## Daily Proceedings

## Conference Minutes

First Day - Wednesday, April 19, 1961
The Eighty Seventh (87th) Session of the West Texas Conference was convened in historic Wesley Methodist Church, Austin, Texas, Wednesday morning, April 19, 1961 at 9:00 o'clock, with Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., resident Bishop of the New Orleans Area and President of the Conference, presiding.

Opening devotions were conducted by the host pastor, Rev. P. L. Woods. Music was furnished by the choir of the host church, Nathaniel Williams, directing.

## Holy Communion

Bishop Moore led in the celebration of the Holy Communion, and was assisted by the district superintendents and the host pastor. The Communion sermon was delivered by Bishop Moore. Four hundred and nine communicants were served the Elements of the Lord's Supper. Bishop Moore an-
nounced that the offering of the morning would be for Africa. Two hundred and nine dollars was received. At the close of the service, Bishop Moore announced a 15 minute recess.

## Organization and General Business

At the request of the bishop, the secretary called the Roll of the Conference. By vote of the Conference, the names of the ministers, minister's wives, and widows who died during the conference year were read first. (See Roll of the Dead) Then followed in order the names of the effective members, the approved supply pastors, and the retired members. The lay members stood by districts, in recognition of their presence.

LEGAL LIMITS: By vote of the conference, the Bar of the Conference was fixed to include the first five rows of pews across the church auditorium.

INTERBOARD REPORT: By vote of the Conference, the report of the Interboard Committee was made the order of the day at $2: 45$ o'clock of the afternoon session.

On separate motions, the Conference Program was made the Official Guide for the Conference sessions, Zan W. Holmes, Sr., J. L. Wattley, and C. H. Johnson, were retained as the Committee on the Journal, Zan W. Holmes, Jr., was elected Reporter to the Press, and Martin J. Walker was elected Conference Song Leader.

PRESENTATION: Bishop Moore presented Dr. O. W. Nail, Editor of "Texas Methodism." Dr. Nail spoke briefly to the interest of the publication.

## Memorial Service

Rev. John B. Richardson presided over the Memorial Services. The service began with the singing of hymn 269, "Jesus Savior Pilot Me." Rev. S. W. Curtis read Psalms 23, and offered prayer. The conference stood with bowed heads as the names of the deceased were read as follows: K. W. McMillan, W. S. Byars, Andrew Gooden, and Freddie Freeman, ministers; Mrs. J. W. Stone, Sr., Minister's widow. The Memorial sermon was delivered by Rev. Dale H. Hansboro, Pastor of St. Paul Church, Corpus Christi, Texas. The morning session closed with the benediction by Rev. Hansboro.

## Afternoon Session <br> First Day - Wednesday, April 19, 1961 2:30 o'clock

The afternoon session began with devotions conducted by Rev. J. D. Mooring. Rev. J. S. C. Grattan read the Scripture Lesson. Singing was under the direction of Rev. Martin J. Walker, Conference song leader. A special selection, "Have Thine Own Way" was rendered by John T. King, J. D. Mooring, Zan W. Holmes, Jr., and Martin J. Walker.

PRESENTATIONS: Bishop Moore presented to the conference the following: Dr. Jenkins, representative of the Publishing House, Rev. John Preciph, representing the Central Advocate, and Rev. B. L. McCormick, Pastor, Grant Chapel A. M. E. Church, Austin, Texas. Dr. Jenkins greeted the Conference, and presented a check in the amount of $\$ 1,697.31$ from the Publishing House. Bishop Moore accepted the check on behalf of the Conference, and presented same to Rev. F. D. Young, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions. Rev. Preciphs spoke briefly in the interest of the Advocate, and Rev. McCormick brought words of welcome and warm greetings from Grant Chapel.

CHARACTER PASSED - DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT: By vote of the Conference, the character of the District Superintendents was passed. Rev. M. A. L. Freeman read the composite report of the district superintendents. The report was adopted by the Conference. (See Report)

MINISTERS RETIRED: The Committee on Conference Relations presented the names of the Reverends I. H. Pierce, J. H. Marshall, and J. H. Hudson, for the Retired Relations. On Motion by T. M. Bruton, the retired relations was granted.

ORDER OF THE DAY: A motion by Ernest T. Dixon that consideration of the Proposed Amendment No. 12 to the Constitution of The Methodist

Church Concerning the Jurisdictional System be the Order of the Day for the Thursday morning business session, carried.

REPORT, INTERBOARD COMMITTEE: The report was given by Ernest T. Dixon. It was adopted by the Conference. (See Report)

CABINET RECOMMENDATION: Following a statement relative to the special meeting of the cabinet, Rev. William Ellison, Jr. presented Rev. Marcus A. Freeman, who read the recommendation of the cabinet. The recommendation was adopted. (See Recommendation)

ANNIVERSARY SERVICE - THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS: Rev. J. H. Carruthers, Chairman of The Board, presided over the service. The report of the Board was read by Rev. F. D. Young. The Conference adopted the report. (See Report)

COMMISSION ON URBAN LIFE: Bishop Moore gave pertinent facts concerning the Commission on Urban Life, and the meeting of the commission in St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 22-25, 1962. He urged the city churches to send their pastors, other ministers to attend if possible.

POINT OF PRIVILEGE: On a Point of Privilege, I. B. Loud requested that Mrs. Noah W. Moore, Jr., wife of the bishop, be presented to the Conference. The request was granted. Mrs. Moore was escorted to the rostrum by William Ellison, Jr. and T. M. Bruton. Mrs. Moore greeted the Conference and made brief remarks.

Bishop Moore presented Dr. T. B. Echols, representative of the General Board of Pensions. Dr. Echols briefly addressed the Conference.

The session was adjourned at 5:00 P.M.

## Second Day - Thursday, April 20, 1961 Morning Session <br> 9:00 o'clock

DEVOTIONS: Morning devotions were conducted by Rev. Antone Dykes, who also delivered a Devotional Message.

ORDER OF THE DAY: Consideration of Amendment No. 12 to the Constitution of The Methodist Church. Bishop Moore requested the Conference secretary to read the Amendment in its entirety. This was done. Following a thorough discussion of each item in the amendment, the Conference proceeded to vote. Tellers were named as follows: Ministers Zan W. Holmes, Sr., W. W. Baker, F. D. Young, William Shaw, Merrill T. Reed. Lay: Mrs. I. E. Stafford, T. M. Shadowen, Odie Davis, Raymond Wilkins, C. H. Johnson.

MOTION: A motion by T. B. Echols, Seconded by M. A. L. Freeman, that after the vote is polled, and if there is no opposition to the approval of Amendment No. 12, that the Conference secretary be authorized to cast a unanimous vote for the Conference, carried.

THE VOTE: Eligible to vote, 146 - Number voting to adopt the Amendment, 146. Number voting against adoption, None. Number not voting, None. Amendment No. 12 was unanimously adopted.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS: Rev. L. L. Haynes, Conference Chairman of The Commission on Christian Social Concerns, gave a brief report on the work of the Commission. He presented Dr. Jackson, Professor, Perkins School of Theology. S.M.U., and a representative of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns. Dr. Jackson addressed the Conference.

DENVER REPORT: At the request of Bishop Moore, Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Jr. gave highlights of the Conference on Missions, held at Denver, Colorado last February.

PRESENTATIONS: Bishop Moore presented Rev. C. S. Weaver, Texas Conference, and Rev. James D. Foy, Pastor, Asbury Methodist Church, Washington Conference. Both brought greetings from their respective Conferences.

Rev. P. L. Woods presented to the Conference, Mrs. J. W. Frasier, an energetic 94 year old member of Wesley Church, Austin. The Conference gave Mrs. Frazier a standing ovation.

TELEGRAM: Bishop Moore instructed the secretary to send a telegram bearing greetings and felicitations from this Conference to the Louisiana

Conference in Session at Gulf Side, Waveland Mississippi.
FRATERNAL VISITORS: On separate motions, Rev. William J. Washington and Rev. L. L. Haynes were elected Fraternal visitors to the Texas and Louisiana Conferences respectively.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS NOTED: At the request of Rev. M. A. Freeman, Rev. E. L. Spencer was permitted to make a statement relative to the liquidation of the church debt at Wyatt Memorial, Amarillo. Other ministers who had either liquidated indebtedness, or remodeled churches and parsonages were presented

NOONDAY WORSHIP: Rev. T. M. Bruton was in charge of the devotion period. Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Jr., Pastor of Hamilton Park Methodist Church, Dallas, delivered the noonday sermon, using for his subject "There Is No Hiding Place." Bishop Moore gave the Benediction.

## Afternoon Session <br> Second Day - Thursday, April 20, 1961 <br> 2:30 o'clock

The afternoon session began with devotions conducted by Rev. E. L. Spencer, assisted by Rev. J. L. Wattley.

## Business Session Bishop Moore Presiding

TELEGRAM: A telegram from Dr. Frank D. Carlton, District Superintendent of the South West Central Conference, was read by the secretary. Bishop Moore instructed the secretary to acknowledge same.

REPORT, CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM: Rev. O. B. Coe, Chairman of the Board, read the report, and moved its adoption. The report was adopted. (See Report) Rev. Coe presented Rev. C. S. Weaver, substituting for Dr. W. D. Lester, representative of The General Board of Evangelism. Rev. Weaver addressed the Conference.

REPORT, CONFERENCE BOARD OF PENSIONS: Rev. F. D. Young gave the report and moved its adoption. The Conference adopted the report. (See Report) Dr. T. B. Echols was presented. He spoke to the interest of pensions in general.

REPORT, COMMITTEE ON JOURNAL: Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr. read the report and moved its adoption. Report adopted.

VISITORS PRESENTED: Visitors to the Conference were presented by E. J. Tanner, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions and Courtesy Bishop Moore presented Dr. J. H. Touchstone of the General Board of Lay Activities. Dr. Touchstone spoke briefly.

CHARACTER PASSED: By vote of the Conference, the character of members of the Conference (Pastors, and in Special Appointments) was passed, unquestioned.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: By vote of the Conference, an Executive Session of the ministerial members of the Conference was set for 1:45 P.M.

MOTIONS: On separate motions, the report of the Conference Treasurer was set for $2: 45$ P.M. and the report of the Board of Education at 3:30 P.M.

## Noonday Worship

Noonday devotions were under the supervision of Rev. T. M. Bruton, Rev. J. G. Owens offered prayer. Rev. I. C. Loud, Pastor of Myrtle Avenue Methodist Church, Lubbock, delivered the noonday sermon. He spoke from the subject "Now is The Time." Rev. Loud pronounced the Benediction.

## Afternoon Session 2:45 o'clock

The afternoon session began with Rev. T. M. Bruton leading in the singing of "What A Fellowship."

## Business Session Bishop Moore Presiding

ORDER OF THE DAY RE-SET: On a motion by Rev. I. B. Loud, the Order of the Day (Treasurer's Report) was re-set for Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock.

RECOMMENDATIONS, COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS: Rev. L. L. Haynes read the recommendations of the Commission and moved their adoption. The Conference voted adodion. (See Recommendations)

TRUSTEES ELECTED: By vote of the Conference, J. H. Carruthers, Zan W. Holmes, Sr., and Prenza L. Woods, were elected Conference Trustees, terms to expire in 1964.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES, RECOMMENDATIONS: Odie Davis, Conference Lay Leader, read the recommendations. The Conference voted approval.

REPORT, BOARD OF EDUCATION: The report was introduced by Dr. W. Astor Kirk. Dr. Kirk presented Rev. William J. Washington, Executive Secretary of Christian Education, who gave the report. Dr. John T. ## REPORT NUMBER 1

## DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S COMPOSITE REPORT April, 1961

To Bishop Moore and Friends of the West Texas Annual Conference:
The District Superintendents serving the West Texas Conference are humbly grateful for this opportunity to report to you concerning our work.

We are not here because of our own excellency, but because God in His illimitable goodness has permitted us to meet to gether in another Annual Conference.

In the light of God's Mercy, we should, here and now pledge our allegiance to Him and rededicate ourselves to the task of "Kingdom Building." The process of growth holds us in ever fresh wonder.

We have come again to an Annual Conference where, as stewards we must give an account of our stewardship. The work of the Church this year has been a real challenge and also a great inspiration.

When Jacob fled from his home in haste by the anger of a deceived father and a robber brother, he passed in his flight one of the fords of Jordan. The only material asset was the stick in his hand. The past was full of terror, the future full of uncertainty. Still, he was rich, for God had blessed him. He carried in his heart the memory of the bestowed blessing, and through the birthright, he had become the priest and the mediator between God and his people. God had blessed him abundantly and the blessing had worked. He returned to the fords of Jordan and gave profound reverence to God. He was grateful. It was a time for retrospection, for meditation and resolve. A time for review of the past and a resolve for the future. This is true for all of us.

Such a moment as this we have returned-a moment full of meaning to this conference. It is a time for retrospection, for introspection and for purpose. We should rejoice in the past successes in God's work, which is natural and proper, but the Glory is His, whose we are, and whom we serve. We thank God for the consecration of both ministerial and lay.

## The Austin-Victoria District: Wm. M. Ellison, Jr., D. S.

We have been greatly concerned and our hearts filled with anxiety for those who have suffered illness and grief. Brothers G. F. Alexander, I. H. Pierce, A. T. Hargrove, W. S. Byars and Sisters I. H. Pierce, Edward Clark, E. C. Purnell and J. W. Stone.

We began the year with a planning conference at St. Peters, Austin. Four additional group meetings followed (Goliad, Victoria, Edna, Luling.) Each meeting was designed to strengthen us spiritually and to keep ever before us our great responsibility and obligations. Woman's Retreat, Workers Conference, Woman's Society of Christian Service and Minister's Wives and Daughters Association have been outstanding in the interest of their cause. One high point of the District this year was the Area Youth Convocation held at Huston-Tillotson College.

Improvement of church properties undertaken by many. Edna, with Rev. E. J. Tanner, the church has been painted and sliding doors installed in the social hall. Harwood, with Rev. A. T. Goode has painted the church. Lockhart, with Rev. J. D. Mooring purchased furniture for the parsonage, built concrete landings, sidewalks, organ for the church and other outstanding accomplishments. Columbus, with Rev. J. W. Elliot has painted the parsonage and decorated the interior. Historic Wesley, with Rev. P. L. Woods has been completely renovated; the pulpit, choir gallery, Communion rail, enhance the beauty of the worship service. In other charges, unsightly buildings have been removed to provide either for parking area or flower gardens and lawns. Debts are kept in tact. With few exceptions, all properties are insured. Other churches are contemplating remodeling or reparing in the very near future.

Under the matchless leadership of Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., and Area Wide Spiritual Service was held at Houston with some 900 or more in attendance. This meeting was designed for the ministers to take a look at ourselves, to enrich our own personal religious life, thus recognizing Jesus Christ is Lord. The aftermath of the retreat led to revivals throughout the District, Luling, Lockhart, Dale, Edna, Victoria and St. Peters had many accessions and conversions.

General and Church Benevolences have caused us much concern. Additional meetings have been necessary to accomplish some of the things needed to be done, as they relate to Christian Stewardship and Finance and systematic giving which would enable us to raise all claims in full.

The following pastors have led their congregations in paying World

Service and Conference Benevolences in full: J. W. Goode, J. D. Mooring, O. K. Brewster, S. D. Miller, Marshall Majors, E. C. Purnell and P. L. Woods. Other churches have not done so well in raising their claims. These are exceptions and not the rule. I am hopeful that more funds will be reported at this conference.

Again I express my Thanks and Appreciation to the fellow ministers, wives and laymen for your support given to the work of the district. And to Bishop Moore, my sincere personal thanks for your patience, understanding and that under your leadership, our conference will grow. We, of the Austin-Victoria District pray that God will give to both you and Mrs. Moore, health, strength, and a long life of service.

We therefore, pledge to you our full support and cooperation.

## Dallas District: T. Madison Bruton, D. S.

God's blessings have been in evidence upon us during the year. We have, for the most part, enjoyed good health. Brother Freddie Freeman, our pastor at Corsicana became seriously ill and passed away. Brother Freeman, though he was a full time employee of the Mexia Public Schools, organized the work at Corsicana so these people could carry on the work of the church without a pastor. This church has enrolled several new members and met all local and Conference askings or requirements. Dr. K. W. McMillan, one of our retired ministers, was claimed by death, also.

We held at least two regular quarterly conferences at each of the charges on the district. We have held, also, four other District-wide meetings. Each meeting was carefully designed to strengthen each pastor spiritually and to keep before us as Ministers of the Lord, Jesus Christ, the great opportunity as well as the responsibilities which are now upon us as God's Fishermen of men. The work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service has enjoyed a steady growth this year under the able leadership of Miss L. C. Dunlap. Every phase of the General Churchs' interest has been carefully looked after and done to the best of our ability. Christian Higher Education has been ever held up before each of the 22 churches of the district.

Three years ago, upon coming to the District as its Superintendent, we found several of the churches standing out as perfect eye-sores; but today, most of these churches once called eye-sores, are now become places of real beauty.

At Mexia (Jones Chapel) we have a place of worship which could hardly be described other than being beautiful. Mexia: (Union Memorial) another beautiful place of worship. Denison is also one of the places spoken of above. We have a beautiful little place of worship here in Fort Worth for the Cogswell congregation. The only two churches now on the district which are badly in need of being replaced or remodeled are: Sherman and Italy, Texas. Here, we had a small building started, walls up, rafters up, but not finished. Then came the tornado and completely destroyed even what we had. These good people need real encouragement from all concerned. We organized in September of 1960 a new church in an exclusive residential neighborhood. It is Highland Hills Methodist Church. The Highland Hills community is the location of the new Bishop College. The Dallas Board of Church Extension, a part of the North Texas Conference of the South Central Jurisdictian purchased for us five acres of land across the street from the administration building of Bishop College. This mission now has a membership of thirty persons and is meeting each week with a church school and preaching service in the J. N. Ervin School in the community.

After having experienced the great out-pouring of the Holy Spirit during the enrichment service held at Houston, Texas, nearly every church on the district has had membership gains. Hamilton Park Church, only four years old, has now grown to a church with nearly 500 members. During the past year, this church alone has had more than 200 additions to its membership. St. Andrews in Fort Worth, has great gains under the able leadership of the pastor, Rev. L. L. Haynes, Sr., Warren, St. Paul, Dallas, our church in the beautiful city of Wichita Falls, Texas have had great gains in membership. Cowan-McMillan, Cogswell, both here in Fort Worth have enjoyed great gains in membership. Thompson Chapel, Fort Worth,

Texas, under the leadership of Brother S. A. Keesee, has done well. Two years ago when Brother Keesee came to Thompson Chapel, this congregation had less than $\$ 500$ with which to build a place of worship. Today, under his able leadership, we have a place of real beauty at Thompson Chapel in North Fort Worth. The membership has been increased and every claim, both local as well as general have been met in full.

General and Conference Benevolences have been carefully held up at each Quarterly Conference. We have done our best to represent each phase of the Church's program. The reports of pastors throughout the district will show just how well the claims of the church have been met.

The pastors in the district, for the most part, have been very cooperative. Whatever degree of success which has been experienced by those of us on the Dallas District during the year can easily be traced back to the fact that we have had a fine spirit of cooperation among us. Although, we have had this good relationship among ourselves, there are, nevertheless, churches which if expected to succeed in future years, must have changes in leadership.

Thanks to Bishop and Mrs. N. W. Moore, Jr., for both sympathetic and kind understanding of us during this first year as we have striven to work together.

## San Antonio District: Robert S. Mosby, D. S.

The San Antonio District is an ever growing challenge. There are increasing demands for more and better services through organized religion, with few exceptions. The work has gone forward under the able leadership of the following ministers and their churches: Brothers W. L. Andrew, William M. Brothers, J. H. Carruthers, O. B. Coe, C. W. Franklin, J. S. C. Grattan, Dale H. Hansboro, E. L. Harrison, L. H. Haywood, A. C. Holden, Mason Johnson, Harvey Kinchelow, John H. Marshall, Albert S. Pitts, J. B. Richardson, E. A. Rogers, C. W. Smith, Martin J. Walker, T. R. Watkins, Elmo Watson and F. D. Young.

At the West Laurel Hts. Methodist Church, Rev. Mason Johnson and his people are the subjects of special mention as they have spent more than five thousand dollars in the renovation of the Church and the area about the Church.

The Rev. E. A. Rogers and his people are in the midst of a building and expansion program in the city of Harlingen, which argues well for our Methodism. We pay tribute of respect and gratitude to Rev. Herholtzer and his Board of the First Methodist Church of Harlingen for the help they are giving us in this work of renovation and building. They are accepting responsibility for more than seven thousand dollars of the total cost of our building and renovation projects.

There is a new emphasis in the San Antonio Area on the building of a cooperative and workable attitude between the racial groups in the district. We are happy to be a part of this very vital and necessary progress.

Ilness has visited the homes of our parsonages. The Rev. J. H. Carruthers of St. Paul Church has weathered a slight seige and is now at work again.

The Rev. J. H. Marshall of Kerrville has been ill most of the conference year and has come, at last, to the point where each of us sometimes must arrive.

We have conscientiously supported the Quadrennial Program of the Church and committed ourselves to its promotion.

All of the demands for World Service, Conference Benevolence, Higher Education, Pensions, Episcopal Funds and other askings have been faithfully presented, and the Ministers and Churches have responded with honest effort.

## Waco District: C. D. Owens, D. S.

The Waco District is proud to report another year of its Stewarship for the building of God's Kingdom.

There has been increased interest in most of the phases of the

Churchs' Program, and our pastors have been diligent in leading the congregation in the New Quadrennial Program, declaring "Jesus Christ is Lord" while a large part of our district is rural, from where most young people are moving in search of a more secure livlihood, yet a number of our churches report a marked increase in membership. Both pastors and members have not been unmindful of the tremendous need for the liberal sharing of their possessions to the great Church World Wide Mission Program. Therefore, most congregations have worked diligently in an effort to make their report in full.

The unprecedented interest which our people of the district are showing in the development of New Churches, and the renovation of older ones, represent new appreciation for the lovely and beautiful. As a result of this growing appreciation, we have another beautiful Edifice on the Maysfield Circuit. Rev. I. C. Greer and his loyal people at Swan Chapel (Rosebud, Texas) have given us theis lovely building. We now have three fine churches on this circuit under the leadership of Rev. Greer. Rev. George L. Johnson and his courageous members of St. James Temple have done a Herculean task in giving to the Church a lovely brick tile plant at a cost of $\$ 35,000.00$ It is a thing of Beauty, and for the two churches mentioned above, many thanks go to the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church for its liberal donations.

Rev. John L. Preciphs and his fine people at Davis Chapel, Marlin, are now in the process of a complete renovation job on the church, when completed will give the appearance of a new building. Much credit is due these pastors and members for a job well done. Several other congregations are planning new Church Homes within the next Conference year.

As we come to the close of three years of service here on the Waco District, we want to give thanks to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon our work, thanks to our ministers and laymen for their untiring support to the Conference and District program.

The Western District: M. A. L. Freeman, D. S.
With sincere thanksgiving unto our Heavenly Father for His continual blessings and providence over us and His spiritual guidance of our lives, we present unto the Conference this report of the Churches and their pastors on our Western District.

I have traveled fifty thousand miles to promote the program of the great Church, have given assiduous application to total enlistment for Christ, evangelism, Christian education, world service, advance specials and other benevolences, conference and district projects, church extensions and building, recruitments for college and seminaries. With pledges and cash, we have raised $\$ 1,800$ on a New Western District Parsonage.

Inclement weather has been extremely unimical, but the only thing that brought tranquility to our hearts is the theme for our Quadrennial Emphasis for 1960-64, "JESUS CHRIST IS LORD". Our faith in Christ spurred our ambition and we became cognizant of the function of that inevitable trinitarian system that gave us the ego in the midst of despair to achieve.

Our pastors on the district: E. H. Carter, R. L. Palmer, Joel R. Harris, W. M. Wamsley, A. D. Porter, H. W. Curtis, C. J. Houston, M. T. Reed, have done a remarkable job. The church debt at Levelland was liquidated under the leadership of M. T. Reed. Rev. M. C. Stone and his congregation are building a New Brick Building at Midland, Texas. Rev. J. L. Mayfield and his congregation have repaired our church at Lampassas, Texas. Rev. I. C. Loud and his congregation have completely renovated the Myrtle Avenue Church at El Paso, Texas. Rev. J. S. Loud has organized a New congregation at O'Donnell, Texas. Plans are being made to build a new church this conference year. Rev. E. L. Spencer has paid Wyatt Memorial Church out of debt and has had many new additions this year.

Bishop Moore, there is much that is unfinished and incomplete. The program of the coordinating council, presented at the General Conference and unanimously adopted, calls us to affirm that, "JESUS CHRIST IS LORD." Let this affirmation undergird our plans and our work. Then,

## Special Recommendations

From the Commission on World Service and Finance:

1. We recommend that all Annual Conference indebtedness to Banks, the Board of Pensions and Co-operations shall be paid in full in the next three (3) years of this Quadrennium.
2. We recommend that the West Texas Conference pay to the NashvilleBirmingham Area $\$ 5,100.00$ which represents the equity of the Mississippi and Upper Mississippi Annual Conferences in the New Orleans Episcopal Residence.
3. We recommend that all individual indebted to the West Texas Conference because of Dishonored Checks, shall reimburse re refund the Conference in Monthly, Semi-Annual or Annual Installments until the amounts owed the Conference are paid in full.
4. We recommend that the West Texas Conference establish a Conference Reserve Fund. And that a reasonable amount for the establishing of this Fund be placed in the 1962-1963 Conference Budget.

## Regular Recommendations

We recommend that the following percentages be used in making apportionments to the five Districts of the Conference.

Austin-Victoria District ....................... $22.0 \%$
Dallas District ....................................... $31.4 \%$
San Antonio District ........................... $26.5 \%$

Western District ................................... $5.2 \%$

## Ministerial Support <br> The Episcopal Fund

We recommend that the Episcopal Fund shall be $2 \%$ of the Pastor's Cash Salary.

## The Conference Claimant Fund

(A) We recommend that the Conference Claimant Fund shall be $15 \%$ of the Pastor's Cash Salary.
(B) $12 \%$ of this amount shall be for immediate distribution.
$3 \%$ of this amount shall be for the Reserve Pension Fund.

## The Minimum Salary Fund

We recommend that the minimum Support Fund shall be $2 \%$ of the Pastor's Cash Salary.

## The District Superintendent's Salaries Paragraphs 802, 821 \& 822

5. We recommend that the District Board of Stewards of the Several Districts of the Conference shall set the District Superintendent's Salaries at $16 \%$ of the combined Pastor's and Associate Pastor's estimated salaries.

The Western District is the Missionary Extension District of the Conference, and is entitled to Board of Mission Subsidy Fund, Maintenance Funds and Advance Funds. An amount of $\$ 2,000.00$ is included in the Conference Budget of the Conference Board of Missions to subsidize the District Superintendent's Salary of the Western District.

## The Waco District

The Waco District is largely composed of Rural Circuits: therefore, the Waco District with its present charges cannot adequately support a District Superintendent. We are recommending that an amount of $\$ 500.00$ out of the Annual Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension Funds be allocated to the Waco District to subsidize the District Superintendent's Salary on the Waco District.
6. We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance shall make the apportionments for World Service, Conference Benevolence and all other Conference askings to the Charges of the Conference. Par: 796.

The Charges of the Conference shall pay World Service, Conference Benevolence and all other Conference askings by Certified Check, Cashiers Check or Money-Order. All such checks and money-orders shall be made to the Annual Conference Treasurer.

All amounts collected on the World Service and Conference Benevolence Budget shall be remitted to the Conference Treasurer monthly by local Charge Treasurers. See Par: 804.

## Advance Funds

The West Texas Conference Advance Specials are to be administered by the Conference Board of Missions. The total Advance Goal for the West Texas Conference Year is $\$ 2,000.00$.

The Pastoral Charges of the Conference are requested to take a special offering for Advance Special during the month of November. Local Charge Treasurers shall remit the same to the Conference Treasurer clearly designated for Advance Specials.

## The Minimum Per Capita Asking For the Conference Benevolence Budget

The minimum per capita asking for The Benevolence Budget is the same throughout the Conference. The Conference is asking that every charge in the Conference raise a total amount for the budget equal to $\$ 5.00$ per capita for $75 \%$ of the full members of the charges reported by the charge in the 1960 Annual Conference Journal.

The apportionment to every charge in the Conference is made upon this basis:

Our total budget is $\$ 74,250.00$.
This amount represents a minimum per capita asking of less than two cents per day, or ten cents per week, or fifty cents per month.

For 14,850 church members or approximately $75 \%$ of the total membership of 19,793 , many of us must and will give more than the minimum. None of us can afford to give less than the minimum asking.

## ANNUAL REPORT <br> OF THE <br> WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., and members of the Eighty-Seventh Session of the West Texas Annual Conference, Greetings:

I have the honor to transmit herewith a report of activities of the Board of Education during the 1960-61 conference year. On September 15, 1960, the members of the board elected for the 1960-1964 quadrennium met pursuant to call of the convener. The following persons were elected as officers of the board for the quadrennium: Dr. W. Astor Kirk, President; Reverend Prenza L. Woods, Vice-President; Mrs. M. M. Loud, Secretary; Reverend Ira B. Loud, Treasurer.
representative to the Bolivia Missions, made his report to that body. Mr. Robinson, St. Andrews, Fort Worth, had had only two engagements since returning. He is yet available to your local church and has some wonderful slides.

## Adult Work

For some few years we have been proposing an adult convocation on Christian education. This year we brought into fruition something of the idea which has been haunting our dreams and aspirations for adult workers. Four of our five district directors of adult work became involved in a biconference Adult Convocation on Christian education at our St. Paul Methodist Church, San Antonio, February 17-19, 1961. The Reverend Robert S. Clemmons, General Board of Education, participated as the major resource leader. The convocation was of special benefit to our district directors and to the workers in San Antonio. The purpose was to give to the district directors some insights that would enable them to sponsor a like convocation within their respective district during the ensuing conference year.

We lament the $29.7 \%$ decrease reported in the attendance of our adults to the church school activities in 1960. We feel that within our adult membership lies our greatest potential, and need, for our concerted efforts in enlisting members for our church school. With only $49.5 \%$ of our total church membership being members of our church schools, we can readily see that there are far too many within our fellowship that are being unattended in their religious growth and development, which can only come through an involvement in study.

## General Church School Work

The primary activity in this area, beyond the usual conducting of local workers' conferences and personal conferences with administrators and teachers, is the annual series of Church School Administrator Conferences that are held in each district each year. This year the Reverend E. T. Dixon, Jr., Department of General Church School Work, Division of the Local Church, General Board of Education, came with us January 5-10 to conduct within each of our five districts a meeting. The attendance to these meetings this year was quite encouraging. In these meetings we are able to get at the tap root of the problems that church school officials and teachers are having.

## Yoư̂h Work

There have been no concerted efforts in the area of youth work this year that would resemble the workings on a major emphasis. However, local churches seem to have a keen interest in keeping their Methodist Youth Fellowships alive. This has been very apparent with many of the local churches that I have visited. The Sunday afternoon meetings are well attended. The additional activities of the youth groups like youth choirs, special study classes, and other fellowshipping activities can be found in local church after local church within the conference. The prennial cry from pastor and youth alike is "we need interested, capable, and dependable adult leadership." It is my personal judgement that this is our most crucial need in the West Texas Conference in the area of dealing effectively with our youth.

District youth Institutes were held in four of our five districts this summer. We were proud of the quality of these meetings because they reflected the care in planning that had been given. The District Directors of Youth Work in each of our districts are persons who truly give of themselves in bringing to all the activities that they sponsor the most capable leadership available.

The signal activity in the area of youth work this conference year was the New Orleans Area Youth Convocation. The West Texas Conference did itself quite a notable task in hosting this meeting. There were approximately 220 youth involved in this activity. The West Texas Conference had a very regretable and embarassing 43 in attendance. The youth of our conference were deprived of a very rich experience. Special words of high commendations should be expressed to Dr. Kirk, Rev. Purnell, Rev. Woods, and many, many others of our conference who worked very hard to uphold the high esteem of our conference as host.

Because of an early conference this year the annual coaching session of our deans and district directors has been moved into May. This year we shall continue the use of the core unit study in our institute programs.

The youth day activities during the Saturday of our Annual Conference continues to be a very rewarding experience in the lives of our youth. We are seeking to have our youth well informed about the working of an annual conference. This year we have a very excellent program planned and we anticipate that our attendance will be larger than ever. The Methodist youth at Huston-Tillotson College are warking with the program, and our own Earnest T. Dixon, Jr. will be the preacher in our evening worship.

This year we participated with the Northwest Texas Conference, W.S.C.S. in sponsoring an accredited enterprise for the Negro youth of the Protestant Churches in the West Texas area. The school was held in Lubbock, Texas, and the Reverend M. T. Reed served as its Dean. There were youth from our churchesc in Midland, Abilene, Lubbock, Amarillo, and Levelland. This is an enterprise that I feel we should continue to support.

February 24-26 were the dates for a CHURCH VOCATIONS CONFERENCE that was held at Huston-Tillotson College. The Reverend Richard Bauer, Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations, Nashville, Tennessee, was the main speaker for this conference. Aside from the youth of the college, we had 11 youth present. Since this was a new venture we are planning to continue this activity for another year. The information that is received from such a conference makes its imperative for us to continue.

## Young Adult Work

There are still too few young adult fellowship groups organized within our conference. These fellowship groups should be organized as a result of a passionate concern for the continued growth and nurture which is desparately needed.

The Young Adults of the West Texas Conference met with the "TriConference Young Adult Assembly" in June at the Mt. Wesley Assembly, Kerrville. Our conference was represented with 10 persons, representing five local churches-two districts. Mr. Burnham A. Robinson, our conference
representative to the Bolivia Missions, made his report to that body. Mr. Robinson, St. Andrews, Fort Worth, had had only two engagements since returning. He is yet available to your local church and has some wonderful slides.

This total represents a $.93 \%$ increase over our offerings for last year ( $\$ 738.72$. Of course, this is only $57.6 \%$ of our anticipated goal for this year. We can and must come closer to realizing our anticipated goals for Rally Day because this is our primary source for funds for the promotion of our work.

## Leadership Educarion

This has been our poorest year for sometime now in the number of Christian Workers' Schools that have been held. This year we held two Second Series schools in Dallas; one being the Tri Conference school (North

Texas and Rio Grande Conferences) at Perkins School of Theology. Our total attendance for both of these enterprises was only 76 . There were five Second Series schools held through the conference this year (Lockhart, Wichita Falls, Lubbock, Beeville, and San Antonio). Our total attendance for all of these schools was 203. The reports in 1960 showed that there were 1,165 teachers and officers in our church schools. Our goal has been to try to involve at least half of our total workers in some type of leadership enterprise. Two hundred seventy-nine persons are two few to have been involved in approved local leadership schools.

The West Texas Conference was represented at the Area Leadership School in Gulfside with 14 persons. This was eleven short of our conference goal and quota. Many of the 14 were conference, district, and local church workers. The board of education participated in the financing for four of this number. All persons attending the school have made themselves available for services within the conference.

As reported earlier, countless workers' conferences have been held in local churches this conference year by the executive secretary. It is through this medium that the problems of local churches become really known, and their needs ministered unto.

We are continuing our cooperation with the established schools with our overlapping sister conferences in Methodism. Many of these schools are held on a biennial basis.

## Church Music

One of the most satisfying experiences of the year was the series of five Church Music Workshops held throughout the conference. Dr. Bliss Wiant, General Board of Education, and Dr. Frederick Hall, Dillard University, were the special resource leaders. We had a total of 320 in attendance for these workshops. Our certified Directors of Church Music gave invaluable leadership in their respective group meetings. The Board has approved the continuance of the certification of the following persons: Mrs. Marcet H. King, Mr. Natheniel G. Williams, Mr. Dillard Warner, and a new certification for Mr. T. Lloyd Hines.

## Methodist Student Work - Wesley Foundations

The work with our Methodist students at Huston-Tillotson College is of a very high quality. The Reverend H. W. Willis, College Minister, has continued to give excellent leadership to a very sound program. The number of Methodist students on campus this year is a slight increase over that of last year. There is no Methodist Student Movement, as such, on campus; the Methodist students are involved in the Student Christian Association, the official campus religious organization. This group has sponsored two special retreats, along with several other regular activities. There are several preministerial students on campus and the Oxford Club has been reactivated.

Boards of Directors have been established this year for the Wesley Foundations at Prairie View College and Texas Southern University. It is encouraging to note the work that is being done by the Reverend W. B. Randolph at Prairie View, and the Reverend R. E. Hayes at Texas Southern University. We envision some rather meaningful work in both of these situations in the immediate years ahead.

## Audio Visuals

The West Texas Conference is still cooperating in the sponsoring of the Southwestern Audio Visual Workshop, Southwestern University, Georgetown. We did not, however, have a representative to the workshop this year. The executive secretary served on the staff. A goodly amount of publicity has already been put into the workshop for July.

The conference board's library is continuing to grow with its filmstrips and films. We are often called upon for the use of our equipment and to project audio visuals for various types of meetings. I would like to use this medium for encouraging the use of the new filmstrips and films that have been released recently by TRAFCO for the promoting of World Service, and understanding the work of the Commissions.

## Leadership Education

1. Each district will be expected to send its full district staff in Christian education to our Area Leadership School, Gulfside Assembly, July 31August 5, 1961. The West Texas Conference has a quota of 25 for this enterprise; we should fulfill our quota this year. The Conference Staff will be expected to attend.
2. In order to provide for more effective work in our local churches, we shall seek to conduct more accredited leadership schools (both First and Second Series) within our conference this year. Our goals in this area are five Second Series Schools and 10 First Series Schools.
3. Invitations are deesired for SPECIAL WORKER'S CONFERENCES with local churches.
4. We shall continue to cooperate in the already established and newly created Leadership Schools that are jointly sponsored with conferences beyond our jurisdictional boundaries. There are currently four established schools, and we expect that there shall increasingly be more.

## Church Music

During the month of February we shall conduct another series of Church Music Workshops within the districts of the conference. We hope to secure the services of Dr. Frederick Hall, Dillard University, New Orleans, Louisiana, for these Workshops.

## Family Life

1. Local Commissions on Education shall be encouraged to organize and establish functioning Committees on Family Life.
2. Attendance to the National Family Life Conference in February, 1962, Chicago, will be encouraged. We hope to have at least three couples from the West Texas Conference attending.
3. Following the National Family Life Conference we hope to have some district family life conferences.

## Audio Visual Education

1. Attendance to the Southwestern Regional Audio Visual Workshop, July 5-7, 1961, Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas, will be strongly encouraged. We hope that all of our certified instructors, conference and district directors in Missions, Evangelism, Social Christian Concerns, and chairmen of local church committees on audio visuals will avail themselves of this training experience.
2. We are earnestly encouraging the proper use of the recently released audio visuals that are available to local churches in assisting them to interpret the World Service program of the Church. Our office will be glad to be of assistance in the use of these and other audio visuals.

## THE HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT TO THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION <br> Report on Christian Higher Education

To: Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr. and Members of the 87th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference, The Methodist Church.

## "WHAT THE CHURCH WANTS TO BE TOMORROW IN VISION AND SERVICE IT MUST EDUCATE FOR TODAY."

Today we meet in the City of Austin, near the campus of our college, but the college is always with us. It is wherever men and women who are concerned turn their hearts and their minds to the challenge of education. We cannot escape the pressures of change and crises. We cannot turn a deaf ear to the call of the times. Young men and women are hungry for knowledge and we must provide the mental nourishment which is required.

Our world is in a dangerous state. The demands of this world are tremendous and we must provide the highest level of academic achievement possible. We cannot afford to be blind to the movements of our world and we must be sensitive to the needs of our young people as they prepare to face the future. Ours is a great challenge and a Herculean task. We carry upon our backs the burden of our task but our faces must carry the light of faith and hope and love.

The kind of education which we provide for our children is of utmost importance and we must continually engage in educational soul searching in order to be sure that we are proceeding in the right direction. We must continually study our goals and revise them in accordance with the demands of the era. The kind of education we give our young people in the generation ahead depends on the goals we determine now and during the next few years. What do we want in Christian higher education? What do we need? What does our position in the world demand?

No one can answer these questions exactly, but we can give some directed thought to them. As a church we must be concerned about them. There has been an accelerated pace of human events, an explosion of knowledge, a surge of poplation, an almost unbelievable breakthrough in science and technology, and, possibly more important than any other force, a menacing challenge to democracy from without our country and from within. The church must concern itself in each of these areas.

As we face the future it is well to remind ourselves that young people in the next generation will live a part of their lives as adults in the twenty first century. They must be prepared to meet its most strenuous tests. Even the best models of education from the past will not be good enough for them. This is due, perhaps to the fact that America has been producing what
one "authority" calls an "educational deficit." That there is an "educational deficit," we can only speculate. However, recent releases indicate that a Russian Man-nik has illuminated our educational skies and this speaks to us in a most positive way.

The bulwark of higher education in America for many years has been our private and church-related colleges and universities. They have important and unique functions to perform in the future and they must be continued as strong and vigorous institutions-educationally, administratively, and financially. They give American education a diversity and scope not possible in tax-supported institutions alone, and they have an opportunity to emphasize individualistic patterns of thought and courses of action. For the years ahead our church must extend itself moreso in order to insure the continuance of the effectiveness of its institutions by providing more substantial support, both financially and in terms of recruitment.

The problem of financing higher education has always been difficult. This is so whether one is responsible for the College budget or for the education of his own children. The church-related college cannot provide an adequate educational program financed by the fees which students pay. Therefore, it is necessary for colleges, through gifts and grants, endowments and auxiliary enterprises, to provide additional funds equal to the need. Huston-Tillotson College has no endowment fund of any consequence. Its main benefactors are The Methodist Church, the American Missionary Association of the Congregational Christian Churches, and the United Negro College Fund.

During the 1956-1960 Quadrennium, The Methodist Church was engaged in its "Higher Education Emphasis." This "Emphasis" is being continued in the present quadrennium. The Eighty-Sixth Annual Session of the West Texas Conference was very generous in granting permission to enlarge the Committee on Christian Higher Education and organize the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education.

The Commission is most anxious to work constructively with the Board and with the College in the area of promotion. Because of scheduling difficulties the Commission did not have a meeting separate from the Board meeting. However, the Commission was engaged in promotional activity on a small scale during the conference year.

The commission recommends that each local church consider the following matters:

1. Selection of a Local Church Representative For Christian Higher Education.
2. Adoption of the proposed organizational chart for higher education activities within the local church.
Details of each of these recommendations are included in this report.
The Commission is very pleased to state that evidence points to good operations on the campus of Huston-Tillotson College. The pages which follow give positive indication of this.

The Commission and the College are pleased to submit this first report of the Quadrennium. We look forward to the remainder of the Quadrennium with great anticipation. We express our gratitude to Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., for his dynamic leadership. We are grateful to the District Superintendents, the other ministers, and the laymen of our conference for their understanding, great concern, and support of our work in this important part of the educative process in America We solicit your continued support and your prayers.

## Suggested Duties of the Local Church Representative for Christian Higher Education

Each local church is asked to appoint a representative for Christian Higher Education whose duties may include the following:

1. To serve as a member of the local church Commission on Education.
2. To receive materials concerning Christian Higher Education and make proper distribution within the local church. (Materials and information received from the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, Huston-Tillotson College, and other sources are considered in this section.)
3. To assist in the planning and arranging for special days relating to Christian Higher Education in the church school, during certain worship services, and in special presentations.
Special Days: June-Methodist Student Day; December-Student Recognition Day; February-Race Relations Day.
4. To consult with high school students of the church, inform them about Huston-Tillotson College, and send their names to the College.
5. To encourage parents to carefully consider sending their sons and daughters to Huston-Tillotson College.
6. To assist Methodist high school students in obtaining information rerelative to the financing of a college education.
7. To help arrange visits to the Huston-Tillotson College campus.
a. by church school groups.
b. by other church organizations.
c. by individual family groups.
8. To acquaint those Methodist high school graduates who plan to attend Prairie View A\&M College, Texas Southern University, and other state colleges and universities, with Wesley Foundation work at those institutions.
9. To organize systematic communication with students from the local church attending college.
10. To solicit the support of all members in the local church in raising $\$ 1.30$ per member annually for Huston-Tillotson College and the cooperative Wesley Foundation ventures at Prairie View A\&M College and at Texas Southern University.
11. To suggest how to utilize the services of members of the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education and personnel of HustonTillotson College in promoting the cause of Christian Higher Education in the local church.
12. To discover alumni of Huston-Tillotson College living in the community of the local church and enlist their help in implementing the above program.

## THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF PENSIONS

## Recommendations:

1. Whereas since 1950 our assessement to the charges for pensions has been $15 \%$ of the pastor's cash salary-and whereas this year we began not only a new decade, but a new quadrennium with more claimants and greater responsibilities that assessment to the charges be an amount equal to $18 \%$ of the pastor's cash salary, $3 \%$ of which shall be designated "Reserve Pension Fund" and $15 \%$ designated as conference claimants for immediate distribution.
2. We recommend that the charges be urged to follow the disciplinary requirements and report to the conference treasurer monthly or at least once per quarter.
3. We urge our District Superintendents to check at each roll call to see that the requirements for reporting our pension fund are being observed.
4. We recommend that the balance of $\$ 20,000$ due the "Reserve Pension Fund" be allocated to the several districts on the basis of their accepted ratio and that Superintendents will break down to the charges their share of the quota.

5. In accordance with paragraph 1692, section 4, we recommend that there be included in our Conference Journal each year the amount apportioned to each charge for Pensions and the amount paid.
6. That we request our General Board of Pensions to pay our claimants on a monthly basis rather than on a quarterly basis as heretofore.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

Bishop Moore, Members and Friends of the 87th session of the West Texas Annual Conference:

It is with a deep sense of gratitude and sincere humility that I come to make our annual report for the Conference Board of Evangelism. Evangelism is the heart of the Church. If it is sound, all that is the body of Christ is a-throb with vital power. If it is strong, every concern and activity which belongs to the body of Christ is carried forward with competence.

We believe the Church has arrived at an hour of supreme opportunity. This is true in terms of unprecedented growth, especially in the United States of America. Present trends indicate there will be a net gain of more than $64,000,000$ people in this country within the next twenty years. This of itself calls for an intensive and extensive program of evangelism which will result in the establishment of thousands of new churches, recruiting and training of more ministers and the reaching of millions of unchurched persons for Christ and His Church.

The Churches' opportunity rises even more urgently from the total world situation and from issues of far greater import than population expansion. In this respect, when has Jesus Christ stood more tall against the skyline of past and future needs? When has the world been more in need of Him? Where is the solution to compare with new men and a new world which can born through Him?

Salvation gained through Christ begins within. Christianity conquers evil and creates goodness first within the heart and mind. It links men with love, power, and wisdom of God. Then through men whose hearts God has cleansed, whose thoughts God directs, and whose deeds God empower, Christianity conquers evil and establishes good.

Our Board has cooperated with the General, Jurisdictional, and Area Board in promoting the program of evangelism for the 1960-61 conference year. Ninety per cent of all churches throughout the conferences have organized and working commissions. We have conducted a workshop in each of the several districts. Our district secretaries have cooperated with the District Superintendents in carrying forward the total program of evangelism, emphasizing: "Jesus Christ Is Lord".

Many churches across the conference reported the observance of the following special days: Christmas for Christ; Watch Night Service; Church Attendance Crusade; From January 1 through Easter, and Four Nights for God. These reports are quite encouraging.

## Program For 1951-1962

The College of Bishops of the Central Jurisdiction have approved the recommendation by the department of area and conferences of the General Board of Evangelism a membership goal of 34,500 new members (net) by the General Conference in 1964. When accomplished, the membership of the Jurisdiction will be 401,840 .

Therefore, we your Conference Board of Evangelism recommend that the goal of the West Texas Conference be 2,500 members (net) for this quadrennium, and that our goal for 1961-1962 to be 800 new members (net) broken to the districts as follows:

San Antonio District ..... 200
Waco District ..... 125
Western District ..... 75
TOTAL ..... 800

We also recommend that the district committees under the leadership of the District Superintendents and District Secretaries of Evangelism in planning conference apportion to each charge its goal (using world service ratio) as a guide.

We request that the membership secretary in each local church in cooperation with the Pastor and commission on membership and evangelism report net gains to the District Secretary of Evangelism at the District Conference or 30 days before the next session of the Annual Conference.

## Evangelism in the Local Church

1. We urge that each Pastor organize the Commission on Membership and Evangelism in the local church. Using the new manual by C. Lloyd Daugherty.
2. We recommend that each local Commission on Membership and Evangelism have an organized group of persons responsible for the care of the membership including:
(a) Visitation of members.
(b) Cultivating the careless.
(c) Classes for Prospective members.
3. We urge each Pastor to organize membership classes for boys and girls, youth and adults.
4. To give full participation to the quadrennial emphasis on spiritual enrichment.
5. We recommend that the Bishop's Crusade of 1959 be repeated in 1962 suggesting March 11-18 as its date.
6. We recommend the following special days for the observance of Evangelistic Out-reach:
(a) World Wide Communion, Oct. 1, 1961.
(b) Watch Night, Dec. 31, 1961.
(c) Aldersgate, May 24, 1962.
(d) Pentecost, June 10, 1962.
7. We urge that the Conference Secretary, the Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism and each District Secretary attend the Council meeting at State Y. M. C. A. Building, Blue Ridge, N. C., June 30 - July 5, 1961.

To be counted worthy to render such meager service as my limited ability will permit, to a Church possessed of a Missionary passion, a Missionary zeal, a Missionary outlook and a Missionary outreach which encompasses the globe quite overwhelms me.

The vast Missionary enterprise of the Church is carried forward through two divisions, namely, The Division of World Missions and The Division of National Missions.

## The Fields Introduction

The Division of World Missions is today a channel of cooperation between Methodism in the United States and 45 other countries. The Church sends missionaries and recurring grants to:

The Department of Work in Foreign Fields of the Woman's Division of Christian Service co-operates with the Division of World Missions in all these countries except Austria, Belgium, Costa Rica, Okianwa and Panama.

National Missions: Areas-Served by the Division of National Missions and The Department of work in the Home Field of The Woman's Division of Christian Service. This vast enterprise is carried forward on the Mainland of the U.S., in Alaska, The Hawaiian Islands, the Dominican Republic and Puerto Rico.

The Division of Home Missions can boast of two mighty potent armsthat reach out to support and to lift: namely, the Section of Home Missions and the Section of Church Extension. Thus build we the Kingdom of God for there are those who have a mind to work.

But in order to carry on so great a work we must have trained spiritfilled, conscientious, dedicated personnel. From the Foreword of the Blueprint of quadrennial Emphase for the Methodist Church 1960-1964, I quote; "At Denver in April, the General Conference responded to a growing conviction that the Christian Church today needs a rediscovery of its nature and Mission, the role of the clergy and laity in worship, Witness and Service, and our dependence upon the presence and power of the Holy Spirit as set forth in the New Testament. It, therefore, adopts Quadrennial Emphases, with two trusts under the theme "Jesus Christ is Lord."

The first emphasis is toward Spiritual renewal-a fresh experience of Jesus Christ as Lord, a fuller expression of His judgement and grace, a New Testament experience of fellowship in Christ, a complete commitment to
obedience. The Second emphasis is Spiritual outreach-making concrete and Specific our obedience in carrying out His Commission in nine Areas of human need and opportunity for witness.

The responsibility for organizing and implementing these quadrennial emphases was given by the General Conference to the council of Bishops. Nine of their members were selected to Serve as the Quadrennial Committee. The District Superintendents Convocation which was the outgrowth of the quadrennial committees-careful planning, met in the City of Chicago, Nov. 18-20, 1960. It was sponsored by the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation.

Here for three action filled days, a Stupendous delegation representing a Cross Section of the leadership of the Church, moved forward in a program of orientation. Here also through the media of prayer, address, sermon and discussion, we sought to recapture the Spiritual renewal and radiance so greatly needed to power the Church's Quadrennial thrust. We came back from that great meeting walking on bubbles.

## Our Mission Today

One of the Areas of great human need and opportunity for witness is that of Missions. The Church exists essentially, not for itself or even its own people and their upbuilding, but for its Mission to the World.

In the April number of the Christian Herald there is a very gripping Serman on the resurrection, the theme of which is "Go, Tell!" Here in these two words-it seems to me is encompassed the whole plan of outreach and uplift in the processes of human redemption. Go: that is Missions. Tell: that is Evangelism. Our great Church calls upon us to intensify our Missionary obedience in the face of Christ's Commission "Go ye into all the world, to intensify our efforts to enlist a larger number of Missionary candidates, to increase the interest and concern of our people for the evangelization of the world and provide means whereby Missionaries may be sent. Every Methodist is asked to support our Missionary outreach by his prayers and gifts.

## Purpose

If we are to accomplish these goals, "We must Seek" a clearer understanding of the nature and Validity of the Church.

The interpretation of this emphasis is based upon the following four aspects:

1. The faith that compels us.
2. The factors that confront us.
3. The frontiers that call us.
4. The Program that unites us in witness and service.

A nationwide Study program to rethink the validity and nature of our missionary enterprise is now under way. Three Leadership Conferences were held in February. The contact with Methodist Churches of the United States will be through Annual Conference Teams composed of the following persons:

Chairman, Conference Board of Missions-President, Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service-Conference Missionary Secretary-Secretary of Missionary Education, Conference Woman's Society-Chairman, Conference Commission on Vocations-Secretary of Missionary Personnel, Conference Woman's Society-One District Superintendent-Two PastorsOne Layman-One Laywoman. Each Annual Conference Team will have a Leader.

The Conference Missionary Secretary-
The Conference Missionary Secretary serves as Special Spokesman for Missions in an Annual Conference. He shall promote the policies and plans of the Board of Missions. He shall seek to develop a close working relationship with the Bishop and District Superintendents.

Hs is to consult with the District Superintendents in the matter of their appointment of District Missionary Secretaries. He is to be an active member of the Annual Conference Team and a Regular member of the Conference Board of Missions. He will encourage a healthy and fair ratio between World Service giving and the Conference benevolence program. Prepare Mission displays at Annual Conference. Encourage the observance of a Missionary Anniversary at Conference.

This import is our very Challenging task. As to work done, we attended the great District Superintendent Convocation held in Chicago. We attended the Regional Conference on Missions in New Orleans. We have distributed much Missionary literature and caused to be held two Conferences on Missions within the Conference.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE April, 1961

Bishop Moore, District Superintendents, Ministers, Delegates, and Christian Friends:

In the name of the 2,796 women of the West Texas Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild. I bring greetings and a most hearty welcome to our new Bishop and "First Lady" of our Area, Bishop and Mrs. Noah W. Moore, Jr.

It is with the deepest sense of humility and gratitude to our divine leader, ministers, officers and members of the Conference Society and Guild that I share the first account of my brief stewardship.

We are privileged to begin a new quadrennium with the General Church theme, "Jesus Christ Is Lord," with the Board of Missions adopting "Our Mission Today" as the new quadrennium emphasis. Our challenge is even greater as we attempt to promote the four major emphases: 1. "The Faith That Compels Us"; 2. "Factors That Confront Us"; 3. "Frontiers That Call Us"; and 4. "The Program That Unites Us in Witness and Service."

The five district presidents join with the conference officers, secretaries in lines of work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild, in projecting this great program of dedicated service and love as we continue "Our Mission Today," in the quest of
Kingdom Building.

All conference officers, secretaries in lines of work and district presidents report some growth as well as promotion in all areas of the work, yet there is hope that through prayer and consistent implementation, our achievement will continue to improve as we strive to attain our emphasis for the quadrennium.

We lift up the following areas where definite progress is shown: an increase in the pledge and giving to Missions, increase in attendance at meetings, increase in literature sales, increase in approved study courses, increase in membership and cooperation with units of United Church Women, increase in exchange of fraternal delegates across the jurisdictional lines, increase in scholarships to girls to Huston-Tillotson College, increase in the observance of "Special Days," and increase in Special Memberships.

We are cognizant of the fact that we have areas which lack improvement, reports showing a major weakness; these are some of the "Factors That Confront Us" as we are challenged with the task to witness daily "Our Mission Today."

Delegates have represented the conference at the following Schools of Mission and Christian Service-Central Jurisdiction, held in June, at Clark College, Atlanta, Georgia; South Central Jurisdictional, held in June, at Mt. Sequoyah, Arkansas; Southwest Texas Conference, held in August, at Mt. Wesley, Kerrville, Texas. Other related meetings attended were, the Annual Meeting of the Texas Council of Methodist Women, held in December, at Fort Worth, Texas; Seminar on State Government, held in February, at Austin, Texas; Annual Meeting of Central Jurisdictional Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild, Chicago, Illinois, and Regional Orientation Consultants Committee on Race, at Louisville, Kentucky. In addition to the above meetings, I attended the Joint Area Council in August, held at Waveland, Mississippi; Gulfside Assembly; and the Quadrennial Program Planning Committee of the West Texas Annual Conference, held in Austin in February.

We are happy to report an increase in our 1961-62 pledge to the Woman's Society of Christian Service as well as judisdiction askings, of cultivation and service in the home and foreign fields.

Our School of Mission holds a coveted place in the hearts of the women and youth of our conference. This is exemplified by the increased attendance and cooperation. It is held here in Austin on the beautiful campus of Huston-Tillotson College. Our interracial faculty is accredited to teach the approved studies. The ministers of the conference give full cooperation to this annual project. Reports show the largest attendance in the history of the school in 1960, with more literature sold. The Youth School is held simultaneously, with the Youth, Student, and Missionary Personnels, and resident Deaconess planning and executing the activities for the youth with one of the approved studies in home or foreign missions for youth being taught.

Following the pattern set at the School of Mission, the districts held educational seminars. Local societies report completion of two to three studies to date. Leadership Education days art held also.

The Societies and Guilds sponsor cooperative projects such as scholarships for four young women attending Huston-Tillotson College, also "The Inez Elizabeth Ann Day Care Center" at Marlin, Texas. The latter project, owned and sponsored by the conference, serves the community in all areas. A renovation of the building is planned for the near future. Forty-three children ( 19 girls and 24 boys) have been enrolled for the 1960-61 school year. Six will graduate in May, Monies received and disbursed for the year totaled $\$ 1,039.89$. Plans are in the making to purchase fifty-five chairs for the Women's Dormitory at Huston-Tillotson College.

In observance of the twenty-year existence of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild, Heritage Teas and Anniversary Programs have been given throughout the conference. Special recognition has been given outstanding workers, such as Local President of the Year, District President of the Year, and District Secretary of the Year. Sixteen Adult Life Membership pins and two Youth pins have been given. They serve a two-fold purpose as they honor and increase the Mission pledge.

The Twenty-First Annual Meeting was held at Simpson Methodist

Church, April 14-16. "Our Mission Today" was our theme for the meeting with all speakers speaking on one of the four major emphases. Rev. E. C. Purnell brought the Communion Meditation, with its spiritual depth setting the tone for the day. Rev. A. D. Minor, host pastor, was in charge of the Communion Service and was assisted by Rev. M. A. Freeman, Superintendent of the Western District.

One of the highlights of the day was the College Hour with the Huston-Tillotson Choir rendering beautiful selections and President J. J. Seabrook delivering a most challenging and inspiring address on "Faith That Compels Us." Our four scholarship girls along with one of the recipients of the Methodist Scholarships presented "The Factors That Confront Us" in a panel discussion, with Dr. Carmen Lowry serving as moderator. A representative of the Texas Methodist Student Movement highlighted the objectives, etc. Miss Josephine Beckwith, Director of Bethlehem Center of Fort Worth, Texas, delivered an inspirational message on "Frontiers That Call Us; Our Mission on the Home and Foreign Fields." Officers and secretaries in lines of work reported on "The Program That Unites Us in Witness and Service."

To further realize "Our Mission Today," we must move forward in unity of service not contending for small things, but striving for great issues. Some one has well said, "Today the frontier of Christian witness is not mainly in the church building, but it is in places where the Christian is in contact with others sharing the same burden and suffering."

As we become of age we should feel a necessity to re-examine our faith as well as our obedience to it; as we emphasize "The Faith That Compels Us," and to bring to bear on all human life, the Spirit and Principles of Christ. Faith loses its compulsion when not exercised to its fullest extent. I know of no better way to express Christian Faith than to witness through action in the church. As a minute part of the $1,800,000$ Methodist women, we are a part of the laity which has or should have a very responsible voice in the program and policies of our great church. We are alert to our responsibilities and obligations, first as local church members by our support of the program and budget in our local churches. As we attempt to measure up to "Our Mission Today," we fully realize that the church has greater opportunities for service, yet the church is confronted with the greatest challenge is has had in the history of our country.

The purpose of the Woman's Division, as well os each quadrennium theme, serves in many ways to restate the aim of Missions as outlined in the Discipline of The Methodist Church, also to remind us of our Mission as Christians to make Christ known to all men around the world.

We again express our sincere appreciation to the Bishop and Ministers. We solicit your continued prayers, counseling, and cooperation as we labor to support the total church program, fully realizing that "The Church's One Foundation Is Jesus Christ Her Lord."

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SABBATH OBSERVANCE

Bishop Moore and Members of the 87th Session of the West Texas Conference:
It is with a deep sense of humility and gratitude that the Conference Board of Sabbath Observance makes its report.

We are gravely concerned over the manner in which so many of our people observe the Sabbath. In spite of the fourth commandment which charges us to "Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it Holy," far too many Christians use the Sabbath as a day for various forms of recreation. Fishing, hunting trips, automobile rides, social events, etc. are deliberately scheduled on Sabbath days. As a result, in many instances church attendance has definitely fallen off, and its effectiveness has been impaired.
"The Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath". Man needs the Sabbath. Living in a world fraught with clashing idealogies, fears, strife, tensions, and evils of all kinds, man sorely needs a day set aside for quiet meditation, prayer, and spiritual guidance. The Sabbath was made to fill this SPECIAL NEED of man.

We who call ourselves Christians cannot maintain our Christian integrity by absenting ourselves from public worship on the Sabbath. Our failure to attend Sabbath worship hinders people who have not fully decided to give themselves to Christ.

In order that the cause of spiritual observance of the Sabbath might be enhanced, we submit the following recommendations:

1. That every local church, through its commission on Membership and Evangelism, participate in the "World Wide Church Attendance Movement', and in other Attendance Campaigns of the Methodist Church.
2. That Sabbath Observance be vigorously taught in the Church Schools of every Methodist Church.
3. That the several special days, indicated in paragraph 296 of the Discipline of the Church, be conscientiously observed.

## REPORT OF <br> THE CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

Bishop Moore, Members and Friends of the 87th Session of the West Texas Annual Conference:

It is with a deep sense of gratitude and sincere humility that I come to make our annual report for the Conference Board of Evangelism. Evangelism is the heart of the Church. If it is sound, all that is the body of Christ is athrob with vital power. If it is strong, every concern and activity which belongs to the body of Christ is carried forward with competence.

We believe the Church has arrived at an hour of supreme opportunity. This is true in terms of unprecedented growth, especially in the United States of America. Present trends indicate there will be a net gain of more than $64,000,000$ people in this country within the next 20 years. This of itself calls for an intensive and extensive program of evangelism which will result in the establishment of thousands of new churches, recruiting and training of more ministers and the reaching of millions of unchurched persons for Christ and His Church.

The Churches' opportunity rises even more urgently from the total world situation and from issues of far greater importance than population expansion. In this respect, when has Jesus Christ stood more tall against the skyline of past and future needs? When has the world been more in need of Him? Where is the solution to compare with new men and a new world which can be born through Him?

Salvation gained through Christ begins within. Christianity conquers evil and creates goodness first within the heart and mind. It links men with love, power, and wisdom of God. Then through men whose hearts God has cleansed, whose thoughts God directs, and whose deeds God empower, Christianity conquers evil and establishes good.

Our Board has cooperated with the General, Jurisdictional, and Area Board in promoting the program of evangelism for the 1960-1961 conference year. Ninety per cent of all churches throughout the conference have organized and working commissions. We have conducted a workshop in each of the several districts. Our district secretaries have cooperated with the District Superintendents in carrying forward the total program of evangelism, emphasizing: "Jesus Christ Is Lord".

Many churches across the conference reported the observance of the following special days: Christmas for Christ; Watch Night Service; Church Attendance Crusade; From January 1 through Easter, and Four Nights for God. These reports are quite encouraging.

## Program for 1961-1962

The College of Bishops of the Central Jurisdiction have approved the recommendation by the department of area and conferences of the General Board of Evangelism a membership goal of 34,500 new members (net) by the General Conference of 1964. When accomplished, the membership of the Jurisdiction will be 401,840 .

We also recommend that the district committees under the leadership of the District Superintednts and District Secretaries of Evangelism in planning conferences, apportion to each charge its goal (using world service ratio) as a guide.

We request that the membership secretary in each local church in cooperation with the Pastor and commission on membership and evangelism report net gains to the District Secretary of Evangelism at the District Conference or 30 days before the next session of the Annual Conference.

## Evangelism in the Local Church

1. We urge that each Pastor organize the Commission on Membership and Evangelism in the local church, using the new manual by C. Lloyd Daugherty.
2. We recommend that each local Commission on Membership and Evangelism have an organized group of persons responsible for the care of the membership including:
(a) Visitation of members.
(b) Cultivating the careless.
(c) Classes for prospective members.
3. We urge each Pastor to organize membership classes for boys and girls, youth and adults.
4. To give full participation to the quadrennial emphasis on spiritual enrichment.
5. We recommend that the Bishop's Crusade of 1959 be repeated in 1962 suggesting March 11-18 as its date.
6. We recommend the following special days for the observance of Evangelistic Outreach: (a) World Wide Communion, Oct. 1, 1961; (b) Watch Night, Dec. 31, 1961; (c) Aldersgate, May 24, 1962; (d) Pentecost, June 10, 1962.
7. We urge that the Conference Secretary, the Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism and each District Secretary attend the Council meeting at State Y. M. C. A. Building, Blue Ridge, N. C., June 30-July 5, 1961.

## WEST TEXAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Bishop Moore, Ministers, and Members of the Eighty-Seventh Session of the West Texas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church:

The work of this Board has not been carried out during this Conference year due to misunderstanding regarding procedure. The Board was convened Tuesday, April 18, 1961 at Wesley Chapel Methodist Church in Austin at 2:00 P.M. Those present were D. H. Hansboro, F. D. Young, C. O. Espie and Connie Y. Conner.

After a review of the Discipline to remind the Board of its duties, it was observed that the structure of this Board is incomplete in not having lay representation from the San Antonio District.

The following recommendations are hereby humbly submitted:

1. That an adjustment be made to comply with Section IV, paragraph 1561, No. 1, page 442 of the Discipline and have representation from each of the five Districts of the Conference.
2. That this Conference comply with Section II, paragraph 1559, No. 1, page - of the Discipline and establish the Golden Cross Society in the West Texas Conference by soliciting the interest of the Bishop and his Cabinet in promoting the Society.
3. That the third Sunday in October be observed as Golden Cross Sunday, and that the week immediately following the third Sunday be observed as Hospitals and Homes Week.
4. We further recommend that in all charges where the Committee on Hospitals and Homes is not organized and functioning, that the Pastor be required at the beginning of the Conference year to perfect such organizations and report same to the first Quarterly Conference.
5. That we seek to develop better relationship with the hospitals within the geographic confines of the West Texas Conference in keeping with Section IV, paragraph 1561, No. 2, page 442 of the Discipline.
6. We especially recommend that:
a. Since a Methodist Hospital is in the making in San Antonio, that the West Texas Conference make a token contribution as an expression of good faith and interest; and
b. That the first funds from Golden Cross Sunday be given this hospital.

## REPORT CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

## Bishop Moore and Members of the West Texas Conference:

We, the board of lay activities need additional help. We are trying to build an organization that will be a credit to our board and to the church of Jesus Christ whom we serve. Lay activities has two continuing goals it needs to meet. 1. Undergird the total program of the church. 2. To train the leadership of the local church to be better churchmen. If you feel the call to serve in any of the following capacities, we would appreciate knowing this. Please don't hide your light under a bushel. Perhaps if you can't help, you will know one who can and will.

The requirements to serve are: 1. Complete dedication to Jesus Christ and His church. 2. That you are a person who honestly believes that prayer is effective. 3. That you are willing to devote time to the study and promotion of lay activities. 4. That this job would be your major emphasis in your free time.

On a Conference level we need the following:
Director of Men's Work-This involves the organization and promotion of Methodist Men's Clubs and working with the three district directors.

Director of Lay Speaking Program-This involves the organization and promotion of Lay Speaker schools. Keeping records of lay speakers, types of talks they give, where given, etc., biography. Working with the three district directors

Director of Stewardship-Organizing and promoting of stewardship EMC schools and the year round stewardship program with emphasis on the tithe. Work with three district directors.

Director of Special Events-Organizing, setting up and promoting retreats, workshops and rallies. Working with three district directors.

Director of Church Builders-Organizing and promoting the former Ten Dollar Club. Working with three district directors.

In addition to the above, several men are needed on the district level to work as Associate District Lay Leaders in charge of an area of eight to 10 churches. (Formerly called Sub-districts) The responsibility here is for the promotion of the total program of lay activities in each local church.

## Plans and Programs for 1960-61

We look forward again this year with keen anticipation to the job at hand. We have some new faces on our staff. We know they will add much to our grogram. To spell out our program in apple pie order, we will list each one rather than discuss the program in a general fashion.

1. Sub-District meetings - June - July - August

Each associate lay leader call a meeting of his sub-district.

1. Set a date for the meeting.
2. Clear date with District Lay Leader.
3. Call or write each local lay leader informing him of time and place.
4. Do the same for each Pastor, Stewardship Chairman and President of Methodist Men's Club
Be sure to have at least one representative from each church. The program for discussion will be the items listed in the following paragraphs.
5. Group Quarterly Conferences and Annual Fall Conference. We again are cooperating with our Dist. Supt. in helping to promote attendance at these meetings and in planning the program.
6. Our Annual Laymen's Retreat - Huston Tillotson College, Austin, Texas It is indeed difficult to put into words the tremendous impact these retreats will have on our district. We urge pastors to attend also. And don't forget that for the first time, you can bring your wife along.
7. L AYMEN'S SUNDAY - October 18th. - Please encourage our churches to observe this custom. Urge each pastor to have a layman in the pulpit that Sunday. Contact Bill Barnes or Jim Martin for speakers.
8. LAY SPEAKING PROGRAM - We have had excellent results with a Lay Speakers School wherever there is a need. The training period should be a minimum of five weeks.
9. STEWARDSHIP - At the Annual Conference in June the Conference Board of Lay Activities recommended that our Conference adopt the Simultaneous EVERY Member Canvas program as outlined by our General Board. It was adopted. Dates will be set soon. We want to urge all of our churches to cooperate.
10. METHODIST MEN - We are greatly encouraged by the addition this year of a director of men's work. Carl is on fire with ideas to help the work of Methodist Men in our churches or in organizing a Methodist Men's Club. Why not put his talents to work.
11. VISIT YOUR CHURCHES - AND MEN'S CLUBS - Get to know your pastors and lay leaders and presidents of Methodist Men. The personal touch is the very best. Promote the program of the church. Methodist Manor - Ten Dollar Club - Bellin Hospital - Camping Program - Subscribe to the Layman magazine - These are but a few.
This is Gods purpose and our destiny. "We are to be the heart of Christ, loving others through us; the brains of Christ, thinking His thoughts; the hands of Christ, stretched out in helpfulness; the feet of Christ, seeking the lost; the lips of Christ, speaking His message. We are to be an extension of the Incarnation."

## VIII

## CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, 1865, by Bishop Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference was held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Conference, held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, President.

The ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper, and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their labors.

This Conference to date has five districts, 109 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz., Huston-Tillotson College, located at Austin, Texas.

## ANNUAL CONFERENCE RULES

## 1. Nominations

The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.

## 2. Limits

No member of the Conference shall be permitted to serve upon more than two of the major Conference Boards, except where the Discipline shall provide otherwise. Special effort should be made to place every

Conference member upon at least one Board. All vacancies occurring on any Board or Committee shall be filled according to the provisions in rule 1.

## 3. Lay Representation

Lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.

## 4. Conference Program

A program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a planning Committee made up of the resident bishop, all district Superintendents, the host-Pastor, the chairman of major boards, the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education, the Secretary of the Conference, the President of the WSCS and the Conference Lay Leader.
This committee shall have the responsibility for the planning and printing of the annual Conference Program-to be paid for by the Annual Conference.
5. Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions intended for publication in the conference journal shall be typewritten and submitted in triplicate to the Conference Secretary.
6. District Committee Ministerial Qualifications

The district committee on qualifications of local preachers shall consist of five traveling elders in the district.
The names of the District committees will be printed in the Conference Journal.

## 7. Pastors Reports

All Pastors' reports to the Conference Treasurer and Conference Statistician shall be turned in at least fifteen days before the dates set for the meeting of the Annual Conference.
Additional rules may be added to this list and these present may be amended or deleted by order of the Annual Conference.
(Rules adopted by 79th Conference Session.)
