# Daily Proceedings 

CONFERENCE MINUTES

First Day - Monday Night - June 6, 1966

Bishop K. W. Pope declared the meeting of the eight Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church in Texas officially open. He presented the Honorable Eric Johnson, Mayor of the City of Dallas, who offered a warm welcome to the delegation.

Dr. Willis Tate, president of Southern Methodist University, was presented. He presented a warm welcome to the Conference meeting on the University Campus. Bishop Pope extended deep appreciation to the committees who worked strenuously to prepare for the coming Conference. The Conference stood and sang, "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name". After the reading of the names of the deceased ministers and wives the choir sang for the anthem of memorial, "Christian, Dost Thou See Them", by Lloyd Pfautach.

The Litany for Christ's Church was led by Bishop Noah W. Moore, Sr. The scripture was read by Bishop Eugene Slater, after which he led the Conference in the Affirmation of Faith. After words of appreciation to the

Choir of First Methodist Church, Wichita Falls, Texas, Bishop William C. Martin, retired, delivered the Memorial Message - "These All Died in The Faith".

The Holy Communion was administered to approximately 4000 communicants. The Call to Thanksgiving by retired Bishop Ivan L. Holt. Closing Hymn - Benediction by Bishop Paul V. Galloway.

## Second Day - Tuesday Morning - June 7, 1966 8:30 a.m.

Devotions: The devotions were conducted by Rev. Lavalle Lowe, Jr. "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" was sung.

The Scripture was read by Bishop Moore, from Paul's Letter to The Ephesians, Chapter 1 and 2; He concluded the reading with the Invocation. Bishop Moore called for the singing of "And Are We Yet Alive". The Rev. Robert S. Mosby was called to the rostrum to offer the Morning Prayer.

Bishop Moore continued by asking the Conference Secretary to call the roll of conference members. The Secretary complied.

The Secretarial Staff was confirmed - Albert S. Pitts, E. J. Tanner, J. S. C. Grattan, Samuel H. Callier, Martin J. Walker, and Taylor S. Stewart.

The Bar of the Conference was set as the first ten (10) rows across the auditorium. The Statistical Staff was named: E. M. Cooper, Mrs. O. L. Jackson, E. R. Shaw.

Rev. Z. W. Holmes, Jr. was named as Reporter for the Conference
Dr. Joe Adair, fraternal delegate from the Southwest Texas Conference was introduced and brought greetings. It was decided by unamious vote to give the fraternal delegates a voice. A new member of the Conference, Rev. Charles Gross, instructor at Huston-Tillotson College, was introduced by Bishop Moore.

Dr. L. Scott Allen, Editor of the Central Christian Advocate was introduced and he presented a check for $\$ 2832.98$ as the West Texas Conference share from The Methodist Publishing House. Dr. Allen gave remarks concerning the journalistic efforts of The Central Christian Advocate.

Dr. M. J. Wynn, President of Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia, brought greetings after being introduced by Bishop Moore. After this, Bishop Moore gave challenging remarks concerning ministerial recruitment. Dr. J. J. Seabrook gave related remarks, after being presented by Bishop Moore.

The composite report of the District Superintendents was read by Rev. E. Charles Purnell, Superintendent of the Waco District. The report was adopted on the motion of Dr. J. J. Seabrook.

Dale H. Hansboro, R. S. Mosby and Martin J. Walker were excused to attend a session of the Southwest Texas Conference for a brief period.

Dr. I. B. Loud offered a motion that the order of the day for Thursday be the report of the Board of Pensions. The motion carried.

Rev. Martin J. Walker was selected as Conference Song Leader.

## Mid-Morning Recess

The session opened after the brief recess with the Report of the Conference Board of Education, Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Jr., presiding. Dr. John T. King, Chairman of the Commission on Higher Education supplemented the written report of the Board of Education with timely historical remarks concerning the development of Huston-Tillotson College. An appropreation of $\$ 8,000.00$ was recommended for insertion in the Conference Budget for

Huston-Tillotson College. Dr. King offered a motion that this matter be recommended to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance for consideration. Dr. Ernest T. Dixon, President of Philander Smith College was presented for remarks. Next, Rev. Earl E. Allen, Director of the Wesley Foundation, Texas Southern University was presented and gave a report of his ministry during the past year on the university campus. These areas of action were presented by Rev. Allen to the Conference: (1) A Fuller Commitment; (2) Willingness to pay the price; (3) Motivation.

Rev. William J. Washington, Staff member of the General Board of Education, was presented next for remarks on "The New Day in Christian Education' Technology, Science, and Social Change were mentioned by Rev. Washington, as three areas affecting the world today. A need for more intensive study with adults needed if the life and witness of the Church is to be enriched.

The Executive Secretary of Christian Education was presented for his report. Rev. John Elliott stressed the nedd for one-hundred (100) hours of serious study per year, for every member of the Church. The Chairman of the Board of Education moved the adoption of the report. Motion carried.

Rev. R. S. Mosby was presented and offered a resolution from the Southwest Texas Conference. Dr. R. F. Curl, District Supt., of the Southwest Texas Conference was subsequently presented for remarks related to the proposed resolution. Dr. L. L. Haynes gave remarks regarding the resolution before the Conference. Dr. Haynes recommended that the matter be referred to theBoard of Christian Social Concerns. Dr. I. B. Loud gave forceful remarks in support of the resolution. Also recognized to speak on this matter were Dr. E. T. Dixon, Mr. Raymond Williams; Rev. S. E. Keesee; Dr. John T. King. Bishop Moore called for the vote, after instructing the Secretary to record and ascertain the eligible voters. Results:

Dr. I. B. Loud offered a mo'ion that a telegram be sent to Mr. James Meridith and Rev. E. J. Elliott. A blanket motion to send delegates to all Conference meetings on the SMU Campus was approved. The Conference adjourned for lunch at noon.

## Tuesday Afternoon - Moody Coliseum - 2:00 p.m.

Following the singing of a hymn and the invocation, Dr. Kermit Long spoke to the combined Conferences. He spoke of "Being" as over against "Doing" and "Trying" to define the indefineable. He prophesied a "great day in the field of evangelism." He said, "Experience must come before expression."

Mr. Ernie Logan, a layman, spoke representing the Board of Lay Activities. He strongly endorsed the "Twelve," as a fellowship of discipline, dedication, and Christian growth.

Dr. McLaughlin, representing the Commission on Chaplains, spoke to the Conference. He spoke on the fine work done by the chaplains.

Rev. Tom Harris, missionary to Sarawak, spoke to the Conference. He described in vivid language conditions in existence there and yet radiated a spirit of hope and optimism.

The Rev. N. R. Saenz and Rev. William Cheyne spoke of the Latin American work of the Church and the great challenge that it presents.

Dr. Ted Richardson presented Dr. Spencer Stockwell who spoke in the interest of the Methodist Mission Home of Texas. He used visual aids to support his report. He presented Rev. Robert Pitzer who continued in the report of the work of the Conference.

Dr. Albert Outler reported to the Conference on the Vatican II Council stating that he felt growth in understanding and toleration was one of the results with a great challenge presented to Protestantism in education and concepts of worship evolving into service. "Self examination and self reform on the highest level," he stated to be a desired trait within any group. "Effective self renewal may be our own last weapon of survival," he stated.

Bishop Kenneth Pope pronounced the benediction.

## Tuesday Night - June 7, 1966 - Moody Coliseum, 7:30 p.m.

The session of the combined Conferences of Texas met to hear Governor John Connally deliver a challenging address emphazing that "Methodism has stood in the front ranks for social and economic progress, with open minds and open hearts."

## Third Day - Wednesday Morning - June 8, 1966

## 8:30 a.m.

Devotions were led by the Rev. John Wesley Tatum, who led the Conference in a prayer, followed by the hymn "Amazing Grace." Scripture was led by Bishop Noah W. Moore, taken from Ephesians 3:-4: (chapters).

The Chairman of the Committee on Journal, Rev. Z. W. Holmes, Sr., reported the minutes of the previous session as being correct and moved their adoption. The Conference so ordered.

Bishop Moore, then called for the renort from the Conference W.S.C.S., Mrs. I. C. McAllister-President. Mrs. McAllister introduced Miss Ruth Nichols of the Woman's Division for remarks concerned with an experimental approach to the implementation of the noble goals of the W.S.C.S. on a regional basis with headquarters in the greater Dallas Area. The report of the Society was adopted, on motion of Rev. J. G. Owens, seconded by Rev. T. R. Watkins.

Rev. Z. W. Holmes, Sr.. Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism was presented by Bishod Moore for the report of the Board. The report was supolemented by remarks by the Secretary of the Roard of Evangelism, Rev. E. J. Tanner. Dr. W. D. Lester of the General Board of Evangelism was presented and gave remarks of inspirational value to the ioy of all the body. The Board's report was adopted on motion of Dr. John T. King, seconded by S. H. Callier.

The Board of Christian Social Concerns. Rev. L. L. Haynes, Chairman, was presented for its annual report. The Board submitted the following recommendations:
(1) Scholarshins be offered at M $\dagger$. Secuioah for persons related to the Board of Christian Social Concerns for their training and enrichment.
(2) That Rev. J. S. C. Grattan be appointed to succeed Dr. L. L. Haynes as the Chairman of the Board.
(3) That the Dist. Superintendenta will see that there is a functioning commission of Christian Social Concerns in each local church. Also that the Cabinet apnoint District Direc'ors of Christian Social Concerns for each District.
(4) That two (2) Seminars - Dallas, Waco - Oct. 14-15th; Austin -Victoria, Western - March $17-18$ th be attended and supported by the Conference at large in the areas of Social Concern.
The report was adopted (along with above named recommendations) on motion of Dr. Haynes and seconded by Rev. J. S. C. Grattan.

Rev. Earl Allen was given special privilege to present the Rev. Robert E. Felder of the Texas Conference (CJ). Rev. Felder gave remarks concerning
the publicity projection of the convocation meeting this week on the SMU Campus.

Mr. Cecil Williams was presented to give remarks concerning the dire need for greated involvement of our local church musicians in the National Ascociation of Methodist Musicians.

Dr. E. O. Tucker was presented from TANE (Texas Achohol \& Narcortic Education, Inc.) Dr. Tucker's remarks were impressive and well received by the Conference.

## Recess - 10:05 - 10:20 a.m.

The Conference assembled after the recess period and sang hymn No. 53 (Sampler) "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing," led by song leader, Martin J. Walker.

Bishop Moore called for the report of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. Mr. Odie Davis, Conference Lay Leader was presented. Mr. Charles Kellogg. representive of the General Board of Lay Activities was presented by the Conference Lay Leader, Mr. Davis, for remarks. The report of the Board was adopted on motion of Mr. O. Davis and seconded by Rev. P. L. Woods.

Represenatives from the Rio Grande Conference were presented by Bishop More. The Rio Grande Conference Lay Leader Mr. R. N. Zapatha and the Rev. Jacinto Alderete, who represented youth work, were presented and gave timely remarks.

Dr. Ira B. Loud was given privilege to present the Rev. Howard Washburn of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes for remarks dealing with projections in this area of Church work and concern.

Dr. Loud then gave the report of the Conference Historical Society with special emphasis on the heritage and contributions of Negroes in our Methodist Church. The oldest church in our Annual Conference was presented with a special framed certificate of recognition. The Rev. P. L. S. Woods, Pastor of Wesley Church, Austin, Texas accepted the award on behalf of the Wesley Methodist Church. The Historical Society's Report was received by the Conference with warm commendation with the recommendation that the pertenient historical data included in this report be printed and made available for insertion in coming issues of the Conference Journal. This recommendation was referred to the Committee on Publishing Interests of the Conference.

Dr. D. R. Fletcher of the General Board of Missions was presented for remarks by Bishop Moore. Dr. Fletcher told the Conference about the new methods and ministry being implemented in selected areas of the nation by the general Board of Missions.

Fraternal delegates to the other seven conferences meeting in this great Convocation were selected by the Cabinet. The selections were read by Rev. Marcus L. Freeman. They were as follows: 1. Texas (CJ) - E. L. Harrison; 2. Texas (SCJ) - Lavalle Lowe; 3. Rio Grande - John Williot, Sr.; 4. Central Texas - R. S. Mosby; 5. North Texas - P. L. Woods; 6. Northwest Texas - I. B. Loud. The Conference was then in adjournment for the noon luncheon period, after the prayer of benediction by Rev. T. H. Lander of the Southwest Conference.

## Third Day - Wednesday Afternoon - McFarlin Auditorium 2:00 p.m.

Invocaton was led by Bishop Noah Moore of the Central Jurisdiction.
Dr. Howard Ham spoke as representive for the Board of Education. He outlined the needs of the time in which we live and the new role of the church in Christian education.

Dr. Willis Tate spoke in the interest of higher Education in Texas. He defined the role of the Church-related colleges. He encouraged further support of Higher Education on the part of Methodists.

Mr. W. Kennard Copeland reported on the Methodist Home at Waco.
He spoke of the changing demands upon the service the church endeavors to render through the Home.

Dr. Hubert Johnson underlined the words of Mr. Copeland and asked support of the Foundation of the Methodist Home.

Rev. Sidney Roberts spoke on behalf of the 66th session Texas Pastor's School to be held on the campus of Southwestern University. A unique presentation of communications was dramatized by use of drama, visual aids, and sound effects. The film, "Impact," was presented.

Dr. Erwin Bohmfalk represented the Commission on Social Concerns and as a part of his report he offered a resolution in the matter of the James Meredith affair in the current news. Delegates of the several Conferences favored the resolution.

Dr. Joe Quillian spoke in the interest of the Christian Ministry, of his concern for the church's need of additional ministers and of the high quality of work and instruction accomplished through Perkins School of Theology.

Bishop Noah Moore pronounced the benediction.

## Third Day - Wednesday Night - June 8, 1966

The session of the combined Conferences of Texas were presented a dramatic performance entitled "The Church Is Here!" It was "A musical-dance-drama sketching 200 years of Methodism in America-from Colonial Days to the secular society and radical theology of our day."

## Fourth Day - Thursday Morning - June 9, 1966

The West Texas Annual Conference opened at 8:30 p.m. The Rv. Luther Henry in charge of the devotions, Invocation Hymn \#141 "O Zion Haste." Prayer, Scripture led by Bishop Moore...Ephesians 5 \& 6th Chapters. Hymn \#53 (Sampler) "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing."

The Committee on Journal moved the adoption of yesterday's minutes. Motion by Rev. Zan Holmes, Sr., seconded by Rev. P. L. Woods.

The Report of The Ministerial Qualifications Committee, Rev. Lavelle Lowe was called for by the Bishop. (See Questions - Conference Journal 1965 beginning with question 19) Question 34-: A. D. Minor-Chairman, Committee on Conference Relations.

Bishop Moore presented the men who will retire at this session of the Conference. They are: Dr. J. J. Seabrook; Rev. R. L. Palmer and Rev. Zebra King (absent because of illness), the two retiring ministers present gave inspiring remarks.

The Report of the Treasurer, Rev. J. Garfield Owens. Moved by Rev. Z. W. Holmes, Jr. The Minister's Wives \& Daugh'ers reported \$4, 290.75. The combined reports were adopted.

The Report of the Commission on World Service \& Finance was made by Rev. S.A. Keesee. Approved and adopted after discussion.

Mr. and Mrs. T. A. Harris Sarawak (Asia) were presented by Bishop Moore, along with their two children. Mrs. Moore made remarks of welcome to this family.

Dr. I. B. Loud asked the Conference to give Mrs. Moore a rising vote of thanks for the Harry Hooser Banquet on last evening. Apporved.

The report of the Conference Board of Pensions was made by Rev. I. B.

Loud, Chairman and Rev. Albert S. Pitts, Secretary. Bro. Loud moved the adoption of the report. Seconded by Rev. A. S. Pitts.

## REPORT NUMBER 1

## THE COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Bishop Moore, Fellow Ministers, Delegates, Visitors, and the Assembly at large, the District Superintendents' Composite Report.
"Forever Beginning", Forever Beginning, the theme of the recently held American Methodist Bi-Centennal, was held as a great and appropriate theme for all Methodist history. Bishop Gerald Kennedy exhalted the appropriateness of the theme in stating that, it reminds us of yesterday, it brings us to an appraisal of today, and it gives projection and hope for tomorrow.

In this year's composite report presented by Bishop Moore's cabinet, we shall not give numerous statistics of the past year's work, but instead shall make a sincere effort to reveal the underlying forces that give statistic meaning and make us humble and grateful as we come to this day . . . the end of another conference year.

THE CHURCH . . . This is my Father's world . . . The church is a piece of the world. The 1964 General Conference has summoned every church in Methodism to appraise its mission and ministry to the community and to the world in the light of what Christ expects from those who call him Saviour and Lord. We go out as the church scattered, to study and execute our Quadrennial Theme "One Witness in One World", but the Methodists are one people. We are striving toward the goals of achieving oneness in local congregations as well as in the function of Methodism as a world church. One Witness in One World ... What better theme can we pursue this Quadrennial?

Evangelism stands at the very heart of the Methodist Church. It focuses the attention of the church on the need of outreach. Through our various evangelistic mediums, many have heard the call.
-Reverend J. L. Preciphs, pastor of our Hollowell Church, Midland, has received 32 members under the program of evangelism.
-Reverend Charles Espie, pastor of our Abilene Church, has increased his membership through a great evangelistic program.
-Four churches in Waco, namely: Brack's, Wesley, Mt. Zion, and St. James held a united revival. This evangelistic effort was no way in vain because thenty-seven young people united with the church. I heard the call and said, Lord, here am I.
MISSIONS ... Send Me...The Methodists have always sensed the needs of peoples near and far. We give of ourselves continually, never thinking of the cost, but rejoicing in the fact that we are a helping church. This year's records will reveal the many churches that kept their debts up-to-date, thus furthering the strides of the mission program. We are builders. Yes, we are very proud of our many building and improving projects throughout the conference. Some of these projects are dreams - soon to be realizations; others are completed projects, dedicated to the service of God.
-Reverend M. T. Reed, Western District, pastor of the Mt. Vernon Church, Lubbock, and his wonderful congregation have raised over $\$ 10,000.00$ on a new church.
-San Antonio and Corpus Christi are in the process of securing sites for new churches.
-The St. Paul Church, Corpus Christi, under the leadership of the Rev. C. D. Owens, recently completed transaction of acquiring a three bedroom brick Parsonage. Truly this is a Dream, and we certainly congratulate Brother Owens and this wonderful Congregation in this worthy venture.
-Reverend JJ. C. Grattan, Austin-Victoria District, pastor of the Victoria Church, and his congregation have recently built a new three bedroom brick parsonage.
-At. Lockhart an efficient weather conditioning system has been installed. Reverend George Brewer, pastor.
-Luling's William Taylor Church has added a new roof to the church, placed new pews and organ there also. Reverend I. C. Greer, pastor.
-Wesley of Austin, Reverend P. L. S. Woods, pastor plans to install a $\$ 20,000$ weather conditioning unit in their church.
-Simpson of Austin, Reverend E. J. Tanner, pastor has refurnished and carpeted the parsonage.
-Dennis Chapel, Groesbeck, Revered Roy E. Stanley, pastor has paid out the church's indebtedness. They are now making plans to install an air conditioning unit.
-Brack's Chapel under the leadership of Reverend E. M. Cooper, has purchased two lots and a building for a parsonage.
-St. James, Temple, has installed an air conditioning system in their church. Let us remember that this is Reverend Luther W. Henry's first year in full pastorage.

-The San Antonio District has held cross-section workshops in studying and discussing the Quadrennial Emphasis, stressing the importance of active commissions in every local church. This statement is also true of the Dallas, Wetsern and Austin-Victoria Districts. What wonderful opportunities we enjoy in sharing our blessings through the channels of this great Methodist Church.
-The Youth of the Waco District has been involved in dialogue with the youth of the Central Texas Conference of the South Central Jurisdiction in the study of "One Witness in One World."

We knew more about human nature and the needs of persons, Christian Education has expended in its understanding of learning experiences. New teaching tools and methods are at our fingertips. A Call is being made to each congregation to "A New Day in Christian Education." The Christian Education program of the West Texas Conference is going forward under the able leadership of Rev. John W. Elliott and other conference, district and local personnel.

WOMAN SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE . . . "And there were women." The Woman Society of Christian Service has contributed greatly on every level. We appreciate their support and co-operation realizing that
their achievements are too numerous to point out at this time. To Mrs. I. C. McAllister, our out-going president, we wish to thank you for your leadership these past years. The horizons of our Missionary program have been widened under your capable leadership. It is with a great deal of regret that we see you leave, however, we thank God for our new Woman Society of Christian Service president in the person of Miss Lillie B. Wilson.

LAY ACTIVITY . . . The Laymen of the West Texas Conference are encountering some mauntain top experiences through their retreats, seminars and other involvements. We are very happy to say at this time that there have been classes for certification on most districts. More and more we are inclined to realize that these lay speakers can render an invaluable service to our conference.

We recommend that a Special Canference Wide Appeal be made under the Direction of the Conference Commission on Christian Higher Education, to raise a special amount of $\$ 4,000$ to be used to establish the Karl E. Down Chair of Humanities at Huston Tillotson College.

The Allowance for each District Superintendent of the Conference for travel and office expense shall be $\$ 1,500.00$ for each Annual Conference year for the 1964-1968 Quadrennium.

The total combined allowance for travel and office expense for the five District Superintendents of the Conference shall be $\$ 7,500.00$ for each Annual Conference year for the 1964-1968 Quadrennium.

The total combined salaries and total combined allowance for travel and office expense for the five District Superintendents of the Conference shall be $\$ 37,500.00$ for each Annual Conference year for the 1964-1968 Quadrennium.

The total combined salaries and the total combined allowance for travel and office expense for the five District Superintendents of the Conference shall be $\$ 150,000.00$ for the 1964-1968 Quadrennium.

The Pastor of the local Charge shall see that an amount equal to $18 \%$ of the Pastors and Associate Pastors estimated salaries for the month, is remitted each month to the Annual Conference Treasurer, clearly designated "District Superintendent Fund". The above specified amount is to be sent by the local Charge in time to reach the Conference Treasurer's office not later than Wednesday after the first Sunday in each month.

The Annual Conference Treasurer shall send to the several District Superintendents their salaries, office and travel expense on the 1st day of each month.

It shall be the duty of the several District Superintendents of the Conference to give Official Guidance and Directives pertaining to all phases of the District Superintendent Fund in all of the Charges of the Conference.

## Special Emergencies

Special emergency expenses shall be paid to the several District Superintendents out of the Special Annual Conference Reserve Emergency Fund.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

Paras. 795, 797, 80\} and Charge Financial Reporiing Prosedures
We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance shall make the Apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolence and all other Apportionments referred to in Para. 795 to the Districts only.

## REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

## TO: Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., and Members of the 92nd Session of the

 West Texas Annual Conference, The Methodist ChurchWe are living in a world which is changing rapidly. There are many kinds of explosions taking place. Not only are there atomic explosions, but there continues to be a population explosion. Young people are everywhere and we need to be concerned about youth and its changing impact on the morals and manners in our world today, and especially in America. According to the Census forecast, we are now moving toward a point where, within a very few years, one-half of the population of the United States will be 25 years or under. Projecting figures still further, we art told that by 1970, no less than 60 percent of the population will be under 25 .

In addition to these sheer numbers, there is another consideration: "Youth's increase in influence." Some assert that "Today, the 'Cult of Youth' is on the way to dominating our total society. On every side "Youth is King'. And whatever our actual age, we all seem to be engaged in a headlong, intoxicating race to see who can look, who can act and who can be the 'swingest'-who can live the youngest."

Whether or not this is all true is a matter of conjecture. But, there is some truth in it, for the Youth Cult is universal. It appears as though the moment a teenage fad is launched, the adults adopt it. Whenever a discotheque is opened, the grown-ups start pouring in. Where will it all lead? What are some of the causative factors? What can be done about it?

We all know the surface events of the last three decades-The Great Depression, The Second World War, the rise of new nations, the struggle for power, the great struggle for civil rights and full citizenship, the spread of affluence, the technological revolutions, and numerous other events which have signelled changes from the preceding decades. We are now in the final third of the 20th Century-a century which has been signaficant for its many changes, inventions, discoveries, ideas and movements. Economists say that only one thing is certain about this latter third of the century; "it will be almost unimaginably different from all the past ages." It is said that more basic and far reaching changes have taken place in the last 30 years than in the 300 years preceding them.

To pinpoint just a few of the more decisive changes, we note that today about $25 \%$ of all the human beings who ever lived are still alive; and, $90 \%$ of all the scientists who ever lived are living now. The rate of the world's population increase doubled in the middle one-third of this century. Statistical reports tell us that 7 out of 10 medical prescriptions filled by pharmacists in 1965 were not even known 30 years ago; that there has not only been a "population explosion" but there has been an enormous "knowledge explosion;" that four times as much is known now as in 1935, and that in the next 15 years scientists will learn as much or more as in all previous history.

Our explorations into space are dramatic and exciting, requiring limitless knowledge or intricacies and details of many fields of learning. Our inventions and technological advances have provided us with better means for living that ever before, and could be the means of living peacefully on earth, if we could curb ancient hates, envies, and fear. New forms of food production, new types of energy, new developments in computers and automation can make the final one third of this century the most meaningful in the history of human existence.

There is, however, unprecedented challenge ahead. There is great promise, and deep menance. Our reach into the future can be creative and productive; against poverty and disease, against prejudice and ignorance; against the dark elements in our nature that set man against man and nation against nations. Where this last one third of the 20t hcentury will take us, no one knows. But, we do know that we now have the knowledge, the tools, the techniques, the scientific and industrial potential for making the world a better place that it has ever been before. And, also, for making it a worse place.

We know that in all the most significant changes which have been expected, knowledge gained through education has been effective, since education is the most important source of human enrichment in both an economic and a broader sense.

Education increases our ability to enjoy more things more so, to live more richly, not in terms of wealth but in terms of character; more creatively, and in greater harmony with ourselves, our environment, and our fellow man. Education produces better parents, better neighbors, better citizens. It produces the most powerful agent of economic progress-resourceful people, aware of the accomplishments of the past, and equipped with the ability and insight to build a better future.

Education is very costly, as well as very productive. It consumes not only large sums of money, but also, the time and effort of many people, including students. The annual cost of operating educational institutions, including depreciation of their physical plants, now amounts to approximately $\$ 35$ billion-four times as much in deflated dollars as was spent per year 30 years ago. Over and above this amount, the economic cost of high school and advanced education consists of the earnings that young people forego while they are in school. If we add this factor, we arrive at a total educational cost of about $\$ 55$ billion a year. Add, then, the cost of on-th-job training in the armed forces, and the total annual cost of education will amount to over $\$ 60$ billion. With this kind of investment, students cannot afford to waste their time and teachers and administrators cannot afford to let students waste this important part of their lives away.

In this age of change, we are keenly aware of at least two things: first, the need of preparation for full, productive, and satisfying employment, and second, the means of securing the necessary training.

One continual cry seems to be heard all over the nation from employers in business, and, in fact, in all fields-there is a great and urgent need for young people who can perform satisfactorily on an all-round basis. Recently a representative of a large corporation stated that he wished he could find a secretary who could both type and spell. If he discovered one who could spell, she was not a good performer on the typewriter; if she could type at a rapid rate, she could not spell. He stated further that if such a person were found, race, color, nor any of the superficial factors would prevent her being hired at a lucrative salary. This presents us with a definite challenge.

The present active interest in and concern for opportunities for training all people, at all levels, consticutes both a means of securing training and a serious challenge to extend ourselves to see that every young person takes advantage of these opportunities. No longer can we excuse ourselves on the basis that we have no where to train, no financial resources for getting training, or no where to work after receiving training. The job is now up to us.

These facts represent a distinct challenge to the Church-related College in general and to Huston-Tillotson College in particular. We have distinct responsibility to the youth of our day. Facing the youth cult as we do, the Church-related college has a real responsibility in this important area. We are called on to do more than give instruction, no matter how effective it may be. We have a unique opportunity to develop in youth an awareness of that which motivates all education and gives it vitality and meaning. To help students believe that the universe is ont an anarchy but an order, because a powerful and friendly spirit whom we know is God is working for its harmony, beauty and perfection, is the supreme function of the Church and her college. The Church should expect to develop in her colleges a leadership that will sense the fact that real and permanent protection lie in the spirit of love and good will. We must assist our students to understand that being alive is more than an incident; that life takes on meaning when one contemplates that he is partner in a plan bigger that himself; that it is what God purposes that really matters. Wemust all realize that it is the Kingdom of God that gives meaning to all our lesser loyalities and that individuals assume importance only as they have a part in the society of men and women which he proposes to build. Around this central concept of the meaning of life of things, we at Huston-Tillotson College invite a student to build his philosophy of life. We join the hundreds of other Church-related
colleges in a continuous rededication of ourselves to the great tasks which confront us.

These institutions, founded by the Church and nutured by her, deserve her continuing support. The Church must continue to do more in providing our colleges, universities and Wesley Foundations. The financial goal of $\$ 1.50$ for colleges and universities and \$ .50 for Wesley Foundations, or \$2.00 per member annually is not too much to expect.

The West Texas Conference has a direct responsibility to and for HustonTillotson College. It has helped the College to grow, not only in terms of budget and buildings but in terms of enrollment. The increase in student body creates additional financial requirements and necessitate an enlarged budget. This enlarged budget must be balanced. We have requested that the Commission on World Service and Finance include an $\$ 8,000$ item in its budget for the ensuing Conference Year, to be designated for Huston-Tillotson College as follows: $\$ 4,000$ for the Chapel Fund and $\$ 4,000$ for the Karl E. Downs Professorship Fund, which is being developed by the College. We are developing a "Chair" in Humanities dedicated to the sacred memory of the late Dr. Karl Everett Downs, son of the West Texas Conference, Alumnus and former President of the College, and a brother beloved. It is our sincere hope that this request will be granted.

The Commission and the College express gratitude to Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., the five District Superintendents, the other ministers, for the support of our work in Christian Higher Education. Through our combined efforts our College and Wesley Foundations will continue to grow and be a vital part of the higher education scene of our country. We solicit your continued prayers and best wishes.

## Christian Educarion: The New Day

The new Day in Christian Education is not a technique, as much as it looks like a prescribed way of doing things. It is a way of doing things with children, youth and adults in such a way that new insights and learning, changing and growing takes place through all of life.

Children have been thought too young to learn in a significant way. This trend of thought has been abandoned. Youth were thought too radical and daring to really be perceptive and understand what is really happening to them. It has been learned that this is a game they play to get what they want, and not what they need. We thought adults to be incapable of learning, or too set in their ways to learn. They do not learn well in situations where telling is done. We all learn, develop, mature, and respond to life
situations in dramatic and meaningful ways, where changes take place as Teacher-Students learn together over against changes taking place on the individual basis.

The New Day is not fully here nor will the maximum potential for a New Day be realized until every Church has used all available resources at its disposal. In the last three years wa have used New Junior High and Children's materials. Within the next two years the Youth materials and Adult materials will be changed or implemented. This means that we have much hard work to do to get ready to use them. The Church must be put in a mood to accept and adequately use the materials being prepared.

The one sign of knowing that we intend to be a part of the New Day is to use well the materials we have now. If we begin to understand the theological, psychological, social, moral, and biblical foundations behind the new children's literature then the basis for approval and acceptance of other new materials is laid.

When the new materials for youth and adults are ready for use the wonderful possibilities for a New Day will be ours. Consequently, the New Day will continue on and on according to the needs of local churches without regard for a basic plan of education imposed from above the local level. If we expect the New Day to solve all of our problems at that moment, the New Day becomes obsolete. The New Day will hely us face our problems, try to overcome them, and plan possibilities because of them. Every church is then faced with its own problems, and the answer to its problems will have to be given within its own ranks.

Wayne Lynndecker, staff member of the General Board of Education, said in a recent conference of Christian Education in Cincinatti, "that we know better then we do". He is absolutely right. Christian Education is too Preacher centered or too Lay centered. It is too theologically involved or not involved enough theologically. It is too professional with a paid staff in charge of implementation or too centered in volunteer efforts for promotion. We need real authentic persons to carry the load of training and interpretation of Christian Education on every level of the church. In our own conference volunteer workers have been expected to carry full work loads, then have time and energy for christian education beyond the local church. We know better than this.

If the New Day is to mean anything at all we must accept it and let it become the instrument, the tool, to promote effective work. The idea of a New Day is frightening if misunderstood. It gives each local church the opportunity to use the resources within the local church without trying to be like another church program-wise. It gives each church freedom and initiative to use fully tallents, skills, and resources within the local church withoutfeeling inferior to another church with the added dimension of calling in consultants to help them study and diagnose their own weaknesses and strengths.

The New Day is a blessing for our conference. Every church meets success or failure on its own merits. Where people are concerned and strive together for improvement, eventually it comes. Where people are disgusted and disgruntled, failure is imminent. The New Day is met with a challenge or doubt, courage or dispair, according to the mind set. If we think creatively, creativity is our business. If we think destructively, nothing can hold things together.

The New Day is just what it says - A NEW DAY. It is a new way to view learning, a new way of teacher-pupil learning and growing together, it is a new way of grouping across age lines, across sex lines, with family groups, through family groups, it is continuing education on days other than Sundays, it is providing worship and church school on days other than Sundays. It might provide week-ends for families that could not be together other-wise.

Best of all the New Day is a way of training the present generations (young and old) for responsible citizenship and churchmanship in the church and the world where a life of mission is given to others or others become a mission for you.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Bishop Moore and Members of the Conference:
Our Church recognizes a counter obligation to provide for their ministers a comfortable support during their conference membership and the same support for their widow and children after death.

Even though every minister knows that this is not a written guaranteed contract, we are aware-both ministers and laymen-that the high moral obligation to provide these benefits are imbedded in the fabric of the Christian Gospel.

To promote and cultivate this work within the bounds of the West Texas Annual Conference is the responsibility of the Conference Board of Pensions.

We, the members of your board, give to you our promise that we will be constant in our work to this end.

We recommend the following:

1. We recommend that Annuiiy Payment for the Conference Year 196667 be set at $21+14=35$.
2. That the Conference continue to enroll all of its ministers under appointment in the Death Benefit Plan with the General Board of Pensions.
3. That $\$ 200$ in Emergency Relicf be given to Reverend George L. Johnson, Retired, who was a surgery patient twice in the past five months.
4. Concerning Proportional Payment of Conference Claimant Fund (See Paragraph 1624 and 823) the board of Pensions beginning with reports made from the charges to this session will keep a record of payments and will mail statements of defaults to the pastor who served the charge for the Conference year of 1965-1966.
5. Since at the conference session in 1967 we will receive only eighty percent of the amount which we are receiving this year from Temporary General Aid; and because it was necessary this year to transfer $\$ 6,000$ of our funds from Reserve to Immediate distribution; we will need to receive from the pastoral charges in 1965-1957 \$10,000 more than we did this year to maintain the current annuity rate; We therefore recommend a twentyfive percent raise in Pastor's Salary in each charge in the Conference.

The total salary paid to 101 pastors (listed in the 1965 Journal) was \$209,164.

The total Conference Claimants paid (listed in the 1965 Journal) was $\$ 21,382$; or approximately $10.2 \%$ of the Pastor's cash salary.

According to the Conference Treasurer's report (which was not complete as this report was being prepared) there is only a fraction of difference in the report of 1965 and 1966.

A twenty-five percent increase, as low as salaries are, would be modest.

It would lift our total cash salary from $\$ 209,164$ to $\$ 261,454$, which would give us assurance that we could keep the current annuity rate, and a possible slight increase.
6. We recommend that in the case of Robert S. Mosby, the date of 1895 be accepted, and the case of T. M. Bruton, the date of 1894 be accepted.

Your board recognizes that there have been conflicting dates in the Service Records of ministerial members of our Annual Conference coming to us from the General Board of Pensions. Therefore, Be Ie Resolved that the Conference adopt the following policy: that, beginning with the Conference Year of 1966-1967, where ther are two or more conflicting dates sent from the General Board on a minmister's Service Record, that the Conference will accept the earliest date given as the correct age.
(This power lies solely with the Annual Conference. See Paragraph 1629$2)$. It was adopted by vote of the Conference.
7. That the Annual Conference express our sincere gratitude to Dr. Timothy B. Echols, representative of the General Board and a member of our own conference, whi was worked tirelessly with us in this report as he has done across the years.

## REPORT NUMBER 7

## REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS ON EVANGELISM

This is no day for Christians to be pessimistic. There are actions of renewal in the church. There are breakthroughs into more meaningful and exciting ways of Christian witnessing. Institutional shackles are being broken as the church moves out to meet people where they live.

The decision of the inner city churches to stand and serve: the rise of an authentic lay ministry, beginning to penetrate occupational and community life; the increasing dialogue between the church and all media which speak to human experience - are but a fow examples of the church's serious desire to encounter the world. We must always remember that God's first love is the world - the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoeverbelieveth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life (John $3: 16$ ).

These and other factors lead us to believe that we are on the threshold of a Golden Age of the Christian Church.

Our theme has been ministry, message, mission. There is no ministry until we have the honesty to loo kat ourselvecs where we are in our relationships to one another and to Christ. The minister must speak "inside his message and not along side of it". The Church must not be so activity-centered that activities become devices to keep persons from encountering one another, we must be willing to pay the price of human involvement - costly though it may be.

Openness need not be seen as a threat but as a channel for God's grace. We must be willing to test the traditional against the needs of the time. Only when tradtional leads to mission is it a valid guide for action.

We need to listen to what the world is saying to the Church. We cannot deny the fact of revolutionary change nor that the Church, at times, finds itself running to catch up with secular groups which it is supposed to be leading.

There is no renewal of the Church which does not speak to a world of revolution. The body of Christ is a task force that witnesses between "a world that is passing away and the new world being born".

It is the living Christ that provides the cutting edge of the evangelistic thrust. It is He who commands us to meet the world where it is. It is gospel, His message that gives meaning and purpose to ministry.

Each Methodist Church must struggle within itself to give meaning and purpose to its ministry. Evangelistic goals provide motivation only as they emerge from within the life of the congregation.

## Program of Evangelism

## I. Introduction

The Aim of Evangelism is to bring all men without regard to race or color into living, active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as divine Saviour and through the regenerating power of the Holy Spirit:
to gather them into the fellowship of the Church;
to lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every area of human life that the Kingdom of God may be realized.

Discipline, The Methodist Church
Paragraph 1464
In the light of this constitutional provision, the Conference Board of Evangelism has a fourfold purpose:

1. To create and promote evangelistic emphases and program to deepen the spiritual life of pastors and church members within the Conference that they may more effectively confront the unchurched in their communities with the claims of Christ.
2. To develop a relevant strategy of evangelism to meet the specific and peculiar needs of the Conference.
3. To develop and make available resource leadership for evangelism within the Districts of the Conference.
4. In cooperation with the General and Jurisdiction Boards of Evangelism to establish workshops and Schools of Evangelism, to help ministers and laymen discover deeper motivations and develop more significant approaches to the areas of evangelism and the devotional life.

## II. Problems Confronting the West Texas Conference

The Church and Evangelism within the framework of the West Texas Conference faces difficult problems - which call for creative study and concerted action by all the Districts. Foremost among these are:

1. The multiplied problems involved in the development of great urban complexes soon to stretch from Dallas to Lubbock, from Austin to San Angelo, from San Antonio to El Paso.

Can Methodism light the dark streets again? Have we a Gospel and the manpower, the commitment and the obedience necessary to become an instrument of God? The City is changing, the Gospel is changeless.
2. The mobility of the population and the rootlessness engendered for large segments of the people, while not unique, demands a relevant and trained involvement of laity and ministry and new approaches to the evangelistic task.
3. The need for renewal of both laity and clergy touching the foundations of motivation until the church becomes the redemptive people of God. Have we lost the mood for evangelism? The presentation of the Gospel to the people?

As our fathers pioneered in obedience with a flexible approach to the demands of a retreating wilderness frontier may we find again for ourselves and our people a fresh touch of God's living Spirit.
4. Rural Sections: Pockets of poverty, amid affluence people still living in the disappearing rural sections of Northeast and Southwest areas of the West Texas Conference often unchurched but not without faith, economically depressed but still hopeful, the social services limited but personal integrity alive - Can we minister to the Rural Areas? Rural areas confront the Church - The Church must confront Rural areas.

## III. Goals

The Board of Evangelism recommends to the Annual Conference two basic goals:

1. A minimum goal of a net gain of 3 per cent in the membership of each charge.
2. The enlistment of a least 5 per cent of our membership for witness and ministry in the work of lay evangelism.

## IV. Projects for Training

1. Ecumenical Evangelism Conference being held at Green Lake, Wisc., July 23-29, 1966.
2. Retreats for clergy and laymen for the purpose of exposing to the demands of the Gospel and motivating to ministry.
3. Development of the Prayer Life and Personal Spiritual Research Groups (like The Twelve) in the local churches people banding together to read, to study, to pray, to share their faith.
4. A Methodist Reading Fellowship to inform and train the mind warm the heart - and lift Methodism to know - ledge and involvement in its God-given tasks.
5. Lift up in every Church the ministry of preaching. From Methodist pulpits may a life changing - expectant redemptive Gospel be preached that men may become new creatures in Christ Jesus.
6. Let every District with the daring of Christ - pioneer at least one project of unconventional evangelism seeking to make the Gospel relevant to modern man in both work and leisure.
7. Let every pastor train every member before reception into membership until there is involvement in personal discipleship of Christ of all who join The Methodist Church.

## REPORT NUMBER 8

## REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Bishop Noah W. Moore, Jr., Members of the Ninety-Second Session of the West Texas Annual Conference, and Friends:
"To serve the present age, my, calling to fulfill; O may it all my powers engage. To do my Master's Will!"

The members of the West Texas Conference Woman's Society of

Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild join 1.8 million Methodist Women in their challenging "Summons to a New Age".

The new structure of the Board of Missions brought exciting changes from the Staff of the Woman's Division, Jurisdiction, Conference, District, and local Societies. This period of transition has been difficult, and there will be more difficult days for us as transfer and merger become realistic. Yet it is rewarding to be "Living In Such An Age", where Missions, the Christian's Calling is the common concern of Christians around the World, emphasizing the mission and ministry of the laiety.

The unified theme, "One Witness In One World", with its emphasis on the renewal of the Church, as well as the unified studies reflect a growing spirit of cooperation between men and women, and evidence a desire for working towards Christian unity as well as the ecumenical outreach of the Methodist Church.

The "Purpose" is no longer "New", and its goals merely convey the idea that the Church's Mission is "One", as society and Guild Members, help women grow in the knowledge and experience of God as revealed in Jesus Christ, challenge them to respond to God's redemptive purpose in the world - provide opportunities and resources which will help women grow in understanding and spiritual power; - share in the witness, service, and outreach of the Church, enlist workers and secure funds for the fulfillment of their responsibility in the Mission of the Church at home and overseas".

The 1965 Regional Schools of Christian Mission culminated plans made by the Woman's Division during the past quadrennium for eight (8) Regional instead of Jurisdictional Schools. Nineteen (19) members of the West Texas Conference Society and Guild (Central Jurisdictional) participated in the new experience with members of the North Texas, New Mexico, Nebraska, Central Kansas Conferences, (South Central Jurisdiction); South CaliforniaArizona, Rocky Mountain Conferences, (Western Jurisdiction); comprising the South Western Region (8). Mmes. L. L. Haynes, and McAlister were selected by the Woman's Division to serve on the planning committee, with Mrs. McAlister serving as Secretary-registrar for the 1965 School and for the 1966 School to be held at Colorado Women's College, Denver, Colorado June 20-24. Annual Conference Missionary Secretaries become "key" words in the program of Education for Christian Mission of men, women, youth, and children in the Methodist Church.

The Conference School of Christian Mission held at our own HustonTillotson College had a total attendance of 87, with 18 from the Southwest Texas Conference, South Central Jurisdiction.

The Reverend J. H. Carruthers led the Bible Hour, text, "The Book of Acts" Miss Lillian Johnson, Executive Secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild, of the Woman's Division, Mrs. C. A. Barr, Southwest Texas Conference, and Mrs. O. B. Coe served as application Group Leaders on the text Mission: "The Christian's Calling", the unified theme. A bus tour of the L.B.J. Ranch, and a visit to the birth place of President Johnson proved to be a most interesting highlight. A check for $\$ 100.00$ was presented to President King as our initial payment on a lecturn for the Auditorium. Retiring President, Dr. J. J. and Mrs. Seabrook were given a cash "Love Gift". Dr. and Mrs. King entertained the group with the traditional "watermelon party".

The 25th Anniversary plans were presented with the review of the emphasis on the three (3) goals of "increased members", four (4) for missions and money. A commitment service (July-August issue, THE METHODIST WOMAN), with members of the school comprising the "Voice Choir" was impressive. "Our Heritage of The Past" was presented by Dr. Carmen Lowrey with other key women of that area. Present and future responsibilities were stressed. Twenty-fifth Anniversary programs ar continuing in local Societies and Guilds throughout the Conference.

The Conference Executive Committee joined Methodist Women in a "Self-study" on the meaning and basis of membership in the society and guild and its motivation for membership cultivation. The first goal of the 25th Anniversary observance, which culminates at the Seventh Assembly in Portland, Oregon May $12-15$, 1966, is membership. Methodist Women are challenged to achieve a 25 per cent increase in Woman's Society and

Guild membership. Methodist Women are being challenged to look at themselves and the image they present to non-church members as well as the church-at-large. A new image is sought as Society and Guild members take a new look at themselves, individually and collectively.

Seven adults and one youth will attend the Assembly, May 12-15, at Portland, Oregon, and a number of visitors from the Society and Guild.

The second Twenty-fifth Anniversary goal is "Four for Missions". Miss Minnie Florence Stein, a member of St. Andrews Methodist Church in Fort Worth, Texas, resigned as Public School Teacher and accepted a full-time Christian service. She was elected to the staff of the section of Christian Social Relations, the Woman's Division, of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, at its annual meeting in January, 1966. She is a graduate of Huston-Tillotson College. She has been active in many areas of the Church, working with children and youth. The Conference Society honored her with a special pin and certificate. The Districts presented her gifts along with the local church and society at the service of appreciation sponsored by St. Andrews Methodist Church. We are proud to report one (1) for "Missions".

Five scholarship girls are being sponsored at Huston-Tillotson College. Of the five, one is from Africa. Five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550.00), is budgeted for this project with $\$ 100.00$ designated for the African student.

The Composite report of the five District Presidents will reflect increases in pledges to mission implementing the third Twenty-fifth Anniversary goal of a 25 per cent by 1966. Program material sales, special memberships, attendance at meetings, observance at all "Special Days", representation on official rosters as well as participating memberships in United Councils of Church Women.

Conference delegates have represented at all meetings of the general church Women's Divisions, Regional Jurisdictional, and across Jurisdictional lines, i.e. South Central Jurisdictional Conference on Missions, State Assembly of United Church Women, Southwestern Area Council, Dallas Regional Advisory Committee, Central Conference Woman's Society, Southwestern Regional School of Christian Mission Committee, Bethlehem Centers and Wesley Community Centers.

In deep humility and with mixed emotions I approach the close of my tenure as Conference President. May I express my sincere appreciation to Bishop and Mrs. Moore, the District Superintendents, Ministers, and Laymen who have in many ways given leadership and cooperation to the program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild. You have influenced my spiritual maturity in many ways.

I made a commitment to serve through the so-called "transition period" of the church as of the conference year 1966. With that focus in view, the four year limitation "in the same office", and my election as Secretary of membership Cultivation of the Central Jurisdiction Society, I tender my resignation as Conference President, to become fully effective at the Annual meeting.

You may depend on my service, loyalty, love, and prayers for our continued growth as we move into the larger outreach of the Church, and Woman's Society into the "all inclusive church".

I have examined the receipt books, the bank statements, deposits and Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild for the fiscal year beginning June 1, 1965, and ending May 31, 1956. I hereby submit my findings in the following manner:

1. Bank Reconciliation (Exhibit "A")
2. Recapitulation of Receipts and Disbursements (Exhibit "B")
3. My comments as follows:

RECEIPTS - All monies recorded in the receipt book and $\$ 59.13$ not recorded were deposited with the American National Bank in Austin, Texas, with the exception of an unaccountable $\$ 0.36$.

The above unaccountable deposits and shoriages could not be classified since there were no explanations.

Receipt No. 39 for $2 \$ 92.00$ was duplicated by Receipt No. 841. Receipt No. 37 for $\$ 14.00$ was a duplicate of Receipt No. 839. Receipt No. A-1 for $\$ 807.15$ is a duplicate of Receipt No. 840. Receipt No. 2 in the amount of $\$ 150.00$ to Mrs. Ellee Payne - Dallas District was included in Receipt No. 842 for $\$ 579.00$ to Mrs. S. V. Thomas. These irregularities came about because of no standard method of accounting. A standard method of accounting removes the method of relying on memory which also minimizes the possibility of error.

DISBURSEMENTS - All disbursements were made by documented checks and approved bank charges in accordance with the general practices of the conference.

Check stub No. 1716 was marked void, but the check passed the bank on May 11, 1966, in the amount of $\$ 193.10$, in lieu of Check No. 1752 stubbed for the same amount and date. Check Stub No. 1760 was blank, but the check passed the bank for $\$ 25.00$ on May 19, 1966.

It makes for good accounting when all checks written are stubbed as written.

RECOMMENDATIONS - Again I must emphasize the need for an accepted method of accounting and workshops or instructional periods for persons who make remittances to the conference. I suggest that the conference have designed a remittance form that will fit the conference's function. This will help classify receipts and credits.

All monies deposited to the bank should be recorded in the receipt book. This will also include redeposits, but these receipts should be marked as such.

The records show no sign of fraud or misuse of the conference's monies but are very confusing and complex because of no accepted system of accounting.

This should be taken care of immediately. The conference should be very proud of you for such honesty, devotion and so much labor without compensation. I suggest that you train an assistant so that should you be suddenly removed by illness or some other reason, the operation of the conference will not be hampered in any may.

I wish to thank you for your wonderful cooperation during this audit and to wish the conference continued success.

## REPORT NUMBER 12

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

I here-in submit a report as to the activities of the Board of Christian Social Concerns for the Conference year 1935-66.

The Board of Christian Social Concerns began its year's work with an organizational program in keeping with the Discipline of the Methodist Church. The three divisions were set up with respective chairmen to implement the program with regard to each division.

The Division of Achohol Problems and General Welfare was headed up by Rev. M. T. Reed. The Division of Peace and World Order by Mrs. O. B. Coe. The Division of Human Relation and Economic Affairs by Dr. Earnest Dixon. Our District chairmen are as follows: Austin-Victoria, E. J. Tanner; Dallas, A. M. Mason, Jr.; San Antonio, Rev. R. S. Mosby; Western, Albert S. Pits.

The Board through its Divisional chairmen and its District chairmen have attempted to carry on in acceptable fashion the spirit and purpose of the General Board: namely: "To lift up before the members of the church and also the secular world the Christian concern for personal, social, and civic righteousness, to analyze the issues which confront the nation and world as well as the local community and the person, and to prepare Christian lines of action."

## The Political Field

On the level of politics, directives have been sent to all chairmen and district leadership to urge members of local congregations to meet the voting requirement of the state of Texas and to go to the poll and register opinions in keeping with civic righteousness. Also to write their congressmen urging their support for beneficial arising in Congress such as the Poll Tax Legis-
lation and the 1964 Civil Rights Bill. To also support candidates whose records showed an interest in the welfare of and the progress of all the people.

## Employment and Job Opportunity

We have tried to keep Division and District leaders alert and to share this alertness on the matter of labor conditions especially for the ministry groups. Realizing that much of the social ills of our nation, riots, and delinquency lay at the base of unemployment. Many of our members work directly with employment agencies such as Texas Employment Commission and with the Federal Program on Job Opportunity. L. L. Haynes, Conference Board Chairman serves on the Advisory Committee of the Texas Employment Commission, representing the minority interests.

## Achohol, Drugs, Gambling, and Race Tracks

Members of the board are quite aware of dangerous inroads made by the alchohol and drug interests on the life of people, especially with its appeal to the youth of our tim. Strenuous efforts wer made to help our people observe Committment Sunday, and conduct Seminars and discussion groups lifting up the danger of drink and drug addiction. Urgent appeals were made also to have the State Legislature oppose all legislation that would give licenses to opening of legalized race tracks, and to support anti-gambling legislation.

## Housing

The problem of housing has been the concern of the board. Appeals have gone out to the people to support local, state, and federal efforts to remove the blights in housing from among us. In some of our districts, leaders went all out to support Urban Renewal. During a study made it was discovered that poor housing contributes to school drop-outs, juvenile delinquency, and breeding places of crime. Legislation for the Fair Housing Act is an upper most need. Good housing is a must for all citizens; it is the solution.

## All Inclusive Church

Since the last conference, marked progress has been made across the Methodist Church in making it an all inclusive church. Here within the boundaries of the West Texas Conference we have shared in this progress. Our Board through its divisional structure and district committees are under the mandates of the General Church to make every effort to cooperate where possible in helping to open up lines of communication on conference, district, nd local levels where we find common understanding of the differences that separate us on the basis of Christian Fellowship. Separation that makes mockery of Christian profession and mar the progress of the Kingdom of God.

Notable is the progress which has been made in the San Antonio District. Rev. Dale H. Hansboro, district superintendent, and Rev. Robert S. Mosby, District Chairman of Christian Social Concerns. An inter-district cooperation committee comprising White and Negro members has been set up and is reported to have done yoeman service in bringing about a working fellowship. Working with this committee are ministers of the West Texas Conference and the Southwest Texas Conference; together with the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Churches and ministers cooperationg in this endeavor are: Jacobs Chapel, McKinley, Highland Terrace, Aldersgate, Laurel Heights, East St. Paul, Jones Chapel, Jefferson, and Trinity in San Antonio, Texas.

The results of these churches, ministers, and people have exchanging of Pulpits by ministers, inter-vistis by congregations, inter-group leadership training institutes, and other efforts with results that have made that area of our conference the brightest spot in Texas for realizing the All-Inclusive Church.

There have been smaller efforts in other sections. The total pictures may not seem as bright or what has been hoped for, but progress goes forward. Thinking is being stimulated, lines of communication are being opened, and the negative aspects of fear and fright are disappearing. A long way to go is a fact of the present, but we are being lured by the dream of our Master that "they should all be one."

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

## Resolution No. 1

A resolution approved on June 8, 1966, at a joint session of eight Texas Annual conferences meeting in Dallas, Texas. Central Texas, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas, Texts, Rio Grande, Texas (C.J.) and West Texas (C.J.) Annual Conference.

We as members of the Body of Christ universal, as citizens of the Kingdom of our sovereign Lord, and we, as citizens concerned for the well-being of the life of all America and the lives of each American, hereby express our deep anxiety and concern at the injury inflicted upon James Meredith. This is but another symptom of our social sickness affecting not only every citizen of America, but also the life of our nation among all nations.

As pastors and laymen representing our part of Christendom, we confess afresh that we, at home and abroad, have not made the imperatives of brotherhood as clear and convincing as we must, and we have not made democracy as precious and as pervasive as is necessary.

We send our sympathy and best wishes to James Meredith and his family, praying for speedy recovery of health and return to his Law School studies.

We send to Aubry James Norvell and his wife our word of concern to share in their suffering, distress, and agnoy.

We have discovered that our deepest depths of anxiety lie in our separation from our fellowman and our defiance of God's purpose for peace and good-will among men. All such outward acts of violence but reflect the silent but known rejection of other men and their place in a free society which too many of us harbor in our thoughts and uphold in our hearts. As we share the guilt of attitude, we feel the great need of a love big enough to forgive us and to make us forgiving and to lead us into a life guided by God' love and truth, and empowered by His Spirit.

As administrators, pastors, we send to Gov. Paul Johnson of Mississippi our word of appreciation of everything he has done and will do toward the full enfranchisement of all citizens there not only as American citizens but also as human beings who seek joy, safety, and fufillment. We pledge to him our committment to these same goals among our several peoples and places in our section of this, our one nation, under God.

To the President of the United States of America we send greetings and would assure him of our desire to be led through the wisest and best possible means of gevernment, as well as through the increasing cooperation of all religious forces in our country, into that brighter day when all men shall forsake the hurtful and seek out the helpful in the relationships of all the citizens of a great country now placed in responsibilities of tremen-
dous world leadership for justice, righteousness and peace.
A copy of this statement shall be sent to the Meredith family, the Norvell family, Gov. Paul Johnson of Mississippi and the President of the United States, and be spread upon the minutes of each of these Annual Conferences.

(6) That the Southwest Texas Conference in its appointments at its annual session in 1936 shall appoint one White and one Negro Minister to the merged church, with the salary of each to be the same.

## CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, 1865, by Bishop Edward Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference was held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Conference, held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, President.

The ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper, and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their labors.

This Conference to date has five districts, 103 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz., Huston-Tillotson College, located at Austin, Texas.

## ANNUAL CONFERENCE RULES

1. Nominations

The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.

## 2. Limits

No member of the Conference shall be permitted to serve upon more than two of the major Conference Boards, except where the Discipline shall provide otherwise. Special effort should be made to place every Conference member upon at least one Board. All vacancies occurring on any Board or Committee shall be filled according to the provisions in rule 1.

## 3. Lay Representation

Lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.

## 4. Conference Program

A program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a planning Committee made up of the resident bishop, all district Superintendents, the host-Pastor, the chairman of major boards, the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education, the Secretary of the Conference, the President of the WSCS and the Conference Lay Leader.
This committee shall have the responsibility for the planning and printing of the annual Conference Program-to be paid for by the Annual Conference.

## 5. Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions intended for publication in the conference journal shall be typewritten and submitted in triplicate to the Conference Secretary.

## 6. District Committee Ministerial Qualifications

The district committee on qualifications of local preachers shall consist of five traveling elders in the district.
The names of the District committees will be printed in the Conference Journal.
