San Antonio Area Council

Rio Grande, Southwest Texas, and West Texas Conferences

PURPOSE—The purpose of the Area Council shall be:

- (1) To share the concerns of the area conferences and make recommendations for cooperative ministries (programs)
- (2) To plan ministries (programs) that may be administered cooperatively by the conferences

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE—An Administrative Committee shall be composed of the Bishop and the Conference Program Directors

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—The Executive Committee shall consist of the officers and Administrative Committee

MEETINGS—The Area Council shall meet twice a year an dthe Executive

Committee shall meet on call of the Chairman

The question was called and sustained. The Report was adopted.

Bishop Slater asked for adjournment of the Southwest Texas Conference, for business of the adjourned session of the West Texas Conference. Motion passed.

Following a brief session of the West Texas Conference, Bishop Slater called all of the area Conference back into session. And called attention to the cooperation between the Conferences in this session. He expressed appreciation for the Conferences' cooperative spirit.

Pledge cards for the Fund for Reconciliation were distributed and time was given to fill them in.

The Conference was then closed by Bishop Slater using the Covenant service as an act of dedication for the entire Conference.

"A New Church for a New World"

The theme of the Quadrennial Emphasis, 1968-1972, for the United Methodist Church calls us to change. It is: "A new Church for a New World." We have a 'given' in this—the New World. It is here—all about us—we are in it—and the watchword is 'change'—'New'. We also have The Church—which is to become New. This is to happen by study/action/involvement in The WORD, The WORK, and The WORLD.

We believe we are in transition in regard to programs imposed and programs developed from the grass roots. So, mindful of this, we simply submit this report as a refinement of the General Church Quadrennial Emphasis with some local tie-ins and references to dates and situations that relate to us.

(1) The Church and The Word

Apart from the encouragement to use the curriculum as it has been developed in the Christian Education Program of the United Methodist Church and to expand upon the principle of experimentation in new forms and new styles of learning, the Committee gave careful thought to the suggestion that the Sermon on the Mount should be the basis for study in understanding the challenge of the new Quadrennium. The book "The Sermon on the Mount" by W. D. Davies (Cambridge Press, 1966, paperback, 155 pages) is recommended.

Bishop Slater has set Jan. 13th and 14th as a time when two intensive periods of study of the Sermon on the Mount will be held at Alice and at Mt. Wesley. Bishop Slater will participate in the training and will also invite some new testament scholar to be a part of the training. Following this period of training, pastors are encouraged to use the Sermon on the Mount as a basis for study and preaching during the period of Lent, which begins on Feb. 19th and continues through Good Friday on April 4th.

It is further recommended that materials be secured by the Family Coordinators of each church and put into the hands of the families with encouragement for home study during this same period.

(2) The Church and Its Work

It is recommended that every effort be made to help each local church promptly to make those structural changes for The United Methodist Church which will help it to be most effective in its work of planning and participating in mission. The proposed new structure will give each congregation far greater flexibility and freedom to determine and carry out its own particular mission within the framework of The United Methodist Church. This is an urgent task to be performed at the very doors of every sanctuary.

The workshops held within our Conference have helped to sharpen the church's sense of mission and to employ new structures only if they may effect a more effective ministry and mission of the local church.

A variety of Christian ministries constitute the program of the local church. Likewise, Christian ministries constitute the life of a dedicated Christian, whatever his vocation. Our times require a strengthening and extending to these ministries so that persons can become equipped to live and help others to live significantly. Then more persons can become involved with Christian mission and the new church can enter with strength upon its

witnessing to the world. Then churchmen will take greater responsibility for helping to shape constructive changes of society. Truly they will become faithful members of His church, and obedient disciples in His world.

We recommend that the ministries on the local level be examined to see whether they are really relevant in today's world. We expect that each congregation will see itself as part of a church in process of renewal. An essential part of this renewal is leadership development of the laity in order that it may assume its full role in life and mission of the new church. More creative worship is needed since worship is the source and motivation of Christian witness and service. There is need for the practice of the Christian style of life which will result in a definite, demonstrable difference in moral behavior, witness and service on the part of Christian in office, marketplace, and home.

We recommend that the Conference Council set up a task-group with specific assignment to develop a standard for membership training and provide stress until all of our churches have a membership training program for youth and adults.

We also urge all churches to examine their concern for others, especially in the area of evangelism. Do we have an evangelistic concern even if we cannot accept old approaches? Do we care enough to enlist for Christ and His Church? Are we thinking, are we planning, are we working to expand the fellowship of those who believe in Christ?

(3) **The Church and The World**

The church's witness in the world is one of reconciling love. This means we must find the way effectively to speak the Eternal Word—the Good News of Christ—so that it may be heard intelligently, believed gladly, obeyed willingly and received convincingly because it is backed up by authentic action. The new church will truly witness by articulating and working for the development of those social structures which are necessary in the face of today's crucial problems in our new world. This requires an understanding of the contemporary world. It assumes that the church is devoted to the task of being a constructive social change-agent under the mandate of its ethic.

We have previously acknowledged that a crisis of immense proportions confronts the Church. It springs from manifold social dislocations. The causes are deep. They are historical, sociological, racial, cultural, and in no small part, theological.

Basically the situation is that in time of immense resources and tremendous potential of every possible sort, millions of every race are deprived of the fullness of the human heritage. For these there seems to be no ready access to freedom of housing, employment, education, culture and worship which many of us take for granted. This, in America especially as it is related to Negro citizens and other minorities, is crisis more tragic, brutal, threatening and immediate than anything which has heretofore struck the nation, even in war or other national calamity.

This crisis will not wait while we unfold a quadrennial program in traditional form. It is not enough to meet it with high-sounding resolutions and a revision of the Social Creed. The hour has come for The United Methodist Church to move out and enable our people everywhere to respond in the context of their circumstances to this situation.

The United Methodist Church must speak to this challenge. To do this, however, the Church must listen intently to the groups who are caught up in it, among them the following:

—the black community, the Spanish-speaking communities, and the American Indians, those in the Methodist constituency and also those not in our church or in any church;

—the poor of every ethnic group, both in the rural and urban sectors of society who have much to tell us if we will listen;

—the teenagers and youth of the church, and of no church, who feel there is no way of bridging the gap between themselves and those of other generations.

Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation

In order that we as a church may move at once on every level of the

church to engage in constructive social change relative to the church's mission in the world, and more particularly to the national crisis in the United States while acknowledging and strongly supporting the clear priority claim of the total world service program, we recommend the raising of a special fund to be known as the Fund for Reconciliation, in the amount of not less than \$20,000,000.

The Southwest Texas Conference amount to be raised will be close to \$225,000, half of which will be spent in this Conference for needs recommended by a special committee to be nominated by Bishop Slater and elected by the Council.

We recommend that on Dec. 3rd, when the Quadrennial Program is to be presented, all delegates be asked to make their pledge to the Fund for Reconciliation.

We recommend that during the weeks after Christmas each local church begin the process of education of its members as to the need which exists and as to the measure of financial response which should be their responsibility.

It is hoped that as many churches as possible will be in a position to make some firm pledge individually and/or as a congregation to its share of the task on or before the first Sunday in Lent. Where readiness is not possible within that time table, we urge careful and deliberate planning by the congregation to make sure that there will be full participation during the quadrennium.

It is anticipated that each church will continue during the quadrennium the work of finding creative ways to extend the reconciling work which the Fund for Reconciliation implies and will each year find ways to give new opportunities to its membership to share in the financial goals of the Fund.

We suggest guidelines be used by the Committee charged with the spending of these funds—

- (1) That projects be developed on the Conference level with full area planning.
- (2) That projects be developed in full consultation with local churches and districts after they have studied needs locally on inter-conference and ecumenical bases where possible.
- (3) In general, as planning progresses, the following would be considered:
 - (a) Pay close heed to ongoing ministries, such as Community Centers and Week Day Kindergartens in low-income areas.
 - (b) Work with ecumenical projects where possible.
- (4) We urge careful evaluation of 'crisis' needs in South Texas and that professional help be sought in determining the course of our commitments to specific needs. We also feel that projects not be undertaken until submitted to and approved specifically by the Annual Conference.
- (5) We recommend that the Bishop appoint a Projects Committee to be responsible for studying and recommending projects to the Annual Conference.
- (6) We recommend that the Enlistments and Vocations Commission be asked to serve as a Committee for Voluntary Service.

We strongly recommend that all churches follow the suggestion of having Dinners of Reconciliation **on or about Feb. 13th**, inviting people from all ethnic and racial groups.

United Methodist Voluntary Service

The giving of substance, however, does not by any means exhaust the potential of United Methodism for addressing itself to this crisis. We recommend also the establishment of a United Methodist Voluntary Service for which persons from age 18 to 30 may offer themselves for periods of direct service as a part of Task Forces organized for special works of reconciliation or reconstruction wherever they are needed. This would be on a subsistence basis, supported by the Fund for Reconciliation. We believe that there is a readiness among young people to render the kind of service that the hour requires. As St. Paul said long ago regarding offerings: "But first they gave themselves." (2 Cor. 8:5)

CONFERENCE MINUTES

First Session - Monday, June 2, 1969

Communion and Memorial Service

7:30 P.M.

The call to worship was given by Rev. LaValle Lowe, Jr., host-pastor. Hymn No. 26, "Holy, Holy, Holy" was sung by the Conference, led by the host-church choir. Rev. Lowe invited the conference to turn to the Ritual for the administration of the Lords' Supper. After a prayer was read, the choir chanted the Lord's Prayer followed by the Gloria in Excelsis.

The invitation to confess our sins was given by Rev. P. L. Woods. After reciting the prayer of Confession Rev. Woods gave the Words of Assurance, and led the Responsive Prayer for the whole state of the Church.

The Choir sang, "Lord Jesus I Love Thee". The Rev. Zan W. Holmes read the Epistle from 1st. Cor. 11:23-32. The Choir sang an Anthem after which the Rev. E. Charles Purnell read the Gospel from St. Luke 22:21-27; the conference stood and recited the Apostles Creed.

The Rev. J. Boyd Richardson, Chairman of the Committee on Memorials called the Conference Secretary, Meredith C. Stone, to call the Roll of the deceased ministers, wives, and widows. He called the following names: Walter A. Webb, T. J. D. Simms, Mrs. Laura Rogers, and Mrs. Myrtle B. Cooke. Rev. Richardson gave a verbal tribute to the memory of their years of faithful service in the vineyard of their Master. The conference closed this part of the service with a moment of silent prayer.

The Rev. Dale H. Hansboro presented Bishop O. Eugene Slater, presiding officer of the West Texas Conference. He announced that the Offering was being taken for the KARL EVERETT DOWNS PROFESSORSHIP FUND. The following ministers served as stewards: A. S. Pitts, E. T. Dixon, Wm. J. Washington, Zan W. Holmes, Jr., P. L. Woods, Mason Johnson, and Mr. Lewis Echols. The amount contributed was \$500.00. The choir led the conference in singing the Offertory Response. After the choir sang "Spirit of God Descend Upon My Heart", Bishop Slater came forward and delivered the Communion message from the 8th chapter of Paul's Letter to the Romans, the 38th and 39th verses. Bishop Slater pointed out the differences which separate us, and the various difficulties which tend to separate us; he then pointed out that the Christian is a conqueror through Him that loved us so that nothing shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord. Following the sermon Bishop Slater was joined by the district superintendents at the Altar where the Elements were consecrated.

Three hundred and fifty-five (355) Communicants were served. The benediction was pronounced by Rev. Lowe and called the conference to holy meditation. The conference adjourned.

Second Session - June 3, 1969

8:30 A.M.

The devotions began promptly at the appointed hour. Hymn No. 336 was sung; the scripture and prayer were given by Rev. Harold T. Ashurst. Hymn No. 1 was sung after which the Rev. Luther W. Henry, Sr. brought the devotional message, after which Hymn No. 143 was sung.

Bishop Slater declared the West Texas Annual Conference officially opened for its 95th session. He called the Conference Secretary to come forward and call the Roll of the Ministerial and Lay Delegation. The quadrennial officers and their assistants were confirmed there being no additional assistants added the officers and their assistants are as follows: Meredith C. Stone, conference secretary; assistants: Albert S. Pitts, J. S. C. Grattan, Martin J. Walker, and Taylor S. Stewart. Garrett J. Goff, conference statistician; assistants, Mrs. O. L. Jackson, E. M. Cooper, William L. Shaw, and

Luther W. Henry. J. Garfield Owens, conference treasurer; assistants: Mrs. J. G. Owens, S. M. Cleaver, and Zan W. Holmes, Jr.

The composite report of the District Superintendents was read by Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Jr. The report was unanimously adopted. Comments on the report were made by Bishop Slater relative to evangelism and urged the delegation to strive diligently to make the Church what it should be in every community.

PRESENTATION: Mrs. O. Eugene Slater was presented to the conference. She made timely remarks.

Bishop Slater called for the report of the Program Council. The Chairman, Rev. E. Charles Purnell, presented the Rev. P. L. Woods, program director. Every phase of his report was adopted with the exception of the report of the Projects Committee. This report was deferred for further study and will be presented to the conference at a later day and hour. (See report section).

The Constitution and By-Laws of the United Methodist Communications Council of Texas was presented. It was adopted.

The Program Director presented our own Dr. Earnest T. Dixon, a representative of the Program Council. He praised the conference program council for the work it had done towards the projections for the ensuing year.

The report of the Board of Pensions was called by Bishop Slater. Rev. Ira B. Loud, the chairman read the report. It was adopted. (See report section).

Bishop Slater invited the noon-day devotional leader, The Rev. Ernest L. Harrison and Dr. Alfredo Nanez, President of Lydia Patterson Institute of El Paso, Texas. Hymn No. 129 was sung after which the Affirmation of Faith was said. The 90th Psalm was read, and Hymn No. 92 was used as the Hymn of Preparation. Bishop Slater introduced and presented Dr. Nanez. He brought the message. Hymn No. 223 closed the worship.

Third Session - June 3, 1969

2:30 P.M.

The devotions were conducted by the Conference Secretary. "O Thou in Whose Presence My Soul Takes Delight" was the opening hymn. The prayer was given by the Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr. Bishop Slater was presented. After remarks he called for the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. The report was read by the secretary of the Board, Mr. Rayford Wilkins. After several questions were answered by Rev. LaValle Lowe, Board Chairman, the report was adopted. (See report section) The report of the Committee on Ecumenical Affairs was read by Rev. Albert S. Pitts, Chairman. The report was adopted. (See report section) The report of the Committee on Publishing Interests was read by Rev. Meredith C. Stone, Chairman. After a brief discussion a motion was made by Rev. L. L. Haynes that the report be amended to include a paragraph that would reflect the attitude of the conference in regards to the charge made against it at the General Conference in 1968. The motion to amend was adopted. The Committee report including the amendment was adopted. (See report section)

PRESENTATION: Bishop Slater presented Rev. Woodie White, representing the Board on Race and Religion. He addressed the conference.

The Merger Committee was called for its report. The Plan on Merger was presented. A lengthy discussion ensued on section V. Bishop Slater interrupted the discussion to present Bishop L. Scott Allen, resident Bishop of the Houston Area. He greeted the conference and thanked Bishop Slater for the invitation extended him to visit the conference.

The discussion on the merger plan continued. A motion to re-write section V spelling out in clear terms for a better understanding and the protection of our pension security. Rev. Ira B. Loud, chairman of the Board of Pensions, and Rev. William J. Washington were added to the committee to assist in the re-writing of that section. The motion was seconded by Rev. J. D. Mooring. It was adopted with section V to be presented in the Wednesday session.

PRESENTATION: Bishop Slater presented Dr. W. T. Handy, Jr., a representative of the Methodist Publishing House. He brought greetings from the House, and addressed the conference. After the announcements were

made Bishop Slater called Dr. Timothy B. Echols to come and give the benediction. The conference adjourned.

Tuesday Evening - June 3, 1969

7:30 P.M.

Worship Leader - Rev. Jacob H. Carruthers

The opening Hymn was No. 233, "Rejoice Ye Pure in Heart". The Apostles Creed was recited, after which Hymn No. 232, "From Every Stormy Wind That Blows", was sung. Solo, "In Times Like These" was sung.

The Scripture Lesson was read from St. John's Gospel 17:1-15; prayer was given by Rev. Carruthers with the hymn, "Let It Breathe on Me", following. Musical moments were given by the Wesley, Austin, Texas choir. They sang, 1: "Jesus is all the World to Me"; and 2: "Alas and Did My Saviour Bleed", this was done in a new arrangement.

The Offertory was conducted by Rev. Ira B. Loud, a host of ministers, and laymen. The choir sang during the Offertory, "Spirit of God Descend Upon My Heart". Rev. J. Garfield Owens announced that Layman O. H. Elliott is the official delegate from our Wesley Church in Austin, Texas.

Rev. P. L. Woods, Conference Program Director, made several announcements germane to Conference activities and its work; he also introduced guests, among them, Dr. and Mrs. Ted Richardson of the Southwest Texas Conference. Dr. Norris spoke for the Gammon Theological Seminary.

Bishop O. Eugene Slater, presiding bishop, presented Bishop L. Scott Allen, resident bishop of the Houston Area. The choir led the congregation in singing the Hymn of preparation, No. 92, "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing My Great Redeemer's Praise". Bishop Allen came forth to preach. He spoke on the subject: "God's Fulfillment Through the Spirit". The Text was taken from Gen. 1:2-3. He pointed out that "God's most lofty purpose was to bring order out of chaos; to lift man to a new level in His creation." He urged letting the Spirit of God have its way. Bishop Allen led the conference in singing "I Will Trust in the Lord". After Hymn No. 72 the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Slater.

Fourth Session - June 4, 1969

8:30 A.M.

The devotions were conducted by Rev. Ralph G. Nathan. Hymns No. 72, 104, and 265 were used along with several scriptures assisted by Mrs. Katheryne Stanley, Rev. P. L. Woods, Rev. M. T. Reed, and Rev. Harvey Kinchlow. The title of the meditation was "A Litany of Renewal". Rev. Nathan presented Bishop Slater. After remarks he called for the report of the Committee on daily journal. The Chairman, Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr., reported that the journal entry of Monday evening and Tuesday morning and afternoon were found to be correct; he moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

The report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was called. The Chairman, Rev. J. S. C. Grattan read his report and moved its adoption. It was adopted. (See the report section)

Mrs. O. B. Coe, and Rev. Roy E. Stanley spoke on the work of the Inner-city. The recommendations of the Board were, on the motion of Rev. L. L. Haynes, Sr. referred back to the Board for further study. It was seconded by Mrs. Coe.

Dr. J. Howard Crawford, district superintendent from the Northwest Texas Annual Conference was presented. Rev. John W. Elliott, Executive Secretary of Education was called for his report. He made his report and it was adopted. (See report section)

ORDER OF THE DAY: On the motion of Rev. P. L. Woods, 10:00 a.m. was set as an Order of the Day for the report of the Ministers' Wives and Daughters Association. It was seconded by Rev. John W. Elliott, Sr.; the motion was adopted.

Bishop Slater announced the transfer of the following ministers to the West Texas Annual Conference: Rev. Marshall E. Hodge, Elder in supernumerary relation from Missouri West Conference, effective June 1, 1969;

Rev. Freddie B. Dixon, Probationary member, effective June 1, 1969; and Rev. Roscoe Nunley, Elder from Gulf Coast Conference, effective June 1, 1969. The deferred report of the Projects Committee was presented. One amendment was made to the report. Amended to place the "Community Developer" under the direction of the district superintendent in whose district he may be serving. The Report was adopted.

Rev. Mason Johnson, Noon-day devotional leader, was requested to come to the podium. The Rev. Dr. Alfredo Nanez, speaker, was also invited to come. Rev. Johnson announced the opening hymn, No. 17, "How Great Thou Art". The scripture was read from St. John 3:1-3; After the prayer Hymn No. 93, "Come Thou Fount" was sung as the hymn of preparation. Bishop Slater presented the Speaker. Dr. Nanez announced his subject, "The Grace of God". He brought an inspiring message. Hymn No. 1, "O For a Thousand Tongues To Sing" brought the worship hour to a close. The conference adjourned for lunch.

Fifth Session - June 4, 1969
2:30 P.M.

The devotions were conducted by the Conference Secretary. Hymn No. 170 was the opening hymn. The prayer was given by Rev. S. A. Keesee after which Bishop Slater, after brief remarks, presented the Rev. W. F. Hathaway, a member of the Southwest Texas Conference. The report of the Board of Missions was made by Rev. J. Hudson Carruthers, Board Chairman. (See the report section) The report was adopted.

Bishop Slater presented Dr. Kenneth S. Thompson, a representative of the General Board of Pensions. Question No. 20, "Are all the ministerial members of the conference blameless in their life and official administration?" was asked. Bishop Slater called each of the district superintendents to answer the question regarding the ministers on his district. Austin-Victoria, Dallas, San Antonio, and Waco. The answer was, "There is nothing against them". The Secretary recorded as the answer to question No. 20: "Yes".

The report of the Board of the Ministry was called. The Chairman, Dr. Earnest T. Dixon presented the Registrar, Rev. Marcus A. L. Freeman to read the report. All of the report was adopted with exception of Question No. 25-d as it appears in the 1964 Discipline of the Methodist Church, which was referred back to the Board for clarification. Their report may be seen in Section V, part II of the Journal.

The deferred section of the report of the Merger Committee was presented to the conference by Dr. John T. King. Section 3 of the "preamble" was ordered, by vote of the conference, to be re-written. This being done this section was adopted. Part V No. 2 was ordered, by vote of the conference, to be re-written spelling out precisely its meaning. This being done this section was adopted. The total report was then presented to the conference for its action. On the motion of Dr. John T. King, seconded by Rev. P. L. Woods, the conference voted unanimously for adoption. It was adopted. (See report section)

A motion by John W. Elliott setting up in each local church a discussion group on merger composed of the following persons: The pastor, lay-leader, Women's Society of Christian Service presidents, the president of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. The motion was seconded by Rev. William J. Washington.

A motion to amend Section VIII of the Plan of Merger regarding the Depository so as to include St. Paul, Dallas; Wesley, Austin; and St. Paul, San Antonio to serve as Co-Depositories. The motion was adopted.

A resolution on transfer of churches belonging to West Texas Conference which are located geographically in the Texas Conference, namely Bowman-Long Branch, Calvert, Marlin, Maysfield Ct., Satin, Majors, Chilton, Goodville Parish, Bremond; and the churches in the Gulf Coast Conference which are located in the Southwest Texas Conference geographically, namely, Arther City, Clarksville Paris, Honey Grove, Terrell, and East Mexia Ct. be transferred to the respective former Central Jurisdiction Conferences overlapping the receiving South-Central Jurisdiction Conferences, namely, West Texas Conference churches to Gulf Coast Conference, and Gulf Coast Conference churches to West Texas Conference. The resolution was adopted.

Dr. Ted Richardson, Program Director of the Southwest Texas Conference was presented.

Bishop Slater presented two members of the West Texas Conference now serving in the Chaplaincy of the armed forces. They were, Captain Samuel H. Callier, and Captain Alexander M. Mason, Jr. They brought greetings to the conference and sought its prayers and blessings as they seek to provide a place of refuge for the men of our Armed Service to which they may retreat when troubles press the soul.

The Conference Secretary read a telegram from the Southwest Conference in session at Wesley United Methodist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas. The telegram was warmly received, and the Secretary was ordered to respond by sending a like message to them. This was done.

Bishop Slater invited Captain Mason to come forward and give the benediction. The conference adjourned.

Wednesday Evening - June 4, 1969

7:30 P.M.

Worship Leader - Rev. M. T. Reed

Hymn No. 93 was the opening hymn. The Apostles Creed was recited, and the Doxology sung. First Cor., 13th chapter was read as the Scripture Lesson, and prayer was offered by Rev. Reed. The choir sang the response.

The Anthem, "Bless His Name Forever", was sung after which Dr. John T. King, President of Huston-Tillotson College, Austin, Texas was presented. He addressed the conference on the subject: "What is a College?" He delivered a very forceful, thought provoking, dynamic message. The offering of \$194.01 was received.

The choir sang a medley of songs which included "Pass Me Not O Gently Saviour", "I Trust in God", and "Something Within Me". Bishop Allen came forth to deliver the message. He spoke on the Text: 1st Cor. 13:10. His message electrified the congregation. The choir sang "Just As I Am". The benediction was pronounced by Bishop Slater.

Thursday Morning - June 5, 1969

8:30 A.M.

Devotional Leader, Rev. J. L. Wattley

After the opening Hymn the devotional leader called the conference to reaffirm its faith. The Korean Creed, No. 741, was recited, after which Prayer for the Church No. 743, was said in unison. For the Scripture lesson, Isaiah 6th. chapter was read. After Hymn No. 87 was sung, the Rev. Wattley presented Bishop Slater; he gave thanks to the devotional leader for his service rendered the conference.

BUSINESS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE RESUMED: Bishop Slater requested a meeting with Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Jr., and Rev. Ernest T. Dixon at their earliest convenience.

REPORTS: The Committee on Minimum Salary made its report. Having been read by Chairman M. A. Freeman who moved its adoption. The report was adopted.

The Treasurer's report was read by the Reverend J. Garfield Owens, Conference Treasurer; it was received and adopted.

The Committee on the Journal was called by Bishop Slater to give its report. The Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr., Chairman, reported that the minutes of the previous day were read and found to be correct. He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

The Rev. S. A. Keese, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, was read and adopted.

The Rev. P. L. Woods presented Mrs. J. G. Owens, president of the Minister's Wives and Daughters Association for her report. Mrs. Owens requested all members of the Association to come to the front after which

each district president was presented to read the report from their district. The reports were as follows:

At 10:00 o'clock A.M. the session was in recess for 15 minutes. The conference was called to order by Bishop Slater, and the Business of the conference was resumed.

REPORTS: The report of the Conference Board of the Laity was made by Mr. Odie E. Davis, Jr., Conference Lay Leader. His report was received and adopted.

The hour having arrived for the mid-day worship, the Rev. Roy E. Stanley was presented to lead the devotions. The opening Hymn No. 72, "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name" was sung. The prayer was given by Rev. Stanley. Matthew 5:1-12 was read. Hymn No. 299, "O Zion Haste", was sung after which Dr. Robert S. Tate, pastor of First United Methodist Church, Austin, Texas delivered the Sermon. His message offered a challenge to the conference. The conference stood and sang Hymn No. 247, "Jesus, Saviour, Pilot Me". The Benediction was pronounced by Dr. Tate. The conference adjourned for the Noon lunch.

Thursday Afternoon Session 2:30 P.M.

Promptly at 2:30 p.m. the Conference Secretary conducted the devotions after which he presented Bishop Slater. The business of the conference was resumed with reports being continued.

The Rev. I. B. Loud made his report for the Historical Commission. He moved its adoption. It was adopted. Meredith C. Stone, Chairman of Publishing Interests read his report. After brief discussions concerning the omission of Publishing House hiring practices. The conference voted to add a paragraph. This was done and the report was adopted.

The Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Sr. presented Rev. E. J. Tanner, Conference Secretary of Evangelism. He read his report. It was adopted. The Rev. Antone Dykes presented the report of the Commission on Health and Welfare Ministry and moved its adoption. His report was adopted.

Miss Lillie B. Wilson was called to make her report. She read her report, and the conference acknowledged its presentation.

Bishop Slater directed the conference to prepare itself to take its action on the three (3) Constitutional Amendments sent down to the annual conferences. The Secretary polled the eligible delegates and the vote taken as follows:

Amendment No. 1: Number eligible to vote-89, Voting for-89, Against-0

Amendment No. 2: Number eligible to Vote-78, Voting for-78, Against-0

Amendment No. 3: Number eligible to Vote-79, Voting for-79, Against-0

Bishop Slater announced all three (3) Amendments carried. He called for the report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns. The report was read by Rev. J. S. C. Grattan. He moved its adoption. The motion received the proper second; it was adopted. Item 2, which had to do with the "National Black Economic Development Conference" was tabled. Item No. 3 of the report of the Commission on Social Concerns dealing with "Homes for children, Unwed mothers, and the Aged" was referred to the Commission on Health and Welfare Ministry.

Bishop Slater asked question 48, "Where shall the next annual conference session be held?" The conference was reminded that the 1968 conference meeting in Austin, Texas May 27-30, 1968 voted to hold the 1970 Session in Austin, Texas. The action of that session was declared to be true, and placed the failure to insert it in the Minutes of 1968 on the Con-

ference Secretary. Bishop Slater opened the house for nominations. Invitations were extended by Rev. I. B. Loud for St. Paul, Dallas; Rev. L. L. Haynes, Sr. for St. Andrews, Fort Worth, and Rev. J. Hudson Carruthers for Wesley, Austin. The vote was called for. Wesley, Austin, Texas having received 68 votes (the highest number) the 1970 session will be held at Wesley in Austin. The Conference adjourned at 5:00 P.M.

Following the Prelude, the invocation was given by Rev. E. T. Dixon. Hymn No. 1 "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing" was sung; Responsive Reading No. 638 "Behold My Servant" was read responsively.

The conference stood and Affirmed its faith, and sang the Gloria Patri. The Scripture Lesson was read using 2nd. Timothy 1:1-11.

The Offertory was conducted by Bishop Slater. \$161.73 was received. The conference sang the Choral Offertory Response. Following the singing of the Anthem, Hymn No. 150 was sung. Bishop Slater presented the Speaker, Dr. Robert Tate, minister of First United Methodist Church in Austin, Texas.

Dr. Tate electrified the conference and challenged the candidates to be Ordained Deacons. At the conclusion of his message the class for ordination was called. They were John A. Greene, Jr. and Henry Lewis Masters. Bishop Slater administered the ritual of ordination assisted by the district superintendents, Rev. Dale H. Hansboro, Zan W. Holmes, Jr., J. Garfield Owens, and Eric C. Purnell.

After the reading of the Resolution by the Committee on Courtesies by Rev. J. B. Richardson, Bishop Slater read the appointments for the 1969-1970 conference year. The Conference stood adjourned Sine Die.

REPORT NUMBER 1

THE COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Christians and the Churches today find themselves in a new and radically changing world; the pace of change is accelerating at alarming rates. As one of the characters in ALICE IN WONDERLAND said, "Nowadays, you have to run as fast as you can to stay in the same place."

The old familiar landmarks are disappearing and new, unfamiliar ones are appearing. Urbanization, industrialization and advanced technology are freighted with their own consequences. Political independence, economic relations, student unrest, military decisions, and the prediction by the Kerner Report that our nation is dividing into two societies — one black and one white — all bear their own unpredictable legacy. Values are changed not so much by rational decision and conscious abstract analysis as by the living responses and adjustments to radically changed circumstances of life. This radical shaking of the foundations of life brings in its deep wake a deep and serious questioning of traditional assumptions and values.

This is the situation in which Christians and the Churches find themselves today; the old signposts have been torn up; the way ahead is not clear.

Such a new world situation, indeed, demands a new Church. This, however, is not to say that the Gospel we proclaim must be forsaken for a new message. The Gospel is the same yesterday, today, and forever. It is ever the answer to the world's problems. But we have this treasure in earthen vessels. New wineskins that are relevant to today's world must be embraced by the Church. Yet, this is not to say that every traditional vessel must be discarded simply because the old is old and the new is new. We must maintain the old vessels which have proved their worth. For example, we must never forsake some of the rich traditions of our own West Texas Conference which have kept men on their feet in the deep waters of the past and can still keep men on their feet in the deep waters of the future; for we are not yet out of all the deep waters — and it is good to have some true and tried and trusted bridges just in case! But even the old vessels must be supplemented by the new that God's word may be truly heard by all His people.

In a new world, we are called to be a new Church with a special responsibility and opportunity to help individuals to see patterns of meaning and purpose in the changes in which they are caught up. We have a special responsibility to cultivate among our members a deepening empathy with the destitute, the marginal, and the uprooted. We have a special responsibility to be headlights instead of taillights. We have a special responsibility to stand for something lest we fall for anything. We have a special responsibility to do our own thing in the light of God's thing for us. Yes, we have a special responsibility to "tell it like it is?"

Through a patient and compassionate Christian "presence," we can encourage uprooted individuals to explore and experience the potential rele-

vance of the Christian hope for their own situation and be inspired to affirm in the words of the old Negro spiritual, "There Is a Balm in Gilead."

With the above thoughts in mind, we present some of the works and labors of our Districts during the past conference year.

The Austin-Victoria District

The District Superintendent, Pastors and Laymen have labored together in a wonderful way this year and much has been accomplished.

1. Our Churches have been led in appreciating and understanding the new Church structure; and all have been organized according to the new plan.

2. The District Institute called together a good number of our very fine young people. Under the guidance of our dear Reverend Charles Smith and his competent faculty, our young people were stimulated in learning and action.

3. A very keen interest has been manifested in the Fund for Reconciliation on the District; the pledges have been generous and the systematic payments of the pledges have been indeed encouraging.

4. We have witnessed a remarkable upsurge in the acquisition of new properties and the renovation and updating of others. We have new chapels and buildings at Cologne, Altair, and Oakland Circuits. The Simson United Methodist Church in Austin, Texas has completely weather conditioned its edifice. Our minister, Reverend E. T. Tanner, is giving excellent leadership here. The Church in La Grange, under the leadership of Brother J. M. Moreland, has modernized its building.

5. All claims of the Church have been accepted and approached with zeal and determination. The Conference Treasurer's report will indicate that a number of our Churches have paid all claims in full.

6. The educational and evangelistic programs of the Churches have been steadily progressing. There are new efforts made to relate all the Churches to the specific needs of the community.

7. As we look towards the prospect of merger, our Churches have been taking advantage of every opportunity to fellowship across racial lines. Conversation, both informal and formal, have been going on among pastors and lay people.

A great deal of interest has been manifested toward the complete Merger of our Conference. The San Antonio District, through constant fellowship across what is now conference lines has, we feel, made rapid progress.

Stewardship

The Pastor's reports will reflect that in almost every Church great

progress has been made. There is an increase in **membership** and an increase in our total **giving**.

This has not been a year of all **sunshine**. We have also had some dark days. Death has entered our ministerial rank. We sincerely regret the passing on of the Reverend W. A. Webb. However, with grateful hearts, we give our heartfelt thanks to God for another wonderful year; for in spite of it all, "We are more than conquerors through Him that loved us." For truly, "Eye hat not seen, nor ears heard, nor has it entered into the heart of man, the things God has prepared for those who love Him."

The Waco District

Henry who served with us during its inception, moved away and Rev. Roy E. Stanley has taken his place. This ministry is basically Methodist in structure, but in its working operation, is most ecumenical. Thousands of people are helped through this Inner-City Ministry. Waco has a deeper sense of Missions because of the influence of the Inner-City Ministry.

Christian Education

This year has basically been spent in the learning of the New Church Structure. The District has been very fortunate in having the Rev. John W. Elliott, Sr. as one of the ministers on the Waco District. As part-time Executive Secretary, he has been a blessing to the Waco District. He has led us in several workshops. He also took a team from the Waco District to Midland to participate in a Leadership Training experience.

Merger

The Waco District, with the actions of the coming Conference, will be among the first Districts to fully feel the effects of the merger. In a proposal of transfer, the Waco District could lose several of its present Church to the Gulf Coast Conference. There have been several meetings on merger which greatly affected the Waco District.

Buildings and Improvements

The Waco District has been very busy in the area of building and improvements. The Church at Goodville has been abandoned and the building and membership have been transferred to Chilton. Rev. R. W. Johnson has given this charge very good leadership. Rev. Johnson has been very instrumental in making improvements to the Chilton and Satin Churches.

The membership of Union Memorial at Mexia has painted the church inside and outside, installed central heating and air-conditioning and installed

indoor rest room facilities in the church. This is a totally rural church. We are grateful to Rev. W. W. Baker for this leadership.

Wesley in Waco has given its parsonage a face-lifting. Under the leadership of Rev. G. J. Goff, other important improvements have been made on the physical plant of the church.

Hollowell-Midland has purchased a very beautiful three bedroom parsonage. Rev. Hayward Henry is the pastor.

Rev. M. A. L. Freeman and Saint James - Waco have put a much needed roof on the church and have also liquidated the parsonage debt.

The Rev. S. W. Curtis and the good members of Springhill Church have completely renovated the church and added new rest room facilities.

The Whitewall Church on the Belton Circuit under the leadership of Rev. Charles Espie has built a Community Center.

Mount Zion and Rev. Roy E. Stanley are in the process of re-locating the church.

Mackey Chapel of Odessa is to be the recipient of another church, free of debt and completely furnished, and a parsonage. This has been done through the leadership of Rev. E. L. Spencer.

Rev. E. M. Cooper and Jones-Mexia are very busy renovating the parsonage.

The Board of Laity

The Board of the Laity is one of the bright spots on the Waco District. Mr. Eddie Evans, the District Lay-leader, has led us in several workshops. He has set in motion some plans for his associates to join him in attending the Regional meeting for the Laity in Arkansas. The Board of the Laity will have representation at Purdue University this summer.

The W. S. C. S.

The women of the Women's Society of Christian Service of the Waco District have made themselves felt in every area of their program. They were the host of the Conference Annual Meeting of the Women's Society this year. The ladies were at their best. They have not only worked on a district and conference level, but they have also been overly involved in the Inner-City Ministry. Mrs. Ocie McDowell is the dynamic leader for this District.

In closing, I would like to say that the ministers have been wonderful on our District. They have attempted to support all the activities of the District. They have supported it financially. The oneness of this District has been the key to its success. The laymen have been great. Their desire to be involved, their desire to learn, and their desire to be challenged have brought a new awakening to our District. We thank God for all of them.

Mooring) has completely renovated its parsonage and Educational Building. Milford-Italy (Rev. Glover Thomas) has made some needed repairs on its sanctuary. Saint Luke, Dallas (Rev. T. B. Echols) has purchased additional land and buildings for future building purposes. Hamilton Park (Rev. Luther Henry) is in the process of negotiating a loan for major improvements on its Sanctuary and Educational buildings. Saint Andrews, Waxahachie (Rev. Joseph Murphy) is in the process of making some needed repairs on its Sanctuary. The parsonage at Mount Calvary, Wichita Falls (Rev. J. H. Carter) is being renovated.

Bishop Slater's Visits

A highlight of our District program this year was the inspiring presence and preaching of our Resident Bishop O. Eugene Slater at two mass worship services on the Dallas District. Ministerial Support - The District Superintendents Fund Paragraph 908

The support of the District Superintendents including annual salary, travel and office expense shall be an amount equal to 18% of Pastors and Associate Pastors estimated annual salaries.

No other amounts shall be levied against the charge of the Conference for the District Superintendents salaries, travel and office expense.

The salary for each District Superintendent of the Conference shall be \$7,000.00 for the Annual Conference Year.

The allowance for each District Superintendent of the Conference for travel and office expense shall be \$2,000.00 for the Annual Conference Year.

The Pastor of the Local Charge shall see that an amount equal to 18% of the Pastors and Associate Pastors estimated salaries for the month is remitted each month to the Annual Conference Treasurer, clearly designated District Superintendent Fund. The above specified amount is to be sent by the Local Charge in time to reach the Conference Treasurer's Office not later than Wednesday after the first Sunday in each month.

The Annual Conference Treasurer shall send to the several District Superintendents their salaries, office and travel expense on the first day of each month.

It shall be the duty of the several District Superintendents of the Conference to give Official Guidance and Directives pertaining to all phases of the District Superintendent Fund in all of the Charges of the Conference.

**Ministerial Support
The Episcopal Fund**

The Episcopal Fund shall be 2% of the Pastor's Cash Salary.

**The Conference Pension Program
The Conference Claimant Fund - Paragraph 905**

The Conference Claimant Fund shall be 20% of the Pastor's Cash Salary. The percentage division for Immediate Distribution and the Reserve Pension Fund shall be set by the Conference on Recommendation of the Conference Board of Pensions. See Conference Board of Pension Report.

Minimum Support Fund

We recommend that the Minimum Support Fund shall be 2% of the Pastor's Cash Salary.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Paragraphs 902-904

1. We recommend that the Total Conference Budget consisting of General Benevolences, Conference Benevolences, plus the Administration Budget and any other Conference Wide Askings be apportioned to the Districts on the Basis of the District Full Membership Percentage of the Total Full Membership of the Conference.
2. We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance shall make the Apportionments for World Service and Conference Benevolence and all other Apportionments referred to in Paragraph 902 and 907 to the Districts only.
3. All amounts contributed in each Local Church for World Service and Conference Benevolence shall be remitted monthly by the Local Church Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer.
4. The Charges of the Conference shall pay World Service and Conference Benevolences and other Conference askings by Certified Check, Cashier Check, or Money Orders. All such Checks and Money Orders shall be made to the Annual Conference Treasurer.

REPORT NUMBER 4

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Bishop Slater, and members of the 95th session of the West Texas Conference:

We bring you greetings from the Conference on Evangelism held at the Hotel President, Kansas City, Mo., January 8-12, 1969.

It was a most inspiring, challenging, informative, and heart warming experience. The addresses by outstanding leaders and discussion sessions provided us new insights and positive methods in the field of evangelism. We hope to project and implement some of these methods during the 1969-1970 conference year.

We believe that the times call for, and the opportunities warrant a major bold crusade in evangelism throughout the West Texas Conference during the 1969-1970 conference year.

Since Methodism was born and nurtured in evangelism, and since her greatest hours have been in times of evangelistic fervor, we are called to reclaim and rekindle fires of United Methodist Faith with eager and determination and confront all of the unchurched with the Gospel of Christ.

We realize that there can be no strong program of evangelism without the consecration which comes from a personal experience of Jesus Christ, our Saviour and Lord. We call ministers and laymen alike to that deepening and dedication of the spiritual life which would lead them to share the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ through every acceptable means of evangelism throughout the West Texas Conference.

The Body of Christ is a task force that witnesses between "a world that is passing away and the new world being born. It is the living Christ that provides the cutting edge of the evangelistic thrust. It is He who commands us to meet the world where it is. REPORT NUMBER 5

**EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR
CHILDREN, YOUTH, ADULTS AND FAMILIES**

Christian education is a way to organize for work as christians. We are given a new structure through which to work, therefore, each local church must find and appropriate ways to operate in mission. Each church must learn to design ministries that meet special needs and also, to find ways that enable them to meet better the needs that they are aware of and are not satisfied with the ways that these needs are being met. The Church is up against it trying to meet felt needs, discovered needs and areas of concern which keep them cumbered with needless time and talent.

In order to get mission and ministry one must know what these mean. It is caring for and being cared for; it is being concerned for and having concerned people think of you; it is loving and being loved; it is sharing with others and their sharing with you.

If a ministry is real it has to be demonstrated in a vital, meaningful, redemptive fellowship of struggling persons becoming aware of who they are and finding proper relationships for all of life.

Your conference director of Christian Education, your coordinators of Children's Youth, Adult and Family Life Ministries are available for service to you. It is our desire to come to each district at least twice this conference year. This means eight trips to each district upon the request of the district superintendents. Also, as many trips to individual churches as possible will be made as time will permit.

In the New Structure many new ways to operate are open to us. Christian Education is the process of organizing for work and mission and undergirding our faith with action. It is a way of planning for work that is the result of teaching-learning where struggle is evident and a change of behavior takes place. If we are to make behavior more adequate as an expression of what we believe our words and deeds must say the same thing. In the New Structure this seems more possible than ever before.

Every church must arrive at its Ministry through this process of striving, struggling, trial and error until we are responsible and free before God and man. Then the kingdom of heaven will be real on earth.

Our church is saying to us that with children, youth, adults and families we can live up to the demands of the Gospel throughout our life. Therefore, the problem that we have is in the arena where all of the action takes place. The Council on Ministries should provide help in the arena and give directions so that purpose, meaning, goals, actions and evaluation will make the church healthy and vital as a place where God and man encounter, and man and man encounter, and man is capable of knowing and trusting himself.

Family Life

1. That each family will have a daily period of devotion.
2. That families across the generation gap will meet in homes or churches to discuss problems and work out meaningful relationships across generation lines.
3. That each church will have family night at least once every three months.

To the Adults of The United Methodist Congregations:

By the end of August, 1969, many adults in The United Methodist Church, will have studied the basic elements of the Christian Faith as treated in the current series, **Foundation Studies in Christian Faith**. Some groups will still be involved in depth study of one of these units. (Some groups have taken much longer than three months to study each unit.) Others have been asking: "What follows Foundation Studies?"

In September, 1969, a new course of study will be offered adults. It is called the Christian Faith in Life series. The topics for this series are drawn from the universal crisis experiences that demands a response from persons. The question the series asks is: "How Can Adults make Responses to these Crisis Experiences?"

There will be three components for each of the twelve units of study: (1) a 184-page paperback study book for each student; (2) a 4-page supplement for each chapter of the study book, 12 issues quarterly, for use primarily when the group meets for discussion; (3) a resource packet for group leaders.

Those who studied the Foundation Studies will recall how helpful the book of selected readings proved to be. Similarly we are introducing a new component, the supplement. (It replaces the book of selected readings, although some readings will be included.) Each weekly issue will be four pages, in full color, and will carry selected readings (from drama, theology, psychology, biography, photographs, reaction questions and the like). For the most part, though not always true, each weekly supplement will relate

directly to one of the chapters being studied. This weekly tool will prove to be exciting and helpful in adult Christian Education

Beginning September 1, 1969, the twelve units of study titles are:

- Unit 1. September-November, 1969:
"Decision-Making"
- Unit 2. December-February, 1969-70:
"Death in Christian Perspective"
- Unit 3. March-May, 1970:
"Work and Leisure"
- Unit 4. June-August, 1970:
"Change and Revolution"
- Unit 5. September-November, 1970:
"Christian Faith and Suffering"
- Unit 6. December-February, 1970-71:
"Maturing"
- Unit 7. March-May, 1971:
"Man in Community"
- Unit 8. June-August, 1971:
"The Meaning of Human Sexuality"
- Unit 9. September-November, 1971:
"Illness and Health"
- Unit 10. December-February, 1971-72:
"The Responsible Use of Power"
- Unit 11. March-May, 1972:
"Family Life"
- Unit 12. June-August, 1972:
"Controversy and Conflict in Christian Perspective"

As with Foundation Studies, the units of the Christian Faith in Life series, will be available for several years after their original publication date. Some groups may choose to study a subject for more than a quarter; this is expected and encouraged as adults continue to study in depth.

The first unit of this new series will be available in the Adult Advance Kit to be mailed June 1, 1969, to local churches ordering it. This will give groups time to become acquainted with the material and the way it is presented. It will allow time for your group leaders to participate in regional training on the district and conference level. You will receive advance notices of these training sessions in your area.

REPORT NO. 6

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Bishop O. Eugene Slater and Members of the Ninety-Fifth Session of the West Texas Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church:

The responsibility of the Conference Board of Pensions to provide for and contribute to the support, relief, assistance, and pensioning of our Ministers and their families is accepted by us with joy, and regarded by us as a sacred cause.

It has been a long and an uphill journey from an annuity of \$2.25 per service year to the current \$40.00 per service year annuity paid with the assistance of Temporary General Aid.

We are thankful to God for the blessings given. We are also conscious of a debt of gratitude to those who have labored in the struggle. We shall always remember with deep and sincere appreciation the tireless work of that gracious tireless group — The Methodist Ministers' Wives of West Texas — who year after year have made substantial contributions to assist the pension program.

There are two reasons for the slow development of an adequate annuity rate in our conference.

One, the salaries of pastors (the disciplinary basis on which the pension fund is raised) in the West Texas Conference have been paid was less than the estimation. **And second, too many charges across the years have failed to pay their required asking for the pension fund.**

We stand now on the threshold of a merger with another (really with six other) Annual Conference(s). When we close the doors of the West Texas Annual Conference, we have lost the opportunity to increase the annuity rate on the back years of our service. We "freeze" our annuity at the current rate that our conference is paying at the time of its closing on all the prior years of service; unless by agreement the succeeding conference accepts the responsibility of equalizing our pension annuity with the one which that conference is currently paying. Your Board holds this to be an important factor in the merger.

We request that it be written into the merger in clear and unmistakable terms with each of the several Annual Conferences with which the West Texas Conference will merge that the prior years of service for all ministers shall be equal in each Annual Conference.

We also recommend that this Annual Conference request the Conference Board of Trustees to sell abandoned property and contribute proceeds from such sale to the Conference Board of Pensions during the Conference Year 1969-1970 . . . That the District Parsonages be sold and district trustees kindly be asked to donate proceeds to the Conference Board of Pensions . . . That each charge be asked to pay an amount equal to 20% of the pastor's cash salary . . . And, in the early morning of December 25, 1969, we request each church in this conference to hold a special service. Remembering that the Mother Conference in this section - the Mississippi Mission Conference - was organized on Christmas Day, 1865, and the First Conference at Lovely Lane in Baltimore, known as the "Christmas Conference" began on Christmas Day in 1784; we could make this a very colorful day and receive an offering on this day for Pensions.

We recommend that this Christmas Offering have a goal of \$20,000.00 - divided among the districts on the regular percentage basis.

We recommend that each minister participating in the Death Benefit Program make a personal contribution of an amount equal to 1% of their cash salary.

We recommend that the Death Benefit Program be continued for the Conference Year 1969-1970 and that our Conference Treasurer be instructed to pay two years to this program - paying for the Conference Years 1969-1970 and 1970-1971. (We recommend this for the protection of each minister during the transition period.)

We recommend that Sunday, Sept. 14, 1969 be Retired Ministers' Day in our Conference and that each Local Church observe the day with a special service paying tribute to the veteran ministers in the conference and re-

We recommend that we establish an emergency Fund of \$500.00 for the ceiving an offering for the Pension Fund.

Retired Ministers and their families during the Conference Year of 1969-1970. This fund to come from the regular Pension Offering.

Bishop Slater and Brethren: It is my hope that our conference will enthusiastically adopt and adequately execute this program.

We owe so much to these ministers and their families who ask so little. To use some of the words of Bishop Ralph Spaulding Cushman:

"They do not ask
That crowds may throng the temple;
They only ask that as they voice the message
They may see Christ!
They do not ask
For churchly pomp pageant,
Or music such as wealth alone can buy;
They only ask that as they voice the message
He may be nigh!
They do not ask
That men may sound their praises
Or headlines spread their names abroad;
They only pray that as they voice the message

Hearts may find God!
 They do not ask
 For earthly place or laurel,
 Or of this world's distinctions any part;
 They only ask when they have voiced the message,
 Their Saviour's heart!"

REPORT NUMBER 7

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS OF THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE

The task that faces the Church today as we take a new look at Missions is to acquaint the people with the new trends and new structure of Missionary endeavor. We must come to realize that the methods of yesterdays are no more effective in this social order in which we live today. Missions of today cannot be accomplished by remote control. It is now an individualized, personalized involvement. It is the call for personal concern. The esarching question is do we care enough? He that has ears let him hear the cry of the needy, let him hear what the derelicts are saying in the midst of their confusion, le him hear the ominous sound of the oppressed in the ghettos, the row of the waves and breakers in this vast sea of unrest, listen and we will discover that the sounds we hear are not just in some distant land across the seas but they are sounds at your door up and down the streets just around the corner.

There is need everywhere, wherever babies cry, wherever little children romp and play, wherever young people hope, yearn and dream, wherever old men and women trudge their way toward a setting sun, wherever sin, violence, suffering, injustices shake the very foundations of our society, we as christians must take the Christ down from the cross, lift Him out of the tomb and let Him again walk the dusty roads of our communities and up and down the paved streets of our cities and make Him a king that walks and talks and touches the lowly and the down-trodden sons of man. Make Him a living Lord, working through us as living witnesses for Him. Every Christian must hear Him say "Ge ye into all the world." This is the mandate for missions, surely God is speaking to us out of the flames and smoke and screams of the rioters. Let us pray that out of the smoldering ruins a new world of love, peace, justice and brotherhood will spring up to the glory of God.

Every church must become invilved in studies and projects in the local communities. The call is for action. Some suggested studies for the local church are: "That the World may Believe," by Albert C. Outler; "Human Rights," by Margaret Bander; "Coming to Life," by Earnest W. Sanders; "Need is Your Neighbor," by Byron L. Johnson; "How Churches Fight Poverty," by Elma Greenwood; "New Ventures in Missions," "Human Rights in World Perspective," by Blaise Sevia. Mandate for Missions.

The functions of the national and world division of the Board of Missions of the United Methodist Church in conjunction with the Women's Society of Christian Service is to maintain Missionaries and Mission projects at home and around the world in some instances in joint efforts with other denominations to aid in the building of churches and parsonages by grants and loans to supplement ministerial support in the small parishes and new churches.

The West Texas Conference has received a total of \$2,974.86 in salary supplement. The days ahead are calling for the dedication of ourselves, our talents and money in order to extend the Christian witness.

In the days of strife and turmoil we feel that the Christian church must clear its stand. I am sure that most of us are aware that there is at this time groups that have moved in on the great institution of the Christian church, recently the black militants made a demand on our Board of Missions for several hundred thousand dollars to be administered by that organization to be given out wherever they determine.

We, the members of the West Texas Conference, do not endorse this action, we definitely condemn this agressive attitude on the part of these extremists.

WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE**WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE**

During the past fiscal year the West Texas Conference Women's Society of Christian Service has been aware of its responsibilities; and has set its program goals in keeping with its revised purpose including: (1) the involvement of as many women as possible in Christian Service, (2) a continual leadership development, (3) better communication among women on all levels across conferences, (4) greater degree of cooperation in effecting the total church program, especially in the areas of Christian Social Concerns and Education for Mission.

To help attain these goals, we have taken advantage of and been involved in many learning and enrichment experiences. Among them are both Regional and Conference School of Christian Mission, District and Local Workshops and Mission Conferences, Annual Meetings on conference and district levels, Study Courses within the local church — some interchurch and some interconference, Interdenominational and interfaith dialogue, and involvement in the program of Church Women United.

Our process of learning is a continual one. June 16-20, 1969 members of the Conference Committee will be involved in the greatest opportunity of the year for over-all training and growth in understanding, purpose, and program at the Regional School in Mt. Sequoyah. The following studies will be offered: **Reconciliation in a Broken World, Toward Understanding China, Being Christian in a New Day.**

Looking forward to merger of the West Texas Conference with other conferences in 1970, we have set-up liaison groups in five different areas to work with representatives in the respective geographically overlapping conferences for the purpose of creating an understanding and workable Christian fellowship. We are involved in pre-merger interconference planning with the Southwest Texas Conference, Central Texas Conference, Northwest Texas Conference and the North Texas Conference.

We are directly concerned with sixteen societies in the Austin-Victoria District, twenty-six in the Dallas District, twenty in the San Antonio District and thirty-two in the Waco District.

The challenge is great, but the privilege to serve is greater. With thanks to our ministerial leaders for their interest and support in promoting the Women's Society of Christian Service, we look forward to deeper involvement and a greater degree of togetherness in the total program of the United Methodist Church.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARIES

Mr. Chairman:

After careful study of the number and extent of the needs for additional ministerial support within the West Texas Conference, and the sources of income, we your committee with to recommend:

- A. That \$4100 be set as the minimum salary for each single full-time minister serving a charge.
- B. That \$4600 be set as the minimum salary for each married full-time minister serving a charge.
 1. That we establish 2% of the Pastor's cash salary as the method of securing the necessary funds for this project.
 2. That each participant in the Minimum Salary must live on the Charge, give full time to the ministry, and cannot be otherwise gainfully employed beyond the amount of \$50.00 each month except $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the Commission in regular meeting.
 3. That Churches receiving Minimum Salary support shall conduct a Stewardship Cultivation Program, and an Every Member Visitation approved by the District Superintendent.
 4. That the 1968 Book of Discipline will be followed in each case when it comes to the qualifications, degrees, and et cetera.
 5. That Associate Pastors, A Special Appointments, and any other ap-

pointmens outside the bounds of the West Texas Annual Conference shall not be eligible for Minimum Salary.

REPORT NUMBER 9-A

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Having given very little concern towards the planning program for the Conference Commission on Worship, and having no formal organization, I thought to emphasize some of the recommendations outlined in the Book of Discipline with a point or two emphasizing the need for using these. Hoping this meets your approval we suggest the following:

Our duties as a Conference Commission on Worship according to (Para. 1387) **The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church** are:

- a. To promote the interest of worship within the conference.
- b. To foster the use of the best resources for worship at conference meetings and in all of the churches in the conference.
- c. To promote the use of **The Book of Worship for Church and Home** and **The Methodist Hymnal** in the churches of the conference.
- d. To plan and promote seminars and demonstrations on ways of worship and the use of hymns, within the grounds of the conference.
- e. To provide exhibits at the conference sessions in such fields as architecture, church appointments, etc.
- f. To cooperate with the Board of Education and the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians of The United Methodist Church, in developing standards governing the work of local church directors, ministers, and associates of music and music assistants in advancing their work in this field within the church. This can be done through seminars and all other conferences on church music.

There is much truth in the statement, that "the Black Church has much to offer towards the renewal and revitalization of Methodism. This is perhaps true because we still have that fervent spirit of the soul alive within us. We give outward and perhaps inward expression to what we feel deep down. But let us not mislead ourselves nor be misled in thinking that we can do without the Christian religion. For Christ was a teacher of men, dealing with their minds as well as their hearts.

We must seek a blending of the vigorous spirit from those of us in the Black Church, with the keen mind of our brothers who are white. So that our merger which will take place will include a merging of head and heart, as well as conferences and congregations.

Therefore, let us make the best use possible of all the resources at our command to be prepared to fully participate at every level as we work, worship, and live together as one people in Christ reconciled.

REPORT NUMBER 10

CONFERENCE BOARD OF THE LAITY

The zeal of District Leaders emphasizing basic needs of the new structure in The United Methodist Church and the use of Program Guidelines presented at the past Annual Conference really enhanced the Lay Image.

This vivid stewardship increases volitive concern and in this spirit we see Day delegates becoming more vocal in meetings which is an aid to

better understanding and better knowledge of the rolls that lead individuals to greater churchmanship.

Bishop Slater called a convocation of Boards for the West Texas Conference, December 2, 1968. The Rev. P. L. Woods, Program Director, provided time for program planning. The Conference Board of the Laity section was largely attended by delegates who had a desire to articulate their concerns which resulted in the need for more communication, better interpretation, and workshops on Lay levels.

Lay Speaking was selected as the first area of concentration and to meet this concern, a Conference Workshop was held December 14th. at Huston-Tillotson College. Dr. John T. King served as the Instructor. Highlights of this Lay Speaking session was the tour of the College Library, a review of techniques for securing research data for speeches that relate to History, Bible, Observations of great Writers, Publications, and featured news.

After this conference workshop, we moved into District Workshops.

WACO DISTRICT: The Rev. E. C. Purnell, District Superintendent, and Eddie Evans, District Lay Leader, started this program, February 8, 1969, at the Paul Quinn College.

SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT: Under the leadership of the Reverend Dale H. Hansboro, District Superintendent, and Robert Foster, Associate District Lay Leader, attracted to their workshop, representation from Corpus Christi, Nixon-Runge, Gonzales, Kerrville, Seguin, and San Antonio. The Reverends J. Garfield Owens, Albert S. Pitts, host pastor, gave timely remarks.

AUSTIN-VICTORIA DISTRICT: The Rev. J. Garfield Owens, District Superintendent, and Timothy Johns, District Lay Leader, and Conference Director of Methodist Men, centered their activities on the promotion of Methodist Men to the First National United Methodist Men Conference at Purdue University, July 11-13, 1969.

DALLAS DISTRICT: The Rev. Zan W. Holmes, Jr., District Superintendent, and Raymond Williams, District Lay Leader, directed their second workshop in October. District Laymen's luncheon was held at St. Andrews Church in Fort Worth. Also shared in training session with the North Texas Conference.

E. C. Ransom, Associate Conference Lay Leader, working with Dr. John T. King for the KARL EVERETT DOWNS Professorship Fund, to date has donor offering matching money up to \$5,000.00

NOTE: All workshops projected new approaches, new fields of service beyond the pulpit that can **offer** further spiritual enrichment, even services in the area of poverty.

The 1969-1970 recommended program is projected in the report of the Conference Program Council by the Director, the Rev. P. L. Woods.

The West Texas Conference Lay Leader was elected at the 1968 Jurisdictional Conference to be a member of the General Board of the Laity. This high privilege and honor also places him on the Jurisdictional Board of the Laity.

The Conference Lay Leader represented the West Texas Conference at the Annual Conference Lay Leaders meeting in Chicago, Illinois. State and Local Merger Committees, Area Council, Reconciliation, and COSMOS (Overseas Relief) Regional Conference in Dallas, Texas. The Texas Conference of Churches organizational meeting, held in Austin, Texas, and Guest Speaker on the Districts. May I project this thought? Our United Methodist Church **offers** us opportunities to be servants where God lives, loves, and acts.

REPORT NUMBER 11

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

In a challenging and fruitful meeting on May 2nd., our conference Board heard the report of the Chairman on "Convo '69", which had as its theme, "HUMAN NEEDS AND THE CHURCH'S RESPONSE." Even as we were confronted with human needs in Washington, D.C., so are we faced with human needs in every city. As in Laughlin's metal sculpture, man is on a flimsy twisting ladder struggling towards his goals. Climbing through uncertainties, overcoming the adversities, needing help, and help, and Christian Concern.

The question is, how can the Church in today's complex and threatening world reach out to sustain man on his ladder? In what new ways can the church respond to human suffering, uplift those who have slipped back and constantly struggling to grasp those hard-to-climb rungs on the ladder:

We were happy to have heard the following reports from division members of their several accomplishments, including:

1. GENERAL WELFARE:

- a. The family adoption plan has become widespread. This plan is designed to rehabilitate disadvantaged families: To provide all necessities for family life, including every phase of education.
- b. Families have been relocated who lost all their belongings in fire. Doctors have provided drugs and medicines without cost to indigents.

2. HUMAN RELATIONS:

- a. Low cost housing had been built under Non-profit Housing and the United Methodist Church. Homes have been rehabilitated and built new under the Housing and Urban Development Program, and homes built in the rural areas under F.H.A.
- b. Public Education:
There is increasingly strong evidence that many residents have taken advantage of Public Education, especially Adult Basic Education, Pre-vocational and Vocational Training. However, there is need for concern that there are many school drop-outs, as well as many in the great urban centers victimized by a lack of education.

c. Employment and Manpower:

It is noted that through coordinated church and civic organizations, more deprived minority individuals are being employed. However, we cannot overlook the most recent statistics showing 35 million citizens without sufficient income to live in minimal health and decency. In actual figures, Whites outnumber the Blacks. However, a higher percentage of the total Black population is affected.

3. WORLD PEACE:

There is an increase of the number of countries with sophisticated weapon systems. Even the small countries have the potential and the capacity to develop nuclear hardware. Your Chairman of Christian Social Concerns, along with approximately 400 more delegates to "Convo '69", sent a telegram to President Nixon protesting the deployment of the Anti-Ballistics Missile System.

4. Recommendations will be projected in the report of the Conference Program Council, the Rev. P. L. Woods, Director.

5. In keeping with Bishop Slater's request that the Board of Christian Social Concerns refine the following issues that were raised on the floor of Conference in the Wednesday morning session, we herewith submit the action taken in the called meeting of the Conference Christian Social Concerns Board as relates to:

Issue 1. Project Equality:

To shed more light on this Project we asked Brother Joe Ader and Mr. Eadling to share with us their knowledge and experience.

Action Taken: It was motioned and unanimously passed that the Board of Christian Social Concerns endorse Project Equality and recommend that the West Texas Conference join Project Equality.

Issue 2. Homes for Unwed Mothers, Homes for Children, Homes for Aged, Homes for Convalescents:

Referred to Committee on Health and Welfare Ministry.

REPORT NUMBER 12

PUBLISHING INTERESTS COMMITTEE REPORT

With the union of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church in April, 1968, and the subsequent combining of operations and personnel of the publishing interests of the two former churches has brought our Methodist Publishing House to a new day of increased service to eleven million United Methodists.

The Publishing House reports that General Conference directives with respect to personnel have been met and that the transition to a revised organizational structure is progressing smoothly, enhancing the House's ability to provide good service to churches, individuals, and agencies of United Methodism.

The General Board of Publication, at its annual meeting in October, 1968 appropriated from the proceeds of the publishing operations of the two former churches 1 million dollars to be distributed to conference claimants during the 1968-1969 conference year.

Production and distribution of books and church supplies under the Abingdon Press imprint showed an increase during the year. The Methodist Hymnal published in 1966, continues to be well received by the church, with distribution no less than four million copies.

In spite of a down-ward trend in church school enrollment and attendance circulation of church school curriculum materials, published under the imprint of Graded Press, showed an increase. Since 1964 and the introduction of preferred audio-visuals and multi-media class teaching packets, Graded Press has produced more than 103 audio-visual projects accounting for distribution of 800,000 records and 1,100,000 feet of film, primarily in the form of filmstrips.

A completely new youth curriculum for youth was introduced in United Methodist church schools in the Fall of 1968. Work is progressing on the second series of materials for adults, scheduled to be used in the Church Schools this fall.

Circulation of the general church periodicals, TOGETHER and CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, experienced further decline. Merger of CHURCH AND HOME, a general publication of the former Evangelical United Brethren Church, with TOGETHER, however, now gives the United Methodist Church a general family magazine with a circulation of more than six million copies every month. This represents just a little more than 50% of the total membership of United Methodism.

In a check of the statistics of the West Texas Conference we find that only 215 copies of TOGETHER are coming into the conference. 70% of these, or 150 copies are complimentary copies sent to ministers for promotional purpose, while only 30%, or 65 copies are reaching Black United Methodist homes.

The General Board of Publications, with the assistance of Conference and District Boards of Publishing Interests, is sponsoring a subscription drive September 28th through November 2nd, 1969 to enlarge TOGETHER circulation. Recommendations to implement this program will be presented by the Director Program. A goal of one thousand new subscribers has been suggested as a target for West Texas Conference.

The Methodist Publishing House and Project Equality

We note two important current developments within the United Methodist Church which have immediate bearing in our attitudes and decisions regarding the relationship of The Methodist Publishing House and Project

Equality. We call these matters to the attention of our respective Annual Conferences.

1. The Committee on Investigation requested by the Board of Publication and authorized by the General Conference of The United Methodist Church is making a careful study of this subject and related items of social concern under the leadership of Bishop Eugene M. Frank. The committee has indicated that its findings will not be available until its official report to the Council of Bishops in the fall of 1969.
2. The Board of Publication of The United Methodist Church has also constituted a committee of five members which has conferred with the representatives of Project Equality on national, regional, and local levels. This special committee will make recommendations to the Executive Committee of the Board of Publication on June 17, 1969. The Executive Committee has power to act for the Board of Publication on this matter.

We are aware of the apparent delay in adjudicating this issue and we feel that in fairness to all concerned, time should be allowed for the completion of the work of these two committees.

However, we hope that the Board of Publication and The Methodist Publishing House are acting in good faith on behalf of the General Conference to reach agreements with Project Equality as soon as technical details can be completed.

We therefore urge that the two committees described above be allowed to complete their work and reports to the Church before our Annual Conferences take any further action regarding The Methodist Publishing House and Project Equality.

REPORT NUMBER 13

THE COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

"Ecumenical" has become a universally familiar word. Protestant theologians find it a convenient wine-skin into which to put that heady new wine which Arch-bishop William Temple called "the great new fact of our time." Pope John popularized it through his choice on the name "ecumenical council". Many Orthodox churchmen welcome the word because it maintains continuity with the church's early days in Greek culture. "Ecumenical" thus appears regularly in the daily newspapers as well as in scholarly religious journals. But the man in the pew most likely finds the word difficult to understand; the man in the street simply ignores it.

Beneath the semantic problem is a more serious question: how much meaning can the ecumenical movement have if the vast majority of church members do not participate in the reality behind the words? As long as it is an exciting reality only to certain bishops, theology professors, selected denominational executives and a few laymen, the ecumenical movement will be neither exciting nor real to most people.

The church has always been ecumenical, at home and in the world; but our conduct so seldom reveals it. My Catholic neighbor, my Lutheran colleague and I will no doubt continue to worship in our respective traditions rejoicing in the freedom each of us has to respond to God's call in His own spiritual language. But as we pray, separately, for each other, let us pray together for ourselves and for all other children of God — pray together and talk together and work together in the ecumenical Christian community, here, now, everywhere.

REPORT NUMBER 14 - PART 1

**A PROPOSED PLAN OF MERGER
BY
THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE
WITH
THE CENTRAL TEXAS, NEW MEXICO, NORTH TEXAS
NORTHWEST TEXAS, SOUTHWEST TEXAS AND TEXAS CONFERENCES
OF
THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH**

I Preamble

Whereas the West Texas, Central Texas, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas, and Texas Conferences, at their respective Annual Conference Sessions in 1968 each adopted a resolution declaring its intention that the West Texas Conference shall merge, at the close of the 1970 Session of The West Texas Conference with each conference in which it lies geographically; and

Whereas the New Mexico Conference has, on several occasions, invited the churches of the West Texas Conference within its geographical territory to become a part of the New Mexico Conference; and

Whereas by the action of the conferences within the South Central Jurisdiction and the conferences of the former Central Jurisdiction, The West Texas Conference became a conference of the South Central Jurisdiction,

BE IT RESOLVED;

1. That the boundaries of the Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas, and Texas Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction shall be so determined as to include all local churches of the West Texas Conference which lie within their geographical territories.
2. That the ministerial members and Approved Lay Pastors of the West Texas Conference whose appointments or conference relationships are within the geographical boundaries of the Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas, and Texas Conferences shall become members of and/or related to the respective conferences, retaining comparable status and full years of service tenure held in the West Texas Conference, thus giving them all the rights, privileges, and responsibilities thereunto appertaining.
3. That all details of the mergers shall be worked out as rapidly as feasible by consultation between the West Texas Conference and each Annual Conference involved, and that the effective time of the mergers shall be the conclusion of the 1970 Session of the West Texas Conference. It is understood that the consummation of merger with any one of these conferences shall be contingent upon a satisfactory acceptance by all of the Annual Conferences involved.

II Churches

That the churches of the West Texas Conference shall be an integral part of the respective merged conferences in which they are located geographically. (See appendix "B".)

III Abandoned Property

That abandoned church properties in the West Texas Conference shall become the property of the respective merged Annual Conference in which they are geographically located. (See appendix "C".)

IV District Parsonages

That the District Parsonages belonging to the several districts of the West Texas Conference shall become the property of the respective merged conferences in which they are located geographically.

V Pension Responsibility and Assets

1. That all pension responsibility and assets of the West Texas Conference be transferred to the Boards of Pensions of the Central Texas, New Mexico, North Texas, Northwest Texas, Southwest Texas, and in accordance with the division made by the Joint Distributing Committee as provided in paragraph 1383 of the 1968 Discipline.
2. That the annuity rate adopted by each of the merged conferences apply to all members, their widows, and dependent children, and all lay pastors, their wives, and dependent children in accordance with the formula as set forth in paragraph 1379.7 of the 1968 Discipline and the Pension Manual of the United Methodist Church. Payments for the years of approved prior service shall be computed according to the current annuity rate paid to members of the conference or conferences within whose bounds the respective number of years of service were rendered. It is understood that the successor of all former West Texas Conference Service at a uniform rate for all members of the successor conference or conferences.
3. The exact amount in the West Texas Conference Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, Ministers Reserve Annuity Credits, Permanent Pension Fund, Stabilization Fund, and Distribution Fund shall be determined by the Distribution Committee and the General Board of Pensions authorized to distribute to each of the merged conferences the pro rata share of these assets.

VI Minimum Salary Provisions

1. That each merged conference establish rules in paying minimum salaries and that these shall be applicable to all conference members, lay pastors, and charges in like manner.
2. That all funds received from the Temporary General Aid Fund for salary aid be distributed in accordance with the guidelines set forth in the section on Salary Aid, pages 18-20, REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON INTER-JURISDICTIONAL RELATIONS to the 1968 General Conference, as long as not in conflict.

VII Other Assets and Outstanding Obligations

That all assets and liabilities of the West Texas Conference be transferred to the respective merged conferences according to a formula based on the number of church members being transferred to each of these conferences.

VIII Depository of Records

That Huston-Tillotson College shall be the depository of all official records of the West Texas Conference, thus establishing the Official Archives of the West Texas Conference. Wesley, Austin, St. Paul, Dallas, and San Antonio shall serve with Huston-Tillotson as co-depositories.

IX Special Appointments

That all conference members under special appointment (with annuity on the Annual Conference) be paid by their Annual Conference through May 31, 1970 and that the Annual Conference to which they are appointed at the 1970 session of the merged conference assume their salary payment as of June 1, 1970.

X Continuation of Officers

1. That prior to merger the West Texas Conference shall elect a Board of Trustees authorized to act in accordance with section VII by

signing deeds and other legal documents in order to comply with the plan of merger.

2. That this Board of Trustees make an Annual Report to each Annual Conference and be continued until the Annual Conference session; however, if the report of this Board so warrants, each Annual Conference shall elect two members who were members of the former West Texas Conference to serve for one year and continued after 1974 only if voted to do so by all the respective merged Annual Conferences.

XI Representation on Boards and Agencies

1. That all Boards and Agencies of the respective merged conference be organized at its 1970 session giving each former conference reasonable representation, on all Conference Boards, and Agencies, including some Chairmanships, in the respective conferences.
2. That the presiding Bishop of the merged conference give consideration to the matter of the appointment of District Superintendents so that there will always be adequate representation in the several Cabinets by persons, who historically would have been a member of the West Texas Conference.

XII Support of Huston-Tillotson and Wiley Colleges

1. It is expected that the respective merged conferences will recognize the historic commitment of the West Texas Conference to Huston-Tillotson College and that the merged conferences pledge themselves to support this institution with pride and enthusiasm.
2. That the respective merged conferences direct a pro-rata share of their contributions for Texas Methodist Colleges to Huston-Tillotson and Wiley Colleges.

XIII By-Laws and Standing Rules

That a Committee be appointed by the nominating Committee of each Annual Conference at the 1969 Session of the Annual Conferences to work with an equal number of members of the West Texas Conference serving with in the bounds of that Conference to re-write the Standing Rules and By-Laws to be presented for adoption by the 1970 session of the merged conference.

REPORT NUMBER 14 - PART 2

**Resolution concerning boundaries of West Texas and Gulf Coast Conferences,
as taken from the Minutes of South Central Jurisdictional Council meeting
April 15, 1969**

"The Chairman of the Merger Committees of the several annual conferences in Texas requests the Jurisdictional Conference of the South Central Jurisdiction through its Jurisdictional Council, to change the conference boundaries so that all churches of the West Texas Conference now within the boundaries of the Texas Conference, be transferred to the Gulf Coast Conference, and that all Gulf Coast Conference Churches now outside the boundaries of the Texas Conference now be transferred to the West Texas Conference effective at the close of the 1969 session of the several annual conferences. Further that the action of this Jurisdictional Council be permissive, and conditioned upon the approval of the Gulf Coast and West Texas Conferences at their 1969 sessions."

REPORT NUMBER 15

**CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF
THE UNITED METHODIST COMMUNICATIONS COUNCIL OF TEXAS**

- I. The name of this organization shall be the United Methodist Communications Council of Texas.
- II. The purpose of the United Methodist Communications Council of Texas shall be to coordinate communications in information activities of the United Methodist Church in Texas.
 - A. One objective of the United Methodist Communications Council of Texas shall be to oversee, through its Informational Service Division, the publication of THE TEXAS METHODIST (formerly The Texas Christian Advocate), a weekly news paper; and cultivate a strong relationship with other mass media of the State with the production and distribution of news releases, and other means, to tell the story of the work of the Church.
 - B. The second objective of the United Methodist Communications Council of Texas will be to oversee, through its Electronic Services Division, the efforts of the United Methodist Church of Texas in the field of Electronic media. The council will oversee the efforts to disseminate information concerning availability of films, audio tapes, and video tape from all sources.
- III. MEMBERSHIP:
 - A. Membership of the Communications Council shall be drawn equally from United Methodist Conferences in the State of Texas, divided thusly:
 1. The bishops who are assigned for episcopal leadership for Annual Conferences in Texas shall be members of the Communications Council.
 2. There shall be six (6) representatives from each Annual Conference, which shall include the Chairman of the Conference Communications Committee and Editor of the conference page in The Texas Methodist.
 3. At least two (2) representatives from each Annual Conference shall be lay persons.
 4. It is recommended that at least two (2) of these six (6) be practicing professionals in the field of Communications. It is further recommended that the person or persons responsible for Program Direction be included.
 - B. Representatives to the Communications Council shall be elected by each annual conference at the beginning of each quadrennium on nomination of the Conference Nominating Committee and shall serve for the quadrennium. Communications Council representatives who become affiliated with an annual conference other than the one from which they were originally elected shall be replaced at the next regular session of the annual conference.
 - C. The annual conference shall qualify and designate their elected representatives for service on the Communications Council equally in the Divisions of Informational Service and Electronic Services.
- IV. OFFICERS:
 - A. Officers of the Communications Council shall consist of the following: Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and the Chair-

man of the two Divisions elected from membership of the respective divisions.

1. The duties of the Chairman shall be:
 - a. To preside over all meetings.
 - b. To call the Annual meeting and any other meetings of the Communications Council or its Executive Committee as may be needed during the year.
 2. The duties of the Vice-Chairman shall be to perform the duties of the Chairman during his absence.
 3. The duties of the Secretary shall be to accurately record the proceedings of the Communications Council and its Executive Committee. Minutes of each of these meetings shall be distributed to all members after each meeting.
 4. The duties of the Treasurer shall be to dispense funds held by the Communications Council, as budgeted by the Council. The records of the Treasurer shall be given a certified audit at the end of each calendar year.
 5. Prior to annual adoption of the budget, the Executive Committee of the Council shall seek the advice and counsel of the World Service Commission of the several conferences involved.
- B. Officers shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Communications Council and no one may serve in the same office more than four (4) years nor as an officer of the Council more than eight (8) years.
- C. The Executive Committee shall appoint annually a Nominating Committee to submit a slate of officers to the Communications Council provided that additional nominations may be made from the floor, at the time of the election.

V. STAFF:

- A. The Council may employ staff persons of the Divisions on the recommendation of the Personnel Committee of that Division.
- B. The Executive Committee may nominate an Executive Director to be elected by the Council.

VI. COMMITTEES:

- A. There shall be the following Standing Committee and such other Committees as the Council may determine:
 1. Executive Committee:
 - a. This Committee shall be composed of the Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, and the Chairmen of the Divisions. There shall also be one (1) representative selected by his conference representatives from each annual conference not otherwise represented by these officers and Division chairmen.
 - b. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to conduct any business of the Communications Council between meetings of the Communications Council.
 - c. Minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee shall be sent to each member of the Communications Council promptly after each meeting of the Committee.
 - d. Decisions of the Executive Committee shall be subject to review by the Communications Council at its meetings.
 - e. Meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Chairman of the Communications Council as needed or on the request of any member of the Executive Committee. Notice of such meeting and agenda shall be sent to all members of the Communications Council, who may attend as ex-officio members.
 - f. Special committees may be appointed by the Executive Committee and such other committees as the Council may determine.
 - g. To review requests from the divisions and recommend a budget to the Council.

VII. DIVISIONS:

A. Informational Services Division:

1. This Division shall be composed of a Chairman elected by the Communications Council, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary elected by the Division and other members as designated by their respective annual conferences.
2. This Division shall be empowered to conduct any business of The Texas Methodist and related activities between meetings of the Council.
3. Minutes of the meetings of this Division shall be sent to each member of the Communications Council promptly after each meeting of the Division.
4. Decisions of this Division shall be subject to review by the Communications Council at its meetings.
5. Meetings of the Informational Services Division will be held annually at the time of the Communications Council and additionally once each year or may be called by the Chairman of the Informational Services Division as needed or on the request of any member of this Division.
6. The following committees may be created by the Informational Services Division to implement programs in the following areas:
 - a. Committee for Finances.
 - b. Committee on Personnel.
 - c. To co-ordinate United Methodist Publishing Interests and United Methodist news services in the State of Texas.
 - d. To provide consultation services for printed media and to establish good relations with news media.
 - e. To develop a philosophy and train leadership in church-related journalism.
 - f. Additional committees as needed.

B. Electronic Services Division:

1. This Division shall be composed of a Chairman elected by the Communications Council, a Vice-Chairman and Secretary elected by the Division and other members as designated by their respective annual conferences.
2. This Division shall be empowered to conduct any business in the field of Electronic Service and related activities between meetings of the Communications Council.
3. Minutes of the meetings of this Division shall be sent to each member of the Communications Council promptly after each meeting of the Division.
4. Decisions of this Division shall be subject to review by the Communications Council at its meetings.
5. Meetings of the Electronic Services Division shall be held annually at the time of the Communications Council and additionally once each year or may be called by the Chairman of the Electronic Services Division as needed or request of any member of the Division.
6. The following committees may be created by the Electronic Services Division to implement programs in the following areas:
 - a. To assemble and disseminate information about the availability and usage of television, radio, and film resources.
 - b. To co-ordinate existing Annual Conference film library resources and to study means of co-operation in their use.
 - c. The placement of audio-visual materials on television and radio in the market areas of Texas and to seek to make the voice of the Church heard in secular production.
 - d. To co-ordinate the production of resources in the area of radio, film, and television.
 - e. To develop a philosophy and train leadership in the use of audio-visual resources.

- f. Committee for Finance.
- g. Committee for Personnel.
- h. Additional committees as needed.

IX. AMENDMENTS:

- A. Amendments to this Constitution, and the creation or amendments of By-Laws, may be adopted at any regular meeting of the Communications Council, provided notice of such Amendments is sent to each member of the Communications Council at least one month prior to the meeting at which such Amendments are to be voted upon.
- B. The vote required to adopt such changes shall be two-thirds of those present and voting, provided that there is a quorum present.
- C. Amendments to the Constitution shall also be ratified by two-thirds of the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the State of Texas.

X. CONSTITUTION:

- A. This Constitution shall become operative and in effect when approved by two-thirds of the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the State of Texas.
- B. Should, because of lapse of time or otherwise, this United Methodist Communications Council of Texas cease to exist, all of its real and acquired assets shall be equally divided to the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in the State of Texas.

REPORT NUMBER 16 - PART 1

REPORT OF FUND FOR RECONCILIATION COMMITTEE

In keeping with the action of the Called Session of the Annual Conference which authorized the Fund for Reconciliation Committee to receive and select projects, for the purpose of recommending to the Annual Conference for its approval, the following action was taken and is hereby recommended for approval.

Resolution

Whereas, the Committee for the Fund for Reconciliation has met two times to hear proposed projects to be supported, and whereas, some 32 projects were submitted, and whereas, these projects have been carefully evaluated in keeping with the guidelines set by the committee:

And whereas, the committee felt that it would be advisable for us to join with the like committees of the other two Conferences of the San Antonio Area, and such was done:

And whereas, the following proposals represent the unanimous vote of the Area Committee.

Therefore, be it resolved that the following recommendations be approved by the Conferences involved.

Item 1: That for the remainder of this quadrennium a Fund for Reconciliation Committee be appointed by the Bishop.

1. That said committee consist of two persons from each of the Annual Conferences of the San Antonio Area, and the Bishop of the Area.
2. That said committee serve under the jurisdiction and guidance of the San Antonio Area Council.
3. That said committee be charged with the responsibility of giving supervision, to help secure assistance, to evaluate the progress of the various projects, to help promote the Fund for Reconciliation through the proper channels, and to report each year to the Annual Conference on the progress made by each of the projects supported by the Fund for Reconciliation.

Item 2: Be it resolved that first priority for funds be given to the following three (3) projects.

1. Mobile Christian Education Unit in Rio Grande Valley. Asking for \$5,000.00 per year — Total \$20,000.00.

2. West Texas Conference Community Developer. Asking for \$6,700.00 per year — Total \$26,800.00.
3. Dos Mundos School. Asking \$5,000.00 per year — Total \$20,000.00.

Item 3: Be it resolved that the following projects be approved for support, if and where funds become available. Be it further resolved that a local church, in whose community one of the approved projects is located and started, may direct up to one-half of its total giving to the Fund for Reconciliation toward the support of such local project.

REPORT NUMBER 16 - PART 2

**Report of Projects Committee
 Fund for Reconciliation**

Exhibit No. 1

We propose that a Mobile Christian Education Unit be provided by using a school bus which will become a classroom. The unit will serve as a basic tool to develop both a social and personal Christian witness in the 'colonias'

of the Rio Grande Valley. There is indicated interest in participation in this project by several different denominations. We believe that as we work together we will come to a better understanding of our shared faith as well as render service to those who are deprived. For the first four years the cost is estimated to be \$40,000.00, of which we ask a total of \$20,000.00 from the Fund of Reconciliation. At the end of four years, we expect to be able to sustain the work ourselves.

1. There has been some effort to contact the people of these areas through the Valley Service Committee. This has been virtually exclusive in its emphasis on social witness.

2. There is need for continuing social witness. The suggestion of one social worker is that a trained social worker begin identifying himself with the people in certain of these areas, expecting that within three or four years he would be able to guide a program in response to the wishes of the residents of the 'colonias'.

3. We see merit in this proposal, but it lies outside our scope of activity and training. Moreover, we need to act between now and three or four years from now. The following are our suggestions for procedure;

4. It is anticipated that the initial contact with the 'colonia' will be through visitation. There may be some planned recreation or some response to immediate needs of the community. Mr. Frank Casso states that in one such situation he and Mr. Felix Lima found some children in need of glasses, and put them in touch with the Lions Club to provide them. One child was found to be crippled, and was brought to the attention of those who provided medical help, so that she can now walk.

There is proposed an afternoon activity (also Saturday and Sunday mornings 9 activities possible) probably to include games, stories, Christian Education. (Sunday School type classes, movies, handcraft, etc.) entertainment and recreation (including movies), and refreshments.

There is proposed the extension of the use of the mobile unit to adult activities as this is possible.

There should be consistent involvement of the Church with the continuing needs of the community. Those who have need of available health, education, services, shall be guided in securing these services. Where there are community needs, the people of the Church shall involve themselves in HELPING meet these needs. This is in contrast to: hiring someone to do the work; doing the work; telling residents of the 'colonias' what to do. Among such needs anticipated: clearing space for a playground; securing decent water.

5. Each cooperating Church will be asked to take responsibility for one session each week (always going to the same 'colonia',) and will be asked to provide funds each for maintaining the program.

Those churches that wish will be able if they choose, to have the guidance of Rev. Felix Lima, a missionary of the American Sunday School Union. The Rev. Mr. Lima has a working relationship with people of many denominations already, and is highly respected by Rev. Ted Grout. He has been doing work in such areas as possible for several years, and is anxious to see broader opportunities such as a unit of this type can offer.

6. There are attached three maps, on which Rev. Mr. Lima has marked those communities in which he believes the needs for this work are greatest.

7. If any 'colonia' responds strongly enough to such a work to make the providing for further work or building seem wise, that will be in the hands of the church that has been working in that 'colonia'.

8. After having studied work that has been done, is being done, and is proposed, by various churches, the above plan has been developed. This has been developed in conversation with other concerned Christians - and letters from some of these are attached to show their evaluation of the proposal. We believe that as work is done as here outlined we will be able to bear Christian witness both personally and socially in a positive and affirmative fashion. We are convinced that those who share in this work will be drawn closer through this cooperative work, and that the entire community will see an ecumenical witness of significance in this new form of mission.

9. Purchases made with money from the Fund for Reconciliation can be held by the district Trustees for the Southern District of the Rio Grande Conference.

10. Those congregations electing to participate fully shall have equal representation in a non-profit corporation which shall hold all other property of this activity.

11. Nothing in this plan shall be interpreted as absolute, but shall be subject to the decisions of the participating Churches.

12. Although the work is to be planned cooperatively, each congregation shall determine the specifics of its own activity (content of teaching, personnel, etc.)

13. This project could profitably use one of the Methodist Volunteers of the Fund for Reconciliation, if such a person were available. This person would need to understand that they should be a coordinator under the direction of the Board of Directors of the Cooperation, which would have full responsibility for personnel, program, and planning. This volunteer would serve as worker in any specific activity beyond that of coordinator only on the invitation of the Church responsible for that activity. If such a coordinator were provided, the amount of support needed would be reduced by \$2,400 per year, unless subsistence for the volunteer would be paid from the project.

14. It is estimated that the cost per year for the first four years would be \$10,000.00 or a total of \$40,000.00. This includes:

We request \$20,000 from the Fund for Reconciliation, and propose that the participating Churches provide the added funds needed until at the end of 4 years it is estimated that at least \$7,000 per year will be needed to sustain the program. Probably each church will be asked to provide initial support of \$500 for a year, and increase to \$1,000 per year. Not all churches will be able to do this, so it may be that some churches will need to accept a partial share in the work of the Unit.

West Texas Community Developer Exhibit No. 2

Situation Analysis

These are times in the course of Human Events when the fullness of the American Dream has not been realized by all of America's people. Many of our people in these United States have lost hope. The effect of our society's inequities are revealed in the lack of adequate housing, the lack of equal education, the lack of fair employment opportunities for many of our people.

The dehumanizing forces of our nation have driven people to a despair that has too often resulted in violent disruptions. A growing number of people are losing faith in our American way of life. Suspicion, lack-of-trust and hatred are becoming walls that divide one ethnic group from another.

The young and unchurched peoples of our nation, no longer have that awesome respect and esteem for the church as did those of earlier days. The church is alleged to be a community of middle class people, who have no real concern for the poor. We daily hear the accusation that our vocal gospel falls too far short of our ministry-of-action.

Our society's inequities are creating a mood that is rapidly becoming more anti-democratic, anti-law-of-the-land, and anti-church. Notwithstanding, these growing hostilities, the church has called us to perpetuate a ministry of reconciliation.

What Has Been Done?

Since the early days of this country's history, the church has fostered a great ministry and has been a prophetic voice. She has perceived the needs of the people and has exerted herself in leading the nation in supplying those needs. Because of her influence the conscience of the nation has been pricked and the performances of sundry ministries have been the result.

Many federal and private agencies have come into being, with the purpose of summoning the resources of our land to aid in meeting the needs of the poor. These agencies have gained competence for meeting the needs in varying degrees. However, in a goodly number of instances they are more proficient in dealing with specific problems than is the church.

The church must continue to look ahead. The church must continue to give that prophetic leadership in reconciling man to the realization of what has been termed, "The American Dream." We must no longer busy ourselves in duplicities. We must no longer strive to compete with agencies that are better equipped to perform their task than is the church. We must vigorously undergird existing institutions and give leadership in meeting other ministries. Let us not duplicate other agencies in trying to supply, what I call, for the lack of a better term, "Band-Aid-Services", rather let us direct our financial resources in a way so as to become enablers to people in search of a better way of life, becoming people of dignity and establishing a feeling of human worth.

Paul Harvey stated in his broadcast January 20, 1969, over KTSA-TV "That the city of New York is expecting to have one million people on its welfare roll by the end of the year." He further stated, notwithstanding our past reconciling efforts, "That New York City is expecting to spend more on Welfare during coming years than it spends on education." It is in this kind of world and in answer to these and other needs that the church is challenged to be a prophetic voice of reconciliation.

Proposal

A. That a portion of the Fund for Reconciliation be used to employ community Developers to serve in the bounds of the West Texas Annual Conference. (The number of paid Developers would be determined by funding ability and would be stationed as directed by a Board of Directors.)

B. That this projects committee deem itself or name a small Board of Directors (with necessary Conference and Episcopal approval) to formulate and supervise a detailed program for the Developers.

C. That each Developer's Office be set up in some one of our churches of our several Metropolitan Centers and that the senior minister of the church give general oversight and full support to the Developer.

D. That the Developer be encouraged to use other United Methodist churches of a given Metropolitan Center as basis of operation when the situation warrants.

E. That although the Developers may be ordained clergymen I do not specify ordination as requirement.

F. That the Board of Directors (Projects committee or its appointed board) exert every effort to get training and possible aid for Developers from our United Methodist Board of Missions.

G. That the Board of Directors include the following among the many possible program emphases:

1. That the Developers develop a working relationship with each agency of the community. (Red Cross, Salvation Army, Social Security, N.A.A.C.P., Urban League, Planned Parenthood, etc.) and maintain an active office of referral.
2. That the Developer begin to organize the community in blocks, sections or wards, around major concerns, such as voting, education, housing, model city, urban development, street needs, utility needs, etc.
3. That the Developer seek ways of harnessing community expertise and channeling it to the benefit of the people of the community. (Home economics, teachers for tutoring, legal aids, medical services, etc.)
4. That the Developers establish rapport with youth gangs in the attempt of rechanneling their energies to creative enterprises.
5. That the Developer be sensitive to the community's needs and alert the Board of Directors in seeking church, federal and foundational funding for programs when warranted.

Program Possibilities

This type of program is said to be meeting with success in several parts of our country. The people of Harlem, through the efforts of Community Developers, have achieved a more reasonable rent rate for tenants. They have forced landlords to bring houses up to the minimum living standards. They have acquired funding for educational and recreational outings for the needy children of the streets, thereby aiding them in their attempt to enter the mainstream of American life. Through the efforts of the Chicago Organizers, the Model City Program has not been able to displace a large section of people, in what some of the people felt to have been a bad venture. The Organizers of both Southern and Northern California have made tremendous strides in gaining employment for the poor. They have managed Federal, Church and Foundational Funding in programs that promote job opportunities, adequate housing and technical and vocational training. They have found ways of actively involving the people in their government. The church is sponsoring some of the growing numbers of organizers. Although most of the church sponsored Organizers that I have met are employed by other denominations, our United Board of Missions has begun to channel its resources in this direction. An article in the November 28, 1968 issue of the Christian Advocate, "Agency Okays Black Community Developers" states, "The more affluent white conferences of United Methodism have ignored the work of existing black institutions engaged in mission . . . Board of Missions National Division leaders made the observation in announcing a \$46,000 program to employ and train seven black community developers to work with Negro churches already serving in the cities . . ."

I am of the opinion that should we accept and administer this proposal in a spirit of christian love, that we will be performing a ministry of reconciliation. I further feel that through the administration of this type program we will be serving as enablers to men in finding dignity, worth and fulfillment.

Note: The terms "Community Organizer" and "Community Developers" are used interchangeably in this paper.

Salary of Developer is subject to adjustment. I feel that it should be set to equal the average Minimum Salary for Ministers of our Texas Annual Conferences.

Exhibit No. 3

Training Enterprises

A bilingual school for children from three-and-one-half to six years of age. Afternoon and evening classes for those desiring further educational opportunities.

Dos Mundos School is primarily for children between the ages of 3½ and 6 years of age. Those of Mexican-American descent who have Spanish as a first language, and Negro and Anglo-American children with English as a first language.

Educational opportunities are provided in the afternoon and evenings for the parents, older brothers and sisters, and neighbors of our children. These include tutorial and basic education courses. Every effort is made to involve those whose attitudes can influence the educational aspirations of children.

Objectives

The Early School and Related Programs

Our primary objective is to help the 3½ through 6 year old child learn his first language better, while simultaneously obtaining a coordinate control

of a second language. English/Spanish or Spanish/English. We attempt to prepare each child for entry into the public school program at age six by means of a thoroughly preparatory, basic education program.

In addition, we strive to introduce the children to experiences outside their home environment. A regular program of field trips and special visitors are scheduled.

We also attempt to give the children an expanded knowledge of their own, as well as other cultures of the area.

Lastly, an extensive educational program is presented for the youth and older members of the community, as well as meeting and recreation facilities for neighborhood groups.

The Early School meets five days per week (Monday through Friday) from 8:30 A.M. to 12:00 (11:30 for the 3½ year olds). Meeting times for the older students and adults are arranged for the maximum convenience of the group.

The first child/individual from a family is charged a fee of \$2.00 per week, plus \$1.00 for each additional member from the family, regardless of the program pursued. Grants-in-aid are available.

Dos Mundos is sponsored by The Coastal Bend Christian Service Association, Inc., which is a corporation constituted by the South Texas Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church, U.S., the Roman Catholic Diocese of Corpus Christi, and the Corpus Christi District Board of Missions of the United Methodist Church.

Purpose of School

The Dos Mundos School is an expression of the Church's mission in the neighborhood to serve families of all social, cultural, ethnic, and language backgrounds. The School is bi-lingual and tri-ethnic. The program of the School is divided into three phases:

- Phase 1 Early School, for the 3½ - 6 year old child. Meets 8:30 to 12:00 Noon Monday - Friday. Primary objective is to help the child learn his first language better, while simultaneously obtaining a coordinate control of a second language. The School attempts to prepare each child for entry into the public school program in first grade by means of a thorough preparatory, basic education program (language arts, mathematical skills, artistic expression, social interaction, etc.) plus experience in Christian faith appropriate to a pre-school child.
- Phase 2 Personal or small-group tutoring for students involved in a regular school experience on any level who need assistance in basic language, scientific, and mathematical skills. Meets three afternoons per week, 3-5 p.m. (Not designed to do the work in behalf of a poor public school teacher, but to reinforce basic communication skills and remedy them for a student so that he may function more effectively in the school environment.)
- Phase 3 Classes for those outside a formal school structure who desire to further their education, especially in the areas of remediation. (This is the adult education phase; not presently under operation.)

Dos mundos was conceived especially for the pre-school child; however, one cannot deal with a child apart from the immediate family situation of the child, nor his community environment. A child's enthusiasm for learning is greatly enhanced when other family members are also involved in guided learning experiences. Dos Mundos has discovered that children who, at first, were having a difficult time in acclimating to Phase 1 Program, have taken giant strides forward when older brothers and sisters became involved in Phase 2.

Bi-lingual, early education is on the vanguard of Texas education. Up to this point in our history, students with the Spanish language as their major language have been (by and large) forbidden to speak their native tongue at the public schools (except in approved language classes or in a few experimental situations). A 1918 Texas law also prohibits any language

but English for the schools. This procedure has been followed under the notion that the best way to equip a Latin-American student to fit into the culture of Texas and learn English is to forbid Spanish. Although there have been shining examples of achievement evidenced by Latin-American youth who have come from culturally-deprived homes, there have been even more situations where 16-year-old Latin-American youth are in the sixth grade or lower. This is caused mainly by a self-perpetuating experience of defeat from first-grade and up, due to an inability to handle English and Anglo-orientated concepts effectively. (Office of Economic Opportunity statistics reveal that 89% of Spanish speaking students in Texas who enter public school do not graduate from high school. Only 1% of these students complete college!)

The case for bi-lingual early education is also enhanced by the proposal of the Governor's Committee on Education immediately before the Texas Legislature. There is a specific proposal that a state-wide program of bi-lingual early education be inaugurated. Funds for such a program are not available, however; yet the the urget need remains.

A third important factor to consider is the area of civil liberties. The monolingual public education practices of Texas are seriously questioned by persons sensitive in the area of civil rights. The U.S. Civil Rights Commission hearings in San Antonio, in December, 1968, heard numerous persons declare how basic human dignity was being abrogated by the prevailing imposition of mono-lingualism in our state.

The Dos Mundos operation was created as a way to affirm the First Article of the Creed and the initial statement of the Bible, "I believe in God . . . creator of heaven and earth . . ." Dos Mundos is attempting to take seriously the "givenness" of God's creation, by helping a child (be he Negro, Anglo, or Latin) to affirm his life, his language and cultural background, and to help him live creatively and responsibly within these "givens". (So many of the Church's traditional kindergarten programs have said subtly: "If you want to be a functional person in Texas, you must be transformed into an Anglo — with English as your language, and a middle-class, Protestant orientation to life, work, etc.)

Dos Mundos is attempting to help a child explore his own cultural heritage and enjoy it — and at the same time, to help the fellow students from differing cultural backgrounds to participate in this appreciation. Hence, each student is given a positive appreciation of his heritage, plus an enriching experience in two differing culutral heritages. The result is that a child is equipped to celebrate his own life and to genuinely celebrate the life of his culturally-different brother. Also he learns the "thinking styles" of other socio-cultural groups.

Each class is specially planned to have students representing Anglo, Negro, and Latin backgrounds, plus a wide range of economic and social backgrounds, so that a cross-fertilization of ideas and experiences may be shared. Each teaching team represents the Spanish and English languages, and shared leadership by persons by at least two ethnic groups.

The interaction of the parents of the students is fostered through the Advisory Council, parents meetings, and volunteer service in behalf of the school (such as working on equipment, helping with field trips, representing the school to interested groups, etc.)

A genuinely human community is a goal of Dos Mundos, which is closely akin to our understanding of the Kingdom of God on earth.

Operational Facts

The School is officially sponsored by the Coastal Bend Christian Service Association, Inc., which is a mission-orientated arm of the South Texas Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church, U. S1; the Roman Catholic Diocese of Corpus Christi; and the Corpus Christi District Board of Missions of the United Methodist Church. The Dos Mundos School is the first major project of CBCSA. (Other projects will be undertaken, such as Leisure-Inner City Ministry.)

The Early School (Phase 1) has 58 students (with a maximum of 60 students). Twenty students have English as the first language; 16 students have Spanish as the first language; and 22 students have some ability in both

languages. Ten families have two students enrolled in the Early School, making 48 families served through the program. Nearly all of the families live within the immediate area of the school, which is located in the Education Building of Oak Park United Methodist Church, 878 Oak Park Drive, Corpus Christi.

The students are charged a \$2.00 per week tuition. A second child from the same family is charged \$1.00 per week. Seven students are given "grants-in-aid." Every family served by the School has given something toward the cost.

Thirteen students are participating in Phase 2, with three leaders. This program has made the difference with several of these students on whether they would stay in school or not.

In Phase 1, there are five teachers, four aides, one secretary, one social worker, one director, one janitor, and seven regular volunteers who give a morning a week. An Advisory Council, composed of parents, persons knowledgeable in early education, and other interested persons from the community at large, have given enrichment to the program and provided the volunteer services which are vital to the School.

\$5,000.00 REQUESTED FOR USE AS FOLLOWS:

The program of the School will be significantly expanded beginning in the Summer of 1969. A special summer program (not duplicating the activities of the City Recreation Department) will be offered. Young people from the Voluntary Service Call of the United Methodist Church and the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. will be on hand to assist. In September, 1969, one or more satellite schools operating under the Dos Mundos central "model" will be held in the Corpus Christi area. Already, in-service training will be required for the Voluntary Service Personnel and the on-going staff of Dos Mundos Central and Satellite Schools. A teacher-training facility is demanded by the current and projected needs of Dos Mundos; plus persons specially equipped to work in bi-lingual, early education are urgently needed for the nation. No such top-flight facility is currently available. At this point, CBCSA is exploring some sort of formal relationship with a university, such as USC, Univ. of Michigan, Our Lady of the Lake, Bucknell Univ., Teacher's College of Columbia Univ., Austin College, or Del Mar Jr. College.

Two specific requests are being made of the Southwest Texas Annual Conference:

1. \$3,000 for the operation of Dos Mundos during the 1969-70 school year. The money is needed for:
 - a. Board and Room (\$50 per month) for the Voluntary Service Personnel and subsistence salary (\$30 per month) for them.
 - b. Salary for the Supervisor of Phase 1 (Sister Norma Rosa Garcia, who is a specialist in bi-lingual education). She will take a major share in the in-service training of Phase 1 staff.
 - c. Provide 10 grants-in-aid to children from economically-deprived homes.
 - d. Expand Phase 2 and begin Phase 3.

This grant is essential to the operation of the basic program!

2. \$2,000 as "seed money" for the establishment of satellite schools in the Corpus Christi area. Two United Methodist Churches have made serious inquiry thus far in terms of hosting a satellite school. Specific guidelines for the satellite schools have been prepared. The financial obligations for the satellite schools must be borne by the hosting agency. This grant will assist one or more of our churches to participate in this program.

REPORT NUMBER 17

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Having given very little concern towards the planning program for the Conference Commission on Worship, and having no formal organization, I thought to emphasize some of the recommendations outlined in the Book of Discipline, with a point or two emphasizing the need for using these.

Hoping this meets your approval we suggest the following:

Our duties as a Conference Commission on Worship according to (Paragraph 1387) The BOOK of DISCIPLINE of THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH are:

- a. To promote the interest of worship within the conference.
- b. To foster the use of the best resources for worship at conference meetings and in all of the churches in the conference.
- c. To promote the use of The BOOK of WORSHIP for CHURCH and HOME and THE METHODIST HYMNAL in the churches of the conference.
- d. To plan and promote seminars and demonstrations on ways of worship and the use of hymns, within the bounds of the conference.
- e. To provide exhibits at the conference sessions in such fields as architecture, church appointments, etc.
- f. To cooperate with the Board of Education and the National Fellowship of Methodist Musicians of The United Methodist Church, in developing standards governing the work of local church directors, ministers, and associates of music and music assistants in advancing their work in this field within the church. This can be done through seminars and all other conferences on church music.

There is much truth in the statement, that "the Black Church has much to offer towards the renewal and revitalization of Methodism. This is perhaps true because we still have that fervent spirit of the soul alive within us. We give outward and perhaps inward expression to what we feel deep down. But let us not mislead ourselves nor be misled in thinking that we can do without the Christian religion. For Christ was a teacher of men, dealing with their minds as well as their hearts.

We must seek a blending of the vigorous spirit from those of us in the Black Church, with the keen mind of our brothers who are white. So that our merger which will take place will include a merging of head and heart, as well as conferences and congregations.

Therefore, let us make the best use possible of all the resources at our command to be prepared to fully participate at every level as we work, worship, and live together as one people in Christ reconciled.

REPORT NUMBER 18

BOARD OF MINISTRY

Following its annual meeting on May 9, 1969 at East St. Paul United Methodist Church, San Antonio, Texas, the Board of Ministry recommends the following:

1. "That all eligible Lay Pastors attend the Courses of Study School to be held at Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas summer 1969, registration blanks to be secured from the district superintendents. It has been agreed that the Reverend J. Garfield Owens will be added to the staff of the Perkins School to serve as Counselor and Tutor as needed.
2. That the Conference Program Council plan and conduct:
 - a. A Lay Pastors workshop to be held October 1969.
 - b. A Conference-Wide Ministers Retreat for inspiration, fellowship and spiritual renewal in December 1969.
3. That the Conference Program Council Director, assist the Conference Secretary and the Registrar of the Board of Ministry in implementing paragraph 665.14 of the 1968 Book of Discipline regarding "a record of the educational history and interests of each minister serving in the conference."
4. That the Conference Program Council explore, with power to act according, the possible participation of the ministers of our conference in the experimental (pilot) project, involving Counseling for

Ministers, being projected by the Southwest Texas Conference Program Council upon the recommendation of that Conference's Board of Ministry.

5. "The 1968 General Conference established a national Ministerial Education Fund to be supported by all the local churches, this fund to begin January 1, 1970. This fund is to be apportioned to the annual conferences by the Council on World Service and Finance on the basis of two per cent of the total paid for all purposes by the churches in each conference in the third year of the previous quadrennium, excluding payments to World Service, conference benevolences, Advance specials, New buildings, and the servicing of debts." The apportionment for the West Texas Conference is \$10,329. One-fourth of this amount will be retained in our conference for appropriate use by the Board of Ministry. The remaining three-fourths will be divided as follows:
 - a. Seventy-five per cent to Perkins and St. Paul's Schools of Theology.
 - b. The remaining amount to the Department of Ministry, Division of Higher Education, Board of Education, the United Methodist Church.

On the basis of the above information and facts, the Board took the following action:

That the conference support the Ministerial Education Fund. The amount of \$5,000 is to be placed in the conference budget for the conference year 1969-1970, representing approximately 5/12 of the total amount expected.

6. That the Conference Program Council in cooperation with the Board of Ministry study very carefully part 6, "Recruitment for the Ministry," of NEXT STEPS FOR THE WEST TEXAS CONFERENCE IN PREPARATION FOR CONFERENCE MERGERS, by James H. Davis of the Department of Research and Survey, National Division, Board of Missions, The United Methodist Church. Particular attention should be given to the following suggestion:

"An active recruitment program is a "must." . . . Perhaps the West Texas Conference needs to prod a national agency, such as the Commission on Religion and Race to provide such a recruitment program. At any rate a realistic, active program of ministerial recruitment needs to be established as quickly as possible . . ."

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That District Superintendent and Ministers make the 1969-1970 Lay Academy for Men and Women a Volitive Concern.
2. That Lay Workshop Program through November need some help, therefore the Conference Board of Laity ask for a loan of \$400 for this period from the World Service and Finance Division.
3. That local churches plan Every Member Visitation using General Board and the Conference Board of Laity personnel before completing these Visitation Programs.

REPORT NUMBER 19

REPORT NUMBER 20

THE REPORT ON THE PROGRAM COUNCIL

A hastily organized Program Council and a completely "green" Program Director have functioned with as much effectiveness as possible during this 1968-69 Conference year. We did not know what we were intended to do . . . not to mention how to do it. Again and again we read paragraphs 841 and 842 in The Book of Discipline . . . the confusion and frustration compounded. The Program Director expresses sincere appreciation to the Program Council for support given and to the Council Chairman for his patience and understanding.

The Program Council met three times . . . August 28 in Austin, December 2 in San Antonio, and March 15 in Waco. The Chairman of Boards met for an additional meeting on May 9. The Convention of Boards on December 2 provided an opportunity for the Boards to organize in accordance with any new legislation applicable to a particular Board. We had an excellent attendance, and the Boards are organized and functioning.

The Quadrennial Emphasis, "A New Church For A New World", seeking renewal of the church through three simultaneous interrelated responses of significant witness presents a definite challenge.

THE WORD . . . using "The Sermon on the Mount" as the specific area of study with the hope that this would be only a prelude to a fresh study of all the teachings of Jesus as well as the complete Gospel record.

THE WORK . . . Every effort being made to help each local church to make those structural changes which will help it to be most effective in its work of planning and participating in mission.

THE WORLD . . . A \$20,000,000. Fund For Reconciliation and United Methodist Voluntary Service

Ministers have had an opportunity to share in an in depth study of "The Sermon on the Mount". Most of them used the Lenten Season as an opportunity to bring sermons based on "The Sermon on the Mount", and many have led their congregations in serious study using the recommended books. Continued study is urgently recommended.

Many of our churches are organized according to the "new structure", others are in the process, and others have yet to begin. It is recognized that undue haste is not the best approach but that clear understandings and directions are needed to make the re-organization most effective.

The Program Council was given the promotional responsibility in connection with the Fund for Reconciliation. The four Districts report pledges well over \$40,000.00. Our Conference goal was \$33,000.00. The latest church wide figures are as follows:

Demonial goal for 1968-72: \$20,000.00.

Pledge goals accepted by 37 of 45 Episcopal Areas: \$22,007,000.

Amount actually pledged to date: \$13,067,500.

The Projects Committee will report later in this presentation. This group organized on February 5 in Dallas and elected Lavallo Lowe, Jr. to the Chairmanship.

The Program Council has not been swamped with program recommendations from the Boards or from the local churches. We have had some dialogue and feel that we have caught something of the spirit of the Boards regarding what we should be about during this last year. Our recommendations, therefore, will be of a general nature keeping in mind that the Program Council will work with Boards in developing and promoting specific programs. Neither the recommendations of the calendar will reflect all that we hope to give careful attention to during this year. Because we stand in a unique position as a Conference it is well that we program to needs as they become apparent during this transition period. Recommendations are as follows:

1. That in accordance with paragraph 1109, The Book of Discipline, the Director of Education become a member of the Program Council staff with responsibilities as described in paragraph 1109.

2. District Program Councils be organized to coordinate programs within the district.

3. The Texas Methodist of the Southwest Texas, Central Texas, North Texas, and Northwest Texas Conferences be circulated in the churches of the West Texas Conference falling within the geographical bounds of these Conferences with a West Texas Conference member assigned to the reporting staff of these several papers.

4. Every church in the Conference set October 1 as the deadline for completing United Methodist structural changes with the Program Council providing help during the months of July, August, and September where needed and requested.

5. That a Conference supported Lay Pastor's Workshop be conducted in October.

6. That during the 1969-70 Conference year as specific opportunities for payments to be made on pledges to the Fund for Reconciliation.

7. That the period September 28 through Neovember 2, 1969 be designated as Together Emphasis Month. This is in keeping with a churchwide call to stimulate Together's circulation and readership.

8. That the Committee on Publishing Interests will develop plans to acquaint the Conference with the publications of all of the Boards and Agencies.

9. That we take advantage of every opportunity to cooperate across Conference lines during this year, and that we initiate as well as cooperate and participate.

10. That District budget committees seriously consider providing ample funds in the District budgets to support the District Secretaries and other District workers as they participate in leadership training opportunities.

REPORT NUMBER 21

HISTORY

**St. Paul United Methodist Church
 Columbus, Texas
 1866 - 1969**

In the year of 1866, St. Paul Methodist Church was organized and erected as a part of the Mississippi Conference under Bishop Matthew Simpson. The Ministers spear-headed the leadership of the Church at that time were: Revs. W. Welch, B. F. Williams and M. S. Jordan. The trustees during the organization and erection of St. Paul were: B. Norman, E. Toller, W. Hunter and E. Eason.

The Texas Conference was organized from the Mississippi Conference which included the entire state of Texas. The West Texas Conference which is our present conference, was organized under the leadership of Bishop

Thomas Bowman in Austin, Texas on January 23, 1874 at Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church.

St. Paul was host to the Annual Conference in 1975 and it is interesting to note that it has entertained six other Annual Conferences.

St. Paul was once the leading and largest church in the Columbus District. The District later became known as the Victoria District, and is now known as the Austin-Victoria District.

St. Paul was rebuilt and the first Colored Windows were used during the pastorate of Rev. M. S. Jordan. The church was also remodeled under the leadership of Rev. Wormely. Other Ministers who gave untiring services were: Rev. Hutchinson, J. W. Stone, D. F. Vance, W. E. Maye.

In 1928 under the leadership of Rev. George Waters, St. Paul was remodeled again.

In 1932 during the pastorate of Rev. C. H. McCutchin, St. Paul was blown down by a storm. From the best pieces of lumber that were left, a tabernacle was erected for church services. At the following Annual Conference, Rev. McCutchin was moved from St. Paul.

Rev. M. A. Freeman who succeeded Rev. McCutchin, raised the first funds for the rebuilding of the church. Rev. O. B. Coe followed Rev. Freeman as pastor.

Rev. J. J. Hardeman, a very inspired minister was sent by the Annual Conference to the pastorate of this church, and through his untiring efforts, St. Paul's walls began to come up in 1938, and the church began to take on its present form. The members soon had a nice building in which to worship and serve God. Before the church was completed, Rev. Hardeman was moved to another church.

His successor was Rev. C. W. Franklin whose leadership led to the present parsonage of St. Paul Methodist Church. Under Rev. Franklin, the W.S.C.S. was organized in the church. The late Mrs. Henrietta Wright was our first president, and its organization the Society has worked side by side with the church in every way possible.

Rev. B. A. Byars was the next pastor to come. He was followed by the late Rev. S. H. Harvey who first instituted the idea of getting a loan and donation from the Board of Missions and Church Extension. Rev. Harvey passed away before his idea could become a reality.

Rev. L. D. Washington, Associate pastor of Trinity Methodist Church, Houston, replaced Rev. Harvey during the middle of the Conference year, through his leadership, the church was successful in getting the \$2,500 from the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Methodist. A \$5,000 loan secured from the Columbus Bank. The present church and the interior of the parsonage was renovated under the dynamic leadership of this young energetic pastor.

St. Paul made wonderful progress under the leadership of Rev. LaValle Lowe, Jr. who succeeded Rev. Washington. It was under his leadership that the building fund indebtedness was cleared up; the Officials saw need of his type of leadership and service some place else and was sent to answer the call.

He was succeeded by Rev. John W. Elliott, Sr. Under his leadership the indebtedness of the pews was cleared up. The Church program was revised greatly. Renovation of the church kitchen and parsonage was made. Many new members were added to the church with the greatest number of them being youth.

At the resignation of Rev. Elliott, Rev. Mason Johnson was sent to St. Paul from a charge in San Antonio. Under Rev. Johnson's leadership, 52 members were united with St. Paul. Three hundred new hymnals were purchased, a new piano, a mimeograph machine and many other necessary equipments were purchased. He began the preparation of a scroll for the purpose of bearing names of those members who had paved the way and passed on, and those who are living and working today in St. Paul.

The West Texas Annual Conference held in May 1968 sent Rev. C. J. Houston to St. Paul. He came from Gonzales, a charge on the San Antonio District. After being at St. Paul for only a short while, Rev. Houston found that the church had grown so much that there was a great need for expansion; he got busy, called the Board of Trustees together and then the

entire church for the purpose of voting for the purchasing of one lot and ½ joining the church property at a cost of \$3,500.00 and the membership already has almost \$2,000.00 on hand to pay for the property.

It was during the 1968 General Conference held in Dallas, Texas that it became known and final that the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church had united, and now under the leadership of Rev. Houston, the Methodist Church's name was changed to The United Methodist Church, which is the reason why this history is headed St. Paul United Methodist Church.

We thank thee God for this great, wide, wonderful world; with the wonderful waters round you curled, and the wonderful grass upon your breast, World you are beautifully dressed.

The wonderful air is over me, and the wonderful wind is shaking the trees — It walks on the water and whirls the mills, and talks to itself on the top of the hills.

You are friendly earth, how far do you go, with the wheat fields that nod and the rivers that flow, with cities and gardens, and cliffs and isles, and people upon you for thousands of miles. Oh! you are so great, and I am so small, I tremble to think of you world at all; And, yet, when I said my prayers today, a whisper inside me seemed to say, "You are more than the earth, though you are such a dot; You can love and think and the earth cannot."

CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in annual Conference relations in New Orleans, La., December 25, 1865, by Bishop Edward Thompson. The Conference then organized included Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas, and was named the "Mississippi Mission Conference." Three annual sessions of this Conference was held and in January, 1867, the Texas Conference was organized out of the Mississippi Mission Conference, which included the entire State of Texas. There were eight annual sessions of the Texas Conference held, and it was during the eighth session of the Conference, held at Marshall, Texas, January 7, 1874, that the "West Texas Conference" was organized, with Bishop Thomas Bowman, President.

The ministers comprising the West Texas Conference were called to meet in Wesley Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church in Austin, Texas, January 22, 1874. Those present at the organization were: G. W. Honey, Jacob Miller, Mack Henson, Daniel Gregory, Samuel Allen, W. O. Sheety, Larkin Carper, Archie Johnson, J. T. Hill, T. T. Leach, T. G. Lacy, Alex Campbell, London Morris, Isaac Wright, Cyrus Hackett, Daniel Harper, and Charles Scruggs. All have finished their labors.

This Conference to date has four districts, 103 Pastoral Appointments, and a school that is a credit to the denomination, viz., Huston - Tillotson College, located at Austin, Texas.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE RULES**1. Nominations**

The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and **annual boards**, commissions, and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.

2. Limits

No member of the Conference shall be permitted to serve upon more than two of the major Conference Boards, except where the Discipline shall provide otherwise. Special effort should be made to place every Conference member upon at least one Board. All vacancies occurring on any Board or Committee shall be filled according to the provisions in rule 1.

3. Lay Representation

Lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.

4. Conference Program

A program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a planning Committee made up of the resident bishop, all district Superintendents,

the host-Pastor, the chairman of major boards, the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education, the Secretary of the Conference, the President of the WSCS and the Conference Lay Leader.

This committee shall have the responsibility for the planning and printing of the annual Conference Program—to be paid for by the Annual Conference.

5. Reports and Resolutions

All reports and resolutions intended for publication in the conference journal shall be typewritten and submitted in triplicate to the Conference Secretary.

6. District Board of the Ministry

The District Board of the Ministry examining local preachers shall consist of five traveling elders in the district.

The names of the District Board shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

7. Pastors Reports

All Pastors' reports to the Conference Treasurer and Conference Statistician shall be turned in at least fifteen days before the dates set for the meeting of the Annual Conference.

8. Determining Correct Age of Pastors

Where there are two conflicting dates in a Minister's Service Record, the Conference will accept the first date given as the correct age.

9. Any Pastor officiating at the funeral of a minister or a minister's wife, or widow shall be required to send a program to the Conference Secretary, and the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions.

10. Additional rules may be added to this list and these present may be amended or deleted by order of the Annual Conference.

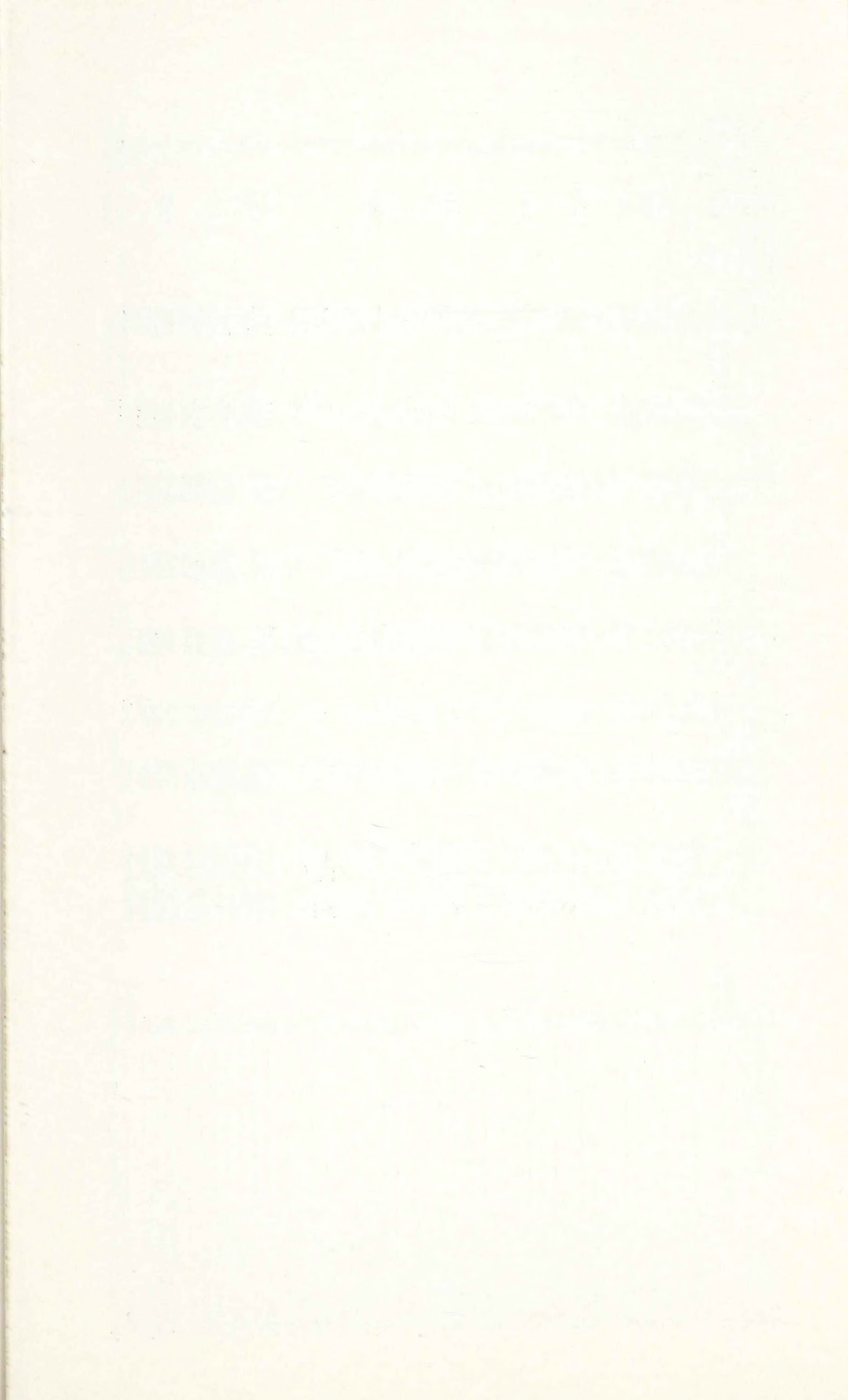
