs over the five districts, the re-activating of several Clubs whose charters had expired, and advancement in the area of Christian Stewardship and Finance over the entire conference. Our efforts during the ensuing conference year will be directed toward continued advancement in all phases of lay activity throughout the conference.

## Activities

I attended a meeting of the General Board of Lay Activities in Chicago, Illinois, July $26-27$, 1958. I have endeavored to transmit the information and inspiration received at this meeting to the laymen of the West Texas Conference. Stewardship and Finance, The Every Member Canvass, Methodist Mens' Clubs, Lay Speaking, The Methodist Layman (Magazine) and other areas of lay participation in the program of the Methodist Church, claimed the earnest attention of those attending the meeting.

## Third Annual Laymen's Retreat

This retreat was held at Huston-Tillotson College, October 17-18, 1958. A well planned program was presented by our Program Director, Dr. John T. King. Revealing and inspiring addresses were delivered by: Rev. Lawrence L. Brown, who spoke from the subject, "Problems of Ministerial Recritment"; Dr. S. E. Warren, "Intergration as a Christian Concept", and Dr. John T. King, "The Lay Leader in the Effective Local Church."

Other meetings attended include the Southwestern Audi-Visual Workshop held at Southwestern University, September 2-5, 1958, and the Conference Board of Lay Activities Meeting held at Huston-Tillotson College, April 7, 1959.

## Recommendations

With the idea of strengthening the program of Lay Activities in the conference, I wish to submit the following recommendations for conference considerations:

1. (a) That a Conference Director of Stewardship be elected to promote the program of Stewardship in the conference.
(b) That a Director of Stewardship be elected in each of the five Districts.
(c) That a Chairman of Stewardship be provided in every local church, and that the name and address of each local church chairman be sent to the Conference Director of Stewardship and to the Conference Lay Leader, and that the several District Lay Leaders send the names of all Church Lay Leaders and Methodist Men Club Presidents to the Conference Director.
2. That the District Planning Committee include in the district budget not less than $\$ 100.00$ for the promotion of lay activities in each district.
3. (a) That a District Retreat or Workshop be held in each of the five Districts annually, and that Visual Aids be made available for use in said retreats or workshops. (District Boards of Lay Activities should assume responsibility for providing these Visual Aids)
(b) That District and Associate Lay Leaders maintain close contact with local church lay leaders, and make available the literature provided by the General Board for study and training.

This has been a banner year for us in many ways. The "Spirit of Christ For All of Life" has been exemplified by work done throughout the conference of the total Church's program, service and finance given by all societies and guilds. We must remember all members were members of the church first and have responsibility to its on-going program.

All officers and line secretaries have promoted their work effectively. However, we realize that there is room for improvement.

Our School of Missions continues to grow. Our faculty is integrated and has been from the beginning. Our Youth School is something of which we are very proud. They are interested in learning about this great missionary work. At the close of the school three youth came forward and dedicated their lives to Christian service; one desires to be a Missionary. Please place these and others on your prayer list, and help us to recruit more youth.

We have Miss Lelia Marie Robinson, Deaconess, serving at Bethlehem Center, Fort Worth, Texas. She is indeed consecrated to the task and gives excellent service to her local church.

Miss Lillian Manning is a Rural Worker in Tennessee and West Virginia. Miss Russell of the Division reports that she was very good while in Scarritt. They discovered that her average surpassed all others in training.

Miss Rosia Lee Johnson will graduate from National College for Christian workers and will take work in the foreign fields.

We have had delegates to the following meetings: Jurisdiction School of Missions, South West Texas Conference School of Missions, State Council of Methodist Women of Texas, Seminar on State Government, Sixth Annual Assembly of Texas Council of Churches, United Church Women of Texas and The Fifth Assembly of Methodist Women where twenty-six women were a part of ten thousand Methodist women from all over the world. It had its desired effect upon us, and we pledged ourselves to go all out for those in need at home and abroad. The theme was, "Christ's Message for Today," which served as a challenge to all who were there.

Visits were made to all districts except one. Study courses, surveys, housing P.T.A., scouting, welfare agencies, Y.W.C.A., and other areas have engaged our Methodist women.

The fellowship with conference societies in overlapping jurisdiction is rewarding. We work very closely together as Christian women. They are wanting to know what they can do to make the Central Jurisdiction Meeting at Huston - Tillotson College, June 10-19, a success. We will have a joint planning together soon at which time, they will be privileged to share ideas, etc., for we wish to entertain the meeting the "West Texas Conference Way."

Our Division quotas and Jurisdiction askings were met with an increase. We look forward to doing something special for our work in Africa, designating the same to the Grays' work.

Inez Elizabeth Ann Center is our conference project. It is a kindergarten with fifty-one (51) children enrolled. Activities are as follows: music appreciation (rhythm band and chorus), art (finger painting, crayolet drawing and handicraft), story hour, reading readiness, supervised and free play, etc. These activities provide the children many opportunities for selfexpression through work and play. Public programs have been presented during holiday seasons by the children. Girl Scouts hold regular meetings once a week. Staff members are troop leaders; they need help at this point.

Sixteen will graduate in May.
We are fortunate to have such efficient staff - both of them are college graduates. One received her M.A. degree from Aimes, Iowa last summer. We realize it is the Missionary Spirit that causes them to remain with us.

To date, they have taken in $\$ 1,236.66$ (as of April 10, 1959).
We wish to express our appreciation to the ministers for their fine support given us. We invite you to visit our project at any time it is
convenient. Our expression is that of gratitude to our Staff and members of our P.T.A. for their excellent work.

Our annual meeting which was held here was well attended by the women of the Conference, and ministers of the Dallas District. The District Superintendent and Pastor enriched our meeting by bringing up spiritual messages each day, for which we wish to thank them. Our theme for the meeting was, "CHRIST FOR THE WORLD WE SING!" We shall never forget our entertainment by the fine women of Warren Methodist Church. Our prayers are for them and the women of the Conference. We realize this report could not have been made without the Divine guidance of God. We have relied on Him every step of the way. We shall continue to sing, "Christ for the world we sing! The world to Christ we bring, With one accord, With us the work to share, With us reproach to dare, With us the cross to bear, For Christ our Lord."

## REPORT <br> THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Bishop King, Members of the West Texas Conference, Friends:
The following report is submitted by your Conference Board of Temperance:

Wa are living in days when our economy has tremendous productive capacity to distribute and consume, and at a time when the church must become extremely conscious of the evils that weaken and destroy our civilization. The Methodist Church, ever conscious of these conditions, speaks convincingly through our Board of Temperance on the problems of Beverage Alcohol, Narcotic Drugs and Gambling.

As we all know, the number one evil in our world today is the Liquor traffic. It breeds crime, destroys lives, breaks up homes, impairs the function of body and mind, slows perception and judgement, deteriorates character and personality. We are Stewards of our bodies, and anything that darkens or destroys human personality is fundamentally opposed to the Gospel of Christ. We are Stewards of our influence upon other people. The use of Alcoholic Beverages violates the Christian principle that we are our Brother's keeper.

The use of Narcotics is becoming more prevalent among our Youth, thus destroying their minds, bodies, and souls. The efficiency with which the Federal and State Narcotic Agents, along with our City and County Police Forces, are apprehending Dope Addicts and Peddlers is to be commended, but we must not become complacent with their efforts alone. We must continue to manifest a Christian compassion, and demand a continuing and intelligent concern if our youth are to be saved.

As Chairman of the Conference Board of Temperance, I attended the South Central Jurisdictional Conference on Christian Social Relations at Mt. Sequoyah last June, and the Inter-Board meeting held at Wesley Methodist Church, Austin, Texas in July.

We wish to express our sincere thanks to the Reverend William Ellison, Jr., Superintendent of the Western District, and to Reverend William J. Washington, for the use of his movie projector in presenting Temperance on the Western District.

Recommendations:

1. That the Conference sponsor and support a Temperance Seminar this conference year at some centralized location in the conference.
2. That each District include Temperance in the program of its District Youth Institute, under direction of the District Director of Temperance.
3. That each District send its Director of Temperance to the Institute on Alcohol Studies, to be held at the University of Texas, June 21-26, 1959.
4. That each local church observe Temperance Sunday and Commitment

Sunday, and that each local church and Pastor cooperate with other

We are gravely concerned over the manner in which so many of our people observe the Sabbath. In spite of the fourth Commandment which charges us to "Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it Holy," far too many Christians use the Sabbath as a day for various forms of recreation. Fishing parties, hunting trips, automobile rides, social events, etc. are deliberately scheduled on Sabbath days. As a result, in many instances church attendance has definitely fallen off, and the effectiveness of the church has been impaired.
"The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath." Man needs the Sabbath. Living in a world fraught with clashing ideaologies, fears, strife, tensions, and evils of all kinds, man sorely needs a day set aside for quiet meditation, prayer, and Spiritual guidance. The Sabbath was made to fill this Special Need of man.

In order that the cause of Spiritual Observance of the Sabbath might be enhanced, we submit the following recommendations:

1. That every local church, through its Commissions on Membership and Evangelism, participate in the "World Wide Church Attendance Movement," and in other Attendance Campaigns of the Methodist Church.
2. That Sabbath Observance be vigorously taught in the Church Schools of every local church.
3. That the several "Special Days," indicated in paragraph 296 of the Disciple of the Church, be conscientiously observed

The period covered by this audit is the time embraced between August 1, 1958 and July 31, 1959, both dates inclusive.

## Income And Disbursements

Income was derived by checking the Conference Treasurer's report from Pastoral Charges and tracing these entries into the bank deposits and bank statements. Test checking was employed. Available cancelled checks were examined with entries in the cash journal in order to support disbursement items of the Conference.

Total receipts from all sources during the period under audit amounted to $\$ 82,883.50$. Total disbursements amounted to $\$ 84,989.76$.

## Balance Sheet

The balance sheet as of July 31, 1959 shows total assets of $\$ 4,748,404.49$. Cash in bank amounting to $\$ 750.00$. Outstanding obligations representing notes payable, adequately secured by Church property, agregating $\$ 217,920.00$ leaves the Conference possessed of a surplus of $\$ 4,530,484.49$; this of course is after due allowance has been made for depreciation of physical assets.

## CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, 1865, by Bishop Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference was held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Conference, held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, President.

The ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper, and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their labors.

This Conference to date has five districts, 109 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz., Huston - Tillotson College, located at Austin, Texas.

## ANNUAL CONFERENCE RULES

## 1. Nominations

The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.
2. Limits

No member of the Conference shall be permitted to serve upon more than two of the major Conference Boards, except where the Discipline shall provide otherwise. Special effort should be made to place every Conference member upon at least one Board. All vacancies occurring on any Board or Committee shall be filled according to the provisions in rule 1.
3. Lay Representation

Lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.
4. Conference Program

A program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a planning Committee made up of the resident bishop, all district Superintendents, the host-Pastor, the chairman of major boards, the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education, the Secretary of the Conference, the President of the WSCS and the Conference Lay Leader.
This committee shall have the responsibility for the planning and printing of the annual Conference Program-to be paid for by the Annual Conference.
5. Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions intended for publication in the conference journal shall be typewritten and submitted in triplicate to the Conference Secretary
6. District Committee Ministerial Qualifications

The district committee on qualifications of local preachers shall consist of five traveling elders in the district.
The names of the District committees will be printed in the Conference Journal.

## 7. Pastors Reporis

All Pastors' reports to the Conference Treasurer and Conference Statistician shall be turned in at least fifteen days before the dates set for the meeting of the Annual Conference.
Additional rules may be added to this list and these present may be amended or deleted by order of the Annual Conference.
(Rules adopted by 79th Conference Session.)
