

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

Daily Proceedings

Conference Minutes
First Day — Wednesday
May 18, 1960

The 86th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference was convened in St. Paul Methodist Church, San Antonio, Texas, Wednesday morning, May 18, 1960, at 9:00 o'clock, Bishop Willis J. King, Resident Bishop of the New Orleans Area, presiding. Opening devotions were conducted by the host pastor, Rev. J. H. Carruthers, and music was furnished by the Senior Choir of the host church.

Holy Communion

The Celebration of the Holy Communion, under leadership of the bishops, district superintendents, and host pastor, highlighted the worship service, which was climaxed by a dynamic sermon delivered by Bishop Odd Hagen of Stockholm, Sweden, guest preacher for the conference week. Bishop Hagen used for his sermon topic, "You Are Not Your Own." Following the sermon, the bishops, assisted by the district superintendents, administered the Holy Communion to approximately 600 communicants. At the close of the service, Bishop King announced a recess period of 15 minutes.

Roll Call

The conference reassembled at 11:00 o'clock. Following the singing of a hymn, Bishop King directed the secretary to call the roll of the conference. By vote of the conference, the names of the members who died during the conference year were read first. Then followed in order the names of the ministerial members, the approved supply pastors, and the retired members. The lay members stood by districts in recognition of their presence.

Organization and General Business

Bishop King called Disciplinary question No. 1: Who are elected for the quadrennium? (Paragraphs 629, 803) Secretary? Statistician? Treasurer? This being the beginning of a new quadrennium, an election was held to fill two of these offices, Secretary and Statistician, the name of the Treasurer to be placed in nomination by the Commission on World Service and Finance, later. By unanimous vote of the conference, T. R. Watkins was elected Secretary of the conference for the quadrennium, and Eric C. Purnell was elected Statistician. The secretary named as assistant secretaries A. S. Pitts, M. C. Stone, and E. J. Tanner. The conference voted approval. The statistician named as assistants, J. B. Richardson and G. J. Goff. The conference voted approval.

Legal Limits — On motion by G. F. Alexander, the Bar of the conference was fixed to include the first four rows of seats across the auditorium of the church.

A motion by E. T. Dixon that the printed conference program be the Official Guide for the conference sessions, carried.

COMMITTEE ON JOURNAL: By vote of the conference, Zan W. Holmes, Sr., J. L. Wattley, and C. H. Johnson, were elected the committee on the Journal.

REPORTER: On a motion by W. J. Washington, Zan W. Holmes, Jr., was elected Reporter to the news papers and other periodicals.

MOTION: A motion by I. B. Loud that the conference send greetings to the Rio Grande Conference in session this week in San Antonio, and to the Lexington Conference, also in session this week, carried.

MOTION: A motion by Dr. W. Astor Kirk that the report of the Board of Education be given at 10:00 o'clock Friday morning instead of at 4:00 o'clock Friday afternoon, carried.

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RESOLUTION: A resolution, proposed by Rev. I. B. Loud, commending President Dwight D. Eisenhower for the stand he took at the recent Summit Conference held in Paris, France, relative to the Powers Case and other matters of U. S. Foreign Policy, received conference endorsement.

Memorial Service

With the Rev. J. B. Richardson presiding, the Memorial Service began with the singing of hymn No. 213, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee". The Scripture lesson, Psalm 23, was read by Rev. S. W. Curtis, who also offered prayer. Following the singing of Hymn No. 242, "He Leadeth Me", the conference stood with bowed heads as the roll of the dead was read as follows, Ministers: J. J. Hardeman, Turner Snow, J. A. Wills. Minister's Widow, Mrs. J. B. Eggliston. The Memorial sermon was delivered by the Rev. S. A. Keesee, who read II Timothy 4: 7-8 for the sermon Text. The Benediction was given by Rev. Keesee.

Afternoon Session First Day — Wednesday, May 18 2:30 O'clock

Afternoon devotions were conducted by the Rev. J. S. C. Grattan. The hymns, Scripture, and prayer, provided a fine spiritual background for the business session that followed.

Conference Business Bishop Willis J. King, Presiding

INTRODUCTIONS: Bishop King introduced to the conference the following: Dr. J. H. Touchstone, Field Director of the General Board of Lay Activities, Dr. L. Scott Allen, Editor of the Central Christian Advocate, and Dr. Roscoe Williams, Minister of the Washington Conference. All brought greetings and made brief remarks. A check for \$1,747.36 from the Methodist Publishing House was presented to the conference by Dr. Allen. Bishop King accepted the check on behalf of the conference.

PASSING OF CHARACTER: By vote of the conference, the character of the district superintendents was passed, unquestioned.

REPORT: District Superintendent's Composite Report: The report was read by the Rev. William Ellison, Jr., Superintendent of the Western District. On motion by Rev. Ellison, seconded by Rev. T. M. Bruton, the report was adopted.

PRESENTATIONS: Bishop King presented the ministers of the conference who had paid off the indebtedness to the Board of Missions during the conference year, and then presented Rev. Prenza L. Woods, Superintendent of the San Antonio district. Rev. Woods gave a brief report on the St. Paul Church project, and then presented a resolution for consideration by the conference to the effect that: The West Texas Conference underwrite a loan from the Board of Missions in the amount of \$45,000.00 for St. Paul Church, San Antonio. (See Resolutions, Conference Journal). Following discussion, a motion by Rev. Woods, and seconded by Rev. T. M. Bruton, that the conference adopt the resolution, carried. The resolution was adopted.

MOTION: A motion by Rev. F. D. Young that the report of the Commission on World Service and Finance be distributed for study by the conference, prevailed.

Anniversary Service Board of Lay Activities

The service opened with the singing of "What A Fellowship". Prayer was offered by C. H. Johnson, Associate Conference Lay Leader, who also presented the speaker of the hour, Dr. J. H. Touchstone, Field Director of the General Board of Lay Activities. In his address, Dr. Touchstone challenged the laity of the conference to greater efforts in all areas of church activities. Adjournment.

Second Day, Thursday, May 19, 1960 Morning Session

The morning devotional was conducted by the Rev. John W. Elliott. Hymns used in the service were, No. 238, "Blessed Assurance", and No. 231, "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour." Scripture was read from Psalm 46. Rev. Elliott offered prayer.

Conference Business Bishop Willis J. King, Presiding

REPORT: COMMITTEE ON JOURNAL: By vote of the conference, the report of the Committee on the Journal was adopted.

PRESENTATION: Bishop King presented Rev. Lavalle Lowe as the Official Representative of the Central Christian Advocate.

REPORT: The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications (Disciplinary Questions 21 through 33): Following introductory remarks by Rev. Ernest T. Dixon, the report was read by Rev. Lavalle Lowe. (See report, Condensed Minutes, Conference Journal). The report was adopted.

MOTION: A motion by Rev. R. S. Mosby that Thanksgiving Sunday be retained as "Golden Cross Sunday", prevailed.

AUTHORIZATION: By vote of the conference, authorization was given for the Ordination of A. M. Mason, elsewhere.

DISCIPLINARY QUESTIONS: With the Committee on Conference Relations reporting, Bishop King called Disciplinary Questions 34 through 46. (See Business of the Annual Conference, Condensed Report, Conference Journal).

PRESENTATION: Bishop King presented G. F. Alexander, C. L. King, and T. J. D. Sims, ministers who received the Retired Relation at this session of the conference. Each made brief remarks, expressing appreciation for the privilege of serving in the West Texas Conference as Ministers of the Gospel. Bishop King presented the Reverends Simon Nieta and P. F. Valdez, Fraternal visitors from the Rio Grande Conference which is in session this week in San Antonio. Greetings and felicitations from their conference were brought by Rev. Nieta.

MOTION: A motion by Rev. E. T. Dixon that the conference send Fraternal representation to the Rio Grande Conference, prevailed. Bishop King appointed Rev. Wm. J. Washington and Rev. E. T. Dixon to represent the West Texas Conference.

REPORT: Rev. William Ellison, Jr. read the report of the Committee on Nominations of the Cabinet for membership of the various conference Boards, Commissions, and Committees. On motion by Rev. I. B. Loud, the report was adopted. (See Quadrennial Boards, Commissions, Committees, Conference Journal).

MOTIONS: On separate motions, the conference voted approval of the approved supply pastors roster submitted by the Board of Ministerial Training, and passed their character, unquestioned.

NOONDAY WORSHIP: Following the singing of Hymn No. 301, "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah", Bishop King presented Bishop Odd Hagen, who delivered the noonday sermon. The Benediction was pronounced by Bishop Hagen.

Afternoon Session 2:30 o'clock Anniversary Service

The Board of Evangelism W. W. Baker, Presiding

The service opened with the singing of Hymn No. 252, "Draw Me Nearer." Rev. W. W. Baker read from the Scriptures, and Rev. Dale H. Hansboro offered prayer. Following the singing of Hymn No. 342, "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind," Rev. Baker presented Rev. L. L. Haynes, who delivered the Anniversary address.

Anniversary Service Ministers Wives and Daughters Association

Devotions for the service were conducted by Mrs. M. T. Reed, and began with the singing of Hymn No. 213, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee." The Scripture lesson was read by Mrs. Reed, and prayer was offered by Mrs. E. L. Spencer.

Mrs. Reed presented Mrs. M. M. Loud, Conference president of the Association, who presided over the business that followed.

MOTION: A motion by Mrs. L. L. Haynes, seconded by Mrs. O. B. Coe, that a Telegram of Sympathy, and a Love Offering ,be sent to Mrs. I. H. Pierce, carried.

REPORT: The report, by districts, of the funds raised for the Reserve Pension Fund were as follows:

Third Day, Friday, May 20, 1960 Morning Session

Devotions opening the morning session were conducted by Rev. Lavalle Lowe, assisted by the Reverends Martin J. Walker and R. W. Johnson. Hymns used in the service were No. 402 and No. 204 (Methodist Hymnal). Scripture was read by Rev. Lowe, prayer was offered by Rev. Johnson.

Conference Business Bishop Willis J. King, Presiding

REPORT: The report of the Committee on Journal was read by Zan W. Holmes, Sr. On motion by Rev. Holmes, the report was adopted.

PASSING OF CHARACTER: By vote of the conference, the character of the members of the conference was passed (by districts) unquestioned, as was that of the ministers in Special Appointments.

PRESENTATION: At the request of Rev. T. M. Bruton, Bishop King presented Mrs. Willis J. King to the conference. Mrs. King, in her usual gracious manner, responded to the hearty applause that greeted her appearance before the conference.

REPORT, THE BOARD OF EDUCATION: Printed copies of the report of the Conference Board of Education were distributed among the members of the conference, after which Dr. W. Astor Kirk, president of the Board, gave a brief summary of the main features in the report. Dr. Kirk presented Dr. John T. King, Conference Director of Christian Higher Education, Rev. William J. Washington, Conference Executive Secretary of Christian Education, Rev. Bob Brannan, Representative, Wesley Foundation, Dr. Ernest T. Dixon, Associate Secretary, General Board of Education, and Dr. J. J. Seabrook, President of Huston-Tillotson College. Each of them gave a brief report of the work in their respective fields. Dr. Kirk then read the recommendations contained in the report of the Board. A discussion of some of the recommendations, followed, after which by vote of the conference, the report was adopted.

Bishop King recessed the conference for a period of fifteen minutes. The conference reassembled following the recess period. Rev. Martin J. Walker led in singing Hymn No. 162, "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing."

CONFERENCE BUSINESS RESUMED. TELEGRAM: A telegram bearing greetings from Bishop E. W. Kelly was read by the secretary. By vote of the conference, the secretary was authorized to send to Bishop Kelly, a telegram of acknowledgement on behalf of the conference.

PRESENTATIONS: Bishop King presented Mrs. I. B. Loud, President of the Conference Ministers Wives and Daughters Association, who in turn, presented Mrs. Odd Hagen, wife of Bishop Odd Hagen, our conference guest preacher. Mrs. Loud then presented the members of the Ministers Wives and Daughters Association. Bishop King commended them for their loyalty, and for the fine work done in raising funds for the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund.

GENERAL CONFERENCE DELEGATES: Next to be presented were the delegates to the recent General Conference, Rev. I. B. Loud, spokesman for the group, after thanking the conference for having honored them by electing them delegates, told of the assignments given each delegate, and expressed the hope that their work was well done.

INTRODUCTION: Bishop King introduced to the conference the Rev. A. R. Nelson, Pastor of Bethel A. M. E. Church, San Antonio. Rev. Nelson, having attended the General Conference of the A. M. E. Church, brought greetings from Bethel and from his General Conference.

NOONDAY WORSHIP: After brief devotions, Bishop King presented Bishop Odd Hagen, who delivered his final sermon of the conference session. Preaching from the Subject, "Seeking and Finding", the bishop warmed the hearts of all that heard him. The benediction followed.

Third Day, Friday, May 20 Afternoon Session

The afternoon session began at 2:45 o'clock with brief devotions conducted by Rev. John Preciphs. Rev. Z. E. King read from the Psalms and offered prayer.

Anniversary Services The Board of Missions The Board of Pensions The Board of Christian Concerns

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS: Rev. J. H. Carruthers, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, presided over the service. He presented Dr. Dennis R. Fletcher, Field Director of the General Board of Missions, Section of Church Extension, who addressed the conference. Others appearing on the program were: Rev. E. C. Purnell, Rev. T. M. Bruton, and Rev. F. D. Young. Rev. Purnell and Rev. Bruton made reports of meetings they attended. Rev. Young gave a summary of the printed report (report having been distributed) of the Board. A motion by Rev. L. L. Haynes that the report be accepted, but that a vote on the recommendations in the report be deferred until the business session of the conference Saturday, prevailed.

BOARD OF PENSIONS: Dr. T. B. Echols, Field Director of the General Board of Pensions, presided, and presented Rev. F. D. Young, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions. Rev. Young gave a history of the "Pension Plan" from the early 1700's to 1960.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS: Rev. L. L. Haynes, Chairman of the former Board of Christian Social and Economic Relations was the presiding officer. Rev. Haynes explained the merger of the Board of Christian Social and Economic Relations, The Board of World Peace, and the Board of Temperance, into one (1) Board, to be known hereafter, as The Board of Christian Social Concerns; that this Board will be composed of three (3) divisions, namely: The Division of Social and Economic Relations, The Division of World Peace, and The Division of Temperance. Under this new setup, Dr. E. T. Dixon presented the report of the Division of Social and Economic Relations, Mrs. O. B. Coe, World Peace, and Rev. M. T. Reed, Temperance. (See Reports). Rev. Haynes pronounced the Benediction.

Fourth Day, Saturday, May 21, 1960 Morning Session

The Saturday morning session began at 9:00 o'clock, Bishop Willis J. King, presiding. Morning devotions were conducted by Rev. E. L. Spencer, assisted by Rev. J. H. Marshall, read from the Scriptures and offered prayer. Hymns used in the service were Nos. 315, 249, and 145 (Methodist Hymnal).

Conference Business

Bishop King, after making brief, general remarks, called for the report of the Committee on the Journal. Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr. made the report and moved its adoption. The report was adopted.

REPORTS:

STATISTICIAN: The report was presented by Rev. Eric C. Purnell. On a motion by Rev. Purnell, the report was adopted. (See Reports).

TREASURER: The report was presented by Rev. I. B. Loud. By vote of the conference, the report was adopted. (See Reports).

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE: The report was presented by Rev. S. A. Keesee. A discussion of the budget portion of the report revealed that certain items in the budget should be increased. By permission of Bishop King, time was allowed for adjustments. Following the necessary adjustments, a motion by Rev. I. B. Loud that the report be adopted, prevailed. (See Report).

DISCIPLINARY QUESTION: Bishop King called Disciplinary Question No. 48: Where shall the next conference session be held? Rev. O. B. Coe invited the conference to hold its next session in Wesley Methodist Church, Austin, Texas. By vote of the conference, the invitation was graciously accepted.

ELECTION, TREASURER: On nomination by the Commission on World Service and Finance and by vote of the Conference, Rev. I. B. Loud was elected Treasurer of the West Texas Conference for the quadrennium.

RECOMMENDATIONS: Rev. F. D. Young presented the recommendations in the report of the Conference Missionary Secretary. Following the deletion of recommendation No. 8, the conference voted adoption of the report. (See Report).

REPORT: CONFERENCE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE: The printed report of the Society having been distributed previously, Mrs. O. B. Coe commented on the report, and moved its adoption. The conference voted adoption.

CONFERENCES ON HUMAN RELATIONS: Rev. Ernest T. Dixon distributed printed sheets with detailed information relative to the series of Conferences on Human Relations to be held in the San Antonio area, October 31 through November 9. He strongly urged persons living in the vicinity where a given meeting is held, to attend.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS: Rev. L. L. Haynes submitted the nominations of the Board of Christian Social Concerns for officers and members of the Board. By vote of the conference, the nominations were approved. (See Conference Journal).

REPORT: The Board of Pensions. Rev. M. A. Freeman presented the report of the Board of Pensions, and moved its adoption. The report was adopted.

MOTION: A motion by Rev. F. D. Young that all pastors who failed to report the full amount apportioned to their respective charge, be required to raise and report the balance within sixty days, was lost. A substitute motion by Rev. L. L. Haynes that a Special Roll Call for Conference Claimants be held at the next session of the Annual Conference, prevailed.

REPRESENTATIVES APPOINTED: With the consent of the conference, Bishop King appointed Rev. J. H. Carruthers and C. H. Johnson to represent the West Texas Conference at the Area Council Board of Mission meeting.

MOTION ON ADJOURNMENT: A motion by Rev. M. A. Freeman, seconded by Rev. F. D. Young, that following the reading of the appointments on Sunday, May 22, the 86th session of the West Texas Annual Conference be adjourned, Sine Die, carried.

REPORT: The Board of Lay Activities. The report was read by Odie E. Davis, Conference Lay Leader. Following the suggestion by the conference that recommendations in the report be referred to the Committee on Entertainment, the report was adopted. The conference also approved the nominations of the Board of Odie E. Davis for Conference Lay Leader, and C. H. Johnson for Associate Lay Leader.

REPORT ADOPTED: On motion by Rev. M. T. Reed, the report of the Board of Temperance, (presented on Friday) was adopted.

VACANCY FILLED: On nomination by Rev. I. B. Loud, C. G. Smith was elected to fill a vacancy on the Gulf Side Committee.

PRESENTATION: Rev. Wm. J. Washington presented the Conference Youth Group in attendance at this session. Bishop King expressed gratification for the large number in attendance, and lifted up the importance of youth in the program of the Methodist Church.

TELEGRAM: At the request of Bishop King, the secretary read a telegram bearing greetings from Bishop Matthew W. Clair.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Necessary announcements were made. Following the singing of Hymn No. 278, "Lead On, O King Eternal", Rev. L. L. Haynes gave the closing prayer, and the benediction.

Closing Session West Texas Annual Conference Fifth Day, Sunday, May 22, 1960

In order to accommodate the unusually large attendance, the closing session of the 86th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference was held in the Library Auditorium. At 9:00 o'clock A.M., a "Model Sunday School" was conducted, with Rev. Marcus A. Freeman in charge.

REPORT NUMBER 1

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

To Bishop Willis J. King and Members of The West Texas Annual Conference:

Happily do we state that this has been one of the best years in the history of our great conference. Reports from the several districts will show achievements in the areas of Evangelism, Stewardship, Missions, and Education.

We are deeply grateful to Bishop King for the outstanding leadership he has given, for his sympathetic understanding of our problems, and for the constant source of inspiration he has been for us at all times. It has been a real joy and a high privilege for each of your superintendents to have worked with you during these years as our Episcopal Leader.

It has been our responsibility to lead the local churches through the pastors into the connection as informed and active components of a world-wide fellowship of Christian worship and Christian service. At the district level, the concern for the connectional character has like-wise been expressed. We are conscious of the mistakes we have made, but we are likewise appreciative, not only of the greatness of the art and the authority of our leader imposed from without, but of the flame kindled within by the Divine Spirit of God Almighty.

Indeed, we are neither unmindful of the loyal and devoted pastors who have done much to make our conference what it is today, nor the consecrated work of our wonderful laymen who have contributed much to make this report possible. We owe each of you a debt of gratitude; and so we say, "THANK YOU."

At this hour we give an account of our stewardship, fully aware of the fact that the church amid insidious ideaologies, bigotry, tension, and hatred on a world-wide scale, not only must hold her own, but must go forward in the strength of God. The great challenge of the hour is spoken in the Gospel of Matthew 28:19-20 — "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." Austin - Victoria District: Robert S. Mosby, Superintendent

We have been given another year in which to serve. We are conscious of our failures. We are humbly grateful for whatever degree of success we might claim.

The askings of the General Church, the Conference, and the District have been presented and emphasized. Higher Education and the Pension needs have been a definite part of our program presentation. The responses by the Pastors and local congregations have, for the most part, been worthy. In SPECIAL MENTION let me call attention to the paying off the debt at Simpson. Reverend Freeman and his people have wrought well. Reverend Richardson and the good folks at Lockhart have renovated the church, and we have here a lovely plant worthy of our place in this city. Reverend Majors has done a great work at Port Lavaca. He has given us a good parsonage and a happy relationship in this coastal city. Reverend Dunn and the officers of First Methodist Church have done us good service in helping to make the parsonage and furnishings possible. We are grateful and happy to make this acknowledgement.

Dallas District: T. Madison Bruton, Superintendent

The immediate and general needs of the churches on the Dallas District have been presented with clarity and interest. The General Benevolences, as well as those of the Conference, have been held up at each Quarterly Conference. An increased interest in Evangelism has claimed many of the congregations of the Dallas District; and many have been brought to Christ. In churches where revivals have been held, the memberships have greatly revived.

The obligations of the churches to local creditors have been met with a minimum of accuracy. Most of the churches on the Dallas District have been able to keep current with their obligations. The Pastors, for the most part, are happy in their work, and in most instances the members have asked their return. We do have two or three churches that are struggling with poorly spaced obligations (monthly payments too large), but we are at this time working on plans to reduce these strained situations. Most of the Pastors will show more increase in their Benevolence giving for the year, as their reports will tell. For the most part the churches have done well.

San Antonio District: Prenza L. S. Woods, Superintendent

At the conclusion of this Annual Conference Session the Superintendent of the San Antonio District ends his term of office. A sincere appreciation is expressed to the Annual Conference for the opportunity to have served in this capacity — and to the ministers and laymen with whom he has

worked for their loyalty and support. It has been a matchless experience in personal growth; and the status of the District has progressed in a very fine way.

Much attention has been devoted to Church Building and Improvement. As a result, the following churches have been constructed:

The seat of this Annual Conference is St. Paul Church, San Antonio. The beauty and adequacy of its building program is evident, and it stands as the best appointed and most functional church plant in the entire Central Jurisdiction. Downs Memorial was organized in 1958; and we are happy to present to the West Texas Conference this new congregation and church. It is located in a rapidly growing community, and in a short time will be one of the strong churches of our Conference.

Notable building improvements have taken place in Pleasanton, Beeville, and Seguin. An addition was made to our church in Pleasanton; Beeville has completely remodeled the church; and Wesley Chapel Church, Seguin, has been completely refurnished and decorated. Plans are practically perfected for the rebuilding of Jones Chapel, San Antonio; the relocation and rebuilding of St. Paul, Harlingen; and for improvements to Ellison-Eads Church, San Antonio.

Three major debts with the Board of Missions and Church Extension have been cleared — Jones Chapel, Scotts Chapel, and Wesley Chapel. There is at this time, only one debt with the Board of Missions and Church Extension on the San Antonio District, and it is being taken care of in a very fine way.

Annual Conference budget and obligations are of no little concern to the San Antonio District. Each year the district has turned in an excellent report on Benevolences and other Conference obligations. Ministerial support is at an all time high of \$47,580. We want it known that credit for this progress and other advances too numerous to mention go to the Ministers who have so effectively led their congregations, and to the laymen who have so willingly followed good leadership. With another note of grateful appreciation we say, "All Hail the power of Jesus' name."

Waco District: C. D. Owens, Superintendent

The Pastors and Laymen who make up the Waco District have been loyal and dedicated to the cause of Christ and His church. We continue to make progress in the field of building and Church Extension. We are very proud of the ultra-modern tile edifice at Port Sullivan, on the Maysfield Ct.; the pastor, Rev. I. C. Greer; and the very generous people of that community, including the Board of Missions which is due much credit for this attractive building. Several congregations across the district are either remodeling or ready to begin. Beth Jones in Waco and St. James in Temple believe they will be able to report new churches during the Conference year. We are working to purchase ground for the purpose of building and creating a new congregation in River Oaks — a new addition in Waco.

We are also proud to report that the last indebtedness to the Board of Missions on the Waco District has been paid. Rev. S. M. Cleaver and his enthusiastic congregation at Mt. Zion, Waco, give to the conference a debt-free church. Evangelism has taken on added interest. In this year of Total Enlistment, several charges report encouraging increases in membership. We have not been unmindful of the importance of the World Service, Conference Benevolence, Advance, and Higher Education Programs. All have been given careful attention. This has been a good year for the Waco District; and with thanks we sing praises to Him from Whom all blessings flow.

Western District: William Ellison, Jr., Superintendent

This has been a remarkable year for the Western District in that our World Service and Conference Benevolences have been paid in full. Again we thank our own Bishop Willis J. King for taking time out from a very busy schedule in 1958 for his visit to the district, in order to get first hand information regarding the possibilities the West affords, and to study the work of this Missionary District. Without doubt, this visit made for the church many lasting and endearing friends.

Page forty-one (41) of the current Journal clearly states: "The Western District is the Missionary Extension District of the conference and is entitled to the Conference Board of Mission Subsidy Funds, Maintenance Funds, and Advance Funds". We have been complimented by these beautiful words and the approval of the Advance Committee. With population shifting north and west caused by governmental reclamation, defense activities, and renewal programs replacing slum areas, and school construction, the urgency for appropriation of these funds was never more needed than today. We realize how vicious certain kinds of competition can become. We also realize the fact that churches of other faiths are building and remodeling all about and around us, keeping pace with the population. A program of extension, and salaries for pastors become most obvious. For example:

(1) Historic Myrtle Avenue at El Paso and Hollowell at Midland, with the Reverends I. C. Loud and M. C. Stone respectively as pastors, have surveyed their areas and are in need of support.

(2) Odessa, a congregation laboring under a tremendous debt on the

church and parsonage, needs some encouragement.

- (3) Lampasas lost its church, parsonage, and \$300 worth of new lumber in the flood of May, 1957. Today there is a beautiful church and a new fellowship hall. This church is on the Extension list.
- (4) St. Luke, with Rev. M. T. Reed, Pastor, at Levelland a town of 15,000 people with approximately 1200 Negroes, 32 miles west of Lubbock is a conditional gift from the First Methodist Church. Today, we are the recipients of a neat four-room parsonage with all fixtures installed at a cost of \$2400. This gift from the First Methodist Church was in agreement that we would match them dollar for dollar up to \$1000. Brothers of the Conference, this is a good investment and well worth what is being asked from the Conference. It is our hope that we shall receive at this Conference sufficient funds to take care of our end of the bargain.
- (5) At O'Donnell, a little town of some 1400 people, located between Lubbock and Big Spring, a survey has been made. The First Methodist Church has developed a strategy for the support of this new project. A building has been leased, seats have been installed, and in December, 1959, it was our pleasure to hold service there. Since then, we have kept the work alive through the efforts of Brother J. H. Hudson. There are other places too numerous to mention at this time. Here is where we meet th real test of Dynamic Discipleship.

We are happy to state that Brother E. H. Carter and the members at Abilene have retired the debt with the Board of Missions and Church Extension. Appropriate dedicatory services were held in February, 1960. Brother A. P. Porter and his congregation at Llano - Mason keep busy doing necessary repairs and improvements on this charge. They have bought sufficient paint and other materials to make both the church and parsonage more attractive.

Our hearts were saddened during the passing of Brother John A. Wills who had served our church at Amarillo for eleven years. We express our deepest sympathy to the bereaved family. Brother E. L. Spencer, who was appointed to Amarillo by Bishop King, August, 1959, to succeed Brother Wills, is doing a wonderful job. This is the only church with an outstanding debt with the Board of Missions. Within the next few months, this church will be debt free.

District Parsonage

During the Conference year 1959-1960, the pastors and members addressed themselves to the task of raising funds to purchase a lot and to build a district parsonage. The response has been most gratifying. We have bought and paid for a beautiful lot 50x150 on a paved street in San Angelo, at a cost of approximately \$1000. The pastors, members, the District Board of Trustees, and the Woman's Society of Christian Service, both local and district, are to be commended for a job well done. In the very near future we are hoping to build a beautiful parsonage which will be a credit to the District and to the West Texas Conference.

The Year Ahead

We wish it were possible for us to mention all worthy causes which claim our attention. REPORT OF THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Preface

Bishop King, members and friends of this Eighty-Sixth session of the West Texas Conference, greetings.

The following report by our executive secretary gives a rather adequate account of the concerns and work of the Board of Education during the past Conference year. On September 15,, 1959, a joint meeting of the Board and the conference and district staffs was held at Huston - Tillotson College. In the interest of economy, the Board did not hold a mid-year meeting. Instead, the Executive Committee of the Board met at Huston - Tillotson College on January 14, 1960 to review the work of the Board, and to make further plans for the balance of the conference year.

The swift progress of Christian education during recent years has affected the whole life of the Church. The changes that have taken place call for a new understanding of Christian education. The teaching ministry is such a vital part of the overall program of a local church that trustees, stewards, building committees, and parents, as well as church school teachers, pastors, and commissions on education, need a broad understanding of its philosophy, theology, and methodology.

During the past conference year the Board has endeavored to provide experiences for leaders and workers in our local churches that will enable them more effeciently and effectively to discharge their great responsibilities. We fondly express our thanks to all who have worked in many ways to support and strengthen the work of the Board. Especially do we here acknowledge the fine leadership rendered by our Executive Secretary.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE

May 20, 1960

Introduction

The beginning of this sixth annual report to the West Texas Conference Board of Education, and subsequently to the Eighty-sixth annual session of the West Texas Conference, finds me deeply aware of the unstinted support which has been received continuously from many sources; all of which have been exceedingly necessary in making the following report possible.

Suffice it for me to here indicate specifically a few sources of ardent support. The General Board of Education, Division of the Local Church, has continued to be a source to whom we in the West Texas Conference have been able to look for guidance and support, both with personnel and finance. The district superintendents and their staffs in Christian education have labored at the tap roots in providing experiences of training and fellowship for that host of faithful workers in the 137 local church school organizations within the West Texas Conference. Of course, the work of the conference board of education is really done by the staunch members of the board and their conference staff workers. The labors of their executive secretary would be simply nil were it not for the thorough planning by the board, and the untiring support and sacrifices made by the conference staff workers.

To each of these persons and groups I am personally grateful for their efforts and concerns in the tasks of Christian education. Together we have sought earnestly to create a wholesome atmosphere for and make plain to all with whom we have worked that the Christian way of life is a growing process toward Christian maturity. Following the moral of the parable of the mustard seed, the Kingdom of God is embedded in our lives by God with the capacity for becoming an actual possession in its fullness through

a continual process of nurture and growth. Through a well developed program of Christian education within each local congregation, and through God's grace, this goal can be realized for each individual.

In order that the reader of this report might fully understand intelligently, it will be necessary to accept the fact that this is largely a "personal evaluation and interpretation" of the activities and concerns of the board during this past conference year. The latter part of the report will set forth some of the proposed activities an dinterest that the board will undertake during this next year and quadrennium. Notwithstanding, however, there will be much datum that will be of concern and interest to the reader.

Report

Taking a look at the vital statistics as reported in our current conference Journal we are faced with some facts that leave us somewhat perplexed. For instance, we will notice that we had an increase in total church school membership of 222, or 2.49% over that of last year (8,910).* There were increases in the total enrollments in the Children's Division (75, or 2.99%) and in the Youth Division (684, or 37.31%). There was a substantial increase in the overall rverage of 1433, or 31.21%, over that of last year. But to look at the picture, whole, as we must do, we will see a sizable decrease in the number of church schools organized within the conference (-5.51%)as over that of last year. While there were 161 members received into the conference from the preparatory membership and on profession of faith which represented an increase of 46.53% over that of last year, there was no increase over that of last year in the number joining the church from the church school. This simply reveals that we are somewhat standing still. There was an alarming loss in the number of pupils attending the Vacation Church Schools in our local churches.

These are a few of the reasons that the statement is made that when we take a look at the vital statistics of our church school work we are left a bit perplexed. Be assured, however, that all is not gloom; there are many areas inwhich phenomenal strides and successes have been made. In a report of this nature you would like the bitter along with the sweet. The balance of this report will be an endeavor to delineate and make plain some of the facts that are revealed in the chart of the next page.

Children's Work

More than ever before the churches of the conference are seeking to improve the quality of educational programs offered to their children. The fact of the importance of a genuinely solid foundation for each child seemingly has been realized. It is so very vital that children be given proper experiences in the type of wholesome atmosphere where their attitudes and concepts may be brought into line with those which we know to be conducive to the full and abundant life in Christ.

The Conference Director of Children's Work, Mrs. P. L. Woods, has been very zealous in lending guidance and structure to the work in this area. She has had a very active group of district directors who have gone into the local churches to work with the workers with children. The district directors for this year (Mrs. C. C. Russeau, Dallas District; Mrs. H. N. Hammons, Austin-Victoria District; Mrs. Dorothy Fowler, Western District; and Mrs. S. M. Cleaver, Waco District) have attended sub district, district, and conference meetings for training. Many of them worked in leadership schools with the workers with children from their local churches within the districts. The realization of the importance of good teaching methods along with the use of proper and adequate materials has been part of the outgrowth of the laborers of these faithful and dedicated workers.

We have reason to believe that there were more than fifteen Vacation Church Schools held during this past Summer within the conference. However, they cannot be reported here until we have received such reports from the local churches.

On February 20, 1960, 22 persons from the West Texas Conference went to Bryan, Texas to participate in the second bi-conference Vacation Church School Training session with workers from the Texas Conference. Subsequent to this meeting six training sessions have been held within three of our five districts for workers in the VCS for this Summer.

Through the cooperation of the Division of National Missions, we will have an extension worker within the conference this Summer to assist with conducting vacation church schools in some of the smaller churches. The worker, Miss Vernell Freeman, is a student at Huston-Tillotson College.

The recommended texts and themes for this year:

Youth Work

Much of the time of the executive secretary has been spent working in the area of youth work. There have been many activities beyond the local church that are worthy of note. First, the conference Board of education named the Reverend John W. Elliott, Sr., as Conference Director of Youth Work in the absence of its former director, The Reverend A. Cecil Williams, who is attending school. Mr. Elliott attended the Seminar for new conference directors of youth work in Nashville, Tennessee in January and has since begun to lend real leadership to the conference in this area.

Three of the districts in the conference have very active subdistrict MYF groups established and working. These groups have enhanced greatly the memberships of the local participating churches because of the deepened interest that has been created. It is encouraging to note that the vitality of many of the local MYF groups has been positively increased this year. This, of course, has been seen in the increased number (684) in the Youth Division of our church schools.

The District Directors of Youth Work (Reverend E. C. Purnell, Austin-Victoria District; Mrs. L. V. Collins, San Antonio District; Reverend G. J. Goff, Waco District; and Reverend M. C. Stone, Western District) have been largely responsible for the phenomenal growth that has taken place. These persons have "gone beyond the call of duty" in working with the youth and their adult counselors. Each district had a youth institute this past Summer of unusual quality. Each of the institutes had a very good attendance; the Western Distirtc had the first accredited institute that we've had within the conference in a goodly number of years. The youth throughout the conference have been loud in their expressions of appreciation for the quality of the institutes held.

This year, as usual, the deans and district directors met for a planning session on the Summer youth institutes. Miss Ruth Emory, General Board of Education, Division of the Local Church, Youth Department, met with this group of deans and district directors in Fort Worth in February. Another meeting was called with this group and youth representatives for further planning in Austin, Texas on April 9.

This year the conference MYF President, Mr. Tommy Smith, and Vice President, Miss Zona G. Perrett, along with two district presidents, Mr. Anthony Owens (Waco) and Miss Thelma J. Miller (San Antonio) went to the annual Southcentral Jurisdictional MYF Workshop at Mt. Sequoyah. They were carried to the workshop by the Reverend J. S. C. Grattan. The conference has received some excellent leadership from these youth since their training experience.

Th one activity which has received a great deal of interest and attention is the forth-coming New Orleans Area MYF Convocation that is to be held at Huston-Tillotson College, August 2-6, 1960. The West Texas Conference will serve as host to this conference and the youth are accepting their responsibilities in a very commendable way.

The youth of the Western District were represented again this year to the Northwest Texas Conference Youth Assembly, McMurry College, Abilene, Texas. Mr. Luther Henry, a pre-seminary student at Huston-Tillotson College, has received a scholarship from the youth of this conference.

Youth Day at the Annual Conference is an activity which always draws good and substantial support from the youth of the conference. At Dallas this past year there were 223 youth attending the activities of the day. This year it is anticipated that we shall have a good representative group.

Student Work

There are approximately 130 students enrolled at Huston-Tillotson College from the churches of the West Texas Conference. We are proud of the type of activities that are available for these youth to further them in their Christian growth and development. The Reverend W. H. Willis,

Chaplain, has done a remarkable work in winning the unequalled confidence of the faculty and the student body.

Members of our conference board of education have continued to work with members of the Texas Conference board of education and the Texas Methodist Student Movement office in developing plans for a stronger Methodist witness on the campuses of Prairie View A&M College and Texas Southern University. The extent of our labors this year have led us into the establishing of two groups of directors who will assume the responsibility for the developing of plans for program — and ultimately a personnel director for the program.

Presently, the Reverend Willie B. Randolph, Navasota, has the assumed voluntary responsibility for the work at Prairie View, and the Reverend Robert E. Hayes has the assumed voluntary responsibility for the work at Texas Southern University.

This, perhaps, represents one of the most potent frontiers that we have before us as a conference board of education . . . rendering an adequate ministry to our youth who attend our state supported institutions of higher education.

This section of the report should not close without offering recognition to the State Director, the Reverend Robert Breihan, for his astute leadership and agile concern for the work on these campuses.

Recipients of the National Methodist Scholarship awards at Huston-Tillotson College for the school term 1959-1960 are: Earnestine Davis, Dallas; Linda L. Ford, Altair; Faye J. Jennings, Victoria; and Alfred Marshall, El Campo. We could have more of our students receiving from this fund if we would moke our offerings on June 12, Methodist Student Day, larger.

Adult Work

Young Adult Work

All work done in the area of adult work beyond the local church, excluding leadership training, has been done in the area of young adult work. By far, the most significant activity in this area has been the consumation of the plans to send a representative to the Mission Field in Bolivia. Plans have been in the making since 1956 to cooperatively work with the Rio Grande and the Southwest Texas Conference young adults in sending a team to the mission field to observe the work of the Methodist Church there. This past year the area which was decided upon was Bolivia. The plans further callde for just one person from each conference to make up the team. April 4, 1960 the team left Dallas, Texas for Bolivia and returned April 27.

Mr. Burnham A. Robinson, St. Andrew's Church, Fort Worth, Texas was the representative from the West Texas Conference. Mr. Robinson is available to the local churches of the conference upon request. His address is 1109 East Terrell Street, Fort Worth, Texas. The local church will be responsible only for Mr. Robinson's travel expense and entertainment. He would be happy to render a message of report to your local church.

The following churches and groups participated in this project by contributing funds. St. Andrews, Fort Worth, \$100; Warren, Dallas, \$100; Wesley, Austin, \$65; St. Peters, Austin, \$14; Hamilton Park, Dallas, \$25; Austin-Victoria District W.S.C.S., \$31.

Adult Work

Most of the churches within the conference that have an organized church school have at least one class for its adults. We could possibly feel some sense of accomplishment in this fact were it not for the fact that we are able to see some very noticable decreases in the Adult Home Members (-85) and also in the Adult membership (-70). The minimum goal toward which we are seeking for the Adult membership in our church schools is to equal that of our church membership. Presently, there are 18,902 members in the West Texas Conference and only 9,132 church school members, or far less than half of the church members (most of whom are adults) are members of our church schools (most of whom are children, not yet members of the church, and youth.)

General Church School Work

The end of all that is done by this conference board is intended to rest and find benefit in the local church school. We would be exceedingly disheartened to know that literally hundreds of persons in local churches were not measurably aided by our efforts. Much has been done specifically for those who have administrative responsibilities in the church school. The most notable was the conducting of a series of Church School Administrators' Conferences that were held October 5-10, 1959 within each of the districts of the conference. The Reverend E. T. Dixon, Jr., General Board of Education, Division of the Local Church, Department of General Church School Work, assisted the executive secretary and members of district staff teams in conducting six institutes where a total of 223 persons registered.

There are many areas that we are interested in improving the work that is now being done. Of the 156 preaching places in the conference there are only 137 church schools organized. A church school CAN be organized in every local church, regardless of its size and membership. We are happy with the reported increase in purchases of church school materials; this is a very essential tool in assisting teachers do the type of work that is justly expected of them.

One encouraging factor that has been discovered is that more of our church schools are giving serious attention to the keeping of records on the standard and approved church school record systems. We hope that more of our schools will adopt this policy.

The Sunday Evening Fellowship is being used in many of our local churches as an opportunity for additional teaching. This observance has lent itself to the increase in attendance to the evening worship services. We would commend churches like Hamilton Park of Dallas, St. Paul of Dallas, and Simpson of Austin, and many others who are finding great pleasure and success in the Sunday Evening Fellowship.

Leadership Education

Technically, three-fourths of all that we do in Christian education from the conference level can fall under the label of leadership training. However, it is well understood that here we are reporting on those Christian Workers' Schools and other enterprises that have been held expressively for training.

The Area Leadership School, July 6-11, held at Gulfside was attended by eleven persons from the West Texas Conference. Seven were from the Dallas District, two from the Western District, and two were from the Austin-Victorai District. These persons represented conference and district workers.

The number of Christian Workers' Schools held this year were at an all time low. There were only two certified Second Series schools, held in Dallas and San Antonio, respectively, and three certified First Series schools held at Corpus Christi, Columbus, and Lubbock, respectively. There were many one and two evening Workers' Conferences held by the executive secretary throughout the conference. Both of the Second Series schools were held cooperatively with churches of the South Central Jurisdiction. This represents a positive trend within our conference.

We would truly hope that more of our local commissions on education would investigate this service from the conference board of education. We definitely feel that it is only through a well trained staff of workers that we will begin to approach the quality of educational experience in our local churches that is desired.

Church Music

There are two Certified Ministers' of Music within the West Texas Conference. They are MRS. MARCET H. KING and MR. N. G. WILLIAMS. Applications are now being processed for Mr. Dillard Warner and Mrs. Susie E. Powell. The West Texas Conference Board of Education is seeking earnestly to provide a fellowship for its musicians wherein they will become better servants in rendering the music for our worship services. Many

persons from our conference attended the National meeting of Methodist Musicians that was held in Dallas, Texas July 13-17. Many will be attending the South Central Regional Choir Workshop at Mt. Sequoyah July 4-9, 1960.

- 1. That the West Texas Annual Conference ratify the proposed constitution for the "Committee for Ecumenical Campus Christian Life in Texas."
- 2. That in accordance with the legislation of the 1960 General Conference (**Daily** Christian Advocate, Vol. VI, No. 8, pp. 367-368), the West Texas Annual Conference approve the establishment of a Commission on Higher Education to promote the cause of Christian higher education within the conference during the 1960-64 Quadrennium.
- 3. That the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to continue during the 1960-64 Quadrennium its present policy of giving priority status (a) to the salary, rent allowance and travel items in the budget of the Board of Education, and (b) to the item labeled "Promotions" in the askings listed under the Commission on Higher Education.
- 4. That the offering received in each local church for Christian education on Church School Rally Day be remitted immediately to the treasurer of the Board of Education on forms provided by the board, and that a duplicate copy of the report be forwarded to the Executive Secretary of the board.
- 5. That the Commission on Higher Education shall promote a conference program designed to encourage an offering of at least \$1.30 per member in each local church for Huston-Tillotson College and the Wesley Foundations related to the conference through the Board of Education. Such offering shall be taken on the second Sunday in February of each year, and shall be remitted to the treasurer of the Board of Education on forms provided by the Commission on Higher Education, a duplicate copy of which report shall be forwarded to the chairman of the commission.

REPORT NUMBER 3

CONFERENCE REPORT OF THE WEST TEXAS COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

TO: Bishop Willis J. King and Members of the 86th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference, The Methodist Church.

Huston-Tillotson Colleges was a novel idea. The histories of Samuel Huston and Tillotson Colleges were full of remarkable accomplishments. What a wonderful contribution they have made throughout the world in spite of so many difficulties. How much greater their christian influence might have been had the two church bodies sponsoring them launched Quadrennial Emphases on Christian Higher Education from time to time. How much greater their Christian influence might have been if more people had understood their importance and had given them proper support. This can be said of many of our church-related colleges. Many people forget how necessary these institutions are in providing the essential Christian leadership for the church and society. The way we support our colleges largely determines their effectiveness.

This has been a successful Quadrennium for your Conference Commission. Each year reports have been made stating results obtained and goals projected. Most of these goals have been rached. This success was realized because the men and women of the conference, under the dynamic leadership of Bishop Willis J. King, his excellent cabinet of District Superintendents, and the very fine ministers in the local churches, accepted the challenge given them by the 1956 General Conference.

The decade of the 1960's presents the Church with a new challenge in Higher Education. It is predicted that higher education which cost \$3,600,000,000 in 1959 will cost almost \$10,000,000,000 in 1969, and that college enrollments will reach 6,000,000 - 7,000,000 by 1970. Private and church-related colleges are expected to enroll about 45 per cent of these students and the cost of four years of college for the student will rise from the present \$6,000 - \$10,000 to a likely \$9,000 - \$15,000. Scholarship, government loans, bank loans, and student self-help plans will have to be expanded. Faculty salaries must be increased in order to compete with government and industry for qualified personnel. New buildings must be built and present buildings renovated. These are just a few of the problems which the Church and its colleges must face in the 1960's. We of the West Texas Conference must share in these problems.

The 1960 General Conference, realizing the need for a continuing emphasis on higher education, strongly recommended a continuance of efforts to raise annually \$1.00 for colleges and \$.30 for Wesley Foundations. The entire responsibility for higher education was given to the Division of Higher Education of the General Board of Education. Each annual conference is required to have a Committee on Higher Education as a part of its Board of Education, but may, at its discretion, enlarge this committee into a Commission similar to the one operating during 1956-1960. It is the sincere desire of your Commission that the Conference authorize its continuance during 1960-1964 so that this most important work can be further projected.

Your Commission reminds the Conference of another challenge to us all — the challenge of a chapel at Huston-Tillotson College. This is a vital need in the life of our College. When the call is made for support of this project it is our sincere hope that the entire conference will rally to the call. For, after all, a chapel is "Of no Small Importance."

As the final curtain is lowered on this quadrennium, the Commission wants to express its appreciation to all for the splendid, and many times sacrificial efforts that have been made in the interest of this cause. The Commission is indebted to Bishop King and is most grateful to him for the encouragement and guidance he has given. Without his support the job could not have been done. It expresses thanks also to all of the ministers of the Conference and to the district superintendents for their support and cooperation. A special word of thanks is extended to President J. J. Seabrook and the College for assistance and encouragement during these four years. Lastly, the men and women in the pews are to be congratulated for their kind acceptance and generous support of the Quadrennial Emphasis On Christian Higher Education.

REPORT NUMBER 4

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE 1960 - 1961

Bishop King and members of the West Texas Annual Conference:

We, your commission on World Service and Finance have made a careful study of all Benevolent and Service causes claiming the attention of our Conference and have used every precaution to see that no cause, board, or commission be neglected. We are also mindful of the present economic status of our people and their willingness to share their material possessions, that the Kingdom of God may be realized in our day; we feel that our budget is reasonable and therefore submit the following report for your action and determination.

Christian Higher Education Huston - Tillotson College and Wesley Foundations

The 1960 General Conference provided that the responsibility of the Commission on Higher Education in the Annual Conference shall be assigned to the Conference Board of Education and that the Program of Christian Higher Education shall be given accelerated emphasis.

The members of the West Texas Conference are requested to contribute a minimum of \$1.00 per year for Huston-Tillotson College, and 30¢ per member for Wesley Foundations.

Many of our members can and will give more to this all important cause, we are including in our Total Conference Budget a minimum amount of \$20,000 for Christian Higher Education. Each Charge in the Conference is apportioned a minimum goal. Let us keep the Christian Higher Education Emphasis before our people at all times, giving them an opportunity to make regular contributions to this cause. Let us also request the Organizations of the Churches to make contributions to this cause.

Special Emphasis should be placed upon Christian Higher Education on Race Relation Day.

Money collected in the churches for Christian Higher Education shall be sent immediately to the Conference Treasurer by Cashier Check, Money Order, or Certified Check, clearly designated for Christian Higher Education.

The Conference Treasurer shall immediately remit all funds received for Christian Higher Education to the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education.

Please Note: There is an amount of \$500.00 included in the \$20,000 apportionment for Travel and Promotional expense of the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education. This \$500.00 represents the maximum amount to be used by the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education for Travel and Promotional this Conference year.

Special Days

Special Information

The Commission on World Service and Finance shall make the apportionments for World Service, Conference Benevolence and all other Conference Askings directly to the Charges of the Conference. Par. 796.

The Charges of the Conference shall pay World Service, Conference Benevolence and all other Conference Askings by Certified Check, Cashier Check or Money Orders. All such checks and Money Orders shall be made to the Annual Conference Treasurer. Money Collected on the World Service and Conference Benevolence Budgets shall be remitted to the Conference Treasurer monthly by local Charge Treasurers.

The above rules concerning Annual Conference Finances do not apply to the District Superintendent Fund. The District Superintendents will give direction concerning this item.

Advance Funds

The West Texas Conference Advance Specials are to be administered by the Conference Board of Missions. The total Advance Goal for the West Texas Conference Year is \$2,000.

We recommend that the District Board of Stewards of the Several Districts of the Conference shall set the District Superintendents' Salaries at 16% of the combined Pastor's and Associate Pastor's estimated salaries. The Western District is the Missionary Extension District of the Con-

ference, and is Entitled to Board of Mission Subsidy Fund, Maintenance Funds and Advance Funds. An amount of \$2,500.00 is included in the Conference Budget of the Conference Board of Missions to subsidize the District Superintendent's Salary on the Western District.

The Waco District

The Waco District is largely composed of Rural Circuits; Therefore the Waco District with its present charges cannot adequately support a District Superintendent. We are recommending that an amount of \$600.00 out of the Annual Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension Funds be allocated to the Waco District to subsidize the District Superintendent's Salary on the Waco District.

We recommend that a **substantial** increase be made in Pastors' salaries in the Charges through-out the Conference where the present salaries for Pastors are inadequate.

REPORT NUMBER 5

REPORT OF THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE 1960

Bishop King, Ministers, Laymen and Friends: Greetings to all of you!

I bring to you this my eighth annual report as conference president. Thank you for allowing me to serve two quadrenniums. Serving in this capacity certainly enriched my prayer life, which caused me to grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. It made me have a world vision and a greater love for mankind, regardless of race, color or creed. This great missionary work is a challenge to each of us to render greater services in His name.

The support given by officers could not be excelled. The work throughout the conference reflects action, giving themselves in service to others and constantly rededicating their lives in the "Spirit of Christ for all of Life."

As always happens, a time of changing is a time of much concern. We are concerned with the steps to be taken because it is always a puzzle to know what is in store for any organization that changes its status. Yet, I am not pessimistic about this hour. I see great possibilities for further development in the change we are making. Institutions are like persons. An unchanging personality is doomed to perish. So it is with an unchanging organization. An individual must be prepared to meet new situations, to foresee the implications of changes, if he is to act as a vital unit of his world; so it is with an organization.

The very idea of progress is a conception of a changing society. So, as we face this new day in the history of our West Texas Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, we want to pause and give consideration to some aspects of it which should not be overlooked.

The Past: We are concerned with our past, which is not long but nevertheless, is a glorious one. We are concerned with the value of our heritage. In order to do this we turn our minds to the pioneers of this movement to pay them tribute to which they are entitled. The Woman's Home Missionary Society as it was known then. The outstanding name in the West Texas Conference then was the name of Mrs. E. Spriggs Ratcliff, who journeyed throughout this great conference raising money for Eliza Dee Hall. She saw the "Light Upon the Mountains" and carried it into the valley where it shone in the faces of girls and boys as they recruited for Eliza Dee and Samuel Huston College. Her good deeds will live on and on in the lives of the women of the West Texas Conference. She was truly possessed with the missionary spirit. Others who carried on in a very effective way and should be remembered are Mrs. S. E. Jones, Mrs. Dorcas Swann, and Mrs. C. S. Williams and many others who served during this period.

Today as we know it is the Woman's Society of Christian Service whose purpose is to: unite all the women of the church in Christian living and service; help develop and support Christian work among women and children around the world; develop the spiritual life; study the needs of the world; take part in such service activities as will strengthen the local church, improve civic, community, and world conditions. To this end this organization seeks to enlist women, young people, and children in this Christian fellowship; secure funds for the activities in the local church and support of the work undertaken at home and abroad for the establishment of a world community.

Those giving splendid services in this new work are as follows: Mrs. K. W. McMillan, serving as our first president, gave rise to a new day. We got off to a good start under her Christian guidence and dedicated

leaders and workers. The light continued to shine. Our first School of Missions was set up with the aid of the Central Conference and the Southwest Woman's Societies. Many leaders were discovered during the administration of Mrs. McMillan.

Mrs. M. M. Ellison succeeded Mrs. McMillan with all of the qualifications a leader should possess, a knowledge of the work. Years before she had dedicated her life to mission work while at Gammon Theological Seminary with her husband. The reflection of her work still shines throughout the conference. "In the Cross of Christ I Glory" and "Go Ye Into All the World to Preach the Gospel to Every Living Creature" were her challenging messages.

As President of the West Texas Woman's Society of Christian Service, I am here to give an account of my activities during these two quadrenniums and also to consider our organization as it now stands. I would ask your permission to recall the circumstances that brought me to this position and thus justify my concern for it at this time. I had served as Secretary of Christian Social Relations where I became acquainted with this great missionary work. Since childhood, I had learned from a devout Christian grandmother that fellowship with people was the wost wonderful experience of mankind. It was with trembling heart and a very humble feeling of my inadequacy for the task that I dared to take the responsibility. But for the certainty that God can use us as instruments to work His will; but for the thought that I was representing the two thousands or more women of the conference who were honored by the act; but for the assurance that I had from women more familiar with the organization that they would back me up and help me to carry on the responsibility, I would not have accepted it. So, today, I want to acknowledge the help and encouragement that I received from ministers, officers, members and friends who were true to their promises during these two quadrenniums. Truly the light is still shining and the darkness failed to put it out.

One of the first steps was to take out membership in the State Council of Methodist Women, whose purpose is to constitute a large body of citizens with a common program on social activities formulated for them by the Department of Christian Social Relations of the Woman's Division of Christian Service and adopted by each conference. These conferences also have the organization within their bounds which is charged with the responsibility for making the social program effective. In addition, there is much that is state-wide in social fields as well as national. In order to act intelligently, effectively and with wisdom upon social questions of a broad nature, it is essential that Texas Methodist women act as on body through state-wide organization. The second year we resurrected the Wesleyan Service Guild. The third year we organized the Youth School of Missions where youth are trained in the work of the Society. During the fourth year our conference project came into being — The Inez Elizabeth Ann Day Care Center located in Marlin, Texas.

We have constantly presented the goals; some part of each has been reached.

Our Conference School of Missions continues to grow. A large number of women are in training each year. We are constantly developing leaders for Christian workers. Our Youth School, held during our Conference School of Missions, has served as a good medium for informing and inspiring our youth. Three of our girls made definite commitments during our School last year and other years. We are grateful to God for these worthy youth. We now have one Rural worker in Tennessee and Virginia and one deaconess, Miss Lelia Marie Robinson, now serving at our Bethlehem Center in Fort Worth, Texas. A number of names are on file with Missionary Personnel of the Woman's Division of Christian Service. Some are in high school, others are in college. We are keeping in touch with them. As we face today's challenges, we fully realize the need for a deepening of faith, and more fervent and earnest prayers because these are times of decision. We are called, as followers of Christ, to serve wherever there is a need. To encourage these girls, each year scholarships are given to aid as many as possible. We have given aid to more than twenty-eight girls during these eight years.

Special gifts were given to Division projects; visits were made to missions projects in the state. Special days have been observed and community agencies supported. Many of our women are working in local Councils of United Church Women of Texas.

A visit from our Field Worker, Miss Dorothy Barnett, proved to be very helpful as she unfolded the work of the Society and Guild to women and youth.

We rank third in the sale of literatue - approved study materials, subscriptions to the Methodist Woman and World Outlook, supplementary, guides, handbooks, and files. If we are to remain an informed society, we must continue to purchase literature in order to have something with which to work.

There has been an increase in our membership to nearly 3,000 throughout the conference. Ministers as well as members of the society and guild are wearing Life Membership Pins. There are six Honorary Life Memberships, youth and children to help meet some of the unmet needs. In 1952 our giving was \$1,000. There has been an increase each year. In giving this year, we reached \$15,000. This does not include support to local churches. So we come to you with grateful heart and sincere gratitude to God for the privilege of working with you. We dare say that our efforts were in vain. The Lord prospered the work of our hands.

My life has been enriched by contacts with Christian women at home and abroad, who have shared with me their experences of faith. They have shown the kind of faith that endures, thte courage that wins, and the love that never fails. You too have shown the same.

I acknowledge my failures in the attempt to carry on this office; I am aware of my inadequacy for the task; and I am conscious of the fact that I have many responsibilities. For all these reasons, maybe I have failed to do what was expected of me. I am very pleased with the person selected to take the wheel now and guide our fragile boat through waves of high seas and bring it in safely to the shores. We forsee this through the eyes of faith.

The Future: Finally, at this hour of expectancy, we are concerned with the future of our organization. We dream of it as an organization that will encircle the globe, building a fellowship of service and love that will help to create the atmosphere of peace and good-will that no forces of evil will be able to break.

So, in my conclusive remarks, may I call attention to our theme, "There is a Light Upon the Mountains." Light and mountains have always played an important part as recorded is our Biblical records. Many outstanding events in both the Old and New Testaments are associated with mountains, and human experiences through the symbolism of high and holy places. ages men have sought to discern the light that is upon the mountains, and Light is used to symbolize and illumine many spiritual truths. Through the to bring it donw unto the realm of everyday experiences.

It is hoped that many mountain-top experiences will be found during the years to come. May these experiences be enduring ones; may they help to set our feet on lofty places. While climbing each mountain, may your eyes be fixed on the light that is upon the same for you know what light is even though it is not always named. And as we descend each mountain, may we give ourselves in service to our fellowmen; may we carry the light in our hearts and minds and souls. Yes, "There is a Light Upon the Mountains." Receive it! Pass it on!

Come let us go up to the mountain of the Lord that He may teach us His ways; that we may walk in His paths. Women of the society and guild, this is the message. We have heard from Him and proclaim to you, that God is Light and in Him is no darkness at all. You are the light of the world.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD PEACE OF THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE May, 1960

Bishop King, Ministers, Brethren, Sisters and Friends:

It is a pleasure for me to bring my report of the Board of World Peace to you at this time.

"Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace who mind is stayed on thee, because he trusteth in thee." Isa. 26:3.

"Great peace have they which love thy law; and nothing shall offend them." Psalm 119:165.

The word "peace" means harmony, tranquility, to be quiet, to be still; and whether between nations or in the individuals heart, this is a high peak of attainment. We are told that we can have peace by the simple act of trusting God. If we trust Him implicitly, we will have peace in our souls because the Word of God says it will be so — not a passing peace, but an ever-abiding peace that floods the inner being.

If we were to go about asking different persons for their definition of peace, we would no doubt receive many and varied answers. Let us try it.

We stop by the bedside of a wounded soldier. "Sir," we ask, "what is peace?" At the moment we belive he would answer: "Freedom from pain, and sleep."

We search out a chinese sitting in the sun. "Our friend, what is peace to you?" And he looks up at us from vacant eyes and answers: "Peace is a bowl of rice for this hunger."

We stop to greet an Indian walking along a dusty deserted path. "Our brother, could you tell us what peace really is?" He looks away to the far horizon and with the strange wisdom of his race answers: "Peace is freedom — freedom to be myself; freedom to walk on these plains and to find, when I return, the glowing oven and the baking loaf." All of these are good and true answers as far as they go. They came out of the depths of human and bodily needs.

World Peace

Our world is kept from actual war largely by fear of relative annihilation. The war of ideals, of economic systems and political structures, has been normal for more than ten years. Even in such a world we must seek peace and pursue it. We must earnestly seek a mutual agreement to end the testing and production of nuclear arms. The dynamic economics must extend technical, financial, economic and material assistance to the underdeveloped countries of the world. Such help should be grounded in understanding friendship and an unselfish desire for the welfare of the people of every nation. In our search for world peace, we have a great asset in the United Nations. We must acquaint more and more of our people with its purposes, organization and outreach to the end that we support it and participate in its activities wholeheartedly.

Cessation of atomic tests ever since man unleashed the power of the atom, the peoples of the world have feared its threat of distruction and sought the promise which this development has offered. They have searched hopefully, but this far without success, for steps by which to minimize the danger of war and to release power for peace.

Both the World Council of Churches and its members in many parts of the world have repeatedly pleaded in statements and representations for an approach to disarmament which could start from a controlled cessation of tests. They realize that the question of international control is the crux. The powers of the control commission, as well as the composition of the inspection teams, are in dispute. Perseverance in the effort to resolve these difficulties is a responsibility which the negotiating governments bear toward all peoples. It must be recognized that any agreement, however carefully framed, involves a measure of calculated risk for all parties. Yet in

face of the atomic peril, so fraught with grave consequences for present and future generations, acceptance of such is surely justified. Moreover, every agreement is one more step in the struggle to allay suspicion and build confidence.

To make tests to cease is important in itself. To demonstrate that international controls are feasible in relations to the cessation of testing can, in the long run, prove even more worthwhile in the development of regulated and progressive disarmament. Churches throughout the world are urged to do everything possible to build an informed public opinion about these issues which are vitally at stake and to make such representations to their governments as they deem proper, especially in countries whose governments are directly involved in the negotiation on the cessation of tests. All are urged to pursue these objectives through every appropriate means.

Conference Board

We have striven hard to continue to promote the program of World Peace throughout the conference. We were well represented at the Methodist Conference on Human Relations in Dallas, Texas, at Southern Methodist University August 31 to September 4, 1959. Conference questions what is our Christian witness on race? What is the nature of the present racial crisis in our nation and the world? What can Methodists do? The program consisted of Bible hour, inspirational hour, Dramatization of Cry, The Beloved Country by The Bishops Company, famous song leader, solo actress, Soloist of the Southland, African quartet, interpretive dancer, panel of bishops, panel presentations and group discussions on Three Conference Questions in Relation to church, housing, employment, and education. The conference also included free time — swimming, bowling, conducted tours of UNIVAC, table tennis, films and special training dealing with community tensions. There were 821 delegates from annual conferences, overseas delegates 9, bishops 8, agency representatives 31, participants 36, making a total of 905. This number does not include hundreds of visitors, with activities setmming from same. Joint meeting of Southwest, Rio Grande, and West Texas Conferences was held for the purpose of following through some of the proposals of the conference. The interest was very high.

The Chairman attended the United Nations in September of 1959. Material was purchased and circulated throughout the conference. During the Youth Convocation which will be held on the campus of Huston-Tillotson College in August, I have been asked to present the United Nations to the youth, for which I am grateful. Letters and telegrams were sent to our President, senators and representatives, urging them to support important bills including nuclear tests.

The members of the committee are very active, presenting the work in the local churches, districts, schools, colleges and clubs. Special days were observed which included United Nations Week, World Order Sunday, and Human Rights Day. Sermons were preached throughout the year on PEACE by our ministers. Prayer vigils were continued this year also.

Communications were received from other boards. Methodist Youth Fellowships from the Pittsburgh Conference, 19,000 youth, requested a report of our peace program in the conference; the same was sent to them. "Not Fear But A Sound Mind" by Dr. Carl Soule appeared in the Michigan Christian Advocate, which may be secured from 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Illinois, from the Board of World Peace. In his conclusive remarks he pointed out excerpts from a 600 page handbook called, "The Effects of Nuclear Weapons" which gives the hard facts of atomic war. A twenty megation bomb would have the following effects: 1) Persons living 30 miles from ground zero would suffer second degree burns on bare skin. 2) Brick and wooden homes eleven miles from the explosion would all be destroyed. 3) Persons 2½ miles from the explosion would be killed by radiation or blast during the first minute. 4) There would be dangerous radioactive fallout 200 miles downwind.

Civil Defense is asking for cooperation of the CHURCH. Let us respond as our faith requires. Not by blessing the program but by speaking with candor and truth to its assumptions. We can help our people most, not by helping them locate their shelters, but by leading them to work for massive reconciliation in the world and the fulfillment of Micah's hopes.

"And he shall judge among many people, and rebuke strong nations afar off; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into prunning hooks; nation shall not lift up a sword against nations, neither shall they learn war any more." Micah 4:3.

Recommendation

The Board concurs with actions taken by the General Conference.

REPORT OF THE

CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Whereas a report in the Dallas Morning News under date of February 17, 1959 states that within five years one half of the population of the State of Texas will be living in seven cities, and whereas six of those cities are within the confines of the West Texas Conference, and whereas eight of 13 other additional cities of the State with the most rapid growth are also within the confines of West Texas Conference, be it resolved that this Annual Conference now in session request the Department of Research and Survey of the Division of National Missions to make a complete survey of these cities and when complete, report to the Annual Conference Board of Missions.

The Annual Conference Board will prepare a report and suggested plans for action of the Annual Conference meeting 1961.

REPORT NUMBER 8

PRESIDENT'S REPORT HUSTON -- TILLOTSON COLLEGE

The college is having one of its finest years. With a freshman class of 176, the largest since the merger (total enrollment 486) we face a greater challenge un-parallel in the history of the school. Huston - Tillotson College is the only church-related college operated for Negroes, west of the Mississippi, that is fully accredited by the Southern Association and Secondary Schools.

Sit-in Demonstrations

Students of Huston-Tillotson College along with students of other colleges and seminaries in Austin, after several attempts of negotiations with the operators of variety stores and restaurants, cooperated in sit-in demonstrations after negotiations failed. Today twelve lunch counters have been integrated.

Religious Life

Our students have shown increased interest in their Christian duties. The yattend campus Sunday School, Prayer Meetings, Vesper Services, and many of them work actively in community churches.

Faculty

We have a well trained, dedicated faculty, many of them have served from ten to thirty years. Several of them serve the Austin community in various religious and civic activities. Two of our faculty members were elected to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences respectively.

On March 15 and 16 the beautiful library was dedicated with Bishop Willis J. King directing the dedicatorial services. The college sincerely thanks Bishop King, the ministers and laymen of the West Texas Conference for their continued support.

W. S. C. S. holds Meet on Campus

Over three hundred delegates, representing the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Wesleyan Service Guild, and the Deaconess of the Central Jurisdictional of the Methodist Church attended the conference in August. We wish to thank Mrs. O. B. Coe, Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the ladies of the West Texas Conference for inviting the conference to the college. The ladies have given marvelous support to the college.

REPORT NUMBER 9

ANNUAL FINANCIAL AND STATISTICAL REPORT WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Annual Conference Pension Plan Its Strength and Weaknesses

Pensions in the Methodist Church are based upon a sense of the obligation of the Church for the support of the entire ministry. A local church has not discharged its total obligation for ministerial support when it has

paid the salary of the minister filling the local pulpit. The local church because of its connectional nature has a pro-rata share in the other items of ministerial support, such as: Episcopal Fund, District Superintendent's Fund, Conference Claimants, etc.

When a candiate is being examined prior to being admitted into full membership in a Methodist Annual Conference, he is asked, "Are you determined to employ all your time in the work of God?" He is expected to do just this. And if he diligently fulfills all or even most of the duties of a pastor listed in the discipline, he will be employed full time and then some.

The assumption of these duties and obligations of the ministry places upon the church the counter obligation of providing comfortable support during the years of a minister's active years of service and of continuing support after his retirement and of providing for his widow and dependent children after his death.

This concern and sense of obligation of the church for the support of the ministry, particularly for retired ministers, widows and dependent children has been demonstrated since the very beginning of the Methodist Church in America.

Certainly this support has not always been comfortable but, suffice it is to say, that there has always been some concern and interest manifested.

The Methodist Church in America was organized in 1784. The organization took place in Baltimore, Md., during the Christmas season. That historic conference adopted a plan to provide for whom it referred to as, "Worn out preachers." It was known as the "Preachers' Fund." It was the forerunner of the "Chartered Fund" and the Pension Program of the Methodist Church.

The "Preachers" Fund was a contributory pension fund to which only preachers paid. No ministers however, was to receive benefits from the fund till he had made payments totaling 50 shillings to the fund.

Besides what the ministers themselves put into the fund, the profits from the sale of books was put into the same fund.

From that time to the present it has been the policy and practice of the Methodist Church to place the profits from the Publishing House into the program of providing support for the Conference Claimants.

In spite of the addition of the profits from the sale of books to the Preachers' Fund, the growth of the fund was miserably slow. Salaries received at the same time by the itinerant ministers were totally inadequate. It is a matter of record that between the years of 1792 and 1796 more than 100 preachers withdrew from the ministry because of low salaries and the need to provide for their families.

This situation demanded immediate attention. A more comprehensive

plan had to be worked out.

A plan was submitted to the General Conference in 1796 which directed that, "There shall be a chartered Fund," to be supplied by voluntary contributions of our friends, the principal stock of which shall be founded under the direction of Trustees.

Interesting provisions set forth in the plan included the following:

1. No sum exceeding \$64 was to be applied in any one year to an itinerant or superanuated single preacher.

2. No sum exceeding \$128 to a married preacher.

3. No sum exceeding \$64 to a widow.

No sum exceeding \$14 was to be applied for the use of a child.
 Elders and those in charge of a circuit were to collect the money.

This new program, that is the Chartered Fund Program, was successful. The Chartered Fund grew thanks to the generosity of thousands of thoughtful and sympathetic laymen.

The name of the "Chartered Fund" was changed in 1832 when the official title became "The Chartered Fund of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States of America." But the purpose remained the same and

the Fund grew to larger proportions.

This Fund was further increased when in 1940 the General Fund for Superannuates of the Methodist Protestant Church was combined with the Chartered Fund by order of the Uniting Conference. This addition brought the total to \$268,608. — In 1959 the assets of the Chartered Fund amounted \$315,697 and currently the distribution of income is \$80 annually to each

of the 99 Annual Conferences.

Now what does this all mean? Simply this, that a portion of the pensions of every Conference Claimant in the Methodist Church is now provided by the sacrificial contributions made personally by the ministers during the first quarter centry of the Methodist Church's service.

The Annuity Rate Plan

For many years the nature of the support of retired preachers and of the widows and dependent children of deceased preachers, was strictly on a relief basis. A paltry pittance a year was not unusual as payment to a retired preacher.

In 1908 the General Conference adopted the Annuity rate plan which was a radical departure from the **relief plan** used previously. Under this plan the benefits paid were payable without regard to need and paid according to a rule or formula.

Under this plan the payments received was considered as a sort of deferred salary and the dignity of the claimant was not offered as in the case of the relief grant.

Under this plan the pension claim is determined by multiplying the years of approved service by the annuity rate adopted by the Annual Conference. This plan is called the pay after you go plan in contrast to the now popular Ministers' Reserved Pension Funds which may be termed the pay as you go plan.

Under the annuity rate plan the years of approved service of a minister are allowed to accumulate year by year until his retirement, at which time the Conference collects the money to pay for his accrued pension obligation.

Conversly "The Ministers' Reserve Pension plan is one in which a fund is built up, generally during a period of active service of a member, in order that subsequent payments of a pension needs not depend upon currently raised income.

Just here we point out some of the weaknesses and inadequaces of the Conference.

The annuity rate plan is often referred to as a current income or cash disbursement pension program for the reason that the money to pay the claimant must be disbursed almost as soon as it is received. Then the amount of Claimant fund raised by an Annual Conference is subjected to many deterrant influences, for example, the health of the National economy; economic condition which may effect a given Conference or even a District within a given Conference. Floods, drouths, crop failures, etc. Then there is the matter of the willingness and eagerness upon the part of effective pastors and the laymen in the several charges to raise and provide the Claimant Fund.

It must also be remembered that the minister in the effective relation is not required by law to give any definite contributory support to the Claimant Fund.

Again, under the Conference Claimant Pension Program, the Annual Conference must adopt the annuity rate each year. The recommendation of the rate comes to the Conference Board of Pensions, and may be any amount they suggest.

And now, no matter what deterrant influences are brought to bear on the Conference Claimant Fund, an Annual Conference findt it almost impossible to reduce an annuity rate once it has been arrived at. For the Claimant, no matter what the existing conditions are, in his thinking, can never justify a Conference for cutting his check. This I say with a great deal of assurance Brethren because I too, shall be just as demanding.

The Pension code suggests that the annuity rate of a Conference be not less than 1% of the average salary of the Conference. Latest figures show that the average salary of our Conference is \$2,700. This means that if we measured up to the Pension Code, our present annuity rate would be \$27 instead of \$15.

We of the West Texas Conference enjoy only partial coverage by the Ministers' Reserve Pension Fund Plan and according to Actuarial computation, it will require by gradual transition approximately 30 years for us to reach the point of complete coverage. If this be true then the Claimant

must depend for a long time yet on the Annual Conference Pension Program.

With this in mind let us move with dispatch and determination toward the lifting of our annuity rate to at least 1% of the Ministers' average cash salary.

We are beaten back by many a foe, But ever strength we borrow, And where the vanguard camps today The rear will rest tomorrow.

REPORT NUMBER 13

REPORT CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

Mr. Chairman and Brethren:

It is with some degree of satisfaction and I hope, with pardonable pride, that I rise to report the work of the Conference Missionary Secretary during the Conference year now drawing to a close.

An emerging and expanding interest in missions, both within the confines of the Conference and of the Area, were definitely manifested in the several Confrence-wide and Area-wide missionary emphases throughout the past year. The following conference with special missionary emphases were held: Under guidance and sponsorship of the Division of National Missions, the West Texas Conference held a Conference on Mission June 16-18, 1959, on the campus of Huston-Tillotson College. The Theme was: "Every Methodist a Missionary." The Division not only gave generous financial aid to the project, but also sent Dr. Richard Becher and Rev. Harold Burkhart to lend added strength to our local leadership. Dr. L. L. Haynes, Jr., as Special Guest Preacher gave three masterful messages which added spirit and life to the ocassion.

Department emphases were as follows:

- 1. The work of the Commission on Missions in the Local Church Dr. Richard Becher, Leader Dr. R. S. Mosby, Presiding.
- 2. The Work and Function of the Conference Board of Missions Dr. Charles Golden, Leader Rev. J. H. Carruthers, Presiding.
- 3. Audio-Visual Aid and Teaching Methods, Rev. Harold Burkhart, Leader.
- 4. Missionary Strategy and Projects in the District, Rev. Wm. Ellison, Jr., Leader Rev. Thomas M. Bruton, Presiding.
- 5. The Local Church and Community Agencies, Mrs. O. H. Elliott, Leader Mrs. O. B. Coe, Presiding.

MISSIONS was the principal emphasis of the Area Council held at Gulfside Assembly, Waveland, Miss., August 25-28, 1959. The theme meeting was: "Christian Witness - At Home and Abroad." Workshops that included a missionary emphasis in their structure were: "Witnessing for Christ Overseas," and "Echoes from the Board of Social and Economic Relations."

Upon the insistence and suggestion of the Division of National Missions, we attempted after the Conference-wide meeting in Austin, to hold follow up Conferences in the districts of our Conference. This we were not able to do in the Northern and Western districts due to the fact that we were unable to work out satisfactory schedules on these districts. However, a Joint Missionary Conference, the Austin-Victoria and San Antonio Districts, the participants, was held at Wesley Chapel, Seguin, Texas, June

17-18, 1960. This conference was a decided success, said by many to have been the very finest ever witnessed in our Conference.

The ministers and laymen of the two districts were very cooperative. Our district superintendents, Rev. Robert S. Mosby and Rev. William Ellison, Jr., were present, and supplied both dignity and efficiency to the work being done.

- (5) "The Work of the Commission on Missions in the Local Church" Mrs. Myrtle Reece, Leader Mrs. J. M. Rogers, Chairman.
- (6) "World Missions Africa, Our Interest", Rev. A. S. Pitts, Leader Rev. J. B. Richardson, Chairman.

Missions is the most important business of the Christian Church. The aim and purpose of missions is to reach people; people of all races, in all conditions, everywhere and through all time. For people are the material out of which the Kingdom of God is to be built. The Christian Church is the agency through which Christ works toward world redemption. And the Christian witness is Christ's method of conveying His plan of redemption to the world.

The Church then, is God's Society, God's Organization, set up amid the cross-currents of human relations and charged with the task and responsibility of redeeming society. And so sure was Jesus of the final triumph and success of His Church in the world that He declared, "The gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

Now we are the Church God established, God ordained, God promoted, God supported, God protected, God sustained. We are the Church, committed to the task through Christian Witness, to mold men into the ideals of the Kingdom.

Jesus Christ was thoroughly committed to the concept of human redemption. The Apostle Paul had much to say about the Kingdom of God. Speaking to His disciples one day, Jesus said, "Greater things shall ye do than I do," and they were amazed; for they lived under the influence of the Greco-Roman philosophy that history moves in circles, going all time and getting no place, moving, but making no progress.

What was, is. What is, will be. The belief that we are restricted and hemmed in by our horizons; no new worlds beyond our horizons awaiting our conquest. Such philosophy is diametrically opposed to our Christian concepts. Our belief is humanity can and must be changed; that society can and must be redeemed. The Christian concept is that just beyond our horizons there are new worlds waiting the coming of the heralds of a new day. And we believe firmly that our horizons can be pushed back.

The Episcopal Address at the General Conference recently held in Denver, Colorado, pointed up Four new Lines of Decision. This program contemplated by the Methodist Church under the direction of its Board of Missions and 45 other countries involving Action Thrusts in mission fields at home and abroad, is the work of the Church. The great Methodist Church by evangelistic effort and the Christian Witness through misions, must participate in bringing about change in these areas.

MISSIONS. Now, Missions is Desire — Passion — Aspiration — Outlook — Out-reach — Spirit. In order to reach the masses through the missionary witness and missionary venture, there must be three forces operative: 1. There must be Vision, without which the people perish. Read the story of Isaiah's experiences in the temple: "In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord." 2. There must be Commitment — There must be Declaration: "Here am I, send me." 3. There must be an accompany-

ing Thrust. The Master of man dreamed of a bright new world. (Vision) He stood one day in the Synagogue and declared: "The Holy Spirit is upon me, for He hath sent me . . ." (Commitment) Then He gathered about Him a few men and led them out to storm the highways of Judea to make His dream a reality. (Thrust)

Ladies and Gentlemen, this is the aim of Missions. To accomplish it, men must be informed; thep must be inspired, they must be challenged, or

they will not respond.

And now, Mr. Chairman, with a growing sense of the need for a deeper consecration and a more intensive cultivation of the whole field of missions within the confines of our conference, I wish to present the following recommendations:

Recommendations

- 1. That we proceed to set up at once, a strong program of Missionary Education within the Conference so that our over-all Missionary strategy can be developed.
- 2. That we create a Committee on Education and Cultivation charged with the responsibility of projecting conference-wide plans each year.
- 3. That such a committee shall be composed of all District Superintendents, The Conference Missionary Secretary, The District Missionary Secretaries, and at least, one other Minister and one Layman from each District.
- 4. That immediately following the adjournment of this conference, the committee will fix dates and places for at least two Joint Missionary Institutes for the Conference year 1960-1961.
- 5. That we encourage a healthy and fair ratio between World Service giving and the Conference Benevolence program.
- 6. That this committee will encourage and work out a worth-while observance of a Missionary Anniversary at the session of the Annual Conference.
- 7. That the funds for Extensions and Missions, now termed "Advance Specials," be included in the budget of the Conference Board of Missions as a part of the Annual Conference Budget.
- 8. That the District Missionary Secretary, working closely with his District Superintendent and Pastors of the District, will seek to have carried out a year-round program of Missions in each of the several churches, and cause to be held at least one District or Sub-district Institute each year.

REPORT CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

Bishop King, Members of the West Texas Annual Conference and Friends:

It is a pleasure to submit at this time, the report of the Board of Evangelism. Methodism was born out of a great evangelistic passion. From her earliest beginnings, she has been characterized by her evangelistic zeal. It is true that the techniques have changed with changing conditions, but it is equally true that her evangelism, by whatever procedure, has been central in her emphasis. Methodism has consistently preached for a verdict.

Evangelism, like John Wesley, takes the world as its parish; and it is not a happy world she is responsible for at this time. Evidences of major crack-ups are easily discoverable, even within our own circles. History records that out of sixteen civilizations that have gone to pieces, thirteen were destroyed, not so much by the antagonistic forces from without, as by a decline of morality and an accelaration of corruption from within. Our civilization seems to incline in the same direction.

Evangelism does not try to hide the evidence of the impending crack-up but it refuses to believe that it is inevitable that our world should go to pieces. She believes that in Jesus we have found a bond of cohesion. The Revised Standard Version of the New Testament gives us support in a meaningful translation of Colossians 1:17, reading as follows: "In Him (Jesus) all things hold together." We believe that evangelism is the answer.

Evangelism of Methodism has always been concerned about a person's spiritual life; but it has shown an equal concern for the way men live, how they make their money, how they take care of their families, fun their business, treat their fellowman, administer their laws, and practice their professions. It advocates an evangelism for all of life, not just for a segment or two, and for all people of all ages regardless of age or social position. Our Board has cooperated with the General, Jurisdictional, and Area Boards of Evangelism in promoting the program of evangelism throughout the Conference. Under direction of our District Superintendents, and with the cooperation of our District Committees, we have conducted Workshops, Convocations, and Christian Witness Missions in each district of the conference. Our district secretaries have given excellent leadership in this area. Pastors and commissions on membership and evangelism have worked faithfully on the local level in carrying out the final emphasis of the quadrennium, Total Enlistment. As a result, church attendance has greatly improved, and many inactive members have been reactivated.

PERTINENT OBSERVATIONS: As we look about, we are made aware of these disturbing facts that should claim our immediate attention:

- Many of our members are leaving the rural sections and small communities for the larger industrial cities and towns. Some of them are being lost to other denominations. We need a closer follow-up of our members in such cases.
- 2. Too many people are being lost to the various by-products of religion, cults, etc. We need to preach the Gospel of Christ as never before, and to reaffirm our faith in the Christian religion.
- 3. We need a closer affiliation and greater participation in the field of interracial repations on the local level.
- 4. We need to make a closer study of our racial needs and problems, and to find a christian solution for them.

With the sincere hope that this will be a great year of evangelism in the West Texas Conference, we submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That we set our goal for two thousand (2,000) new members for the 1960-1961 conference year, and an increase of 10 per cent in church attendance.
- 2. That new churches and church schools be organized in needy areas.
- 3. That each pastor establish membership training classes for children, youth, and adults.
- 4. That a workable program for young adults be formulated.
- 5. That the total enlistment of more families for Christ and His Church be the earnest effort of every local church.

CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, 1865, by Bishop Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference was held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Conference, held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, President.

The ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper, and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their labors.

This Conference to date has five districts, 109 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz., Huston-Tillotson College, located at Austin, Texas.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE RULES

1. Nominations

The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.

2. Limits

No member of the Conference shall be permitted to serve upon more than two of the major Conference Boards, except where the Discipline shall provide otherwise. Special effort should be made to place every Conference member upon at least one Board. All vacancies occurring on any Board or Committee shall be filled according to the provisions in rule 1.

3. Lay Representation

Lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.

4. Conference Program

A program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a planning Committee made up of the resident bishop, all district Superintendents, the host-Pastor, the chairman of major boards, the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education, the Secretary of the Conference, the President of the WSCS and the Conference Lay Leader. This committee shall have the responsibility for the planning and printing of the annual Conference Program—to be paid for by the Annual Conference.

5. Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions intended for publication in the conference journal shall be typewritten and submitted in triplicate to the Conference Secretary.

6. District Committee Ministerial Qualifications

The district committee on qualifications of local preachers shall consist of five traveling elders in the district.

The names of the District committees will be printed in the Conference Journal.

7. Pastors Reports

All Pastors' reports to the Conference Treasurer and Conference Statistician shall be turned in at least fifteen days before the dates set for the meeting of the Annual Conference.

Additional rules may be added to this list and these present may be amended or deleted by order of the Annual Conference.
